Barn wedding centers create zoning issue

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A series of seemingly innocent steps taken by Clay County to regulate rural event centers such as

barns for weddings has led to what one county commissioner is calling a “train wreck” as he pursues an unusual solution to the problem.

At the Nov. 10 meeting of the Board of

County Commissioners (the regular meeting was moved to Nov. 10 because of the Nov. 8 presidential election), commissioners heard from representatives from both sides of an issue that deals with what is

being called “rural event centers.”

One side, consisting of a quiet neighborhood along County Road 214 in the Mel-

Two years after ‘the fog’

City recovering from suicide contagion

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – At age 44, Kevin Mobley has buried both of his sons.

Mobley’s twin sons, Austin and Dakota “DJ” Mobley, were born premature. Together, the two boys weighed less than a bag of sugar. Austin passed away six days after birth and was cremated, but DJ clung to life.

In the next 15 years, DJ grew into the impression of

Kevin, a 23-year veteran paramedic-firefighter whom DJ undoubtedly admired. DJ joined the Explorers Club at the Keystone Heights Volunteer Fire Department and learned

rose area, doesn't want a rural event center – in this case, a barn for weddings – in their nature-oriented backyard. The other side – the family that wants to establish such a business – says it has followed all the county's rules and sunk its life savings into their dream, and are now left with a battle on their hands.

"It's been a train wreck," said Commissioner Buck Burney, who represents the district in which the problem exists.

The situation can be traced back to an amendment to an ordinance which would allow such things as barns for weddings in agricultural areas. The amendment would require the applicant to satisfy "conditional use" regulations, instead of having to apply for a total rezoning.

The problem came up because a conditional use change does not require the same type of notification to those residents who might be affected by the conditional use as a rezoning does. Rezoning notifications are quite comprehensive, while a conditional change notice simply calls for a legal notice to be placed in the newspaper – the type of item that most people don't read or are so complicated and full of legalese they are difficult to understand, said Burney.

So Burney, who says he understands both sides, has come up with what can only be called an unusual solution to the problem.

"We've got to find them another piece of property, and that's what we're trying to do now," he said Nov. 14.

Burney's idea calls for residents of the neighborhood that are affected to come up with about \$175,000 to \$200,000 that would be used to purchase the property in question. The owners of the property would then be able to take that money and purchase another piece of property for their business.

"That would be a win-win for everybody," Burney said.

County money would not be involved, Burney said, adding that some residents have already come forward with the funds.

The dilemma the county, the neighborhood and the business owners now find themselves in can be traced back to more than a year ago, when the subject of businesses in rural areas first came to the fore. A longtime resident came to the county saying he and his wife wanted to rent out their existing barn for weddings to supplement their retirement income, but wanted to make sure they were following all the rules before they really got the business in full gear.

With such weddings becoming more popular, the county staff said they had

been questioned by others interested in the same thing, but added the county really had nothing to deal with the issue. Eventually, after discussions with the Planning Commission and the BCC, it was decided that regulations for rural events in areas zoned agricultural or agricultural/residential would fall under "conditional use," and would not require a total rezoning.

"We wanted to keep it simple," said Diane Hutchings, BCC chairman.

But for Russell and Rhiannon Myers, another couple that wants to establish a barn-wedding business, the situation has turned out to be anything but simple.

After hiring attorneys from Rogers Towers in Jacksonville and consulting with them and the county every step of the way to make sure they were following all the rules, the Myers found themselves in the midst of a neighborhood that didn't know until just a few weeks ago that the business was coming into their area and – more than that – didn't want it, the Myers said at the Nov. 10 BCC meeting.

"From Day 1 we have made this clear. We have not tried to hide anything," said Rhiannon Myers, a lifelong resident of Clay County who said she and her husband purchased the property for his plans to retire.

"We had a dream to start our own business – something we wanted to be able to pass along to the kids," she said. "You can rest assured, everybody, that it's not this

There will be no festivals, no concerts, no bar or eating establishments.

"An honest barn wedding (business) is our only intention," said Russell Myers.

Plans for the approximate 15 total acres call for five acres to be used for the barn-wedding business. It involves building a 5,000-square-foot "barn" that would include the area for a wedding reception, bathrooms, a kitchen to support caterers (it will only have a refrigerator, a microwave and an ice maker), a concrete outdoor pad that will seat 250 in white folding chairs for the actual ceremony and a parking lot that is being designed by arborists to ensure the large oak trees are as protected as possible. There will be no outdoor sound system, the Myers said, and a natural buffer remains to separate the event center from the neighborhood.

But nearby residents, who nearly filled the commission chambers Nov. 10, said they feared for their quiet, nature-oriented neighborhood. Fragile ecosystems and animals, lifelong dreams of forever homes and

their beloved lifestyles are being threatened by the proposed business, they said. And they didn't even know it was coming until just recently.

Calling the situation the result of "unintended consequences," resident Jinny Fonvielle said, "We're not opposed to anyone making a living but we are opposed to a commercial venture coming into our neighborhood unannounced."

Others said property values would also be affected, and while they did due diligence to make sure their forever homes were not in an area that would support threatening zoning, they were facing the prospect of just such a thing.

"This is our nightmare," said one resident.

Burney said he is hoping to have a solution to the problem by the Nov. 22 BCC meeting. The Myers have been "very gracious" in agreeing to wait until that meeting to see if a solution can be reached, he said, and several neighbors have stepped forward with the funds to purchase the Myers' property.

All that remains is to find a piece of property that will suit the Myers' needs, Burney said.

With that in mind, he has been meeting with potential property owners in the area and searching for suitable sites, while en-

couraging others to do the same.

Hutchings, who also called the Myers "gracious" in their agreeing to wait to see what happens, said she hopes a solution can be found, and added, "I think we need to go back and look at the ordinance."

Commissioner Wayne Bolla agreed, saying he sees the situation as "two distinct issues," with one being the current problem and the other a "broader perspective of a county problem or a county issue that we need to maybe tweak this ordinance a little bit so that we don't have this 10 times over again the next couple of years."

Bolla advised the staff to be "thinking about" how to fix the problem.

County Commissioner Wendell Davis, in his last BCC meeting after eight years of service, advised that the two new commissioners who will come on board at the Nov. 22 meeting (Vice Chairman Ronnie Robinson will also be replaced) be given all the information they need about the situation so they can make an informed decision.

"There's a lot of history here," he said.

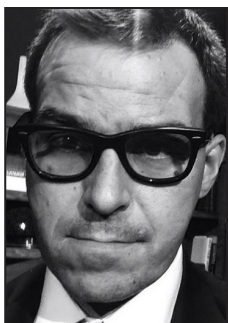
In the northeastern part of Florida, one high-profile state Senate race was in doubt almost to the end.

The Senate District 8 slugfest between Democrat Rod Smith and the Election Night winner, Republican Keith Perry, was the marquee matchup and a boon, via advertising, for mass media companies.

Perry narrowly won, 119,284 to 107,394 – a margin of 52 to 48 percent.

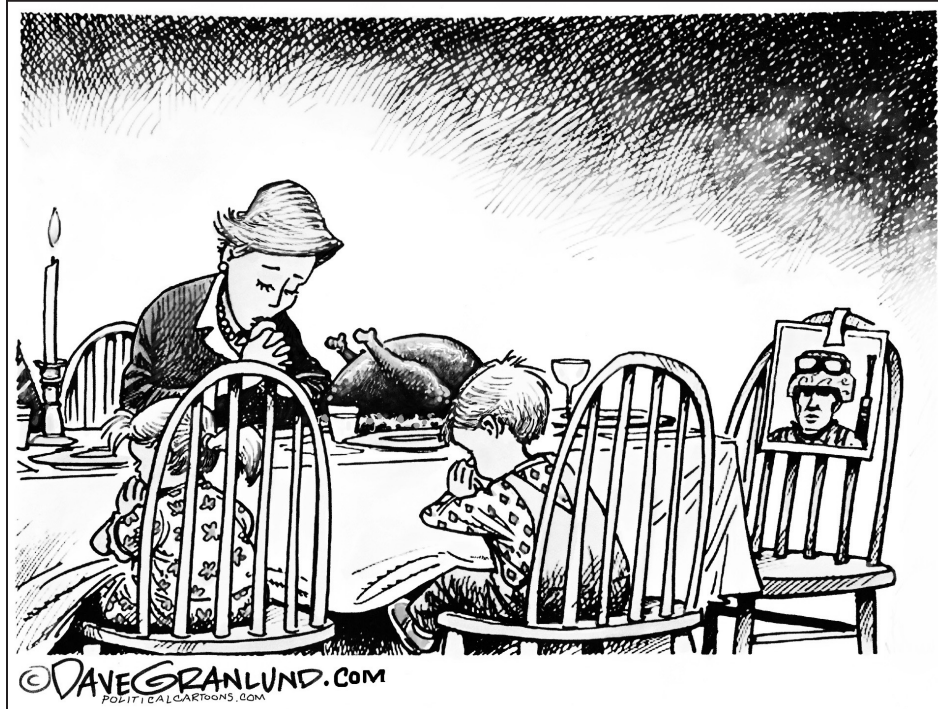
Polls showed as the race progressed, momentum was moving to Perry. And that momentum was helped along by timely ads, running in heavy rotation through Election Day, from the Florida Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee.

Virtually anyone who is anyone in the Florida Senate gave serious money to the FRSCC (for example, "Friends of Dana Young," which gave the committee a mil-

5 Years Ago, 2011

- The Clay County Health Department issued a 60-day rabies alert after finding a dog had tested positive for rabies in Middleburg near County Road 218.

- Clay County was one of 12 Florida counties to share a \$1.6 million grant to enhance voting by mail for overseas and military families as part of a coalition called "Our Mission: Your Vote."

- Officials from the Town of Orange Park and the Historical Society of Orange Park broke ground on a Veterans Memorial at the front entrance to Magnolia Cemetery on Kingsley Avenue.

10 Years Ago, 2006

- Clay County School Superintendent David Owens assured parents from two schools that no schools would be closing after the school board decided to slow down development of a concurrency plan.

- Residents filled the county commissioners' meeting room and two other rooms in the County Administration Building opposing a Board of County Commissioners' proposal to implement mandatory solid waste collection county wide. It was approved 4-0, with one commissioner absent.

- Keystone Heights Mayor Mary Lou Hildreth asked the Clay County Legislative Delegation to fund a new community center for the city.

20 Years Ago, 1996

- Green Cove Springs residents celebrated the opening of the new Winn Dixie store just north of the city on U.S. Highway 17.

- Keystone Heights Mayor Archie Green said the \$1 a day fine for code enforcement violators was too low arguing it was easier to pay the fine rather than clean up the violation. He proposed a \$100 a day fine.

- After taking possession of the Keystone Heights Cemetery, city council voted in a \$35 permitting fee for each burial.

30 Years Ago, 1986

- After weeks of contentious debate on whether he should be a contractor or an employee, Orange Park Town Council voted 3-2 to renew the contract for Town Manager Larry Myers.

- Orange Park High Latin teacher Cheryl Hendry threatened to resign if the school moved forward with a planned fundraising event where donors would kiss a pig. She said the event would put undue stress on the animal.

- Seeking to fill a \$1.2 million budget shortfall, the Clay Board of County Commissioners voted to raise from \$5 to \$10 the fee charged to garbage haulers.

Race set to race funds for new playground

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Clay County runners have a chance to help replace a 20-year-old playground to help keep students fit and healthy.

The Inaugural Reindeer Run 5K run/walk, scheduled for Dec. 10 at 8 a.m., is open to all runners and walkers and wheelchairs and baby strollers are permitted. Race proceeds will go to pay for a new playground at McRae Elementary School just north of Keystone Heights.

The 5K starts and finishes on Lawrence Boulevard in front of City Hall at 555 South Lawrence Blvd. in downtown Keystone Heights. The well-shaded course winds through the neighborhoods surrounding the city. Water stations will be located at mile 1, mile 2.25, and the start and finish area.

Registration and checks can be mailed or dropped off at McRae Elementary, State Road 315C, Keystone Heights, Fla. 32656 Attention: Reindeer Run

No bikes, skates, skate shoes, skateboards or scooters are allowed. Registration is \$20 through Nov. 30, but it jumps to \$25 through Dec. 9. Race day registration is \$30. Refunds are not available.

Official race timing services will be provided by PRS Race Timing. Race timing chips for shoes will be provided by PRS Race Timing and must be returned after the race. All runners and walkers must have an entry number to participate in the event, which begins at 8 a.m. The roads will reopen at 9:30 a.m.

The first 150 registrations will receive a t-shirt while late & race day entrants are not guaranteed a t-shirt.

Race packets will be available for pick up at City Hall, 555 South Lawrence Blvd. on Dec. 9 from 5-7 p.m. and race day, Dec. 10 from 6:30-7:30 a.m. Awards will be given to the top winners of the various age categories at the conclusion of the race.

Parking is available at Natural Park, across from City Hall, or Keystone Beach. Runners are asked not to park along Lawrence Boulevard.

lion dollars from October to Nov. 3). But one committee – "Working for Florida's Families," the committee of Sen. Rob Bradley – stands out in the Senate District 8 race.

All State bound

Percussionist one of Florida's best

OAKLEAF – Mike Summers proudly carries with him on his smartphone a photo of his son Nathan showing the then-toddler holding a new drumstick.

“This is the reason why he is playing percussion,” Summers said. “From that moment on, I could see this is a natural gift. There’s a correct way to hold a drumstick and if a college professor saw that little kid hold [it], he would say, “That’s the correct way to hold a drumstick.””

Summers said his son, whom he teaches in his role as band director at Oakleaf Junior High, would go on to practice the drums using a practice pad.

“Ever since I was younger, I’ve always wanted to play the drums,” said Nathan Summers, now 12.

Years of practice and sharpening of his percussion skills since fourth grade have paid off for the seventh grade student as he was recently selected as one of only seven percussionists in Florida – and the only Clay County student – who will play in January in Tampa as part of the 2016-17 All State Middle School Band.

“If you’re selected for the All State Band, you’re considered one of the best musicians in the state of Florida and, for a percussionist, it’s a difficult process,” Summers said.

Living with the burden Sisters remain active in spite of having juvenile diabetes

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — At a glance, Kaylin and Trinity Hoffmann appear completely different.

Trinity enjoys the rigors of softball and cheerleading while Kaylin prefers the quaint beauty of photography and drama club.

The one area the sisters intersect on

throughout the night and day and after every meal when they must inject themselves with insulin.

Kaylin and Trinity live with type 1 diabetes, an autoimmune disease in which a person's pancreas stops producing insulin, the hormone that enables people to get energy from food. Type 1 diabetes strikes both children and adults at any age and develops suddenly, causing patients to de-

pend on insulin injections to mitigate the disease.

There is currently no cure.

The American Diabetes Foundation estimates roughly 1.25 million live with type 1 diabetes nationwide. November is National Diabetes Awareness Month, a time when many living with the disease attempt to educate others on the burdens and dangers the disease brings.

Sarah Hoffmann, the sisters' mother, still remembers the moment Kaylin, her eldest daughter, was diagnosed.

Kaylin, who was two at the time, persistently dozed off and refused to eat drink. Sarah knew something was wrong and took her to their family doctor to run some tests.

"I didn't know what to do when the doctor told me," Sarah said. "He said 'I know

containers of flowering plants could line Lawrence Boulevard.

It's part of an aggressive initiative called Streetscape 2020 to indicate the year in which the city hopes it's completed.

In a TownScan Survey completed earlier this year, residents reviewed scenes of city streetscapes, landscaping, public spaces, pathways, signage, and other elements of urban design. Using electronic polling devices, they indicated whether they felt the subjects of the images would be appropriate for Lawrence Boulevard, rating them from 1 (Not My Vision!) to 3

(Indifferent) to 5 (Yes, My Vision!). While showing the results to the room, the facilitator asked for volunteers to say what they liked and didn't like about the images.

Keystone Heights Mayor Tony Brown has been thinking about this vision for the city's downtown area streetscape for the past few years. The city has been actively working on it for the last eight months.

His vision also encompasses ensuring pedestrian safety along Lawrence Boulevard, making businesses more visible and having the town "go green" with solar streetlights.

But it was cars that first inspired Brown.

"It all started with parking issues," Brown said. "Businesses weren't accesible

because of the parking."

To begin sketching out the possibilities, Keystone Heights hired Michael Baker International, an engineering company, to collect data on the initiative, conduct an analysis and then produce sketches and recommendations for the streetscape plan.

The company presented its plans to business owners and residents this fall.

The group brainstormed about new ideas and the company will present its final plan in the next few months.

Deborah Etheridge, an employee at Mallard's Dollarama, located smack in the middle of downtown, said she believes the streetscape plan will improve business.

"I think just slowing down traffic will help everything out," Etheridge said.

Etheridge is optimistic about the plan Brown has in store knowing the benefits it will have, especially with parking.

"I'm excited to see what they have in store for the city, they have been planning this for years now," Etheridge said.

The city is currently looking for grants from state and federal sources to keep the plan in motion.

Even business owners who aren't as up-to-date about the Streetscape 2020 plans are excited.

The manager of Locker Room, Elise Moore, didn't attend the meeting with the engineering service, so she isn't sure of the specifics but still is anticipating positive changes.

"I don't really know anything about it," Moore said. "But, it's always nice to have something beautiful in your town."

Brown also said there are plans to install signs guiding people to open parking lots. The on-street parking will also be configured differently to allow drivers greater visibility when turning onto Lawrence Boulevard from side streets.

With decorative lights, shrubbery and much more, Brown has high hopes for what this town will look like.

"I think it's going to be big excitement," he said.

how to fight fires with his dad. Kevin describes DJ as a gregarious boy who was popular with girls and endlessly compassionate with animals. But as DJ passed puberty, he grew increasingly distant, quiet and frustrated.

He became further isolated when an incident with an airsoft gun resulted in his dismissal from Keystone Heights Junior-Senior High. School officials moved DJ to the Clay County School District's alternative school, Bannerman Learning Center in Green Cove Springs, where he had no friends.

In the early morning hours of February 19, 2014, Kevin discovered DJ had taken his life just a month before his 16th birthday.

The news of his death filtered through Keystone Heights Junior-Senior High. Kevin's marriage dissolved after DJ's death. The house Kevin built for his family grew quiet, uncomfortable and cold, so he took on projects to keep himself busy, away. He sold his house a year later and moved up the street.

Kevin said packing boxes of DJ's personal affects was cathartic.

"I had to find out what I wanted to keep, what I needed to keep," Kevin said. "I wanted him to be remembered, but I didn't want [the new house] to be a shrine."

All the while, Mobley experienced visions at night of what he'd seen the morning he found his son.

"It was a hard hit to the whole community," Kevin said.

The next month, then-13-year-old Alexandria Pace, DJ's girlfriend, died by suicide in a similar manner. The events led Clay

County School District officials to believe the children had reached a suicide pact – until more reports of suicidal thoughts among students bubbled up.

After a string of suicides, attempts and deaths among students and residents during the 2013-2014 school year, Keystone Heights became the epicenter of a suicide contagion. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, a contagion occurs when "a group of suicides or suicide attempts, or both, that occur closer together in time and space than would normally be expected in a given community."

"What does occur is called a 'point cluster,' that means students die by suicide in the same geographic location in a short period of time, and it's very well known that teenagers are the most likely group to imitate suicidal behavior," said Scott Poland, co-director of the Suicide and Violence Prevention Office at Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale.

"We are all finding it at the middle school and high school level and the effect seems to be greater than ever before and I'll use the analogy it's like throwing a rock into a pond."

Roughly 60 children were hospitalized under the Baker Act by September 2014. The fire department rescued one child in particular by cutting "something" off his neck. One child lived "because the tree branch broke," said one official.

The number of Keystone Heights residents evaluated under the Baker Act between 2013-14 rose 43 percent from the year before. The number of residents undergoing the psychiatric examination process every year since has yet to drop.

In an open letter to the Clay County School Board, then-principal Susan Sailor verified the severity of the contagion.

"I endured seven months of unrelenting

emotional trauma – 24 hours a day," Sailor said. "Parents brought their child to my front door at 9:30 at night – parents called at midnight because they found a note or saw their child's Facebook posts. Parents and students called over spring break because they knew of a child who was a suicide risk."

Doctor's diagnosed Sailor with secondary post-traumatic stress disorder and subsequent depression after the incident, states her Aug. 4 memo to the school board.

When asked to speak about her experi-

ences, Sailor said she wasn't ready.

School officials scramble

The school district contracted with Melissa Witmeier, director of training and community engagement with the Tallahassee-based Florida Council for Community Mental Health to help remedy the situation. She organized student counseling services and created suicide prevention programming.

Witmeier helped the district land a

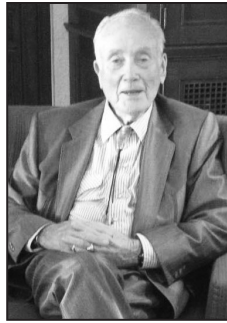
Most of all Don enjoyed time spent with his family, especially his wife of 21 years, Doreen, whom he considered his soul mate.

Restaurant aims to be anything but typical

LAKE ASBURY – Located on Henley Road, Boondocks Grill and Bar looks like nothing else in the area.

“A lot of this wood doesn’t grow around here,” said Randy Petty, who owns the new restaurant with his wife Theresa. “We had it brought in from South Carolina. We wanted something unique, with personality.”

The big, rustic building includes multiple types of wood that has been dried and aged, stones, and custom doors shipped from New Mexico. Tree trunks line the entrance. The full-service, wooden bar is hand-carved.

The couple owns a successful ready-mix and concrete-crushing business, but they decided to take on the tall task of starting a restaurant. The opening is planned for early December.

“We had talked about it for years,” said Theresa, who grew up in the Green Cove Springs area. “I was against it, but I finally caved.”

It wasn’t a decision they took lightly. Nearly 23 percent of all restaurants fail in the first year, and 44 percent fail within three years, according to a study commissioned by Restaurant Startup and Growth magazine.

Boondocks sits where Pulcinella’s used to be. The Pettys razed that building and began construction in January. That was after a year of getting permits in order and acquiring a liquor license.

“We’ve put our nest-egg into this,” Theresa said. “We owned a restaurant in Jacksonville – Spanky’s – years ago, and Randy always wanted to get back into it. We really spent a lot of time planning this, trying to account for every detail of the business.”

Walking through the front doors, guests enter a large, stunning space with high ceilings made of insulated tin, antique decorations and wood-crafted booths that each have its own fireplace. An area near the kitchen is outfitted like an old-time, small-town jail.

The urinals in the men’s room are made of beer-kegs. Another bar area has stools that face each other on each side, encouraging conversation.

“We really wanted this to be a destination in Clay County, where people feel like they’re on vacation for the couple hours that they’re here,” Theresa said. “We shopped for the antiques to give it a 1940s and 50s feel.”

Boondocks offers a Louisiana flavor and will feature live music in the back-

Keystone Heights Airport has new plan for growth

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Planes are scattered all over the tarmac of Keystone Heights Airport. A red and white six-seater idles in front of the main hangar and, to the west, there are larger corporate jets. Pilots and mechanics sit around in the main hangar fixing planes.

Nestled where the southwestern border of Clay County meets Bradford County, Keystone Heights Airport is perpetually changing as it edges closer to its 75th anniversary.

Airport Manager Maria Gall makes it clear that the historic airfield is more than a runway as she pores over the master plan that will guide the facility's development over the next 20 years.

Last year, board members earmarked new facilities including building more hangars, a new flight office and expanding the runway by 868 feet.

The runway looks like two-thirds of an inverted triangle – the westernmost run-

way the Federal Aviation Administration wouldn't pay to rehabilitate is abandoned. Keystone Heights Airport has two runways in use that total about 5,000 feet each in length. An expansion would allow the airport to accommodate larger aircraft.

On the administrative side, officials will break ground on a new terminal at the end of January. The facility includes a lounge pilot planning area. And, if weather strands pilots overnight, they'll be accommodated with showers and TVs.

Gall said that as a smaller airport, Keystone Heights focuses on service in a wider effort to cater to a diverse range of pilots, whether they are recreational, commuter or corporate.

"You're sitting here and you never know if some historical aircraft is going to come in here," Gall said. "You can't help but stop what you're doing and go out and introduce yourself to the customer because you never know where they're coming in from."

The airport also has an extensive military background as it was commissioned in

1942 by the United States Air Force, one of 43 army airfields in Florida. Some of the airport from 1942 remains.

"We're wanting to expand, while wanting to maintain the integrity the airport has always had," Gall said.

The original apron, the area in front of the terminal where airplanes park, is still there. The hardstands, where planes would turn around and park in 1942, will be developed for hangar space, Gall said.

ground while people dine. A spacious back patio has four large-screen televisions for sports.

"My biggest thing is bringing people

back around the table with good home-cooked food," Theresa said. "This is a family destination. We really wanted this to be a destination rather than just a restaurant."

The Pettys already have hired a chef, cooks, bartenders and servers. They emphasized that the live music "won't be blasted" but will add to the social atmosphere. The menu will include a Cajun flare and will highlight farm-to-table items. It will be a place for customers to get a steak or build their own burgers.

"We view this as an investment, not only financially but for our community," Randy said. "We wanted to give back and offer the people of this area a special type of place to go, a different kind of experience than they'd normally find."

There's a fenced-off firing wall that flying gunners would shoot into to practice their aim, and due to EPA regulations, it can't be dismantled due to the presence of lead bullets within the wall.

The airport is owned by the City of Keystone Heights, but doesn't receive funding from the city or Clay County government. Financially, the airport is solely dependent on leases and fuel sales to cover operational expenses in addition to federal and state grants that pay for new infrastructure.

As for the challenges, Gall points out that the airport is low-staffed. Keystone Heights employs a full-time airport manager and an airfield operations manager with a part-time employee who reports to each. The airport is governed by seven board members appointed by the Keystone Heights City Council on an almost all-volunteer basis.

In the mid-1970s, Scott Fryar started washing airplanes, then pumping gas and he eventually got a pilot's license. Now, as vice-chairman of the airport board, Fryar splits time between the airport and his job at Seminole Electric in Palatka.

"Once the flying bug bites you, it's got you," Fryar said.

Fryar recently visited similar-sized airports in Lake City, Gateway, Hilliard and Palatka to see firsthand the kind of amenities they offer and whether some could be replicated here. Fryar said the service of bigger airports isn't always welcoming.

"We don't want to turn it into JFK airport or Chicago International, but we certainly want to make the airport self-sustaining," he said "We want an inviting atmosphere while being a successful business."

While the airport has to deal with the strict security rules of the Transportation Security Administration, Fryar said airport staff strive to make the small facility as comfortable and personal as possible for the pilots and passengers who visit.

At one of the hangers, Jeff Hathorn

rolls open the doors to show off a 1939 yellow N3N-3 that he flies a couple times a month next to a racecar that owns two track records and a 1957 Beetle in which he taught his sons to drive. Hathorn, a former Navy pilot, had housed his airplanes in Gainesville and he said the environment was nowhere near as cordial as Keystone Heights.

"I absolutely love the service," Hathorn said.

Though Hathorn said he wouldn't change a thing, he added there always could be more hangars.

But Gall said the process to approve new buildings is thorough, and each has to be shown to provide a long-term benefit for the tight-knit aviation community at Keystone Heights Airport.

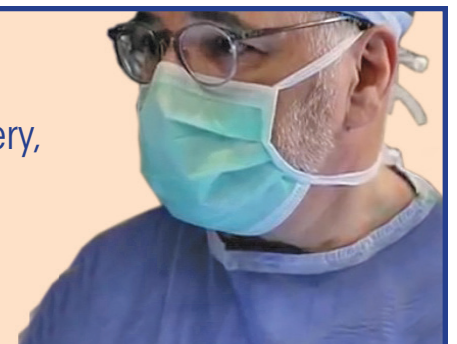
"We have to take a hard look at development, because whatever we bring in needs to be sustainable, it's giving back to the community and hopefully create jobs," Gall said. "We want something that's not only going to make an imprint – we want something that's going to be timeless out here."

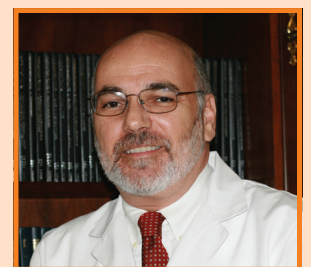

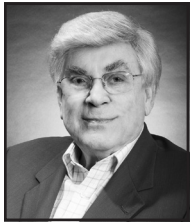

Gym once center of city rededicated

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – On a recent ride from her St. Augustine home to Keystone Heights, Sherri Anthony captured years of memories on a simple notepad preparing to honor her father, Alva Edison "Bud" Anthony Jr.

She helped tell part of a larger story of deep friendships and community to a crowd of about 50 attendees at a Nov. 3 ceremony in which officials rededicated the gymnasium that bears her father's name, 50 years after its construction.

"Most of you here tonight, made memories in this gym," she said. "You stole your first kiss, danced your first dance, ran mile after mile in sprints, screamed during pep rallies and games and watched your loved ones graduate."

Anthony recalled her memories at the event in which the community got its first peek at \$350,000 worth of renovations that began in the 2014-15 school year. The gym now has its first-ever air conditioning system, new paint inside and out, new electrical wiring and disability-accessible

bathrooms and more.

A.E. "Bud" Anthony Jr. served on the Clay County School Board from 1958 until 1966 and fought to get the school district to build the gym at the school, which at the time, served only grades K-12. After a stint in the U.S. military, Bud Anthony

was the public relations director for the Clay Electric Cooperative and got the land donated to the school district. The school district named the gym after him in 1971, however, his name was not added to the outside of the building until 20 years later. Completed in late May 1966, the first event held in the gym was the early June graduation ceremony for the Class of 1966.

"Tonight, we celebrate and honor a man that extended himself outside of the boundaries of his home and saw to it, that the entire community and school would have a place, a hub, within the city limits where they could gather, laugh, cheer and sometimes even cry together," said Sherri Anthony.

She said growing up in Keystone Heights meant either being in church, having fun on a lake or playing at that gym. As a teen in 1975, Sherri Anthony and her teammates would go on to an undefeated basketball season on that gym floor under coach Cecelia Jackson. She credits the gym for helping her earn a scholarship to play ball at Flagler College, which led to her current role as girls basketball coach at Nease High School in St. Johns County.

"To say we are all lucky is an understatement," she said. "We saw scholarships walk through those doors, racism tackled, Title IX come into effect, numerous students graduate and friendships forged that have lasted a lifetime. This sense of community is exactly what my father wanted."

Former Keystone Heights basketball coach Lyndel Kirtley drove from his home in Spartanburg, S.C. to take part in the rededication ceremony. He recalled the year he was hired, in the 1965-66 school year, the Keystone basketball team had to play its games at the Melrose school gym.

"Fifty years ago, when I came here, this was a sand pit. I came down from Kentucky and interviewed for the job," Kirtley said. "I was driving through the school zone here on [State Road] 21 and I thought, 'Heck this must be a small school and I was looking at the gym and I saw the outdoor courts...I said maybe they play outdoors.'"

Mike Summers said percussionists are put through a more rigorous audition than most other instruments, for example, the trumpet, which he plays himself.

"Percussionists have to learn three separate requirements across the percussion family," Mike Summers said. "Like I said, a trumpet player learns maybe two songs, a percussionist has to learn songs on the timpani, on the xylophone, on the snare drum – they have to show that they are versatile players."

Being selected for the All State Middle School Band is an honor, Summers said. He said the six other percussionists selected hail from Volusia County, Sarasota, while three students are from Palm Beach.

"So he's not only representing our school and the Oakleaf community, he represents Jacksonville, Orange Park and this whole Northeast Florida area and, in January, he's going to get to perform with that band," said Summers who, along with a full-time associate band director, teaches 290 band students at the junior high, one of the largest band programs in Florida.

While the news was announced Nov. 1, Nathan spent May through September rehearsing for the audition for the role.

"For this all-state audition, I was the one who helped throughout the summer," Mike Summers said. "The requirements [for auditions] are released every May, so the band directors in the state of Florida get the requirements and then they provide that to their students and I sat down with Nathan and, from the month of May all the

Summers said Nathan even practiced for the audition when he took summer vacation in Illinois while visiting his grandparents.

"I didn't have to push him on it. He loves doing this," Summers said.

For the audition, students are selected for All-State Band through a process of blind judging. Students are assigned a number, an attempt to prevent any biases from entering the selection process.

"The judge has no idea that it's Nathan Summers – he has a number, actually. [The judge] doesn't even know what school the student's from. The judge doesn't know who the band director is, the judge doesn't know what county, what school, he just gets a number and he's listening to this audition," Mike Summers said.

At the audition, Nathan was also given a sight reading of music to study for 30 seconds and then perform impromptu for the judges. He then had to perform the pieces on the snare drum, the xylophone and the timpani.

"What does that tell the judge? It tells him, OK – I can give this kid a piece of music and he can learn it. He's that quick. He

has it up here," Mike Summer said, pointing to his head.

Looking back over his September audition, Nathan Summers said it was actually an easy process for him, with one caveat.

"For my percussion audition, it was kind of hard but, what I did, was I played all the rhythms. I missed a note or two but I played all the rhythms that was on there," Nathan Summers said. "I feel very, very very grateful that I was able to make All-State after all that practicing and hard work, it was all worth it."

This is not Nathan's first honor for his percussion skills. As a sixth grader, Nathan was selected for the 2015 Clay County Honor Band.

"Nathan is – for the last couple of years – he's one of the reasons we're able to do what we do here. We have to have strong players, just like on an athletic team – football or basketball – you've got to have all-star players and Nathan is one of those," Mike Summers said.

Nathan Summers said he knows as he progresses in school, the music he will learn will get more difficult, a process he welcomes.

"I just want to always keep improving, becoming a better player," Nathan Summers said.

The gym was completed in 1966, however, Kirtley's draft board in his native Kentucky called him up to serve three years in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War. He returned to Keystone Heights after his service and coached here until 1971.

The gym would transition from being less of a community hub in 2000 when the Clay County School District built a new gym on the campus across the street at Keystone Heights Junior-Senior High.

And, as the years went by, the gym fell into a malaise of neglect bordering on disrepair, that is, until a particular student took notice.

The refurbishing project was kick-started in 2014 when then-sixth grade student Brandon Ludwig brought the gym's ailing conditions to the attention of then-school board member Tina Bullock and then-superintendent Charlie Van Zant Jr.

He took them both on a tour to point out the decay.

"The insulation had kind of been falling out of the ceiling, some of the pictures on the walls were kind of cracked, the bathrooms weren't ADA-compliant, the floor just wasn't in the best condition, the paint was falling off the walls," Ludwig said. "When I brought them in here to look at it, they didn't realize it had gone to this point and so they both really, really wanted to help."

Keystone Heights Mayor Tony Brown said he was grateful the building has been renovated to further honor "Bud" Anthony, a man he said "had a heart of gold."

"You know, in our nation, we throw things away. We see things fall apart and, unfortunately, this building was getting close to it and with the integrity and the love for our school system and our community, this building it is what it is today," Brown said.

Bud Anthony died January 11, 1995, six days after traveling to Nease where he cheered on the team his daughter coaches.

what's wrong' and pulled me into his office. it's not any better than having cancer. It's a disease that's slowly killing them."

At age 6, Kaylin almost slipped into a coma when her blood sugar was nearly 10 times the normal limit.

They went to Wolfson Children's Hospital, where doctors taught Sarah how to give insulin, count carbs and other information. Doctor's later diagnosed Trinity on Nov. 14, National Diabetes Awareness Day.

As Kaylin, 16, and Trinity, 13, grew, it became apparent the disease would conflict with their lives and interests.

"I could be in the middle of a basketball game and then 'oh it's time to check

your blood.' It's inconvenient," Trinity said.

"I have to do it though, because if I don't, I'll die."

"It's kind of like pause everything around me so I can deal with my disease real fast," Kaylin added.

The commitment spills over into Sarah and her husband Chris's life.

"Diabetes doesn't go on vacation," Sarah said. "It doesn't have a spring break, it doesn't let us sleep all night we have to get up all night to check sugar, so try and wake up your 13-year-old to fix her blood sugar because she's low, so you're trying to force food or drink down someone's mouth at 2 a.m."

Parents and patients often seem like mathematicians as they count every carb and translate the numbers into units of insulin. They keep a log of what they consume and snack if sugar levels drop too low.

Kaylin utilizes a pump to regulate her insulin levels. All she has to do is type the units of insulin she requires into the device, which connects to her arm via wires. Those wires get in the way of Trinity's sports, so often she has to step off the field to check her sugar levels or inject herself with insulin.

"It is possible to live a healthy life after diabetes and it doesn't have to stop children from doing what they want to do," said Brooks Biagini, executive director of the North Florida JDRF chapter. "We're in the business to put ourselves out of business," Biagini said.

Since the disease entered their lives, the Hoffmanns have raised about \$100,000 for JDRF. They also take part in clinical trials to give researchers data on the effectiveness of their treatments.

Arson, meth charge for Jacksonville man

ORANGE PARK – What began as an apparent one-pot methamphetamine cook in a vehicle in the Blanding Boulevard Walmart parking lot recently ended in drug and arson charges for a Jacksonville man.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Brien James Morris, 22, on Nov. 15 after he had recovered from burns he received on Nov. 2 while allegedly cooking the illicit drug in the store parking lot at 899 Blanding Blvd.

A witness told deputies that she saw Morris go back and forth from his car to nearby bushes near the Murray's gas station fronting Blanding. She said an unknown man and woman pulled Morris from the fully-engulfed vehicle and called fire and rescue to the scene.

One witness said he saw Morris pull into the Walmart parking lot "trying to put a fire out inside of his car," states the police report.

Derryle Whiting said he pulled Morris from the car and called 911. He was initially transported to Orange Park Medical Center, but was then transferred to the burn unit at Shands Hospital in Gainesville.

"The vehicle was completely burnt and was almost bare metal," states the report.

Police seized two mason jars of meth oil with one weighing 89.5 grams and a second one weighing 88.2 grams. The state standard for trafficking charges is possession of 14 grams or more.

Morris is charged with arson during the commission of a felony, manufacturing methamphetamine and trafficking methamphetamine. At press time, he remained in the Clay County Jail where his bond is \$300,009.

Two-vehicle crash ends in fatality

MIDDLEBURG – One person is dead and a second in serious condition after an early morning head-on collision on Nov. 15 on County Road 218 at Mimosa Avenue in Middleburg.

According to the Florida Highway Patrol, Michael Michell, 45, of Macclenny, was driving a 1998 GMC Sierra pickup heading eastbound on CR 218 and Kathryn Touchton, 31, of Jacksonville was driving a 2010 Honda Accord westbound around 6:13 a.m.

For unknown reasons, Michell veered off the road on the left shoulder. His truck then entered the roadway traveling eastbound in the westbound lane where he collided with Touchton's Honda.

Touchton died due to the crash, while

Michell was transported to Orange Park Medical Center where he was listed in serious condition. Both Michell and Touchton were wearing seatbelts, according to FHP.

Woman arrested for machete attack

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A Green Cove Springs woman faces one charge of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon after she allegedly struck a victim with a machete.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Jessica Jean Arnott, 28, at 10:40 p.m. on Nov. 14 after an incident of apparent hysteria among Arnott resulted in a victim being attacked with a dull machete, the report said.

Earlier in the morning, the victim received a call from Arnott's sister, asking the victim for help to calm Arnott. Arnott's sister told the victim Arnott was on drugs, according to the report, and said imaginary people were telling Arnott to hurt other people as well as herself. When the victim arrived, Arnott yelled at the victim and witness and called him wolves, the report said. Arnott then began pacing in the front yard of the house for approximately 30 minutes.

According to the report, Arnott then went to the backyard and retrieved a machete. She then swung the machete at the victim, striking the victim on the right arm above the elbow, the report said. Arnott then dropped the machete and ran to the neighbor's house. The victim grabbed the machete and put it under the vehicle so the defendant would not know where it was, according to the report.

Police said the victim was not injured due to the dullness of the machete.

Deputies transported Arnott to the Clay County Jail, where she remained at press time on a \$25,003 bail.

Sexual predator charged for failing to report address change

MIDDLEBURG – Authorities arrested a registered sexual predator last week for changing residences within 1,000 feet of a school and failing to report his address change, according to the police report.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested James Eric Watson, 39, on Nov. 10 while he was sleeping for moving 650 feet away from Wilkinson Junior High and failing to report his change of

address, the report said.

Roughly a week before his arrest, he contacted a friend who let him live with her residence. She later discovered he was a sexual predator and that he should not be living in the residence.

The house in the 5000 block of Timberwood Trail is approximately 650 feet from Wilkinson Junior High. It is illegal for sexual predators in Florida to reside within 1,000 feet of schools.

At press time, he was in jail with bond set at \$100,006.

Federal jury convicts last two charged with money laundering

JACKSONVILLE – A federal jury found Erick Estrada-Lopez, 41, of Jacksonville and Michael Rounsville, 48, of Callahan guilty of crimes arising out of a money laundering scheme on Nov. 14.

Estrada-Lopez was convicted of conspiracy to commit money laundering and faces a maximum penalty of 20 years in federal prison. Rounsville, an officer with the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, was convicted of accessing a law enforcement database without authorization for financial gain and furthering the money laundering scheme. He faces a maximum penalty of five years imprisonment. The sentencing hearings have been scheduled for February 27, 2017.

According to evidence presented at trial, Estrada accepted \$42,000 in cash from co-defendant Manuel Rodriguez, 33, of Middleburg, which was part of \$200,000 that Rodriguez had agreed to launder for an undercover agent who was posing as a drug dealer.

Estrada deposited the cash in his business bank account and obtained a \$42,000 cashier's check that Rodriguez deposited into his bank account the same day. The next day, Rodriguez wired the \$42,000, along with an additional \$25,000, into the

undercover agent's covert bank account to complete the laundering of the cash.

Rounsville ran the covert name of the undercover agent through the FBI's National Crime Information Center database and the Florida's Driver and Vehicle Information Database. Rounsville reported the results of those searches to the conspirators. Rodriguez testified that, at the request of another co-defendant, he delivered an envelope containing cash to Rounsville while he was working off-duty in Jacksonville.

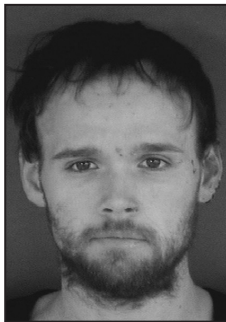
Sting nabs PC sex crime offender

ORANGE PARK – An online sex crimes sting has ended with a Callahan, Fla. man charged with multiple counts of attempting to lure a child for sex via the internet.

The arrest comes after an Orange Park Police Department officer, who is also a member of the Internet Crimes Task Force, took part in an operation targeting people who prey on minors for sex over the internet. The sting was conducted with the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office and was carried out July 19-24 with officers going online to different apps posing as 14-year-old girls.

Police said between July 30 and Aug. 5, Adam Corey Fields, 27, emailed six photos of his penis to the officer posing as the victim.

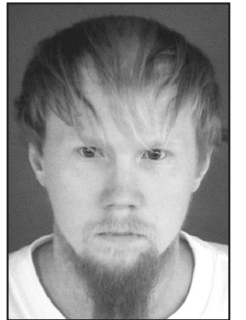
Fields faces six counts of using a PC to solicit or lure a child, and one count each of using the computer to solicit a minor for unlawful sexual activity and using a two-way communication device to facilitate a felony. \$70,000-plus federal grant to deploy counselors to the schools and community. Dubbed School Emergency Response to Violence, it's the same program that provided counseling in the aftermath of the Sandy Hook mass shooting.

"Obviously, the school board was very concerned about it. We were concerned if they were getting enough resources and we did everything we could to follow up on that," said former Keystone Heights Junior-Senior High principal Tina Bullock, who at the time, served as the District 3 school board member. "What's hard to know is how to help. It's hard to talk about. Unless you've experienced it yourself, you really don't know what to say to make the healing begin."

Suicide warning signs

- Talking about suicide
- Making statements about feeling hopeless, helpless, or worthless
- A deepening depression
- Preoccupation with death
- unnecessary risks or exhibiting self-destructive behavior
- Out of character behavior
- A loss of interest in the things one cares about
- Visiting or calling people one cares about
- Making arrangements; setting one's affairs in order
- Giving prized possessions away

Bullock said the district sent social workers to the schools and made mental health resources available to students during holiday breaks. Teachers and students lauded Jacksonville-based Right Path Mental Health Clinic for its success counseling those who struggled after the suicides. The clinic stationed two mental health counselors at each Keystone Heights school by the time 2013 ended. There was no counselor at the schools before Right Path offered their services.

"That was the first time I ever witnessed such a traumatic experience with young adults – first time," said Don Jackson, Right Path's chief executive officer. "It was a big influx of kids and parents that actually needed help during that time. It was really tough on our staff to see the emotions of the teachers and the kids that were affected by the situation."

Several teachers struggled with their feelings and their students' feelings to a point one teacher was Baker Acted in the spring of 2014. Another teacher lost her adult son to suicide.

Jackson said Keystone Heights felt like a fog had settled on the city.

"When you talk about that situation ev-

everything runs together, everything seems so close almost like it was a dream," Jackson said. "It was quiet. I almost felt like it was its own world. You would hear it in peoples' voices."

Considering the nearest mental health center is 30 miles away from Keystone Heights, the counselors were overtaxed and had a waiting list of kids. The clinic eventually had to hire new staff to meet the demand. The heaviest hit came to those closest to DJ and Alex.

"I've contemplated many times joining DJ and Alex," said Dakota Puls, a senior at the school. "I came close to it once. Very close. I attempted it, and I was in the middle of it right before I stopped. I felt like no one understood, no one cared. That wasn't true, but that's how it feels. It feels as though if you die, if something happens to you, no one would care, no one would bat an eye."

DJ was Puls' closest friend, so his suicide put her in a state of shock. Frozen,

she could not cry for a week. She said after Alex's death, the school allowed students time away from their studies to talk in a no pressure environment and mourn their friends' deaths. It helped, she said.

Kevin found some solace in the situation in solidarity shared in the firehouse. He said suicide "may have crossed my mind at some point," but "I never acted on it."

Prevention education void

In Poland's 35 years of experience in suicide prevention and suicide contagion, a single constant emerges.

"The schools have a tendency to pretty much ignore it," he said. "Here's the bottom line, losing someone close to you to suicide is arguably the most complicated grief we can ever face. Unfortunately, sometimes with adolescents there are those who feel really guilty."

Poland firmly believes Florida needs stiffer requirements when it comes to suicide prevention education.

"Florida schools have been very slow to accept any responsibility for suicide

prevention, very slow to train their teachers and principals who make the decisions about training and prevention [for teachers,] Poland said. "Ninety-five percent of them have never received any information about suicide prevention."

Many nationally-recognized curricula are free to use. One popular program comes from the Tennessee-based non-profit, The Jason Foundation. Nineteen states have passed The Jason Flatt Act, which requires all educators to complete two hours of youth suicide awareness and prevention training each year to renew their teaching license. setting up protocols, a step by step process this teacher should do to establish this safe environment for a student," said Brett Marciel, director of business development with The Jason Foundation. "Every school needs to have one in place, unfortunately many don't."

According to an April 2016 GDC study, suicide rates have increased 24 percent since 1999. In 2009, suicides accounted for 12 percent of all deaths among Florida youth aged 15-18, according to the Florida Department of Health. Poland urges school districts to be proactive with their suicide prevention instruction.

Suicide is almost always the result of untreated or undertreated mental illness, according to Poland.

"I think that mental health has been put on the back burner," Jackson said. "I know what the school focuses on – educate, educate, educate, educate. I have to teach these kids to be ready to pass these tests, but you have to look out for the mental health part of it."

The community heals

Puls remembers DJ and Alex in different ways. She keeps a photobook with pictures of him tucked in her driver's side door and keeps DJ's dog tags on her keychain, so he's with her wherever she goes.

After DJ died, she joined the Explorer's Club to fulfill a promise she made with DJ before his passing.

DJ and Alex have left something else with Puls, however. They've left an impression of compassion and understanding she attempts to share with anyone she can.

"A lot of people feel alone. They feel like no one will understand and no one will care. I think

that's why over the years I've let people know. I'm here if you need me, I'm here if you need to talk," Puls said.

Nearly three years after DJ's death, Kevin continues to maintain the headstones of his sons' grave. He visits a minimum of twice a week, scrubs off any algae or moss, ensures sod is laid properly and flowers dutifully arranged.

"I talk with him," Kevin said. "I want to make sure he knows he's never forgotten."

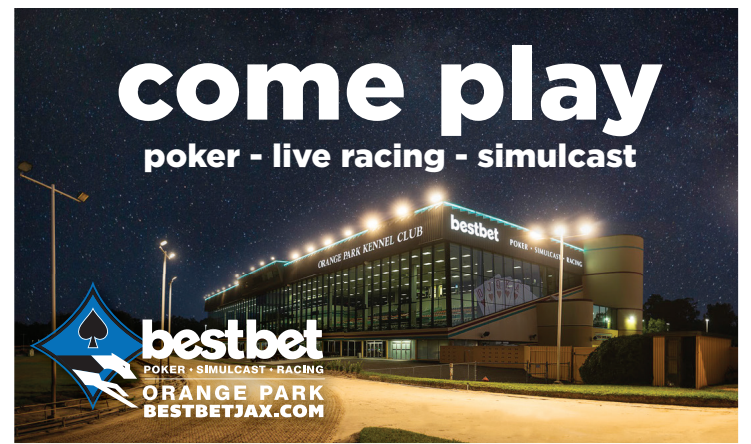

Blue Devils 'shed the monkey'

CITRA, Fla. – A sterling defensive effort from a hardly-known sophomore and a “Phoenix” rising from a much-known senior marked a drastic uptick of Clay High’s football team that produced a thrilling 41-38 win in a Region 2-5A matchup with historically strong North Marion High School Nov. 11 in Citra.

Clay allowed an early 22-8 lead evaporate to a 30-29 deficit at the half. In the second half, it was quarterback returned to wide receiver Jaylan Jenkins who caught a key 48 yard pass to the North Marion 19 yard line to set up a game-winning touchdown with 2:50 left that sealed the deal.

“I wanted the ball to make up for my fumble,” said Jenkins. “My job is to catch the ball. Caleb just put it up there for me.”

Clay senior running back Colin Wilson finished with all six Clay scores off 270 yards of hard running while sophomore defensive end Cody Devore, all of 170 pounds, was instrumental on defense in hurrying the North Marion fourth quarter passing attack.

“Cody Devore loves football and you can tell he was locked in on chasing that quarterback,” said Clay High football coach Joshua Hoekstra. “Colin Wilson had a great week of practice. What better time than November for him to be running strong again.”

Devore’s answer to his effort was simple. Lack of respect.

“I don’t think their offensive line which was huge thought they would have any trouble stopping me,” said Devore. “I used my speed to not get stuck under them. They were big, for sure, but their big tackle had to chase me.”

Hoekstra has lamented his Blue Devils’ bad luck in closing out on away games in the very successful playoff history of the last four years. Clay’s last away playoff game win was a 74-73 win in 2013 against Bishop Kenny that fueled the Blue Devils to the Class 5A title game, a 66-8 loss to American Heritage in Orlando.

“We finally got that monkey off our back,” said Hoekstra, as his Blue Devils next travel to ravenous Baker County High School in Macclenny for their Nov. 11 region semifinal.

Unlucky 13 ends Broncos Cinderella season

CRESTVIEW, Fla. — Triskaidekaphobia: Written reference to the superstitious fear of the number 13.

For the Middleburg Broncos, it should have been lucky number 13 as 2016 would be 13 seasons since the football team made the region playoffs.

"There has definitely been a lot more jumpiness in the hallways at Middleburg High School the past few weeks," said Bronco head coach Karl Smeltzer, who turned an 0-10 season last year to a region playoff berth this year. "The focus we had with our games with Ed White and Nease that put us in position to earn the playoff spot was not quite here. I think the team had to come to grips with being a playoff team after such a long time."

The feel good ended abruptly in the region 1-6A opener as host Crestview won 35-0 in a seemingly obvious blowout of the Broncos Friday night in Crestview.

"The score does not do us any favors about the way the game went," said Smeltzer. "We had our opportunities, but we didn't finish them. They are a big play team and we needed to get off the field on third downs."

Before the game, Smeltzer and his Broncos were feeling pretty good and determined to show a little gamesmanship. Both teams refused to be the first on the field, but, after a third whistle, the officials made both teams enter the field simultaneously. It would be that kind of night.

"When I first met these guys in eighth grade when I got here, I told them by the time they finished, they would be winners," said Smeltzer. "I'm proud of them for sticking with me and the program. Here we are in the playoffs, first time in 13 years."

Kicking off to the Bulldogs, the Broncos were on pure adrenaline and were showing they were ready to play. On the opening drive, Crestview tried the Broncos with

some run and pass combinations and tried going deep on third down. Middleburg was ready and Bronco safety Andrew Thomas came up with an interception that put momentum into Middleburg's favor.

Not having a single player with playoff experience showed as the Broncos went three and out with a strong case of nerves. After the punt, Crestview showed they too had issues when senior cornerback Teron Allen had interception number two slip through his hands. Crestview had an illegal man down field and Middleburg declined the penalty bringing up fourth and short. Unconventionally for the first quarter, Crestview went for it and found a seam off Middleburg's left side scoring the first points, 7-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Broncos got going with Allen picking up 25 yards and the Bronco run attack, led by Robert Lowder, figuring out where the weak spots in the Crestview line were. All game, Middleburg's Achilles heel would turn out to be the dropped passes in critical times. On this drive, the Broncos lined up to punt and went for the fake. Needing three yards, the short snap looked good, but only gained two yards and the Bulldogs would take over on downs. Crestview would come back with a run/pass attack and finally caught the Broncos with a delayed handoff that broke free and score the second Bulldog score, 14-0.

Middleburg would continue attacking on the next drive, coming up short and punting. Early in the second quarter, the Bulldogs ran a planned quarterback run around the right side and would bring the score to 21-0. "I thought we came out with a lot of energy and our team discipline was sound, especially getting that first score early," Navy head coach Carin Gabarra. "When you play a team like Boston University, however, you need to be mentally focused for the entire 90 minutes, which was our downfall with a few mental lapses late in the game."

Voted on by the League's 10 head coaches, with restrictions of excluding their own student-athletes, nine of the ten League members were represented by at least one student-athlete on the All-League squads. Bucknell led the group with eight student-athletes earning recognition, and Boston University collected the second most at six followed by Colgate and Navy with five, each.

Junior Natalie Dzhandzhapanyan head-

lined Navy's five all-league members as she was named a Second Team All-Patriot League honoree. The Diamond Bar, California, native was just one of three Mids to start all 20 matches this season. Dzhandzhapanyan tallied five points on two goals and one assist, which included the game-winning goal against American.

Along with Dzhandzhapanyan, teammates Rachel Feldman, Meghan Hegarty, Clare MacAdam and Megan Rogers were

placed on the league's third team.

Rogers rounded out Navy's five all-league players, as she collected her first career all-league laurel. Along with Dzhandzhapanyan, Rogers has also started in all 20 matches for the Mids, recording the third-highest minutes played on the team with 1,654. The junior defender, who has started in 42 consecutive matches, has tallied three assists this season. Rogers has helped anchor Navy's backline to four shut-outs, which includes three in league play.

Rogers, who has one remaining season to play soccer for Navy, credited St. Johns Country Day School coach Mike Pickett for his intense workouts and game plans for readying her for play at the NCAA Division I level.

"Coach Pickett's intensity and the knowledge he passed along made the transition much easier," said Rogers, who landed a free kick to forward KayKay Harding to beat Lakeland Christian 1-0 in 2014 to accomplish her third straight Class 1A state title for the Spartans. "The biggest adjustment would probably be time management. USNA is high school on steroids basically. And it's also hard balancing soccer, with school, with military, and finding time to enjoy the college experience."

Rogers cited big wins against Maryland and Colgate as highlights of the year, but a big win over Army was in front of a filled stadium. "The big wins were Maryland and Army," said Rogers. "The Maryland win was the first time we've ever beaten them."

Rogers' future plans are to finish her soccer career then move into Navy pilot training.

"So next up is the spring season, which is short, only five games rather than 20 or more in the fall," said Rogers, who was known for her blazing speed on the field as she led the Spartans to three Class 1A state titles. "Then I have just one more regular season next fall. There really is no break, everything sort of happens simultaneously. My goal is to get a service assignment as a Navy Pilot come next fall. I have the order of merit and the grades to do so. I'd love to be able to fly P-8s."

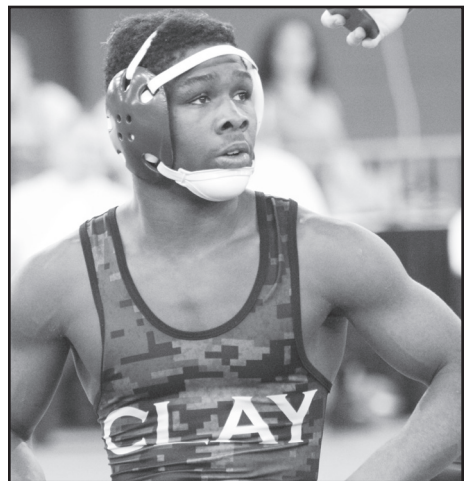

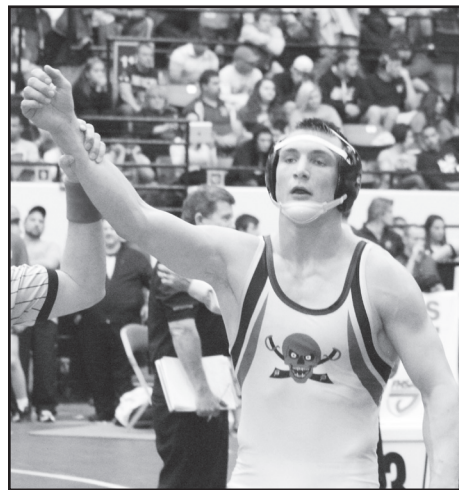

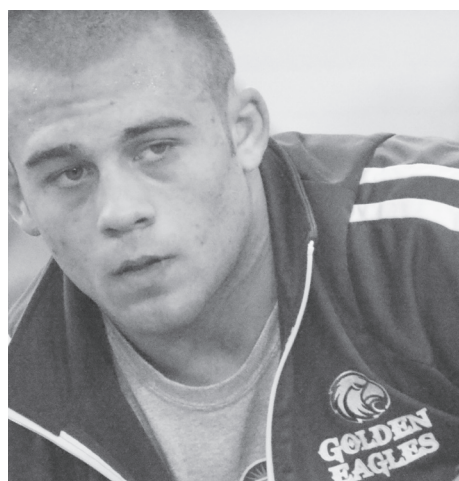

semifinal on Friday. "We've won the district title three years and have had those tough region games at home. We went to Palatka to stay in the playoffs and got down 21-0 early then came back to win in overtime. To be honest, I like our chances on the road against anybody at this point."

Last year, Clay lost 34-24 against Wakulla at Wakulla in the state semifinal.

The Blue Devils' have been crowned district champions in three of the four past seasons and, thus, have entertained region playoff opponents in Green Cove Springs. This year, with a district runnerup finish, Clay will travel up until a possible region championship game before challenging for a Final Four spot and a title game in Orlando.

Baker County, at 9-1 and 5-0 in district play, will host the Blue Devils after a 35-7 blowout of Belleview High in their region quarterfinal game. Baker County's lone loss was in their final regular season game against undefeated (10-0) 1A-power Madison County, a 26-21 loss. Madison County loss to eventual state champion Trenton in last year's Class 1A state semifinal.

"We have to take care of the football against Baker County," said Hoekstra, who lost 28-14 to Baker County in regular season play. "Last time, we went over there and couldn't score in their red zone. The two turnovers tonight were a 14-point swing here."

Against North Marion, recent Louisville verbal commit Colin Wilson, a senior running back who has been struggling to become 100 percent healthy after a near-lethal knee injury suffered in the Blue Devils playoff win over Westside in 2014, rumbled from play one, a 70 yard scoring run that displayed the rare combination of power and speed that Blue Devil fans witnessed in Wilson's sophomore year.

North Marion, though, was hardly impressed with Wilson's first series explosion, as the Colts answered with their own 70 yarder, though just 67 yards, with quarterback K.J. Minter blasting downfield for his opening salvo and an 8-7 Colts lead with just a minute off the clock.

"All the credit goes to the offensive line," said Wilson, who, with back to back 200-plus yard games, now has 1,074 yards in 10 games with 14 touchdowns.

Settling behind his offensive line of Max Moore, Nathan Fitzgerald, Devon Vatick, Jarrod Leeds and Jason Brooks, Clay would punish the Colts' defensive line on the second series with Wilson carrying the ball five times for 30 yards before scoring his second touchdown at 8:40.

"I think we finally got everyone in psync on the line and we had fewer penalties from the line," said senior offensive lineman Devon Vatick. "It's good to have a back like Colin running because we know to just keep driving and he'll break it."

Two key plays, a sideline pass to wideout Jaylan Jenkins and a power run up the middle by Marcus Jones behind Fitzgerald, kept the drive alive.

Jenkins and Wilson moved the ball quickly to a score; Jenkins with a 10 yard pass play to the North Marion 35 and Wilson bludgeoning Colt tacklers for 24 yards to the 11 yard line. Two handoffs got Wilson in for score three and a 22-8 lead with 4:30 still left in the first quarter. Wilson converted the two-point conversion from the Wildcat formation.

North Marion, with a visibly sizable offensive line, went to their ground game in a show of mano-a-mano manpower and plugged in with a mix of power running and short passes to get a 15 yard scoring run from tailback Jalen Patterson, who rumbled through a tackle attempt by Clay linebacker Zach Alvarado to put six points on the board for North Marion.

As the second quarter began, Clay had their first punt of the night as the Colt defense started gumming up the line of scrimmage.

Clay's defense, with linebackers Evan Martin and Rico Schitzler being first responders to the Colts running attack, started beating North Marion to the punch

between the tackles to force some errant passes and force the Colts' first punt of the night.

Starting at their own 20, Clay embarked on an offensive plan of runs and throws that saw the Blue Devils score off a 10-play drive that featured just one third down as Eason starting slinging passes to widen the field and get North Marion to back up a bit. A 19 yarder to Jenkins, a five yarder to Wilson and a seven yarder to Jenkins was enough to get the Colts' defense on its heels and set up three runs through the middle by Wilson ending with a 20 yard scoring rumble and a 29-14 Clay lead with 6:15 left in the half.

With North Marion also trying to find success off the corners with quick passes, Devore started to make his 170-pound frame a nuisance to Minter in the backfield off slant blitzes and strong pass rushes. A Devore sack on third and 10 at the Colts 36 charged the Blue Devil sideline and fanbase, but a fumbled punt by Jenkins squelched the enthusiasm quickly.

North Marion seized the momentum shift moment with a quick scoring pass from 30 yards out to wideout Jordyn Riley. A two pointer was good and the game got tense at 29-22 with 1:16 left in the half.

Disaster struck a second time as Wilson fumbled away at the Clay 35 yard line and North Marion again answered swiftly with a second scoring pass to Riley, this time from 18 yards as North Marion took the lead 30-29 as the half ended.

After the halftime break, Wilson tore up the North Marion defense with three straight runs up the middle netting 37 yards and field position at the Colt 44 yard line. A pass interference call on a pass attempt to Jenkins put the ball on the Colt 30 where, two plays later, Wilson rambled in for a score and a 35-30 Clay lead.

North Marion held the ball for 15 plays and nearly eight minutes including the first three minutes of the fourth quarter and came way with a fumble recovered by Clay linebacker Angel Valdez at the Clay 25 yard line. Clay could do no better with a punt on the next drive.

North Marion ate four minutes of clock and stole the lead 38-35 with a one yard scoring plunge after Clay's defense again stayed on the field for nine plays as Minter tried to take control of the game with a combination of quarterback run-pass options.

Two incomplete passes, both rushed by Devore off the edge, ended the Colts' final surge.

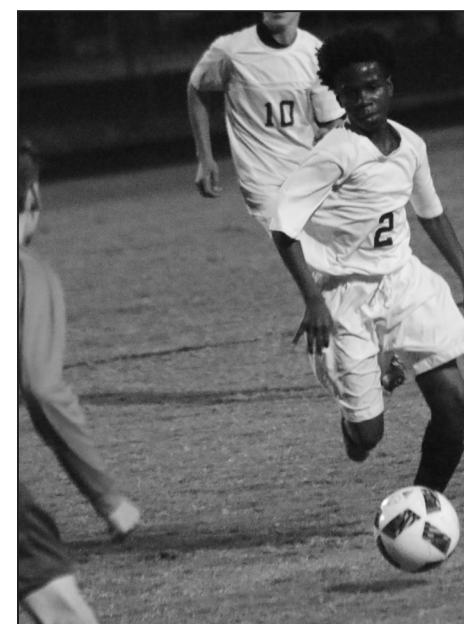
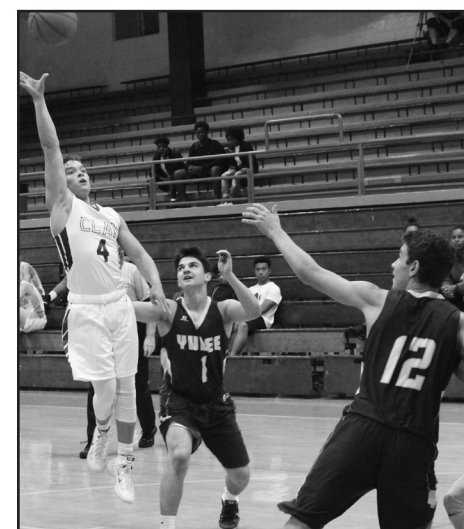

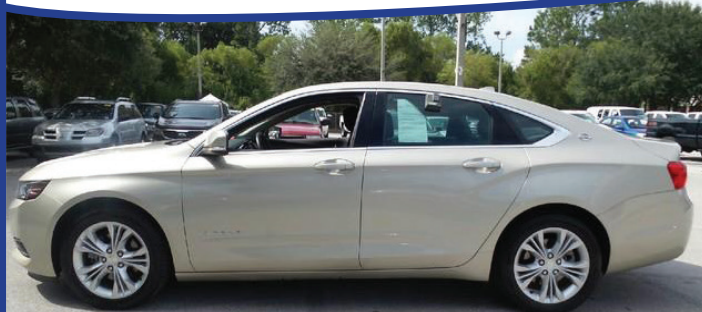

away, but the stout Bronco defense held. Going into halftime, the Broncos now felt they could stop Crestview. They had to take full advantage of the deferment and get the drive going in the third with the opening kickoff. "That stop before the half was a good spark for us," said Smeltzer. "We came out in the third with some fire, but couldn't take advantage."

Coming out of the locker room, the Broncos took the kickoff and for the first time, Crestview could not put it in the end zone for the touchback. Middleburg would have their first scoring opportunity very quickly. Quarterback Garrett Blanchett was finding Allen through the air with Lowder and backfield mate Alex Joe grinding on the ground for substantial gains.

"They started loading the box up front," said Smeltzer. "They did not show that in the film we saw. Once we got to throwing the ball and spreading them out, we seemed to keep shooting ourselves in the foot."

Middleburg drove the ball down to the Crestview four-yard line and faced fourth and four. Blanchett was scrambling looking for either an open receiver or a seam to get the one yard they needed for a first down. It appeared to everyone that Blanchett was tackled and play stopped. Not hearing a whistle, Crestview stripped the ball from Blanchett and went 96 yards for what would be the most deflating blow to the Broncos and a 28-0 Crestview lead.

"That was a debatable play, but whether it was or not, we still had to overcome it," said Smeltzer. "We let it be the nail in the coffin. We had our chances."
