Recent Orange Park election questioned

Mayor: to contest the election or not?

ORANGE PARK – An email forwarded to town officials by Mayor Eugene Nix alleged voters from outside the Town of Orange Park voted in the April 11 election. Nix promised legal action for the results of the election, but by the regular April 18 town council meeting, his tone changed.

"I intend to investigate this and use whatever legal means at my disposal to challenge the validity of this election," Nix wrote in the April 14 email to Town Attorney Sam Garrison and obtained by Clay Today. Nix's email alleged he had verified information that at least one voter was not a legal resident of the town, and that if there was one then there surely "must be more," but gave no further information. The incumbent Nix lost the race for Council Seat 2 to opponent Alan Watt by seven votes on April 11. Under Florida law, candidates have 10 days following an election to file a legal challenge with the clerk of court.

Garrison then forwarded the email to Clay County Supervisor of Elections

City to contractor: delays will cost \$500 a day

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Following a lengthy discussion at Tuesday night's meeting, the Green Cove Springs City Council voted to stand their ground regarding the current contract after a Monday morning visit to the Spring Park Pool jobsite and a recommendation from city staff.

The city will begin the imposition of the \$500 per day damages, excluding Sundays, on Core Construction who failed to meet their April 14 extended deadline for the substantial completion of the Historic Spring Park Pool restoration project.

This doesn't mean the city will begin sending daily or weekly invoices to the contractor, but the council wanted to state publicly that the terms agreed upon in the revised contract are still in effect, and since missing their deadline for final completion, the city will remove the sum total of damages from their final check after the project is complete.

"Rules without consequences are just conversation," said Vice Mayor Mitch Timberlake. "We need to go forward with letting them know that we intend to pursue liquidated damages."

The decision did not come without some disagreement among council members. Councilman Van Royal believed that the imposition of damages was redundant since it had already been mentioned in the

Chris Chambless and Town Clerk Sarah Campbell.

After a one-on-one conversation with Garrison immediately following the council meeting, Nix appeared to backtrack on the decisive language of his email. Nix said instead of legal action, he intended to make election officials aware of any "anomalies" in the system.

Nix said he had received an "anonymous tip" that a non-resident of the town had voted in the election, but was unwilling to provide any further details on how he had verified the authenticity of the information, or any further details regarding the information. He said he would provide proof later.

At press time, Nix had not provided proof of his allegations to Clay Today.

In an interview shortly after his conversation with Garrison, Nix said he now believed the results of the election would not change even if he decided to litigate, and said financially he did not want to go through the trouble of a lawsuit.

"I don't think this community needs to go through [litigation], my only goal or point is that if I see inefficiencies in the system then I want to correct it so it doesn't happen again," Nix said.

"I'm not interested in getting in a legal battle, that's not me first off, and it's not worth it."

Chambless said that in his tenure, no

elected official or candidate has challenged the results of an election. He said however, there is a precedent for questioning the residency of a voter. Typically, voter residency challenges are filed prior to an election and require the voter in question to provide contrary evidence and vote on a provisional ballot.

"We would make every attempt to contact that individual and let them know that a statement has been made against their eligibility and allow them to provide information to the contrary," Chambless said.

Chambless said there are a number of safeguards to curtail situations where non-residents are voting in municipal elections.

Only the circuit court has the power to question a vote after the fact.

"We have a part in it from the standpoint that we maintain the voter registration rolls but we have no investigative power, so it would be incumbent on the courts or the state attorney to prove that a voter registered at an address that they don't physically live at," Chambless said.

Nix said that while he no longer intends to file a legal contest, his conscience could rest easier if a full audit was performed on the voter rolls.

However, that will not happen unless he contests the election with credible evidence, and currently Nix does not intend to contest the election results.

Nix chocks his narrow loss to his supporters not making it to the polls, and an initiative by what he calls "community activists" intended to swing the voters in his opponent's favor. "They went all out and I think some questionable things were done that should not be allowed to be done," Nix said, but did not elaborate.

Nix used the phrase in a mass email sent out to residents following the election.

"We have one last chance of taking back control of our town from a handful of community activist[s] who are determined to change Orange Park[']s great quality of life as we know it and take it in a different direction than what it was meant to be," Nix wrote

He then publically endorsed candidate Ron Raymond for Seat 1, who is in a runoff election against candidate Larry Nichols. Their opponent, Eddie Henley, came in third after getting 166 total ballots in his favor

"Seat one will have a runoff election Tuesday May 9th with Ron Raymond and the other guy," Nix wrote in his mass email to Orange Park residents. "I strongly urge you to return once again to the [polls] May 9 and support Ron and your voice on Council[,] otherwise the residents have lost BIG TIME!"

Speaking during the town council meeting's public comment period, Rev. William Randal of St. Simon Baptist Church expressed his offense to Nix's use of the phrase community activist as a pejorative. He also said Nix's endorsement was unethical.

"I just don't believe that pastors and preachers and activists ought to be called unethical when we're only trying to encourage people who have been oppressed and forgotten and the least and the lost of the community to get out and register to vote," Randal said.

"I believe that as a sitting mayor, who is elected by the people of Orange Park, [you] should not have the right or authority to send out letters like this to registered voters and town citizens, including myself," Randal said. "In my opinion what you're doing is oppressing and dividing, and I believe, Mr. Mayor, from your seat as the mayor, you should respect and sincerely appreciate an apology for what has been sent out."

When asked his response for his public endorsement, Nix said considering he has been voted out, the situation is of no consequence.

"As far as I'm concerned, I am still a public official, but the fact that I won't be returning [next year] kind of marginalized my situation," Nix said.

Nix also criticized a Nichols campaign mailer that contains a photograph and quote from Green Cove Springs Mayor Pam Lewis endorsing Nichols, who owns Grace House Counseling Center on Fleming Island. Both Lewis and Town Council member Connie Thomas work together with Nichols.

"There's a golden rule that you don't get involved in another person's election...we don't do that here just as a matter of rule," Nix said. "Now the fact that I am leaving my term and we have a runoff going, that I think is very important to the community, I don't see a problem with it."

contract that was hammered out in late Febraury, and that any seemingly aggressive action toward the contractors could delay the project further.

"A contract is a contract and no matter what we do tonight we're not sending bills," Royal said. "Understand that the substantial completion date was [April] 14th and here we are on the 18th and we'll get to this matter when it comes time. Accept the report, not giving away any legal stance that we've got, and let's get this project done."

Royal made an initial motion to accept the staff's report, but not to reiterate their position on the \$500 per day damages in the interest of completing the project before getting into the financial details.

"My goal is to open up that pool at

Spring Park," Royal said. "I believe that I've seen Core working now, and I believe that there's an end in sight."

With an initial support from Council member Steven Kelley, following further discussion Kelley took back his second from Royal's motion as he felt the motion would imply that the contract is not enforceable. Council member Constance Butler seconded Royal's motion and a vote was taken. Butler and Royal voted yes, Mayor Pam Lewis, Timberlake, and Kelley all voted no and the motion failed.

The discussion continued as Timberlake made a motion to accept the staff's report and to publicly state that the city recognizes the imposition of damages to be paid out, showing that they will enforce what is written in the contract. Royal stated that he would not support this motion should it go to vote. Kelley seconded the motion, and it passed 4-1 with Royal dissenting.

The expected date for completion of the

project is still up in the air. There are several items still unfinished, according to the staff report, though the report also noted a significant increase in the presence of workers on the jobsite following the February 28 council meeting.

The imposition of damages officially began on April 15 and will continue until the next deadline for completion, April 28, when the cost of liquidated damages will increase to \$1,000 per day — excluding Sundays — until substantial completion is reached.

Core Construction did not have representation involved in the conversation at the meeting. In a separate business item, the council voted unanimously to renovate the large pavilion that sits across the park from the pool project, with spending not exceeding \$35,000 for the improvements.

The council agreed this fix is somewhat temporary, but could last several years before this or future councils vote to demolish the pavilion and rebuild that side of the park, a project that was bid at almost \$500,000 to complete.

"I don't see it as being a short-term fix, I'd like to wait a little while before we have to revisit it again because we'd be wasting that \$30,000," Kelley said.

The major work to be done is the installation of a metal roof, replacing the current fiberglass roof which has fallen in disrepair. In addition to the roofing the concrete will all be power washed, and structures including walls and tables will be repainted to match the color of the new pool facilities.

"If you put a decent roof on it and you do a good job it could last 10, 15, 20 years," Timberlake said.

Funding for the project is expected to be paid by the surtax the city receives from Clay County, with a pending donation of up to \$13,000 by the organization Friends of Spring Park.

The Era of Bad Feelings

The Era of Good Feelings is the term used to describe the aftermath of the War of 1812 where the American nation sought to establish national unity during a period of one-party dominance. The Federalist

Party, representing the urban and aristocratic citizens, disappeared after the disastrous Hartford Convention in 1814, leaving only the Jeffersonian Republicans as the sole political party. The Jeffersonian Republicans so dominated the political land-

scape that President James Monroe ran unopposed in 1820 and would have won a unanimous vote in the electoral college except for the vote of a few rogue electors.

With the death of the Federalist Party, Monroe went on a national goodwill tour in 1817. While in Boston, the former Federalist stronghold, the term Era of Good Feeling was first used in a local paper.

I am coining a new term to describe the current state of affairs of American politics: the Era of Bad Feelings.


We have two political parties and each one hates the other. While political parties, by nature, are competitive, they have had a history of working together until the 1980s. After about a half-century of Democratic Party dominance in Congress from the 1930s to the 1980s, the Republican Party decided to stop working with the Democrats and, instead, oppose them on virtually every issue. Compromise was replaced by conflict.

The end of compromise led to the collapse of ideological diversity in both political parties. Entering the 1980s, both the Republican and Democratic Parties had a mix of moderates, liberals and conservatives. Today, the Republicans have a few moderates among the mostly conservative ranks, and the Democrats have a few moderates among its liberal base. The political center is gone and the political extremes dominate both parties.

Political hatred of the other party has grown so strong, that it affects what we read, what we watch, where we live and even who we marry. A Pew Research study of 10,000 Americans found that partisans prefer living in communities of like-minded individuals. Fifty percent of conservatives and 35 percent of liberals think it is "important to live in a place where people share my political views."

Liberals watch MSNBC and read American Prospect, the Progressive and the Daily Kos. Conservatives have Fox News and Rush Limbaugh to listen to, and they read the Drudge Report, Weekly Standard, National Review and Breitbart.

As Americans increasingly live in communities of like-minded individuals and



Guest Column Clemency and Florida's overbearing 'politics of death'

He would put it off as long as he could, aides said, and trembled when he finally had to sign a black-bordered death warrant. Despite his profound opposition to capital punishment, LeRoy Collins sent 29 men to their doom during his six years as

Florida's governor. He was in anguish each time.

To some people, that example casts a poor light on Aramis Ayala, the state attorney for Orange and Seminole counties, whose announced decision to seek no death

sentences is the crux of an unprecedented battle in the Supreme Court with Gov. Rick Scott and, now, the Florida House of Representatives.

But it is Scott and five of his predecessors who come off worse in comparison with the totality of Collins's record. The awesome power to commute death sentences has been a dead letter in their hands.

Collins, however, was unafraid to exercise that power, and he commuted 10 death sentences to life in prison, nearly one in every four that came to him.

No Florida governor has granted clemency to any death row inmate since Bob Graham last did so in 1983. The six sentences that Graham commuted comprise Florida's entire total since the death penalty was restored in 1976. There have been 76 executions since then.

Meanwhile, 276 condemned men and women have been spared by executive action in 22 other states – including Alabama, Texas and Louisiana – and the federal government.

In Florida, however, what New York's Gov. Mario Cuomo aptly called "the politics of death" are so overbearing that Gov. Lawton Chiles could not get the necessary majority of the Cabinet to agree with him to spare Danny Doyle, a mentally retarded murderer from Broward County. The outcome was a curious compromise: to postpone Doyle's clemency hearing for 25 years. Doyle remains on death row. The unconventional reprieve expires this year.

The U.S. Supreme Court has since forbidden the execution of mentally retarded inmates but left it to the states to decide who is sufficiently retarded. Gov. Rick Scott, an avid advocate of the death penalty, could conceivably sign the death warrant that Chiles forestalled in 1992. On that occasion, Doyle's fate was debated in a public meeting, but Gov. Jeb Bush put a stop to discussing death row cases in the sunshine. Bush, Charlie Crist and now Scott have never offered any reason for denying clemency other than to say they found no grounds to overturn the verdicts of the courts. That simply means they haven't been looking hard enough.

Throughout history, kings, presidents and governors have been the courts of last resort for prisoners who have exhausted their legal appeals. However, they act or not, largely unbound by any rule of law and subject to no appeal. Clemency is regarded as an "act of grace" that requires no explanation for being granted or denied. Florida's Administrative Procedure Act explicitly excludes it.

It is hard to understand or excuse why Florida's most recent governors have refused to spare anyone. Perhaps they have believed that the judiciary is infallible. But it is not. Jurors make mistakes, prosecu-

tors don't have to explain why they seek death in some cases and not others, and killers can sell out their less culpable codefendants to save their own skins.

The system is so rule-bound that an inmate can lose his life because an attorney did not make an objection or file an appeal at the right time.

In 1993, even as he voted with a unanimous court to allow the execution of Larry Joe Johnson, Florida Justice Gerald Kogan decried "the problems inherent in applying procedural bars to death cases." Florida, he said, "will electrocute a man injured and most probably maimed psychologically while serving in his nation's military in Vietnam and elsewhere. This will happen even though it is clear that, had this case been tried today, the procedures used in the trial court ... would have been selfevidently defective ... The record, in this case, leads me to the disturbing conclusion that the legal system has failed to give Larry Joe Johnson even one particle

of credit for his honorable service to his country or for the injury and disability he suffered while in the armed forces of the United States."

Kogan's cry from the heart prompted Chiles to withdraw Johnson's death warrant for more study, but he signed another one after an expert who had diagnosed post-traumatic stress disorder changed his opinion. Johnson died.

A governor who might fear political consequences from showing mercy should consider the courage Collins displayed in December 1955 when he and the Cabinet spared the life of Walter Lee Irvin, a black man who had been twice condemned for raping a white woman in Lake County. Collins was contemplating a campaign for reelection in a climate supercharged by the U.S. Supreme Court's decision to ban racial segregation in the schools. The judge in the case and the sheriff, a notorious racist, did everything they could to hurt Collins politically, but he was re-elected.

"In all respects my conscience told me that this was a bad case, badly handled, badly tried, and now on this bad performance I was asked to take a man's life. My conscience would not let me do it," Collins said.

Subsequent investigations showed that Irvin and his three co-defendants, two of whom had already been shot dead, were most surely innocent, framed by the sheriff. It wasn't even clear that a rape had taken place. Two legislators from South Florida are now trying to pass a resolution affirming the innocence of the "Groveland Four."

Irvin, who lived long enough to be pa-

roled, would have died in the electric chair but for a governor whose conscience defied the politics of death.

Political hatred is becoming so ingrained in Americans that parents increasingly object to their children marrying outside their faith. I'm not talking about religious faith, but their political faith. A half-century ago, only 5 percent of Americans objected if their child married a member of the opposite party. Today, that number has increased to 40 percent.

As part of the growing intolerance of those who hold opposing political views, we increasingly engage in stereotyping to justify our hatred. Instead of dealing with individuals, it is easier to ascribe negative traits to everyone who belongs to the "wrong party."

Republicans stereotype Democrats as socialists intent on destroying the free enterprise system and encouraging individuals to go on welfare rather than work. Remember Mitt Romney's statement to Republican donors that he could not win the vote of 47 percent of the American voters because they were dependent on government handouts?

Democrats attack Republicans as homophobic Neanderthals who hate women and minorities, and they have no compassion for the less fortunate in society.

Stereotyping is the lazy person's way to stop dealing with people as individuals and

instead lump everyone together as a bad person. It is so much easier to dismiss the ideas of an entire group, than it is to sit down and talk about an issue and how to resolve it.

The most recent manifestation of the Era of Bad Feelings is the 2016 presidential election. Many Republicans hated Hillary Clinton. They would argue that they disliked her because of her policies, but most could not envision any circumstance under which they could support her.

Democrats hated Donald Trump because they viewed him as a racist and a womanizer, and they also believed he was unprepared to be president. To many Democrats, the billionaire Trump could never understand the burdens of poor Americans.

Sixty-three million Americans voted for Trump and, yet, somehow Democrats are convinced all of them were crazy. Clinton received 3 million more votes than Trump, but Republicans saw this as a sign of Democratic insanity.

If we spent a fraction of the time trying to understand and empathize with members of the other party, we may actually find that most of them are decent, honest people who have the same concerns that we have. We might even discover that they may have a better idea than we have.

We cannot expect more of politicians than we expect of ourselves. It is time to end the irrational hatred that is counter to our real values and is impeding our ability to solve the problems that desperately need to be solved.

Rooterville farm animal sanctuary an Eden for all kinds

MELROSE – Like every good idea, Rooterville Sanctuary started with 33 fully-grown hogs.

Cause and effect took over from there.
As founder Elaine West describes, "It iust happened: God has a sense of humor."

In 2004, West had already been rescuing unwanted pigs, neutering them and finding them homes. After a few big rescues, she quickly realized the hog halfway house model she had setup was no longer adequate.

She decided she had to do something.

More than 13 years later, Rooterville has grown to house more than 300 animals on a 30-acre farm near Melrose. But today, Rooterville is not just a sanctuary for un-

wanted and forgotten hogs. It also provides a safe haven for cows, chickens, turkeys, dogs, cats, goats and bees.

On any given day, the hogs roam free on the property chewing on peanut hay and rolling around in mud holes to cool down.

Each has the dignity of a name, and the burden of a story. On hot days, you'll find Temple and Lulu laying on each other in the shade.

Lulu, a 400-plus pound farm pig was discovered roaming the streets of Tampa by wildlife authorities. At the time, she was only a farm piglet, a fraction of the size she would grow to be. When she arrived at Rooterville, the other hogs shunned and bullied her.

Temple, the Australian cattle dog adopted by the sanctuary, shielded Lulu from the abuse, which has made them inseparable ever since.

Rooterville workers focus on ensuring the animals' time at the sanctuary is different from their pasts. It's part of the reason why nearly every worker is either a vegetarian or vegan.

"My main reason was the welfare of the animals, how they've been treated on factory farms, where over 95 percent of the meat in grocery stores come from," West said. "When I saw that I knew that was something I could not morally and ethically support, so I stopped."

West has lived meat-free for 22 years, and uses the sanctuary to help educate others about living vegetarian or vegan as

Some animals from Rooterville come from factory farms, so the workers see firsthand the after effects it can have on the animals.

Stella, the 400-pound farm pig, likely was a breeding sow in a factory farm. She lived her first five years in a cage.

In 2006, Stella fell off the back of a truck on the way to a slaughterhouse and collapsed in a family's driveway on the brink of death. When she was brought to the sanctuary, workers realized she would live with partial paralysis for the rest of her life from her mistreatment.

While she has since died, Rooterville uses Stella's story to advocate against the horrors of factory farms. Her memory lives on in a memorial butterfly garden in the center of the farm.

A reoccurring theme in the pigs they take in, however, is entirely innocuous. Pet owners believe they are purchasing what is known as a 'teacup pig,' or, a pig that will remain the same size throughout their life.

Unfortunately, the buyers are duped into buying farm pigs. Teacup pigs are a myth, and many of the pigs purchased under this pretense can grow to 500 pounds. Owners looking to hand the hogs off to animal control organizations often find there just aren't services available to handle these animals.





16.75-pound bass takes lead for TrophyCatch Season 5

TALLAHASSEE – An Estero, Fla. man is the heaviest catch leader in season 5 of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's TrophyCatch program.

Dominic Montalto of Estero leads the state after having caught a 16-pound, 12-ounce largemouth bass caught in a private pond in Estero.

This comes close to the current certified state record of a 17-pound, 4-ounce largemouth bass caught in Polk County in 1986. A team of FWC biologists verified the accuracy of Dominic's scale, catch videos and photos.

"When I first saw the fish, I thought it was a log with a volleyball under it — until it moved," Montalto said. "Once I realized it was a big bass, I started targeting it and just kept trying until it took the bait."

Montalto was fishing from shore around dusk using a Johnny Morris Titanium 8 heavy-action rod with a Bass Pro Shops Pro Qualifier 7.1:1 reel and a XPS Z9R Perch Swimbait lure in bluegill color.

Montalto is 19 years old and learned to fish from his father, Joe. The Montalto family refers to themselves as a "fishing family," noting that they made the move from Illinois to Florida a year ago and specifically selected their home based on nearby fishing ponds. Dominic Montalto currently attends Florida Gulf Coast University where he is pursuing a degree in physical therapy.

TrophyCatch is a partnership between FWC biologists, anglers and fishing industry leaders, such as Bass Pro Shops, that rewards the catch, documentation and release of largemouth bass weighing 8 pounds or heavier in Florida. In order to be eligible for prizes, anglers are required

"There's just such a need for it," said Chloe Dercks, a farm intern living at the sanctuary for the next two months. "There's all these animals that don't have homes and there's just not enough sanctuaries in the country in order to house all of them — especially pigs. For some reason a lot of farm animal sanctuaries just don't want to take in pigs."

Pigs are expensive to care for, especially when it comes to medical care. Pigs are prone to foot infections, for instance, that can erode the bones in their feet.

Dercks is currently traveling around the country from sanctuary to sanctuary studying how they operate. She said she wants to open her own sanctuary one day and visiting other sanctuaries gives her a more in depth look at how they operate. She just came back from sanctuaries in Jamestown, Tennessee and Grass Valley, California.

Florida has a few animal sanctuaries. There is Another Chance Ranch in St. Augustine, as well as CJ Acres Animal Rescue Farm in Keystone Heights and Kindred Spirits Sanctuary in Ocala.

All depend on donations to continue

caring for the animals that no one else will.

Rooterville is looking at moving to a new location as they are currently near overcapacity and are eyeing acreage near the Orlando area. When they find it, they'll begin a massive donation drive to help fund the move.

This will be the sanctuary's third move since it incorporated in 2004.

"We have to find the right property first and that's proving to be a process," West said. "It's going to take some time, if and when we find property then we've got to build it out and design it. It can all be moved gradually."

Until then, the sanctuary has no-cost tours for those interested in learning about their animals. West said a new location will not only help them adopt more pigs, but will help drive more donations and more people through the gate to meet the pigs they support.

West said now, more than ever, it's important people realize the plight of homeless pigs.

"I feel guilty when I can't take pigs in," she said, "because a dog and a cat, at least maybe they'll have the dignity to get a humane euthanasia at a shelter, a pig is probably going to end up in somebody's freezer, so, yeah, when I can't take in somebody's pig – it hurts."

While living and working in Palatka, Sandra Hartley was an instrumental figure in planning and organizing a similar annual event there. After accepting the role as the human resources senior executive at the

Clay County Sheriff's Office, she decided to bring the event to Clay County, calling every organization she could come up with that dealt with safety for children and family well-being.

"The idea behind the event today is about prevention and awareness," Hartley said. "If anyone wants to pick up resources, everyone is here."

The event was headlined by a large tractor-trailer that reminded guests in bold print that they can make a difference in the lives of abused children. The truck, and the blue pinwheels, are part of the national campaign Pinwheels for Prevention, which works to showcase organizations that help children live worry-free, safe lives. submit photos or videos of their catch to TrophyCatch.com, showing the fish's weight on a scale, before releasing it back into the water. FWC biologists use Trophy-Catch data for bass research, to make informed decisions about the management of Florida bass fisheries, and to promote the catch-and-release of trophy bass.

Dominic's trophy bass qualifies him for the TrophyCatch Hall of Fame Club, which offers rewards for catches weighing 13 pounds or heavier. Hall of Fame Club catches are celebrated at a ceremony each vear and club members receive \$100 gift cards to Bass Pro Shops and/or Rapala, a fiberglass replica mount from New Wave Taxidermy, a \$50 SpiderWire merchandise credit code, and a Fitzgerald Rod, among other prizes. Since the beginning of Season 5 in October 2016, 12 Hall of Fame bass have been approved. Dominic's catch also puts him in the lead for becoming the TrophyCatch Champion, which is awarded to the angler with the heaviest catch of the season. Anglers have until the end of Season 5 on Sept. 30, 2017, to submit their catches and try to take the lead.

Anglers are also eligible to win the TrophyCatch Grand Prize, which is awarded to the angler with the heaviest combined weight of approved catches throughout the entire season. The Grand Prize includes a Shimano prize pack of G. Loomis and Metanium combo, and a Lake County tourism prize pack of a three-day, two-night stay

in Lake County with a fishing trip guided by professional angler Tim Frederick. Second prize includes a Shimano prize pack of Expride and Chronarch MGL combo. Third prize includes a Shimano prize pack of Exage and Casitas combo.

The FWC encourages anglers to join TrophyCatch as citizen-scientists to assist in fisheries management and the conservation of Florida's lakes and rivers. "Frankly I didn't think I'd be one of the finalists, let alone win," Saunders said.



She said she wants to help children express their feelings they have experienced



due to trauma by drawing pictures that speak to their mental condition. Saunders knows a friend's father had a stroke and art therapy helped in his recovery.



OAKLEAF – Lindsey Estevez is a tattoo covered, recent high school graduate working with men who, often, are two to three times her age.

Estevez, 18, is a statistical anomaly in a field where she works as a wastewater operator for the Clay County Utility Authority. That agency, and many other specialties like it, currently faces an aging workforce incapable of capturing the interest of younger generations.

As the younger generation increasingly turns to science, medicine and technology fields, the 'somebodies-gotto-do-it jobs' have seen a slow decline in youthful new hires and a gradual climb in the average age of their employees.

Now, as many of these employees are primed to retire, employers are looking for new ways to fill what could be an impending workforce void.

Before the crisis reaches critical mass, companies have begun the search for a remedy. And for many, the

solution comes from education.

"We have a lot of aging employees," in ther wastewater treatment plants, said Celeste Laffy, public information officer for CCUA. "It's not really sexy, but it's something that we all have to rely on. And when you ask kids when they're in school what they want to be, they always think of really interesting careers, and you can't really imagine most of them saying 'hey, I want to be a wastewater operator."

Two years ago, the utility began an internship program with the Clay County School District to reach out to students who may be interested in related fields, whether it be environmental sciences, engineering or technology.

That's how Estevez first got involved.

"I wanted to work with my hands, be outside, have on the job training," said Estevez, a graduate of Middleburg High. "I didn't even know it was a job, wastewater operators, people don't even think about it."

It's reasons like this that contribute to the utility's worker age range of 27-years-old to 66. Wastewater operators are especially in demand now, considering there is only a finite number to serve an ever-growing population who rely on that water for irrigation and aquifer replenishment.

Often, Laffy said, utilities will fight over workers, offering ever-increasing benefit packages and wages to licensed operators.

By no means, however, is this worry exclusive to the field.

"Young people come out of school now and they're not interested in being plumbers or concrete workers... they all want to go be [Information and Technology] workers," said Bill Garrison, president of the Clay Economic Development Corp. "How do you make these occupations sexy again? How do you make them where young people are attracted to them? There's no easy way to address that, I can tell you right now, there's no easy way."

The EDC is currently in talks with

More than 70 new high-wage jobs coming to Clay County

ORANGE PARK – An idle building on Wells Road is soon to undergo a remodeling job as the U.S. Navy consolidates multiple civilian engineering jobs under one roof.

Fleet Readiness Center Southeast is consolidating several offices on and near Naval Air Station Jacksonville to a single location at 680 Wells Rd. in Orange Park.

FRCSE is moving into the 18,000 square foot building that formerly houses Fortis College before it expanded to the old Staple's location on Blanding Boulevard in the Big Lots plaza.

Adams Interiors, a Clay County-based commercial contractor, is scheduled to complete the interior renovations by August this year. The average wage of these new Clay County jobs is \$95,000 a year, nearly three times the current average wage of jobs in Clay, which is \$36,000.

FRCSE is the largest industrial employer in Northeast Florida with 3,000 civilian personnel and 1,000 military personnel.

The Clay County Economic Development Corp. has assisted FRCSE officials with locating a new location that met their needs and was near NAS Jacksonville.

Clay EDC was initially introduced to FRCSE by Clay Chamber President Doug Conkey in the summer of 2016. The EDC worked with FRCSE for several months to find the right real estate option that fit their specific criteria.

Clay County's economy will benefit greatly from this consolidation, especially restaurants and other retailers in the Wells Road area, according to an EDC news release.

Many of FRCSE employees are already Clay County residents. Initially the new FRCSE office will have 70 engineers and logisticians, but that number will quickly grow to nearly 100 highwage employees.

"Established in 1940, the facilities at FRCSE have turned out almost every type of Navy aircraft - fighter and attack planes, patrol, antisubmarine, reconnaissance, transport, trainer, special configuration and helicopters. The overall workload for FRCSE has expanded to include the rework of engines, components, and ground support equipment, plus other support functions vital to the Fleet," according to the FRCSE website.

multiple companies in Clay County on how best to remedy the growing problem of workforce greying. So far, the best ideas to come from talks have all revolved around education. Exposing teens, in particular, to potential careers through expos, fairs, career days and internships to help remove the stigma hanging over some of these careers and help groom a new generation of skilled workers, said Garrison.

"It pays to invest in the budding workforce," Garrison said. "And I think we're going to see more and more of that."

The hunt for younger workers is increasingly frantic in the construction field. There are currently about \$1.2 billion in Department of Transportation projects in process in Northeast Florida.

"With that much work, we have a clear need for the next generation to help build the infrastructure in Northeast Florida," said FDOT engineer Scott Lent in a recent interview with Clay Today. "We are trying to educate students about the transportation and construction industry as a whole. We need contractors and consultants, so we're trying to engage the next generation into the industry."

Over the last four years, FDOT has participated in a regional expo to show students aspects of the construction field. Construction Career Day drew 600 students to the Jacksonville Equestrian Center March 30 in a showcase of almost every piece of machinery in the FDOT arsenal. Vac-Con, the Green Cove Springs based truck-mounted machine manufacturer, employees 318 people. More than 50 percent of those employees are over age 40.

"We have this issue facing us," Garrison said. "It's not just Clay County obviously, it's everywhere."

When Estevez moved from intern to employee in June, another employee simultaneously retired. She expects by next year to move from a trainee to fully-licensed wastewater operator, a career that will make her \$50,000 annually before she even leaves her parents' home.

"I really didn't have a plan, I wasn't interested in anything," Estevez said. "I didn't really know where I wanted to go with life...Some of my friends have gone to college. I'm cool with that, it's just not for me."

\$10 million building underway at Moosehaven

ORANGE PARK – Residents of Moosehaven Retirement Community can look forward to a new addition to the compound.

Executive Director John Capes and the board recently broke ground on the \$10 million Centennial Hall building, which has the hope of becoming the compound's centerpiece building.

Centennial Hall will be a three story, congregate assisted living facility for residents who need fewer hands-on services than others on the 61-acre compound on Park Avenue in Orange Park. The 55,585-square foot facility will be constructed from a concrete frame and feature a flat roof and V-shaped design to give more residents a view overlooking the St. Johns River to the compound's east.

Centennial Hall will also feature the ability for residents to plug their mobility scooters in for charging at their front door, something highly desired by the residents and a feature construction contractor Ginger Rivers has never seen before.

"It'll be state of the art," said Rivers,

who is the director of operations for E. Vaughn Rivers Inc., the construction company contracted to construct the building. "Moosehaven has spent a lot of time designing it so it'll be the centerpiece of their facility. It'll be something that everyone driving by" will appreciate.

Moosehaven slates the buildout will takes roughly 14 months.

Founded in 1922, Moosehaven provides a continuum of community care to members of the Loyal Order of the Moose and Women of the Moose. The facility offers residents the opportunity to age in place and get the healthcare they need as their age requires. The campus offers independent living, assisted living, skilled nursing care and hospice care.



The city's Community Redevelopment Agency – which is comprised of the city council members - voted 4-0 (with council member Dan Lewandowski absent) on April 17 to have the city's Heritage Commission apply for a grant from the Florida Department of State Division of Historical Resources. The feasibility study and accompanying grant application is an outgrowth of public feedback given at the April 6 pavilion visioning session.

"This is a very special place and it can draw tourists and not only will we benefit from better facilities for the community, but the surrounding areas," said LaDonna Hart, co-founder and chair of the Heritage Commission, speaking this Monday referring to the April 6 community session.

Hart said a restored pavilion could be used for class and family reunions, a youth center and a community center where the mayor could use to hold for special awards ceremonies and many more.

"It's just a focal point to bring the community together," Hart said.

When he was a teenager, Mayor Tony Brown spent entire summers at the city's pavilion playing ping-pong, billiards, listening to concerts and, when it got hot, jumping straight from the dock into the

Things are different now. The lake levels in Lake Geneva, which makes up the shore of Keystone Beach, today extends far beyond the pavilion.

"I don't think the younger generation, the teenagers of today understand what this used to be," Brown said. "My generation and up and some of the younger ones that are in their 40s – we remember the water, we remember all the activities we had here.'

While the lake levels have changed, the pavilion has also changed over the years.

City officials and residents are currently pushing to undergo a major restoration to the pavilion. Residents want to restore the pavilion to the way it looked and functioned in 1921, complete with its original

Residents shared memories and suggestions at an April 6 visioning session held within the pavilion itself. Some residents stood in the back because of the packed house while members of the Kevstone Heights Heritage Commission unveiled early conceptual plans for the pavilion restoration.

Made in the shade: plants for a shaded yard

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – If you have trees in your yard, you most likely have those areas where plants just seem to struggle because of the shade. Whether it is the area of your lawn that you need to resod every few years, the bed where some

of your plants just never seem to grow or a completely bare spot, shaded places can be a challenge in the landscape. However, with proper choices you can have a beautiful garden with little sunlight.

First of all, while some varieties may have the ability to

tolerate some shade, no turfgrass is able to truly thrive in these areas and will likely never perform as well as it would in full sun. Consider adding more landscape beds where you can plant a diverse array of plants that will flourish. Vegetable gardens will also likely fail with less than 6 hours of sun during the day.

Another item to consider is that shade does change during the day and during seasons. Note how it may shift during the day or throughout the year. Afternoon shade is usually preferable to morning shade for most plants.

Shaded areas can also sometimes be poorly suited to any landscaping if they are too wet or dry, have many tree roots or have an extremely thick canopy. If the tree canopy is too dense, you can consider thinning out some branches to allow more light through but this should be completed

by an ISA Certified Arborist to ensure it is done correctly.

One option for shady spots under large trees are understory trees. These species evolved to grow in dense forests so are well-suited to survive in the shaded yard. Some options include Eastern Dogwood, Red Buckeye, Redbud or Dahoon Holly. Shrubs such as Camellias, Azaleas, Florida Anise, or Beautyberry can also be planted. There are many other options available as well. These can be planted as single specimens or in striking groupings.

For lower growing plants, River Oats can be an effective ornamental grass and most ferns can also do well. If you are looking for groundcovers, consider Asiatic Jasmine, Ajuga, Cast-Iron Plant, Lilyturf, Asiatic Jasmine or Mondograss. Color can also be found in the shade garden by utilizing Gingers, Kaffir Lily, Walking Irises and shrimp plants. If you are looking for a palm like plant, Coonties, Palmettos, Lady

Palms and Needle Palms are well suited to the shade. For more plants and ideas for your shade garden you can read the UF/IFAS fact sheet on shade gardens found at http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/ep457.

Just like with any landscape, you should never use any invasive plants. Stay away from Nephrolepsis cordifolia, also known as the tuberous sword fern. Other invasive, shade tolerant plants to avoid include Wedelia. Goral Ardesia, and Nandina.

pinwheel "has come to serve as the physical embodiment, or reminder, of the great childhoods we want for all children."

The truck, which travels to about 20 locations each April for similar gatherings, made its first stop in Clay County for this event.

"Our goal is providing a hub for networking of providers," said Tommy Forrest, an employee of FedEx Freight and road team member for the Pinwheels for Prevention Truck. "I'll see people from different organizations exchange business cards and it helps the various organizations connect."

Irene Toto, chief executive officer of Clay Behavioral Health Center and Kids First of Florida, served as a co-sponsor of the event through her organizations, and believes that bringing everyone together is the only way to protect children in Clay County

"Awareness is key," Toto said. "Protecting our children is everyone's job. This event teaches everyone in the community

that working together we have a better chance of keeping kids safe."

Behind the whole event is an organization that sees many of the abuse cases first-hand, the Clay County Sheriff's Office. When Hartley decided to organize this event after moving from Palatka, Sheriff Darryl Daniels was one of the first on board.

"Over the years I have seen so many [child abuse] cases in Northeast Florida that it sickens me," Daniels said, adding that Clay County has had more than 600 serious cases of child abuse in the last two


years. "I hope this event brings awareness to the fact that we have some kids running around dealing with this [in Clay County]."

Awareness was the theme of the day, as many organizations, and some members of the community, do not believe that the average resident knows how serious of an issue this is locally.

"The community needs to be aware that there is significant child abuse out there," said Catherine Gaul of Middleburg. "I have a foster child who was abused. We came here today because it's good for her to know that it's OK and that she'll be OK."







Cook advises 'listen to your mama'

In the first installment of the (soon to be) world-famous "Tales from the Plancha" series, I visit with Taylor Rayburn of Brewer's Pizza near Orange Park. Located right here on Blanding Boulevard, Brewer's is also home to the Pinglehead Brewing Company and some of the best pizza on the planet.

I caught up with Taylor before dinner service where we discussed his earliest food memories, how he got his start in food service and his best advice for home cooks.

Taylor's earliest food memories took place at Burdav's Café in Ft. Worth, Texas. His mother ran the kitchen making all of the



biscuits from scratch and working 6 to 7 days a week. When his dad didn't have work and he didn't have school, Taylor would visit her

"She had a towel set off to the side and every once in a while she would go grab it and wipe her face because she was sweating because it was so hot back there," he said.

Taylor's mother told him "When you turn 18, you are going to have a job." Early one Saturday morning, his mother — who managed a local Waffle House — had an employee not show up for work. She called home and a very young and hung over Taylor answered.

"I need your (fill in the blank) here now."

After a quick shower, a blurry-eyed Taylor walked in and was greeted by his mom who told him "you are on the meat station, don't fudge (you get the idea) up." He made it through service that day prepping all of the bacon, sausage and hamburgers. It was a heck of a place to cut your teeth.

In October of 2012, Taylor walked in to Brewer's Pizza. They had just fired a dishwasher and Taylor – who was looking a job – had no problem washing dishes. Troy Maas, – the owner – liked what he heard and hired Taylor on the spot.

As time marched on past 2012, Taylor worked his way up the food chain at Brewer's and is now the head cook. He gets to use his creativity each week by creating recipes for what's called "The Monday Mash-In." The mash-in involves creating such unique pizzas as Chicken Pot Pie, Pesto Pizza, or Chicken Enchilada Pizza and then pairing them with the finest craft beer known to mankind.

Taylor's best advice for home cooks is to find a recipe from a reputable source and try to replicate it. The provider has an understanding of seasonings and this should be used as your guide. After that, feel free to make any additions, subtractions or substitutions. In addition to following a recipe at least once, Taylor encourages cooks to have everything measured and set out in advance, before you fire up the grill.

When it's time to cook, you won't be searching for ingredients that you could have had prepared in advance. This makes for an enjoyable cooking experience.

Veterans share WWII stories with new generation

JACKSONVILLE - John Francis Frank said he'd never forget D-Day. Serving in the Navy's amphibious unit. Frank stormed Omaha Beach during the Battle of Normandy when he was only 19.

The water was so rough. When we landed, the shooting started and never stopped, it was continuous shelling and your ears rang for days," Frank said.

On a 50-mile stretch of beach, 9.000 Allied soldiers died and laid there for weeks. Frank remembers the stench.

"It's a smell you live with, as I'm speaking it comes back," Frank said.

There were two items of importance before Frank, the first was a bottle of sand from Omaha Beach. The second was a German helmet with a bullet hole through the front. Frank said he saw the soldier die.

"Helmets protect you. But they don't protect you from a direct hit," Frank said. "He wasn't much older than I was."

Frank wore his army side cap and uniform on a table with nine other veterans in the University of North Florida's main ballroom Monday. Former pilots, infantryman, sailors and combat engineers told war stories and fielded questions from a packed crowd, giving students and younger veterans a glimpse at the World War Two experience that is quickly vanishing. Hosted by the UNF Military and Veterans Resource Center, the Green Cove Springsbased Military Museum of North Florida

and UNF's Thomas G. Carpenter Library also displayed WWII artifacts.

Howard Spencer flew P-47 bombers in the Army Air Corps and endured 93 missions over France, including Bastogne Remagen and Metz. He earned the Distinguished Flying Cross and the French Legion of Honour. Spencer's unit hovered 1,000 feet above his targets - buildings and tanks. Spencer said job his was to "make a mess of things."

"To fly 90 missions and survive, somebody was looking out for me I guess," Spencer said.

The event wasn't completely serious though. Spencer told a story about going to the bathroom inside an airplane which brought the audience to tears.

"Hey Spencer," called out Navy pilot and former UNF professor Donald Farshing, "been there, done that."

Ray Wikstrom, head of UNF's Military Veteran's Resource Center flew helicopters for 31 years, including in Vietnam.

"The speakers' were sincere and there

member Don Morgan revealed his vision for a pavilion that would draw others from outside the community. The new pavilion would feature air conditioning, a small kitchen and restrooms while removing old changing rooms that largely have remained unused.

"It will be quite a long time before we make any formal presentation to the state," Morgan said. "So we've got quite a bit of planning time to work with.'

The pavilion represents the heart of the community with its central location and, more importantly, the memories the residents still carry of summer days in their childhood.

The city tapped Morgan, 85, for probono design work for the project's initial stages. The Heritage Commission will begin looking for potential grants to fund the pavilion restoration. Last fall, Keystone Heights was named the 71st Certified Local Government in Florida, a new status that gives it eligibility for grant money under the Florida Department of State. The city hopes to use state funding plus other grants and donations to save the landmark building.

Once the city has a better idea on what it plans to spend, the restoration will go out for bid.

However, the city must remain realistic about its expectations. There is no current projection on what the landmark project could even remotely cost the city.

"We have no idea what we're looking at in terms of overall cost for the project," said City Manager Scott Kornegay. "We know it's going to be sizable. It's going to be a big project. This is a historical structure, and anything we can do to bring it back to its original use and function and bring it back to where it used to be and start having more events and gatherings down here would be super."

The town hopes to have the remodel completed before the city marks its centennial anniversary in 2025.

During the visioning meeting, residents punctuated the opportunity the city has to restore such a historical structure.

"The signature of this place in a way was water," said resident Richard Bloodgood. "People came from all over...it wasn't just the water, the water was great, but it was the atmosphere. The pavilion, the lights, the ping-pong table, the billiard table and all that other stuff. We have a golden opportunity here...I feel so good about this, just looking out there and seeing all that beautiful water and landscape."

The redesign would also reattach the pavilion's bandshell, which was removed in the 1980s. At that time, the bandshell was essentially a semi-circular metal dome. Morgan hopes to replace it with the less costly yet durable fiberglass.

The bandshell became an essential centerpiece to city concerts. Now, however, with amplification devices so common in music, the bandshell wouldn't become so

much a necessity, but draw others to the community.

The restoration is as much for the community as it for others outside the community. As the levels of Lake Geneva disappeared, so did much of Keystone Heights' tourism. A redesigned pavilion would help

guide new tourism, but a restored shoreline would drive it.

A new bill seeks to allocate money to do just that. Senate Bill 234, introduced by Fleming Island Republican Rob Bradley, would pipe water from Black Creek near State Road 16 and Penney Farms to Lake Magnolia on Camp Blanding property.

The project calls for the construction of a pipeline that would have a 10-milliongallon transmission capacity. Current estimates put a \$41 million price tag on the project with completion slated for June 2023. It would be paid for using funds from Amendment 1, which was approved by Florida voters in 2014.

Senate Bill 234 sailed through the senate without question, while its house companion, House Bill 847, is currently dead in the water without so much as a hearing scheduled yet.

Reconstruction for the pavilion would follow the same timeline as the proposed water project.

The city council restored the pavilion's facade and interior in the 90s, but the new proposal would be a more dramatic restoration.

The restoration comes at a time when Keystone Heights is trying to plan for the future.

"It's like everything, it takes time," Brown said. "We're pushing forward to do what we can for the lakes and keep a positive attitude.'



The officer punched Fales until he released his legs, kicking the officer again until the officer drew his taser, removed the cartridge, and used it to stun Fales until he stopped re-

Fales was transported to the Clay County Jail where he is facing felony charges for battery of a law enforcement officer, resisting an officer with violence, and abusing a child without great bodily harm. In addition to the felonies he is facing misdemeanor charges for domestic battery and vandalism under \$1000 for damage done to the

Fales' combined bond amount is set at \$110,000 and his next court date is scheduled for May 24.

was a fair bit of humor too," Wikstrom said.
"It's a great experience, I cherish events like this."

Andy Ramotnik served in the Army Air Corps and piloted B-25's in North Africa and Germany. Ramotnik, who now lives in Orange Park, was shot down over Germany and taken prisoner. He was sent to Stalag 17B, a notorious prison camp in Austria that "America in WWII" magazine described as a "sprawling eyesore and den of misery."

Groups of a hundred men were periodically forced to march and denied food. They would sleep in farm fields, exhausted. Back at the camp, Ramotnik went with another soldier, John, to get water for coffee.

"That's when I noticed there weren't any guards stationed in the alleys where they were supposed to be," Ramotnik said.

They made a break for it and escaped through woods and a cave until they ran into Germans building foxholes and caves and were sent back to the prison camp.

Ramotnik spoke in sharp bursts, he'd pause and ask the audience, "What would you do?" or "What would you think?" whenever his story came to a set of decisions he had to make during his escape. One was whether or not to attack a German civilian who discovered Ramotnik and John in the cave. Instead, Ramotnik offered the man cigarettes, and then fled.

The second escape was simpler, Ramonik said. On a forced march, Ramotnik, John and 20 French POWs walked far past the guards and ran for the woods. Ramonik received a job and regular food from a sympathetic Polish wife of a German soldier fighting in Russia. After "a close call"

from the German troops, the Polish woman asked Ramotnik and John to leave, but a Polish teenager told them the war was over.

Ramotnik and Spencer enlisted the day after Pearl Harbor. Al Malitz, a combat engineer who toured in the Pacific Theater, was eager to join the fight from an early age.

"Me and my friends said, 'I hope the war lasts so we could get in it,'" Malitz said

Jack Spitler and Matt Lindy hauled guns, uniforms, medals from the Military Museum of North Florida in Green Cove Springs to UNF. They volunteer at the museum, attend UNF and love military history, so their presence was an ideal fit.

Old military uniforms rested on mannequins while Lindy told curious students about his favorite relics, the 53-pound French Hotchkiss machine gun, and the .30 caliber M1 Garand bolt action rifle. Matt Lindy is a mechanical engineering sophomore at UNF. Lindy said he was thankful to see the veterans speak.

"The chance to see World War II veterans are few and far between, Lindy said. "You can read books about military, but hearing the history firsthand is pretty special."


Spitler said he loved military history and his experiences working with veterans at the museum. Spitler is a freshman history major at UNF and he said the Distinguished Veterans event was an experience he would never forget.



Two district wins in a week

OAKLEAF – The Oakleaf High softball team came home from a rugged Kissimmee Klassic championships against the likes of Florida and Kentucky state champions and continued on with their roll toward the upcoming district tournament with a 10-0 win over Atlantic Coast and a 5-1 win over Fleming Island, both district 2-8A foes, with Atlantic Coast one of the two teams to put the Knights at 21-2 overall.

Against Atlantic Coast, on April 11, the Knights took just one inning to rev up the runs engine against Taylor Bauman, the Stingrays top pitcher, who actually got three grounders from the Knights' batting lineup; Katie Kistler; new as the leadoff batter, Alex Acevedo, Angela Agurkis and

Rebecca Koskey, as head coach Christina Thompson continued to swap her top four hitters almost on a game-by-game basis.

Knights' pitcher Kelsey Sweatt manhandled the Stingray bats in the second with three strikeouts.

In the second inning, Oakleaf's bats bombarded Bauman with Baylee Goddard starting on first after being hit with a pitch then Mika Garcia singling. Haley Willis, Jenna Curtis and Tracy Ferguson all hit fielder's choice grounders to move baserunners with Kistler singling in Willis for the lone run of the energetic inning.

Atlantic Coast had a strikeout and two flyouts for offense in their third inning before Oakleaf scored four runs off a walk to Koskey, a single to Goddard, and error to a Garcia grounder that scored the first run of the inning before Willis nailed a suicide bunt to score Goddard and Ferguson smashed a two-run single for a 5-0 lead.

Clay looking to youth to survive upcoming districts

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Clay High Blue Devil Softball Head Coach Matt Lewis is searching.

His team has an identity crisis right now, and he knows where he has to go and what he needs to do.

"It's there, we're maturing, we're getting there," said Lewis, after his April 11 6-0 loss to the Baker County Bobcats, a former 5A regional foe with a 16-7 overall record, Tuesday night. "It's my job now to drag them kicking and screaming."

Of course, he was referring to the team's mental state. With only one senior playing right now, the team needs leader-

Not the cheerleading screamer, said Lewis, but a leader to step up when the team needs it, and punch the ball deep to spark her team. Right now, the job is vacant and Lewis needs to fill the void. After four games at Kissimmee where the team came back 2-2 after three days, his starting pitcher, Morgan Crutcher, threw over 20 innings and she needed time off.

"Not that I don't want to throw a game away and just throw away a loss; but I need people to step up too," said Lewis. "I need to put pressure on other people. We had a pressure practice, we threw live against ourselves in practice, and I'm trying to put pressure on people. I don't have Morgan (Crutcher) to keep us in a one-nothing ball

Baker County is in district 3-5A while Clay has ascended to district 4-6A. Clay and Baker County have a long history in the Class 5A region playoffs with Baker County knocking the Blue Devils out of the 2015 playoffs in the region semifinal en route to 5A title. Last year, Baker County lost in the 5A state semifinals to eventual runneruup Bayshore High while Clay, the

district 4-6A champion over Ponte Vedra eventually lost to Ponte Vedra in the region semifinal. Clay, locked up at 7-1 in district play with Ponte Vedra, will host the district 4-6A tournament in a week (April 24-27).

Against Baker County game, the Blue Devils only hit four base hits in seven innings. It wasn't a bad game early as the Devils kept it to a 1-0 game through the second inning. Clay held them again in the third.

After never needing more than four bat-

Sage sisters lead Spartans on to regions

JACKSONVILLE - Twin sisters Kendall and Courtney Sage, multiple event track athletes for St. Johns Country Day School, got a handful of top four finishes and one district title to lead the Spartans' girls track squad to a third place finish at the district 4-1A track and field championships held at Bishop Snyder High School on April 12. St. Johns' boys team took sixth with hurdler Connor Hale and distance runners Ben Kailes and Matthew Stratton all taking top four finishes.

Athletes return to Bishop Snyder on April 25 for the region 1-1A track and field championships with top four finishers heading to the state championships May 5-6 at Bradenton's IMG Academy.

In the 300 meter hurdles, Courtney Sage, a freshman, had the top qualifier top in the preliminaries of 47.37 and improved that to 46.99 in the finals to finish behind Kendall Johnson of Providence who won in 46.13. Johnson clocked a 48.77 in her preliminary heat. Johnson also won the 100 meter hurdles in 15.68 with Sage third in 17.11. Sage was fifth in last year's 100 meters hurdles district final and fourth in the 300 hurdles with Johnson second. Sage finished third in the region meet last year in the 300 hurdles. Sage was ninth at the state meet in 49.20.

In the 100 meter dash, Kendall Sage won by a quarter second in 13.07 over Oceana Brown of the Florida School of Deaf and Blind who ran 13.26. Sage had the top qualifying time of 13.12 and improved that in the final to her winning 13.07. Kendall Sage also advanced in the long jump with a 15'-2.25 jump for fourth behind Semaj Mc-Ghee of Bishop Snyder who won at 16'-5".

In the boys hurdles, St. Johns' junior Connor Hale placed third in the 110 high hurdles in 17.15 behind Will Mallory of Providence who won in 15.57. Hale also

advanced to regions with a fourth in the 300 hurdles in 45.49; also won by Mallory. Hale improved in the 110 hurdles from his eighth place finish in 20.42 last year and 10th in the 300 hurdles in 50.08.

In the boys 400, St. Johns sophomore Jett Isley finished second in 52.16 to advance with Tyre Singleton of Florida School of Deaf and Blind winning in a sprint in 52.12. Third place was also close with Bishop Snyder's Malik Fordham in at 52.23. Isley was ninth at last year's district meet in the 200.

In the distance events, St. Johns got a second in the 800 from sixth grader Juliet

RHS Fertil goes in four events

JACKSONVILLE - Clay High track sprinter Erykah Murray, a state weightlifting champion just two months ago, has a sprint title as her target as she showed off speed with her proven power with top four finishes in the 100 and 200 meter dashes at the district 4-2A track and field championships held Wed., April 12 at the Bolles School in Jacksonville. Ridgeview sophomore hurdler Glenn Rodgers also won a district title in the 110 meter high hurdles.

Teams and top four athletes return to Bolles on April 25 for the region 1-2A track and field championships with top four finishers advancing the state championships at the IMG Academy in Bradenton May 5-6.

In the team scoring, Bolles won the women's title with 250 points with Bishop Kenny second with 104. Clay was fourth with 54 and Ridgeview took fifth with 51 points.

For the boys, Bishop Kenny won over Bolles 170-137.50 with Ridgeview third at 110 and Clay eighth at 24.

Murray, who got into the finals of the 100 meters with a fifth place qualifying time of 12.69 blasted in the finals later in the day with a second place 12.62 improvement behind Jada Williams of Westside High's 12.17 winning time. Murray finished fifth in 13.00 in the 2016 district race with Williams third.

In the 200, Murray had the same

pitch, and two batters later, Jose Almonte lined a ball to right field that Tyler Sullivan could not catch on a dive. The ball rolled all the way to the wall, allowing Tejeda to score the winning run. Kyle Kubat (0-1) took the loss while Crawdads outfielder Travis Bolin (1-0) earned the win.

Kannapolis threatened to jump ahead early, loading the bases with one out in the top of the first inning, but the Crawdads turned a double-play to end the inning.

The teams traded runs in the second inning. Tyler Sullivan dropped a base hit into shallow left field, scoring Zach Remillard for a Kannapolis lead, 1-0, but the Crawdads knotted the game when a Dunning throwing error on a pickoff attempt allowed Ti'Quan Forbes to score from third base.

Dunning, the White Sox No. 11 prospect this season, worked a career-high 8.0 innings while totaling a bakers dozen of strikeouts. He allowed an unearned run on two hits with no walks in his second outing at the Class A level. Mike Morrison pitched 2.0 scoreless innings for Kannapolis, striking out four and working around one hit.

With his career-high 13 batters, allowing an unearned run on three hits over eight innings in the Intimidators' 2-1 loss to the Hickory Crawdads in 12 innings, Dunning sports a 0.64 ERA with 21 strikeouts in 14 innings this season. In the South Atlantic League, Dunning has the top ERA with his 0.64.

Dunning's eight-inning performance Thursday followed a six-inning effort in his season debut last week against Lakewood. Both were longer outings than all but one of the starts he made between the Rookielevel Gulf Coast League and Class A Short Season Auburn last season.

"I really just got in the zone and was doing what I could to help out the team," said Dunning, now 22, via telephone Friday morning in North Carolina. "I'm just waking up and will head to the field to workout. I don't pitch for another five days."

The last Intimidators pitcher to record at least 13 strikeouts in a game came May 24, 2013, when Jake Cose tallied 13 against the Crawdads in Hickory.

Dunning said he stays away from thinking about the records and even did not know he was mentioned in a recent Sports Illustrated Major League Baseball preview issue.

"I have no clue about where I stand as far as going up to the Majors," said Dunning. "It's all about timing and other guys maybe getting traded or retiring or any number of things. I just keep working hard, improving my pitching and let that show what I can do."

As far as his pitching skills, Dunning commented that his control with his fast-ball; now clocking in at an average of 90-94 miles per hour, is getting better each day

"My slider is still good and I can move the ball around the corners pretty consistently," said Dunning. "The guys at this lev-

el are much better hitters as they all are as you go up the different leagues toward the Majors. The key is to keep the speed and keep the batters off balance. I have to keep improving until I get the shot."

Dunning said his speed was around 88-90 at Clay then up a bit at the University of Florida to between 95-98.

Dunning also commented that he missed taking a shot in the batter's box, but he understood the reason for not getting a shot to hit the ball.


"We have guys training to hit and guys training to pitch, " said Dunning. "Everyone had a specific role. I do miss hitting the ball though. It was fun at Clay to get big hits."


Kannapolis plays in the South Atlantic League Northen division against teams named the Greensboro Grasshoppers (Miami), the Hagerstown Suns (Washington), Hickory Crawdads (Texas), Lakewood BlueClaws (Philadelphia), Delmarva Shorebirds (Baltimore) and West Virginia Power (Pittsburgh).

Dunning, drafted 29th out of Florida in 2016 by the Washington Nationals, came to Kannapolis after pitching in 2016 for the Auburndale Doubledays in the New York-Penn League and earning a 3-2 record with a 2.14 ERA and 29 strikeouts. With the Gulf Coast League Nationals, Dunning pitching just two innings of Rookie League.

Dunning's older brother, Jake, is also in the Major League Baseball farm system with the Charlotte Knights, also a Chicago White Sox affiliate. On the Knights website, Jake Dunning is listed on the disabled 7-day list. Jake Dunning, 29 and also a right hand pitcher, was a 2009 draft choice of the San Francisco Giants in round 33. Jake Dunning currently holds a 22-16 Minor League pitching record and 0-2 for the

Major Leagues with the Giants. Dunning pitched in 2013 and 2014 for the Giants. He has 371 strikeouts in minor league play and 16 in the Majors.

Drew Weeks

One other Clay High graduate in the Majors, outfielder Drew Weeks, is currently playing for the Hartford Yard Goats (3-5) in the Eastern League has played in eight games with a .263 batting average on 1153 at bats. Weeks has 17 minor league homers in three years with a season-high eight dingers last year with the Modesto Nuts in California. Weeks was drafted in round seven in 2014 by the Colorado Rockies out of the University of North Florida. In his last 10 games at Hartford, Weeks is hitting .214 with five runs batted in.

Wes Weeks

Wes Weeks, Drew's younger brother, is currently playing at UNF (24-13) and sports a .263 batting average with 16 RBIs off 31 hits. Weeks had his first homer of the season in March against Dallas Baptist and a second in game three of the same series.

In a Saturday Atlantic Sun conference match against New Jersey Institute of Technology (3-26), Wes Weeks had three hits on the day; one a double and scored a run. Week's first at-bat resulted in a base after being hit with a pitch. North Florida won 6-3 after taking the first two of the three-game series 13-8 and 16-1. Weeks hit a double and had one RBI in game one then had three hits and two runs in the second game. For Weeks, the jump to baseball at the North Florida level as been more learning situational baseball.

"Coach Smoke Lavelle is a great guy and wants us to learn the game of baseball more than just going and hitting and catching baseballs," said Weeks. "He likes ground balls more than fly balls because one of his favorite things he says is he's never seen a fly ball take a bad hop. His strategy with ground balls is to get on base and score from that."

Against NJIT, Weeks imitated a favorite pre-at-bat ritual of brother Drew by taking a moment and staring at his bat before stepping into the batter's box.

"It really is to get a focal point on the bat," said Wes Weeks. "Drew and I talk a lot and he has taught me some things to keep my mind right for the game."

As for future aspirations and the possibility of joining his brother in the Majors, Wes Weeks said it's a plan set at a higher level

"God has a plan for all of us and if baseball is in mine, then so be it," said Weeks. "For that, I'm just working hard to get better each day."

Weeks has been in a battle with freshman Tanner Murphy, out of BartramTrail High School, for playing time in the outfield and has gotten the nod lately.

"Everyone is so good at this level, but I always expect to compete for a starter's shot," said Weeks. "I'm a competitor just like everyone else and it is a matter of desire to keep improving."

Weeks still maintains his outstanding footspeed on the basepaths, as was evident during his football days at Clay High with numerous 80 yard breakaways during his state finalist run with the Blue Devils.

"I'm still pretty fast and I try to use it wisely when I'm on base," said Weeks.

The Ospreys continue their season with a trip to Gainesville to play the University of Florida before returning home to host University of South Florida and April 19 and A-Sun foe Florida Gulf Coast University on April 21. Gulf Coast will play a threegame series in Jacksonville with games on April 22 and 23.






Stokes leads St. Joseph's to doubleheader sweep

in five innings in the nightcap. Pitching in the second game for the Hawks' was Clay High graduate Ashley Stokes.

In the opener, SJU and Delaware went to extra innings knotted at 7-7.


Abadie put SJU ahead 4-0 as she scored on a single by Zierke in the third.



FHSAA approves new playoff

By Randy Lefko Sport Editor

OAKLEAF - In a 14-2 vote, the Florida High School Athletic Association Board of Directors voted to approve a new football playoff format at its meeting Monday morning in September 2016.

Beginning with the 2017 season, district play will be eliminated in Classes 1A-4A, with teams making the playoffs based on a point system. Classes 5A-8A will retain districts, with the district champion receiving an automatic playoff bid.

FHSAA Points System

"Based on the feedback from our membership, the majority of our constituents wanted our old playoff system changed," FHSAA Executive Director Dr. Roger Dearing said. "We are hopeful this change will create the most exciting high school football postseason in America.'

For Classes 1A-4A, no region or district play will be required, as each school third round region games.

Sponsor

will control its own schedule. Four teams from each region (16 total) will make the playoffs based on the new points system.

District play for Class 5A-8A will remain, with 32 teams qualifying for the playoffs in each class. District champions will receive an automatic bid to the playoff and will receive a 1-4 seed based on the new points system. Four wild cards will be taken from each region based on points following the conclusion of Week 11.

The new format, generated through more than a year of study by FHSAA administrator Frank Beasley and other staffers, will be instituted for the 2017 and 2018 seasons.

The four larger classes (5A-8A) will continue to have districts and champions will receive automatic playoff bids and will be seeded 1, 2, 3 or 4 within a region which guarantees a home game for the first round of the playoffs.

Each of those classes will also have 16 at-large bids, four per region, based on the points formula. Those wild cards will be seeded 5-8.

The highest seed will host second and

Ironically, the pair had different opinions about the "Warehouse."


