Blanding Blvd. widening up for public comment

MIDDLEBURG – Florida Department of Transportation is now accepting public comments on the project to add two lanes on a stretch of road on Blanding Boulevard from County Road 218 to the Black Creek bridge in Middleburg.

Transportation officials held a public hearing Dec. 1 to expand the roadway from four lanes to six lanes, a \$21 million project officials said will provide more efficient east-west movement at the intersection of Blanding and CR-218. The project will also include widening the CR-218 bridge over the south prong of Black Creek.

Blanding is Clay County's main thoroughfare, prone to backups and traffic jams. With the completion of the project – first announced in 2013 – the intersection of Blanding and CR-218, a major choke point on the road, will see alleviated traffic.

"Clay County is growing like crazy," said Bill Henderson, district planning and environmental manager with FDOT. "One of the places that's really growing is south of Middleburg, towards Penney Farms."

The project is part of a larger reconstruction effort along a six-and-a-half mile stretch of the road dating back to 2002. Officials knew they would have to execute the buildout in sections. The widening project from Knight Boxx Road to Old Jennings Road saw its completion in 2009. A section from Allie Murray Road to Old Jennings similarly saw completion.

Construction for the remaining section from



Medical marijuana Commission leans toward no moratorium

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Planning Commission looks to be charting a careful, but compassionate, course on its dealings with medical marijuana and a potential moratorium on the issue.

The idea of an approximate year-long moratorium in dealing with zoning regulations for medical marijuana dispensaries and treatment centers was discussed at the Planning Commission's Dec. 6 meeting, and while no action was taken, the commission looked to be leaning towards advising a quicker resolution to the situation, rather than suggesting a year-long moratorium on dealing with it.

"I don't think that we should drag our heels on something the voters of the state of Florida have passed," said Belinda Johnson, commission vice chair.

The Planning Commission acts as an advisory board to the Board of County Commissioners, which has final say on all planning and zoning items.

The issue will come before the Planning Commission for a recommendation at its January meeting and will also be looked at by the BCC at that time.

The subject of medical marijuana came to the fore in the fall, when the issue appeared on state ballots in the Nov. 8

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Canova Christmas tree almost burned down the house

By Christmas in the late 1880s, nearly a decade had passed since the painful years of the Civil War and the early 1870s wresting of the Clay County seat of government from interior Middleburg to the town of Green Cove Springs.

The Canova family arrived as the hostilities ended and watched with enthusiasm as Green Cove Springs became a destination for wealthy Northern winter tourists, settlers and investors.

Family patriarch, Raphael, was neither northern nor a tourist. He was both sherriff of St. Johns County and mayor of St. Augustine with strong ties to Confederate military leaders. He realized the high probability that St. Augustine would be occupied by Union troops and he, his family and assets a prime target.

Putting his substantial number of properties in the hands of trusted agents, he moved his family, hired hands, cattle and livestock to a prepared camp near the St. Johns River. There they rode out the conflict serving as both supply, information and support for locals in Clay, Putnam and St. Johns counties. At war's end, he relocated to Green Cove Springs.

When the results of the public referendum made Green Cove Springs the new county seat, Canova was elected to perform the duties of county clerk. To add to the difficulties of the switch, all the county records disappeared.

With his political and law enforcement experience, Canova was able to use his longtime political contacts in Duval County to establish property and other records before Clay County's creation in 1859. This left him with just over a decade of information to fill in.

The right man was in the right place at the right time. In the late 1880s, events would evolve to put the same right man in the right place again.

It was Christmas Eve, approaching dark, when family, friends and neighbors were ushered into the Canova parlor to begin the gift giving. Some of the younger children stopped in their tracks when they saw the large tree filling one corner. Having trees in the house was just catching

on and this one twinkled in the shadowy room with over 30 candles clipped to the branches.

Youngsters jumped again when Santa, Raphael's adult son, Phillip, with his fluffy white hair and beard and wearing the red Santa suit all the way from London, England ho-ho-hoed his way into the room.

He had just begun distributing candy and gifts from the tree, when suddenly he leaned into the branches and his beard erupted in flames and ignited the tree. Chaos ensued.

As the screams erupted, family patriarch, Raphael, arrived on horseback in the back yard, leapt from his horse and ran toward the noise. It was bedlam for a moment there.

Quickly assessing the situation, he ripped off his greatcoat and wrapped Phillip and the tree in its folds, walked them both out the front floor to ceiling windows and threw them into the water trough.

They shook the tree almost dry and redecorated sans candles. For a few days, Phillip looked badly sunburned and it was almost Easter before his eyebrows grew back.

Once again – the right man, in the right place at the right time and it was the same man.

election. State voters passed what is known as Amendment Two, which expands the availability and use of medical marijuana. The BCC sent a request to the Planning Commission in October asking for its recommendations on how to approach the issue should it pass.

The county currently has no zoning regulations in place to deal with dispensaries and treatment centers and technically cannot accept any applications for those items at this time, said County Attorney Courtney Grimm. In fact, she said, the county needs to hear from the state itself on how to form such regulations.

That is expected to take place in the next six months, and Grimm has been among those suggesting a temporary moratorium as it would allow the county staff to develop sound regulations to deal with the zoning issues surrounding the dispensaries and treatment centers.

Both Green Cove Springs and Orange Park governments have already implemented such moratoriums.

But at the Dec. 6 Planning Commission meeting, the sentiments expressed by both the audience and some commission members appeared to lean towards implementing regulations without a moratorium.

Richard Klinzman, who ran for a position on the county commission in November but was defeated, said he was no advocate of illegal drug use but believed medical marijuana could absolutely benefit some victims of illness, especially children suffering from cancer. Saying medical marijuana seemed to work and "bring a lot of relief" to children, he asked the Planning Commission to delay any kind of a moratorium.

"I think you have to be very coldhearted to say 'no, we don't want that in our county,' and if you want to use it you'll have to drive to Miami," he said. "What I'm looking for is your support in delaying a moratorium on this."

Johnson said she agreed with his views, especially since she knew a family that had been affected by a child with cancer and had seen how the use of medical marijuana had helped them. Saying many people don't understand the difference between "medical marijuana" and "regular marijuana," she said the medical marijuana made it possible for the child to simply eat after chemotherapy treatments.

"It does help," she said, adding she would like to see the county move forward as soon as possible after the state determines its recommendations rather than utilize a moratorium.

Planning Commission Chairman Joe Anzalone said he, too, had personal knowledge of how medical marijuana could benefit people, citing a one-year-old child who experienced seizures on a daily basis without the use of medical marijuana.

"I think this is something that is go-

ing to be good. I don't think it's something that we should take lightly and we should not be dragging our feet on it. I think if we are going to do something we should do it quickly," he said.

In other action, the Planning Commission released its schedule for meetings on updates for the county's comprehensive plan. All meetings will start at 6 p.m. The schedule and location for each planning district is as follows: Orange Park, Jan. 11, Orange Park Library: Green Cove Springs. Black Creek to Allie Murray will begin in the winter of 2018, with the stretch from Black Creek to County Road 218 expected to begin a year afterward.

"It's a very high volume road," Henderson said. "So we're really trying to expand that to get people through quicker. It should do a really good job."

The project all ties in with construction and widening currently underway on Blanding Boulevard from Old Jennings Road to south of Branan Field Road that began in August 2015 at a price of \$16 million. The leg now under construction includes adding four-foot bike lanes and six-foot sidewalk in both directions, replacing the traffic signals at Coppergate, Branan Field and Old Jenning roads, adding street lights

from Bear Run Road to just south of Branan Field Road and constructing a new drainage system including new pipes, inlets and a small pond. Medians are being narrowed to allow for the roadway widening and curb construction, according to FDOT data.

Henderson said some businesses could expect decreased access for short periods during construction, but said once the road is finished business owners could expect higher traffic to shuttle through that segment of road.

FDOT held a similar call for public comment in 2013, however the plan changed slightly based on updated traffic count information collected since. Regardless of how smoothly the construction will go, businesses remain concerned.

"People are definitely going to get hit, eventually," said John Placzkowski, owner of Clay County Transmission. "And I don't

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The Shame of Florida: **Options on the felon vote**

In the first part of this article, I focused on the origins of the felon vote in Florida and the consequences it creates for both

those convicted of a felony and on the Florida taxpayers. This part will focus on the various options concerning the felon vote.

We know that over a quarter of all Darryl Paulson

voters who have lost the franchise due to a felony conviction reside in Florida. We

know that over 10 percent of the voting age population in Florida are denied the right to vote due to a felony conviction. In the United States, 1.77 percent of whites are disenfranchised due to a felony conviction compared to 7.66 percent of blacks. Florida has disenfranchised 23 percent of its black citizens because of a felony. This has led the Sentencing Project to declare that "in 2010, more people are disenfranchised in Florida than in any other state and Florida's disenfranchisement rate remains highest among the 50 states."


Critics argue that there is a process to seek the restoration of your voting rights. True, but the process is terrible, unfair and slow. The Florida cabinet and governor make up the Clemency Board which meets four times a year. Currently, 1.7 million Floridians have lost the right to vote due to a felony conviction.

At the September 2016 meeting of the Clemency Board, 48 petitions were considered and 23 individuals had their civil rights restored. At this rate, it will take decades to work through the backlog of 12,000 appeals on file. This excludes the hundreds of thousands who have not filed for restoration of their rights because the process is too complicated, expensive and time-consuming.

Florida requires non-violent felons to wait five years after probation and parole to file an appeal. Violent felons must wait seven years. In addition to the waiting period, it then takes an average of nine more years before your case will be heard. This means that after you have paid your debt to society for your crime, you must wait between 14-16 years before your case will be heard. That strikes me as "cruel and unusual punishment."

Florida, Iowa and Kentucky are the three states that impose a lifetime ban on felon voting unless you seek restoration. Between 2011-2015, 93 percent of appeals in Iowa were approved and 86 percent in Kentucky. In Florida, only 8 percent were approved.

In Florida, the success of voter restoration depends on who is the governor. Gov. Charlie Crist and his cabinet modified the

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appeals process and, as a result, 155,000 felons had their civil rights restored in four years. Gov. Scott reversed Crist's policy and in the first six years of his administration only 2,339 received the restoration of their rights. During Gov. Bush's eight years in office, 77,000 had their rights restored.

Critics point out that these individuals committed a felony and have forfeited their right to vote. But, is this a lifetime ban? Almost all states restore voting rights after the completion of probation and parole.

It is also apparent that most felonies are non-violent. One-third of all arrests in Florida are drug related and only a quarter of felons serve time in prison. They are not threats to society.

Individuals in Florida have been convicted of felonies for the following: driving with a suspended license, disturbing eggs of nesting turtles, burning a fire in public, walking through a posted construction site, catching lobsters with tails that are too short, and lunching helium balloons into the air. These are not what most people would consider to be violent crimes.

Another objection, although often unstated, is political. Democrats have pushed for the felon vote because they believe they will benefit. For the same reason, Republicans have opposed easing felon vote restoration. There is some truth to this concern, but do we make policy because it is justified, or do we make it only if it benefits our party?

Studies have shown that ex-felons register as Democrats over Republican by a five-to-one margin. Studies have also shown that only about one-third of ex-felons registered to vote and only one in five voted. Still, in a close election, this may be the margin of difference.

Florida's current felon vote policy is so far out of the mainstream that it stands out in comparison to other states. When 27 percent of all disenfranchised felon voters reside in Florida, you know our policy is extreme.

Restoring civil rights in Florida will apply only to non-violent felons according to a proposed constitutional amendment that

• Charles Bickerstaff said he wanted to set up a Jaycees chapter for the 27 inmates in the former Doctors Inlet Road Prison. He said many of the inmates were working to "better their own prison community."

• The Clay County Transit Authority announced it was expanding services from two buses to four with help from a grant from the Florida Department of Transportation. may appear on the 2018 ballot. The "Voter Restoration Amendment" currently under review by the Florida Supreme Court, exempts violent felons from having their civil rights restored unless they appeal to the Clemency Board.

Restoration works and is widely supported in the criminal justice community. A study by the Florida Parole Commission found that recidivism rates for ex-felons who had their civil rights restored was 11 percent, compared to 33 percent for those who did not have their rights restored. That is one reason the National Association of Chiefs of Police supports restoration of civil rights to ex-felons.

As a society, we claim to value redemption and forgiveness. Jesus did not tell the thief on the adjoining cross to wait 14 to 16 years to seek forgiveness. "This day, you shall enter heaven."

Finally, restoration is the right thing to do. It is right because it lowers recidivism and saves taxpayer dollars on unnecessary prisons. It is right because it reintegrates individuals into society and gives them a second chance to be productive citizens.

Nothing is more sacred in American society than the right to vote. We should be seeking to expand this right instead of denying that right to non-violent felons who often made a youthful mistake that they are now forced to pay a lifetime penalty. It is past time to do the right thing.

Pop-up museum provides lessons in history and science

ORANGE PARK – Science and history recently converged in a portable classroom on the campus of Orange Park Junior High with a tour stop from a pop-up museum called "The Science of Shipwrecks."

A joint project between the Key West based-Mel Fisher Maritime Museum and the State of Florida Department of State's Division of Historical Resources, the museum gives students a glimpse into the shipwreck of the Santa Clara, a Spanish merchant ship that crashed into a coral reef in 1564 due to human error.

OPJH history and social studies teach-

er Cindy Cheatwood said the museum's stop in Clay County began back in February when the school applied to the state for the grant that would pay for its tour stop here. Reasons for bringing the educational exhibit to the school are meant to start a conversation of sorts.

"When I bring my civics kids in, I explain to them that not only is this about the history of Florida and North America, but it's also about what role citizens had in bringing this here," she said.


Cheatwood said part of the reason the junior high applied for the grant is "to try to spark a little interest in marine

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archaeology or archaeology, in general." From a practical standpoint, the display panels explain how the Santa Clara sank after hitting a coral reef in five meters of water on the southwestern edge of the Little Bahamas Bank, approximately 37



kilometers north-northwest of West End, Grand Bahamas Island. But the displays also show "the how" in which an archaeologist operates underwater to find such a lost treasure. One panel, for example, shows how scientists used a grid system to search for artifacts, which Cheatwood said, are fascinating how well they were preserved underwater some five centuries.

"If you can imagine being underwater for 500 years, you know those vials are still round. It's amazing and when I talk to my students about this, I say, 'You're going on this trip, what are you bringing with you. What are the values of the things that you bring? ...They get to kind of put that in their heads – I only get to carry so much. A typical sailor wouldn't have had much room, so the things that you find are really interesting," Cheatwood said.

Students from W.E. Cherry and Grove Park Elementary schools walked to the Gano Avenue campus to visit the museum. However, before they entered the portable, they had a chance to learn about Mel Fisher and how his quest all began by watching a biography on the modern-day explorer "so they could kind of see where he got his interest and the passion. I mean you really had to have a passion to pursue it the way he did relentlessly would be a good word for it."

Students, depending on their grade levels, got to take part in a scavenger hunt inside the pop-up museum. They could read the displays and their scavenger hunt outlines and then find the objects in the classroom.

"It's just crazy how so many artifacts were found and they were in kind of pristine condition that they were able to identify what they found and that science is so advanced that they can do that. It kind of shows you that they had their own versions of technology as well," said Lana Peyton of Middleburg, an OPJH eighth grade student who volunteered Dec. 4 to guide members of the community to the portable classroom much like a big-city museum docent.


Accompanying Peyton was fellow eighth grade classmate Camila Bautista, also of Middleburg. Bautista paid special attention to the technology used in 1564.

"I found it interesting the way they preserved weapons or technology that they found there and I found it interesting the way that they did it and each weapon and technology they have a story to tell and I think they're telling it by preserving it and I just found it really cool."

Cheatwood said having the pop-up museum in Clay County was an honor. She also said this traveling display is a great example of how to capture history and present it in such a succinct, professional manner.

"Just the fact that Mel Fisher's name is on this gives it a certain kind of credential. The historians who have put all the work into documenting this, this is a lesson in how you do it right. So, if you want to have a project and you think it's going to have historical merit, you're going to have look for good examples and this is very well done," Cheatwood said.

Although Fisher is probably best known for his search for the fabled Spanish galleon Atocha, he first began searching for sunken treasure in 1962 when he met a man named Kip Wagner. Ill-equipped and his crew not able to devote full-time to the project, Wagner invited Fisher to join him



on a 50-50 basis in search for the 10 shipwrecks of the 1715 Spanish Plate Fleet that was lost in a hurricane off Florida's east coast.

In 1980, Fisher was thrust on to the international stage as a treasure hunter when he discovered more than \$20 million worth of gold and other riches fom the Santa Margarita, a sister ship of the Atocha that was lost in the same storm of 1622. He quickly learned that finding treasures and artifacts is only the beginning – they must be conserved, studied, restored, recorded, and shared or exhibited with the world.

"I feel honored that the people who made the museum wanted our school to have it here," said Ryley Barnett, OPJH eighth grader.

Videos hope to educate Floridians

Fish and Wildlife hopes to reduce bear-human conflicts with informative videos

TALLAHASSEE – As part of a continuing effort to reduce conflicts with bears, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is releasing two new videos in the "Living with Florida Black Bears" series, designed to educate the public about how to safely coexist with bears in Florida.

The "Cause for a Call" video outlines when and how people can reduce conflicts with bears by taking simple steps such as securing trash and other attractants.

The "BearWise Communities" video describes how to make a neighborhood "BearWise." BearWise communities work to coexist with bears. This video educates residents on when and how to report bear





conflicts or sightings, and how to secure food items that attract bears to a neighborhood.

Unsecured trash and attractants, such as bird feeders, are the number one cause for bears coming into contact with people. This summer FWC researchers, in partnership with Dr. Joseph Clark, a leading black bear scientist, employed cutting-edge modeling to confirm that Florida's robust black bear population is estimated to be over 4,000 bears. More bears in Florida means more chances for human-bear interaction, which can be dangerous.

The new videos are being added to the existing "Living with Florida Black Bears" series, which already includes the following videos:

•How to Make Your Wildlife Feeders Bear-Resistant

•How FWC Conducts Bear Population Estimates


The crimes of robbery, aggravated assault, burglary and larceny were all down in this report while murder, rape and motor vehicle theft all increased. Murder figures included the 49 people killed in the Orlando Pulse Nightclub shooting on June 12, 2016.

Law enforcement officers made 380,515 arrests from January through June 2016. Statewide, four law enforcement officers have been killed in 2016, three in motor vehicle crashes and one who was struck by a vehicle while on-duty. One correctional officer died after collapsing during a training exercise.

"These figures show that continued progress is being made to drive down Florida's crime rate, which is already at a 45-year low. While there's more work to be done, well-deserved credit for these im-

Settlement leads artist to design escape room experience

OAKLEAF - It all started with a bottle of Redemption Rye Whiskey.

Oakleaf visual artist Kyle Willis and his friend Tommy had been drinking beers throughout the day and didn't want to drive intoxicated to grab more alcohol, so they polished off half a bottle of whiskey belonging to Willis' girlfriend with the promise he would buy her another tomorrow.

He kept his promise and bought the bottle the next day.

"Tommy's like, 'hey, she only had half a bottle, maybe we should take a couple drinks out of it before we give her the bottle.'" Willis said.

So Tommy drove into the Oakleaf Town Center to grab a bag of ice and reached a four way intersection. As they started to accelerate, Willis heard Tommy scream, "She's not even going to stop!"

Willis looked up from his phone with just enough time to catch sight of a student driving a Nissan and texting before she impacted the side of their SUV. The student had run a stop sign while texting.

Their car flipped, an event Willis de-

also continues to play a significant role in the economy is that of cultural and arts tourism. Many of our state visitors are adding visits to our state's cultural resources as a complement to their vacation while many visitors are coming to Florida solely for what we have to offer culturally whether it is a museum or special heritage event.

According to a 2013 report from Mandala Research, a cultural tourist typically spends more and stays longer than other types of travelers. The U.S. cultural traveler spends 60 percent more, approximately \$1,319 per trip compared with \$820 for than those who do not participate in cultural or heritage attractions. That adds up to more economic impact for our economy and more tax receipts for our state and local governments. Our cultural facilities also employ thousands here in Florida providing jobs and prosperity for Florida families throughout the state.

This year was looking to be another

great year for the state's museums and cultural facilities but unfortunately two hurricanes slammed into our beautiful state. Hurricane Hermine, made landfall in the Florida Big Bend, and stretched her destruction to Tallahassee. Impacts from Hurricane Matthew wreaked havoc along Florida's east coast. Many cultural attractions, museums and historic sites closed in its wake. This, in turn, caused a loss of revenue and capital deepened by dramatic, social media images of flooding.

These images continue to dampen visitation today statewide. At the same time, extra expenses are a reality for repairs and cleanup of historic sites and cultural institutions. This deep financial dent remains all the way from vibrant Miami, through the celebrated seaside communities of St. Johns County and northward to historic Fernandina Beach. Clean up has begun, but winds and floods deeply injured authentic Florida historic sites and museums

In Florida, all of our tourism assets from the largest theme parks to our smallest museums create a canvas for which the sunroof of the SUV.

Players must work together, find clues, decode messages and solve puzzles to unlock the door to freedom. If players do not complete all of the requirements, or if they do not finish in the time allotted, they are let out of the room and are unsuccessful in their escape attempt.

Willis' Escape-topia locks players in a turn of the century circus-inspired set of rooms where players must unravel a storyline of a murderous clown in order to escape. The room opened to the public in late October, joining a zombie and beast escape room owned by his business partner.

Willis gets a cut of his room's profit every month to help make up for the \$6,000 investment into creating the room.

"It's a nice new revenue stream," Willis said. "I plan on using that, at least some of that, to bootstrap the next one. I want to open up another location in Jacksonville" and maybe South Florida, Willis said.

forget about art."

Clay County has a smaller population in comparison to the densely packed urban core of Jacksonville, so Frasier said she understands the disparity of artistic opportunities. However, the opportunities and funding for the arts available in Clay County leaves many artists burned, forced to seek higher opportunities out of the county. Clay artists take their spending dollars and ideas into Duval where cooperative funding on the county and corporate level help artists thrive.

Likewise, when artists live and work where they live, communities thrive. In an astonishing report by the advocacy and research foundation Americans for the Arts, the group found funds generated on local, state, and federal level totaled \$22.3 billion in yearly revenue. This far exceeded the \$4 billion appropriated to arts programs throughout the country.

Nationally, the industry generates roughly \$135.2 billion of economic activity, over four million full-time jobs and generates \$86.68 billion in resident household income, according to the 2011 report.

"I don't see a lot of funding for the arts [in Clay County,"] said Oakleaf-based visual artist Kyle Willis. "What little funding I do see, I see entities like the Art Guild of Orange Park keeping that from getting in the hands of artists."

Willis said the way the art collective applies for county and state grants allows surplus funding after materials are purchased to go into the art collective's bank account instead and never into the "hands of artists, ever."


Aside from grants, one way the county funds its arts community is through capital generated from the sale of Florida art license plates. The Department of Highway, Safety and Motor Vehicles doles the funds out to the county where the plates were purchased, but each county must designate a recipient arts organization within the county.

In the 2016-17 budget, the county received \$2,125 in revenue from the plates. In Duval, a percentage of the construction costs from any vertical construction project is transferred to the Art in Public Places Trust Fund. The fund helps implement citywide plans for the creation and placement of artworks in the county.

Often, even one building project will bring huge sums of money into the fund.

When specific funds for arts in any community dry up, however, there are grants artists can apply for from various entities.

However, Willis said, many artists don't know how to write grants or know what grants are available. Since he began to learn about this process, among others involved in making money as a full-time artist, he's shared his knowledge with other struggling artists in and out of the county. He founded the art collective Local Artists Coming Together for community after he received cold, canned responses from existing art guilds and collectives in Jacksonville.

There aren't that many opportunities currently for both musicians or actors to make a living [in Clay County]."

Walsh points to Green Cove Springs' annual CalaVida Arts Festival as an example of how the community is slowly adding more to Clay County's artistic central nervous system. Fraiser said events like CalaVida help bring a bigger sense of community to the county and help artists, but said she would like to see more events like these.

Like Duval, Clay County artists tend to collaborate with local businesses to bring projects to life. Brewer's Pizza on Blanding Boulevard is home to Pinglehead Brewing Company, which has collaborated with local visual artists to make many of their drink labels as well as a platform to advertise and promote local musicians.

The Urban Bean Coffeehouse Café at the corner of Park and Kingsley avenues hosts "Art Buzz" as a free resource for visual artists and artisans alike to set up shop and sell their wares at no cost to them. Likewise, the Rogue Gallery Comic Book Shop hosts "Rogue's Night Out" monthly to give artists a larger platform to sell their wares in an environment similar to Jacksonville's monthly art "Art Walk."

As Clay County brings in new businesses with a focus and appreciation for the arts, in turn, the demand and supply for arts will grow, according to Willis. However, until that time, Frasier will continue to leave the county to perform her blues songs.

"[Clay County] just isn't popping," she said on her way to a gig in Duval. "It needs to be popping."

"There's not one in Clay County, if I find the right spot, especially one that's close to [Interstate] 295 – I'd love to make one in Clay County...Wells Road could use some new blood," he said.

There are two escape rooms in Jacksonville currently, part of a growing wave of similar real-life puzzle-thrillers that have swept across multiple continents from Japan in the last decade. Willis said he could save on the costs of housing, transportation and food he had to expend to make his first room if he created the next one closer to home.

Willis built the room up from a set of two office buildings with white tile ceilings and carpeting into a horrorthemed adventure room in seven weeks with wood, homemade props and a good deal of sweat. He created his own puzzles without peeking at other escape rooms to form a truly unique experience, he said.

Some of his puzzles are math-based, while others use smell to help find the answer. Players find a message from an investigator in the room detailing how the detective has knowledge of Giggles

the Clown's murders and then must discover a timeline of each child's death through a set of intricate, self-designed puzzles to escape the rooms.

Willis shares the space with his business partner, who – after his previous partner pulled out shortly after opening – got into talks with Willis to add on to the previous two escape rooms.

Throw is a \$6,000 investment and Willis owns a horror-themed, cerebral puzzle that started on paper and then materialized. His escape went live to the public in late October while Willis watched via internet cameras he installed.

When pressed for more details on the plotline of the escape room, Willis smiled and said, "I don't want to give it away."

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Study documents nutritional risk in Florida's older adults

GAINESVILLE, Fla. – Older adults who eat at congregate meal-serving sites may come to the meals with significant nutritional deficits, according to a new study by a researcher at the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.

Congregate meals are delivered through the Area Agencies on Aging, administering state and federally funded meal and nutrition education programs with outreach services. Collectively, about 425 congregate sites in Florida serve thousands of meals daily.

In the study, Kelly Springstroh, an undergraduate in the UF/IFAS food science and human nutrition department, wanted to determine if handgrip strength predicts nutritional risk in older adults.

This study showed that handgrip strength alone was a weak predictor of nutritional risk but may be useful as a component of a nutritional risk screening tool.

The nutritional risk was due mainly to inadequate servings of recommended food groups, rather than problems with appetite, chewing or swallowing or significant weight loss, according to the study, led by Springstroh, under the supervision of Wendy Dahl, a UF/IFAS associate professor of food science and human nutrition. Congregate meals have high standards for meeting nutritional quality, Dahl said. They're often served five times a week, but some people don't come to the meals every time. Thus, the nutritional risk may stem from the quality or quantity of their other meals, Dahl said.

"There's new research on handgrip strength and nutritional risk, which is very

useful in hospital patients and others," Dahl said. "It's about muscle mass and function. Loss of muscle and strength is a sign of malnutrition – people are not getting enough protein and/or calories.

Other nutrients are I also important, but getting enough to

eat and getting enough protein is critical."

"Older adults need more protein than younger adults to maintain muscle mass and strength," she said. "Handgrip reflects muscle mass and strength, so it gives us information about nutritional status independent of body weight. It's not adequate to only assess weight. Older, obese individuals can be at significant nutritional risk if they have a poor quality diet or have lost weight/muscle mass. Handgrip helps us to



determine their risk as well as for others with lower body weights."

Researchers conducted the study at 10 congregate meal sites in North Central Florida.

Dahl said handgrip strength, if tested

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in combination with a brief questionnaire,

may be useful for nutritional risk screening







'Tis the season for flu vaccinations

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The Florida Department of Health in Clay County will wrap up National Influenza Vaccination Week on Dec. 10.

The department, along with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. remind everyone that even though the holiday season has arrived, there is still time to get a flu vaccination. It is recommended that everyone six months of age and older receive the vaccine each year to protect against illness.

"But it's so popular, you'll find it in retail outlets this year."

Breeders worldwide send their latest poinsettia varieties to UF/IFAS, where scientists test how well they'll grow in Florida's sub-tropical environment, Barrett said. Nurseries use information from UF/ IFAS experts to make sure they can grow the latest and best varieties for their customers.

"I loosely describe what we do as being like a movie critic," he said of the 138 varieties that will be on display. "We don't create the product. We evaluate it and tell you what's good and bad about it."

For people who will buy poinsettias at this year's sale, they'll take them home and use them for holiday decorations. But they'll want to make sure the plants get plenty of light, so you'll want to keep them in bright light. They can be replanted on the homeowner's landscape, Barrett said. Poinsettias are "short day" plants that blooms when days are short and nights are long – like we see this time of year.

They grow well in areas where prolonged freezes are not normal. Indeed, they grow best in temperatures that range from 65 degrees at night and 75 to 80 during the day, according to UF/IFAS Extension documents. In other words, they don't do well north of North Central Florida, Barrett said.

Here are a few other poinsettia facts. Poinsettias are not poisonous, contrary to a popular misconception. The plant is native to Mexico and the Aztecs used them in their fall celebrations. The plant's name comes from Joel Poinsett, who introduced the plant to the U.S. in 1825. At that time, he was ambassador to Mexico.

Roundtable discusses aftermath of hurricane season in Florida

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. – Recent data reports show that Floridians filed more than 112,000 insurance claims valued at \$729 million in losses as a result of Hurricane Matthew and another 18,000 insurance claims totaling \$95 million were filed as a result of Hurricane Hermine.

That's the report given Dec. 2 in St. Augustine as Florida Chief Financial Officer Jeff Atwater and Insurance Commissioner David Altmaier hosted an insurance roundtable discussion with representatives from more than 25 insurance companies operating in Florida.

As these insurance claims are processed, paid and closed, Atwater and Altmaier have followed the insurance industry's claims-paying practices to ensure Floridians are treated fairly and their claims are handled appropriately, according to a news release.

The roundtable was held to mark the conclusion of the 2016 Atlantic Hurricane Season and also included officials from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to have a public conversation about the successes and challenges related to the first two storms Florida has faced in more than 10 years.

"We will not accept anything less than the best and most efficient effort from every single insurance company operating in the state of Florida," Atwater said. "Commissioner Altmaier and I are pleased with what we've seen thus far, but we will continue to meet with residents until Floridians' concerns have been addressed."



increases risk of malnutrition, and if handgrip can help us identify those individuals, we can intervene sooner," Dahl said. "At this point in time, there is no quick, validated nutritional risk screening tool for use at congregate meal sites."

Springstroh surveyed 136 people, ages 60 and older, who eat at one of 10 congregate meal sites in North Central Florida. She measured their grip strength, which is an indicator of muscle strength. Participants also answered questions about their overall diet, whether they have difficulty swallowing and other queries pertinent to older people.

She found that 68 percent of participants showed nutritional risk. Dahl said she was most surprised at the prevalence of participants' nutritional risk. But she wasn't surprised that the nutritional risk

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is mostly due to lower consumption of certain food groups, especially fruits, vegetables and meat, which tend to be more expensive. Congregate meals serve those who are socio-economically challenged, so that might be a factor in their food choices, Dahl said

Participants in congregate nutrition services program are thought to be at higher nutritional risk than the general older American adult population due to their lower functional. socioeconomic and health status, according to a federal study published in 2015.

Dahl points out that handgrip strength measurements may need to be further studied to be useful in assessing nutritional risk of community-dwelling adults. That may allow grip strength measurements to be included in nutrition risk screening. If so, this may be a great addition to traditional screening, as it takes a quick assessment and can give very valuable information towards treatment, Springstroh said.



Fixing a patchy lawn

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – After a long and hot summer, turf grass in Northeast Florida

has been through a lot of stress. It has baked in the sun, been through weeks without rain, and at times cut too short, irrigated too much or too little, and been covered with pesticides, herbicides and fertilizers.

However, as fall begins the grass be-

gins to go dormant, the insects hopefully do so as well, and the turf can get a break but some diseases can begin to thrive. Probably the most common of these fall diseases is brown patch (Rhizoctonia solani), also known as large patch, which can cause large areas of the turf to yellow, then turn brown, and finally die. This disease can infect all warm-season turfgrasses including St. Augustine grass, Bermudagrass, Zoysiagrass, Centipedegrass and Bahiagrass.

Brown patch becomes active in lawns when temperatures drop below 80 degrees Fahrenheit and become dormant at temperatures above 90 degrees Fahrenheit. Infection often occurs during periods of high humidity or excessive moisture for 48 hours of more and is spurred on by excessive thatch and the use of high rates of nitrogen fertilizer, normally more than 1.1 pounds per 1,000 square feet.

The symptoms of this ailment start as 6-12 inch off-color patches that turn yellow, then reddish brown, then brown to straw colored. The outer ring of the patch will be dark and wilted and this is the location where the pathogen is actively damaging new turf as the ring expands. Looking closely, you will also see black rot at the point where the grass stem meets the leaf blade.

If brown patch is present in your lawn, there are some things you can do to prevent it from reoccurring the following year. Avoiding excess soluble nitrogen fertilizers from November-April can help. Use slow release nitrogen fertilizers with an equal amount of slow release potassium. In fact, avoid fertilizing from October to February because turfgrass is dormant and will not need the nutrition during this time.

It is also best to never stress the lawn by mowing it too short, with St. Augustine grass the height should be 3-4 inches and never cut more than 1/3 of the leaf blade each time you mow. Also, lawn mowers can spread the disease so mow diseased areas



last and wash the clippings off of the mower when done.

Irrigation or watering should also be limited to one day a week following daylight savings time and make sure the follow the St. Johns River Water Management District watering guidelines all year. If you feel that your lawn stays wet a day or two following irrigation, you will want to water for less time and do not water if there is a rain event.

The best strategy is to only water when the grass is showing signs of wilt and water in the early morning. You may also find this disease in areas that have shade, especially in the morning, which can lead to turfgrass staying wet longer than in sunny areas. Another strategy to consider is to use preventative fungicides. This is done by monitoring the timing and location where the disease normally occurs each year and then apply a fungicide by the instructions given on the label before conditions become right for the growth of brown patch. Commonly recommended fungicides are propiconazole, thiophanate methyl, mycobutanil or azoxystrobin.

If patches are large and the turfgrass does not recover, re-seeding, plugging or re-sodding may be needed. Following the establishment period, cultural practices as described in this article should be followed to limit the chance of the disease returning. Miss Florida talks Everglades restoration with students

ORANGE PARK – Clay Virtual Academy students received a lesson on the Florida Everglades Tuesday morning from the state's newly crowned Miss Florida.

Courtney Sexton, the Kingsley Lake native elevated to stardom in July when she won the state's most prominent beauty pageant, gave students all the knowledge they would need to save the Everglades.

Human interaction through pollution, redirection of water flow and de-habitation has resulted in the destruction of half of the Everglades.

Invasive species, such as the Burmese Python, have also contributed to loss of wildlife. There are currently more than 60 threatened or endangered species currently living in the Everglades.

Congress authorized the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan in 2000 as a plan to "restore, preserve, and protect the south Florida ecosystem while providing for other water-related needs of the region, including water supply and flood protection."

"The Everglades needs us because of threats," Sexton said to the children. "Things that are hurting the environment, we could talk for hours on end about it."

Winners of the Miss Florida pageant

settle into their role knowing they will eventually volunteer much of their next year educating children on one cause or another. For the last six years, the Miss Florida Organization has collaborated with The Everglades Foundation to raise awareness about the problems facing the Everglades to classrooms all over the state.

It appears to work as well – the students are more engaged once "someone with a crown" walks into the room.

"I think this was pretty engaging for them, there was a lot of interaction," said Gayle Weaver, distance learning specialist with Clay Virtual Academy. "You could see hands going up, they wanted to answer they wanted to have that engagement."

For students, this was a chance to not only learn about the newly-crowned Miss Florida, but to learn about the most pressing issues facing a precious Florida landmark. For Weaver, however, the lesson was a bit of a reunion. Weaver taught Sexton 6th grade math in Bradford County.

Sexton's goal is speak to 20 classes and she's booked more than 20 schools already.

"I've learned as I do one presentation, a teacher or a parent shares about what the kids learned and how much fun they had and then another school books me. It's a great cause and I think that's why it's easy to book the teachers and the parents and the school."



Sexton will also assist Congressional representatives and senators in lobbying for further expansion of Everglades restoration. It's personal to her now, as well. She attended a 12-day bus tour with the Everglades Foundation to familiarize herself with the terrain and the problems affecting the region.





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

Appeal court throws out 2015 battery conviction

TALLAHASSEE - The 1st District Court of Appeal agrees with a Middleburg woman to a point that the court has thrown out

her 2015 sentence for aggravated battery with a deadly weapon.

In its Dec. 1 opinion, the court said Joyce Ann Angelo, 35, the trial court here in Clay County erred by prohibiting Angelo from testifying about prior acts

It all began January 1, 2015 at 11:05 p.m. when the Clay County Sheriff's Office responded to the parking lot of Prevatt's Wings and Things in the 2600 block of Blanding Boulevard. Police said witnesses told them that night that Angelo used a box cutter to strike Marlon Owens - "her child's father – in the right side of his neck. Owens and a friend "were driving around looking for scrap food for his hogs" when he noticed Angelo stumbling in the parking lot.

According to police, when Owens approached Angelo, she said "let's fight" and, within minutes. slashed his neck with the box cutter.

The 1st District Court of Appeal ruled that "once the defendant presents evidence that the victim committed an overt act at or near the time of the incident that reasonably indicated the need for self-defense, the defendant may present evidence of prior specific acts of violence by the victim to prove the reasonableness of the defendant's apprehension at the time of the incident."

According to the opinion, both the defense and prosecution dispute whether the error was "harmless" vet the state argues that it met the burden to show the error was harmless because Angelo was still able to preset her theory of defense and her version of the stabbing was contradicted by eyewitnesses.

"However, while there were two eyewitnesses who testified to the events around the time of the incident, neither witness testified that he or she saw how the conflict began or was watching when the victim was cut. Thus, the State cannot prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the error did not contribute to the verdict," states the opinion.


The 1st District Court of Appeal reversed Angelo's 45-month sentence and subsequent two years of probation that she was handed on August 19, 2015.

Sheriff's office urges homeowners to be 'fire smart'

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Between 2010-2014, U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 210 home fires that started with Christmas trees per year.

These fires caused an average of six deaths, 16 injuries, and \$16.2 million in direct property damage annually, according to data collected by the National Fire Protection Association.

On average, one of every 34 reported home fires that began with a Christmas tree resulted in a death, compared to an average of one death per 142 total reported home fires.

Some type of electrical distribution or lighting equipment was involved in onethird - 35 percent - of home Christmas tree fires.

Twenty-three percent of Christmas tree fires were intentional.

Two of every five home Christmas tree fires started in the living room, family room. or den.

Data also shows that nearly half of holiday decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source. It's fun to decorate for the winter holidays, but holiday decorations can in-



crease your risk for a home fire. As you deck the halls this season, be Fire smart.

Inspect holiday lights each year before you put them up. Throw away light strands

with frayed or pinched wires. Water your Christmas tree every day. A dry tree is dangerous because it can catch on fire easily

Consider using battery-operated candles, which can look, smell and feel like real candles. If you do use lit candles, make sure they are in stable holders and place them where they cannot be knocked down easily.

Candles may be pretty to look at but they are a cause of home fires – and home fire deaths. Remember, a candle is an open flame, which means that it can easily ignite anything that can burn. With the days growing darker and winter setting in, a few candles scattered round the room can lend a warm glow to an evening. But with candle fires resulting in around 350 casualties each year, we would like you to take extra care with candles this winter - nearly 40 percent of all fires started by candles result in a death or injury.

Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.

Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn.

Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.

Survey shows homeowners want incentives to conserve more water

GAINESVILLE – Homeowners with irrigation systems would use less water if they were offered more incentives, according to a new University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences report.

Most will even pay more for better water quality.

Respondents to a UF/IFAS online survey of 3,000 such homeowners in Florida, Texas and California said reducing the price of water-efficient equipment would be the most effective strategy. That was followed by more practical information on household water conservation, easier identification of water-efficient appliances and better landscape irrigation ordinances.

Additionally, respondents liked the idea of a real-time water use mobile app and more information on the environmental impacts of water conservation.

"We know that informed homeowners are aware and concerned about the environmental consequences of excessive irrigation water use," said Hayk Khachatryan, an assistant professor of food and resource economics and the lead investigator in the survey. "However, awareness and concern are necessary, but not sufficient, conditions for resource and water conservation. Efforts in promoting the adoption of watersaving irrigation systems and practices will be more successful when environmental conservation measures are combined with economic incentives such as utility or manufacturer rebates on smart irrigation equipment."

To get better-quality water, 64 percent of survey participants said they're willing to pay higher monthly water bills. Of those, 26 percent said they'd pay less than 5 percent of their current bill; 30 percent would pay 5 percent to 15 percent more and 8 percent were willing to pay more than 15 percent.

UF/IFAS researchers used the survey to analyze U.S. household water use and irrigation practices. They surveyed homeowners in Florida, Texas and California based on water scarcity issues identified in a U.S. Environmental Protection Agency report from 2008.

Government or utility company incentives to purchase these items were fairly scarce. About 18 percent of respondents said they received an incentive to install low-volume /dual flush toilets. Only 17 percent said they received rainwater collection tanks, and only 16 percent received flow-restrictor taps/low-water shower heads


Oakleaf had wins over Bolles, Nease and Baker County with losses to Camden County and Bishop Kenny.

At the Border Wars at Fort Walton Beach, Ridgeview High placed 14th in the power tournament won by Holy Cross with 292.5 points over 2A-power Tampa Jesuit's 247.0 points. 3A-power Flagler Palm Coast was third with 196 points. Ridgeview, with Marcus Reid, an Orange Park transfer as a champion, scored 70 points for 14th. Reid's Raider teammate, junior Saied Ejmali, would lose to eventual champion Avery Holder of Flagler in the 132 quarterfinals.

"Paul stayed on him and made him work," said Cobbert. "He had to try some scoring moves and Paul is very good as a counter move wrestler. It's all good competition." 

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

by an undefeated team, but finished with a flurry that looked alot like a 74-73 playoff win a few year ago that propelled Hoekstra into football folklore.

In 2016, a burly Ponte Vedra High senior quarterback, Nick Tronti, became the gnat in the face that never goes away as the Shark offense slyly took advantage of the Blue Devil pass rush with Tronti putting up 552 yards of offense and six touchdowns with an effective read option and also a green-lighted pass-to-run option out of the pocket.

"We tried everything on D to stop Tronti, we blitzed, we put a spy on him, we tried everything," said Hoekstra. "He had a performance that was similar to Bilal vs North Marion and John Wolford vs Clay in 2013."

Ponte Vedra opened the scoring in the first quarter with Tronti showing off his strategy of read-options with running back Hal Swan pounding in from 34 yards out.

Clay answered with Wilson scoring from four yards out off a 13 play drive.

After a pooch kickoff from Clay kicker Liz Fogarty that caused a 22-man scramble at the 35 yard line, Ponte Vedra took over with Tronti directing a 16-play scoring drive that included a fourth and five scramble with Clay defensive tackle Angelo Dorsaingvil in chase that finished with a first down at the Clay 17. Clay's defense stiffened a bit with William Cornwell forcing a hurried pass by Tronti that went incomplete and linebacker Rico Schnitzler nailing Swan in the backfield. Tronti again went to a read-option and defensive tackler Tobiah Griffin sniffed it out, but was a step behind Tronti as he finished in the end zone

Ponte Vedra tried their own pooch kick on the ensuing kickoff and created the same mess as Fogarty's with Clay recovering at their own 25. Jenkins went down the Shark sideline for his 60-yarder that woke up the Blue Devil fan base, but Clay failed to score.

Taking over at their own six yard line, Ponte Vedra struck quickly with Swan breaking for 29 yards with cornerback Marquez Delafield making a touchdownsaving ankle tackle at the 39 yard line.

Again, Clay's defense stiffened with Griffin and linebacker Evan Martin thwarting Tronti efforts just off the line of scrimmage, but Tronti escaped from the Clay 31 to the 12 to set up a scoring pass a play later and a 21-7 lead with 4:09 in the half.

With 4:04 to the half, Clay seemed intent on issuing a final statement before the break and Jenkins went twice from the backfield at the 45 yard line with the second carry going 20 yards, but coupled with a face mask, put Clay at the Shark 15 yard line. Two plays later, wideout Ajay Belanger caught his patented slant pass touchdown from quarterback Caleb Eason to score the game 21-14 with 1:35 still in the half.

On the Fogarty kickoff, coverman Dakari Augustin crushed the Shark returnman at the 20 to put Tronti and his friends 80 yards from a half-ending score. Two quick out passes netted a first down at the 50 with Tronti methodically moving the Sharks offense, but linebacker Zach Alvarado upset the pass-party with a sack at the Clay 15 yard line stalling the momentum at a first down play. A third and eight situation put Tronti in pass mode, but cornerback Christian Swilley swatted an end zone pass to give Ponte Vedra coach Matt Toblin a choice of a fourth down field goal or an offensive play against a Clay defense rising to the occasion. Toblin chose field goal, but missed wide left to the eruption of the Blue Devil faithful who sensed a shift on the field as both teams left for the locker rooms sensing yet another finishing flurry by Clay football.

An incompletion to wideout Derek Smith was reversed with a defensive holding flag and Clay took over at the Shark 37.





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
