City wants its own School Resource Officers

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Tuesday’s meeting of the Green Cove Springs City Council was one where visitors needed to stay until the end.

As council members wound down and moved on to council comments, Pam Lewis started a conversation about a recent workshop held between the Board of Coun-

ty Commissioners, School Board and the Sheriff’s Office regarding funding School Resource Officers for every school county-wide as required by a new state law.

Lewis explained that she had called members of the school board requesting that part of the money for SROs be given to the city so it can fund city police officers at Charles E. Bennett Elementary and Green Cove Springs Junior High.

“I told them how wonderful our police department is with community policing and about the hard work they’ve done with children and their families,” Lewis said. “It makes sense to have our own police department provide the resource officers.”

Once the council comments moved to Mitch Timberlake, the mayor asked Police Chief Derek Asdot to speak to the department’s involvement in the schools.

“When incidents happen in the schools we’re the ones responding, we’re the ones dealing with the families, we’ve already built those relationships,” Asdot said. “I’d hate to hand those over to somebody else and then we’d kind of lose that. We worked hard to build it and we do a really good job at doing that. I don’t want to talk about other agencies but if you look at what we

Charter Review Commission sets public hearing dates

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Wrapping up months of work, the Clay County Charter Review Commission decided at its April 24 meeting not to put the question to voters of whether the county manager’s position should be an elected post rather than the appointed post it currently is.

It also set the dates for the three public hearings it is required to have to let citizens speak to the two issues it is recommending be put on the November general ballot for a vote, and approved the language that would be used for those issues on the ballot.

The Charter Review Commission is appointed every four years to look at the county’s charter and determine if there are issues that need to be revised or amended.

Any items the CRC suggests might need to be revised or amended must ultimately be put on the general ballot for a vote of the citizens of Clay County. The CRC has no power to actually change any part of the charter, but can only recommend items to be put before the voters for their approval or disapproval.

Clay County is one of 20 charter counties in the state, which means it is governed under what is called “home rule.” The other 47 counties are known as “constitutional” counties and are ruled by state statute.

Meeting since last October, the current CRC has approved two issues it will recommend to be put on the November ballot. One of the issues involves changing the term limits for county commissioners from the current two consecutive four-

Grisly double murder rocked Clay County

Late one Sunday night, March 25, 1946 to be exact, a homesick young soldier, armed with an Army issue M1 rifle, slipped out of his barracks at Camp Blanding.

At trial, Pvt. John Upchurch would claim he was homesick and just wanted to steal a car and go home to New Jersey. What happened turned out to be very different.

Walking and hitchhiking, he ended up mostly sleeping in Orange Park and plotted to acquire a car at the popular lovers' lane, a dirt road that meandered through the woods to the St. Johns River in the area of today's East Holly Point. Young locals, up

to no good, joked about "going to watch the submarine races."

Sure enough, he found Nathan Ledbetter and his lady friend Clara Jones, both from Jacksonville. Ledbetter was a popular former star dirt track race car driver turned successful business man and married to a lady not named Clara Jones.

Upchurch loomed up in the glare of the headlights and demanded their money and the car, Ledbetter pulled a pistol and the panicked soldier opened fire. He emptied the clip – eight rounds of 30-caliber bullets, as fast as he could pull the trigger. The M1 Garand was a killing machine at 500 yards and served the U.S. military in

Orange Park wants to offer School Resource Officers

ORANGE PARK – For Orange Park Town Council, there is no question about whether or not the town's police officers should act as Student Resource Officers for Orange Park schools.

During the final moments of its May 1 council meeting, Town Manager Sarah Campbell mentioned that preliminary discussions with the Clay County School Board have been held regarding Orange Park's potential involvement. According to Campbell, the discussion centered around municipal officers acting as SROs in three schools within town limits – Orange Park Elementary, Grove Park Elementary and Orange Park Junior High. Campbell said that regardless of how the council feels, the decision will be made at the school board's discretion.

"It's really at the school board's discretion whether they would like to enter an agreement with the municipalities to provide this service," Campbell said. "They have mentioned that there could be some cost sharing – it would not be 100 percent cost sharing but a portion of this could po-

tentially be reimbursed."

Before handing the discussion over to the council, Campbell broke down the worst-case scenario costs, which would mean 100 percent funding by the town, and how that would play out over six years.

The first year would be the most expensive with a grand total of \$288,730. Broken down, \$124,882 of that cost goes towards paying for personnel with another \$36,348 going towards operating costs. In the first year, there is also a \$127,500 cost for capital. In year two, the grant total decreases to \$149,395. There is no capital cost in year two or any of the following years. There is, however a slight increase in personnel costs each year and in year six, an increase in operating costs. Still though, the grand total for year six is \$191,283 which is nearly \$100,000 less than the year one total.

When it was time for the council to come to a consensus, the five council members found themselves in complete agreement with each other citing absolute necessity.

"I think it's vital that we do everything we can to keep our officers in the school system," council member Connie Thomas

said. "For one, being a social worker myself and knowing that once a relationship is built with a kid, which certainly has been at this point, that we do everything we can to keep our officers there. They have a better finger on what's going on with the kids."

"If the county comes in [and serves as our schools' SROs], you add a second tier of a relationship that needs to be built between the county, the kids and the school and you're just setting up another problem there as far as trust issues go," Thomas continued. "If at all, we need to look at the budget and figure out how to do this. It's in the best interest of the kids."

Council member Alan Watt, too, agrees that municipal officers belong in the town's schools.

"What they offer or end up doing may not work out but I think we should surely investigate it because it would be much better for us to have our own officers in the schools," Watt said.

Council member Ron Raymond, like the rest of the council, agreed and said that if the Orange Park Police Chief is okay with this, it's a done deal. Mayor Scott Land

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The elected and the willing

Leaders help demolish someone's future forever home

MIDDLEBURG – Area civic, elected, business and volunteer leaders joined Clay County Habitat for Humanity last weekend to demolish a home in the nonprofit's Fourth Annual Leaders Build event.

Although the site at 1769 Treeland Ave. is not ready to begin a full-blown construction project yet, Executive Director Carolyn Edwards said the nonprofit is standing ready thanks to the efforts of April 28.

"We don't quite have a family picked out yet but we will and when we do, they'll help us build their new home here, right where this house currently stands," Edwards said.

Volunteers hailed from the U.S. Navy, Clay County Sheriff's Office, Board of County Commissioners, Clerk of Court and School Board. From the private sector came volunteers from VyStar Credit Union and Wells Fargo.

According to Habitat's Volunteer Director Kim Voigt, the Leaders Build event brings together board members and community leaders to work collaboratively on a project that serves a community family in need. This year, more than 60 people showed up to help flatten this abandoned house.

Before grabbing a sledgehammer and taking it to windows, doors, cabinets and more, Sheriff Darryl Daniels cited legacy as a driving force for work of organizations

such as Habitat for Humanity.

"You often times wonder if what you really do matters and this is one of those things that you can reflect back upon when you get older, that later generations can hear about," said Daniels, surrounded by CCSO officers there to volunteer as well. "These are the things that matter in life and to be able to give back tangibly to the community, that really has value. You're adding value to somebody's life and to the community and that doesn't get forgotten."

Habitat and School Board member Janice Kerekes, while not joined by other school board members, said she was excited about the turnout.

"Thank you so much for joining us today," Kerekes said, speaking as vice president of Habitat. "I know it's early on a Saturday but I'm so happy about how many of you showed up for this cause today."

"We all know how important it is for our children to have a safe place to live. The kid or kids who will call this future house home will have a safe place to lay their head to rest. They're going to get a good night's rest, they'll do better because of it and grow into an important part of [Clay County]."

After a safety message, County Commissioner Mike Cella quickly made his way to the house's front and, with the help of other leaders and volunteers, dismantled

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Primary solution was left on table

To the Florida Department of Elections, I am known by the acronym “NPA” – no party affiliation. That means I have not registered as a Democrat or Republican.

This was a deliberate choice on my part, but it comes with consequences.

NPA's will be treated as non-people in the August primaries. We can't cast a ballot for candidates from either of the two major parties, even though the primary determines who appears on the ballot in the general election.

The other consequence, as a political operative once explained to me, is that I am targeted by both parties.

My phone will ring constantly with suggestions that I vote for this person or that one. And my mailbox will be over-stuffed with fliers and pleas from all candidates on the final ballot. I'm the guy they want on their side.

I can live with the second consequence.

The first one, though, is becoming more of a problem for me and the estimated 3.5 million Floridians who have declined to formally choose sides.

The Constitutional Revision Commission took a stab at addressing that issue with Provision 62, proposed by Commissioner William Schifino, a Republican from Tampa.

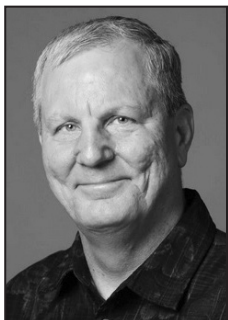
It would have allowed voters in November to decide if the state wanted to adopt a so-called “top two open primary” where every candidate appears on one ballot and everybody gets to vote. The top two finishers, regardless of party, then go to the general election.

A few states already do this, notably California.

The plan passed the Ethics and Elections Committee 6-3, but it was skunked 7-0 in the General Provisions Committee, chaired by Republican Jacqui Thurlow-Lipisch, a county commissioner from Martin County.

Or, in the parlance of the commission, it was laid on the table. Voters don't get to

This Week in History

5 years ago, 2013

After deliberating six hours, a four-man, two-woman jury convicted a Jacksonville man of two counts of second-degree murder. Cornelius Walston, 30, of Jacksonville, had been on trial for the October 18, 2009 stabbing deaths of David Wiley Smith of Middleburg and Kevin Lee Martin of Orange Park that took place during a brawl outside of Club Myth on Fleming Island.

A 78,000-pound external fuel tank from a decommissioned Space Shuttle made its way by barge along the Intracoastal Waterway from Cape Canaveral and back down the St. Johns River to Reynolds Industrial Park in Green Cove Springs. The tank was donated to the Wings of Dreams Museum in Keystone Heights.

The Clay County Chamber of Commerce basically told School Superintendent Charlie Van Zant Jr. and the school board to simmer down after a Chamber survey found that 76.6 percent of respondents viewed the bickering between both camps as “harmful to the business interests of Clay County.”

10 years ago, 2008

The Clay County Sheriff's Office investigated the theft of an \$80,000 Ferrari Spider from the Orange Park Mall parking lot. The car's owner, Robert Hecht, told detectives the car contained \$400,000 in jewelry he kept in the front compartment.

organizer of the annual Ham Jam, said the festival and barbecue competition would not take place in 2008 due to the slow economy and lack of sponsorships. The event was first launched in 1987.

Clay County Library System Director

Arnold Weeks said the county’s libraries would be getting a new code of conduct as it prepared to open up free internet access to library patrons. The new code addressed accessing internet pornography.

Marion Scott, 14, won first place in the Concert on the Green Young Artist Competition. Along with a \$1,500 prize, he was selected as a featured soloist to perform with the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra at the Concert on the Green event May 24.

The inaugural March of Dimes WalkAmerica walk in Clay County raised \$26,000 to help fight birth defects.

30 years ago, 1988

Circuit Court Judge Giles P. Lewis sentenced Elwood Ireland, 69, of Lake Geneva, to seven years in prison after pleading

guilty to a lesser charge of manslaughter. He was originally charged with first-degree murder for shooting his wife, Margie Ireland, 60.

The Clay County Sheriff’s Office arrested Alonzo Plummer, 16, for murder, as well as Howard Vaughn Jr., 17, both of Green Cove Springs, for allegedly shooting Rodney Ricks, 20, of a Miller Street address.

Gov. Bob Martinez honored Lakeside Elementary School physical education teacher Kim Tracanna with one of eight Governor’s Leadership Awards. She was the only female teacher to receive an honor from Martinez.

40 years ago, 1978

The Clay County Health Department’s

Health Advisory Council recommended the Board of County Commissioners hold public hearings about establishing nighttime hours at the county clinic. The goal was to provide health care access to the indigent.

CETA Director Elaine McBride filed sexual and racial discrimination charges with the Florida Commission on Human Relations against the Clay County Board of County Commissioners, which kicked off a six-week investigation.

In its annual reorganization, Green Cove Springs City Commissioner John Bradley was seated as mayor replacing commissioner Joe Love who was sworn in to a second term in office.

choose.

The result is that we see candidates in both parties run to the extreme left or right in the primary, then disavow much of what they said when the general election rolls around because they have to appeal to the whole state.

Republican gubernatorial candidate Adam Putnam, for instance, spent the early days of his campaign trying to sound like Rambo on steroids – talking tough about all the red-meat issues his party’s base adores.

I think he is a lot more moderate than he has been letting on, but general wisdom is that only the most dedicated voters in each party turn out for the primary – in other words, the base.

And with challengers Ron DeSantis and more-than-likely Richard Corcoran shooting routinely flames out of their mouths, Putnam is basically forced to prove he won’t cave to those lilly-livered liberal elites if he is elected.

That’s no way for anyone to govern.

Fun fact: In 2010, when Rick Scott came from nowhere to win the governor’s mansion, only 22 percent of registered voters turned out in the primary compared to

49 percent in the general election.

In 2016, primary turnout was 22 percent compared to 75 percent in the general.

An open system would help moderate some of the primary garbage we hear every time an election rolls around.

The same goes for Democrats. Gwen Graham is defending herself from those on the hard left who will settle for nothing less than full support of everything on their agenda.

The problem is, most people live somewhere in the middle.

That brings us back to the NPA choice a lot of us make.

Right now, there are two choices: stay the same, or swallow hard and pick a party.

Neither one helps solve the problem.

People say they are tired of all the negativity in politics. The CRC had a chance to make a small dent in that but laid it on the table instead.

Let’s step back and think about the last two weeks. The school board, the county commission and the sheriff have been

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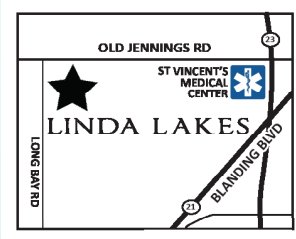

Community helps provide Water for Africa

OAKLEAF – What began as a research project grew into a community movement as students, parents and families in the Oakleaf community raised more than \$4,500 to provide safe clean drinking water for remote villages in Kenya.

Oakleaf High students Jackson Hickey, 15, Natalia Pennock, 17, and Reagan Euwema, 16, didn't expect their class project to create such a response among their fellow students at first.

Euwema said when the trio made their first presentation to the school during the third lunch period, all they had to do is explain how many children die daily due to not having access to clean water.

"Many illnesses can come from dirty water – cholera, etc. A child dies every 15 seconds from water-related illnesses," Euwema said.

The trio began their research in January as part of teacher Tina Detrick's AICE Global Perspectives social studies class. Detrick had students research the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals, a set of 17 goals that are designed to rid the planet of poverty. Detrick assigned Euwema, Hickey and Pennock Goal No. 6 "Clean Water and Sanitation."

"Originally, it was just going to be a smaller scale fundraiser; just try and solicit donations from individual classes, but after we realized how much we could raise if we got more classes in on it, we decided to make it a sort of competition between the fifth period classes at Oak-

leaf," Hickey said.

The student-centered project required the three students to write a presentation after they collected all their research and then present their findings to the class using a lesson plan similar to what teachers use daily to teach students. But, they also had to find a solution.

That's where they came across water filtration manufacturer LifeStraw, which is based in Lausanne, Switzerland, but has a charitable arm based in Washington, D.C.

"During our research, we found LifeStraw, and then we found how to make our own water filters out of turkey basters and activated carbon and coffee filters," Euwema said.

Their class presentation also involved showing their classmates how to make their own makeshift water filters that can be used on hikes and outings.

Hickey said, while the class project took off and got the Oakleaf community excited, it made him realize how fortunate families are in the U.S.

"People here take for granted how water is used in so many parts of daily life – drinking, bathing, washing clothes. While we're fortunate to have it – we just turn on the tap and it comes out – some people have to walk miles for water that might not even be clean," Hickey said.

Originally, Euwema, Hickey and Pennock set their goal at collecting \$2,640, which would have been enough to purchase six of LifeStraw's "Community" filters. LifeStraw would deploy the filtration

For some, that means having a place to perform their solo pieces and earn \$1,000 in scholarship money while doing so. For others, it means giving them a public place to professionally display their art and for LeAnn Hilliard, the nonprofit does just that.

"It's just so awesome that my poster is here on display for anyone to see," said Hilliard, winner of the 2018 Concert on the Green Poster Contest.

Just as it's done since shortly after its founding, the organization held a poster concert to give local students a chance to design the poster the nonprofit will use to advertise its annual Concert on the Green. Not only will the winning poster be displayed in the Thrasher-Horne Center for the Arts gallery, which is where Hilliard's poster is currently hanging, but it will also be used for all official information pamphlets. Hilliard's poster hangs alongside 44 other runners-up – the 45 posters were the ones selected by the judges out of the 148 entries.

Hilliard's poster would be quite hard to miss too and not because of its position in the gallery. Featuring a colorful clarinet – an instrument she used to play – surrounded by contrasting explosions of color and a stream of musical notes from the Overture of 1812, which is played each and every year at the annual outdoor concert, Hilliard's poster truly pops.

"My teacher told us it didn't have to be realistic and I just sort of ran with that," Hilliard said, while describing how her poster came to be. "Beyond the design, I really tried to use complimentary colors everywhere because that always contrast

so well."

Because her poster won, Hilliard will be receiving a \$500 scholarship that she can use towards majoring in art or any other discipline of her choice, which is great for Hilliard because despite her love of art, she intends to keep it as just a hobby.

"You don't want to do a hobby as a job because then you'll start to dislike it because it becomes what you have to do, not what you want to do," Hilliard said.

According to Hilliard, she didn't think she would win and that's due to the numerous other posters her piece is surrounded by in the Thrasher-Horne gallery.

"There are so many other ones that could have won this," Hilliard said, pointing to a poster her friend designed. "It means the world to me, though, that I did win. There are so many great pieces and I'm really happy to have my piece in here with them." While one of the key pieces of the poster is how it displays the information for the upcoming concert on May 27, there were a number of things the judges were looking for, according to Carron Wedlund, poster contest chairman for Concert on the Green.

"We were looking at the art techniques used, the materials, the poster effectiveness and elements of design and I think [Hilliard's] achieved success in all of that," Wedlund said.

Wedlund's stretch of roots in the Clay County art community doesn't end with Concert on the Green. She's been in the Art Guild of Orange Park for over 10 years.

"I'm so honored to be [the chairman] of Concert on the Green," Wedlund said. "Art is just so important to this area, and to any community really, and that's why things like [Concert on the Green] and the Art Guild of Orange Park exist. We are all working to keep art in Clay County."

"Clay County has come a long way, too," Wedlund said. "For a while there, art seemed to lose its place in schools but now, more and more art teachers are be-

ing added."

Concert on the Green President Lauren Hoffman chimed in to further explain Clay County's art evolution. She said art and music promote the greatness within our community. With that comes more exposure. With more exposure comes more growth. With more growth comes more events like Concert on the Green, which raises money that is then put back into the community. That money helps promote more greatness in the artistic community of Clay County and the circle continues.

"As long as this circle continues, Clay County's artistic and musical students are in good hands," Hoffman said.

The scholarship Hilliard received was paid for by funds raised by donors, fund-

raisers and events over the past year and, according to Hoffman, it's always been this way.

"I think the most important part of our organization, besides the students, is the people that keep us going," Hoffman said. "We are a grassroots movement of people who want to support art and music in our community. None of our staff is paid. We are here for the kids."

The gallery will host the posters at the Thrasher-Horne Center from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday thru Friday, until May 11, where the gallery will be closed on Friday. The gallery will continue displaying posters until May 24. This year's Concert on the Green will take place May 27 at St. Johns Country Day School.

Blueberries are just a part of this sanctuary

OAKLEAF – The blueberries are ready, but only for a short time.

The finicky crop, available locally at the Blu By U blueberry farm in Northwest Clay County, will be ripe for the picking for less than a handful of weeks. The farm's opening day was April 28, and, because of the staggered ripening of the plants, will offer the fruit until the bushes are completely picked over and next year's growing season starts.

After suffering from bad weather last year, the farm – in its third official growing season – hopes to shatter its yield record, going from 2,500 pounds in their first year to an estimated 5,000 this year.

"It has to get cold in the winter to produce a good crop, if it doesn't get cold, you don't get any berries," said the farm's owner Tom Morris. "On the other hand, if it freezes you don't get any berries, but this year we've been lucky."

Morris and his friend and farm manager Matt Merrill got into the blueberry business after spending a couple decades in youth ministry.

"We went from raising teenagers to raising blueberries," Morris said, laughing. "I don't know what's been easier, there's still drama and they're still moody."

The two set out to create something that was unique to the area, starting with blueberries and eventually growing into a destination for field trips and youth retreats.

"We wanted to get a piece of property that we could do something with," Morris said. "Somewhere we could enjoy na-

ture and pick and eat blueberries. We also wanted something that could be a retirement option."

They found the former site of Veterans Farm and decided to learn how to farm blueberries.

After the first year's success, they decided to try and add to the experience. Now the farm offers more than just blueberries with a built-out sandy beach area that sits next to the homemade plywood drive-in movie screen.

As you take the meandering gravel road, which is lined with signs to direct patrons deep into the woods where the farm is located, you will eventually come to the penned-in area where the farm's fauna are kept, complete with a dozen and a half chickens, five ducks, a mini donkey and two fresh baby goats who moved to

the farm a couple days prior to this year's opening day.

They even purchased 35 caterpillars that they saw through their metamorphosis, creating the inaugural Blu By U butterfly garden to accompany the bees kept at the farm that help pollinate the blueberries.

"We want people to enjoy themselves out here, it's not just about the blueberries," Merrill said as he walked through the field sampling this year's crop. "We've already had a couple retreats [in the off-season], and kids from local churches have come out to watch movies on the screen."

Merrill said the best part is seeing the fruits of their labor, families walking the rows of blueberries smiling and enjoying what the two men have created. After the blueberries are picked and weighed, they

offer snow cones and fresh squeezed lemonade made with Blu By U lemons.

Blueberries sell for \$4 a pound for the u-picks, and \$7 if you buy the pre-picked berries sold next to the lemonade and local honey in the 1880-built farmhouse at the center of the property. They also have adolescent plants for sale in case a customer wants to try growing their own bush full of the plump blue marbles that surely beat anything store-bought.

The farm will continue to open up Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., and Saturdays from 9 to 6. During this year's season, the farm expects at least 300 people every Saturday, and busy days might prevent some skipped hours as the berries ripen up. According to the website, the first Saturday and Tuesdays went so well that they are forgoing their Thursday hours this week to save up berries for Saturday, May 5. For more information, they recommend watching their website, www.blubyujax.com, and Facebook page for updated hours. If you missed the first round, however, there will be a second harvest in June when the late-season variety ripens.

systems and train villagers on how to properly operate the system. Now, the project has raised enough money to deploy at least 10 filters. Each Community filter has the capacity to purify enough water for 100 people every day for five years.

Pennock said she was moved when she watched a video and saw children's faces light up after receiving clean water for the first time.

"Water kind of allows them to go to school in a way because if they have good hygiene and clean water, they can go through their day with not having the complications of being dehydrated or anything like that," Pennock said.

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The generosity and involvement that residents maintain well into their nineties is inspiring.

"One resident in her eighties, just told me the other day she wanted to learn to play an instrument!"

“It definitely didn’t feel good but I deserved it because in the end, my burger

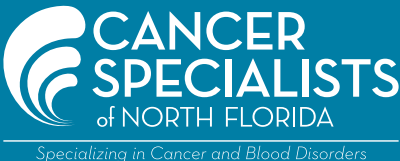

Lionfish are known to eat just about every marine creature in its range, by some estimates that includes over 70 different fish, invertebrates and mollusks. Their external spikes act as a shield to fend off most predators and make the fish extremely difficult to capture as well.

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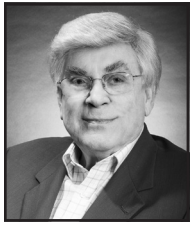

echoed this and stated that using town officers as SROs would enhance the small town feel and benefits of living in Orange Park.

Vice Mayor Gary Meeks, who previously served as a police officer at one

point in his career, explained how years ago when he started the Officer Friendly Program in Orange Park, he believed municipal officers should be the ones protecting the town's students and still today, he feels the same.

"I fought this battle a long time ago," Meek said. "I'm going to tell you, it's not even an option [to say no]."

After their discussion, the council passed a motion 5-0 to allow Campbell to proceed with discussions with Superintendent Addison Davis under the guidance that the council does indeed wish to put municipal officers in Orange Park Elementary, Grove Park Elementary and Orange Park Junior High.

In other business, council presented a proclamation recognizing former Town Clerk Joyce Bryan and all of her contributions to the town. One of the highlights of Bryan's career was the creation of the Orange Park Fall Festival, which has grown to be a regional event in its more than 30 years. Before the proclamation was read, Campbell expressed feelings of regret that were echoed by the council in that the town did not make a proclamation like this honoring Bryan when she retired and was now playing catch up. Regardless, Bryan said she was honored and even came prepared with a speech.

"I hope that I was able to help the citizens of this town have a better life and I hope that I helped to contribute to the improvements that were made here," Bryan read from her speech. "This has been my home for a long time and I hope it remains so."

year terms, to three consecutive four-year terms. That proposal would also impose a lifetime term limit of three four-year terms for county commissioners. As it currently stands, a county commissioner could serve two four-year terms, take a break, then run for office again, and serve another two terms, repeating that action over and over.

The second issue basically involves raising county commissioner salaries incrementally to bring them more in line with most other county commissioners in the state.

Clay County commissioners' salaries are currently much lower than most other commissioners in the state. Approval of this item by voters would bring the Clay commissioners' salaries (over four budget years) to about 70 percent of the salaries set by general law in non-charter counties. That would put their salaries at about \$51,580 instead of the \$37,580 they currently earn.

Those two items will be put before voters at the three public hearings the CRC is required to have. Those meetings will be May 9, May 24 and June 13.

One item that won't be put before voters is whether the county manager position should be an elected or appointed post. That item was brought up for discussion by CRC member Ronald Stotler. Stotler said, while he wasn't "saying anything against any individuals," that he believed the position has grown over the years to one that is very powerful and includes the duties of comptroller and clerk of the records.

"As it's evolved over a period of time, this has become probably the most single powerful position in Clay County," Stotler said, adding later, "I'm a big believer in checks and balances and I'm a big believer in the public picking who is in control."

Support for the idea was hard to find among other members of the CRC and the citizens who appeared at the meeting to speak to the subject. Instead, the consensus was in support of an appointed county manager and in particular of Stephanie Kopelousos, who is the current county manager.

"I think that this county manager does an awesome job," she said. "There are checks and balances. The county manager is not writing a check for 50 cents without somebody knowing about it before it clears the bank so everybody knows about it and where it belongs."

Many cited the idea that if the position were elected, it would become a political position, rather than an executive position – a change they did not like.

Saying he would not be in favor of making such a change, CRC member Larry Kirkman said, "Just look to the north to Duval County to the level of animosity between the mayor and the city council. That would give you an idea of what you might have to look forward to."

Kirkman also cited the idea that an elected county manager would basically be a part of a "popularity contest" in an election and would not have to display any real skills – just popularity. That person would also become very hard to fire as opposed to a county manager who is appointed by the county commission and can be terminated by that commission.

"I think what we have now works," Kirkman said.

CRC member Tamara Brandt agreed, citing especially the requirement in the county manager's contract that calls for the person to be on call for 24 hours a day.

"I think that this county manager does an awesome job," she said. "There are checks and balances. The county manager is not writing a check for 50 cents without somebody knowing about it before it clears the bank so everybody knows about it and where it belongs."

Art Hooker, also a CRC member, agreed Kopelousos was doing a good job, and mentioned her level of compensation (\$177,000 a year).

"It's my understanding that she's never taken a cost of living adjustment so I think we're being well served in this county by a county manager who quite honestly could have gone and served anywhere based on her history."

CRC member Amy Miller said she would echo Hooker's comments. "I looked at her compensation and I don't think she gets paid enough," she said.

Among those speaking in the public comment section of the meeting was Van Royal, a Green Cove Springs council member. "The reality of it right now is we've got five county commissioners that are responsible to the public and they take that seriously and it's our job to elect them and their job to hire the best qualified person and in my vein they have done that and it works," he said.

George Egan, president of the Reinhold Corp., spoke about the county's current form of government being good for bringing jobs to Clay County. "I spend a portion of every working week trying to bring jobs to Clay County and the most attractive thing we can do for companies outside of Clay County is to make our government work smoothly and efficiently and be an attractive place to move," he said, adding that leads to jobs in Clay County that are "hopefully high paying" and therefore improve the quality of life.

Former county commissioner Wendell Davis also spoke against changing the county manager position to an elected one. He also spoke in favor of Kopelousos, saying she had helped greatly in moving Clay County forward in the outer beltway construction, which will bring many jobs here. He called Kopelousos a "cheerleader" for jobs and economic development and mentioned that she was definitely available 24/7.

"I've talked to her at midnight and she's answered the phone. I've talked to her at 5:30 in the morning and she answered the phone," Davis said.

Mike Cella, current vice chairman of the Clay County Commission, also spoke in favor of the existing form of government in the county, saying he had spoken to probably thousands of residents over the past few years and not one of them had complained about it. "Our form of government works. It's survived the test of time," he said. "Don't fix what's not broken."

In the end, Stotler repeated that he had "no personal complaints whatsoever with our government," but was glad the issue was debated.

"I don't have any strong feelings one way or the other. I just think the discussion needed to be had and we had it," he said.

There was no motion made to bring the item before voters and no vote taken.

three wars. Upchurch was at most three yards from his victims.

Ears ringing and eyes barely focusing, Upchurch saw the carnage, lost his nerve and ran from the scene. He ended up in Jacksonville on Market Street at military police headquarters where he spun a tale of going AWOL and stumbling across the

scene and the bodies. Little did he know that the sleepy little town of Orange Park and most of Clay County were wide awake the moment after the sound of that gun fire was heard. With the car lights blazing in the woods, people found the bloody horror quickly, alerted Clay County and Jacksonville law. The MPs were a little surprised when he walked in the door though.

MPs drove him to Orange Park and when confronted with the gory mess now

brightly lit with car lights, he cracked and confessed.

Upchurch remained in military custody until April 3 when he was indicted for first-degree murder by a Clay County Grand Jury and became a guest of Sheriff John Hall in Green Cove Springs. The trial for the murder of Nathan Ledbetter commenced April 23.

Two days later, the jury found him guilty and recommended mercy. Judge McNeil

sentenced him to spend the rest of his natural life in jail, two days after that. On May 1, he was transferred to Florida State Prison at Raiford.

It was 37 days between the commission of the murder and the commencement of the sentence. Judging by supplemental minutes to Clay County Commission Meetings, it took far longer for the Army to retrieve their M1 Garand from Sheriff Hall's evidence locker.

What's attacking my azaleas?

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Last week we discussed the popular azaleas that many have in their landscape but didn't have much time to discuss the insects that attack them. With proper culture and care, you may never see some of these issues but it is best to be prepared if you do.

Some pests you may find on your azalea include lace bugs, spider mites, leafminers and azalea caterpillars.



Lace Bugs

Lace bugs are small insects that live on the underside of leaves and suck nutrients and water out of the leaves. This will cause a speckled look to the top surface of the leaf and tiny black dots of waste on the bottom. The insect itself may be difficult to see but is cream colored with lacey wings and

is around 1/10 of an inch long.

These pests can be prevented by placing your shrubs in the right location, watering and fertilizing them correctly, or even with a strong spray from a hose to knock them off of the leaves. In spring, insecticidal soap or horticultural oil can be applied to the underside of the leaves and some systemic products can give year-round control if applied to the soil around the plant.



Spider Mites

Spider mites are not insects, but will feed on leaves with their sucking mouthparts causing a bronzing or rusty discoloration of the leaves. These are very small and are often identified by placing a piece of white paper under the foliage and beating the leaves gently with your hand. Some mites should fall off and you can then identify them.



For control, insecticidal soap or horticultural oil can be applied to the undersides of leaves or use a miticide that is labeled for control of spider mites on ornamental plants. Always check the label before applying any pesticide and follow all directions and safety precautions.

The damage of these pests will be chewed leaves and they are between one-half-inch and two inches long. Since they feed in groups and are fairly bright colored with a red body and black and yellow stripes, they are usually highly noticeable. For control, handpicking and crushing or placing the larvae in a container of soap water is often sufficient but if infestations are heavy enough, a pesticide labeled for control of these caterpillars could be used.

Leafminers

Unlike the previous two pests, the leafminer is actually the larvae of a fly that eats its way through a tunnel it chews within the leaf. This is often noticed as a squiggly path on the top of the leaf. Once inside the leaf, this pest is difficult to control and they are often not in great enough numbers to cause major damage.

Azalea Caterpillar

In our area it is also likely you may have issues with the azalea caterpillar.

ST. AUGUSTINE – After enduring the surprise death of their coach just days before the softball season opener, the Ridgeview High softball team had a bit of regrouping to do on their way to an "eerily" weird 6-0 win over Clay High in the district 4-6A championship game played April 27 at Pedro Menendez High School.

"He was definitely here and is laughing at us with a Michelob in his hand,"

said Ridgeview coach Bryson Barker, after his Panthers benefited from an error-filled night by the Blue Devils. "We went through a lot as a team this year and there was a turning point in the middle of the season that we decided that we were going to use (Coach Roger) Harvey's death as a motivation. He would have loved this. We were tight in the beginning of the season with a lot of emotion, but then decided he played loose and had fun and that's where we needed to be."

The title, Ridgeview's first ever cham-

pionship trophy in softball, came by way of a first inning of mishaps by Clay; three field errors, that led to a quick 3-0 lead for the Panthers, and a seventh inning of mishaps that added the final three runs.

"This means a lot for me; knowing that coach Harvey was here," said Kelsey Solomon, a senior player for Harvey last year and now an assistant coach with Barker. "I know he's watching and I'm just honored to be part of it."

Clay pitcher Morgan Crutcher, who

of St. Cloud,” said Fleming Island track coach Karen Moritz. Montalvo was fifth behind Miller at the 2017 3200 championship with Miller at 9:37.28 and Montalvo at 9:38.88.

Miller, a senior, and the school record holder in the 3200 meters, topped the region field with his 9:25.46 winning effort that beat the field by nearly two seconds. Miller also competed in the 1600 later in the day, but did not fare as well with a 4:33.62 effort for the 10th place with a 4:21.20 the winning time. Miller ran 4:30 to win the district title and has a 4:23 school record set this year.

“It wasn’t his day in the 1600, but we are past that and ready to focus on the gold medal in the 3200,” said Moritz.

In the sprints and hurdles, Fleming Island got top finishes from hurdler Glenn Rodgers and sprinters Anfernee McCaskill and Felipe Fernandez to put three more Golden Eagles in top contention for state medals. Rodgers, who transferred from Ridgeview last year to be able to compete in football and track, continued his blitz attack on the state 110 high hurdle lists with his fourth sub-15 second effort at the region championships with a 14.74 finish for fourth place. Rodgers had crept lower into the 14s with a 14.78 split in the prelims after winning the district title in 14.92.

“He had good basic technique when he got here,” said Fleming Island boys coach Chris Otero. “We worked to get him to that first hurdle in step because he was stuttering when he got there. From there, his form just clicked and he keeps getting faster. He has to trust his steps.”

Rodgers, a junior, finished 12th at the Class 2A championships with a pedestrian 15.97 for Ridgeview last year.

McCaskill, seventh at last year’s region 100 meters and an injury scratch in the 200, bounced back to get third in the 200. In the 100, McCaskill had his fastest time of the year at 10.92, but the wicked fast final was won in 10.62 with seven of the eight finalists well under 11 seconds.

“Both Anfernee and Glenn were just shy of breaking their own school records with Glenn’s time from regionals sitting eighth on the state qualifiers list,” said Moritz. “Another good run could see a medal. The 200 has always been Anfernee’s best event. Thanks to the plus eight rule, he made it out in the 100 a well.”

McCaskill’s 10.92 is the 13th fastest time in the state with Taylor Banks of Miramar top time ast 10.57.

“He’s been very explosive out of the blocks this year,” said Fleming Island boys coach Chris Otero. “He had some injury issues last year, but he’s healthy and motivated for his senior year. He has been stronger on his finish more this year and that’s a key in the 200.”

In the 200, McCaskill, fifth ranked, is one of six sprinters under 22 seconds listed for the state meet.

“Coach Chris Otero and Coach Jessica

Zayakosky have done a great job working with him this season and putting him in competitive meets,” said Moritz. “He’s been racing against the best all year and was prepared to compete in a fast region.”

In the 400, Fernandez, a senior, has also chipped away at his time with a handful of sub-50 second efforts in the last two weeks, hopefully, putting him on track for at least two more drops in time and shot at the state title. Fernandez finished second at the region meet in 49.13 with a 48.76 the winning time. His split has him eighth ranked in the state with the top two times under 47 seconds; 46.56 and 46.83 and the next nine under 49 seconds. Felipe was 49.28 in the region prelims and got hand-timed at 48.94 in the 4 x 400.

“We asked a lot out of Felipe this week and he more than surpassed our expectations,” said Moritz. “He anchored both the 4x800 and 4x400 teams and ran in the 400, qualifying for state in all three. He is the first athlete in school history to qualify for the state meet three events.”

For Oakleaf, Briley continued his path to a repeat state title; he is the 4A defending champion in the triple jump, with one of his best efforts with a 47’-11.25” winning jump. Briley, about a foot better than the state list and also third in the long jump at 21’-10.25”, has gotten close to the elusive 50 foot mark in the triple jump which has been his target all year. Oakleaf jumps coach John Carter has coyly hinted that the state meet will be where his best jumps will come. Briley is ranked 10th in the long jump with two jumpers both over 23 feet at the top.

“We work all year to be at our best at the biggest meet,” said Carter. “Melvin likes to have someone pushing him to go bigger.”

Briley’s 47’-11.25” jump is top ranked with three jumpers in the 46-plus foot range just behind him.

“He is a one of a kind athlete and that is what separates him from the others,” said

Carter. “He is still working on his technique everyday.”

For Johnson, consistency has been the key thus far with Carter noting that her experience in the past two state meets could carry her to gold in two events. Johnson’s winning leaps of 18’-9” in the long jump and 38’-9” in the triple jump; first ranked and second ranked by just one inch, respectively, put her in prime position to earn her first track state medal. Johnson finished 13th in the triple jump and fifth in the long jump last year, but is the only returning jumper in the top five at the long jump and one of just three sophomores from last year’s top 15 finishers.

“It’s all hers this year,” said Carter. “She has seen two years of state meet athletes and it should be her turn this year.”

One other Oakleaf athlete, mammoth shotputter Jalen Rivers, just a sophomore, unloaded his best put of the year with his first 50-plus mark; a 51’-2.25” effort that earned third at the region meet. Rivers, with a 48-footer at districts, positioned himself as the third best on the state meet two feet from number one and just a foot to number two.

For Fleming Island, also earning their trip to the state meet with either a top four finish or a Plus 8 invite were the boys 4 x 400 relay; Jared and Jacob Ashe, Austin St. Laurent and Fernandez, 14th ranked in 3:23.45 (3:15.78 top time) and the boys 4 x 800; Jared Ashe, Cameron May, Landon Opp and Fernandez, 16th ranked in 8:09.75 (7:52.82 top time);

For Oakleaf, also earning a trip to the state meet was Tahja Peoples in the 200; sixth at regions in 26.13 and 22nd ranked (24.29 top state time).

With that, the Lady Blue Devils won a 20-12 district title from a feisty Orange Park High team for the 4-1A crown on April 24 at Baldwin High.

In semifinal action on April 23, Clay rolled over Westside 47-0 while Orange Park won a tense 20-19 game over host Baldwin.

In Class 2A, Fleming Island, the defending district 1-2A champion, and Oakleaf both lost in their semifinal matches at Mandarin High; 13-12 to Robert E. Lee for the Golden Eagles and 16-0 to Sandalwood for Oakleaf. Sandalwood beat Lee 24-0 to advance. Fleming Island lost in the region finals to Dr. Phillips of Orlando last year.

In district 5-1A, Keystone Heights beat top seed Lecanto 12-0 in their semifinal but fell to Belleview 33-12 in that championships held at Citrus High School.

Clay moves into the region semifinals with a Thurs., May 2 match at Terry Parker. Last year, Clay defeated Terry Parker but lost to Choctawhatchee in the region finals.

In Clay’s semifinal win over Westside, quarterback Ciara Zino continued her Joe Montana-like dominating play as the Blue Devil signalcaller with a first quarter touchdown pass to Alexis Stilianou from 10 yards out with a PAT pass to Kimber Griffin.

“We have her rolling out and making option decisions on the edge,” said Stilianou. “She’s become more of a runner lately because defenses are sitting back on our receivers. We take what is open.”

“That kid threw great tonight,” said Oakleaf coach Christina Thompson. “The first time we faced her, we had some things figured out. Her ball was moving way better tonight and the rise ball was working

exceptionally well. She got us to chase and I was very impressed with her tonight.”

Oakleaf could not get any air off Kendrick’s pitches, but, in the sixth, Angela Agurkis, the Knights’ power hitter softball put down a squeeze bunt that got Rebecca Koskey across home plate for a 2-2 score.

“When coach gave me the sign, I thought I have to get this done. I haven’t been producing hitting so if I need to bunt, I need to bunt and lay it down; there is no stopping me on that one. In district 2-3A, St. Johns Country Day

School held off St. Joseph to win 7-6 to advance to that championship game on Thursday against University Christian, an 11-1 winner over Oak Hall. .

For Fleming Island, the unlucky season finally got a lucky bounce.

"We just had three straight games that we lost by a run in two and 10-5 in the other," said interim coach Grant Bigilin, who has filled in for head coach Marty Lanoux as he recovers from heart surgery. "This team has been in a lot of games, but we find a way to not close them. Tonight, they may have been tired of losing close games. Maybe it's a turnaround for us."

Fleming Island returns to Atlantic Coast to face the Stingrays on Thurs., May 3 in the district championship with Atlantic Coast owning at 2-1 regular season win in March.

"Either of these two other teams would be fine for us to face because Oakleaf we tied 1-1 and Atlantic Coast we lost 2-1," said Bigilin. "We gave both games away so this is our second chance."

4-3A champion at 5’-5”, answered with a jump of 5’-5” to win the jump off. For the region title, Washington High’s Tytavia Hardy won with a 5’-5.75” leap with Petrosky’s rival Abigail Thorpe of Creekside second at 5’-3.75”. Petrosky beat Thorpe in the district championships with a 5’-5” leap.

“Kaley had problems with her footing early which caused her to be in a jump off for fourth place,” said Middleburg High coach Craig Martin. “During the jump off she cleared a height higher than the second place jumper cleared. Her two jumps in the jump off looked perfect, she should be good at UNF with a chance to win.”

Petrosky’s Middleburg training partner, Bryce Quiett, the district 4-3A champion at 6’-7.5”, needed just a 6’-5.5” leap to win his region title by two inches. Quiett is second seeded for the 3A championships with a 6’-11” leap the top mark of the season.

“Bryce is good. There is one jumper from the south region who jumped that 6’-11”,” said Martin. “We will see what happens.”

For Bronco sprinter Marcus Floyd, a second place finisher at the triple jump last year in Class 3A, the region 1-3A championship meet held at Florida High in Tallahassee on Thurs., April 26, produced some drama as the lithe sprinter and jumper got the triple jump title, got third in the 100, but walked off the track in the 200.

First in the region triple jump at 44 feet, 6.25 inches, Floyd will need to punch up two feet plus to get into the medals at the state meet with the top mark at 47’-10.8.” Floyd jumped just 43’-1.5” inches to



win the district 4-3A title and 45’-11.75” to finish second in 3A last year.

“Marcus jumped 46 feet mid season last year,” said Middleburg High coach Craig Martin. “He irritated a muscle in the 100 so he didn’t finish the 200 finals.”

Floyd won the district 200 in 22.28, but will not run the state race where that time would rank 12th statewide behind six sprinters under 22 seconds.

In the 100, Floyd, eighth in 3A last year at 11.22, was second in this year’s district 100 behind Bartram Trail’s Devin Cooper with a 10.84 effort. At regions, Floyd got third at 10.92 to be ranked 14th with Cooper ranked 16th statewide behind top two times of 10.44. St. Augustine’s Dexter Brown, third at the district 100, won the region title in 10.83 with Cooper fifth.

For Orange Park, sophomore Alex Col-

lier, the district champion and the region champion with a 48.79 effort, will be in hot water with a pair of sub-48 second times on top of the 400 meter race. Collier is ranked seventh and led a 1-2-3 district finish in the 400 last week, but teammates Sean Dixon and Alex Meadows could not break the 50 second barrier with Meadows finishing 10th in 50.98 and Dixon 11th in 51.45.

Two other outstanding region performances came from Orange Park thrower Destiny Basden who took second in the shot put at 35’-2.5” just four inches off from first place and third in the discus at 105’-11” with the winning toss at 123’-8”. Basden is 18th seeded in shot put and 17th seeded in discus.

In the distance races, Orange Park’s John Bear, a winner in the 800, 1600 and

3200 at districts, finished fourth in the 3200 in 9:52.55 and fifth in the 1600 in 4:30.76 which got him a Plus 8 invite, but Bear did not finish in the 800. Bear got a 16th seed in the 1600 with a 4:12.56 the top time with his 3200 time seeded 19th with a 9:28.80 at the top.

In pole vault, Middleburg’s Matt Oliver, fourth at districts at 12’-9.5”, finished 11th at regions at 11’-9.75”.

“Matt needed a foot personal record (to get out of regions),” said Martin. “We used a different pole to try and reach that (winner at 16 feet-plus), but the pole didn’t quite work out.”

Landscapeer facing state insurance fraud charge

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A Fleming Island man turned himself in to the Clay County Sheriff’s Office April 25 to be officially booked on charges stemming from a state investigation.

The Florida Department of Financial Services charged Joshua Philip Fletcher, 33, of Fleming Island, with one count each of knowingly concealing payroll data in order to commit worker’s compensation fraud and organized fraud.

According to the arrest warrant, the investigation that began on Feb. 22 found Fletcher and his wife Jill Fletcher, who co-owned J Fletcher Enterprises Inc., purchased minimal worker’s compensation insurance coverage for his company TriMac Outdoor, a statewide commercial landscaping company.

The investigation – conducted by state officials from the Bureau of Insurance Fraud, Bridgefield Employers Insurance Company and Summit Holdings Special Investigations Unit – found “Joshua Fletcher and Jill Fletcher failed to report its company’s true payroll exposure [redaction] ...revealed in an effort to commit worker’s compensation premium fraud,” states the warrant.

Under Florida law, an employer’s worker’s compensation insurance premiums are calculated on a formula involving the amount a company pays in payroll, the rated risk of the work being performed and the number of employees to be covered by the policy. In the event a worker is hurt on the job, worker’s compensation insurance covers the worker’s work-related medical expenses up to a point.

Misrepresenting any of the factors used to calculate insurance premiums is a form of insurance fraud commonly referred to as “premium fraud,” according to the warrant.

Under Florida law, the crime is a first-degree felony.

After being booked on the charges, Fletcher posted a \$100,006 bond and was released from custody.

Woman sentenced in DUI-injury crash

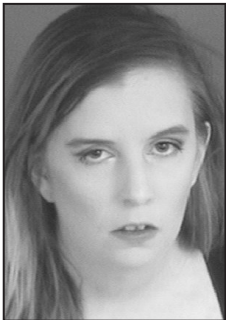
GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A Clay County judge sentenced a Jacksonville woman to state prison on April 25 for seriously injuring a man while driving under the influence in a January 2017 crash.

Fourth Judicial Circuit Court Judge John H. Skinner sentenced Sarah Alyssia Aldrich, 23, to 55 months in a state prison while also giving her credit for 33 days she served in jail.

Court officials also dropped a charge of reckless driving originally lodged against Aldrich for the January 21, 2017 crash that occurred on U.S. Highway 301 in the northbound lanes in Western Clay County.

According to the arrest warrant obtained by the Florida Highway Patrol, Aldrich was driving a Dodge Dart sedan heading southbound in the northbound lanes when she struck a Toyota Camry sedan head-on. When FHP arrived, Aldrich had been removed from the car and transported to Orange Park Medical Center for treatment of injuries. The driver of the Toyota, Christopher D. Roughton, 23, was in the process of being removed the car when FHP arrived on the scene. Roughton was also transported to OPMC where he was listed in critical condition for injuries he received in the crash.

A voluntary blood-alcohol test revealed Aldrich had a blood-alcohol content of 0.23, almost four times the legal limit for impairment.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A Keystone Heights man believed to be responsible for the DUI-related deaths of two Interlachen residents is now in the Clay County Jail after the state attorney’s office filed paperwork April 10 to move the case forward through the courts.

Eric B. Pierce, 53, faces indictment on two counts of DUI manslaughter, two counts of vehicular homicide and one count

of DUI with serious bodily injury to another person.

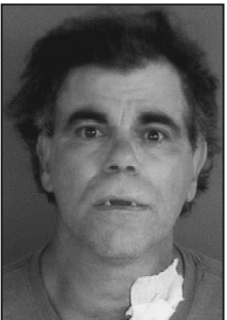
Witnesses told the Florida Highway Patrol that Pierce was driving recklessly in and out of traffic in a 2004 Dodge Ram pickup southbound on State Road 21 near County Road 315C on September 29, 2017 when he attempted to pass several cars in a no passing zone at 7:42 p.m.

While attempting to pass, Pierce’s truck ran head-on into a 2011 Ford Fiesta driven by Ronnie Wayne Thomas, 52, of Interlachen. Both Thomas and his passenger in the Ford, Tabatha May Taylor, 42, were pronounced dead at the scene.

Pierce and a passenger, Frederic Donald Helm III, 73, of Orange Park, both received critical injuries and were transported to Orange Park Medical Center.

State Road 21 was shut down for several hours while FHP conducted the investigation.

At press time, Pierce remained in jail.

ing convicted in a local courtroom.

Fourth Judicial Circuit Court Judge Michael Sharrit sentenced Larry Todd Prevatt, 49, of the Orange Park area to five years in prison for one count of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon and a concurrent five-year term for one count of burglary. He was sentenced on April 19 by Judge Michael Sharrit.

Sharrit also gave Prevatt credit for 233 days he served in jail that will be applied to his prison sentence.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office originally charged Prevatt with attempted first-degree murder, aggravated battery with a deadly weapon and armed burglary for a fight and shooting that took place on April 11, 2016.

According to the arrest warrant, Prevatt walked into the victim's residence on College Drive near Orange Park carrying a baseball bat and a can of gasoline. Police said he violently assaulted the victim and attempted to set the residence on fire. Prevatt assaulted both Brian Darnell and Prevatt's estranged wife who had been dating Darnell since January 2016 when she filed for divorce.

During the melee, police said Prevatt bit his estranged wife on the arms during before Darnell entered a closet and retrieved a shotgun that he used to subdue Prevatt. "When deputies arrive, both Larry Prevatt and Brian Darnell are lying in the yard, approximately 12 feet away from one

another in complete exhaustion and both severely injured," states the warrant.

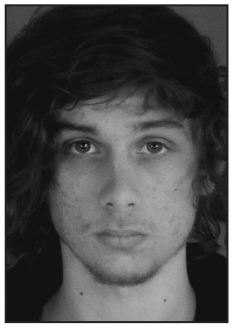

Those honored annually are nominated by people in the community. Nominators write a letter about the person and what they have done to serve the community. A committee then reads the nominations and select from the eventual winners.

by it," Coleman said. "Volunteering is something that I just naturally do, and this is a great reward."

do and follow our Facebook page and see what we're doing, we're in the schools, we're already there."

Asdot then presented some numbers to the council, saying that his department had been involved in 1,411 programs at C.E. Bennett since 2015 and 1,709 at the junior high in the same time period.

"I think that speaks volumes right there," Asdot said. "That's what we do."

Timberlake and the council decided to make an emergency motion, and voted unanimously, to send Asdot and City Manager Danielle Judd to Thursday's school board meeting to present their case for funding members of the Green Cove Springs Police Department for their two schools.

"We've already got heavy involvement in the schools, and our officers have already done a phenomenal job of engaging themselves in the community," Timberlake said. "It makes sense to use people that are already involved in the schools and that the students already know."

Also in discussion was Spring Park

Pool, which is now fixed up and ready for the first full season after last year's construction snafu caused a late opening.

"That pool is a huge attraction and will continue to be a huge attraction for this city," said long-time pool supporter and city council member Van Royal.

The pool will begin operations Saturday, May 5, from 11 a.m. until 7 p.m., hours that will continue on the weekends until Memorial Day, May 28 this year, when the pool will open from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. all days Tuesday through Sunday with Mondays reserved for cleaning. After Labor Day, the pool will revert back to the weekend hours through the first day in October.

Fees for the pool are set at \$4 for adults and \$2 for children under the age of 17, with seniors 65 or older and active duty military being charged \$3. Passes will again be available at \$84 per adult and \$63 for children, seniors and military. Family passes, for a group of five, will be \$200 for the season.

Aside from the recently renovated pool, the city will be doing a rehaul of another city-run entity – the electric utility system, after unanimously passing a resolution Tuesday that will allow the city to borrow the not-to-exceed amount of \$10.7 million from CenterState Bank, the lender chosen the last time the council met.

Passing the resolution sets the money in motion with the city now having approved the full amount as well as any costs related to the transaction.

The \$10.7 million is being borrowed at a 3.3 percent fixed rate over 15 years with the city paying \$915,445 annually until the term is up in 2033. The total interest paid by the city on the loan is expected to be around \$3,179,322.

"We are accelerating projects that would've taken us well in excess of 10 years to even begin to work on, and hopefully they'll be completed over the next three to five years," said Timberlake. "It will make a huge difference to the reliability of our electric service."

Following the resolution, there were no additional action items, but the council heard a presentation from North Florida Transportation Planning Organization representative Wanda Forrest concerning im-

portant transportation improvements coming to Green Cove.

Forrest talked about four major areas where road resurfacing and sidewalk improvements will be completed, including the First Coast Expressway bridge across the St. Johns River just south of Green Cove Springs that will take place sometime in 2022-2023, and a resurfacing project along U.S. Highway 17 from Black Creek going up to Water Oak Lane on Fleming Island, which is expected to start construction later this year or in early 2019. The last two areas of improvement are sidewalks that will go in along Governor's Creek Bridge and along N. Palmetto Avenue and Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard in the city.

"Where there are not sidewalks, there will be sidewalks on both sides," said Janis Fleet, city Development Services director.

Royal, who has been asking for improvements to the sidewalks along the Governor's Creek Bridge during previous years' TPO presentations, has finally got what he asked for.

"Thank you, particularly for that bridge – it's a safety issue," Royal said. "It will make it a lot easier for a lot of us to have connectivity."

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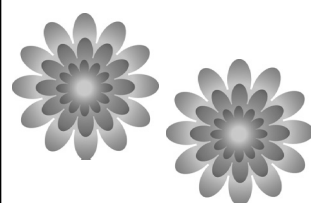
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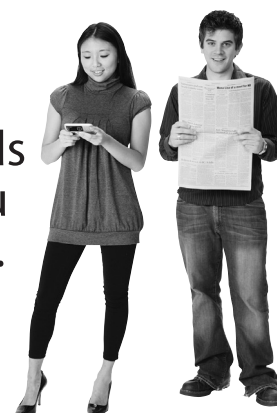
