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Sheriff talks crime in Middleburg

MIDDLEBURG – Monday's town hall meeting in Middleburg offered Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels and a few of his top-ranking deputies the chance to speak directly to the community.

The event – the second event of its type – began with Daniels saying how poor the

turnout was at a similar event in the Oakleaf community. About 35 residents joined more than a dozen CCSO deputies who took up much of the room inside the Middleburg Civic Association building.

Drugs and school resource officers became the top two topics of discussion for the event. Attendees appeared extremely concerned with the drug problem in the area, with some raising concerns over having personally observed drug deals in broad daylight. The sheriff and his staff assured attendees they are there and will continue to eradicate drugs from the area and Clay County.

"We're still going to be out there. I've seen people upset that we're stopping vehicles and we're doing things that are holding them up as they go places, and I apologize for that, but I'm not going to apologize for trying to stop the drug trade out there," said Chief Wayne McKinney. "[In the last two months] we did 472 traffic stops. One of the things I found interesting was the total vehicle searches we did was 126 and we made 98 drug arrests, that's a pretty

School Board signs SRO agreements

FLEMING ISLAND – All Clay County high schools and junior high schools are set to receive resource officers until the end of the 2019 school year.

During its regular June 7 meeting at Fleming Island High, the Clay County School Board voted to approve four different agreements that work together to ensure junior high and high schools receive the added security of a resource officer on campus during school hours. These agreements were created in collaboration with the Board of County Commissioners, the Clay County Sheriff's Office, the City of Green Cove Springs and the Town of Orange Park, and their respective police departments.

The first agreement signed was between

the board, the BCC and CCSO, and lasts from July 1 to September 30, 2018. This agreement acts to put a school resource officer in Bannerman Learning Center, Keystone Heights High, Clay High, Middleburg High, Fleming Island High, Ridgeview High, Orange Park High and Oakleaf High. It also stations an SRO in Wilkinson Junior High, Lakeside Junior High, Lake Asbury Junior High and Oakleaf Junior High.

This agreement, as well as the other three signed that night, come as a way to abide by the recently-passed, but significantly underfunded, Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act that requires each Florida school district to assign at least one SRO to every school using one of three given options: SROs, school guardians via the Guardian Program, or

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

Captain Jacob Brock and frontier East Florida made a perfect match

acob Brock was born in Vermont, at his father's farm on the Connecticut River; he was destined to remain a river rat the rest of his life. Brock worked and trained as a mechanical engineer, married and fathered four children in Hartford, Connecticut.

By the late 1840s, he and his four children were in Charleston, S.C. In 1849, he commissioned the construction of his first ship, The Darlington. She was a beauty. With competition in Charleston heating up after almost three years, Brock moved south to the St Johns River. In the fall of 1853, Brock and his steam-powered sidewheeler, Darlington, began year-round scheduled service on the river from Jacksonville to Enterprise, 205 miles south on the river from Jacksonville, at Lake Monroe. This decision would be the key to his success, d seasonal commercial service. settlers now had a dependable method of shipping goods to market and reliable transportation for passengers and sup-

The area was still in a fragile and budding era of civilization with periodic Indian attacks. Duval County, which still included Clay County in 1850, counted just a little over a thousand souls. Settlers were isolated and having consistent contact with

the outside world in the form of Brock and the Darlington became a hugely comforting part of the equation. Locals fondly referred to the ship and her captain as the Old Reli-

Brock lived big, he risked big and he reveled in hard work, enjoying life and the people along the river. Middleburg was his first base of operations and a logical choice because the area was teeming with activity and provided a continual supply of cargo.

The shrewd Captain Brock noticed increasing numbers of Northern and European tourists eager for a sportsman's experience and constructed the Brock House in Enterprise. Men hunted and fished all day, then gathered with good brandy and strong cigars to laugh, spit and tell tales.

In 1860, Brock added the newly constructed, Hattie Brock, to his already expanding fleet. Named for his daughter. the side wheeler Hattie was equipped with powerful engines and posh accommodations for 75 to 100 passengers.

The rumblings of secession were already gathering on the horizon and Jacob Brock enthusiastically volunteered his ships and himself to the service of the Confederacy. Basically, Brock like most successful frontier pioneers, simply didn't like to be told what to do by anyone - govern-

ments included.

In early 1862, a Union fleet attacked Fernandina and Brock raced to rescue fleeing Confederate sympathizers. Captain Brock and his passengers were captured. The Darlington escaped and was hidden by a loyal crew. Brock remained in prison in Boston for most of the war.

Not until the spring of 1864 was the Hattie found concealed in a remote tributary south of Palatka. A small crew was boarded to take possession and progressed to Enterprise to refuel. There, they suffered a severe and colorful tongue lashing from the porch of Brock House by none other than the boat's namesake, young Hattie Brock. Granted, she was raised as a Southern belle but after all her father was

Brock regained his ships after the war and picked up the pieces of his freewheeling, rollicking life. The Brock House in Enterprise became a particular favorite of Northern politicians and former military men. The Captain was never one to allow political differences to interfere with a good time and hosted with equal success Rockefellers, Goulds, Beechers, Pres. Ulysses Grant and Gen. William Sherman.

But times were changing and it took more than a fearless willingness to risk and good stories to succeed on the river. Florida tourist trade was becoming a gold mine and competition from the big boys was fierce. Jacob Brock amassed a fortune but was outmatched by immense bankrolls of the Baya and DeBary steamship giants.

Brock died at his shipyard in Jacksonville in May of 1877.

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Youth Connection sees first success stories

ORANGE PARK – Six months ago, obtaining a high school diploma seemed nothing less than a herculean task for two Clay County students.

The possibility was always there but it was more pipe dream than anything else. Now, though, Tavian Raggins, 19, and Milena Carter, 18, are not only high school graduates, but looking at a future that's wide-open, bright and finally, within their

Raggins' and Carters' success stories are the first to emerge from a new organization formed last fall called the Clay Youth Connection.

In its infant stages, Clay Youth Connection worked to address housing challenges its members new existed within the community. They heard stories of students on the verge of dropping out of high school due to instability in their housing.

Clay Youth Connection worked with the Clay County School District to identify students who were temporarily displaced and give them a place to live, so that a lack of sleep on a proper bed, or a void of breakfast, will no longer be a hurdle they face in their high school education.

While the Moosehaven retirement community stepped up to become the home of

the Clay Youth Connection, the program became the sole mission of Orange Park Town Council Member Connie Thomas.

"We had a lot of people concerned about a lady always on the side of a road in town and it turned out that she was homeless," Thomas said. "That's when I decided to learn more about the homeless in Orange Park.'

After looking into the homeless problem, Thomas discovered a dark truth hidden within the town: homelessness doesn't affect just adults; it affects children too, and many of those children, despite their situation, still attempt to make it through school. Thomas brought this to the attention of Moosehaven's Executive Director, John Capes, and everything fell into place.

Before Clay Youth Connection, Raggins was living with his mom, dad, four brothers and his sister. Not only did Raggins struggle to find a private and personal space within the house he called home, he was void of basic necessities that a student needs to

be successful in school: a backpack, pens and pencils, paper and more.

"School was, and is, very important to me but I was struggling," Raggins said. "I couldn't focus at home and that affected my work in school."

Before Clay Youth Connection, Raggins was, in his words, "just barely making it." He knew he needed a change of scenery and a place to focus, but his family wasn't growing smaller anytime soon and his parents weren't buying a new house. One day, though, Raggins heard about the Clay Youth Connection while attending class at Orange Park High and how it could help

"When I heard about it, it sounded like something for me," Raggins said. "I looked into it and knew I needed this."

Raggins, determined to make something better of his education, explained to his parents what the program was and they begrudgingly agreed – they were not excited about saying goodbye to their son for half a year.

"I mean, they hated it when I first told them," Raggins said. "Once they saw how I changed, and how beneficial it was to me, their feelings changed."

Not only did his parents' feelings change, Raggins himself became a new

Fight over judicial vacancy ratchets up

state appeals court Tuesday morning quickly stepped into a legal battle about whether a Northeast Florida judge should be elected or appointed by Gov. Rick Scott and cleared the way for an appointment process to at least temporarily continue.

The 1st District Court of Appeal issued an order after a flurry of activity that included Scott administration attorneys fil-

ing a request late Monday to block a ruling earlier in the day by Leon County Circuit Judge Charles Dodson.

the power to fill certain judicial seats – or whether the seats should be filled through elections.

Trotti contends that an upcoming vacancy created by the retirement of 4th Judicial Circuit Judge Robert Foster should be filled in the November election, while Scott's lawyers say the position should be filled through appointment.

Foster was expected to leave office Jan. 7, 2019, which would be the end of his term, because of a mandatory retirement age. But on April 2, Foster sent a letter to Scott making the retirement effective Dec. 31, four business days ahead of schedule.

The Scott administration takes the position that the governor's acceptance of a judicial resignation before the start of an election-qualifying period creates a vacancy that will be filled by appointment, rather than election. The 4th Judicial Circuit is made up of Duval, Clay and Nassau counties.

In the challenge filed by Trotti, Dodson ruled last week that the seat should be filled by election and issued an injunction against the Scott administration and a judicial nominating commission from moving forward with an appointment process. The state appealed Dodson's ruling last week, which placed an automatic stay on the decision.

But Monday, Dodson again ruled in favor of Trotti and vacated the automatic stay – and complained that the Scott administration had essentially ignored his earlier injunction. Dodson pointed to a May

Drama and power grabs

f you were looking for something entertaining to watch on television this week, you should have checked out Clay County's newest drama.

It's called "Power Grab: the story of a misinformed chairman."

The story began to unfold last fall

when the Board of County Commissioners appointed the Charter Review Commission. Under state law, because Clay County government operates under a charter-based form of government, the

county commission is required to empanel a Charter Review Commission every four years to review the county's governing documents.

According to CRC chair Amy Pope-Wells, this week's installment of the commission's drama began to unfold June 1 when she said she received "42 messages" from constituents who were concerned about a Clay County School District employee who was seen assisting a candidate file for office at the Clay County Supervisor of Elections office while, she believed, was on the school board clock at the time of the spotting. Ooh, looks and sounds like a spy drama, doesn't it?

However, to the outside, it looks like Cornfield County.

"When consulting with the CRC attorney. He advised that we collect all the information and share it with them, with the body[meaning the CRC members]," Pope-Wells told county commissioners Tuesday.

I would have loved to have been able to hear the county commission members' inside thoughts when Pope-Wells was speaking, especially since she was speaking about something that was absolutely none of her business or that of the CRC.

But, thank God for true leaders like Gayward Hendry. He was the only county commissioner who sought to gingerly tell Pope-Wells she was off base. Way off base, in fact.

"I don't see as there's anything to resolve," Hendry said.

Pope-Wells refused to understand what Hendry said.

Allow me to assist.

You were appointed to attend to matters involving the Clay County government and its charter. The Clay County School District does not fall under nor is governed by the county charter. Deductive reasoning — which we're supposed to be taught in about third grade if my memory suits me right — creeps in and tells us Pope-Wells did not clearly understand her duties.

Or, she perhaps is attempting to grab some freshly-tilled power of her own in hopes of running for public office herself one day. A lot of previous CRC members have done just that — Travis Cummings, Brian Campbell, Michael Kerekes, to name a few from recent

16 hearing in which he said the nominating process should "cease immediately."

"If the governor and secretary of state had any doubt about that, there should have been a motion for clarification or something of the like filed," Dodson wrote Monday. "Instead it was as if I had not ruled. The nominating process kept going. My order was not even a bump in the road."

But Scott administration attorneys filed a motion late Monday with the 1st District Court of Appeal requesting reinstatement of the stay on Dodson's earlier ruling. They said the Florida Constitution and earlier cases - including a case filed by Trotti in 2014 - make clear that Scott has the authority to appoint a replacement for Fos-

The appeals court Tuesday morning issued an order giving Trotti until Friday to respond to the Scott administration's motion. It also said the appointment process can at least temporarily move forward.

"The automatic stay ... shall remain in effect to permit the Fourth Circuit Judicial Nominating Commission to continue its interview and nomination process, pending a final ruling on the (Scott's administration's) motion for review by this court," the one-page order said.

Trotti, who lost the 2014 case, sought to qualify to run for Foster's seat but was

denied. Dodson's ruling last week said Trotti should be listed on the state Division of Elections website as qualifying to run for the judgeship. Dodson wrote that the "creation of an artificial appointment" had

But in the motion filed late Monday, Scott's attorneys said Dodson's order would put Trotti into office by "default." Qualifying for judicial races ended last month.

"Here, the undisputed facts establish that Judge Foster's resignation was tendered and accepted by the governor before the election process commenced at the beginning of the candidate qualifying period," the motion said.

"The governor is therefore constitutionally authorized and obligated to fill the vacancy by appointment, and the secretary of state is prohibited from qualifying candidates for a judicial seat that will not be filled by election. Because appellee's (Trotti's) arguments are contrary to the language of the Florida Constitution and well-established precedent, he cannot demonstrate a likelihood of success on the merits."

Her comments regarding the school district, at face value, looked like an attempt to cast shade on that body's integrity.

And for those constituents who messaged Pope-Wells. Please, take a Leadership Clay class so you can learn more about Clay County or something similar.


The CRC is scheduled to hold its final public hearing on June 13, after we go to press. In that hearing, commission members – if they all show up – have their last opportunity to hear from voters about two proposed charter amendment questions that will be on the ballot this fall. On average, about seven of the 15 appointees have not been attending meetings since the pay hike issue was brought up and quickly passed.

One ballot measure asks voters to modify the current term limit ordinance to allow county commissioners to serve three, four-year terms, whereas, currently the charter only allows two, four-year terms.

The other amendment asks voters to kill a 10-year-old citizen-initiated charter amendment that capped BCC member pay at \$37,500. This ballot measure gives BCC members pay hikes for the next four years.

Perhaps it's time for the county commission to address whether a CRC is an actual viable entity it needs to utilize in the future? If nothing else, please thoroughly educate these CRC members as to clearly what their roles are.

Regardless of what you do, please become informed.

BCC approves agreements, funding for SROs

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – After months of meetings and discussions, the Clay County Board of County Commissioners approved agreements with the Clay County School District to place school resource officers in every school.

The first item up for discussion was the board's duty to approve a resolution that would direct the Supervisor of Elections to place a 1 mill ad valorem tax on the August 23 ballot. The tax referendum was approved with a 3-2 vote by the school board now goes to the voters for a decision. The tax increase would result in an additional \$10 million for the school district that would provide \$5.6 million to be used to fully fund school resource officers in every school, and \$4.4 million that would go into the general fund to be used on things like school hardening as well as keeping

up with updates to curriculum. The money would not flow into local coffers until 2019.

There wasn't much discussion from the board as this vote is primarily a duty of the commissioners to more or less forward the ballot item from the school board to the Supervisor of Elections. However, Chairman Gavin Rollins took issue with this requirement prior to calling role on the vote.

"What happens if we don't vote for this?" said Rollins, who teaches ESE History at Oakleaf High School. "Why does it come to us if it's ministerial, if we have no choice in voting on it, then why does it even come to us?"

County Attorney Courtney Grimm answered with quotes from state statutes that order the school board to submit things like this to the BCC, and another that says the BCC is the only board with

SJR State to add advanced manufacturing program

PALATKA – St. Johns River State College will use a \$1.38 million grant to establish an advanced manufacturing training program at the school.

As part of the Governor's Florida Job Growth Grant program, the new degree program will train students to be part of the next generation of engineering technicians. The new programs will include an Associate in Science program as well as college credit certificate programs in mechatronics and robotics as well as non-degree training for production technicians.

According to the Florida Chamber Foundation "By The Numbers" report, "Manufacturing continues to be a leader in helping Florida diversify its economy and create new jobs. Florida's manufacturing has grown 3.4 percent over the last year. And in the last four years, Florida's manufacturing has continued to grow at a rate more than three times higher than the nation overall."

SJR State President Joe Pickens said he is grateful for the role the college gets to play in preparing students for new jobs in this field.

The Associate in Science in Engineering Technology will prepare students for employment in advanced manufacturing as process and production technicians, industrial machinery mechanics, quality assurance technicians, programmable logic control technicians and operators, and industrial engineering technicians. The core classes of the engineering technology program align with the national Manufacturing Skill Standards Council Production Technician Certification

The mechatronics certificate program is part of the Engineering Technology degree program and the Advanced Manufac-

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turing specialization designed to prepare students for positions in industrial engineering, maintenance and technology.

The mechatronics certificate program, part of the Engineering Technology degree program and the Advanced Manufacturing specialization, is designed to prepare students for employment in the areas of industrial engineering, maintenance and technology or provides supplemental training for persons previously or currently employed in these occupations. The content includes instruction in advanced manufacturing equipment maintenance techniques, operation of various industrial components, tools and instrumentation, quality and control testing, material handling protocols, robotics applications,

Hospital to launch \$2.9 million expansion

ORANGE PARK – Orange Park Medical Center will spend \$2.9 million to add 2,100 square foot to its Neonatal Intensive Care Unit

The expansion will add five new NICU beds to the already existing unit. The new beds are designed and equipped to address either level II or level III subspecialty newborn care, with ability to care for babies born at less than 32 weeks gestation and 1,000 grams as well as babies born with critical illness, at all gestational ages.

With the new expansion, Orange Park Medical Center's NICU will more than double the beds available for newborn babies. The hospital, which delivers over 2,000 babies each year treats around 500 of those babies in their NICU.

"There is a great need for more critical care neonatal beds in our community," said Kathy Hester, Orange Park Medical Center's Chief Nursing Officer. "As prematurity and neonatal abstinence syndrome rates continues to rise we are taking action to make sure we are prepared to help care for those in need."

Neonatal abstinence syndrome is defined as a group of problems that occur in a newborn who was exposed to addictive opiate drugs while in the mother's womb.

Included in the hospital's upcoming upgrades will be new technology that allows a bedside camera to shares live-streaming video through a secure and closed system. This new feature will provide 24/7 access to families allowing them to see their new baby when they are unable to be at the hospital. TMPartners is the architect and Commercial Construction Services is the contractor on the expansion project. Construction will begin this summer and is expected to be complete in early 2019.


The booking, including event venue, lodging, food, and beverage, came in at \$65,260. The Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman told us Thursday that the expenditure covered "costs associated with an upcoming fundraiser" for the committee, with "all proceeds [going] toward 2018 Senate races."

This will be a group sail, not a charter, Bradley added.

There is recent precedent for a Disney cruise fundraiser.

According to reporter in the Miami Herald, former House Speaker Steve Crisafulli organized a similar event in 2013. The buy-in then was a \$50,000 contribution to the Republican Party of Florida.

Disney and subsidiaries have donated over \$45,000 to Bradley's committee since its inception, illustrating a shared political vision. Contributions to Bradley's committee swelled after he was named the Senate budget chair in November. Working for Florida's Families pulled in back-to-back-to-back six-figure hauls heading into the 2018 Legislative Session, and since Bradley's District 5 seat isn't up this cycle, much of that cash is indeed likely to go toward boosting the re-election campaigns of his fellow Republican Senators.





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Free Summer Meals are back

Orange Park Junior High and Montclair Elementary are the program's newest editions

ORANGE PARK – Many students across Clay County are finding themselves back in school this summer, taking advantage of the school district's free summer meals program.

The long-running service allows children, 18 and under, to receive free hot meals at select schools. Adults accompanying the children can partake in a meal for just \$2. Food is available Monday through Friday with breakfast from 8-9 a.m. and lunch from Noon-1 p.m.

"Hunger doesn't stop when the school year ends, so it's important that we continue to serve meals to our community," said Susan Glover, director of Food and Nutrition Services for the Clay County School District.

One of those meal locations is at Orange Park Junior High where the cafeteria has been packed each day with children from the Bright Minds Camp and those walking from the surrounding neighborhoods. OPJH and Montclair Elementary are the newest free lunch sites in the county. To qualify, schools must have at least 50 percent of its student population receive free or reduced lunch and be in a geographic area of need.

This summer marks the end of the program at Middleburg Elementary due to low turnout from previous years. However, families in the Middleburg and Clay Hill

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

high percentage of the people we actually search that actually have dope in their car"

According to the Sheriff's Office, they are finding the drugs through more enhanced investigations at routine traffic stops. Patrol vehicles are stopping cars for moving violations, but will ask the driver first if they have anything illegal in their car, and then they will ask for permission to search the car. If permission is denied, the sheriff reminded the audience that they can legally say no to a search, and they will bring a police dog to do a quick sniff-sweep of the exterior of the vehicle. According to the sheriff, and the law, the entire stop should take no longer than the 30 minutes allowed for a typical traffic stop.

"If you ain't doing nothing wrong, you ain't got no problems," Chief Kenny Stivers said. "The dogs are trained to hit on dope scent – if you don't have dope in your car, but the guy who rode with you to Winn-Dixie was smoking dope, the dog is going to hit on your car. So understand, OK, take some responsibility. If you've got a pothead friend, don't let him ride in your car."

The sheriff then went on to talk about the amount of police work that is done on a daily basis that the department does not publicize, including the recent seizure of four kilograms of uncut fentanyl and \$55,000 cash, and the same person being caught with a trafficking amount of heroin on Fleming Island, according to the sheriff.

"There's a lot of things that go on that you have no idea about what's happening. There's men and women who work in an undercover capacity that put their lives in serious danger to keep you safe and you'll never ever hear about them," he said. "You'll never hear about the fruits of their labor because we don't publicize everything."

The drugs the sheriff discussed Monday were recovered as part of an active investigation alongside the State Attorney's office, according to Public Information Officer Chris Padgett, and no arrests have been made as the narcotics unit is still gathering evidence to ensure all parties involved are caught.

"Narcotics is a different realm because

they work [with undercover officers and confidential informants] on these types of cases," Padgett said. "Documentation doesn't always get submitted because it is very active intel."

As the drug arrests conversation died down, the sheriff was asked about what was going to happen regarding School Resource Officers in Clay County Schools. The sheriff took a firm position early on that he was not happy with the plan set in motion by the Clay County School District, and that going forward he expects deputies serving as school resource officers in each school.

"I'll say this, that is not the ideal scenario for Clay County – my opinion – but the school board has elected to fund school

resource officers being in the high schools and junior high schools and then they would like for guardians to be in the elementary schools," Daniels said. "It came down to money, not Sheriff's Office money, school board money. The law says that the school board owns the SRO program."

Daniels said that the guardian program wasn't something he had to agree to. Despite his distaste for the idea, though, he said he would support it temporarily.

"I don't have to participate in the guardian program, I can say, 'We're not gonna do a guardian program in Clay County,' now that puts it back on school board to fund up school resource officers for all the schools," he said. "Where are they going to get the money from in short fashion? They're not, so this is the prudent thing to do."

Daniels said at one point that maybe someone from the school board, or that Superintendent Addison Davis should have been invited so that they could have answered questions specifically related to their budget and decisions regarding the issue. Though not present Monday evening, Davis responded to some of the questions asked from the school's perspective.

"As Superintendent of Schools, I agree that funding should be placed on visibility and accessibility of law enforcement," Davis said. "In our school district it was an underfunded mandate. With that said, it's very clear that, to have school resource officers in every school would be \$5.6 million, which we do not have."

promoted to lieutenant colonel.

Brian spent several years as a contract pilot with the Department of Defense where he flew intelligence reconnaissance missions for Special Operations Command in Africa and Southern Italy.

After relocating from San Diego to Jacksonville with his wife and three children, Brian's goal of working with his father became real. Brian had earned a master of

business administration while on active duty and said that he wanted to put that degree to use rather than become a commercial pilot.

"The lifestyle of a commercial pilot didn't really work for me," said Brian.

After a few years of searching, Brian and Eric decided to open a Pet Supplies Plus store together. They're 50-50 partners in the business. Brian lives in Jacksonville and fills the owner and operator role while Eric still lives in Ohio and oversees a lot of the behind-the-scenes aspects

of the business.

"We're big pet lovers and animal lovers and we loved the business model that they had," said Brian.

The first location the Rolf's opened was in Atlantic Beach in the summer of 2016. After two years of success with that location, they expanded and opened the store in Orange Park.

One of the first things you notice upon walking into the store is how organized everything is. Not a single bag of food or toy is out of place.

"I inspect everything like a Marine Corps Officer," said Brian. "I want to make sure everything is as clean and organized as possible and I think our customers really appreciate that."

Another standout feature of the store is their self-service pet cleaning station. For \$10 per half-hour customers can bring their pets in and give them a bath right in the store. Everything they need is provided from soaps to towels and the store cleans up afterwards.

There is also a groomer on site who provides a variety of services. Orange Park groomer Brian Robinson has already gathered himself a repeat customer base, according to Brian Rolf.

The Rolf's have partnered with multiple local rescue organizations including Safe Animal Shelter, Clay Humane and The London Sanctuary. All three organi-

zations participated in the grand opening and customers were able to vote for their favorite organization. The winning organization received a \$1,000 gift card from the store while the other two received \$250 gift cards.

They also plan to hold adoption events at the store on weekends, according to Brian.

The store isn't just for the pet owners as animals are welcome too.

"As long as they're on a leash, we've had everything in here from dogs, cats, puppies, kittens, snakes, a couple weeks ago at the Atlantic Beach location we had a goat come in on a leash," said Brian. "We'll get rabbits and other small animals in harnesses, big birds on people's shoulders, you name it and it's come in."

When asked about any future expansion plans, Brian said that they'd like to expand eventually but it depends on the real estate and the areas that they feel need the concept.

"This isn't a concept that you move into a St. Johns Town Center or somewhere like that," said Brian. "This is one that you move into an area with an established neighborhood. Even on Blanding Boulevard we're surrounded by neighborhoods."

That thought plays into why the Rolf's like the Pet Supplies Plus model in the first place. They saw it as being very neighborhood-oriented and people-friendly.

person. At Moosehaven, he was given school supplies, food, a place to sleep, live and call his, constant guidance and a job.

While all of these amenities served to keep Raggins focused on the goal, and certainly allowed him to do so, it was his life coach that allowed Raggins to grow into the young man he is today.

"My life coach would come and just talk to me, and we'd talk for hours and hours," Raggins said. "I just needed someone to talk to, someone to give me guidance and advice, someone to be there for me and even though we only met once a week, she was that person for me."

After graduating, Raggins moved back home and is now waiting for the call of duty, which he's hoping comes next month.

"I'm joining the Army and I'm hoping to go in July," Raggins said.

For Raggins, the Army is the route he thinks best suits him and his goals in life.

"I want to be financially secure, continue my education which they'll pay for, get insurance and everything else," Raggins said. "I think it's the right step for me and I can't wait to get started."

None of this – a high school diploma, a job, a new outlook on life and the Army – would have been possible without Clay Youth Connection. According to Raggins, the program showed him just how successful someone can be, and how beneficial it is, to have stability in your life.

At an event held at First Baptist of Orange Park to celebrate Raggins and Carter's accomplishment, Raggins, in front of his many mentors and sponsors, said he's beyond happy to be in the position he's in right now.

"All of this is because of you, and the best is yet to come," Raggins said.

While Raggins struggled to focus on education before Clay Youth Connection, Carter struggled to find a supportive backbone from her loved ones, affecting not only her education, but every other aspect of her life as well.

Before joining the Clay Youth Connection and graduating from Ridgeview High, Carter's family life could best be summed up as abusive.

"Before all of this, I lived with a very abusive family, my family," Carter said, during celebration for her and Raggins. "I was very shy. I couldn't even look people in the eve."

Today, Carter is still a tad shy, but her gaze is claer when you're talking to her. She's now smiling and confident, not only in her abilities, but who she is.

"I'm a different person now," Carter said. "When I first got to Moosehaven, I immediately lost it."

"I couldn't stop crying because everyone was so nice to me," Carter said, fighting back tears. "I wasn't used to that. I was used to being surrounded by mean people."

Once she was free of abuse, and safe in the hands of Moosehaven and Clay Youth Connection, Carter said she broke from her shell

"Everything changed," Carter said. "School, work, my friends, my life – all of it. All of it changed."

Now that she's a high school graduate, something Carter admits seemed

far-fetched before Clay Youth Connection, she's heading to Virginia Beach to be a nanny for the summer to save money for another thing she never thought possible – college.

When Carter returns from Virginia Beach, she's going to pursue her passion for art as a graphic arts major at St. Johns River State College.

"I've been doing art since I've been able to hold a pencil in my hand, maybe even before that," Carter said with a chuckle.

While attending college, Carter plans to move back in with her family, but this time, she believes things will be better. In fact, according to her, things are already better.

"We're working on it and things are definitely getting better," Carter said. "The main problem was removed so now we're just working through the emotional state of our relationship."

"I think everything will be OK," Carter

Thomas said she is happier than she ever thought possible to see the program work the way every stakeholder imaged.

"I consider this one of the greatest blessings of being an elected official," Thomas said. "To be a small part in these children's live is a huge moment for me and I'm ready for the next round of [Clay Youth Connection]."

Next school year, Clay Youth Connection will still be the same as it was. This time, though, those involved have learned what works, what doesn't and what can be improved on. They're also planning to receive help, either via a partnership or simply as a support, from Touchstone, a youth crisis center functioning in Duval County.

"What we did this year was spectacular, and I'm so excited to have Touchstone join in on this," Thomas said. "I can't wait to see how Clay Youth Connection grows from here."

outside security forces. These options can be used in any combination as well. For the past four months, the Clay County School District and Board have worked to comply with the new act via multiple meetings and negotiations among elected officials.

The first agreement signed will come with a cost of \$245, 878 from the district's general fund, but during the meeting, Superintendent Addison Davis said that there is a chance the BCC covers this cost.

"Mrs. Kopelousos did call me today and she said that the BCC potentially would be willing – she'd have to have a conversation with them – to cover the \$245,000 if the school district was willing to have a three-year agreement resolution to use our gymnasiums in order to allow, whether it be PAL, or YMCA, to continue to engage with our school system and use, after hours, our gyms, in order to give places for kids to participate in the evening," Davis said.

While nothing is official, if the BCC were to follow through with this, Davis said the board would need to make an official motion to approve such a plan and

ensure that it is financially sound, as the board would still be responsible for providing supervisors to these areas after hours and paying for things like heating and air conditioning.

The second agreement signed during the meeting was essentially a continuation of the first agreement. This second one would see SROs maintain their occupation in the schools listed above from October 1, 2018, to September 30, 2019. Doing so will cost the school board \$1,923,669, and will come from the general fund. Both of these agreements not only place an SRO in the 12 listed schools, but also provide one lieutenant, two sergeants, one investigator, two relief SROs and one training deputy for additional services related to the SROs.

Despite these 12 schools receiving the boosted security, there are still a number of Clay County schools not covered in those two agreements. That's because the school board signed two more agreements that utilize the Green Cove Police Department and Orange Park Police Department in place of CCSO. To that end, the school board signed an agreement with the Town of Orange and its police department to use their already existing DARE officers

as SROs. These officers will continue to provide DARE educational assistance but now, they'll be acting as the SROs for their respective schools as well. These schools include Grove Park Elementary, Orange Park Elementary and Orange Park Junior High. In total, this agreement will cost the school board \$210,801 and last from July 1 to June 30, 2019.

The fourth and final agreement is virtually the same as the third, and is a collaboration between the school board, the City of Green Cove Springs and its police department. This agreement also lasts from July 1 to June 30, 2019, but it costs less with a total of \$143, 534. It places an SRO in Charles E. Bennett Elementary and Green Cove Springs Junior High.

Board members virtually had no discussion on the agreements, while Davis explained that the BCC might potentially cover the cost of the first agreement. Because each of these four agreements were met with a motion that passed 5-0, it would seem that the school board is in complete and total agreement.

How they're going to afford the new security plan is a question met with some dissension amongst the school board members

When it was time to vote, the board voted 3-2 to approve a ballot measure asking voters to approve a one-mill tax to fund the new security program, with the balance being used for operating expenses. Board members Mary Bolla, Janice Kerekes and Carol Studdard voted yes, while Betsy Condon and Ashley Gilhousen voted no.

"Shall an additional one (1) mill of School District ad valorem millage tax, beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2023, be approved to enhance the safety and security of students and staff, and provide for necessary operating expenses of the School District?" the ballot question reads. According to Condon, her constituents claim the ballot measure is too vague. She also stated that she feels the board has not yet scrubbed the budget enough in an effort to free up additional funds.

"I don't feel confident that we have scrubbed every single line item of our budget to look for additional ways that we can find funds differently, and think differently," Condon said.

These sentiments were echoed by Gilhousen, who also voted no. Despite Gildhousen and Condon's votes, this ballot question will be seen by voters who make their way to the polls come August.

communities are in close proximity to the Wilkinson Junior High location.

"Everybody likes a free meal, it's not that McDonald's food or that unhealthy stuff, It's good, healthy food, the same stuff we feed them at lunch," said Patricia Walsh, OPJH cafeteria manager. "They get up out of bed and come up here to get their breakfast and lunch, because mama was at work and they need something to eat besides cereal or that sugary stuff."

Since the program's launch, kids have been very receptive. Leona Fordham, 5, enjoyed the food so much, that she was unable to pick just one favorite meal. While her brother Toray, 8, was mostly excited to eat some ice cream. They were among the students who recently packed the OPJH cafeteria to receive a free hot meal.

"This is our third year doing it, it helps

out a lot with summer food costs, since we are low income" said Shelley Clessas, the Fordham siblings' babysitter. The fact that Clay County can do this and support this is great, because there are a lot of kids that go hungry, it's near and dear to my heart."

Additionally, the district is currently testing a food truck for use in the Clay County schools. By next summer, the truck will help further expand the free summer food service, replacing the Mobile Bus which operated in previous years. The district food truck is tentatively scheduled to hit the streets beginning Aug. 20.

The Summer Meal Program runs now through Aug. 2, during that time the district remains committed to making sure its children won't have to worry about going hungry this summer.

"Order, order, order; that is my pet peeve, I want the last child to have the same thing as the first child," said Glover. "As far as running out food, it should not happen."

Juveniles arrested for string of vehicle break-ins

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Two juveniles face charges of burglary following an investigation by the Clay County Sheriff's Office.

On June 12, CCSO received multiple calls about several vehicles being burglarized in the Chief Ridaught subdivision on County Road 220. Mother leaves toddler in car for hours

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A St. Augustine woman who went on a drinking binge at a Clay County bar faces child neglect

charges after leaving her toddler child in her car unattended while she imbibed.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office booked Stephanie Lynn Ward, 35, a resident of Hardwood Trail in St. Augustine, in the Clay County Jail on June 7 after she was arrested in St. Johns County and transported to Clay County

According to the police report, Ward had been seen drinking at Saloon 17 just north of Green Cove Springs on U.S. Highway 17 where a bartender claimed to have served the woman drinks from about 4:30

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p.m. until 9 that evening. When Ward went to leave she was heavily intoxicated, according to the report, and came back into the bar to get help jump starting her car.

Upon helping Ward, the bartender and others inside the bar saw a child in the backseat of the vehicle sitting in a child's car seat. Witnesses said the child was sweating and crying. The bartender went inside to call 911 but Ward had left by the time she had placed the call. She was later arrested in the Nocatee community in St. Johns County.

Ward faces a felony for child neglect and was released from Clay County Jail on \$25,000 bond.

Sowing seeds of learning

MANGO, Fla. – Members of the Clay County Leaftastic 4-H Horticulture Club captured second place in a statewide judging competition held here last weekend.

Christopher Mize, 11, of Orange Park, Makayla Rathjen, 11, of Keystone Heights, and Taylor Thigpen, 11, of Green Cove Springs, were there silently peering over a room filled with plants, cuttings, produce and flowers on June 9. There, they went up against the expertise and training of 4H youth from all around the state whose skills were put to the test. Time spent working to learn about plants with their club, in their own gardens, and using Florida 4H and Master Gardener resourc-

es was now put to the test. As the minutes ticked by, the only sound in the room was pencils scratching as they worked to identify the 100 plant samples and judge eight different offerings of vegetables, fruits and horticultural plants.

Along with learning and competition opportunities like these, 4H also teaches youth sound leadership and organizational skills. They complete record books throughout the school year that document what they've learned about specific topics they choose for the year, and demonstrate their knowledge through public speaking. They stand up in the community as civic-minded individuals who perform community service. They present publicly to adult groups, fundraise to meet their

the power to request such things from the Supervisor of Elections.

"The Board of County Commissioners is the only one within the county that can then request the Supervisor of Elections to open the books," Grimm said. "The school board can't do that without going to you."

Rollins continued his criticism of the obligation to vote in favor of the resolution as he called for the vote and the other four members gave their verbal approval, with the chair waiting until all four yes votes came in to make a statement and vote no.

"The legislature needs to fix that because that's crazy. It takes away the whole point of voting, because what is voting if you have to vote?" he said. "I'll go on record and vote against it even though I'm technically not allowed to supposedly, just to see what happens, I don't know if they'd come lock me up or what, but 4-1 on that, I guess."

Commissioner Mike Cella took an opportunity to state his agreement with Rollins on the frivolous nature of the requirement, but that he felt like it's just something they have to do as part of the job.

"I agree with you that it is ministerial in our duties to be able to do that. I don't technically agree with the language, but we don't get to decide that," Cella said. "The voter will ultimately get to decide what they want to do with that when this shows up on the ballot, so we're just moving that along and they'll be able to make that decision."

The next topic for discussion came in the form of two agreements between the BCC, the school district and the sheriff's office regarding the funding of school resource officers first for the time between July 1, 2018 and September 30, 2018, and another agreement for the time period between October 1, 2018 and September 30, 2019.

The agreements outline who pays what going forward with the three-party cooperation for meeting the state requirement for school resource officers. In the first agreement that ends on Sept. 30 this year, however, the current agreement has the school board paying \$245,000 for the additional officers. Talks with representatives from the district might result in a different agreement being made with the school board to allow the county to use school facilities in return for their payment of that \$245,000 plus about \$43,000 capital expenses, altogether totaling about \$289,000.

Rollins and commissioner Diane Hutchings – who also chairs the board of the charter school St. Johns Classical Acad-

emy – took issue with the agreement, with Hutchings saying they already pay the school district money and should already be able to use the facilities.

"My point is, and I'm going back to how you all reacted when we wanted to use the Thrasher Horne and we give them money, so that's why this is putting kind of a question in my mind," she said, referring to a bill they considered too expensive from the Thrasher Horne Conference Center rental for the county's recent veteran appreciation event.

Rollins agreed, citing a recent event he was involved in that was planned at Clay Hill Elementary that had to be moved.

"At the last minute they shifted and said, 'Sorry, you can't use the elementary school,' and it wasn't a conflict of scheduling, so I'm not sure where the conflict was," Rollins said. "I would say, generally, that it would be helpful if the relationship with the school district wasn't just when they needed money, it was continued on in terms of other facilities and that type of thing."

Following these comments, Cella came forward with some additional information about the use of facilities, which has been an arrangement he's tried to organize since being elected to the board.

"Programs that are organized and supervised, those are things we can't do as

a community because we don't have an indoor recreation facility," he said. "So we turn to schools, which should be the community center for our different neighborhoods, and I'm sure we can work it out."

According to Cella his hometown hosts events for kids at the various schools and helps build a sense of community, and with this agreement on the table he thought this would finally be the time to make things happen.

"My feeling was that we have something they are in need of at this point in time so this would be a good opportunity to tie those two together. I talked to the County Manager about maybe a three-year deal and the superintendent was amenable, at least from what I saw at the last meeting, that he would, under the first three years, take that cost on in terms of maintenance," Cella said. "Kids in this community have been waiting long enough for a program that they can take advantage of. Move them off the couch and out from in front of computer screens and phones and let them run around a little bit."

Once the board had heard these terms, they agreed to vote the agreements through unanimously with the expectation that the school board would allow the county to use their facilities for three years in exchange for the county's payment of that \$289,000.

Sheriff

Davis said he has a shared goal with Daniels to put school resource officers in every school across the county.

"I aspire to put SROs in all of the schools, but right now we don't have the [financial]resources to do that," Davis said. "We're doing what we can while still focusing on teaching and learning. We can't remove instruction and curriculum and continue to provide accelerated opportunities for our students to compete not just locally but nationally.

Daniels cited the July 1 deadline for the school district to submit a list of applicants' names to the sheriff who will then move into the 144 hours of training required by the state for those chosen as guardians.

"There are people who, a little over 30 people, have applied to fill the roles as guardians. It's kinda odd because the people have to already be employees of the school district to even be considered for guardians," Daniels said. "The spirit of the way that the law is written was so that a current school employee who has a concealed weapons permit, who wants to be in this program, would be in the program. But the district went a different route, or is going a different route, and they're hiring from the outside and gonna make these people employees."

Daniels said he's not concerned with whether or not they're current employees as long as they pass a background check, psychological examination and other requirements involved in the 3.5-week training course. Daniels said that every time he gets the opportunity he asks Davis for the list of names, seemingly concerned with the amount of time it would take to train the guardians, but that he should be fine as long as he has the list by the July 1 dead-

Davis said the district is treating the process with great importance, and they have had almost double the number of applicants that Daniels cited who are already undergoing interviews with a panel of experts who Davis pulled to help with the hiring.

"We have had over 65 apply, and we have been vetting internally this week,"

Davis said. "Included on the panel is a deputy from the sheriff's office to make sure we are selecting the right individuals."

Davis continued about the district's joy in the amount of interest they have received for the positions, and that he is working to get the candidates' information to the sheriff as soon as possible to get training underway.

"We are excited about the pull with 65 candidates, we'll be able to narrow that down to 30 candidates and probably send more than 30 to the training." Davis said. "We are excited that the Sheriff is willing to work with us to fulfill that need while we seek additional funding that would place SROs in every school. We'll have the list to him this week so they have it in hand a few weeks early."








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


FSU's Rhett Aplin drafted by Kansas City Royals

Nadler returns to smash Pies' 5K field

JACKSONVILLE – Keystone Heights High grad Enoch Nadler has the 2020 U.S. Olympic Trials Marathon in Atlanta on his back bumper, but, on the way, the fleet-footed road racer made a stop in downtown Jacksonville Saturday night for a "speed" test.

"Five seconds faster than last year, I'll take it," said Nadler, 32, who now heads up the Florida Track Club elite racing team in Gainesville. "This is the last race of the spring. I had my two fastest track 5Ks beating my college times, my fastest 1500 meters and now this, my favorite race of the year."

Nadler not only revved his engine in defense of his title from last, but blasted the field with a five second improvement of last year's time.

"I credit a lot of the speed these past two years with training with fast people," said Nadler, a standout runner for the University of Florida after leaving Keystone Heights. "Our elite club improves each day and gives me a core group of fast runners to train with and that's key. It's very tough to train hard by yourself and my team keeps me sharp."

From the starting cannon's smoke-filled

blast, Nadler exploded off the start line to put the chase on the women's field who had started two minutes earlier and had a \$100 Equalizer bonus attached to the endeavor. With the Equalizer bonus as part of the equation, the first runner across the line; male or female, would capture the extra prize money.

"It definitely is a worthy chase," said Nadler. "I was coming here to test myself and go fast, but the extra cash on the line makes it more exciting."

Nadler would not take long to catch early womens race leader Ani Veltcheva, a 14 year old phenom and a two time Florida middle school state cross country champ out of Gainesville's Abraham Lincoln Middle School, who tested Nadler's resolve in the first two laps with her own seemingly-suicidal pace that put the stellar women's field on notice

With racers taking a figure eight course from the Landing around the CSX building and in front of the Florida Times Union Center, Veltcheva kept her substantial lead on the women for two laps while Nadler hunted her down by ping-ponging around the women's field on the first of the four laps

By lap three, Nadler had taken control

of both fields and pushed his 4:40 per mile pace to the finish line for a 14:32 time with Tyler Stahl, 21, a very distant second at 15:28. R.J. Dorazil, 39, took third in 16:05. One other area athlete, Oakleaf High junior Dylan Nelson, 16, finished seventh in 17:00

For Veltcheva, the pass by Nadler on lap three put a damper on her courageous start with veterans Crystal Davis and Claudia Jalon, both 24, giving chase with Jacksonville's Julie Stackhouse still in the three-racer mix.

On the final lap, Davis, a frequent racer in Orange Park, tapped on the accelerator just enough in the final 600 yard stretch in front of the Time Union Center to hold off Jalon for the top prize in 17:48. Jalon finished second in 17:52 with Veltcheva hav-

ing enough reserve to edge Stackhouse for third with both clocked in at 18:11.

In the ensuing open Run for the Pies 5K, Steven Cartwright, 14, of Jacksonville, held of a 1200 runner field to edge Brad Smith, 48, of Ponte Vedra Beach, with a winning 17:30 split by four seconds. Top area male finisher was Josue Velazquez, 27, of Orange Park, in 16th at 18:42.

of the year with last year's winner, Kelsey Sweatt, now at University of South Carolina-Upstate.

"I feel like the pitcher and catcher should be the top two players to lead the team's defense," said Davis. "There was a lot of pressure though, but Angela (catcher Angela Agurkis) was so important. A catcher is so important to a pitcher. She sees things with my mechanics and keeps me straight."

"The batter had two strikes on her and I threw her a really nasty curve ball that should have been a curve," said Davis. "She should have been out and we should have been at bat. Heights (5A), Clay (6A) and Oakleaf (8A), the abundance of talent spread around the county was quite possibly the best in the history of the county. Clay and Keystone Heights both lost in their semifinals while Oakleaf lost in the 8A championship game.

Behind Davis, the Oakleaf defense and two members of the Clay Today All County first team included third baseman Baylee Goddard and second baseman Rebecca Koskey, both returners to the first team roster. Koskey, a senior, proved her value to the Oakleaf not only with her team-leading 35 runs batted in and four homers off a .449 batting average, but by transitioning from her right field slot to becoming one of the best second baseman in Florida as coach Christina Thompson looked to replace a stellar graduating class of 2017.

"I know I have a good defense behind me," said Davis. "We lost some really good players, but this year's squad came together and made the defense just as good. Baylee is probably the hardest batter for me to get out because she is so strong. It's good for me because I face her and Rebecca and Angela many times during practice and I think it helps me when I face other teams knowing I've already faced some of the best batters around."

Goddard, a junior, was her usual intensely steady defender of the hot corner while her power at bat was evident with a walkoff homer to keep the Knights in the championship hunt at the prestigious Kissimmee Klassic and a third base appearance in the final inning of the state championship game that ended with a groundout







with two outs. Goddard's batting average was a tad lower than 2017 mainly because opposing coaches were well aware of her batting power. Oakleaf's 1-4 batting lineup; Katie Kistler, Koskey, Goddard and Angela Agurkis formed one of the more formidable set of bats in the country.

Finishing off the infield are shortstop Molly Crawford, a Keystone Heights senior speedster, and first baseman Sydney Lewis of Clay. Crawford was built for speed and created a sense of hurry in opposing defenses with her raw speed to first base on would-be routine ground balls. Crawford had 42 runs batted in with three homers and 17 stolen bases.

Lewis, with 21 runs batted in to lead the Blue Devils, was masterful as a baserunner mover with her bunting prowess (13 successful sacrifice bunts) for coach and dad Matt Lewis, plus her field leadership at first base; six errors in 57 touches with two double plays.

"Sydney's best game was a three RBI day against Trinity Christian (4A runnerups) that had her nail a squeeze bunt for the third run and the win," said Matt Lewis. "She was solid at first base with just six errors in 387 opportunities."

Behind the plate, Oakleaf catcher Angela Agurkis, with a strong .436 batting average with three homers, added to her mystique as a top powerhitter in Florida with some well-place scoring bunts as coach Christina Thompson employed a handful of suicide squeeze bunts for game-winning

opportunities. Agurkis, one of the more vocal defensive leaders for the Knights, also had 27 RBIs

In the outfield, left field belongs to Oakleaf speedster Destiny Pacetti with Keystone Heights' senior Ashleigh Jennings manning centerfield and Clay freshman Paolo Jorge-Silva showing some prowess from the right field grass not only with her bat but also with her cannon arm. Jorge-Silva, with her .328 batting average and a late flurry of hits in the post season, will be a key player for Clay in 2019. Jorge-Silva had just two errors in 23 touches for an 87 percent fielding percentage.

"Paolo was our newcomer of the year with her first start in the 10th game," said Lewis. "Her two run single against West Florida (region final win 5-1) put that game out of reach. She was in top three of many offensive categories for us."

The Clay Today First Team pitcher is Clay High's Morgan Crutcher, just a sophomore, who time and time throughout the Lady Blue Devils' playoff run to the Final Four was the catalyst for Clay's defense. Crutcher struck out 146 batters with her 14 wins and a 1.315 earned runs average.

"Morgan had a nine inning playoff win, 2-1, over Ridgeview in the region semifinal and a 2-1 win in regular season play as two huges games for us plus the win over West Florida," said Lewis. "In 14 games she did not give up an earned run, but 17 unearned runs were scored. She also had eight shutouts."




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

At the 43 minute mark, local favorite and Clay High alum Liz Fogarty, now at Mississippi State, found herself one-onone with the goalie, trying to tame a wild pass. The ball came in right where Fogarty couldn't comfortably head the ball, so she

elected to attempt a kick.

"I was nervous to head it over the goalie" said Fogarty. "It bounced over and the goalie missed it. Me being so tall, I was thinking I'm about the rocket that thing over the goal, so I was just going to hit it with my leg. But the ball was too far in the air, it hit the ground, took a weird bounce and my Karate kick didn't work, then the Goalie wrapped around me and got a poke at it."

Within minutes, the field was awash in a deluge that quickly formed huge puddles. With the lightening continuing, both coaches finally agreed to call the game in the name of player safety.




