

Muller case lands in federal court

JACKSONVILLE – The case of Trumaine Devone Muller, 33, of Jacksonville, earned national attention in May 2017 when Sheriff Darryl Daniels announced the reputed drug dealer would face first-degree murder charges for selling fentanyl-laced heroin that led to the death of an Orange Park college student.

Now. а vear later. without little Muller's fanfare. case is weaving its way through the courts, but not on the state level where it all began. With his case being passed on to United State District Court,

a federal grand jury indicted Muller on four felony charges in the November 10, 2016 death of 18-year-old Ariel Jade Brundige who died of a drug overdose in an apartment in the 1400 block of Berrier Street in Orange Park.

Muller faces 20 years in prison for intentionally selling the fatal drugs to Brundige the prior day, but after further investigation, Muller now faces three new charges of selling other drugs on other dates. Count two of the indictment cites a case in which Muller allegedly "knowingly and intentionally" sold a mixture of heroin that included a detectable amount of furanyfentanyl, a schedule I drug under U.S. law. This sale allegedly took place on January 31, 2017, however, the federal indictment filed this year on May 10 does not give details about where the drug sale took place. Count three of the indictment cites an


Hoover appeals removal from ballot

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A candidate for Clay County Court Judge is appealing a lower court judge's ruling that would prevent her from running against Clay County Judge Kristina Mobley, in what will be Mobley's first time having an opponent after being appointed by Gov. Rick Scott on July 23, 2015.

Mobley's opponent, Lucy Ann Hoover of Middleburg, filed an appeal against Seventh Judicial Circuit Judge Howard Maltz's June 21 ruling that said she was not eligible to run against Mobley. Maltz

5-0 No Toxic Solite land to remain undeveloped

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Tuesday's meeting of the Board of County Commissioners filled almost every seat in the room, all for one agenda item.

About 32 Clay County residents used their three-minute time limit to voice opposition to a proposed land use amendment to grant an inactive shell corporation, Stoneridge Farms, the ability to sell off part of a parcel of land near County Road 209 to a developer. The site that would be developed was cleared by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection after the site's former owner,

The sweet taste of Independence Day, 1900s-style

n the early decades of the 1900s, the Fourth of July was a big deal in Clay County.

Feelings of patriotism loomed large but it was also the perfect time for a break.

The date falls in the middle of the hot Florida summer. It was an event to look forward to through the monotonous, first half of the summer and remembered with fondness through the dog days of July and August.

By today's standards, the celebrations were not spectacular. Events of varying size were planned in all parts of the county to recognize the founding of the nation. Green Cove Springs, as the county seat and the most populated area, gathered the largest crowds and organized the biggest show.

As the date approached, merchants and town residents unpacked the holiday paraphernalia of assorted ribbons and bunting and American flags. Gradually, the town took on the theme of red, white and blue.

Churches and social clubs planned their displays, mostly game booths for children with prizes for all and special foods for judging and sale. Despite the heat, wood stoves in kitchens all over town stayed fired up for days in preparations despite the heat. For rural women isolated at farmsteads on lonely dirt trails miles from neighbors with never ending chores that needed redoing almost before they were done the mid-summer break was a gift sent from God.

The streets of Green Cove Springs bustled even though most of the tourists and hotel staffs had packed up and headed North in April. Streets were crammed with wagons, horses and in the later decades backfiring automobiles. A circus could not have provided more excitement.

After some rural families shared a picnic lunch under the trees, the older children scattered and the men migrated toward the bandstand and parking area to lean against something, confer about politics and make deals. The women settled toddlers and babes on quilts to nap and commenced to revel in the real purpose of the day – simple conversation

But, as peaceful and innocent as this scene may seem, there was always a ten-

sion in the air. In this time at the turn of the century, law enforcement was a fragile thing. Men were accustomed to looking out for their own. As Sheriff Weeks said when he and Arch Murrhee separated in the woods north of Green Cove Springs to capture a gang of bank robbers it was "every man for hisself."

As harmless as the participants might appear, every man was more than likely armed with a pistol; some of the women too. A few who would later be returning home on lonely dark roads kept rifles or shotguns near to hand. The roads held danger from ambush by escaped turpentine camp convicts and assorted homegrown troublemakers.

In the afternoon, a fiddler would take the stage with rousing selections and assorted toe-tapper songs. As shadows deepened, families packed up and began to drift off home.

For one little girl in Orange Park, this was the best part – sucking a sugar soaked lemon half when the lemonade barrels were cleaned out at the very end.

alleged Muller drug sale that took place on February 8, 2017 in which the drug mixture was made up of heroin and cocaine.

Count four is a charge of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon dating to an offense that occurred on February 8, 2017. According to the indictment, Muller was in possession of a Smith & Wesson .38-caliber special plus P revolver on that date.

The indictment also cites prior felony convictions in state courts dating back to July 28, 2005, when Muller was convicted of grand theft. In 2006, he was convicted for possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and in 2007, 2008 and 2011, he was convicted of possession of cocaine and the sale of cocaine. He also has convictions for evidence tampering and introducing contraband into a county detention facility.

On May 23, U.S. Magistrate Judge Patricia Barksdale held an arraignment for Muller – who is also known by the nicknames Jolly and Lucky – in a federal courtroom in Jacksonville. Muller pleaded

not guilty to all four counts in the May 10 indictment. He is currently in federal custody while he awaits a status conference set for Aug. 20 in Jacksonville before Judge Marcia Morales Howard. He could go on to a

jury trial as early as Ariel Bundige Sept. 4.

In the original Muller case, a Clay

County grand jury indicted Muller along with Brundige's boyfriend, Tyler William Hamilton, 26, and friend Christopher Allen Williams, 32, for manslaughter related to her death. Both were with the victim when she purchased the narcotics and when she died. The incident occurred at Williams' residence in the 1400 block of Berrier Street. Hamilton and Brundige also worked together at the Cracker Barrel restaurant in Orange Park.

During a highly-dramatized press conference held in May 2017, Daniels sent out a warning signal for those who sell drugs in Clay County.

"For someone who would sell heroin or bring in fentanyl, and thinks that it's OK to bring these products into Clay County, I have more disdain for them than I have the regular criminal," Daniels said. "We've talked about dragging people from the gates of hell in the past, so we don't have to do that, just get the hell out of Clay County."

While she was not present at Daniels' press conference, State Attorney Melissa Nelson issued a statement supporting the indictment.

"The opioid crisis is a very real and steadily growing issue that threatens the safety and well-being of our community," said State Attorney Melissa Nelson in a prepared statement.

Shortly after the news of the indictment hit the internet, the Libertarian Reason Foundation jumped on the case.

"The sheriff's office says this is the first time it's ever charged someone with murder for a drug overdose. One slight problem: It's not entirely clear under what legal authority they've brought this charge," writes Scott Shackford, the associate editor at Reason.com.

Pipe and drum corps updates name, reaches next generation

FLEMING ISLAND – Bagpipes and drums aren't what most people think of when they hear the word 'band.' People typically think of a guitar, drums and a singer or two, but certainly not bagpipes.

Formerly known as Clay County Pipes and Drums Corps., First Coast Highlanders bagpipe and drum band performs at various events year-round but also teaches the willing how to play the bagpipes.

Art Tenney, 71, of Starke, started the band in 2009 because he wanted to play his bagpipes without having to be in a competition band. He has been playing bagpipes for 49 years and was the Clay County Sherriff's Office bagpiper before starting the band.

The band is made up of seven students, seven pipers and five drummers with a total of 19 members. Members range in

age from 9 years to 74 years old. Tenney believes no one is too young or too old to learn the bagpipes.

"We'll teach anyone, it doesn't matter how old they are," Tenney said. "We'll teach somebody at 8-years-old if we think they can do it, or if they're 108-years-old and they want to, we'll teach them. There's no limits.'

Brothers Blake, 12, and Tyler Buterbaugh, 9, of Middleburg, are both students in the band. Blake is learning how to play bagpipes and Tyler is learning how to play drums.

"Our mom heard about them and she called Art to find out how we can get involved and learn to play instruments," Tyler Buterbaugh said.

Brooklyn Harrell, 11, of Orange Park, has been learning the bagpipes for a yearand-a-half. She first saw Tennev play at St. Giles' Presbyterian Church near Orange

Park and decided she wanted to play as well

"I wanted to play because it's something I never heard before," Harrell said. "It's a lot of practice and work, and I mess up sometimes, but I just have to practice, practice, practice."


People interested in joining First Coast Highlanders don't have to be Scottish. however, many of its members have Scottish roots.

Gaps in schools, rural counties persist in diversion programs

and liberals agreeing that diversion is the best remedy for "common juvenile misbehavior."

Caruthers said these programs help public safety, improve outcomes and save taxpaver money.

One major move: "civil citations" are now rebranded as "pre-arrest diversion" programs. "This language is both more expansive and more accurate - unlike traditional citations, juveniles who receive civil citations must report to a program that includes a needs assessment and sanctions beyond a simple fine."

Circuit level diversion programs are required by the state starting July 1, with the first report due in October.

For advocates, this year's report took a look at best practices and how they translate into results. Many of the conference call speakers noted that this approach is one with self-evident benefits, and spotlighted the intersection of smart "restorative justice" policy and the interests of taxpayers and policy makers.

Demographically, there is equity among both gender and ethnicity in the use of diversion. Utilization across the board is 58 percent, with Latinos topping out at 65 percent, and whites at 57 percent. Diversion is more likely in incidents in schools (75 percent of the time) versus incidents in the community (52 percent).

Scott McCoy, senior policy counsel of the Southern Poverty Law Center, said that "we're doing better with the racial disparity problem," though there are still gaps in schools.



t happened again. Over the past two weeks, I've gotten a hard lesson on how important crime information is to our readers. This time, it started with the June 14 edition of Clay Today.

That week. we had what

seemed to be a record number of obituaries and death notices paired with what seemed to be a record shortage of pages.

Three pages of

obituaries and

death notices and accompanying photos telling of the passing of loved ones overshadowed our weekly list of arrests and bookings as we tried diligently to place them all inside 32 pages.

Yet when readers called in to ask why the arrests and bookings were missing, and I explained that they were bumped due to obituaries being inordinately lengthy, my explanation did not matter. I even explained how the info box on page 15, beside the two scant police briefs, was there to direct readers to our website, claytodayonline.com. We had collected and compiled arrests and bookings, we just didn't have room for them in the paper. We believed that posting arrests and bookings online in full would be enough. After two weeks of phone calls, I hear you loud and clear, Clay County.

For many callers, the online posting did not suffice.

"I don't go online," snapped one caller as I tried to explain our process.

If there is one thing I've realized since I've been in this position at Clay Today, our readers make it clear that they want to know who was arrested. where they were arrested and for what charges they were arrested.

However, with a tight 32-page paper, we had a quandary, which only led to a question. How do we balance the needs of all of our readers all of the time? The answer, which is everelusive, may not exist.

Now, of course, the June 14 edition of Clay Today is not the first time I've fielded a spate of phone calls from readers who want to know happened to a certain feature.

I'll never forget the man who, after battling traffic from his commuter job in Jacksonville, came in almost at closing time one day to ask how in the world could we have screwed up the Sudoku two weeks in a row. From what he said, his wife reads Clay Today "cover to cover" but his only guilty pleasure was the Sudoku once she finished reading all of the articles.

"It's the one thing I look forward to all week," he said.

The look on his face gave me a sincere understanding of his frustration. It's a feeling we've all shared.

In the last year, I've had to explain other changes in the paper. For example, CrimeWatch and Clay's Most Wanted were ceased due to internal changes with the Clay County Sheriff's

by past editions of this study, there has been a consistent disparity in the frequency at which students of color are arrested for eligible offenses at school."

Black students are still almost 2.5 times as likely as white students for school arrests, per the report. Leon County is the worst, with black students being 11.67 times more likely than white students for arrests.

The issues with racial equity in school usage of this policy was the worst news of this report, which by and large shows strides, with evidence-based progress.

The state's top three counties using pre-arrest diversion are Monroe at 97 percent, Miami-Dade at 95 percent and Pinellas at 93 percent.

Rural counties are laggards on this front, and there is room for improvement for next year's report.

"Nearly all the top-performing jurisdictions have a policy that presumes law enforcement officers should issue a prearrest diversion in all eligible instances. Arrests, with few exceptions, must be justified in writing by the law enforcement officer," the report reads.

Caruthers noted that in top-performing jurisdictions, civil citation is a "presumptive norm" and that law enforcement training is annualized for veterans and part of orientation for new hires.

Many jurisdictions have utilization rates of 90 percent or higher, Caruthers said.

Monroe County was singled out for routing youthful offenders into diversion programs within 24 hours of the offense.

And diversion is effective as a deterrent. According to the report, only 4 percent of juveniles in these programs reoffended over the next 12 months.

The biggest barrier to diversion are arrests for domestic violence.

The report lauds Duval and Hillsborough counties for strides made from previous years, with memoranda of understanding driving a policy change.

"Duval County adopted a new memo-



randum of understanding in May 2017 expanding its use of pre-arrest diversion by defining eligibility, addressing the process of citing an eligible youth, and strengthening its Teen Court program. This has led to an increase in utilization from 27 percent in 2016 to 59 percent in 2017. The county had an average 90 percent utilization in the first quarter of 2018, positioning it to be a top performer in 2018," the report states.

Duval had racial disparities in utilization that have abated, as of 2018, with increased usage, a priority of State Attorney Melissa Nelson that has become policy.

Michelle Morton, Juvenile Justice Policy coordinator of the ACLU, asserted the "increased advocacy ... changed the culture," turning around Duval's approach to these issues.

McCoy noted that "racial disparity" issues have been mitigated in Duval due to "increased utilization" of diversion programs.

Hillsborough County, meanwhile, "adopted a new memorandum of understanding in August 2017 expanding its use of pre-arrest diversion by expanding the list of eligible offenses. The County continues to exclude 13 misdemeanors that are eligible in other counties."

"The new agreement followed a oneyear pilot study using pre-arrest diversion for marijuana possession. This led to an increase in utilization from 37 percent in 2016 to 50 percent in 2017. The county had an average 60 percent utilization in the first quarter of 2018."

A more expansive list of eligible offenses would lead to better results, according to multiple speakers on the call.


Office – changes over which we had no control.

Agencies stay prepared in active shooter exercise

ORANGE PARK – A catastrophic event can sometimes lead to positive change.

After the February 14 shooting in Parkland, schools and first responders across the state took stock of their own communities and are now trying to create change that would prevent a similar event from happening again.

Last Thursday at Ridgeview High, representatives from various agencies throughout Clay County met for an active shooter tabletop discussion. This was not a simulation where school administrators sat in a gym and watched via monitors a drill unfold. The June 21 event was simply a conversation between every line of defense the schools have in preventing or stopping a shooter.

"In the past, the administrators of various schools would be at those type of [simulation] exercises, kind of witnessing and observing what was going on," said Clay County Sheriff's Office information officer Keith Smith. "What we tried to cover today was that first initial eight hours of when the incident takes place, during those initial critical hours of locking down the school, getting it back to where the kids are getting out of the school, reuniting them with their parents, and then the coordination with us, the Clay County School Board, with their public information officer Nicole Snyder and just working together from there."

Smith explained that, though everyone from the schools to law enforcement, fire and rescue and county emergency staff have a general idea of what to do, it's beneficial to ensure that everyone is in sync.

"We're familiar with what each others' policies and procedures are," he said, "We just wanted to make sure that all the administrators are doing the same thing, that Wilkinson Junior High is doing it the same way as Coppergate Elementary, and identifying who's going to be doing what. Because after it happens, it's too late. That's what we're ultimately going to be doing – providing that unified command and making sure we're all working together."

Smith said that several questions had been brought up that might take some additional thought and preparation. Any unanswered questions will not have to wait until next summer.

For example, he said he has talked with School Superintendent Addison Davis and the two agreed that there should be updates throughout the school year where everyone comes back together on a weekend or after school to make sure the awareness remains top-of-mind.

"We are all extremely busy in our jobs and our work, but we have to carve out

time such as this in order to protect our greatest assets, which is our students along with our employees," said Davis, who played a key role in the event.

"We wanted to make sure that we had all major players in the same room to have discussions about an unfortunate situation if ever exposed to it. This allows us to have a heightened awareness and allows us to have a deeper conversation about how we address issues within our schools and within our community," Davis said.

After the training, representatives from

the Florida Health Department, through local sponsorship from the Northeast Florida Healthcare Coalition, provided "Stop the Bleed" kits for each Clay County school at the event and provided training to schools on how to use the first aid items in the kits.

According to the Department of Homeland Security, "Stop the Bleed" is a national awareness campaign to cultivate grassroots efforts that encourage bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency while waiting for fire and rescue to arrive.

Wreaths Across America gearing up for holidays

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – It is time to begin talking about the annual Wreaths Across America program called "Christmas in July." Each year, family members of fallen military members lay wreaths on gravesites as a symbol that the servicemember is not forgotten during such a special time of year. The largest Wreaths Across America event takes place at the Keystone Heights city cemetery and is spearheaded by Joan Jones and Harry Keenan.

Donors are asked to use the codes, FLKHMG and FLO-217 to ensure their donations are earmarked for the Clay County event. Otherwise, without the codes, their donations go to the national nonprofit's pool of funds used to purchase wreath all over the U.S.

This year, donors can get one wreath for \$15, but if they buy two for \$30, the nonprofit throws in a third wreath for free.

In the past three years, the Keystone Heights event has grown so large that there have been more wreaths than there are military veterans buried in the city cemetery. Jones and Keenan donated the wreaths to cemeteries at Middleburg United Methodist Church and at least two other locations in Clay County.

This year, the Wreaths Across America

Clay County is on the air

How amateur radio is making the world a small place

ORANGE PARK – Members of the Clay County Amateur Radio Emergency Service and the Orange Park Amateur Radio Club recently reached out to the world.

Amateur radio operators turned classrooms into command centers as they hunkered down for its annual National Field Day for ham radio enthusiasts held June 23 at Orange Park High.

"To me it was always a sort of fascinating thing," said Jeff Martin, a guest at the field day. "I've talked to people, the farthest was in the Indian ocean. It's really interesting. I like it as a hobby."

Amateur, or ham radio, is the use of radio frequencies for non-commercial communications.

The objective of the field day, is for ham radio groups to make contact with as many states across the country as possible in 24 hours, all while running on a generator, in order to simulate an emergency situation.


However, the ultimate goal of the event is to increase public awareness and incite interest in amateur radio. Attendees were able to learn more about the science behind radio operation and learn how to obtain an Federal Communications Commission license to broadcast on their personal radios.

Amateur radio also plays a pivotal role in emergency communications during natural disasters. During Hurricanes Hermine, Matthew and Irma, ARES set up shop in Clay County shelters and were able to provide alternate communication between shelters. In the event of an Emergency Operation Center communication break-down during a storm, ARES can step in as an auxiliary. During some of the most catastrophic disasters of recent years, Clay County amateur radio was able to intercept and help relay messages to first

River Road project to go out to bid By Wesley LeBlanc

ORANGE PARK – After a debate that lasted nearly an hour, Orange Park Town Council voted to stay the course and keep its River Road Improvement Project on its Capital Improvement Projects list but not before the project appeared to be doomed.

In what could be described as the 11th hour, council members Ron Raymond, Roland Mastandrea and Alan Watt almost killed this project until Watt changed his mind in what ended as a 3-2 vote with Raymond and Mastandrea voting no.

Improving the pot holes and manhole covers that extend above the roadway on River Road has been debated for at least a year. In a previous debate about the project, the council directed staff to finalize design plans to prepare for it to go out to bid. After receiving those directions, Public Works Director Chuck Pavlos made his way to the podium during the June 26 regular council meeting to explain that the final design is ready. Unfortunately for Pavlos, Raymond and Mastandrea were unhappy and Watt had questions.

The source of Raymond's unease came from a lack of full public consent, which according to Raymond, was supposed to happen. Pavlos, though, said that 100 percent consent was never a part of the direction given to his team, but rather, a general consensus instead, which the River Road community did get involved.

"All of the specific items you mentioned are in here, but the thing in question is the term, 'consensus of the homeowner,'," Pavlos said. "I don't know

responders during Hurricanes Sandy and Harvey.

"The motto is: If all else fails, amateur radio," said Scott Roberts, assistant emergency coordinator and public information officer of Clay County ARES. "We don't want to wait until everything fails, we want to be there to help before that happens."

As the fast-paced age of social media seems to over shadow radio communications, ARES and OPARC are still determined reach the next generation of amateur broadcasters.

"Amateur radio has the reputation of being for your grandpa, and it's not that way anymore, a lot of kids are getting involved," said Roberts. "The older people are starting to pass on, we need to get the younger people involved, so when there is an emergency and there is no communication, we've got radio operators.

One-mil hike to be on ballot

FLEMING ISLAND - Clay County voters will see a question on the ballot asking to approve an additional one mill of ad valorem tax to fund school safety and operating expenses.

"Shall an additional one (1) mill of School District ad valorem millage tax, beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2023, be approved to enhance the safety and security of students and staff, and provide for necessary operating expenses of the School District?" reads the Aug. 28 bal-



lot question.

This exact ballot question was at the center of discussion during May's monthly school board meeting where it sort of ended up in limbo.

Then, arising from referendum limbo. the ballot question came up again during the June 7 regular school board meeting. This time, though, the referendum was met with a number of constituents who support it as it stands, and a few who do not.

OPHS teacher Laura Mayberry, who spoke on behalf of teacher's union President Renna Lee Paiva said the additional funds from the one mill could help fund health insurance for the district.

"If [legislators] aren't going to fund us, then we are going to have to fund us, and that's what this millage increase is about,' Mayberry said. "This additional mill would cost the average Clay County property owner \$100 a year. That's \$8.33 a month and the increase would bring in approximately \$10 million for our public schools and that is money desperately needed."

we're defining that, but I think we have consensus of the homeowner. We've had 10 meetings, I think, on this project and many public hearings, so I think the homeowners have expressed their concerns and we've addressed those concerns."

This did little to soothe Raymond's concerns, despite Pavlos clearly explaining that he followed the direction from the previous council. When it came time for Mastandrea to speak, he showed concern over the lack of future proofing in the final design, and problems that grew from previous project involvement from the firm that helped design the River Road Project Improvement plan.

Watt's concerns revolved around the lack of ribbon curving in the final design, which Pavlos said could quickly and easily be added in, and the utilization of nonbump traffic calming, which John Bartholomew, one of the masterminds behind Orange Park's traffic calming policy, explained falls on the residents of the area rather than the final design of the project.

According to the traffic calming policy adopted by the council, the residents of an area would have to band together with a majority opinion on which traffic calming devices would be deployed before the council discusses them in a public setting.



Mayor Gary Meeks and Council member Connie Thomas had little to say except that she was satisfied with the final design presented by Pavlos. Thomas and Meeks expressed the opinion that the council has sat on this for long enough and that it was time to get this project out to bid.

"We're going to kill this thing tonight if we continue like this," Meeks said.

When it came time to vote, the council was polled individually. Meeks and Thomas voted yes. Mastandrea and Raymond voted no. Watt, after expressing that despite his feelings it was time to move forward with the project, voted yes, finalizing the River Road Improvement Project design plans. Now, this plan will seek bids for construction. Next up was council approval of a finalized five-year CIP, which has been a topic of discussion for quite some time. According to Town Manager Sarah Campbell, the June 26 meeting was the last meeting the CIP could be adopted before moving into budget planning for 2018-19.

"The CIP has been prepared using the strategic priorities established by the Town Council in 2018. The Town Council may certainly adjust the CIP to reflect different priorities prior to the final adoption," states a letter from Campbell to the council. "Per the Town Charter, Council must adopt the CIP before the end of June. The public hearing for final adoption is scheduled for [the night of the June 26 regular council meeting]."

One of the most notable changes the CIP endured came after a vote made during the Feb. 6 regular council meeting where the council voted 5-0 to move \$500,000 from the town's balance, or reserve fund, to the general fund budget. At the time, then-council member Meeks cited that the purpose of the reserve was for times like these, referring to the town's need for money to continue Hurricane Irma cleanup and stormwater maintenance.

"If we are going to do this, \$81,000, I just don't think that's going to touch it," Meeks said, referencing the \$81,000 freed up for Irma cleanup from the CIP. "This is what the \$5 million is for – it's for a rainy day and the rainy day is here."

Toward the latter half of the meeting, the council voted 5-0 to spend \$75,258.61 on a Bobcat Skid Sheer vehicle that, according to Pavlos, will speed up street debris cleanup by 25 percent following storms and other natural events.

The almost three-hour meeting ended with Meeks calling for faster meetings and suggested council ask their questions to staff before each meeting so as not to spend time doing so during the regular meetings. Raymond expressed his disagreement and stated he would do no such thing.

"I hate to disappoint you Mr. Mayor, but I think the time to ask those questions is here, right in front of God and everybody," Raymond said.

Citizens invited to become informed about hurricane season

MIDDLEBURG – Clay County officials are reaching out and trying to get more

citizens interested in hurricane preparedness during 2018.

Clay County Emergency Management is holding a Hurricane Irma Citizen Recovery Meeting on July 12 at the Middleburg High School Cafeteria at 3750 County Rd. 220 from 6-8 p.m. Officials will discuss the availability of upcoming programs that can potentially assist Clay County residents whose homes were substantially damaged by Hurricane Irma, particularly those which have repetitive or severe, repetitive flood losses. According to a statement from Emergency Management, there are approximately 250 Clay County homes that are considered substantially damaged and cannot legally rebuild unless they elevate their home to the new flood standards. The assumption is that many residences will either need assistance with elevation or will be seeking assistance with property acquisition.

State and FEMA officials will also be on hand to discuss the upcoming programs that could assist these and possible future devastated homeowners.

Agency representatives will discuss such topics as program eligibility, program capabilities, match requirements, program requirement, the application process, periods of performance and program restrictions.

Northeast Solite, shut down operations in the mid-1990s.

The problem, however, is that Solite eventually became a site that did nothing but burn toxic waste in enormous kilns. Day and night, the factory would burn its kilns so hot that the mortar between the bricks would melt out after a few months of use, according to former employees.

The item had already been unanimously denied at the June 13 Planning Commission meeting where nearly 20 residents spoke against the proposal. However, the buyer's consultant Susan Fraser – who once served as head of the Clay County Planning Department – sweetened the deal and returned to the BCC with hopes of getting that decision overturned. Unfortunately for her, the commissioners did their homework, and voted a unanimous 5-0 to deny the proposal.

Fraser asked the BCC for a continuance to move the debate to the Aug. 14 BCC agenda. She also mentioned some changes since the Planning Commission meeting, including decreasing the proposed housing density from three units per acre to 2.5. Meanwhile, the standard for the area is around one, and a promise to do additional testing of the site prior to building new homes there. This was not good enough for the audience, though they kept their "boos" to a minimum.

Buyer Michael Danhour spoke after Fraser and said he is also concerned about pollution and would agree to additional testing before he built any homes. However, said he would have to be held at his word as there would be nothing stopping him from just building on the site as-is should the zoning be changed and the property sold.

Once the board had heard testimony from the buyer and his representative, commission chair Gavin Rollins banged the gavel and opened public comment. Each speaker pleaded to the board to deny anything that would allow the sale of this property before it is cleaned up.

The audience painted a picture of a decades-long cover-up by Northeast Solite, a company that had caused potentially catastrophic health issues and abandoned the site once operations ceased in 1996.

Multiple speakers with backgrounds in field and lab testing listed chemicals present such as arsenic, lead, dioxin and cyanide. One resident cited that of the 13 original homes near the former Solite facility, 10 nearby residents had died of cancer since 1996. Former employees told stories of black smoke pouring from the stacks during the night, when no one could see, as well as an outright disregard for their safety as they were frequently assured that respirators were not necessary as the chemicals were being burned and would not get into the air.

One man had lesions covering his arms that he claimed were turning into cancer, another lives with a defibrillator on his chest after suffering a massive heart attack at age 28 before being laid off by Solite. He had spent countless hours in the furnaces where the waste was being burned attempting to patch areas where mortar had burned from the walls.

Employees and neighbors of the property cited a multitude of birth defects and cancer deaths, all of which they attribute to their proximity to the site that burned toxic waste for decades. Michael Zelinka Sr.'s said his wife became pregnant with twins after his stint at Solite.

"My son, Michael, had a twin brother," Zelinka had written. "He fit in the palm of my hand. He survived 2 minutes after birth. Michael was born legally blind, he has dyslexia. He was born a year and a half after I stopped working at Solite."

After nearly two hours of public comments, Commissioners asked Stoneridge Farms for a rebuttal and Albert Galliano took the podium.

According to the Florida Division of Corporations, Stoneridge Farms has been an inactive corporation since 2016. The Department of State's sunbiz.org website shows Stoneridge Farms is a subsidiary of Northeast Solite. Galliano, who introduced himself as a representative of Stoneridge Farms, is in Clay County actively trying to sell assets owned by the officially inactive company.

Galliano promised that the site would be cleaned up, and laid no blame on Solite. He said they were willing to put up \$2 million from the sale of the residential piece of the property toward cleaning up the most polluted areas that are yet to be cleared by the DEP, \$2 million that the DEP required to be stored in escrow for that very use when clearing the properties in question for future use.

"We did things the way they were supposed to be done," Galliano said.

After Galliano sat down, Commissioner Mike Cella began the discussion and asked Galliano why Stoneridge Farms, or rather, Solite, hadn't started cleaning the site upon the shutdown in 1996. Galliano ducked the question and gave a history of Solite, and explained that when the company divided up its assets they sold off parts that were undesirable, such as Stoneridge Farms. He then said that they currently don't have enough money to do the cleanup which is why they're trying to sell the property and make up the funds necessary to begin remediation.

Galliano went on to reluctantly admit that Stoneridge Farms is a subsidiary of Northeast Solite. Cella knew this and knew that the two companies share the same president and the same mailing address in Virginia. He then went on to cite Solite's estimated \$31 million in revenues in 2017, refuting Galliano's claims that Stoneridge is broke.

"There's a certain level of uncertainty because there's a lot of uncertainty that you're portraying," Cella said. "... how are we supposed to believe that you're going to be yearly reporting and then update the bank money to do the cleanup if we can't even get you to pay the \$300 that it takes to file as a corporation in the State of Florida?"

Following Cella, the rest of the commission shared his distrust for Galliano and Stoneridge Farms, with Diane Hutchings getting Galliano to admit his position as one of the five vice presidents for Northeast Solite, not Stoneridge Farms.

"These are our neighbors, these are people that we have family ties to, we love them. You're from out of town, you worked here for a while, but you don't live here anymore, do you? We've been left with a mess and it is going to be cleaned up," Hutchings said. "We're done, there is no more talk of development, there is only talk of cleanup."

The commissioners continued with Gayward Hendry requesting that he be the one to make the motion to deny everything Northeast Solite had requested, and to deny any continuance or further action on the issue until the site had been completely cleaned up. Hendry suggested the site would make a nice county or state park.

"It's gotta get cleaned up and you guys have to pay for it, you made the profits and you left and that's just not the way [things are done]," Rollins said. "I believe government has a responsibility to rein in people who basically just come in and raid a community and then leave. That's what I intend to do, I'm not sure exactly the strategy, but I intend to do whatever we have the ability to do within our power to hold you accountable and responsible."

After the 5-0 vote to deny. the board directed county staff to put an item on the first agenda in July where they could discuss with the county manager and county attorney their best steps for ensuring Northeast Solite pays to clean up the property.

handed down the ruling after hearing arguments in the case on June 19 in a Clay County courtroom. Mobley's original complaint also challenged Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambless' decision to allow Hoover on the ballot.

"We are on solid ground with the discretionary authority vested in a constitutional office, like that of Chambless as detailed by the Florida Division of Elections 2016 Supervisor's Handbook and the 1974 Bayne v. Gibson case, which has stood for over 40 years," Hoover said. "And furthermore, I truly believe that this is the right thing to do. I have to go with that belief and I have to have faith that this is the right thing to do, mainly for the people of Clay County."

Judge Maltz ruled that Hoover simply did not file her documents on time, therefore, she missed the official deadline to qualify and should not be on the ballot.

"Fla. Stat. 105.031(5)(a) makes clear that in order for Hoover to have qualified for the judicial race at issue, in addition to being present at the Clay SOE office before the noon deadline, she had to submit all her qualifying paperwork by the deadline. The uncontroverted evidence demonstrates that Hoover failed to meet the statutory requirements to qualify because her Form 6 Financial Disclosure was not received by Ms. Hogan, the Clay SOE filing officer, before the noon May 4, 2018 deadline," states the ruling. "There were no exceptional or special circumstance that prohibited Hoover from meeting the deadline – only the fact that she waited until the last minute to begin the process.'

Unlike Hoover, Chambless said the judge's ruling was not ambiguous and he will move on and prepare the ballot for the August Primary until he gets orders to do otherwise as a result of Hoover's appeal.

"The judge's orders were clear so, at

this time, we are going to comply with the order," Chambless said. "Qualifying ended last Friday at noon, and the ballot is currently being coded as we speak, so we will continue with the judge's orders until there is something that changes."

Not only does Hoover feel this case is important for the people of Clay County, but she believes it will matter to all of Florida as well.

"I truly believe that we have a very good legal argument on this matter and its really best that this case goes to the district court of appeal because this is the kind of issue that is going to affect statewide policy," Hoover said. "It's going to have much broader implications than Clay County – it could affect the entire state."

As far as the appeal goes, Hoover and her team plan to continue forward with the same arguments presented during the June 19 court session. Despite choosing not to appeal, Chambless still believes his original decision to allow Hoover to qualify weren't necessarily wrong.

"I guess, first and foremost, I did not expect the verdict that would side with the plaintiff for the mere reason that everything we do is to ensure that the process is open and transparent," Chambless said. "I never contemplated that the law was to require me to look at the timing of the candidate completing the document in such an uber-critical way, Hoover's documents being 12 minutes late."

On May 29, Mobley filed the complaint against Hoover and Chambless, stating that she believed Hoover's name should not be on the ballot because Hoover failed to properly, accurately and punctually qualify on time.

Mobley's office referred comments to her lawyers, Paul Renner and Michael Fackler. Renner was unavailable for comment as he was out of the country and, at press time, Fackler, has not returned calls for this story.

Water, water, everywhere...

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Rain is usually a welcome sight for gardeners, helping to keep the soil moist, our plants growing and our irrigation systems off. However, this year has been extremely wet for many people in our county and some plants are starting to show their complaints that it has just been too wet. Here are some tips on how to tell if your landscape is waterlogged and how to protect your plants.

When is Wet too Wet?

Many of our landscape plants may actually be quite happy with the last few months, especially in landscapes that are found on sandier upland soils. For these sites, which often dry following rain events in just a couple of days or less, you are likely just having to mow the grass more often and get to keep your irrigation sys-

tem off.

However, if you live on the eastern side of the county, where the heavier black soils are found, your plants may be showing signs of water stress. If roots stay saturated too long they cannot properly exchange oxygen in the soil and then can become damaged or die. Look for symptoms such as leaf yellowing, drooping or wilting foliage, leaf drop, die-back or even plant death. In fact, the effects of too much water look a lot like drought damage.

If your plants were under standing water or the ground has been soggy and soaked for a long period of time, it is likely you may see some damage but it does also depend on the type, age, and overall health of your plants.

Dealing with Water Stress

If your plants are showing the signs of water stress, the best first step is to

try to get them to dry out. If in containers, put them up on blocks or gravel to allow drainage and clear any blockage of the pot's drain holes. If in the ground, pull back mulch away from the plant for a few days and allow the soil to dry. Hopefully the weather will cooperate as well and give your plants some time to recover.

Additionally, if it is raining consistently, you should not need to irrigate your landscape or lawn.

Make sure your rain shut-off device is working properly or just turn off your irrigation system until dry weather returns and your plants actually need it. This will save you money and keep water from going to waste.

Wait and See

After water damage, you may have to wait awhile to see how the plant recovers. There is no steadfast rule on which plants will pull through or not, but just treat them right and give them time. Some plants are still just now showing their damage from Hurricane Irma.

You may also have additional issues with diseases after having too much water in the landscape, with turf diseases such as brown patch or take-all able to flourish and many root rots being found in other landscape plants. If the plant does succumb to the issue, try to find species that tolerate wet conditions better when you are replanting.



Turner indicted for murder, more

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A Clay County Grand Jury handed down an indictment against a Keystone Heights man for firstdegree murder and other charges.

The grand jury indicted Joe Arthur Turner, 28, on the additional charges of sexual battery and burglary with assault or battery in the death of Jordan Cooper, a woman with intellectual disabilities.

Police found Cooper's body in the at-

tic of her parents' home on December 11, 2017 after she had been missing since around Thanksgiving. Her body had been concealed under insulation.

Turner was questioned about Cooper while he was held in the Clay County Jail on a separate, unrelated burglary charge when he became linked to Cooper's murder.

A Jan. 19 press release from CCSO said, "Evidence obtained during that investigation subsequently linked Joe Arthur Turner to Jordan Cooper's murder, sexual assault and the burglary of her residence."

The evidence in question included women's clothing in Turner's possession that matched the description of items taken from Cooper's home. DNA testing conducted on the clothing matched DNA from Cooper's home and the sexual assault kit.

At press time, Turner remained in the Clay County Jail without bond while awaiting trial for both the previous burglary and the Cooper case.

Vargas, once in police custody, was transported to the Clay County Jail and charged with custodial sexual battery of a victim under the age of 18. He is currently in the Clay County Jail with bond amount set at \$250.003.

Man exposes himself, gets arrested

ORANGE PARK – A Clay County Sheriff's Officer arrested an Orange Park man for indecent exposure the afternoon of June 24.

According to the police report, Stephen James Newman was arrested at a Walgreens in the 2600 block of Blanding Boulevard after an officer responded to a call about a suspicious person. According to the police report, the officer arrived on the scene to find Newman lying under a tree in the corner of the parking lot. began. The search included air units that used heat signature programs in an effort to pick up on the signature of McLemore. No such signature was found, but a missing soldier's map and score card was found in the wooded area near the exercise area. As a result, an additional 500 responders were requested to help with the search. Two days later, on June 22, some 200 people responded to the search area in Camp Blanding.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office reported that evening that McLemore's body was found in a wooded area but a cause of death had not yet been determined.

The Florida Highway Patrol, Baker County Sheriff's Office, Clay County Fire Rescue, Marion County Sheriff's Office and Jacksonville Sheriff's Office and their accompanying air units, as well as the Civil Air Patrol assisted in the search for McLemore.

Northeast Florida Safety Council offers fireworks safety tips

JACKSONVILLE – Everyone loves to celebrate our nation's birthday but it doesn't seem official unless there are fireworks. But unfortunately, fireworks are a major cause of injuries during the summer, according to the Northeast Florida Safety Council, Inc.

The Council offers general safety rules for handling fireworks and guidelines for specific types of fireworks. General rules include:

• Never allow young children to handle fireworks

• Older children should use them only under close adult supervision

• Anyone using fireworks or standing nearby should wear protective eyewear

•Never light them indoors

• Only use them away from people, houses and flammable material

• Only light one device at a time and maintain a safe distance after lighting

Never ignite devices in a container
Do not try to re-light or handle mal-

functioning fireworks

• Soak unused fireworks in water for a few hours before discarding

• Keep a bucket of water nearby to fully extinguish fireworks that don't go off

Sparklers

Sparklers are a lot more dangerous than most people think. Parents don't realize they burn at about 2,000 degrees – hot enough to melt some metals. Sparklers can quickly ignite clothing, and many children have received severe burns from dropping sparklers on their feet.

Bottle Rockets

These small rockets are attached to a stick, lit by a fuse and typically fired from a bottle. Teens have been known to have bottle rocket wars, firing them at one another and causing chest, head and eye injuries. The greatest concern by physicians are injuries to the eye that could result in reduced vision or even blindness.

Firecrackers

Firecrackers are designed to explode on the ground. They are often linked together by one long fuse and explode in a series. They are designed to be very noisy, but they also can cause burns and other serious injuries.

Roman Candles

Roman candles eject multiple exploding shells from a tube the user holds in his or her hand. There have been numerous reports of children and adults losing fingers, experiencing severe burns and other injuries, which are sometimes caused when the device gets jammed.

M-class Fireworks

Just don't use them. Every year people will explode M-80s, M-100s, even M-250s. The unmistakable explosions associated with these devices can rattle the windows of homes for blocks. They are produced illegally and without quality control, have short fuses and cause hundreds of extremely severe injuries each year.



job I got but every day I walked out of my house feeling like I wasn't doing anything with my life. But even then, I knew what it meant to leave your mark on the world. I knew I wouldn't be here today without my parents. We weren't a wealthy family but they helped me in every way. My dad worked for 25 years in a prison; he hated it but he did it so we could live comfortably."

He said he kept searching for something he could achieve because he knew he wanted to leave a legacy.

In some ways, Hill will acknowledge, things had come to him too easily. Growing up in northern Florida, on the land his grandparents once called home, he worked on the family farm, planting and harvesting corn, black-eyed peas, maybe some okra and tomato plants. In school he earned high grades almost without trying.

Following the footsteps his dad had made as a college football star, Hill played linebacker and then tight end on his high school team, always as a starter, never experiencing a losing season. Shortly before graduating he passed his exam as an EMT fireman; after earning his diploma, he went to work.

"Basically, I was a paramedic except I couldn't push meds," he explains. "I could run an IV, pull a line, do advance cardiac. And I was 18 years old."

Hill showed his musical gift early too. As far back as second grade, he performed in talent shows and dressed as Elvis.

"I dyed my hair and everything," he said, chuckling.


In church he sang with the children's choir and later was appointed to lead the praise band on Wednesday night services. For several years just before Christmas he performed at Disney World with the high school chorus.

"It was funny because my main interests were football and weight lifting," he said. "I mean, I enjoyed music – I was a huge Vince Gill fan and I loved Johnny Cash and Hank Jr. But I never thought that music would have anything to do with my future."

One fateful day, at a moment of difficulty in his marriage, he went to have a wisdom tooth removed. First, the anesthesia wore off in the middle of surgery and shortly after that, the dentist accidentally broke Hill's jaw. He went home, hoping to just weather the pain alone. By the way, it was his birthday too.

After a while his brother-in-law showed up and insisted that Hill come along as he headed out to play a gig with his cover band. Never mind that Hill hadn't touched a guitar for several years. "Just watch my hands," he was told. "If you sound bad, we'll turn you off. Enjoy yourself."

He did. Hill began sitting in frequently, getting his guitar chops back, singing backup and even taking the lead on Lynyrd Skynyrd's "Simple Man" and a few other tunes. He began writing as well, beginning with "Papa's Song," an appreciation of his late grandfather. Eventually, the band's lead singer invited him to play it as a solo



acoustic performance during intermission. He said people liked his song.

"Almost that quick, man, they became fans and started coming to shows just to watch my acoustic set an hour and a half into the show. I noticed that people were listening to me. They paid attention to the stories I wrote into my songs, they wanted to know more. Right then, I felt I'd found what I'd been looking for," Hill said.

It didn't take long for Hill to pack up and head with his father and brother-inlaw to Nashville. CMA Music Fest 2012 was in full swing as they arrived. "It was a horrible time to pound on doors," he remembers, laughing. "But I'm not kidding; we went into every building on Music Row and dropped off my homemade business cards. I came in with nothing but my passion, like, 'Hey, man, let's do this!'"

Making friends quickly, Hill got to know Craig Morgan, who introduced him to his drummer Mike Rogers. They hit it off and agreed to work together on a full-length album, with Rogers producing. Creatively, they clicked from the start.


"We agreed that this would be about me finding my natural sound without forcing anything," Hill said. "Mikey grew up in the outskirts of Myrtle Beach, so we both came from the same small-town, familyoriented place."

They emerged from the studio with an album Hill calls People Like Me. It's a varied package, with tracks that rock hard like they do it in the South with "Stage Song", honor the love of his life in "Swerve", celebrate with the reggae-flavored "Don't You Worry Bout' Me" and mourn in "I Hate That Car" a romantic breakup, testify with dignity and deep emotion in "How Great Thou Art" and proudly proclaim the small-town virtues that define who Hill is, musically and personally in "Those Were the Days."







CHS Chopek wins thriller over Michigan champion

KISSIMMEE – Among the elite wrestlers of Florida, Clay High's state runner-up Steve Chopek has piled up a handful of day one and day two wins at the AAU Scholastic Duals National High School Wrestling Championships held June 23-28 in Disney's ESPN Wide World of Sports.

Chopek, second in Class 1A for Clay at 120 pounds, is now wrestling with the Spec Ops team that is chockful of state title holders and medalists including Tampa Prep's Anthony Artolona (1A state champ 152) and Ben Buhler (1A state champ 113)and Tallahassee Lincoln's Justin Grant (third in 2A, 170).

In day two action on Monday, Cho-

pek won by pin over South Dakota Blue's Dane Christopher; then won a major decision 9-1 over Jared Kuhns of Contender Elite Legend of Pennsylvania in round two action. Spec Ops won both matches decisively; 69-9 and 41-17.

In day one action on Sunday, Chopek won his first match 7-3 over Iowa Black's Caleb Fuessley, in a 36-25 win for Spec Ops. Match two was a 68-3 blowout of Roughhouse Boys of Tennessee with Chopek winning by pin.

Spec Ops got a loss to Michigan Blue Pittbulls, 24-22 with Chopek winning a tough 8-7 match over Derek Giallombardo, a Michigan state champion at 125 pounds with a 55-3 high school season record.

KISSIMMEE – After a rough outing in last year's AAU Scholastic Duals Wrestling National Championships in the rugged big-school Community I division that saw the Oakleaf Spartans wrestling squad get one win in four days, a move to the Developmental Division comprised of younger teams, Oakleaf has found renewed success on the mat after two days of action. Matches will continue to June 28.

"I think the kids are wrestling great and gelling together with their teammates," said Oakleaf coach Wes Champs, who finished Pool play Monday night in fourth place and got seeded into the Silver championship bracket for a shot at a 10th-20th place finish. "We got kids from Middleburg, Creekside, Miami and three from Orange Park High. They've practiced hard together and now are competing as a team."

Note: The North Florida Wrestling Academy White team, fifth in Pool play with a 3-3 record, advanced to the Bronze championship bracket in the Development rankings. At 126 and 132, Storm Mercado finished unbeaten with three pins, a major decision and a 6-3 win. Matthew Ross has just one loss.

Oakleaf closed day one with a 3-2 team record with wins over Westerville, NC, (54-16); a loss to the Ohio Titan Red

of catch and run plays for big gains. Fleming Island's top running back from the pocket, DeWayne McBride was mainly a blocking back for the event.

"We had Max Michaels playing on the offense side, but defense needs to get better and he may return to that side," said Springs. "Both Vanguard and Westside were hitting routes behind our linebackers and in front of safety Jacob Ashe. Our linebackers have to pick those guys up."

Jackson, the Class 3A champion at 113 with an explosive 47 second pin and 10-1 record at last year's nationals. "He adds a lot of championship level preparation both before the matches and during the week."


