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Flooded homeowners get glint of hope

Three major programs to aid victims of Irma available

MIDDLEBURG – As Clay County begins preparations for another hurricane season, there are still hundreds of people wading through the messy waters, destroyed

houses and dramatically different lives Hurricane Irma left behind last September.

The damage Irma created in Clay County was permanent for some, temporary for others, but destructive for many. Some 1,300 homes were impacted with 500 destroyed. Despite the county's best efforts, money still isn't flowing in fast enough to

get these families back on their feet. Just last Thursday, though, on July 12, the county did take a big step forward in securing more money for families affected by Irma last September.

At a meeting hosted by Clay County Emergency Management at the Middleburg High cafeteria, Clay County Emergency Management Director John Ward, spoke to over 100 people about three major programs that could help families affected by Irma finally get the funds they need. Ward discussed the Flood Mitigation Assistance Program, which provides money to families wishing to elevate their homes and the

On July 17, nearly 20 people met in an exhibit hall at the Clay County Fairgrounds to take part in an open discussion with the director of Clay County Tourism and Film Development, Kimberly Morgan, and a hired consultant. John Whisenant of North Star Destination Strategies, a community branding and tourism development firm based in Nashville, Tennessee. According to Morgan,

et's begin today's effort not by look-


ing forward, but by looking backward. I invite you to join me in reminiscing about an adventure that began 57 years ago when a young John F. Kennedy addressed a joint session of Congress:

"I believe that this nation should

commit itself to achieving the goal, be-



fore this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to the earth."

Fueled by the Cold War and the successes of the Soviet Space Program, the United States accepted this challenge. It would not be an easy task, but nothing worthwhile ever is. Icarus himself did not even dare to dream such a dream.

President Kennedy reinforced our American resolve a year later when he told a crowd at Rice University, "We choose to go to the moon. We choose to go to the moon in this decade and do the other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard, because that goal will serve to organize and measure the best of our energies and skills..."

That measure was soon realized. On July 20, 1969, American astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin walked on the surface of the moon. We had broken free from the bonds of gravity and touched another world.

Let us not let July pass without taking pause to reflect on this greatest of accomplishments.

Search to replace city manager moves to next step

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The search for the new Green Cove Springs city manager is narrowed down to 12 semi-finalists after a meeting last week.

After current City Manager Danielle Judd anearly nounced in 2018 that she would not be seekanother coning tract at the end of this year, the council voted to hire a search firm to collect applications and find ideal

candidates who could attempt to fill Judd's shoes.

At its March 21 meeting, the council voted to hire the Texas-based firm Strategic Government Resources, which has been collecting applications since the spring.

Last Thursday was the council's first update since the application period had opened, and then closed. Sixty-four candidates applied for the position and SGR narrowed that pool down to the 40 candidates, a pool they thought would be most appropriate for the city. Doug Thomas, a senior vice president at SGR, presented the applicants to all five members of the city council.

During the presentation, council members were instructed to mark down a number between 1-3 for each with 1 being the top score. This process, called the triage by Thomas, would narrow the candidates down to what would become known as the semi-finalists.

Through the triage, not much is known about the candidates. All the information presented Thursday was the same that could be found on a resume.

"We're going to know a little about a lot of people at the front end of the process," Thomas said. "By the time we get down to [the finalists] we're going to know everything possible about those individuals."

Candidates were presented to the council from all walks of life including former police and military, some lawyers, and others who had a more traditional background in city government. Each applicant was

given a place in the presentation with one or two slides outlining their background.

About half, 23, of the 64 total applicants were from Florida. Six applicants came from both Georgia and Michigan and the rest spanned the map with some from Alaska, California, Texas and other states. Assistant City Manager and Public Works Director Mike Null served as the only internal candidate currently working for the city.

Thomas moved through the candidates quickly, but with precision. The goal was to be as objective as possible and give each person a fair chance at receiving the coveted "1" vote.

Council members listened carefully and wrote down their votes, but asked questions about length of time spent in a job, why they chose to apply and whether or not they intended to live within the city limits. Thomas answered what he could, and other questions were written down for use in the next step of the process.

Both council members Van Royal and Mitch Timberlake questioned why several of the candidates seemed to have moved around a lot between jobs and even states. "Normally city managers are hired and fired with enthusiasm but rarely by the same board," Thomas said. "In many cases you can walk on water with the council who hired you, but organizations change and communities change and councils change."

Thomas said that after an election, city managers often wonder whether or not they'll still have a job once their contract expires, because when the council changes their direction they typically look at replacing city staff as a means of seeing quick change.

Following the presentation, the votes for each of the 40 were tallied and, similar to golf scoring, the candidates with the lowest scores were moved forward into the next round of consideration. The city elected to move forward with 12 candidates, including Null, and kept another three to serve as reserve options. Thomas said this is customary because sometimes candidates chosen as semi-finalists will pull themselves from consideration as the next step involves a lot more work on their end and they could be further along in another search. Council member Pam Lewis asked

Trump now liability for GOP contenders?

wonder if GOP gubernatorial candidates Adam Putnam and Ron DeSantis are feeling a little queasy.

It was a quite the global spectacle Monday, watching President Donald Trump all but genuflect to Russian "President"

Vladimir Putin, but it had to be worse for Putnam and DeSantis right here in our little corner of the planet.

Both men have been unflagging in their bro-love for Trump in the leadup to the Aug. 28 Republican primary. DeSantis has been

saturating TV with ads trumpeting his endorsement by "the big man himself" while Putnam hasn't let that little detail derail his undying allegiance to the "commander" in chief.

While that strategy may appeal to Trump's true believers who turn out for the primary, it becomes problematic in the general election.

After the President's inept performance Monday in his face-to-face with Putin was widely panned, even by many Republicans, close association with Trump, while always a risky election-year strategy, may be downright toxic now.

Florida voters generally approve of the president a little more than most, but it's a stretch to think that number won't go down after Trump sided with a dictator over his own intelligence reports regarding Russia's covert attempt to influence the 2016 election

That sets up a dilemma for DeSantis and Putnam.

Do they begin to distance themselves from "the big man himself" and risk the wrath of the almighty base? Or do they just pretend Monday never happened and hope so much other stuff will occur between now and November that undecided voters forget about Helsinki?

That's not Putnam's only problem, either.

The latest Gravis poll has him trailing DeSantis by six points. And now he may face a renewed backlash from the tweet that wouldn't die. That's the one, almost a year ago, where he declared himself a "proud NRA sellout."

Congressmen pan Trump's performance with Putin

t's a measure of how dubious President Donald Trump's performance was at the Helsinki summit with Russian leader Vladimir Putin that even

Republicans who proudly campaigned with the President in 2016 are distancing themselves from his remarks.

of Fleming Island in Florida's 3rd Congressional District, bemoaned a "missed opportunity" by the President.

"Today's press conference between President Trump and Vladimir Putin was a missed opportunity to hold Russia accountable for their meddling into our 2016 presidential election. I don't agree with President Trump's comments that his regime didn't interfere. The evidence from our national security agencies is clear; Russia deliberately tried to undermine our republic. This is unacceptable," Yoho said Monday.

"Putin has never been, nor will he be, a friend to the United States. It must be made clear to his regime that we will not tolerate any hostile action against the United States. The preservation of our Republic is paramount and is of the utmost importance to all Americans," Yoho added.

U.S. Rep. John Rutherford, a first-termer from Jacksonville who has not been quick to criticize the President in the last year and a half, likewise distanced himself from Trump in his own brief statement on Monday.

"Today was a missed opportunity for the President to place additional pressure on Vladimir Putin for his regime's misdeeds. Even with the President's misgivings with those who seek to undermine him at home, we cannot equate ourselves with the Putin regime, its record of hostility, and its assaults on democratic values across the globe. We must seek to avoid sending the wrong message to our allies and emboldening those who wish to harm us and undermine our values. We must always stand up for our freedoms, our values, our allies, and the American way," Rutherford said.

Rutherford is not facing a primary challenger in Florida's 4th Congressional District, and has a massive financial edge over an underfunded Democratic foe. Rutherford will face George "Ges" Selmont of Ponte Vedra Beach in the November general election.

U.S. Rep. Al Lawson, a Tallahassee Democrat whose 5th Congressional District runs east to Jacksonville, hazarded no political risk in criticizing the President as he did Monday.

I use St Brendan's Isle Mail forwarding service. As a live-aboard cruiser who spends 10 months a year overseas I find this an extremely valuable service. Please note I am a resident of Pennsylvania and NOT registered to vote in Florida. So, the legal controversy does not affect me.

If St Brendan's Isle is driven out of business then I will take my business to a different state, probably Texas, which is more friendly. I will not use any Florida alternative for fear they may also be driven out of business and changing all forwarding addresses is not something I wish to do.

I have spent time in Green Cove Springs and have used the services of the local marina for maintenance, repairs and storage in no small part because of the proximity to St Brendan's Isle.

I would like to add I find the ruling curious. We live in a culture where homeless folks are encouraged to vote and given an address. If this interpretation were to go into effect everywhere, be universally accepted, a whole class of folks would be disenfranchised from the voting process. 
Putnam's office, in a statement to the Times, denied all that.

Cops bond over books

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Members of the Green Cove Springs Police Department want children to associate them with pizza and storytime, not just law and order.

"I don't like hearing parents say to their kids, 'Be good or he'll arrest you,' when they see us," said GCPD officer James Acres. "I don't want them to be afraid of us if they need help."

Under the administration of new Chief of Police Derek Asdot, community outreach has been the No. 1 goal for the department. While the department is focusing more on investigations, the agency's clearance rate has improved. Officers attribute that partly due to their involvement in the community and the amount of trust the city's residents have in the officers under Asdot's command

In late June, Asdot and his staff devised a way to get officers in front of kids while promoting education at the same time. In partnership with the Green Cove Springs Library, the department is hosting a Summer Literacy Program, which involves cops reading different children's books at 11 a.m. every Tuesday in Spring Park through the end of August.

"This is just one more way for us to get involved in the community," said Sgt. Tam-

my Perry, the reader at Tuesday's event. "We're trying to get a mix of the people working patrol [to come and read] so the kids can see different faces and get more familiar with members of our department."

The program could be an especially good primer for young kids, who will now see an officer stationed at their schools with the start of the next school year as local officers will be serving as school resource officers at Charles E. Bennett Elementary and Green Cove Springs Junior High.

"This lets them know that police officers aren't mean," Acres said. "We're here to help them and be there if and when they need us."



The program started with five kids in attendance but at the first Tuesday reading, about the fourth in the series, there were almost 30 kids waiting for storytime before the officers even showed up. The real fun starts after the book is finished when GCPD's Leah Wojnar, driving the department's infamous pink Cadillac Escalade, arrives on the scene with her car filled with Hungry Howie's pizza.

Wojnar approached Hungry Howie's when the Summer Literacy Program was first conceptualized about providing pizza for the series. The restaurant agreed to offer pizza at no cost for the events. Wojnar also visited the library to work with library

staff to select the 10 books that would be read as a part of the program.

"Chief Asdot came up with the idea to get kids to read. The more they read, the better they'll do," Wojnar said. "The kids already know the pink car has the pizza," she said. Kids of all ages are invited to participate in future readings. Officers will arrive around 11 a.m. every Tuesday, weather permitting, at the shelter next to the playground at Spring Park. Officers have also participated in readings at the library and host other community events throughout the year. 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

Council: Kingsley East subject of shoddy work

ORANGE PARK – The Orange Park Town Council seems to be fed up with the work of multiple construction teams responsible for the work recently completed on Kingsley East and Plainfield Avenue.

During its July 17 regular council meeting, the already lengthy meeting was extended by an additional 15 minutes to allow the council to discuss projects that, in their eyes, didn't meet expectations.

In her regular council report, Town Manager Sarah Campbell addressed what seemed to be the elephant in the room who also had to endure the extralengthy meeting Tuesday night.

"There are a number of things that I would share with you tonight, but the only thing we all want to talk about is Kingsley East so I'm just going to jump right in if that's alright," Campbell said.

Campbell said staff received 20 photos detailing problems present with the work on Kingsley East, of which, staff agreed there are about 16 problems that need to be corrected.

Campbell attempted to let the council know that concerns she had already heard before the meeting were already being addressed.

"We can get into specifics if you want, but the big picture is, 'we get it,'," Campbell said. "We don't intend to provide you with a bad product. We're on it. We were on it as soon as it was raised to my attention yesterday afternoon and we've had three or four meetings on it in the last 24 hours"

"My goal is that when issues are brought to my attention, I would like to solve them for you and I would like myself and my staff and my team to be able to solve them for you, if given the opportunity," Campbell said.

The council decided to open up the topic for discussion and were forced to vote to extend the meeting 15 minutes past the 10 p.m. regular cutoff time. Mayor Gary Meeks said, that simply put, the Kingsley East project is disappointing

"I think the disappointing thing about this project is that we are already getting ready to pave in phases two and three of this project around [July 23 or July 24] and yet, from the very beginning in phase one, we have seen repetitive mistakes all the way down [the avenue]," Meeks said. "I would challenge you, and I know you'll meet the challenge, to institute

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what percentage of the chosen semifinalists typically choose to pull their names, and Thomas said there is no set standard.

Ordinance allowing food trucks in the works

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Food trucks might soon be routing their GPS systems to the City of Keystone Heights.

During the regular Keystone Heights City Council meeting held July 2, City Clerk Lynn Rutkowski explained to the council an ordinance she has been working to bring into fruition. For anyone familiar with the food trucks rules and regulations found in the Jacksonville Beach area, what could become Keystone Heights' ordinance will sound very familiar. That's because Rutkowski has been working with Jacksonville Beach in an effort to retrofit their ordinance to fit within the City of Keystone Heights.

"This ordinance in front of you [which, at this point, was simply a draft] is tweaked from that of Jax Beach," Rutkowski said. "It's very, very good, and I've been working with [Jax Beach officials] to adopt something similar to what they're doing here in Keystone."

According to Rutkowski, the food truck ordinance is something she's been working for quite a while and she's been doing so due to the increasing demand for the food service vehicles.

"Food trucks are becoming more and more popular and they're coming into the city," Rutkowski said. "They're coming into the city and people are asking for them, and they're asking about them, so this ordinance is hopefully what will be our way of answering those questions." When Rutkowski brought the draft ordinance up to the council, the number one question she was looking to see answered was what locations the council saw best fit for food trucks coming to town. Rutkowski recommended the commercial district of Keystone Heights, citing that this area of the city has the most property and parking. The council did not have to vote to answer this question just yet, but the general consensus was that the commercial district would, in fact, be the best area for food trucks to set up shop.

As the draft stands right now, mobile food vendors must be located on a lot of at least one acre, must display their permits at all times and must be within 100 feet of a main entrance to an eating establishment or similar food service business. The draft also states that the hours of operation for a food truck must fall between 7 a.m. and 10 p.m.

During the meeting, the general consensus seemed to be that food trucks coming to Keystone Heights should operate under a provision called Use-by-Exception, which at its simplest level means that as long as a food trucks checks off all of the required boxes, and follows all of the rules and regulations set in place, the food truck will be allowed to serve in the city.

The first hearing for of this ordinance will take place during the next Keystone Heights City Council regular meeting on Aug. 6.

In other business, the city council is looking at ways to cut down on the thru traffic on Commercial Circle, specifically

large vehicles such as semi-trucks and garbage trucks. According to Rutkowski, more and more business owners have complained to city hall citing increased traffic through what is widely considered the busiest part of Keystone Heights.

City Manager Scott Kornegay recommended the council place a weight restriction on the books to handle the issue. He said the restriction would prevent large vehicles such as semi-trucks and garbage

trucks from traveling through and would allow police to enforce the regulations and accompanying fines for those who fail to follow the rules.

If this recommendation is put into motion, signs will be made alerting incoming drivers of the restriction. During the meeting, though, the council recommended to staff that more research be done to determine the best solution for this issue.

these community meetings, of which there were five held July 17-18, was to gather the community's thoughts and information that will be used to develop a strategic tourism plan for Clay County.

Of the 19 people that attended this first meeting, County Commissioner Mike Cella, County Manager Stephanie Kopelousos, Green Cove Springs Mayor Van Royal, Green Cove Springs council member Pam Lewis and County Clerk of Court Tara Green, as well as others, were present and committed to weigh in. Whisenant took to the front of the room to explain his role in these meetings.

Whisenant explained how he spent last weekend posing as a tourist in Clay County on what he called a reconnaissance mission

"I do this to experience what a tourist coming to Clay County might experience," Whisenant said.

As a tourist, Whiseant experienced, or at least learned about, exactly what those present at the meeting cited Clay County tourism as consisting of: family events, river traffic, golf, concerts, parks and more.

"After my time here, this is what Clay County is," Whisenant said. "It has a family feel. It's welcoming. It's homey."

One thing Whisenant particularly harped on, and certainly one thing he suggested Clay County hone in on, was the waterways present throughout the area. When he asked the crowd what they thought of Clay's boat docks and ramps, the crowd was for the most part in agreement that river access was limited at best.

"Our riverways are always limited and even more so on the weekend," Green said. "We have to open up more boat ramps and areas for people who want to get on the water to do so."



During the first of five community meetings to discuss Clay County tourism, the audience learned that out-of-state tourism and the money it brings in to local coffers saves each household in the county \$225 in annual property taxes.

Another thing attendees agreed on was the history of Clay County, or rather, the preservation of this history. For some, Clay County has a history that needed to be preserved but also not a shackle to the future of the area. For others, like Lewis, she felt that there wasn't enough appreciation for the history the county holds.

"It's a mixed bag here when it comes to preserving our history," Lewis said. "It's a tug-of-war really. Some want it to be [preserved] and some might not appreciate it enough. That's something we have to work together on."

Bed and breakfast owner Dale Garlinghouse of Green Cove Springs said history only matters to a portion of the county and that will only continue to decrease.

"If you weren't born before 1960, you probably don't care about the history in Clay," Garlinghouse said.

When asked how the room feels about the direction tourism in Clay County should go, Clay County Sheriff's Officer Gary Cross said 'steady.'

"If we have sudden growth, that brings a new way of life to Clay and that could bring with it increased crime rates," Cross said. "If [Clay County tourism] maintains steady growth, we, as a county, will be able to grow and adapt with it, which will help maintain our current crime rates, and maybe even lower them."

Tourism and Clay County don't to go seem hand in hand, at least in the way say, Orlando and tourism do there, but surprisingly, tourism is a very vibrant section of the county's economy. According to Whisenant, the U.S. Travel Data Center reported that in 2016, the economic impact of tourism in Clay County was \$178 million dollars. Even more surprising, the money earned from tourism helps each and every household.

"We'd all be paying \$225 more in taxes, per household, if [out-of-state] tourism wasn't in Clay," Morgan said.

On top of that, Morgan said that 3,000 Clay County employees currently work in the tourism sector, which helps the county

keep its unemployment rate, which is currently 3 percent, compared to the state's rate of 3.8 percent.

When asked to name one thing each person would bring to Clay County if money and politics had no part in the decision, the answers began to piece what might become the future of Clay County one day. Garlinghouse said more boat ramps. Green explained that the county needed to create a conference venue that could also serve as a home for a resort-like experience. Royal said the county could use a sports complex, something Whisenant explained is almost always certain to bring in a lot of tourism to an area.

After all was said and done, Whisenant and those present in the meeting had determined four things Clay County needs to do now to develop its tourism industry further. First, utilize the fairgrounds more. Second, develop more attractions, attractors and products to give the county more to market to the rest of the Southeast. From there, the county needs to create a point of differentiation, or something the county can say is unique to it and shouts to potential visitors, "visit us because of this," and finally, fix its advertising overload.

"If there's too many signs, too many things reaching for the attention of people, it just becomes white noise," Whisenant said. "Instead of looking at these things, people driving by might not even register it's there. We call that chatter in the advertising industry and you don't ever want too much of it."

To close out the meeting, Morgan made a plea to those present in the audiences, explaining that without more communication, the tourism of Clay County has nothing to stand on.

"If we don't know what you're doing and what you offer to tourists in Clay County, we can't tell people about you," Morgan said. "We can't tell your story."

state's home acquisition program, which serves as a way for the state to purchase the property of families who, rather than rebuilding, would prefer to simply say goodbye, and finally, a Community Development and Block Grant.

Potentially more important than all of that, though, was a survey Ward asked all in attendance to complete. This survey asked participants what kind of damage they saw occur from Irma and what their plan was moving forward. This survey, according to Ward, is of the utmost importance in securing the most funds possible for Clay County.

"We can't help you if you don't know what you need," Ward said. "We did a lot of the public meetings, but we were still shellshocked at what was going on. Now we've had some time. These programs are getting ready to roll out in the next couple of months so we have to be prepared."

Ward said he is ready to fight for the residents after seeing the damages first-hand

"I want to fight for our community and get every dollar we can get because this is going to be a competitive process," Ward said, explaining that Clay County was competing with not only the damage left behind by Hurricane Harvey in Houston, Texas, but with Hurricane Maria, which destroyed half of Puerto Rico, as well.

Last November, officials launched the new nonprofit Recovering Clay that was meant to spearhead volunteer fundraising to collect money to aid needy families. One woman at the November kickoff event for Recovering Clay, Carol Gardner, saw her entire home destroyed by the hurricane.

"I saw my entire life floating in front of me," Gardner said at the time, remembering the first time she was able to make it into her home after Irma.

Now, 10 months later, and already nearly two months into the 2018 hurricane season, Gardner's home is no more. Due to the damage done on her house, which

experienced waters that rose over six feet, Gardner and her husband learned that the only option was to completely demolish her home. She was only offered \$80,000 by National Flood Insurance, which hardly covered the costs of her waterfront home along Black Creek.

"We're still very shy on what we should be getting, especially after losing everything you have," Gardner said.

Not only is Gardner short on the funds she should be receiving to build a new house on the plot of land her old home used to sit, she's still responsible for paying her mortgage on the destroyed house every month.

One might question why Gardner would choose to rebuild in the same spot on which her previous home was destroyed, but for her, the answer was easy — it's home.

"To be able to rebuild means a lot," Gardner said. "My husband and I were married there. My daughter and son-in-law were married there. It's a beautiful piece of property and we love it. I mean, it's our home and it always will be."

Now, over half a year since the fateful day Irma flooded her home, Gardner still finds herself surprised at everything she's been through.

"We had never flooded before and we never really thought we would," Gardner said. "Lesson learned for sure, but I never thought that if we did ever flood, we would have to go through so much red tape to get our lives back."

Gardner is frustrated about the entire situation. She's unaware of where local Irma fundraiser money ended up and she doesn't know anyone that received any of it. She's tired of crossing through red tape after red tape just to get some help, but most of all, she's just ready to be home. Following Irma, Gardner stayed with friends and family to ensure she and her husband had a roof over their heads.

"I'm tired of all of this," Gardner said. "I just want my home and my life back."

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Challenger Center receives road paving funds

OAKLEAF – A \$2 million grant from the state should kickstart a development that's been about 20 years in the making.

Last week, the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity announced the recipients of \$16 million in grants with Clay County receiving \$2,065,000 for the construction of Atlantis Drive, a road that will connect newly-opened State Road 23 to Challenger Center, a mixed-use property that can't be developed until there's a road to the property.

"The concept is that people should be able to live, work, play and shop without getting on a major roadway," said Challenger Center partner Ken Smallwood, an Orange Park real estate developer and lead partner on the project along with former State Senator Jim Horne of Fleming Island. "They can do everything right there in their neighborhood on a property that spans about 800 acres."

The road would fall near Trail Ridge Road and contain about 20 percent residential, 40 percent commercial retail and about 40 percent office and high end distribution warehouses, according to Smallwood

"The county wanted jobs but they didn't want congestion, we think that for them to allow this kind of mixed use that it'll be a winner," he said. "We've had the property for about 20 years but everybody says, 'We need a road.' We were never able to develop it ourselves, we're just a bunch of people that bought the land. We're waiting on someone to come along and put in that road."



According to Smallwood, the \$2 million grant will solve that problem on the road which he called a "shovel-ready" project that can begin as soon as they get bids back – about 90-120 days he estimates.

Smallwood said they had committed to the state that they would add about 1,000 jobs in the first 10 years once development begins, but he is hopeful to add even more than that. "The road is going to make it all possible," he said.

There has been some interest from businesses, including a potential 189,000 square foot office building that would house an insurance company and bring 2,500 jobs all at once. He also said the JaxUSA economic development partnership is wants to work with the property to try and bring new businesses to the area. Once the road is built, Smallwood expects the corner lots, closest to SR23, to go first, as well as a townhome or apartment complex. "That will bring the workers, and once employers see workers then we'll start getting some of the employers here," he said. "Bring the road and the business will come."

something that would not allow the lack of check and balance. I mean, we have engineering. We've got construction. We've got project management. We've got a public works director and we also have a town manager, so there's no reason in the world we should've gone all the way down to the river with poor curbing, misaligned sidewalks, misaligned walkways, the problems [the Women's Club is facing] — all of this without it being corrected."

Meek's complaints, which were echoed by the rest of the council, didn't end there, however. He said Plainfield Avenue was experiencing problems as well.

"Tell everybody what's going on on Plainfield because that's a \$3.5 million job that's again sinking in between Silverwing Circle and Loring Avenue," Meeks said. "I'm concerned about that road. It's collapsing."

The work the council found themselves

dissatisfied with was completed by Jacksonville-based engineering firm, Stone Engineering Group, and St. Augustine-based

contractor, Besch and Smith Civil Group. As Meeks mentioned. the Plainfield Avenue job was a \$3.5 million job, although it's important to mention that this job was was funded by a bond. The Kingsley East project, on the other hand, council

signed a \$1.1 million contract with Stone Engineering Group and Besch and Smith Civil Group to remodel a stretch of Kingsley Avenue that has been dubbed Kingsley East, the section from U.S. Highway 17/ Park Avenue to the river.

To alleviate the concern surrounding these projects, Meeks suggested hiring an engineering inspector not affiliated with the council to take a deeper look at the work completed thus far, and do so before the projects continue further. The responded by approving a measure to address his concern by a 5-0 vote.

The conversation didn't end there, though. Meeks wanted to ensure that this engineering inspector complete his work prior to phases two and three begin next week and suggest that if this doesn't happen, the council take formal action to halt the project altogether. Campbell responded by explaining that although she would do her best, she can't guarantee that this happens as fast as Meeks would like, citing that Florida law dictates how engineering inspectors are hired, meaning she doesn't have much wiggle room for expediting the process

"OK, but you aren't going to go out and spend two weeks trying to find somebody are you?" Meeks asked.

At this point, with tensions between the council, Campbell and staff extremely high, Town Attorney Sam Garrison stepped into to remind the council where their jurisdiction begins and ends.

"Let's take a deep breath," Garrison said. "If Sarah, our town manager, or any town manager, wants to go out and get engineering services, the law says what that process looks like and so she can't go around that. She has to follow that process."

Meeks asked Garrison what they're expected to do if a project is about to begin the next phase, despite the first phase failing in many aspects.

"You tell the town manager to fix it and you let her fix it," Garrison said. "Any additional directions beyond that is where the council's [jurisdiction] ends."

As for Kingsley East and Plainfield Avenue, like Campbell explained, she and staff are looking into the incorrectly-completed work. In the meantime, based on the council's motion, Campbell will begin the formal process of hiring an engineering inspector to review the work completed on these projects. As it stands though, phases two and three of the Kingsley East project will begin next week, as originally projected.

celestial orbs are oriented in a straight line

A solar eclipse happens when the Moon is between the Sun and Earth, blocking part or all of the disk of the Sun. You might remember that Northeast Florida was able to experience a solar eclipse last August.

When Earth is between the Moon and Sun, conditions are right for a lunar eclipse, when the full Moon passes through Earth's shadow in space.

There will be a total lunar eclipse on July 27. And while eclipses are not rare, this one is particularly noteworthy, for it will be the longest lunar eclipse of the 21st century, lasting for 1 hour and 43 minutes.

This is just 4 minutes shy of the longest a lunar eclipse can last. In the words of the immortal Maxwell Smart, "Missed it by that much!"

So why aren't all eclipses the same? To answer this, we must consider both optics and celestial mechanics.

A shadow has two main parts: The lighter region called the penumbra which surrounds the dark inner region called the umbra. During any total lunar eclipse, the Moon is passing through Earth's umbral shadow

As for the mechanics involved, remember that orbits are not circles, but ellipses. This means that the distances between orbiting bodies is not constant.

Earth is at its farthest point from the Sun, called the aphelion, in July. This results in Earth's umbra to be longer and wider.

Meanwhile, the date of the full Moon and the time the Moon is farthest from Earth, the apogee, fall on - yep, you guessed it - July 27. This means that the Moon will appear smaller in the sky and that it will be moving slower in its orbit.

Finally, the orbital path of the Moon is through the center of the umbra.

Putting it all together, we have a slow-

er-moving, smaller full Moon passing straight through a larger umbral shadow being cast by Earth. Viola – the makings of the longest lunar eclipse of the century.

Since this total lunar eclipse will be preceded and followed by a partial eclipse, from start to finish this eclipse will last 3 hours and 55 minutes. The accompanying Fact Box has the precise times.

Now, you're saying, "Tom, you truly are 'out of this world.' What can we do to witness this for ourselves?"

Sadly, not too much from the United States. Although this eclipse provides us the opportunity to learn some physics and astronomy, it will be visible primarily in Europe, Africa, Asia and Australia. However, many sites will be streaming the eclipse live.

So, a twofer today on the Moon. It's not something I usually do – I guess its just a "phase" I'm going through!

City to get volleyball court

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Green Cove Springs residents will soon have the beach in their backyard as the city moves forward with a sand volleyball court in Spring Park.

City Parks and Recreation Director Glee Glisson, the brains behind the project, wanted to bring a full-size, regulation beach volleyball court to the park, utilizing some empty space that was left behind after the police station building was moved out of the park.

"We didn't want just any volleyball court, we want to use beach sand," Glisson said. "But that's the biggest expense, the sand."

Luckily for Glisson, Lake Asbury-based Heart Rock Materials, half of the Boondock's Bar and Grill restaurant, agreed to donate 166 tons of beach sand for the project. After the city approved labor and the necessary equipment, including the boundary lines and net, Glisson watched as city staff broke ground on July 5.

"The city is providing commercial grade nets and boundary lines, this will be a nice court," Glisson said. "The only thing is that people will have to bring their own ball."

Glisson looks for the court to be ready for play at the beginning of September. Currently a hole has been dug and city workers have laid out ground covering to prevent weeds and grass from growing up through the sand. Glisson intends to keep the court in immaculate condition so that players feel comfortable tromping around barefoot, the way sand volleyball is intended to be played.

"That's such a great use of that space," said council member Steven Kelley. "I am so glad Glee brought that to the council, what a good idea!"

This will be Glisson's first major undertaking as parks director, but she is no

stranger to Spring Park.

Prior to being hired in April as the city's first-ever Parks and Recreation Director, Glisson served as pool manager for 25 years. Since being hired, Glisson has been going nonstop trying to do what she can to improve all city properties and get every corner of the community involved in their parks.

"There's a lot more coming, and a ton of new equipment planned for all the parks," Glisson said. "So far this job has been a lot of fun. The city manager and the council have allowed me to bring in my own ideas and soon you'll see new sports, new equipment and affordable programs for every-

with retirees across the country – and, naturally, in Florida – flocking to the tiny courts for what looks like a shrunken game of tennis. GREEN COVE SPRINGS — In the peak of the summer heat, one of the most helpful things to have in your landscape is also one of the worst to be working with. However, mulching can pay dividends when it comes to conserving water, keeping your plants happy and healthy and cutting down on the time you spend weeding.

Why Mulch?

Mulch serves many purposes in the landscape and vegetable garden. It provides a barrier to growing weeds, modulates soil temperatures, retains water for your plants, and gives the bed a clean, finished look. Additionally, as time goes on, mulches made from organic materials such as hardwoods, bark, or pine needles will break down and add some nutrition to the soil.

However, making the right choices when mulching is important.

Choosing Your Mulch

You want to select a mulch that is

made up of organic material that will decompose into the soil. There are many options for this including those made from the destruction of nasty invasive plants like melaleuca. The only exception would be cypress mulch, which is not a sus-

tainable product and can lead to the deforestation of cypress stands. You may also want to stay away from mulch of questionable origin, as it may contain pests or diseases or other debris.

Stone mulch is also a poor choice as it does not enrich the soil and can reflect heat back into your plants. The best place for stone mulch is in areas without plant material or to manage erosion or other issues.

Laying Your Mulch

After you choose and locate a source for your desired product, make sure to clear the area to be landscaped of any weeds and level the soil as best you can. You may also want to create an edge of your landscaped area to hold in the material which can be done with brick, pavers, plastic edging, logs, or even a vertical cut with a shovel if your soil has enough clay.

Some choose to use a layer under the mulch such as newspaper, cardboard, or landscape fabric.

This can help prevent weeds from growing up into the mulch but paper products break down over time and the landscape


fabric can break dog, clog with soil, or limit some plants from spreading.

In Florida, spread your mulch at a depth of 2-3 inches over the area.

Do not allow mulch to cover the trunk or stem of any tree or plant as this will lead to possible rotting and disease so keep it a few inches away. The practice of "volcano mulching" where mulch is mounded around the base of a tree is especially egregious.

June continues wet weather trend across the district

PALATKA – While rainfall has not reached record-breaking levels, June continued a trend of higher-than-average rainfall for counties within the St. Johns River Water Management District, including Clay County

A full hydrological report was presented during the July 10 SJRWMD governing board meeting.

The district received above-average rain for nine of the past 12 months, with areas of unusually high rainfall in parts of

St. Johns, Flagler and Brevard counties. The districtwide 12-month rainfall total is 13.5 inches above average.

Flagler County had the highest 12-month rainfall total, with 72 inches. Seminole County had the highest monthly rainfall, at 8.8 inches, followed by Putnam, with 8.7 inches, and Brevard, with 8.6 inches. Even the driest counties, which include Alachua, Bradford and Indian River, experienced more than 6 inches of rain during June.

Mauloni gets sixth award







Banks stayed steady at the top of the box to put a shot on frame in the 65th minute, but Vega was there to stop the Armada FC from closing the gap.


Conor Doyle had a close chance in the 67th when he sent in the ball from distance and forced a save from Vega.





pretty tough running, but that's a small part of being successful on the track."

Nelson, who recently won the USATF National Youth Outdoor steeplechase title at College of Brockport (NY) on June 26 with a 6:46.62 time.

"It was pretty hot at that race and the pace was not too fast," said Nelson. "I had raced the guy who was second at Disney before and knew he would want to run the first two laps fast to try and set himself apart from the field."

Nadler sees Nelson use of steeplechase training as a springboard to a successful high school cross country and track season. Nelson holds the cross country 5K (3.1 miles) record for Oakleaf at 16:48, but would like to get under 16 in September

"Dylan has really stepped it up this summer big time," said Nadler. "In the past, he's run a much larger AAU summer schedule with more races and less training for cross country over the summer. This summer, his main focus has been on preparing for a big junior year of cross country and less summer track. We're looking for a breakout cross country season and an even bigger track season in the spring."

At Disney, Nelson and Shey Green of Team Dynasty (NY) blasted away from the field at the run to establish the race as a two-man effort at first. Nelson and Green traded surges in those first two of five laps before Nelson took control in the third lap as Green's strides over the hurdles started to falter.

"I think I have probably the best technique over the hurdles than most kids my age and that helps in the latter part of races because I'm not thinking about hitting that barrier," said Nelson, noting that the steeplechase barrier is attached to the track and will not fall over as in the other track hurdle races; the 110 high hurdles and the 400 hurdles. "The beauty of steeplechase is that raw speed does not dictate the race." As Nelson, the defending AAU club champion, pulled away from the field in the final laps of the Disney race, his eye was on the 6:15 meet record before him.

"I knew what the record was and we went through the first 800 close to the pace, but when I pulled away and he didn't stay with me, I just concentrated on good form and winning the race," said Nelson. "If we had battled to the end, the record may have fallen."

Note: The national high school record is 6:02.84 set in 1988. With one more national race on his summer list, in Iowa at the AAU Junior Olympic Games at Drake University in Iowa July 26, where Nelson finished third in 2017 in 6:34.14, the goal is the triple crown. The winning time in 2017 ws 6:29.32.

"I set my mind on winning all three of these races; USATF, AAU Club and the Junior Olympics this year as my list before settling into my cross country training,"

said Nelson. "My time is faster than last year at this point. I will go up, compete, takes some time off afterward then regear for September."

Nelson, 27th in region 1-4A last year in 17:09.67 after advancing with a fifth place 16:48.44 record run in the district race a week prior, has been training with a strong contingency of area runners; Fleming Island's Andrew Miller and Evan Fuller; Ridgview's Joel Nesi and Orange Park's John Bear, plus Bishop Kenny standout Nathan Jubran to build up his foundation while traveling to Gainesville to do speed work with Nadler and his Florida Track Club Elite Team runners.

"My buildup runs are with the locals guys, then I go to Gainesville one or two times a week to be with coach Nadler's group," said Nelson, who has a 4:39 mile best. "I'll do 5-7 mile runs here and ladders for speed; up from 200s through 1200s with mile repeats with Nadler."



Pro coach brings expertise to Fleming Island lacrosse

FLEMING ISLAND - Fleming Island High lacrosse coach John Hawley has slowly built his Eagles team into a regionally strong unit with interest growing more and more in north Florida in the sport.

"We started three years ago just trying to keep the interest level high here," said Hawley, a Naval Academy standout and a recent US Lacrosse North coach of the year recipient for his 2018 season. "The previous coaches here, like previous coach Jeff LaVangie, now at Shorter University, set a high standard for the kids to learn the sport and we have just tried to keep that momentum."

On Mon., July 2, Hawley, who took over for LaVangie in 2016, landed Florida Launch offensive coach Brian Duncan in Fleming Island to discuss and coach a summer session to a large group of Fleming Island lacrosse players. Florida Launch is part of the professional Major League Lacrosse league based out of south Florida.

"Brian is a great guy, has been coach at Flagler College, and is interested like all of us to spread the game of lacrosse," said Hawley, who finished at 9-3 with a midseason eight game win streak with wins over three eventual district champions; Bolles and Fletcher. "He is here to give us some fine points of lacrosse that can better our kids games. We have kids from six years old to some Fleming Island alums; Justin Safranski and Jason Kunath, here tonight."

Duncan, in his second year with the Launch, brought his vast experience; at Florida Institute of Technology where he guided the team to a 12-4 record and a Sunshine State Conference championship game, plus landed seven All-Conference players in that historic year. Duncan also coached at Bolles in Jacksonville and Jacksonville University.

Prior to Jacksonville. Duncan, a midfielder at the University of Maryland-Baltimore County, spent 10 years at Community College of Baltimore County where he won a junior college national title in 2004 earning him NJCAA National Coach of the Year honor.

"I'm trying to pinpoint the fine points of lacrosse at a high level to these kids because coach Hawley has started from the ground up with his summer programs and has progressed to feed the high school programs with kids genuinely wanting to get to the next levels," said Duncan. "North Florida is a good breeding ground for lacrosse talent and more and more schools are finding ways to include it in their athletic programs."

Fleming Island High is the lone school in Clay County that offers lacrosse with some talk of expanding that into other

"It's a great sport to develop footspeed and awareness of teammates and defensives quickly with split second decisions moving the ball downfield," said Hawley. "This is a very football-centric county and it's tough to crack that code. If the coaches saw how much running we do, lacrosse might be a good supplemental sport for football and soccer guys. A lot of strong lacrosse areas have the football coaches as lacrosse coaches because of the crossover."

Hawley runs a summer schedule of three days of practice a week with informal scrimmages and a day of conditioning.









