

Families' stories told in art exhibit

JACKSONVILLE – Mary and Chuck Highhouse had a family reunion last week, however, it involved only the two of them and some weathered memories.

The couple walked onto the second level gallery of the Museum of Contemporary Art in Downtown Jacksonville, looked down at the floor and gasped as MOCA Director Caitlín Doherty comforted Mary with a hand on her left shoulder. Tears welled up in Mary's eyes as she saw, for the first time in a year, damaged photographs rescued from her home in the carnage brought

OP home has historic significance

ORANGE PARK – An Orange Park home previously owned by recently-deceased U.S. Sen. John McCain might soon become a part of a new historical section of town.

Following McCain's return home from the Vietnam War as a prisoner of war, he, his wife at the time, Carol, and his children moved into a home at 553 Fatio Lane, just off of Milwaukee Avenue. Dubbed a midcentury modern home, the home would was one of only 14 built in Orange Park by now-famed architect Robert Broward.

"He bought a big area of land that he decided he and a contractor were going to build a housing development on," said Dane Lacey, a founding member of the Town of Orange Park Mid-Century Modern Enthusiasts. "The type of architecture, mid-century modern, was extremely popular at the time. It was cheap, simplistic to build and came across as futuristic."

Broward's development began around 1957 and, after a short period of time, the contractor behind the housing development buckled under financial pressure. As a result, Broward only saw his architectural vision end for Orange Park. Today, those homes are located on Fatio Lane, Laurel Grove Lane and Lake View Lane, and can be best be defined as flat, very private in the front with little to no windows, and a large glass-pane back section. While the mid-century modern style might not sound

Brutal pain, tragedy came to Orange Park in 1938

eople living in Orange Park at this time were accustomed to suffering and struggle, death and pain.

Times were hard and had been that way for so long that it almost seemed normal. People were hanging on by their fingernails trying to scrape out a living and keep food on the table. They would have sworn it couldn't get any worse.

But they would have been wrong. Even the strongest and toughest were stunned by the news tearing through the community that day. Two of the town's littlest ones. Ruthie and Virginia-Lee, were missing, suspected dead, drowned off The Point.

Where the river bank forms a steep bluff and slopes down to the shore was the favorite place for residents of all ages to gather for community and church picnics and afternoon swimming. It was called The Point (now Holly Point).

Early in the afternoon on that summer

day, the girls, their chores done, decided to take an early swim. They headed to The Point with Ruthie's bulldog, Cloud, dancing around their bare feet.

Ruthie was 11, had a smile that could light up the world. She lived with foster parents in Orange Park and only occasionally saw her mother, a woman alone, who lived and worked in Jacksonville. Her foster parents treasured her and the whole town had a special place in their hearts for brave little Ruthie.

Her summertime friend. Virginia-Lee. was 15 and visiting with her half- brother's family. Almost a young woman, Virginia-Lee had the manners of a princess and had already captured the hearts of neighborhood boys.

A little after three that afternoon, Ruthie's sopping wet dog returned but the girls were not to be seen. Deputy Sheriff A.H.

Hoover takes steps to have Supreme Court hear case

TALLAHASSEE – A would-be candidate for Clay County Court Judge is hoping to appeal a 1st District Court of Appeal ruling that would prevent her from running

against Clay County Judge Kristina Mo-

Lucy Ann Hoover of Middleburg has started the process to get the Florida Supreme Court to consider her case. Rather than filing a case, Hoover had to first file a notice to

invoke discretionary jurisdiction.

"A [notice of invoke discretionary jurisdiction] is requesting the court to consider hearing the case on its merits," Hoover said. "You list all of the issues that you believe are important enough for the supreme court to consider."

While the district court of appeal ruling leaves Hoover off the ballot, the Florida Supreme Court is Hoover's last hope. If the high court rules in her favor, there is a chance that a special election could be held to sort out the matter.

Clay County Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambless said that a special election would allow Clay County voters to choose between Mobley and Hoover.

"There would be a special election." Chambless said. "It's never happened while I've been here, so this could be a first."

If the Florida Supreme Court does accept her case, and if Hoover won the appeal, Chambless said that depending on the timing, this election might be grouped into another election in the county, but if the timing isn't right, it would simply be its

The case began in June when Mobley filed a suit against Hoover's qualification as a candidate in the upcoming election. In the suit, Mobley's attorneys argued that not only did Hoover fail to complete her qualifying documents correctly, but that she failed to turn them in on time as well. Originally, Hoover based her argument on a case called Bayne v. Gibson, which saw a person attempt to qualify for a state legislative seat, but due to extraneous and external issues, was unable to do so on time. This person had completed all of the necessary documents correctly but failed to turn them in on time due to circumstances bevond their control such as incorrect directions, large crowds and a lack of signage.

According to the ruling of Hoover's appeal, her reliance on Bayne v. Gibson was misplaced.

"Accordingly, unlike Bayne where circumstances beyond the candidate's control caused him to miss the qualifying deadline, the evidence here supports the trial court's dispositive finding that, 'nothing prevented Hoover from submitting all of the necessary paperwork to qualify for the judicial race other than her waiting until the last minute to complete and submit required documents'," the ruling states. Hoover disagrees, hence the potential appeal, but if the Florida Supreme Court accepts Hoover's appeal, Hoover said she'll still use Bayne v. Gibson as grounds for her

Hoover filed the notice to invoke discretionary jurisdiction on Aug. 17 and on Aug. 24 filed a 19-page brief arguing the merits on which the high court should hear her plea. Mobley has the opportunity to provide a counter to the notice, but she must do so within 20 days of the notice filing. Hoover is unsure of when she'll hear back, but she hopes to hear back soon, not only for her sake but for the Clay County voter's sake too.

"Clay County deserves a vote and a choice on who they want in that [judge] seat," Hoover said. "It needs to be up to the voters. They deserve the chance to look at our credentials and backgrounds and deem who they see most fit for the position. If I didn't believe that, then I wouldn't be doing

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DeSantis, Gillum wins are nothing less than astonishing

f Florida voters wanted a contrast in the election for Governor, they have it. The differences between Andrew Gillum

and Ron DeSantis in the November election couldn't be dramatic — and it goes far beyond the fact Gillum now stands one election win away from being the first black Governor in the state's history.

He is a hard-left, progressive candidate who didn't play

it safe in the campaign and was continually overlooked, but he never went away. He shocked pollsters, pundits and everyone but himself the night of Aug. 28 in winning the Democratic primary.

DeSantis is the anointed acolyte of Donald Trump who surged on the president's endorsement and blew out Adam Putnam, the one-time heir apparent to the governor's mansion, to secure the Republican nomination.

DeSantis had a 20-plus point lead in the polls leading to Election Day with his complete embrace of the president and his policies.

It is set up as a national referendum on the president, and maybe it was always going to be that – just not like this, though.

Gillum lagged well behind early in the polls. Even as he surged at the end behind a populist and positive message of change against the status quo, he was basically dismissed by the pundits.

DeSantis cruised in the closing days of the primary, seemingly at ease and assured.

Gillum?

He ran hard the entire way.

He didn't have enough money, at least until a late infusion of cash from George Soros, progressive billionaire Tom Steyer, and Collective PAC, a group dedicated to electing African-Americans.

He didn't have enough experience.

It wasn't his "time" in 2018. Maybe later.

But something about his campaign connected with voters. His upbeat message, his unabashed progressive platform — it all worked and set up the November showdown against DeSantis and/or Trump, depending on how you view the race.

Yes, Florida politics rarely ceases to astonish, and we greet the news that the son of a bus driver is now the Democratic nominee for Governor.

Gillum never stopped believing, even if most others did.

Even as late polls showed Gillum was surging, he still trailed Gwen Graham by 5 points. She was trying to make history, too, by becoming the first woman to hold Florida's top office.

So, what happened?

An endorsement by Bernie Sanders certainly helped. Gillum pushes a populist agenda – a \$1 billion increased commitment to public education. Increased vocational training. A ban on assault weapons, high-capacity magazines, and bump stocks, and tougher background checks.

He will actually use the words "climate change" from the Governor's pulpit if elected

He proposes raising corporate taxes or, as he calls it, "ask the richest corporations to pay a little more of their fair share."

It is a reliably progressively agenda, against what is sure to be a 180-degree opposite in DeSantis.

But let's leave the policy wonk stuff for another day and focus on what we just saw.

While Gillum might have been mayor of Florida's capital city, he still was largely an unknown through the rest of the state. He called himself the only "non-millionaire" in the race. It's true he was out-moneyed by

billionaires Philip Levine and Jeff Greene.

Graham had a famous last name – her father, Bob Graham, served both as Governor of Florida and in the U.S. Senate.

How could the son of a bus driver overcome that?

It started with a message that resonated. His Democratic rivals stressed many of the same points, but Gillum's progressive and "why not now?" platform seemed to connect. Voters clearly saw him as the face and voice of change they were looking for.

It's a remarkable achievement to get this far.

The journey isn't done, though.

To break 20 years of Republican rule in Tallahassee, Gillum will have to convince a statewide electorate that he is more than a fresh face and more than just the latest face of history. It will be his challenge to prove he has answers as well as a great story.

That Tuesday night was a time for Gillum and his supporters to celebrate and reflect. They have accomplished something that wasn't supposed to happen. They proved the experts wrong. They believed when few others did.

They made history. But as the primary result proved, anyone who believes Andrew Gillum is satisfied with getting that far is mistaken.

The story from the Aug. 30 edition headlined "Board seeks raise for superintendent" should have read "Superintendent asks board for supplement predecessors also received."


In following with a policy enacted by the Clay County School Board in early 2014, Superintendent Addison Davis asked board members on Aug. 27 to consider approving a \$28,900 salary supplement that prior superintendents had received since the late 1980s.

During the Aug. 27 school board workshop, discussion surrounded a consent agenda item placed on the agenda by Davis and David Broskie, the district's assistant superintendent for human resources.

The supplement dates back to Ann Wiggins' tenure as superintendent when the board voted to add \$3,000 to her base pay, which is set by the state. Years after Wiggins retired, and David Owens was elected superintendent in 1996, Owens would continue bringing the supplement request to the board until Toni McCabe was named assistant superintendent for human resources

Each year since, until the 2014 policy change, the superintendent automatically received the supplement.

Prior Superintendent Charlie Van Zant Jr. did not receive the supplement his last two years in office nor has Davis received the supplement since his election in August 2016.

by Hurricane Irma. The Highhouse photos and others from Clay County were taken by world renown photographer Gideon Mendel, whose Drowning World Project photo exhibit opened Aug. 30 with a reception at the museum.

"This is only a fraction of the photos, that you know, that didn't make it and then, we had a lot that did make it so I'm thankful for that. Gideon wanted to take the ones that he knew won't do me any good, but it's so cool to see them," Mary said.

Irma's floodwaters forced the couple to completely gut and rebuild their 2,400 square foot home on Hill Road in Middleburg on the South Prong of Black Creek. The storm took with it part of Mary's family history, including letters from the 1700s and photographs from the 1800s.

"That picture of my mom in the middle is amazing," she said as she pointed to another photograph Mendel has stored under a clear plastic material atop a black backdrop to resemble the look of being underwater.

Mendel, 58, who is based in London, began the Drowning World art and advocacy project in 2007 when he photographed two floods that occurred within weeks of each other, one in the United Kingdom and the other in India. For Mendel, Drowning World is his personal response to climate

change

"And that's my dad, but you can't see his face – you can only see his one eye," she said, as Mendel looked on.

"He wasn't that handsome, anyway," Chuck said, to interject some humor into the somber gathering.

Mary said looking back over the past year and thinking about the house they had lived in flood-free since 1991, they simply did what they had to do to get through it all

"It feels amazing to be where we are now and that we can look back at it and I still will cry, but it's OK. You know, it's OK. It's just really cool to see how far we've come in the short amount of time and to look back on the sadness of it all and know that it has a happy ending," Mary said.

Along with the Highhouse family, Mendel shot photographs nearby at the home of Terrence McKeen and his mother Gloria. Mendel happened upon McKeen and his mother as they were wading to their home – near the Middleburg boat ramp – for the first time after the storm.

"They said, 'Sure, come along," Mendel said. "I walked into the house with — Terrence went in first — and he just burst into tears. I mean there was a moment there where he just sort of ... went into the home and just broke down and his mother came in and they embraced each other."

Like a modern-day storm chaser, Mendel was in Houston shooting photos of the damage from Hurricane Harvey when he got a message from Doherty, a colleague with whom he has worked on previous art projects. She allowed him to crash on her

sofa each night he was not out documenting the storm's damage.

Further down from the McKeen's home off Main Street, Mendel met the Highhouse family and got out and began taking photographs. While he did not shoot any photographs, he took possession of some old photographs to cure what he calls his fascination of how a storm event treats photography.

"Outside [the Highhouse] house, there was a team of about 30 people helping and people were going through their stuff drying it out, laying them in the yard to dry," Mendel said. "They gave me all their damaged photos along with a whole lot of other pictures laying out to dry. And there was this situation of people bringing tables back like an industrial operation and there was takeaway food."

Mendel is convinced the art of photography brings people closer together. Case in point: he said being with each subject he has photographed in such trying times creates a special bond that is indescribable. While Mendel began his career as a photojournalist, he said his "Submerged Portraits" node of the project in which he stages photographs is central to the entire climate change narrative.

"It's a kind of a chain of fate and coincidence, which brings me and my life intersecting with the lives of these people who've been flooded and, in that moment, there's a connection in a portrait, which is kind of the heart in the center, the central node of the whole project," Mendel said.

Both Mary and Chuck Highhouse said they were grateful to meet Mendel a year ago and grateful of the way he told their story. And life goes on a year after the storm.

"We're settled again. We started over after 45 years...you know, when you lose everything, it's hard. It's hard," she said.

OPMC breaks ground on 2nd ER

JACKSONVILLE – Orange Park Medical Center is adding a second stand-alone emergency room on the Westside.

Hospital officials held a groundbreaking ceremony on Aug. 29 for the new \$12 million facility at 5773 Normandy Blvd. The new 10-bed facility will join Park West ER at 6477 103rd St. as a free-standing ER facility.

"We are building this facility because families have told us they want easy access to high-quality emergency care in their neighborhood," said Chad Patrick, CEO of OPMC, in a press release.

When complete, the new facility will have 24-hour a day access with around-the-clock radiology services and board-certified emergency physicians.

"Emergency medicine is changing," said Steven Goodfriend, Emergency Services medical director of Orange Park Medical Center. "More people are going to free-standing EDs (emergency department) because of convenience."

David Castleman, division chief of rescue for the Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department, said that the area is one of the busiest areas in the city for rescues.

"It enables our rescues to get in and get out and get back in to serve the public and the 911 call volume," said Castleman.

Patrick said that within the first year of Park West being opened, it saw 39,000 patients at the facility and expect that number to rise to 56,000 this year.

"There's so much to celebrate today with this groundbreaking and I congratulate you and your staff for seeing the need for easily accessible ER care for the Westside," said Terrance Freeman, newly appointed City Council Member for District 10

The new facility is expected to employ 50 additional staff members when complete.

It is expected to open in late 2018.

OPMC opened its Park West free-standing ER in 2015 and, two years later, spent \$7 million to add 3,100 square feet and 8 new hospital beds.

Harrington called out the volunteer fire department.

In less than an hour, seven private boats were on the water searching for the girls. Deputy Harrington told the newspapers what everyone knew.

Close to shore the shallow water was innocent but the bottom shelved off quickly and dangerous currents played around the point. A boat and crew arrived from Seashole Funeral Home shortly after 5 p.m. and joined the search.

For three nights and two days, the boats moved back and forth in a designated pattern and always a crowd waited on the bank, speaking in muted voices, waiting for some sign from the boats.

Desperate onlookers summoned a priest to bless round loaves of bread with lighted candles implanted and release

them onto the water. It was believed that the bread would drift over the bodies, stop and the candles stop burning.

But, the melancholy parade of the boats continued — back and forth. In the nights, bonfires on the beach, lanterns and spiting torches allowed glimpses of the agony people shared. Images flashed of tears trailing down exhausted and drawn faces, men slumped with fatigue from holding the ropes that pulled the gruesome hooks sliding along the bottom of the river.

The bodies were found. Virginia-Lee went home to West Virginia and Ruthie was laid to rest in Magnolia Cemetery.

Fewer and fewer of the long-timers are still around to remember little Ruthie and Virginia-Lee but now you have heard the story. Remember them walking down the sun dappled two-rut dirt road, sliding their bare feet in the warm sand, with towels draped across their shoulders like little movie stars.

Mexican-style rice, romaine lettuce, seasoned chicken, black beans, corn, queso cheese sauce, fresh cilantro, tortilla chips, and a topping of her choice which could have been either Pico de Gallo, salsa or guacamole.

While Daniels chose the Tex Mex Rice Bowl, the Pulled Pork Cheesy Fries seemed to be the most popular item among students that day. This meal consists of baked fries, pulled pork, cheese sauce, jalapenos, sour cream, barbecue sauce and tortilla chips.

If neither of those meals fit their fancy, students were free to order a staple among tex-mex lovers: Nachos Supreme. As the name would imply, this dish consists of tortilla chips with all the toppings one could think of with a serving of seasoned turkey slathered on top.

Each month, the menu will change to keep things fresh for students. According to Susan Glover, the Clay County School District's director of Food and Nutrition Services, students can always expect to find healthy alternatives, in this case the turkey, as part of the meal.

"Just like with all of our meals, our goal is to give the students something that's not only tasty, but healthy as well," Glover said

According to Glover, the food truck is nothing more than an arm of the district's cafeteria system. She said both the cafeteria and The Filling Station get all of their supplies fresh and from the same source.



On top of that, the three employees manning the truck are Food and Nutrition Services employees. Furthermore, every meal at The Filling Station costs the same as a meal from the cafeteria — \$2.25. And just like the cafeteria, the food truck will provide help to those who can't afford the full price or need it for free.

"At the end of the day, [The Filling Station] really is just an extension of our school cafeterias," Glover said. "It's just another option available to students who want something different."

So far, the truck seems to be a hit, according to Glover. On Aug. 31, when the 11:40 a.m. lunch session began, all of the seniors sprinted to the truck to get in line – seniors had won a competition at a recent pep rally and as a result, they were the grade level that got to eat at the truck that day. The only real downside to the food truck currently is that it can only accommodate about 60 students each lunch session, of which there are multiple each day. Glover said because each of the meals

must be prepared ahead of time, which ensures kids aren't spending half their lunch period waiting for their food to be ready, there can only be a limited number of students served.

"...that's okay though," Glover said.
"Every student will get their chance to eat at [The Filling Station]."

Just as excited as Glover and the kids about the new food truck is Clay County Superintendent Addison Davis.

"When we started to have the vision, determining what the benefits of bringing a food truck to the students would be, I never knew walking up to the food truck, and seeing kids sprint in line to get to this new innovative menu, how awesome it would be," Davis said.

"What a fresh new way to engage kids and feed them healthy meals every day and what a great opportunity to be innovative in our approach to school food nutrition. When you look at this food truck, this is only the start of it, the start of a differentiated lunch menu, but more importantly, now, we begin our next phase."

The next phase for the food truck is its inclusion in Clay County school culinary programs. In these programs, students across the county are taught how to cook, how to prepare meals, how to best serve a meal and everything that happens in between. Davis plans for the food truck to be an extension of that program in the coming months.

"Now we let it grow legs to our culinary programs, to let students interact with it and learn hospitality among their cohorts," Davis said. "We want this in our business pathways too. Students can be actively involved to learn how to operate a business, how to prepare culinary items to customer needs, how to develop a menu and overall, practice their craft."

Davis did not have a timeline of when the food truck would be integrated into school culinary programs but said it will happen. Beyond normal school hours, Davis and Glover both hope to see The Filling Station positioned at sports games throughout the county with students eventually standing on the other side of the truck's serving windows.

According to Davis, the food truck would allow students to not only learn how to operate this business and prepare food for customers, but it would be a great way to earn volunteer hours as well.







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City turns to Peach State for new city manager

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Green Cove Springs city council members chose to replace outgoing City Manager Danielle Judd with former Kennesaw and Americus, Ga. City Manager Steve

Kennedy.

Council members voted 5-0 Sept. 4 to offer Kennedy a base salary of \$130,000 annually for three years with an Oct. 1 start date.

Judd said she would stay on inStev a consultant role for a few weeks to over-

see the transition. She announced earlier this year she would not be returning to the role. The hiring process began in May.

Kennedy, 65, previously served as the city manager of Americus, Ga. from 2015-2018 and almost 11 years as Kennesaw, Ga. city manager. He spent more than 40 years in government over five stints in

Georgia. Kennedy said Green Cove Springs appealed to him because of nearby family and the city's proximity to water. From a professional standpoint, he spoke to the growth opportunities in Green Cove Springs and he felt he was the right person to move the city to' the next level.'

"At my prior locations, I've dealt with the growth, the good and the bad, and I'm ready to help the city in any way I can moving forward. It's a good opportunity," Kennedy said. "At each location, I've used a different skill set from the toolbox in my time there."

Kennedy said Judd laid out a strong foundation for the city and he was encouraged by the councilors' preparedness and questions.

"Looking at [council members'] vision and their plan, the way they regularly review goals, strategies and tweak them to truly address what's coming up from a leadership standpoint, that's what got my interest because they understand that process and what's needed at their level in order to make the rest of the operation at the city work effectively," Kennedy said.

In April, Kennedy was fired by Americus city council members and he said the reason for his firing was unclear. He said a city manager's employment is closely tied

"[As a city manager] You can go from walking on water to being not worth anything, and it has nothing to do truly with vour abilities." Kennedy said. "It was a 4-2 vote, and all that I know was that it was without cause. That's just the way it is and the way it happens."

Mike Null, current Green Cove Springs assistant city manager and public works director, was considered for the city manager position. City council members almost uniformly ranked Kennedy first and Null second. Rounding out the final four candidates were Barrow County, Ga. Manager Mike Renshaw and Boynton Beach Assistant City Manager Colin Groff, a Green Cove Springs resident.

Null told council members the city had to be in the driver's seat for growth. He laid out the millions of dollars in projects he was involved with.

"I want to be the one to lead the city

into its next growth phase," Null said.

The candidates were interviewed for an hour and thirty minutes each on Aug. 31 and were tasked to provide a first-year game plan. The questions spanned from how candidates would handle the city's growth and hurricane experiences, to why Green Cove Springs was an ideal fit to naming the last book they read.

Doug Thomas, a senior vice president at Texas-based Strategic Government Resources that sifted through 64 applicants, presented the final candidates.

"Clearly, you've got four good candidates," Thomas said, before council members opted to offer Kennedy the position.

Council member Van Royal ranked Kennedy third, though he said Kennedy was a strong pick. Mayor Connie Butler ranked Kennedy second and Null first due to his familiarity with the city, she said.

"He's been here, and he has a passion and a hunger for it. I think he would go above and beyond," Butler said. "That was my gut feeling with Mike."

familiar here, it is popular in other states, such as California where they are highly-sought after as their popularity has grown to extraordinary heights. Sadly, as time goes on, some of these homes have lost that mid-century modern look.

"One of the houses has been so heavily renovated that it doesn't even match the description of what it used to be," Lacey said. "There are some, too, that we're [TOPMOD] worried are being sold for just the piece of land, meaning the home might soon be flattened."


It's because of this, and the historical significance, that TOPMOD, with the help of Town Council member Connie Thomas, are attempting to bring wider attention to these homes and her fellow council members.

"I wanted to begin by starting the discussion with this council about this historical treasure we have and I'm hoping we can get a board...formed out of it, so we can look deeper," Thomas said. "I want to see these homes' historical significance protected not only to preserve them, but to up the property value and the entire town as a whole."

Thomas is aware of the potential pushback she and TOPMOD might receive. She said many residents move to Orange Park to avoid regulation and restriction, but she's hoping residents and the council don't see this move as an attempt to restrict these homeowners from making the house a

home. Instead, she views this move as an attempt to enhance the value of the homes by signaling community leaders to the treasure that she and TOPMOD view these homes to be.

One of these homes, and possibly the one with the most historical significance, is the McCain home, and according to Eric Block, a former resident of the home, it contains more significance than most might think. Block lived in Orange Park from the

age of 8 to 18 while his dad worked as a Naval Captain and pilot at Naval Air Station Jacksonville. When Block was about 12, his mother became best friends with McCain's wife Carol at the time (they would get a divorce in 1980). During those years, the McCains and the Blocks would grow to be very close, so close that one year, Carol McCain would leave her kids under the care of Block's parents so that she could travel north for Christmas. Unfortunately, on that

trip, Carol would endure a terrible car accident that left her legs permanently injured. While Carol was in the hospital, and recovering afterwards, the Blocks moved into the McCain home to help Carol with the family – at the same time, McCain was being held in Vietnam as a POW.

"I spent a substantial period of my time in Orange Park growing up in that house with the McCains and from my point of view, I don't see how it's not an important part of history since not only is John an important part of history, but his wife is too," Block said.

Most know of McCain's accomplishment politically but fewer know of the political life Carol McCain led. She served as the Clay County director for Ronald Reagan's 1976 presidential campaign. A few years later, Carol would work with Reagan's wife, Nancy Reagan, as a press assistant on Reagan's 1980 presidential campaign. After Reagan won, Carol would become the director of the White House Visitors Office where she was responsible for virtually anyone looking to visit the White House, whether it be a tour or other matters.

"Carol was a big deal in Washington herself," Block said. "From a historical perspective, between the two of them, both went to Washington and both filled very important roles there. That house isn't just the previous home of John McCain – it's the previous home of Carol McCain as well and for that, it needs to be preserved. It is history."

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

Clerk of Court expands online payment system

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Clerk of Court office is making it easier for residents to pay fines to the courts after hours, 24/7.

Clerk of Court Tara S. Green said the new partnership with a service called nCourt allows those who owe fines to pay them around-the-clock.

First implemented in other Florida counties on a testing basis, nCourt showed it helped improve the number of fines that were paid on time, therefore, creating a higher level of compliance.

The new system has also been credited for lowering driver's license suspensions and contempt of court or collection agency issues

Until now, residents could only use the nCourt link and site for payment of civil traffic citations in Clay County. This newly-expanded online payment system now also includes all criminal case types as well as options to pay other citations such as game

and fish, parking, and tobacco, plus payment options for driving records, copies and driver license reinstatements.

This expanded online option also applies to making payments on approved court cost payment plans. Green and her staff are happy with the results they have seen so far.

"This is truly a win-win for everyone involved in this process," said Chief Deputy Clerk Tracie McRae. "We already see an increased level of payment compliance because the users have the convenience of making their payments any time of the day or night, without a trip to the courthouse or branch office, which are only open during the day."

The goal is to process all payments through the Clerk's Office site in an efficient and streamlined manner while preserving the integrity of the payor's credit card information. The nCourt service provides that needed level of security.

The link to the nCourt online payment website is online at www.clayclerk.com. Citizens who need to pay a citation or pay for court costs and other fines can do so by clicking on the Pay Costs & Fines button. Users will find further instructions on the nCourt website.

While payments can no longer be made through the Clerk's Office over the phone, they will still be accepted by Clerks when submitted in person at the main courthouse in Green Cove Springs and at Clerk's Office branch offices in Orange Park, Middleburg and Keystone Heights. Citizens may also make payments by phone through nCourt.



Residents pushback on CCUA 'non-offer' for water, sewer system

ORANGE PARK – Residents of Orange Park found themselves at odds with town council Tuesday night as they came forward to raise concerns about a letter town government received from the Clay County Utility Authority in June.

Clay Today published a story a few weeks ago that focused on a letter sent from CCUA Executive Director Tom Morris to Town Manager Sarah Campbell, and by proxy, the town council. In this three-page letter, Morris proposed

that CCUA take over Orange Park's water and sewer system. The letter also laid out the terms CCUA would set if Orange Park allowed the takeover. In the letter, CCUA said it would pay Orange Park \$20 million, employ all current Orange Park water utility system employees, provide faster and more efficient service and more. While not an official legal offer, it is a letter detailing all the benefits CCUA can offer for the system takeover.

When Clay Today reported on the letter, both Campbell Morris and Orange Park

Mayor Gary Meeks commented on the matter.

At the time, Campbell, Morris and Meeks said the letter was simply the start of a discussion. Campbell said the town would have to come up with its own terms and appraisal of the system if the letter was acted upon. Morris said this potential

transaction was in its first stages and is merely an offer — not a legal one, but a written on. Meeks said that before going any further with the discussion, it's important that the council hear what the town has to say first.

"I don't know

whose idea it was to make this proposal and I don't know whose idea it was to sit on this proposal from June to August," Barbara Davidson said. "[Someone told her], 'I want you to know, until I picked up the Clay Today, I had no idea that this was underway,'."

Residents who spoke on the possible offer said they had no interest in seeing CCUA acquire the town's water utility systems. Some went as far as to suggest that the council not even meet with CCUA,

which is set to happen on Sept. 18 at 5:30 n m

While Davidson was speaking, Meeks jumped in and said that the town had received no offer at all and suggested the Clay Today story was 'fake news.'

"Don't read everything," Meeks said.

"That's what they call today, 'fake news,'."

While no legal document proposing a purchase has been received by the town, the letter from Morris reads very similar to a written offer. In an August interview, Meeks called the an offer.

"We have just now decided to hold a joint meeting to learn about this and we really don't know how this is going to pan out," Meeks said in the cover story from Aug. 16. "Whether it's worth it or not, we don't really know yet. Before we take the offer, the main thing we have to do is hold the public hearings on it to figure out if the

council wants to do it and the council will make that decision based on how the town feels about it."

Shortly after referring to Clay Today as fake news, Meeks then said that no offer had been received.

"As of this morning, I talked to the town manager, and we have received no offer to purchase anything from this town," Meeks said. "They did ask if we would listen to their interests and I don't know if any interest will ever be developed out of it. I don't know if [the town council] wants to do anything."

Davidson then responded by telling the board if they have no interest in selling it, then they shouldn't even bother meeting with them, which received bouts of applause from a portion of the audience.

Council member Ron Raymond agreed and later made a motion for the council to cancel the upcoming meeting with CCUA. Meeks and Raymond voted yes to cancel meeting while council members Connie Thomas, Roland Mastandrea and Alan Watt voted to keep the meeting on the calendar.

"I don't see any problem with listening to it [what CCUA has to say]," Watt said.





Clay woman walks to raise awareness about stroke, heart health

MIDDLEBURG – Seven years ago, Bethany Fonseca could barely crawl her way to the door after having a stroke. In just a few days, she will do something she almost lost the chance to ever do again – walk.

The 35-year-old Middleburg resident had lived the first 27 years of her life relatively healthy. She didn't have any underlying diseases. She did everything doctors told her to do. Other than occasional migraines, health-related problems never found themselves at the forefront of Fonseca's life, at least not until two episodes that she unfortunately chose to ignore. The third episode would be the stroke that could have taken everything away from her.

"I think I had a couple of little episodes before the stroke, but ultimately, I just wasn't able to do anything about them at the time," Fonseca said.

The first episode happened while Fonseca was brushing her hair getting ready for work. Out of nowhere, her hand and arm went numb and she dropped the brush. The numbness went away a few minutes later and she continued with her business. A couple months later, something similar happened again. Fonseca grabbed her keys to take her dog outside

and while walking down the apartment stairs, she dropped her keys. This time, her hand was so numb that she couldn't position her fingers around the keys to pick them up

"Probably at that point, I would have gone to the doctor or the emergency room, but I had my kids with me and it was really late at night, so I was like, 'you know what, I'm just going to go to bed and see how I feel the next day,'," Fonseca said. "That was the second episode and again, I ignored it. The third one was a few months later and that was the big one; that was the stroke."

On the morning of the stroke, Fonseca had a friend over at her apartment. While sitting and chatting, Fonseca noticed that she had a headache, but for her, headaches were nothing new. Again, she ignored it. Shortly after her friend left, Fonseca went to go take a shower. As soon as she bent down to draw the shower, the room started spinning.

"My vision was all but gone," Fonseca said. "It was very blurry but I could make out the M of my friend's name on my phone so I was able to call her and I said, 'hey, something's not right and you need to come over.'."

Fonseca's friend had every intention of making her way inside to help Fonseca but when she arrived at the apartment, the door was locked

"I had to literally army crawl my way from the back of my apartment all the way to the front and the only one home at the time was my dog," Fonseca said. "Every time I would collapse, he would nudge me in the rear to get me going and to get me up, and by the time I got to the front door, I only had enough strength to reach up and unlock the door to let [my friend] in."

Once her friend was inside, she called 9-1-1 and in no time, Fonseca was being cared for at Baptist South. She doesn't remember anything that happened that night, but she distinctly remembers waking up to the sound of doctors talking. They explained that all of the tests showed she was OK and because of that, they were going to release her.

"You're not sending me anywhere," Fonseca recalls telling the doctors. "I've had migraines my entire life and not once have they ever been like this so until you figure out what's going on, I'm not going home. I refuse."

As a result, a neurologist was called in to do a stroke assessment and almost immediately, due to Fonseca's lack of complete feeling down the right side of her body, the neurologist determined that Fonseca had a massive stroke. She was rushed to the Intensive Care Unit.

"I can't imagine what my life, if any, would have been like if they sent me home," Fonseca said.

From this point forward, the next few months of her life would be the toughest Fonseca had ever lived. She could no longer take care of her two girls, 5-year-old twins who had just began kindergarten. She could no longer work. She couldn't even go to the grocery store to buy food. To help, Fonseca's mom flew in from Texas to help care for her. Fonseca's work friends, who she calls family, helped her with anything she needed too. She said if it wasn't for her friends, she wouldn't have made it.

It's been seven years since Fonseca suffered a stroke and today, she's happy to be living the life she once had. Although some things have changed — such as a new diagnosis of an autoimmune disorder. Now she has extended bouts of fatigue, but

sicknesses stay longer than usual as her body is less capable of fighting off illness. She doesn't let it get her down, though.

"If that's all I have to deal with after the stroke, that's fine by me," Fonseca said. "My life could be significantly worse."

Today, Fonseca is back at work with her twins back by her side, and they'll be walking by her side in the Sept. 15 First Coast Heart Walk. The 2018 walk marks the event's 25th anniversary, but it will be the first time Fonseca will be participating with her daughters by her side.

"I do the walk every year, but this is the first time my girls will be doing it too," Fonseca said. "They're 12 now so it's not cool to like mom, but I think they'll be really excited to do it with me. They understand now what it means."

Each year, the American Heart Association teams up with hundreds of residents of the First Coast like Fonseca to use the walk to spread awareness of heart disease and stroke. The money raised helps fund research that can lead to new technologies to catch both heart disease and strokes before they ever happen, among other things. Since the start of the Heart Walk, of which there are over 300 held nationwide each year, in 1993, mortality rates from cardiovascular disease and stroke have dropped 45 percent.

The First Coast Heart Walk will be held on Saturday, Sept. 15, at Jackson-

ville's Metropolitan Park and includes either a three-mile walk designated for any participant or a one-mile stretch of walk designated specifically for survivors. Over the past 25 years, the American Heart Association and the American Stroke Association have funded \$3.4 billion for research. Every day, about 2,150 Americans die from heart disease. The American Heart Association said it's the No. 1 killer in the U.S. and takes the lives of about 219,000 each year. For anyone wanting to walk, individuals and teams can still register online at www.firstco-astheartwalk.org.

Fonseca, who walks each year with Brooks Rehabilitation, the site of her physical therapy located off University Boulevard, is proud to participate each year. For her, it's a way to open the eyes of someone who might not recognize the signs of what's to come, much like her younger self.

"I think it's important to get out there and raise more awareness," Fonseca said. "It was a big eye opener for me and I learned that a stroke can happen at any age. [Strokes] don't discriminate. They don't care about your race, your gender, your lifestyle. It can happen to anyone and if what happened to me can save even just one person, then it's all worth it."

"The stroke I had doesn't define me," Fonseca said. "It's not who I am - it's a tool to help others."

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Upcoming events on how to become a better steward of your landscape

wrote two new books that were published this spring adding to 3 my previously published Florida gardening books. I will be hitting the road this fall on a book tour (aka #FloweredShirtTour) and will be doing presentations and running

workshops from Panama City to Miami. This is when I find out, yet again, how big our state really is. But I also have a fair number of local events as part of the mix.

My first new book: "A Stepby-Step Guide to a Florida Native

Landscape," a University Press of Florida book, which I coauthored with Marjorie Shropshire. This book answers the question, "I have a small yard filled with exotic plants. How do I transform it to a sustainable, easy-to-care-for native landscape?"

To answer that question, we created a typical 1/3 of an acre lot and went through the steps to "Nativize" it. We started with assessment and then discussed various strategies to help readers create a resil-

ient and long-lasting landscape that provides habitat for bird and butterflies but will still be accepted in any neighborhood.

We also answered the question "Why

Many Floridians are adding more Florida native plants to their landscapes. The reasons for this trend vary widely, but here are some. To reduce maintenance costs—both time and money, to reduce irrigation and water use, to reduce pollution and runoff for the sake of nearby waterways, to attract birds, to use fewer pesticides—organic or not—for health reasons, to save monarch butterflies and other pollinators, to reduce utility bills by cooling the air and shading south or western exposures, to reduce frostrations with dealing with poor turf grass condition and to create an authentic Florida yard.

The second new book: "Climate-Wise Landscaping: Practical Actions for a Sustainable Future" with Sue Reed, a landscape Architect in Massachusetts, and a foreword by Doug Tallamy. Published by New Society Press in BC Canada. Color photos throughout. Sue and I did not debate climate change, but took a proactive and optimistic approach, with hundreds of actions that property owners or managers (homeowners, communities, churches, and municipalities) can take right now to accomplish at least one of 3 objectives: 1) help the landscape survive climate change, 2) help wildlife survive climate change, 3) help to mitigate climate change.

While this book is not specifically for Florida, our state certainly is at risk in the

face of climate change with rising seas, longer droughts, and bigger, more erratic storms. While one landscape may not seem

to make a significant dent in the climate, there are many millions of gardeners and landscapers. If we all work together in our neighborhoods and communities, the difference will be huge.

Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights, and Human Rights to testify on solitary confinement and women prisoners, and by the U.S. Senate Governmental Affairs and Homeland Security Committee to testify about the Federal Bureau of Prisons.

"We have the biggest prison population in the world. We have the biggest prison population in human history here in the United States," Kerman said. "The fastest-growing segment of our criminal justice system and that prison population has been women. Female incarceration has risen by 800 percent in this country... I believe that we've reached a point in this country where most people are questioning whether we have made the best choices."

JALA's Equal Justice Awards includes the presentation of the Robert J. Beckham Equal Justice Award, named for a former JALA board member and longtime supporter. It is bestowed on a person or organization who has notably promoted the cause of equal justice for low-income residents of Northeast Florida.

"He's dealt with change that came from growth and external issues that came from growth," Timberlake said.

After more than seven years with Green Cove Springs, Judd said the city provided a strong base for Kennedy to start with.

"When you have a transition between managers, it's important to have that stability and I know that's there," Judd said.





Choose wisely: buying the right plant

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – If you walk into a garden center or nursery, the options in Florida can be overwhelming. There are hundreds of varieties of trees, shrubs, flowers and grasses available, so the question comes up: "What do I look for?"

Choose Plants for Your Yard

The first step in determining if the plant that catches your eye will work for you is to ask "Will it work for me?" Think about the mature size of the plant in the space you want to plant it as well as its needs. You will always have poor results if you try to put a specimen in a location where it does not get the right amount of light or moisture. Also, make sure the plant will survive our winters or summers. Clay County is in USDA Hardiness zone 9a, so if the plant's tag does not have this in its range, stay away unless you can protect it. For example, a plant with a range of 8-11 would work well but ones that list 6-8 would struggle through our summers and those with 10-11 will not make it through the winter outside.

Finally, do some research before you buy a certain variety and look for common issues such as pests and diseases. For

some plants they have been specifically bred to reduce these problems and may be a better choice than older, more susceptible varieties.

Knowing your yard and its characteristics will make this easier and if you put the right plant in the right place, you will have good landscape success, less maintenance and hopefully save you some money.

Choosing the Best Plants

After choosing your specimens, look at each plant available to choose the best for your landscape. Choose those that have the best overall form and health. Check for insect pests, leaf spots and other diseases

and avoid these specimens. Also stay away from those that look heavily stressed or wilted. While the discount section may seem tempting, you may be bringing extra work upon yourself or bringing pests and diseases into your landscape.

Plant size should also be a consideration at the nursery as well. If a plant is too large for its container, it will have more trouble during the establishment period once you take it out of its intensive irrigation and place it in your yard as the foliage can be too much for the roots to support with water uptake.

Also, stay away from trees and shrubs with circling roots. These have been in a

container for too long and are less likely to survive in the landscape as the roots continue to grow in that direction and do not spread out. Also, when selecting flowering plants, look for those that have plenty of unopened buds left instead of those in full bloom. Plants that are sold after their blooming period may be great, discounted additions to the landscape but you will have to have patience for the next years bloom.

Finding Plant Sources

If you do some research, you may find you have several options within the county and region to find your landscape plants. Check your yellow pages as well as nursery grower organizers such as the Florida Nursery Growers and Landscaper Association and the Florida Association of Native Nurseries for local members.

Finally, plant sales to support local schools and organizations can be a good source as well such as our 4th Annual UF/IFAS Clay County Master Gardener Plant Sale being held on Sept. 8 from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. at our office, 2463 State Rd. 16W, Green Cove Springs.





Eagles stumble with costly miscues

JACKSONVILLE – Traveling into Duval one week after the Fleming Island Golder Eagles opened their season with a home victory, the team knew they faced a stout opponent in the Sandalwood Saints who also opened their season with a victory at Ribault. There could only be one unbeaten

left standing in the end. Marred with mistakes and opportunities left on the table, Fleming Island would mark their first loss of the season as they took until the second half of the game to get their house in order and put points on the board.

"A lot of mistakes, a lot of mis-read keys, just a bunch of mistakes. I don't know what it was but that just wasn't our same team that was playing the past two weeks" said Fleming Island Head Coach Damenyum Springs.

After 24 minutes of play, down 29-0, the deficit was too great for the team to overcome. Even holding the Saints scoreless in the third quarter wasn't enough to bounce back as Fleming Island would go down 35-13 to even their season at 1-1.

The Golden Eagles started with a positive as they won the coin toss and deferred receiving until the second half. On Sandalwood's opening drive, it only took two plays for Fleming Island to come up big when Saints Junior Quarterback Jeff Sims misfired and was picked off by Andrew Thomas. The pick would set the Golden Eagles up with a first and 10 on the Sandalwood 26. Two runs and an incomplete pass to Sam Snyder would leave Springs with an easy decision to take the points with a field goal. Kicker Zachary Fletcher launched a 36 yard attempt that had plenty of distance, but veered wide right.

Missed opportunity number one.

Sandalwood taught Fleming Island a lesson on second chances by marching down the field with a mix of quick hit passes and darting runs to go 80 yards for their first score at 7:01. The bright spot was a blocked point after by Fleming's Jaelin Blount to keep the score at 6-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, Fleming started off on the 20, and on first down saw a streaking Sam Snyder wide open. Quarterback Dean Hyams placed the ball perfectly, hitting Snyder in stride. After the catch, Saints defender Adam Burns stripped the ball with a hook from behind.

Missed opportunity number two.

With the recovery, the Saints again marched 58 yards in large part with a 33-yard reception that put the score at 13-0 after the good point after. The Golden Eagles took the ball back, and turned to game standout Aaron Ramirez who hooked up with a screen pass for +9, and reception for another 20 yards. Dewayne McBride did some heavy lifting of his own to carry the ball five times on the drive to get Fleming Island to a third and eight to go on the 18. The incomplete pass set up an Avery Coussens field goal attempt that would go wide left.

With 1:12 still left in the first quarter, Fleming Island's third missed opportunity had the team reeling.

The second quarter saw Saints QB Sims pick apart Fleming Island's secondary with

a pass release from snap to reception in under 1.5 seconds.

"We had pressure on him early, we had him wrapped up early, but we just couldn't tackle him," said Springs. "We didn't tackle well and he's a division one caliber athlete and he outplayed us."

The quick hits to Saints Taylin Nalls, Kaleb Parker, and Javonte Kinsey could not be adjusted to quickly enough and had the Golden Eagles back on their heels the entire first half. Before defenders could get near their receivers, the ball was already in their hands and they were turning upfield

In eight plays, it was 19-0 and a twopoint conversion made it 21-0. Fleming Island answered with a six play drive that stalled and ended in a punt.





Out patterns to Calise and Isaac Chaffin kept the ball moving and clock stopping before Huff went over the middle to Jackson on a post pattern that created a collision with safety Ian Willey that knocked Jackson unconscious. After a delay, Jackson was removed via ambulance and Willey was ejected.

Huff quickly quelled the Creekside fans,




