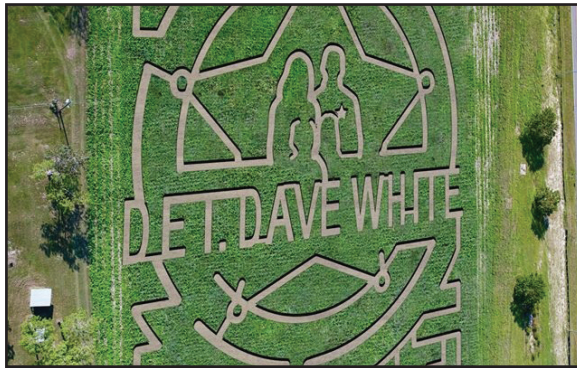


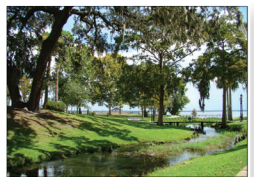

ORANGE PARK – Jack Davitt, a Clay County Navy veteran of 30 years, has lived with back pain from degenerative discs for years. After disappointing results from virtually all types of treatment, he's looking to one final drug to ease his pain – medical marijuana.

Davitt attended the Sept. 27 grand opening of Atlanta-based Surterra Wellness, Orange Park's first and only medical marijuana facility. Like many attendees,

Florida Supreme Court refuses to hear county judge legal battle

TALLAHASSEE – A months-long fight to have her candidacy recognized and her name on the upcoming ballot for a judge seat in Clay County has ended for Lucy Hoover after the Florida Supreme Court refused to review her case Oct. 2.

In June, Clay County Court Judge Kristina Mobley, who was facing her first time up for re-election, sued Hoover, her only opponent. Mobley's suit claimed Hoover failed to properly qualify to be on the ballot.

"In the end, I'm very proud of the fight, but I am disappointed in the outcome," Hoover said. "I'm more disappointed, though, for the voters of Clay County. This wasn't about me. It was about the right of the voters to have and make a choice in the election."

Her argument boiled down to the premise that Hoover simply failed to not only properly complete all necessary candidate paperwork but did not turn the paperwork in on time as well. Hoover, on the other hand, said because she was in the office filling out the necessary paperwork at the time of the deadline, she should be allowed

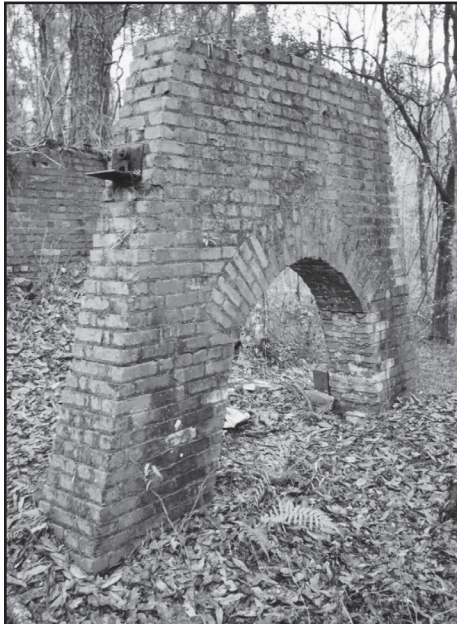
Doctors Inlet was home to brickyard for almost two decades

In 1925, Jacksonville real estate developers Gamble and Stockton launched plans to build their Mediterranean style subdivision, San Marco, and began construction of a brickyard in neighboring Clay County.

They shrewdly wanted to avoid heavy competition for materials from Miami developers where the design style was proving to be a roaring success. It was a perfect site with large deposits of perfectly suited clay, and adjacent to the Atlantic Coastline Railway providing inexpensive transport to their building project and the possibility of vast distribution.

At peak operation, the plant produced more than 80,000 brick and hollow core tile a day making it one of the largest manufacturing plants in the state. Almost as an afterthought the plant produced clay cups in high demand by the turpentine industry and shipped throughout the southeast.

A series of huge buckets mounted on a conveyor belt scooped chunks of rich red earth and dumped it with a damp thud into rail cars powered by teams of mules along an elevated rail track into the manufacturing area.



This graceful yet utilitarian arch was one of dozens supporting the elevated tram track of the Gamble Stockton Brick Factory, located eastward off today's College Drive in the area of Northglen subdivision.

The clay was packed into shaped trays or forms to produce brick, hollow core tile or turpentine cups. Then, it was stacked on

rail cars and progressed to the long drying tunnels. Moving out of the factory area, the cars began their slow progression through one of the long drying tunnels where it moved over continually smoldering trenches continually removing moisture.

The next step was movement by rail to the large beehive shaped kilns for the final cure. These ovens operated through the night with their coal fires constantly monitored and tended to maintain critical temperatures. Finished product traveled by railcar along Stockton Gamble's spur line to the nearby Atlantic Coastline Railway for dispatch north and south.

The man-made portions of the complex were a testament to the pride in craftsmanship of the builders of the times. Decorative patterns combining brick and hollow core tile were woven at the corners of the large two-story office building facing present day College Drive. Even the utilitarian arches supporting the elevated tram line were laid in the traditional English pattern popular in the early 1800s.

Although strictly utilitarian, the structures had both dignity and presence.

With the coming of the depression

years in the 1930s, the company changed hands several times but continued to operate. In 1943, when owned by Florida Brick and Tile it was heavily damaged by a fire and ceased manufacturing.

For over five decades the graceful brick bones of a vast manufacturing operation sat hidden in the silent woods known only by occasional adventurous youngsters who fancied exploring and teenagers in search of a trysting place. The voracious Florida vegetation draped the scorched and broken walls with vine, saplings grew into trees to collapse the drying tunnels and soft blankets of leaves hid much of the mound for the rail line to the ovens.

Visible reminders were few. Brickyard Road ran east off today's College Dr. and three charming red brick cottages sat along its beginning. Across the road several round domed bee hive looking structures surely puzzled newcomers. The cottages had been employee housing for critical onsite workers and the "gnome" houses were kilns for high temperature curing.

Ironically, the road is more well-known than the factory thanks to the famous southern rock band, Lynyrd Skynyrd.

Villas Continental sells for \$10.55 million

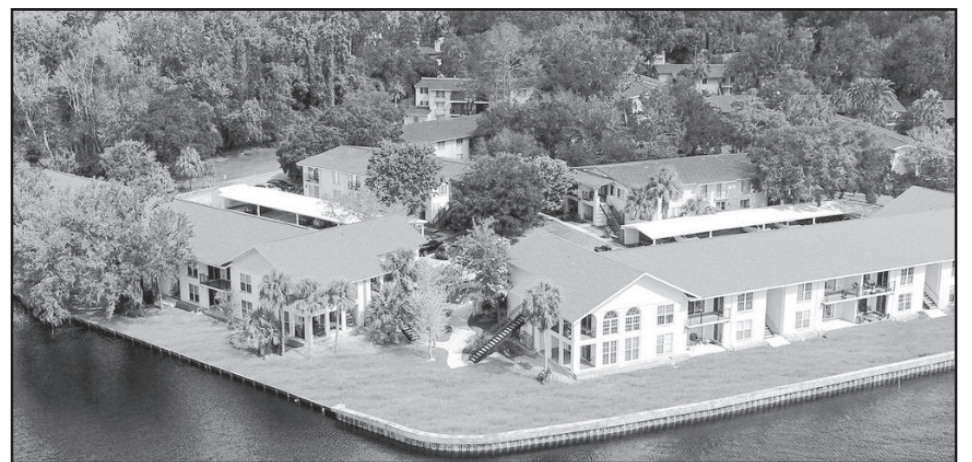
ORANGE PARK – Representatives from Colliers International Northeast Florida brokered the \$10.55 million sale of Villas Continental, a fractured apartment community on the St. Johns River in Orange Park.

Venterra Realty Inc. purchased the community from TR Jax, LLC. Bradley Coe, Morgan Williams and Douglas Blair, directors of multifamily investment services for Colliers International Northeast Florida, represented Venterra Realty Inc., in the transaction. Josh Nugent and Liz Bobeck, realtors with Berkshire Hathaway Florida Network Realty, represented the seller. The sale closed on Sept. 27.

The community consists of 84 apartment rental units out of a total of 99 units. The

remaining 15 units are fee-simple owned condominium residences. Villas Continental is located within the footprint of Club Continental, a luxury private resort and club that includes a boutique hotel and event venue.

The concrete block community was constructed in the late 1960s and consists of 12 two-story rental buildings, a fitness center, a protected yacht basin and a permitted marina. The unit mix comprises six one-bedroom units, 43 two-bedroom units and 35 three-bedroom units, with a blended average unit size of 1,192 square feet. All of the rental unit interiors were previously upgraded with high-end finishes such as granite countertops, stainless steel appliances, nickel fixtures and enhanced lighting



and flooring materials.

Villas Continental represents the second fractured community that Venterra has purchased in metro Jacksonville in the past year. The Colliers International Northeast Florida multifamily team assisted Venterra in purchasing Cobblestone at Eagle Harbor, a 190-unit fractured community located on Fleming Island, in October 2017.

"The two fractured communities are

strong additions to Venterra's existing portfolio of holdings in Jacksonville, which includes two additional conventional apartment communities totaling 520 units," said Coe. "The Orange Park submarket continues to perform strongly from a multifamily fundamentals perspective, with rental rate growth of 7.2 percent over the past 24 months and a present vacancy rate of 2.5 percent."

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Amendment polling vote on drilling, vaping bans could be close

Offshore drilling, fracking and vaping? All the practices draw out detractors, especially in Florida.

But a poll by the Florida Chamber of Commerce shows it may be a close call whether voters will ban all three with a single constitutional amendment.

The Chamber poll, obtained by Florida Politics, shows 50 percent of those surveyed ready to vote “Yes” on Amendment 9, with 34 percent planning to vote “No.”

That means of just those who have an opinion on the measure, just under 60 percent plan to support the amendment. But it takes at least 60 percent approval for the amendment to change Florida’s constitution.

The poll finds 14 percent of voters remain undecided. Should voters break in favor of the amendment, that should give the needed lift for the measure’s passage. But if they break “No” on 9, the amendment will likely fail.

The Chamber poll found a lower number of undecided voters regarding this constitutional amendment than it did for anything besides the popular Amendment 1, which increases Florida’s homestead exemption and boasts 60-27 support according to the poll.

If passed, Amendment 9 would prohibit oil or natural gas exploration and extraction in Florida state waters.

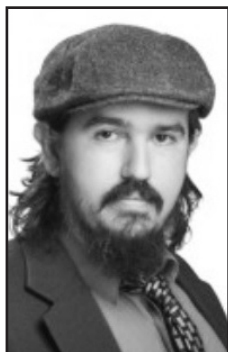
Notably, opposition to drilling since the Deepwater Horizon oil disaster largely shored up again in Florida, and it reaches across party lines.

Both Democratic gubernatorial candidate Andrew Gillum and Republican gubernatorial candidate Ron DeSantis, for example, voiced opposition to offshore drilling from the campaign trail this year.

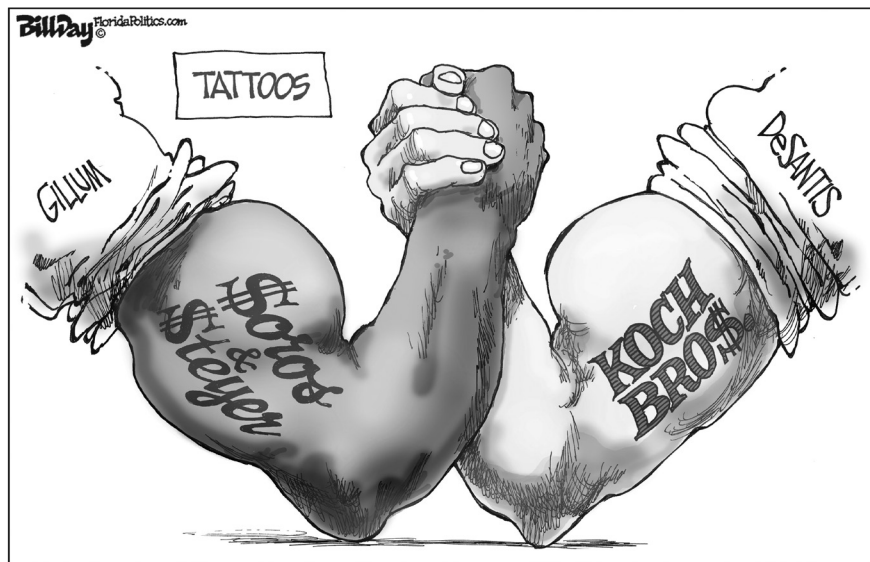
But bundled in the same amendment, there would also be a ban on use of vapor-generating electronics, including electronic cigarettes and pipes, in any enclosed indoor workplaces.

The ban is similar to a ban on smoking tobacco in the workplace, passed in 2002 by 71 percent of voters.

The Florida Chamber Poll was conducted Sept. 19-24 and includes responses from 622 voters, of whom 41.5 percent

This page continues to be the public’s page. The Opinions page is simply that – a place where opinions are shared. Not every opinion shared is going to make everyone happy all of the time. The purpose of the Opinions page is to make people think, and then if needed, have them take action.

And because we are a local paper, we ask that the Letters or Columns or whatever you decide to rush out and not to send in this time, stick to subjects that matter here in Clay County. There is tremendous change slowly taking place in Clay County.

The unemployment rate for Clay County is at an extraordinarily low level (3.3 percent for August 2018, compared to 3.9 percent in August 2017), however, still more than 60 percent of our residents commute outside of the county for jobs. The local housing construction industry is back up and running steadily and there’s this ginormous (yeah, I used a non-word, word) roadway – the First Coast Expressway – under construction that is going to dramatically change our little hamlet forever. No turning back.

With those changes, look for more residents, more traffic, possibly crowded schools, possibly more crime. And with those issues facing us, elected officials who make decisions about roads and building new schools will be forced to wrangle with funding and creative

were registered Democrats and 40.5 percent were registered Republican, with 18 percent not belonging to one of the major parties. The poll has a margin of error of 4.4 percentage points.

Meanwhile, a separate Florida Chamber of Commerce poll shows voters favor three constitutional amendments that reduce taxes or make it harder to increase them. But only one of those amendments, Amendment 1, polls at the required level for passage.

A majority of voters favor passage of Amendment 1, a near-majority support Amendment 2, and a solid plurality support Amendment 5, according to the poll. All three of those amendments, which appear on ballots statewide on Nov. 6, relate to taxation.

About 60 percent of voters polled plan to vote ‘Yes’ and support Amendment 1, which if passed will bring the maximum homestead exemption in the state from \$50,000 to \$75,000 on homes assessed at more than \$100,000. The poll shows 27 percent will vote ‘No’ and 12 percent remain unsure.

But even if all undecided voters end up voting against the amendment, it still would meet the 60-percent threshold required for passage.

Amendment 2, which would make per-

30 Years ago, 1988

Two-term incumbent George A. Bush announced he would seek a third term on the Clay County School Board District 2 Seat.

Green Cove Springs City Council unanimously approved its new budget that set the millage rate at 2.611 mills, which reflected a 20.6 percent increase before considering the rolled back rate.

Renee E. Daigle, daughter of John L. and Jane C. Daigle, of Green Cove Springs, was accepted into the U.S. Military Academy’s Corps of Cadets.

40 years ago, 1978

Orange Park Town Council set its property tax millage rate at 3.4 mills that would bring in a projected \$405,563 for an increase of \$97,059 from its 1977-78 budget.

The Clay County Development Authority board voted to accept Gate Petroleum of Jacksonville’s \$6,000 per acre offer to buy four acres of land in the CCDA’s indus-

manent a tax cap on annual assessments for non-homesteaded properties (excluding school taxes), has the support of 50 percent of voters surveyed, while another 25 percent plan to vote against the measure and 24 percent remain unsure.

That likely puts the measure on the road to passage – winning 2-to-1 passes the 60-percent mark easily.

But the measure will need 60 percent of voters who weigh in on the question to support the measure, so if voters break against the amendment, passage could turn dicey.

A plurality of voters also supports Amendment 5, which would require a two-thirds vote of the Florida Legislature to enact or increase taxes and fees. The poll shows 45 percent of voters will vote “Yes,” with 36 percent voting “No.” Another 18 percent remain undecided.

That means of those who have an opinion on the measure, just 56 percent favor the amendment, short of the amount of votes required to make it part of the Florida Constitution.

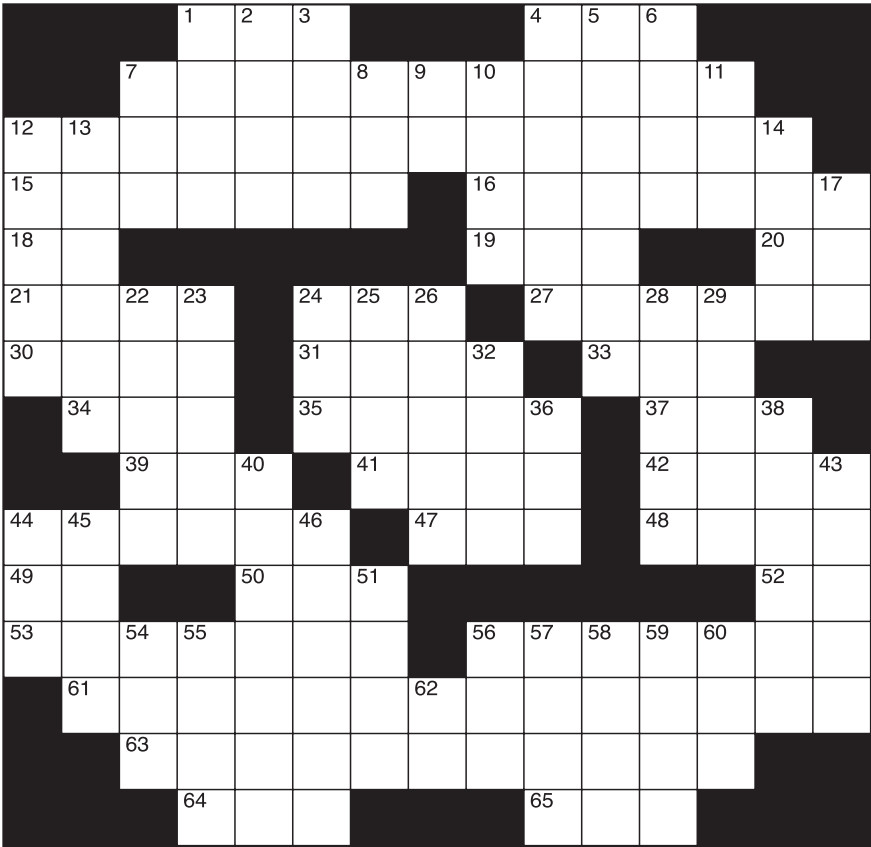

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New climbing wall helps kids safely 'monkey around'

FLEMING ISLAND – With assistance from physical and occupational therapists, children persistently weaved in out and around Wolfson Children's Rehab-Clay's new climbing apparatus on Tuesday.

The \$4,000 contraption, complete with ball pit, rock climbing wall and monkey bars for children with brain injuries or neurological disorders, was donated by Epic Theatres at Oakleaf and the Variety Club of Florida.

Terri Tomlinson, a clinical manager and speech pathologist at Wolfson, said she was thankful for the donation and the addition of the therapy tool will help kids with several activities.

"There's a whole variety of things to do on there," Tomlinson said.

Variety Club Director of Fundraising Richard Goldstein said the organization asked Wolfson what equipment they wanted after a large fundraising drive at the movie theater.

"We gave an adaptive bike to Wolfson in Jacksonville, and Wolfson Clay asked for a climbing wall," Goldstein said. "I've never seen anything like this. It took a while with all the parts to get set up, but this is marvelous."

The climbing system helps patients improve motor skills, endurance, mobility, coordination and strength, said physical therapist Peggy Glatz.

"It's great for strengthening arms, legs, core, coordination, motor planning and trying to figure out how they're going to get up to the top and how they're going to get down safely," Glatz said. "It's been a blessing and it's been wonderful."

Some children traverse across monkey bars before diving into a ball pit, others scale the rock wall. Therapists place a ball at the top of a wall for Sheryl Lowentzen's 5-year-old son, Easton, who has down syndrome. He tackles the wall with aplomb, raising his fist when he retrieves the ball.

"All that climbing can really strengthen them and make those skills better,"

Lowentzen said. "They love it."

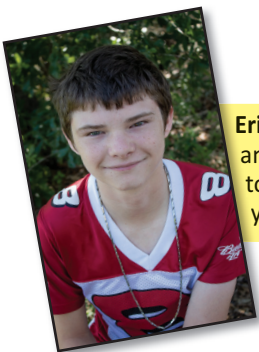
Julie Saldivar's son Dylan, 5, who has autism, she said the donation was a fantastic addition to Wolfson Clay.

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Shady past leads to teaching certificate denial

ORANGE PARK – An Orange Park man with a felony criminal history will not become a Clay County educator after the Florida Department of Education denied his application for a Florida educator’s certificate.

Samuel Carothers Keator II, 42, recently applied for a Florida educator’s certificate and on Sept. 19, was denied after a Sept. 5 hearing he did not attend. The Education Practices Commission of the State of Florida said Keator, who has both felony and misdemeanor charges on his record, lacks the “good moral character required to be a Florida Certified Educator.”

Keator’s charges date back to as early as May 24, 1999 for a misdemeanor charge for passing a worthless check. An earlier charge was redacted from the file. Less than two months later, Keator was arrested for a felony grand theft, according to the ruling.

Then, on November 22, 1999, Keator committed the felony crime of organized scheme to defraud. That December, Keator was charged with another misdemeanor charge of passing a worthless check, according to the DOE investigative report. After that charge, Keator wouldn’t be charged again until 2009. On June 16, 2009, he was found guilty of two misde-

meanor charges of passing a worthless check, according to the ruling.

On May 25, 2013, Keator was arrested after committing grand theft and computer crime to defraud or obtain property, both felony crimes, according to the Orange Park Police Department report. On May 25, the owner of Southern Cross Total Lawn Care, the company Keator worked for at the time, contacted police after somebody used his company card to steal \$403 from an ATM in the Kingsley Avenue Walgreens. Police spoke with the manager of the Walgreens and used video surveillance footage to identify Keator as the suspect.

According to the police report, Keator must have overheard his employer say the company card’s PIN number. The report also said the company never authorized Keator to use the card. When police questioned Keator about the incident, he admitted the crime. Police said Keator said he was aware he was not authorized to use the card did so anyway to pay his electric and cable bill.

Keator would run into the law again on July 16, 2013, when he was arrested for petit theft by knowingly calling a taxi without the intent to pay, according to the police report.

On that day, police spoke with the taxi driver who said he picked up Keator in his taxi at Orange Park Medical Center. The taxi drove Keator to 901 North Orange Ave. in Green Cove Springs, the Clay County Jail. Upon arrival, the driver told Keator the fare was \$30.09, which Keator admitted he had no money and could not pay.

According to the police report, when of-

ficers spoke to Keator about this taxi ride, he said he was recently released from jail on charges of grand theft and computer crime and was on probation.

“He stated he had no where to go, no money and no food,” states the police report. “He said he felt desperate and didn’t know where to tun.”

In this desperation, Keator unsuccessfully attempted to get his probation officer to violate him and have him arrested. After that, Keator told police he called for a taxi to take him to the Clay County Jail because he knew that if he didn’t pay the fare, he would be arrested, according to the police report.

Years after those incidents, Keator applied for a Florida Educator’s Certificate and because of the crimes in his past, was

denied a certificate. The Florida Department of Education ordered that Keator is denied issuance of a Florida educator’s certificate and barred from reapplying for one year, effectively a one-year probation period. During this period, Keator must pay a \$500 administrative fine. This file also lists seven additional orders that Keator must follow if he is ever employed in a position that requires a Florida educator’s certificate. In the event Keator is hired by a private or public school for a position that requires a teaching certificate, he will be placed on a highly-monitored two-year probation period that includes paying a monthly administrative fee of \$150 for the first six months of teaching. He must also remain crime-free and complete in-service coursework on education ethics.

Road resurfacing discussed at town hall meeting

FLEMING ISLAND – Clay County has millions of dollars’ worth of road resurfacing in its future and it has allocated \$5 million to sooth the problem this year. With hundreds of roads in need of resurfacing, where do they start?

The solution is a ranking system based on six criteria: oxidation of the asphalt, cracking of the asphalt, the cuts patches and potholes, the asphalt’s depressions and rutting, the “Ride ability” and overall traffic volume.

The lower the ranking, the worse condition the road is. For example, in the latest rankings on the county’s website, stretches of County Road 315C, Circle Ridge Drive and Water Mill Drive were given a score of 31 and a high priority from the Clay County Public Works.

Public Works Director Dale Smith said significant wear on roads is expected after a few decades. Roadways and intersections are worn by frequent stopping and starting and from petroleum products. Florida receives a high amount of water – an average of 52 inches of rainfall per year – which seeps under base of roads and eats at the base of a road, he said.

“For a local road, you get 25-30 years max before you have to resurface it, because asphalt roadways are considered flexible pavement, so they’re actually giving every time you drive on them,” Smith said.

Smith said the county received a battering from Hurricane Irma, which certainly didn’t help. He added that water damaged older roads in the county.

“Irma was not our friend,” Smith said. “It flooded, but it got the ground so saturated, there are still areas you walk on and that water has killed the lime rock.”

Last year, the \$5 million got as far as resurfacing 39 roads, County Commissioner Mike Cella told residents at a town hall Sept. 27 on Fleming Island.

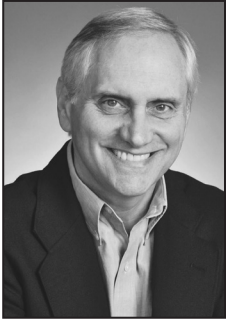
“Typically, the past two years, roads that are in the 30s-point totals, those are the ones we’re getting done first,” Cella said. “A million dollars doesn’t go as far you think when you’re repaving roads.”

Cella said the point system eliminated a political aspect of the rankings for the counties’ 775 roads, where different parties may lobby road elected officials in hopes of resurfacing in certain districts.


“The subjectivity is sort of gone[by using the point system],” Cella said. “It’s very objective, it’s fact-based how (public works) does it.”

The rankings will fluctuate, however. Maintaining Clay County’s thousands of miles of roads is an endless task, a bit like maintaining a house, Smith said.

“Your road may move up the list, or a few roads may have degradation to the point where they’re worse than yours,” Smith said. “It’s not a first come first basis. The worst comes first.”

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Alas! River Road to get almost \$2 million upgrade

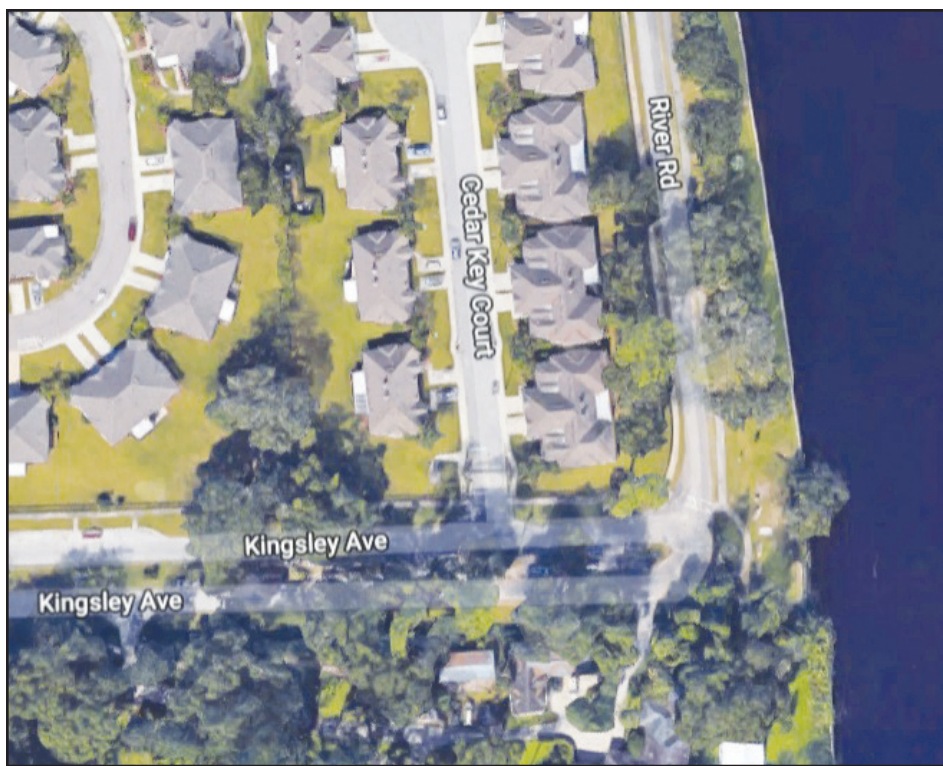
ORANGE PARK – Three years since the conception of the project, Orange Park's River Road will finally see its massive face-lift come to fruition.

In 2012, Orange Park Town Council requested a pavement analysis of all town streets, which ended with 26 roads identified as being in poor or very poor condition. As a result, the town implemented a resurfacing and general street-repair program for all of these roads. As of last December, only eight roads remained in the poor category. One of those roads is River Road, but after a motion that passed 3-1 at Town Council's Oct. 2 meeting, with council member Connie Thomas absent, the project contract has finally been awarded.

Jacksonville-based contractor J.B. Coxwell Contracting was awarded the bid for the \$1.95 million resurfacing project. The project includes pavement removal and reconstruction, pavement milling and resurfacing, drainage modifications, new curbs and gutters, a new sidewalk, the removal and replacement of residential driveways,

the replacement of water mains, fire hydrants and water services, and the replacement of the sanitary force main.

"Different things happen in different sections of the road, but overall the residents' wishes were 18 feet wide, so 9-foot lanes, and a 6-foot walking path," said

Town Manager Sarah Campbell. "There are no trees that have to be removed as part of the project, although we do have some that are diseased that we may address during the project."

This project, which is approximately 1.36 miles in length, will take about rough-

ly eight months to complete. However, town officials do not have an exact start date yet. A start date won't be announced for at least a month as a pre-construction meeting must be held first, Campbell said.

While the motion to award the contract was passed, it wasn't without a fair share of pushback from residents beforehand. Residents and council members spent more than an hour of the meeting discussing the contract. According to some River Road residents, the inclusion of ribbon curbing, a special type of curb that stabilizes pavement and prevents the edges of asphalt from crumbling, was tacked on to the contract at the last minute.

However, town council meeting minutes as far back as June indicate that the council spoke with River Road residents about the use of ribbon curbing. Some argues that the ribbon curbing unnecessarily inflated the cost of the project. Without the

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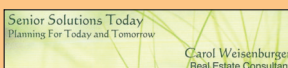
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Crop maze honors slain detective David White

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — In the top corner of the Amazing Grace Family Farms' Crop Maze is a badge number. "Romans 12:21" is carved into the maze, referencing a Bible verse about triumphing over evil, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

The maze is designed to honor Clay County Sheriff's Detective Dave White who was shot and killed during a Middleburg drug raid in 2012. He was 35.

Kelly Mosley owns the Amazing Grace Family Farms with her husband, Justin, said she was leaning on designing the maze after a superhero.

"I thought that was a good idea and would be well-received, but my husband actually said we should do a local superhero like Jennifer (White's) husband," Mosley said. "I thought that was a great idea."

Mosley said the Dave White Memorial Foundation is special to her because she witnessed the detective's funeral proces-

sion six years ago but didn't know the family at the time.

"We stood along the route with hundreds of other people just to show them support," Mosley said. "I think it's really cool years later our families became friends and we're able to let them know he's not forgotten."

Proceeds from the maze ticket sales will go to the foundation. The 5-acre maze, at 2899 Wisteria Farms Rd., is open Fridays 5-10 p.m. and Saturdays 10 a.m.-10 p.m. in October.

Throughout the year, the Dave White Memorial Foundation hosts fundraisers such as golfing and fishing outings to raise money for its annual scholarship.

The Dave White Memorial Foundation's logo is the centerpiece of the maze. Clay County Sheriff's Office Public Information Officer Chris Padgett said White and his wife, Jennifer, were Middleburg High School grads and pillars of the community.

"We don't want his name or his legacy to ever be forgotten," Padgett said. "So,

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Streetscape gets moved up on FDOT list

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — The Keystone Heights Streetscape 2020 project might be in for a name change soon now that the project's start date has been moved to 2019.

With construction originally slated to begin in 2020, the Streetscape project aims to restore the original pedestrian-friendly personality to Lawrence Boulevard. As originally proposed the project would run from East Walker Drive south to Lakeview Drive on State Road 100.

"So, we saw that we had an improvements project lined up for a start date of Spring 2019 and because of that, we were able to roll the Streetscape 2020 project into that," Keystone Heights City Manager, Scott Kornegay, said. "So yeah, the new start date for Streetscape is Spring 2019."

According to Kornegay, the Streetscape 2020 project was slowly moving forward, but after Florida Department of Transportation officials identified the milling and resurfacing project for State Road 21 from the Putnam County line to north of Commercial Circle in the city, it proved more economical to roll Streetscape into the bigger project. This resurfacing project is part of the FDOT's five-year plan.

Streetscape calls for paved shoulders in the construction area to be widened and

mid-block crossings and bulb-outs will still be added. Signal and pedestrian improvements at the State Road 100 intersection are also part of the proposal.

Currently, all of this is in the proposal stage, but Kornegay expects all of it to come to fruition soon with a construction start date next spring. FDOT engineers will be available for questions at an upcoming open house at the Keystone Heights City Hall on Oct. 25 from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

In other city council business, the Keystone Heights City Council kicked off October as the Attendance Awareness Month for students in the city.

"As the Mayor of the City of Keystone Heights, I proclaim our city will stand with the nation in recognizing September as At-

tendance Awareness Month," Mayor Karen Lake read from a proclamation. "We hereby commit to focusing on reducing chronic absenteeism to give all children an equitable opportunity to learn, grow and thrive academically, emotionally and socially."

Clay County School Superintendent Addison Davis was present for the meeting and congratulated the council on its commitment to attendance awareness. He also touched on the importance of student attendance and movements like this that bring awareness to the issue in Clay County.

"We know that attendance is extremely important as it relates to education," Davis said. "If students aren't in attendance, they'll darken our doorways and miss out on access to our great resources and teach-

ers. We'll never ever begin to elevate and continue to improve students and teaching within Clay County [without attendance]."

According to Davis, already the district is seeing increased attendance in McRae Elementary, Keystone Heights Elementary and Keystone Junior-Senior High, and as the school year continues, Davis expects those numbers to continue to rise.

Groups form partnership on reverse mortgage assistance for seniors

TALLAHASSEE – Florida Housing Finance Corporation, Fannie Mae and the Florida Department of Elder Affairs, are working together on the Elderly Mortgage Assistance Program.

Administered by Florida Housing, the corporation has spent more than \$47 million in federal funding from the Hardest-Hit Fund towards the program.

ELMORE assists elder homeowners with home equity conversion mortgages – better known as "reverse mortgages" – who, because of a hardship, are having difficulty making property tax and homeowner's insurance payments. As a result, these homeowners are facing foreclosure for non-payment of these required costs.

Homeowners who meet specific qualifications may be eligible for a two-year forgivable loan of up to \$50,000. The funds will be distributed to the mortgage servicer, on the homeowner's behalf, in a lump sum to repay property-related expenses paid by the servicer (e.g., property taxes, homeowner's insurance, flood insurance and association fees) plus upcoming property-related expenses for up to 12 months.

Rebuild Florida commits \$616 million for Hurricane Irma repairs, rebuilding

MARATHON – The Florida Department of Economic Opportunity launched a long-term \$616 million recovery effort to help Florida families whose homes were damaged or destroyed by Hurricane Irma.

Rebuild Florida is a program run by DEO in partnership with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. This program was announced jointly by Gov. Rick Scott and HUD Sec. Ben Carson in June and will connect eligible Floridians with federal disaster recovery funding, prioritizing most-impacted communities and the most vulnerable low-income individuals, including the elderly, those with disabilities and families with young children.

The nearest Rebuild Florida center to Clay County is in Jacksonville at 215

Market St. where case managers can help homeowners register for the program.

"We know that many families across the state are still struggling, even one year after Hurricane Irma. Our Rebuild Florida team will guide homeowners through every step of the process and help them repair and rebuild their homes," said DEO Executive Director Cissy Proctor.

Register online at RebuildFlorida.gov or by calling the Rebuild Florida representatives at 844-833-1010. Rebuild Florida centers will also be opening in the hardest hit counties. More information about these locations will be available at RebuildFlorida.gov. Eligible Florida residents have until Dec. 23 to register for the Rebuild Florida Housing Repair and Replacement Program.

The program is open to residents who own their homes and also to owners of rental properties. Detailed eligibility requirements are available at RebuildFlorida.gov.

Free financial aid form help for high school seniors

ORANGE PARK – Officials from St. Johns River State College know how confusing it can be for teens to complete the Federal Application for Student Financial Aid form. So, the college is hosting "FASFA Frenzy" to provide free assistance to families applying for aid.

"Finances should not be a barrier to attending college," said SJR State's financial aid director Suzanne Evans. "The event will provide qualified students with assistance in completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, which is the first and most important step in applying for financial aid."

Students and parents should also be aware of two changes to the nationwide financial form. Students can apply for aid as early as Oct. 1 and can base their financial information on the previous year's tax return. Potential students intending to enroll in college during the 2019-20 academic year are encouraged to complete the form as soon as possible, as some funds are awarded on an as-needed basis while others are awarded first-come, first-served.

Clay students can get help at the SJR State Orange Park Campus on Oct. 25 from 6-8 p.m. in the Viking Center at 283 College Dr.V Building (Viking Center)

Students will get step-by-step instructions for completing and submitting the FAFSA, along with the Florida Financial Aid Application. Computers will be provided. To complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, students/parents will need to bring their student's Social Security Number, Driver's License Number, Alien Registration Number if not a U.S. citizen and most recent federal income tax returns, W-2s, and other records of money earned. Parents will also need to supply information on bank statements and records of investments and records of untaxed income, if either are applicable.

City welcomes new city manager

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – New City Manager Steve Kennedy greeted council members and residents at Tuesday's city council meeting and discussed his first week in charge and his fondness for the area.

Kennedy was city manager in Americus, Ga. from 2015-2018. A Valdosta State University alum, he served more than a decade as Kennesaw, Ga. city manager and was Thomasville, Ga. director of administration and controller for almost 20 years. He started in Green Cove Springs Oct. 1.

Former City Manager Danielle Judd left the city last month after seven years. Kennedy said he was impressed by the quality of the staff who were getting him acquainted with the city in his first week.

"It takes a great team and there's one here," Kennedy said. "That really makes my job easier having those committed folks already in place."

Referring to the initial transition, Kennedy said he needed to acclimate to his new county, meet residents, department heads, county officials and set expectations.

"It's different here. In the short period of time we've been here, we've experienced

that. I'm having a blast already," Kennedy said. "I plan on continuing to have blast. There's a lot of things in front of us and a lot of opportunities."

Council members said they looked forward to working with Kennedy.

"It's a great place to live and work," said Vice Mayor Steven Kelley. "We're glad to have you."

"We're excited for the next era in Green Cove," Council member Mitch Timberlake said.

In other business, the Northeast Florida Community Action Agency extended hours of service to Monday through Thursday rather than one day a week. The agency has an office in City Hall where it assists low-income residents in the community. Council members agreed to a trial period for a couple months for the new office hours and cited concerns with adding to city staff's workload.

Food Truck Friday, a monthly community gathering with food and local bands held at the corner of Walnut Street and Magnolia Avenue, will temporarily move to Spring Park due to extensive renovations at Clay Theatre, which was the site adjacent to the vent's staging area. The hours were also extended by council members to 5-9 p.m.

Jacksonville sexual predator charged with child pornography production offenses

JACKSONVILLE – United States Attorney Maria Chapa Lopez announced that James Thomas Butler II, 38, Jacksonville, has been arrested and charged by a federal criminal complaint with production and attempted production of child pornography.

In 2001, Butler was convicted of attempted sexual battery and lascivious molestation of a minor in Jacksonville and was required to register as a sexual predator. Because of his prior sex offense conviction, Butler faces an enhanced mandatory minimum penalty of 25 years, and up to 50 years in federal prison, and a potential lifetime of supervision. He has been in custody since his arrest on Oct. 2. A detention hearing is scheduled for Oct. 9.

According to the complaint, on May 2, FBI agents and other law enforcement officers executed a search warrant at a home in north Jacksonville, where several offenders and sexual predators re-

sided. While interviewing the residents, the agents seized two smartphones from Butler, who was residing at the location. During a forensic review of one of the devices, agents discovered pornographic videos of a minor child that appeared to have been surreptitiously filmed using a hidden camera. Further investigation revealed the identity of the child and the Jacksonville residence where the production had occurred.

This case was investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, and the Duval County School Police Department. It is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney D. Rodney Brown.

It is another case brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative launched in May 2006 by the Department of Justice to combat the growing epidemic of child sexual exploitation and abuse.

Tony Walsh, the founding director of the Thrasher-Horne Center from 2004-

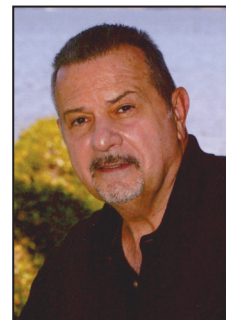
2013, is also on the festival's board. Walsh said he's noticed the festival's growth over the years with the number of musical acts, artists and authors in attendance.

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to qualify.

At the time, the Clay County Supervisor of Elections, Chris Chambless, said he likened the situation to a voter being in line before the voting deadline. If a voter is in line before the deadline, they are still able to vote even if they have to do so after the cut-off time. For that reason, Chambless allowed Hoover to qualify.

In court, Hoover's argument failed to hold up and Mobley won the case. Hoover, though, continued to fight with appeals until she found herself attempting to ap-

peal to the high court after she disagree with a ruling from the 1st District Court of Appeal. Her last bastion of hope to see her name on the ballot, the High Court was the final authority in this case. Unfortunately for Hoover, the Florida Supreme Court denied to review her case, therefore ending the challenge that would have, had the court sided with Hoover, allowed voters to choose between her and Mobley.

For Hoover, the high court's denial to hear her case is a reflection in the system's trust in duly-elected constitutional officers, in this case, Chambless.

"This is the [Florida Supreme Court] telling us, the citizenry, that we cannot rely on the authority of our duly-elected constitutionals," Hoover said. "It's their way of saying [Chambless] has no right to make a judgment call to follow a policy that's been in place for over 40 years. It's not right."

Despite the loss, Hoover has no regrets.

"I have no regrets," Hoover said. "I've learned a great deal and it was a wonderful and amazing educational process."

Chambless said he is just happy that the process was able to occur.

"I'm just glad that the process was allowed to run its entire course because I think that by taking the opportunity to ask the question to the highest court, it ensures that you know everyone was served by the process," Chambless said. "You may not like the outcome, or you may like the outcome, but you know this case was heard and I think that's important. It gives all of this closure."

Because Hoover's name will not appear on the ballot, Mobley is presumed elected. Officially, according to Chambless, it will be known that Mobley faced no opposition.

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firing last week. In a termination letter, Kopelousos wrote Zike acted poorly for a county employee in a leadership position.

"Anything less than termination would signal a degree of tolerance on the part of the county regarding such offenses that would be entirely inappropriate, insupportable and inconsistent with the mission of the Department and the County," Kopelousos said.

According to the investigation, Zike texted a woman in his department about hanging out with him at a Vilano Beach hotel and sent a shirtless picture of him-

self to the woman. He promptly apologized to the woman and stated he had been drinking and thought she had broken up with her boyfriend.

"Yeah no that's not cool," she replied.

Then the woman's boyfriend and Zike later exchanged messages.

"Damn man i [sic] sure hope my dumb [expletive deleted] didn't start a [expletive deleted] storm. God I'm such an idiot when i been drinking," Zike said.

"Naw man, I'm good," The boyfriend replied. "You didn't know. We've been together this whole time and have never been broken up."

The woman notified Clay County Human resources after the exchange. She

told investigators Zike asked her for sex in the past and told other employees, in front of her, that she rejected his advances. She said Zike also made a comment to her about talking to female volunteers and new hires, "...about the possibility of being approached sexually by coworkers," according to the investigation.

Investigators found that misconduct took place between Zike and the complainant.

"Battalion Chief Zike's conduct is unbecoming of an employee in his position and adversely impacts the Department and the County," investigators said.

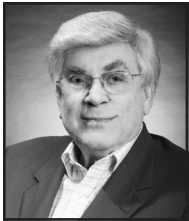

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Polston Lab ‘recruits’ insects as plant allies

GAINESVILLE – A University of Florida lab spearheaded a campaign to recruit insects as allies that can aid in reducing plant stress to enhance food security.

The initial, 12-month “recruiting” effort by Jane Polston, a professor of plant pathology at the UF Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, successfully completed the first of three phases of a scheduled four-year project under the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency’s Insect Allies program.

Almost \$900,000 will fund the Polston lab’s effort throughout the project. The aim of the project is to develop a rapid response capability for farmers to defend mature crops from unanticipated or fast-moving environmental and biological threats.

UF is taking part in Insect Allies as part of a team of researchers led by Penn State, alongside additional subcontractors from the University of Texas at San Antonio and Pacific Northwest National Laboratory. Together, they study plant-insect-virus systems to understand and improve how they might work together to improve plant defenses.

Polston, who leads the virus team, said the interdisciplinary project has been an exciting opportunity for her to bridge her



background in plant virology with other contributors’ backgrounds in biology, entomology, chemical engineering and “OMICS” – proteomics, metabolomics and genomics.

The Polston Lab facilities for insect-rearing and capabilities for analyzing viruses and virus-plant host range were critical for executing a Phase I demonstration and will continue to be vital to meeting the rigorous research milestones set by DARPA. “It’s so interesting to reconsider insects and viruses as allies rather than as detriments that need to be eliminated to increase food production,” Polston said.

She noted how, as a plant virologist,

she spent decades studying ways to manage crop-destroying plant viruses and the insects that transmit them – without ever considering them as potential tools for beneficial intervention.

The project team ultimately aims to demonstrate its rapid response capability in a system that uses common whiteflies to deliver beneficial genes to tomato plants to alleviate the effects of drought stress.

During Phase I – and consistent with the team’s biocontainment methodology – their objective was limited to confirming that gene delivery by an insect is possible in a laboratory. The team suc-

cessfully demonstrated transmission of a deconstructed virus from one plant to another via a whitefly.

Specifically, Polston’s team of researchers – including co-Principal Investigator Garry Sunter, UTSA department of biology, UF/IFAS post-doctoral researchers Alba Nava and Zafar Iqbal; and UF/IFAS biological scientist Heather Capobianco – used a deconstructed begomovirus to transmit genes that encoded for yellow fluorescent protein.

“We were so excited when we looked in the microscope lens and saw that glow,” Polston said.

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Conserving water through rain water harvesting

Water resources in Florida are increasing in demand from all sides; residential, commercial, agricultural and industrial. As our state is projected to increase in population by 6 million people by 2030, many are wondering how we are going to keep up with the increasing demand of water. There are many solutions to reduce the impacts to our water resources, one of those being the use of rain barrels or cisterns.

Rain harvesting by use of rain barrels or cisterns collects rainwater from a building's rooftop. With an average of 52 inches of rainfall each year, Florida is the perfect location to reuse rainwater for outdoor purposes. Potential applications can be hand watering of your vegetable garden or crops, washing your car or pets, or even refilling fountains or ponds.

What is the difference between rain barrels and cisterns?

Rain barrels are normally used for smaller applications, such as residential homes and barns and commonly refer to a 55-gallon barrel as the collection container.

You can have a single rain barrel on your site or have multiple barrels to increase the amount of water collected. Cisterns are basically large-scale rain barrels that catch a much larger volume of rain water to be reused. They can be stationed above ground or buried below ground level, depending on site conditions.

What are the pros and cons of water collection?

Rain water collection has many benefits including reduction of stormwater

runoff, reduction of the stress of treatment systems, is generally a reliable source of irrigation for landscape and crops and can potentially reduce your residential water bill through reduced water consumption.

Some potential problems that can come with water collection are the initial cost of purchasing a container, especially if you are looking at cisterns as a method, which can be expensive.

Water should not be used for human consumption as it could contain bacteria or other contamination harmful to humans. Some watering applications by a rain barrel may not be feasible. For example, it would take about forty 50-gallon rain barrels to irrigate the average Florida yard once. However, rain barrels are a great starter if you are looking to collect and reuse rainwater.

Water Collection Consideration

Rain barrels and cisterns can be applied to any number of sites and locations. If there is a roof, you can collect rain from it. You should consider several factors before starting down this path however. If you are interested in a cistern, you need to calculate the square footage of your roof to figure out what size storage container you might need.

It is not exact, but you can use the square footage of your home as a rough estimate. Based on a general rule of 1-inch of rain on 1,000 square feet of roof will produce 600 gallons of water, calculate your total of gallons you can collect per 1-inch of rainfall. An average 2,000 square foot home can potentially collect over 60,000 gallons of water per year.

While there are no state laws that restrict rain water collection, there may be local ordinances that restrict where cisterns need to be located. You should check with your local county zoning or code en-

forcement to check if there are any ordinances pertaining to water collection.

Because it is a container of standing water, the rain barrel should have a lid or fine mesh covering the opening to prevent mosquito populations. Both rain barrels and cisterns need to have good filtration to remove any leaves, shingle particulates, or other contaminants that may have collected from the roof.

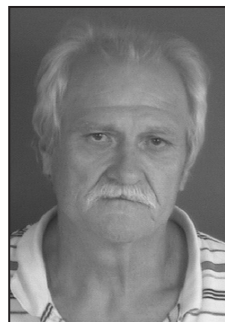
At press time, Marshall remained in jail where her bond is set at \$10,003

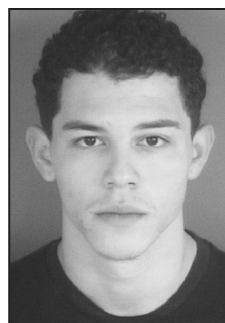

Davitt found himself ready to try this new type of treatment. While many guests were there for the celebration, Davitt was there to get his needs addressed, pronto.

“Today will be the first day trying medical marijuana,” Davitt, who just recently received his state-approved card, said. “I’m just so excited. I have faith this will work.”

According to Davitt, despite the numerous medicines he’s tried taking, the multiple chiropractor appointments he’s gone to and the acupuncture therapy sessions he’s been through, he still deals with the back pain that’s plagued him for years.

“Nothing has worked,” Davitt said. “I’m tired of this pain and I’m tired of trying things that don’t work.”

What has Davitt so confident in medical marijuana? His son. Davitt’s son suffered a bad back injury months ago and, according to Davitt, medical marijuana has been the only thing that’s helped ease the pain. He said it was his son’s confidence in the drug that persuaded Davitt to give the drug a try.

While marijuana is slowly becoming legal both recreationally and medically throughout the nation, Clay County has been slow to adopt the drug. Today, recreational use of the drug is illegal in all forms, but after a voter-approved Florida Constitutional amendment passed in 2016, non-smokable forms of medical marijuana are legal. Patients cannot obtain the drug without a physician’s recommendation.

After a recommendation, it’s up to the patient to secure a state registration card that tells facilities like Surterra Wellness that legally, you are allowed to purchase

the drug.

While medical marijuana cannot be purchased without undergoing these stringent approvals, anybody can stop into the shop on to browse Surterra’s offerings or speak with an employee about what might be right for them. Located at 80 Blanding Blvd., Suite 3, in Orange Park, this Surtterra Wellness is just one of 11 in Florida, with more stores in other states.

Strictly retail, Surterra Wellness sells vapes, oils, patches and more, and all of its product is manufactured in Florida. With more than 300,000 square feet, Surterra Wellness’ cultivation facility in Hillsborough County is the largest cannabis grower in Florida.

At the Blanding location, after signing in, guests are welcomed by one of 10-15 employees. From there, guests or patients wait in the welcome lobby before being ushered back into the kitchen area, located squarely in the center. According to Kim Hawkes, Surterra’s senior manager of Government and Public Relations, it’s in this kitchen area, where guests can sip on coffee and tea, that much of the discussion takes place.

With its walls lined with products to buy, farther back into the facility looks more like a sleek and classy hotel than a place to buy marijuana. Near the back of the building, sits the area where patients complete the purchase of medical marijuana products.

“We want this place to feel very comfortable,” Hawkes said.

The price to walk around the building, chat with specialists and determine if the drug is for you is free, but the cheapest product, a transdermal patch, of one of five Surterra products. They offer different types of marijuana referred to as either calm, serene, soothe, zen or relief starting at \$20 each. The next cheapest product is a vaporizer, which costs \$25. For a tincture oil, depending on the oil dosage, the price is anywhere from \$40 to \$150. Oils, lotions and oral sprays will cost somewhere between \$60 and \$75. These products still contain tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC, and because of that, patients will still feel the psychoactive effects of the drug. According to Hawkes, patients feeling those effects should not drive.

Hawkes said that ideally customers purchase the product recommended to them by a physician, but if the customer feels something different would work better, they’re free to purchase something else.

“It’s all about the patient and what works best for them,” Hawkes said. “Different products and different strands work differently from person to person.”

The medical marijuana products Surterra Wellness sells help with a number of different things such as mood management, stress and anxiety, pain and discomfort, which is what brought Davitt in to the center.

Surterra Wellness’ Orange Park facility, located on Blanding Boulevard across from the Orange Park Mall, is open Monday through Saturday, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

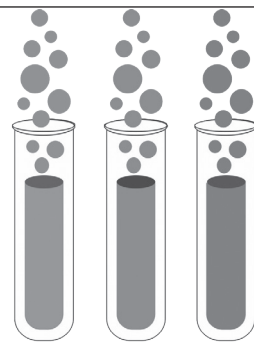

curbing, the cost would have been roughly \$1.8 million.

After the discussion centered on ribbon curbing, Council Member Roland Mastandrea explained his hesitation with the project design and cited the 9-foot lanes as a negative. According to Mastandrea, the lanes should be 10 feet wide.

“Different things happen in different sections of the road, but overall the residents’ wishes were 18 feet wide, so 9-foot lanes, and a 6-foot walking path. There are no trees that have to be removed as part of the project, although we do have some that are diseased that we may address during the project.”

“Our own experts in this town and the people we hired to write the project, and our own fire department, feel that 10 feet is what should be there for the safety of the people,” Mastandrea said.

While 10 feet is the Florida Department of Transportation lane width minimum, FDOT does allow variances for special cases. The council sees River Road as a special case in this situation, which is why its lane width will be 9 feet instead of 10. According to Raymond, the smaller width prevents River Road from becoming a speedy detour from U.S. Highway 17 as the tighter lanes will naturally cause drivers to slow down. It also allows for the distance between cars and pedestrians on the sidewalks to be larger.

In other business

In other business, town council signed another contract with Advanced Disposal that will see the trash company handle the town’s garbage for at least another five years, with the possibility of a five-year extension near the end of the original five years. The council, who in the past has complained about Advanced Disposal’s services, said that the company has improved its service levels and provides a service unlike what the company provided in the past.

“It’s a whole lot better than it was at the beginning of the contract,” Raymond said.

Council member Alan Watt disagreed with the rest of the council. According to Watt, for years, Advanced Disposal has provided unsatisfactory service and a few months of good service is not enough for him to forget that.

When it came time for a motion, the council voted 3-1 to hire Advanced Disposal to handle the town’s trash for at least another five years.

FHSAA releases football power rankings

GAINESVILLE – The football playoffs are five weeks away, but the football season is past the midway point and area teams can now see the target.

The FHSAA has released its five week power rankings that determine the playoff potential off all teams at the halfway point. Playoffs are determined by a points system based on strength of schedule and past history.

In Classes 5A-8A, 32 teams will qualify with district champions four slots and at-large qualifiers earning the final four slots in each of four regions.

In Classes 1A-4A, 24 teams will earn playoff spots with six at-large qualifiers based on points with top two seeds getting byes into round two of regional playoffs.

Beginning with the 2017 season, district play was to be eliminated in Classes 1A-4A, with teams making the playoffs based on a points system. All 16 playoff berths in those classifications will be determined by a new points system that factors in wins, losses and the final record of every opponent played.

The four larger classes (5A-8A) will continue to have districts and champions will receive automatic playoff bids and will be seeded 1, 2, 3 or 4 within a region - which guarantees a home game for the

first round of the playoffs.

Each of those classes will also have 16 at-large bids, four per region, based on the points formula. Those wild cards will be seeded 5-8.

The highest seed will host second and third round region games.

Area teams with still possible playoffs in sight include Oakleaf, fourth in Region 1-7A with region finalist Fleming Island, 5A runner up Trinity Christian, 4A champion Raines, district 3-7A runnerup Buchholz and 6A top ranked, unbeaten and region finalist in 2017 Ocala Vanguard giving Knights a bucket load of points possible.

Fleming Island has Oakleaf, Final Four 7A and district 3-7A champion Bartram Trail and a 4-1 Orange Park left on the schedule to get points.

In Class 5A, Ridgeview got a boost with season opening win over Nature Coast, top seed so far in Region 2, but has district 5-5A gauntlet ahead of them; Orange Park, Menendez, Clay, Baker County to either get big points or lose ground. Orange Park's 4-1 season thus far is a hot target for Panthers. Clay needs to run their table to get in with a final game against 2A runnerup University Christian a possible last game points boost. Orange Park's second half has three teams ranked above them in 5A, plus 7A-Fleming Island.

In 4A, Keystone Heights snuck in last

Roberts snags game-ending interception for Bulls

TAMPA — USF became the fastest Florida FBS team to reach 150 program wins with a 20-13 victory over East Carolina in the Bulls' American Athletic Conference opener at Raymond James Stadium on Sept. 29.

USF (4-0, 1-0) reached 150 wins in program game No. 255, three games faster than Florida, and junior Jordan Cronkrite broke a 13-13 tie with a career long 80-yard touchdown run with 10:13 remaining. Cronkrite (Miami) posted his second straight 100-yard rushing game with 129 yards on 15 carries (8.6 ypc).

Redshirt freshman safety Nick Roberts, an Oakleaf High graduate and a Clay Today defensive player of the year, sealed the victory by intercepting his first career pass at the ECU 44-yard line with two minutes remaining.

"We were in cover three and I was a curl, flat player," said Roberts who started as a cornerback and shifted to a safety after the Bulls' spring game. "I saw the number one receiver run a comeback, then I saw the ball and ran under it and caught it."

Roberts liked the shift from corner to safety.

"Our coaches just tell us to go, go, go," said Roberts. "I just play faster at safety."

USF's defense pitched a shutout in the fourth quarter for the second straight game to help the Bulls improve to 20-5 in AAC games over the past three seasons, the best record in the conference. The Bulls have scored 46 unanswered points in the fourth quarter over the last three games.

ECU (1-2, 0-1) grabbed a 7-0 lead on the game's opening drive before the Bulls rattled off 13 straight points and took a 13-10 lead into halftime.

Tied at 13-13 in the fourth quarter, Cronkrite busted through the middle of the

line and sprinted 80 yards to the end zone with 10:13 remaining. It marked USF's longest scoring run since Marcus Shaw went 80 yards against McNeese State on Aug. 31, 2013.

ECU's comeback attempt was dashed with two minutes left, when Roberts hauled in his first career interception at the Pirates' 44-yard line. Roberts finished with a career-high eight tackles while senior safety Jaymon Thomas (Immokalee, Fla.) led the way with 10 total stops.

USF won its fourth straight conference opener and improved to 5-1 in American Athletic Conference openers and 10-6 in conference openers overall.

Following a bye week, the Bulls are back in action on Saturday, Oct. 6 at UMassachusetts where former Clay High running back Bilal Ally is running the ball. Kickoff is set for 3:30 p.m. in Amherst, Mass.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Fleming Island High cross country runner Andrew Miller, a 2017 graduate, continued his ascension into college cross country in his freshman year at Elon University, with a top team finish and a top five school time as the Elon men took sixth overall at the Queen City Invitational in New York on Fri., Sept. 28.

In the men's race, the Phoenix mens team was sixth overall with 174 points. Liberty took team honors in the men's 8K run with 18 points with the second-place team, Embry-Riddle, nearly 100 points behind the Flames with 115 points. Freshman Andrew Miller broke into the program's top-five performance list as he led the Phoenix with a time of 25:05 and was 11th overall.

Miller led the maroon and gold men for

the second straight meet while fellow first-year teammate Kieran Ungemach was next for Elon with his time of 25:45 and 28th overall. Colton Lawson was the third Phoenix runner to cross the line with his time of 26:09 followed by Richie Kasper (26:12) and Cooper Jansson (26:19) as the other scoring runners for Elon.

Racing for the first time in nearly a month, the Elon women's team finished third overall at the meet with 92 points behind Duke (64) and Liberty (72). Geraniotis was the runner-up in the women's 5K race with her new personal-record time of 17:26, the third-best performance in school history. Anastasakis also finished in the top-10 at the meet with her new personal-best time of 17:48, also breaking into the program's all-time top-10 performance list.

New personal records from senior Coralea Geraniotis and junior Melissa Anastasakis helped lead the way for the Elon University cross country programs at the Queen City Invitational on Friday evening,

Sept. 28, at McAlpine Creek Park.

The meet was Geraniotis' first with the team after competing unattached at the Elon Opener. The Orleans, Mass., native bested her previous personal-best by 25 seconds as she was just three seconds from the school-record mark.

Anastasakis also had a huge jump in setting her new personal-record by over a minute as the Hillsdale, Ontario, native is now ninth in school history in the 5K.

Chelsea Smith was the third Phoenix runner to cross the finish line in 19th and also set a new personal-record with her time of 18:12. Freshman Hannah Preeo was next with her time of 18:19 in 22nd followed by Natacha Savioz, who ran a 18:43 as scoring runner for the Phoenix women.

LAKE ASBURY – With three pre-state level cross country races scattered statewide over the September 29 weekend, area harriers got a chance in the last week to put the readiness barometer to work.

Tops on the list was the FLRunners.com Invitational held in Lakeland on Saturday and featuring Orange Park High senior John Bear taking on defending state champs from around Florida and finishing 13th in 16 minutes, 34.92 seconds.

At Ponte Vedra High School, the Fleming Island High boys team, led by sophomore Kameron Wallizada, finished second to host Ponte Vedra. The top area finishers, St. Johns Country Day School's power duo; senior Benjamin Kailes and freshman Matthew Stratton, wound up ahead of Ridgeview's Joel Nesi and also Wallizada.

At the Fleming Island High Eagles 5K cross country race held Saturday late afternoon at Van Zant Park in Lake Asbury, it was Oakleaf High junior Dylan Nelson running a strong solo test in 17:08 to win uncontested as a top "off the radar" effort.



Clay High's Carlton Waiguru, a sophomore, strode in at fifth in 18:55.12 at the Eagles 5K.

For Orange Park High coach Doug Barrows, his main push for the next four weeks is speed.

"We are done with strength work and this was the last meet for the team to see where we stand in our training to take on the best runners in four weeks at districts," said Barrows. "John has been steadily pushing his strength levels up to be stronger at the end. Now, we start factoring in speed into the mix."

Barrows, who brings an ultra-distance background to his coaching at Orange Park, sees the peak season as forthcoming.

"The team has to realize that we are going to go up against teams like Creekside, Ponte Vedra and Bartram Trail in our district and all three have been in the state meet mix the past few years," he said, noting Bear's 12th place district finish last year. "John needs the team to get closer. The Aris brothers are right there. Our new guy, Ladarius Dumas, is strong, but him and the Aris brothers; Stevenson and Steven, have to include the killer instinct knowing this is it. One race and you go home if you are not willing to take out anyone in the top 16."

Note: Ponte Vedra, Creekside and Bartram Trail were third, fourth and fifth at last year's region meet behind Tallahassee Chiles and Niceville with Orange Park only fielding Bear who wound up 18th at 17:14, just out of the state-advancing top 16. The top 10 boys region finishers were under 17 minutes.

"We have to have John in the low 16 minutes, which he has proven all season, but it's the next four guys that have to pull it together," said Barrows.

Barrows noted also that in the Boys Invitational race at the FLRunners.com meet, the Orange Park boys team, minus Bear, and led by Dumas' 38th place in 18:17.21, finished 13th out of 39 teams with the Aris brothers in at 67th in 18:44 for Stevenson and 96th in 19:07 for Steven.

"Those two compete hard against each other, but they have to think past that and start taking out other teams runners," said Barrows. "We get those three in under 18 and John sticks one at a low 16 then it's all on our number five to bring it home."

In the Race of Champions, Mount Dora junior Gabriel Curtis, fourth in Class 1A last year, was the overall winner in 15:57.34 with Hugh Brittenham, a senior at Estero High and seventh in Class 3A last year, second in 16:01.96.

"John is just 30 seconds away," said Barrows. "The gap to 18 minutes and under was 90 runners so that's where we are

working to get the others in at."

For Fleming Island High's boys and girls teams; both with season wins at meets this season; Bartram Trail's Bales N Trails for the boys team and the Bob Hans Invite at Ridgeview for the girls, have put both teams on the radar as districts approach with top runners Kameron Wallizada and Mei Chiang leading the Golden Eagles charges.

For Wallizada, who has run in the second pack of his most recent races, then unleashed a final surge in the final 1.5 miles, the inching to 16 minutes keeps running numbers crunchers awaiting his first sub-16 minute race.

Nesi, who had a complicated finish at the recent UNF Invite with severe dehydration and fatigue putting him in an ice bath after that race, rebounded strongly at the Ponte Vedra race with a best of season 16:55 effort on the oppressively hot and humid atmosphere.

"I felt strongest I've been all season," said Nesi, who was spotted at the recent Jaguars vs. Jets football game. "I think we figured out what has been going on with my weakened finishes."

With Wallizada just behind Nesi with a 16:58 finished for ninth, it was Fleming Island's Will Livesay at 11th in 17:08 who could very well be the pivotal runner for coach Karen Moritz' boys team at Fleming Island.

"He has been really working harder and harder each week and seeing the results," said Moritz. "I'm hoping he gets that first sub-17 minute time at districts, then gets his confidence up for a strong region run."

Fleming Island had four runners behind Livesay under 18 minutes; Landon Opp, Jayden Scherer, Gage West and John Brinkman, to boost the Golden Eagle score.

"John Brinkman had the race of the season and it comes close to where we could have six guys in a big pack," said Moritz. "Kameron is consistent now under 17 and Will is close. Those next four are all able

to get 20-30 seconds more on a good day."

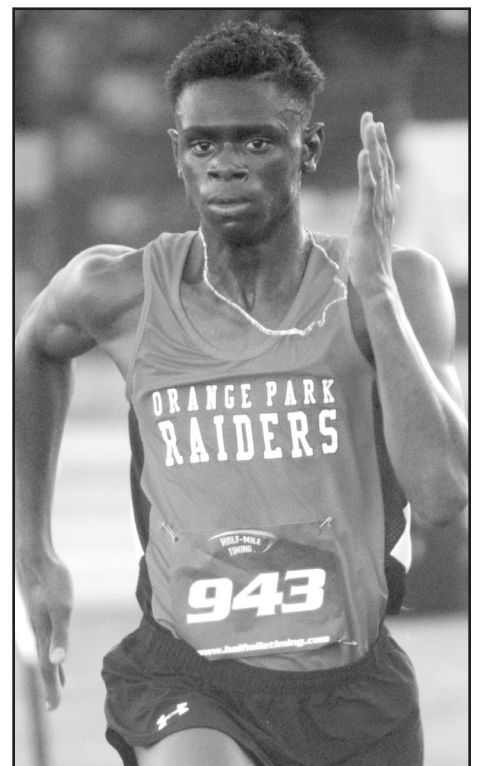
For Kailes and Stratton, who doubled down with their 1-2 finish at the Katie Caples Invite a week ago at Bishop Kenny High, coach Jay Birmingham is the master of November, plain and simple.

"No speed work until October and a high mileage base," said Birmingham. "Our runners train on their own in what we call 'One Hundred Days of Summer' with Benjamin running 1008 miles and Matthew running 800 from May 27 to Labor Day."

Kailes finished third overall at Ponte Vedra in 16:30 with Stratton hanging just off his tail for fifth in 16:46.

At Katie Caples, Kailes won in 16:46 with Stratton second in 17:01.

"Our focus is November 10, the state meet," said Birmingham. "We are not really interested in meet results until districts."

Nesi, and dad Al Nesi, the Ridgeview coach, also have gotten some good races recently from senior Keith Kelley who finished 22nd at Ponte Vedra in 17:41.

"Keith is a guy that excels at the races," said Nesi. "He may not look like he likes practice, but he likes to compete."

Also in Class 4A, district 1-4A specifically, is Nelson, who has hovered also in the top 10 of recent races with a 16:49 at Katie Caples in the Invitational race, the effort at Van Zant was all a mental test.

"He's the kind of kid that needs a guy next to him to battle," said Oakleaf coach Jim Henderson. "This race (Van Zant) is more a mental test to see how hard he was going to push himself by himself. I think it will help in our very fast district."

Nelson, who finished races under 17 minutes last year, finished a disappointing

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especially our seniors, battled tonight. Our kids have a ton of pride being part of Clay High football. We just came up a little short; it's pretty unfortunate."

In district 5-5A play, Baker County (4-1, 2-0) is on top with their win over Palatka with Orange Park ahead of Ridgeview 22-7 after a lightning stop Friday. Clay still has to play Baker County, Ridgeview and Palatka and could shake up that district line up with three wins there.

"We just need one win, I have no clue on rest," said Hoekstra. "We lost two district games by three points total. Brutal. I would imagine we win out, 5-5 and hope to get some help."

Menendez, who had blow out victories over powerhouses 6A-St. Augustine and state runner up 5A-Ponte Vedra high school, plus two of the top running backs in the state in Kenny Logan and Tye Edwards who both have multiple Power Five scholarship offers, the Clay attack was, at best, frustrating as the Blue Devils captured the lead late in the fourth quarter off an 80 yard scoring run from Brown to go up 33-28 with 8:31 left in the game.

"They have talented running backs but so do we. I believe we are just as talented and deserving of praise as their guys" said Brown, who scored on runs of 45, 80 and 12 yards plus had a 45 yard kickoff return that led to a Clay score.

Menendez would take less than two minutes on their opening drive to score with Logan, who rushed for 227 yards, breaking a 50 yard run on the first play from scrimmage then scoring two plays later to give the Falcons a quick 7-0 lead. Clay would waste little time showing off their own running back skills with Spencer Lesage breaking open a 33 yard run to the Menendez 34 yard line. Lesage would later convert a fourth down run to the 21 yard line, but Clay missed a field goal by Tucker Reape.

Two series later, Logan would run 41 yards up the middle leaving the Blue Devil

secondary in the dust with blazing speed to give Menendez a 14-0 lead at the end of one quarter. The Blue Devils would get excellent field position after a 45 kick off return by Brown to start the offense on a short field. Lesage and Brown would lead the Clay ground attack inside the Falcon 10 yard line. On fourth and one from the six, Lesage was stopped less than one inch short of the first down much to the disdain of the Clay coaching staff questioning the officials spotting of the ball.

Logan would come up big again with a third down run 40 yards to the Clay 46 yard line that set up a 34 yard pass to the Blue Devil 10 yard line. Menendez would pound in for the score with Edwards, who also hit the 227 rush yard mark, but Brown would blast a 45 yard scoring run on a fourth and seven to put Clay on the scoreboard.

On the kickoff, Reape would execute a perfect "pooch" kick that allowed special teams/linebacker Cain Creery to recover the football for Clay at the Menendez 43 yard line. Quickly, quarterback Turner Erstad then found tight end Chris Davis for 36 yards to the seven yard line. Two plays later Erstad would run for the score to cut

the lead to 21-13 with two minutes left in the first half.

Edwards would go big with a 75 yard kickoff return to the Clay 10 where the Blue Devil defense stuffed the run game to force a field goal attempt. With a roughing the kicker flag, Edwards returned to the backfield to score off a 10 yard run to give the Falcons a 28-13 lead.

The Blue Devils wasted little time on their opening drive of the third quarter to find the endzone after big gains by Lesage and Erstad led to a 12 yard touchdown run by Brown.

It was then time for the Clay defensive line led by defensive end Kenneth Johnson to make their presence known. Johnson would sack Logan on third down for an eight yard loss and suddenly the momentum clearly shifted to the Blue Devils.

Using that new found momentum, Brown would run 43 yards to the Falcon 22 yard line to set up a 12 yard scoring run from Erstad to pull Clay to within two points at 28-26. The two point conversion would be no good with 4:31 left in the third quarter.

Johnson and the Blue Devil defense

seemed to stall the Logan and Edwards assault with Johnson crashing in on fourth and five to hold the Falcons to a missed field goal with 8:47 left in the game.

From there the marathon of emotional swings would begin.

Brown would take the first play 80 yards for a Clay touchdown and their first lead of the game at 33-28 with 8:31 left to play.

Menendez would waste little time as Logan ran the ball twice all the way to the Clay 14 yard line. Edwards would score two plays later with 7:07 left to regain the lead at 36-33 after a successful two point conversion.

Clay's Alec Holt took the kickoff to the 43 yard line but the Blue Devils drive stalled to a fourth down and 10. However, Turner would find wide receiver Bri'shaun Britt on a perfect slant route for a 57 yard touchdown pass to regain the lead 40-36.

Edwards would answer on the Falcons next possession with a 50 yard run to the Blue Devil 24 yard line. The Clay defense would hold the dynamic duo to nine yards on the next three plays to set up a fourth and one with 3:50 left. Edwards would break through the line and run through the Clay secondary to reclaim the lead at 43-40.

Not be outdone, Holt answered back taking the kickoff 85 yards and just like that Clay went back on top 47-43 with 3:36 remaining.

On the final salvo of the thrilling fourth quarter, Menendez started their drive at their own 45 yard line and Edwards smashed four straight runs of 8-12 yards each down to the Clay 19 yard line. Logan would then break through the secondary for a touchdown to regain the lead 49-47 with :41 seconds left.

The Blue Devils did have one final opportunity but a third down pass was picked off and Menendez escaped with a district win over a Clay team that was clearly frustrated by another close loss; their second district loss by two points or less in the past three games. For you math majors, that is two district losses by a combined three points.

there is nothing there," said Garis.

Simmons connected on eight of his first nine passes on his way to a 295 yard night, finishing 16 of 28, as the Knights offense overwhelmed the hosts. By the end of the first quarter, Oakleaf had 279 yards of total offense and led 21-0. Washington had both of his touchdowns in the second quarter to give the Knights a 34-6 halftime lead. Had the Golden Eagles not won the turnover battle 3-1, defensive backs Courtney Williams and Darius Harris intercepted Simmons and Williams recovered a Simmons fumble in the end zone after Simmons had run 78 yards on the game's first play. Oakleaf might have matched the 63-point blitz they smeared Bartram Trail with on September 14.

The Fleming game plan was actually effective in limiting King, who had only five net yards on his first four carries. But on his sixth carry, he burst through a hole on the left side and outran the secondary 80 yards to the end zone, putting Oakleaf up 14-0. Taking away the 80 yard jaunt and the 75 yard gallop, King was held to 64 yards on 17 rushes, less than four yards per carry. But the big plays crushed the Golden Eagles.

If Fleming Island was going to keep the game close, they needed to fire on all four offensive cylinders themselves, and on this night they committed a slew of costly mistakes. There were six dropped passes in the first half, two of which would have resulted in touchdowns. Avery Coussens missed a 32 yard field goal that would have given the Golden Eagles an early lead. A shotgun snap from the Oakleaf 32 yard line went over the head of Fleming quarterback

Dean Hyams, resulting in an 18 yard loss that killed a drive. In what was likely the turning point, Golden Eagles' defensive tackle Glenn Rodgers roughed Oakleaf punter Tyler Laberis, allowing the Knights to maintain possession of the ball with a new set of downs at the Fleming Island 42 yard line. On the next play, Washington took a quick hitch from Simmons and turned it into a 32 yard gain. Two plays later, King scored from five yards out to give the Knights an insurmountable 20-0 lead. With the way the Oakleaf offense was playing, there would be no catching them.

In the second half, a Laberis punt hit the back side of the Golden Eagles' Landon Perry in the back and was recovered by Oakleaf's Donovan Thomas at the Golden Eagles 32. Fleming Island was penalized eight times for 93 yards.

"I thought we had a great game plan," said Fleming Island head coach Dame-

nyum Springs. "We just did not execute it well at all."

The Golden Eagles had their moments. Aaron "Azie" Ramirez ran for 117 yards and two scores, including a 45 yard touchdown run that got the Golden Eagles on the board in the second quarter. Max Michaels scored two touchdowns, one on a two yard plunge and one on a screen pass that he took 45 yards on a fourth down. Fleming Island drew within 34-21 by outscoring Oakleaf 15-0 in the third quarter, but their comeback hopes were squashed by Jamaric Bonner's 20 yard touchdown run with 10:27 remaining that pushed the Knights' lead back to three scores.

The Knights, 4-1 overall and 2-0 in district play, have only Gainesville Buchholz and Creekside standing between them and an outright district title. The Golden Eagles have a bye week before returning to action at Bartram Trail on October 12.

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

Jaguars win home blowout of N.Y. Jets

JACKSONVILLE — On one of the hottest game days in NFL history, the Jacksonville Jaguars used their summer training in Florida to an advantage with a 31-12 route of the New York Jets Sept. 30 in TIAA Bank Field.

Behind quarterback Blake Bortles' 388 yards of passing and a relentless offense that pushed for 503 total yards, the Jaguars ruined the Jacksonville debut of Jets' rookie quarterback Sam Darnold with a huge plate of defensive attacks in front of the very loud 65,353 fans in TIAA Bank Field.

After a dismal 9-6 loss to Tennessee last week, the Jaguars exploded for a 16-0 halftime lead with a 31 yard scoring pass to T.J. Yeldon in the first half and a 67 yard pass to Donte Moncrief in the second half that were the momentum drivers for the Jags, now 3-1.

Moncrief finished with five catches for 109 yards with Dede Westbrook snagging nine catches for 130 yards as Bortles blew up the Jets secondary in the oppressive heat.

On defense, the Jaguars got three sacks including a safety by Marcell Dareus and Calais Campbell as the second half starter. The Jags defense limited Darnold to a paltry 167 yards passing.

The Jaguars head to Kansas City at Arrowhead Stadium this week for a 1 p.m. start against the unbeaten Chiefs.

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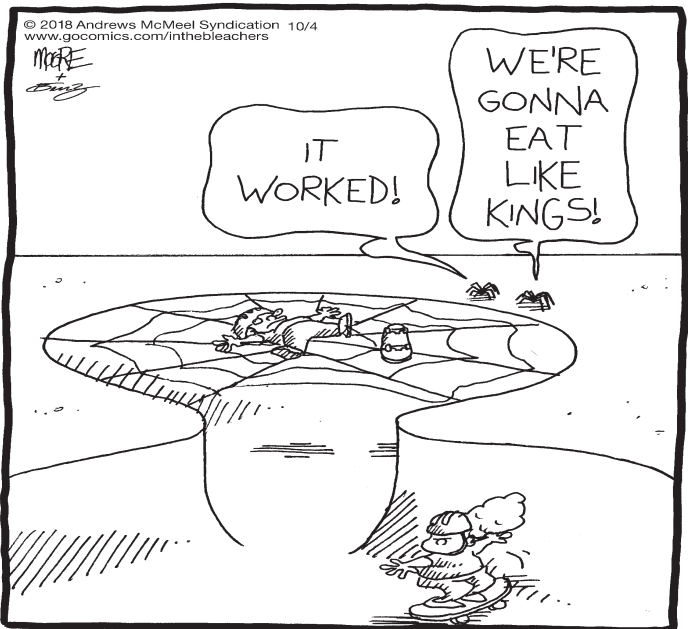
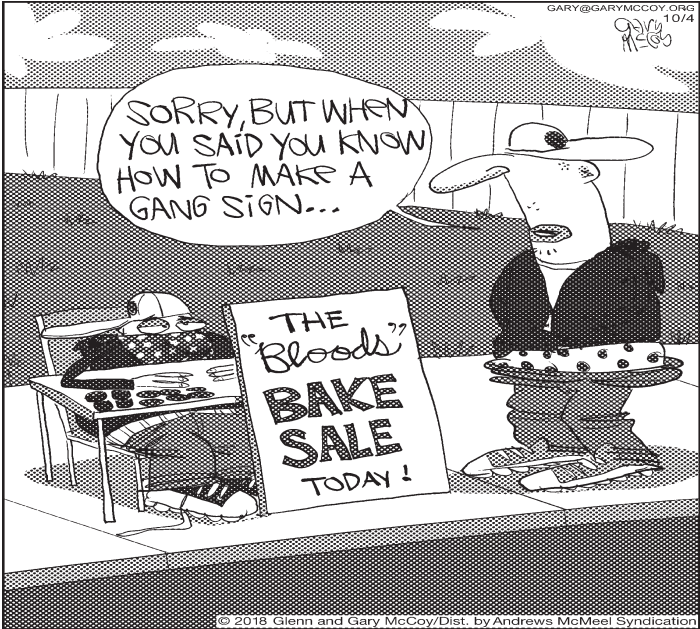

27th in 17:09 at the region 1-4A championships last year.

“He knows what sub-17 feels like with this year’s results,” said Henderson. “He should be comfortable in the fast district and region races this year.”

Also finishing a strong race at Van Zant, Nelson’s teammate Damien Price, a senior with four years of strong running for Oakleaf, who held off Eagle’s View Academy’s Marcus Haynes for second with a kick in 18:38.36. Clay High got a strong finish from newcomer Carlton Waiguru, a sophomore, who strode in at fifth in 18:55.12.

For the Fleming Island girls, fifth place finishers at the Katie Caples Invitational race behind powerhouses Bolles, Creekside, Montverde Academy and Trinity Prep, all non-Class 4A schools, the future rides on a team of young runners with enough savvy to shake up the very strong region 1-4A teams of the last few years; defending region and state champion Winter Park, region runnerup and fourth at state Winter Springs, and Lake Brantley, third in region 1-4A and sixth in 4A, plus fourth in region 1-4A and 12th in 4A Lake Minneola with fifth in region 1-4A and ninth in 4A Spruce Creek.

At Katie Caples, Lake Minneola finished 11th with Spruce Creek 14th. Also behind Fleming Island, in seventh, was Braddock High out of Miami, third in 4A last year.

Fleming Island was 11th in region 1-4A in 2017.

at the 2017 region 1-4A race. That finish was for her twin sister Jessica Fliess. Jennifer Fliess finished strongly in 20:37 for 33rd place in the 2017 region 1-4A championship race.

Freshman Mei Chiang, who ran 19:22 at Katie Caples, was in an elite field that had the top eight under 19 minutes with winner Carly McNatt, of Holy Trinity, winning in 17:53.

Fliess, the lone upper classmen, will be instrumental in the next four weeks in pulling her underclass sisters into championship form.

Set for Sat., Oct. 6 at Cecil Field’s golf course, runners will get a sneak peek at the Region 1A, 2A, 3A course as those meets will be coming to north Florida in November. The New World Fall Spectacular/Region 1A-3A Preview features races Friday night starting at 4 p.m. in junior high school and the Jacksonville-based Gateway Conference with Saturday races for high school varsity and junior varsity slated to start at 8 a.m.

Also on Saturday, Middleburg High will host the Bronco Bob Classic which serves as the St. Johns River Athletic Conference championship race.

In the 100, Williams won in 48.56 with Heinton second at 49.21. Behind the pair, Fleming Island got two swimmers; Josh Conomea and Charles Johnson both tied for eighth at 53.05.

Heinton was the region 1-4A 100 free champion in 47.13 last year and second in the 50 free in 21.69 to graduated teammate Jack Neeley. In region 1-3A last year, Williams was seventh in

the 50 free in 22.50.

Tigers get first shutout since 2008

HAYS, Kan. — Fort Hays State posted its first shutout of an opponent since the 2008 season when it defeated Central Oklahoma on Saturday night (Sept. 29) by a score of 15-0. Dante Brown set a new FHSU single-game record for field goals, accounting for all 15 points on five converted attempts. The No. 18/13 ranked Tigers sent home a packed Lewis Field Homecoming crowd of 7,140 fans happy, especially with a fireworks show after the game.

On the offensive side of the ball for FHSU, Jacob Mezera, an Orange Park High graduate, is now the all-time completions leader in school history. He passed Mike Garrison on his third completion of the evening and now has 556 in his career with an 18-of-31 effort on the night, going for 201 yards. Matt Wendelberger caught five passes for a team-high 91 yards, while Harley Hazlett had a team-best seven receptions. Charles Tigner posted his second-straight 100-yard rushing game, finishing with 101.

Brown, who provided the only fireworks in the game as far as scoring was concerned, opened his record-setting effort with a 21-yard field goal in the first quarter at the 10:55 mark. He knocked through three more in the second quarter to tie the single-game mark, converting from 39, 30, and 25 yards. The Tigers led 12-0 at halftime.

While Brown was busy climbing toward a new record for field goals in a game, the Tiger defense flat out shut down the Broncho offense in the first half. FHSU held UCO without a first down until the 1:38 mark of the second quarter. FHSU held UCO to just 18 yards in the first quarter, and just 88 yards by halftime. A 40-yard pass is what produced UCO's only first down of the half.

The game's first turnover, a Doyin Jibowu interception at the 5:32 mark of the third quarter, led to Brown's fifth field goal

of the game. Brown set the new single-game mark with a 44-yard conversion at the 2:56 mark of the third quarter, culminating the scoring for the game. It passed the mark of four set by Ryan Achilles in 1993 and Brandon Brown in 2016.

The Bronchos pushed the ball into Tiger territory three times in the fourth quarter, but the Tigers kept them off the scoreboard. UCO reached the FHSU 13 early in the fourth quarter, but an Ian Nordell sack on 4th-and-5 ended its hopes of any points. Another UCO drive stalled out at the FHSU 42 in the middle of the fourth quarter, ending on an incompletion on 4th-and-7.

Finally, Connor Shedeed put a cap on the Homecoming shutout with an interception at the FHSU 12 returned 24 yards to allow FHSU to run out the clock.

The Tigers claimed their first shutout since August 28, 2008, when they defeated New Mexico Highlands 44-0 in Hays in a non-conference game. It was Fort Hays State's first shutout in an MIAA game since 2006 (its first year in the conference) when it defeated Missouri Southern 10-0 in Hays.

The Tigers held Central Oklahoma to 234 yards of total offense. Chandler Garrett was just 16-of-38 passing in the game, throwing for 175 yards. He also rushed for a team-high 37 yards. Jose Delgado led the tackling effort for FHSU with 10 tackles. Jibowu had six tackles, an interception, and a team-best two pass breakups.

The Tigers remain in a tie for second place in the MIAA with Northwest Missouri State at 4-1 overall. Central Oklahoma dropped to 2-3 on the season. Pittsburg State continues to lead the MIAA, now at 5-0 overall. The Tigers go to Emporia State next Saturday (Oct. 6), looking to keep pace in the standings with the frontrunners, before returning home on October 13 to face Pittsburg State.
