Incumbent sues to de-certify opponent

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – With less than two weeks until the Nov. 6 general election, a local school board candidate has filed a suit against her opponent seeking her removal from the ballot.

Incumbent Ashley Gilhousen, who represents District 5 on the Clay County School Board, accused her opponent Lynn Chafee last week of failing to properly

qualify as a District 5 school board seat candidate. The suit filed Oct. 23 claims Chafee was not a resident of District 5 at the time of qualifying and because of that, is asking a circuit court judge to remove Chafee's name from the ballot. However. at the same time, Clay County Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambless, said based on the documents Chafee filed for her candidacy, Chafee is a resident of District 5.

"After further review, Supervisor

Chambless has confirmed that the documents that Chafee filed were properly completed and her voter registration address on file does fall within the District 5 boundaries," according to an official statement released by the Supervisor of Elections office on Oct. 17. "However, whether Chafee legally resides at that residency is out of his purview.'

Attorney D'Agata leaving school board for new job



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Forum addresses state, local amendments

ORANGE PARK – Clay County's five constitutional officers spoke to about 50 people at St. Johns River State College last week and addressed the 12 amendments on the Nov. 6 ballot.

Coming in with 56 percent undecided in statewide polls, Amendment 10 captured the most discussion. If approved, the amendment would make the positions of tax collector, sheriff, property appraiser, clerk of court and supervisor of elections elected. All five positions are currently elected offices, but that's not the case for all Florida counties

Clay County Clerk of Court Tara Green said the constitutional officers acted as checks and balances.

"So, [constitutional officers] are elected by the 155,000 registered voters vs. maybe five people on a county commission or a county manager or mayor," Green ad-

dressed the audience. "[Amendment 10] ensures you guys the right to elect those individuals in these five positions."

Property Appraiser Roger Suggs said since his office evaluates a property's taxable value and the county sets the millage rate, it was critical the two processes were independent of each other.

"A vote yes on Amendment 10 guarantees your right as a registered voter to always be able to select your five constitutional officers in the future," Suggs said. "It also guarantees those five constitutional officers will be able to administer their duties independently and without any influence of another government agency."

Amendment 10 is a bundled amendment in that it also calls for creating a state counter-terrorism agency, requires the state Legislature begin its annual session in January instead of March on even-numbered election years and alters language securing the state's Department of Veterans Affairs, essential changing wordage from "...the state may have VA," to "Shall have a VA."

"This new language will not only retain it, but it makes it a mandate," Sheriff Darryl Daniels said.

Critics of Amendment 10, including the Florida League of Women Voters say as written, it would take power away from local government. Opponents also claimed the new VA and counterterrorism language

"Based on the false documents
Defendant Chafee submitted to Supervisor Chambless, Chambless justifiably
– though in error – certified that Defendant Chafee was qualified to run for Clay County School Board, District 5," states the lawsuit.

The suit filed by Gilhousen against both Chambless and Chafee claims Chafee does own a house in District 5 but, it was not the home she was residing in at the time of qualification. Instead, Gilhousen claims Chafee was living in a Fleming Island house at the time of qualifying. Under Florida law, a candidate's primary residence must fall within the district boundaries at the time of qualification. It's this statute that Gilhousen's case stands on

"I own three homes and my legal residence is my home in Green Cove Springs and it was at the time of qualifying," Chafee said.

Chafee said she has been at the Fleming Island home lately because she is about to put it on the market. Because of that, she is there often to clean and clear it out.

Chafee describes the lawsuit as a distracting scare tactic by Gilhousen and her team. She said it nothing more than a

cheap trick.

"I haven't done anything wrong and I hope the voters can see through this cheap trick," Chafee said. "It's desperate and dirty tactics from my opponent and I hope people can see the attack for what it is."

Gilhousen, on the other hand, said it is neither a distraction technique nor a scare tactic. Instead, she said it's an oath she swore as a school board member that compelled her to file the suit.

"It's important to me that we respect the rule of law," Gilhousen said. "As an elected official, I swore an oath that I would uphold the Constitution of the State of Florida and the United States of America, and I feel that I'm duly bound by that law. My commitment to the voters of Clay County is that I will do everything I can to ensure the integrity of our political process to ensure our laws are upheld."

While Gilhousen acknowledged how late in the race this lawsuit has come, she said it was because it was only recently brought to her attention, in late September, that Chafee was not a District 5 resident.

"If it was brought to my attention months ago, all of this would have happened months ago," Gilhousen said.

Chafee said it's worrisome and scary that somebody has been following her around, photographing her.

While Gilhousen's team ensured this

claim made its way to the Supervisor of Elections, she never expected Chambless and his staff to investigate the issue.

"Just to be very clear, I never asked the Supervisor of Elections office to do an investigation because I know that it is not within his purview to do so," Gilhousen said. "There are statutory limitations and because of those, it would not be a legal thing for him to do or engage in, so I never made that request of him."

Now, like Chafee, Chambless is being sued by Gilhousen although according to the official filing, Chambless' name is attached in official capacity only.

"Defendant Chambless is the constitutional officer charged with administering elections within Clay County, Florida and is a necessary and indispensable party for the purposes of the relief sought by this action," the lawsuit reads.

The lawsuit asks that the court order Chambless to de-certify Chafee and remove her name from the ballot as a candidate. However, voters already are casting mail-in ballots and it is unclear whether a judge will hear the case before Nov. 6. Gilhousen said she could not speak on that matter and what that means for the election.

Chambless said if a court orders a candidate's name off a ballot after ballots have already been printed, but before the election is over, typically, the Supervisor of Elections office would attempt to sup-

press the results. This means that mail-in ballots would go out to voters with a memo to explain a candidate on the ballot has been removed by court order. At voting booths, voters would see a notice that explains this as well.

Gilhousen filed the lawsuit with Jacksonville attorney Paul Renner, who also serves as a member of the Florida House of Representatives. Chafee has not yet requested the services of a lawyer, though.

"At this point, I have only heard through word of mouth that I'm being sued," Chafee said. "I haven't' received anything to that effect so if and when that occurs, then I'll take whatever steps myself and my advisor feel is appropriate."

Gilhousen said she hoped Chafee would have withdrawn from the race and eliminated the need for attorneys and court. "My hope was that once she became aware, she would do the right thing and remove herself from the ballot," Gilhousen said. "I'm disappointed that hasn't happened yet."

Chafee said she has no plans to withdraw herself from the ballot.

"Ballots are already out and this election, like my race, is moving forward," Chafee said.

Chafee is in a runoff with Gilhousen after neither candidate received 50 percent of the vote plus one vote to win. Their opponent Travis Christensen has thrown his support behind Chafee.

Not your grandfather's balloon races

FLEMING ISLAND - Energy, force and motion came together last week in a unique way at Paterson Elementary School.

While simply reading through the textbook might work for some, sixth grade science teacher Julie Killian prefers to get her students more involved. Weeks of research, design and following detailed instructions all came together Oct. 18 when science classes held balloon races. To be exact, students built cars that were then powered by balloons to learn hands-on how energy, force and motion all work together to make an object move.

"This is a very educational way to teach them about kinetic and potential energy because it's applied right in front of their eves." Killian said. "It helps them see how these things work in real life.'

While this isn't the first time Killian has hosted a balloon-powered car competition in her five-year career, it's no less exciting. For her, it's seeing the kids put what they learn into action and the excitement that

comes with it that keeps this competition a staple at Paterson.

Each student was required with creating a race car powered by at least one 9-inch balloon. While they were allowed to use the internet for race car inspiration, Killian encouraged them to come up with their own design.

If a race car was unique enough, it earned the student a few bonus points. No matter how unique though, the car had to

Voters Outraged

Campaign Lies Exposed With Public Records

Clay County, Florida With less than two weeks remaining before the November 6th General Election, voters are being subjected to a nearly constant barrage of campaign advertisements. This is true even at the local level where one candidate for Clay County School Board has come under attack after claims Classical charter school, she recently made were found to be untrue.

In a recent campaign statement Ashley Gilhousen told News4Jax that she is the only candidate in her race with children in the public schools. The problem with her statement: it isn't true.

When asked directly by the reporter whether she sends her kids to public school or to the private charter school, the candidate refused to answer the question.* Clay County School District officials, however, have confirmed that Gilhousen pulled her students out of the public school system for the 2017-2018 school year and has enrolled them in the St. Johns Classical Academy, a private charter school located on Fleming Island. Parents, teachers, and voters across Clay County have been issuing public condemnations of the campaign for attempting to mislead the voters.

Charter School Family Connection

Throughout this year's School Board elections, charter schools have continued to be a hotly debated issue. While the majority of the public is opposed to diverting tax dollars away from our public schools and instead giving them to private corporations, several candidates, including Gilhousen, have been heavily funded by charter school lobbyists and special interests.+

Charter schools have been a major talking point in the District 5 School Board race where Gilhousen is struggling to retain her current seat as political newcomer Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee continues to pick up endorsements. Prior to Gilhousen getting caught in the lie about her children, public school teachers have repeatedly called out Gilhousen for failing to recuse herself in September and October of 2016 when she voted to approve the contract for the St. John's Classical Academy charter school. The reason: her mother is the owner

Current County Commissioner Diane Hutchings, Gilhousen's mother, is the founder and owner of the St. Johns Classical Academy, Inc., the corporation the runs the charter school by the same name. A Gilhousen failed to recuse herself from both votes in 2016 and has since helped divert more than \$5 million to her mother's private charter school, the same school her children attend and which barely earned a 'C' rating from the State of Florida this year.

"I'm shocked that any elected official would act in such an unethical way and not follow the law," said current District 1 School Board Member Janice Kerekes. "This is clearly a conflict of interest and I am hopeful that the State of Florida will take up this matter and investigate any wrongdoing on the part of Commissioner Hutchings and her daughter. It's not right that they can award themselves millions of our hard earned tax dollars and yet have no accountability.'

District 5 Frontrunner

Running for District 5, Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee will bring her experience working in the court system to the Clay County School Board. Chafee, whose four children all attended public schools in Clay County, is a Child Advocate Manager for the Guardian ad Litem program in the Fourth Judicial Circuit where she fights to protect abused, abandoned, and neglected children. Chafee is active at her church. River Christian, and previously served on the board of Directors for Quigley House and Grace Episcopal Day School. Chafee has been active and involved throughout the Clay County School District having served on multiple School Advisory Councils. Additionally, Chafee was previously a student tutor at Grove Park Elementary.

Following the August 28th Primary Election, Republican State Committeeman Travis Christensen announced his full endorsement and support of Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee. Christensen, who was previously running against Chafee in the primary, garnered more

than 8,000 votes.

"It is clear to me that Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee is the only candidate in this race who will fight for our public schools while protecting the conservative family values that our community holds dear," said Christensen. Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee, the frontrunner in the District 5 race, has earned every major endorsement this election season. In addition to her endorsement from the teachers, Clay County Education Association, and support employees, School Board Members Janice Kerekes and Tina Bullock have also announced their support for Chafee.

"Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee is the candidate I trust to stand up for our public schools and the children of Clay County," said veteran School Board Member and current Chairman, Carol Studdard, "Why would we elect a charter school advocate to be on our School Board? We need the candidate who believes in our public schools and will stand up to Tallahassee special interests."

Additionally, after reviewing the credentials for all candidates and conducting in-person interviews, the Clay County Education Association has endorsed Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee. "Our committee chose Ms. Chafee because she truly represents the interests of our community and is willing to fight for public education," said President Renna Lee Paiva. 

think the year was 2006. My wife, son and I boarded a plane to go to our nephew's

wedding in Annapolis, Maryland.
And although he

he and I had had a prior conversation, I tried to do something special to help calm his fears.

So, when we boarded, I made a point to sneakily tell the head flight attendant that this was his first flight. After getting the plane up in the air and before it was time to pass out snacks, the surprise unfolded.

The captain announced the name of all the first-time flyers – just the little kids – over the public-address system, while the flight attendants went around and pinned wings on each little passenger.

I could see the smile on my son's face dissolve any anxiety he felt previously.

Last Saturday, I could relate a bit to my son's trepidation, however, I was not going to let anyone see it on my face. Or, so I thought.

After hopping in the seat of the single-engine plane, we strapped in, secured the top and sat on the grassy runway at Haller Airpark awaiting our

turn to take off.

Upon takeoff, we cleared the trees and headed south of Green Cove Springs. My pilot, Joe Tierney, president of the Experimental Aircraft Association, looked over and asked, "Are you doing, OK?" (See how he busted me?)

I said, "Yeah, yeah," as I took a break from wondering at all of the stands of pines below us. It looked like pines for miles and miles. The plane tilted to the left and Joe said we were going to take a turn and head north now.

All I could do is stare out of the window.

"Is that St. Johns County, over there?" I asked as we coasted above the river and headed to Green Cove Springs.

We were about 800 feet high and we traveled about 200 miles per hour in his plane he built himself using a kit. He said he invested about \$70,000 in the aircraft, but on the retail market, the same plane would cost as much as \$500,000.

see all of the landmark buildings in the city as we headed north towards Fleming Island. The pace was a good and steady clip.

Joe said, that after a while, you get used to the bumps and bounces a small aircraft like his often takes. I truly thought it was because I'd gained a little weight.

From our fast-moving perch, I could identify Thunderbolt Elementary School, and other landmarks. Yet each time I saw a pine, I couldn't help but think how this county is about to experience tremendous change.

I saw U.S. Highway 17 and reveled in how it looked like a ribbon with a green stripe down the middle as I viewed it from above and how it has grown over the years from a two-lane road to the six-lane thoroughfare it is today. That road is another visible result of how growth changes

not only the look, but the attitude of a community.

I also thought about Thunderbolt and how Fleming Island's growth in the 1990s exploded to a point the island grew to need three elementary schools

From my perch I could also see acres and acres of cleared pine stands that are getting ready to make way for new housing developments and even more are coming. And with them, come new schools and new roads.

are redundant and the Legislature's change in a start date was meant for campaigning purposes.

Suggs noted two other bundled amendments – Amendment 6 and Amendment 9. Amendment 6 increases the retirement age of judges from 70 to 75 and includes "Marsy's Law." a victim's rights provision. Amendment 9 prohibits offshore oil and gas drilling and vaping in workplaces.

"Obviously those are two similar things," Suggs said to laughs from the audience. The panel also addressed the county-specific amendments added by the county commission and charter review commission.

One amendment would set term limits on constitutional officers to three fourvear terms, which wouldn't take effect until 2032. Tax Collector Jimmy Weeks and Green said there was a wealth of knowledge in constitutional offices.

"We're policy makers. We're administers of the law, not ministers of the law," Green said. "One other county in state of Florida I know of that implements term limits on constitutional officers, but the other 66 counties like the way it works."

One amendment would increase commissioner salaries substantially based on an economic development review and population over four years. Another amendment would increase the county commissioner's consecutive four-year terms from two to three, but permanently cap commissioners to three terms.

"[Currently] An individual could complete those two terms, take a term off and then come back and be re-elected," Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambless

Student Brittany Lassiter, 24, asked the panel questions about lobbying in Tallahassee. She said the panel was excellent because she learned more about the amendments.

"I think this was a great opportunity to come out to honestly learn more on what we're voting on," Lassiter said. "You've seen through social media about what's going, but that's not what's really going on.

Attendee Samuel Edwards, 22, raised concerns about Amendment 1. He said. he learned at SJR State how much local governments rely on ad valorem taxes. Amendment 1 would raise the value of homestead property tax exemption to \$100,000-\$125,000 and increase the maximum exemption to \$75,000. Based on current assessed values, Suggs noted the county could lose about \$6 million a year, while saving eligible homeowners about \$200-\$400.

"Learning that there's going to be more exemptions, that going to be a lot less money they collect from ad valorem taxes," Edwards said. "I don't think people quite understand how important taxes are for the services we use."



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Fix in the works for Council on Aging money woes

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The Council on Aging of Clay County is turning to a familiar face on an interim basis to oversee its transportation losses of about \$17,000 a month.

Renee Knight, the Council's executor director from 2001-2007, started last Fri-

day. She is currently ElderSource's Director of Community Services.

"I will do my best to give you all and the Council on Aging the most information and try my best to make this work for our seniors," Knight said

On Knight's end,

she said the council was attempting to evaluate scaling back the organization's flex line and the council's contracts with the Jacksonville Transportation Authority and Department of Transportation contracts, who assist with funding some

The Council on Aging's Board President John Bowles told county commissioners at the Oct. 23 BCC meeting that Knight was more than capable for the job.

The board terminated the contract of former Executive Director Al Rizer last week. "If anybody understands our community, our agency's mission and our business operation, it's Renee. We are delighted to have her on board," Bowles said.

"She's going to provide our organization with the expertise and support we need in this time of transition." County Auditor Mike Price gave commissioners a breakdown of money the Council needs to keep transportation afloat while developing a plan of controlled phasing out of flex lines over a six-month period.

Price said the council needs \$20,000 a month and \$25,000 for fuel. In addition, he asked commissioners to forgive \$165,893 in fuel and maintenance costs.

With their cash position currently, I don't think the board stands that much a chance of earning those monies anyway, so this basically represents a recognition of reality," Price said.

Commissioners agreed to provide the \$45,000 for operating expenses and fuel and vehicle maintenance for November.

CCOA Board Vice President and former Clay County Commissioners Wendell Davis said the council was in the process of "untangling a spider-web." But with the county, council and ElderSource meeting weekly, he said they would work for the

next 30 days to develop a six-month plan and assess flex lines and contracts thor-

"In 30 days, we may not have all the answers, or have it solved. But we will certainly talk more intelligently," Davis said.

County Manager Stephanie Kopelousos, the former state Department of Transportation secretary, said officials would meet with Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged.

"They understand what position we're in and they understand what the goal is," Kopelousos said. "I think they're going to help us get to that point we need to get to."

Commissioners agreed to a funding agreement with the Council, with the understanding there would be amendments based on future meetings of the agencies. Commissioners Wayne Bolla and Mike Cella said cutting senior services was out of the question, but a concrete plan to curb transportation losses was imminent.

Price added the Teal Line - which serves the Keystone Heights area – had about a \$76,000 net loss per year and the Magenta Line had near \$98,000 in losses. When commissioners asked Price how the problem started, he said management turnover combined with a decline in flex line revenue led to the perilous financial situation.

'Mostly you have flex line revenue that isn't sufficient to cover flex line costs," Price said. "In every other activity, they've got they're covering their costs."

Vision is the secret to success

I teach monthly leader development classes, and, in these classes, I'm often asked what is one factor that distinguish-

es good leaders from great leaders? And like any good academic my answer is - it depends! When participants don't like that answer and force me to respond my answer is vision. Being able to commu-

nicate a compel-

ling vision is a defining characteristic of great leaders.

Consider the critical role vision has played throughout history in the success of leaders like Henry Ford, Walt Disney, Nelson Mandela, Abraham Lincoln, Jeff Bezos and many others. Each of these leaders shared a clear and compelling vision with their followers. Without a compelling vision, people are not moved to follow a leader, and if the quality of a leader's vision is inadequate people will be reluctant to follow.

I recently polled attendees in one of my leader development classes and less than 20 percent could identify the vision for their team. I realized leaders recognize the importance of vision they just don't know how to develop one. So here goes.

Do you want to be a great leader? If so, the following questions can help guide the development of your vision.

Q1. Why does our team exist and why is it important?

The keyword in this question is why - every leader knows what their team does, but it's harder to articulate why they do it. I encourage you to web search "Start with Why" and watch the video by Simon Sinek. He explains that individuals are not compelled to join a cause when you explain what you do; the more compelling approach is to explain

why you do it. The video has some great examples of highly successful companies that use this approach.

Q2. Over the long-term (5-10 years), what do we hope to accomplish?

What difference do we want to make? When answering these questions, think about your team in the future. If they are consistently fulfilling their purpose with excellence, what images do you see? What ideas come to mind? Once you have that image in your mind – the next question becomes: what are the stories I might tell around those ideas and images that explain my vision?


Q3. What are two goals my team has for the next year?

These goals are the action steps the team needs to take over the next 6-12 months to help accomplish the longerterm vision. Answering this question helps a leader align the team with the vision and can help guide the communication of expectations.

So, if you have followed me, you should now realize creating a compelling vision requires an appeal to the better angels of our nature (Q1), it is part storytelling (O2), and it involves some strategic thinking (Q3). In more practical terms, answering these questions can help you identify the purpose/mission of your team, the team vision and team goals.

From my experience, people don't follow leaders with fancy titles and authority. They follow ordinary folks who can create a compelling vision of the future. I hope you will use these guiding questions to clearly define where your team is going and how they are going to get there.

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Salad recalled due to salmonella fears

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – More than 730 pounds of salad was recalled last week due to fears of salmonella and listeria monocytogenes contamination, according to the United States Department of Agriculture.

USDA warned of contaminated corn in "Marketside Fiesta Salad with Steak." The product came in clear clamshell packaging produced from Oct.11-14, with a use by date of Oct.17-20. The salads shipped to Walmart, Trader Joe's and Whole Foods in Florida, Georgia and South Carolina.

GHSE LLC, a Green Cove Springsbased arm of Santa Paula, Calif.-based Calavo Growers. Calavo began operations, primarily avocados, in the former 800,000 square foot Food Lion facility three years

"The problem was discovered on Oct. 15, 2018 when GHSE, LLC received notification that the corn used in the production of their ready-to-eat salad product was being recalled by their corn supplier

due to Listeria monocytogenes and Salmonella concerns," the USDA said.

Products recalled have the establishment number, "EST. 45781" inside the USDA mark of inspection.

Citing a high health risk, the recall was issued Class I status, meaning there is a chance consumption of the product may "cause serious, adverse health consequences or death," according to the agency's website.

At presstime, there were no confirmed cases of salmonella or listeria monocytogenes related to the salads so far. The USDA said it urged people who consumed the product to contact a healthcare provider.

Salmonellosis is a common bacterial foodborne illness usually lasting four days to a week. Most people recover without treatment, according to the USDA, though some may need hospitalization. Within 12 to 72 hours, symptoms include abdominal cramps, fever and diarrhea after eating a contaminated product.

bacteria could cause listeriosis, an infection affecting weak immune systems, pregnant women, newborns and older adults.

The release said it's uncommon the bacteria affects people outside those three groups, but fever, muscle aches, headaches, confusion, loss of balance and convulsions sometimes preceded by diarrhea or other gastrointestinal effects are

potential symptoms.

"Persons in the higher-risk categories who experience flu-like symptoms within two months after eating contaminated food should seek medical care and tell their healthcare provider about eating the contaminated food," the USDA release said



Plea deal: 5-year sentence for drunk driving death

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A 55-year-old Magnolia Point Golf and Country Club resident faces a five-year prison sentence, two years of house arrest and eight years of probation for a 2017 drunk-driving fatality.

Fourth Circuit Court Judge John Skin-

ner sentenced Lisa Frances Beverly to prison on Oct. 23 for the death of Glen Aaron McDonald, 39, of Fleming Island whom she struck and killed while McDonald was driving a scooter on U.S. Highway 17 around 10 p.m. on August 4, 2017.

The State Attorney's Office originally sought to convict Beverly of DUI manslaughter, but the negotiated charge was lowered to leaving the scene of an accident involving death and misdemeanor DUI. According to the Florida Highway Patrol, which investigated the crash, Beverly had a blood-alcohol content of .20 the night of the crash, more than double the limit of .08. According to terms of the plea, Beverly won't have driving privileges for three years after being released from prison, will be required to wear a SCRAM alcoholdetection monitor for one year after prison and be subject to random alcohol testing while on probation.

After prison, Beverly's vehicle will also be equipped for three years with an interlock device that requires drivers to take and successfully pass a breathalyzer BAC test before the car allows them to drive. She will also be required to perform 250 hours of community service with Mothers Against Drunk Driving and participate in a Victim's Impact Panel, which involves telling others how their drunk-driving experi-

ence changed their family's lives.

The night of the crash, witnesses told FHP they saw Beverly heading south on U.S. 17 when she rear-ended McDonald's scooter at the foot of the Black Creek Bridge. The scooter and McDonald became trapped underneath Beverly's GMC Envoy and dragged McDonald's body to the top of the span of the bridge where he fell off.

Beverly continued dragging the scooter without McDonald until her vehicle passed Garber Auto Mall where it flew out from under her SUV. Meanwhile, Beverly continued driving with the vehicle engulfed in flames until she pulled into her driveway in the 3300 block of Hawktree Court.

After being detained and questioned by police, Beverly said, "she didn't know what to do so she drove home." The entire incident was captured on video.

The night of the crash, McDonald was transported to Orange Park Medical Center where he was pronounced dead later in the week. Several of his organs were donated to others after the crash.

Country Club resident in possession of 700,000+ images of child pornography

ORANGE PARK – A Orange Park Country Club resident faces 10 counts of child pornography possession after an investigation by the Clay County Sheriff's Office.

Police arrested John Michael Moss-

man, 39, on Oct. 22 at 3:07 p.m. using a warrant police obtained after first interviewing him on Oct. 16.

Mossman, who told police he moved here from Illinois about two-and-a-half years ago, lived at the home on Glenlyon Drive with his

parents. On Oct. 16, Mossman confirmed for police that he was the only user of his electronics in the home and that they were password-protected. According to the police report, he also told police he owns an external hard drive and laptop. The officer went on to ask Mossman if he had knowledge of peer-to-peer file sharing and Torrent websites, which Mossman admitted he did.

"I advised John that Law Enforcement on multiple occasions downloaded child sexual exploitation material from the IP[Internet Protocol] address at his residence," states the report.

Police said before Mossman invoked his Constitutional right to an attorney, he admitted that he had been arrested in Illinois previously for being a "Peeping Tom" involving a 12-year-old child.

"John admitted to being caught looking into a 12-year-old child's bedroom window. John also stated he previously worked at a children's hospital in Illinois," states the CCSO report.

According to the police report, the initial investigation as of Oct. 22 showed detectives uncovered at least "700,000 images of child exploitation files" from Mossman's devices

"Several of the files were submitted to NCMEC[the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children] and returned as recognized child victim's[sic]," states the report.

Under Florida law, if a suspect owns 10 or more images of child pornography and one file shows an exploited child under age 5, the charges are then elevated to a second-degree felony.

At press time, Mossman remained in the Clay County Jail where his bond is set at \$115,030.

Drunken gunshot ends in arrest

ARGYLE – A night of drinking ended in a gunshot into a neighbor's home last weekend in the Argyle community.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Richard Dean Lowe, 32, on Oct. 20 at 2:31 a.m. after responding to a home in the

3000 block of White Heron Trail

According to the police report, Lowe struck his mother while brandishing a gun. After the altercation, he allegedly fled the scene in an Acura sedan with Washington state license plates. He was located minutes

later at Argyle Elementary School, a few streets from the home.

Police found evidence showing Lowe had shot a bullet through a garage door in the home that ended up going through the wall of a next-door neighbor's home.

Police said the family whose home was shot was all asleep and were not wounded in the shooting and officers later found the gun on a shelf in the garage. Police also said both Lowe and the victim had the smell of alcohol on their breath.

Lowe is charged with shooting through a building, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and domestic battery. At press time, he remained in the Clay County Jail with bond set at \$100,758.

3 killed in separate weekend crashes

JACKSONVILLE – Three separate traffic accidents resulted in the deaths of three men in Clay and Putnam Counties last weekend.

The Jacksonville Florida Highway Patrol office reports that 66-year-old John Moore of Middleburg was killed in a crash Oct. 20 at 8 p.m. while riding his 2014 Harley Davidson Ultra northbound on U.S. Highway 17 in Putnam County.

FHP said Moore was ejected from his bike and pronounced dead at the scene near Hoot Owl Road. He was struck head-on by a 2000 Ford F-150 truck driven by Brian Plante, 50, of Satsuma, who was not injured.

vote by the school board, in which board members Janice Kerekes and Chairman Carol Studdard dissented, D'Agata has accepted a position as deputy general counsel with the Florida DOE in Tallahassee.

"Reaching the decision to resign was incredibly difficult for me, as my tenure fortuitously coincided with an era of dramatic growth and improvement seldom seen by public school districts in our state, and even our country," D'Agata wrote in his resignation letter. "I take tremendous pride in having played a role – albeit a minor one – assisting the Board, the Superintendent and his Cabinet Members, and so many gifted personnel throughout our District in such achievements for the good

of Clay County students and the community at large."

D'Agata was originally attracted to the job he's leaving after learning Davis was elected to lead over the district in 2016. According to D'Agata, he had worked tangentially with Davis in the past and enjoyed doing so, so when he learned Davis was elected, he applied for the position in Green Cove Springs.

Now, after 18 months, he's moving on, but he said he'll always be available for advice to the board. D'Agata also told the board during the Oct. 23 School Board Agenda Review Workshop that the board will have a good friend in the DOE now.

While he's served as the attorney for the Clay County School Board for about 18 months, Clay County was not where he fell in love with education. D'Agata began his career as a classroom teacher more than a dozen years ago.

"I was an educator before I was a lawyer," D'Agata said. "I was a teacher. I got my Ph.D [a doctorate in education] while in my second year of law school." D'Agata said it was his time as an educator that inspired him to practice law in the field of education. Today, he has 15 years of law practice under his belt, with many of those years devoted to education.

Davis, like the rest of the school board, said he was sad to see D'Agata go but happy about the work he did for the district during his tenure.

"I'm thankful for the last two years of work D'Agata has done for this board," Davis said. "It's not easy being in that position, but he did great things for us and with us."

Looking forward, the school board is now tasked with hiring a new attorney and

they must do so fast as D'Agata's last day is Dec. 21.

"We have to try to figure out the best way for Clay County because every county is different and I want to get the best legal service I can get for the least amount of money," Studdard said.

Because the Oct. 23 meeting was only a workshop, no action could be taken. The Clay County School Board will discuss its next move in the legal arena at the upcoming regular school board meeting, which will be held at 6 pm. on Nov. 1. In the initial discussion, the board talked whether there was a consensus to hire a new attorney or a desire to only contract for legal services with a law firm well-versed in education policy and law.

Camporee provides fun, builds confidence

ORANGE PARK – In an idyllic scene of childhood fun, hundreds of kids ran, laughed, played and launched handmade rockets.

Many were clad in uniform, kids gathered in mass to have a day of fun outside at a local Scout camp. However, this day was not for the Scouts themselves. Instead, it was for a community of children who rarely, if ever, have this opportunity.

This scene unfolded Oct. 20 at Camp Echockotee in Orange Park, where Learning for Life, a Scouts of America organization that focuses on special needs kids, organized a Special Needs Camporee for youth throughout the metro Jacksonville area. The Camporee drew in almost 200 special needs students and their families and provided kids a place where they could feel safe.

"I think it has an incredibly positive effect on their lives," said David Gabriel, the youth event chairman for Order of the Arrow, the Scout honor society that helped organize the event. "This experience could be something that they remember for the rest of their lives. If it gets them excited to take a break from their phone and take a break from their TV and go outside and join nature and have fun, that's why we're here."

According to the Episcopal Center for Children, a private nonprofit organization in Washington, D.C. that assists children with special needs, getting special needs children outside can be crucial for their health. It can improve their coordination, motor skills and their social skills, as well as build self-esteem.

"With the ever-increasing technological advancements that are coming along, it's easier for children to just be perfectly content sitting at home with their phone and their screens, totally invested in the palm of their hand," Gabriel said. "Getting back into nature sort of gives them the opportunity that a lot of children don't get."


The Camporee included games, Scouting activities such as arts and crafts, bounce houses, food, and boat rides on Doctors Lake. After the daytime activities, the organization set up camp sites in the woods of Camp Echockotee, with free to use tents, prepared for special needs to spend the night and experience real camping outdoors. The Scouts even prepared a show for them, including skits and songs for the campers.

According to Michelle Thompson, a Learning for Life executive who organized the event, such an event can have a great impact on the Scouts as well.

"It's touching because you get to see a lot of young men and women who are normally in it to earn badges and help themselves put themselves aside and help come together and make a lot of fun for a lot of kids who don't normally get a situation where they can just have fun and it's care-

free and it's not just about each individual Scout," Thompson said. "Some of them said they don't really bump into any special needs kids where they are, and they said they're not really different from how we are, they just learn differently than we do.

"Another thing is that they learn com-

passion and patience. It gives them an opportunity to give back to the community as a whole. They have to learn to put others first," Thompson said.

AJ Wooten, 16, of Jacksonville, said this was his fourth year attending the Camporee.

"It's pretty fun," Wooten said. "I like the idea of everyone coming out to help the special needs. It encourages them, helps them to keep going and learn more. And it helps them to accept themselves. It's something to socialize, go outside, have fun."

According to Wooten's father, Albert Wooten, the event has changed AJ's life drastically.

"When he was in school, they would call him stupid and make fun of him and stuff like that, just really give him a hard time," Albert said. "It wasn't until he came here that there was that first time he really felt accepted. It was that first time I saw him socially interacting and stuff in a real way. He was just having fun you know he felt accepted. To me, as a parent, that was just amazing. So that set the stage and that's why we go every year."

Albert Wooten said there's no way to measure how much AJ has improved because of the Camporee, but as a parent, he knows the Camporee is a major reason behind it.


"Now he's a little more comfortable in

his skin," Wooten said. "Now he's a social butterfly. I mean he's still got some awkwardness about him of course, but he's a lot more fluent about his communication and interacting with people. He's more confident. So, I think that's the key thing is growing their confidence. Having that moment where you're just one of the kids, they accept me, they like me, then it lets him know there are other kids out there like him, where I'm not sure he really believed that before."



two Mello Yello bottles with a hand sanitizer concoction in the bottles used for consumption. Two empty cans of chewing tobacco and hand sanitizer were also found in the van.

Barnes was fired Sept. 26 by Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels. Barnes denied knowledge of how inmates received contraband in the report, and said he was getting unfair treatment because of his father's position in the sheriff's office. David Barnes Sr., a 25-year law enforcement veteran, is CCSO's director of Personnel and Professional Standards.

The report said Barnes was questioned over claims he allegedly told inmates where they would be working on the detail in advance and showing inmates videos on his phone. Barnes was separately investigated for staying inside a work van in June while inmates worked outside for about an hour, according to video evidence cited in the investigation.

He also had a pending investigation for acting outside his authority in Bradford County.

Argyle man held in 2017 home invasion robbery

ARGYLE - An Argyle man remains in the Clay County Jail without bond on charges of home invasion robbery and kidnapping.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Victor Blaine Paulk, 31, on Oct. 12

for a robbery that took place on July 20, 2017 at a home in the 200 block of Capella Road.

According t.o the arrest warrant, Paulk and another man went to the victim's home where they were invited in because the unnamed man and the

victim used to be roommates. According to the victim, "they had some drinks and watched television.'

According to the warrant, Paulk and his accomplice, returned to the victim's home "armed with handguns forced their way through the front door."

Police said the victim was forced to get on the living room floor face down where Paulk and his accomplice tied the victim's hands and feet using USB cables to prevent him "from being able to leave his residence," states the warrant.

The victim told police that one of the robbers went into the victim's pocket and took a bank ATM card and other credit cards and forced him to give them his PIN numbers. They then stole a 46-inch television and the victim's cell phone before one man fled to an apartment in Jacksonville.

This past March. Paulk's accomplice told police the guns were BB guns, not handguns and admitted tying up the victim and committing the crime.

Paulk has a scheduled court date of Nov. 10. There is no word on whether his accomplice has been arrested.

Disgraced deputy enters plea deal

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - A former 10year veteran Clay County Sheriff's Office deputy who allegedly filed a false police report will no longer be allowed to work in law enforcement in Florida and will serve 11 months on probation after he signed a plea agreement Oct. 16 with the State Attorney's Office.

The investigation found Mark Alan Andrews, 42, was drinking at the Ameri-

can Legion Lodge in Keystone Heights on December 31, 2017 before he left and hit another vehicle and fled the scene. According to police, the crash occurred at 1:10 a.m. when Andrews abruptly pulled out Mark Alan Andrews into a traffic lane in



his CCSO unmarked police car and struck the passenger side of a vehicle passing by. He was later charged with false report of the commission of a crime and leaving the scene of an accident resulting in property damage.

Andrews was given credit towards his sentence for having served one day in jail after entering a plea of no contest to the charges. He will also be required to successfully complete a drug and alcohol evaluation and complete rehabilitation, perform 25 hours of community service, pay \$6,677.95 for investigation costs.

"Andrews will have a permanent record of this criminal conviction for the rest of his life. The system worked the way it should – he has been prosecuted and the case has been resolved," stated Chief Assistant State Attorney L.E. Hutton, who oversees the Clay County Office, in a prepared statement.

The night of the accident, the driver of the vehicle Andrews struck, Eliza Taylor Chapple, of Valdosta, Georgia, immediately stopped her car and got out, but Andrews fled the scene. The crash took place on West Walker Drive near Wendy's restaurant.

When Andrews fled. Chapple attempted to follow him but, she was unable to catch up and returned to the scene of the accident. About six hours later, a call for service came into the CCSO Communications unit. This call involved the report of an abandoned CCSO vehicle in Keystone Heights. When police got to Andrews' house at 6357 Baker Rd. in Keystone Heights, there were numerous CCSO items thrown across a yard, including a taser, several loaded firearm magazines and more.

After the call, CCSO contacted Andrews who reported his police vehicle had been stolen and then abandoned a few doors down the street from his home. As a result, CCSO opened an investigation that determined the damage done to the vehicle was consistent with the traffic crash reported by Chapple.

During CCSO's investigation, Andrews, a former homicide detective, provided written and recorded sworn statements in which he said that his police vehicle was stolen. He also said he was home asleep when his vehicle was stolen and had no knowledge of Chapple's crash. Andrews also said he never left his home the night of the crash

Further investigation found Andrews lied, after interviewing two witnesses who said they saw Andrews drinking at the

American Legion Lodge shortly before the accident. Police also found Andrews used his CCSO-issued laptop shortly after the accident occurred.

Police also seized Andrews' personal and CCSO-issued cell phone records, which showed he was not asleep, but made phone calls after the crash. Cell phone records showed Andrews was "in numerous areas of Keystone Heights prior to and after" the crash

It was also determined that Andrews was the driver of the police vehicle that crashed into Chapple's car. CCSO arrested Andrews on May 17, 2018 after a judge issued a warrant the day before.

Devils' upset bid ends at 1:42



Roberts snags 61 yard pick for USF Bulls

USF (7-0) matches program's best start to a season

TAMPA – University of South Florida running backs Johnny Ford and Jordan Cronkrite both rushed for 100-plus yards as No. 21/20 USF posted the program's second straight 7-0 start to a season with a 38-30 victory over University of Connecticut before a homecoming crowd of 41,127 at Raymond James Stadium on Sat., Oct. 18 in Tampa.

One of just five remaining unbeaten teams in FBS football, No. 21/20 USF (7-0, 3-0 in The American) seized the momentum with a 17-point third quarter and totaled 611 yards on the way to matching the program's best-ever start to a season. After heading into halftime tied at 7-7, USF registered 199 of its 346 total rushing yards during a 31-point outburst in the second half.

After Connecticut cut its deficit to 17-14, Jernard Phillips got the Bulls back into scoring position with a career long 69-yard

kickoff return. Two plays later, Barnett registered his team-leading seventh rushing touchdown of the season from 20 yards out with 2:34 remaining in the third quarter.

On the next Bulls' series, Oakleaf High graduate and redshirt freshman safety Nick Roberts' 61-yard interception return set up Ford's second 15-yard rushing touchdown to help pump the USF lead up to 31-14 less than a minute in the fourth quarter. Roberts, who has switched from a cornerback recruit to the safety position, has matched his career high with 10 tackles while fellow redshirt freshman Mekhi LaPointe (Seffner, Fla.) set a new career high with a game-high 11 tackles.

USF finished with two 100-yard rushers for the 15th time in program history. Ford scored three times on seven carries and finished with 164 yards in his first career 100-yard game. The freshman from Miami set a USF game record (minimum five carries) with 23.4 yards per attempt and now owns USF's longest non-scoring run after breaking off a 78-yarder in the third quarter.

USF is one of only five remaining undefeated teams left in FBS football this sea-

MIDDLEBURG – Orange Park runner William Saunders signed up for the Black Creek 5K run to get a quick time on a relatively flat course.

"They didn't tell me they changed the course and added hills," said Saunders, who won the 30-34 age group despite the hills, but with a 23 minute, 25.5 second split. "That was awfully hard. I was shooting for around 20-21 minutes."

With the 7th annual event adding a 10K (6.2 miles) course to the agenda, race director Michael Patch saw an increase in interest in 2018. The 5K had 330 runners. The 10K had 57 finishers. The race proceeds benefit the David White Memorial Scholarship named after Clay County Sheriff's Office Detective David White, who was killed in a drug arrest operation in 2012.

"I think the 10K distance will become popular as more hard core runners can get enough distance to make it worth the effort," said Patch, who noted the David White Scholarship fund has released nearly \$65,000 over the past seven years. "The 5K is a more recreational runner fit while going 6.2 miles is a bit more intense for the average runner. We had about 80-85 new faces this year."

In the 5K, Clay High cross country ace Luke Bybee, 16, battled with previous winner and master's runner John McColl, 36, of Middleburg, and came out on top with a final surge to win in 19:57.8. McColl was just five seconds behind at 20:04.0 with 13 year old Triston Schultz third at 22:04.5.

In 2017, Bybee was sixth with McColl second to Ridgeview High senior Keith Kelley who won on the "easy" course in 17:48.8.

"I think being near districts in my high school cross country season helped me in the new course," said Bybee, who will compete Wednesday in the district 4-2A championship race at Ridgeview High School. "John is a strong runner and was tough to shake."

For the women, Bishop Snyder High Schooler Hannah Johnson, 15, had to






Game four reverted back to Rivers and friends blasting the net to a 25-14 finale for the title. after being locked at 11-11.

"Nease had a very hard time getting momentum, and our girls just kept fighting the good fight and it helped us take the game over," said Prewitt.







and racing to the end zone to send the Clay sideline into a frenzy with their lead now at 17-0 with Reape's third PAT kick.
