Lawsuit between school board candidates put on hold

Judge recommends to let Nov. 6 election play out

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — A lawsuit filed by a Clay County School Board incumbent against her opponent has been put on hold until after the upcoming Nov. 6 election.

Last week, on Oct. 23, incumbent Ash-

ley Gilhousen, who represents District 5 on the Clay County School Board, filed a lawsuit that saw her accuse her opponent, Lynn Chafee, of failing to properly qualify as a District 5 school board seat candidate. A week later, on Oct. 30, 4th Judicial Circuit Court Judge Gary Wilkinson heard the case. Wilkinson's main concern with the case was whether pushing for a hearing date before the Nov. 6 election would

even affect the election. Because of how many votes already cast, Wilkinson recommended waiting until after the election for another hearing.

"With over 30,000 votes in already, the judge said pushing the hearing date to before [the election] wouldn't have an effect on the election," Gilhousen said. "Because of that, [Wilkinson] recommended that we

Residents get first look at upcoming streetscape project

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — For the first time since the Streetscape project inception, the residents of Keystone Heights were able to speak directly with the Florida Department of Transportation about what the project will do for the city.

Held on Oct. 25, the FDOT and Keystone Heights City Council held a Streetscape open house at city council chambers. Here, not only were the City Manager and Mayor present, but representatives of FDOT were there to answer any questions residents might have had.

"This is the first time we're getting di-

rect feedback like this, but so far, it's been pretty positive," Keystone Heights Mayor Karen Lake said. "There are some minor concerns, like construction times, but overall, people seem to be excited about this."

While this project has been on the table for years, this open house served as the first time residents were able to see what the project might actually look like. While not too many residents made an appearance during this open house, there will be another in the coming months to give residents another chance to speak with project officials.

The \$7.2 million project will span 7.2 miles of Keystone Heights, or a 5-block area running along State Road 21 from East Walker Drive south to Lakeview Drive.

"We'll be paying for some small things like landscaping along the road, but for the most part, FDOT is covering the \$7.2 million," Keystone Heights City Manager Scott

WAPE frightened horses, stampeded the cows

It was in the late 1950s, when work crews arrived and cleared a plot on the east side of two-lane Hwy 17 about a mile south of the Doctors Lake Bridge. Even the clearing attracted attention because in those days there was nothing much but pine woods on either side of that road from Orange Park to Green Cove Springs.

Construction began but just stirred up more questions. It was weird with curving walls and a flat roof. It didn't look like anything locals had ever seen before. When the swimming pool and high diving board went in – traffic increased and slowed to a near crawl.

Then, word got around that the bizarre structure would be home to a new and improved radio station called WAPE and was projected to be bigger and better than anything on the airwaves at the time. The swimming pool was supposed to be part of some new-fangled contraption to cool the transmitter.

Locals laughed and went about their

regular business after speculating that they had a good name – WAPE – and that monkey business was probably exactly what those duck-tailed, turned-up collar young disc jockeys were up to.

When they began broadcasting, WAPE suddenly had almost everybody in Clay County's attention. They cranked that thing up and rock and roll music came screaming out of every telephone and barbed wire fence in Clay County. With the addition of the distinctive ape call, chaos reigned.

Dogs howled, livestock stampeded, and the dairy cows quit giving milk. Teenagers were thrilled to talk to friends while Jerry Lee Lewis and Patsy Cline wailed in the background – parents not so much. The jury was still out on whether rock and roll was the work of the Devil or just good fun.

WAPE dialed back the decibels and everything returned to normal until summertime came and young girls started showing up in bathing suits to flirt with the platter spinners and pose around the pool.

This time cars full of gawkers driving

by came to a crawl and tow trucks did a lot of business pulling cars out of the ditches. After all it was the fifties and folks just weren't accustomed to seeing skin. Bathing suits were expected at the beach or the lake but not on the side of a public highway.

The music was great and reception was perfect.

For the first time, teenagers could listen to music after the sun went down

without the marathon adjusting of knobs or holding the radio over their heads.

Clay County residents found instant friends anywhere in the southeast when people found out they were neighbors of "The Big Ape." Every Clay County boy who trained at the U.S. Marine Corps' Parris Island remembers feeling a little less homesick when he heard the ape holler out over the radio.

Carroll urges voters to say 'No' to all 13 Constitutional amendments

FLEMING ISLAND – Multiple former Florida elected officials are telling people to vote 'no' on all of the state's 13 proposed Constitutional amendments on the ballot.

Save My Constitution is an organization made up of former state and federal lawmakers, as well as two former lieutenant governors. Labeling the ballot measures as "confusing" and "misleading," the group proposes that the public votes

against them.

Former Florida Lt. Gov. Jennifer Carroll disagrees with the way the amendments were conceived.

"I don't like bundling in general," said Carroll, who still maintains a home and presence on Fleming Island. "Any subject matter in the amendment has to be connected to the bill title and these amendments are not."

Organizer Jake Capistran believes the amendments are too long.

"It's absurd that there are (13) amendments on one ballot," Capistran said. "It's 20 pages. That's what voter disenfranchisement is."

Capistran is a field organizer for NextGen, a nonprofit organization that teaches

voters about candidates who support environmental policies.

According to an August 2018 Orlando Sentinel article, former Florida House member Jim Kallinger said the group is looking at all the issues.

"We're saying vote 'no' on everything because we feel they were conceived in a deceptive way," Kallinger was quoted as saying. "We're going to address the process."

Capistran believes that the amendments were made purposefully confusing.

"The writing on the amendments is super confusing," Capistran said. "It's meant to confuse students. They'll vote yes on things they don't understand."

Save My Constitution was formed

largely to oppose the process that places members on the Constitution Revision Commission.

Every 20 years, the governor and legislative leaders appoint members to the commission. The 37-member commission can put amendments on the ballot. Save My Constitution leaders believe that the process allows "lobbyists" and "political insiders" on the commission.

Carroll believes that the ballot measures circumvent the legislative process.

"The Constitution Revision Commission is not supposed to be revising the constitution," Carroll said. "It is an unelected body with no oversight and with special interests."

Chafee Leads In Runoff

Opponent faces growing pressure over allegations

Clay County, Florida – With the November 6th General Election just days away, voter outrage continues to mount over allegations that recently surfaced concerning District 5 School Board candidate Ashley Hutchings-Gilhousen, daughter of County Commissioner Diane Hutchings, who also owns the private St. Johns Classical charter school.*

Sending Her Kids to Her Mother's Private Charter School

In early October, public records showed that Hutchings-Gilhousen did in fact pull her kids out of Clay County public schools and has enrolled them in her mother's private charter school, despite the fact that she has continued to claim she sends her kids to public school on her campaign literature. Her opponent, Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee, has repeatedly called out Hutchings-Gilhousen for lying to the public and for failing to recuse herself in September and October of 2016, when she cast the deciding vote two months in a row to approve her mother's private charter school. Since opening, the charter school has diverted more than \$5 million of taxpayer money to the Hutchings-owned private corporation.

"I'm shocked that any elected official would act in such an unethical way and not follow the law," said current District 1 School Board Member Janice Kerekes.

Owner and lead shareholder of the private St. Johns Classical charter school, Diane Hutchings

"This is clearly a conflict of interest and I am hopeful that the State of Florida will take up this matter and investigate any wrongdoing on the part of Commissioner Hutchings and her daughter. It's not right that they can award themselves millions of our hard earned tax dollars and yet have no accountability." In its first year of operation, the Hutchings-owned school barely achieved a C-grade from the Florida Department of Education. Hutchings-Gilhousen, who is struggling to retain her seat, has been heavily funded by special interest political committees and charter school lobbyists. ^

District 5 Frontrunner

Running for District 5, Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee will bring her experience working in the court system to the Clay County School Board. Chafee, whose four children all attended public schools in Clay County, is a Child Advocate Manager for the Guardian ad Litem program in the Fourth Judicial Circuit where she fights to protect abused, abandoned, and neglected children. Chafee, who resides in Green Cove Springs, is active at her church, River Christian, and previously served on the board of Directors for Quigley House and Grace Episcopal Day School. Chafee has been active and involved throughout the Clay County School District having served on multiple School Advisory Councils. Following the August 28th Primary Election, Republican State Committeeman Travis Christensen announced his full endorsement and support of Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee. Christensen, who was previously running against Chafee in the primary, garnered more than 8,000 votes. "It is clear to me that Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee is the only candidate in this race who will fight for our public

schools while protecting the conservative family values that our community holds dear," said Christensen. "I am proud to support Lynne as we work towards her November 6th victory. Let's reject the special interests trying to control our School Board."

Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee, the frontrunner in the District 5 race, has earned every major endorsement this election season. Christian Coalition urges 'Yes on 4'

For leaders of the Christian Coalition of America, the letting ex-felons vote seemed a no-brainer.

"Redemption and second chances are really at the heart of the Christian faith," said Keith den Hollander, national field director.

So now, the famously conservative organization stands with liberal organizations, like the ACLU, in championing Amendment 4, which would automatically restore the voting rights of most felons — except those convicted of first-degree murder and sex offenses — upon completing their restitution to the state.

A new ad is airing by Christian Coalition of America features Brett Ramsden, Florida Justice Initiatives director, discussing his own experience being stripped of the right to vote.

Ramsden, a recovering opioid abuser, said during 12 years of serious addiction, it never occurred to him he might be putting his right to vote on the line.

That's partly because while he committed numerous misdemeanor thefts in service of his addiction, he never got arrested on a felony charge. But Florida's legal system raises the stakes for repeat offenders. And while Ramsden eventually was sentenced to two years of felony probation, he never spent a day in prison.

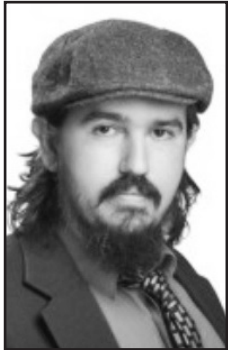
"That's another misnomer. Seventy-five percent of returning citizens never did serve any prison time. Our offenses weren't considered severe enough to warrant prison sentences."

The Sarasota resident is now sober and involved in the political cause of promoting restoration of rights.

"Voting is really important," Ramsden said. "It's our civic duty as Americans to vote."

Ramsden also notes that sentences in full get determined by judges, but a lifetime ban on voting rights takes place based on statute, regardless of the circumstances and severity of a crime.

Yet a frequent concern among conservative political organizations remains what effect a sudden infusion of millions of ex-voters onto the voter rolls.

The Heritage Foundation has produced detailed arguments on why felons should lose the right to vote and argues that with more than half of felons becoming repeat offenders, there should be a process for seeking clemency after a sentence is completed before rights get restored.

"It makes sense to wait some period of time, as Florida does, to make sure that the felon really has turned over a new leaf," wrote Roger Clegg and Hans von Spakovsky for the foundation.

Ramsden, though, said Florida's clemency system remains broken. He still must wait years before he can apply for clemency despite finishing his sentence in 2014, and there's now a seven-year backlog on requests being heard by Florida's Cabinet.

As for practical concerns that ex-cons will all vote Democrat, meaning they could

vote against the Christian Coalition's normally conservative agenda, den Hollander holds little patience for that argument.

"I have found when that argument gets made, it usually has its roots in systemic racism," he said. "The people making that argument make assumptions on who they think it is who has a felony record and how it is they will vote."

The Christian Coalition of America believes criminals should serve their appropriate time, but he said the point of sentencing should be "corrections" and not "punishment." That means encouraging re-entry to society, not putting up barriers.

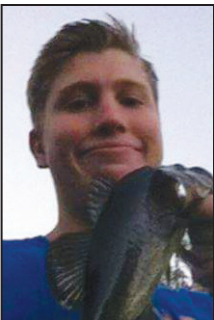
MADD hosts walk Saturday



experimental aircraft was not as successful as it was this year.

"No, I did it one year before, but I must admit, I did actually quit early because it felt kind of like going down in a roller coaster and by then, I was kind a little bit of a wimp," Heisler said.

Heisler, one of more than 100 kids from Duval and Clay Counties who took part in the Young Eagles Program sponsored yearly, free of charge by Chapter 1379 of the Experimental Aircraft Association, which is based at Haller Airpark, south of Green Cove Springs off U.S. 17.

Heisler described this year's flight as awesome. He is glad to have earned his certificate, gotten his photograph taken with his pilot and enjoyed time his two brothers and father who accompanied him.

He said it was amazing being up in the plane "because you just have a view of everything, the trees and houses and all the people and the St. Johns River. Oh, it's so huge. You really get a concept of how big it is when you're flying. When driving over the bridge, you're just like, 'Oh, that's pretty big,' but when you're flying, you're like, 'Oh, that's actually really big'," Heisler said.

Jayden's 13-year-old brother took a steadier approach to having taken the flight, his second

"I guess I just enjoy flying planes. Everything looked tiny," said Jacob Heisler.

Although Jacob said he couldn't identify specific landmarks, the ride was exciting and made him "a little bit interested in becoming a pilot."

And that's the whole point as the nation faces a tremendous forthcoming shortage of commercial pilots at the same time air travel gains in popularity.

Another facet leading to the impending shortage is a law that prohibits commer-

cial pilots from flying past age 65.

"Right now, the airline industry is experiencing a thing where a lot of guys are reaching that retirement age and there's not a lot of guys coming up through the pipeline to take their place. The airlines get their pilots from the military and some from private general aviation, but mostly they come from the military, so there's just not the numbers that there used to be," said Joe Tierney, president of EAA Chapter 1379.

The EAA launched the Young Eagles program in 1992 to get kids from 8 to 17 the opportunity to go flying in a general aviation airplane for free. The volunteers who participate in the Young Eagles program are local members of EAA who are volunteering their time, aircraft and fuel to make the flights possible.

After the flight, the pilot presented each student with a Young Eagles logbook with a code they can use to activate a Free EAA Student Membership, which has a

few perks. Young Eagles get free access to the Sporty's Learn to Fly Course valued at \$199, free admission to 300-plus science and technology museums, free Academy of Model Aeronautics Student Membership and a free electronic copy of EAA Sport Aviation.

Paul Jaffray, 54, of Fleming Island, coordinated the Oct. 20 event for the EAA chapter. An IT director by day, he likes to fly to relieve stress. Sometimes he and his wife will hop in their plane on a Saturday morning and fly somewhere just for lunch and back again.

The Experimental Aircraft Association provided a \$1 million insurance policy for the day and, Jaffray said, part of his job was to ensure the licensed pilots who flew children that day had a successful background check and were not fatigued but were ready for flight. Prior to boarding a plane, each student also went through a safety briefing.

Jaffray took 9-year-old McKenzie Harris up for a successful flight. She said before going up, she imagined flying as being scary "because you go high up in the air and very fast."

Said she enjoyed seeing a few birds, but she's not sure she's interested in being a pilot.

"I wanted to see what it would be like flying," she said. "I saw the St. Johns River, it looked so small down there."


It was the first time Jim Steele of Jacksonville had ever attended a Young Eagles event. Steele accompanied about 8 members of Boy Scout Troop 522 out of Ortega United Methodist Church who are working on obtaining their aviation merit badge and the fly-in provided the proper mix of ingredients required. Scouts can earn an aviation merit badge en route to becoming an Eagle Scout.

"We've got several of our boys who are working on their aviation merit badges. It's an optional badge – this is something they show interest in and they pursue on their own," Steele said.

"They have to do some basic study on some aerodynamics, understand the mechanics of the plane, some safety things, careers in aviation, and of course, get some flight time in also," Steele said.

Council on Aging taking steps to right financial woes

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay Council on Aging board met Tuesday and signaled steps to right the organization's financial woes with the help of newly-hired Interim Executive Director Renee Knight.

Knight was the council's executive director from 2001-2007. She currently serves as the ElderSource director of community services. ElderSource is a state organization that provides funding and services to the council.

Knight gave board members a list of her tasks in her less than two weeks at the helm, such as acquainting herself with staff and senior centers, hiring a part-time employee to assist with payroll, reviewing bank statements and records and planning for administering a survey of riders along with assistance from other organizations.

"We are working to really get a clear picture of where we are financially," Knight said.

She said council staff will meet with county, state Department of Transporta-

tion, Jacksonville Transportation Authority and state Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged officials this week. In addition to multiple meetings, ElderSource's staff will assist the council to formulate its 2019 budget and review the contracts of routes funded with JTA and DOT money before possible cancellation.

The council also decided to free up a combined \$80,000 as needed from its restricted kitchen and building funds to make payroll. Last week, county officials decided to fund the council about \$45,000 for op-

erating expenses and fuel reimbursements to buy time, while the council came up with a plan to handle more than \$15,000 in monthly losses. Officials from ElderSource, the county and the council are currently meeting once a week.

The council will advertise the executive director position to find a pool of applicants and offer a salary between \$75,000-\$85,000 per year.

"We set a salary range, drafted the language as to who we're looking for, and we'll advertise," Board President John Bowles

said. "Renee can pick up the pieces and run with the ball. The clock is ticking. We only have her for that three-month period."

A causality of the lack of cash and staff time is the council's car show. Board members said the council will reimburse vendors shortly. This would have been the fifth car show and board members said the loss was significant because the event functioned as a community outreach, not just a fundraiser that brought in more than \$10,000.

Schafer, who lives in Argyle, said she was originally afraid to call Mothers Against Drunk Driving for the support and services they offered.

"I was looking for places to speak to people about it," Schafer said. "It took me a long time to get my courage up to call them."

MADD program specialist Judy Cotton, who specializes in outreach, and Schafer repeat the same quick-fire sayings when they discuss one of the country's prevalent epidemics: "Start drinking, you stop thinking"; "We [MADD] want to go out of business"; and "Only about 1 percent of people [drunk driving] get caught." According to National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, more than 10,000 people die in alcohol-related crashes per year.

Like MADD 2018 at the Orange Park Town Hall Saturday morning. The event is from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m., on Nov. 3, with registration beginning at 8:00 a.m. Registration is available online at www.walklikemadd.org under upcoming walks.

Cotton said it's a misconception that MADD aims to end drinking. She said curbing underage drinking and increasing awareness of moral, legal and life-long consequences of drunk drivers getting behind the wheel are the organization's main goals.

"We don't care if people drink. It's such a misconception that we don't want people to enjoy a glass of wine with dinner or have a beer. That's not us," Cotton said. "We ask they do it wisely and responsibly — we just don't want them to drink and drive. I think everybody should want that."

MADD may be unpopular to support because people don't know its array of services or mission, Schafer added. The

fashionable advertising of alcohol — think young people dancing on a beach — pose a threat to minors, she said.

"People don't like talking about it because alcohol is a legal drug. MADD isn't against drinking

It's a message that's been out there for a long time" Schafer said. "People are ignoring it and still dying from it."

Schafer said she would like to see stricter advertising standards or potential class action lawsuits against the industry.

"It's sending the wrong message and we have to get the opposite message out there too, like if you drink and drive this is going to happen. Show the twisted car,"

Cotton said. "That's what I feel."

Cotton called drunk driving one of the most commonly committed crimes in the United States.

"On average people do it 80 times before they get caught," Cotton said. "For some people, getting caught is the luck of the draw."

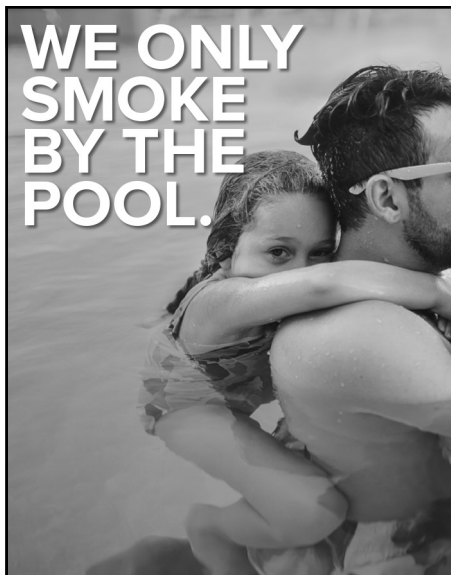
Letting kids drink is not a rite of passage, Cotton said. Adults who provide alcohol are a major part of problem. She said MADD would rather deal with prevention rather than intervention.

"Until everybody stops drinking and driving, we'll be here," Cotton said.

NFLT acquires 2300 acres near Camp Blanding

CAMP BLANDING – The North Florida Land Trust recently made a 2,300-acre stride in their continued conservation efforts of the Ocala to Osceola wildlife corridor.

In September, the NFLT completed a 2,500-acre acquisition, their largest easement acquisition ever and on Oct. 29, they made one of their largest in-fee acquisitions to date. Coming in at 2,300 acres, this acquisition near Lawtey will further the NFLT’s conservation efforts in the Ocala to Osceola, or O2O, wildlife corridor. In this corridor, there are an estimated 15 to 40 different types of endangered species that, because of the NFLT’s efforts, will have a better chance at bouncing back.

“I’ve heard anywhere between 15 to 40 different types of listed endangered or threatened species in that area with possibly more that migrate north and south through the O2O,” NFLT President Jim McCarthy said. “So, to know that an acquisition like this will be helping out those animals, well that’s great news to hear. It’s another step in our process completed.”

Some of these animals include the gopher tortoise, quail, and the Florida Black Bear.

This piece of land connects Camp Blanding with Jennings State Forest and is comprised of pine trees, hardwood forests and a lot of ground cover, which according to McCarthy, serves as an excellent home to the many types of wildlife within the area.

“That’s why it’s so important that we protect and conserve such a critical piece of the wildlife corridor,” McCarthy said.

Not only does this 2,300-acre piece of land house different species of animals, it also contains Boggy Branch, which is one of the headwater tributaries of Black Creek. McCarthy said that right now, the NFLT has not officially determined how this new piece of land will be managed, but he said he does think the NFLT will do some restoration work along the creeks.

“There is a headwater of Black Creek and that’s particularly significant for us to restore,” McCarthy said. “With proper restoration of the creeks in the area, less water will flow downstream into Black Creek, which could perhaps reduce flooding.”

This in-fee acquisition, with in-fee

just let the election play out.”

Both Gilhousen and Chafee agreed with this recommendation. Neither Gilhousen or Chafee were present during this hearing — only their attorneys were. Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambless, who is also being sued by Gilhousen in this case, was not present either, but his attorney was. It's important to note that Chambless' name is attached in an official capacity only.

“Defendant Chambless is the constitutional officer charged with administering elections within Clay County, Florida and is a necessary and indispensable party for the purposes of the relief sought by this action,” the lawsuit reads.

Chambless said he understood why Wilkinson recommended the course of action, or rather lack thereof, that he did.

“I think the judge's decision was reasoned given that as I understood, his ruling was that based on the plaintiff, Gilhousen and the defendant, Chafee's, agreement, if Chafee lost, the case would be moot,” Chambless said. “Given the judge's calendar, he decided to let the election go as normal and should Chafee win, the case would proceed.”

While no court order was given to Chambless yesterday, the Supervisor of Elections did explain the action he likely would have taken if the court ruled in Gilhousen's favor and ordered Chafee's name removed from the ballot.

“The likely remedy, should the judge have decided to remove the candidate, would have been that from that moment on, we would put a notice into every vote-by-mail ballot going forward that states that the court has removed this candidate and therefore, her votes would not be tabulated and at every booth and polling location, that same message would be displayed,” Chambless said.

With over 30,000 ballots already cast, though, to what effect that remedy would have worked is unknown.

While both Gilhousen and Chafee agreed to allow the election to play out first, Gilhousen did say that regardless of the election results, there will be a hearing about this issue that she requests take place before Nov. 20, when the Clay County School Board holds a School Board Organization Meeting. During this meeting, newly-elected school board members will take their district seat for the first time.

With this initial hearing behind her, Gilhousen said her focus is on the voters.

“Well at this point, my focus is on earning the trust of the voters and pushing forward in this election,” Gilhousen said.

Following this hearing, Chafee said she was happy the election will go forth as planned.

“Yesterday's hearing was good for the voters of Clay County because this election will go forward and voters get to choose who they want to represent them on our public school board,” Chafee said.

“Our duty is to show the public that the Constitution Revision Commission’s duty is to make proposals and make outdated language streamlined, not completely rewriting the constitution itself,” Carroll said.

According to a Florida Politics article, former Lt. Gov. Jeff Kottkamp believes the CRC has unmeasured power.

“We understand the game of politics, and the influence of special interest groups,” Kottkamp is quoted as saying.

The CRC is “an unelected body that frankly doesn’t represent anybody and is not accountable to anybody,” according to Kottkamp.

The group believes that bundling different objectives into amendments is a serious issue, as the amendments will entice voters to vote for controversial issues.

CRC member Brecht Heuchan opposes Save My Constitution’s concerns.

In the same Florida Politics article, Heuchan said, “grouping some ideas together keeps the ballot from becoming too lengthy to complete. If all of the CRC proposals were left as single amendments, there would be 25 questions on the ballot instead of 13.”

Capistran thinks that more could have been done.

“(There’s) way too many of them,” Capistran said. “They could have broken it up.”

“It’s way too long.”

The CRC also believes that bundling makes it easier for voters to understand the amendments.

Carroll disagrees.

“A single subject allows voters to go over the information in-depth,” Carroll said. “It doesn’t make it easier for voters, it makes it easier for special interests.”

“It is a disservice to voters,” Carroll said.

Carroll thinks that Save My Constitution’s members have a duty to the people that elected them.

“We took an oath that we would defend the Constitution. It is near and dear to our duty and obligation,” Carroll said.

“We may not be here, but we have to do something to protect our children and grandchildren.”

“I can’t think of a better time to launch this app,” said FDLE Commissioner Rick Swearingen. “I hope all parents will download this before going trick or treating and then use it often to help keep their families safe or to report suspicious activity.”

The app also allows you to search active AMBER, Missing Child and Silver Alerts, search wanted persons or stolen vehicle information, search unsolved cases in Florida and submit a tip about suspicious activity.

The FDLE App is available for download free of charge in the Google Play store and the Apple App Store. Search for “FDLE Mobile App” in the Google Play Store or for “FDLE” in the Apple App Store.

To use the interactive map to display the registered residential addresses of sexual offenders and predators, location services on the mobile phone must be turned on. However, all other sections of the app are still usable even if location services are not turned on.

The FDLE mobile app does not track your location or store your personal information. It should never be used as an emergency app because it is not monitored 24/7. In an emergency situation, please call 911.

Blue Angels share blue skies with flare

JACKSONVILLE – The U.S. Navy’s Blue Angels blasted through the blue skies above Orange Park and Jacksonville with their usual precision as nearly 100,000 fans crane skyward to watch the acrobatics on Saturday and Sunday at the Naval Air Station Jacksonville.

During their aerobatic demonstration, the Blues fly six F/A-18 Hornet aircraft, split into the Diamond Formation (Blue Angels 1 through 4) and the Lead and Opposing Solos (Blue Angels 5 and 6). Most

of the show alternates between maneuvers performed by the Diamond Formation and those performed by the Solos. integrated avionics, coupled with improved supportability, represents an exponential leap in warfighting capabilities.

Since 1946, the Blue Angels have flown for more than 260 million spectators. The team performs at both military and civilian airfields, and often performs directly over major cities such as San Francisco’s “Fleet Week” maritime festival, Cleveland’s annual Labor Day Air Show, the Chicago Air and Water Show, and Seattle’s annual Seafair Festival.

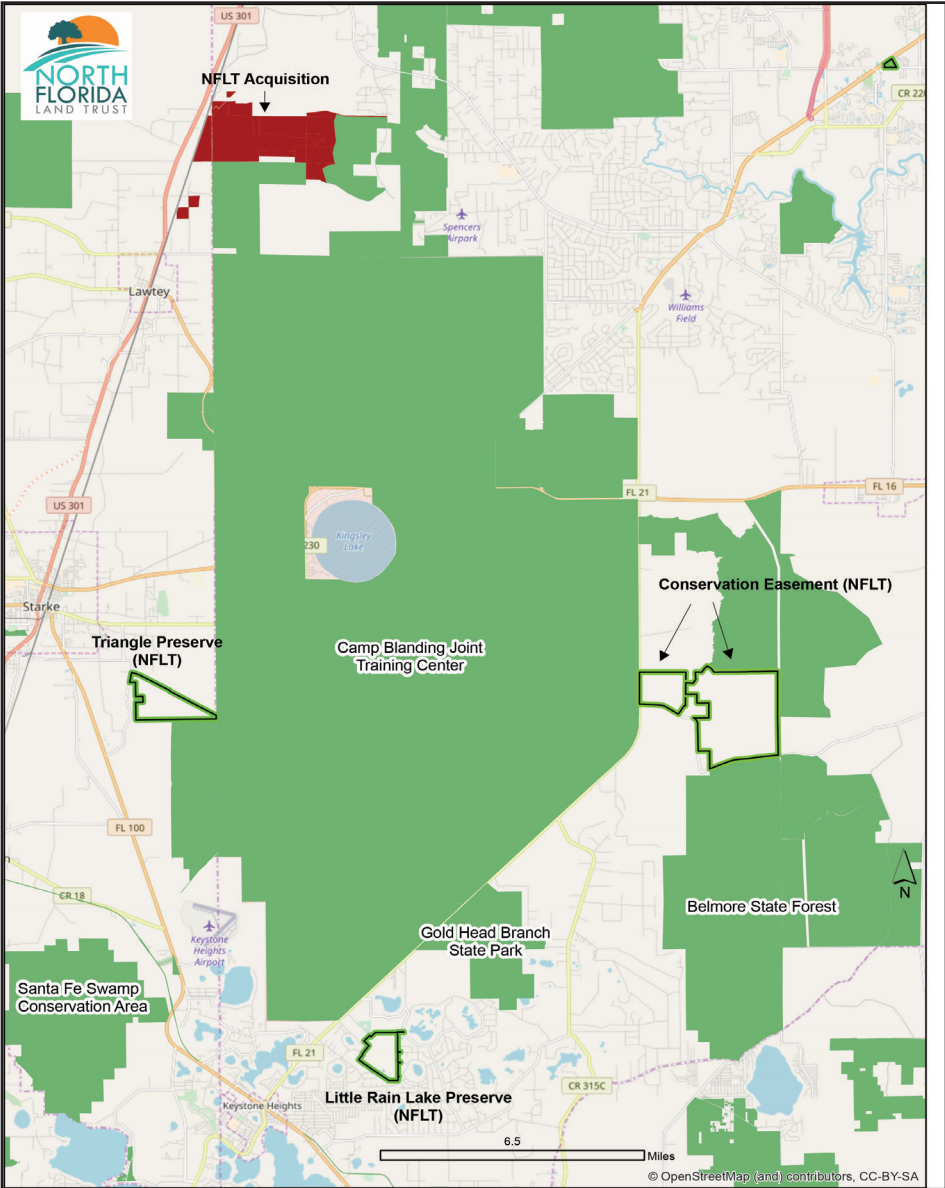

serving as a way to designate that the purchase comes with all ownership rights to the land, is part of the NFLT's ongoing effort to not only continue to preserve and maintain parts of the O2O, but also provide Camp Blanding with larger safety barriers. Because of its proximity to Camp Blanding, it also provides the Army National Guard training camp with more land for active, reserve and emergency responder training.

Because of how important these lands surrounding Camp Blanding are, with these 2,300 acres attached directly to the Northwest corner of the training center, the Army National Guard funded the \$5.4

million purchase of the land. NFLT will be managing the land though, which is where they will incur costs.

According to McCarthy, this acquisition was a two-for-one in that not only does the land purchased help the O2O, but Camp Blanding as well.

The last acquisition by NFLT, which was an easement acquisition of 2,500 acres, created a 14-mile corridor within the O2O. While this acquisition doesn't connect directly to this stretch of land, it serves as yet another puzzle piece in the NFLT's greater picture.

"When you look at the map, you can see this grand picture of conservation that we're going for," McCarthy said.

Braswell was arrested and charged with aggravated domestic battery and transported to the Clay County Jail. At press time, Braswell was free on bond.

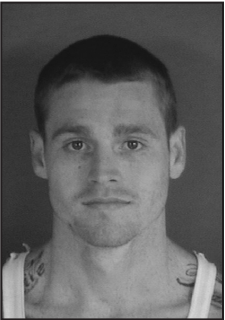
Stolen auto invloved in traffic accident, man charged

Officials discuss transportation impact fees

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – County officials met Tuesday at an infrastructure workshop to discuss transportation impact fees and changing the impact study area for all new development from one mile to three miles.

Planning and Zoning Director Ed Lehman and county staff recommended the impact study area be increased to three miles for new developments. Previously, the impact area for a major traffic study was three miles for residential developments and two miles for non-residential, but in 2008, the modified impact area was reduced to one mile.

Commissioner Gayward Hendry asked why the reduction was made in the first place. Lehman said the recession at the turn of the decade was a likely cause.

“In December of 2008, I’m sure Clay County was feeling the extent and effects of the great recession and this was probably recognizing the economy was slow and it was time to give these developers a break,” Lehman said. “It seems like the timing would indicate that.”

With the arrival of the First Coast Expressway and a boom in development, Lehman said if a larger area wasn’t studied for new building, the county could fall behind in providing necessary infrastructure to developers.

“We think our development’s impacts are well more than one mile,” Lehman said. “So, we think developments should bear a proportion of those costs for providing those improvements.”

A major traffic study is anything that requires 400 or more daily trips, he said. The county uses impact fees, at several different rates for residential and non-residential development, to maintain public infrastructure affected by the increased use. Officials said the average trip length within unincorporated parts of the county was 6.6 miles. They halved that number to arrive at three miles.

“There are two trip ends to every trip,” Lehman explained.

A fair share cost is a site-specific calculation for providing capacity improvements of projects that generate more than 400 daily trips. If capacity is available within the impact area, no fair share cost is required. Between impact and fair share costs, new projects only have to pay the higher of the two fees to prevent the county from “double-dipping,” Lehman said.

Road impact fees were initially adopted in 2008, but collection was suspended in 2009 due to the rough financial climate.

County commissioners passed impact fees last September on a 4-1 vote, with Commissioner Gavin Rollins the lone dissenting vote. The county began the policy Jan. 1, with increases across the board effective in late July. Lehman said the county has collected more than \$1.3 million this year.

Should everyone get a trophy?

During the year I have multiple conversations with my colleagues about awarding youth who participate in our 4-H competitions. During these conversations I often find myself asking the same question to some event organizers, “why are you giving everyone a blue ribbon, medal, or trophy?”

The typical response is some variation of, “every child is a winner, we don’t want one child to feel like they are not as good as another, we should be building them up, not breaking them down.”

I know as parents, we think our children are amazing at what they do, but the question remains; Are we doing our children justice if we always give them first place, is that realistic and what is that teaching them? When they interview for a job and do not get it because they were not the “best” fit or are overlooked for a promotion because someone did the job better, how will they handle it?

Healthy competition is important to the development of a child both personally and socially. Let me explain why, competitions are not meant to be easy for participants, they are meant to challenge their knowledge and skill level. Meaning participants need to learn and practice in order to suc-

ceed in a competition.

After decades of research, Carol Dweck, a world-renowned Stanford University psychologist discovered a simple but groundbreaking theory called, the power of mindset which can be applied here.

Her research shows how success in school, work, sports, and almost every area of human endeavor can be dramatically influenced by how we think about our talents and abilities. People with a fixed mindset—those who believe that abilities are fixed—are less likely to flourish than those with a growth mindset—those who believe that abilities can be developed.

How do we influence the development of a fixed mindset? We give trophies to every participant despite their level of ability and effort. One of the primary reasons young people with a fixed mindset are less likely to flourish is due to their fear of failure later in life (e.g., college) when they realize they may not be the best at everything.

I know some reading this article may say, but what is good for one child is not always good for another. I agree and that’s why I think, regardless of trophies, that giving feedback, coaching, and recognizing true achievements will help young people develop skills that will empower them as adults.

As a youth development professional, I

have the awesome responsibility of helping young people develop the skills they will need for real world situations. That would include winning and losing. I let my 4-H members know that they cannot always be the best, but they can always do their best and learn from their experiences. This approach helps instill a grow mindset.

So, the answer to my initial question is NO – not all participants should receive a blue ribbon or trophy.

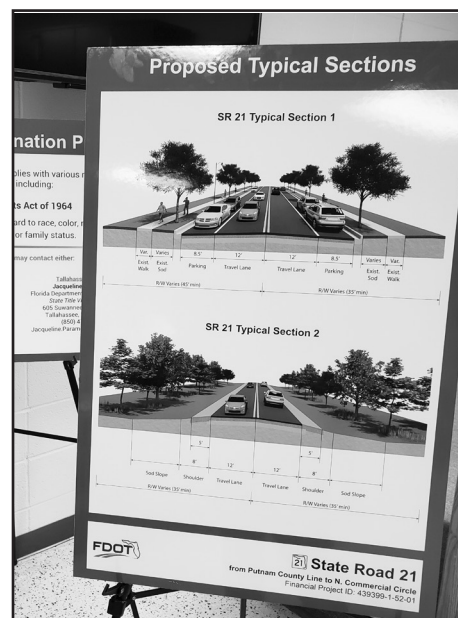
Kornegay said. At the most recent Keystone Heights meeting, Kornegay announced that the project would start Spring 2019, but as projects as large as these go, it seems the start date has changed. According to the FDOT Public Information Specialist Sara Pleasants, construction will begin in the summer of 2020 and end in the fall of 2021.

According to Kornegay, despite changing construction dates, the scope of the project mostly remained the same. The 7.2-mile stretch will be resurfaced, widened and will receive multiple bulb-outs. These bulb-outs will not only make pedestrian crosswalks safer by shortening the distance pedestrians have to cross, but the improvements will make on-street parking more efficient.

“There will be marked horizontal parking space that will allow for more cars to park,” Kornegay said.

Currently, the on-street parking does not have designated spaces in many areas — there are areas marked for horizontal parking, but how many cars fit in that space depends on how drivers choose to park.

During construction, two driveways will be closed, but these driveways lead to nothing more than wooded areas. Ko-

Kornegay said the closure of these two driveways won’t affect traffic on State Road 21.

When the Streetscape construction is done, Kornegay said that stretch of State Road 21 will act as Main Street, U.S.A of Keystone Heights. There will be new ornamental light fixtures and light poles along the road, new landscaping and more. The street will feature new light mechanisms along the yellow line powered by solar that will serve as more effective reflectors.

Mark Natirboff owns property along this stretch of State Road 21 and despite the incoming construction, he’s excited to see what Streetscape brings to the city.

“You know, my opinion could change when the construction actually starts, but right now, I don’t have anything negative to say about it,” Natirboff said. “It looks positive for the community, and it sounds like this area will be quite beautiful because of it.”

Like Natirboff, Lake said this project will give Keystone Heights the facelift it needed for quite some time. For her, it will make all of the difference in the city becoming what she’s always imagined it as.

“This project, Streetscape, is the difference between a nice but standard downtown and a quaint, walkable downtown that you really want to be in,” Lake said. “I can’t wait for it to be here.”

ST. "Our defense played good enough to win, but we had too many missed tackles," said Macpherson.

Menendez woul amp up their offense behind running back Tye Edwards who finished with three touchdowns off 137 yards on the ground and inside running from fullback Izez Hayward who bludgeoned his way to 108 yards.

With Ridgeview knocking off Baker County and Menendez in the past two weeks and the Raiders losing to both, Macpherson's hopes for a playoff spot in a strong season may have to wait for another year.

"From 1-9 to six wins and a guaranteed tie for most wins in the county is a pretty big step," said Macpherson. "We had our playoff chances and didn't take advantage."

Ridgeview (5-5, 2-3) finished their season and must wait for final regular season games to determine playoff point totals. Clay (3-6, 2-3) beat Palatka (3-6, 1-4) and will probably have their first non-playoff season in nearly a decade. Clay finishes with 2A-University Christian.

JACKSONVILLE – Knowing that their top runner, sophomore Kameron Wallizada, was only returning to the lineup after two weeks of swimming and therapy, the Fleming Island High boys cross country team, led by junior William Livesay, took a page out of the ‘man-up’ playbook to grab an astounding 4th-5th-6th-7th finish and a second consecutive team title at the district 1-4A cross country championships held Saturday at Sandalwood High School.

“We knew when Will went by Kameron near the middle of the race that the rest of us would have to run our best races to take up for Kameron being injured all last week,” said junior Landon Opp, who took the fifth spot behind Livesay’s fourth. “We kind of stormed the fort after that to get as many guys up front as possible. Kameron stayed in our pack and we crushed the finish.”

Livesay, who has improved steadily throughout the latter part of the season as he approached the elusive sub-17 minute mark, crushed his personal best time with a 16 minutes, 45 seconds finish behind winner Caden Monk of Buchholz who won in 15:59.4 in a mano-a-mano battle with Oakleaf High junior Dylan Nelson who took the runnerup spot in 16:08.9.

“I had my best race by 40 seconds, I think, but I was a little surprised that I was with him so close to the finish,” said Nelson. “I kept trying to put surges on him to feel him out, but he had little effect from them. Then, he put the hammer down in the last quarter mile and I had nothing left to respond.”

Mandarin sophomore Zachary Bradley was able to inch past Livesay 10 yards from the finish in a sprint for third in 16:44.9.

Fleming Island finished with 33 team points to beat Buchholz’ 51 as the runnerup. Adding to the Golden Eagles’ finish were Wallizada, in at 16:54.2 despite a foot injury that hampered his training; junior John Brinkman at seventh in 16:55.8 and sophomore Jayden Scherer, in at 11th in 16:58.2.

“They all crushed their best for the year,” said Fleming Island coach Karen Moritz, who was emotionally spent after watching her team’s effort while monitoring her husband Dave’s team, Ponte Vedra High School, as they finished an excruciating fourth at the district 4-3A championships at Middleburg High School to advance to regions in one of the deepest fields in Florida. “You know I’m a cryer and I’m happy on one end and a little sad on

Junior Jennifer Fliess took seventh in 19:48, sophomore Emma Millson took ninth in 19:51 and Adams finished in 15th at 20:30 to complete the top five finishers for the Golden Eagles.

Marisa Kortright, a sophomore, finished 23rd with freshman Kennedy Williams 25th.

Fletcher finished third with 78 points with Buchholz fourth.

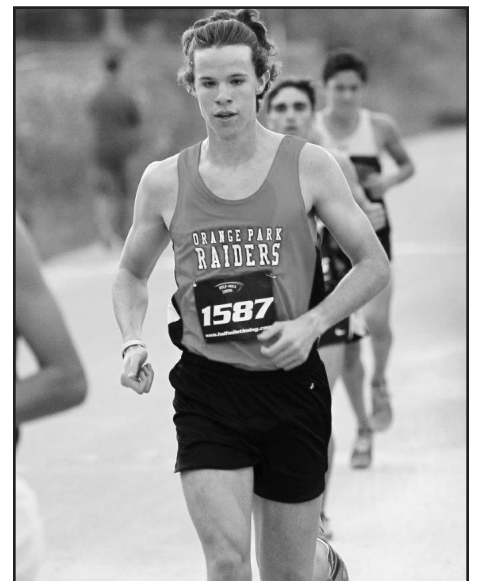

Another issue the Knights must address before the post season is penalties. Against Creekside, the Knights were called for multiple late hits and personal fouls which slowed their momentum early in the game. Even the Knights coaching staff received two sideline conduct warnings from officials with one resulting in a penalty against the home team. If the Knights plan on having a deep playoff run, they will have to address and show improvement with these issues especially in the highly competitive 7A classification.

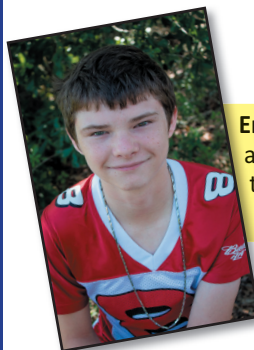

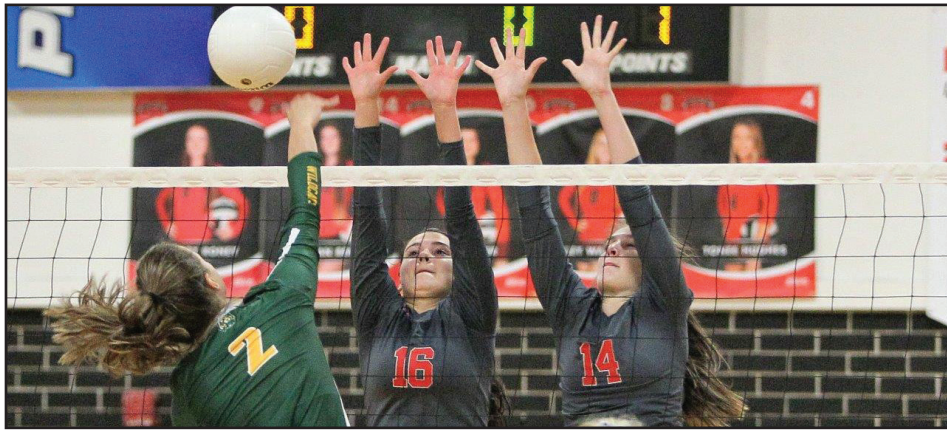

Yellow Jackets’ comeback falls short in football final

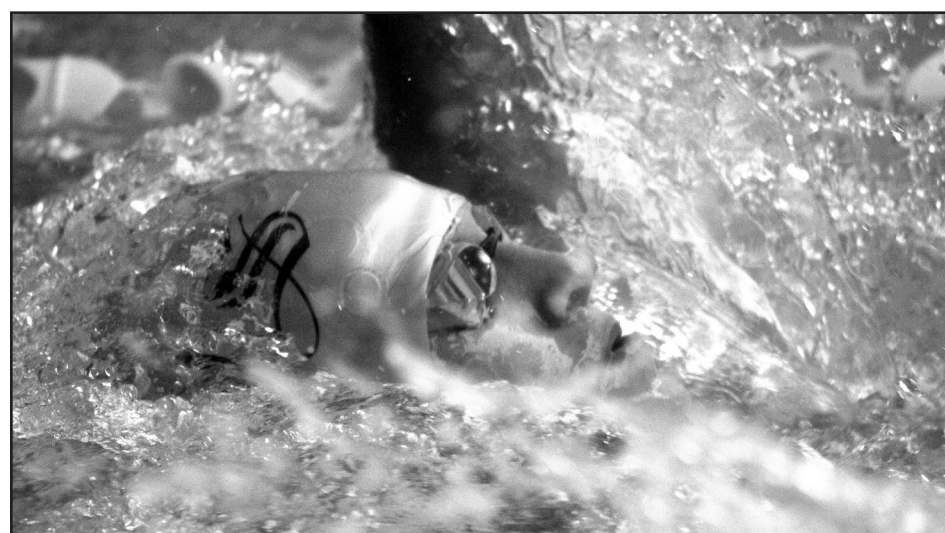
"With Creekside the defending region and state girls champions and Bartram Trail's boys second at regions and third at state last year, we have a tough time getting our swimmers past regions," said Oakleaf coach Kate Swartz. "We'll give it our best and see who survives."

Oakleaf's girls 200 medley relay; Paxton Shuppert, Kelsie Craig, Kylie Loving and Lauren Galloway, all underclassmen except for Craig who swam in the 3A state

meet last year in breaststroke, took fourth in the event by just two seconds. The relay is ranked ninth in regions. Galloway is ranked 20th in the 50 free in regions with Craig 21st. Galloway is also ranked 19th in region for 100 free.

"These girls are the core of the team and will get some rough swims today, but the experience of knowing these are probably state champion swimmers in our district is a good learning experience," said Swartz. "We have a bunch of good incoming freshman swimmers."

Getting top 10 finishes for the Oakleaf were boys 200 medley, sixth (14th in region); Ethan Schroeder, sixth in 50 free (11th in region) and fifth in 100 free (eighth in region); Oakleaf divers Trinity Kaviany, fourth (eighth in region); Angelina Escobar, fifth (11th in region), and Genesis Kaviany, sixth (12th in region); Kylie Loving, sixth in 100 butterfly (11th

for several critical first downs, finishing with 51 rushing yards on 11 carries. He pushed his way into the end zone from a yard out for the game's first score early in the second quarter. On the game-winning drive, he converted a third and 10 with a 12 yard completion to fellow senior Jaiden Turner.

That score stood until the halftime, thanks to a defense that had forced two turnovers. Miller intercepted Baker County quarterback Alex Bowen's first pass of the game to give the Panthers' the early momentum. Dominic Stanfield's fumble recovery at the Ridgeview 20 yard line and 36 yard return removed a Wildcats' scoring threat and led to Huff's touchdown run.

Baker County came out in the second half determined to ride on the back of running back Marius Graham. The sophomore carried the ball on 14 of the Wildcats' first 17 plays in the second half, running for 104 yards in the third quarter. Those two drives ended in touchdowns, one by Graham and one by fullback Kelton Knabb. Graham finished with 247 yards rushing on 34 carries. But every time Baker County appeared on the verge of taking control, the Panthers responded. When Knabb tied the game at 7-7 with the first of his two short touchdown runs, Huff answered with a perfect 26 yard throw to a well-covered Isaac Chaffin to retake the lead for Ridgeview.

"I've never seen, been on or coached a team that had so much fight in them," said Porch, soaked from a celebratory Gatorade shower. "When it looked bad, they found a way."

Nearly every Panther contributed. Four different defenders had tackles for loss, including Miller. Six different receivers

ers caught passes, led by Turner, who returned from injury to make five catches for 50 yards. Six different players carried the ball. The secondary limited Bowen to seven completions in 21 attempts. Punter Tyler Duggan drilled a field position-flipping 78 yard punt. Matt Koziolk booted a 39 yard field goal that added the decisive points with room to spare. But Porch was most pleased with the blocking of his offensive line.

"The offensive line stepped up and dominated against the best defensive line they have played all year," said Porch.

Led by senior Caleb Plyler's 59 yards on 11 rushes, the Panthers ran for 142 yards on 34 carries. Playing only his second game on offense, Miller had two catches for 43 yards, including the game-winner. On defense

he had a tackle for loss in addition to his interception. As a punt returner, the junior alertly fielded a bouncing kick to save the Panthers 10 yards in field position.

Taking over after Miller's touchdown, the Wildcats drove to the Ridgeview 38 yard line before safety David Osborn stepped in front of intended receiver Avant Lee and picked off Bowen's final pass, stepping out of bounds to be mobbed by a host of jubilant teammates.

The emotional win capped a regular season of momentum swings. Ridgeview opened with three wins, suffered through

a five-game losing streak, and finished by beating ranked opponents in consecutive weeks.

With their regular season complete, the Panthers must wait on the results of games in Week 11 to learn their playoff fate.

"We need some help, but we did what we needed to do tonight," said Porch. "If it ends here, what a hell of a way to go out."

Baker County, which held a 408-324 edge in total offense, took a 21-17 lead with 6:03 remaining on Knab's second short touchdown run. The Wildcats fall to 6-3 overall, 4-1 in District 5-5A.

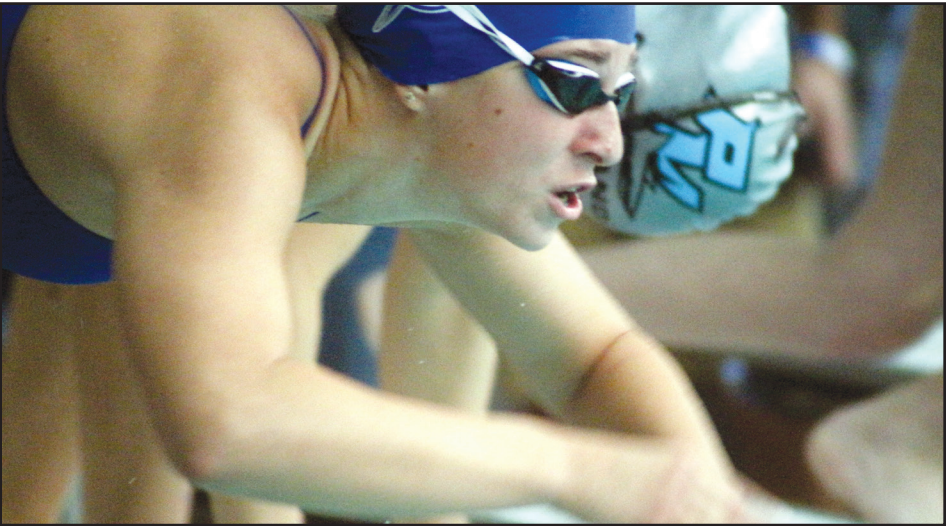
