## 61% of Clay voters turnout

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Buoyed by a 61.39 percent voter turnout, Clay County voters said no to three proposed county charter amendments but gave the green-light to a fourth amendment placing term limits on constitutional officers. A total of 93,997 of Clay County's 153,119 voters

cast ballots. The amendment to give county commissioners three, four-year terms instead of the two, four-years terms failed by a vote of 60,416 no votes to 26,882 yes votes or 69.21 percent to 30.79 percent. The measure was placed on the ballot over the summer by the Board of County Commissioners after the BCC-appointed Charter Review Commission failed to pass a

measure recommending the measure.

The amendment that would have raised county commissioner salaries over the next four years failed with 51,871 no votes to 33,228 yes votes or 60.95 percent no to 39.05 yes. The measure would have wiped out a 2010 measure that voters passed freezing BCC member salaries at \$37,000

## School board takes small step to replace attorney

FLEMING ISLAND – The Clay County School Board will hold a workshop on Nov. 26 to determine how the board will move forward to replace the school board attorney.

School Board Attorney David D'Agata recently announced to the board that he was resigning from his position in Clay County to take a position as the Deputy General Counsel for the Florida Department of Education. His final day will be Dec. 21, which means the school board has about seven weeks to find his replacement. D'Agata urged the school board to start the process during its regular Nov. 1 school board meeting.

"I want to do everything that I can to make sure that everyone is in a good place," D'Agata said. "The board, you're

my client and I do an awful lot of work for the administration as well, and really what we're looking at here, and what I would hope to achieve, is to get the ball rolling and get the data that is necessary for the board as it is constituted post-Nov. 6 to have the relevant data in front of it and potentially, have candidates, at least present themselves as interested parties...as early as perhaps the end of the month."

D'Agata said he knows that is very ambitious, but because of the short time he has in his current position, he believes it is imperative the board get started quickly.

He recommended the board hire a staff attorney to focus solely on operational concerns and the Superintendent and staff and have a second attorney or law firm to represent the school board. While the school board was open to D'Agata's

# Drug-free depression treatment comes to area

ORANGE PARK — A new clinic in Orange Park is offering patients a drug-free treatment for depression that claims to be more than twice as effective as medication.

While therapy and prescriptions have been the standard go-to in treating depression, in 2008, transcranial magnetic stimulation came onto the scene after being approved by the Food and Drug Administration. TMS targets the area of the brain that releases the chemicals that keep people free from depression.

“It’s different, but after some time, patients find that everything is drowned out during the treatment, so it turns into something peaceful or relaxing,” said Psychiatrist General Marcus De Carvalho, who also serves as the medical director of Hope Peace Recovery Treatment Center in Orange Park.

TMS requires patients to wear a sci-fi-like helmet that uses a small electromagnetic coil that delivers bursts of magnetic energy to the dorsolateral prefrontal cortex, which is the area of the brain where

depression lies. These bursts of energy tell the brain to produce the chemicals that a depressed person’s brain does not produce. It’s the lack of these chemicals that lie at the heart of depression, which is why TMS, like other treatments, aims to make the brain produce them.

While the helmet delivers those bursts, unless distracted by the television or music the clinic has available to patients, a patient will hear what sounds like a woodpecker knocking on wood. Despite TMS’ differences to traditional treatments for depression, De Carvalho has based much

of his practice today on it. Years ago, De Carvalho saw a hole in Orange Park. It had plenty of doctors, nurses and pharmacists, but it was missing one thing: psychiatry.

“Orange Park is the most underserved area in psychiatry in the country,” De Carvalho said, who opened his original psychiatry office up on Wells Road. “There are not enough psychiatrists in this area. That was why I took my business here.”

In February, he opened a TMS treatment center on Jacksonville’s Southside and opened the Orange Park clinic in August at 350 Corporate Way, Suite 100.

Nearly three months later, his clinic, HPR Treatment Center, has treated over a dozen patients, with nine having fully completed the treatment. A cycle of TMS treatments involves 36 treatments, five of which are administered in one week. He has seen patients who saw poor results from medication now being treated successfully for the first time in their life.

That’s because where medication has only a 30 percent efficacy rate, which decreases with each new medication

# After 60-year wait, tolls to become reality

OAKLEAF — It’s nearing time to whip out that SunPass. Clay County can expect tolls on the First Coast Expressway starting next year.

The first phase of the First Coast Expressway project, 12 miles in all, connects Interstate 10 to Blanding Boulevard and was completed in June, though tolls were not activated. Despite initial projections, Sara Pleasants, a spokeswoman contracted by the Florida Department of Transportation, said tolling will start in 2019 as the agency puts the finishing touches.

“We’re in the final months of construction (of phase one),” Pleasants said. “We’re continuing to make adjustments to New World Avenue with the drainage along the project. We expect tolling to begin in 2019.”

The tolls do not require commuters to stop anymore and dump money into an old school tolling station. There will be two 20-cent interchanges, payable via the elec-

tronic system SunPass, are between New World Avenue and Normandy Boulevard, and between Normandy Boulevard and 103rd Street. The 60 cent toll gantries are located at 103rd Street and Argyle Forest Boulevard, Argyle Forest Boulevard and Oakleaf Plantation Parkway and between Oakleaf Plantation Parkway and Blanding Boulevard. Without a SunPass device installed in commuters’ vehicles, commuters will have their license scanned when they pass tolls for 25 cents more in a process called toll-by-plate.

SunPass devices are available online at sunpass.com or select grocery stores and drugstores. Commuters opting to purchase SunPass can then go online and add cash to their accounts. The toll device will also be usable in other parts of Florida where tolls are in place.

Pleasants said the tolls have been in test mode for the past five months.

Published reports in August found Florida’s Office of Inspector General announced

# Teachers collect supplies for Hurricane Michael victims

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Twenty-seven pallets of books, food, toiletries, clothes, school supplies and more are heading to Jackson, Gulf and Calhoun counties as residents there recover from Hurricane Michael.

Members of the Clay County Education Association teachers' union and the Clay County School District began collecting the goods Jackson County Education Association President Dave Galloway reached out locally.

CCEA President Renna Lee Paiva rallied teachers here and became determined to help those recovering from the Category 4 hurricane that made landfall on Oct. 10.

"I had a call from Dave Galloway of Jackson County, and he's a union president up there, and I texted Mr. Davis and said 'hey, do you want to partner with us and collect some goods?' and Mr. Davis being how great he is, just put it out to everybody," Paiva said. "Just a few weeks later, we had pallets and pallets of supplies ready to go out."

Paiva said the supplies collection drive was reminiscent of last year's relief efforts in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma, which left more than 1,100 homes flooded in Clay County from Orange Park to Middleburg.

School Superintendent Addison Davis didn't hesitate to answer Paiva's call for help. He said that immediately he got to work asking community leaders, teachers,

parents, students, principals and anyone else to donate supplies for Hurricane Michael relief.

"Originally, [Paiva] reached out to talk about what we can do for surrounding counties in need and you know, what a beautiful opportunity for us, Clay County, to band together and provide support to those in need," Davis said. "We're still to a point where everyone remembers what we endured with Irma and we're still sensitive to the impact Irma had on our community,

# Scott pulls out another nailbiter

No one wins airtight, statewide elections quite like Rick Scott; now you can call him U.S. Senator. At 12:15 a.m., incumbent Senator Bill Nelson’s longtime chief of staff, campaign manager and confidant Pete Mitchell addressed what was left of his campaign party, declaring the race had been called by multiple media, that Scott had won, and that Nelson would be making a statement later Wednesday, Nov. 7.

The former businessman who won election as governor by one percent, and then won re-election by one percent, knocked off Florida’s Democratic U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson by less than one percent Nov. 6 in a contest that dragged way into the night while Democrats hoped and prayed in vain for a South Florida miracle.


“Numerous reports on the Senate race have called it for Gov. Scott. This is obviously not the result Sen. Nelson’s campaign has worked so hard for. The Senator will be making a full statement tomorrow,” Mitchell said.

It was unclear if Mitchell was saying that Nelson also has called the race. An exhausted looking Mitchell entered the room, made the brief statement at the microphone, and left.

Ultimately, Florida voters seemed to know and like Scott, for all his quirks and hardline politics, more than Nelson for all his squishiness. Final score: Scott 50.3 percent; Nelson, 49.7 percent.

This election not only shattered Florida records for money spent on the campaigns – \$177 million through last week, with bills still not posted – but also set new low-water marks for negative campaigning, as both candidates and their allies strove to define or redefine their opponents.


For Scott, that meant Nelson and several Democratic committees combined to spend at least \$80 million convincing voters that the governor cut education funding, stripped away environmental protections, oversaw Florida’s red tide disaster, waffled on health care pre-existing conditions coverage, refused to expand Medicaid in Florida, pushed through tax cuts that made rich people richer, and had

a dodgy business career, highlighted by massive Medicare and Medicaid fraud by his company.

For Nelson, that meant Scott and the New Republican PAC spent nearly \$100 million, including at least \$51 million of Scott’s own fortune, convincing voters that Nelson’s accomplished little or nothing in a half-century in public service, other than voting along Democratic lines in key moments involving taxes and health care; has long been an empty suit collecting government pay and amassing government pension benefits; and that he’s getting old, and perhaps growing “confused.”

While Scott’s campaign aggressively and sometimes angrily fought back against the charges leveled against him in the Democrats’ campaigns, Nelson mostly shrugged off Scott’s attacks.

And in the end, voters figured they knew Scott, and, like his record or not, it won over the image of an empty suit.

For all his public awkwardness supporters say makes him look genuine and critics say makes him look creepy, Scott managed, especially in the closing weeks, to project a sincerity: someone who looked in command overseeing hurricane recovery, someone who looked comfortable playing with his grandchildren, someone who sounded true stating his positions.

Also in play was Nelson’s card-carrying membership in the opposition to President Donald Trump, while Scott went from close friend and ally of Trump, to someone who hardly ever spoke the president’s name, to someone who joined the divisive party leader at a rally last week.

astronauts, Robert Cabana and John Grunsfeld. Both clocked so many hours in space on multiple shuttle missions. They were really friendly and awesome to meet.

Sadly, the launch was scrapped on Saturday morning due to a helium valve issue at the launch pad. I spent Saturday at the Kennedy Space Center to check out the expo that NASA had set up for the probe launch. I met multiple scientists who worked on the probe, and many were Girl Scouts. I also ran into Dr. Thomas Zurbuchen, the associate administrator of NASA’s Science Mission Directorate, who told me the importance of completely perfecting the mission before takeoff.

At 1:00 a.m. Sunday, we took our last sip of coffee and boarded the bus with our fingers crossed. After an hour of waiting on the large balcony, the countdown began. All the lights went out, and the only thing we could see was the glowing launch pad with the huge, orange Delta 4 Heavy. Everyone pulled out their cameras and silence filled the air. We could only hear the faint counting at T minus 1:00.

All eyes were on that launch pad. 3-2-

In huge swathes of Florida outside the urban cores, Trump’s support may remain unchanged, and party leaders like Volusia Chair Tony Ledbetter spoke of a Republican base that was angry, ready to vote.

Many political observers postulated that Nelson had never previously been seriously challenged in his Senate campaigns, beating then-U. S. Rep. Bill McCullum in 2000; controversial Secretary of State Katherine Harris in 2006; and then U.S. Rep. Connie Mack IV in 2012, each by easy margins. Lucky some called him.

Scott, meanwhile, was seen by many political observers as someone capable of overcoming negative campaigning against him to come out of nowhere to win, as he did in 2010, defeating Alex Sink 49-48; or with an underwater favorability rating, as he did in 2014, defeating ex-Gov. Charlie Crist, 48-47. His personal wealth certainly helped: he spent \$73 million of his own money in 2010, and at least \$51 million this time.

In the end, Democrats were left with a now outgoing Senator who couldn’t convince voters he could fill his suit, and voters picked the politician they felt they knew better, despite Nelson’s 46 years in public service.

District 2 Clay County Commissioner Doug Conkey won a second term in office, while political newcomer Janice Kerekes captured 62 of the vote to defeat runoff opponent Eric Jaffe.

**20 years ago, 1998**

Fifty-five percent of Clay County voters approved a County Charter amendment to establish the office of County Auditor, while 57 percent of the voters approved a measure to separate the powers of Comptroller from Clerk of Court. Fifty-eight percent of voters approved extending a one-cent sales tax for road construction.

Green Cove Springs Fire Chief Richard Knoff was named to the Governor’s Wildlife Response and Mitigation Review Committee.

# Superintendent creates new avenue to reach community

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – School Superintendent Addison Davis is coming to a screen near you along with education specialists, teachers, students and more.

Davis’ new initiative “Community Connections” can be viewed from the District’s YouTube Channel from any web browser or video streaming service. In the series, Davis will focus on one aspect of the school district, such as anti-bullying efforts during Bullying Prevention Month.

With one episode currently available for viewing, Davis said he is excited for what these community connections can do for the school district.

“I wanted to make certain that when we talk about stakeholders understanding our way of work and what we are trying to accomplish, we have as many avenues as possible for people to connect and that’s what this is all about,” Davis said. “It’s about connecting with community members and giving them an inside and deeper look at what it is exactly that we do.”

The first episode, which was released Oct. 23 on the district’s YouTube page, features Davis and Assistant Superintendent


of Climate and Culture Michael McAuley discussing bullying for roughly 18 minutes. Together, they explain why it happens, how it happens, what it can do to a student and what the school district is doing to bring it to an end.

“At the end of the day, bullying is all about intentionally causing harm or wanting to cause harm to someone else, whether emotionally, physically or something else,” McAuley said. “I appreciate the fact that we [Clay County School District] talk about it in terms of zero tolerance because it should not be tolerated ever.”

Zero tolerance means that there is no threshold for bullying in Clay County schools – if students bully someone, there will always be consequences.

Davis said the plan is to air one video a month and has already lined up months of guests. And, just like the first video, there will always be an authoritative source of information to complement Davis in the videos.

For example, one month might focus on the Superintendent’s Student Advisory Council and feature a student council member to have a discussion. A video about teacher needs might feature a teacher and so on.

“We will not only see senior staff in these, but principals, teachers, staff, school-based leaders, students and more,” Davis said.


According to Davis, the first Community Connections installment received nothing but positive feedback from viewers.

“One email was sent that said it’s the most authentic and genuine conversation I’ve had in my two years,” Davis said. “I have leaders and community members thankful for defining certain elements of education and heightening their awareness within our district. It’s all been posi-


tive, and we can’t wait for the next one to come out.”


Davis said the Student Advisory Council and other initiatives he’s brought to the school district during his tenure, Community Connections serves to improve the school district, and as a result, the community.

“The more we can get people on the same stage, the better we can become in understanding how we can move from where we are now [eighth in the state] and into the Top 5,” Davis said. “That’s what this is all about.”



treatment attempted, while TMS has anywhere between a 70 and 80 percent efficacy rate.

“When you take a pill, it has to go through your gut,” De Carvalho said. “It has to bind all of the receptors in your gut and it will make you nauseous. You might possibly vomit. You might develop diarrhea for the first four weeks.”

De Carvalho said those are the acute side effects of many depression medications. He also said that doctors like himself coach patients to push through it because these symptoms eventually do dissipate.

“Once it goes away, then it goes into the liver – it’s not even working yet – and in the liver resides enzymes that will activate medications and make them work,” De Carvalho said. “Your liver may not even have the enzymes, and that’s why so many patients go through so many medications when they come to us. Then, it gets into the heart, the heart beats and boom, it’s shot into the entire body.” De Carvalho said the heart can shoot it to

centers of the body that can cause weight gain, decreased libido and more. When this medication finally makes it to the brain, it kick starts the brain into making serotonin, dopamine and norepinephrine – chemicals usually missing in depressed patients.

TMS bypasses the acute side effects that occur in the first few weeks of medication and goes directly to the dorsolateral prefrontal cortex, which houses the center of depression.

Patients must first go through a 45-minute brain scan that will reveal where the dorsolateral prefrontal cortex is in their head. Then, the first of 36 treatments can begin.

“For some patients, it takes a few times before the effects are really noticeable, but often, our patients are feeling the effects after the first treatment,” De Carvalho said. “It varies from person to person.” De Carvalho said he’s had a patient that struggled with lifelong depression.

This patient had been to therapy time and time again, taken multiple medications and even attempted to take their life multiple times, but after a complete cycle of TMS, finally found themselves free from depression.

De Carvalho admits the unconventional nature of TMS might produce skepticism, the treatment is growing in popularity.

While any person can undergo the treatment, they must first have tried at least one medication aimed at treating depression. Upon at least one of those medication’s failure, they can be approved for TMS, which De Carvalho said is covered by most insurance companies, including Tricare.

According to DeCarvalho, over 40 million Americans deal with depression daily and, in 2017, over 1,200 Clay County residents were hospitalized for depression, so the need is evident.

“The more we can educate the community about what’s out there to help them, the less likely people are going to find relief using other things, like drugs or alcohol,” De Carvalho said. “[Depression] is such a huge issue in our country and people are always like, ‘well how are we ever going to get better?’ and it’s just by doing stuff like this. This is how we can provide a care to people who are struggling and suffering.

“These machines, I believe, can really make a difference in Orange Park,” De Carvalho said.

reccommendation and agreed to hold a workshop Nov. 26 at 9 a.m. in the District Office Accounts Payable Conference Room in Green Cove Springs.

While the D’Agata replacement issue took up a large portion of the meeting, it began with three attendees who commented on the runoff election between incumbent District 5 school board member Ashley Gilhousen and her lawsuit against her opponent Lynne Chafee. Gilhousen’s suit alleges Chafee is not a resident of District 5 and therefore, should not be on the ballot. However, before attendees could speak, Chairman Carol Studdard read a legal statement D’Agata recommended regarding the public comment portion of the meeting and how that time is set aside solely for matters pertaining to the school

board and the agenda at hand.

All three speakers, one of whom was school board member Betsy Condon’s husband, Joe Condon, criticized the board for maintaining their support of Chafee in light of Gilhousen’s accusation.

Joe Condon asked that board members who supported Chafee resign should the courts rule in Gilhousen’s favor. Studdard asked speakers to refrain from use of slander or defaming anyone. She also explained that the school board has no say over the qualifications of a candidate.

“I want you to understand something,” Studdard said. “This school board conducts the business of the school district. We have no control over who runs for an election, who doesn’t run for an election and how people vote.

“This is not the proper forum to vent political disparagement against anybody. This board has nothing to do with the po-

litical race, lawsuits or anything – that is totally out of our purview,” Studdard said.

**In other business:**

The Nov. 1 school board meeting also served as the last meeting for District 3 school board member Betsy Condon, who lost in the August primary to former school board member Tina Bullock. Condon’s supporters praised her service over the past four years, while she took the opportunity to offer parting words of advice.

Gilhousen said she was honored to have served “in the trenches” with Condon.

“You are a class act. You are a professional in everything you do. You’ve brought an incredible amount of expertise...I respect you deeply and I appreciate your friendship and everything you brought to this board and I hope you know that you can walk out of here with your head held high because you’ve done and given so

much to this county and its children,” Gilhousen said. Condon reminded the board that although she’s no longer serving, she will remain involved.

“I would just implore you to remember that you are here to serve one purpose and that’s the students of this county,” Condon said. “Everybody, all of the employees, chose to get into education because they love kids and they love imparting knowledge...for the rewarding career you’ve all chosen, whether it’s the support...or our teachers and administrators...that’s why I ran. I believe that I kept parents and students at the forefront of my decisions.

“I will pay attention. I will come and speak. What we’re doing here matters and I still have a kid in school and it still matters a whole lot to me and even when he graduates, it will still matter. It truly is about raising Clay County’s future,” Condon said.

# West Nile case prompts local warning

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – County officials alerted residents to be aware of mosquitoes Nov. 2 after a Clay man tested positive for the West Nile Virus.

But mosquitoes testing positive for the virus were not found in Clay County, according to UF/IFAS Clay County Extension Director Brad Burbaugh. The agency oversees mosquito control in the county.

He said the agency sprayed a half-mile radius near where the man lived, which Burbaugh said was confidential, and set six traps nearby. Mosquitoes were then sent to a state lab for testing.

"All of those mosquitoes in that area came back negative. We've had elevated traps in that area since we were notified of it," Burbaugh said. "The most important thing for us is we

treated it like it was a localized case, even though it may not have been. We've continued to monitor the area." The human case had no connection to the mosquitoes that tested positive in Keystone Heights in July, he said.

Burbaugh noted the man did travel out of state to Indiana – a state where 27 counties had mosquitoes that tested positive for the virus, but the cause of this case remains unclear. Duval and Nassau counties have also experienced cases of the virus.

"(Clay County's case) could have been travel-related," Burbaugh said. "(Indiana has) had some major issues with West Nile this year. That may have been the case too, we're not sure." UF/IFAS and its contracted mosquito con-

# Hitting the Century mark with spunk

MIDDLEBURG — On Nov. 2, 1918, World War I was coming to an end, the sinking of the H.M.S. Titanic was six years old and the radio wasn't widely in use.

Middleburg resident Audrey Smith, who turned 100 last Friday, relayed insights from a century worth of experiences as four generations of her family held a party for the occasion.

Smith was born in Providence, Rhode Island, less than three months after South African civil rights leader Nelson Mandela. Smith lived in the same 16-room tenement house for 75 years. She laughs and mentions how she was born on the top floor and moved to the middle floor when she married in 1941.

Providence experienced vast changes from 1918 to the modern-era. Smith recalled taking trolley cars to school, which would end around 5:30 p.m. When she talks in her thick New England accent, her family listens.

"We had no school buses, but for four cents we could get a ticket to ride. At least you could get around without having an automobile," Smith said. "I wouldn't be

able to find my way around (in Providence now). They've moved rivers out of the way (in the 1980s) to change the lay of the land. They moved the train tracks out of the way."

Smith recalled the war effort — war rations, victory gardens and all — and President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's infamous speech when the Empire of Japan attacked Pearl Harbor. Her family didn't have a TV until the mid-1950s.

"It was a little bit of a thing," Smith said. She moved to Clay County in 1997 near her son, to find care for her husband, Herbert, who had a stroke. Herbert worked for the

control company frequently monitor about 30 traps around the county, test the pools and frequently send results to the state. Burbaugh said mosquito counts have been down because colder weather, with some traps not meeting the threshold to spray. The Department of Health in Clay County cautioned residents to avoid mosquito-infested areas and use mosquito repellent when outdoors. The DOH urges residents to follow “Drain and Cover” procedures, such as emptying containers of standing water and shielding items with tarp that could accumulate water.

According to the Mayo Clinic, 20 percent of those infected develop West Nile Fever, which produces symptoms of rash, body aches, headaches, vomiting, diarrhea, fever and fatigue. Visit [cdc.gov](http://cdc.gov) for more information on West Nile Virus.

According to the National Institutes of Health, West Nile virus was first isolated from a febrile patient from the West Nile district of Northern Uganda in 1937, but did not make its way to the U.S. until 1999 when a case was diagnosed in New York City. The virus is “associated with temporally dispersed outbreaks of mild febrile illness. In recent years, the epidemiology and clinical features of the virus appear to have changed, with more frequent outbreaks associated with more severe illness being noted.”

The DOH’s Nov. 2 advisory is Clay County’s second West Nile scare in the past three months. On July 20, county officials reported that samplings of mosquitoes from the Keystone Heights area tested positive for West Nile virus, but no human cases were confirmed. Mosquito Control stepped up its neighborhood eradication efforts and spread the word about how residents can avoid the risk of infection.

per year. CRC members claimed that having a higher salary for county commissioners would result in better quality candidates running for office.

The amendment that would have ended the appointment of a Charter Review Commission every four years and make it necessary to empanel a CRC every eight years instead, failed with 69,290 no votes to 17,132 no votes or 80.18 percent no and 19.82 percent yes votes.

The only county charter amendment to pass was one imposing term limits on the county’s constitutional officers passed with 47,970 yes votes to 37,646 no votes or 56.03 yes votes to 43.97 no votes. The vague amendment did not state specific officers that would be affected by the measure.

Another statewide measure of note is Amendment 4, which will restore voting rights to residents who had previously been convicted of certain felonies. The amendment specifically excludes those individuals who have committed murder or a felony sexual offense.

In terms of local numbers, 48,948 Clay County voters said yes to Amendment 4, while 42,899 voted no. On the state level, 64.47 percent voted yes, and 35.53 percent voted no. State constitutional amendments require a 60 percent

approval to become law. Clay voters ushered two incumbents back into office on Nov. 6.

County Commission Chairman Gavin Rollins of Keystone Heights defeated Democratic challenger Cheryl Owen by a vote of 13,259 votes to Owen’s 2,655 votes.

Incumbent District 5 School Board Member Ashley Gilhousen of Lake Asbury defeated political newcomer Lynne Hirabayashi Chafee by a vote of 49,505 votes to Chafee’s 33,632 votes.


Gilhousen’s campaign got a last-minute boost from publicity surrounding a lawsuit she filed claiming Chafee did not reside in the district when she qualified to run. At press time, the lawsuit remained unresolved.

In terms of voter habits, Early Voting once again proved successful as 37,416 Clay County voters opted to avoid the long lines on Nov. 6. On election day, 36,362 voters went to their neighborhood precinct to cast ballots. Another 20,219 voters opted to vote by mail this cycle, therefore allowing them more time to peruse the lengthy state constitutional amendments.

Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambliss said the Nov. 6 results are considered unofficial until his office certifies the votes in 10 days. The 10-day window is allowed for overseas and military ballots to be received and counted as long as the ballots are postmarked on Nov. 6.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The charm of Green Cove Springs has found its way into its newest business, Red's Wine Bar, and Clay County residents are partaking of its offerings.

Boyce and Kim Royal opened Red's Wine Bar in late June, and the couple has been surprised by the community's support of the bar.

thought of having a glass of red wine.

Located a few blocks from the St. Johns River, at 414 Walnut St., the cobblestone street sets the scene for the maritime theme inside the bar.

Once inside, the scent of gardenia and dewy honeysuckle from a burning Anthropologie Capri Blue Rain candle makes customers feel relaxed as the sound of Ray LaMontagne plays softly in the background.

Maps and pictures of sailboats hang on walls throughout the bar, and two model sailboats sit atop a three-tiered wine rack the Royals built themselves. The neutral colored tables feature a succulent plant, as well as plenty of room for guests to share a charcuterie board and a glass of wine. White and grey chairs help make the brick bar and 10 dark bar stools stand out.

If the decor doesn't peel away the stress, one of the 45 bottles of wine or 11 craft beers the bar serves, might.

The atmosphere is what sets the bar apart from others. It's quiet enough to where someone can read a book, but not too quiet guests feel like they have to whisper to each other and that's what customers appreciate most.

"You can hear each other talk and have a conversation," said Arial Taylor, 41, a funeral director from Fleming Island. "You're not screaming over everything else."

In the past, Green Cove Springs residents had to commute to Jacksonville or Orange Park if they wanted to enjoy any kind of nightlife. The bar's location makes it the perfect spot for a date night, girl's night out or for someone wanting simply to get out of the house.

Taylor and two of her girlfriends, Jordan Tillis, 47, a pharmacist from Lake Asbury, and Homemaker Kristin Walker, 48, from Green Cove, are happy to have a place so close by where they can get together to catch without having to

commute. The trio has been going to the bar since it first opened.

“I like the atmosphere, but more importantly, the owners,” Tills said. “The owners come out and talk to you, so a family-type feel to it.”

Green Cove Springs resident Justin Hall, 34, is one of the owners of Spring Park Coffee just a couple of blocks away and is excited to see another small business succeeding.

“Walnut Street has great potential for

local businesses to come, as long as people keep coming and supporting small businesses,” Hall said.

Other small businesses in the city donated some of the art and furniture in Red’s, which does not go unnoticed by patrons.

“I like the way they decorated it,” Walker said. “It goes back to the charm, and small-town feel.”

Adding to the charm is the bar’s variety of the wine and craft beer selection. The couple wanted to stock the shelves with bottles people can’t get from Publix, so they guests have access to wines and

beer they normally wouldn’t – 20 whites, 24 reds and one port dessert wine make choosing a glass of wine a little bit easier.

Two more Red’s regulars, Carmen Darfler, 43, and William Darfler, 50, from Fleming Island, say they haven’t had a bottle of wine they didn’t enjoy.

“We love coming on Sundays when the wine is 40 percent off Saturday night’s open bottles,” William Darfler said. “We can try different types of wine without spending a lot of money.”

Red’s is quickly becoming “the place to be” not in just Green Cove Springs, but in all of Clay County.

“We want this to be successful because it’s a local family business and it’s what Green Cove needed,” Carmen Darfler said.

The Royals try to interact with patrons to hear their suggestions on how they can make the bar even better. They have plans to expand the menu to more than just charcuterie (cheese) boards to include small plates and desserts and have also worked on adding more wines to the selection.

“We want people to come in and hang out for an hour or two and walk away and say, ‘I had a good time’,” Boyce Royal said.

# Task force sets sights on preserving town's historic structures

ORANGE PARK — After getting the go ahead from Orange Park Town Council, the newly-formed Historic Preservation Task Force of Orange Park is now working on ways to best develop and then implement a framework for preserving the town's historic structures.

Leading the charge is council member Connie Thomas, who came up with the idea after learning about the town's hidden enclave of Mid-Century Modern homes, which she and other believe should be preserved for posterity.

"We need to decide if we want a committee or a board," Thomas said. "Then, we'll make a recommendation to the council and hope that they agree with us."

The task force is going to wait until its next meeting to decide on which structure it should adopt.

"Boards are bodies that have, for lack of a better term, some type of government-backed power behind it," said Town Attorney Sam Garrison. "They're not just advisory. Committees themselves serve as opportunities to workshop issues and are more advisory."

He said boards are typically made up of five people, with each member picked by a council member. Because of the responsibility boards hold, members on a board can only serve on one board at any given time. In short, boards hold more governmental power than committees.

"Regardless of the route decided on, you are all deemed public officers, so you must abide by the Florida Sunshine Laws," Garrison said.

This means that the task force, and what comes of it in the future, whether it be board or committee, must make public notice of any meetings and cannot discuss any task force-related things in private.

From here, task force members each shared what they thought historic preservation in Orange Park should look like. Among the many opinions shared, it was clear that the task force has at least one primary goal: to ensure that the historical character of the town is preserved while maintaining civil reasoning in doing so.

"We don't want to be forceful," Thomas said.

The task force suggested creating historic districts with landmarks that designate a property or structure's historical value. They also stressed finding a way

to give the future board or committee teeth without damaging relationships with homeowners. To do this, they decided that homeowners should be included in the decision-making process.

Dane Lacey, the chair of Town of Orange Park Mid-Century Modern Enthusiasts and member of the Historical Preservation Task Force, said that the group also needs to focus on carving out exactly what it means for a structure to be deemed historical.

"Just because something is old, doesn't mean it has historical value," Lacey said.

This first meeting was short, but it's clear the task force wants to preserve the historical value of some hundreds of historical structures within Orange Park in a way that is not only beneficial for the town, but the property owner as well. Whether or not this happens, though, is up to the Orange Park Town Council, which has the final say.

plans to launch an investigation into the SunPass' amassing a backlog of collectings nearly \$200 million in tolls from users statewide. The state also announced it was fining the SunPass Conduent for \$800,000 in damages.

"People driving under a toll gantry might see a flashing light, but the tolls are not collecting money right now," Pleasants said. Phase one of the massive project that has been on Florida maps dating back to 1955, cost roughly \$164 million, according to the FDOT. The First Coast Expressway is funded by Florida's Turnpike Enterprise through bonds, and fees collected from the tolls which will fund ongoing road maintenance. In Duval County, the FDOT also completed an interchange that connects I-10 and Beaver Street.

Aimed at alleviating congestion across Clay, Duval and St. Johns counties, First Coast Expressway is 46 miles in its entirety and will cost about \$1.9 billion when completed. Next year, FDOT will begin

construction extending Blanding Boulevard to U.S. 17 in Green Cove Springs into St. Johns County where it will connect with Interstate 95.

"It's nice that it gives drivers in Clay and Duval County another option to take the congestion off the other roadways," Pleasants said. "Clay County especially has been growing by leaps and bounds. Some of the infrastructure needed to support that."

The final segment of the project is slated to finish construction in 2023 and cost about \$500 million. Phase three, which includes a four-lane rebuild of the Shands Bridge, will connect State Road 16 to I-95. The third segment secured funding in April.

Pleasants said the road can also function as an evacuation route in case of a serious storm.

"It provides people with another way to get out of the hurricane if there's an evacuation situation," Pleasants said. "That will be more true once we finish the second and third phases that connects I-10 to I-95, so those St. Johns County people can shoot right across the bridge to get to I-10."

Besides managing a cat and three parakeets, she frequents the Middleburg Senior Center and is known for her dutiful volunteering at Middleburg United Methodist Church.

Smith worked in several jewelry stores and retired from a tool and die company in Providence in the mid-1980s. Her daughter, Bonnie Craven, who lives in Colorado, said Smith used to avidly sew square dancing and wedding dresses.

"(Audrey) made all my clothes and birthday cakes," Craven said. "She still balances a checkbook to the penny."

Patti Evans, Smith's caregiver of 4 years, said it was amazing all that Smith had seen and done.

"Her determination to get to 100 is unreal," Evans said.

Smith's neighbor Nancy Long said she talks to Smith 45 minutes every day. Long touted Smith's work with the church dinners and food programs.

"She's so strong," Long said. "She never

complains and is so sharp."

Her son Gerald presented her with a card the size of a table.

"It's the biggest birthday you've had," he said.

In Smith's room are dressers and bureaus from 1912. She said she can track her family back to Stephen Hopkins, a signer of the Declaration of Independence and governor of Rhode Island.

As for hitting the century mark, Smith said the secret was staying physically fit, which she credits to more than 30 years of square dancing.

"Keep active and just be happy with what you do as long as you're keeping busy and don't get into trouble," Smith said. "Having a lot of friends around you can go a long way."

Smith was in a traveling square dance group that went as far as Canada and Washington D.C. where it rented out gyms to dance in.

"That's what kept us going. We'd have large crowds," she said. "In Washington D.C., you could be dancing with some big diplomat and not even know it."





# Police Briefs

## Clay man charged with breaking into Alligator Farm

ST. AUGUSTINE – A 23-year-old Green Cove Springs man faces charges of burglary, damaging property and criminal mischief after allegedly jumping into a crocodile enclosure Tuesday morning at The Alligator Farm on Anastasia Boulevard.

Officers from the St. Augustine Police Department arrested Brandon Keith Hatfield around 6:50 a.m. Nov. 6 near the historic St. Augustine Lighthouse where he was reported as “wearing underwear, crawling on the resident’s lawn, and hiding in their bushes, apparently attempting to conceal himself.”

Hatfield told police he had been bitten by an alligator and he appeared to have an injury on his left foot.

While en route to Flagler Hospital to get treatment for his injuries, police received a call from The Alligator Farm staff who reported it had been broken and they had surveillance video showing the alleged suspect.

Police found Hatfield’s Croc slip-on sandal in the crocodile pit at the animal farm.

According to the surveillance video, the break-in took place around 7:45 p.m. Monday when Hatfield allegedly entered The Alligator Farm and damaged property to numerous exhibits and statues around the complex, including the Nile Crocodile enclosure called “Oasis on the Nile.” Police said Hatfield was clearly visible in the video and is shown scaling a 20-foot fence and then climbing atop a structure where Egyptian artwork and Gabon vipers are displayed.

Police said Hatfield then jumped into the pool with the crocodiles, which was caught on tape along with the subsequent croc attack. One report said, “A considerable amount of blood was found on a zip line platform.”

At press time, Hatfield remained held without bond in the St. Johns County Jail.

## Traffic stops ends in drug charges



The officer had Feaster’s passengers exit the vehicle while two other officers searched the vehicle.


Inside the vehicle, officers found several bags containing marijuana, a vial containing a white powdery substance and ammunition in a purse in the vehicle.

Feaster was transported to the Green Cove Springs Police Department before being transported to the Clay County Jail for booking.



As naval warfare changes, so does the course and materials at supply school

evolve to create the most dynamic, lethal, safe and professional warfighting team for the Navy our nation needs.

“NSCS’ flagship curriculum, the Basic Qualification Course is modeled to prepare new supply officers for their first operation tours in the fleet,” said Lt. Adam C. Johnson, school public affairs officer. “Other courses ... are designed to refine intermediate and advanced level skillsets of both officer and enlisted operators.”

Hurst ensures sailors have the tools to deter any threat and maintain war readiness in an era of great power competition. Hurst continues a tradition of service.

“I come from a large military family, with both grandfathers and several uncles, cousins, my aunt and my brother serving in different branches,” said Hurst.

“Serving in the Navy offers a great opportunity to serve my country, see the world and pursue additional opportunities to use what I learned even after I leave the Navy,” said Hurst.

so we really truly understand what others may be going through."

For Davis, he never doubted the community and its support in this situation.

"For us to band together, it just shows our unity and collaboration and our community's awareness to reaching out, to extending our hands to others, and we're proud of being able to have that opportunity," Davis said.

Paiva said she expected to have enough supplies to fill at least a van, but on Nov. 6, it wasn't a van that showed up to the Clay County School District Operations Warehouse, it was a Penske moving truck.

Originally, these supplies we're just going to Jackson County, but after learning of the devastation in other counties near Jackson, Paiva decided to spread the supplies throughout the three different counties.

"Gulf County, I believe, lost an entire elementary school," Paiva said. "They are really in need, just like Jackson and Calhoun...and I'm so proud of Clay County. We have stuff from the community, the union teachers, the non-union teachers, the parents and so many more. They really showed up."

Paiva, Davis and Clay County aren't alone in bringing 27 pallets of supplies to counties more than five hours away. They also received some help from The Teamsters Union. Kenneth Barringer, one of the Teamsters who will be driving the supplies to Gulf County, said that The Teamsters are a group of UPS drivers who use their time to drive supplies back and forth to areas in need. Nov. 6 marks more than three weeks of supply-driving time for him, but still today, doing what he does brings a smile to his face.

"This is some of the greatest, most humbling work I do," Barringer said. "To see these people, to see their faces light up when you show up with these supplies, to see them cry, to shake their hand, to help people you've never met out...it is something I will never forget."




## Orange Park Medical Center Undergoes \$6.4 Million Technology Upgrade

ORANGE PARK – Orange Park Medical Center is wrapping up a \$6.4 million technology upgrade that has been underway for

18 months. The upgrade includes mobile devices and equipment including iPhones, patient smart bands, wireless vital monitors and more. The technology will help enhance patient safety and communication.

Orange Park Medical Center is one of only 8 hospitals in the country and the only hospital in Florida to have all of the following high-tech features:

Patient smart bands helps doctors and staff members quickly access patient information and track process through the ER. Wireless vitals monitoring is conducted with wrist-worn vital sign devices that provide real time vital readings to a patient's care team to allow patients uninterrupted sleep and send immediate alerts when irregularities occur. This avoids frequent vital sign checks multiple times a day and throughout the night.

Electronic communication boards will be mounted on the wall of every emergency and inpatient room, giving the patient live information on who their care team is, pop-ups with who just walked into their room, goals, medicine, schedule for tests and treatments, diet restrictions and more.

Advanced nurse call system allows patients to push the nurse call light to send an immediate alert to their nurse's smartphone to improve response time.

A real-time equipment locating system involves electronic tracking tags that are placed on mobile equipment so the equipment can be quickly located when needed to provide the care team more time at the

bed side with patients.

The new iMobile system will arm staff with smartphones that provide secure texting, voice and broadcasting. The devices include a full hospital directory so caregivers can connect in real time and receive test results instantly. Patients can also communicate with their care team on their mobile device through their nurse call button.

# Gilhousen defeats Chafee for School Board District 5 seat

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Ashley Gilhousen cruised to an election day victory in a runoff to remain on the Clay County School Board Tuesday night, securing almost two-thirds of the vote to defeat opponent Lynne Chafee.

The incumbent carried 49,505 votes, or 59.55 percent of votes to Chafee’s 33,632 votes or 40.45 percent. Gilhousen won all 47 precincts.

The District 5 school board seat race last month saw Gilhousen sue Chafee and accuse her of improperly qualifying. Gilhousen claimed Chafee did not live within the district at the time of qualifying and sought to have Chafee thrown off the ballot. District 5 encompasses Green Cove Springs and Lake Asbury, from Old Jennings Road to the Putnam County line.

Last week, however, the candidates

agreed to hold off on the lawsuit until after the election, based on a recommendation from 4th Judicial Circuit Court Judge Gary Wilkinson.

Gilhousen said she looked forward to serving on the school board for another four years and thanked voters.

“I’m absolutely humbled by the incredible outpouring of support we’ve received in this election cycle,” Gilhousen said. “It was a hard-fought campaign on both sides and I think at this point everybody’s glad it’s been settled at the ballot box.”

As for the lawsuit, Gilhousen said she needed to consult her attorney before discussing details of the lawsuit, though she said the goal of getting a hearing before Nov. 20 was “still on track.”

In a prepared statement, Chafee called the campaign an “amazing experience,” and said she was grateful for her supporters, teachers and support staff.

“While I am disappointed with the outcome, I can hold my head high knowing that I ran a clean and honest campaign. I will continue to advocate for the best interests of all Clay County’s children,” she said.

The school board will meet Nov. 20, where Tina Bullock, who beat Betsy Condon in the August primary, will join Gilhousen, Carol Studdard, Mary Bolla and Janice Kerekes. At that meeting, school board members will elect a new chairman and vice chairman for the coming 12 months.



# Don't let fire ants ruin your year, fight back!

For decades the red imported fire ant (*Solenopsis invicta*) has been a major pain (pun intended!) in home lawns, landscapes, playgrounds, parks, pastures and croplands. They have an economic impact too. I have seen fire ants damage electric systems such as junction boxes and air conditioners and make people yelp when bitten. At one point, my three-year-old daughter was afraid to go outside because she thought the mean ants were going to attack her.

Not all ants are created equal and properly identifying them is the first step in determining how and when they should be managed. Management methods differ because treatments that affect one species of ant may or may not affect another species. As many of you probably know, fire ants are especially persistent. This means controlling them, which often will require repeated treatments.

Research shows us that one of the most

effective methods to control fire ants is by using ant baits. Ants foraging for food pick up these baits and bring them back to the colony. These baits work in different ways, but all have the same end goal which is to kill the queen thereby stopping colony reproduction. Contact treatments or management strategies, such as flooding the ant mound with water or kicking and destroying the ant mound only displaces and reduces ant populations but will not control them effectively.

Baits can be used for individual mound or broadcast applications, but the best way to eradicate these painful pests is by using both approaches at different times of the year. In the spring or fall, broadcast a bait product over the entire area affected by

fire ants. Then wait several days and treat individual mounds with a granule, dust, or drench-style ant control product.

Controlling fire ants is both art and science. Here are some tips for you to practice both the science and art. Be proactive – the best time to apply fire ant bait will be in the fall and/or spring. This will help reduce the number of active mounds as they start building in the spring. Active mounds are generally reduced in numbers during the colder months and applying the bait right before the cold months helps reduce the mounds even further.

'Home remedy' options can be used, but they will provide limited control. Products like diatomaceous earth, boric acid or even grits may kill some ants on contact, but

rarely eliminate the colony. Also, trying to flood the ant mounds out is not effective as the colony will just relocate. Using gasoline or fire to control an ant colony is both dangerous and can be harmful to the environment and is not recommended.

When choosing a product for fire ant bait, read the label and make sure you can apply the product in your situation. Several products can only be applied to residential lawns and may not be labelled for application on grazing pastures or around vegetable crops.

The instructions for most baits recommend broadcasting the bait around the base of the mound, not on top of the mound. Research shows that if applied on the top of the mound, the ants will not take it into the mound. Broadcast around the base of the mound in a two to three-foot radius for greater control. This painful insect can be troublesome to get rid of, but not impossible. It will take the proper approach and most likely will not be controlled in one shot, but it is possible to enjoy time outdoors without fear of painful bites.

## Knights head to playoffs

OAKLEAF – By virtue of a schedule filled with what are dubbed Category 1 teams, Oakleaf High, under first year coach Frank Garis, earned a region playoff spot despite a 5-5 overall record and despite a 3-1 district 3-7A record.

“November football is the reward,” said Garis. “Another week to spend with this team is a blessing. At Oakleaf, this will become an annual tradition.”

In the old days of football, teams that finished the regular season in a tie, played what was dubbed a Kansas tie-breaker, which involved playing on a neutral field, putting the ball on the 25 and playing until a win. Keystone Heights did it a few years ago.

In 2018, in district 3-7A, Oakleaf High tied with Buchholz and Bartram Trail in district play at 3-1; Oakleaf beat Bartram Trail, Buchholz beat Oakleaf and Bartram Trail beat Buchholz.

Didn’t happen.

Instead, FHSAA wisdom added a points system to determine quality teams for playoffs to avoid blowouts in round one. Note: In region 1-4A, Gadsden County, at 0-9, earned a playoff spot.

In their final regular season game, Oakleaf lost to unbeaten 6A Ocala Vanguard 46-34 to actually boost those playoff points.

Garis played the system to perfection and Oakleaf did earn the right to continue

the season with an opening round game at Tallahassee Lincoln on Thurs., Nov. 8. Lincoln has a 6-4 regular season and 2-0 district 1-7A record in a three-team district; Leon (3-7) and Chiles (6-4).

Lincoln has been a state powerhouse since 1999 with three state titles, two Final Four finishes and one state runnerup finish in the past 20 years. Lincoln lost legendary coach Yufuf Shakir to Manatee High in 2017 and was replaced by Quinn Gray, a former NFL quarterback.

# Fleming Island girls, boys get to state XC

GAINESVILLE — It seems freshman Grace Adams has become the unsung hero for the Fleming Island High girls cross country team as the now-healthy harrier climbed back to her usual number two finisher for the Lady Golden Eagles as they finished second overall at the Region 1-4A cross country championships Friday morning at Santa Fe College in Gainesville. The second place finish puts Fleming Island's girls in the state meet in Tallahassee on November 10. Freshman Mei Chiang was the top runner for Fleming Island with an eighth place finish in 19 minutes, 4.78 seconds, another drop in her previous school record.

"That was the plan all along," said Fleming Island head coach Suzanne Baker, who languished as her girls team with Chiang the district champion, finished second at the district 1-4A championship race last week with Adams, finishing as fifth runner on the team, slowed by a flu. "She led a nice group of three runners today at the finish that got us the runnerup spot."

For the Fleming Island boys, it was junior Will Livesay for a second race leading

the boys team with the Golden Eagles finished sixth and also advancing to the Class 4A championship race in Tallahassee on November 10.

"Last week felt pretty good (fourth in districts), but this is better than that," said Livesay, who finished 18th overall in 17:07.80 to lead Fleming Island's finish-

ers. "I heard someone at that last left turn yell that I was in 16th place and top 15 go to state so I surged thinking I wasn't going to make it. Even though the person who yelled was wrong about me in at 16, it helped me and I used that to sprint to the finish."

In the girls race, the top time was from Timber Creek freshman Amber Schulz who broke away near mid race to cruise to victory in 18:20.55 ahead of Lake Brantley junior Ashley Klingenberg, second in 18:32.32.

In the top 10 of the girls race, Chiang's eighth place finish was among six of seven returning state meet runners, including defending region champion Mackenzie Czurak of Winter Springs who was fourth and Klingerberg who was seventh in Class 4A last year. As a freshman, Schulz is set to attend her first state meet.

With the next group of finishers being from the Orlando area, Adams carried in at 19th place in 20:08.7 ahead of Fletcher High senior Laurel Overby. Adams was leading point with teammates Lauren Schaudel, 22nd in 20:12.51, and junior

# Fleming Island flawless in blowout of Bartram Trail

BARTRAM TRAIL — With a remarkable 13 total errors; digs and services, the Fleming Island High volleyball team propelled themselves to the region 1-8A championship game for the first time with a 3-0 blowout region semifinal win over district rival Bartram Trail High School on Wed., Oct. 30 at Bartram Trail High School.

"This is one of the grittiest bunch of athletes on one team that I have had to coach," said Fleming Island coach Amy Walker. "The whole team was hitting on all cylinders. I haven't seen that team since our conference win over Nease."

With the three straight game wins; 25-12, 25-16 and 25-12, Fleming Island never gave the Lady Bears, who beat the Golden Eagles twice this season; in regular season play and for the district 4-8A title 10 days ago, a chance to catch their breath or to surmount any kind of response to the full-frontal attack bestowed upon them.


"It was really weird that I envisioned this scenario; us coming up short at districts (lost to Bartram Trail) and then having to bounce back," said Walker. "I kind of thought the girls would have the mental advantage because we have been trading off wins and losses to them all season. We had really good practices this week and for the week before Fletcher."

Against Fletcher, the region opener, Fleming Island showcased a bit of what was coming to Bartram Trail with a 3-0 win.

Fleming Island (25-3) continues into the region 1-8A championship game against Tallahassee Leon (26-3), a semifinal 3-1 winner over Tallahassee Chiles in a rematch of the district 3-8A final won 3-0 by Leon. Leon beat Tate High 3-0 in their region opener.

Leon, 8A runnerup in 2017 to Venice High and 7A Final Four loser to Tampa Plant in 2015 and 2016, owns a Class 6A title from 2011 and a 159-65 record since 2011.

Fleming Island, under Walker since

2015, has failed to make the region playoffs with semifinal losses to Buchholz and twice Bartram Trail in district tournaments. Walker, while with Orange Park until 2014, has playoff experience up to the region semifinals with a 6A region semifinal loss to Leon in 2011 and a 6A region semifinal loss to Buchholz in 2008. Walker coached Orange Park to region playoffs six times from 2007-2012.

In game one against Bartram Trail, Fleming Island rifled off to a quick 12-8 advantage behind Maya Walker and Jillian Jackson who sent monster spikes to the Bartram Trail defense that were blocked to the floor on the Lady Bears side of the court.

Behind a strong string of serves from Kailey DePaula who put down five scor-


ing strikes from the backline that Bartram Trail's defense could not send back.

"We went back to basics and purpose in the past week's practice," said Walker. "We had a bunch of mental errors in past games and I wanted to eliminate those mistakes."

Up 17-10 and anticipating a rush to the finish, Fleming Island rallied behind a set of misdirected feeds to Rayna Durden that drew the Bartram Trail defense, but let Walker go one-on-one with successive strikes to the 25-12 win.

"They wanted to double on me and we kind of baited them," said Durden, who finished with 13 scoring shots. "Maya had a great game and made them stretch to cover both of us."

Game two stayed close to 6-6 before Fleming Island ran away with four Durden

blasts that ignited the Eagle defense and put the score at 14-9 with Bartram Trail looking bewildered on defense.

"We were reading their rotation and saw where they were going and it let us get into our blocks quicker," said Durden.

Another set of service receiver errors by Bartram Trail, off serves from Lyara Rosario pushed the score to 18-11 with little action on top of the net before a double block from Durden and Madison Mas preempted two final thunderbolts from Durden to score the game 25-16.

"They were so amped up after game two that I had to remind them to focus and finish," said Walker. "I didn't want their minds to slip and let them back into the match."

Game three again started with a 5-5 tie erupting to a 13-9 deficit behind Walker and Jackson taking control above the net. A huge round of hits from Jasmine Robinson was a momentum driver with Jackson putting the game at 24-17 before a net serve by Bartram Trail ended the match.

Jennifer Fliess, 24th in 20:14.70 within earshot and keeping the Fleming Island point total low as they awaited two more finishers; Emma Millson and Marisa Kortright.

“I felt great and knew Lauren and Jennifer were near,” said Adams. “I still have a little chest congestion, but I wasn’t going to run that far back at this race. We wanted the state meet.”

As runners flooded the finish area, it was Millson who emerged with Kortright about 15 yards behind her bringing in the final scorers for Fleming Island in 48th and 52nd place; 20:57.55 and 21:07.83, respectively.

Stratton, who emerged behind Kailes with Cartwright and Xander Peacock of Blountstown in a three-man sprint to the finish, wound up fifth in 16:32.65 in his best time of the season. For the St. Johns team finish, it was a strong finish from Kailes’ younger brother Jacob at 16th in 17:25.71 and a best finish at 34th in 18:03.5 from senior David Gonzales that put the Spartans entire boys team on the state meet bus with a sixth place team finish. “I was on the finish final run in a group of guys and was running a little tactical and a little survival,” said Gonzales. “Coach Jay always tells us to pick guys off at the end for extra points.”

state meet with their third place finish behind Tallahassee Maclay and Bishop Snyder.


“That was a surprise,” said Birmingham of his third place team finish. “We had a great pack finish at districts and Evelyn and Hannah both stayed near at the end.”

“We are right where I want to be,” said Nelson, who was second to Buchholz High senior Caden Monk in the district 1-4A championship race last week with a 40 second personal best split. “I saw him turn a couple of times during today’s race to make sure I was still with him. That was nice of him to keep me up front.”

Nelson, who finished in 16:33.18 with Monk taking fourth in 16:19.01, became the first Oakleaf High cross country runner to advance to the state meet with Oakleaf

top of the bracket, Hagerty has Robert E. Lee and Columbia has Fletcher.

That being said, the Knights have been on the field with what could be considered the toughest schedule in north Florida with two former state champions: 4A-Raines and 5A-Trinity Christian and three teams now in the playoffs: 4A-Glades Central, 7A-Buchholz and 6A-Vanguard. That lineup accounts for the Knights' five losses.

"The only game that I scheduled was the Trinity game (week 7) & the Kickoff Classic vs Fletcher," said Garis. "Seven opponents with bonus points was a big reason we made the playoffs."

Against Vanguard on Friday, Oakleaf teetered with an upset in the 46-34 loss with quarterback Walter Simmons airing out the game with four touchdown passes off 318 yards.

Senior tailback Keshawn King finished with 132 yards of rushing with just a pass touchdown.

"Every team we play prepares to stop Keshawn," said Garis. "Our offense has done a great job taking advantage of that and Keshawn is still preforming above and beyond expectations."

In the first quarter, Oakleaf flubbed a fake punt attempt that gave Vanguard field position for a four yard touchdown run.

the ball three consecutive times to give Fleming clinching first down.

“I just had to do my job,” said Ramirez. “I love my teammates.”

For most of three quarters, the outlook was not good for the green and gold. Orange Park outgained their guests 194-85 in the first half, shutting out the Fleming Island offense. Despite the disparity, the score was tied 7-7 at the intermission because of a critical turnover. On the game’s first play from scrimmage, a shotgun snap sailed over the head of Orange Park quarterback Vinnie Walker and rolled all the way to the end zone. The Golden Eagles’ Glenn Rodgers overtook Walker in his chase for the ball, and recovered it for a touchdown.

“If you look at the game mathematically, those were seven points in a five-point game, so obviously it was huge,” said Orange Park coach Tom MacPherson.

Still, the Raiders took a 13-7 lead in the third quarter on Alex Collier’s second touchdown of the night. After Zykeim Sermons moved the ball to the Fleming Island one yard line with a 24 yard scamper, the junior darted untouched off of left tackle for an easy score. Collier led Orange Park with 104 yards on 19 rushes, while Sermons gained 96 yards on 17 carries.

The turning point came late in the third quarter. With the Golden Eagles facing a third down and three yards to go, running back Dewayne McBride fumbled forward as he crossed the line of scrimmage. The ball bounced up to him, but slipped through his hands again before he prevailed in a furious race to the pignskin, cradling it at the Raiders’ 10 yard line. Instead of a turnover, the result was a 19 yard gain. Two plays later, McBride plowed into the end zone, and Avery Coussens’ PAT as the quarter ended gave the Eagles a lead they

would never relinquish. Fleming Island scored the next ten points of the game, shutting down the Raiders offense until less than two minutes remained.

“We pride ourselves on winning the game in the fourth quarter,” said Fleming Island coach Damenyum Springs. Our defensive line started pounding them, and JJ [Jeremiah Jackson] did his thing in the fourth quarter.”-

Jackson, a junior defensive tackle, had two tackles for loss and a sack in the final frame. Rodgers had two and a half sacks as the Golden Eagles harassed Walker into 11 incompletions and an interception on 17 throws.

Each team was left mostly with their running games on a soggy night, and the Golden Eagles’ ground attack seemed to improve, largely due to Ramirez, as the game wore on. McBride chipped in with 83 yards on 15 carries.

The Golden Eagles also had a decided edge on special teams. Dean Hyams punted twice for a 49.5 yard average, both times pinning the Raiders down inside their five yard line, while Orange Park averaged only 30.0 yards on five punts. Fleming Island was successful on a fake punt when Avery Coussens broke two tackles to gain 11 yards and a first down. The Raiders failed on a fake punt when Jacob Ashe tackled Orange Park punter Dennis Mitchell for a loss, a turnover on downs that Coussens converted into points with a 36 yard field goal. Fleming Island had 118 return yards, while the Raiders had only 41.

Each team finishes the season with a 6-4 record. Orange Park’s mark is a substantial improvement from 2017’s 1-9 campaign.

“We are going to tie for the most wins in the county,” said MacPherson. “The hard part will be to turn from a 6-4 team into a consistent contender.”

timely encroachment flag on third and five at the Clay 13 yard line. Two plays later, University Christian led 6-0 with Clay blocking the PAT kick.

University scored again after an interception near midfield that led to a 48 yard scoring run as the Clay defense seemed unable to stop the Christian running game.

With another nine play drive with just one third down, University looked destined for a score, but tackles for losses from line-



# Nesi gets four year quest fulfilled

JACKSONVILLE – Ridgeview High cross country coach Al Nesi, Jr. got a rare glimpse of his son Joel in an emotional hug that transcended two years of turmoil for the pair as Joel Nesi, a senior cross country runner for dad Al at Ridgeview, culminated a four year quest to make it to the state cross country championships on Saturday in the Region 1-2A championships held at Cecil Field's New World Golf Course.

"I can't even talk," said an emotionally drained Al Nesi. "We've been through a lot; me, Joel, the family and the team. I can't tell you how I feel. I'm so proud of Joel to get to this point."

Nesi, who had lost his wife, Jodi, a year ago to a tragic boating accident, has soldiered on with son Joel in trying to fulfill a lifelong dream of Jodi Nesi; to see Joel run a state championship race.

"I have used the inspiration from Heaven to keep strong for my mom," said Joel Nesi, moments after he finished ninth at the region 1-2A championship race to complete the journey to the state championship race on Sat., Nov. 3 in Tallahassee. "It's surreal, but I was out of it at the half-way point (17th place, top 15 advance to state) and I just told myself I wasn't going to fail. It had been too tough a journey."

Nesi, who had teammate Keith Kelley as the lone two Ridgeview runners to advance from districts a week ago, settled in behind the dominating force of Bolles High School's front running team with overall champion Charles Hicks blitzing the field with a 14 minute, 53.11 second effort

"It was tempting to go out and try to stay with them, but dad and I talked last night and decided to wait out the first mile, then get in under the top 15," said Nesi, who sprinted in to finish at 16:29.2, a personal best time. "I was a little worried about being a little too far back because they went out so fast so I just put the hammer down to keep picking guys off. In other races, I've fallen off the second to third mile. Finally, I got there."

Kelley finished 24th in 17:13.4 in his best region finish.

In the girls race, the Ridgeview High girls team all advanced with their third place finish at districts behind lead runner Anna Magruder, but it was a surprising finish from Hayley Schaefer, normally the third finisher for the Lady Panthers, who battled through a gauntlet of runners in the straight 200 meter finish to get 57th overall in 23:39.15 as the top Ridgeview finisher.

Ridgeview finished 10th of 11 teams in the girls race.


Runners now head to Tallahassee for the state cross country championships on Sat., Nov. 3.

In the girls region 1-3A race, won by Creekside's Claire Openshaw in 17:53.01, Middleburg High sophomore Emma Musante had one of her best races in her short career to finish 36th in 20:12.6.

she traversed the nearly 5,500 yards of fairways and greens at Mission Inn Resort.

"I worked on improving my drives to be straighter and longer this year, but have to work on my woods; second and third shots," said Jackson. "I missed some putts today (day two) that I should have made."

The top finisher for the Class 1A tournament was Meiyi Yan, a senior from First Academy of Orlando who was 19th last year, with a 136 (67, 69).

In her first round, Jackson finished with a 76 to better her first round of last year, an 82, before finishing off her second round at 78 with last year's second round at 81. Jackson finished 45th last year and 41st two years ago as an eighth grader.

"I really wanted a top 20 finish today," said Jackson, who was accompanied on the course by dad and coach Billy Jackson. "I think I was a close as 22nd at the 17th hole in the second round before having my worst hole of the tournament; a triple bogie, that dropped me to 25th."
