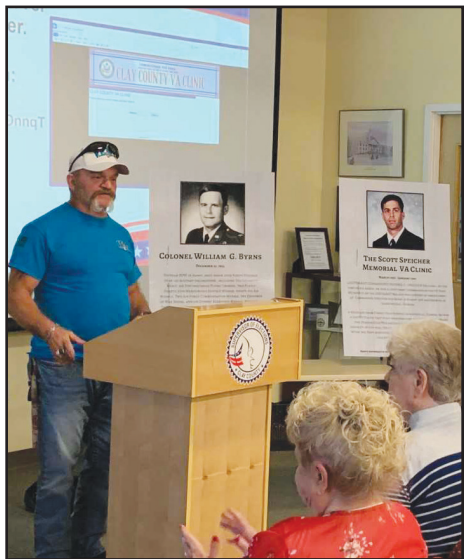

OPMC prepared for the worse

Staff of 70 were waiting at emergency, operating rooms

ORANGE PARK – Dr. Steven Goodfriend only had enough time to take one deep breath the moment he got the call Friday night that a civilian Boeing 737-800 had bounced off the runway and into the St.

Johns River. Then the Emergency Room Medical Director at Orange Park Medical Center joined in a frantic, yet well-organized, response to an unknown disaster.

Within minutes, a crew of 70 trauma and emergency room doctors, surgeons, nurses, practitioners and operational support staffers were ready to accept casualties.

"It's what we do," Goodfriend said.

"We mobilized everyone, and everyone was ready. Everyone came in. Everyone wanted to help."

Area hospitals were on alert for nearly an hour after the regularly-scheduled Miami Air International flight 293 from Guantanamo Bay NAS ran off the runway at 9:40 p.m. and into the river at Jacksonville NAS with 143 passengers and crew

Clay County Memories

Morning rush hour used to include oxen in early Clay County

Since the days of the early settlers at the dawn of the 1800s, vast timber resources in the area now known as Clay County provided seed capital for fortunes and supplied a small cash crop allowing families to survive when times were hard.

In the early days of the logging industry before machinery and decent roads, gigantic primary growth trees were moved by the muscle and sweat of men and animals to the nearest body of water and floated to market. Getting the product to the buyer was always the costliest part of the job.

Transportation became increasingly more difficult and costlier as resources were tapped further and further inland and in less inviting terrain. Mucky swamps were a particular problem.

Mules and horses with their relatively small and solid hooves just sank in the mud. Some ingenious loggers tied gunny-sacks around their feet to prevent slipping and sinking. If rains continued, the footing for man or beast became impossible.

Oxen were the answer for these conditions. Their hooves are broader and split. When combined with their massive power and strength they were just the ticket for sucking logs through the mud.

But, not just anyone can control an ox, let alone a team of the enormous crea-

tures. It requires a special talent, and some insist, magic.

Otto Murrhee had a serious situation up Peter's Creek.

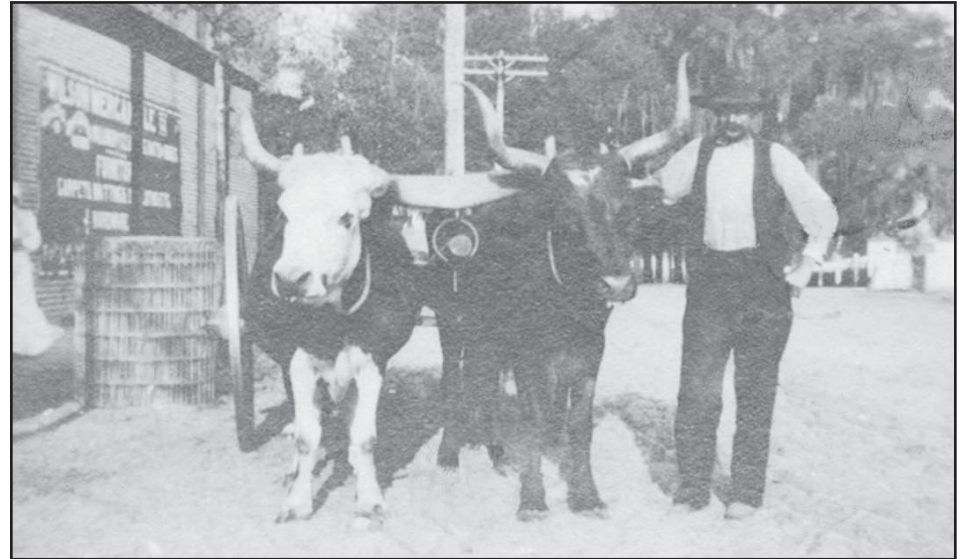
He had a whole shipment of railroad ties cut and ready to deliver but couldn't get them out. Ties were cut to order and a contractor who didn't supply when promised quickly slid to the bottom of the list. The rain fell unremittingly, and the place just bogged up worse than usual.

The cash was waiting, and the ties were just sitting there turning color and soon to be second grade instead of first.

Now Murrhee had mules and an ox penned up at the temporary cutting camp but the ox was the only way to move those ties and he wasn't cooperating worth a hoot.

Murrhee went into Middleburg and hired one Henry Howard, a man known to have a way with animals. He agreed to pack up a little sack with his stuff and come to the camp to see what he could do.

It was the custom to set up a cutting camp deep in the woods and the men lived there during the week and got carried home on the weekend until the job was done. These camps were isolated deep in rough territory where the truck made its own road.

When Murrhee delivered Howard to the camp, first thing Henry did was walk to the pen, nod to the mules and introduce himself to the ox and in no uncertain terms tell that hairy mammal that his present behavior just wasn't going to cut it.

Murrhee just shook his head and wondered if he hadn't made a powerful mistake. But ... he drove off and waited three days to come back with a crew to load the

ties into a wagon and deliver. He found every one of those ties pulled out of the muck and on dry land. Henry Howard was sitting on a stump his sack tied at his feet, waiting to be paid and carried home.

Some people just had a knack of talking to an ox. Maybe they still have the talent today, but people never have the opportunity to find out.

Clay County celebrated New Year's in 1858 by breaking away from Duval

CLAY COUNTY – There was a greater reason to celebrate New Year's Even in 1858 other than ushering in a new year.

Residents along the Black Creek District toasted their independence from Duval County hours before the struck midnight, signaling the creation of Clay County.

With Black Creek driving the local economy with steamships filled with timber and turpentine, as well as an accessible way to import and export other goods, local residents didn't like making the long trip, especially the 50-mile journey for those who lived on the southern end of the creek, to Jacksonville to conduct county business. So, they created their own county by carving away a 644-square-mile chunk of southwest Duval.



Efforts to break away from Duval started months earlier. Petitions were passed along the creek, around Kingsley's Pond and after church. Once it had 170 signatures – all white men – local Florida representative John G. Smith took it to Tallahassee on Nov. 26, 1858. It came out of committee on Dec. 3 and it eventually was passed 26-0 in the House. The Senate approved the new county, 35-0, on Dec. 27

and Gov. Maddison Perry signed the bill on New Year's Eve.

The name Clay came from statesman Henry Clay. Although he was from Kentucky and had no known ties to the area, locals were so impressed with his political stances – he helped found the Whig and Republican parties – they put his name at the county courthouse.

The original county seat was Webster,

which originally was known as Whitesville and now is the village of Middleburg. The railroad lines bypassed Webster, and northern visitors flocked to the warm springs and aristocratic hotels in Green Cove Springs, so residents voted to move the county seat to Green Cove Springs. In its heyday, Green Cove Springs was so popular, President Grover Cleveland had bottles of the local spring water shipped to the White House.

And since the bulk of the county's money was in Green Cove Springs, it made sense to move the county seat there as well.

Barney McRae was forced moved the county's business away from Webster. McRae was voted out of office in 1971 and replaced by William B. White. When White

opened a store in Green Cove Springs and decided to live there, residents from the northern part of the county – which now comprises of Middleburg and Orange Park – gave up on moving the county seat back.

Green Cove Springs has remained the county seat since, any many of the county’s documents from McRae’s tenure remain missing – presumably as a reaction to Middleburg losing the county seat.

Today it is a bustling county with nearly 220,000 residents. Most residents now live in the central and north-eastern part of the county where large, sprawling suburban communities have been built. According to World Population Review, Fleming Island has the largest population in the county with

27,126 residents, while Middleburg has 13,316 and Orange Park has 8,558. Green Cove Springs now has 7,345 residents.

Clay remains a popular destination, especially for young families. Growth has been so rampant, the Clay County School District already is considering the construction of two new schools, the Clay County Utility Authority is ready to open an expanded wastewater treatment plant in Green Cove Springs that will increase daily capacity by 850,000 gallons and the First Coast Expressway is currently under construction that will link Duval, Clay and St. Johns counties, including a multi-lane, limited access road that will run through Green Cove Springs, Argyle Forest and Middleburg from Interstates 10 to 95. Part of the expressway includes widening the Shands Bridge from two lanes to four.

Beat the heat: As summer approaches, don't leave pets in hot cars

CLAY COUNTY – Can you believe the first “official” day of summer is just a month away? Based on current temperatures, I think it’s probably safe to predict that August will be a scorcher. But as summer approaches, it’s important to remember how the heat can affect our furry friends, too.

It’s common for my many people to bring their dogs along for the car ride, but when is it too hot for us to leave our dogs in the car? I think a good rule of thumb, based on the temperature, is to consider if you would leave your child in the car without air conditioning for the same amount of time as you are leaving your pet.

However, as a faculty member of the University of Florida, I turned to the science and data to provide you with some research-based information on how heat can affect our furry friends. For example, if your vehicle is a cool 70 degrees when you exit, it only takes approximately 20 minutes for the temperature to rise to nearly 100 degrees.

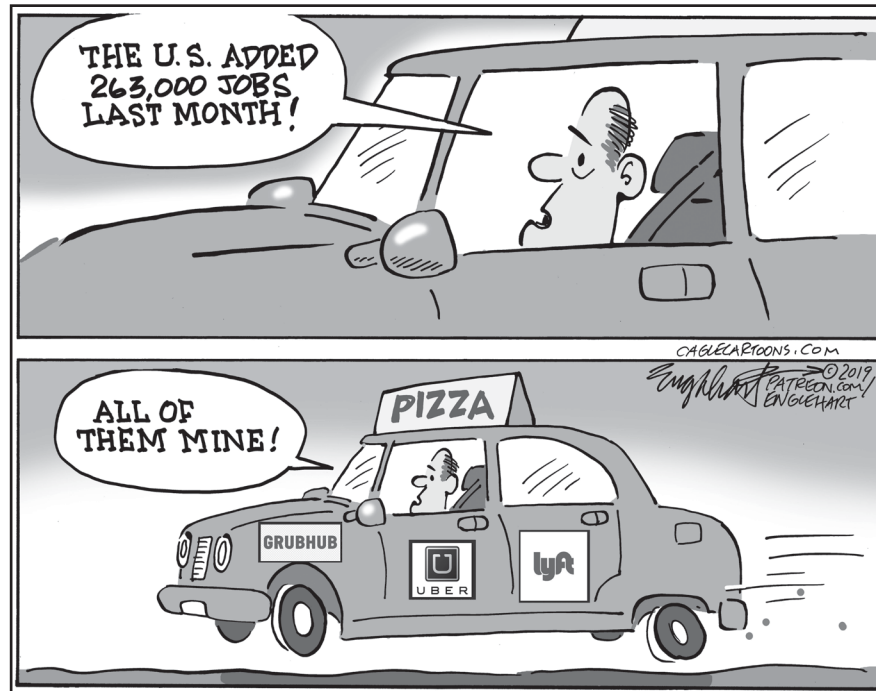
According to the American Veterinary Medical Association, the average body temperature of a dog is 101-to-102 degrees - so cracking the windows may not provide enough relief to keep animals from overheating. In fact, AVMA studies show that a parked car with the windows cracked heats up at almost the exact same rate as a car with the windows rolled up.

I know that we all have those, “well, I’ll only be a minute” or “I’ll park over here under this tree” moments, but let’s be realistic; how many times has that minute innocently turned into 30 minutes because we ran into someone we knew or got sidetracked? Also, if you are parking under the only tree in the parking lot, chances are it is just as hot there as the rest of the lot.

In the past few years, I have noticed more pet owners leaving their engine on to provide air conditioning for their pets in-

Confidence in fair play shaken when sporting events aren't settled on the field

As fans, we were disgusted when seven NFL referees missed a blatant and intentional pass interference, along with helmet-to-helmet contact at the end playoff game between the New Orleans Saint and Los Angeles Rams. If the officials did their jobs – make no mistake, it was ineptitude – New Orleans would have been in position for a short, game-winning field goal to win the game.

We then were sickened when the NFL later admitted to the gaffe – all while celebrating the Rams’ trip to the Super Bowl.

As fans, we were inspired to see Auburn’s run in the NCAA basketball tournament that included improbable wins against college giants Kansas, Kentucky and North Carolina. And we were collectively disheartened when Virginia’s Ty Jerome clearly double-dribbled at midcourt in the final seconds. If properly called with two officials clearly watching the play, Auburn would have had a two-point lead and the ball with seven seconds remaining.

(Many fans also were upset by a foul called with six-tenths of a second to go that sent Virginia guard Kyle Guy to the line for three free throws. He made all three to send the Cavaliers to the Championship game, 63-62. The argument

too often has been a close call shouldn’t be made at the end of the game. That’s wrong. If it’s a foul in the first minute, it’s a foul in the final minute. And it was a foul.)

But the foul shouldn’t have been a factor if the referees made the obvious double-dribble call.

In retrospect, apologies now are meaningless because they’ve become too routine and insincere.

Again, as fans we shook our heads when three NBA referees failed to call three fouls on the Golden State Warriors in the final two minutes in their playoff game against Houston. Steph Curry should have fouled out on either of the two missed calls, but given two extra lives, he wound up hitting a big 3-pointer down the stretch to wrap up Golden State’s 104-101 Game 1 victory.

NBA later admitted the mistake, but it didn’t change the outcome. Or our confidence in fair play.

Now, as fans, we were forced witness to another troubling decision during the stretch drive of the Kentucky Derby. Maximum Security clearly was the best horse, but his victory was taken off the board following a protest by two riders who felt he slightly drifted out of his lane coming into the final turn.

While I’ve covered the Florida Derby and Flamingo Stakes seven times each, I don’t profess to be an expert on thoroughbred racing. But I didn’t see anything that seemed so out of the ordinary it warranted such a dramatic response. And unless you had a 65-to-1 win ticket

side the vehicle. In theory, this sounds like a remedy to the overheating concern, but in reality, there are hundreds of reported cases where the air conditioner didn't provide enough airflow or ventilation for the animals.

I'm not saying this approach isn't helpful, but after watching news segments of families who have lost their pet because this approach didn't provide enough ventilation, or the dog flipped the vehicle's cooling system off was personally devastating.

So, what can you do to avoid overheating your pet when you go to the store or out to eat? Your best option is to leave your

pets at home or find dog-friendly establishments. There are some great phone apps that can provide information on dog-friendly shops and restaurants. One that I have used before is bringfido.com.

We all know it is hot in Florida during the summer. We all know it is dangerous to leave our pets unattended in parked cars. I hope this brief snapshot of the science convinces you to keep your pets at home or find dog-friendly places during the summer.

It's just like elections. If you don't like the outcome, investigate. If you don't like the investigation, investigate the investigators.

Apparently if you get beat at Churchill Downs, an inquiry is as important as performance.

The Kentucky Derby could have been a much-needed diversion from the death of 23 horses in a recent three-month stretch at Santa Anita Park, as well as an industry-

wide problem with excessive whipping, abuse and illegal drugs.

While some horse-racing experts said Maximum Security's disqualification was proper since he drifted out of his lane. They also admitted that, just like offensive holding in football and traveling in basketball, it's something that essentially could be called during every race.

What little integrity horse racing had – and it was very little in wake of the industry-wide abuse – now is gone.

Even winning trainer Bill Mott knows his winning horse's place in Kentucky Derby history forever will be tainted, especially since his horse wasn't involved in the inquiry and eventual disqualification.

"They'll be talking about the result of this race from now until they run the next Kentucky Derby and the next 10 Kentucky Derbys and the next 20 Kentucky Derbys," Mott said. "There's always a lot of controversy in this sport, and we're probably going to be involved in it from now on. But you know, I'm going to take it."

Unfortunately, like in so many other big moments in sports, fans now are forced to accept obvious missed calls that steals legitimacy of winning – and our confidence in fair play.

Sheriff, superintendent reach agreement to police schools during, after class

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels, Superintendent Addison Davis and School Board Police Department Chief of Police Kenneth Wagner said they've reached an agreement to police county schools around the clock.

Both sides maintained there will be a working relationship between CCSSO and CCSBPD, although how that would happen still remained in the gray. Since the new police force's inception, Daniels sent out a press release on April 22 that said CCSSO would begin routing any and all calls for service, alarm calls and reports of criminal activity on school board property to CCSBPD, including after-school hours.

"To that end, I believe that it is in the best interest of our students and schools to assist the School District Police Department in providing law enforcement services for Clay County School Board (CCSB) property and at school events," Daniels said in the release. "Given that the School District Police Department has primary jurisdiction on all CCSB property, I will begin the process of routing calls for service at CCSB properties to the School District Police Department."

Davis responded three days later to formally request a meeting to remove politics

from the conversation, and to determine how the relationship between CCSBPD and CCSSO would work in the future.

"My letter is a formal communication to ask an immediate sit down to remove the politics and focus on what matters most, our children," Davis said.

Then on May 1, Davis, Daniels and Wagner addressed the public in a video together posted by both the school district and CCSSO. In it, Daniels explained that he

believes all parties involved were committed to keeping everyone safe on school grounds.

"I have good news," Daniels said in the video. "I believe that the school district and the sheriff's office are on one page. I believe that the department under the leadership of Chief Wagner will be supported by the sheriff's office and district employees to keep our kids safe."

Daniels said they agreed on a number

of subjects, details and possibilities, including interlocal agreements and memorandums of understanding. Daniels and Davis explained the agreement through the video.

"It was a blessing to come together today to discuss all of the future possibilities and the partnerships that will continue to grow to protect our children, each of our schools, our teachers and our community members so that nobody goes unnoticed," Wagner said. "We're here for them to deliver great quality service and good customer in serving and protecting the community."

During the May 2 regular school board meeting, Davis addressed this video and expanded on the relationship between CCSSBPD and CCSSO.

He explained that Daniels agreed to continue school service coverage for all schools until August 13, which means they won't be rerouting all service calls to CCSSBPD as previously stated. According to Davis, the school district and CCSSO are currently in the process of formally hammering out memorandums of understanding and interlocal agreements.

While there was no official timeline for when that process for writing out the memorandums of understanding and interlocal agreements, it should be completed by Aug. 13 since that's when CCSSO's school coverage expires.

New school on Fleming Island would relieve overcrowding at Paterson Elementary

FLEMING ISLAND – A new kindergarten-through-8th grade school could be built on 43 acres of land on Fleming Island to prevent Patterson Elementary students from being rezoned to other schools, if one Clay County School Board member’s plans come to fruition.

“We have 43 acres in Fleming Island for a junior high, but [we] had talked about creating a [kindergarten] through [eighth grade] there,” board member Janice Kerekes said. “We don’t have the capacity for a junior high, but we do have capacity to get permission to go forward, hopefully, to build a K-8 and we would alleviate a lot of portables in the district. We would solve this districting problem. It would alleviate overcrowding at all of these schools.”

Kerekes also said the school could recapture students going to St. John’s Classical Academy, a charter school, which would secure the school district additional full-time equivalent dollars, which are determined by student enrollment in public schools.

During the May 2 school board meeting, Kerekes said that she planned to prompt the school board during its June meeting to discuss how the district could potentially build a K-8 school before PES redistricting becomes an issue.

Superintendent Addison Davis held a meeting two weeks ago at PES to discuss future rezoning options for the school as it nears capacity. Most of the parents hoped there would be no rezoning. Kerekes, who

represents the district that PES falls in, announced that she intends to bring an item to next month’s meeting that would see the PES dilemma solved.

The school would likely need to be ready for the 2020-21 school year because at the PES meeting held by Davis, he announced that no redistricting or rezoning would oc-

cur for the 2019-20 school year and that instead, this discussion would make a reappearance the following year. Davis said it doesn’t mean the PES redistricting would happen during the 2020-21 school year, only that 2020-21 is the earliest it could happen.

Davis also said no sixth grader would be rezoned, which means any student currently a fourth grader is safe from rezoning. ESE students or students in military families would be exempted from rezoning as well, although voluntary efforts are welcomed.

School board chairwoman Carol Studdard agreed with Kerekes, saying the board needs to consider a K-8 school, as well as a new elementary school near Green Cove Springs.

“I don’t believe in rushing into anything overnight, but I do believe we need to look into this K-8 school and building an elementary school on [County Road] 315, which would certainly take care of Magnolia, Magnolia West and the other subdivisions that are going in along that other road,” Studdard said.

School board member Ashley Gilhousen reminded the board they have a workshop scheduled at the end of May to discuss the options, so more information surrounding the possibilities of new schools in Clay County may be expected then.

VA puts a roadblock in Brock's 2,650-mile walk for WWP

Army veteran told to return for benefits evaluation

WANBLEE, S.D. — Ken Brock wasn't de-toured by consecutive weekends of deadly tornadoes in Alabama during his journey from Keystone Heights to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, to raise awareness to the programs at Wounded Warrior Project that help veterans deal with post-traumatic stress disorder.

Several rounds of violent thunderstorms didn't turn him away. Neither did flooding in Missouri or Nebraska, or wind, rain and snow that the past week a struggle as he pushes through the Badlands.

On Tuesday, however, the 53-year-old U.S. Army veteran ran into a force more formidable, and less forgiving, than Mother Nature — the Veteran's Administration.

Already 1,722 miles into his five-month-plus trek, Brock will have to return to Florida next week for a random, yet mandatory, evaluation of services. Failure to appear could result in the loss of his VA benefits.

"That really threw a monkey wrench into the trip," Brock said. "I told them what I was doing. I asked if I could reschedule. They said no. This is a one-two-three punch."

The appointment wasn't scheduled before Brock left Amvets Post 86 in Keystone Heights on Feb. 1. In fact, the VA Clinic gave him a nine-day notice and was unwilling to change is unexpected appointment, although his sacrifice for more than three

months has brought tremendous awareness, attention and resources to the same veterans the VA is entrusted to help.

"I got a call [Tuesday] and they said I had to be back on the 16th," Brock said. "They didn't care."

Brock was forced to return to Sioux Falls, S.D., late Tuesday. He rented a car and started the 1,520-mile drive home. After the evaluation in Wildwood, he said he will drive back to South Dakota and finish his walk.

"I have my cart and [service dog] Pam, so I had to drive," he said. "I couldn't leave it up there. I had to put everything in the car. But I will be back. I'm going to finish this. It may not be by July 4 like I planned, but we'll see. I'm going to come up here and continue on."

Brock is concerned the VA may have mistaken his commitment to completing the 2,650-mile walk as a sign he no longer suffers with PTSD.

"I bet that's what they're thinking," he said. "They don't see I'm still having nightmares. They don't know how difficult this is. This walk isn't a cure. It's a distraction. It's a way to deal with it."

"I'm finding out there are good people in this world. I'm trying to bring life to something that's good and they want to take it from me. If so, that's all right. I'll land on my feet."

Calls to the Veteran's Administration for comment weren't returned.

Rep. Ted Yoho (R-3), whose district in-

cludes Keystone Heights, said he will ask the VA for an explanation, saying, "I'm going to stand for this veteran."

Brock completed another 100 miles last week, which left him only 928 miles short of his destination, and many of those miles were completed in a winter mix of rain, snow and wind.

"It was awful," he said. "I had to push the side of my tent to keep the wind from caving it in. Finally, I got so tired, I gave up and went to sleep. It's been freezing and raining just about every day. But I've kept going."

Until the VA unexpectedly stopped him.

Clay students will get small share of additional \$9 million in state funds

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Florida legislators concluded negotiations for the education budget last week, and while the Clay County school district will get an additional \$9 million, it will only result in a \$30.16 increase for each student after operational costs are deducted.

After finishing the pre-kindergarten-through-12th grade budget, the state had

an increase of \$248 for each student. The actual number, however, is \$131.16 for each student, according to Assistant Superintendent for Business Affairs Susan Legutko.

“Dollar-for-dollar, per student, the district will see \$131.16,” Legutko said. “Last year, that number was \$101, so what we’re seeing is a \$30.16 per student increase this year.”

The number brings in roughly \$9 million to the school district, but that doesn’t

mean the district can spend it on whatever it chooses since some of the money includes categorical funding like Florida’s Best and Brightest.

Best and Brightest is essentially a bonus given to qualified teachers and principals at the end of the year. The Clay County School District was given \$3.7 million in categorical funding for Best and Brightest and that money can’t be used for anything else.

“I can’t take that money and say, ‘I need it for instruction,’” Legutko. “It has to go to [Best and Brightest].”

After categorical spending, the rest of the money won’t go far. According to Legutko, 80 percent of the district’s annual

budget goes to salary and benefits. With teacher salaries coming in at roughly \$4 to \$5 million, and support salaries coming in at \$2 to \$3 million, there isn’t much left over. And after salaries, that money will go toward benefits.

From there, money must go toward standard things like operational expenditures, emergency expenditures and building the school district’s fund balance.

“Eight million is not really a lot of money for us to do anything other than our standard operation, as you can see,” Legutko said.

Any additional funds left over that could be spent on things outside standard operations.

This highly publicized drama on the high seas became the symbol of the world's indifference to the plight of Jewish suffering at the hands of Adolf Hitler.

Group kicks, screams to delay deteriorating process of Parkinson’s Disease

FLEMING ISLAND – A Clay County group meets twice a week are yelling,

stretching and moving to fend off the degenerative process of Parkinson’s Disease.

The ailment affects several muscle groups and wears the body and mind down gradually. But a group of 25 patients and

their caregivers work out every Monday and Thursday at 9:30 a.m. in a spacious auxiliary building at Sacred Heart Catholic Church for exercises focusing on ankles, wrists and necks – often while counting and singing.

They also clench their fists to their chest and emit a hearty yell that echoes.

“Wasn’t that beautiful?” supervisor Stan Harris asks with a laugh.

Harris and supervisor Tom Dorsky sit at the front of the class. Harris was diagnosed in 2000, Dorsky in 2015.

The mood of the class is jovial: a woman heckled Dorsky for getting some dates wrong, which led to laughter from the group.

“I can’t win for losing, can I?” he said while raising his hands.

There is no known cure for Parkinson’s

Disease, but exercise can deter further degeneration and multi-tasking helps. The symptoms are not limited to shaking. People suffer with sleep difficulties, constipation, vision problems, depression, anxiety and digestive problems.

Dorsky said the group follows the program of the Gary Sobol Parkinson’s Network that targets cognitive abilities, balance, cardio and strengthening participants’ voice. The Fleming Island group formed in 2014 after speech at the University of North Florida.

“People with Parkinson’s tend to withdraw. This is as much a social activity as it is exercise,” Dorsky said. “One of the

'Patient demand is high' for marijuana dispensary on Blanding Boulevard

ORANGE PARK – The sale of medical marijuana in Florida was unthinkable five years ago in Florida.

But last week customers were able to buy vape cartridges, CBD and smokable pot in various strains and flavors at Curaleaf Orange Park at 496 Blanding Blvd, the second for the company in the Jacksonville area and the 24th in the state.

Dylan Adams, regional manager for 12 Northeast and Central Florida locations, called Curaleaf's statewide expansion rapid. He said the company's location Blanding Blvd. was appealing.

"The patient demand is high. It's been tremendous," Adams said. "The ability to have great community engagement is paramount."

In 2016, voters passed an amendment legalizing medical marijuana. Although legislators added several stipulations, legislators finally voted to approve smokable medical marijuana in March.

The store resembles a modern cell-phone store, albeit with a tight security system. Customers provide staff their ID behind a window to check in. In lieu of approaching the L-shaped counter, they can visit consultation room.

Senior operations manager Vinit Patel oversees the Tampa and St. Petersburg area for the company. Patel said the Legislature's bill attempting to cap THC levels in products, which failed last week, would have been a lose-lose for the customers.

"It's a matter what the consumers and patients want," Patel said. "What that cap does is make the people buy more product to seek the same level relief."

Patel said he favorite story to tell is why he entered the cannabis business. A pharmacist by trade, he was dismayed by the opiate epidemic, calling it the worst abuse problem in the country's history.

He was tired watching addicted patients falling apart in a vicious cycle.

"I wasn't feeling like we were getting anywhere, and I felt like I was part of the problem pushing out opiates to all my patients and it was counterintuitive," Patel said. "You're towing the line and it's a difficult balance. [Medical marijuana]

last August. Rep. Ted Yoho (R-3) who has spearheaded efforts at the federal level, said every update on the clinic is the fruition of a dream that started five years ago.

Clay County has about 30,000 veterans, with 11,000 enrolled in the North Florida/South Georgia Veterans Health System. The clinic will have mental health services, primary care, lab draws and other services from telehealth, according to VA officials.

"The goal is to make sure veterans have access to care and I can't tell you how proud I am of this community," Yoho said.

Chad Adams, North Florida/South Georgia Veterans Health System assistant director, said the VA had recently received the 75 percent design drawings. The property has 135 parking spots. Adams added that the new clinic and put less pressure on other systems and cut commute distances to other VA facilities such as Gainesville or Lake City.

The first candidate for the building's name was Marine four-star Gen. Roy S. Geiger, 1885-1947, of Middleburg. His story was presented County Commissioner Gayward Hendry, who served in the Marines.

Hendry said Geiger is referred as the father of Marine Corp. aviation because he developed tactics that are still being employed today. Geiger flew in France during World War I.

Hendry said Geiger didn't garner the attention of other generals, but he commanded the 1st Marine Air Wing at Guadalcanal and was the commanding general of the First Amphibious Corp, which he led in Guam, Okinawa, Bougainvillea and Peleliu in World War II. Geiger was also the senior Marine on the deck of the USS Missouri when the Japanese surrendered in 1945.

"He was a man of very strong charac-

ter, that's why we in the Marines revere him," Hendry said.

Chief Petty Officer Andrew Baker's nomination was presented by his wife, Tina Baker. He was killed in 1997 during a training mission in North Carolina while his HH-60H helicopter was trying to refuel on the frigate USS Taylor.

All four of the crew based out of NAS Jax perished in the crash.

Andrew Baker, of Middleburg, was a search and rescue swimmer who trained over 300 pilots and 100 air crewman, Tina Baker said. She said her husband's death wasn't in vain. From the crash, the U.S. Navy learned more about night vision, lighting on frigates and Andrew Baker trained several helicopter pilots who later served in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Tina Baker said she was honored her husband made the cut and she wanted his name to be remembered.

"A lot of men on those missions [in Afghanistan and Iraq] I can tell you they were trained by my husband," Tina Baker said. "His legacy still lives on today, my

oldest son Chief Andy Baker, thank God, he just came off the teams. He did six tours in Libya, Syria and Afghanistan. He always had that vision of following in his father's footsteps."

The third candidate was U.S. Air Force Col. William G. Byrns of Fleming Island, the namesake of the local chapter of Vietnam Veterans of America.

Byrns was a prisoner of war at the infamous "Hanoi Hilton" for more than 300 days, enduring torture after he was shot down in Vietnam. The colonel later flew missions during Operation Desert Storm. He was the keystone speaker at the county's first Vietnam Veterans Day Ceremony in March.

Vietnam veteran Gary Newman served multiple tours there and was on the USS Maddox during the Gulf of Tonkin incident. Newman was inducted in the Florida Veterans Hall of Fame last year.

"[Byrns] didn't give up," Newman told the audience. "He's a good American hero."

The fourth name eligible for voting was that of U.S. Navy pilot and Jacksonville native Scott Speicher, the first American casualty of the First Persian Gulf War in 1991. Speicher was 33. His body was not recovered until 2009.

Walter Smith, from Mobile, Ala., was a firefighter on the USS Saratoga who knew Speicher. After 22 years in the U.S. Navy, Smith is now a chaplain for Veteran Enforcers Motorcycle Association.

"It was a hard time on the ship because he was the first casualty of the war. We were on the flight deck when his squadron came back and he didn't come back,"

Smith said. "[Speicher] always had a smile on his face. Everyone said he was an upbeat person who loved his family. All in all, he was a great man. All of these are great men."

The final nominee was Lance Cpl. William F. Thompson. His entry was read by his son Trevor. William Thompson, who was in the audience, was involved in Operation Dewey Canyon on the Laotian border of Vietnam. On Feb. 16, 1969, his unit was ambushed, and he was shot in both arms and the chest.

"For more than 18 hours he laid on the jungle floor hanging on to life, he survived that night with the help of a Navy corpsman," Trevor Thompson said. "The next morning under the canopy of heavy fog, Lance Cpl. Thompson was one of the few men who survived the night."

William Thompson spent the next few weeks on a hospital ship and the recovery process took years. When he returned home and was discharged, Thompson worked in the automotive industry, as a small business owner and volunteered in several veterans' organizations.

"Without the healthcare services from the VA, he likely would not be where he is today," Trevor Thompson added.

on board. Once casualties arrived, all were relieved the injuries seemed minor.

About an hour after the crash, the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office said 21 people were taken to area hospitals. OPMC got four of them, and its Park West ER in Orange Park got another three.

"We didn't know what to expect," Goodfriend said. "We put our MCI [mass-casualty incident] plan into effect. We've trained for this. We were ready. For over an hour, we assumed the worse. But it was a big relief, just a lot of bumps and bruises.

Some were in more pain than others, like a fender-bender. It was nice to be part of something that was bigger than you and have it turn out all right."

It also helped Goodfriend critique his hospital's ability to handle a real emergency outside a controlled environment.

"You know what's supposed to happen during a drill," he said. "This wasn't a drill. It all happened in a matter of seconds. It was great to see how we reacted in a non-drill situation. We were ready."

All 21 patients had been released from area hospitals by Saturday.

"There was a lot of anxiety, a lot of butterflies," Goodfriend said. "But at the end, it all worked out."

a difficult balance. [Medical marijuana] was the obvious choice because this is the complete opposite."

To purchase medical marijuana, potential patients must visit a qualified physician and pay a \$75 fee for a Registry Identification Card. Patients with cancer, epilepsy, glaucoma, AIDS, PTSD, Parkinson's Disease and other conditions are eligible.

In the parking lot, a man who wanted to be identified only as "P.J.," said medical marijuana was the reason he could work again. He suffers from spasms. The medications he was taking caused his arteries to clog and organs to fail, he said.

"I wasn't able to work for nine months," he said. "It seems to be working."

Marijuana has stigma attached to it. The plant was attacked in films like "Reefer Madness," and represented in stoner culture like "Cheech and Chong" were humorous but may not have helped.

Patel said it was the responsibility of the industry to showcase to medicinal aspects of cannabis in a professional envi-



ronment. The euphoric, anti-inflammatory and analgesic effects of marijuana far outweigh the effects of a handful of painkillers, he said.

The next frontier for marijuana is the legalization of edibles and recreational marijuana. Patel said there's no telling when those products could be legalized.

"It's hilarious if you think about it because it's an archaic thing. This has been a medicine for thousands of years. Then modern medicine puts it off to the sideline," Patel said. "Here we are trying to revamp it and show the benefit of it, and we're getting traction."

Help wanted: Teacher recruitment fair has 100 openings

Certified applicants can meet principals Saturday at Fleming Island High

FLEMING ISLAND — Anyone interested in being a teacher during the 2019-20 school year has a good chance to land a job this Saturday at the 2019 Clay County School District Teacher Recruitment Fair as the district tries to fill 100 positions.

The first in Clay County since 2013, the recruitment fair is exclusively for would-be teachers.

The fair will utilize the Fleming Island High training center and the school's cafeteria, with administration from all 42 county schools will be represented.

"It's going to look like a job fair," Human Resources Specialist for the district, Michelle Bily, said. "We're targeting teachers specifically and each school will have their own table and marketing to attract potential candidates."

Bily said attendees should have their certifications, dress for the occasion and



bring plenty of resumes since interviews and subsequent job offers could be given by any school on the spot. Right now, the district is looking to fill 100 teaching positions at 42 different Clay County schools. Bily hopes the recruitment fair ends with

each position filled.

According to Bily, anyone that doesn't receive an offer on the spot shouldn't lose hope. The district expects to see another 250 to 350 jobs created during the summer, and anyone who attended the recruit-

ment fair will have a leg up on the competition.

"So, like a lot of districts, we might hire between 250-350 teachers each summer and by attending the fair, our administration is getting early access to outstanding candidates," Bily said. "They're also getting to speak with our principals face to face."

Interviewing with a principal is used by most Florida schools, but it doesn't always lead to a job since many districts have district administration that hire teachers. In Clay County, though, Bily said principals and their staff do the hiring, which is why it's important for applicants to meet principals and their staff.

"We're going to be filling as many positions as we can," Bily said. "Each principal knows how many positions they need to fill and they're at this fair to do just that, so we really recommend that anyone hoping to teach in Clay next year makes it to this event."

Interested teacher can attend the recruiting fair at 9 a.m. to noon on May 11. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m., and each teacher should bring a resume.

JTA gradually restoring bus services to Clay County

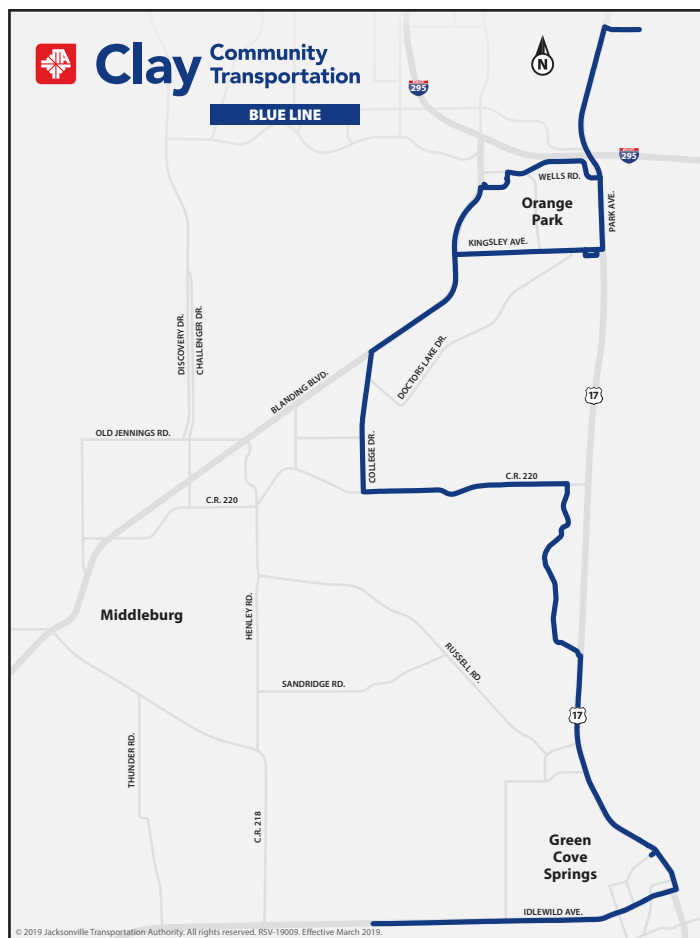
CLAY COUNTY – State and local officials believe selecting the Jacksonville Transportation Authority as the county's provider was the best decision as the Duval-based service gradually restores the county's flex route service.

ElderSource, the state's senior agency in the area, pulled its senior services contracts from the Clay Council on Aging in early December citing fears the COA wouldn't make payroll. The COA was also the state transportation provider for Clay. The organization, losing between \$150,000-\$200,000 a year, cancelled its flex lines to save money.

The Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged gave the COA's TD contracts to JTA on an emergency basis, set to expire June, 2020. JTA assumed the TD services Jan. 2.

The county which has no oversight of Clay's transportation except funding. In the 2018/2019 fiscal year, the county budgeted \$541,370 for the COA. The remaining funds were split between JTA and Aging-True, the new Duval County-based senior services provider for Clay.

Most criticism toward agencies involved the loss of flex routes, which ran throughout the county. Flex routes and TD services are not the same thing. The disad-



vantaged services are for the disabled, life-sustaining trips or other medical appointments. Flex routes cover less urgent trips

to hospitals, the Clay County Courthouse, grocery stores, the Orange Park Mall or working customers students at local colleges.

In March, service was returned to two flex lines, Red and Blue. The revised lines cover Orange Park, Fleming Island, Green

Cove Springs and Middleburg. JTA Vice-President of Operations Lisa Darnall said the goal was to limit any break in TD or flex route service, which would always be difficult on a tight turnaround.

then spending Mother's Day with their children. It's gathering that becomes more important with year, as they appreciate their unique connection while trying to register their stories in memory books.

"With the flex routes there was a bit of an overlap. What we did was redesign those. We're still covering most of the routes the flex routes provided," Darnall said. "We had three and a half weeks to start a TD service. It took a lot of people and a lot of hours to make sure that service wasn't affected at all."

The new flex routes have about 80 customers on average a day and the TD services average 110. The county, JTA and AgingTrue reached an agreement for an additional 25 senior daycare trips a day, with county providing \$88,000 until the next fiscal year.

The county's only obligation is subsidizing 10-percent of TD cost, about \$65,000. The county had provided more than eight times that amount as well as fuel reimbursements and vehicle maintenance costs to offset COA issues, County Auditor Mike Price wrote via email.

The Teal and Magenta flex lines, which took customers to distant locations such as Keystone Heights and Gainesville, were a major financial headache for the COA. The lines still haven't been reinstated.

"We're in the process of putting together a comprehensive cost-analysis plan for (the county) to look at what other services we could pick up as well," Darnall said.

USDOT announced in April that JTA received a \$16.6 million grant for a new line. The state Department of Transportation would contribute \$8.3 million and JTA officials said they would match the state's figure.

The "Orange Line," expected to launch service by the end of 2020, includes construction of 22 platforms at 13 stations, 15 buses and 24 Transit Signal Priority devices. The new line is an expansion of JTA's primary First Coast Flyer Bus Rapid Transit system.

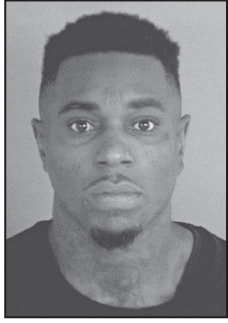

According to court documents, on Nov. 9, 2016, Muller sold heroin with traces of fentanyl to Christopher Williams and Tyler Hamilton. Williams and Hamilton provided a portion of the substance to Ariell Jade Brundige, 18, from Orange Park. Brundige, a first time opiate user, snorted what she believed was a small dose of heroin. However, the substance that Muller had sold also had traces of fentanyl, which caused

her death early the next morning.

During the ensuing investigation into Brundige’s death, the Clay County Sheriff’s Office made a controlled purchase of heroin and furanylfentanyl from Muller on Jan. 31, 2017.

On Feb. 8, 2017, during the execution of a search warrant, officers seized furanylfentanyl and a loaded revolver from his apartment in Clay County.

Christopher Williams and Tyler Hamilton previously pleaded guilty to manslaughter in state court and were sentenced to a year at the Clay County Jail.

Both already had served nearly 22 months in jail awaiting trial.

“Families and communities have been ravaged by the opioid epidemic. I commend law enforcement and the U.S. Attorney’s Office for their skillful investigation and prosecution of Trumaine Muller for the overdose death of [Brundige],” said State Attorney Melissa Nelson.

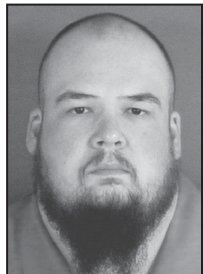
“We appreciate the hard work of everyone involved in this. This is truly teamwork at its finest,” stated Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels.

Middleburg man arrested after search uncovers several child pornography photos, videos

MIDDLEBURG – A search at a man’s home in Middleburg uncovered at least 10 photos and videos of children having sex, including one of a 5-year-old.

Steven Windle Burnsed, 33, was arrested and jailed on May 3 after being charged with 10 counts of possessing, controlling or viewing a depiction of a child involved with sexual conduct.

His bond was set at \$1.5 million.

Clay County Sheriff’s Office deputies conducted a search warrant at Burnsed’s home at 4560 Crazy Horse Ave., where detectives uncovered electronic devices with several email, internet and blogging/social media accounts that contained sexually explicit photos of children. According to the arrest report, some of the files contained sadomasochistic and bestiality abuse.

Burnsed’s next scheduled court appearance is June 5.

Mom charged with spending her disabled son’s workman’s comp payout on herself

MIDDLEBURG – A 70-year-old woman was arrested last week and charged with spending \$757,432 of her disabled son’s money.

Barbara Lightsey Selph was charged with exploitation of a disabled person May 2 after investigators said he syphoned away most of her son’s workman’s compensation award following a 2010 accident that left him unable to care for himself.

The son, Verlon E. Selph Jr., received \$879,467 in a settlement following his accident. His mother was appointed as his

plenary guardian. Investigators with the Clay County Sheriff’s Department said the mother diverted most of her son’s money with “unauthorized appropriation, sale or transfer of property” from Dec. 2015 to Feb. 2018.

Barbara Selph originally was appointed his guardian on Aug. 28, 2015.

Her son died on May 28, 2018.

The investigation also revealed Verlon Selph Jr. was married at the time of his death, which would have made his wife, Retha Selph, the sole beneficiary of his estate.

Barbara Selph’s bond was set at \$100,003. Her next court appearance is June 12.

CCSO: Man caught in Jacksonville after setting fire to Orange Park fence yard

ORANGE PARK – Quick investigative work by the Clay County Sheriff’s Office, Florida Fire Marshall’s office and Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives led to the arrest of an Orange Park man who was charged with setting a business on fire while another man slept a few feet away.

Noah Casey Coffin, 24, of Orange Park, was charged with arson to an occupied structure after deputies said he set a fire at R Camp Fencing, 185 Blanding Blvd, early Thursday.

The yard, where wood fencing panels are built and stored was destroyed, along with a small office building where William Hollabaugh was sleeping.

According to the sheriff’s office, several people, including Hollabaugh, reported the fire at 6:13 a.m. After the fire was extinguished, State Fire Marshall’s Office investigators quickly determined the fire was deliberately set with “an ignitable liquid” at the front of the building where Hollabaugh was sleeping.

He escaped without injury.

Deputies found Hollabaugh’s backpack near Memory Gardens cemetery – the same route witnesses saw Coffin running.

Jacksonville Sheriff’s Office found Coffin on Longchamp Drive, about 2.5 miles away, at about 7 p.m.

R Camp Fencing owner, Randall Champ, said Coffin may have argued with an employee at his business on Wednesday and was ordered to leave. Witnesses said he returned early Thursday. By 6:15 a.m., the business was quickly engulfed after at least one propane tank exploded.

Clay County Fire and Rescue said yard was “a 100-percent loss.”

Kam Y. Ebrahimi, who owns Kamy’s Kars next door to the fence yard, said local businesses have had a problem with transients hanging around in the alley that makes up the fence yard.

Additional charges were filed against Coffin while he was in jail for violating his parole. He was sentenced to parole last February in St. Johns County for stealing a car and driving without a license.

Orange Park man couldn’t out-run deputies following Walmart theft

ORANGE PARK – A man was finally caught last Wednesday after he led a Clay County Sheriff’s Office deputy on a car and foot chase in Lakeside.

Artravian De’Von Peake, 31, of Orange Park, tried to escape police after he was caught stealing \$886.57 worth of items from the Walmart at 899 Blanding Blvd., according to the arrest report.

Peake made several abrupt lane changes on Blanding with a patrol car following with its lights and siren activated. He drove on the wrong side of the road after turning onto Londonderry Drive before turning onto Moody Avenue, and then onto Timber Lane. Shortly after the deputy gave up the chase in the residential area, Peake’s car broke down after he struck a curb.

Peake reportedly broke through a wood-

en fence while trying to flee, but he eventually was caught. It took two officers to detain him following a brief scuffle.

Peake was in the Clay County Jail Thursday with a bond totaling \$38,264. He was charged with retail theft, criminal mischief, resisting, obstructing or opposing a police officer, attempting to flee or elude the police with flashing lights and siren active, using an antishiplifting device, leaving the scene of an accident with property damage and a second offense for driving without a license.

Woman jailed after grabbing man by cheek while refusing to leave after their date

ORANGE PARK – A date ended with a trip to the Clay County Jail for a Jacksonville woman charged with grabbing a man by his cheek.

Ashley M. Owen, 34, was booked on battery – dating violence.

According to the Clay County Sheriff’s Office, Owen was visiting a man on Gano Avenue. After she took a shower, she was asked to leave. She instead wanted to sleep in the victim’s spare bedroom. She grabbed him by the mouth when he declined, the arrest report stated.

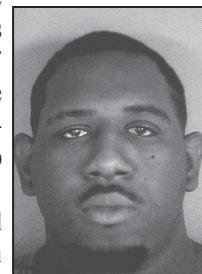
The victim suffered a small cut on the inside of his right cheek.

things you have to be careful of, people with Parkinson's voices tend to get soft over time. The larynx is nothing but a muscle. People think of Parkinson's Disease as tremors but it's internal, external, dementia. It's not just one thing."

According to the Parkinson's Foundation, about 930,000 people in the U.S. will be living with the disease by 2020 and 60,000 are diagnosed each year.

The exercise class is free, and the group has frequent dinners and a support group just for caregivers. Harris said residents with Parkinson's Disease need an outlet and sense of community.

"[The group] is a big source of support for everybody," Harris said. "Parkinson's Disease affects all muscles, it's not just motor skills, the whole human body is affected."

Sandy May's husband, Ozro May, 73, was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease

in December. Both were career educators in Clay County and the couple attend the classes weekly. She was thankful she didn't have to drive to Jacksonville.

"The movement has done him a world of good. It's a very positive thing for him to stay active," Sandy May said. "For me as a spouse, it's like a support group. It makes you feel like you're not alone."

Ryan Mitchell and his caregiver Pam said a benefit of the class was they could share issues dealing with the disease with others.

"It's been a very positive experience," said Mitchell, who's been with the class nearly since its inception.

Jaudon Newberg is the caregiver for her husband Curtis Newberg. She said since the group was so close-knit, they looked out for each other. Several encourage each other and egg each other on.

"(My husband) isn't just shaking, it's the rigidity, he doesn't swing his right arm when he walks," Jaudon Newberg said. "Our group provides positivity, when you leave here, you feel good."

Magnolia Lake State Park recognized for its history

CAMP BLANDING – Maude Jackson has dedicated her life in promoting civil rights and preserving the rich history of a nation’s struggle for equality. Last week, she helped memorialized a significant part of her life by unveiling a state marker at Magnolia Lake State Park, one of four segregated parks in Florida.

The marker is located on the grounds of Camp Blanding, between Sandhill and Brooklyn lakes. It was built in 1957 to be a separate park for blacks with a lake, boat ramp, dock, swimming area, bath house and picnic pavilions.

Magnolia Lakes was about 10 miles away from a whites-only camp, Mike Roess Gold Head Branch State Park in Keystone Heights.

Jackson, who marched with Rev. Martin Luther King, frequently visited the park. She was joined in the unveiling by former park ranger Sandy Cook, as well as Green Cove Springs Mayor Connie Butler, Keystone Heights Mayor Karen Lake, Florida Director of State Parks Eric Draper, Chairman of Clay County’s Historical Preservation Board Robert Dews, Col. Frank Zenko and Lt. Col. Michael Allen from Camp Blanding, Gold Head Branch State Park rangers Steve Earl and Kevin Patton and several members of the Florida Trail Association.

Since Camp Blanding is a secured base, the marker will be moved to State Road 21 and Treat Road. A smaller sign also will be placed a mile away along the Florida Trail as you enter the old park.

Jay Leno, Jenna Bush Hager surprise Fleming Island sailor with George H.W. Bush's modified van

FLEMING ISLAND – U.S. Navy veteran David Miller, of Fleming Island, was surprised when he was given a modified van once used by Pres. George H.W. Bush during a recent broadcast of the Today Show.

Miller, who served the country for 10 years before a degenerative neurological condition turned life upside down for him and his family, was given the keys by former "Tonight Show" host Jay Leno and Jenna Bush Hager, daughter of the former president, outside Rockefeller Plaza.

Jenna became emotional as they rolled up in a former Secret Service van modified to meet Miller's needs that had previously been used by Jenna's beloved "Gampy." Jenna and Leno then gave the van to Miller, 31, along with his wife, Misa, and their daughter, Rachel, 7.

"I hope you and your family have as many happy memories in this van as my family did," she said.

Jenna also presented Miller and his family with a personalized letter from her father, former President George W. Bush, recognizing Miller for his service and noting that George H.W. Bush would've been honored to donate the vehicle. Miller at the former president then were on Facetime so

Bush could personally thank him.

Miller served in the Navy from 2007-2017 after enlisting right out of high school. He was working as an aviation ordnance tech on the USS George Washington off the coast of Japan when he met Misa, whom he married in 2011.

Their life took a dramatic turn in 2017 when Miller was deployed on the USS Nimitz in the Middle East and suffered a seizure. He was medevacked to a hospital in Bahrain, where he was diagnosed with a rare disorder called cerebellar atrophy and ataxia, which affects movement and speech.

"I was scared so bad because I couldn't walk," Miller said. "I thought I was paralyzed. I just thought, 'Man, how am I going to support my wife and child now?'"

Miller's motor skills are diminished, and his speech is slurred as a result of the condition, which has no cure.

"At least I gave my all when I was able-bodied," he said. "That's all I can say. I just tried my best."

The surprise was made possible by BraunAbility, a company that manufactures wheelchair-accessible vans. The

company owned the former Secret Service vehicle and reached out to Leno to help donate it through its Drive for Inclusion initiative.

"The bad news is it's a used car," Leno joked to Miller. "The good news is it was owned by a Navy hero. And that hero was President George (H.W.) Bush."

The van will help Miller as he gets settled on Fleming Island, where he just moved a month ago after having previously been in Japan. This is the first time the family has all lived together.

State track titles

for Rodgers, Collier and Rivers

JACKSONVILLE – Three area track athletes; Fleming Island High's Glenn Rodgers, Orange Park High's Alex Collier and Oakleaf High's Jalen Rivers answered plenty of pre-race speculation by winning in dramatic fashion state track titles in Saturday's championship meet held at University of North Florida.

Orange Park High junior sprinter Alex Collier blasted the field in the Class 3A 400 meters for his gold medal but added to the drama of the day with a third in the 100 meters and a spectacular anchor leg on the Raiders fourth place 4 x 400 relay on the second day of the championship weekend.

For Rodgers, who has toyed with nationally ranked times throughout his senior campaign, minor adjustments to his highly technical event came to play in his come-from-behind win in the Class 4A 110 high hurdles where the top three hurdlers finished within just a half second of each other.

For Rivers, who has dominated the Class 4A shotput lists since about mid-season, his gold medal came with yet another 50-foot plus toss that bested the field.

Collier, who has chased Miami Norland senior Tyrese Cooper, the top ranked sprinter not only in Florida, but nationally, the 400 meter showdown was a second shot at Cooper for Collier after a thrilling second place finish at the Bob Hayes Invite.

"He's the guy I've been gearing all of my training for," said Collier, who surged in the final 80 meters to nail his elusive sub-47 second effort at 46.33 for the win. "I ran his race at Bob Hayes and he beat me. I ran my race today and I beat him. Period."

Ironically, Cooper was also on Collier's mind for the earlier 100 meters where Miami Northwestern High was going to field three sprinters to the mix of

Fleming Island, who hosted Martin County on Mon., May 6, was unranked statewide last week and ranked 17th in Class 2A prior to the playoffs.

Note: Clay won 18-13 over Godby on Monday to advance to the Class 1A semifinal while Fleming Island lost their 2A playoff 18-12 in double overtime to Martin County.

At Clay High, Zino and pals immediately took command against Terry Parker with

Zino hit Paolo Jorge-Silva in a crowd for a gain on 12, Salinas for a nine yarder, Paradise for 14 to set up a three yard scoring toss to Salinas on an out pattern at 6:24 of the first period.

Terry Parker had just three downs to operate with an incomplete and fumbled pitch as a result of heavy pressure from Brooklyn McClain and Hannah Agee on the defensive rush.

A 24 pass play from Zino to Alexis Stilianou got Zino a three yard run score with 1:44 left in the first before Zino snared an interception on a post pattern that got a touchdown toss to Stilianou on the first play of the second quarter.

of the expected showdown between Collier and Cooper.

As the field bolted from the start, Collier gapped the field with a fast start and battled to hold on to third in 10.75, but a tad in front of Cooper.

"I wish I could do that one again," said Collier. "I got a great start, but the rest of the field came after me. I thought I had it, but against this field, I had to stay focused with my finish. I had to reset my head to take the 400 later in the day."

For Rodgers, who had the second fastest time in the nation at the Bob Hayes Invite; 14.22, the Class 4A field was loaded to the hilt.

"We worked on two things this week; the start and the last three hurdles," said Rodgers. "I knew if I got a clean start, three steps and a clean first hurdle, I would be in the best position of the field. That's how it all starts."

Rodgers nailed the start and was even with the field with South Dade's Ulysses Grace on his right side and Miramar's Osaji Skyers on his left side sprinting toe-to-toe.

"We've been working on staying focused and low to the hurdles the last three hurdles to not give away precious seconds," said Rodgers. "After the last hurdle, I came down first, it was all about the lean."

Grace, who was slightly ahead of the torrid pace, tumbled after the last hurdle while Rodgers inched past Skyers to win in 14.20 with Skyers second in 14.21 and Grace reaching the line in 14.25 in one of the closest finishes of the day.

"Every little piece of the race came together today," said Rodgers. "I've had some stumbles this year, but when you compete right on the edge, things can happen. The key is stay focused, learn from it and move forward."

Rivers, who won his region title last week with a 52'-8.75" toss after a district 1-4A winning 54'-3.25", continued his streak with a winning toss of 54'-4" to win by just five inches over Flagler Palm Coast's Paul Nelson. Nelson bested Rivers after two throws with Rivers taking the lead on his third throw. Rivers fouled on his fourth throw, but Nelson threw 52'-9" on his final put.

Other highlights for the championship weekend included a second place finish in the Class 1A 300 meter hurdles from St. Johns Country Day School's Courtney Sage, a junior, who also finished seventh in the 100 hurdles. Sage's 300 hurdles time of 45.38 was a new personal fastest after she won the region 1-1A title in 46.00 last week.

In the Class 1A 3200 meters, St. Johns freshman Matthew Stratton ran his personal best for a second week in a row with a fourth place 9:28.62. Stratton also placed ninth in the 1600 in 4:29.70.

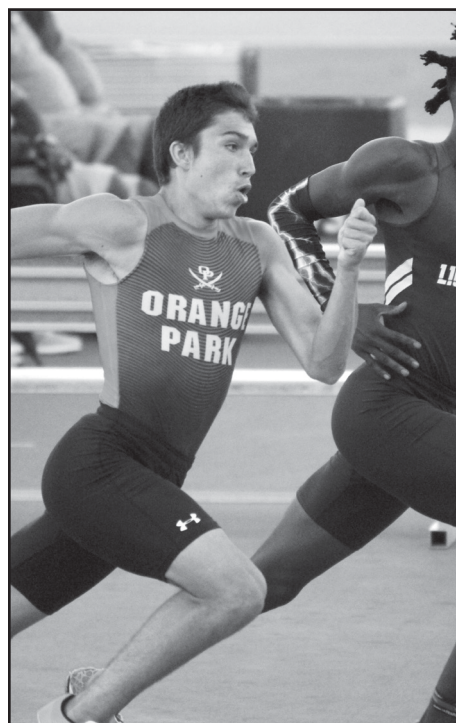

grade for the two athletes. Guy also finished seventh in the 800 in 1:55.27.

"Joel and I have been running against each other since eighth grade," said Guy. "To finish together at state in our last race was pretty neat."

Guy, who broke a 15 year school record in the 1600 during the season, knew the Class 2A race was going to be crowded.

"We wanted to get him in the mix and in position for a final kick after the final turn," said Keystone Heights coach Richard Bland. "I take him nine out of 10 times if he's close enough to be the toughest guy out there."

For Ridgeview coach Al Nesi, watching his son compete in his final race and medal was only a prelude to fall races in cross country.

"I am emotional, but I don't see it as his last race, but as the start of a new chapter," said Nesi, who was visibly emotionally spent from the day. "I get to now watch him in college (Flagler College). He's had a

good senior year."

In Class 3A, Orange Park High senior John Abate, who won district and region titles in the high jump, continued his medals in the event with a third place that topped Middleburg High's Bryce Quiett. Abate also finished seventh in the 300 hurdles with another click off his best time from 38.66 at regions to 38.62 on Saturday.

In the Class 3A 1600, Orange Park High senior John Bear finished off an injury-plagued final year with a medal; eighth in 4:25.64.

"To get a medal after this whole season was fighting this nagging knee was pretty big for me," said Bear, who plans to run at Florida State College of Jacksonville in the fall, heal up some more and then transfer to a four year school. "I really wanted to get here and be able to give it my best shot. I never thought about not coming."

In Class 4A, Fleming Island High freshman distance runner Mei Chiang got her first tasted of elite level running at the state level with a 15th in the 3200 and an 18th place in the 1600; both with times very much slower than Chiang's seasonal bests.

Oakleaf High's girls 4 x 100 relay team blasted a third place run behind St. Thomas Aquinas and Dr. Phillips with the top three separated by less than two seconds; 46.28, 47.54 and 47.62 for Oakleaf.

One fourth place finish with some excitement was Oakleaf High's Loren Johnson, a senior, who was the defending long jump champion. Johnson finished fourth in her event by six inches.

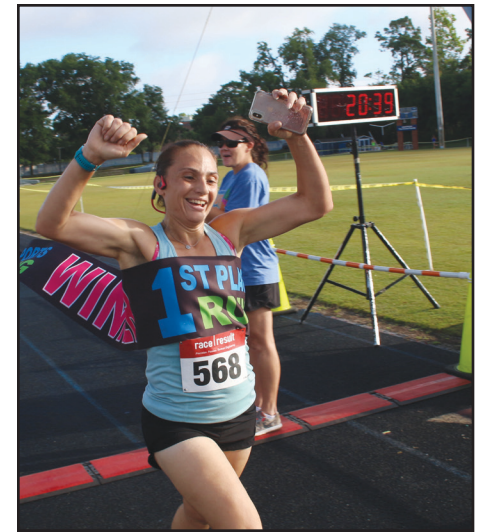

For the boys Lake Asbury scored 89 points with Oakleaf second at 82 and Green Cove Springs third at 59.

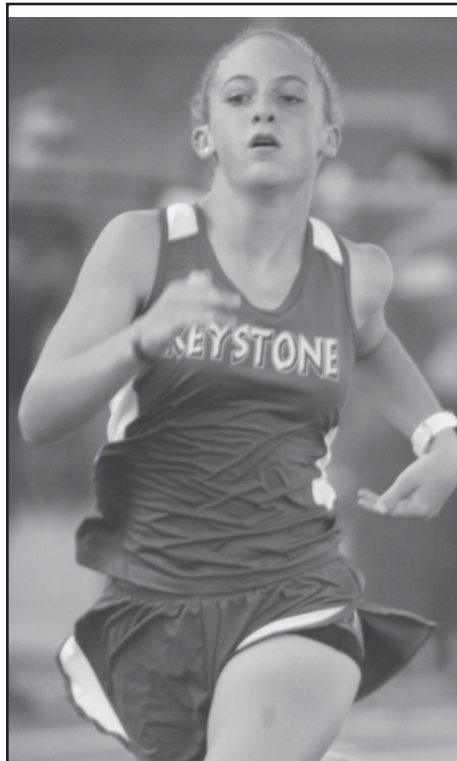
For the girls, Oakleaf scored 124.50 points to Lake Asbury's 101 with Green Cove Springs third at 64.50.

With this being one of the most important special recognition programs the FHSAA sponsors, 12 girls and 12 boys from all over the state will be awarded a total of \$50,000 in scholarships.

“The hardworking men and women of Florida’s dairy industry are honored to recognize the significant accomplishments of these amazing student-athletes,” Florida Dairy Farmers CEO Michele Cooper said. “Their dedication and discipline set the bar very high for their fellow students and we’re proud to help them take the next step toward their amazing futures.”

Haley Wadsworth, a Middleburg High volleyball player, was selected for her 3.96 GPA and also being the valedictorian of her class. Wadsworth lettered in four sports (tennis, weightlifting, volleyball, soccer) and is earned All-County honors in tennis. Haley is the class representative and President of the National Honor Society, BETA

National Club and Future Business Leaders of America Club. She is the daughter of Debbie Wadsworth and will be studying business management in college this fall.

To be eligible for this award, students must be a graduating senior with a minimum 3.5 unweighted grade point average and earned a minimum of two varsity letters in at least two different sports during their junior and senior year. The 2019 Florida Dairy Farmers Academic All-State Team selection committee received applications from 116 qualified student-athletes and evaluated them based off athletic participation, academic record, extracurricular activities, community service and essay. Each Academic All-State Team member will be recognized at a commemorative banquet on Monday, June 10 in Gainesville, where they will receive a \$1,700 scholarship and a commemorative medallion. Out of the 24 All-State Team members, one male and one female will be named the Ron Davis Scholar-Athletes of the Year, the FHSAA’s most prestigious honor bestowed on any active student-athlete. The winners of this award will earn a commemorative trophy and an additional \$4,600 in scholarship funds – \$6,300 in total.

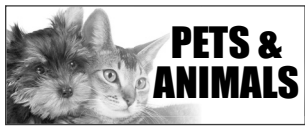


