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Commissioners want some answers first

Sheriff's Office asks for \$10.2 million increase in budget

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Board of County Commissioners want more details why Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels needs \$68 million to run his agency for the next fiscal year.

According to the proposal, Daniels' budget request is \$10.2 million more than what was budgeted this year because it addresses the challenges of future growth.

"He's asking for what he needs 10 years down the road in year one," BCC Chairman Mike Cella said. "I understand we'll need all those folks in 10 years, but we don't need those folks on the street right now. We can't afford those folks."

Cella said he'd

wants the sheriff take incremental steps toward the 10-year goal. According to Commissioner Wayne Bolla, he's not sure BCC currently can't afford a 15-percent increase.

"For the public, this is \$68 million," Bolla said. "We got one page of backup and a little bit of supporting documentation. We don't want to cripple the sheriff – he's keeping us safe – but at the same time, the \$10.2 million dollar [increase] is equal to a full mill. That's a big tax increase we'd

be facing if we said okay fine, so we have some questions to ask here."

The commission said it would send those questions back to the sheriff's office for answers.

"We all want the sheriff to have what he needs to keep our people safe," Cella said. "In the past couple of years, his budget has been met by this board and met his request. At this point in time, it's almost impossible to meet this request based on

Riverkeepers alarmed by magnitude, early arrival of algae blooms

ORANGE PARK – Algae blooms in the St. Johns River aren't new, but the timing and frequency of the blooms have put river watchdogs and residents on alert.

St. Johns Riverkeeper staff told residents Wednesday at Orange Park Town Hall about the causes of algae, the effects of pollution and how they can help.

The St. Johns Riverkeeper is one of 14 riverkeeper organizations in the state. It monitors the 13 counties touching the St. Johns River, from Indian River County to Duval County. With the river's health, the organization's advocacy includes finding solutions, educating the public and raising

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Clay County Memories

WAPE's blaring rock and roll frightened the horses in Clay County

It was in the late 1950s when construction started on the east side of two-lane U.S. Highway 17 about a mile south of the Doctors Lake Bridge. That alone was something to talk about since nothing much went on between Orange Park and Green Cove Springs in those days.

A radio station, WAPE – The Big Ape – was coming to Clay County. Fifty-thousand watts of power, it was a giant and one of only a few in the nation. WAPE was state of the art design and engineering with a rare water-cooled transmitter.

Locals knew none of this so the soon to be neighbor was hardly worth conversation at Reed Wager's gas station in Green Cove Springs. Around the lunch counter at Doc Snyder's drugstore in Orange Park some wondered if it would mean more traffic on U.S. 17 and more business for the town. On the porch at Price's Store in Doctor's Inlet where movers and shakers gathered for a lunch of sardines and saltines with an icy Coke, it wasn't even mentioned.

As construction neared completion the natives did begin to wonder at the engineering of the huge tower. A few snickered at a business with a swimming pool and high dive board. (The pool water cooled the transmitter; the dive board was decoration.)

The regulars at Price's Store with their usual mistrust of big city outsiders speculated that monkey business might be exactly what those young slick haired, duck tailed, whipper-snapper disc jockeys were

up to.

After a good laugh they went back to discussing politics, crops and arguing about quality of area moonshine recipes and forgot all about the radio station. But that would soon change.

Then WAPE started broadcasting – really broadcasting – and not just over the radios. Jerry Lee Lewis and Elvis could be heard on every telephone and barbed wire fence in Clay County. Cattle stampeded through vegetable gardens and dairy cows quit giving milk. Only teenagers enjoyed hollering over Little Richard's music when talking on the telephone.

Engineers made adjustments and milk production and everything else settled back to normal – for a while.

Summertime came and it all heated up again. The guy in the black ape suit appeared hopping up and down on the side of the road caused some distraction. Car loads of county workers heading to Green Cove placed bets as to when he would pass out from the heat.

But then the weekends came and a bevy of girls in scandalous two-piece bathing suits began cavorting in the pool and prancing around for the benefit of those disc jockeys and anyone driving past. Most

local girls could only watch because Clay County was still so small that someone would have made sure that their mothers were informed before they could get dry and get home.

Some say an early cold snap ended the practice. Others swear that the Sheriff got tired of pulling cars out of the ditches for drivers that couldn't keep their eyes on the road. Perhaps drivers just became accustomed to seeing skin. Times were surely changing.

For a while there - real or imagined - Clay County was hopping and WAPE was the main attraction for young people. An outsider would have thought that Hugh Hefner had built a Playboy mansion annex on U.S. 17.

Teenagers of the day were disappointed to learn that it was mostly talk. But the music was great and the reception perfect. Fans in Clay County could listen to the radio after the sun went down without constantly adjusting knobs or holding the clock-radio over their heads.

Young Clay County boys, new recruits at basic training all the way in Parris Island, South Carolina remember listening to WAPE and feeling a touch of home. County residents of all ages became instant celebrities anywhere on the southeast coast once people knew they lived just down the road from The Big Ape.

The station was imitated by wannabes all over the country, but Clay County had the real thing.

Mock thanks county commission for interim job

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – County Interim Manager Lorin Mock said his goodbyes to the Board of County Commissioners during his last regular meeting. And after months of hard work, he said he was thankful for the opportunity.

Mock, the county's fire chief, was

named interim manager last December after Gov. Ron DeSantis selected then-county manager Stephanie Kopelousos as his Director of Legislative Affairs.

"I think this will be my last formal time with you in this capacity and I'd be remiss without I think thanking the board for the opportunity," Mock said. "Sometimes growth opportunities don't come the way you envision them to come, but this has been a tremendous growth opportunity for me personally."

County Auditor Mike Price and County Attorney Courtney Grimm deserve special

praise for their work, Mock said, because they're responsible for a lot of assistance, advice and counsel – even in times when he didn't know he needed it.

"I don't think I would have been able to do half of the things we did in the last couple of months without them," Mock said. "Sometimes it wasn't what I was always seeking but probably what I always needed to hear."

Mock also thanked to all of the directors and division chiefs of the county's individual departments because, according to him, they were all challenged with new things for

the county. Specifically, Mock was referring to the county's transportation woes during the past few months when public transportation switched from the Council on Aging to JTA. "I don't think [any of us] had known a lot about transportation and we learned a lot about how to run senior centers along with our partners at Aging True and how to at least begin to form some things for transportation which hopefully will continue to grow over time," Mock said. "I certainly didn't know about roads and drainage and engineering. Those were all things

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GCS approves expansion of electric infrastructure along C.R. 315

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – City council members approved framework Tuesday night of a plan to substantially increase commercial electric infrastructure on a County Road 315 property.

Two of the city's electric customers, Precision Airparts Support Services and parts manufacturer AMMCON, need to upgrade C.R. 315's main electric feed from 13 Kilovolts to 23 Kilovolts.

The city's usual policy would require the first business requesting increased service to handle the full cost of the feed improvements and its lateral line. Secondary users on the feed would only have to pay for their lateral line. In this case, both businesses and the city would share potential costs for the feed.

City Manager Steve Kennedy recommended the new approach. Council members concurred in a 5-0 vote.

"My request is that we reevaluate that program because part of the cost association of having an electric utility is to have sufficient infrastructure in place to deliver your product," Kennedy said. "Part of that is, we contribute to the cost because it does improve our system. It's not just for those specific individuals."

The estimated cost of improving the C.R.

315 main feed is \$200,000, and city staff recommended absorbing half. Both PASS, at an estimated \$40,000, and AMMCON, at \$56,000, would pay for their lateral lines. With no agreement currently in place, there's a possibility the costs would be spread out over a company's utility bill.

Assistant City Manager and Public Works Director Mike Null said the cost-sharing agreement with large customers was positive for growth.

"This is part of what we can do to attract new businesses," he said.

The city could collect interest on the remaining \$100,000, over a three- to-five-year period, Kennedy said.

City documents stated that the city's estimated \$160,000 share, with the added ability to recover \$60,000 at 3% interest, would be funded through retained earnings, and it required a budget adjustment.

"This upgrade does add some benefit to the overall electric system," according to city staff's recommendation. "We would then propose to recover the remaining \$100,000 by charging \$20,000 [20%] to each of the first five customers to request a new or expanded service greater than 800 amps. Both PASS and AMMCON fit this description, so we would collect

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New law bans 'sanctuary cities' throughout Florida

Clay County was in compliance long before bill was signed

Gov. Ron DeSantis on Friday signed a bill passed earlier this year that requires local governments to work with the feds to enforce immigration laws.

The legislation began as an anti-"sanctuary cities" measure, though critics noted officially there were no sanctuary cities in Florida to begin with.

Now, the "Rule of Law Adherence Act" (SB 168), carried by Sarasota Republican state Sen. Joe Gruters, will "require state and local governments and law enforcement agencies ... to support and cooperate with federal immigration enforcement."

The immigration issue presented a flashpoint throughout the 2019 Legislative Session, with protesters at committee meetings and Democrats doing everything possible to kill the bill, though numbers ultimately were not on their side.

The Florida Democratic Party and immigration organizations lambasted the measure once again on Friday, with one group even saying it will "terrorize" immigrant families.

But DeSantis was greeted with nothing but resounding cheers at the Okaloosa County Commission building, a world away from the controversy over the bill.

The Governor noted that when he was campaigning, he promised to "deliver on promises."

"One of the promises [was] to do whatever we can on the state level to fight illegal immigration, specifically sanctuary cities," DeSantis said.

That's because sanctuary cities, contends DeSantis, create "law-free zones."

"When I sign this bill," he added, "... in Florida that will not happen."

"We ran on this," DeSantis said. "A lot of the stuff we ran on, people couldn't get done ... we got it done."

"This bill is simple ... it's our state's policy that we work with the federal government."

"We're going to cooperate to ensure the safety of our cities and communities," DeSantis said.

The bill marshals 287(g) agreements, if a non-citizen is arrested. Those agreements offer avenues for federal reimbursement for detention.

DeSantis recognized Gruters and House

Going after drug companies a good first step for Clay in war against opioids

Clay's Board of County Commissioners voted last week to join a growing lawsuit against drugmakers who've recklessly flooded the marketplace with opioids to create the worst man-made epidemic in modern medical history.

That's a good start, but there's so much more that needs to be done.

More than 130 people die every day of an opioid overdose in the U.S., according to the National Institute on Drug Abuse. We all know someone who's struggling with opioid addiction, or worse, someone who's died from it. They're our parents, husbands, wives, sons, daughters, brothers, sisters, best friends and next-door neighbors. And until now, there hasn't been much we can do about it.

By starting with the head of the snake – Big Pharma – we can continue with the steps needed to get illegal pills off the street and reign in the business of pain management.

"The time is now," said county attorney Courtney K. Grimm.

Clay County joined Bradford, Hamilton, Suwannee and St. Johns counties, as well as the city of St. Augustine, in the national racketeering lawsuit against 20 drug manufacturers and marketers. It asks the companies pay back for

the costs relating to health and medical care, training for first responders, child protective services, public information campaigns, counseling and rehabilitation services, mental health treatment, infants born with opioid dependency and the loss of property values in areas affected most by the addiction.

Six law firms asked commissioners "to represent Clay County in litigation against various entities responsible for the opioid epidemic and the costs that the County has incurred to date and will likely incur in the future in combating this crisis."

The three-biggest targets are McKesson, Cardinal Health and Amerisource Bergen. Those three distributors control nearly 90% of the opioid market.

The group now has 14 counties in Florida, Ohio and South Carolina as clients, as well as 14 cities and South Florida Behavioral Health. They claim Big Pharma encouraged doctors to prescribe long-term and high-dose opioids for chronic pain, while misrepresenting the risks of misuse and addiction. When the U.S. started cracking down on how pills are prescribed, addicts turned to the black market where opioids are readily available. It also pushed addicts to stronger opioids like heroin and fentanyl.

Clay officials don't know how much the county can expect to recoup if the racketeering lawsuit is successful. There already are indications the settlement will be several billions, which would rival what Big Tobacco was forced to pay out in 1998, but it pales to the \$1.05 trillion pharmaceutical manufacturers made in 2016.

Purdue Pharma already got the ball

ORANGE PARK – America’s Favorite Cowboys are coming to the Thrasher-Horne Center in Orange Park on Sunday, March 1, at 2 p.m. The event is sponsored in part by Allegro ALF10313 on Fleming Island.

sponsor Cord Byrd before calling up U.S. Rep. Matt Gaetz, a congressional ally of his and President Donald Trump.

Gaetz, in remarks that touched on a number of topics over many minutes, noted the huge local interest in the bill signing that required the location to be moved to the commission building. He lauded DeSantis for being the “boldest, most popular governor in America,” as well as supporting law enforcement and public safety.

Gaetz noted that 5,000 illegal immigrants show up at the southern border every day, and they are dispersed by a “catch and release” policy.

“They get a plane ticket anywhere in the country,” Gaetz said to groans. “And you pay for it!”

Gruters said this was a “historic day.” “Florida is at the forefront of the entire country when it comes to passing meaningful legislation,” Gruters said. “This truly was a team effort ... 244 amendments ... had to pass it twice on the Senate floor and three times on the House floor.”

“It almost came to a standstill,” Gruters

said. “Then the Governor got involved ... at the end, when it really mattered, he engaged.”

“We passed the strongest ban on sanctuary cities in the entire country,” Gruters added, noting the bill is “about criminal illegal aliens who have broken other laws.”

Rep. Byrd said the bill was “about recognizing American citizenship.”

“We kept hearing opponents of the bill talk about illegal aliens,” Byrd said.

He added that the bill was about putting citizens first.

rolling when it agreed to pay the State of Oklahoma \$270 million for fueling that state’s opioid crisis.

Overdoses killed more than 350,000 people in this country from 1999 through 2015, the lawsuit contends.

Of those, more than 200,000 died from pills prescribed by doctors for pain.

While lawyers fight Big Pharma in court, state and local agencies need to make doctors more accountable for their roles in the crisis.

Whether through ignorance, negligence or a desire to repay drugmakers for favors, some doctors have over-prescribed pain killers that helped create the epidemic.

At the same time, we need to require treatment centers to show results. Keeping

a patient on synthetic opioids like methadone for several years only sustains their addiction, not treat it. There are addicts in this community who’ve been taking drugs like methadone for more than five years. That’s outrageous.

Treatment means fixing the problem, not prolonging it.

Patients should be given a long-term plan with an end date to rid themselves of addictive chemicals.

That means creating a plan to eventually wean them off drugs like methadone, even if it takes a couple years, not making them a prisoner of daily doses for the rest of their lives.

The opioid crisis is real. And it’s deadly. Holding scrupulous companies that put millions of pills into our community is a good start.

But there’s so much more that needs to be done.

Annie Lee Keyes Community honored by Orange Park

ORANGE PARK – There’s a pocket of houses on Miller Street, Floyd Circle and Annie Lee Keyes Boulevard where more than 60 residents who have called the area home for more than 50 years.

On Friday, June 7, they were honored by the town.

Orange Park was in its beginning stages of integration and the desegregation of schools and businesses 50 years ago. An educator for more 30 years, Annie Lee Keyes solidified her place in Orange Park history when she became the first African American administrator at Grove Park Elementary.

“Years ago, the [Orange Park Town Council] voted unanimously to name a street after my mom and that’s what Annie Lee Keyes Boulevard is today,” Edward Keyes, the man behind the celebration. “That was really special for her and the community so it came to me this year that I wanted to do something to celebrate the entire community.”

So, after some research and speaking with community members, Keyes learned there were 63 homes in what he calls the Annie Lee Keyes Community that have been there for more than 50 years.

And without them, he said Orange Park wouldn’t be the same.

“And so that’s who I decided to celebrate,” Keyes said. “They’re our founda-

tary and the Orange Park Athletic Association pool, which has been filled in, used to be a mecca for the community to socialize,” Keyes said. “Whether it was sports or life or something else, everything was learned on those fields. After the fences went up, we were cut off.

“These were the places we all went to socialize and come together. Once it was choked out, it led to our youngsters not having things to do and I believe it choked the life out of our community. So, with things declining over the years, we were looking for something positive to reflect on.”

That’s where the idea for the celebration came from, Keyes said. Residents from the Annie Lee Keyes community, Mayor Connie Thomas, council members Randy Anderson and Roland Mastandrea, church representatives and local businesses representatives gathered at the GPE cafeteria to celebrate the residents who, through the highs and lows, have kept the community together for the past 50 years.

“They all came to the elementary school that night and it was stunning,” Thomas said. “It was a truly magical evening. It felt like you were around royalty.”

Thomas said Keyes and other speakers spoke about the professional basketball, football and baseball players that came from the GPE field that used to be open. They spoke about the residents who had

tion, our base. They’ve kept the community together, even though things haven’t been so positive all the time.”

Keyes specifically referred to the Clay County School District’s decision years ago to put fences around the perimeter of each school. While Keyes understands the safety reasons behind the decision, he said it’s choked the life out of the community.

“The school field at Grove Park Elemen-

lived through segregation and integration. They spoke about times in history when it seemed like the community might be destroyed, times in history when despite all odds, it rebuilt itself.

"They were committed to staying there," Thomas said. "The community, their history, there was not a chance they would say goodbye to it."

Thomas hopes to keep that sense of community alive throughout Orange Park. According to her, those longtime residents are who the town council should be looking to for guidance as the town begins its future visioning process.

Meanwhile, Keyes hopes to make celebrations an annual thing.

"We want this to be a yearly thing," Keyes said. "I called on the community and

the community showed up. Several people donated money to kids so they could enroll in sports programs.

Several donated funds to educational efforts, like SAT tutoring and more. We even had a scholarship."

Keyes said local barbershops donated free haircuts so that before the start of the next school year, residents in the Annie Lee Keyes community could get a fresh cut.

For him, it's this driving community effort that has him ready for next year's celebration.

Keyes recalls running into one of the 50-year residents, Debra Kelly, in a local dollar store.

That's when he told her she would be honored at the Grove Park Elementary event.

"When I told her we were going to honor her for being a part of the community, she grabbed her heart and her eyes lit up and she hugged me so tight," Keyes said. "If

Application deadline approaching for Federal Reverse Mortgage Assistance Program

TALLAHASSEE – The deadline to accept applications for Florida's federal Elderly Mortgage Assistance Program is June 30.

Florida Housing Finance Corporation Florida Housing has disbursed 100 percent of the funds for Florida's Hardest-Hit Fund ahead of schedule. Originally scheduled to end in 2020, qualified homeowners who are seniors in Florida may continue to apply for assistance through ELMORE until the end of the month.

As of May 31, 2,725 seniors in Florida have received assistance through ELMORE, and Florida Housing has disbursed 100 percent of the \$1.135 billion received from the US Department of Treasury.

"HHF programs were originally scheduled to end in 2020 and Florida Housing was able to distribute these funds well ahead of schedule," said Trey Price, Executive Director for Florida Housing. "I highly encourage seniors in Florida who are struggling with their reverse mortgage to apply before the June 30 deadline."

Homeowners who meet specific qualifications may be eligible for a two-year forgivable loan of up to \$50,000. The

funds will be distributed to the mortgage servicer, on the homeowner's behalf, in a lump sum to repay property-related expenses paid by the servicer (e.g., property taxes, homeowner's insurance, flood insurance and association fees) plus upcoming property-related expenses for up to 12 months.

Applications received on or before the deadline will be processed.

Florida homeowners with reverse mortgages who want to see if they qualify

for the ELMORE program should contact the toll-free ELMORE Application and Information Line at (800) 601-3534 to apply and/or receive more information on the program. Additionally, you may visit the ELMORE program website at www.FloridaELMORE.org for more information. Florida Housing will also be hosting ELMORE events throughout the state. For more information on the event dates and to set an appointment, call the toll-free number. There is no cost to apply for this program.

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Clay Habitat for Humanity joins push to curtail rising home prices

Clay County Habitat for Humanity has joined Habitat for Humanity International in a widespread push to improve home affordability through advocacy the organization hopes will get the attention of politicians.

The 2017 Clay County Quality of Life Report from the Clay County Chamber of Commerce showed what Habitat for Humanity calls a drastic increase in home prices since 2012. According to county Habitat Director Carolyn Edwards, the escalating costs to purchase a home makes organizations like hers even more important.

“Our homes allow people to live comfortably in a home they can afford,” Edwards said.

Edwards said according to the Low-Income Housing Coalition’s Out of Reach 2018 report, a two-bedroom apartment costs about \$1,118 in Florida. At minimum wage, a person would need to work 104 hours a week to afford that rent – and it include other costs like utilities or food.

The average cost for a two-bedroom apartment in Clay County dropped to a little more than \$1,000, which would still require a minimum-wage worker to work nearly 100 hours. Habitat’s new advocacy

initiative aims to create a conversation with those who can make a difference, according to Edwards.

“We want to collectively, as a Habitat for Humanity unit with 1,300 affiliates throughout the nation and world, put emphasis on helping improve home affordability,” Edwards said. “We have reports that let us know that more than 10 million folks in the U.S. are going to be impacted by these rising home costs. We need to get those reports and this information in front of those that can make a nationwide change: the policy makers, the politicians and anyone else.”

Edwards said the initiative is new, so details are limited. But she said with Habitat’s worldwide reach, she expects real change to happen. According to the official press release for the initiative, the advocacy initiative, dubbed the Cost of Home Campaign, seeks to identify and improve policies and systems through coordinated advocacy efforts at the local, state and federal levels.

Edwards said plans for that are in the works but that for now, Clay County Habitat for Humanity will continue to do what it’s always done.

“We’ve been giving affordable housing to Clay County citizens for years and years

and we will continue to do that on top of all this,” Edwards said.

Edward recalled one of the most recent Habitat for Humanity home events where a single mother with two children who had been working more than 100 hours a week between two jobs to pay rent, and her family was given a better life thanks to an affordable home.

“That woman is now a homeowner who doesn’t have to work 100 hours a week anymore just to afford a roof over her family’s

head,” Edwards said. “That is what affordable housing has done for her. She’s in a three-bedroom, two-bath home. She has a yard for her kids. She’s in a safer community. She’s now able to do what has always been most important to her: spend time with her children.”

“These kind of changes in people’s lives – that’s the kind of change we want to bring to people throughout the nation with our new initiative,” Edwards said. “Everyone deserves affordable housing.”

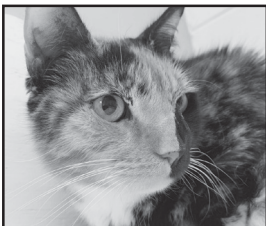

Keystone Heights to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho

Brock back on schedule to arrive at Idaho on time

Army veteran only 110 miles from self-imposed finish line

SUPERIOR, Mont. – There still are two significant mountains between Ken Brock and Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Compared to all the other challenges in his cross-country walk from Keystone Heights, they now appear to be little more than speed bumps.

Brock not only has picked up speed in his quest to walk from Amvets Post 86 to Idaho for the town's Fourth of July parade, he's on a pace to hit the finish line well ahead of his self-imposed July 3rd deadline.

"I'm going to make it," he said. "I'm getting close. I'm physically and mentally exhausted, but I'm not going to slow down. This is really catching up with me. I still have two mountain passes to go. That will



be tough, but I will get through it.

"There will be plenty of time to rest when this is over."

Brock left Clay County on Feb. 1 on a journey to bring awareness to the post-traumatic stress disorder programs at Wounded Warrior Project.

He's ran into several obstacles along the way, including two weekends of deadly tornadoes in Alabama, flooding in Nebraska, snow in South Dakota, a glitch with his GPS that sent him five miles off track and into the wilderness and two-week bureaucratic detour back to Florida for a mandatory evaluation by the Veteran's Administration.

Each setback was enough to put an end to the 2,650-mile trip.

"All it did was make me more determined to finish," he said.

And finish on schedule.

Brock has completed 2,540 miles of his trip, and he has 110 miles to go with about two weeks to get there. He averaged more

than 35 miles a day in the last week. His drive now is fueled by the mile post numbers that dwindle to double, then single, digits.

And after pushing through so many problems, Brock finally got a break this week along Interstate 90.

"My GPS sent me along a trail and I got lost," Brock said. "The trail was a dead end. I either had to cut through a forest or backtrack five miles, and I wasn't going to backtrack."

He had to take apart two barbed-wire fences so he could cut across private property with his cart and service dog, Pam. He relied on trails created by wild animals, and he had to bypass a tunnel that had collapsed.

"I finally got back to the highway, and believe me, I'm sticking to roads from now on," Brock said. "I was a little worried when I was lost. I was afraid I'd get caught. I didn't know what was out there."

When he got to I-90, the westbound lanes were closed for construction. That gave him an easy and open highway for days.

"It will open back up sooner than later, but I was able to boogie," he said. "It was great to have the interstate all to myself."

A mission that once seemed so impossible – and unlikely – now is down to a handful of miles and days.

"A half-mile was a struggle when I first started," Brock said. "Everybody was betting against me. But I've proven every one of them wrong."




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Part 1: Identifying your animals

CLAY COUNTY – As those of us living in Florida are aware, hurricane season already has started and it will end in November. As I was thinking about my family this year and what our plan is for this season, I wondered if others were planning. I always get calls a day or two before the storm is to hit from small farmers or one-horse owners asking what they should do with their animals like livestock and horse. Identifying them is the first step.

While most people do not own enough animals to do freeze branding or maybe they just do not want to do that, there are other methods to identifying your animals. Below you will find some tips for identifying your horses and livestock during a storm, or any emergencies situation for that matter. Keep in mind that what works for one may not work for another but being prepared ahead of time will lessen the stress.

Different methods for marking or identifying your animal:

Whether leaving your animal on your property or moving them to a safer location, marking your animal with your contact information is crucial. There are several methods for marking animals, the following are a few identification options for your horses and livestock:

- Paint or marker contact information on them so that it can be read. (Use a prod-

uct that will not wash off in the rain and water and of course is non-toxic.)

- Livestock tags – heavy duty plastic identification tag for livestock. Braid tag into manes or tops of tails. You may need to punch a hole in the bottom of the tag for the bottom end of your braid. These can be purchased agriculture supply stores, some local feed stores and at online livestock supply companies.

- Attach ID tag to halters or collars. This can be anything from dog tags to luggage tags. Make sure it is in a place on the halter that won't hurt the horse or dangle and get caught on something.

- Microchip. Make sure contact information is up to date.

- Neck Strap – heavy duty plastic or leather identification collar for horses. A tag marker is the best options for writing on plastic tags, but a permanent marker will work.

Identification tags should contain own-

ers name, address and phone number; if possible, a 2nd contact number is recommended. Other information is optional. Keep in mind that marking, microchipping and tagging are things you can or should also do with other pets as well as.

In Part 2, we will tell you what to do if you have to move your animals during a storm and what to do if they stay.

During hurricanes if you are planning to transport your animal be aware of the Florida policies for the transportation of animals both intrastate as well as interstate. 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
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School board starts process to create half-cent sales tax to pay for improvements

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County School Board is one step closer to a half-cent sales tax after giving Superintendent Addison Davis direction during the June 17 school board agenda review workshop.

Agenda review workshops serve as a way for the school board in advance to prepare for an upcoming agenda. While official motions can't be made at these workshops, direction was given to move them closer to a desired half-cent sales tax increase.

"We the board can give direction to [Davis] to get [the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability] started so that if we approve this, they're doing to be ready to go the very next day," school board member Janice Kerekes said.

OPAGGA is an arm of the Florida Legislature Office and it will be used to help the school board find a Certified Public Accountant to guide them toward a possible half-cent sales tax to cover the cost of nearly \$300 million needed for facility improvements at 41 schools.

The board started mulling over the option of a half-cent sales tax at its June 6 meeting to cover the costs of the improvements.

Unable to cover these costs with a bond, Assistant Superintendent of Operations Michael Kemp told the board the only option to fund the improvements was through a sales tax.

The proposed sales tax can't be used for salaries. It can only be used on capital improvements like infrastructure needs,

and it would be line-itemed for everyone to see. All five board members approved of giving Davis direction, but they disagreed how to do it. House Bill 5 goes into effect next January and it won't allow changes to sales tax during a special election. Instead, referendums would need to be on a general election ballot every two years.

Kerekes pushed to get the sales tax referendum on a special election this year. Board member Ashley Gilhousen was concerned with that timeline during the last two regular meetings and the workshop.

"The feedback we got from the public is it is too much, too fast," Gilhousen said. "I worry we're rushing into this. What they're going to accuse us of is what they accused us of last time: a lack of transparency."

School board member Mary Bolla expressed similar concern. Despite their concerns, they're still on board with a half-cent sales tax; they're just unsure if a special election is the way to proceed.

The board is set to vote on this half-cent sales tax at the upcoming June 27 regular meeting. Kerekes anticipates the board will pass the vote, so Davis was told to contact OPAGGA to begin the process.

"If we wait to do this until after the vote, that will add another two weeks to our timeline while they search for one," Kerekes said. "If we direct [Davis to direct OPAGGA] now, on Day 1, when we approve it, they can start the process right then and there."

The vote is June 27 at the Teacher In-service Center at Fleming Island High.

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Study identifies access, poverty, obesity as major health needs in NE Florida

Local nonprofit health care organizations join forces to improve care

Clay Today

Access to care, poverty, obesity and lack of physical activity are among the most significant local health needs, according to the latest Community Health Needs Assessment conducted by nonprofit health care organizations in Northeast Florida, including Clay County.

These issues disproportionately impact certain demographic groups including children, seniors, veterans and the LGBTQ community.

The study collected data from focus groups, interviews with key stakeholders, and surveys in five Northeast Florida counties and provided insight from more than 1,300 individuals who represent the broad interests of the community.

Other top community health concerns based on the report include: behavioral health; cancer; and, maternal, fetal and infant health.

Researchers analyzed regional health care statistics and compared them with other areas and benchmarks, where possible. Additionally, facilitators reviewed findings from recent assessments of the community's health needs conducted by other organizations.

The Community Health Needs Assessment is conducted every three years to provide local health care organizations and health departments with an accurate understanding of evolving local health needs. The Jacksonville Nonprofit Hospital Partnership commissioned the report. And the source was smaller than a grain of rice.

"My whole life was changed by a tick," he said.

A single bug bite while walking through Jerry's Forest on Fleming Island was enough to create a food allergy to red meat called alpha-gal. It's a syndrome that keeps him from eating beef, pork, lamb, venison or other red meats.

"It's definitely life-changing," he said.

Alpha-gal syndrome not only limits what Gregorius can eat, it also affects what he wears and which medicines he can take. He now is allergic to the meat of all mammals – and everything that comes from them, like milk, leather, wool and gelatin. Since most gel capsules include pork byproducts, he has to be diligent to monitor his medicine.

"Basically, if it has four legs and hair, I can't eat it," he said.

The condition is caused by the Lone Star tick that's predominantly found in the Southeast. The saliva from the insect directs the body's immune system to react to red meat. What makes diagnoses so difficult is it generally takes several hours for the symptoms to appear. Although more than 5,000 are suspected of having the allergy in the Southeast, experts said it's impossible to know how many more suffer with it since it's not easily diagnosed.

But as the population of white-tailed deer grow, which is considered the leading host for Lone Star ticks, so do the reported

cases of alpha-gal.

Gregorius said he eventually made his own diagnosis after doing research on Lyme disease.

"Nobody could figure it out," he said. "I saw a lot of specialists. Even now, I still can't find anyone around here who knows how to treat it."

Gregorius said he's lost 40 pounds since he was forced to restrict red meat and dairy products from his diet, and that's affected his pressure-washing company because he no longer has the energy for big jobs.

His allergies also have created a personal dilemma. As the president of the Traditional Bowhunters of Florida, he questions whether he should still hunt animals he can't eat.

"We teach ethics [at TBOF], so I have to ask myself if it's all right to harvest an animal," Gregorius said. "I'm really have internal issues with that. I don't know what to think."

He still tromps through deep woods and thickets to locate future hunting sites. Although he's very careful to wear repellent, he still gets bitten.

"I had two ticks yesterday," he said. "I've had thousands bites in my life."

There are other ways to decrease the chances of a tick bite – and the possible diseases that come with it.

"To protect yourself from ticks around the home think about protection for your pets, yourself, and your landscape," said Wayne Hobbs, an environmental horticulture agent with UF/IFAS' Clay County Ex-



tension. "When in wooded or heavily-vegetated areas wear long-sleeved shirts and pants and keep them buttoned. Tucking in clothing, including pants into your boots is also helpful. And wear insect repellent. Lighter colors can help finding ticks much easier and check yourself immediately after being anywhere likely to have ticks.

"Check your pets as well and talk to your veterinarian about preventative options. In your landscape, keep the lawn mowed and free of debris. Cut back heavy vegetation from any areas you use frequently and try to locate decks, patios and playground equipment away from brush and wooded areas."

Still desperate for answers – and a cure – Gregorius is learning to adjust. Steaks and barbecue have been replaced with chicken and fish – as long as they're not fried in a milk and egg batter. He's even learning to eat emu.

"They tell me I'm healthier," he said. "My cholesterol is down, and I probably added 10 years to my life."

"But this isn't way to do it. Who knew one tick could turn everything upside-down?"

the fact that it out-strips the kind of revenue we'll be receiving in terms of taxes, so it leaves us no choice but to send the letter asking for further financial information to help us determine how much we may or may not be able to increase the budget."

BCC also wants to see three years of comparative data to give the commission a more-rounded understanding of this budget proposal, according to county auditor Mike Price. One question, specifically, comes from Bolla who wants to know if he's heard correctly that the sheriff has purchased more cars than people.

"Can we get insight for that capital dollars for the cars?" Bolla asked. "He's got more cars than he's got people: I don't know if that's true or not."

According to Price, the answer is yes, the BCC can get insight for capital dollars.

"The short answer is yes," Price said. "Below the fund level, he can move money around wherever he wants."

Since the sheriff is a constitutional officer, he's free to spend it as he sees fit. If Daniels wants to move cars to a three-year basis instead of a five-year basis, he can do so with operational funds, Price said.

Until commissioners get answers, it won't entertain a motion for the budget proposal.

\$20,000 from each in the near future."

Kennedy said he'd return with more details at a future meeting.

Council Member Van Royal called the plan a prudent way to add revenue.

"I think it helps us with the system and flat utilities revenue," Royal said. "I think this is a way of adding money not only to the capital part, but at the end of the day ... the return on the investment is really good."

Council Member Connie Butler told staff to protect the city's investment in the language of the contract if something went wrong. Council Member Mitch Timberlake

also asked for guarantees and a carefully thought out agreement when it would be brought before the council.

"That's the only concern I had," Butler said.

"They've got a track record over there," Timberlake said. "So, I'm an optimist."

In other business, city leaders unanimously passed three changes of the city's code on first reading.

To simplify residential or commercial questions, Planning and Zoning Director Michael Daniels pushed for the addition of a Future Land Use and Zoning compatibility table, a Permitted Use table and a Lots Requirement table to the city code.

"The main purpose of these code changes is to reorganize the development-related zoning information," Daniels said.

FLEMING ISLAND – Fishing enthusiasts can gather this weekend for the Florida Antique Tackle Collectors Summer Antique Tackle Show to showcase, trade, buy and sell some of the rarest tackle made in Florida.

With over 300 tackle makers in Florida – many who’ve been around for decades –

the state is a great start for anyone looking to add to their rare and vintage tackle collection. Shows like these, hosted by FATC member Jim Berglund, helps starting or completing your own antique collection.

“We started because there were so many lure makers in Florida,” Berglund said. “There’s over 300 in Florida. It’s just that not many are well known because they’re not making thousands and thousands of pieces of tackle like some of the

bigger companies. We all get together during these shows to help people find exactly what they’re looking for.”

Berglund is a collector and has been doing it for so long that he needs only 20 to 30 more pieces. Because of the rarity in tackle he needs, it could be a while before his collection is complete.

The FATC has been in service since

1978, and the first show decades ago had just 25 tables with about 45 people in attendance. Today, the FATC has more than 300 members, and they expect to see at least that many people at the upcoming show.

The diversity of the FATC is surprising to most, Berglund said. He said there’s

retirees, people as young as 20, children, which are referred to as Minnows, as well as doctors, insurers, members from other states, Canada, Europe and Japan. While a worldwide audience isn't expected here, Berglund said members from overseas often travel to attend the larger FATC shows.

Man arrested after girlfriend beaten, sent to UF trauma unit

ORANGE PARK – Police charged a man for the brutal beating of his girlfriend early Monday, June 17, after deputies found blood splattered on the floor and walls throughout a house on Wells Road.

Matthew Lyndle Waggoner, 38, was in the Clay County Jail after being booked for felony battery, domestic battery by strangulation and aggravated domestic battery. On Tuesday, CCSO added violation of probation charges.

Clay County Sheriff deputies were called by the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office after a woman was taken by ambulance to UF Health's Trauma Unit with bruises and swelling to her face. JSO said her injuries were so severe she couldn't write because her eyes were swollen shut, according to the arrest report.

After the beating, the woman went to her ex-boyfriend's house in Jacksonville before being transported to the hospital.

Clay County deputies went to where the beating reportedly occurred and found signs of a struggle. They also found Waggoner, who was arrested on Jan. 1 for aggravated domestic battery, with bruised knuckles and a swollen left hand.

GCSPD K9 takes down man who sped through crash scene

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A man speeding through a roadblock at a crash scene late Wednesday, June 13, nearly struck officers with the Florida Highway Patrol and Clay County Sheriff's Office before finally being caught less than five miles away.

Oda Charles Carter, 44, of Orange Park was booked in the county jail after being charged with attempting to elude and flee during a high-speed chase, driving under the influence, possession of less than 20 grams of marijuana and failing to submit to a DUI test.

Carter drove through a crash scene on U.S. 17 near Town Center Boulevard on Fleming Island. All southbound lanes on U.S. 17 were closed while FHP investigated a head-on collision that resulted in serious injuries to three people.

Carter was clocked by radar at 107 mph, CCSO said. He pulled into the VyStar Credit Union parking lot and was seen materials later identified as marijuana into the bushes.

He was detained by a K9 officer from the Green Cove Springs Police Department.

The accident on Fleming Island hap-

Tode, 65, and Connie Sims Hensley Tode, 66, both of Green Cove Springs, were sent to Orange Park Medical Center with critical injuries after their pick-up truck was struck head-on by a pickup driven by David Frederick Pulliam, 49, of Jacksonville.

Pulliam was driving north on U.S. 17 when he apparently lost control and crossed into the southbound median, striking the Todes. Pulliam was hospitalized with serious injuries.

Charges are pending.

Expired tag leads to bust for pot, LSD, heroin, fentanyl

MAXVILLE – A man ticketed for an expired tag wound up in the Clay County Jail on a multitude of drug charges.

ORANGE PARK – A woman originally suspected of shoplifting wound up with more-serious charges – possession of methamphetamine and tampering with evidence.

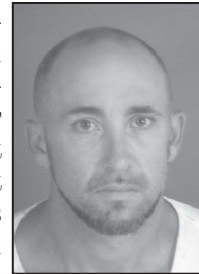

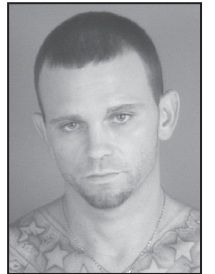
Jason Paul Poland, 32, was booked into the Clay County Jail.

Deputies added another charge – introducing or removing contraband in a detention center – while he was being booked into the Clay County Jail after officers found more drugs in his wallet.

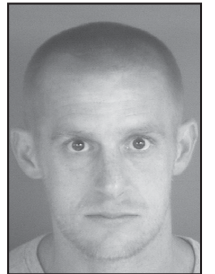
Local man busted for using fake \$100 bill at Waffle House

Study uses orange peels for better heart health

GAINESVILLE – You've heard an apple a day keeps the doctor away. Now orange peels may improve your heart health.

Yu Wang, an assistant professor of food science and human nutrition at the UF Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, has been awarded a \$500,000 grant from the U.S. Agriculture and Food Research Initiative, part of the USDA. With the award, Wang plans to lead a research team to ensure extracts from orange peels improve the gut's ability to stave off fatty linings in your arteries.

Recent research has shown that gut bacteria help develop cardiovascular disease. When they feed on certain nutrients during digestion, gut bacteria produce trimethylamine N-oxide as a byproduct. TMAO levels are powerful predictors of future cardiovascular disease, according to researchers at the Cleveland Clinic.

Wang and her colleagues want to work on that gut bacteria. They will study how orange peels promote gut health and, therefore, overall human health.

Americans generate about five million tons of orange peels a year, Wang said. Right now, the peels are mostly treated as waste, she said. But the Food and Drug Administration considers natural orange peel extracts safe for human consumption. So, Wang wants to put those peels to better use.

"This research could be critical to enhancing the cardiovascular health of millions of people worldwide," said Wang, a faculty member at the UF/IFAS Citrus Research and Education Center at Lake Alfred. "In addition to improving consumers' health, our research results could provide additional economic returns, benefiting U.S. agriculture and food systems."

For the new UF/IFAS-led project, researchers hypothesize that orange peels will modify gut microbiota and help prevent atherosclerosis, a disease characterized by fatty deposits on the inner walls of arteries.

When gut microbiota breakdown chemicals called choline and carnitine, the process eventually produces trimethylamine.

Enzymes can then convert TMA into TMAO, Wang said.

But orange peels contain components that interfere with TMA enzymes, Wang said. Researchers believe that action will help prevent atherosclerosis.

To test these hypotheses, the researchers will combine animal studies with enzyme tests to assess how orange-peel extract consumption can prevent cardiovascular diseases.

In her own preliminary study, Wang used experimented with three groups of mice to see if she was going in the right direction with her research proposal. One group was fed a regular diet, the second was fed a regular diet plus carnitine, which induced TMAO. The third group was fed a regular diet, carnitine and orange peels.

They found orange peels altered the composition of bacteria in colon in the mice fed with regular diet, carnitine and orange peels.

"Within three years, we expect to understand more about the mechanisms associated with orange peel consump-

tion, TMAO formation and the prevention of atherosclerosis," Wang said. "We hope this project can not only positively impact human cardiovascular health via the promotion of gut health, but will also provide a simple and an efficient usage of orange peel."

awareness.

Blue-green algae feeds off nitrogen and phosphorus. Those nutrients arrive in the river from several avenues. Sewage sludge is being dumped in the St. Johns Upper Basin in South Florida. Excess fertilizer from farmers and residents finds its way to the river. Septic tanks, treated wastewater and stormwater runoff contribute to the problem.

The winter was mild, rains were heavy and river water moves slow, which, along with the human factors, made for the perfect algae cocktail, St. Johns Riverkeeper Outreach Director Kelly Thompson said.

When nitrogen and phosphorus nutrients enter the river, algae gorges and flourishes. However, the buoyant algae block sunlight for other aquatic vegetation. When plants decay, this depletes oxygen for fish and limits food sources for manatees, such as eelgrass.

"We get a body of water that doesn't have enough oxygen for the fish and wildlife that depend on it," Thompson said. "What really raised the alarm for us that it would be a bad year was it started so early, April 10."

Some algae are toxic. Anatoxin, Cylindrospermopsin and Saxitoxin have been found in river samples in Clay County. Symptoms of algae exposure include nau-

sea, rashes, stomach cramps, vomiting and diarrhea, according to the state Department of Health. Six blooms were reported at Doctors Lake and are currently listed on the state Department of Environmental Protection's algae bloom dashboard.

The algae that's detrimental to the environment is bright green and resembles a sheet of paint on the water. Authorities still learning algae behavior and can't know if it's toxic from the naked eye.

"Our waterways are sick," Thompson said.

Solutions stem from septic tank phase-outs, to enforced fertilizer ordinances or shad harvesting. The St. Johns Water Management District is reviewing a Doctors Lake project to remove phosphorus from treated wastewater. The agency hopes to remove 65 pounds of phosphorus.

On the state level, Thompson and St. Johns Riverkeeper Volunteer Program

Manager Megan Riggs said they were pleased with Gov. Ron DeSantis establishing a Blue-Green Algae Task Force consisting of experts in the field to discuss the problem.

The House shot down Senate Bill 1278 that would have implemented statewide regulations on Class B biosolids use, treated human waste. The bill would have been based on FDEP technical advisory committee recommendations. Sen. Debbie Mayfield (R-Vero Beach) proposed the bill, which died in messages in the House.

Riggs encouraged residents to participate in advocacy and citizen science. On the local level, volunteers can sample water with test strips or apply to captain patrol boats. St. Johns Riverkeeper staff said it was important for residents to tell their neighbors.

"You don't have to be an expert," Riggs said. "We need to start today."

Former Orange Park Mayor Eugene Nix said there was too much blame on residents for pollution while the larger users of fertilizers or entities doing the dumping were ignored.

"They're taking it from one place and putting into another," Nix said. "It's always somebody else that's been doing it [to them]."

Orange Park resident Chris Grover said she felt galvanized by the meeting.

"It just struck me today, they're trying so hard," Grover said. "We as citizens expect, 'I won't use fertilizer and I guess everybody else will take care of it,' but I really think we need to lobby."

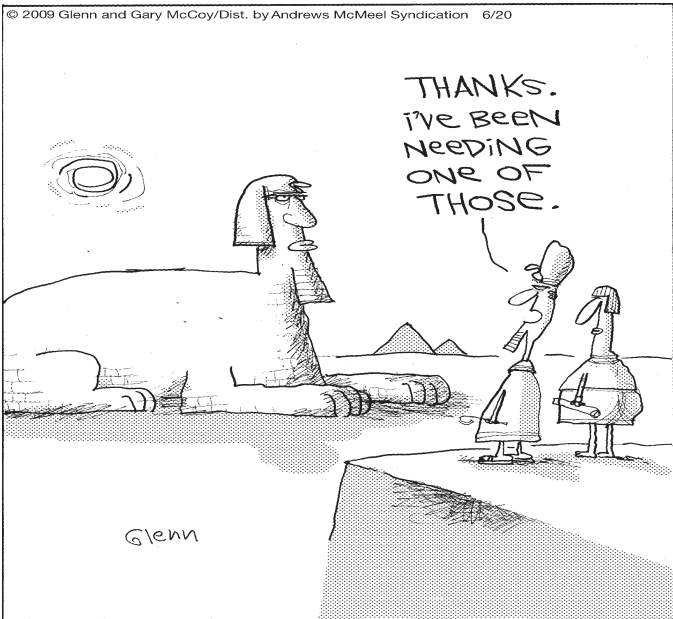

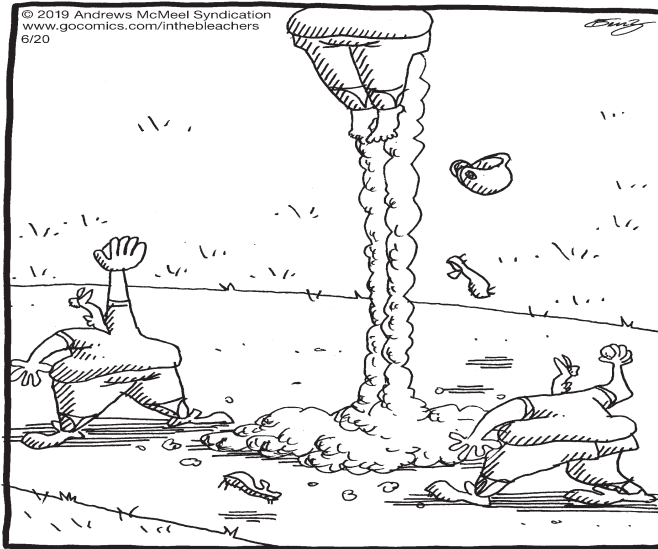

More than 230 people died due to traffic crashes across the four-county region in 2017, nearly twice the number of people murdered. "Fatal traffic crashes are a major public health issue," according to Jeff Sheffield, North Florida TPO Executive Director. "People have become desensitized by using the term accident, which implies that these crashes are not preventable, but they are."

The North Florida TPO is the independent regional transportation planning agency for Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns counties. The agency leads our region's efforts in planning, funding and mobilizing resources to develop and maintain our transportation system. Collier third against nation's best

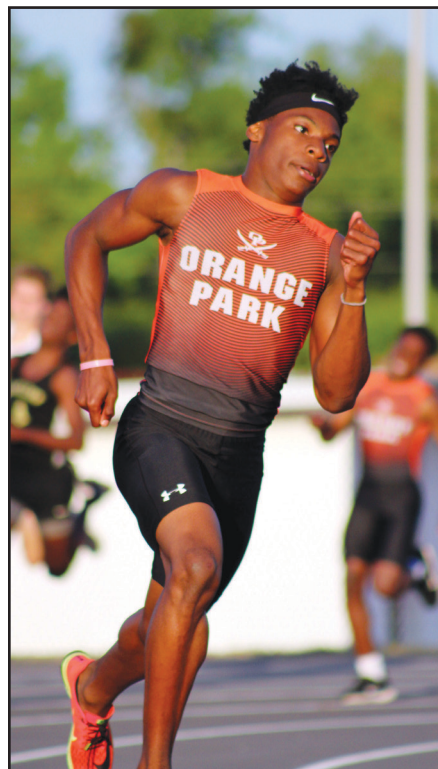

Collier, with a 46.33 second split for the Florida 3A title at University of North Florida, took third in the 400 meters at New Balance with a 47.24 split behind winner Randolph Ross of North Carolina, who won in 46.80, and Anthony Brodie of New York, runnerup in 46.88.

Ross, who runs for Garner Senior High in North Carolina, is the North Carolina 4A champion with a 46.80 time in May. Ross also high jumped 6'-8.25" at the New Balance meet for ninth.

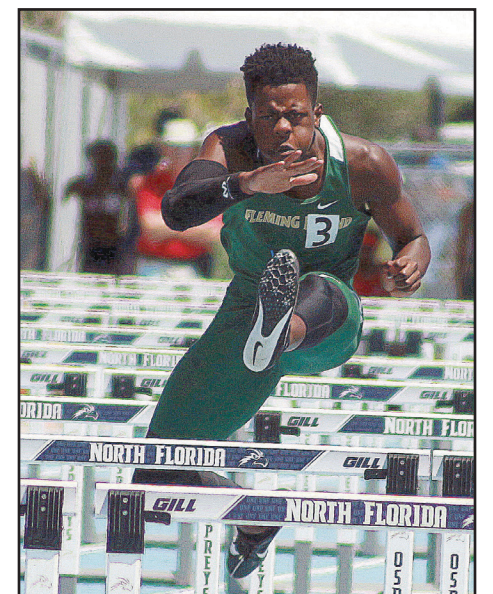
Brodie's 46.88 was a personal best by nearly a second with his previous best



just 47.39.

Collier, third in 3A in the 100 at 10.75, later competed in the 100 meters with an 18th place finish in 10.69 seconds with Joseph Fahnbulleh of Minnesota winning in 10.41 and Javonte Harding of Virginia, the 5A Virginia state champion at 10.63, getting runnerup at 10.43. The top six sprinters were under 10.50 seconds. Fahnbulleh, the Minnesota 2A 200 meter state high school champ who is headed to the University of Florida next year, has a 10.23 personal best in the 100. Fahnbulleh also anchored the 2A 4 x 200 relay gold medalists.

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Skye's limit is 'no limits'

Soccer ace combines Ace Hardware, fitness blog, modeling and award-winning video to her resume

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Clay High athlete Skye Paradise has found her way to a few region and state playoffs in her four years as a Blue Devil and her athletic accomplishments, like catching a football or scoring a soccer goal, have put her face in plenty of newspapers and magazines.

Nowadays, Paradise can be found slinking sledge hammers at Ace Hardware, working out three hours at Retro Fitness, selling boutique items at the Pink Seahorse and, most recently, adding a state award for producing a video on glassblowing. Paradise also finished second in a Fitness-Girls modeling contest just a month ago.

"She only sleeps about two-three hours a night," said Shannon Paradise, the mom. "She is always thinking of what to do next."

Having just finished off a second Final Four trip with the Clay flag football team, Paradise adds one more state championship opportunity with a digital twist to it. Paradise recently produced an instructional video for the prestigious Jim Harbin Media Festival sponsored by the Clay County School District and the Florida Association of Media in Education. Paradise came home a winner at the county and region level and now awaits her fate on the state level.

State winners are judged online through July with state winners announced in November at the 45th Annual Jim Harbin Student Media Festival in Orlando.

The video is of her dad, Craig, and his ability to create glass masterpieces with his glassblowing business, EssanarGlass, in his garage.

"On the same night as the Clay County sports banquet at Fleming Island High School, I was in another room getting an award for my video that was submitted to the Harvin festival while my mom, Shannon, was in the sports banquet," said Paradise, who plans to play soccer at Huntington College in Alabama. "I ran to the sports banquet to tell her I won the video contest."

At Clay High School, the daily morning news broadcast done through instructor William Weeks, asked Paradise one day to be the face of the DTV news.

"Devil TV asked me to be the host last year," said Paradise. "They never had one and I did it. I loved being in front of the camera and it worked. I had fun with and made the news fun. I was kind of the Ron Burgundy of Clay High School."

Paradise later found out about the Jim Harbin Media Festival and, with Weeks' encouragement, produced and submitted an instructional video. Paradise did do a comedy video, but Weeks suggested the instructional video with her dad, an accom-

plished glass blower. "We did a couple of different films, but Mr. Weeks suggested doing the instructional on my dad because no one knew about him doing that," said Paradise. "I recorded about two hours of films that got edited to about a seven minute film."

The experience of producing the video lit a fire for Paradise.

"It was super hard," said Paradise. "I think I was able to put clearly and concise on film the whole process. That's when I thought I could do more with video."

Paradise, who has used her speed on her feet to be a decisive breakaway threat in both flag football as part of two Final Four appearances and soccer for Clay where the Lady Blue Devils annually battled with powerhouse Ponte Vedra, chuckled that just two years ago, she was a slightly out of shape, not so fast sophomore athlete trying out for whatever sport she could muster enough energy to attempt.

"I was even told I would never play on one team because only play the best six and I wasn't one of them," said Paradise, who chose classroom over a stint on the track team as a sprinter for her senior year. "That comment hurt, but I eventually decided to change my image."

Craig Paradise also fell into a time not spent staying fit part of life as he transitioned from a construction worker to a professional glass blower about two years ago to deciding that a P90X workout video may

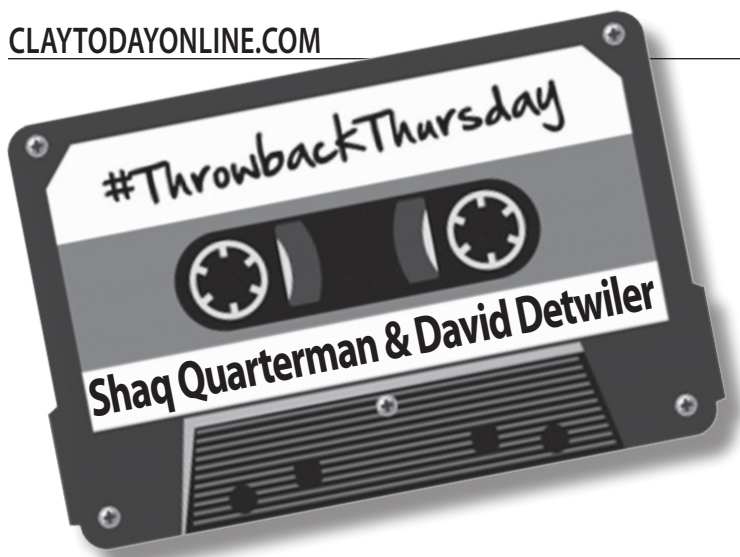
be able to turn the trick and put his fitness level back where he wanted it.

"Her freshman and sophomore year, she was slow and chunky," said Shannon Paradise. "And, she had an attitude problem. She decided to change herself."

With her dad, Paradise slimmed down, got stronger and got faster bringing success on the athletic field. That experience of changing her body and appearance has fueled an outreach of sorts that creates her own Youtube videos that talk about her transformation and offers encouragement.

"I found out I might want to be a personal trainer," said Paradise. "June 1, 2017 was the first time I ever stepped into a gym and it changed me. I lost 30 pounds, got fit and people around me noticed. I've gotten so many private letters thanking me for my fitness advise. People sometimes hide their fear of going to the gym."

Paradise, who works at Hagan Ace Hardware in Green Cove Springs and the Pink Seahorse boutique shot, also in Green Cove Springs, branched out and is now able to be seen on social medias with her Skye Paradise fitness videos.

Quarterman would win a state title in the shotput while Detwiler excelled in middle distance races. Detwiler's major

accomplishment as a junior high trackster was to win the Bob Hayes Invitational 800 meters as an eighth grader.

In football, Oakleaf Junior High ran a table of 30 straight wins with Quarterman the alpha dog of the squad.

Detwiler, at Lakeside, was a cerebral lineman and linebacker, more apt to use his sports' sense, speed and savviness to make plays for the Gators.

In high school, Quarterman, at Oakleaf High School, blossomed under coach Derek Chipoletti in 2014 as a junior to garnish a first-ever unbeaten season; 10-0, a first-time playoff berth and a first-time region championship game (at home) before ending the season in that region game to Niceville. Quarterman also was a weight-lifter for the Knights with a 13th place finish at the 2015 state meet.

Detwiler stayed with track and wrestling; where he also excelled at Lakeside, to become an 800 meter region qualifier and a cross country ace.

In wrestling at Fleming Island High School, Detwiler was part of a dramatic shift in wrestling that put the Golden Eagles program, under coach P.J. Cobbert, in the statewide conversation Detwiler, one of just two region champions, finished fifth place in Class 3A in his sophomore year after a tough loss to eventual South Dade High two-time unbeaten (128-0) champion Patricio Lugo, now a top NCAA wres-

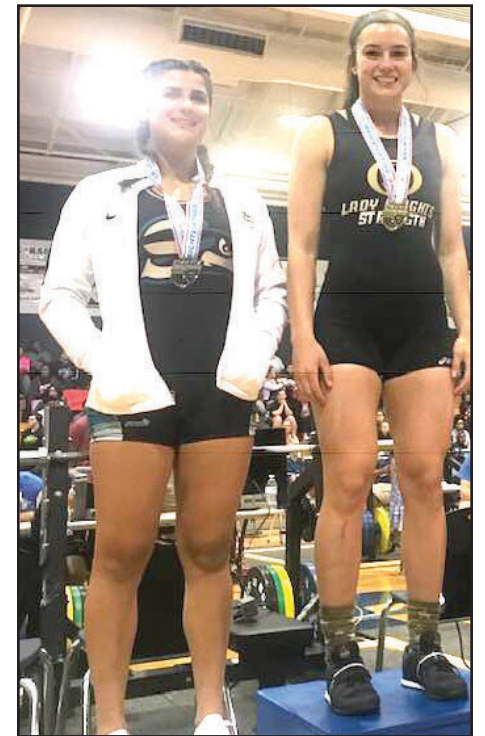
year with a 350 total.

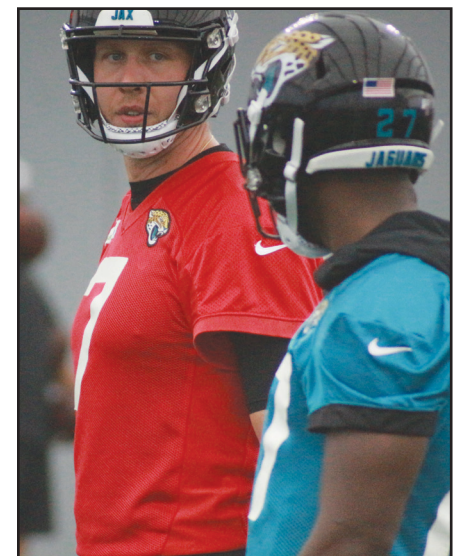
"We have this little break," Marrone said. "We're looking forward to everyone coming back ready to go, in shape and practicing right away."

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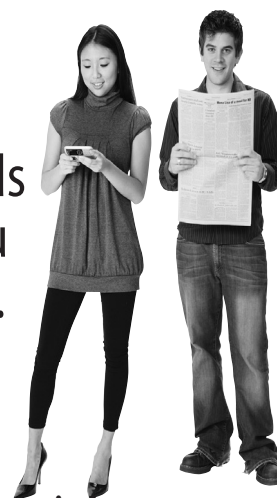

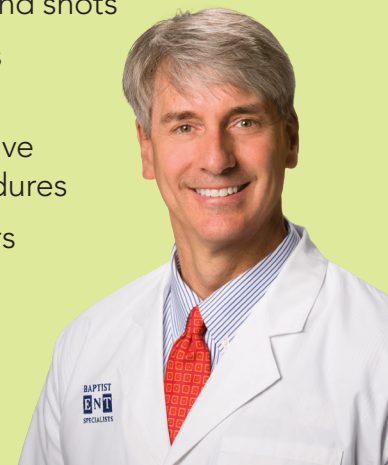
