JACKSONVILLE - Halloween decorations are still at the front door, tucked behind a growing monument of flowers and balloons. So is the crime scene tape that warns anyone from entering the house on Harbor Island Drive.

While Susan Elizabeth Mauldin won't be coming back to her Fleming Island home after being reported missing more than three months ago, law enforcement

BCC moves closer to \$130 million overhaul of roads

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The Board of County Commissioners moved one step closer to begin work on an extensive road project funded by \$130 million worth of bonds.

The BCC held a workshop last Tuesday to discuss in detail the six projects in mind. This project consists of four fixes to road links in the county deemed deficient and one road linked deemed critical. It also includes what the county is calling a First Coast Connection.

"The First Coast Connection connects [U.S. Highway 17] to the First Coast Expressway," County Manager Howard Wanamaker said.

The bond project previously included talk of turning roads like County Road 220 into six lanes, but Wanamaker said the community has been clear: Clay County doesn't want any more six-lane roads.

That means the project, despite how drastic its changes will be, will see all of its roads categorized as either suburban, urban or rural, which translates to, at most, the projects will bring result into new four-lane roads.

Two of the projects, Sandridge Road from Henley Road to Country Road 209 and C.R. 209 from Sandridge Road to C.R. 315B, will increase two-lane roads to three-lane roads. These two projects have a cost of roughly \$25.6 million and \$16.5 million, respectively.

West Tocoi, Clay County's transportation hub for lumber, naval stores, crops

hen Clay County was carved from Duval in 1859, homesteaders and naval stores operations were already beginning to cluster on the west bank of the St. Johns River just south of Green Cove Springs. But... war erupted and all traffic on the St Johns River stopped.

After the Civil War, steamboats again began to ply the river and life picked up in West Tocoi.

Steamboat schedules called the landing West Tocoi to distinguish it from Tocoi on the opposite side of the river. First named by early native Indians. Tocoi means "shallow crossing" and the fording site was part of a network of tribal and game trails traveled for generations before the Spanish arrived. It was almost at once a rough and tumble busy commercial landing with frequent steamship stops to load sawn lumber, naval stores and seasonal crops. As newcomers settled inland, larger and larger numbers of livestock, naval stores and agricultural products began to arrive at the docks for dispatch to northern markets. The dock was usually cluttered with animal skins – from bear and panther to alligator – headed for Jacksonville tanneries. One local woman widowed when her husband was killed in a grizzly boiler explosion at the West Tocoi sawmill supported


A few curious travelers, mostly naturalists and independently wealthy would be adventurers, visited but stayed only briefly at the town's rough and primitive boarding houses.

Then in the early 1880s, the Jackson-ville, Tampa and Key West Railroad began laying track and the first leg from Jackson-ville to Palatka swerved close to the St. Johns River to include a stop in West Tocoi. Operation commenced in March, 1884, and by the beginning of the tourist season the next November, the town was perfectly situated.

Tourists anxious to avoid an arduous and sometimes dangerous ocean voyage to reach St Augustine were able to travel by train all the way to West Tocoi then board the new ferry and after a short trip across the river arrive at the settlement's sister city on the opposite shore.

There they boarded the St. Johns Railroad for a harrowing trip in open rail cars pulled along track by mules with no enthusiasm for the project. The brochures made this jaunt sound more impressive than it was but it certainly gave tourists a story to tell when they returned north.

Even when the mules were replaced

with a wood-burning engine passengers had to be alert to pat out any sparks that blew onto their clothing and were occasionally recruited to disembark and gather wood along the way.

In 1892, Mr. Flagler's railroad to St. Augustine east of the river was complete and the St. Johns RR closed in 1895. West

Tocoi, like the rest of Clay County, began a gradual decline as fickle investors and tourists flocked further south in search of something new. All that remains today are pilings in the river and deserted concrete block quarters built for turpentine workers in the 1930s and 40s and often mistaken for abandoned motels.

Keystone exploring options to beef up police patrols

City council mulling creating its own department, asking for more deputies from sheriff's office

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — The City Council is once again mulled the idea of creating its own police department before deciding to find ways to pay for additional deputies from the Clay County Sheriff's Office.

The council asked Town Manager Scott Kornegay last month to explore how it could be done. Kornegay invited Clay County School District Police Department Chief of Police Kenneth Wagner to Monday's meeting to walk the council through the process.

"Believe it or not, this is not that difficult, and it came to my surprise, to start a police department," Wagner said. "Now there's some costs with it, but to actually start it is a simple process."

Wagner said the process begins with a proclamation from the city council declaring the intent to start a police department. That goes to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement. If approved by them, it goes to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Virginia and their approval creates the police department. That process is the simple part, Wagner said.

Next comes hiring officers and finding a space, which Wagner said requires a lot of logistics. The city would need a police department building and it would have to explore Memorandums of Understanding to possibly establish partnerships with surrounding departments like those of Starke and the Clay County Sheriff's Office.

CCSO currently handles law enforcement in Keystone Heights with three deputies on patrol. Wagner said the department would likely need a chief, three sergeants and 14 officers for a total of 18 officers.

"This doesn't include the people you would need to hire for clerical work like archiving reports," Wagner said.

A city staff member could handle that to reduce costs. Wagner used school department's costs to estimate a cost for Keystone Heights. Officers could start at \$40,000 a year, but with benefits and uniform costs that price would level out at \$56,000.

"That's what you'd be paying [each officer]," Wagner said.

The Keystone Height City Council didn't appear to be in favor of starting a police department. The discussion began after council members decided the city could use more police coverage, especially in the areas surrounding the actual city limits.

Starting a police department is not ideal, council member Tony Brown said. He'd rather the city look into the cost of requesting additional CCSO coverage.

"I personally as a taxpayer don't want to pay more in taxes [for this police department]," Brown said.

The council agreed and requested that city staff look into the costs associated with having additional CCSO coverage in the city and surrounding areas.

Waste Not Want Not celebrates 30 years of service to NE Florida

ORANGE PARK – Getting the volunteers with Waste Not Want Not to raise their glasses in a 30^{th} birthday toast wasn't difficult.

But with more than 140 volunteers, getting them all in the same photo proved to be a greater challenge.

There was plenty to celebrate on Feb. 1 when the nonprofit that's committed to rescuing food destined for landfills and putting it on the plates of hungry residents marked 30 years of service to the Clay County area.

"It started with one woman, one store, one charity," said executive director Sandra Staudt-Killea. "To survive this long is a real fete. Most nonprofits don't last this long."

And the group is only getting stronger. In the past 30 years, Waste Not Want Not has worked with local groceries, bakeries, restaurants, vendors and farmers to save more than 22 million pounds of "perfectly good food that would have ended up at the dump," Staudt-Killea said. More than 2.1 million pounds was redistributed last year.

The organization started in 1990 when Debra Smyers started collected soon-to-be-outdated, but unmarketable, food from the Publix at Pine Tree Plaza in Orange Park and delivering it to the St. Francis Soup Kitchen in Jacksonville.

She recruited a couple friends, including Karen Helseth and Mary Cobb, to create one of the most-successful charitable organizations in Northeast Florida.

Food collected is taken to food pantries, missions, soup kitchens, group homes, support meetings and weekend backpack programs in 10 local counties, including Clay.

Not only has Waste Not Want Not expanded from Smyers' garage to Grace Episcopal Church of Orange Park, both Helseth and Cobb still are involved,

"I started with this because it was at my church," Cobb said. "I still do it because it's important to volunteer. The people

who need us are always so glad to see us. They're always so grateful. It's something you love to do. I've been doing it for 30 years. Hopefully, I will keep doing it for another 30 years."

Helseth and Cobb were recognized at the birthday party for their continued service. Jack Eccleston, Wilma Miller and Helen Howard were honored for serving at least 20 years.

"Every little bit, everything every vol-

unteer does, all together we're rescuing anywhere from 4,000-to-7,000 pounds of food a day," Staudt-Killea said.

Research shows more than 25% of the food that's produces is thrown away before it reaches the consumer, Staudt-Killea said, and half of the food bought is tossed out. Also, food doesn't become spoiled on its sell-by date, either, she said.

'Fake Florida' states taking advantage lack of film production program

More than 70 film and television productions have wanted to shoot in Florida in recent years, but didn't due to the lack of a statewide film production program.

According to trade association Film Florida, those productions would have used more than 220,000 hotel room nights; provided 110,000 cast and crew jobs; accounted for \$1.3 billion in spending; and increased state and local tax revenues by millions of dollars.

But just because fewer productions are choosing to film in Florida doesn't mean the Sunshine State has been absent from the silver (or small) screen – it just means another state has stepped in to the role of fake Florida.

Among the billions in lost business are 20 or so projects that were set in Florida. allowing other states to depict Florida to the world.

Those projects account for \$500 million in lost business, or nearly half of the potential economic impact Florida has ceded to other states since the last state-backed film program lapsed.

The estimate only includes productions that went forward - that means expected spending from canceled shows such as Netflix's "Bloodline" aren't included, nor are spending estimates for shows that relocated, such as HBO's "Ballers," which addressed the change in scenery by having the main characters move from Florida to California.

Florida legislators take great pride in the state's low taxes, weather and geographic diversity, among other things. However, legislators don't seem to have the same pride when it comes to Savannah, Georgia, doubling for Sarasota, North Carolina for North Florida, Southern California for South Florida, Long Island for Central Florida or New Orleans or Atlanta for Tampa, Jacksonville or Miami.


While the amount of cash studios would have spent is known, their full impact is immeasurable.

Past film productions have large and sustained spikes in "film tourism," where viewers see a location on television or in the theater and decide to plan a vacation to see it in person.

"Dolphin Tale," for instance, led Clearwater Marine Aquarium to new heights in attendance. Prior to the film's release, the attraction pulled in about 75,000 guests a year. Following the film's release, attendance went up 10-fold. Nearly a decade


Astros cheating scandal proves continued hypocrisy against Rose

Three Major League managers have lost their jobs - and likely their careers - for using technology to steal signs from the Los Angeles Dodgers during a pair of World

Series. But Houston Astros were allowed to keep their 2017 World Series title, and the same was true for the 2018 Boston champion Red Sox.

Junior Johnson used to say, "If you aren't cheating, you aren't trying." To put in a way Johnson would



appreciate, the level of dishonesty used by the Astros and Red Sox would be like a Ford Pinto racing against a Ferrari.

Astros manager A.J. Hinch, general manager Jeff Luhnow and former assistant general manager Brandon Taubman all were suspended for one season by MLB after they were caught using a camera in centerfield to steal signs given by the catcher ahead a pitch. Red Sox manager Alex Cora, who was a bench coach in Houston during the 2017 season, also was fired for taking the cheating scheme to Boston

New York Mets manager Carlos Beltran was hired in October, but he was fired a few days later when the team learned he was one of the 2017 Houston players who was aware of sign-stealing.

Baseball's investigation into the Houston scandal revealed "most" of the players were involved. The video office at Houston and Boston monitored signs with the centerfield camera and relayed the next pitch as a text message to a smart watch or cellphone in the dugout. Players or coaches then banged garbage cans on the bench to signal what pitch to expect.

The scheme was both elaborate and simple. Bill Belichick certainly must have been impressed.

What's disturbing is the Astros cheated and got to keep their World Series title. At the same time, Pete Rose currently is banned from being on the Hall of Fame ballot for betting on baseball while he was a manager with the Cincinnati Reds, although there's never been any suggestion that he violated rules as a player.

Rose eventually and reluctantly admitted he bet on the Reds. That has nothing to do with his remarkable career as a player, which included 4,256 hits and being selected to 17 all-star games for a record five different positions.

I admit to a bias since I used to live in Ohio, and I grew up as a Reds fan. My father took me to a Reds-Dodgers game when I was in fourth grade, and it remains as one of my greatest memories to see Jim Maloney pitch against Don Drysdale at the old

later the aquarium is still averaging close to 800,000 visitors a year.

As for "Bloodline," the Monroe County Tourist Development Council estimates it produced \$65 million in tourism spending and \$30 million in production, which in turn generated \$9.4 million in state and local tax revenues and created 1.748 jobs from season 1 alone.

Those stats are a key piece of the argument the state should launch a new film program: When studios come to the state, they spend big and pay well — the average film industry job pays \$82,000 a year, or about two-thirds more than the average wage statewide – and the economic impact continues years after production wraps.

Data from the Association of Film Commissioners International provides more backing.

According to the association, one in five tourists worldwide make travel plans based on the films or television series they watch.

Critics of film production programs have attempted to dismiss the evidence by arguing film tourism isn't a thing.

But that runs counter to another central cog in their argument – that if a production is set in Florida it'll produce the same tourism numbers as if its shot in

While stakes are high for the state's economy, they aren't for the state's budget. Industry experts say a new film production program wouldn't have to fork over bundles of cash at a loss in order lure business, thanks in part to the state's natural

The proposal on the table in the 2020 Legislative Session reflects that. SB 530, sponsored by Sarasota Sen. Joe Gruters, is rather austere compared to film programs in states such as Georgia.

The program would provide completed productions with a rebate for the lesser of \$2 million or 20% of their qualified expen-

To qualify, studios would be required to apply ahead of time, hold 70% of filming days in Florida, and employ a mostly-Floridian cast and crew.

Additionally, only expenditures paid out to Florida employees and businesses would count toward the spending total eligible for a rebate.

Gruters' bill has already cleared its first committee. The House companion, HB 497 by Sarasota Rep. James Buchanan, awaits a hearing in the House Workforce Development and Tourism Subcommittee.



St. Catherine Family Life Center to open in November

ORANGE PARK – This year marks the 50th anniversary of the St. Catherine's Catholic Church on Kingsley Avenue. As with most 50-year-old buildings, there has some wear and tear, which required constant and regular maintenance.

St. Catherine's parish, however, is taking things a step further.

Demolition started last November on one of the older buildings, Rooney Hall. A new Parish Family Life Center will arise in its place.

One of the hallmarks of the Catholic church is demonstrating faith through service. St. Catherine's holds many activities but is running low on space and modernity in its former and current buildings.

"Currently, we have lots of activity but not great facilities," said Father Ignatius Plathanam, a 47-year member of the priesthood, the last six spent at St. Cath-

erine's parish. "With the new building, we hope to have more people coming into the parish and participating in more activities."

The new Family Life Center is expected to accommodate 360 in its main area, with a smaller meeting hall that is expected to fit as many as 200 people.

"We have a very dynamic youth ministry," said Plathanam. "The youths can also use the multipurpose hall [in the Family Life Center]."

Plathanam is happy with the youth ministry but feels as if improved facilities will increase the interest of young people in the church and in the activities offered there. He thinks that young people who may have been unhappy with the facilities at St. Catherine's may have gone somewhere else and with the new building hopes it will bring them back.

"We also have the seniors exercising, which is open to the public. They are now doing it in Haut Hall [the other main older building which still stands and may be replaced at a later time]," said Plathanam. "They will be able to do that in the multipurpose hall. It will also be used for other different activities such as Scouts. We can also host wedding receptions and other big meetings for which it can be rented."

The expected completion of the project is expected by the end of November – just in time for the holidays.

"There will be real excitement about the new building. It will be a real boost to our presence. I think it will be a big asset to Clay County and the city. We will be able to be of service in that way, having a very great facility for meetings and conventions and those things," Plathanam said.


The new Family Life Center will be able to accommodate 360 people in its common area and as many as 200 in the smaller meeting hall.




Workers started tearing down the hold Rooney Hall in November. Construction is expected to start soon on the new Family Life Center, with a scheduled opening date in November.

Green Cove Springs considering \$125 stormwater utility fee

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The City Council proposed changes to Chapter 70 of Ordinance O-01-2020 - stormwater utility - during its meeting last Tuesday.

Councilmember Mike Null read the proposed changes to the ordinance by suggesting a \$125 annual usage fee for each equivalent stormwater unit. The fee was originally set at the special session meeting of the City Council on Nov. 19. That meeting also had a presentation that followed a seven-year period of analysis and study to create a Stormwater Utility and

fee per structure. It had been suggested to be set between \$200-\$250 for each ESU.

The annual budget is \$750,000 for stormwater capital improvement and funding for stormwater system projects.

At its most-recent meeting, the council proposed an ordinance setting the fee at \$125. Final approval or denial for the ordinance will be ratified on Feb. 18.

The first ordinance was adopted on Jan. 8, 2013, which was the predecessor of the Stormwater Utility Fund. Changes since that time have led to the current legisla-

Tree fees, noise, parking, public comments fill Orange Park's agenda

ORANGE PARK - It was a night of regulations during last Tuesday's town council meeting as discussion of tree fees, noise ordinances, front lawn parking rules and public comment time limits filled the meeting's two-hour runtime.

The council passed its first vote regarding the tree fees it's been mulling over for the past few meetings, but it wasn't done so without contention from the two council members: Alan Watt and Roland Mastandrea. At \$165 an inch of Live Oak tree, the tree fee was too high for them.

"Staff did a good review of comparable places all over Florida," Watt said. "This ordinance would make us the most expensive. There's places out there charging \$10 an inch, \$50 an inch...\$165 dollars an inch is outrageous."

Watt said he doesn't disagree whether the town needs a tree fee. He said it's reasonable to have one, but he believes the proposed amount is too high. Mastandrea

said he felt the same. This wasn't enough to sway the council though because the first reading of the ordinance was approved with a 3-2 vote, with Watt and Mastandrea dissenting.

"Do we want to deter the annihilation of trees...or do we want to continue to remain healthy and maintain the environment we have here in town?" Council member Eddie Henley, who voted in favor of the ordinance, asked.

low chance of contracting the virus unless you've been in close contact with someone who has the coronavirus – which right now, typically means a traveler from Wuhan, China – the city where it originated.

What are the symptoms?

Symptoms can be cold or flu-like including a cough, possibly with a fever and shortness of breath. Some will experience nausea, vomiting or diarrhea. Most can recover within a few days, but some with weakened immune systems- such as the young or elderly- may develop a serious infection such as bronchitis or pneumonia. And it can be deadly.

Is this a serious American health threat?

Currently, the flu is a bigger health threat in the U.S. than coronavirus.

The flu kills roughly 35,000 Americans every year- more than any other virus. This season, it's already sickened an estimated 15 million Americans and killed more than 8,000, according to the Center for Disease Control. Yet fewer than half of adults get a flu shot.

How is coronavirus spread?

Health officials believe it's spread through large droplets from coughing or sneezing that can affect people up to six feet away. By contrast, measles or chickenpox spread through smaller droplets over much greater distances.

How do we stop the virus from spreading?

Take the same steps you would take to prevent any virus: wash hands regularly; cover coughs and sneezes with your elbow; don't touch your eyes, nose or mouth; and, stay away from people who have a runny nose or are coughing or sneezing.

Do face masks work to stop the virus?

Face masks can't hurt but most people don't wear them consistently or tight enough to fully cover the nose and mouth so droplets can still spread. If worn properly, masks can prevent the spread of droplets in the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes and they do prevent you from touching your face. However, officials with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control are not recommending face masks because right now coronavirus is not an immediate threat to anyone who hasn't come in contact with someone with the virus.


It turned out that they were more than willing.



Williams always asked for a word's definition and origin, as well as using the word in a sentence. He said spelling competitively is more about language patterns and roots rather than rote memorization, he said.

"Definition helps if you already know what the word means because it's hard when you just have what the word sounds like," Williams said last year. "[For country of origin], it's just patterns for the language that help.

The lists provided usually have 1,100 words, which means Williams will spell on the fly. Williams practices regularly with his mother Annica.

'You never know what they're going to throw at you. There's a lot of words [on the list]," she said. "You can only get so far with memorizing, so what we worked in the past year was language, patterns and roots.

a great cause," said Henry's mother, Rebecca Kruck. "Some of the people I know but a lot of them I don't know and it just means a lot to me that they're willing to take part in this journey with us."

The runners took off and the eventual winner, Dylan Nelson, was out in front early.


He stayed in the lead for the duration of the run before cruising down the homestretch and crossing the finish line at a time of 16 minutes, 38 seconds.

Groups partner to protect 578 acres along north shore of Black Creek

CLAY COUNTY - The St. Johns River Water Management District and North Florida Land Trust have partnered on the conservation of 578 acres with three miles of riverfront on the north shore of Black Creek. The property is located across from the district's Black Creek Ravines Conservation Area in Clay County and within NFLT's Black Creek Preservation Priority Area. The acquisition was finalized today.

'We are excited about the opportunity to conserve these lands and further pro-

tect Black Creek," said St. Johns River Water Management District Executive Director Dr. Ann Shortelle. "This partnership with NFLT and the landowners provides the public with future opportunities to enjoy this distinctive property while protecting the land and waterway."

"This is an incredibly important piece of property along Black Creek and we look forward to owning and managing this property," said Jim McCarthy, president of NFLT. "We are thrilled to partner with the district to make this possible and we

thank them for their partnership and quick response. Their staff, led by Dr. Shortelle, was a pleasure to work with and we look forward to partnering with them on future acquisitions."

Under the agreement approved unanimously by the district's Governing Board at its January meeting, the district will have a perpetual conservation easement on the property, at a cost of \$150,000, NFLT will own and manage the property, allowing for public access including hiking, camping and other passive recreational activities.


Rideout Point is a significant acquisition in an area with distinctive ecological features. The property is relatively undisturbed and has alternating high, sandy oak bluffs and hardwood forested floodplain. The First Coast Expressway, once fully constructed, will cross parts of Clay, Duval and St. Johns counties and will divide the property into two sections.

The tract is near the Camp Blanding

Military Reservation, Jennings State Forest, Belmore State Forest and the Bayard Conservation Area, making it part of an extensive network of conservation lands providing for water quality protection, water storage, natural systems protection and recreational opportunities.

The district buys land in the course of its work to protect and preserve water resources and owns or manages nearly 773,000 acres of land throughout its 18-county service area. District lands protect water resources while also protecting plant and wildlife habitat and providing areas for public recreation and environmental education. In addition, the district holds 138,145 acres in non-regulatory conservation easements.

Conservation easements are legal agreements designed to conserve open space, water recharge areas, environmentally sensitive lands, wildlife habitat or historic features on a specific parcel of land.





Florida is a **Closed Primary State**

In a Closed Primary Election, voters are limited to choosing candidates of their own party.

If you choose the Republican Party, you are allowed to vote only for Republican or non-partisan candidates.

African exhibit puts White-Oyler's passion on display

ORANGE PARK — The Orange Park Library is now the temporary home for a collection of African artifacts from countries like Liberia, Rwanda and Guinea.

Former Clay County teacher and resident Diane White-Oyler has traveled to Africa several times, and she's lived there for years. Her house is a showcase for her travels but now that she's retired, she wanted to pass on her love for Africa.

"When I retired, these things were just sitting in my house," White-Oyler said. "My family had enjoyed these things for years, but I wanted some of it to be somewhere where others could enjoy them like we did."

White-Oyler has a doctorate in African History and African Humanities from the University of North Florida. Her love of the continent goes back years — before she became interested in it while teaching world history. Her interest grew into a love that she extended to students following her many trips there.

She remembers teaching students at Orange Park Junior High and Middleburg High about Africa and being able to actually show them artifacts from numerous countries.

If she was teaching students about the different qualities of threads and cloths used for clothing, instead of just relying on a textbook image, she would bring in a piece of clothing made using those threads.

"They loved it," White-Oyler said. "How often do students get to go hands-on with something they're learning about in their textbook?"

What White-Oyler loves most about Africa is the differences between societies there and the way things work back home in America. What struck a chord with her was the way they treat their elders. Instead of nursing homes and potential lone-liness, African cultures prioritize elders. They aren't sent off to a nursing home or left alone. They're responsible for teaching children and passing on their knowledge to those around them, and they're often the foundation in the middle of a family.

White-Oyler also loved the sense of family there.

"You can stay if you're liked," White-Oyler said. "Widows remain a part of the family. Even some divorced people remain a part of the family."

African cultures also don't stop outsiders from becoming a part of their family. This meant a lot to White-Oyler as she's an only child. Africa gave her a bigger family.

"We need to think about doing things

CLAY COUNTY - Think back to when you were a child. For some of us it was not that long ago, for others it may have been a while. Regardless of how far back you have to remember, it may be easier for some of you because of one thing; you kept a journal as a child. This trend has taken a bit of a back seat recently and I must admit that I did not keep a dedicated journal as a child. However, I'm just now starting to learn about the huge benefit it can be to our children.

The University of Rochester Medical Center outlines several benefits for everyone who keeps a journal, including; managing anxiety, reducing stress and coping with depression. Thinking about the stressors and situations we face every day, it makes sense. When we have a problem and we're stressed, keeping a journal helps us identify what's causing that stress or anxiety. Once we've identified our stressors, we can work on a plan to resolve the problems and reduce stress.

Now, we do need to keep in mind that journaling isn't the end all be all of stress reducers and problem solving. Journaling is one aspect of mental health and a healthy lifestyle. To get the most benefits from journaling we should also; relax and meditate each day; eat a healthy, balanced diet; exercise regularly; and get plenty of sleep. Journaling can help you to track these each day.

Another thing to keep in mind is that there isn't one sure fire way to journal. However, here are a few tips to get started. Try to write every day by setting aside time. This could be when you get home from work, before you go to bed, or even at lunch. Make it easy by keeping pen and paper handy allowing you to write down a thought. If it works best for you to keep a journal on your computer or smartphone, do it! When you do journal, write what feels right. Remember there isn't one set way to keep a journal, it's your own place to keep your thoughts on the day and organize them.

Lastly, use your journal as you see fit. Your journal doesn't have to be shared with anyone. If you want to share your journal with friends and family, you can certainly do so. With that in mind, it is important that we respect the privacy of others, if you come across someone's journal, don't read it without their permission.

Keeping a journal will help you or your children create order in life when it may feel like chaos. You'll also get a chance to learn more about yourself when you journal by revealing your most private fears,

thoughts and feelings. Remember, the journal is for yourself, so look at writing in it as a time to relax, de-stress, and wind down.

In 4-H programs, we ask our 4-H members to keep a record book that includes a journal. While learning in their 4-H clubs, member journal about what they did or learned, helping them to keep their

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



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School district scrambling to keep pace with repairs, pay scale

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County School District is doing well in many areas according to state rankings and assessments, but one area that's falling under the curve is maintenance.

The district is struggling more now than in previous years to keep its maintenance department staffed. This hasn't led to a decline in work quality because that department said it refuses to let that happen. But it has led to slower response times and longer days. Director of Maintenance for the district, Philip Hans, said the main factor behind this struggle is simple: CCSD isn't competitive.

"We have trouble recruiting and maintaining talent," Hans said. "We really do. I can't keep somebody that has seniority that's been in the trade for 15 to 20 years. They come in here and work until a job opening on the outside comes up and then they leave."

Hans said one of the only competitive things about the district is the benefits, but benefits only go so far when a job on the outside pays enough to cover the pricier benefits outside of the district and then some. Apprenticeships used to be a reliable source of work, Hans said, but instead of students sticking with the district after graduation, their talent is being picked up by companies on the outside with better pay.

The solution is simple according to Hans: money. The district needs to pay its employees more. Across districts of similar size, Clay pays roughly \$4 less an hour on average in maintenance positions like electrician, plumbing and carpentry.

CCSD electricians make a starting wage of \$12.36 whereas in similarly-sized districts like Escambia, the starting wage is \$14.29, for example. In St. Johns, the starting wage jumps to \$17.33.

This has been the case for some time, but it's come to a head because not only is talent leaving for better jobs, but top talent is reaching the point of retirement so the maintenance department is in a fall.

"The industry's changed and our ability

to have the capacity to support or retain talent is becoming tougher and it's not just in all of the maintenance areas that require professional licensing and examination," Assistant Superintendent for Operations Michael Kemp said. "We're just trying to shoot the flare across the bow. Our concern is that our top guys are in drop. All of the knowledge of everything going on in schools is leaving."

Even the Florida Legislature's Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability agrees, citing a need to increase the district's maintenance staffing size in order to align with state staffing guidelines for a district the size of CCSD.

Hans said it's not as simple as hiring just anybody. The jobs require an intense knowledge of the district's schools or at least a focused dedication to learn such things. A higher wage would encourage that kind of talent, according to Hans.

"We don't just want bodies," Hans said.
"We want the right bodies."

The quickest solution to the problem, according to Hans, would be better pay. The financial impact of that solution is roughly \$550,000. Whether or not that happens is up to the school board and it likely hinges on the upcoming November ballot where voters will decide if they want to pay for a sales tax to yield the school district additional funds for millions and millions in maintenance repairs and needs.

officials said they will bring her remains back to Clay County to provide semblance of closure to her friends and neighbors.

When hours turned to days and days turned to weeks after she disappeared last October, few held hope of her being found alive. Those fears were realized when a search team found her in a South Georgia

landfill on Wednesday. Dental records confirmed the worst: it was Mauldin.

Within hours, the person of interest in her disappearance, Corey Louis Binderin, a 45-year-old handyman from Fleming Island, was charged with her murder.

Officials with the State Attorney's Office, Clay County Sheriff's Office and the Federal Bureau of Investigation confirmed Mauldin's death – and charges against Binderin – during a Saturday morning joint press conference in Jacksonville.

Binderin had been paid to remodel Mauldin's bathroom. When he didn't do the work, she demanded her money back. She was reported missing shortly after that.

"This morning we are confirming the remains of 65-year-old Clay County resident Susan Mauldin were recovered last week from Chesser Island Landfill in Folkston, Georgia," State Attorney Melissa Nelson said. "Last night [Friday], 45-year-old Corey Binderim was detained for the murder of Susan Mauldin."

Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels said detectives found evidence inside her home that connected her disappearance to Binderin. The agency's initial focus was at the Rosemary Hill Waste Management Transfer Facility in Green Cove Springs. Detectives then shifted their search to an area the size of "a baseball diamond" at the Chesser Island Landfill.

"Information developed early on in the investigation that the Rosemary Hill Waste Management Transfer Facility in Clay County, Florida, was a place of interest for the detectives," Daniels said. "This facility is a transfer station for Clay County waste to be moved to the Chesser Island Landfill in Folkston, Georgia. The Clay County Sheriff's Office contacted the FBI for assistance for this part of the investigation. Several logistical meetings were held be-

tween the Clay County Sheriff's Office, the FBI, the State Attorney's Office and Waste Management. A search area was identified and secured, and a logistical search into the landfill continued until a search date was established."

As many as 213 officials from Florida and Georgia law enforcement agencies, as well as the FBI, scoured the area, sifting through nearly 7,300 tons of garbage until a correction's officer with CCSO found a partial skull on Jan. 29, FBI Special Agent in Charge Rachel Rojas said. Mauldin was positively identified two days later.

"We know how difficult this is for all of Susan Mauldin's friends and neighbors," Rojas said. "But we're also pleased and thankful that we have some answers we can provide.

"The Chesser Island Landfill is very

organized. They directed us to the area where she was most likely to be and they preserved that area. The held it by diverting all incoming debris to other areas of the landfill. Over the next few weeks, Clay County detectives pushed their investigation forward until they felt a search could be the key to this."

"Without the FBI, we would not have found Susan Mauldin," Nelson said.

Daniels said he doesn't believe anyone else was involved in Mauldin's death.

Binderin was arrested for forgery on Dec. 2 and was in the Duval County Jail when Mauldin's body was found. He's expected in court in Jacksonville for that charge on Thursday. He then will be taken to Clay County to face charges of second-degree murder and tampering with evidence. Mauldin is the first person found at the landfill since deputies unearthed the remains of 7-year-old Somer Thompson in 2009. She was kidnapped while walking home from Grove Park Elementary in Orange Park on Oct. 19. Her body was discovered two days later at Chesser Island.

Authorities also believe a missing Nassau County hairstylist Joleen Cummings' remains are buried at Chesser Island. She's been missing since 2018.

Nelson said federal, state and local agencies worked tirelessly to find Mauldin.

"This is like searching for a needle in a haystack," Nelson said. "They did this for one reason: A relentless search for truth."

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

Elsewhere in the county, three two-lane roads will grow to become four-lane roads. They are: C.R. 218 from Pine Tree Lane to Cosmos Avenue, C.R. 220 from Baxley Road to Henley Road and C.R. Road 209 from C.R. 315B to U.S. 17. Those carry costs \$20.4 million, \$12.4 million and \$9.3 million, respectively.

The First Coast Connection will increase the road from U.S. 17 to C.R. 315 from two lanes to a 1.6-mile stretch of four lanes for a cost of \$15.2 million. That's a stretch of 1.6 miles. A new two-lane road connecting C.R. 315 to the First Coast Expressway, for to 2.9 miles, will also be built as part of the connection for \$24.8

million. The total cost of the First Coast Connection project is \$40 million.

Most of these projects include stormwater drains, ditches and gutters alongside the roads and some include sidewalks and other pedestrian-focused amenities.

"These [projects] are all on a five-year timeline," Wanamaker said.

The county is taking out \$130 million in bonds to cover the cost of this project, but the grand total for the construction is \$124.2 million. Commissioner Gavin Rollins said the board anticipates putting the leftover \$5.8 million in reserves. He also said the road projects won't dismiss other road work like repaving and the paving of dirt roads. That will still happen during all of this as the two do not

affect each other. All of the projects will happen concurrently and not on a staggered timeline. Wanamaker said drivers can expect increased traffic as a result, but he said the final product will alleviate the traffic problems currently plaguing the targeted areas.

The public still can't voice its opinion at the Feb. 11 BCC meeting. A town hall will be held on Feb. 14 and the final vote will be at the Feb. 25 meeting.

"People will like it and people won't," Commission Chairman Gayward Hendry said. "I notice once you deal with something a while, it's not as painful as when you start. Your body and mind acclimatize to whatever was negative to start with and I think that's what we're going to experience with this."

The ordinance doesn't, in most cases, apply to residents looking to remove a tree on their private property. Orange Park Director of Economic and Community Development Stephen Smith said the ordinance is for commercial development and for rare cases of residential development. He said for the most part, residents looking to take down a tree in their yard don't need to worry about the fee.

"It would have to be a large amount [for



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the fee to kick in]," Smith said.

If this ordinance is passed at the second reading, the fees will be \$165 an inch of Live Oak tree, with the diameter being measured from a person's breast height, and \$148 an inch for other types of trees.

Rules and regulations didn't stop with the tree fee discussion as the council swiftly to the town's noise ordinance. Orange Park Police Department officers are currently required to use a noise meter, according to Town Manager Sarah Campbell.

"Not every officer has one though," Campbell said.

The noise ordinance amendment that passed with a 5-0 vote which makes the process more subjective in nature. Campbell said it allows officers to use a reasonable test that takes important factors into context like time of day and area. The officers can use factors like these and others to subjectively determine if someone is outside the limits of the town's noise regulations.

The council also approved an ordinance

amendment to prevent vehicles from being parked in the front yard of a home with a 5-0 vote. Vehicles can only be parked on a driveway in the front yard of a house with this ordinance in effect. It does however have some wiggle room.

"Nothing shall prevent a property owner from parking in that portion of the front lawn between the driveway and nearest side lot line," the ordinance reads.

In other business, the town council has begun discussions on a possible change to the way it allows for public comments at meetings. Public commenters receive three minutes on the podium before a beeper sounds.

Many wished to speak for longer than the allotted three minutes. The council discussed some options, but opted to push the discussion to the next meeting to give council members and residents a chance to determine a solution





Nix lone title for Eagles runner-up spot


Clay third at Gorman Invite





Though Fleming Island won overwhelmingly, it was Clay who threw the first salvo with 106 pounder Tazz Hampton, a state qualifier last year for Middleburg High School, taking down Hunter Herrington 8-6 in a tough opening match to stall out the Fleming Island shut out attempt.

2018: Eagles win third Tussle

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — An ominous start to the Tussle of Muscle wrestling dual match between Clay and Fleming Island high school's was in the very first match with Clay senior Connor Green securing his first win in the annual event staged at Clay High School on Thurs., Feb. 8.

Green, a recipient of two of the quickest pins in Tussle of Muscle history, roared out of the gate in the first match of the night, at 160 pounds against Fleming Island's Trace Insalaco, and went right to work to not repeat history with a first period ferocity that excited the hometown crowd, but, nonetheless, scored just two points. Insalaco,

awarded technical violation points via the throws, ended the first stanza at 2-2.

Insalaco continued his savvy wrestling to go up 6-2 with Green punching up a reversal to end the second stanza at 6-4.

As the Clay strong crowd anticipated a rebuttal in the third period, Green, injured last year and sixth in Class 1A two years ago, delivered with an escape and final throw to win 9-8.

A lightning-fast Spradle pin by Fleming Island's Ryan Smenda over Joseph Grelli at 220 that put the score at 12-9 Fleming Island as the rivalry continued to heat up and live up to its history.

The turnaround in scoring started at 285 with Fleming Island's Jose Concepcion outlasting Clay's Ryan Rivers for a 2-1 win followed by a 15-0 tech fall from Lou Gagliardo at 106 over Justin Byler, a 9-1 major win by Briar Jackson over Daniel Porter at 113, a forfeit to Albie Snedaker at 120; an 8-2 win by Jacob Sandoval over Cale Hoskinson at 126, a forfeit to Jaquan English at 132 and a final comefrom-behind thriller from Tyler Williams

over Clay's Grant Stanish at 138. Williams fell behind 5-2 in the second period, then grabbed an escape with a minute left in the third period before taking Stanish down as the buzzer sounded; forcing overtime. In the overtime, Williams hit the first takedown for the 7-5 win.

With the match locked up for Fleming Island, Clay veterans Peyton Hughes and Dylan Taylor both won the final two matches; Hughes, an 8-3 win over Vince Hauser and Taylor, a 5-2 win over Luke Chop.

2017: Tussle of Muscle blowout goes to Fleming Island

FLEMING ISLAND – A knockout blow from a returning wrestler that took a two-year hiatus erupted the Fleming Island and Clay high school wrestling world to fuel a Tussle of Muscle win, 42-12, for the Fleming Island High wrestling team in Wednesday's annual event bent on showing off the best wrestling in Clay County and, arguably north Florida. The win, Fleming Island's second in two years, did not come with an excruciating final tally of takedowns, first points and escapes as did last year's Tussle that was decided on an eighth critera tiebreaker.

"Ben (160-pounder Ben Sann, a senior for Fleming Island) is a hammer that had some injuries over the past couple of years but he has always had Fleming Island wrestling in his blood," said Fleming Island coach P.J. Cobbert. "He had some issues coming back with his endurance and stamina, but he has worked his butt off. We knew what he could do. I don't think Clay knew what he could do."


What Sann did was annihilate Clay High's Justin Merring, a top 160-pounder in the Class 1A ranks with a number three ranking in Class 1A, with a lighting fast pin of 26 seconds that started an avalanche of Golden Eagle wins en route to the lopsided victory.



Lady Knights give Jenkins one more game

JACKSONVILLE – A steal of an inbounds pass by guard Geniyah Durante that turned into two more free throws was enough to stymie a five point swing by Nease High and give the Oakleaf High Lady Knights basketball team a 70-65 district 1-7A tournament win for Oakleaf coach Frank Jenkins.

"We are not going to play a pretty game," said Jenkins, who has planned this season as his final for coaching basketball in north Florida after a 40 year career. "We fight and fight and claw and claw. That's what we do."

Against Nease just two weeks ago, Jenkins pulled out a 41-28 win over Nease High's 2019 National Girls Basketball Coach of the Year Sherri Anthony at Nease that snapped a 49 game home win streak. Anthony's resume includes a state title (1999), nine district titles, eight Sweet Sixteen wins and two Elite Eight wins as well as a state runnerup finish last year; 43-40 to Miami Dillard.

"Now, we have to duplicate it tomorrow only a little bit better," said Jenkins, 16-10, who next faces Flagler Palm Coast in the district semifinals. "Flagler Palm Coast is huge."

Jenkins, wno came to Oakleaf High School 10 years ago when the doors were opened after a stellar 19-year tenure at Wolfson High in Jacksonville, said jokingly that the youthful vigor of his young Oakleaf team; led by freshman Kaylah Turner's 16 points per game and freshman Fantasia James' 10 points per game would not be enough to pursuade him to stay for one more season.

"Forty years is enough," said Jenkins.

After falling behind 37-33 at the half-time break with Nease converting a handful of steals to layups, Jenkins directed a second half of hockey-like line changes to keep the pace very high Nease shooting guard Stephanie Manherz (13 points per game) and 6'-0" center Cecilia Molis, who had a decided height advantage to battle Oakleaf senior center Dejah Oden.

"We don't have size, but we just keep going up and down the court and going after loose balls," said Jenkins. "Dejah did as good as anyone against their very good center."

In the second half, Nease was able to inch away from the start with Oakleaf clawing back to tie at 43-43 with Durante converting half court steals to layups on top of James hitting a jumper at the behest of Jenkins yelling, "Shoot, Shoot."

Nease attempted to sneak away late in

the third, but Durante struck with a three pointer that tied the game at 50-50 just before the end of the stanza with Nease upping to 52-50.

James popped off three straight buckets to keep the game at 56-56 before Durante stepped up and back and floated a go-ahead jumper at 61-60 with 2:27 to go.

Another Durante missed shot, offensive rebound, layup pushed Oakleaf up 63-60.

A double team trap foul between Turner and Martina Ramsey gave Nease a free throw with Oden falling with a rebound giving Molis a free layup and Nease a 66-65 gap before Durante made her steals and free throws to finish the game, 70-65.

ward for a while for a win in this match. The win at Flagler was icing on the cake."

With Clay powering to a 6-21 early lead with wins in the lower weights starting with freshman Lou Gagliardi at 106 over Fleming Island's Albie Snedaker, Clay looked to be running away with the match early.

Clay High coach Jim Reape watched as his early lead slowly got chopped down with methodical precision as Fleming Island got a win at 126 from Tracy Davis over Dale Browning, both state qualifiers. Fleming Island then lost two rematches between Clay's Derek Miller and Xaiver Sampsel at 132 and Julian Summa over Fleming Island sophomore Paul Detwiler at 138. Sampsel and Detwiler both won the first matches with Miller and Summa at the Westside Kiwanis Invite earlier in the season.

Detwiler entered the mat against Sawdo and showed off the same grittiness of his three years with the two stalemating at 0-0 after the first period. Detwiler then fought his way out for an escape point as the Fleming Island bench erupted.

"I did not know what my mat stamina was going to be," said Detwiler.

In the third, Sawdo was able to get away from Detwiler to tie the score at 1-1 as time ran out with Detwiler nearly punching up a takedown in the final seconds only to have it ruled out of bounds.

In the overtime period, Sawdo, starting on the bottom of the referee's position, quickly escaped for the winning point.

"David will always be one of the guys Fleming Island will remember for his courage at the least," said Cobbert. "I think he did okay out there and it gave us a push."

FLEMING ISLAND - In a seemingly eye for an eye rebuttal, Clay High senior Adam Breindel answered Fleming Island High's Anthony Petrelli's lightning-fast 11-second pin at 145 pounds with his own 36-second pin at 152 to fuel a Blue Devil surge that wound up a 34-27 wrestling dual match win for Clay Wednesday night at Fleming Island High School.

"What's funny about tonight with all the rivalry and craziness is that this is the first time I have ever won in this matchup with Fleming Island," said Breindel, the Class 1A defending champion at 145 pounds. "Last year, I lost by pin (to Fleming Island's John Martorano) and I really wanted to get a win here before I finished at Clay."

Prior to Breindel's fast work of Fleming Island freshman Franco Bello, who stayed off his shoulders three times with a neck


Zapp was named 2018 Junior Player of the Year in Florida.


"Dylan is the first cross country and track runner for us to be able to compete







"Lindsay and Kaila are great friends and training partners," said Clay coach Rodney Keller. "They and the rest of the team truly punch the time clock, as we say, and now we get one more big meet to go out and try to have a great time."

For Ridgeview coach Trentin Davis, the rise of his Panthers teams comes with a strong summer program and adding lifters to weight classes. Having Clay High pushing the girls will make the state meet even that more exciting.

"I think gaining the pieces in different weight classes made a huge difference," said Davis. "We are taking the weekend off to prepare for a hard week of prep; six days straight. 




