In-need students still being fed by school district

As long as classrooms are dark for coronavirus, children still will get breakfast, lunch

CLAY COUNTY – Despite being closed as a precaution to the coronavirus pandemic, some district schools still are offering breakfast and lunch to students in need.

After Clay County confirmed a 57-year-old man as the first case of coronavirus, Superintendent David Broskie announced all schools will close and remain closed

until at least March 30, which includes scheduled Spring Break from March 23-30.

Students still got breakfast and lunch from March 16-20.

"As part of our ongoing efforts to minimize the impact on our students, I am

Grateful family reunited with teenager who saved them

Cole Adam receives Kingsley Lake Yacht Club Life Saving Award after saving family of four

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – A family was reunited with their rescuer at Kingsley Lake Park on Saturday.

Jon and Megan Tawney were on a kayak with their two children in February when the kayak began to capsize. Fortunately, the family had life jackets, but they were stranded in Kingsley Lake for over an hour. Emergency Management Services was present at the scene but without a boat, they weren't much help.

Cole Adam, 16, however, had a jet ski

that would save the lives of the Tawneys.

"He quite literally saved us," Megan said.

When Adam found out that a family was stranded on the lake, he did what "anybody should do" and got in the water to help. Jon had called 911 minutes after the boat capsized and to the credit of EMS, they arrived shortly after. They didn't have a boat, though, so the Tawneys had to tread water until Adam arrived on his jet ski with an EMS member.

Adam first put the two children on the jet ski and took them to safety on the shore. He then returned to Jon and Megan. The Tawneys rescue journey didn't end there. They were taken to Orange Park Medical

Morgan returns to Orange Park after carving out Panama Canal

In January of 1880, Nellie Morgan was born during a viciously cold Boston winter. That winter was so cold that the family along with many others took comfort in hovering closely together around a smoky fireplace and reading aloud the glowing magazine and newspaper accounts touting the balmy temperatures in sunny Florida.

Her father, a skilled shipbuilder was confident of immediate employment because of the rapidly growing opportunities for his craft in Jacksonville.

Nellie's father departed to Florida to arrange employment at the shipyards and purchase property in Switzerland, just across the St. Johns River from Orange Park. In 1882, Nellie and her mother joined him and soon after sister, Julia was born.

The family frequently traveled by boat across the river to visit and trade in Orange Park. Since the town was founded by and attracted many settlers from the Boston area, they at once made friends and developed close ties in the new community.

Mrs. Church an educated and refined woman early on encouraged her daughters in reading, fine sewing, etiquette and hospitality. In their free time, they fished and crabbed in the river.

Often, they spent whole afternoons swinging, long petticoats flying, through the tall live oaks clinging to ancient thick vines. At the proper age, the girls went to school in nearby Orange Park. Every morning they were bundled still sleepy eyed into the rowboat for the trip across the river and deposited on the dock. A short walk two blocks up broad sandy Kingsley Avenue, then a right on Reed brought then to the two-story schoolhouse.



Nellie Morgan thrived in the cosmopolitan society of young couples drawn to the American construction of the Panama Canal. These decorative reptiles were probably more familiar to her.

In June of 1889, Nellie married Stanley Morgan an Orange Park boy and former schoolmate. The newlyweds settled in Philadelphia. After the death of their first and only child, they looked for a change of scene and traveled to the Isthmus of Panama. Construction of the Panama Canal brought together an international group of professionals and briefly carved out a happy and cosmopolitan community in the dense South American jungles.

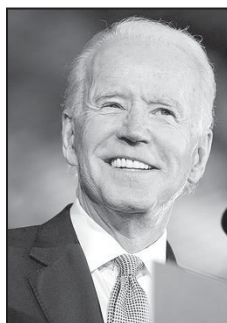
At the proper age, the girls went to school in nearby Orange Park. Every morning they were bundled still sleepy eyed into the rowboat for the trip across the river and deposited on the dock. A short walk two blocks up broad sandy Kingsley Avenue, then a right on Reed brought then to the two-story schoolhouse.

In 1909, Stanley and Nellie returned to Orange Park and purchased the old Helfrich home at 1200 Plainfield Ave. in Orange Park. The house was small and dark.

The yard was nearly barren except for a pitiful Spanish bayonet standing sentinel near the street. The original owner had planted the entire property right up to the foundation in orange trees that were frozen to the roots by the infamous Florida freezes of the late 1800s. Nellie ordered cabinets, bookcases, fireplace mantles, doors and windows from a catalog. When they arrived by boat from Jacksonville, she hired local carpenters to install them and add a sunroom to the southern side of the house. Every room danced with sunlight but the pitiful state of the yard was visible from every room.

Nellie and her hired helpers transplanted live and laurel oaks from the woods. Friends shared cuttings of camellias and azaleas. She supervised the construction of a grape arbor and planted mail order Scuppernong grapes. Years later, when Nellie hired neighborhood boys to pick grapes from the lush arbor, she always laughing told them to whistle the whole time they picked.

CLAY COUNTY - Despite residents becoming wary of coronavirus, more than 29,000 Clay County residents helped give Joe Biden and President Donald Trump resounding victories in Tuesday's Florida Primary. Biden won his race with 61.44% of the vote, garnering 6,706 of 10,915

ballots cast by county Democrats. Trump earned 17,745 of 18,579 votes from Republicans. Trump's Florida victory clinched the Republican nomination for the general election. Statewide, Biden beat Democrat challenger Bernie Sanders by 39.1 points, while Trump easily outdistanced his challengers with 93.8% of the votes.

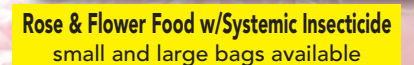

Bradley defends state budget 'sprinkle list' as 'smoothing rough edges'

The outlines of the FY 20-21 budget are finalized, including the "sprinkle list": a list of 170 local projects blessed by state funds by the Senate and 124 by the House.

In the age of coronavirus and a seemingly inevitable recession, the sprinkle list holds, and budget chairs defended it Saturday when announcing a budget deal, even as neither they nor staff could say how much money was devoted to it.

Senate budget chief Rob Bradley (Rep.-Fleming Island) said, in an extended back and forth with Matt Dixon of POLITICO Florida, that "both sides presented ... and accepted ... offers."

Bradley said, "this is a budget over \$90 billion and we're doing it in a compressed time period."

"When you get to the end," Bradley said, "it's only natural that you smooth some rough edges, because you don't catch everything."

"In any negotiation, when you're dealing with that kind of money ... it's very natural to put some money aside ... I'm proud of the list."

House budget chief Travis Cummings (Rep.-Fleming Island) added "health care issues ... the most vulnerable Floridians ... environmental and water quality issues."

Whether "members" or "special interest groups," Cummings said that they speak with presiding officers and try to get "consideration."

Bradley rejected the idea that campaign contributions influenced the list.

Some highlights of the Senate sheet:

Money for colleges and universities populated the list: \$12.5 million for University of Florida operations; \$6.8 million for FGCU – School of Integrated Watershed and Coastal Studies; \$3 million for State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota – Parrish Center; and Bethune Cookman University – Operational Support got \$1 million.

As well, University of Central Florida – Florida Center For Nursing got \$75,000. The University of Florida Lastinger Center – Algebra Nation Florida – Statewide Digital Math got \$500,000. The University of South Florida – Cybersecurity Initiative emerged with \$627,500. University of South Florida Sarasota/Manatee – Operational Support got \$2.5 million.

As well, Edward Waters College got \$2 million for operational support.

Water and sewer projects were like-

Support SB 230, HB 713

Bill would require 911 operators to tell callers how to perform CPR

To whom it may concern,

Several years ago, my wife went into cardiac arrest. She was just 38. Fortunately, I was able to do hands-only CPR until paramedics arrived and used their training to help. Thank goodness I did. It saved her life.

When there is an emergency, we know to dial 911, but are you aware that 911 operators in Florida are not required to know how to explain how to perform hands-only CPR? Dispatchers who answer these calls are often our first point of contact and have the unique opportunity to help callers as they wait for first responders to arrive. In moments when every second is critical, they are the gateway to our emergency response system.

To ensure all dispatchers are trained and able to coach bystanders on how to perform CPR, I ask that you please include telecommunicator CPR in the Health Department package bill, SB 230 and HB 713.

Cardiac arrest is among the leading causes of death in the United States, where more than 350,000 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests occur each year. It strikes suddenly and without warning, and what happens in the first few minutes can mean the difference between life and death. For every minute without CPR, survival from a witnessed cardiac arrest decreases 7-10%. Given the protracted emergency medical service response times in many rural areas, the need for CPR to be initiated prior to EMS arrival is even greater.

wise in the Senate mix.
Clay County Utility Authority Saratoga Springs Water Treatment Plant came out with \$1,000,000 in new money. Naples Bay Red Tide Septic Tank Mitigation Program – Design of Phase 2 emerged with \$950,000. St. Pete Beach Sanitary Sewer Expansion Project emerged with \$500,000.
A million dollars was allocated by the Senate for certified DOC teachers, with a \$1 million appropriation to raise pay 15%.
Some non-governmental actors got into the Senate mix: Bascom Farms/Sturgeon Aquafarms came out with \$1.425 million. The Italian Club of Tampa emerged \$1 million richer. And Tampa’s Straz Center for Performing Arts emerged with \$750,000. The Live Like Bella Childhood Cancer Foundation got \$250,000. And Floridians for Puerto Rico got \$500,000. Florida Debate Initiative, meanwhile, got a million dollars.
Moving to the House list, university money was likewise a big spend.
Florida International University, where a former staffer for Speaker Jose Oliva works in governmental relations, got \$17 million for operational costs. Additionally, FIU got \$1 million for the Institute for Economic Freedom and another \$1 million for targeted STEM initiatives.
At \$19 million, they’re the biggest win-

And if you’re like me, you can’t wait for sports to return. My mind is tired from being used to process information, not relax during a good ballgame.

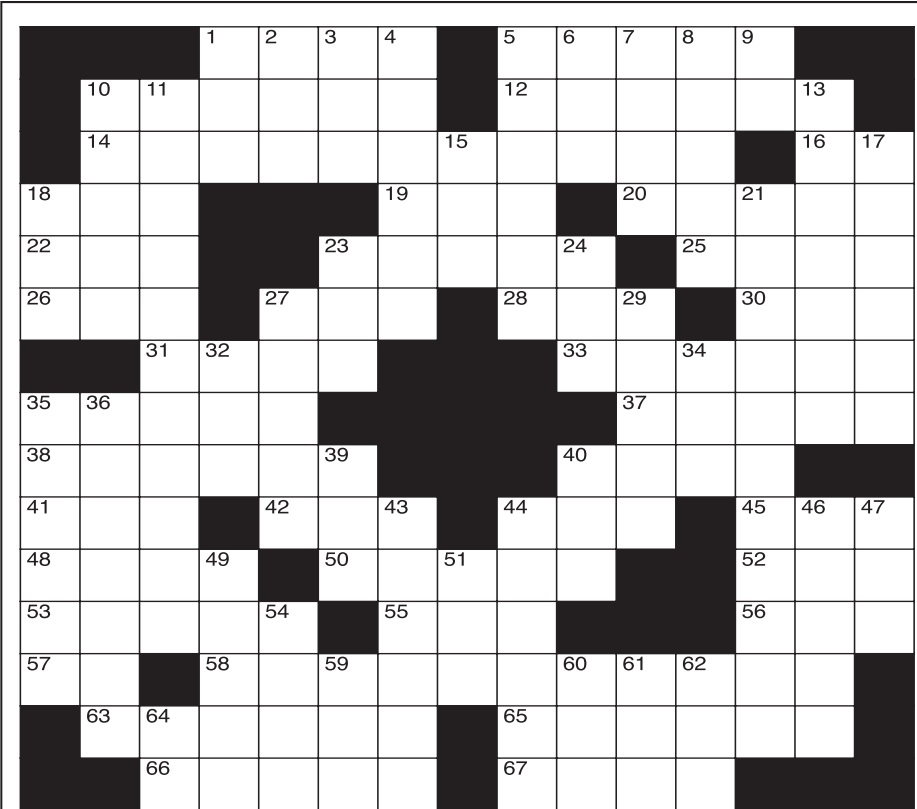
ners from the budget. Other Miami-Dade scores include Nova Southeastern University, which scored \$1,625,000 for its Veterans Access Clinic. And Miami Dade College Operations, which got \$4,412,496 for operations.
Also winning: Gulf Coast State College, which got \$2 million for a STEM building, Embry-Riddle got \$1 million for its Center for Aerospace Resilience. Nova Southeastern University scored \$1.625 million for its Veterans Access Clinic.
UF, which got \$12.5 million for operational support from the Senate, got the same number from the House.
Universities of Distinction money went to the University of North Florida and Florida Gulf Coast University, meanwhile.
The Job Growth Grant Fund, an incentive program once funded at the \$85 million level by Gov. Rick Scott, took a major trim: down now to \$20 million.
With QTIs, or qualified targeted incentives, stripped out of the House tax package, it appears that bit by bit the legacy of incentive-driven deals is being eroded.

Dispatchers can and should be trained to provide CPR instructions to bystanders. They can coach callers with real-time, step-by-step instructions, enabling these callers to become lifesavers while awaiting EMS arrival. This is known as dispatcher-assisted CPR (or telephone CPR). Our goal is to ensure that all dispatchers receive this training, and as a result, all callers are provided with these important instructions.
Dispatcher-assisted CPR has been shown to significantly increase bystander CPR rates and cardiac arrest survival. It has the potential to increase the chances by 15% of a bystander to step in and perform CPR. Even trained bystanders may need coaching during what are difficult

and often frantic times, and those without previous CPR knowledge can quickly be instructed.
Dispatcher-assisted CPR is also an effective and low-cost strategy to improve cardiac arrest survival. Still, it remains underutilized. More comprehensive implementation of CPR prearrival instructions has the potential to save many lives each year. I ask you to please support and include telecommunicator CPR in the Health Department package bill, SB 230 and HB 713, ensuring all dispatchers are trained and able to provide this life-saving instruction.

OP couple earns accolades for distinguished career on the road

ORANGE PARK – A local couple who spend their days together driving across the country are being given a special award for their efforts.

Couples drive all over the United States all the time, but what about couples that do so in a tractor trailer go from Florida to Tennessee to California in a matter of days? Karen and Richard Black of Orange Park spend about one week at home together for every six to seven weeks they spend on the road, but don't worry, those six to seven weeks on the road are spent together, too.

"We love it," Richard said. "We're always together. She drives through the day and I drive through the night so we're always driving."

Richard and Karen have been together for almost nine years and they've been driving semis together for almost five of those years. For them, it just made sense.

Both have a prior history in the military. Karen was in the Navy and Richard was in the Air Force. Richard, however, has been driving semis for 15 years. While Richard was driving, Karen raised their youngest child until they graduated in 2015. With children out of school, Karen decided that she wanted to drive semis, too.

"The freedom is really nice," Karen said. "It can get hectic, of course, with other drivers and traffic, but you get to see the country, and in our case, we get to see it together."

"When we go through [somewhere] we like, we're always saying, 'Let's go there one day.'"

Karen and Richard know their situation is unique. They've actually seen similar situations go the opposite way.

"We've known couples driving together and the two will get in a fight and the wife takes off in the truck without the husband," Karen said. "You really have to like the person you're with."

The Karen and Richard tag-team are so effective the company they work for, U.S. Xpress, named them drivers of the month in November. U.S. Xpress picks a driver of the month for each month to create a pool of 12 truck teams. The company then picks a driver of the year out of that pool and Richard and Karen are set to receive that honor this year.

"It's awesome to be recognized for this because we're practically always on the road and they (U.S. Xpress based in Tennessee) don't really know us beyond our work," Karen said. "So to be recognized for this, it means our work really speaks for

itself and that's a nice feeling."

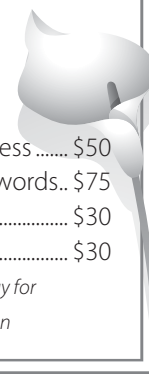

County wary state may allow tourism dollars to be spent on infrastructure

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Tourism Development Council could soon be using funds to pay for infrastructure, building maintenance and sewage work if Florida House of Representatives legislation gets passed.

The committee got some good news at their March 11 meeting. Bed tax collections are up more than 16% for January, month over month and new sports events are coming to the county.

But there was one issue Tourism Director Kimberly Morgan said wasn't good. "There is one other [piece of legislation] I really want you all to pay attention to because it affects this board directly," Morgan said. "It's the taxation legislation. The House has really requested that they expand permissible uses of the [Tourism Development Tax] to include road construction, water and sewer infrastructure, and parks and recreation."

Those costs are paid for by other departments in the county government and they tend to take up a large amount of funds, especially in the case of road construction and water and sewer infrastructure. If the legislation passes, some of the county's tourism department's funds would likely be open to use for those kinds of things.

TDC member Pat Sickles said she thought the legislation only applied to TDT amounts more than \$16 million, which means it wouldn't apply to Clay County. Morgan said whether or not the funds come out of Clay County's TDT, the county would feel the effects of funding coming out of other larger county's tourism de-

partments. "If our neighbors to the north and east who have those budgets [more than \$16 million] are impacted, that directly impacts us whether we like it or not," Morgan said. "We reap the benefits from their marketing dollars. "When that starts to happen, and their marketing dollars are threatened to go toward infrastructure, then the pipeline to

refuel the engine of economic development goes away." TDC chair and county commissioner Mike Cella said he's against the idea and would work to prevent Clay County specifically from dipping into TDT funds to cover the cost of projects usually covered by other departments. The legislation is currently brewing in the Florida House and is bundled in with

a lot of other tax legislation, Morgan said. Before it can come to fruition, it must first be passed by the House and then the Senate. Cella said that the Senate has been great at continuing the funding of Florida tourism, especially in spite of a House that hasn't been too keen on doing the same.

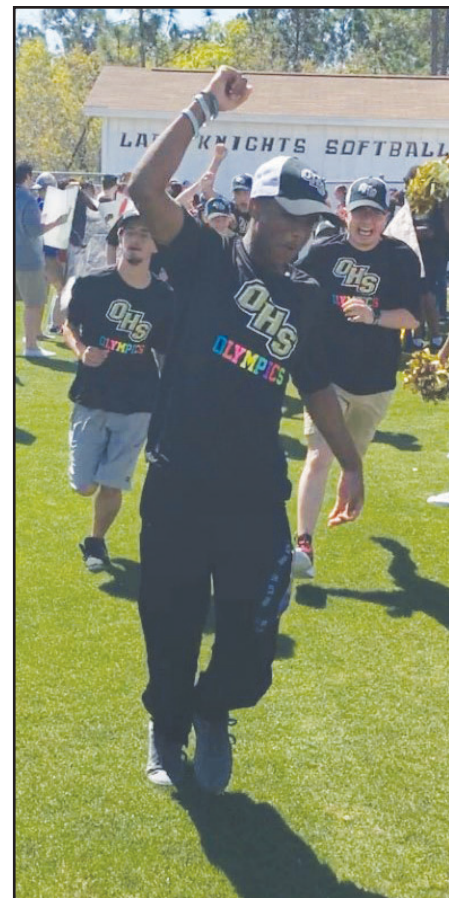

Ride services prepare for bumpy road created by coronavirus

Uber, Lyft fit cars with cleaning supplies, instructions to safeguard riding public

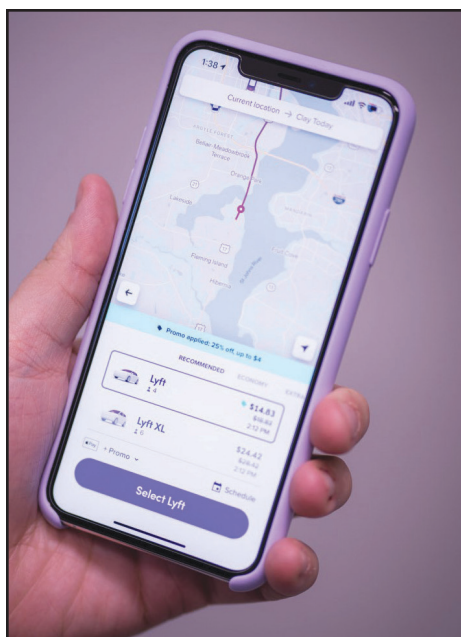
CLAY COUNTY — As the coronavirus continues to spread through the nation, ride services like Lyft and Uber are asking drivers to clean more often and stay home if they're sick.

The country has seen a push for social distancing. And while Lyft and Uber aren't slowing their services down during the outbreak, it is asking its drivers to take more caution moving forward with the driving jobs they take.

"The safety and well-being of everyone who uses Uber is always our priority," Uber representatives said in a statement. "We are actively monitoring the coronavirus [COVID-19] situation and are taking steps to help keep our communities safe."

Uber has a 24/7 team available to help public health authorities in response to the epidemic, the company says. That team will work to temporarily suspend the accounts of both riders and drivers confirmed to have the virus. Those who've exposed to or in contact with someone who has the virus also will have their accounts suspended.

Uber is asking drivers with the virus to self-isolate. Those that do will receive fi-



to the drivers. Lyft will suspend rider and driver accounts of people that test positive for the Virus. Drivers affected by a suspension will receive funds from Lyft.

"We will provide funds to drivers should they be diagnosed with COVID-19 or put under individual quarantine by a public health agency," a Lyft representative said. "This helps support drivers financially when they can't drive, while also protecting our riders' health."

"These funds will be given to affected

drivers who are identified to us by public health officials or who contact our support team to self-report and provide documentation that they have been diagnosed with COVID-19 or put under individual quarantine by a public health agency. We will provide funds to affected drivers based on the rides they provided on the Lyft platform over the last four weeks."

Clay County officials confirmed a fourth positive test for coronavirus on Tuesday.

COVID-19 forcing local theaters to slowly close the curtains on movies, audiences

CLAY COUNTY — As COVID-19 cases continue to pop up in Northeast Florida, theaters in the area are adjusting how their systems work.

AMC Theaters in Orange Park closed March 17, as did the rest of AMC theaters nationwide. That group will remain closed for six to 12 weeks. But before enacting that measure, their theater capacity numbers were halved. This was a nationwide policy enacted in the name of social distancing for AMC.

"We are ever so disappointed for our

moviegoing guests and for our employee teams that the new CDC guidelines that Americans should not gather in groups larger than 10 people make it impossible to open our theaters," AMC CEO Adam Aron said. "Still, the health and well-being of AMC guests and employees, and of all Americans, takes precedence above all else."

The other theater in Clay County, New Vision Theaters Fleming Island 12, is increasing the frequency of its usual cleanings. Leigh Ann Rassler, marketing director of the theater, said that the theater already cleans and sanitizes its surfaces,

Baptist Health's Oakleaf ER on guard for COVID-19

OAKLEAF — Medical facilities nationwide are taking all possible precautions in the wake of the coronavirus outbreak. The new Baptist and Wolfson Oakleaf ER is no exception.

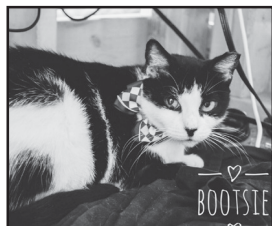

Churches move services online to keep parishioners healthy

CLAY COUNTY – Many churches in the area have moved nearly exclusively online for the time being as a result of the coronavirus.

As the coronavirus, or COVID-19, continues to spread through the states, churches in Clay County are doing their part in the community to flatten the curve. As social gatherings get replaced by social distancing, congregations in Clay County will be getting their Sunday morning praise and worship through livestreams.

“This is not a decision we have made lightly or out of fear, but in faith for two primary reasons,” Church of Eleven22 Pastor Joby Martin said in a statement. “[One], honoring the authority of our governing officials who have urged caution around large group gatherings and [two], desiring to care well for those in our community and church family as we all navigate this challenging season.”

Martin said the church is excited to seize the opportunity to livestream services, which is already done every Sunday, and “use technology in a positive way, reducing our spiritual distance with each other and the Lord.” All official Eleven22 events, gatherings and classes scheduled through March 18 were canceled. Off-campus disciple groups, however, were still on and able to meet at the discretion of each

group.

Russell Baptist Church held its regular Sunday worship last week but asked nobody to offer food or drinks in Sunday School classes. Sunday night services have been canceled indefinitely, Pastor Patrick Martin said. He asked that if anyone feels sick or is already immune-deficient, that they stay home.

“And for goodness sakes, wash your hands,” Martin said. “Sing through the first stanza of ‘Amazing Grace’ and keep washing until you get to the end. That’s roughly 20 seconds, which the CDC says is necessary to kill germs.”

Hibernia Baptist Church held three worship services the last Sunday, but held no study groups, preschool ministry, children ministry or foundations. The church also canceled all regularly scheduled weekday activities that were set to take place on site.

The church already livestreams its 9:30 a.m. and 10:58 a.m. services and will continue to do so, encouraging those who feel sick or are immune-deficient to get their Sunday worship in online rather than at the church.

Lake Asbury Baptist Church livestreamed its services last Sunday and encouraged in-house attendees to sit with ample distance between each other. It also asked members to refrain from shaking hands and hugging.

theaters and other areas with high foot traffic often but is increasing its frequency of those cleanings as a result of COVID-19.

The theater is also capping its attendance, much like AMC did before closing all of its theaters.

“In an effort to provide our guests with the safest and most comfortable environment possible, we are also reducing the overall capacity in all of our locations by 50% effective immediately and continuing until April 30, 2020,” Ressler said.

She said the theater is also taking aggressive steps to provide additional space between guests in pursuit of the best social distancing practices. Guests will not be able to use refillable popcorn buckets,

but they can have new one to receive a free large popcorn for the same price as a bucket refill.

While moviegoers continue to buy tickets to theaters, the number of movies in the theater available for viewing could start to dwindle soon depending on how long the virus sticks around.

Blockbusters like Disney's upcoming “Mulan” and Paramount Pictures’ “A Quiet Place Part II” have been indefinitely delayed as a result of the virus. Both were expected to hit theaters this month. Other movies in the pipeline like James Bond's latest venture, No Time to Die, have been delayed as well.

Elsewhere in the world, countries like France and Italy have closed all theaters as a result of COVID-19 as well as businesses like restaurants and coffee shops.

County's health department, EMS join forces to fight COVID-19

Goal is to minimize the spike of infections by taking simple precautions

CLAY COUNTY – The nation's focus is flattening the curve of coronavirus and Emergency Management Service Director John Ward said social distancing is the best way to do that.

As of Wednesday, there currently are four confirmed cases of the virus in Clay County, which is quite low all things considered, but as anyone keeping up with COVID-19 knows, that could change in a matter of days. If Clay County residents can continue to wash their hands, stay home from work when sick, and keep their distance, it could help flatten the rise of the infection.

"The biggest thing we're pushing for right now is the social distancing," Ward said. "We really need folks to take this seriously. We need people to wash their hands and we need them to stay away from large

social gatherings."

Ward said it's important for everyone to follow these guidelines. While children and younger people aren't necessarily at a risk for death if they come down with the disease, people over the age of 65 are at risk, not to mention those of any age already immuno-compromised. We have to reduce younger people from spreading it to older people or those at risk, Clay County Florida Department of Health administrator Heather Huffman said.

Ward warned students out of school as a result of the virus shouldn't use the free time as an excuse to hang out with friends or go to gatherings. He said the same applies to those working at home. Gov. Ron DeSantis' original recommendation regarding gatherings was no more than 1000 people. That number soon dropped to 250 and then 50 with DeSantis' warning against any gathering with numerous people.

Huffman said it's important that anyone who feels sick in any way stay home.

"If there's a fever, a cough or anything really, just stay home," Huffman said. "Do not come to work if you're sick."

Fever is the No. 1 indicator, Huffman said, and a dry cough or shortness of breath is a strong sign that you may have the virus. She said there's a lot of other sickness going around too right and some telltale signs that you may be sick with

something other than COVID-19 is aches and pains, coughing and sneezing. She said those symptoms are likely that of a cold or flu.

If you think you might have the virus, Huffman said to call the county's call center for it at (877) 252-9362. It's available all seven days from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. You will be asked to explain your signs and symptoms and then be told about your next steps.

Huffman said going to the emergency room shouldn't be your first step.

"Emergency rooms shouldn't be your first step if you have a sickness like this," Huffman said. "That's more for cardiac arrests and other immediate emergencies. You should always refer to your primary care physician before an [emergency room] for a situation like [COVID-19]."

"What we don't want is someone bringing [the virus] into a hospital so it's important that if you are going to a hospital, you call from the parking lot to let them know. Then, someone can assist you properly from there."

This includes getting a mask and other

making precautions to prevent the possible spread of it inside the building.

Ward said what's most important right now is that people listen to accurate and qualified information. This includes the CDC, the Department of Health and the county's EMS.

"There's a lot of false information out there and that can do a lot of harm," Ward said. "This is not a time to panic, but it is a time to prepare and do your part in helping to flatten the curve."

Instead of buying a year's worth of toilet paper, Ward and Huffman recommend buying enough supplies to last you two weeks. They said a self-quarantine would likely consist of 14 days and everyone needs to be prepared to live exclusively within the confines of their home for those two weeks. That means don't talk to a neighbor and taking a walk in the neighborhood. Self-quarantine means isolation.

"I'd be remiss to not say wash your hands," Huffman said. "Twenty seconds, warm water, sing your ABCs or Happy Birthday. Just make sure there's friction and that you scrub. Couple this with limiting close contact with others."

"We're ahead of the curve of where places like China were at this time [in the cycle] and we can continue to flatten the curve if we all pay attention and follow the guidelines laid out before us."

Bars close, restaurants limit customers to fight coronavirus

ORANGE PARK – John Lewis, who has worked at Cheers on Park Avenue for the past eight years, isn't sure what the future holds after bars in Florida were closed beginning Tuesday night by Gov. Ron DeSantis, in attempts to curb the spread of COVID-19.

All bars that rely more on alcohol sales than food was ordered to close. Restaurants that sell more food than alcohol were allowed to remain open, but only at 50% occupancy.

"A lot of the employees here [Cheers] work paycheck-to-paycheck, including me. I have three kids," said Lewis "A lot of them are concerned about not getting their paychecks. Is there going to be some help from the government?"

According to Lewis, until DeSantis' order there weren't any plans for the popular bar to close. He and the other employees, however, were advised to go onto the website <https://www.usbgfoundation.org/> and to apply for the bartender emergency assistance program.

At Saloon 17 in Green Cove Springs, the sentiments were similar.

"I haven't heard anything about the clo-

sure until today," said one bartender who declined to be identified. "It looks like the economy's going to shut down. I think it's going to cause a ruckus. What are people going to do to live? For today, I haven't gotten any official word. Until someone comes and physically tells me to close, I'll be open."

The doors at Saloon 17 were open at 6 p.m. Tuesday.

Until Tuesday's St. Patrick's Day, there wasn't any significant change in the number of customers, according to the bartender.

"I think it's because a lot of other places may be closed. I took my kids out and the bowling alley and restaurants are empty," the bartender said. "Thirty days will be tough. I live off of tips. I don't know what I'm going to do."

No steers and lots of tears

Clay County Fair canceled in response to COVID-19 pandemic

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – When Tasha Hyder arrived at the Clay County Fair Association office on March 12, she was defiantly certain the county fair would proceed as planned with a grand opening on April 2.

By the time went home, her eyes were puffy from crying and there was a defeated quietness in her voice.

As fear of the coronavirus spread, schedules crumbled like a house of cards, and the widespread panic quickly enveloped the Clay County Agriculture Fair.

For the first time in 34 years, all shows, rides and exhibits will skip their annual trip to the Clay County Fairgrounds this year. The sign in front of the fairgrounds already is counting down the days to next year's event, which is scheduled to start on April 1.

"What's frustrating is we know we're disappointing a lot of people," Hyder said. "We're disappointing our volunteers. We're disappointing the kids in FFA and 4-H. Their hearts are just broken. This impacts so many people in this community. It's gut-wrenching."

"It was a hard decision, but it was an easy decision. When you think about the community we serve, over 50% of our people are elderly who are prone to catching this virus. We're a family affair. How can we consider ourselves a family affair if we continued this event and one of our people gets sick and passes away with it? That wouldn't be a responsible event. When you put that into perspective, it really was an easy decision."

Hyder said her office is working to re-schedule the agriculture and livestock exhibits. She also said those who bought advance tickets with a credit card will automatically receive a refund back onto their card. Those who paid cash should fill out a form on the fair's website, claycountyfair.org.

There were signs of a pending implosion of local events when Hyder learned on March 18 the livestock show and rodeo in Houston had been canceled. Her telephone started ringing here immediately from concerned residents. She calmly reassured there were no plans to cancel this year's fair.

A day later, she was in tears.

"That's how quickly things changed," she said.

The loss of the 10-day event will create a wave of economic losses for the rest of the county. In addition to money lost and not earned at the fairgrounds, local restaurants and hotels will feel the sting of empty rooms, Clay County Director of Tourism and Film Development Kimberly Morgan said.

"It's a tremendous loss," she said. "No. 1, from a quality of life perspective, it's sad. I'm sure it was a hard announcement for them to make."

"On the tourism side, it will have a huge economic impact. We won't have those dollars floating around the county. I think I've cried about 10 times, too. I feel bad, not only for the event planners, but for the small businesses who relied on those visitors walking through their doors."

Hyder said county emergency management service manager John Ward and Clay County Health Department Administrator Heather Huffman were part of an emergency meeting among fair board directors on March 12. It quickly became clear there was only one acceptable response.



"We were 21 days away from the fair. We had to make some decisions," Hyder said. "We have people traveling from all over the place. We couldn't sit and wait. We're taking a huge hit. As of now, we're up to about \$500,000 that we're losing. We're a nonprofit organization. That's a huge hit. The closer we got to the event, the more money we could have lost. That's a financial decision, not a safety one. But it does play a roll. We had to stop the bleeding."

"We just couldn't continue the fair knowing we would be at fault. We had our protocols; we had our policies, cleaning schedules. We were ready to go with the recommended advice. But we just couldn't."

Another factor was fair volunteers.

Many are older and fall into the targeted group who are more likely to suffer the worst symptoms, including death.

"Fifty-percent of our volunteers are over the age of 60. We started seeing them cancel," she said. "At that point, would it be safe for us to continue our fair if we don't know if we have enough manpower to put on a safe event? We are a volunteer-based event."

Hyder said she soon will get started with next year's fair. But for now, her emotions are empty.

"It's been like a funeral around here," she said. "We're a staple of the community. I don't get speechless, but I really don't have words to describe how we're feeling."

It's been weeks since that day on Kingsley Lake and despite the scare, the Tawneys are doing great.

"It was the best worst-day of our lives," Megan said. "I'm just thankful for the hundreds of people involved in getting us to shore safely and getting us back up to health."

Local, state, national officials providing continuous updates on coronavirus

CLAY COUNTY – The Florida Department of Health in Clay County wants residents to know symptoms of COVID-19 are fever, cough and shortness of breath.

Symptoms of COVID-19 are fever, cough and shortness of breath. Symptoms may appear in as few as two days or as many as 14 days following exposure. Most people recover from COVID-19 without needing special treatment. The elderly and those with underlying medical problems like high blood pressure, heart problems and diabetes are more likely to develop serious illness. There is currently no vaccine to prevent COVID-19. The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to the virus.

As of Wednesday, there were 314 confirmed cases of coronavirus in Florida, including 289 among residents and 25 visitors. So far there have been seven deaths reported. Claytodayonline.com will be updated as more information is gathered. There is no charge to use the website.

The origin of the virus for the majority

of cases remain under investigation. So far 136 have been confirmed to involve people who have traveled and 50 who came into contact with an infected person.

There were four cases – all residents – reported in Clay County as of Wednesday.

Nationally, there are 6,519 cases and 100 deaths. The numbers are expected to increase, especially since health officials believe COVID-19 is far from reaching its peak.

In the meantime, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention have issued the following information to better safeguard the country:

Know How it Spreads

- There is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus.
- The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person.
- Between people who are in close contact with one another (within about six feet).



FLEMING ISLAND – Lunchtime traffic is usually bustling along U.S. Highway 17 on Fleming Island, but the threat of COVID-19 (coronavirus) has closed doors at bars, limited on customers in restaurants, resulted delivery services working overtime and created a lack of residents venturing far from their homes.

- Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes.
- These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.

Take steps to protect yourself

- Clean your hands often. Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick
- Put distance between yourself and other people if COVID-19 is spreading in your community. This is especially important for people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.

Take steps to protect others

- Stay home if you are sick, except to get medical care. Learn what to do if you are sick.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow.
- Throw used tissues in the trash.
- Immediately wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

Wear a facemask if you are sick

- You should wear a facemask when you are around other people (e.g., sharing a room or vehicle) and before you enter a healthcare provider's office. If you are not able to wear a facemask (for example, because it causes trouble breathing), then

you should do your best to cover your coughs and sneezes, and people who are caring for you should wear a facemask if they enter your room.

- If you are NOT sick you do not need to wear a facemask unless you are caring for someone who is sick (and they are not able to wear a facemask). Facemasks may be in short supply and they should be saved for caregivers.

Clean and disinfect

- Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily. This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets and sinks.
- If surfaces are dirty, clean them. Use detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.
- To disinfect: most common EPA-registered household disinfectants will work. Use disinfectants appropriate for the surface.

Options include:

- Diluting your household bleach. To make a bleach solution, mix: five tablespoons (1/3rd cup) bleach per gallon of water or four teaspoons bleach for each quart of water.
- Follow manufacturer's instructions for application and proper ventilation. Check to ensure the product is not past its expiration date. Never mix household bleach with ammonia or any other cleanser. Unexpired household bleach will be effective against coronaviruses when properly diluted.
- Alcohol solutions. Ensure solution has at least 70% alcohol.
- Other common EPA-registered household disinfectants. Products with EPA-approved emerging viral pathogens are expected to be effective against COVID-19 based on data for harder to kill viruses. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for all cleaning and disinfection products (e.g., concentration, application method and contact time, etc.).

Jacksonville man jailed for fighting with deputy, K-9 partner

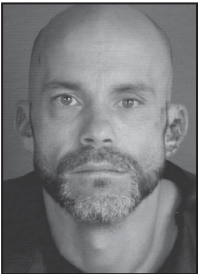
ORANGE PARK – A man was taken to jail March 13 after he fought with sheriff’s office deputies while being questioned about possible illegal drugs.

When Hunt arrived to the Clay County Jail, she was caught trying to hide methamphetamine and a straw during booking.

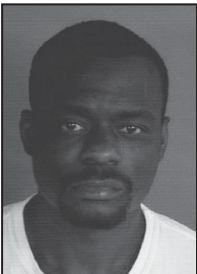
She is being held without bond on the current charges.

ORANGE PARK – The Orange Park Medical Center along with area swim schools and other water safety organizations will be joining together for a Water Safety Day event this Saturday at the Orange Park Mall.

The event will help prepare parents and children for a safe summer. The event will include fun for both children and parents including games and activities for children, children CPR training, water safety education, information on swim lessons and food trucks.

The event will be held 10 a.m.-2 p.m. at the Old Navy parking lot.

“Drowning is a major cause of accidental death for young children and can occur in just centimeters of water,” says Dr. Miren Schinco, Trauma Medical Director and Surgeon at Orange Park Medical Center.

However, drowning is not the only risk. Many different water activities families choose come with their own opportunities for disaster. On average there are 10 deaths a day from unintentional drownings in the United States. One in five people who die from drowning are children 14 and younger.

Dr. Schinco shares these tips to keep your family safe wherever you choose to make a splash this summer.

Poolside

- Private home pools should be enclosed with a safety fence that measures at least four feet high and has a self-latching gate.
- Never use a mobile device, even at home, while supervising children swimming.
- Use diapers designed for use in the water. They do not get as heavy and they help prevent the spread of germs.
- Prevent children from diving through water toys to help prevent a spinal cord injury.

Boating

- The law requires everyone on board to have a life jacket available on the boat.
- Each lifejacket should fit the family

member based on their height and weight.

- Remind children to keep all body parts inside the boat at all times.
- While swimming near a boat, keep children away from the motor, even if the boat’s motor is not running. Lakes and other bodies of water.
- Always enforce the rule that children must inform a parent or supervising adult before they go swimming.
- Another rule for children around bodies of water, especially older children swimming, is that they must be able to see the supervising adult at all times.
- When jumping into natural bodies of water, always jump feet first and be aware of sandbars and other hidden objects in the water.

Other water safety tips

- If children are playing in a sprinkler, pay attention to how slippery the ground is. Move the sprinkler frequently or take a break until the water can soak in.
- Do not keep containers of water, including buckets and kiddie pools, around your home. Empty them frequently.
- Enter children in water safety and swimming lessons by the time they are four. Keep the arms-reach rule with toddlers when around water. This includes bath tubs and beaches, as well as other bodies of water.

“We’re standing by ready for children and their families if an accident happens,” said Dr. Schinco. “This Water Safety Day event is a way we can be there for them before an incident occurs.”

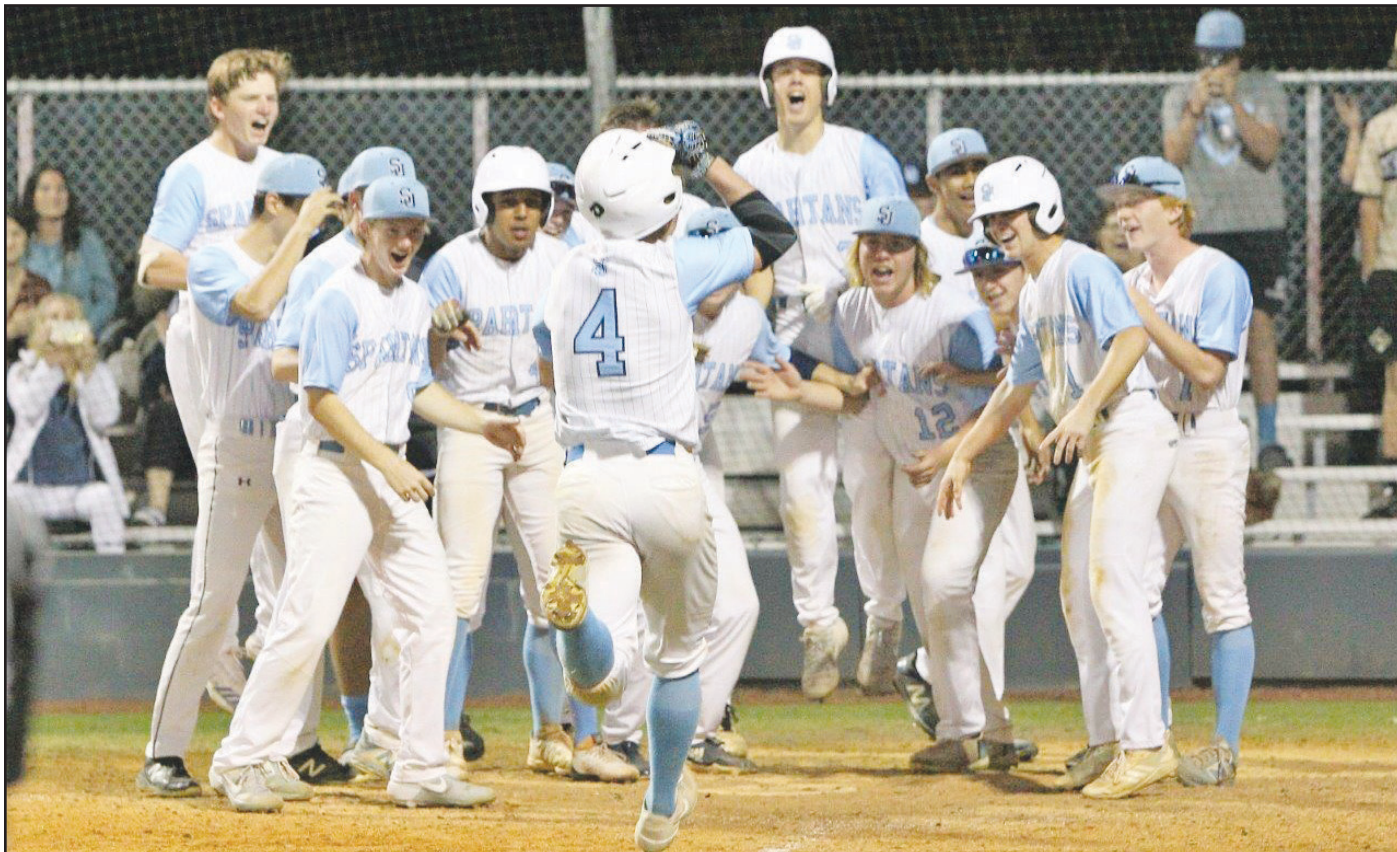

The game featured not only two sibling coaches; Christina Thompson at Oakleaf, ranked as high as number two in Class 7A by Miracle Sports and, with the loss, dropped below the Max-preps Top 25 list, and Casey Thompson, brother to Christina at Ridgeview, ranked number three in Class 4A, now at 10-1, but also featured the aforementioned Lady Knights batting lineup which has bashed opponents to this point with a .382 batting average and six batters; Jaeda McFarland, Ciara Gibson, Jaycie Brookshire, Kaylee Lambrecht, Khloe Banks and Mariyah Sanchez all holding averages above .400.

After dealing Oakleaf High softball (and sister Christina Thompson) their first defeat of the 2020 season, the Ridgeview High Panthers, coached by Casey Thompson, traveled to the other corner of Clay County to take on the 6-3 Clay Blue Devils in back-to-back county rivalry clashes.

"No kidding," said Casey Thompson, referring to the battle of lineups. "I was telling them all day not to get intimidated by their (Oakleaf) statistics."

Put those batting numbers against the

"We were alternating every other game with these two, but with this being a possible last game, I wanted to give Morgan Crutcher some game time," said Lewis.

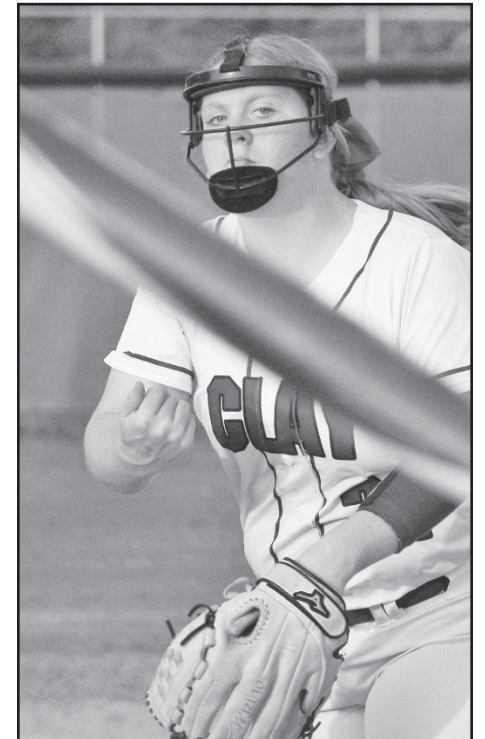
Clay, now 6-4, opened with three quick throwdowns from McKean who put down nine pitches to put three Raider batters back in the dugout.

FLEMING ISLAND - Fleming Island High lacrosse ace Will Krupsky's putaway 2:23 into overtime lifted host Fleming Island to an improbable 12-11 win over Bartram Trail on Fri., March 13. Fleming Island improved to 7-2. Bartram Trail falls to 3-4.

Due to the Florida Governor Ron DeSantis' announcement that Florida public schools would be closed for the next two weeks due to dangers associated with the corona virus, a closure that could be extended, it is uncertain whether any more games will be played this season. If Friday's game was the last of the season for the Golden Eagles, it certainly provided some lasting memories.

The Bears had a golden chance to win on their opening possession of the sudden death overtime, but attack Robert Jones missed high with a shot from point blank range from the left edge of the crease. A trade of turnovers left Fleming Island's Nate Vernon with the ball, and the junior goalie launched a long, high pass toward teammate Ryan Suhrer, who was streaking down the middle of the field. Vernon's pass traveled too far, but Suhrer gave chase and caught it on one bounce. The senior somehow evaded Bartram Trail defenseman Larry Ingalls, who was closing fast from the opposite direction, and continued his sprint toward the goal.

As two other Bears' defensemen converged, Suhrer flipped the ball to Krupsky on the goal's left side. Alone with Bartram goaltender Brody Johnson, the freshman faked a high shot and deposited the ball into the right side of the net, igniting a jubilant Golden Eagles celebration.

Fleming Island was thoroughly whipped in the first two quarters, outshot 26-10 as the Bears scored seven consecutive goals to lead 8-3 at the intermission. Junior Brody Davis smoothly directed the visitors' offense from behind the net, finding

teammates next to the goal with targeted passes and scoring two goals himself. Bears' senior Ian Parr dodged the Fleming Island midfielders for two goals in the first half, and finished with a hat trick. Meanwhile, the Bartram defenders hounded the Golden Eagles all over the field, forcing errant passes and turnovers. It did not help the Fleming cause that three defensive midfielders— Nick Cory, who was out with a concussion, Aaron Brown (abdominal injury), and Ben Catenis (suspension)— did not play. Only a strong effort by Vernon, who made seven saves in the first half, kept the game from getting out of hand.

"Nate stepped up when we needed him to and made some big saves," said Fleming Island head coach John Hawley.

Two halftime adjustments by Hawley helped turn the tide. First, the Golden Eagles moved their best player, senior Eric Dobson, to midfield from attack. Playing the Notre Dame commitment on both ends of the field improved the hosts' ability to clear the ball from their defensive end and allowed Dobson to run the offense from the top of the box. His three assists were as important as his four goals.

"That move seemed to free him [Dobson] up and stimulate the offense," said Hawley. The other tactical change was on defense, where Hawley instructed off-ball defenders to slide and double-team Parr when the Bears' marksman drove toward the goal.

"Number one [Parr] is a great player, and he has a great first step," said Hawley. "We decided to slide earlier in the second half, and it seemed to work."

The Bears scored only three goals in the second half.

Led by Dobson and junior attack Sean Hawley, who scored four goals, the Golden Eagles outscored Bartram Trail 8-1 over the final nine minutes of the third quarter and the first 11 minutes of the fourth to take an 11-10 lead. Bartram's Davis scored from the goal's doorstep with 12



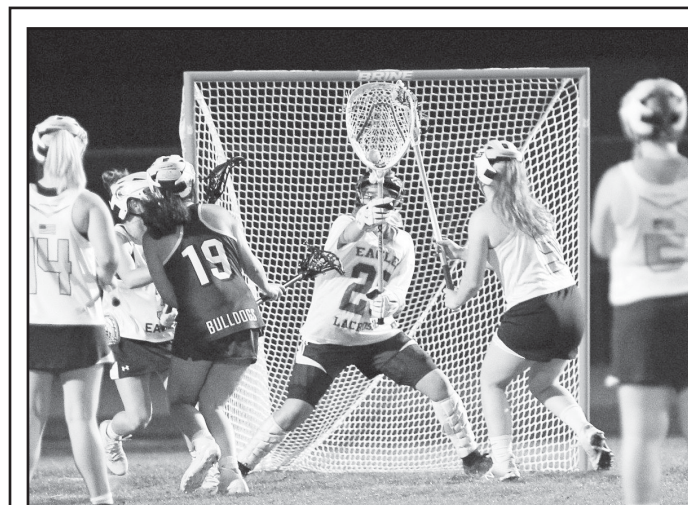
One of Fleming Island lacrosse's top scorers is willkrupski who has golden eagles on one loss season.

Area coaches hoping for resolution to season

GAINESVILLE – Coronavirus has not only taken its toll of the United States sports and business worlds, locally two area high school coaches; sister and brother Christina and Casey Thompson; of Oakleaf High School softball and of Ridgeview High School softball, have taken a grassroots approach to the potential long-term impact of the pandemic's reach.

"I created the hashtag (#PressPauseSoWeCanPlay) so that our community can come together and, hopefully, make enough noise to prevent the total cancellation of spring sports," said Christina Thompson, in a statement released on Twitter, Facebook, Instagram and other social media. "This is bigger than just baseball and softball."

For Casey Thompson, the reaction and possible shutdown is a highly emotional decision.

"It's heartbreaking," said Casey Thompson. "It's going to shatter every athlete's season, especially the seniors around the state. We've reached out to a lot of coaches and no one disagrees at this point."

In a press release of March 16, 2020, the FHSAA stated that the agency continues to monitor developments regarding the CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) and its impact on Florida and local communities.

Schools and school districts should continue to follow state and local health department advisories regarding extracurricular activities and athletic contests.

Furthermore, Spring Sport rankings will not be released until further notice. As we receive information from state authorities and health departments, the FHSAA will continue to make



decisions for each sport individually, moving forward. "We are doing everything we can to get both our softball and baseball communities buzzing," said Christina Thompson. "And hopefully get our decisions makers to pause, and not just cancel entirely (like the NCAA, NBA, NHL, MLB and others that have recently cancelled the finish of their respective seasons). Our kids don't get an additional year of eligibility."

The FHSAA release also advises to please follow the FHSAA website for the most up-to-date information. The FHSAA office will be closed March 17-27. However, staff will be working remotely and will be available during regular business hours via email. For contact information, click here.

Spring Sports FAQs

1. If our school or school district has cancelled all extra-curricular activities, may we practice?

Practice is a school and/or school district-based decision. Provided your school and/or school district permits you to do so, practices are permitted.

2. May we continue to play games if our school or school district allows us to play?

This is a school and/or school district-based

decision. Provided your school and/or school district permits you to do so, and conditions are appropriate, returning to your regular schedule of games is permitted.

3. What happens if my athletes do not meet the minimum contest requirements at the end of the season due to mandated cancellations?

The Executive Director may waive the minimum contest requirement on a case-by-case basis. Each school Athletic Director should work through their sport administrator to gain approval.

4. If we have a game scheduled and the other team does not agree to play or make it up, is it counted as a forfeit?

No, if a makeup date was agreed to in your game contract, both schools will be required to uphold the contract. However, if there is no contracted makeup date and no agreement on a necessary makeup date, the game will be stricken from the schedule and neither school will be awarded a win or a loss. We encourage all schools to work together to reach the best decision for student athletes.

5. What is the status of the FHSAA Spring Sports State Championships?

The FHSAA currently plans on maintaining the schedule as is, but will continue to work closely with host venues, local school districts, public health officials and our Board of Directors to help guide our decision-making process throughout the coming months. Decisions will be made in the best interest of

"Now, I feel like I can run a really fast time in my 400 so I'm holding off until it counts," said Collier. "Now, it's time to work out until we get back. I can kill my body and have a longer recovery time."

With his nearly-just-as-fast teammates; Dixon, Diego Soto and hurdler Joel Childs, the Raiders ran roughshot in the 4 x 400 relay with a state-best 3:21.64 split with Creekside a distant second at 3:27.31.

"That was our first time with that lineup," said Collier, noting last year the Raiders finished fourth in 3A with a 3:18.76 split (Miami Carol City won in 3:11.50) with Dixon, Soto and Collier still on the track and graduate John Abate the lone non-returner. Childs is primarily a hurdler who finished fourth in 40.78 in the 300 hurdles and seventh in the 110 hurdles in 15.62.

Orange Park was second to Creekside in the 4 x 200; 1:31.53-1:32.67, with a team of Lawrence Thomas, Dixon, Sermons and Kadin Elmore. Fleming Island was third at 1:34.08.

In the 4 x 100 relay, Columbia edged out Orange Park; 42.04-42.25, with Stewart Udel joining Soto, Sermons and Collier. Fleming Island was third at 42.54 with Oakleaf fourth, Middleburg fifth and Ridgeview sixth. Top performance for area girls athletes was from Sage who won the 300 hurdles by nearly two seconds with a 45.87 split of Bartram Trail's Carolina Minozzi (47.08). Fleming Island's Isabelle Flores was third at 47.17. Sage's time is ranked 28th in Florida with Miami Northwestern's Markalah Hart number one at 41.84. Sage's time is tops in Class 1A.

Staying with flat out speed, Oakleaf's girls team was led by sophomore Arianna Eason, who was a freshman member of the Lady Knights 4 x 100 relay team at the Class 4A state meet, who whipped up a 12.58 second place finish in the 100 to Paxon senior Shaniya Berry. Eason then returned to the track to take fifth in the 200 in 26.74 with Fleming Island's Lily Amsden a step off in sixth at 26.74.

Top times in the state, according to TFRRS Florida, are 11.75 for the 100 and 24.35 for the 200.

Baer's Bulldogs, Roney's Crusaders out

SPARTANBURG, S.C. – Fleming Island High grad Summer Baer, now a point guard for Barton College in South Carolina that has hovered in the top five for three point shooting nationwide in the NCAA Division II rankings, has been named to the Carolina Conference third team in a press release of March 6, 2020.

Baer averages 12.5 points per game and ranks first in the conference in three-pointers made with 102.

Note: The Barton women's basketball team (24-6), the second seed in the 2020 Conference Carolinas Championship, overwhelmed Emmanuel (Ga.) (20-10), 76-51, in the semifinals on Saturday afternoon at the Jerry Richardson Indoor Stadium. The Lions were seeded third.

The Bulldogs lost 67-65 to fourth-seeded Limestone (21-8) in the finals. Limestone upset No. 1 seed Belmont Abbey (27-3) by a 74-69 score in their semifinal game. The NCAA cancelled all championship tournaments due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

Against Emmanuel, Barton junior guard Summer Baer (Fleming Island, Fla.) hit two treys to give her 174 career three-pointers, a new program record for the NCAA Division II era. Baer finished the season with 106 three pointers to lead the conference and rank

Barton recently won their first conference playoff game; an 84-71 win with Baer hitting for 15 points on five three-pointers.

Baer now has 106 threes in 246 attempts (43%) to lead the conference. Baer finished second in national three point shooting behind leaders Morgan Brunner of West Liberty and Emily Stoller of Glenville State; both with 111 threes made; Brunner with 319 attempts (34%), Stoller with 296 attempts (37%). Third-ranked was Charity Shears of West Virginia State with 103 of 272 (37%).

At Belmont Abbey College, also in the Carolina Conference, Belmont Abbey juniors Allie Downing and Maria Kuhlman have been named to the All-Conference Carolinas First team, the conference office announced today. Both ladies were named All-Conference last season as well.

Kuhlman, a grad of Ponte Vedra High School, is scoring 13.9 points per game, which is also in the Conference's top 10. Her 3-point FG percentage of 48.2 is the highest in Conference Carolinas. She scored a season-high 26 points against Emmanuel on January 20, when she shot 9-16 from the field, including 6-9 from three-point range.

Belmont Abbey was top seed in the Carolinas Conference during the championships tournament and features former Middleburg High grad Hannah Roney as a top assist producer.

In an 87-37 conference tournament win over Chowan, Roney dished six assists and hit the first bucket of the game. Kuhlman finished with 24 points. Roney had three points.

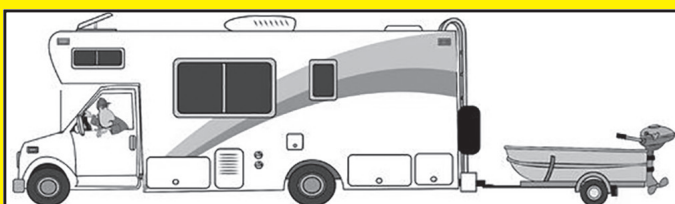
