Cook, Broskie win key races

Cook to become county's first woman sheriff; Broskie to continue as superintendent of schools

CLAY COUNTY – There's a new sheriff in town.

Clay High graduate and former Atlantic Beach Police Chief Michelle Cook received 37% of the vote to emerge from a crowded

field of candidates, including embattled Sheriff Darryl Daniels, to become the first woman to be the county's highest-ranking law enforcement officer. She's will take office on Jan. 5.

Cook, who started her campaign eight months ago and gained momentum throughout the process, promised to move the Clay

County Sheriff's Office forward, and to "heal some wounds at the sheriff's office and rebuilt trust with the community."

Cook met with supporters at Whitey's Fish Camp while they waited for results to pour in. When she was declared the winner,

Boucher selected to replace Price as county commission auditor

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Heather Boucher was selected as the county's new commission auditor, replacing retiring Mike Price.

Price has served as the watchman and alarmist of the county's budgets and more for years but his time working for the county's government has come to an end. Considering the importance of an auditor's role in a public government, the BCC wasted no time finding the next person to serve in that role.

"I think I would be a great candidate for having innovation and the efficiency that we have all talked about," Boucher said. "I have a lot of experience gaining those efficiencies and [finding new routes] to innovation."

The BCC agreed, selecting Boucher over two other candidates for the position. Boucher had to present herself as a candidate to the board during an Aug. 14 special meeting and prove why she was the best candidate.

The BCC had already met with Boucher and the other candidates in one-on-one interviews and Friday's public interviews were the final part of the process.

Boucher is a certified internal auditor which is similar to a certified public auditor except the skill set of a CIA is more focused and less-broadly applied like that of a CPA.

It matters not though because as commissioner Mike Cella pointed out, Boucher has all of the credits necessary to become a CPA from the University of Florida. She needs only to take the CPA exam to become one so the opportunity for that is an asset of hers.

Boucher was the youngest of the candidates and her lack of experience compared to the other two candidates, especially in the realm of public service, was something the BCC questioned but the experience Boucher does have prevailed.

She started her auditing career working as an Enterprise Risk Services Consultant for Deloitte & Touche, LLP, before working in the banking industry as a senior internal auditor for EverBank. She currently works as a senior internal auditor for CSX.

"I think my background and knowl-

edge of working through those industries and the different roles I have will be of great importance in a transition for me into a county government position," Boucher said.

Boucher said if hired, she would bring to the position a proactive mindset and the ability to problem solve, both things the BCC said would be necessary in the position. The BCC commended her on this and her high energy. They also said she explained how specific situations in her past have prepared her for critical situations that might arise in the county auditor position.

"An auditor is what I would consider a semi-public position," commissioner Wayne Bolla said. "It's not like they're an accountant, we throw meat at them over the fence and then they come back with an answer. Sometimes they need to be up front and I would prefer to see Heather because I think she can do that."

Bolla also liked that because of her younger age, she has more time to develop new skills and is more likely to stay in the position longer.

The BCC gave Boucher the highest marks during its evaluation of all three candidates and she was announced as its selection. The soonest Boucher will begin work is Sept. 8 but it could be as late as Sept. 25 before she's officially working as the county auditor.

As county commission auditor, Boucher will "serve as the internal consultant to perform economy and efficiency analyses and reviews for the Board of County Commissioners for components and programs of the county."

Another hurdle for mail-in voting – signature verification

Post office can 'easily handle' vote by mail ballots

Amid COVID-19 concerns, a University of Florida survey reports 60% of those questioned are considering voting by mail in the upcoming general election. While stories abound about the potential for votes being delayed by a deluge of ballots at the last minute amid cutbacks in the U.S. Postal Service, there is another sticking point with the potential to disenfranchise voters – signature verification.

In Florida, ballots had to arrive at the county Supervisor of Elections office by Aug. 18. The signature on the ballot is compared with the one on file at the Supervisor's office and – if there seems to be a discrepancy or there is no signature on the ballot – it is sidetracked into the "curing" process.

While the process is designed to catch people who might be attempting to cheat the system, it can also mean legitimate votes are being flagged and not counted.

If the ballot is received early enough, the Supervisor can contact the voter, who can then sign and return an affidavit and the vote will be counted. However, in a time crunch or if the voter doesn't take the required verification steps, their ballot won't count.

It happened to Troy Fitzhand's nonagenarian grandmother in Florida. "She forgot to sign, and she had to go through the cure process. It was just too tedious of a process for her ... so she's one of those people who didn't have a vote counted."

Unlike most of us, Fitzhand and his two brothers are trying to do something about it. The trio of twentysomethings is rolling out their new tech company, Ballot, in time for the General Election in November. Their software cuts out humans by comparing signatures electronically.

"The heart of our mission is to both help counties process elections, but also to ensure every legitimate vote is counted and has the ability to be counted," Fitzhand said.

And while there's a new focus on signature verification, there's also been a lot said about the U.S. Postal Service's ability to handle a crush of mail-in ballots. However, a study shows the post office has "plenty of physical capacity" to do the job.

However, if new cost-cutting Postal Service policies put in place by Postmaster General Louis DeJoy continue to slow

mail delivery, the report’s conclusions may become moot. But author Nick Zaiac, an associate fellow at the center-right R Street Institute, contends that even if COVID-19 is still a crisis during the early-voting season, the post office is capable of answering the challenge.

“They have plenty of physical capacity. They have lots of experience with moving mail through all kinds of disasters and with all kinds of staffing shortages,” he said. “These ballots can pretty much just be normal mail and, assuming it gets into the system in time, and people put it in the mail in time to get to be returned, its infrastructure should be adequate to handle this election in a timely and generally successful fashion.

Florida is one of the states with “a fairly short lag between when ballots arrive and when they need to be back to the Postal Service, Zaiac reported. His advice is to request a ballot early, then fill it out and mail it back immediately. Better yet,

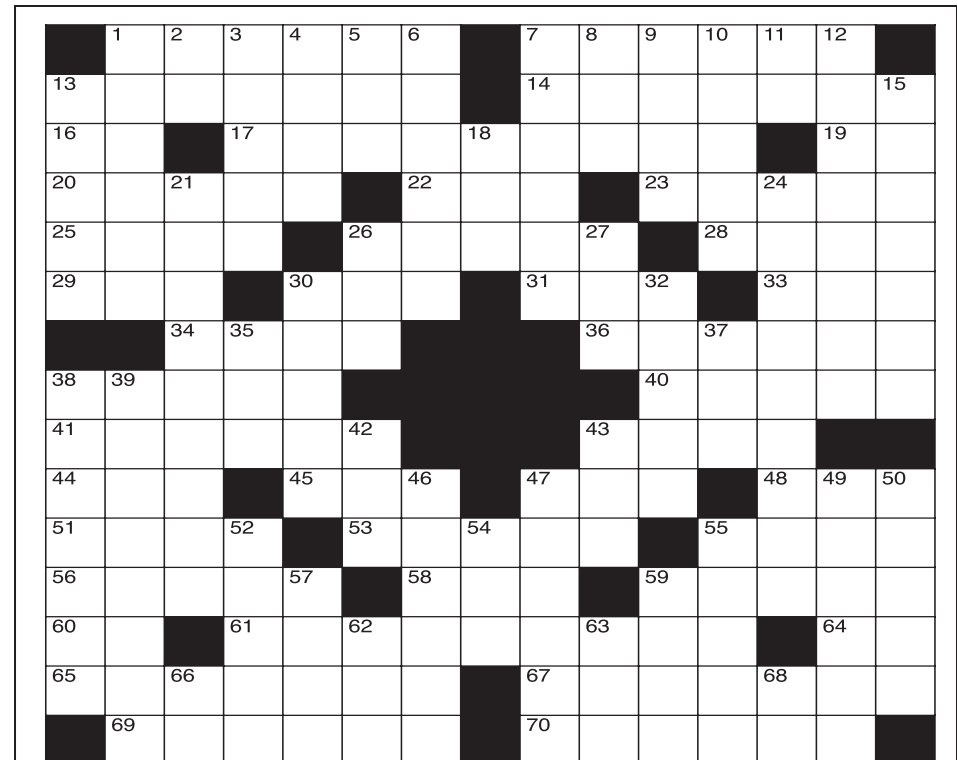
he recommends, hand-deliver it to the election supervisor’s office or leave it in a dropbox at an early voting site.

“[Fewer] steps between you and your town clerk or county clerk or board of elections is good. And less physical buildings it has to move into and out of and vehicles it has to move into and out of are good,” he said.

A University of Florida poll of 11,000 registered voters conducted in July found that just over 60% of all respondents said they intend to vote by mail in the General Election, with about 14% saying they would vote early in person and nearly 19% waiting until Election Day.

Regarding rumblings about the government defunding the Postal Service, Zaiac said there’s not much to defund.

“The Postal Service largely is a self-financing agency. They do borrow from the Treasury,” he explained. “But the only real tool outside federal officials have beyond law is attaching conditions on these Treasury loans to the Postal Service. The Postal Service does lose money, but they have plenty of cash on hand to go well into 2021, so they can make it through the election.”

AMC celebrates today's reopening with 15-cent movies

National chain, including theater at Orange Park Mall, back in business Aug. 20

ORANGE PARK – AMC Theaters at the Orange Park Mall reopened today, Aug. 20, after months of being closed for COVID-19. And to celebrate tickets are just 15 cents for selected shows.

The international company announced Aug. 13 it would be opening 100 U.S. theaters on Aug. 20. The Orange Park Mall was one.

To celebrate the return, AMC will say “welcome back to movies in 2020 at 1920 prices” which is also the year that the company’s founders, the Dubinsky Brothers, began their theater business in Kansas City, Missouri.

“The remaining AMC locations will open after we get further clearance from state and local authorities that it is safe to do so,” AMC said in an email to A-List members.

AMC said all staff and customers will wear masks, reversing what CEO Adam Aron said in June that masks should be encouraged when theaters reopen, but not enforced.

AMC’s mask mandate joins other mask mandates by Clay County-located businesses like Walmart.

Will 15-cent movies be enough to convince customers to return to the silver screen while wearing a mask the entire time?

That depends on how you feel about its initial offerings: 2017’s “Beauty and the Beast,” “Black Panther,” “Back to the Future,” “Bloodshot,” “The Goonies,” “I Still Believe,” “Jumanji: The Next Level,” “Sonic the Hedgehog,” “Grease,” “Star Wars Episode V: The Empire Strikes Back” and “Ghostbusters.”

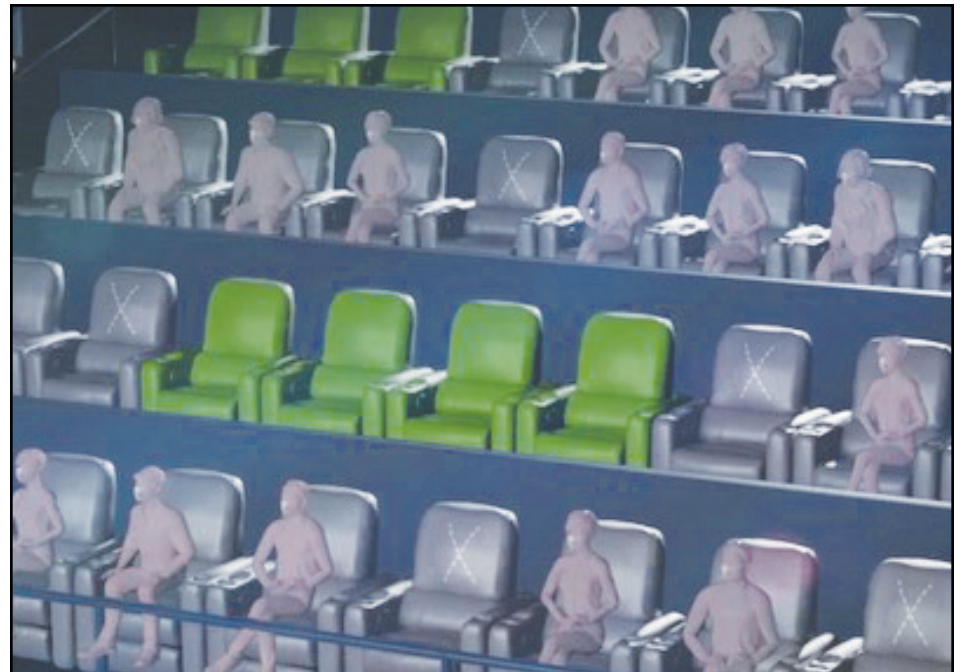
None of the movies are particularly new. Movies like “Sonic the Hedgehog” and “Bloodshot” came out this year, but those movies were released ahead of the coronavirus shutdown.

New movies like Christopher Nolan’s upcoming sci-fi epic “Tenet” is expected to arrive in theaters soon. AMC will require standard face masks.

Neck gaiters, open-chin bandanas and masks with vents or exhalation valves will not be allowed. The company will sell masks for \$1.

Food and drinks will be available. If buy food or drinks, you may remove your mask to enjoy your refreshment.

You will be allowed to sit next to others in your immediate party but there must be



one empty seat in between you and others that aren’t in your party.

The initial batch of movie tickets sold for 15 cents on Thursday, Aug. 14. The price will jump to \$5 after that. New releases like “Tenet” will be approximately \$10, according to AMC.

Movie productions across dozens of studios saw their production schedules pushed back.

The movies set to release in theaters

soon like “Tenet” and Disney-Fox’s “The New Mutants” were filmed and completed before the coronavirus shutdown.

AMC furloughed its CEO and other corporate employees earlier this year when it closed more than 600 locations. That put a lot of non-corporate employees out of jobs. The company also had its credit rating downgraded and faced a possible bankruptcy filing.

Daniels suspended as Clay County Sheriff following arrest

Embattled sheriff faces one felony, three misdemeanor charges related to affair

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis suspended Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels Aug. 14 after the embattled sheriff was arrested a day earlier following a year-long investigation by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the State Attorney's Office.

Five days later, Clay County voters officially removed him from office by electing Michelle Cook as the next sheriff.

DeSantis selected Matt Walsh of the Jacksonville Florida Department of Law Enforcement office on Aug. 15 to serve as the interim sheriff.

Cook will take office on Jan. 5.

DeSantis' executive order states Daniels can't serve as the county's sheriff or be paid until a new executive order is issued after one felony charge of destroying evidence and three misdemeanor charges of making false claims a former lover was stalking him.

The order states "State Attorney for the Fifth Judicial Circuit to the Fourth Judicial Circuit to represent the State of Florida re-

lating to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement's investigation of Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels for allegations of official misconduct, pursuant to section 27.151(3), Florida Statutes, is no longer confidential."

Daniels lost his bid to win reelection to Cook on Tuesday. Former Atlantic Beach Police Chief and Clay High graduate won the Republican nomination after garnering 37% of the vote in the six-candidate race. Daniels was second with 29%.

If Daniels had won, he would have remained suspended until his legal issues were resolved – or if DeSantis permanently removed him from office.

Daniels has maintained his innocence and said the timing of his arrest – five days before the primary – appeared to be politically motivated.

He issued the following statement shortly after Cook won the election:

"These politically motivated charges that have been made against Sheriff Daniels and announced right before the election combined with dirty politics from other campaigns by closing the election through recruiting a write-in candidate resulted in more than 10,000 Clay County voters not casting a vote in the race for Sheriff. This resulted in the electing of a St. Johns County resident to now serve as the likely Sheriff. Sheriff Daniels appreciates the support from the voters of Clay County and is calling for a review of this travesty that was committed on Clay County voters."

Daniels was referring to a write-in candidate, who also gave donations to Harold Rutledge's campaign, that triggered an unusual Florida law. With no Democrats in the race, the primary was supposed to be open to all voters. But when Francis Bourrie entered the race, it excluded Democrats and voters who don't identify with a political party – 70,848 registered voters

– from participating in the race for sheriff. Bourrie withdrew from the race on Wednesday.

According to information filed at the Clay County Courthouse, the embattled sheriff was charged with felony charge of tampering with evidence by asking the CCSO information technology office to delete information and destroy his cellphone and three misdemeanor charges for making "knowingly false" claims he was being stalked by a former girlfriend. The FDLE was asked to investigate whether Daniels abused his authority by demanding his former lover, Cierra Smith, be arrested.

King's options were made public five days before the primary election that essentially will determine who will run the sheriff's office for the next four years.

Clay County Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambless said the charges didn't exclude Daniels from running for office. Daniels kept votes already cast for him, as well as any that are casted until the polls close Tuesday night, Chambless said.

Cook finished with 14,483 votes, while Daniels had 11,362.

Daniels' problems started when Cierra Smith went public about their affair that started when both worked at the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office Jail. Daniels admitted

Like a good neighbor, State Farms' Banks assists Bennett Elementary

Insurance agent organizes push to provide backpacks to school supplies

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Charles E. Bennett Elementary is home to many low-income students who need help. Local State Farm insurance agent Diane Banks decided to do something about it.

With the help of community members and her company, she purchased back to school kits for both students and teachers.

State Farm let their agents know that they had secured the partnership that would allow for excellent pricing for school supplies.

"State Farm partnered with educationalproducts.com, and they negotiated some lower prices for orders that came from State Farm agents," said Banks. "I live in an area where people struggle with their income, and I thought, you know, even the purchase of a pen or a pencil is tough these days because of COVID and people being unemployed, etc. Not to mention the struggles that they have already. And so, it just made sense to me to partner up with the elementary school, Charles E. Bennet, which is right around the corner from me and offer to purchase some school supplies for them."

Banks was able to purchase 53 teacher supply kits at a cost of \$9.89 each. She had a budget of \$500 to buy the supplies.

The kits are integral to the reopening of school, with the COVID-19 pandemic still a significant health

concern. The packages included facial tissues, disinfectant wipes, dry erase markers and hand sanitizer. She also personally donated \$500, and State Farm matched that contribution. The school then received the additional \$1,000 to use as it saw fit.

"I spoke with the assistant principal at the school [Charles E. Bennett] to get feedback from her on what they needed because I could have purchased student kits, teacher kits, or just backpacks," said Banks. "And she told me, and I'm glad I talked to her because they had already collected enough student supplies, pretty much for every student who was going to school there. She said they were having a really difficult time getting the new disinfectant that teachers needed to have."

That worked out perfectly, as the teacher kits already contained plenty of those items. They felt that it would be much more helpful to get the teacher kits, as they had plenty of supplies for the students.

Banks, whose office is located on Idlewild Avenue, sees Bennett Elementary students pass her office daily during the school year.

"I insure a lot of people in the community. Many of them bring their kids into the community," she said when asked why she decided to get involved in the virtual back to school drive. "And my office is right on the path of where they would walk to and from school every day. I would see the kids, and I just felt like it was important to try and support the community in whatever way I could."

COVID-19 was the inspiration behind the virtual drive, but Banks now hopes it can be replicated annually.

She has sent flyers to other businesses in the area and also the Green Cove Springs board of commissioners.

"My hope is that it'll become a tradition of sorts," she said. "And we can continue to do it year over year."

2020 TRIM NOTICE INFORMATION

Understanding Your Notice of Proposed Property Taxes

Dear Clay County Property Owner,

The 2020 Notice of Proposed Property Tax forms, also known as TRIM (Truth In Millage) notices, will be mailed to Clay County property owners on August 21st. Florida law requires the TRIM notice to be prepared and mailed each year by my office on behalf of the taxing authorities. Although your TRIM notice is not a bill, it is intended to notify you of possible changes that may appear on your November tax bill.

Your property taxes are calculated as follows: **Taxable Value x Millage Rates = Property Taxes**
(*the taxable value is estimated by the Property Appraiser; the millage rates are determined by the taxing authorities*)

Taxing Authority Tax Information: By law, each taxing authority must establish maximum millage rates necessary to fund their proposed budgets. The notice displays last year's final millage rates and taxes, and this year's proposed millage rates and taxes. Also displayed are the times, dates, and locations of the public hearings for each taxing authority. Due to **COVID-19**, Executive Order 20-179 authorizes the use of "communications media technology, such as telephonic and video conferencing" for taxing authorities conducting millage rates and budget hearings. Visit www.ccpao.com for updated hearing information.

Property Appraiser Value Information: By law, my office is required to annually assess your property at its **market value** (based on the status of the real estate market on January 1, 2020). The proposed assessments were determined using market-derived variables prior to any reported **COVID-19** cases. Therefore, adjustments to the proposed assessments would be inappropriate. However, our office is closely monitoring COVID-19's impact on the real estate market, and any negative impacts remaining as of January 1, 2021, will be reflected on next year's assessment roll.

The **assessed value** is generally the market value limited by any assessment reductions, limitations (caps), or agricultural classifications. The **taxable value** is the assessed value minus any exemptions such as homestead, disability, widow, and widower. The notice displays prior and current year data specific to your property such as market value, assessed value, taxable value, and any applicable exemptions, classifications, or assessment reductions.

Although my office is responsible for mailing the notice, the market, assessed, taxable values, and exemptions are the only issues within my authority to address. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact my office. Additional information, including **property records cards**, a detailed **TRIM Guide**, **TRIM FAQ's**, and **Taxpayer's Bill of Rights** can be accessed at www.ccpao.com.

on one felony and three misdemeanor charges related to an extramarital affair, finished eight points behind with 29%, while Ben Carroll was a distant third with 15.4%.

Cook now was supposed to face a write-in candidate on Nov. 3, but that candidate, Francis Bourrie, withdrew from the race on Wednesday.

In other key races, David Broskie officially dropped his interim label as superintendent after he beat former Superintendent Charlie Van Zant 47.66%-37.59%, while Diane Hutchings ousted Ronnie Robinson to become the next tax collector.

Broskie joined supporters at V Pizza on Fleming Island to await the results. With every update, his lead continued to grow.

Broskie was appointed interim superintendent on March 2 by Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis after Addison Davis resigned to accept the job as superintendent for the Hillsborough County School District.

When Broskie woke up Wednesday morning, the election was an afterthought.

"I have been laser-focused on the re-opening of schools and creating a safe environment for our students and employees," he said. "I took a couple hours to celebrate [Tuesday night], but I was right back at it on Wednesday morning. Dealing with reopening and the campaign was a real challenge. During these times, being a superintendent is a 16-hour-a-day job.

"I was focused more on getting schools reopened than my campaign. It's all been a little overwhelming."

Broskie will face a write-in candidate who also hasn't actively campaigned, so Broskie's victory essentially is assured.

Voters also elected three new members of the Clay County Commission. Jim Renninger won the District 3 seat, while Betsy Sistrunk Condon will represent District 4 and Dr. Kristen Burke won in District 5.

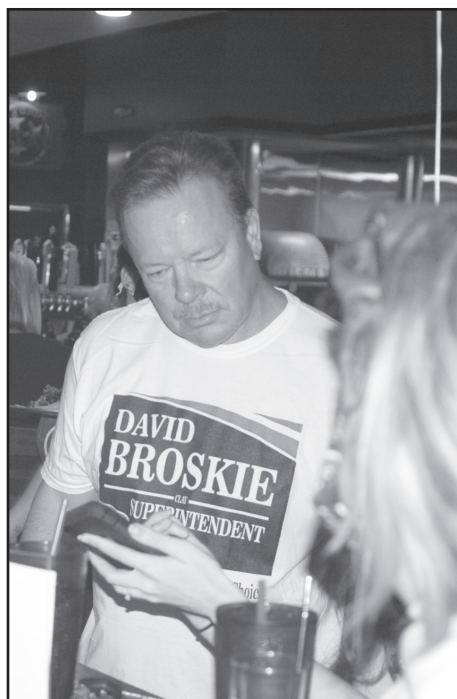
Jennifer Bradley, wife of current Florida Sen. Rob Bradley (R-Orange Park), defeated Jason Holifield for the Republican nomination. She now will face Democrat Melina Barratt, who ran unopposed, in the primary election.

Kat Gammack, the former aide to Con. Ted Yoho, took a significant step to replacing him by winning the crowded Republican Party field for the District 3 seat. Gammack got 22% of the vote in Clay

is a graduate of the FBI Law Enforcement Executives. She credited her family's deep ties to Clay County – particularly in the Green Cove Springs area – as formidable foundation to launch her campaign.

"We ran a grassroots campaign," she said. "What really helped is I have deep roots in Clay County. My family's been here for 50 years. I probably had 150 volunteers working with me in the last eight months. The ground game was incredible."

Daniels was suspended on Aug. 14 by DeSantis after an investigation by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and State Attorney's Office determined he asked the IT department at the sheriff's office to destroy information on his cellphone that may have provided details of his affair with a subordinate when they both worked at the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office Jail. Daniels also was charged with three counts of making false claims to have the woman arrested for stalking.

DeSantis appointed FDLE's Matt Walsh to serve as the interim sheriff. His roll now will end when Cook is sworn in.

Several candidates were running without party opposition and they automatically advanced to the general election, including Republican Sam Garrison, Libertarian Kenneth Willey and Democrat Leroy Edwards for the 18th district for the Florida House; Rep. Bobby Payne and Dem. Jaiden Hamilton for the 19th district of the Florida House; Rep. Melissa Nelson for State Attorney; Rep. Charlie Cofer for Public Defender; Carlos G. Nuniz for Supreme Court Judge; Rep. Tracy Scott Drake for Property Appraiser; Rep. Chris Chambliss for Supervisor of Elections; and, Rep. Mike Cella for District 1 seat on Board of Commissioners.

James J. Daniel, Lester B. Bass, Michael Kalil, Lance M. Day, Adrian G. Soud, David M. Gooding, Meredith Charbula, Tatiana R. Salvador, Mike Sharrit, Virginia Norton and Waddell A. Wallace all were unopposed for races for Clay County Circuit Judges.

County and 25.2% statewide to advance to the general election against Adam Christensen, who narrowly beat Tom Wells by less than 800 votes.

Tara Green won re-election as the clerk of the circuit court, beating David Coughlin by 17,374 votes, while Scotty Taylor has a 368-vote lead against Ken Smallwood for State Committeeman.

Mary Bolla (District 4) won re-election to her seat on the school board. Since neither Carol Studdard (39.56%) nor Beth Clark (37.62%) received more than 50% of the vote in their non-partisan race for the District 2 seat on the school board, they will face each other again in November.

One out of three registered voters – 52,057 of 158,250 – voted in the primary, according to the Supervisor of Elections Office. Of that, 17,769 were sent my mail, 13,472 were from early voting and 20,813 were cast on Tuesday.

Cook started her campaign 242 days ahead of Tuesday's primary. She has 28 years of law enforcement experience and

Wilkinson students to get shady reception when they return to class

MIDDLEBURG – Wilkinson Junior High students will be welcomed back to school with a new shady surprise.

Social distancing at the school will mean the school's highly coveted courtyard areas will have lower capacities, meaning more children could have been stuck in the sun if it weren't for the school's latest project.

A new sun shade will be a place so students to socially distance, eat lunch, catch up on what their friends did over the weekend and more. It wouldn't have been possible without the surrounding community.

"It takes a community to raise a child is the saying," Wilkinson Principal Christina Cornwell said. "Well in school, we say it takes a community to raise and educate a child and that's what our community is doing today."

WJH is a community partnership school which means that on top of its nor-

mal schooling, it features a clothes closet, a free laundry facility, a food pantry, parent resources and finds itself as the site of many charitable drives like monthly Farm Share food drives. Cornwell, her school and WJH Community Partnership School Director Summer Burrell work tirelessly to ensure not just students, but the surrounding community as well, are well-learned, well-fed and well-taken care of as best they can.

For Cornwell, Burrell and WJH, the campus isn't just a place for students to learn. It's a holistic community center of sorts where all hands are on deck to make sure people get the help they need. If this sounds like a lot of work, it is but Burrell said the local business leaders make it easier with their help.

WJH secured a grant for the sun shade from the American Academy of Dermatology to fund the project, but Cornwell and Burrell had to figure out how to build the shade after getting the materials purchased. That's when Burrell reached out

to Northeast Florida Builders Association, their executive director Bill Garrison, and the organization's nonprofit arm, Builder's Care.

Garrison has lived in the area, less than a few miles away from WJH, for 30 years – two of his children went to Wilkinson – so when he received a call from Burrell, he answered the call to action immediately.

Garrison, his son who went to WJH, another former WJH student, and nearly a dozen other volunteers from NEFBA, Builder's Care and Clay Builder's Council gathered at the school Thursday, Aug. 13, to begin work on the shade spot.

"It means a lot to be here today doing this," Garrison said. "It's great to take the role I'm in and the organization I work for

and leverage that and bring it back to the community we serve."

The project began at 9 a.m. Thursday and it required hours of the volunteer's time but despite the sun shining intensely overhead and the 90-degree weather, each person on the project worked diligently with a smile.

"We work for the community and its nonprofits," Builder's Care executive director Justin Brown said. "Our mission is to help the mission of other nonprofits and today, that mission brought us here. It's an honor."

Cornwell and Burrell are excited to see students again, and they're especially excited to see their faces light up with smiles when they see the new sun shade.

dence and three misdemeanor charges of making false claims related to an affair.

Walsh met with his administrative team early Monday and said he will work to “turn the page and to move forward as an agency.”

“I’ve already met with my command staff and I’ve been briefed on the excellent work they’ve done in regards to engaging with the community in an effort to understand its needs,” Walsh said. “As a team, we will strive for excellence in everything we do. Although my appointment is temporary, I’ll provide stability and support to the members of the Clay County Sheriff’s Office.”

Walsh’s tenure shouldn’t be long. Michelle Cook won the Republican primary Tuesday and likely will become the next sheriff. She still has to face a write-in candidate in November who hasn’t campaigned for the job. Cook is expected to be sworn in on Jan. 5.

According to documents from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Daniels asked the sheriff’s office IT department to delete information from a cellphone that had information about his affair with Cierra Smith, who worked with Daniels when he was in charge of the Jacksonville Sheriff’s Office Jail. He also was charged with demanding Smith to be arrested for stalking. While Smith was briefly detained, she was released without charges.

to the affair after he called CCSO to have Smith arrested in an Oakleaf parking lot. He said she was stalking him.

Smith was briefly detained at the jail, but was released without charges.

DeSantis then received an anonymous letter from a deputy or officer at CCSO, claiming Daniels made threatening remarks during a morning briefing. Daniels reportedly was angry someone within the department had been leaking information to Facebook about the incident. The anonymous officer said Daniels wanted to “determine who it was and murder the [expletive] that leaked it.”

Daniels not only questioned the timing of King’s findings, but the unusual options he gave the sheriff.

Daniels said King told him to resign immediately, remove his name from the current ballot, return campaign funds and promise to never run for office in the Fourth Judicial Circuit again or face charges.

“Listen, there’s been folks who’ve tried to bully me in my life and that’s one thing Daniels made his first appearance Aug. 14 and he pleaded not guilty.

“As a team, we will strive for excellence in everything we do. Although my appointment is temporary, I’ll provide stability and support to the members of the Clay County Sheriff’s Office.”

Now it’s up to Walsh to bring some normalcy back to CCSO.

“The sheriff’s office has been, and will continue, to work tirelessly to reduce crime, reduce the fear of crime and to improve the quality of life for the people of Clay County,” he said. “At this time, I do not have any plans to make any personnel changes, but I do intend to have an active roll in the day-to-day operations of the agency. My entire focus will be on supporting the mission of the men and women of the Clay County Sheriff’s Office.”

Walsh is the assistant special agent in charge of the FDLE’s Jacksonville Regional

Operations Center and the statewide coordinator for the Critical Incident Stress Management and Peer Support Team. He’s been with the FDLE for 17 years and in law enforcement for 23 years.

Walsh wasn’t part of FDLE’s yearlong investigation into Daniels.

“My education is providing crisis support,” Walsh said. “My training as a leader is to provide crisis support. There’s no doubt there’s crisis going on here in this agency. I’m here to provide that support and give them a chance to do what they’ve been doing for years and to serve the citizens of Clay County.”

Not only is CCSO in disarray, Walsh said the headlines of the day have added to the frustration of anxiety within his department.

“If you look at every agency around the country, around the state, they’re in times of crisis. There is a time of crisis right now with COVID and civil unrest,” he said. “My job is to come here and provide stability and support to the members who are doing a great job. It’s business as usual. The members of this agency will continue to do what they’ve been doing for years. I’m here to provide them support and help them move on, turn the page.”

Clerk's office has options to handle restrictions created by COVID-19

County has ways to keep child support payments current during pandemic

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Clerk's office has adjusted the way it does business as response to the COVID-19 pandemic, including collecting payments for court-mandated child support obligations.

With people losing jobs due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the county has created ways to stay current.

While the courthouse remains to the public for most business, there is still an online option in place where people could make their child support payments. For those where less than tech-savvy, though, they were able to use no-contact drop boxes to make their payments.

Depository Deputy Clerk LaShonda Hampshire-Baskin is a long-time employee of the clerk's office.

"Overall, most Clay County parents with court-ordered child support were able to keep up with their payments throughout the crisis," Hampshire-Baskin said. "Either because they didn't lose their job or received a stimulus check that allowed them to meet their obligation despite losing their job."

"The sudden influx of the 1,500-plus stimulus checks to be applied to child support case balances in our county certainly was a new challenge, but one that they



Depositionary Deputy Clerk LaShonda Hampshire-Baskin

[clerks] worked through quickly so local children and their caregivers could receive their funds," said Mary Justino, Communications and Community Outreach Director.

For those in arrears, many stimulus checks were routed directly to the clerk's office to be applied directly to those accounts.

"That helped a lot of cases," said Hampshire-Baskin. "When it first hit, as far as the stimulus coming out, our system saw something it had never seen before."

"It's a weird silver lining," said Justino.

Hampshire-Baskin has spent a lot of time speaking to parents on the phone,

explaining the situation and available options. While the Clerk's Office is not in charge of child support payment enforcement – there is a state-level agency for that – they do handle court-mandated obligations.

Typically, if a person is unable to meet their obligations, they may petition the court for adjustments to the original order. An adjustment may be granted, but the option to request it is available.

Hampshire-Baskin says that the Clerk's Office has pretty much been "business-as-usual," with the stimulus checks coming in and allowing many people to continue to make payments.

She also noted that Child Support Enforcement has currently suspended enforcement services.

If a case is handled through the State of Florida Child Support Enforcement Revenue, and the payee has fallen delinquent, they have a little more time than usual to get back on track.

Between the stimulus payment, online payment capabilities, and no-contact drop off locations, Clay County residents who need to make child support payments have lots of options.

Images of America: Orange Park Local author chronicles the town's rich history with stories, photos

ORANGE PARK – Cynthia Cheatwood dedicated nine months to compiling the stories and photographs that are the foundation of Orange Park's past, calling it a humbling experience to create a chronological accounting of the town's history.

The advanced history and civics teacher at Orange Park Junior High will release her long-awaited book, "Images of America: Orange Park" on Monday, Aug. 24. The project took a schoolyear to compete, but it was generations in the making.

"There's never been a book that just addressed the history of Orange Park," Cheatwood said. "The Historical Society of Orange Park and been trying to bring out message for a long time.

"This was a very exciting project."

The town has hundreds of stories. Cheatwood soon learned there was as many bases on lure as fact. She spent days

pouring through records and old photographs. He entrusted Clay County Clerk's Office historian Vishi Garig, Clay County Leader columnist Mary Jo McTammany, as well Carolyn and Barney

Clark, Van Royal and Steve Howard to provide and vet each tale.

Cheatwood gathered information from the State Archives, Clay County Historical Archives, local collections and several university archives.

The book reveals how Orange Park, once known as Laurel Grove Plantation, was incorporated in 1979. The warm climate and easy access to the St. Johns River made it easy for some of the nation's leaders, like President Ulysses S. Grant and Harriet Beecher Stowe, to unwind amid the mossy oaks.

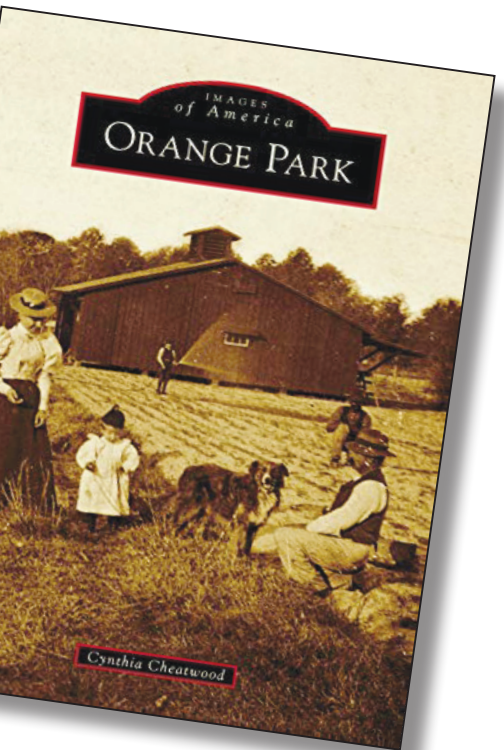
Counting the cover photo depicting William Elliston Parmenter Jr., his wife Ione and daughter Mark on their strawberry farm in around 1896, there are 216 photos of the town. The son of a Boston judge eventually became one of the founders of Orange Park, and he kept journals that recorded the town's politics and social life.

Of course, no story about Orange Park would be complete without the town's "Monkey Farm." Cheatwood found the story so intriguing, she dedicated an entire chapter to it.

The Yerkes Laboratory of Primate Biology operated for 35 years south of the state of James Burbridge for animals from Cuba and Africa.

"The Monkey Farm was an intense story," she said. "There needs to be a book on Dr. [Robert] Yerkes on it. I could have done more, but it wasn't always warm and fuzzy."

Other chapters include: "The First Hundred Years," "Pines and Pioneers," "Tourism," "Making a Living in Early Orange Park," "Orange Park Normal and Industrial School," "Moosehaven," "Building



Community" and "Small-Town Pleasures."

"The town has an interesting story that most people really don't know," Cheatwood said. "Orange Park deserves it. We've always been considered a throughway for people going from Jacksonville to Green Cove or Jacksonville to Fleming Island. But it's so much more than that."

The book is endorsed by the Orange Park Historical Society. It's also a historical preservation project.

The historical society meets at the Clarke House, and Cheatwood said the small greenhouse out back is in desperate need of repairs. The greenhouse originally was built as part of William Clarke's pecan business. Cheatwood said portions of the book's proceeds will be spent on repairs.

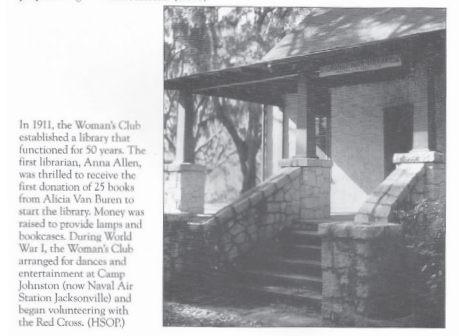

After William Clarke's death in 1943, the Pecan Grove closed. The buildings where workers lived on the property were converted into rental apartments to provide income for Corrie Clarke until her death in 1979. One rental structure remains on the property, along with the Clarke House, garage, and storage barn. The town purchased the 15-acre tract in 1991 as a community park for residents and visitors. (HSOP)



The Orange Park Woman's Club was the first civic organization in town, founded in 1910 by eight women with a desire to serve their community. With leader Mary Berry, the club adopted Orange Park Elementary as its first project, raising money to buy slates and drinking cups for students. It also purchased trash barrels for the town. Soon after forming, the club cared for 100 people during a malaria outbreak. (CCA)

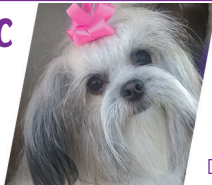


In 1911, the Woman's Club established a library that functioned for 53 years. The first librarian, Anna Allen, was thrilled to receive the first donation of 23 books from Alicia Van Buren to start the library. Money was raised to provide lamps and bookcases. During World War I, the Woman's Club arranged for dances and entertainment at Camp Johnston (now Naval Air Station Jacksonville) and began volunteering with the Red Cross. (HSOP)

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Roger A. Suggs, CFA, AAS, CCF, Clay County Property Appraiser, announces that on Aug. 21 the Notice of Proposed Property Tax forms, also known as Truth in Millage notices, will be mailed to all Clay County property owners.

Florida law requires the TRIM notice to be prepared and mailed each year by the

property appraiser on behalf of the taxing authorities.

Although the TRIM notice is not a tax bill, it is intended to notify property owners of possible changes that may appear on the November tax bill. Therefore, property owners are encouraged to review the information and deadlines carefully.

The property appraiser is responsible for administering exemptions and estimat-

ing the value of all property as of Jan. 1 each year. The TRIM notice displays three values: market value, assessed value, and taxable value.

The market value is the most probable sale price (on Jan. 1), and may increase or decrease as the market dictates. Due to the upward direction of the real estate market in 2019, the majority of properties in Clay County experienced an increase in market value.

The assessed value is the market value less any benefit for the Save-Our-Homes cap, or other assessment limitation. Although market values increased, the assessed values of properties with an existing homestead exemption will be capped at 2.30%, and non-homestead residential and commercial properties will be capped at 10% - with the exception of properties with new construction, additions and/or renovations.

The taxable value is the assessed value minus any exemptions. It is important to remember that while the assessed value of property may be capped, taxes are not. Ad valorem property taxes are calculated as follows: Taxable Value x Millage Rate = Property Taxes. The taxable value is estimated by the property appraiser and the millage rates are determined by the taxing authorities.

Property owners who have questions regarding an exemption status or a property's value are encouraged to contact the property appraiser's office for an informal review. This informal review can be handled in person, by telephone, email or mail.

A property owner also has the option to file a formal appeal via petition with the Value Adjustment Board by the deadline listed on the bottom of the TRIM notice (Sept. 15). This date is also the

deadline for the property appraiser to accept late-filed applications for exemptions, assessment reductions and agricultural classifications.

The property appraiser's office is closely monitoring COVID-19's impact on our community and the real estate market.

As previously stated, the proposed assessments were determined and certified using market-derived variables as of Jan. 1 (prior to any reported COVID-19 cases). Therefore, adjustments to the proposed assessments would be inappropriate. Any negative impacts remaining as of Jan. 1, 2021, would be considered for next year's assessment roll.

The back of the TRIM notice displays public hearing dates and explanations of the various columns to assist property owners in understanding the notice. By law, each taxing authority must establish maximum millage rates necessary to fund their proposed budgets.

The millage rates can be reduced prior to the mailing of the tax bills. Property owners who are concerned or have questions regarding proposed budgets, millage rates or resulting taxation levels, should contact the taxing authorities or attend the budget hearings listed on the notice.

Due to COVID-19, Executive Order 20-179 authorizes the taxing authorities to use "communications media technology, such as telephonic and video conferencing" for conducting hearings. Therefore, in addition to traditional in-person meetings, remote access may be available.

Updated hearing details and additional information including a TRIM Guide, property record cards, Taxpayer's Bill of Rights, and answers to Frequently Asked Questions are available on the property appraiser's website at www.ccpao.com.

Safe Animal Shelter wishes it can cash in on Petco's story competition

CLAY COUNTY – Safe Animal Shelter needs your help to win \$100,000.

The SAS competes each year in the Holiday Wishes competition to raise money for shelter. And while it's won money in the past, it's never taken home the gold.

SAS executive director Sherry Mansfield said winning the top prize isn't an easy task.

"We've been doing it for years as it's an annual thing Petco does," Mansfield said. "You have to basically get as many people as you can to submit a story about adopting from your shelter and how it's changed someone's life. We've come close but we've never won."

There are two ways SAS can bring home some money: by winning the \$100,000 "Share Your Story" contest or by submitting a lot of stories that finish as finalists. Mansfield said SAS could take home the \$100,000 grand prize or it could end up coming away with \$5,000 to \$10,000.

Two submissions have been made so far and both are touching stories of how a new adoption can heal the painful wound saying goodbye to a pet can leave behind.



"Her nose is too pointy to be cute," one submission reads. "Her ears are too long. These were my first thoughts when Safe Animal Shelter brought a shy hound mix in to meet my husband and me."

This family had just laid its 6-year-old dog Lulu to rest after its bout with cancer when it realized that they needed another furry friend in the family. Despite the initial thoughts, the other partner in the relation-

ship fell in love with Daisy, the dog with long ears and a pointy nose.

"It turns out Daisy is exactly the right dog for me at this time," the writer said. "I have been my husband's caregiver for the past two years, and the last eight months he has lived in an assisted living facility."

Daisy has helped her owners cope with the physical distance they face in their relationship. The other story Mansfield has received is about how one dog's dislike of cats transformed into a motherly relationship for some cats in need.

"I think both of these stories are heart-felt and touching and I hope they speak to the people that read them," she said.

Mansfield said any money won will go toward replacing funds usually raised by in-person fundraising. SAS had to cancel its 29th annual auction gala at the Thrasher-Horne Center because of the COVID-19 pandemic which crippled the finances of the shelter. It's still moving forward with an online event, but Mansfield said in a coronavirus-affected world, fundraising isn't as easy.

"We have almost 500 animals out in foster or pre-adoption still waiting for surgeries as vets closed due to Covid-19," Mansfield said. "We are probably facing \$40,000

to \$50,000 in spay and neuter surgeries and other medical procedures so we could really use some extra money right now."

Some of the items taken included a bottle of clothes soap, a fan, bleach and two five-gallon buckets of deck coating.

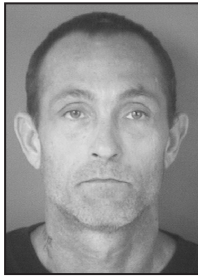

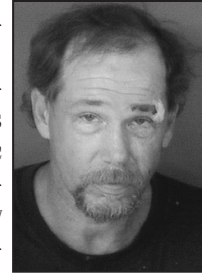

ORANGE PARK – Amidst the ongoing shifting of go or no go for fall sports, the Cecil Field Preseason Cross Country Summer Cross Country Classic will take the first steps (pun intended) to bringing competition back to the forefront of high school sports with event director Richard Fannin expecting a barnburning field of some of the fastest runners in Florida.

“Getting the green light from the FH-

The boys race at the Cecil Field Summer Classic will feature recent 4:01 miler Rheinart Harrison of Nease who brings in a contingency of 7-9 runners under 16 minutes including St Johns Country Day School junior Matthew Stratton, a second-place finisher in Class 1A last year.

SAA, it takes some of the pressure off of us to put the meet on,” said Fannin, a coach at Bishop Kenny High and former coach at Bishop Snyder. “Had the FHSAA voted to cancel or push us back, a lot of runners and teams would have been on higher alert. Their vote is going to make this one of the strongest fields in the state on day one.”

Note: Races start at 6:15 p.m. with an open race for middle schoolers running 2.5KM and JV and adult open runners going the 5K distance. At 7 p.m. the girls high school varsity race begins with the boys set for a 7:45 p.m. start.

“Action will be fast and furious at the front with six girls that have run 18:30 or faster and 11 that have run 19:00 or faster,” said Fannin. “Bolles features a trio of girls that have all run 18:17 - 18:24 (Elizabeth Csikai, Maxine Montoya and Ella Mickler). Meadow Millett of the

Tampa area has also run 18:15 for the distance, and Isabella Babilonia of Viera HS also comes in with a best of 18:13. Kendyl Cardwell of Montverde Academy has also run 18:30. Fleming Island runs a tight pack of front runners and could get second or third with a good Mandarin team.”

Fannin noted some COVID rules such as masks up to the start line, team tent areas will be roped off, fans will be a little restricted in where they can go, but, most importantly, the band will still play.

“We will have live band throughout the night to add to the festivities,” said Fannin. “We have the runner from Nease High; Rheinhard Harrison, who just ran the fastest high school miles, a 4:01 time with six or seven guys coming able to go under 16 minutes. That’s fast for the first meet of the season.”

Among the sub-16s, is St. Johns Country Day School junior Matthew Stratton,

who hit 15:39 last year, and a handful of potential 17 minute runners from Fleming Island; both boys and girls.

“Harrison’s best for the distance is 15:23, followed closely by teammate Bradley Ball, who has run 15:34. Clay County’s own Matthew Stratton (St. Johns Country Day) comes in as the third seed with a best of 15:39,” said Fannin. “All in all, 36 boys come in with seed times of 16:59 or faster, which should make the race for Top 25 medals exciting.”

For Fannin, the go-ahead of the meet is as big a deal for the area mainly because it is the first competitive event in north Florida since March.

“The kids are raring to go,” said Fannin, who guided Snyder to a state meet berth in his tenure there. “There have just been team time trials over the summer where most teams go to camps or compete in road races. This one is going to be very fast.”

Fannin detailed that the running will have a wave start with seeds per wave.

“We had over 400 runners sign up so we carved out waves for the fastest 300 and will set them off in groups of 30, 40 runners,” said Fannin.

There is no fee for parking or admission, but with the first race at 6:15, parking and traffic should begin building at 4:30 - 5:00.

Meet is held at the Cecil Field golf course (now known as New World Sports) - 13715 Lake Newman Street.

New World will also be hosting the Regional Championships for divisions 1A, 2A and 4A Friday, October 30th, the New World Fall Spectacular (Saturday October 10th) and the North Florida JV Championships Saturday October 17th.

Jack Neeley, Andrew Heinton, John Hutton and Nick Hackett with Jacob Thompson on the third team after Hutton graduated, that were three-time 4 x 50 free relay gold medalists from 2015 through 2017.

“All four of us have the mindset that the repeat is the goal this year and the second gold is do-able,” said Johnson, referring to the Golden Eagles state title in the medley relay backstroke, breaststroke, butterfly and freestyle, 50 meters for reach team-

mate) last year and a near-miss second place finish in the 4 x 50 freestyle relay. “Our attitude is that every meet is possibly the last meet. We want to chase the boys’ mark.”

With their season in jeopardy from day one despite the projected August 24 restart of area schools, Clark saw the opportunity to compete as a gift.

At the Class 3A championships last year, the Fleming Island quartet battled through a fast start from Fort Myers High who got an early lead. Emma Grimm re-

sponded with a scintillating breaststroke leg that gave the Golden Eagles enough space to hold off Fort Myers for the title.

In the 4 x 50 free relay, the same Fleming Island relay squad chased Tallahassee Chiles for the silver by just two seconds.

“We are so excited, but we also know that the season is shorter and we probably won’t be able to compete against as many teams as in the past,” said Clark. “For us, though, the season was a warmup for districts, regions and state.”

With the summer swim programs shut

down; the Eagle Harbor Screaming Eagles, for both girls, the readiness to compete at a high level quickly is the forefront challenge.

“During the season, our meets are set up to improve certain aspects of what we want to do in the post season,” said Johnson. “Some swimmers progress faster at the end of the season, some improve their stroke by the end of the season, but with a shorter schedule, it’s going to be a challenge to kind of find all the right pieces before districts.”

Committee, chaired by Dr. Jennifer Roth Maynard and including 13 medical professionals, that recommended a start delay. SMAC's concern was an increase in data showing COVID cases in ages 11-17 and, with no data available from in-school populations, the SMAC reported noted that, as of August 10, "only four of 67 counties had opened schools, therefore we have absolutely no new data from the impact of reopening schools on the COVID-19 infection rate...Due to the 2-14 day incubation period of SARS-Cov-2 viral shedding or symptom development, this data will not be available for review until schools have been open for face-to-face education and activities for 14-21 days at a minimum."

SMAC's recommendation was to delay the start of fall sports beyond August 24 "in order to evaluate crucial date of COVID-19 3-4 weeks after schools have opened."

In an 11-5 vote by the Board of Directors in the board's third emergency meeting on Fri., Aug. 14, after four hours of discussion, the FHSAA board moved to start sports on August 24. The five votes against included the board chairperson, Lauren Otero, the athletic director at Tampa Plant High School.

One statewide group represented to the board a petition of nearly 40,000 signatures in a LetThemPlay campaign.

According to Fleming Island High Athletic Director Travis Cunningham, the vote just started his plans to re-schedule games on all of his sports teams with access to other counties the primary sticking point.

"Right now, St. Johns County is able to play out of county and Duval County is having a meeting tomorrow (Tues., Aug. 18) to see when their start date is," said Cunningham. "We lost the Clay and Lake Minneola football games right out with the proposed season start against Palatka at

home on September 11. We also lost Tallahassee Godby at the end of the season because Leon County schools will stay within their county. If possible, we would like to reschedule the Clay game and they would to." Cunningham has schedules set up for his other fall sports; golf, cross country and volleyball, with slight changes in each. Volleyball will not travel to a high-powered tournament in Orlando and not have New Smyrna Beach High visit as one loss on the schedule. Cross country will open at the August 21 Cecil Field Preseason Classic in Jacksonville.

Cunningham, noting other sports will start September 9, said his school as well as most of the county have had good responses for the COVID restrictions of the summer training sessions.

"I think the kids and the staff understand what is at stake and have responded," said Cunningham. "We have been kind of going with the flow of what is needed and has to be done to keep moving forward. The kids lost a bunch of time with this summer and don't want to lose anymore. The county in general has been really good."

At the FHSAA meeting, in a motion made by Carlos Ochoa, Athletic Director at Hialeah Gardens, it supported Option 1 as on the table with amending of including an opt-out date of September 18 for the state series, instead of the October 12 opt-in date for the state series as originally proposed. After lengthy discussion including information from Dr. Jennifer Maynard from the Mayo Clinic in

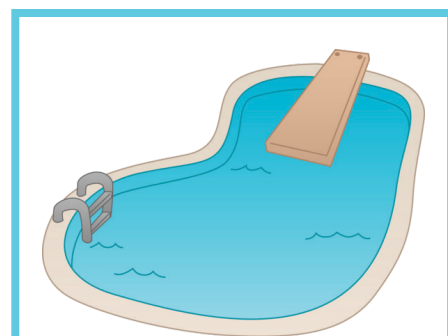
Jacksonville, the chairperson of the Sports Medicine Advisory Committee, explained that only one county in the state is under the five percent positivity rate for COVID-19 infections. That was not enough to sway the board to go with their preferred option of Option 3B.

Option 1 presented a plan to keep the August 24 start date with games starting the week of September 7, which would start with Week 2 games that would have been played on August 28. It also pushes the season end week back by one week to have it end on November 6 instead of October 30.

In this plan, all Kickoff Classics and Week 1 games would be outright canceled but could be rescheduled later on, if permissible. Also, the FHSAA noted on the plan that if a county has restricted travel to county-only, they would be required to notify the FHSAA and opposing schools on the schedule regarding this issue.

Another change in the Option 1 plan

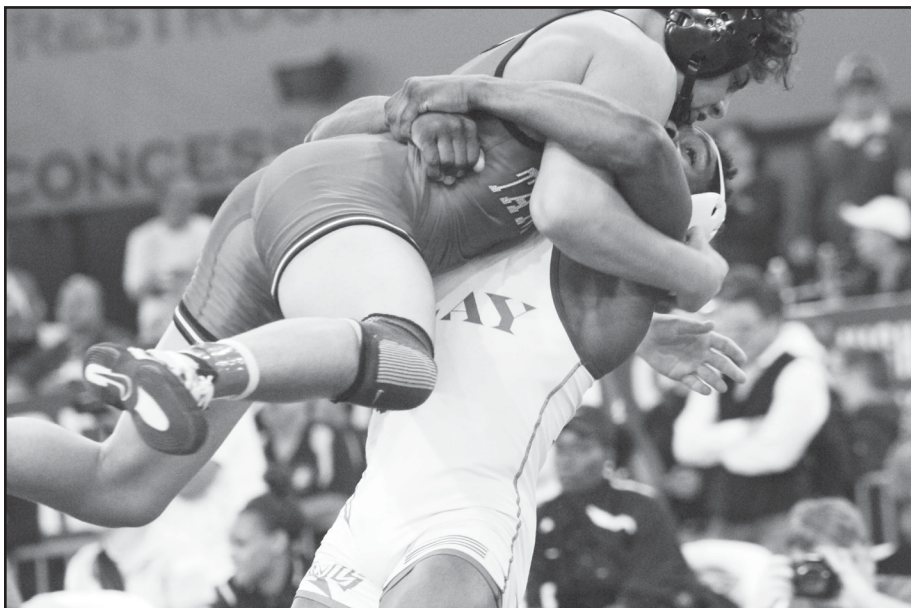

Wash later commented on Quarterman in a post-session press conference giving him high marks for football intelligence.

"If you look at our division, it is a very strong running division," said Wash. "We wanted to get guys with a very high football IQ and, talking about Shaq and Nate (Nate Evans, rookie UCF), both of them are very intelligent and have done a nice job of picking up schemes. We know they are going to bust, but, with both guys, that bust only happens once."

One comment Marrone recalled about Quarterman was a conversation with his linebacker where Quarterman shared his own thoughts.

"Coach, I'm just telling you now when my cleats are on the grass, I will do whatever you want me to do. I'm going to play," recalled Marrone of the conversation. "Those are the kind of things you feel good about. Now they've got to go out and earn it."

Also, this week, the Jaguars added more hometown love to their roster with the recent signing of former Columbia Lake City defensive tackle Tim Jernigan.

Jernigan, a second round pick out of Florida State University by the Baltimore Ravens in 2014, got signed from the Philadelphia Eagles where he played the last three seasons.

It was, for the Jaguars, a move to solidify a defensive tackle position hit hard during 2020 Training Camp by illness, injury and COVID-19 optouts, plus the departure to the Ravens of All-Pro Calais Campbell, but the signing was personal for Jernigan, who attended Justina Elementary School in Jacksonville before graduating from Columbia High School.

"It damn sure feels good to be home," he said via videoconference shortly after

the Jaguars' 90-minute practice Monday morning at the Dream Finders Homes Practice Complex.

Jernigan joins Quarterman as two local products on the Jaguars roster and has already brought a little fire to the Jaguars defensive attack.

Defensive coach Todd Wash noted that the linebacker depth has been good sign amidst the breakdown of the defensive line. The Jaguars signed free agent middle linebacker Joe Schobert from Cleveland to put former middle backer Myles Jack on the weak side with Quarterman learning the middle, where he was an All-ACC first teamer with the University of Miami and K'Lavon Chaisson, a first round pick fighting for a possible fourth spot.

Early on, the Jaguars are projected to have solid starts from Schobert and Jack with Chaisson and Carrius Marsh (a free agent from Arizona Cardinals) battling for the third spot and Quarterman on a list of six vying for backup slots.

"I think we're going to have some solid depth at the linebacker position," Wash said. "It was very important this offseason that we go out and get football players that are very intelligent. That's one thing we've got with this group, top to bottom."

In a Friday practice session last week, Quarterman, who has been marked as a special teams athlete while learning the ropes of NFL linebacker, got a high-five from defensive coach Todd Wash after making a read during team drills against the first string offense led by quarterback Gardner Minshew.

The Jaguars had their first padded session on Mon., Aug. 17 with Jaguars coaching Doug Marrone seeing an uptick in the team's play.

"Everything's a ramping-up type period," Marrone said. "We want to get used to it. We don't want to see people on the ground. We don't want to be leaving our feet."

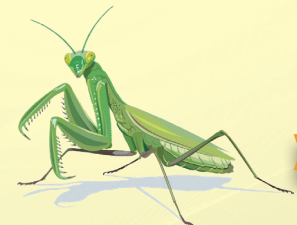

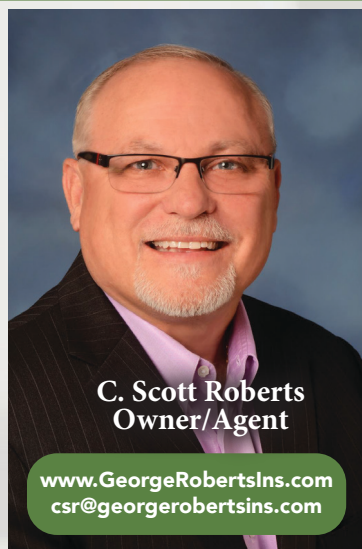

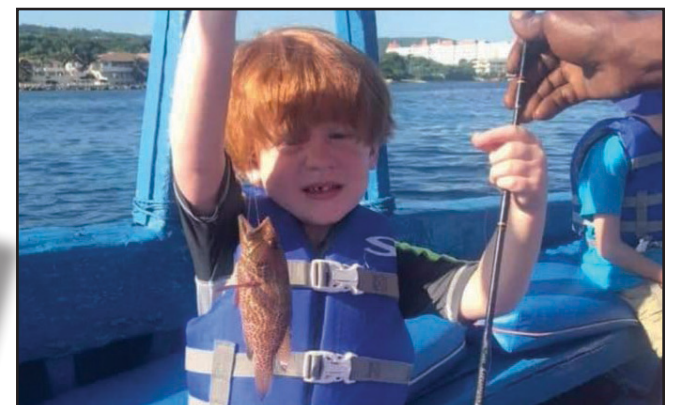
