Demands for homes going through the roof in Clay

Inventories at record lows; desire for ownership at record highs

FLEMING ISLAND – The sound of steady rain frequently was interrupted last Wednesday by the sound of hammers and table saws. The demand for homes in Clay doesn't allow for off days for something as annoying as rain.

Bad weather, crime and high taxes are chasing people from the Northeast to Florida in record numbers. Added with low interest rates and millennials who've grown tired of living in the spare bedroom of their parents' house, a perfect storm has created a housing demand that has real estate

agents working a lot of overtime.

"Hammers are flying. It's a good source of business, obviously, to have the demand that's out there," said Watson Realty Corp.'s Rich Zeisel. "A lot of it has been pent up demand for a lot of millennial buyers who've been living at home with their parents. And now, in the later stages of their 20s, now they want to get out on their own and they have the wherewithal to get out on their own. You have interest rates that are historically as low as I've ever seen a 2.5%, or in some cases even lower.

"The demand is pushing the builders to

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Bob Page appointed vice chairman of FMPA's Policy Makers Liaisons Committee

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Bob Page will serve as the vice chairman for the Florida Municipal Power Agency's Policy Makers Liaisons Committee.

Page has been in Clay County for more than 20 years and served three terms on the Green Cove Springs City Council. He represented the city in FMPA meetings and committees and after terming out, he continued to serve as a liaison between the two. Since his last year on council in 2013, he's been that liaison and now he's been selected as the vice chairman of the Policy Makers Liaisons Committee.

"I'm thrilled about it and happy to be the vice chair," Page said.

Page continued to serve as the city's liaison in 2013 because it was more difficult for someone else on the council to



attend as they all had full time jobs. He volunteered to continue to do it as he had a general interest in FMPA and the work surrounding it, and because he loved to serve his city

The FMPA is a consortium of municipal electrical groups within the state of

Florida, according to Page, that banded together in the 1970s in order to leverage independent strengths into one large group with great purchasing power. It's much like a union, in that instead of a single municipality's representative working to use their individual purchasing power for electricity or something along those lines, an entire group of different representatives can bargain using their collective purchasing power. But it isn't a union.

Page said the collective purchasing power has been used to obtain better electrical power prices and services.

"So not only are we getting better purchasing power, but better representation as well in issues with state legislatures and other things," Page said. "Beyond purchasing power and representation, we're also getting the ability to interchange information amongst one another."

The Policy Makers Liaisons Commit-

tee is a subcommittee of FMPA and was designed to have another way to communicate with legislative parties as cities with municipal power, Page said. Instead of having a utility board member go to the meetings to represent Green Cove Springs, Page attends on the city's behalf and relays information back and forth between the two parties. Even before Page, it was historically someone on the council that represented Green Cove Springs and not someone on a utility board.

Page said the position rotates throughout the committee annually and that his turn for vice chair arrived. He's excited for what this entails.

"I think it's just a desire to be active in the community and help out in any way that I can that keeps me so excited about all of this," Page said. "It's just one of those things I find enjoyable and interesting and I'm more than willing to keep doing this."

Green Cove Springs authorizes a new Citizens Advisory Committee

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Green Cove Springs City Council met briefly Tuesday and the only item of note was the discussion and authorization of the newly formed Citizens Advisory Committee.

City Manager Steve Kennedy addressed the council regarding the Green Cove Springs Citizens Advisory Committee. The goal of it is to provide input and feedback on matters of public opinion regarding a variety of issues related to the operation of the City of Green Cove Springs. The input received may be factored into various decisions made by the City of Green Cove Springs. This committee would help to advise the city council with the voices of the city residents on different items.

The committee will have three officers: chairperson, vice-chairperson and secretary

Selection will include an application

and survey which will be evaluated. Meetings will be held monthly.

Following the briefing on the committee, the city council unanimously voted to pass the motion, 5-0.

Finally, there was a request for a 30-golf cart parade in Green Cove Springs on Dec. 5.

The request included the city barricade some of the streets and provide security. The council approved the request with the following caveats:

- A minor special event application would have to be filled out.
- A sponsor would need to be found to be to pay the GCS Police officers who would be on duty.
- All CDC guidelines for health considerations in regard to COVID-19 must be observed.

The parade would be led entirely by residents



Clay County Sheriff's Office earns Excelsior accreditation

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation officially reaccredited the Clay County Sheriff's Office with its third Excelsior Status. Sheriff Michelle Cook, Undersheriff Ron Lendvay and other agency leaders accepted the reaccreditation during the Commission's video meeting. The agency underwent a thorough review on July 14-16, comprised of a three-member assessment team. The team ensured compliance with 260 Florida law enforcement standards. Of the 260 standards, the CCSO was found to be in compliance with all mandatory and applicable non-mandatory standards. The assessors commended CCSO members for their knowledge, professionalism and enthusiasm.

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DeSantis mulls reducing daily COVID-19 reporting

The Governor's Office has begun discussing the possibility of decreasing Florida's coronavirus reporting from a daily release to a weekly release.

There is no consensus yet on what factors would lead the Governor's Office, the Department of Health and the Division of Emergency Management to slim what has been near-daily updates. And Gov. Ron DeSantis' communications director, Fred Piccolo, told Florida Politics that the change is not imminent.

Spectrum News reported Friday that the state has started exploring the possibility of a weekly report now that Florida is in Phase Three.

But Piccolo said staff have only discussed the possibility once or twice.

DEM spokesman Jason Mahon, whose agency is tasked with publishing the state's coronavirus data, said the Division has not been a part of any conversation on reducing the report's frequency. And DOH spokesman Alberto Moscoso, whose agency compiles the data, also said the Department hasn't been apprised of those discussions either

"I don't think it's surprising to read," Moscoso said. "At some point there has to be a discussion about a path forward."

State and local officials, the media and the general public alike view the state's data, which is published on a dashboard and detailed in an archive that sees thousands of new pages added each day. Reducing that data would have to come only when the time is right.

"Everyone likes the data and likes to see the numbers," Piccolo said.

The discussion is still young, but Piccolo says the switch would likely be tied to a decline in new cases. One threshold he mentioned was when Florida achieves a day with zero deaths tied to COVID-19.

Over the last two weeks, Florida has confirmed an average 92 resident deaths a day.

Ultimately, reducing the frequency of COVID-19 reports would "treat it like any other infectious disease, like hepatitis," Piccolo said. DOH also releases weekly reports on influenza and mosquito-borne illnesses like Zika.

However, he noted that the Governor's Office is "definitely seeing an uptick in positive tests," which come as other parts of the country are seeing a resurgence. He attributed the recent to the increased

The year was 1927. The world held its collective breath when Charles Lindbergh made the first successful nonstop solo flight across the Atlantic Ocean from New York City to Paris. The flight took 33 hours, 30 minutes.

Al Jolson astounded audiences with "The Jazz Singer," the first feature-length movie with synchronized sound.

The U.S. government settled on an annual operating budget of

\$2.86 billion, and American inventor Philo T. Farnsworth demonstrates the first working television system he called the "dissector tube."

America was still two years away from the collapse on Wall Street – and the Great Depression that followed, along with the debut of the Popeye the Sailor character.

And here in Clay County, Orange Park Elementary opened its doors for the first year of classes.

Since then, a British Airways Concorde has made the transatlantic flight in as little as 52 minutes, 59 seconds.

Thousands of songs and hours of movies can be downloaded in seconds on a device smaller than a deck of cards.

Even more impressive, it can all be stored in the "cloud." Whatever that is.

Board Referendum that would establish a restricted half-cent sales tax during the General Election.

Our schools need repairs. Portable classrooms are crumbling and taking up space once used for playgrounds. Air conditioners are being held together with piecemeal maintenances. Lunchroom and libraries are so small, some students are forced to eat lunch as early as 10 a.m.

As the county continues its extraordinary growth, there's an inescapable fact new schools must to be built.

It's not going to be cheap. Repairs

are estimated to cost \$318 million. New schools that need to be built in the next 10 years will cost another \$300 million. You can pay a half-cent now or pay a lot more

An extra half-cent shouldn't make a huge impact on a family's budget. That's a single penny for a Happy Meal. Are we really going to miss \$5 on a \$1,000 purchase?

But what it means to the future of our schools and children is priceless.

"There are concerns here," said Orange Park Elementary Principal Carole McCullough. "We are very old. We are in very much in need of a lot of work. We don't want to mess with it unless we can really overhaul it."

Orange Park isn't the only school showing its age. Clay High is 84 years old. Middleburg Elementary is 82 years old. Green Cove Springs Junior High is 68 years old. Charles E. Bennett Elementary is 66, while Keystone Heights Elementary is 64 and Orange Park High is 62.

More than half of the district's 51 public schools are 50 or older. It's house of cards that's dangerously close to collapsing.

"We aren't asking for new carpet or new buildings," McCullough said. "We need basic things. There are so many things here that are old and antiquated."

McCullough, however, refuses to use the disintegrating infrastructure of her school as an excuse. Orange Park Elementary is rated seventh in Florida among

2,118 other elementary schools - and she's proud to talk about that.

"We're getting it done academically," she said.

Now it's up to us to do our part. Including COVID-19 concerns, our educators are doing an incredible job under difficult circumstances. We can sit back, pinch pennies - literally - and watch our schoolsfall apart. We can watch our classrooms become so over-crowded it affects a child's ability to learn.

Or we can do the right thing.

We can vote **YES** for the half-cent sales tax for Clay County schools.

Our county's future depends on it.

availability of rapid tests, which he said could be reigniting public interest in testing, and the step to Phase Three of the reopening strategy.

"Right now we're doing this every day as long as we need to," Moscoso said.

Saturday's report showed 4,044 new diagnoses and 87 deaths, making it the first time in eight weeks that cases have increased by more than 4,000. With an additional 2,539 cases reported Sunday, 755,020 people have tested positive and 16,168 have died, including non-residents in the state.

Florida's coronavirus reporting has been a contentious topic, with media outlets asking for more transparent data and state and federal officials touting state's virus reporting as exemplary.

The latest battle unfolded when the state posted data on cases in schools for three consecutive days in late August but scrubbed the reports from its public-facing archives on the fourth day. In late September, the state began publishing weekly case data that broke cases down by school and higher education institution.

Following reports about the possible

change to weekly updates, Democratic Sens. Lori Berman and Janet Cruz issued a joint statement calling the tidbit from Piccolo a "political stunt" and a page from President Donald Trump's "tired playbook of obfuscation."

"Even as new daily coronavirus cases are creeping up again, the DeSantis administration has offered up a trial balloon to move Florida from daily COVID reporting to weekly reporting," the Senators said. "They stated that staffing costs are constraining, but there is perhaps no greater use of public funds."

DOH and DEM first released a joint COVID-19 report on March 16. Between March 19 to April 24, the state released both a morning and evening report each day. Since then, the state has released one report each day, except for Oct. 10, when a glitch and duplicate data forced officials to delay and ultimately scrap that day's re-

Academic teams sharpen their skills during competition

County teams conduct practice contests throughout November

ORANGE PARK – Do you know the Greek whose theorem states that the square of the hypotenuse of a right triangle is equal to the sum of the squares of the other two sides?

Academic teams from Green Cove Springs and Lakeside junior highs do.

Green Cove Springs defeated Lakeside, 170-140, Thursday, Oct. 15. The two teams went back and forth, but Lakeside came up short.

Richard Maly is a seventh and eighthgrade math teacher at Lakeside. He is also the coach of the academic team. He has been at Lakeside for five years and has been the team's coach since his arrival. He loves being the coach.

"You get to work with kids who don't get to do things after school," said Maly. "Maybe they're not the athlete or the band person, but they want to participate in our

school after school hours in extra-curricular activities, and I get to provide them an opportunity to do that."

Michael Taft coaches the Green Cove Springs team. He has been the coach for seven years. He is a teacher of government and civics and also tutors math.

"I love questions and answers and the trivia behind it [the academic team]," said Taft. "Plus, a lot of the trivia questions and stuff, it gets the kids motivated in different parts of education that they may not have been involved in. For example, if a kid doesn't really like science, doing this academic trivia might get them interested in it."

Team members practice on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:45-5 p.m. between September and November.

Questions posed to students are from numerous subjects. Current events, history and math are among the different categories from which questions can be pulled. Timothy Danz is an eighth-grader at Lakeside who is an Academic Team competitor.

"It helps refresh my memory on things I did know and things I didn't know," said Danz. "And it lets me learn new things. It's just fun, kind of like Jeopardy, and it keeps my mind refreshed."

Katie Costea is also a member of Lakeside's team. She volunteered for the team when Mr. Maly asked during class if anyone was interested in joining the team.

Both Costea and Danz anticipate joining the academic teams at their respective high schools next fall.

Kathryn McNeill and Ellison Shipe are members of the winning Green Cove

Springs team and are both eighth-graders. "I just really like trivia," McNeill said. "I always watch Jeopardy."

"I just really like joining clubs and doing as much I can," said Shipe. Both will be attending Fleming Island High next year and want to continue to compete.

Taft was happy to get the win. "Lakeside is always – it's like every year is back and forth, back and forth between Lakeside and Green Cove. Richard Maly here; he's a great coach here at the school. I dread coming against Lakeside; I do. I dread it because I know how good he is and how hard he trains with these kids."

Transgender Senate candidate for District 5 dies

Death of Melina Rayna Svanhild Farley-Barrett comes 20 days before election

GAINESVILLE - A transgender Senate candidate running in Northeast Florida died Wednesday after a long battle with thyroid cancer, just weeks before the end of her historic run for office.

Melina Rayna Svanhild Farley-Barratt of Trenton was the Democratic nominee in Senate District 5, a largely rural and deep-red sinecure in Northeast

In a district where 51% of registered voters are Republicans, few Democrats would take on the political machine of Senate Appropriations Chair Rob Bradley and his likely successor and wife, Jennifer Bradley. But Barratt was no ordinary can-

She was the Legislative Director with Florida NOW and - as she told Florida Politics last year – she was the first transgender woman to run for the state Senate. She was not intimidated by the Republican composition of the district and the challenge posed by the opposition.

She said she had been thinking about "running for something" for three years. A run for state House was dropped when Dr. Kayser Enneking filed to run in her state House district.

"The Florida Senate [run] is easier to manage," she said, than a run for Congress would have been.

Ultimately, however, the aspirations of the campaign trail faded to the grim reality of a life coming to its natural end.

Jennifer Bradley, whose name will face Barratt's on the ballot still, offered words of condolence Wednesday afternoon.

"I'm saddened to hear of the passing of Melina Ravna Svanhild Farley-Barrett. While I never had the opportunity to meet Melina, she was a passionate advocate for equality whose work was impactful to many. My prayers are with her family and friends during this difficult time," the Republican said.

Terrie Rizzo, chair of the Florida Democratic Party, lauded Barratt as a "trailblazer and a constant advocate for equality."

"As the legislative director for the National Organization for Women (NOW) Florida and president of Gainesville Area NOW, she always worked to improve the lives of others and ensure equality for women and transgender people." Rizzo said.

Barratt's friends remember her as a

"Melina is well known for her feminist work battling for the equity and rights of women and LGBTQIA equity in Florida's Capitol, throughout the state, and around the nation. She is the first transgender woman candidate to run for election as a legislator in the Florida Senate and, even in ill health, she fought bitterly to stop the bitter discrimination against transgender and gender-nonconforming people," asserted Lakey Love and the team at Florida National Organization for Women on a Go-FundMe page set up to defray \$15,000 of her final expenses.

Barratt's name will still be on the ballot, but county Democratic leaders will pick a replacement candidate, leading to a "Vote Barratt to pick _ ing approach ahead of Nov. 3. Time would seem to be of the essence for the selection, even though a Democrat is not likely to win the district.

FLEMING ISLAND – Erica Carnegie, 18, has been selected to represent Clay County at the Miss Florida Teen USA competition next year

Carnegie recently learned that she'll represent the county April's Miss Florida Teen USA pageant, and she couldn't be more excited for the opportunity. It's an chance for her to showcase years of personal work but also a chance to highlight something very important and close-to-home.

"My platform is [arteriovenous malformation] and rare disease awareness," Carnegie said. "Specifically, aneurysms and AVM because I'm an AVM survivor. It's like a clump of blood vessels on the brain or elsewhere in the head that can cause an aneurysm, strokes, internal bleeding or even death. After I had corrective surgery, I wanted to find an organization to talk to others with an AVM about their experience."

Miss Florida Teen USA will be the largest stage yet for Carnegie to spread awareness of AVM and the National Youth Ambas-

sador Program for The Aneurysm and AVM Foundation she founded. Carnegie founded the first youth ambassador program for the foundation after simply reaching out to them to ask about whether a program like it existed. She was given the opportunity to kick the program off and assemble a team of other ambassadors.

There's now a team of 10 youth ambassadors in the program and Carnegie is thrilled about it.

"To know I helped assemble a team of individuals like this, to know I brought them together, it makes me so happy," Carnegie said.

She's excited to use the platform of April's pageant to talk even more about AVM, the foundation and the youth ambassador program. April's pageant will be the culmination of years of pageantry for the 18-year-old college student.

Her first pageant was the Miss Clay County Fair pageant and she recalls how shy and reserved she was back then. She said she "never would have guessed she'd be where she's at today" when she was on that stage in 2016. She caught a bug that year though and, after receiving encouragement to do more from her mother who was also into pageantry, pageants became a yearly thing for Carnegie.

Now she's competing in one of the largest pageants in Florida with hopes to become Miss Florida Teen USA where she'll then move on to compete in Miss Teen USA.

"Competing in pageants has allowed me to expand my platform and it's made me more outspoken, outgoing and better at public speaking and interviews," Carnegie said. "[Residents] need to have some housing they can afford. These are the folks who are working in local restaurants. They're bus drivers. They're teachers. They're working in hospitals," Edwards said. "For those making minimum wage, they've got to work 108 hours a week in order to afford a two-bedroom apartment at the market rate."

casting their ballots — some of them getting in line long before the polls opened at $8\ a\ m$

"Record-breaking," said Clay County Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambless the first day of early voting. "The highest single day of early voting previously was around 6,100, and [Monday], our very first day of early voting, we were in the 7,000s if I remember correctly."

The actual turnout throughout Clay County turned out to be 7,959.

Counting 19,430 mail in ballots already collected by the elections office, 31,147 eligible voters in Clay County – nearly 19% – had already cast their ballots by the first day of early voting.

The Fleming Island polling location had the highest turnout in the county, followed by Orange Park. The rest of the polling locations turned out in the following order: Middleburg, Eagle Landing, Green Cove Springs, Thrasher-Horne in Orange Park and Keystone Heights.

Multiple voters spoke after casting their ballots, referencing the importance of getting out to vote early as well as the smoothness of operation. The line moved quickly, and voters were in and out with relative ease.

"It was very important to me because I want to make sure that my vote is counted," said Mary Kenney of Orange Park. "It was very short today. I only waited about 12 minutes."

"I just want to make sure this is one of the most important presidential elections, especially in the United States," said Mitchell Brooks. "It means a lot to me. Also, a lot of the amendments in Florida are very important, too, especially in Clay County." Brooks said he only waited about 15 minutes to vote and that the operation was perfect.

One voter, a U.S. Army Vietnam Veteran who preferred not to be identified, arrived early in the morning to cast his ballot.

"I waited about five minutes [to vote]," the veteran said. He then spent the rest of the morning outside of the Orange Park

polling station seated on the roadside with a Trump/Pence 2020 yard sign promoting his chosen candidate.

The general refrain among voters seemed to be that they sensed this election's importance and wanted to avoid any possible problems in the voting process.

Chambless believes that if the current pace continues, record involvement in the

process could be seen.

"Eighty-seven percent is the highest amount recorded in Clay County in the last 40 years," said Chambless. "Should this [voting by mail and early voting] continue, we could conceivably surpass that 80%, and should that be the case, we could see a record-breaking, somewhere in the high 80s."

Ascension-St. Vincent's to expand emergency services to Green Cove Springs

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Ascension-St. Vincent's Hospital has a long-range plan to build a two-story, 36,000-square-foot emergency treatment medical facility at 1050 N. Orange Ave.

The first floor, according to a concept plan that has been submitted – an official site plan has not yet been submitted would be 18,000 square feet for the emergency department.

The second floor would be comprised of medical offices.

"It's to be an emergency department," said Mike Daniels, city of Green Cove

Springs Planning and Zoning Director. "That's really the intent behind it, is that it would have an emergency department and it wouldn't have other types of patients; it would be really just for emergency department. In terms of, kind of, a full-service hospital, that's not the plan."

The idea, according to Daniels is to mimic some of the similar facilities that are in Jacksonville.

At current, there is not a timetable for the project. Before an official site plan can be submitted, a traffic study has to be com-

"We did have a neighborhood meeting," said Daniels. "One of the big concerns that



was brought up during that neighborhood meeting was the issue of traffic and would

and also any traffic issues with the surrounding neighborhood. That would be something that they need to submit, and we need to review that. Once they do that then it'll go back through the planning and zoning commission and the city council."

The location was a corner that was regarded as being in disrepair. It will be updated and not only newly functional, but more aesthetically pleasing to the city.

Many of the details for the project are still in the works.

"It is too early in the process to have those details," said Kyle Sieg Senior Public Relations Specialist, Ascension Florida and Gulf Coast. 

Orange Park man among those prosecuted for illegal firearms

TAMPA – U.S. Attorney Maria Chapa Lopez announced the results of firearms prosecutions for fiscal year 2020. The U.S. Attorney's Office for the Middle District of Florida has charged more than 200 individuals with violations of federal firearms laws, including Joshua Sams, 20, of Orange Park.

Charges arose from armed robberies, possession of firearms and ammunition by convicted felons, possession of firearms in furtherance of a drug trafficking and violent crimes and false statements in relation to gun purchases.

'Fighting violent crime and keeping our citizens safe continues to be a paramount priority for the Department of Justice and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Middle District of Florida." said United States Attorney Chapa Lopez. "Despite some recent changes in priorities in some of our local law enforcement agencies, we hope to continue to work together with our dedicated and courageous law enforcement partners to remain laser-focused on holding violent criminals accountable, reducing gun violence, and protecting our communities."

Several firearms cases have resulted in significant sentences in FY20, throughout all five divisions of the MDFL.

Clay Health provides suggestions for safe Halloween

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Florida Department of Health in Clay County recommends celebrating Halloween virtually or with members of your own household. The department is encouraging all residents to practice social distancing precautions in order to reduce the risk of spreading infectious diseases

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention explains when family and friends attend celebrations in communities with higher cases of COVID-19, it poses a higher risk for spread of infection. To get more information on COVID-19 case numbers in your or your family's community go to the Florida Department of Health's website, https://floridahealthcovid19.gov.

During Halloween Celebrations

Limit close contact and maintain a distance of six feet or more with people you do not live with. Avoid busy areas and minimize gestures that promote close contact i.e. hugging, shaking hands, or fist bumps. Instead wave or verbally greet others.

Social distance and limit close contact

- Maintain a distance of at least 6 feet or more from people you don't live with. Be particularly mindful in areas where it may harder to keep this distance, such as restrooms and eating areas.
- Avoid using restroom facilities at high traffic times, such as at the end of a public
- Avoid busy eating areas, such as restaurants during high volume mealtimes. if you plan to eat out at a restaurant.
- Minimize gestures that promote close contact. For example, do not shake hands, elbow bump, or give hugs. Instead wave and verbally greet others.

Wear masks

- Wear a mask at all times when around people who don't live in your household to reduce the risk of spreading the virus.
 - Avoid singing, chanting, or shouting,

especially when not wearing a mask and within six feet of others.

- Do not use costume masks in place of cloth masks
- Do not use a costume mask (such as for Halloween) as a substitute for a cloth mask unless it is made of two or more layers of breathable fabric that covers your mouth and nose and doesn't leave gaps around your face.
- Do not wear a costume mask over a cloth mask because it can be dangerous if the costume mask makes it hard to breathe. Instead, consider using a Halloween-themed cloth mask.

Limit contact with commonly touched surfaces or shared items

- Clean and disinfect commonly touched surfaces and any shared items between use when feasible. Use EPA-approved disinfectants external icon.
- Use touchless garbage cans if available. Use gloves when removing garbage bags or handling and disposing of trash. Wash hands after removing gloves.

Wash hands

• Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.

Keep safe around food and drinks

Currently, there is no evidence to suggest that handling food or eating is associated with directly spreading COVID-19. It is possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object, including food, food packaging, or utensils that have the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes. However, this is not thought to be the main way that the virus is spread. Remember, it is always important to follow good hygiene to reduce the risk of illness from common foodborne germs.

- Make sure everyone washes their hands with soap and water for 20 seconds before and after preparing, serving, and eating food. Use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.
- Instead of potluck-style gatherings, encourage guests to bring food and drinks for themselves and for members of their own household only.
- Limit people going in and out of the areas where food is being prepared or handled, such as in the kitchen or around the grill, if possible.
- Wear a mask while preparing or serving food to others who don't live in your household.
- If serving any food, consider having one person serve all the food so that multiple people are not handling the serving
- Use single-use options or identify one person to serve sharable items, like salad dressings, food containers, plates and utensils, and condiments.
- Avoid any self-serve food or drink options, such as buffets or buffet-style potlucks, salad bars, and condiment or drink stations. Use grab-and-go meal options, if
- If you choose to use any items that are reusable (e.g., seating covers, tablecloths, linen napkins), wash and disinfect them after the event.
- · Look for healthy food and beverage options, such as fruits and vegetables, lean proteins, whole grains, and low or no-calorie beverages, at holiday gatherings to help maintain good health.

CDC recommends that you do not use a costume mask as a substitute for a cloth mask unless it is made of two or more layers of breathable fabric that covers your mouth and nose and doesn't leave gaps around your face.

Limit contact with touched surfaces or shared items. Wash your hands to prevent the spread of germs and illnesses. Don't forget other safety issues that may pose a threat during Halloween celebrations such as traffic hazards, limited view with costume masks, and stranger dangers. The following risk activities below can be found on the CDC website (https://www.cdc.gov/ coronavirus/2019-ncov/daily-life-coping/ holidays.html)

Low Risk Activity during Halloween Celebration

- Carving or decorating pumpkins with members of your household and displaying
- Carving or decorating pumpkins outside, at a safe distance, with neighbors or friends.
- Decorating your house, apartment, or living space.
- Doing a Halloween scavenger hunt where children are given lists of Halloween-themed things to look for while they walk outdoors from house to house admiring Halloween decorations at a distance.
- Having a virtual Halloween costume
- Having a Halloween movie night with people you live with.
- Having a scavenger hunt-style trickor-treat search with your household members in or around your home rather than going house to house.

Moderate Risk Activities during Halloween Celebration

- Participating in one-way trick-ortreating where individually wrapped goodie bags are lined up for families to grab and go while continuing to social distance (such as at the end of a driveway or at the edge of a yard).
- If you are preparing goodie bags, wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 second before and after preparing the bags.

meet that demand. When you look at it in terms of months of inventory, what's available, in Clay County it's at .98. We have less than one month of inventory as of Monday. This is the first time I've seen less than one month of inventory in 20 years."

Construction crews are working feverishly, especially in the Green Cove Springs, Lake Asbury, Fleming Island, Middleburg and Oakleaf areas. The county's building inspectors review 15-to-20 sites a day. With hundreds of new homes currently under construction — and hundreds more in the planning phase or on a waiting list — there are no suggestions of a slowdown.

Dream Finders Homes built 99 homes as part of its first phase on Eagle Harbor Circle on Fleming Island. They sold out quickly.

Phase 2 is a 48-house community called Reserve at Eagle Harbor on U.S. Highway 17 on Fleming Island. There currently are only four lots remaining.

Buyers are so eager to lock in a home at a good price, they're willing to wait as long as seven months to allow construction teams – rain or shine – to clear the lot and build a house.

The numbers slo prove the COVID-19 pandemic has accelerated the real estate business. Dee-Dee Robinson, who owns DD Home Realty on Wells Road in Orange Park, said the disease has led many to not

take life for granted.

"People are saying 'why not?' They're not putting things off anymore," Robinson said.

The demand for existing homes is just as fervent. A sign of a healthy balanced real estate market is when there's enough inventory to satisfy five to six months of demands, said Northeast Florida Association of Realtor's Melanie Green. Clay County's list of available houses now is measured in weeks, not months.

"This is unheard of," Green said. "There's not as many sellers, but there's a big demand."

Robinson said agents have to be patient and creative to close every deal. With so

many buyers, sellers generally can sort through several offers.

"It is a big problem. I've got buyer who need to be in a home and we're submitting offers and we're not getting them accepted because the sellers are getting multiple offers," Robinson said. "Sometimes I have to submit three or four offers before I get something accepted. I'm showing more houses in a pandemic, so we're being safe. I have to show more in order to get something under contract."

Zeisel agreed, saying it often takes less than a week to put a home on the market and get several offers.

With a median selling price \$255,250 reported in September, according NEFAR,

real estate has become a significant driving force of the county's economy.

"If you're \$300,000 or less, as soon as you come on the market, when it's positions properly and marketed accurately with high-quality photos and doing the right things to make sure the buyers can actually see it, you'll have a contract generally that week a lot of times with multiple offers," Zeisel said.

The threats and uncertainty of the virus also have convinced residents to remodel their homes instead of selling them, Green said. That is supported by a 21% increase in stock prices for The Home Depot since the COVID-19 pandemic started in March, and a 48.6% jump from the lowest stock prices during the pandemic compared to this week for Lowe's Home Improvement.

The pandemic has changed what homebuyers want in a house, too, Zeisel said.

"There are a lot of people now that have found their position in the job that they're working permits them to work from home," he said. "Now, more than ever, it's important they're not inside an 800-square-foot apartment. They want a place of their own because they can work from home. It's created a whole different kind of demand.

"Now the buyers who are coming in are looking at other bedrooms they can convert into office space or are their floorplans that have office space already built into it because more and more people are working from home."







"Normally, I coach to earn our way in with games like Baker County and Raines that battle test us. This year, and we still have unbeaten Clay, we are maturing as the season goes. That's always been my theory."

The highlight of the game, on both sides as Macpherson was switching out quarterbacks Tavien Wilkerson and Derrionte Myrick to offset passing and rushing attacks and Middleburg coach Karl Smeltzer was giving his junior quarterback free reign to run or throw on the fly, it was the

first two plays of the third quarter that exploded the county rivalry into a frenzy.


With Orange Park kicking off, Middleburg fullback Logan Padgett showed off some wheels against the highly athletic Raider secondary by blasting through a center-guard gaping hole and outsprinting the likes of Erickson McConnell, Raider safety, to the end zone for an 83 yard score and a Bronco lead of 13-9.

Knights gain momentum for Bartram Trail battle

MANDARIN – The Oakleaf Knights redeemed themselves after a year of dwelling on a heartbreaking 2019 34-33 loss against the Mandarin Mustangs. This time they left no doubt about who was the better team Friday, riding the backfield of quarterback Walter Simmons III and running back Adrian Grey to a convincing 35-12 road victory. The Knights jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter and never looked back.

The loss last year was followed by a subsequent loss to Bartram Trail that knocked the Knights from the playoffs. Bartram Trail would finish as 8A runnerup to Apopka.

"This is one we definitely circled on the schedule," said Oakleaf head coach Frank Garis. "It doesn't matter what the situation is, record-wise. It's one that we definitely wanted since last year. We kind of preached it to the kids. It's been 371 days. This is that bad taste we got left with at the end of the game last year. We wanted to make sure all that pain and heartache kind of came out tonight." Simmons III, Grey, and company left no doubt.

Simmons III set the tone early, opening the scoring with 8:56 remaining in the first quarter on a 13-yard touchdown run that showed his strength and elusiveness. From that point, the rout was on.

"We can't operate without him [Simmons III]," said Garis. "Anytime it's a play that's taken away or becomes a broken play, he does an unbelievable job of making the smart heady play of not forcing turnovers or forcing the issue."

On the next drive, Simmons III connected with his favorite target, Terrance Anthony, for a 24-yard touchdown down the seam.

"I think they [the team] did a great job of being locked in and dialed in early because we've had some slow starts this season," said Garis. "But the way we started this game is a great sign for us from our standpoint of we're fixing our issues."

While Simmons III got most of the attention, Grey was the Knights' workhorse, punishing Mustang defenders and driving his legs all night long to the tune of 178 rushing yards.

"Last year they stopped me, so this year I just had to come out and play," said Grey. "this is an every week thing. I do this

every week. I try to come out 110%; leave it all on the field every week." The Oakleaf offensive line blocked well all night, opening holes for Grey on 13 different carries of five or more yards. When the holes weren't there, he ran hard, breaking tackles, driving his legs, and almost always finishing runs falling forward. The Knights leaned on Grey all night, handing him the ball 29 times

"He's our guy; he's our heartbeat," Garis said of Grey. "We had a situation, were coming into the game we were down to two running backs, so Adrian [Grey] had to carry us. He said, 'Yes, sir, let's do it.' You guys see how electric he is. It's hard to tackle that kid because you don't know if he's going to try to run you over, make you miss, or try to stutter you and jump-cut. To us, he's the perfect running back for our offense, and we go how he goes."

Oakleaf (4-2) plays next week at Bartram Trail (5-1), while Mandarin (1-4) hosts Sandalwood (5-0).



return to the state meet to retrieve her first title, but not necessarily in the two events she near-missed in last year.

"I feel pretty good this year, but with everything that happened since March, it's been hectic," said Stotler, who has committed to swim at the University of Tennessee next year. "I was going to a meet to get my Olympic Trials cut when we got the call that the meet was cancelled because of the COVID. The high school season has been challenging with all the restrictions and all."

Stotler noted that last year's state meet was en route to her going to the Winter Nationals in December.

This year, the nationals are set for the two days prior to state because of the CO-VID.

"Instead of a one day national meet, the nationals are being held in eight different locations because of the COVID so I'm swimming Thursday and Friday in Sarasota at nationals, then Saturday and Sunday in Stuart at the state meet," said Stotler. "It's crazy and a lot of swimming but I'm training for it just like last year."

Medina stormed into the state meet last year after winning the 100 free at regions by a touch in a tied time at 48.84 and a third in the 200 free by less than one second in 1:47.95, and though his times improved slightly at state; 48.51 for 11th in the 100 and 1:47.12 for 19th in the 200, this year is different.

"His workload up to this point has been tremendous," said Orange Park High swim coach Susan Johnson. "He should go in the 50 and 100 frees and taking him out of the 200, I think, has improved his speed. We've improved to make him faster."

For Medina, the return to the state meet has been a journey of a new country, new school and new pool and training since arriving at Orange Park High School.

"I started swimming in the back pool of a friends house in Puerto Rico and then I went to a swim team in the city to try out," said Medina, who was interviewed with his mother, Melisa Pagan, at the Argyle Pool. "The guy who trained me at the first pool was the pool maintenance guy."

In his home country of Puerto Rico, Medina found his passion for the sports via a workout that included a host of local swim stalwarts that invited Medina to join them.

"We were doing 100 meter repeats at what was supposed to be one minute, 15



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

seconds, but I was hitting 1:10s against the big guys," said Medina. "The feeling I got when I knew I could swim like that and still be strong at the end to do more let me know I could take this to the next level. That was when I was 14."

Johnson noted that Medina came to America to train at the Bolles School and there he met Charles Johnson, Susan's son.

"He's the one that got me to talk to coach Johnson and eventually come here," said Medina. "She knows all about big meets."

Johnson, six years at Orange Park, has three Olympic Trials on her resume plus

some stellar splits for the famous Mission Viego team out of California. Johnson swam collegiate at the University of Georgia.

"He is very shy and kind of was in awe at the state meet," said Johnson, who coaches with former Fleming Island butterfly specialist Kyle Casias. "This year, he is focused much more on doing what it takes to finish."

Medina noted that his inspiration for medals has become by way of watching American Olympian Michael Phelps outtouched South Africa's Chad Le Clos in the 200 butterfly in the RIO Olympics.

"When I saw him do that, I said, I want to do that." said Medina.

FHSAA releases football playoff brackets

GAINESVILLE - With the COVID pandemic affecting schedules throughout the state, the Florida High School Athletic Association has released the regional playoff brackets with November 6 to be the start date with Play-In games to open the tournament schedules.

One guy that likes the set up is Middleburg High coach Karl Smeltzer who is slated to travel to unbeaten Pensacola Escambia (4-0) in their playoff opener with 6A strongholds Robert E. Lee (4-0) and St. Augustine (3-2) to possibly follow with an upset.

"We probably drew the toughest route into the playoffs with Pensacola Escambia our first game, but I think we are going to be a very dangerous team by the time the playoffs start," said Smeltzer, after a grueling 30-27 loss to an also much-improved Orange Park team on Friday. "We have eight sophomore that are starting, but this team went from a 35-0 loss to Ridgeview one week to a 34-27 loss two weeks later to them that came because of a late turnover. We are slowly cleaning up that stuff and, I have said before, this is a fun group to coach because they play hard from start to finish. We clean up the mistakes and we could upset some people down the line."

Playoff games; starting with Play-in Games for lower seeded teams, will begin

November 13 and run through six rounds of play to December 17-19 where the state championships will be played at Gene Cox Stadium in Tallahassee for Classes 1A-3A on Dec. 10-12 and at a to-be-determined site Dec. 17-19 for Classes 4A-8A.

After this summer's series of meetings designed to form a policy for the 2020 season with regard to teams able or unable to play games in their respective regions, the FHSAA determined that any team that dones does not qualify for the FHSAA state tournament may compete in a post season bowl game after the regular season sched-

ules are completed.

According to the FHSAA rules and regulations, there will be no district champions for 2020, but all teams who remain in the state tournament will earn a playoff spot.

The game draws and opponent selection will be via a blind draw; not won/lost records

For Classes 1A-4A, which includes Keystone Heights, if more than eight teams competed in the regular season, a play-in game will be schedule with lower seeded teams playing each other to fill the 8-team bracket.

For 5A-8A, which is all the Clay County public high schools, 16 teams will fill the region bracket with seeds 16 and 17 to play play-in games. Home teams were determined by a coin flip.

In Class 4A, Region 1, Keystone Heights will travel to Bradford County for their regoin opener on Nov. 13. Opposite the Indians, Palatka will travel to South Sumter.

On the upper side of the Region 2 bracket, Bolles hosts The Villages and West Nassau hosts Fernandina Beach.

In 2019, Bolles won the region final over Bradford before losing the Class 4A championship to Booker T. Washington. Keystone Heights lost their region opener to Astronaut 34-14.

There are no Play-In games for region 2-4A.

In Class 5A, Orange Park (2-4) will travel Citrus High (1-3) on November 13 for their Play-In game with the Raiders having Menendez above them in the bracket. Orange Park will play Menendez on October 30 in a scheduled season matchup.

In the opposite bracket to Orange Park is North Marion (0-4) at Belleview (0-4) and Dunnellon (3-0) at Eastside (0-4) on Thurs., Nov. 12 at Citizen's Field.

In the adjoining 5A region bracket, where Ridgeview and Clay reside, the Panthers (5-1) will travel to Tavares (3-1) in their opener on November 13 while Clay (5-0) hosts Leesburg (0-3) in their opener.

Wilkerson bobbled the ensuing center snap and got corraled at midfield, but got up and hit Nolan Chambers with a rainbow pass to the Bronco seven.


"My theory all the time is give me young players and a couple years," said Macpherson. "We got a ton of talent, but also all sophomores and freshmen. We'll see the result in two years."

dominated the Womens Category 1-3 races with wins in all three disciplines; time trial (At Camp Blanding), road race (staged at Penney Farms, and criterium (at Thrasher Horne Civic Center). "We were able to sit atop our RV and watch a little of it and that made the weekend pretty cool. It's been a beautiful weekend."

Two area officials, Kimberly Morgan, director of tourism in Clay County, and Mike Cella, a county commissioner, were both on hand for the road race event Saturday morning in Penney Farms to see the fruits of the plan to bring world class cycling to Clay County.

"We were scheduled to host the USA cycling qualifier in June, but the COVID cancelled that," said Morgan. "We couldn't get the event as a national qualifier, but we will host that national qualifier next year. We are the first national cycling event in the United States and we combined with Airstream Ventures in Jacksonville to put this on as sort of a test run for next year's event."

Morgan noted that 10 states were represented in the racing including as far as California and Minnesota.

"I think that the cyclists nationwide were just ready to compete," said Morgan. "This is the first racing events in the country. We appreciated all involved, public safety, the sheriff's office, Camp Blanding for the time trial, our friends in Penney Farms, the Velobrew Cycling team all made it a great team effort."

For Cella, the event was granted through the county's bed tax and considered the event a two-fold benefit.

"That TDC (Tourism Development Council) money is generated to put on events like this because it brings out of state tourism into our county," said Cella. "The other part is the quality of life aspect of sharing our county with people from around the country. Residents like to have events like this in their hometown. It creates a buzz and we can showcase our community. We have had great feedback already from this event and great anticipation of the next one."

On the mens side of the racing, in the criterium Pro Category 1-3 division, area racers got to see one of the southeast's best young cycylist, a Artem Shmidt, just 16, of Georgia, who brought his national age group champion pedigree to battle with the some of the best veterans of Florida cycling including Florida state champion Owen Schott of Ponte Vedra

"We had a three-man break and we worked out, but I had a little more to win the sprints," said Shmidt. "I had some junior gears on my bike, but was able to breakaway on the sprint. Owen was hanging for a while at the end."

Shmidt, 16, who has won multiple national titles in his very young cycling career, battled with Schott, 40, a endurance athlete with the Jacksonville-based Velobrew Racing Team, in Sunday's exciting criterium that circled the Thrasher Horne

Civic Center in a 0.8 mile loop of fast action on College Avenue.

"This was awesome to see the Under 18 national champion, an Under 23 national champion all in one spot made the two days very competitive," said Schott, who brought a slew of the Jacksonville-based Velobrew Racing Team athletes.

"I think Clay County was well represented and the community really supported the efforts of everyone who put it on."

Schott reiterated that the original plan for the cycling event was the USA nationals qualifier in June, but that the COVID experience cancelled that event.

"The goal is to bring the best amateurs here to compete in a world class event," said Schott. "I can't think of a first-time event that was run so smoothly. This could really double in size in the future and have hundreds of cyclist in each event."

In the final surge of the Sunday criterium, Shmidt's youthful legs of speed outkicked Schott for the win. Justin Bolde, 33, finished third just a hair off the pace as he was part of a mid-race breakaway.

In one of other race that featured youthful exuberance, Stephen Pimentel, 22, of Fresno, California, a Category 4 and 5 racer in the Penney Farms road race, took a two-mile jump on the Peloton, the chase pack of cyclists, on the turn from Thunder Road to CR 218 and held on past Lake Asbury to outlast the chase pack to the finish line in front of Penney Farms.

"We drove all the way out just for this," said Pimentel, who was competing with a group called Velo Kings Racing in his first pro cycling event after a tennis career in California. "I broke away at that turn and had some attacks throughout the race on that big hill (on Thunder Road). We got mountains in California."

Pimentel also finished seventh in the criterium and was the Omnium champion.

"We are going to compete in the state championship races next week even though we can't win a title, but the racing is intense here," said Pimentel.

For event director Joel Lamp of Airstream Ventures out of Jacksonville, who orchestrated all three days with a lot of Clay County officials.

"On a scale of one to 10, this has been a 10 for the event," said Lamp. "I think everyone enjoyed the course here in Clay County. Overall, it was a great event with everyone contributing to make it well run and with just some small hiccups. I think we'll see more of these type of events. This was a great criterium set up that the racers all loved.

Everyone got to see a part of Florida and compete in some very competitive and challenging races."

At the Florida State Road Race Championships, held Sat., Oct. 17 in Ocala, Hemmerlein won the 19-29 state title and took third in the Pro 1-2 race, Shmidt finished fifth in the Pro 1-2 race and second in the Under-35 race, and Michael Hernandez, a racer for the Florida Velo team out of the Tampa area, was Pro 1-2 champion. At the Clay County Great American Road Race, Hernandez won the road race title and was fifth in the time trial and criterium.

We wanted to come out here and fire them up in the first quarter."

And fire away they did.

On the first play, Griner only needed seconds to find wide receiver Reid Waugh in the left flat to go up 7-0 in 28 seconds.

For the rest of the game, Clay bolted on a super-charger in that steamroller and simply smashed the Falcons 49-7. The total team effort kept Clay a perfect 5-0 as they continue to flatten anything that gets in their way.

For first year coach Kyle Kennard, the explosiveness of his offense under Griner only hides the affection for his big guys up front on both sides of the line of scrimmage.

"My defensive line doesn't get enough love" said Kennard. "Especially my interior tackles. They get after it and it showed, allowing only seven points. They are quiet, play hard, and just get after it week in and week out. We wanted to make the Falcons one dimensional tonight, make them throw the football, while stopping the run. I'd say we were successful."

After the one-play drive, the defense forced a Falcon punt to set up Griner and the Steamroller. Clay, using runners Al Querious "Q" Ray, Griner, Gavin Rossow, and sprinkled in Jaden Bryan and Jarvis Lee to keep the Falcons guessing. Clay powerhouse Q Ray would pull a ton of work gaining 211 yards on 17 carries with one a 68-yarder, running in the second score at 7:40. The 211 was Ray's second straight 200-plus yard rushing total with a third in game one at 199 yards.

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Monroe offense ignites

ORANGE PARK - Ridgeview High football coach Matt Knauss unleashed his offensive game plan to highlight his quarterback and his air attack and the result was fruitful as the Panthers threw haymakes all night to a 36-0 win over Gainesville Eastside Friday night.

"We have probably five good receivers and one of the best throwing quarterback around," said Knauss. "We realized that our running game as a priority was not working and that our air game was going to have to become more prominent. We opened it up and the result was good."

Ridgeview senior quarterback Max Monroe had his way in the air with a 14 of 22 passing night for two scores; one a 78 yarder to Spencer Calise, the other an 11-yarder. Monroe also ran for a touchdown.

Eagles exact rebound on Bucs

FLEMING ISLAND - Fleming Island High running back Tim Thomas ran for 216 yards and a touchdown as Fleming Island started fast and cruised to a 27-7 victory over visiting First Coast on Fri., Oct. 16 as the Golden Eagles rebounded from an overtime loss to Oakleaf High last week.

"We came out and we executed," said Fleming Island head coach Damenyum Springs, whose Golden Eagles scored on their first two possessions. "The O-line was opening up holes and the two big backs had a little boost tonight."

The two backs Springs was referring to were Thomas and Sam Singleton. Thomas, a 220-pound senior who is committed to play at the Air Force Academy next fall, rushed for 166 yards in the first half and had only three carries over the final two quarters. Singleton, a 190-pound sophomore, contributed 81 yards on 11 attempts and scored twice.

"Thomas ran hard and had good vision, while Singleton put his foot in the ground and made people miss," said Springs.

The Golden Eagles put their overtime loss to Clay County rival Oakleaf the previous week behind them, turning to a formula that had served them well during a 16 game regular season winning streak that ended against the Knights— a pun-

ishing ground game and an opportunistic defense.

Fleming Island needed only 18 seconds to score on the first drive of the game. Thomas ran through a huge hole up the middle for 65 yards on the first play from scrimmage. On the next play, Singleton found a similar hole and sprinted untouched to the end zone from 14 yards out.


After the Golden Eagles defense forced a three and out, Fleming Island used a mix of passes and runs to march 77 yards in 12 plays. Thomas capped the drive with an eight yard run over left tackle, and, after Colt Hyams' extra point, the hosts led 14-0 with 5:38 remaining in the first quarter.
