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The Way, Chamber join forces to provide healthcare to uninsured local workers

In the third of a three-part series, The Way Medical Clinic is pushing forward despite the challenges of COVID-19 and the economic slowdown that came with it. In the first two installments, The Way revealed it will open a second clinic in Orange Park next year and its plan to create ClayPASS to help needy families navigate more efficiently through the healthcare system. This week, the series will conclude with a program by The Way and Chamber of Commerce to provide medical care to uninsured businesses in the county.

CLAY COUNTY — The Way Free Medical Clinic and the Chamber of Commerce are looking to bring local employers and their employees into the fold of free healthcare.

Free healthcare may sound too good to be true, but that's exactly what The Way Free Medical Clinic in Green Cove Springs provides to its patients. The Way executive director Don Fann said there's a stigma with the clinic and free healthcare, but he says it's not healthcare just for the homeless or for those with nowhere else to turn. The Chamber and the clinic are working to break that stigma so that otherwise un-

insured, low-income employees without healthcare can get the medical attention they might need.

"Way@Work is a free medical care program for low income, uninsured employees of local businesses," Fann said. "So many businesses can't afford to provide insurance coverage to employees who are ineligible for benefits and this program outreached local businesses to enroll eligible low-income, uninsured workers into The Way Free medical clinic's care before they become ill so that when they do need care, they're already a patient."

Way@Work is a multi-step program The Way plans to launch in January. It's multistep because adding hundreds of new pa-

tients at one time wouldn't bode well for the clinic. So The Way and the Chamber of Commerce will work to bring the new patients onboard in phases.

Way@Work works directly with local businesses to pre-qualify workers for free medical care before they become ill, Fann said, and when it launches, it will be free to both workers and employers, and participating businesses will have the option to sponsor the program through a corporate donation, which is tax deductible.

After Fann and his team came up with the idea, they knew they needed to dig into Clay County's business community, and that meant bringing in the Clay County Chamber of Commerce and its president, Wendell Chindra.

"A crucial piece of Way@Work is getting businesses to buy into the idea and the program," Chindra said. "The Way has been here doing good work, but Way@Work needs to receive some validation and collaboration, which is where we come in."

Chindra and the Chamber will be working with its members to get them involved, and he said having the Chamber behind the program will help it gain more ground.

"I approached Wendell because I saw the potential and immense value of the partnership with the chamber," Fann said. "Essentially, this is an outreach program so even though we may think there are say, 50,000 low-income, uninsured in Clay County, we don't know who or where they are necessarily. We do know many are employees in our local businesses though and the chamber's extensive reach is just a perfect augmentation to this program for

Fann said one of the greatest benefits of the program is the employees and their family will be able to receive free health-care from the clinic. Beyond the immediate benefits of free healthcare and healthcare in general, Fann said employers will likely notice improved employee performance, attendance and retention.

One of the leading factors employees leave their job is benefits. If a happy employee doesn't have benefits, they might leave their job in search of a job for health insurance. Way@Work will be there to bridge that gap, Fann said.

The program is expected to launch next year and as the months go by, more businesses will be brought into the fold.

"Employers at their heart would like to give as much as they could, including benefits, but financially, it's difficult," Chindra said. "Add COVID-19 to the equation and the word impossible definitely enters the vocabulary. With the addition of COVID-19 and everything we're dealing with, I think the timing of the program is great.

"When Don first approached me about this, it sounded too good to be true and I felt as though by adding our name to it, it will validate it and take the possible lack of trust from businesses away from it. Timing is important. You could have the greatest idea in the world, but if the timing is off, it could fail. The timing could not be better for this and I'm excited for our local businesses to learn about this."

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The Power of prevention: An advocate's plea for action

Without any doubt, prevention is the best medicine.

In both personal behavior and public policy priorities, keeping bad things from happening is not only wise, it's potentially life-saving.

For more than 40 years, it has been my honor to advocate for tried and true policies, programs and practices for children which reduce risk and enhance success.

In so many ways, our children's health and well-being depends on us doing our best to avoid problems before they bring negative results. From the earliest stages of life, access to prenatal care enhances the likelihood of a healthy birth. The research is clear and convincing...early health care in pregnancy minimizes newborn distress and reduces infant mortality.

We have learned so much about early brain development and the importance of providing positive sensory experiences to enhance emotional well-being and pave the way for educational success. Babies are smart in so many ways. When they receive the attention they crave, are properly fed and lovingly cared for, they learn that they are safe and secure. When they are ignored, neglected or suffer violence, they perceive their world to be an unsafe and frightening place.

Innovative neurological research tells us that the majority of brain growth and development occurs years before kindergarten. Realizing that our homes are our first school rooms recognizes the vital importance of the early years. That is why timely education and support services for new parents and affordable high-quality early learning opportunities in the community are so essential for our children's educational futures.

I doubt that anyone would dismiss these realities as unimportant, but it's up to all of us as individuals, family members, neighbors and citizens to do all we can to create opportunities for our youngest to survive, thrive and succeed.

When it comes to children, it's not whether we pay; it's when. Investing in success is far better than paying the high costs of failure. Not only does an ounce of prevention avoid a pound of cure...it far outweighs a ton of punishment.

My experience tells me that a "whole child, whole family and whole community" approach to assuring that prudent investments in quality care should be made

New year finally takes us away from 2020 – and to start of a new racing season

The best thing about 2020 is the fact it's almost gone. That means we can be optimistic about 2021.

For me, that means the return of the racing season.

The lure of sports-car racing has always been tempting for NASCAR drivers.

Jimmie Johnson is on that long list of stock car drivers who continues to accept the challenge of a twicearound-the-clock race.

Johnson will join Action Express Racing in the No. 48 Cadillac DPiV.R. His

co-drivers will be 2019 Indianapolis 500 winner Simon Pagenaud, two-time Rolex 24 at Daytona winner Kamui Kobayashi and former Daytona and LeMans winner Mike Rockenfeller in a second Action Express car.

Action team manager Gary Nelson, the former NASCAR Cup Series Director, last week confirmed the formation of second car for the Jan. 30-31 on the 3.56-mile Daytona International Speedway road course.

"We've been talking to Jimmie about running with us for many months," Nelson said. "It all came together in November with the support of Hendrick Motorsports and their tremendous partner, Ally. "Jimmie has a lot of experience at Daytona, not only on the oval, but turning into the infield as well. Simon brings a lot of endurance experience and Kamui adds a wealth of car setup knowledge and speed to the car. We won the Rolex 24 with Mike in 2010, so he is familiar with how we operate. I would like to thank fellow IMSA competitor Paul Miller for sharing the 48 number. We're looking at having a great 10 days in Daytona starting with the Roar Before the 24."

The Cadillacs have won the last four sports car marathons, including in 2018 when Action Express won with its No. 5 Mustang Sampling prototype.

The other three Cadillac wins were by Wayne Taylor Racing, but Taylor switched to the Acura ARX-05 after Penske Racing withdrew from the series.

Taylor's void will be filled by Chip Ganassi Racing. The organization that's won a record six 24-hour races at Daytona will return in a Cadillac with drivers Renger van der Zande and Kevin Magnussen. Additional drivers will be selected later, but Ganassi has a long list of candidates from his NASCAR and IndyCar teams, including four-time Daytona winner Scott Dixon, Kurt Busch, Alex Palou, Marcus Ericsson and Tony Kanaan

Johnson retired last month as a full-time NASCAR driver after winning 83 of 686 starts. He will race in selected IndyCar events in 2021, as well as the 24-hour race in Daytona.

Next month's race will be Johnson's 10th career sports car start. Eight came

at Daytona and one came in 2010 at Watkins Glen International.

"The Rolex 24 At Daytona is one of the marquee races in the world." Johnson said. "It's such a challenging event for both team and driver and requires such a high level of concentration throughout. It's just such a fun and unique race to compete in. This will be the first time I've raced with Action Express and have been very impressed with the team and its preparation.

"I'm also excited to have Ally on board and to be co-driving with Simon, Kamui and Mike, who are three world-class drivers with experience in this race and the DPi class. I've finished second in this event, so I'm looking forward to trying to get on the top step in 2021."

Johnson will try to join A.J. Foyt, Mario Andretti and Jeff Gordon as the only drivers to win the Daytona 500 at 24 Hours of Daytona.

He also will try to join the ever-growing list of prominent stock-car drivers to win the Daytona sports car race. Kyle Larson, Jamie McMurray, Juan Pablo Montoya, Kyle Busch, Kurt Busch, A.J. Allmendinger, Dale Earnhardt, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Clint Bowyer, Michael Waltrip, Mark Martin,

Casey Mears, Paul Menard, John Andretti, Darrell Waltrip and Tony Stewart all have appeared in Daytona's 24-hour main event.

Car owner Rick Hendrick said he expected Johnson and newly-crowed Cup Series champion Chase Elliott to be in the 24-hour race.

"Both of our guys, Chase and Jimmie. will be in the 24hour race, so I'm looking forward to that," Hendrick said during Elliott's post-race celebration.

Hendrick then quickly back-peddled.

"Maybe I jumped the gun on that. I'm not 100% sure. I heard a rumor, okay, so I can't confirm that.'

Elliott hasn't slowed down in NASCAR's three-month break. He finished third at the Snowball Derby at Five Flags Speedway in Pensacola, and he's scheduled to drive a Midget in next month's Chili Bowl Nationals at the Tulsa Expo Center.

The son of 1988 NASCAR champion Bill Elliott, hasn't yet confirmed his plans to race at IMSA's season-opener. Bill Elliott won the smaller GTO Class in the 1987 24hour race.

The Roar Before the Rolex 24 open practice session is scheduled for Jan. 22-24 and it includes the Motul Pole Award 100 qualifying race to determine the starting grid for the Rolex 24.

The Rolex 24 At Daytona will take the green flag on Jan. 30 at 3:40 p.m.


While I consider myself an optimist by nature, it's clear to me that the good things $% \left(x\right) =\left(x\right) +\left(x$

Vietnam veterans, CenterState Bank team to provide food, clothing to homeless students

ORANGE PARK – Two seemingly unrelated organizations in the county have teamed up to get food, clothing and other essentials to the school district's homeless population.

The local chapter of Vietnam Veterans and a bank likely aren't the first two things to pop into your head when you think of a food and goods drive team-up, but that's exactly what happened with Vietnam Vet-

erans of America Chapter 1059 and Orange Park's CenterState Bank. The two raised truckloads of food and clothing for homeless students in Clay County.

"It was probably early fall that we were made aware through my Rotary Club that there is a large population of homeless students in Clay County," CenterState Bank's Michele Riley said. "When we heard about that, we decided that we'd do a drive as there was a serious need for clothing and food, as well as toiletries. We have been

doing this drive now for several months and it's been extremely successful."

This months-long drive originally started off as a single-month project. CenterState Bank branches receive \$125 each month to put back into the community by means of a charity or some other community-helping act or organization. Riley and her team landed on the school district's homeless population months ago and the need was so large that now, several months later, the drive is still alive

It received its largest donation yet just

last week. That's where David Treffinger and the Chapter 1059 Vietnam veterans come in. Treffinger doesn't remember exactly how his chapter learned of Riley's work, but he said when they did hear about it, they got right to work.

"I put an email out to our members, about 155 members in this chapter and 30 associates of Vietnam Veterans of America, about what was needed." Treffinger said. "We held an outdoor meeting on Dec. 5 and


MIDDLEBURG – The Florida Forest Service is honored to present this year's prestigious "Volunteer of the Year" award to Dennis Chapman of Middleburg.

that's where we collected everything for the students. We had truckloads of things. Trunks were full, back seats were stocked...I just couldn't believe it."

Treffinger said for as surprised as he was, he probably shouldn't have been. That's because the veterans of Chapter 1059 are some of the most generous people he knows, Treffinger said.

"It's been phenomenal working with David," Riley said. "The vets have been the largest contributor to this drive so far. We were just beside ourselves when we learned of how much they had raised for us. Our branch is stuffed with food and goods for these students."

Riley said the goods have been primarily going to Middleburg and Orange Park highs. Riley said that's where the most recent intake of goods is going, although she's recently heard of Grove Park Elementary and Ridgeview High's need. She said

schools like Ridgeview don't have great storage options for drives like this, but that she wants to work with the district to possibly create a network of involved schools.

If a school can store the goods and allow someone from a different school to access them, that'd be perfect, Riley said in reference to storage options in the district.

Riley and her team are working to get the truckloads of food and essentials to students before the school district's winter break begins. She said she's learned in this process that many homeless students live in cars without heat, under bridges and in wooded areas in Clay County.

"We take for granted our homes and our jobs that keep us somewhere warm and not worried about food, but there are children in our county that are homeless and school might be the only place they get warmth and food," Riley said. "We are just trying to help however we can, be it some food or a pair of socks.



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Union County Correctional inmates contribute \$600 to Kids First

State's most-hardened criminals collect money to help abused, abandoned children

ORANGE PARK – Kids First of Florida, a community-based agency for children's welfare and foster care in Clay County, received a \$600 donation from inmates of Union County Correctional Institution in Raiford

Approximately 110 inmates of the prison are members of the Vietnam Veterans of America

"Every year for the past six years, we have been making donations to different charities throughout the state of Florida," said Gary Newman, Vice president of the Vietnam Veterans of America, Florida State Council. Newman is also the advisor of the incarcerated chapter 1080 of the organization.

"We raise money by having a Walk-A-Thon every year, and that's where we generate our money, plus donations. This year we weren't able to have the Walk-A-Thon to raise the money, but we did have some assets left over. The prisoners decided who to give the money to."

Union County Correctional Institution, formerly known at Florida State Prison, houses the state's most-dangerous criminals, including all 339 inmates sentenced to Florida's Death Row.

Newman quickly realized some of the most-hardened prisoners still want to play a role, however limited, in their community.

Newman already had discussed Kids First with the inmates, and they immediately liked the donation idea.

"We are in a position now where we can do a little more for our kids, especially during the Christmas season, with a donation like this that Gary [Newman] was able to acquire through the generosity of these inmates," said Ernie Cohen of Kids First.

Newman is partial to Kids First. He came from a broken home and was raised in foster homes and orphanages. He didn't have a real Christmas until he was 6 and he has never forgotten the one gift he received that year-a Nutcracker set.

"I've always had a very soft heart for kids who unfortunately cannot have a decent Christmas," he said. "So, I really wanted to be able to support the Kids First program of giving out gifts at Christmas time."

Some of the inmates at the prison in Chapter 1080 had a similar childhood experience and wanted to give back to society

as much as they could. This small effort was one way they could do that.

Donating to Kids First touched those involved.

"It made us super-ecstatic," said Newman. "We love giving back to the children, especially those who unfortunately have not had nice Christmases."

"I was so moved by this," said Cohen.
"Gary [Newman] is very involved with the
Vietnam Veterans of America, and they've

been generous with us in the past, and Gary's been generous with us on a personal level. Those are always appreciated. But a group of people, seeing the challenges of these inmates, it makes it even a little bit more special than people just out in the community on an everyday basis. They took it on themselves to raise money for these kids and it's just so moving for me and everybody else in the agency."







Facebook Question of the Week Do you trust the new COVID-19 vaccines?

CLAY COUNTY – With the first of two major COVID-19 vaccines going into the distribution phase, residents are split on their feelings about the vaccine.

We asked Clay Today readers what they thought about the incoming COVID-19 vaccines. Some are outright against it. Some are for it. And some said they will be cautious of the side effects.

The general public won't see the vaccines until a couple of months. That's because the vaccines first are going to healthcare workers and first responders.

"Phase 1A [of the vaccines] will be for large hospitals," Clay County Health Department administrator Heather Huffman said. "The State of Florida has been allocated about 170,000 doses at the beginning."

It's easy to see 170,000 vaccines won't make a dent in Florida's population of 21.5 million, but it's going to the people who are at greater risk than others. Domenic Musco said anyone who wants to get the vaccine should be able to get it.

"If it works, and it's approved for use, get it to anyone who wants it ASAP at no cost," Musco said. "Prioritize most at-risk and essential workers. Let's get this CO-VID-19 thing over with."

Others are suspicious of the vaccines. The Food and Drug Administration, which is made up of scientists, have already approved the Pfizer vaccine, which was created by scientists as well, but that won't stop people from believing otherwise.

Some of the responses to Facebook Question of the Week about vaccines include people saying the vaccine is microchipping the global population, that it changes the genetic code, and that the side effects are drastic and not worth risking, although the FDA said it wouldn't have approved the vaccine if that was true.

"If you want to get one, get one and if you don't, then don't," Clarise Keegan said. "This is America. We're all adults. We can make our own decisions rather to or not. No one should be forced to do anything they don't want to do."

Many said they simply don't trust the vaccine. Kathy Roy said she's not anti-vaccine, but that due to how new the vaccine is, she's going to wait to see how others feel after getting it. Daret Garcia said he's

not going to get it because he's read that certain medications can trigger symptoms of Stevens-Johnson and Susan Soltys said she's going to wait a year to see the side effects

"I don't trust it," Kimberly Shadrock said. "It is being rushed and not getting any true trial periods."

The majority responses include some variation of "it needs more testing before I get it myself," so for now, only time will tell how the vaccine works in Clay County. It seems the county will not see many in line for the vaccine on day one if the responses to this week's Question of the Week are any indication

District increases proposed salary increases after hearing litany of teacher complaints

FLEMING ISLAND — Veteran teachers in the district will receive a larger raise than originally planned after they expressed their disappointment in a plan to boost salaries by 1.28% during the most recent school board meeting.

As the Clay County School District and School Board prepares its legislative priorities, many teachers came to the recent school board to talk about their disappointment with their initial raises. That discord made an impact because the district and the Clay County Education Association reached a new agreement for a larger raise

"Clay County District Schools is proud to announce a tentative contract agreement with the Clay County Education Association," according to the district. "This tentative agreement recognized the contributions of veteran teachers while also adhering to the statutory requirements set forth by House Bill 641.

"Under this House Bill, the District is able to move the teacher starting pay to \$44,867 and all teachers will receive a minimum salary increase of \$1,200. Due to the funding outlook as a result of the recent executive order, the District is able to recognize these veteran teachers. The District is committed to supporting all employees while remaining fiscally responsible."

The statement comes days after teachers spoke directly to the school board during the Dec. 10 meeting to express their displeasure with the district about the 1.28% raise.

"You're sitting on the healthiest general fund balance this district has ever seen," Clay County teacher Chris Trahan said. "We just passed the sales tax that

will alleviate the financial burden that our property repairers represent. You have the \$1.8 million that [the Clay County Education Association] proposed that would give our veteran teachers the lifeline and your own bargaining team called that proposal reasonable and yet, you rejected it."

Also, not only are veteran teachers going to receive a raise that equates to \$600, which is an extra \$50 a month on a 12-month calendar, but starting teachers are receiving a large jump in starting salary. Veteran teachers weren't opposed to higher salaries for starting teachers. They said it just made the sting of the 1.28% veteran teacher raise hurt even more.

Trahan's comments came five days before the district agreed to a higher raise.

"Looking at this, I must take issue with the fact that this body values my experience [14 years of teaching and a Master's of Education amongst other accolades] and its veterans at 1.28%," Trahan said. "To be told that a veteran teacher during a crisis year is only worth \$500 to \$600 more is an affront to every teacher here, both new and experienced.

"Year after year, we are told to save for that rainy day. What do you call teaching in the middle of a global pandemic? What do you call last March when we packed up our classrooms and redesigned our curriculum to teach online overnight? I'm sorry, but the storm is no longer coming. It is here and your employees are in the eye of that storm right now."

Before the district reconsidered, some worried about the sustainability of teaching in Clay County.

"No teacher can do their best if they can't take care of themselves," said second-year teacher Jennifer Corona. "If this is the way teaching will go, if they have to take second or third jobs to take care of

themselves, then this career just isn't sustainable for me and I wish that wasn't the case because I love this job."

The school board and the district apparently got to work quickly on solving this problem because the district and CCEA agreed on a minimum \$1,200 raise for all teachers less than five days after the meeting.

OAKLEAF – Keedron Bryant just wanted an outlet to appeal for social justice and awareness. He got so much more.


Vanilla Ice and Sir Mix-A-Lot were booked a year ago, and all VIP badges were sold out weeks before the show.

State Farm, CCSO employ simulator to help teen drivers





for him. A couple keystrokes on a social media site changed all that.

The average wait time on a kidney transplant list is anywhere from two to four years. Farhat was on that list for six and a half years before a friend that goes back over 30 years, Roger Higginbotham, discovered that he was a perfect match for him. Farhat's nearly seven-year search for a kidney came to an end on Aug. 25 after the donor remembered one of Farhat's Facebook posts.

"I'd be lying if I didn't say that phone call from Roger was one of the best phone calls I've ever received." Farhat said.

Higginbotham's journey to becoming Farhat's donor goes back to July, 1999. Higginbotham's wife, Karol, told him she was going to get tested to be a kidney donor. The Fleming Island man remembered asking his wife if she had gone crazy. He wasn't aware people who were alive could

donate one of their kidneys. Karol said she felt a call from God to donate her kidney, so he decided to follow her on that journey.

She donated a kidney to a former coworker's spouse that December, and it wasn't long before Higginbotham followed. He remembered seeing one of Farhat's posts on Facebook that he had a stencil on the back of his vehicle asking for a kidney. He didn't think too much of it at the time, but that picture and Farhat's need for a kidney continued to pop up on his Facebook feed.

"It was like I couldn't escape it," Higginbotham said. "I really felt like God was trying to show me this so I told Karol about it and I told her I want to look into it."

That was in March. After Higginbotham was approved to be Farhat's donor, he went to Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville to begin the process. That required extensive testing both to ensure that he was a match and to ensure Higginbotham could live healthily without one of his kidneys.

He learned in May that he was a perfect match

"He called me in early May and I asked how he was doing," Farhat said. "He said he was doing good and at that point, I thought he was calling about something business related [Farhat is a builder supplier and Higginbotham is a builder]. He said he had been going to Mayo and I, still not thinking anything of it, told him I hoped everything was okay because I thought maybe something was wrong.

"He said, "I'm fine brother, but I'm calling to tell you I've been going to get tested for you and Mayo said I'm a perfect match.' I told him I wasn't sure if I should cry or laugh, and that he shouldn't feel obligated at all to do this."

Higginbotham, a member of the Board of Directors for the Clay County Habitat for Humanity, didn't feel an ounce of obligation. He was helping a friend.

The two kept things quiet and off of social media. Higginbotham still needed to tell the rest of his family and Farhat had to tell. The two eventually agreed on Aug. 25 for surgery, and the two arrived at the hospital together at 5:30 a.m. The surgery

changed both their lives for the better.

The surgery was a success and the recovery went well. Farhat, after six-and-ahalf years, was finally free from dialysis, free to travel further than 45 minutes of Mayo without the fear that a matching kidney would come in on a moment's notice, and free to live the life he used to live.

"I love him like a brother," Farhat said. "He is absolutely family. We can't do much right now because of COVID-19, but when that's passed, we will get everyone together and Roger and Karol will for sure be there. Roger saved my life."

Higginbotham didn't want any publicity. Nor did he do it for the praise that came with his decision. He simply wanted to help someone because it was the right thing to do. "I feel like all of this is a blessing," Higginbotham said. "God blessed me with being healthy enough at my age to do this for another human being, and I'm so happy I was able to do this for Eddie. I really feel strange getting all this publicity because it was never about that. I did it because it felt like something God told me to do."

Fallen soldiers to be remembered Saturday

Services held Saturday in Orange Park, Keystone Heights and Middleburg

CLAY COUNTY - Three locations across Clay County will participate in Wreaths Across America ceremonies on Saturday to commemorate the lives lost over the years by American military service personnel.

In Clay County, three different locations - Jacksonville Memory Gardens in Orange Park, Keystone Heights Memory Gardens, and Hardage-Giddens Holly Hill Memorial Park in Middleburg – will participate in the ceremonies at noon to honor fallen American veterans.

"It's personal to me because I feel like, as far as our veterans go in our local locations, the veteran's cemetery, the national ceremony, they get those honors and rites," said Jimmy Arthur, a 20-year retired U.S. Army veteran who served as a mortuary specialist and now works with the Hardage-Giddens Holly Hill. "And I feel like in Clay County, in our community, our veterans deserve those same rites as the ones that are in the national cemetery. It's personal for me because of that fact. We never leave a fallen comrade, and this is extending that same courtesy. We never leave a fallen comrade, no matter where they're laid to rest."

While the ceremonies will continue this year despite the COVID-19 pandemic, they will do so with some changes in order to adhere to medical guidelines.

All people arriving at the Memorial Gardens should remain in their vehicles during the ceremony. They can tune into 94.8 FM on their radios to listen. The specific events will take place to include a moment of silence, speeches and musical selections. Those who would like to place a wreath will turn on their hazard lights to signal volunteers to bring one to their ve-



hicle. Following the ceremony, those wishing to place wreaths will be able to do so but must wear masks and maintain social distancing.

Clay County is very military friendly to those actively serving, veterans, and those who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

The project started when Worcester Wreath Company of Harrington, Maine, had extra wreaths following the 1992 holiday season and decided to have them placed in a low-traffic area of Arlington National Cemetery. Other volunteers helped in the efforts to get the wreaths to Arlington, and a ceremony was organized at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier to lay them.

For years, the ceremony was repeated until 2005, when a picture of the wreaths at Arlington made it onto the internet. That was the beginning of the spread of the tradition which would lead to Wreaths Across America, held each year on the second or third Saturday of December.




Salvation Army 'Rescues Christmas' with its annual toy giveaway


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Keystone teachers win grants from Farm Bureau, St. Johns River Water Management District

Hendry retires (again) after serving the community for more than 50 years

Former county commissioner to stay involved, but plans to spend time on his farm

LAKE ASBURY — Gayward Hendry's U.S. Marines Dress lues still hangs in his closest. The creases are razor sharp. His Company Grade White Hat is clean and crisp. At 73, his jaw is still firm, his handshake is powerful.

So much as happened in Hendry's life, but little has changed. He still wears the same size dress blues he wore during his 20-year stint in the military. He's still not afraid to speak his mind. And when he looks you in the eye, you know it's the truth.

After spending his entire adult life serving the community, including the last four years on the Clay Board of County Commissioners, Hendry will walk away. Yet he will stay involved.

For now, he's finding tranquility on his farm making cane syrup. There also are plans to travel and fish to be caught in the Gulf of Mexico

"I don't sit around much," Hendry said just a few days after his term on the commission ended. "I watch very little television. I never take a nap in the afternoon. So far, I've had plenty to do between church and farm and the various organizations I'm involved in. I'm still wide open."

It's also the fourth time he's retired.

Hendry spent 20 years at the Jackson-ville Sheriff's Office. Some of that overlapped with is time as a reservist in the Marines. After retiring from JSO and the Marines, he worked 14 years as a senior investigator with the State Attorney's office. He retired from that job and became a chief inspector with the Clay County Sheriff's Office. He retired from CCSO and

spent four years on the county's planning commission before winning the District 5 seat on the BCC in 1996.

"I could have run one more time, but I decided to take a break," he said. "There's stuff I still want to do. I tell everybody I'll be back. And I'm going to keep my fingers in the political things around here.

"There's a lot of stuff out there I wouldn't spit on, but there's a lot of stuff out there that needs real attention."

Hendry said a brief conversation with a woman at church played a role in his decision to walk away from the BCC. She wanted a dirt road on her property to be paved. Hendry said it was against the law to use county resources on private land.

The woman vowed to never vote for him again.

"I don't need that stuff," Hendry said.

"Let me tell you about this county. When I ran the first time, they kept telling me it's a part-time job. That's B.S. in the first order. It can be a part-time job if the only thing you do is go to meetings and return a few phone calls. It's a full-time job if you

work it the way it should be — being proactive. You get out there and look at stuff that needs to be fixed. If you do it that way, if you return all of your phone calls and try to help everybody that reaches out to you, it's full-time. The worst thing in the world is telling somebody you can't do something."

Hendry still serves. He's the president of Farm Bureau, a past president of the Clay County Historical Society, a board member of the Military Museum of North Florida, the president of the Lake Asbury

Working from home for the holidays: Tips to stay productive, employed

The holiday season brings families together, but it also means added distractions for the many people working from home due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

How can remote workers keep their focus sharp and their productivity high while noise and interruptions surround them? And what can businesses do to ensure their employees aren't slacking and projects are on track?

"Working from home creates a different psychological vibe from the all-business environment of a brick-and-mortar office setting, and that feeling is magnified during the holidays," says Cynthia Spraggs (www. virtira.com), a veteran of working remotely, author of *How To Work From Home And Actually Get SH*T Done*, and CEO of Virtira, a completely virtual company that helps other businesses work virtually.

"The holidays bring new challenges to getting work done efficiently at home, and at the same time, employers have concerns about how the holidays can affect workers' productivity in a home setting. It

can cause tension between managers and employees."

Here are tips to employees and employers about working from home productively during the holidays:

How WFH employees can vercome holiday distractions

Create a mental commute and brain warm-up. A morning routine can help clear the mind and prepare for the working mindset. "The drive to the office used to create a mental separation between home life and work life and give the worker space and time to prepare for the day," Spraggs says. "A similar separation time is vital at home, especially in a holiday atmosphere, in order to focus on the work tasks ahead. Develop a routine, such as reading or exercise, that warms up your brain."

Create must-do lists. The holidays are filled with gift lists, parties, family obligations, baking plans, and other tasks that aren't usually on the everyday agenda. "When these distractions make it difficult

to focus," Spraggs says, "it helps to start the day with a list of work tasks that must be completed that day. Prioritizing them makes it more likely they'll get done, even if your mind does veer off into visions of sugar plums."

Keep your office space a quiet place, and show everyone the door.

"Establishing a clear boundary is a must," Spraggs says. "I strongly advise you to put a door between you and the rest of the household, and keep it shut. Otherwise, the home holiday cheer will break your concentration as people and pets stream in."

How employers can keep WFH workers from slacking during holidays

Trust, don't micromanage. Some businesses go so far as screen- or mousetracking software on company-provided devices to check in on their workforce. But Spraggs says that type of micromanaging can be counterproductive as employees feel distrusted and overly pressured. 'Such a management practice during the holidays comes across worse," she says. "Managers can find less intrusive ways to help employees stay on track. Set targets and measure results, preferably using online dashboards with status reports. This makes it easy for employees to earn your trust. The more you trust those who have earned it, and don't hound them, the more they will produce."

Have daily check-ins. Remote managers should establish either a daily one-on-one call or team call with their employees. In the holiday season, Spraggs says, extra efforts should be made in communication to compensate for people taking time off and getting projects completed. "A regular routine of calls provides a forum for the employees to consult with the manager and each other," Spraggs says, "and the manager can track performance in real time."

Set holiday goals and rewards. "Your quarterly goals can be augmented by special holiday goals and rewards for meeting them," Spraggs says. "These dangled carrots incentivize working diligently at home during the holidays and give them a bonus. Making it fun and competitive, the productivity goes up."

"It's all about discipline and knowing how to protect the work side of your home from the fun side during the holidays," Spraggs says.

Despite White House Task Force advice, Ron DeSantis says Florida restaurants will stay open

Despite facing pressure this month to take a step back on Florida's pandemic reopening timeline, Gov. Ron DeSantis reassured restaurants Tuesday that he won't shut them down.

On Sunday, news broke that a White House Coronavirus Task Force report for Florida recommended stricter measures for stopping the virus including mask wearing at all times in public, increased physical distancing by reducing capacity or closing indoor spaces at restaurants and bars and limiting gatherings outside of immediate households. States like California are reimposing restrictions in the face of rising cases, but Florida has waitresses, cooks and family-Owned businesses covered, the Governor said.

"We just want to send the message, some may want to shut you down, we want to pull you up," he said during a press conference with several restaurant industry workers.

"You're working folks who are working hard to make a living, and you can take it to the bank in the state of Florida, you're going to have that right defended by the Governor."

Since September, Florida has been in reopening Phase Three, which allows all businesses to open. The order lifted all COVID-19 state-level restrictions and preempted local governments' abilities to close businesses and assess fines on individuals.

"If a local leader wants to put them out of work, you're damned right I'm hobbling them from doing that," DeSantis said Tuesday. "If they want to shut down businesses, I'm going to stand in the way. I'm going to stand with these folks here because they have a right to make a living and I don't think government has a right to put these people out of work and not let them put food on the table for their family."

Businesses put every effort into protecting customers and their staff, the Governor noted, or guests won't visit.

"I have not seen a single business owner — I have not seen a single employee who has acted like this virus isn't real," he said. "They all understand that, but they also understand that they have to be able to make ends meet."

State health officials reported 9,411 new cases and 94 deaths in Tuesday's pandemic update. And with the holiday season, experts expect cases to go on the rise again.

"The vast, vast majority of infections are occurring in people's homes, particularly if you have people getting together," DeSantis said. "Closing a restaurant for indoor dining is going to lead to more people doing that in private homes anyways."

Instead, government should inform people about situations with higher risk and let individuals make their own decisions. Mandates and shutdowns haven't worked for other states, he noted.

Florida is among 10 states with the lowest new infections per capita, according to the task force report.

"If the mandate was so important, Florida would be higher than all of those states," DeSantis said.

"Rankings are almost irrelevant as the entire country is surging," the task force report said.

The Dec. 6 report obtained by the Center for Public Integrity also urged leaders to begin warning about the risks of gathering during the December holiday season.

The White House Coronavirus Task Force is chaired by Vice President Mike Pence, and Dr. Deborah Birx serves as its response coordinator. The task force's reports are sent to governors across the U.S.

Last week, the Orlando Sentinel and the South Florida Sun Sentinel, based in Palm Beach County, sued DeSantis' administration for failing to make public the weekly reports about coronavirus conditions in the Sunshine State. The Governor held his Tuesday press conference at Okeechobee Steakhouse in West Palm Beach.

The lawsuit said the DeSantis administration is violating the Public Records Act by refusing to release the reports, which provide recommendations and snapshots of virus conditions state by state. The lawsuit filed last week in state court in Tallahassee seeks the immediate release of requested and future reports.

The White House has indicated these reports should be "widely" shared, including with the media, according to the newspapers' lawsuit, as reported by The Associated Press.

Besides, he's too busy to dwell on hate and negativity. There's too much work to be done, too many projects that need im-

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
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mediate attention. Anything else is simply a distraction.

School security guard arrested at school for cocaine possession

MIDDLEBURG – A Clay County District Schools employee has been charged with possession of cocaine following a Clay County Sheriff's Office investigation.

Douglas Charles Batchelder, a guardian with Clay County District Schools, was arrested by the Clay County Sheriff's Office after detectives received information he was involved in the use of illegal narcotics. Working jointly with the Clay County District Schools Police Department, detectives responded to Middleburg High on Nov. 15 and met with CCDSPD Chief Kenneth Wagner and Batchelder.

While there, a CCSO K9 alerted to Batchelder's vehicle for the presence of an illegal drug. Detectives found a brown wallet in the driver's side door that contained a white substance that field-tested positive as cocaine. Batchelder admitted to ownership of the cocaine discovered inside his vehicle and completed a sworn written statement.

The guardian program was established in 2018 following the mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman High School. Guardians assist deputized officers. They are highly trained to respond immediately in the event of a school shooting.

CCSO deputies arrested Batchelder, and he was transported to the Clay County Jail.

CCSO deputy fired for turning in fake timesheets

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A 26-year veteran of the Clay County Sheriff's Office was fired and arrested for organized fraud on Dec. 10.

Sheriff Michelle Cook said Timothy James Bell cashed a check of more than \$1,350 after fraudulently turning in hours from secondary jobs hired through the sheriff's office. CCSO said it has surveillance of Bell either leaving early or not showing up for his part-time assignments, although he electronically submitted hours to the agency.

Deputies are offered an opportunity to do part-time work through CCSO, primarily for security and property checks. Bell turned in hours for work at the Clay County Utility Authority on Nov. 7 and 16, Duval Asphalt on Nov. 10 and 21, and Fleming Island Plantation on Nov.15. He also turned in hours for simultaneous work at Duval Asphalt and Fleming Island Plantation, although they are more than 10 miles apart from each other.

"This is why it's so important to hold those responsible," Cook said. "None of us want our badges tarnished."

"As disappointed as I am in Bell's actions which lead to his arrest, I'm just as proud to say that the information about his illegal activity also came from agency employees. These employees who understand the importance of honesty and integrity. It

is important to hold those who stray from our oath accountable, to maintain the trust of the public we serve."

CCSO said the investigation into Bell is ongoing. The former deputy was released from the Clay County Jail on his own recognizance.

Social media post puts spotlight on school police officer

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Sheriff's Office denied it ignored a claim by a resident that a Clay County School District Police Officer sent inappropriate test messages and was involved in chats to a 14-year-old girl.

Nathan Waits, who's the president of a group that chats with men while pretending to be children. Waits posted a confrontation wit the officer at his school on Facebook. Waits also said he notified the sheriff's office about the messages in October ago.

Sheriff Michelle Cook said a departmental investigation revealed the man mistakenly sent a test message to a land-line number at the agency. Landlines generally don't accept text messages.

The school officer has been placed on leave, according to the school district.

"The Clay County District Schools Police Department is aware of the allegations made on social media posted by a citizen on December 8, 2020. The Clay County District Schools Police Department Officer referenced in the post has been placed on administrative leave indefinitely pending the results of an internal investigation by the Clay County District Schools Police Department and an outside investigation by the Clay County Sheriff's Office," said district spokesperson Nicole Young.

Waits said he has transcripts of the chats, including an apparent conversation asking the girl about sexy bikini photos.

The district's police chief angrily defended CCSO and said his department takes all allegations seriously.

"That law enforcement agency [CCSO] is an outstanding agency with many highly qualified individuals with the highest levels of integrity and a strong commitment to always doing the right thing, even when no one is looking," Kenneth Wagner posted on Facebook. "They serve with honor, pride and compassion. I am proud to say I worked at that agency for over 20 years.

They would never fail to respond to a complaint, such as the incident posted on social media.

"The agency I lead [CCSDPD] at this moment in time has all of the same traits and a compassion and dedication to their duties. They nor I would fail to respond to a complaint. Mischaracterization, statements, or information on social media has created a firestorm of people from all across the country to reach out to me and people with whom I serve with via phone and social media with baseless allegations, being vile, vulgar and evil."

Cook said her department is investigating the case.

State champ Brooks brings gold to Clay lifting

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - During their senior season of weightlifting, Clay High graduates Lindsey Brooks and Kailah McKean have once again combined talents to bring their lifting expertise back to the Blue Devils' room of Iron.

"She's always been my sidekick, even when we were on the team as athletes," said Brooks, who won the Class 1A title at 199 pounds while McKean took fourth in the Class 1A Unlimited Division last year. "Now, we are together again as coaches helping coach Keller (Clay coach Rodney Keller). It's nice to watch the action without actually having to lift."

For Clay lifting coach Rodney Keller, the return of the past champions and even any past Clay lifter, is a welcomed addition to the eyes in the training camp especially with a bevy of state powerhouses attending a Suwannee High Invitational on Friday.

"Most of the girls that have been successful here have been with the program and tradition for three to four years," said Keller, who noted that Friday at Suwannee High School is the last powerhouse meet for area lifters before the Christmas break and the upcoming state meet climb. "What they bring to the room is tremendous expertise as well as the proverbial "street cred" of what if feels like to be in those tense situations."

Third in 2019, Brooks, who dominated her weight class with a district and region title last year, was able to put her name at the top of the championship list last year with her 20 pound gap served up on bench press. McKean was also a district and region champion.

and jerk," said Brooks, who was top bench press last yer with her 185 pounds 20 pounds higher than a handful of 165 pounders below her. "I try to bring the mental attitude to the girls now because I've been there and I've had coach Keller teach me how to win the mental game."

Brooks would give away 15 pounds on the clean and jerk, but the five pound differential was enough to win the title.

McKean finished fourth with a 425 total with Reeves hoisting a combined 600 for the gold. McKean improved from a 13th place finish in 2019 at 355 total.

"Being able to have her here with me is nice because we pushed each other last year," said Brooks. "Now, we are thinking about the team and what they need to succeed. It's really good to watch the progress."

Keller noted that there are now three classes of competition in girls weightlifting with Clay moving up to Class 2A.

"Girls weightlifting is blowing up statewide," said Keller. "This meet will tell us where we really are."







"We used to tell Dean that if he got the ball in the middle of the field in front of the goal not to pass it," said Waters. "He was so fast with the ball that he just ran through the defense and took his shot. I think Chris is trying to take on that role. We got him in kind of a hybrid position from the midfield in as a forward."

For the rest of the team, Waters is seeing youthful vigor and a lot of learning.




