


Board moves closer to re-districting

Final vote could come as early as March 4

CLAY COUNTY – The school board is one step closer to finalizing its redistricting plans for Oakleaf High, Tynes Elementary and Lake Asbury Junior High areas.

The school board met for a workshop on Jan. 26 that was followed by a special redistricting-focused meeting afterward and during the special meeting, it approved advertisement for all three redistricting plans it has for the district. This brings the district's plans one step closer to a full approval because it has been officially advertised, the board can vote on the plans in March.

"It's not going to be fun," board chair Mary Bolla said. "Aside from Discov"It's not going to be fun. Those tough decisions have been exten-

sively discussed in the past few weeks and it even resulted in a town hall that happened last where district leaders spoke directly to the parents and staff of Oakleaf High to answer questions and quell concerns

The Pine Ridge, Fox Meadow, Whisper Creek and Two Creeks neighborhoods, south of Tynes Boulevard for Two Creeks, will be re-districted to Ridgeview High. Some of these are existing neighborhoods and some are neighborhoods in development and the result is that about 360 students will move from Oakleaf attendance to Ridgeview High. That will drop the capacity of Oakleaf High from a projected 115% if changes aren't approved to 92%, while

North Fork puts students on target for firearms training

MIDDLEBURG – The first thing Larry LeClair teaches at his North Fork Training Group firearms classes is to avoid conflict. He insists it's always better to walk away from a possible threat and to maintain a calm demeanor in the mostthreatening of circumstances.

But if nothing else works, LeClair makes sure his students know how and when to use a gun.

His students can earn their firearms competency training certificate in his classes. Not only does he teach how to handle, clean and use a firearm, the certificate is the first step toward earning a carry and conceal permit.

"The demand for carry and conceal

County closer to finally landing Community Development Block Grant

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Board of County Commissioners is one step closer to obtaining a Community Development Block Grant it's spent months trying to get.

A CDBG is a special government grant that provides funding for a range of eligible activities like rehabilitation housing, emergency repairs, property acquisition, street and sidewalk construction. Susan Grich from the Health Planning Council of Northeast Florida spoke to the BCC during its Jan. 28 meeting about where they're at in the CDBG process.

"The draft plan will be completed this spring, a public comment period will happen this summer, and we anticipate...adoption by the county by Fall 2021," Grinch said.

Grich told the BCC the goal of the grant is to attach the link between housing and health. She said the quality of housing, affordability, location, community attributes, and more all affect the physical and mental health of individuals in a community. She said these attributes aren't really captured in the entitlement funds of the CDBG, but that it's something the county should be aware of when planning funding.

How this potential grant money will be used will be up to the BCC and Grich said the county will help shape what the BCC decides to do with public comments in the form of town halls, surveys and more. CDBGs provide annual grants to communities, in this case Clay County, in a formulaic way to counties and cities to develop communities with new housing and expanded economic opportunities for lowto-moderate-income people. Clay County's 2018 poverty rate was 10.6% and the low-or-moderate-income percentage of the county's population is 42.2%, so this CDBG funding, in theory, could help nearly half of the county's demographic.

Grich said a survey will go out soon, and she said it will help her group get a pulse of the community.

"The part that's great about CDBG funds is that it lets you, the people of the county, determine and shape and architect how you want these funds to spend," she said.

Before any of the funding arrives, three things must be completed. The first is a consolidated plan that is essentially a fiveyear strategic plan that assesses housing needs and market conditions and includes an action plan for funding use. The second is the impediments to fair housing must be recognized. This includes not discriminating based things like race, color, religion, sexual orientation or gender identity.

The final piece is the citizen participation plan, which is made up of things like the resident surveys, town halls, and more.

The CDBG acceptance isn't guaranteed and it will ultimately be up to the BCC later this Fall but based on Grich's word, things are rolling in the right direction.



The county could approve a Community Development Block Grant to help fund projects to help the low-to-moderate-income population as soon as this Fall if things go according to plan.

Rep. Cammack to serve on House Agriculture and Homeland Security Committees

CLAY COUNTY – Congresswoman Kat Cammack has been appointed to a seat on the House Agriculture and Homeland Security Committees for the 117th Congress.

Rep. Cammack will serve as the only Florida Republican on the committee and will join her colleagues and Ranking Member Glenn "GT" Thompson to work on agricultural issues important to constituents in Florida's Third Congressional District, the state of Florida, and across the country. Congresswoman Cammack will also serve as a member of the House Homeland Security Committee alongside Ranking Member John Katko (NY-24), working on legislative initiatives related to cybersecurity, counterterrorism, emergency preparedness and response and border security.

"It is an honor to serve on the House Agriculture Committee on behalf of the hardworking men and women of Florida's Third Congressional District. Our district and state is home to thousands of farmers, ranchers, and producers and I am proud to work on the issues that matter to them – from commodity prices and exchange rates to trade, subsidies, conservation and more," said Cammack. "My first priority during my time on this committee is improving and expanding access to rural broadband for my constituents."

Florida's Third Congressional District is known for its strong peanut, livestock, watermelon, blueberry, hay, dairy and timber production. The district includes Clay, Alachua, Putnam, Bradford and Union counties, as well as a majority portion of Marion County. The district's largely rural counties are some of the Sunshine State's leading producers, contributing to Florida's second largest economic driver.

"I am also honored to serve on the House Homeland Security Committee during this session. My background in national defense and military strategy from the United States Naval War College will serve my constituents well as I work with my colleagues to increase border security, improve emergency preparedness in Florida, and support counterterrorism and intelligence efforts to keep Americans safe, especially amid emerging global threats by China and Russia," said Cammack. "Florida is also home to annual hurricane threats, making it even more important that a Floridian with a vested interest in coordination with FEMA after every disaster serves on this committee and knows and understands the challenges that come with the hurricane season."

Cammack's appointment to these committees is an important nexus that serves to strengthen critical domestic supply chains and improve border security, counterintelligence measures and emergency preparedness.

Subcommittee assignments for the House Agriculture and House Homeland Security Committees have not yet been made and will be announced at a later date.

Orange Park Town Council denies Mastandrea's request to pay for lawsuit

ORANGE PARK – It didn't take long for the Orange Park Town Council Tuesday night to finally put an end to councilman Roland Mastandrea's request to pay for his legal fees for a lawsuit he filed against two residents.

With Mastandrea recusing himself, the council voted 4-0 to end any discussion about the town representing the councilman in his defamation and slander lawsuit against Peter and Shirley Johnston, who've criticized him publicly and suggested he was involved with the proposed Orange Park Plaza project on Kingsley Avenue.

Mastandrea contended he was entitled to the town's backing after he demanded a written public apology from the Johnston's.

DeSantis slams 'disingenuous' White House vaccination distribution narrative

Gov. Ron DeSantis challenged the Joe Biden White House again Tuesday on vaccine distribution, saying that more doses were needed and rejecting the narrative that his administration wasn't doing enough.

The Governor slammed as "disingenuous" claims from the White House that the state had only distributed roughly half of its vaccines, saying the state was "number one in the country" for vaccinations given among populous states.

DeSantis said when he addressed media Monday in Jacksonville, he "explained how these doses work with the second doses coming in."

'We're not going to divert second doses away from seniors," DeSantis said. "Seniors want it. We're going to do it.

"If the implication is you should be giving those doses away to other people, that's not the way the FDA has prescribed it.

"We're absolutely committed to that.". As he has said previously, the governor said the state could handle as many as 500,000 first-shot inoculations a week, much more than the 266,000 shots the state gets.

"The possibilities are endless and contingent on getting more of the first dose," DeSantis contended.

The Governor also swatted away a question about an expanded role for the Federal Emergency Management Agency, reiterating his claim that "all we need are more doses."

DeSantis avoided the inflammatorv FEMA camp metaphor he workshopped previously on the subject. instead, he made a more vanilla case for localized resource allocation.

"If it's taking the current doses and diverting, it's robbing Peter to pay Paul," the governor said of the proposal for federal centralization of vaccination.

'Most Governors are saying the same thing," he added.

The comments from DeSantis, a potential 2024 presidential candidate on the Republican side, came the morning after

THE PLAYERS on course for the Tour's spectacular return to TPC Sawgrass

PONTE VEDRA BEACH - At any other golf course, the sound of hammers, slamming metal, tractors and lawnmowers would be distracting. But TPC Sawgrass' Stadium Course isn't any other golf course.

Work around the famed golf course is a warp speed

ahead of this year's PLAYERS Championship. Corporate villas started being erected the first week of December. Every blade of grass, grain of sand and flower-


ing bush has been Don Coble manicured to cre-

ate an intoxicating atmosphere of both golf and tranquil splendor.

A year after the world came to a screeching halt by the COVID-19 pandemic, this year's PLAYERS Championship mark the one-year anniversary of a national shutdown – and the slow return to some normalcy.

Last year's tournament was canceled shortly after the first round. The PGA TOUR originally said the tournament would continue for the second round without fans, but hours later they shut it down and sent everyone home.

The Tour eventually returned with extreme protocols that excluded galleries and required daily medical checks three months later.



"As we think about what's happened since that day for the PGA TOUR, we've really been back at playing golf for the course of the last 30 weeks or so since June, and we take a tremendous amount of responsibility and pride and care and consideration for how we've been able to do that with health and safety being the priority of everything that we're doing," said tournament director Jared Rice.

Rice said a limited number of tickets will be made available. Galleries will be restricted to 20% maximum occupancy, and tickets will be available to subscribers of THE PLAYERS newsletter and past ticket purchasers. They will receive an email from the tournament in the next few days. The pre-tournament offer for Stadium passes will be made available on Feb. 16.

Tickets and parking passes will be issued digitally. All patrons will be required



to wear masks and hospitality areas will be designed to better assure proper distancing. And entry gates, souvenir shops and snack bars will be contactless.

"We feel that hits our priority of how we can deliver the tournament in a healthy way and with the safety of everybody in mind, our sponsors, our fans, our volunteers. All of that is mission critical to us," Rice said. "And that number also – just for reference, that's the total tickets issued or access issued. We know over the course of 150 plus acres of turf grass out on the golf course, 18 holes, 12 hours that fans will be able to be walking around freely and enjoying every bit of this golf course that Jeff [Plotts, Director of Golf Course Maintenance] and his team makes look so spectacular.

"From a hospitality perspective we've modified everything. That means in hospitality zones we'll have open-air venues, and again, looking for ways to make sure it's as safe as possible, limiting some access there. And then from a fan perspective, again, really looking at ways we can focus on social distancing as part of, again, any food and beverage experience but still make it great for our fans.

"You'll see a lot of commentary about three Ws: Wear a mask, wash your hands and watch your distance, and those are things that we'll talk about when you're on-site."

The world's top players are expected to return to the Stadium Course. They will find a course that's in spectacular shape.

really hasn't gone away," LeClair said. "It's certainly increased with all of the turmoil in the country, the election, COVID. When people feel threatened, they want to fee safe. They believe in their Second Amendment rights that gives us the right to bear arms and protect ourselves in a law-abid-

ing manner."

LeClair operates two classes a month. He tries to limit his classes to six or seven people, and it starts with a classroom setting in a conference room at Fantastic Floors in Orange Park. From there, classes then move to a gun range.

Gun sales prove Americans clearly are concerned about their personal security. According to the Brookings, gun sales in the past 10 years showed dramatic spikes following the mass shootings at Sandy Hook Elementary, the Island Regional Center terrorist attack in San Bernardino, California, the school shooting at Parkland and the COVID-19 pandemic and recent social unrest.

Current monthly firearm sales have reported to be nearly 1.4 million in the United States, including nearly 180,000 purchases days after President Donald Trump declared a national emergency last March for the pandemic. The demand has created shortages in both firearms and bullets, as well as the necessity to learn how to properly handle a gun.

"If you can find ammo, you're lucky," LeClair said. "People know the only person you can count on when things are bad is yourself."

Persons wanting a carry and conceal permit also have to pass an FBI background check and file an application with the Florida Department of Agriculture. The average wait time for the permit, if approved, is about 55 days.

Even with a permit, gun owners aren't allowed to carry a firearm in police stations, courthouses, schools, sporting events or municipal buildings. Florida law allows gun owners with permits to carry inside a restaurant, but they are restricted from being near the bar.

LeClair said many novice shooters can learn by using lasers instead of slugs. But it's important to know how to shoot live rounds because threatening situations aren't like a video game.

Clients need a gun and 50 rounds of ammunition to take a North Fork class. And in Florida, rifles, shotguns and handguns aren't required to be registered.

LeClair also has created four colorcoded levels of awareness: white, yellow, orange and red. White is the least-threatening situations, like walking alone on a secluded beach. Red is the most-dangerous, like being in the middle of a riot or a victim of home invasion.

"Most people walk around not paying attention, thinking they're in the white zone," LeClair said. "You need to always be in the yellow zone where you're always aware of your surroundings. That's how you recognize trouble and avoid it. The best thing is being trained to use a firearm and never having to do it."

All students are told their gun training certificates – and possible carry and conceal permits – create additional responsibilities.

"It not a badge. It there to protect you and your family," he said. "If you get backed into a corner and have to defend yourself, are you willing? That's something you won't know until the time comes. But if it does, you'll know what to do."

LeClair said he's never been forced to shoot someone.

"And I hope I never have to," he said.



BCC learns county is about to get Pfizer vaccines for COVID-19

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The county is set to receive the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine and will begin vaccinating people with it or one produced by Moderna.

Commissioners were warned the Pfizer vaccine isn't going to miraculously bolster the supply numbers in the county. The demand far exceeds the supply that's provided by the national and state governments.

"We have the people," emergency services director John Ward said. "We could double the dosage if we had the supply."

The supply simply isn't there though and it's unclear when it will be there. Clay County Florida Department of Health administrator Heather Huffman said during the Jan. 28 regular meeting the Pfizer vaccine will moderately increase the county's doses. Of the county's population of 220,000, a little more 13,000 have been vaccinated, Huffman said. The county's health department vaccine pod at the Clay County UF/ IFAS Extension office at the fairgrounds is pivoting to the arrival of Pfizer's vaccine. This vaccine requires ultra-cold storage, which presented a logistical challenge the department has already solved, and the county has already added additional vaccinations stations to its site to account.

Huffman didn't specify how many Pfizer vaccines the county expects, but in previous weeks where the county has received new shipments of the Moderna vaccine, it received anywhere from 1,000 to 3,000 at a time. Simple math shows that a couple thousand won't meet the demand, so it's still going to be difficult to register for a vaccination time.

Ward said last week when new appointments went live, more than 45,000 unique

visitors hit the site to get appointments. The county is not receiving anywhere near that many vaccines so many have been disappointed with the process.

Huffman said the Pfizer vaccine will go live at the same time that the county is administering additional first doses of Moderna as well as second doses for that vaccine, "so it'll be a little crazy that week."

The county is beginning to administer second doses of Moderna and Huffman said to expect more symptoms of sickness after it. She said you won't be sick, but you might feel an effect of a sickness like a fever, soreness or just a generally "cruddy" feeling.

"What's happening in your immune system is that the first shot is very similar to creating natural immunity and the second dose is creating those B cells," Huffman said. "It's a good sign to feel those effects [you've likely heard about] because it means your body is working overtime to create long term antibodies."

In other news, the BCC approved the limited alcohol zone for this year's Scottish Games on Feb. 27 with a 5-0 vote. This means the Scottish Games this year at the fairgrounds will have alcohol for sale in designated area like it did last year.

One bidder returned a proposal: PADL LLC.



Ridgeview High's population increase from 67% to 85%.

This will impact approximately 300 students beginning the 2021-22 school year, according to the district, and transportation already provided to Oakleaf will also be provided to Ridgeview. Incoming seniors will have the option to remain at Oakleaf or move to Ridgeview.

Tynes Elementary re-districting will affect the Summer Brook, Branan Mill Plantation and Whisper Creek neighborhoods. Those students will change to Coppergate Elementary. This will involve about 150 students and it will keep Tynes at 82% population instead of a projected 120%,

while Coopergate will grow from 74% to 92%

The third re-districting is targeted in the Lake Asbury area and will involve the students from the Wedgefield, Orange Park South, Breckenridge, Madison Commons and Greenwood Estates neighborhoods being moved to Lakeside Junior High. This will affect roughly 190 students, which would keep Lake Asbury to 64% instead of a projected 113%. The change also will address future growth in the Lake Asbury area. Lakeside's capacity will grow from 64% to 80%.

All of the plans will be advertised in public places following the approval during the Jan. 26 special meeting and the board will formally discuss it during its regular meeting on Thursday, March 4.

Florida-friendly plant showcase: Camellias

CLAY COUNTY – Fall and winter are not often the time that most people associate with flowering but some plants can be surprisingly amazing performers during cooler temperatures. One of these common landscape plants that deserves even more attention for its versatility is the camellia.

Background

Camellias represent a large group of evergreen shrubs and small trees native to Asia. In fact, teas are produced from *Camellia sinensis*, but you are unlikely to find these in the area even though it is possible. *Camellia japonica, Camellia sasanqua*, and their hybrids, have been utilized in American landscapes for over 200 years. They have proven time and time again to be great landscape performers and depending on the variety, can provide many interesting features.

Why use Camellias?

The main feature of most camellias are their attractive blooms that come in a variety of forms, sizes, colors, and timing. In fact, if you choose the proper varieties you can have almost continual flowering throughout the late winter and early spring and even the fall. Outside of their blooms, these plants are long-lived and work great as foundation shrubs, small trees, screens, or hedges. You can even find different plant sizes ranging from 25 feet down to three feet at maturity.

There is likely a camellia to fit almost any landscape as long growing conditions are correct.



Caring for Camellias

The key to proper camellia care starts with proper landscape placement. Camellia japonica does best in partial shade while sasanqua varieties can take full sun but prefer some shade in the afternoon. All varieties like fertile, acidic, well-drained soils. Get your soil tested to ensure that the pH is between 5.0-6.5 and amend if needed.

To make your soil more suitable for camellias mix 3-6 inches of organic matter into the top 12 inches of soil at planting throughout the planting bed. They will also benefit from a 2-3" layer of mulch but be sure to leave this away from the original root ball at planting and plant them onetwo inches above the soil line. Allow space for them to grow to their full size as well as heavy pruning will reduce flowering and performance.

Fertilization once or twice a year dur-

ing the spring and early summer is usually adequate with about half a pound of a slow release fertilizer per 100 square feet of planting bed. Use a product that has equal amounts of nitrogen and potassium but is low in phosphorous such as 12-4-12, 15-5-15, or similar. These are drought tolerant plants, but some extra irrigation may be required during extended droughts, especially if they are planted in higher sun areas.

If pruning is needed, do so in late spring or early summer so as not to remove the buds that will become blooms in the fall or winter. Some pests to keep an eye out for include tea scale, aphids, and spider mites. Dieback, leaf and bud gall, leaf spot, and root rots may affect them, but risks can be lessened by planting them in the proper location and sanitizing pruning tools after

Scarlett Group works to prevent, 'clean up the mess' after cyberattacks

ORANGE PARK – Experts say cybersecurity should be taken seriously, whether it's by an individual or a larger organization. It should also be taken seriously whether what's being secured is in a major metropolis such as New York or Washington, D.C. or smaller locales like Clay County.

The Scarlett Group, through its various Information Technology offerings, is looking to drive home this message in the county.

"Having a cybersecurity organization right here in Clay County, a professional cybersecurity organization that services the small-to-mid business market is a great asset to the community as opposed to having to go to Atlanta or go to Miami or go to, you know, out of state," said Thomas Burt, executive vice president. "The enterprise-level ... when you talk about huge companies, IT companies, smaller and mid-businesses can't afford to go there."

Scarlett is a home-grown IT servicing company with its executive offices on Kingsley Avenue. The company was started in 2008 by Brian Chancey, the president and CEO of the company, as a general IT services company specializing in auditing. It has now grown significantly and has operations and collaboration centers in Jacksonville and Raleigh, North Carolina.

"We started a cybersecurity division in November," Chancey said. "Specifically, because that discipline, that has become a discipline in of itself. It has become such an issue, even a growing issue with the pandemic. So we help businesses, small businesses, also government organizations of 10-3,000 employees dealing with the prevention, incident response and detection of cyber events. And they're happening every day."

People are often under the misimpression that cyberattacks only take place in large cities or companies. But Chancey said the type of attacks varies, as do their targets.

"It's not necessarily targeted to the size of the business," said Tyler Chancey, cybersecurity consultant with the Scarlett

Group. "It's almost like they do a blitz, a blanket attack. The most vulnerable people are the ones who click on that. And they could be anyone."

"I would say it [vulnerability to cyberattacks] depends on the industry, and that's where Clay can get a little tricky," Brian Chancey said. "Depending on which area you're in, you're going to have different sorts of attacks. I'd say with Clay, the biggest threats in general to our clients, especially smaller clients, would be the blanket phishing attacks that aren't super targeted. They're more like, 'Hey, let's see who clicks this and see who takes the bait."

Chancey sees more spear-phishing attacks with a cyber-enemy directly attempting to infiltrate their systems for the larger, enterprise-level clients.

In conjunction with competitive price points for their services and their under-

standing of local culture and practices, those vulnerabilities make Scarlett a go-to in Clay County.

Burt estimates that about 50% of Scarlett's employees are Clay County residents. Being a very military-friendly county, they fit in well in terms of supporting veterans.

"We also have internships," said Burt. "We're always looking for interns. We've partnered with Leader Quest, which is a retraining, if you will, helping prepare veterans for the business world. And we've had interns come to us through Leader Quest who may or may not have had IT experience, and they give them some of the low-level, mid-level credentials, and then they want to get practical experience. We can be a stepping-stone or a career for veterans."

The Scarlett Group has worked with doctors' offices, law firms, construction companies, nonprofits, local governments and pharmacies. They also worked with a veterinarian who was the victim of ransomware.

Burt understands the necessity of being local.

"Having a local professional firm to provide prevention, detection and response is a huge value to the community. Many organizations that experience a cybercrime incident don't know where to turn – we are always here to 'clean up the mess' after an attack," he said.

ORANGE PARK – Clay County students in seventh and eighth grades are invited to submit their ideas and plans for making their community a better place.



Jesus was speaking to all of us when He said, "Do not judge and you will not be judged." This is one particular teaching that will bring you great peace if you accept it. Incorrectly judging others adds a burden of responsibility that you do not have to carry.

Understand that this judgment He speaks about has nothing to do with legal issues. This is not instruction for the legal or judicial system. It is not personal direction for you in such issues as jury duty or testifying in a legal matter.

This is instruction in relating to other individuals with whom your life intersects. It refers to all personal relationships whether in your family, workplace, church or just in the interactions of your life with other individuals.

When you judge the motives of others, you put yourself in the position of God. This is really the danger area. It is the part of judging others with which the Savior is most concerned. Jesus referred to this when He spoke of having a log in your own eye while you point out the speck that is in your friend's eye! Few, if any, are qualified to pass personal judgment on anyone else. And definitely none of us is qualified to judge the motives of another.

The classic Scriptural illustration of this point is in John chapter 8. A woman was discovered involved in adultery. Religious leaders wanted to stone her which was the punishment of the era. They came to Jesus with the woman and asked Him what should be done to her.

Jesus' answer was classic. He looked over the men standing there who had already formed their judgment of her. He said, "Let the one who is without sin among you cast the first stone at her." Then starting with the oldest one there to the youngest one, they left without doing anything.

Each one of them recognized his own lack of qualification to judge the sin of the woman. Those who had come to judge her were condemned by their own guilt.

Let's don't carry this illustration too far. Suffice it to say that we all always need to look carefully at ourselves before we judge anyone else. If we were to do this, we would make more effort to correct our own faults before acting in judgment toward anyone else.

If you make the effort to be the person you really want to be, you will have no time look for the faults of others.







Health and emergency officials: COVID-19 vaccines are arriving in Clay County – but not fast enough

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Residents are continuing to receive their COVID-19 vaccines – some already getting their second doses – but it's still not happening as quickly as health and emergency officials would like.

Most of the population can't get vaccines provided by Moderna and Pfizer since there's an order of disbursement based on the governor's office and state department of health.

"It is set for 65 and up, and frontline medical workers," said John Ward, Clay County Director of Emergency Management. "So that's who we've been prioritizing per the Governor's order currently at our distribution sites."

At this time, the staffing and low number of available doses limits the vaccination locations.

"It's the Godbold building there at the Clay County Agricultural center, and it is open Monday through Friday, 9 [a.m.] to 4 [p.m.]," said Ward.

Hospitals were the first to receive the vaccine, but they were for the express purpose of inoculating their front-line medical workers.

Orange Park Medical Center started issuing a second round of Moderna inoculations last week. Ascension St. Vincent's provided 2,500 free shots a week ago at the Clay County Fairgrounds.

"Orange Park Medical Center has vaccinated approximately 2,500 employees, physicians and community health care workers

over the past month. In the coming weeks the hospital will provide another 2,500 second doses that will complete the two-dose regimen. We are pleased to be doing our part to help protect healthcare workers on the front lines across our community. Due to supply, Orange Park Medical Center is not vaccinating the general public or providing additional first dose vaccines at this time," said Dr. Brad Shumaker, OPMC's chief medical officer.

The county received 5,750 doses during the past four months. They are expected to receive another 1,900 doses in the next few days.

Clay County has about 35,000 residents

who are ages 65 and older and approximately 5,000 front-line medical workers. People from other parts of the state are making appointments and coming to Clay County to receive the vaccination. They can't be turned away if they meet the criteria. After the 65 and older and front-line medical worker group vaccinations have been completed, the next group to receive it is slated to be personnel with underlying medical conditions. Examples of those are asthmatics, diabetics and those suffering with COPD.

Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis said this week about 22% of the state's elderly have received their vaccinations. He also said by Feb. 1, the vaccine will have been offered to

every staff member and resident at nearly 700 nursing homes and more than 3,000 assisted living facilities in the state.

Once the first two phases of the vaccination plan has been completed, everyone else should be able to receive the vaccine. By that time – estimated to be mid-summer – the availability of the vaccine should increase, as should locations for distribution.

"We're seeing Publix, Walgreens, CVS, Walmart, those type of things come online, so it'll be in more places, more opportunities for our citizens to go out and get," Ward said. "And then the goal would be, just like the flu shot, any doc-in-the-box, any primary care, those type things, would have it in order for our residents to go get it."

Crosby Sanctuary offers tranquil escape into Florida's undisturbed nature

ORANGE PARK - Clay County's Crosby Sanctuary in Orange Park, owned by the Duval Audubon Society, is an undeveloped, 510-acre area of swampland and trails. It is easily accessible from Orange Park but is only open to the public on one Saturday a month. During that time, it offers a peaceful and quiet escape for those wanting to experience nature during what has become a difficult time for many.

Many have turned to more outdoor pursuits to try and decompress to escape the disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

tried to spend as little time as possible outside," said Dylan McManus of Fleming Island. "You know, first the shutdown and quarantine along with the work from home order. At first, I was ok, but then I felt like I was starting to go stir-crazy. Now I found this, and it's pretty cool."

By 'this,' McManus means the Crosby Sanctuary, where he can get out for hours at a time - when it's open - and just enjoy being outdoors with relative safety. Not many people are out and those that

are, are well beyond socially distant. They don't have to worry about masks and can just enjoy their time with nature.

While no hunting is allowed, there are "I've had to work from home, and I've many species of wildlife which make the sanctuary their home, including fox, beaver, deer, raccoon, and more.

"It's nice to be out here," said Stacy Leonis. "I get to see a lot of birds. I try to bird watch when I have time. Also, if you're lucky, you might see something bigger cross your path, but not usually."

In the early part of the century, there was a plan by the Florida Department of Transportation to pave a road and build an elevated bridge through the area, however the Crosby sanctuary's presence stopped it from happening.

Currently, the Crosby Sanctuary continues to offer limited access to a nature preserve filled with birds, mammals, native plants, reptiles, amphibians and invertebrates. It provides nature therapy for those in need. It gives birdwatchers somewhere to relax and study their avian subjects.

The sanctuary is located at 427 Aquarius Concourse and is open from 8 a.m. to noon on the fourth Saturday of every month. but the Saturday openings may vary. For a complete schedule or to schedule an appointment, visit duvalaudubon.org.

"Social distancing, no masks, some peace, and a chance to just escape," said Leonis. "Nowadays, you can't ask for much more than that.'





Home Instead fills demand for in-home healthcare

ORANGE PARK – While the COVID-19 pandemic has cost families their jobs, it has created an overwhelming need for healthcare specialists.

With senior citizens 65 and older becoming one of the largest segments of the population, worries about the pandemic are forcing many elders to remain at home where they feel safest and most comfortable.

Many live alone or with their adult children. Many adult children who remain employed now are working from home. Those aging parents who live with them and the elderly who live alone now need in-home care.

Home Instead of Orange Park fills the additional demand for in-home caregivers.

"We call it in-home care," said Betsy Miller, co-owner and administrator of the business with her husband Christian. The Millers bought Home Instead eight years ago. "And these things are the things what we point out as bullet points: companionship, meal preparation, light housekeeping, medication reminders, and personal care assistance. Also, we specialize in Alzheimer's and dementia support. We also have a contract with the [Veterans' Administration], so I would say about 25% of our patients are V.A."

With the aging population increasing

globally and locally, there aren't enough assisted living facilities. More people want to stay in their own homes for as long as possible.

The organization is looking for people to fill the caregiver roles as the need increases. They welcome people who are already certified as Home Health Aides, Certified Nursing Assistants or Licensed Practical Nurses.

"We can also work with people with no experience," she said. "So we can train as well."

Home Instead has a program which trains people without experience to be inhome caregivers. It doesn't, however, certify a trainee as a home health aide. It does train the associate to work with the company.

Home Instead has been around for about 25 years. The client list is booming, according to Miller.

"Word of mouth; people know who we are. We have a very good reputation in the industry. So yea, people are calling us. People are needing services. There's always been a caregiver shortage, so this isn't something that's new. But I think it's something that has become even more magnified over the past year," Miller said.

Clay County has always been very community-centric on both the clients and caregivers, Miller said.

"People in Clay County are very, very supportive of each other. We do a lot of

community-based giving back," she said. "We're out in the community; people know us, and they find out about what we're doing through these efforts. A lot of people don't think that you could become a caregiver, or they've thought about it, but they didn't know how to go about doing it. We get so many people that once I talk to them during that phone screen or that first interview, they say, 'I just want to help people.' And I believe that COVID has really brought that to so many people's attention."



Clay High powerhouse Jeniyah Stevens at 154, just a sophomore, had the battle of her season with her and Gainesville senior Deborah Lee tying at weight at 345 total with Stevens getting the win via weigh-in weight 146.5-150.9. In the duel, Lee dominated then bench press, 190-155, while Steven controlled the clean and jerk, by the same numbers, 190-155.

At 169, Clay junior Gianna Torres won by 15 pounds over Matanzas Lucie Dudley, 300-285, with a decisive 150-135 bench press win.



In Class 3A, Oakleaf finished as runnerup to Bartram Trail in district 2-3A led by Tamira Briley, a top state contender.




