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Orange Park decides

Mastandrea looking for another three years on Town Council

Councilman touts his role in town keeping its Emergency Services departments

(In the first installment of a weekly series, candidates for the Orange Park Town Council will be profiled. This week, Seat 3 incumbent Roland Mastandrea is looking for re-election in his race against John Hauber. Next week, Virginia Hall, the incumbent for Seat 4, will be profiled, in her race against Susana Thompson.)

ORANGE PARK – Roland Mastandrea wants another three years on the town council'

Mastandrea was elected in 2017 and his term is up this April. The past three years of his time on the dais has only convinced him that working for the town is his calling and his list of goals is how he plans to fill another three years. The only thing standing in between him and another three years is newcomer challenger, John Hauber.

"I ran for office three years ago for several reasons with several goals and I have to say that I believe I accomplished every single one of them," Mastandrea said. "What I have found since then is that there is more I can do. I have the ability and I have the time to put into this town and that's what I want to do."

Mastandrea is proud of a lot of things the town has accomplished since

2017. At the top of that list is helping the town's emergency management services gain its independence. A longstanding conflict between the county and the town, Orange Park residents and council members were heavily in favor of bringing ambulance and fire services back under the umbrella of the town.

"The county wanted to take it over and obviously the town wanted to keep it, and we worked to bring it back to the town and here we are," Mastandrea said. "One of my other goals that I believe I accomplished goes hand in hand with this: the relationship between Orange Park and the county. Over the past several years prior to my council, it wasn't a good relationship and

it was very adversarial.

"As one of the five elected officials, I had a hand in helping the Town of Orange Park keep its EMS department while also amending the relationship between our body and that of the county."

Mastandrea is also proud of his hand in helping the town acquire a grant writer. He said the town was years behind when it came to securing federal and state dollars for project funding. The grant writer has already brought thousands of dollars back to the town since then, according to Mastandrea.

'We're bringing more tax dollars back to the town than has ever been done before and I'm happy to say that I'm a part of that," he said. "I want to continue to be a part of it."

He's also proud of his involvement in approving the controversial Orange Park Plaza project.

"There was a group of residents... not huge in the grand scheme of Orange Park's population...but a group who were adamant against the development," Mastandrea said. "We took a real beating as a council from them, but we made the right call based on concrete factual evidence."

Mastandrea said approving the development was about taking into mind the concerns of citizens and cross analyzing that with actual evidence. He said those against it would bring up overcrowding Orange Park streets with traffic. He said they weren't traffic experts so they didn't actually know, and he said traffic experts said otherwise. The same goes for schools, according to Mastandra. He said those

against the plaza said it would lead to the schools becoming overcrowded.

"They weren't experts on that either," Mastandrea said. "We actually talked with the school district and they were in support of this.

The controversy is still there, especially his very public dispute with two residents and his failed request the Town's insurance policy pay his legal expenses in the dispute, but the project was passed and Mastandrea said he looks forward to working with the town, town staff and the developers to bring the project to life over the next few years. It's one of the things highest on his list of goals for a potential second term, right beside the town's visioning.

"The vision is going to significantly change the Town of Orange Park financially, visually and residentially, and it's going to help with things like the town's walkability, support of local businesses, and parks and recreation." Mastandrea said. "The council has been very serious about this and it's something we're going to continue to do."

Mastandrea wants to continue work on visioning, attack new revenue sources in light of less sales tax and less gas tax revenue rolling in due to COVID-19 and so much more but all of that will be decided this April by the voters he's served since

"I love this council that we have now," Mastandrea said. "We are all pro-Orange Park and I just see the possibility for so much more to be accomplished and I'm confident that I can help make it all happen. I love what I do and I want to keep doing it."

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
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Keep Public Notices in full view

A bill approved by a Florida House committee on Feb. 3 will be sent to the floor later this month that would effectively end the practice of placing public notices in newspapers for local governments' most impor-

tant actions, such as meetings, new ordinances, rezoning, the establishment of new districts and property tax rate changes.

a cost-saving measure for local governments. It gives them the option to publish legal notices online — on a local government's website or a third-party website — if that costs less than newspaper publication. By moving to an online-only system, local governments would leave millions of people who do not have access to the internet in the dark when it comes to their local governments' dealings.

It would also give government more control over that information.

Each week, 6.8 million Floridians read printed daily and weekly newspapers, according to the Florida Press Association, of which the USA TODAY Network is a member. So, arguments that House Bill 35 makes sense because "no one reads newspapers nowadays" are clearly wrong.

Public and legal notices are also posted at no additional charge on newspapers' websites and a website maintained by the Association, floridapublicnotices.com. Newspapers must also provide email notification of new legal notices when they are printed in the newspaper and added to the website.

Can you think of the last time you visited our counties official URL? Do you even know it? A newspaper's web audience is about 10 times larger than most cities and county websites, according to the Press Association. Unless people go looking for notices, they won't see them. In the paper, they stumble upon them while reading the news.

Of course, public notices do represent a source of revenue for newspapers across Florida, including Clay Today. Some reading this editorial might assume we're trying to protect our bottom line. (That bottom line, by the way, ensures local jobs

Parents need to be more involved with protecting children against internet crimes

CLAY COUNTY – Last Tuesday was Safer Internet Day in the United States and another 140 countries around the world. It also was National Cut the Cord Day, National Bagel and Lox Day, National Pizza Day and National Toothache Day.

While other national days are set aside to celebrate things umbrellas, chopsticks, bubble gum, Ferris wheels, cabbage, vacuums, shower with a friend and crab-stuffed flounder, there is nothing whimsical

or amusing about having to place attention on the very real problem of keeping our children safe from the dark dangers of the world wide web.

Too many of our children are being exploited online by predators. What's even more alarming is, parents often are clueless about the abuse.

For the Internet Crimes Against Children and Human Trafficking department at the Clay County Sheriff's Office, it's a very real issue that demands their attention every day of the year, not just Feb. 9.

"It is a challenge," said Det. Ryan Ellis. "It's one of those things, even though technology is not new, if you think about other illicit things or things that have been made illegal, such as drugs or at

one point, even alcohol, those things have been around for thousands of years. We have technology that in the big picture of mankind, it's fairly new.

"Even though people know that it's dangerous, it hasn't quick had the time and the attention that's needed like other things have, like firearms and safety and drugs and why certain things are harmful. Drinking and driving has been around way longer than a Smartphone. It is a constant battle. I have a couple sayings that unfortunately end up telling parents where their children are victims or have been involved in something like this, is: 'Smartphones are too smart for kids, sometimes; and kids aren't smart enough for a Smartphone.' The internet is such a mature place."

Ellis' job is daunting. He pours through disgusting and disturbing evidence every day to lock up people who take advantage of our children. Just in the past two weeks, his department arrested two local men who've been charged with multiple counts of possessing illicit photos and videos of children having sex.

And during the pandemic there's been an increase in activity, Ellis said.

"We've seen an uptick and we've been extremely busy, unfortunately," he said. "I joke with people sometimes I could find something else to do or we could go get cats out of trees or help people cross the road, it's shame there's such a need for it."

His office tells parents there are

are maintained, not just in journalism but in marketing, circulation, page and graphic design, finance and other sectors).

While House Bill 35 would small weekly newspapers like Clay Today as well as larger newspapers like the Miami Herald financially... it would hurt you, too.

This notion everyone is online is simply not true. We learned that lesson during the COVID-19 vaccine rollout, when many Florida communities required seniors to go online to register for an appoint-

ment, causing confusion and frustration for those unable to navigate the web (luckilv. the state has rolled out a new system). With more than 4 million Florida residents ages 65 and older, moving important public notices entirely online hurts them - 14% of Florida's seniors do not have internet access, according to a 2019 Nielsen Scarborough report.

It also baffles us the Legislature would do away with existing private-industry infrastructure to allow government to take over the process with no supervision. If governments decide to re-create the functionality of the existing online system (a system that allows you to search all public notices in the state on the same website instead of hundreds of city and county ones), they will incur significant costs.

If governments decide to do it on the cheap by posting notices on an obscure webpage, the public will lose easy access to crucial information. That should be enough for lawmakers of any party in a state known for its government-in-thesunshine laws to reject House Bill 35 filed by Rep. Randy Fine of Brevard County.

HB 35 would still require governments to post a notice, at least annually, in a newspaper or other publication to all residents and property owners offering them the alternative to receive legal notices by

first-class mail or email after registering with the agency.

The cost of doing that might eat into whatever governments save by not running all notices in the paper, a Florida House staff analysis of HB 35 found.

"The cost associated with this requirement, and with subsequently providing the notices, may offset to an unknown amount the savings realized from online notice publication," according to the analysis.

Florida lawmakers must answer: Does dismantling a private-industry infrastructure and replacing it with a government operation serve taxpayers when savings might not be as big as promised? How would the public know important notices or controversial actions are not hidden from view?

COVID-19: A little discomfort now worth not catching deadly virus

CLAY COUNTY - More people are getting their second dose of the COVID-19 vaccine and the side effects can be surprising if you aren't aware of them.

The first dose brings with it side effects that you might expect: soreness in the arm, perhaps a low-grade fever and a touch of drowsiness, but that's easy-mode compared to what some are feeling after the second dose.

There's nothing to be alarmed of, though. These effects fade within 24 hours and are a small price to pay in order to receive a vaccine that is not only keeping vou safe.

Trials for both the Moderna and Pfizer vaccines shown the chances of contracting COVID-19 are dramatically reduced. especially after a few weeks for the body to build immunity. Research, however, isn't clear whether those vaccinated can still spread the virus.

I have multiple family members who have received the COVID-19 vaccine. Two of them are frontline workers – one is a doctor and the other is a firefighter - and both experienced similar side effects after the second dose. Both said they would endure it again if they had to because it's protecting them and those they come into contact with on the job and in their per-

hardly sleep from having chills. The next morning, I had a fever, felt achy, had a headache, and no appetite for basically the whole day.'

The following morning after feeling sick on Feb. 3, he felt 100% fine. He's been fine ever since and even more comforted knowing his body is more prepared than ever to fend off COVID-19, a virus that's killing thousands every day.

The doctor in my family received her second dose about a week before the firefighter. She felt similar symptoms.

"The second dose vaccine side effects started about six hours after the vaccination," she said. "I had full-body aches like with the flu, major chills, fatigue and my temperature reached 100.5 Fahrenheit. I was on Tylenol and Advil around the clock and basically slept most of the day."

She said the symptoms lasted 24 hours and then promptly disappeared. She felt completely normal the next day except that she felt very tired, likely due to what her body had endured in the previous day.

These side effects are normal and while the person administering the vaccine might warn you about them, and while you might hear about it through hearsay, it's important to truly understand what you're going to be dealing with.

It will give you a peace of mind to know that what you're experiencing is normal, and you won't need to worry that something has gone wrong. You will likely feel sick for a day and that's fine.

You're doing people like me, people who can't yet get the vaccine and millions of others in the same boat, a great service by



School board sends DeSantis letter to consider teachers as frontline workers in pandemic

Request would allow younger educators, staff to get COVID-19 vaccinations

FLEMING ISLAND – The school board is going to send a letter to Governor Ron DeSantis urging him to consider teachers and education employees frontline workers for COVID-19 vaccinations.

People 65 years of age and older, as well as all frontline workers like doctors and firefighters, can get the COVID-19 vaccine now. The school board wants the definition of "frontline workers" to be expanded to teachers and school-related employees because it believes they should have access to the vaccine should they wish.

"Hopefully, as the vaccines become more and more available, we can encourage the governor to realize that teachers are on the frontline and that all education employees are on the frontline," board chair Mary Bolla said during the Thursday, Feb. 4, school board meeting.

Superintendent David Broskie said this has been the hot topic, and he's supports the request and has been heavily advocating for younger teachers to be eligible for the vaccine. He said other districts have already sent letters to the governor and that he would be willing to do the same.

"I know other districts have sent letters to the governor...and I'd be agreeable to do that if the board would like me to do that," Broskie said. "I think the governor has [received] the message and we've all attempted to lobby that to occur, but I consider it to be a serious issue and [will] continue to advocate for it and go from there."

Bolla suggested sending a letter, especially in light of the Florida legislature having two new Clay County-representing members.

"We should be keeping our local legislative delegation aware and two (of them) are brand new and making sure they're aware of what we're doing and our frontline workers...is important.," she said.

The board came to a 5-0 consensus to send a letter to Gov. DeSantis on behalf of the Clay County School District. Board

member Ashley Gilhousen added the letter wouldn't be asking the governor to make vaccines mandatory for teachers and school-related employees. It will only ask the governor consider teachers and school-related employees as frontline workers so that they may have the option to get the vaccine.

In other business, the school board voted 5-0 to approve a new board policy establishing the Citizens Oversight Committee for the half-cent sales tax approved by voters in the general election last year.

The committee will be composed of Clay County residents selected by the individual board members and the superintendent to serve as watchdogs for the tax.

This committee won't have the final say over how that money is spent. That goes to the school board who is only allowed to spend it on things outlined in the resolution voters approved last year. But the committee will be allowed to symbolically put its stamp of approval on items marked for the tax for the board.

which is 35 years, and this year, we've raised more money than ever before," physical education teacher Kim Tracanna-Breault said. "I'm not surprised though because this is a very giving student body. It's a giant family and when we're committed to something, we're all committed."

Principal Dawn Wolfe mentioned the district's seven mindsets, which is a part of the district's social-emotional learning culture push, and how last month's motto was "Live to Give" and that this month's is "Making a Difference." Be it irony or coincidence, those are two statements the school has certainly taken to heart this year.

The school is officially done with its fundraising after a strong six weeks and its grand total collected was \$18,417.92, which is the most in school history and currently first place in the district. Tracanna-Breault said other schools will probably top them – she mentioned Oakleaf, whose schools have populations reaching more than 1,000 – but she'd be happy to see Lakeside finish second or third.

"It's really not about the placement or winning though," Tracanna-Breault said. "I want those titles for our kids here, but at the end of the day, it's about raising this money in the name of being good and doing good and doing right by [Riddle and Pops]."

The teacher stressed AHA fundraising isn't just a Lakeside thing. It's a county-wide drive and it's not about who is rais-

ing the most. It's about raising money for a good cause and she's proud Lakeside contributed a fraction of the more than \$100,000 raised by the district.

The project coincides with February being American Heart Month.

Tracanna-Breault loves the fundraiser because not only does it raise money for a good cause, it teaches the children how to contribute without realizing it. She said they complete heart-related quizzes and brain-related games to obtain prizes associated with the fundraising and without realizing it, they're learning so much about those organs and keeping them active and

healthy.

She said the goal this year was to raise \$6,000, which has been achieved in the past. The students, faculty and parents quickly broke through that ceiling and have broken through eight goals beyond that to reach \$18,000.

"I don't push the students to really hit these high numbers, especially in a year like this where money is tight due to the pandemic and all that," Tracanna-Breault said. "This was the students and their parents. I talked on Facebook about it and parents would message me and say 'let's raise even more' and it just went from there.

"It's a testament, really, to this school. The people here are good and they want to help and raise this money. If I hadn't put an end date to the fundraising, I'm sure they would have kept going."

Riddle raised \$1,040 and Pops' grandson, Reed, was the top student with \$1,500. Other students have raised as much as \$830, which is how much Camryn Hiscox raised. Thirty-eight students have raised more than \$250. About 60 students raised at least \$25 last year, which earned them an invite to an on-campus AHA party with games, food and celebration and more than 130 have raised that much this year. Students that raise \$50 got to slime Wolfe and at different fundraising levels above that, the students get to slime other faculty members.

"The P.E. teachers kind of coordinate the event, but I won't take credit for any of this," Tracanna-Breault said. "This is a school-wide event and we have the best students, parents and faculty out there. They make this happen."

Wolfe said Tracanna-Breault is far too humble to mention how much of a role she played in the fundraising. She said the students at the school love and adore their P.E. teacher and for them, fundraising is one part raising enough money to go to the party, slime their teachers and earn prizes, but another part of it is making Tracanna-Breault happy.

"They love her," Wolfe said. "We're all family here and she's been here for 35 years. She's taught kids, those kids' kids, and now the grandkids."

This is Tracanna-Breault's last full year before she retires in November. The school has raised more money for AHA during her last year than any year before. While she would likely never notice it due to how humble she is in the role, it's easy to see that her Lakeside family worked hard this year to let her go out with a bang.

"You know, for some students, this school and the people here...that is their family," Tracanna-Breault said. "That's what Lakeside Elementary is about too: we're family. This job, these kids, this faculty...this is my life. I don't even know what I'm going to do when I retire to be honest. I know this though: I get so much back from these kids and that's what I've loved most about this."

One of the Oakleaf schools with a population of nearly twice of Lakeside might come back and take first place, but one thing is clear: to everyone at this school, Lakeside Elementary is the winner in their hearts.

"I started my parks career in Florida many, many years ago, and been bouncing around out west between that and now in Texas, California and New Mexico," Ferris said. "Parks and theme parks for the last 42 years."

The 150-acre, former Girl Scout campground sits on Black Creek and allows visitors a chance to get away from everything, to spend time alone or with family, and to enjoy nature.

The camp features different areas which have cabins.


some of which have climate control, some of which do not. They also have tree house cabins, which are mounted about 25 feet off the ground and are very popular rentals. The cabin and tent areas all feature kitchen and shower buildings. The tent areas are raised flat rectangular portions of ground about 20-by-10 feet, where tents can be pitched. All of the cabin and tent areas also have firepits and grills for outdoor cooking.

There are many animal species in the park, many of which are protected.

Different species of reptile and birds also make their homes in the park. Tortises have been seen, along with skinks – a snake/lizard hybrid – and snakes. Bird species vary, which attracts many bird watchers. Owls, hawks and bald eagles also make their homes in the park.

There are also mammal species which in the park, however those are more transitory in nature, passing through rather than making permanent homes. Coyotes, wild pigs and bears have been seen in the park.

Ferris loves his job. He loves seeing and interacting with the people who come into the park, as well as taking care of it. He hopes that people will continue to come to the park, enjoy nature, and he will do everything he can to make sure that Camp Chowenwaw is a place where it happens.






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


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Romance scams: The lonely should think with their heads, not heart

CLAY COUNTY – More money has been lost to romance scams than any other type of fraud reported to the Federal Trade Commission.


Nobody wants to be lonely and being lonely, especially during the holiday seasons, but it can lead people to making some otherwise unintelligent decisions.

The decisions usually end in financial fraud for the population of adults 60 and

"It's mostly older women in their 50s, 60s or even 70s," Jax Federal Credit Union fraud manager Marianne Hubbell said. "They're lonely, they go online, and these people on the other side of the screen promise them the world. Within a short amount of time, these scammers are promising their love and asking for money.'

Here are some troubling stats related to fraud like this. straight from the FTC: people reported \$201 million in financial losses to these scams in 2019 and the average amount lost by a single person was \$18,000. The number of people reporting a monetary loss during the first and second quarter of 2020 jumped up 19% from the same time in 2019, likely as a result of targeted scamming at those unemployed due to COVID-19.

Hubbell said catching these scams before the monetary loss happens is important and there are some things to look out for in the beginning.



Romance scams accounted for the highest aggregate dollar losses for adults 60 years of age or older, with people reportedly losing \$201 million to the scams in 2019 according to the Federal Trade Commission.

"If they profess their love right away. that's a big red flag," Hubbell said. "Something else to note is that you really shouldn't just send someone you've never met a lot of money. Go online. See if you can find the pictures they're using elsewhere, because they usually use someone else's pictures. Ask them what their job is and search for

She said if someone tries to move things off of a website like Facebook or a dating app and into text messages and phone calls, that can be a red flag. These things move fast, Hubbell said, and it's often hard to tell when it's happening to you so it's important for others around you to recognize this and help you.

She said the person on the other end being overseas is another big red flag as are requests for electronic and wire trans-

"Sometimes, it's obvious but these people are lonely and desperate for a connection that they don't see it happening," Hubbell said.

She recalls a case where the person said they needed to transfer money to their romantic partner because their bank accounts were frozen and they couldn't buy anything. That scammer requested the money be sent to a bank account. Hubbell asked the person if they recognized how weird it was that someone was requesting thousands of dollars.

"A lot of people just get in too deep and then they're embarrassed to have been someone that was scammed." Hubbell said. "The person on the other side is saying exactly what they want to hear and that makes it tougher to recognize what is usually a scam."

Hubbell said her bankers will notify her when someone is making odd wire transfers and the like and then she and her team will begin to monitor the situation. It's her job to try and catch it before the big financial scam actually happens and she also works with those already scammed to help them move forward.

She said money often can't be returned unfortunately but that it's important to report any fraud or scam like this to the FTC, the FBI and local police. The scammers are often hitting multiple people at once and by reporting it when it happens, you're helping the FTC and FBI piece together the

"We're just trying to help you and it's hard to get across to these people because they're so into this relationship and their hearts are involved at that point," Hubbell said. "You're not thinking clearly at that point because you're thinking with your heart, not your head.'

CCSO's Challenge Explorer Youth Program provides law enforcement skills

Young members learn quickly of the discipline, hard work it takes to be in law enforcement

ORANGE PARK – The Clay County Sheriff's Office Challenge Explorer Youth Program, run by deputy Matthew Brown, allows local youth to develop basic law enforcement skills, discipline, time management and planning, allowing them to compete in statewide competitions to test their skills.

Brown has been in charge of the program for about two years, but it has been a part of the CCSO for decades.

"I did some research trying to find how long the program has been established here at the sheriff's office," said Brown. "I could only go back as far as somewhere in the '80s." The program looks for a particular type of youth to be a participant.

"The easiest way to describe it," said Brown, "[is] it's kind of like it's the ROTC [Reserve Officer's Training Corps]; similar program, but the law enforcement version of that. There's certain requirements. Age 14, and age 21 is the cutoff."

Interested young people must apply, have no criminal background, and pass a background check, like any other CCSO applicant. There is also an academic component to the application process. Candidates must have a 2.0 grade-point-average or better. To be placed in any leadership position, they must have a 3.0 average.

Bond set at \$750,030 for man charged with several counts of child pornography

MIDDLEBURG – Bond was set at \$750,030 for a Middleburg man accused of having 10 images of children having sex.

Michael Ralph Peiffer, 49, was arrested on Feb. 5 after a detective assigned to the Internet Crimes Against Children Unit at the Clay County Sheriff's Office served a search warrant on Jan. 12 for one of his electronic devices. They found images or video of children, including one who was described as 5 or younger.

According to the arrest report, the images were obtained between Nov. 6 and Dec. 15, 2020.

Couple linked to Clay charged with killing witness

OCALA – U.S. Attorney Maria Chapa Lopez announces the return of an 11-count superseding indictment charging David Chappell Fey, 56, of Belleview, and Shari Lynn Gunter, 57, of Ocklawaha, with the

murder of a government witness and conspiracy to murder a government witness. Fey and Gunter are also charged with conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine and fentanyl causing the death of their victim. Fey faces an additional eight

counts of distributing methamphetamine and Gunter faces one count of distributing methamphetamine.

The statutory penalties for these offenses include up to life imprisonment and death.

According to the superseding indict-

ment and other court records, Fey and Gunter conspired together and murdered "K.B." to prevent her from communicating information to law enforcement regarding the distribution of methamphetamine by Gunter and Fey. On April 6, 2016, K.B. was found deceased in her parked vehicle near a cemetery in Oxford, Florida, the victim of an apparent drug overdose. Upon further investigation by local, state, and federal agencies, it was determined that K.B.'s death was not accidental, but that she died from homicide caused by the intentional injection of fentanyl and methamphetamine. K.B. was 31 years old at the time of her death.

In addition to intentionally murdering and conspiring to kill K.B., the superseding indictment alleges that Fey and Gunter conspired to distribute methamphetamine and fentanyl, the use of which resulted in the death of K.B. Fey is separately charged with distribution and possession with intent to distribute methamphetamine on eight different occasions between Jan. 19, 2016, and Oct. 17, 2019. Gunter is charged jointly with Fey in one of the distribution counts, occurring on Jan. 19, 2016.

An indictment is merely a formal charge that a defendant has committed one or more violations of federal criminal law, and every defendant is presumed innocent unless, and until, proven guilty.

Fey was arrested in Middleburg on Oct. 17, 2019, for selling, manufacturing, delivering and trafficking methamphetamine after the Clay County Sheriff's Office stopped

him for having illegally-tinted windows. They recovered 114.5 grams – a quarter-pound – of methamphetamine in his car after K9 Konan with the Florida Highway Patrol alerted deputies of the presence of the drugs. They found four bags of meth on the front passenger seat.

Those charges were dismissed Tuesday, Feb. 9.

This case was being investigated by the Drug Enforcement Administration, with support from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, the Marion County Sheriff's Office, the Unified Drug Enforcement Strike Team, the Sumter County Sheriff's Office and CCSO. It is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorneys Michael P. Felicetta and Tyrie K. Boyer.

Man arrested for drugs while sitting in car at convenience store

MIDDLEBURG – A man was arrested three weeks after Clay County Sheriff's Office deputies found him sitting in his car at a convenience store on County Road 218.

When they approached the car on Jan. 18, deputies said they saw two syringes in the door. After a search of the car, Michael Eugene Haun, 39, of Middleburg, was charged with possession of cocaine, methamphetamine, a controlled substance and drug paraphernalia. A warrant was issued on Feb. 5 and he was arrested on the same day.

His bond was set at \$62,511.

several ways to identify and prevent posting sexual content. As impossible as it seems, parents need to tell their children it's never all right to be asked or to share nude photos. Once they're sent, the child can never get them back. According to JAMA Pediatrics, 14.8% of teenagers have sent and 27.4% have received a "sext" – and 12% of them forwarded them without consent.

Such behavior is a cybercrime that can

follow a child well into adulthood.

Much like teaching children against the dangers of firearms and alcohol and drug abuse, parents need to be involved with their children's online safety.

"I tell parents don't ever take the approach of 'not my kid or my kid would never do that.' That's not to say every child that gets on a Smartphone is going to get involved in things they shouldn't or make mistakes," Ellis said. "Just because your kid does something, it doesn't make your kid a bad kid. Sometimes, people are fearful of what they don't know or understand. We have to break that barrier and get par-

ents to have those real conversations, to get involved in their children's internet activity.

"We expect children, and that's in the simplest term, we expect children to be mature beyond any other expectation of what we have on them on the internet. We wouldn't expect a child that's 10 years old to be able to get on the highway and drive. We wouldn't expect a smaller child to be responsible around a firearm. We shouldn't expect that of a child on the internet. That's the thing we're trying to get across is even though the internet has a lot of great things and it is needed and it is resourceful and

we do have to embrace it because that's the route we're going whether we like it or not, but we've got to have those real talks."

A child also has to know how to respond to sexts. Violations should be reported to a CyberTipline, reported to a school police officer, a school counselor, police officer or a parent.

"You can't be blind to the fact your child could be exploited," Ellis said. "Your child could make a mistake. We have to be involved."

And remain vigilant until the threats – and the need for a Safer Internet Day – goes away.

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
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Adams to represent Middleburg at Florida Hometown, U.S.A for third year

MIDDLEBURG — Sheridan Adams, a sixth-grader that attends Tynes Elementary school, is a long-time participant in the Florida Hometown, U.S.A. program. Chosen to represent her home of Middleburg, she exemplifies the values espoused in the program.

"We are a non-profit, educational youth program," said Linda Watts, founder of the program. "This is our 35th year. We were organized in 1986. It's a program to stress and encourage young people to volunteer and give back to their hometown."

Every year, the non-profit chooses five Florida towns and gets recommendations from schools and other sources about children who are doing good things in their communities. They then take these children and give them the opportunity to partner with volunteer opportunities. These opportunities continue to demonstrate the importance of giving back to other young people.

"This is actually Sheridan's third year as a hometown representative," said her mother, Deidra Adams. "Her first time she was six. She had so much fun traveling all over Florida volunteering. Every time she is old enough for the next age group, she wants to go back and do it again. She's done tiny miss at six, eight years old she was little miss, now she's 11, and she is the Junior Miss representative."

Sheridan initially got involved by helping her mother clip coupons to get food items for donations to different food pantries. She and her mother were unaware of the program at the time. She had already gotten onto Watt's radar, however.

"Miss Linda [Watts] kind of noticed her community service involvement and requested that we come and interview for Hometown U.S.A.," said Adams.

"We have a fundraiser in November. Each year in November in Orlando, and we do have a fundraiser event where we do select the five girls," Watts said.

The selection includes an interview process to ensure that the program is something in which the girls are really interested in being involved.

There is also a competitive aspect involved in the program. The winner was selected from three separate vents. There is the interview portion. There is an on-stage portion where the girls dress up similar to a pageant. There is also a reception, and then the winner is chosen. Three judges come together to select the winner. The winner receives \$500 and is recognized by state officials. They also take a trip to Tallahassee, where they tour the state capitol, the state supreme court and the governor's mansion. They also receive the Presidential Student's volunteer award.

In addition to her service, Sheridan is an active ballet dancer, having practiced it for the past two years.

"I love the organization because you also get to meet new people who can become long-time friends," she said. "I love volunteering because I get to meet people at nursing homes and children's hospitals."

Sheridan's love of ballet has influenced her future. One day she hopes to teach ballet to children whose families can not afford for them to learn the art.

Before the inception of school resource officers and school safety officers, CCSO officers were in Clay County schools with more direct access to students. That helped them to identify candidates and generate interest in the Explorer Program.

"Kids would come up and say 'Hey I want to go into law enforcement,' or they heard about the explorer program, so we were able to give them that information," said CCSO spokesman Andrew Ford. "And so, typically what happened, now that we have a school police department in the schools, that kind of took us out of the schools where we could share that information to those kids. So now you have to find another way to get that message out to kids in schools and in the community that we do have an explorer program, and we want kids to come and sign up."

According to Ford, many children in the schools show interest in a future law enforcement career but are unaware of the program.

Being a member of the program teaches many law enforcement skills and helps prepare the participant for a successful future.

"We have our meetings on Monday nights," Brown said. "They attend the meetings, and they learn law enforcement things. They learn how to do traffic stops. They learn how to use a radio; how to communicate. Rank structure, how to be organized, take notes, things like that. They learn different parts on how to become a law enforcement officer, and they learn what a law enforcement officer does."

It's not just about policing for the children, though, stressed Brown. There is also the critical aspect of community engagement. Members volunteer in the community, help with special events, or assist the disabled in doing good things in their community.

"They give back to the community,"

Brown said. "And it goes towards their community service hours."

Ford referenced the program's importance to help create well-rounded young people, which colleges are looking for as much as they look for academic achievement.

One former member is currently at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, completing his U.S. Army Advanced Individual Training in his occupational specialty before returning home to serve in the Army Reserve. He has already reached out to Brown to express interest in attending training to become an officer in the CCSO

Both Ford and Brown feel that the Explorer program has great value to the community.

"Number one, I think you have to have a person who is overseeing it show the same type of commitment and dedication that he shows to his job as he shows to the youth," said Ford. "Matt Brown has been extraordinary in doing that. A SWAT operator, so he knows tactics. But also, with that comes discipline. Matt couldn't be successful today if he didn't have that type of discipline and work ethic. So, anyone that joins that program, you know they'll be held accountable in the values that the explorer program has."

In a time when many young people want to affect change in their daily lives and communities, the Explorer program helps members to gain the necessary leadership and organizational skills to thrive in the future.

many weddings back, according to what she heard from brides with whom she spoke.

Tammy Martin, manager of Pink Bouquet in Orange Park, had a different take on the situation.

"This is the third year," she said. "We were surprised that, you know, 200 brides, between 200-and-250, actually registered. Brides are getting creative, and no one's really letting the coronavirus stop them from getting married.

"And as much as you think couples wouldn't be traveling, they are traveling.

They're traveling and doing destination weddings."

Other vendors present included photographers and caterers.

Our Story Productions provides photography and videography for its clients. This is the first year that they have attended the Bridal Spectacular.

"We're happy to be here in this expo to meet brides," said Aida Varas, photographer for Our Story. "It [COVID-19] has affected us and the families that are trying to get married. Very surprised [at the turnout for the expo]; we're very fortunate."

Based on ticket sales, Olson projected that visitors' volume to the expo would be roughly the same as last year's attendance of about 200.





For the Golden Eagles, who finished regular season play with just two losses (to the pesky Bartram Trail High Lady Bears, the Class 7A defending champions), the win marks Rosano's first playoff win although her high school days saw her part of a few deep playoff runs under then-coach Darrell Ivey.

"I try to bring that experience to them when I got here and the talent that was here was very capable of championship play," said Rosano. "I wanted to win the balls in the air, get it on the ground, then run in down the field."



Fleming Island High's girls soccer team won a 3-0 match with Creekside to give first year coach Joy Rosano, left, her first district championship trophy.




Forward Gianni Gardner fires first shot of the night against Creekside.

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Ridgeview and Clay highs place second at state cheer

LAKELAND – History repeated itself at the FHSAA State Cheerleading Championships January 22-23 at the RP Funding Center in Lakeland, as Bishop Snyder won a title for a second consecutive year after failing to win its regional. Ridgeview was the runner-up to the Cardinals in the Class 1A Small Non-Tumbling Division, while Clay finished second in the Class 2A Large Co-Ed Division. Four Clay County schools participated.

After a third place finish at the Region

1 competition January 9 at Oakleaf High School, Bishop Snyder easily qualified for the finals in Lakeland with a score of 84.8 in the semifinals, a marked improvement from the 79.9 the Cardinals had received in the regional. In the finals, Snyder pulled out all the stops and executed a difficult routine to win the division with an eyepopping 89.5. The Cardinals' path to the championship was very similar to the road they took in 2020, when they finished fourth at the Region 1 competition before winning the state title two weeks later.

Ridgeview could not quite recapture the form that had earned the regional title and

an automatic berth in the Lakeland finals. The Panthers' 83.2 was a little off from the 85.1 they had received at the regional, but still far outpaced Lakeland Christian, which finished third with a 79.4. The Panthers' routine featured flyers that did roundoffs into their stunts, and hand-in-hands (stunts where flyers are flipped from handstands in the hands of their bases to upright positions).


"We had two drops," said Ridgeview coach Aimee Stutz, who was pleased that her squad perfectly executed a difficult pyramid. "However, that was at the beginning of the routine and after that, the kids really came together and finished the rest of it strong."

In the Class 2A Large Co-Ed Division, Clay scrambled from mid-week adversity to score an 85.95, claiming second place behind Bartow. The Blue Devils lost two athletes the week before the competition to injury, forcing freshman alternate Lilliana Jordan into action. Coach Lori Davis had increased the difficulty of the pyramid from the regional routine and had to make further changes due to the injuries. Clay got off to a rough start when senior Kylee Griffin turned her ankle on the landing of the opening tumbling pass. But Griffin, who will see an orthopedic specialist to determine the extent of the damage, tolerated severe pain to execute the remainder of the routine.

"Coaches and cheerleaders from other teams all called her [Griffin] a beast because they were amazed that she finished," said Davis, who noted that Griffin had to perform multiple jumps after her injury.

Kyle Busch wins exhibition race after friends clash in final turn

Speedweeks off to a fast start at Daytona International Speedway

DAYTONA BEACH – Kyle Busch couldn't catch a break during most of the 2020 racing season. Things are already better in 2021.

Busch drove through a last-corner accident to go from third to Victory Lane in the Busch Clash exhibition race Tuesday night the Daytona International Speedway. The wreck between Ryan Blaney and Chase Elliott was nothing more than friendly fire, it allowed Busch to lead the final 125 yards — the only time he was out front on the 3.61-mile, 14-turn, road course — but they were the only ones that mattered.

Yeah, I kind of felt like there was an interesting opportunity there that was presenting itself. I was kind of catching those guvs and running them down for a couple laps there towards the end. I think they were pushing each other a little bit, kind of messing each other up more so than being able to run clean laps," Busch said. "I was gaining. I wasn't going to get there. But obviously they got together there in that final corner. I wasn't sure if Chase was going to push the issue and push back on Blaney and knock him through the turn and make him miss the exit or what was going to happen. The both of them had to make the turtles [speed bump curbing], if you will. They just got together and started crashing.

"When that started happening, I was hoping they were going to wreck long enough that I could get up in there and get by them, we could win the thing. It's never over till it's over at these types of places, especially when you have those last-corner, last-ditch-effort chicanes like here and the [Charlotte] Roval."

Elliott recovered to finish second, followed by Joey Logano in third, Tyler Reddick in fourth and William Byron in fifth. Blaney limped home in 13th place.

"I certainly don't want to wreck him out of anybody," said Elliott, who's won the last four points-paying road course races on the Cup Series schedule. "And more than anything, hate neither one of us won. Hate to hand it to somebody else like that."

Blaney agreed.

"But I told him if you're going to make a move like that, make sure you at least win the race," he said. "Don't hand it to the third-place guy."

The Clash was an invitation-only 35-lap race among 21 drivers. The regular season is scheduled to start Sunday with the Daytona 500. The Cup Series then will return to the Daytona road course for 70-lap main event on Nov. 21.

Other races this week include the Duels qualifying races that determine the Daytona 500 starting lineup on Thursday, the NextEra 250 for the Camping World Truck Series on Friday and the Beef, It's What's For Dinner 300 for the Xfinity Series on Saturday.

The starting lineup for Tuesday's Clash was determined in a blind drawing. Blaney started on the pole, but Denny Hamlin passed him on the first lap and he stayed ahead for 21 laps. Blaney finally got to the front with five laps remaining, only to lose the opportunity to win after being turned coming out of the final chicane.

For Busch, it was a lucky turn of events. He won a single race last year, and that didn't come until the 34th race of the 36-race season.

"We just did our job, executed as well as we could execute," he said. "It all kind of came together there at the end."

Despite the injuries, Clay's routine went well, with the only hiccups being Griffin's touchdown and a fall during the opening stunt sequence. Davis was thrilled.

"Having all new guys this season, with injuries within the week, with last minute changes, with a new freshman added at the last minute and an athlete twisting her ankle and pushing through, we are so proud of this team." she said.

Fleming Island made drastic improvement from a 62.85 received in the regional, scoring an 82.2 in Lakeland to snare third place behind the Blue Devils. The Golden Eagles routine features multiple stunts using just a single base for each flyer.

"We are right on track," said Fleming Island coach Ryan Andrews. "Every year, we want to be as clean as we can be at States [the FHSAA state competition], but we want to make sure we are peaking for the [United Cheerleaders Association, or UCA] nationals and finish in the top five there."

Middleburg improved on its score of 61.1 at the regional with a 61.9 in Lakeland, but did not advance to the finals in the Class 1A Small Varsity Division. The Broncos had only one fall despite some last-minute adversity. Kyla Sawdo, Middleburg's best tumbler and middle flyer, was forced to miss the competition due to Covid-19 protocols. Senior Brittney Horton was brought in from the sideline cheerleading squad and learned Swado's role in a two-hour emergency practice the day before the competition. Horton then hit all her stunts and tumbling passes in Lakeland, impressing head coach Rhiannon Weiskopf. "This team rallied together and did a great job, considering," said Weiskopf. "Overall, the routine went great."

After qualifying for the state semifinals at the regional on January 9, Oakleaf was unable to compete in Lakeland due to Covid-19 contact tracing protocols. According to head coach Daniel Richardson, the Knights will not compete again this season.

Next up for Bishop Snyder and all the Clay County schools except Oakleaf will be the UCA Cheer National Championship competition at the Walt Disney World Resort in Orlando on April 23-25, 2021.


