An epidemic of innocence

Sheriff's office employs help of cyber detectives, computer-sniffing dog

ORANGE PARK - The stacks of folders at the Internet Crimes Against Children and Human Trafficking unit of open cases keeps growing at the Clay County Sheriff's Office's Investigations Headquarters.

Each file represents a case involving the possible exploitation and abuse of a child. They are filled with disturbing images and accounts from around the world that can be traced back to Clay County.

In the darkened background, lights flash on oversized computer towers that are used to track down society's most contemptable predators. Like the growing number of cases, the computers never

Sheriff Michelle Cook announced Monday her department arrested 62-year-old Patrick William Roach of Orange Park on

Feb. 18 for possessing 10 or more images of children having sex.

The sheriff's office, along with the FBI, State Attorney's Office and Department of Homeland Security have been besieged with tips and complaints, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic. Since many children are home instead of in the classroom, the chances of them being targeted by a predator on their cellphones or electronic devices

When he moved out of the city limits, he had to resign because you had to live in the city limits. So, I'm kind of picking up his flank, continuing with the mission.'


John Hauber wants to be a leader, not politician, on Orange Park Council

ORANGE PARK - Don't call John Hauber a politician.

That's why he's running for Orange Park Town Council's Seat 3. He wants to bring back the passion of years past and marry it with an ever-evolving Orange Park so that the soul of the town is kept intact.

Synergy program will allow students, teachers, parents to stay in touch with online program

FLEMING ISLAND – The school district is looking at a new program called Synergy that could change the way teachers interact with parents.

Synergy is an education platform that synthesizes all of the district's current functions into one easy-to-use place. Parents, students and teachers can view grades and classroom performance in Focus and then parents can view their child's behavior in a separate program called Class Dojo. Other programs are used for other functions and it's a large web of software functioning individually.

"One thing we're really excited about is it takes multiple platforms and condenses them into one platform," Clay County School District supervisor of technology services Sabrina Thomas said to the school board during their Tuesday, Feb. 23, agenda workshop. "This is an all-integrated application just like you'd see with anything modern and professional."

The program was supposed to launch earlier in the district but like with everything else, COVID-19 delayed that. One feature especially neat about Synergy is that it allows teachers to send messages and

pictures to students. If a student is doing well in class, a teacher can let the parent know for an immediate feedback reaction. The same goes for discipline.

"It's a very good classroom management tool," Thomas said.

There's also points that can be given to students for good behavior, which is another facet of the feedback loop that makes Synergy better than what the district currently employs.

'Right now, parents have Focus to see the grades, class dojo to see behavior and so on," Thomas said. "We're condensing that into one app so parents can see behavior, grades...and everything else...in one place."

Training for Synergy began in January for school administrators, school counselors and secretaries. District staff will begin to receive email flyers with information about the Synergy rollout plan in May and the rollover will begin in June with an official planned launch on July 1. Teachers and instructional staff will receive training in July and August, which is the same time a media campaign will launch to inform parents of how it works. Synergy will be integrated into the district at that point and will serve as the new home for grades, behavior records and more.

Staff that have already used the program are "very pleased" with the program and excited for the full rollout.

In other business, the school board is planning to hold a workshop next month to review its code of conduct for students, specifically the code's technology section. School board Ashley Gilhousen said a lot of disciplinary action stems from cell phone usage. She proposed that the board create new rules for technology based on grade levels - elementary, junior high and high school. She said the district needs to figure out a way to stop students from abusing the privilege of technology in school while also encouraging the use of cell phones and other technologies because of how integral and essential it is in modern learning.

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DeSantis wants Legislature to restrict local governments' emergency powers

lorida's been in a state of emergency for nearly a year. But that's currently only to get federal funds.

Gov. Ron DeSantis wants state law-makers to help get life in Florida back to normal, including by restricting cities and counties' abilities to place lockdowns on residents.

Florida may be open at the state level, but many local orders to mitigate CO-VID-19 outbreaks remain in place. Speaking from Hialeah in Miami-Dade County, DeSantis expressed his frustrations with lockdowns after he was asked about the county's nightly midnight curfew.

State lawmakers, including Hialeah Republican Sen. Manny Díaz, will be looking at local governments' pandemic powers, the Governor said. Lawmakers should look into "just moving on" with some of the emergency orders at the local level.

"I think if a local government's going to do it, I do think absolutely there needs to be a limited duration and it should require some type of legislative sanction," DeSantis said.

The Legislature has the power to "terminate" the Governor's actions, he said, but lawmakers haven't done so because he was "judicious."

"We were really using our authority to lift people up rather than to lock people down," DeSantis said.

Some Republicans, including St. Petersburg Sen. Jeff Brandes, want to limit the Governor's unilateral powers during an emergency. Brandes plans to file legislation that would require at least one other member of the Florida Cabinet to sign off on orders like lockdowns. Zephyrhills Sen. Danny Burgess, chair of the Senate Select Committee on Pandemic Preparedness and Response, said his panel should consider the Legislature's role in a sustained emergency.

However, the effort isn't an attack against DeSantis but rather a precaution for the future.


Florida has been open since September, when DeSantis lifted all state-level restrictions. The Phase Three order also limited local governments' abilities to shut down businesses and guaranteed the "right to work" to businesses and workers.

However, the order did not encompass curfews, the Governor said. He has never supported a curfew, he added.

The Governor contrasted South Florida against other cities across the nation that have been shut down.


Politics and pandemic creates a combination that endangers all of us

hen Donald Trump was the president, Dr. Anthony Fauci told us a year ago "there's no reason to be walking around with a mask," despite the threat of COVID-19.

Now that Joe Biden is the president,

Fauci, the director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases and the man who's in charge of the nation's response to the coronavirus, now says it's "common sense" to wear two masks instead of one.

That's what happens when you mix politics with a pandemic.

Our elected officials do us a disservice when they're more interested in pandering for votes and blaming their opponents than telling us the truth about COVID-19. Less than two weeks ago in a televised town hall on CNN, Biden said "it's one thing to have the vaccine — which we didn't have when we came into office — but a vaccinator. How do you get the vaccine into someone's arm?"

That wasn't just a misstatement. That was a lie.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, more than 10.6 million Americans, including thousands in Clay County, had been inoculated against COVID-19 before Biden was inaugurated.

CNN didn't challenge Biden's claim, which was a greater disservice because the network knew better. But the truth apparently didn't fit their agenda.

And it proved again politics have no place in the world's fight against a killer virus

Johnson & Johnson is expected to have its vaccine approved and shipped out within days. The company will join Moderna and Pfizer in eradicating the virus. Those vaccinations were created by scientists, not politicians.

Heather Huffman, the administrator of the Clay County Health Department, told the Board of County Commissioners Tuesday 62% of our county's seniors have been vaccinated.

"We're above the 50% threshold and that makes me happy," she said.

Huffman updates the commission every two weeks. She never mentions Republicans or Democrats. Her outlook often is mixed with concern and optimism. That's what happens when you're being honest. She's concerned only with vaccines, not votes.

Huffman, along with Director of Emergency Management John Ward, the county commission, Orange Park Medical Center, Ascension St. Vincent Clay County, the sheriff's office and the school district, have done a monumental job keeping all of us apprised of the coronavirus – all while working within confusing, and often ridiculous, HIPPA guidelines.

That's why you should never mix politics with the pandemic.


And you should count on your community leaders to keep you informed. They're more interested in your safety than your vote.

"Los Angeles isn't booming. New York City's not booming," DeSantis said. "It's booming here because you can live like a human being, people take precautions, which is great, but you're not locked down, people aren't miserable, and I think it's really remarkable what's happening."

No one predicted "forever restrictions," he added.

Florida has been in a state of emergency since March 9, 2020. Florida implemented a stay-at-home order in April, and within the month, DeSantis announced plans to start reopening the state.

The Sunshine State may have its doors open, but DeSantis has no plan to end the emergency declaration.

"The only emergency I use is to get the reimbursement from FEMA," he said. "If I don't have that, then all the stuff we do, we don't get reimbursement to the state, which obviously, we want from a perspective of just fiscally recouping any losses that we're doing. But that's the only, I think, valid reason to have any of that in place at this time."

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Ret. Army Lt. Col. Richard Hall served in the U.S. military for 33 years. Now he's helping Keystone Heights' Junior Reserve Officer's Training Corps achieve their own milestones.

Under Hall's direction, two sub-units finish with their highest scores in color guard competition in the school's history.

"I am just super proud," said Laurie Burke, Keystone Heights principal. "I mean, all that we've been through with the students and COVID [19] and not even knowing what kind of activities we were going to have, our students have done amazing in our JROTC program. They're finally getting to participate in some of these fun things that they are here for and are in the program for."

The girls' color guard, consisting of eighth-grader Sylvia Hunter, freshman Trista Harrison, sophomore Hailey Lemmon, junior Elizabeth Anderson earned first place in their competition.

At the same event, the boys' regulation armed squad, which also executing drill

and ceremonies but with weapons, finished third. That unit was composed of seven boys: freshman Hayden Sargable, sophomore Brian Rutkowski, juniors Nathan Baxter, Austin Laws, Ethan Brown and Owen Hunter and seniors Colton Shealy and Nicolas Rodriguez.

over the years. At one point, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, patients were camping out overnight to be early enough to be

"Before COVID, we see anywhere between 10 and 25 patients during that time," said Archambault. "Maybe average in the 15-20 range. And so, we could see about 20 or 25 patients. Sometimes 40 patients would show up, so we went to a lottery system."

Patients in pain would be seen first, but after that, they'd be selected in a blind

Patients are willing to wait to be seen and are grateful for the services provided at the clinic.

"I've been here, and they've pulled several teeth of mine," said Irene Tatar of Green Cove Springs. "They're very good. It's a very great association that they got going on here. It's a very great gift for them to help with the dental. Dental is so expensive for people. I really like that they have this program. I hope they never

lose this program. I hope this program stays for a long time."

"I'm just trying to get my stuff situated," said another patient. "It's great, I think. It's helping people out that can't afford it. I got quoted – almost \$2,000 to get my stuff situated [from another dentist]. and they're helping the community out."

In addition to the dental treatment, almost everyone who goes to the clinic receives some level of health and nutrition treatment. Many of the dental problems are directly linked to a poor diet and health habits.

The building where the clinic is currently located is scheduled for demolition later this year. They are in the process of searching for a new location. Archambault is attempting to move the clinic to share a site with the Way Medical Clinic, either permanently or until they can find another location.

"It's just rewarding to go and have a chance to educate patients and to provide some relief for those who really don't have any other place to get that education

or treatment," Archambault said.

To identify if a patient is eligible to receive the services rendered. There is a screening that takes place. They are screened by the health department. The financial threshold to receive treatment is 200% of the poverty

> level. If they have dental insurance, then they aren't seen.

"About two-thirds to three-fourths of what we do is pain relief, usually in the form of extraction," said Archambault, who has been involved with the clinic since its inception about 18 years ago. "We do save teeth by doing root canals and fixing them."

For specialty work, patients are referred to outside clinics at no cost to them, where they can have the specialty work done. After that, they return to the first clinic to continue or follow up on their treatment.



have increased.

The National Center for Missing and

Exploited Children reported the number of cases it's forwarded to local and state officials jumped from three million in 2019 to 7.7 million in 2020. Tech companies reported more than 45 million photos and images of children being sexu-

ally abused were posted online.

In 2020, CCSO received 154 tips about child porn, which has led to 17 search warrants and 21 arrests, Cook said.

"I think, from the law enforcement perspective, we've always recognized and realized just how dangerous these types of search warrants are," Cook said. "And we've always taken, at least since I've been here, the necessary precautions because they are dangerous.

"This has been around Clay County for some time. It's a priority for me. It's absolutely vital we keep our children from sexual abuse. I highlight this information to show you the sheer volume."

The investigation on Roach started when the NCMEC told Clay County authorities on Aug. 17, 2020, it uncovered 18 uploaded files classified as "child pornography" to a cloud-based account in Orange Park. According to the arrest report, there were nine additional linked cyber tips for a total of 180 suspected child abuse images.

After tracking down the Internet Protocol address and linking it to a home on Glynlyon Drive. CCSO got a search warrant for the internet provider. That revealed 180 files had been downloaded from July

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
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Health department:

62% of county's seniors have been vaccinated for COVID-19

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Sixty two percent of the county's 65 years of age and older have received the COVID-19 vaccine.

Clay County Florida Department of Health administrator Heather Huffman gave the Board of County Commissioners its usual update at the Feb. 23 meeting amongst an otherwise short and sweet agenda. Huffman had only good news to speak of, though, and she walked the board through some impressive numbers for the county.

"The case numbers are in the low numbers and that's good news," Huffman said. "I think what's most important to talk about is the vaccination numbers. Sixty two percent of the 65 years of age and older population is vaccinated. We're above the 50% threshold and that makes me happy."

She also told the BCC that Clay County had officially doled out 40,000 doses of vaccines and that happened in less than two months. She said the past two months have been a great showcase of the county and its partners' excellent work in getting the vaccines to those that want it.

Gov. Ron DeSantis recently announced

the state would be opening up four federal vaccination sites. One of those four sites will be in Duval at the Gateway Mall. De-Santis also announced that by way of executive order, these federal cites might change the priority vaccination groupings to include those 50 years of age and older that are teachers or law enforcement of-

Huffman stressed if that's the case, that new priority grouping will apply exclusively to the federal sites meaning the sites in Clay County like the one at the agricultural fairgrounds and those at Publix will not be able to open up vaccines outside of the usual 65 years of age and older.

The Federal Drug Administration is going to review the Johnson and Johnson vaccine on Feb. 26 and it's expected to roll out shortly after. It's a single-shot vaccine and Huffman believes that shot will be better for homebound individuals and those that struggle with needles. Another topic that occurred during her portion of the meeting was the question of homebound individuals in general. Huffman said she hopes the governor's office explicitly outlines what counts as homebound, as people can take advantage of that definition otherwise. She said homebound is currently looking

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
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Orange Park Junior High stays ahead of the learning curve with voluntary weekend sessions



ORANGE PARK – The — The Wildcats at Orange Park Junior High are working to get ahead of the learning loss stemming from COVID-19.

It's no surprise that the first few months of COVID-19 and distance learning were a struggle for everyone involved. Teachers and students had to learn new technologies to make virtual learning possible and both had to adapt to the new circumstances of education. All of education is aware that this will result in a widespread learning loss, but the Wildcats at Orange Park are working overtime to get ahead of it, and they're doing it on their volition.

"So with COVID-19, there's some learning lost and some have been home, some have returned to school, and there's a lot of plans in our district and across all of education about how to create summer programs to recoup the learning lost," Principal Justin Faulkner said. "For OPJH, we don't want to wait until summer time

and that's why we've created Wildcat Saturdays."

Faulkner said there are still state tests to come and that's why his school isn't content with waiting until the summer to get started on regaining the learning lost. He and his team came up with Wildcat Saturdays as a way to get students the extra education time they need in areas like reading, writing, math and test preparation.

Many students were excited about this idea on its own, but the school went a step further and talked to local businesses like Sonic and McDonalds to get breakfast provided for the students. Other businesses have donated gift cards and more and all of this works to entice the students who were maybe on the fence about voluntary Saturday school.

This is so much more than a study session though — it's a program designed specifically to attack those areas of learning most affected by COVID-19 and it was built in such a way that every student dips in and out of the many different facets of

learning.

"There's nine different sessions that the kids rotated through," Faulkner said. "They're divided up into small groups of about nine and that allows for much more targeted interaction. The content we teach is curated and based on research and best practices."

He said the team behind the program came up with a six-Saturday plan that will help students who attend just one session and those who attend all six. Faulkner said the school is even looking internally at data to see what the numbers look like for a student that attends all of them versus a student that attends just two and so on. That's because the school has bigger plans than just this six-Saturday course.

"We have big plans for this," Faulkner said. "Our goal right now is to attack that learning lost from COVID-19, but we want this to be just another aspect of OPJH. We see a future where there's a Spring session and a Fall session every year."

Justin Davis was a student at the first session on Feb. 20, and he said he learned different ways to write things on the Florida State Assessment tests that "will help me understand other subjects and learn information." Killian Drury was surprised at how fast the time went last Saturday. They learned during a test preparation session that it's important to ready everything on a test and carefully follow all instructions. Faulkner said he was worried students and teachers wouldn't want to do this. He was wrong. More than 100 students signed up for the first session and 85 students attended. He sent out messaging to teachers asking if they'd be interested, and 20 minutes later, he had a full lineup of teachers ready to go. What's better is that using Title 1 dollars, he's able to ensure each teacher is paid for

their sessions.

The sessions don't directly address every course of study – science and civics aren't included – but Faulkner said studies show reading directly affects every other course of study and it helps with test preparation and comprehension.

Jayla Bryant said they loved the activities during the first Wildcat Saturday because they learned new vocabulary that will help them in school and on state tests.

"It was a great success," Faulkner said.
"The kids responded very well to it and we have six Saturdays identified for this. Our goals are: one, to provide opportunities for students to get extra facetime and hands-on learning; and two, to remediate the learning lost. We want to eliminate the need for our students to have to go to summer school and we want to get them back on track so that we can put the COVID-19-related learning loss behind us."

Wildcat Saturdays weren't mandated by the district or the state. It's not an idea considered elsewhere, but Faulkner and his team came up with it as a method of proactivity.

"We even faced some skepticism that people would want this and we proved that wrong," Faulkner said. "Our kids are our community and I know that pockets of my community here were hit harder than others in terms of how it impacted learning loss. If we don't act on it, nobody else is going to and the best we can do is make up for the learning lost now instead of later and in any way we can.

"The teachers and the community believe in our kids. They are amazing and they all show up for them. Even when teaching is the hardest it's ever been, and even when learning is harder than it's ever been, our Wildcats show up and it's remarkable to see."

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
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Dr. Gentle lives up to her name at her chiropractic business

He was medically retired from the military in 2010 due to an injury and in 2012, he tried his hand at a fire department in Savannah before becoming a law enforcement officer after that. He fell in love with law enforcement and became a violent crimes detective in 2016. He remained in that role until 2018, which is when he came back home to Orange Park. He still recognized the town when he returned home, but he could tell some of the ideals that made the town what it was back in his youth had gone dormant.

"There was a lot more growth, and that's not a bad thing," Hauber said. "It's something inevitable in most cases. The biggest things I've found is a lot of residents, and this is from going around and talking to people I've known for many years...(they'd say things like), 'we didn't know this was going to happen,' or, 'we did know and we spoke up and nothing was taken seriously."

"The other change I saw was that the community wasn't like it used to be. Community outreach has changed. It's not the same feel I had when I was a kid. We've lost touch in reaching out to citizens... politicians and the leaders of our community would actually come out to neighbor-

hoods...and talk to people. That's stopped as well."

Hauber plans to be extremely active not just with the townsfolk in the Town Hall every other Tuesday Night if elected, but with the residents. The people that can't attend meetings because of work, or church, or because they have kids at home — Hauber wants to knock on their doors and talk to them about their issues, gather their thoughts on current proposals in the town and ultimately, restore a sense of transparency he feels has been lost in politics. Hauber doesn't even like to refer to these kinds of things as politics, viewing the word "politician" as almost offensive these days.

"I almost find the word politician offensive and I find 'leader' more appropriate because that's what you should be," Hauber said. "Leading your residents and youth in the area – to want to do better for them-

selves and the community and the only way to do that is to give it back to them."

Having been an Eagle Scout and having a son in Scouts BSA, Hauber envisions the town asking troops around the area to help with cleanup efforts that are otherwise completed using town resident tax dollars. He said troops are willing and able to perform clean ups because they're all about community service.

Hauber spoke to Clay Today for nearly an hour about his desire to run for town council and his reasons why, but distilled down, his message is this: He wants to bring back the small town feel of Orange Park while figuring out smart ways to grow. He wants to keep the history of Orange Park alive in doing so and above all that, he wants to be transparent.

He wants to donate his monthly check for being a council member to a local youth sports organization to sponsor children that might not otherwise be able to afford to join. He's not against mega-corporations necessarily, but he loves Orange Park's commitment to local business and wants those business owners to feel welcome and supported in town. He wants to continue the town's commitment to its local law enforcement and its fire department. Having a history in law enforcement himself, he knows firsthand what the officers go through day in and day out in that field of work, he said. He wants to continue to open up the town's surrounding waterways to the public, something the Rob Bradley Conservation Park will soon make happen.

He wants his children, and all of the children in town and their families as well, to be able to create the same memories of Orange Park he holds so dearly in his mind today. "I will be transparent in everything I do," Hauber said. "If you're just presenting an idea, let's be transparent about the details of that idea. We're not dealing with classified information. These are civic issues and they need to be presented that way."

Hauber will running against incumbent Roland Mastandrea in the April 13 election.

Challenger Center will 'ignite the county's economy for many decades to come'

OAKLEAF – Challenger Center is now open for development.

That was something echoed by many during the honorary groundbreaking ceremony held at the long-awaited Atlantis Drive off where Challenger Drive intersects with Trail Ridge Road on Thursday, Feb. 18.

There were about 30 people there to celebrate the occasion, including county commissioners, former state senators and representatives, residents and Clay County business leaders. It's just an area of undeveloped land right now but it's expected to bring more than 700 jobs to the county.

"The County is always looking forward to economic development opportunities like this one," Board of County Commissioners chairman Mike Cella said during the ceremony. "We're excited to see this type of road project begin because it does signal potential job growth in this very prime location in the Oakleaf-Middleburg area right next to our brand-new First Coast Expressway."

Cella capped off his introductory speech by explaining how 2021 will be a great year for the county. He said it's a year of new jobs and further increases of the commercial tax base, which means the county can better serve its community. Roughly 719 jobs are expected to be added

to Clay County when the 740-acre development is completed.

District 2 commissioner, Wayne Bolla, who represents the Oakleaf area, said in a couple of years, nobody would recognize where they were standing. That's because the Challenger Center, as it's referred to as, will be an area of commercial business development.

"We can also expect to see a return on investment," Bolla said. "There's \$1.5 million in private capital investment in connection with the project and at least 719 full-time jobs in District 2 in the next 10 years."


This project comes by way of more than \$2 million funded back in 2018 as a result of the county's push and partnership with the Florida Department of Transportation and others, as well as then-senator Rob Bradley and then-representative Travis Cummings.


Bradley talked about how easily the project could have fallen through, but

through many partnerships and leaders that continued to pursue it. It's a day of watching the fruits of our labors and visions begin to bloom, he said.


The new Atlantis Drive will be a little over half a mile long and it will be a fourlane road divided by a raised medium. Clay County Utility Authority executive director Jeremy Johnston said the road is a win-win for all parties involved, including CCUA who helped with some of the more utility-based design aspects like stormwater and sewage.

"With the start of Atlantis Drive, Challenger Center is poised and ready for takeoff," county manager Howard Wanamaker
said. "It will ignite the county's economy
for many decades to come. This new roadway will provide access to new commercial, retail, office, light industrial and
residential development with the promise
of millions of investment dollars and hundreds of full-time jobs."







27, 2020, to Aug. 5, 2020.

The ICAC unit, searched Roach's home on Feb. 18. With the assistance of a K-9 Ty, one of the few dogs in Florida trained specifically to detect electronics, deputies found devices containing more than 1,000 images of child pornography.

"Many electronic devices, such as computers, hard drives, cellphones and other digital media were seized for further digital forensic work," Cook said.

Roach immediately was arrested.

Agents are particularly cautious during pornography raids. On Feb. 2, two FBI agents were shot and killed in Sunrise serving a warrant for child pornography

and violent crimes against children.

"These suspects have a lot to lose if they get caught," Cook said. "This work is difficult. It is dangerous, detailed-oriented and technical, but it is absolutely vital that we keep our children safe."

The ICAC has several "souped up computer" forensic machines which processes digital evidence.

"All around here in the room are forensic machines that we use to forensically process and examine evidence that we seize during investigations," Ellis said. "Anything and everything and in every way possible – as ancient as $3\frac{1}{2}$ floppies to writable CDs, thumb drives, Micro SD cards, cellphones, hard drives."

K-9 Ty has become one of the county's best weapons for catching predators, said ICAC Detective Ryan Ellis. The English



Golden Labrador is one of three in North Florida that can detect chemical odors of electronic devices capable of electronic storage, Ellis said.

K-9 Ty helped FBI and Naval Criminal Investigative Service agents uncover evidence that led to the arrests of a U.S. Navy lieutenant and a Chinese national woman in Jacksonville for conspiracy to make false statements to a firearms dealer to illegally obtain guns.



K-9 Ty is both an important and playful part of the Clay County Sheriff's Office. The English Golden Labrador can detect electronics, as well as providing therapy for abused children. Ty has been responsible for "dozens" of arrests, according to Detective Ryan Ellis.

"Some offenders who have been involved with this for large amounts of time, do what we call 'collect,' and they keep and memorialize imagery of sexual abuse of children," he said.

The dog's playful nature also allows it to be used for therapy for young victims dealing with anxiety while being questioned.

Roach is being held on a \$250,030 bond. His next court appearance is scheduled for March 23 at the Clay County Courthouse.









St. Johns beat Maclay 7-0 in the



Labady, with a bye and two pins to the final, fought past a 0-0 first two periods before a stalling third call netted one point and a 1-0 leadbefore her pin for the title.









Creekside ends its season with a 7-8-3 record





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

son opener on November 11. Maclay advanced to the region final with wins over Lafayette (8-0) and Oak Hall (4-0). St. Johns beat Bishop McLaughlin 8-0 in their region quarterfinal before facing St. Joseph Academy.

At the first water break it was only 1-0. That break was all the Spartans needed to make the adjustments. Just like that, at the half it was 7-0 capped off with an amazing corner kick by Julia Boaventura, who put a wicked side-spin on the ball, hooked it around the 10 players standing face-toface in front of the goal, and the Flashes keeper watched the ball go in unassisted. 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
