

Three Oakleaf cheerleading teams take home the gold

OAKLEAF - The Knights Youth Cheerleaders won first-place national championship honors at The Quest, one of the biggest cheerleading competitions in the world.

The cheerleaders took home the gold in 18-and-under Level 1 traditional recreation cheerleading, 10-and-under Level 1 traditional recreation cheerleading and 8-and-under Level 1 traditional recreation. It's a big win for some of the hardest-working cheerleaders in Clay County.

Community to celebrate unexpected survival of puppy following vicious attack

FLEMING ISLAND – Frank Byman always knew there would be a day when his community would get together to remember his puppy, Arlo. For weeks, however, he figured it would be to memorialize the beagle's difficult fight after being mauled by an aggressive dog.

The one thing nobody expected was the dogged determination by an animal that not only survived being tossed by the neck like a ragdoll on March 30, but getting through five different life-saving procedures and surgeries.

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Clay County not affected by governor's executive order lifting COVID-19 orders

CLAY COUNTY – Florida COVID-19 emergency is over, according to Governor Ron DeSantis, and his latest executive order ends all local COVID-19 emergency orders.

The order also bans school, businesses and government buildings from requiring anyone to prove they've been vaccinated against COVID-19, effectively ending the concern some residents have over the possibility of COVID-19 vaccination passports. It also bans government orders enforcing masks too

How does all of this affect Clay County, which has been in a local state of emergency since the start of the pandemic, though?

Not much. "An emergency order is different from a local state of emergency, which is what I enact in Clay County when there's a threat," Clay County Emergency Management Director John Ward said. "It helps us circumvent purchasing processes [and other things] that might require more time than we have."

Ward said the county has been in a state of emergency since COVID-19 began, but that this is different than the "emergency

orders" DeSantis banned with his latest executive order. Emergency orders often limit rights and liberties, like being forced to wear a mask by governmental order.

"An emergency order directs citizens to do something," Ward said. "Some counties wrap all of that into a local state of emergency. We don't."

Ward said one time the county enacted an emergency order was when it enacted a curfew during Hurricane Irma. The county has never enacted an emergency order in relation to COVID-19. Some counties have curfews as a result of COVID-19 while oth-

ers have full-on mask requirements when out and about town. That's not the case for Clay County and Gov. DeSantis' executive order doesn't change any of the county's COVID-19-related proceedings as a result.

"I think they [state government] had a lot of issues with some communities down in South Florida that had curfews for extended periods of time and mask mandates and that's what they're trying to control, I believe."

DeSantis' executive order states: "Whereas, in light of these recently enacted reforms, the widespread vaccination of Florida residents, and the sufficient supply of vaccines for all eligible Florida residents, I find that it is necessary for the State of Florida to enhance its rapid and orderly restoration and recovery from the COVID-19 emergency by preempting and suspending all remaining local emergency restrictions on individuals and businesses and to return day-to-day life back to normal everywhere in the State."

Because Clay County's government has not enacted any "local emergency restrictions on individuals and businesses," this executive order doesn't affect county residents

Hauber, Thompson join Orange Park Town Council; Randy Anderson selected as town's new Mayor

ORANGE PARK – The town council welcomed its two newest members, John Hauber and Susana Thompson, who replaced Roland Mastandrea and Virginia Hall, respectively

It was a quick meeting for the Orange Park Town Council and more centered on the routines associated with welcoming new members to the council, but the new council did make votes to resurface roads and approve a memorandum of agreement for a local event. But none of that happened until Hauber and Thompson were sworn into office Tuesday night.

Mastandrea and Hall were not present at all for the meeting and their seats remained empty until Hauber and Thompson were sworn in

"I'm very humbled to be here," Thompson said. "I want you to know that I'm here for all of you. I'm here to stand by the oath that I've taken. I plan on using due process throughout these years. I'm very glad to be here representing all of you."

Hauber expressed similar thoughts

during his first meeting Tuesday night, explaining to the council chambers, which were full with dozens of residents, that the town is under new leadership and that he looks forward to working with the town, the council and the town's residents to take the community in the right direction.

Hauber and Thompson weren't the only people on council whose positions changed. Alan Watt's time as the town's mayor came to an end and the council voted to make council member Randy Anderson the new mayor. Council member Eddie Henley was voted as the vice mayor.

One of the new town council's first votes of the night was a vote to approve a four-road resurfacing project. It will cost \$155,039.39 and will see Sylvan Chase Court, De Barry Avenue, from Gano North to the Orange Park town limits, Railroad Avenue and Holly Leaf Lane South resurfaced. These roads have been identified by the town as in poor condition and town staff secured pricing for the resurfacing from Hubbard Construction, which has a contract with Clay County for paving roads.

This project wasn't put out to bid like other construction projects because of Hubbard Construction's contract with the county and Thompson wasn't a fan of this. She said she's glad the roads are being resurfaced, but she felt the project should have gone out to a bid to see if there's any money to be saved off the project. The council approved this resurfacing project with a 4-1 vote, with Thompson dissenting.

The council also voted to approve a memorandum of agreement with the Concert on the Green organization to have this year's event in the town. It will cost the town \$4300 of in-kind expenditures, which means the town doesn't expect to be reimbursed but if the event makes enough money, the town could be paid back. The event this year will take place across three separate nights: June 24, July 29 and Aug. 26.

Town manager Sarah Campbell reminded the council they have an extra \$10,000 because Moosehaven canceled its annual July 4 firework show, which usually costs the town \$10,000. The council approved this memorandum of agreement with a 4-1 vote, with Thompson dissenting.

She took issue with some of the legal wording around the memorandum of agree-

ment, but she said her "nay" vote has nothing to do with the event itself. She also said she loves the event and thinks it's a great get for the town of Orange Park.

In other business, the town is set to receive \$3.7 million in direct funding from

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Fantasy sports regulations bill dropped for Special Session

Lawmakers have dropped paid fantasy sports regulations from their lineup for the gaming Special Session.

The House and Senate weren't able to settle disagreements on legislation (HB 9A/SB 16A) to regulate the lucrative online games, including minimum age requirements. Both the House and Senate versions had passed their first committees — the Senate version is ready for the floor — but legislative leaders plan to postpone the measures Tuesday.

Compounding the issue, lawmakers only had this week to settle disagreements. Even further, lawmakers planned to adjourn the Special Session on Wednesday.

Lawmakers will be able to take up the measure next year, along with the Senate's proposed bingo regulations that died Monday. But for now, the bills will be postponed on the Senate floor and in the House Select Committee on Gaming on Tuesday.

Senate President Wilton Simpson told reporters Tuesday that fantasy sports might be the one gaming topic lawmakers consider during the 2022 legislative cycle.

These things come up every year and again we'll let the committee process work next year," he said.

Sen. Travis Hutson, the St. Johns County Republican tasked with shepherding the Senate's bundle of bills, told Florida Politics that negotiators were far off on several topics, including the age question.

Currently, fantasy sports players must be 18 or older to wager money on the game. The House and Senate bills propose that 21 should be the minimum age to play, but lawmakers couldn't agree on the need for that.

Scott Ward, an attorney representing DraftKings and FanDuel, told the Senate Appropriations Committee Monday that the movement to raise the age to 21 is a vestige of sports betting in Las Vegas casinos that serve alcohol.

"We're talking about fantasy sports, doing on your phone in your living room with your friends," Ward said. "There's no alcohol involved."

He also commented on the exclusion of collegiate sports, adding, "I do think that it's ironic that the other bills being offered on sports betting allow you to bet on college sports but this bill will not allow you to bet on fantasy sports on college sports."

Further, Ward took exception with a provision in the House version that would have required fantasy sports teams to include at least seven players competing in at least five separate events.

Job openings won't be filled until Florida cuts off 'free' money



Gov. Ron DeSantis should be lauded for getting Florida's business re-opened eight months ago and for helping to reduce COVID-19 related infections and deaths.

All that's needed now are workers. Being open at 100% occupancy

doesn't help when I the workforce is operating at 50%. That's why the Governor needs to take the next step by joining the growing list of states that will refuse to accept

Hundreds of workers, especially in service-related businesses, are needed in Clay County. As long as it's easier and more lucrative - to make money living on government handouts, "Help Wanted" signs will continue to clutter storefront windows.

According to Google Trends, people aren't even trying to find work. Employment searches were down by more than 15% in March. Too many capable workers have become addicted to "free" government money, prompting a lot of businesses to cut services and hours.

A reduction in COVID cases, added with the growing number of residents who've received the Johnson & Johnson, Moderna or Pfizer vaccine, prompted the Centers for Disease Controls and Prevention to drop public mandates for face coverings. That means the federal government should stop paying people to

sit at home. The standard weekly unemployment benefits in Florida are \$275 a week. Workers can get an extra \$300 a week from the Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation. The minimum check for not working in Florida now is \$575 a week, or \$14.37 an hour, which is \$5.82 higher than minimum wage.

The original intent of the benefits was both worthy and necessary since millions were furloughed or fired by the pandemic. But since most states are open without restrictions, it's time to punch the time clock again. While benefits are still important for some, especially families with childcare, health and schooling issues, too many use the payments as a paid vacation.

Unless the government decides to keep giving away money beyond the current September cutoff date, many unemployed workers will face economic and reality withdrawals in about four months. Now that it's safe to work, it's best to wean them off their dependency on government aid as soon as possible.

Businesses are doing their part by offering sign-on bonuses and significant boosts in entry-level salaries. Some fastfood restaurants in Clay County now are paying more than \$10 an hour and reducing their minimum hiring age.

The Orange Park Mall, in conjunction with the Clay County Community Partnership School, recently held a job fair for teen-aged students. Bestbet had a job fair to fill a variety of jobs last week, and Applebee's Grill + Bar is offering free appetizers to anyone who interviews for one of the franchise's 10,000 job open-

"Twenty-four states so far across the United States have passed fantasy sports regulation bills. Zero of those bills have this provision," Ward told the House Select Subcommittee on Authorized Gaming Activity on Monday. "This provision would probably knock out 60% to 70% of the contests that are currently offered in the state of Florida."

Rep. Sam Garrison, a Fleming Island Republican who is co-sponsoring legislation to ratify the overarching Seminole Gaming Compact, told a House panel Monday that the sports betting provision could be problematic.

"There's a legitimate question and legal question as to whether or not the sports gaming, with the hub-and-spoke model as contemplated in the compact, triggers Amendment 3," Garrison, a lawyer, said. "It's an open legal question. Period."

The Compact would enable the Seminoles to serve as a hub for online sports betting, with pari-mutuel operators contracting with the Tribe. Pari-mutuels would get to keep 60% of sports-betting revenue, with 40% going to the Seminoles. The Tribe would pay the state up to 14% on the net winnings.

Online sports contests are not affected by an addendum, signed Monday, to the Compact removing a provision that could have led to legalizing other online wagering. That addendum also postponed language within the Compact on fantasy sports until Oct. 15.

Another possible disagreement comes with consumer privacy. The House includes some data protections while the Senate version does not.

In Hutson's view, the Tribe already has a framework for addressing addiction.

"We're not going to micromanage the Tribe and how they do stuff," the Senator told reporters Monday. "I'm not going to sit there and micromanage any contract. It's something that they're able to do. Other tribes have done that. I believe they have the ability to do that already."

SAFE Animal Shelter uses dogs to affect lives of prisoners

CLAY COUNTY — Dogs are changing the lives of prisoners inside the Lawtey Correctional Institution and it's happening with the help of the county's SAFE Animal Shelter.

SAFE's Jennifer Knaus has been the lead of the shelter's Pups at Work program for some time and she's constantly at work, trying to expand the program to even more prisons in Northeast Florida. The Lawtey Prison was the first prison to join the program and she's worked with dozens of inmates and dogs to get them certified as American Kennel Club Good Canine Citizens.

The 10-week course gets the dogs those certifications, but what does it do for the inmates helping the dogs? A lot, actually.

"It's new for me," Anthony Ledbetter, a Lawtey prisoner said when asked about what it's like being able to train dogs while in prison. "I'm used to prison being violent and this is different."

Ledbetter said they teach dogs "guidance," through simple commands like sit, talk, yes and no. While teaching the dogs, he's been taught by them that it's important to understand that life just isn't simple for everyone. It means a lot for him to be able to have this opportunity, which he said makes a dog's life better and his own life better.

"It's fun because it starts off a little rocky and then it ends like a family," he said

Rober Houpt, another prisoner at Lawtey, said being able to train the dogs while serving time in prison gives him the ability to feel and know that he's doing something worthwhile "in helping one of God's creatures." He's taught dogs to sit, stay, "come here," roll over and speak and he said the dogs have taught him "patience, a sense of well-being, balance with nature, a better understanding of dogs."

He said it's even crossed his mind to open up a shelter when he gets out, or at

least work for one.

"It's an opportunity to share a bond and learn from one another, and for both humans and animals to grow a better understanding about each other," Houpt said.

Knaus said the program is equally beneficial to the dogs because they get much-needed love and attention.

"I love seeing how much it changes everybody involved," she said. "It changes the dogs, the inmates and everyone involved for the better. Everyone grows in positive ways through this. The dogs learn better behavior, the inmates learn patience...it's a great program."

Inmate Jerome Brown said one of the biggest things the dogs have taught him is "how to love." It means he's no longer the "selfish person I once was and God is using me...to make a dog's life better," which in turn, makes his life better, he said.

"The best part for me is being around a group of men that are trying to make a difference and having the people (that run the program) treat us as if we are still somebody, [still] human," Brown said.

Thomas Cook said one of his favorite parts is the impact he's making on families he'll never meet. He's training dogs to be more obedient and better family members in a home and he takes pride in knowing he's able to make that happen.

"To have a dog to lean on when everything else fails, or when you're having a not so good day, is an uplifter," Cook said.

One prisoner, Erik Noftz, said before

going into prison, he had anger issues but that training the dogs has helped with that. It's taught him patience and it's taught him how to understand what others, in this case dogs, are going through.

'We teach each other patience, love and understanding," Noftz said. "I do not speak dog and they do not speak 'me.' Love is a great one (to learn because) everyone needs love — even 'unlovable' creatures.

"I love this program and for me to contribute a calm and loving dog to a warm home means I have done something good for the world. If I can change the world one dog at a time, I am finally doing something right."

Noftz said the program has changed his entire life because he's now a totally different person than who he was four years ago before going into prison.

"This program has opened my eyes up to endless possibilities in working with dogs," he said. "Who would love to train dogs every day, outside in beautiful weather instead of being stuck in an office?

"These relationships are very unique for the prison environment because you can be open, honest and loving to these dogs. Prison is not a conducive environment to form bonds and having the opportunity to love something that loves you back is awesome."

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

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Community Partnership School finally celebrates 'grand opening'

Student climbing ladder of success at Keystone Heights Junior/Senior highs

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — The city's junior/senior high schools have been a community partnership school for nearly three years, but its opportunity to launch with a grand opening was delayed by COVID-19.

The opening was finally held on Friday, May 14, with members of the Legislature, community leaders, school board members and superintendent gathering at the school library to celebrate the school. While the school would have loved to have its grand opening when it started the community partnership school, it still featured reallife stories of how the school has helped many students.

"I lost all of my teeth," one student named Damian said. "I had given up on fixing that...until [Community Partnership School director Tina Baker] told me about it"

Damian said Couch and her team worked with Damian to get him on the right track to getting new teeth. While the process isn't over yet, Damian said he's incredibly thankful for all of the help he's received.

"Watching her and others strive for something I had given up on was inspirational." he said.

Another student, Caleb, spoke to the importance of the school's Indian Bucks store. He said the store is full of supplies students might need such as food and house supplies. Caleb said that teachers can hand out Indian Bucks to students for doing well in the classroom or, if a teacher

can see a need that Indian Bucks could address, they'll hand them out.

An important part of the store is it allows the students in need some privacy when they pick up essential supplies. Caleb also talked about Loads of Love, the school's laundry room.

"Nobody should have to worry...about having clean clothes or not," Caleb said. "Everyone should be able to do their laundry...and it makes that possible."

Before Damian and Caleb, both of which are junior high students, talked about the community partnership school, principal Laurie Burke explained why the partnership between the school, Aza health, Children's Home Services and Santa Fe Community College is so important to the community.

"One hundred percent of students are a part of the free and reduced lunch program...and that shows our need for something like Children's Home Services and a Community Partnership School."

Burke said since the school became a certified community partnership school, it's nearly achieved a one-to-one ratio for Chromebooks and students, something that's been especially helpful in the age of remote learning. It also helped fund the purchase of COVID-19-related personal protective equipment for the school's students and it made Loads of Love, the school's clothes store, and the Indian Bucks Store a possibility.

Keystone's junior and senior high schools are the second community partnership school in Clay County. Wilkinson Junior High was the first. Earlier this year, Orange Park High became the district's third. It's something everyone in the district, including the school board and the superintendent, are proud to offer the program in Clay County, and they foresee even more of the partnership schools opening in the future.

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Governor signs bill allowing to-go sales of alcoholic beverages

Senator Jennifer Bradley's bill turns pandemic emergency order into permanent law

CLAY COUNTY - Governor Ron DeSantis signed into law Senate Bill 148, which authorizes restaurants or vendors of alcoholic beverages also holding a public food service license, to sell or deliver alcoholic beverages prepared by the vendor in sealed containers. The bill extends additional sales options, commonly referenced as alcohol-to-go, that are similar to measures implemented by emergency orders by DeSantis during Florida's state of emergency related to COVID-19.

"Alcoholic drinks to-go became an important source of revenue for restaurants that were trying to survive during the pandemic," DeSantis said. "This law is an important measure to continue the positive economic impacts of a temporary order. I want to thank the Legislature, but particularly Senator Jennifer Bradley and Representative Josie Tomkow, for being ready and willing to create common sense reforms that got government out of the way and increased opportunity for Florida busi-

The bill was introduced to the Florida Legislature by Bradley of Fleming Island and Polk City's Tomkow.

"Alcohol-to-go has been a lifeline to our restaurants during the pandemic," Bradley said. "Not surprisingly, this is a popular option for customers who want the restaurant experience when ordering to-go. As we emerge from the pandemic, this option that has helped our restaurants survive financially should be permanent. Thank you to Governor DeSantis for signing this important legislation to do just that and support our hardworking restaurant industry and its customers."

"Some of the hardest hit businesses throughout the pandemic have been our local restaurants," Tomkow said. "Through the proactive leadership of Governor De-Santis and his executive order to allow the sale of alcohol-to-go, many Florida

restaurants were able to increase sales and continue to keep their doors open. I'm thankful to the Governor for his support of this common-sense measure that allows for restaurants to continue to offer alcohol-to-go as an option. This pro-consumer, business-friendly bill will help support our restaurant industry and its tens of thousands of employees."

"I applaud Governor DeSantis on signing this historic piece of legislation that will greatly benefit our bar and restaurant license holders throughout the state," said DBPR Secretary Julie I. Brown. "The law allows businesses to meet customer needs by providing the ability and convenience of serving alcohol-to-go, and I am pleased that Florida is actively adapting to meet the evolving customer and business needs in the industry.

Under Senate Bill 148, an eligible vendor that sells or delivers alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption must hold a public food service license, ensure the sale or delivery of alcoholic beverages is accompanied by the sale of

food in the same order, and comply with sealing and packaging requirements established in the bill. The vendor, or the agent or employee of the vendor making the delivery, is also responsible for verifying and documenting valid proof of the recipient's identity and age at the time of delivery pursuant to provisions of Florida's Beverage Law regarding deliveries.

"Florida's restaurants were some of the businesses hit the hardest by the CO-VID-19 pandemic," said Carol Dover, president and CEO of the Florida Restaurant and Lodging Association (FRLA). "With indoor dining shut down, our operators had to get creative at ways to keep revenue coming in and their staff employed. Thanks to Governor Ron DeSantis' executive order, many restaurants were saved from closing through their ability to sell alcohol with togo orders for off-premises consumption. With the Governor now signing alcohol-togo into law, our restaurants can continue to count on this source of revenue as they provide excellent meals and beverages for their customers."

Many of the residents of the Ashton/Brighton subdivision will meet at Moccasin Slough Park on Sunday to meet a spunky dog who has more than 100 followers on the community's nextdoor.com website.

"I want these people to have a chance to come see him," Byman said. "So many want to meet him. Every time I post an update on Nextdoor, so many people chime in with responses. He's an amazing little guy."

The party at 4393 Raggedy Point Road on Fleming Island will run from 2-4 p.m. More important, the park is pet friendly.

For more than two months, nobody expected a celebration. Byman and his wife were talking their three dogs along Winston Lane when a Dogo Argentino attacked the 13-week-old beagle, according to an incident report filed by the Clay County Sheriff's Office.

Byman eventually managed to tear his dog from the Dogo Argentino's mouth, but not before he put the dog in a headlock and poked him in the eyes.

From there, Arlo struggled for weeks to breath and eat. He suffered nerve damage in his neck, which restricted his ability to swallow. Every procedure at BluePearl Pet

Hospital in Orange Park was described as a last-ditch effort.

"He wouldn't die," Byman said. "He didn't get up, so I didn't give up. It was a horrible three weeks."

According to Byman and the arrest report, Byman's three dogs were on a leash as they walked in front of a neighbor's house. The Dogo Argentino was released from inside the house and it attacked one of two beagles.

Dogo Argentinos are one of the most-

lethal breeds in the world. They specialize in hunting big game, especially wild boar. Some, however, can be trained for search and rescue, police assistance, guide dog and competitive obedience.

"It's a pit bull on steroids," Byman said.
"It's a dangerous dog. It's a killing machine.
They're called a gladiator breed."

With a bite of 500 pounds a square inch, 100-pound muscular build and a history of ferocity, Denmark, Norway, United Kingdom, the Cayman Islands, Iceland, Austra-

lia, Singapore and Turkey have banned the dog from their countries.

Clay County Animal Services investigated the attack, Byman said, but the department didn't issue any penalties.

Arlo spent two weeks at the animal hospital, racking up more than \$15,000 in expenses. Byman said his attorney will attempt to recoup the money from the Dogo's owner's homeowner's insurance.

Byman said he's committed to pushing Clay County to changing its rules regarding dangerous animals.

"I don't want the dog put down," he said. "That's not what this is about. I want Clay County to update its archaic dangerous dog laws. I want to protect my neighborhood. You can't have a vicious dog like that running around without a leash."

For now, Byman is more focused on thanking the residents who rallied around his puppy.



day programs and recently offering art, music and yoga classes for its participants.

Kennedy feels a strong factor in helping a person with disabilities is engagement within their home and the community. This closely aligns with BASCA's role of working to create independence and stability for those they serve. Kennedy doesn't simply believe people with disabilities should just be "babysat" or ignored. He believes people with disabilities need engagement within their homes and out in the community they live in.

Kennedy was most recently the Executive Director of the Care Centers of Nassau for 10 years, a 72-bed Intermediate Care Facility. He also served as Program Director at "Camp I Am Special" in St. Augustine for seven years.

An example Kennedy has of the community realizing just how valuable people

with disabilities can be, an individual with disabilities he knew had to stop working his job at Dairy Queen due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Shortly after lockdown restrictions were lifted, the employees at Dairy Queen called Kennedy asking him if it was all right to let him come back to work because they understood this individual was a committed and hard worker.

Kennedy believes companies need to understand when they hire a person with disabilities, they likely will get loyal, dedicated workers who love their job for life. People with disabilities are eager to learn and happy to have a job. Kennedy strongly supports businesses that hire people with disabilities because jobs help to facilitate social bonds and interactions, give a sense of independence and create involvement within their communities.

The former CEO, Beth Clark, is confident she is leaving BASCA in good hands. While BASCA is sad to see Clark retire,


Levy said this win feels amazing because Oakleaf Cheer is entirely volunteerbased

Husband, wife sentenced to 80 years for 2015 murder

For Clay Today

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - State Attorney Melissa Nelson announce Tuesday Joseph and Bobbi White, both Middleburg, pleaded guilty to second-degree murder, armed burglary, armed robbery and arson after deputies found the charred remains of a Jacksonville man near Nolan and Ellis Ford roads near the Jennings State Forest.

As terms of the plea agreement, the Honorable Michael Sharrit sentenced Joseph White to 45 years in Florida State Prison and Bobbi White to 35 years in Florida State Prison on May 14.

On Dec. 15, 2015, members of the Clay County Sheriff's Office were called to conduct a death investigation. The victim, Corey Bryan Lane, was found inside a severely burned vehicle. The victim and vehicle were quickly identified as being reported missing in Duval County. An autopsy on Lane revealed he had been fatally stabbed and his death was ruled a homicide.

An investigation revealed the Whites were acquaintances with Lane and regularly saw him, including the day of Lane's murder. A search warrant was executed on a Middleburg residence. Both Joseph and Bobbi White were detained for questioning. where both provided several inconsistent stories about their involvement in Lane's death. Detectives collected Lane's cellphone, wallet and wallet, bloody clothes and bloody knife, a hammer, a large sum of cash and a bloody floor mat from Lane's

Lane's family said he left his home in Jacksonville earlier in the day to take the Whites to a doctor's appointment. The couple also were charged with possession of heroin when they were arrested.

The two were then arrested by the Clay County Sheriff's Office. The case was investigated by the Clay County Sheriff's Office and prosecuted by Assistant State Attorney Jonathan Sacks.


Orange Park man sentenced for offering child sex abuse photos on internet

JACKSONVILLE - Antony Eugene Woody, 33 of Orange Park, pleaded guilty to a federal charge of advertising images depicting the sexual abuse of children for sale using the internet. Woody faces a mandatory minimum penalty of 15 years,

and up to, 30 years in federal prison, and a potential life term of supervised release.

According to court documents, in February 2019, the FBI discovered that an online user named "imsoofreakyy" was using a particular social media application to offer child sex abuse images for sale on the internet. Meanwhile, the Clay County Sheriff's Office received a Cybertip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children that the same user "imsoofreakyy" was using a particular email address to advertise images of children being sexually assaulted. CCSO detectives were able to identify this individual as Woody.

On March 22, 2019, CCSO officers and FBI agents executed a search warrant at Woody's residence and made contact with him. During an interview with law enforcement. Woody admitted that he downloaded child sex abuse images from the internet, labeled these images with

titles, prices, and his online contact information, and then re-posted them for sale using a social media app. Woody also admitted that online customers responded to his advertisements, that he would receive money for these sales using Venmo, and that he defrauded some of these customers by taking their money but refusing to send them the contraband images that they had purchased. Woody received at least \$995 in profits from these sales through the Venmo app. A search of Woody's cellular telephone revealed 33 videos and 40 images depicting the sexual abuse of children. Two of these images bore superimposed advertising language that was created and placed on them by Woody.

The case was investigated by CCSO, the Westbrook (Maine) Police Department, the Broward County Sheriff's Office and the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Boston and Jacksonville, with the assistance of the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children. It is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney D. Rodney Brown.

This is another case brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative launched in May 2006 by the Department of Justice to combat the growing epidemic of child sexual exploitation and abuse. Led by the U.S Attorneys' Offices and the Criminal Division's Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section, Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state, and local resources to locate, apprehend, and prosecute individuals who sexually exploit children, and to identify and rescue victims. When Clay County Sheriff's Office deputies arrived, they found the elderly man sitting in his car on Tanglewood Boulevard.

His left eye was swollen with a small cut under the eye socket, and his lip was cut.

Deputies found Moody sitting on the sidewalk close the to scene. His hands had blood on them. according to the arrest report.

Water management district approves designation of Florida Reuse Week

For Clay Today

CLAY COUNTY — As part of the St. Johns River Water Management District's water supply core mission, the staff encouraged the use of reclaimed water — also known as water reuse. The purple pipes you may have seen around your neighborhood or community are helping to extend Florida's water supplies. The SJRWMD is said more than half of all wastewater in our district is now treated and reused for beneficial purposes.

During our meeting this week, the District's Governing Board voted to recognize May 16–21 as Florida Water Reuse Week. The district joined others around the state in this annual observance focused on celebrating and encouraging the use of reclaimed water.

Florida is a national leader in using reclaimed water. Reclaimed water — wastewater that has been highly treated to remove harmful organisms and substances — has been used in Florida since 1966. In the district alone, more than 57% of all wastewater is reused for beneficial purposes to replace traditional freshwater supplies. The use of reclaimed water continues to increase for irrigating residential lots, golf courses and other green spaces, and for groundwater recharge, environmental enhancement such as wetlands creation and restoration, fire protection and

industry. Reclaimed water also provides an environmentally responsible alternative to disposal of wastewater, which contributes to improving water quality (another of our core missions).

Currently, there are 140 reuse systems in the SJRWMD 18-county District which uses more than 217 million gallons a day of reclaimed water. As the district continues to actively promote effective use of reclaimed water through the District's cost-share program, providing financial assistance to entities developing alternative water supplies. These include:

- Water reuse
- Pilot programs to explore innovative treatment technologies
- Innovative uses and applications of reclaimed water

Since 2014, SJRWM has provided more than \$96 million in funding from the District and state sources for reuse projects, which today are responsible for more than half of the reclaimed water made available daily within our District. Reuse projects continue to be among those reviewed and ranked by staff for consideration by our Governing Board to receive cost-share funding.

Thanks to the many local government partners, utilities and others who are investigating and implementing projects to expand the use of reclaimed water.



CLAY COUNTY — The Supreme Court is set to take up a new abortion case that could limit long-standing Roe v. Wade, which is the case that set the precedent for legalized abortion.

The case being taken up by the Supreme Court is about a Mississippi law that bans most abortions after 15 weeks. In 1973, Roe v. Wade originally gave women the freedom to abortions during the first trimester, which is defined as the first 12 weeks. Many states have since expanded the time women can choose to abort a fetus/child. The Mississippi case, Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, would ban abortions after 15 weeks.

For this week's Facebook Question of the Week, we asked readers what they think about the case. Many responses were spirited. Here's what they had to say:

"Why is this coming up again and again?" Cheryl Cigno responded on Facebook. "Let people make their own choice."

Cigno explained she supports a woman's right to abortion and that this kind of decision lies solely with the woman in question. However, others disagreed.

"Outlawed unless rape or medically necessary," Terry Phillips said. "I personally know of a couple women who've had three due to inconvenience. Others in order for personal gain. No remorse or repercussions."

Karen Fey said abortion shouldn't even be up for debate in a courthouse when talking about first-term abortions.

"Bearing in mind that most of these decisions are made on personal thoughts on religious grounds: The freedom of reli-



gion should legally prevent this from being enacted by the government," Fey said. "In fact, this shouldn't even be up for discussion. Now, if the the fetus can survive without medical intervention, unless there's a medical reason for abortion, that does need some kind of discussion. This is the rare case, though, as most are early term."

Irene Robertson is on the other side of the issues, stating that abortions should be outlawed.

"Why abort when adoption is an option?" Robertson said. "In the case of rape, we don't kill the children of murderers to pay for the sins of the parent, why should we kill the children of rapists for the sins of their father? We protect unborn wildlife, the least we could do is protect the life of unborn humans.

"As for the argument for late-term abortion, there is no reason not to deliver the baby instead of aborting. Babies as young as 21 weeks are able to survive with help outside the womb."

Orange Park Medical Center earns top stroke certification

ORANGE PARK — Orange Park Medical Center has earned a Comprehensive Stroke Center certification for its ability to deliver the highest quality of care to patients suffering from a stroke. Hospital's designated as a Comprehensive Stroke Center provide a higher level of stroke care to their patients quickly and by following best-practice protocols that increase the survival rate and poststroke patient functionality outcomes.

"Receiving this certification is great news for our community," said Dr. Ronnie Bond, Neurologist and Stroke Program Medical Director at Orange Park Medical Center. "We need this level of care accessible to all populations in Northeast Florida, and the surrounding areas."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, stroke is the fifth leading cause of death, the leading cause of adult disability and affects more than 795,000 Americans each year. A stroke

occurs when blood flow to the brain is disrupted by a blood clot or by bleeding from a burst blood vessel, impairing the brain's ability to function.

Dr. Bradley Shumaker, Orange Park Medical Center's Chief Medical Officer says the certification wouldn't be possible without the hospital's strong partnership with EMS and the hospital's multidisciplinary team of specialists and staff.

The certification is granted by Det Norske Veritas, a Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved regulatory deeming authority. Comprehensive Stroke Centers also serve as a resource center for other facilities in the region by sharing their expertise in stroke care.

Orange Park Medical Center's stroke care has been recognized by The Joint Commission as a Primary Stroke Center and Acute Stroke Ready Hospital and by American Heart Association with the Get with the Guidelines Gold Plus Stroke award

the federal government as part of the American Rescue Plan Act.

"The ARPA was passed by the Federal Government in early 2021," official town documents read. "The Town, as a nonentitlement unit of local government, is expected to receive \$3.7 million in direct funding. This is not a grant. It will be disbursed in two segments — \$1.8 million by June 2021 and \$1.8 million by June 2022."

The Department of Treasury issued guidance for seven different ways this money can be used: supporting the public health response, addressing the negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency, serving the hardest-hit communities and families, replacing lost public sector revenue, providing premium pay for essential workers, investing in water and sewer infrastructure and investing in broadband infrastructure.

Anderson suggested setting up broadband internet in places like Clarke Park. Hauber suggested setting up a scholarship for the Orange Park Athletics Association or giving money to youth organizations in town, which is in line with the youth-first promises he made during his campaign for the council seat. Watt suggested a bonus for the town's fire and police.

"This thing is out for 60 days for public comment," Watt said. "That is public comment — not comment by towns or municipalities. Everyone sitting here can go online and submit comments to the federal government and by law, they have to read all those comments and take them into consideration. If you have strong feelings about something...take your shot. This is your opportunity."

The Town Council didn't make any formal votes regarding how to spend the \$3.7 million in ARPA funding it's set to receive and it won't make a vote in spending until after those 60 days of public comment are completed.

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Annual car show attracts hundreds, helps thousands



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



"It is a big deal for Jilly to make this team is because it lets her know that her hard work is paying off," said Chris Peterson, LaBelle's coach at Fleming Island High School. "We are proud that she will represent Fleming Island girls lacrosse this year."

The event is open to all girls in grades

9-11 who play on their high school team or who play for an approved scholastic club team. Prospective players must first try out and make a regional team to participate.

LaBelle has only been playing lacrosse for four years, far less than many of her teammates on the North Florida team. But she has ascended rapidly, thanks to athleticism developed in other sports and hard work. LaBelle spent 10 years doing gymnastics, making the U.S. regionals in Level 7 and reaching Level 8 before quitting as she entered high school. Turning to diving just two months before the high school meets began in her freshman year at Fleming Island, LaBelle qualified for regionals on the one meter board in her first season. 



"When we scored the four runs, I knew right there we were going to win this," said McCrea.





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
