

Emergency Management: Hurricane preparation should start long before the storm season

CLAY COUNTY — It's that time of year when Clay County residents begin to watch the weather forecasts in anticipation of that swirling mass of wind, water and destruction known as a hurricane. Floridians know all too well that you don't have to be in the

direct path of a storm to feel the effects.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration predicted an above-average hurricane season. Experts recently revised their original forecast to include a 60% chance of an above-normal season, a 30% chance of a near-normal season and a 10% chance of a less than normal season.

While NOAA doesn't expect 2021 to match the historic level of storms from a year ago, it believes there will 13 to 20 named storms with winds of 39 mph or greater, with six to 10 becoming hurricanes with winds of 74 mph or greater.

New director of traffic and engineering to tackle county's exponential growth

Smith: Developers are responsible for building, maintaining new roads

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Richard Smith was selected as the new director of engineering and traffic control operations and he's excited to tackle the challenge of the county's exponential growth, especially as it relates to the roads 220,000-plus residents use each day.

Smith grew up in Bradford County, graduated from Bradford High, and he obtained an engineering degree from the University of Florida in 1985. He didn't leave Florida once until he was 22 years old and even then, it was to watch his Gators play ball against an out-of-state team. His engineering journey eventually led him to Atlanta, where he worked as a private engineer for 35 years. He witnessed first-hand the massive growth Atlanta experienced in his three-plus decades there and he's excited to help guide Clay County through its own intense growth.

"Atlanta's population was 1.6 million when I first arrived and when I left seven months ago, it was six million," Smith said.

"I'm not saying we've got that ahead of us here, but it definitely feels similar, especially when looking at the rise of the county's numbers. I think we're doing a better job here than [Atlanta] was doing...and I mean that truthfully."

There are a couple of reasons Smith believes Clay County is better positioned for its upcoming growth, which is fueled primarily by the construction of the First Coast Expressway that's set to bring jobs, residents, schools and commerce to the area. He said one of the best things the county is doing is simple to explain, but harder to understand: the development pays their way.

The boiled-down version is this: developers are responsible for building the roads of that development – not the county – and the new residents should cover the costs of roadway maintenance. Another way of wording this is that taxpayers in Keystone Heights won't have to pay for a road for a Fleming Island neighborhood.

The maintenance costs will be covered for a long period of time. The people living in one of the new developments will pay additional costs each year so when it's time to fix a road or repave it, the money is already there.

"You don't drive in their neighborhood or walk their sidewalks...so you won't be paying for it," Smith said. "It's a fair way of doing this kind of thing, I think."

The neighborhoods are built with traffic concerns in mind, too. Anyone that's driven down County Road 209 knows how frustrating and dangerous it can be. That

Clay County increases public safety with CARES Act funds

For Clay Today

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Clay County received \$38 million in Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding to strengthen the County's readiness to address the ongoing impacts of the COVID-19 Pandemic. County Commissioners have used the funds to provide aid to nonprofits, businesses, and families; to enhance public safety at government buildings; and to address medical and public health needs in the community.

Commissioners designated \$2.9 million in funding to protect the health and safety of first responders and patients by providing upgrades for the Clay County Fire Rescue Department. With CARES Act funding, the county purchased personal protective equipment for first responders, and decontamination and sanitizing systems for fire stations and rescue units.

Several projects were also completed to enhance emergency medical response and emergency medical transportation, including the purchase of three new fourwheel-drive Advanced Life Support rescue units, which have been fully equipped with the latest life-saving technology. These new units will be deployed to existing stations in rural areas of the county where four-wheel drive capabilities will improve access for paramedics. Clay County has 11 fully equipped, front-line ALS rescue units and six spare rescue units that can be swapped out when a primary unit is in maintenance. The new technology will be installed on all primary rescue units, spare units, and supervisory vehicles.

The new four-wheel-drive rescue units will be housed at Station 11 in Keystone Heights and Station 23 in McRae.

Clay County Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners Mike Cella said, "Public safety is the number one priority for Commissioners, and we took full advantage of the CARES Act funding we received to purchase cutting-edge technology and equipment to protect both our first responders and the community."

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Superintendent recommends masks not be mandatory during next school year

David Broskie: Students, faculty and staff still should be encouraged to keep mouth, nose covered

FLEMING ISLAND – The school board will soon decide whether masks will be required in the upcoming school year.

The school board gathered on May 25 for its monthly agenda workshop meeting and during it, Superintendent David Broskie made the recommendation to the board masks no longer be required in schools for the 2021-22 school year. The board did not make an official vote regarding this recommendation, however, as it will formally do that during its July meeting after it votes to advertise this change during its June meeting.

"With the increase in vaccination opportunities, we have more individuals that can get vaccinated...and I'm going to make a recommendation that face masks be optional and not mandatory beginning June 14, which is the start of the Summer School program," Broskie said.

The school board seemed to agree with Broskie's recommendation but won't formal-

ly vote until the July school board meeting. Broskie said even if masks aren't mandatory as they were this past year, they'll still be encouraged as will other safety protocols.

"I have no doubt Florida has led the way in reopening schools [in the country]," Broskie said. "I have little doubt Clay has led the way for Florida. That doesn't mean there weren't bumps along the way, but our bumps compared to other [districts] were minor, minor, minor rumble strips along the way."

"My goal as Superintendent is to return the school system back to the way it was...a return to normalcy. Keep in mind, our top priority will always be the safety of our students and staff," he said.

Broskie said while his goal is to return school to pre-COVID conditions as soon as possible, actually doing that won't happen overnight. The district will take a "phased-in approach that makes sense based on common sense."

Broskie also said masks are not required at the upcoming senior high school graduation ceremonies.

Other COVID-related changes for the upcoming school year include the end of One-Clay Online, which was the district's own online school platform. Broskie said this is ending because the state is not going to fund it this year.

"The OneClay Online virtual platform we had this year won't be there next year," he said. "Simply put, the state is not funding it. The 'Gold Standard' for education is physical in-person education with a qualified teacher that cares about your child and I look forward to welcoming OneClay Online students back into our schools."

Despite the possible removal of a mandatory mask requirement, Broskie said the health department will still perform contact tracing and quarantine on behalf of the school district, which speaks to Broskie's commitment to continued safety despite changes to things like masks.

"I think...going back to school as normal as possible...should be everyone's goal," he said. "A return to normalcy is what our community strives for us to do. In order to do that, the first and most controversial piece of that is the use of face coverings. I'm making a recommendation that they're optional, but still recommended.

"Those that want to wear a mask can feel free to do so and will be protected to wear one. Those that don't...given the fact that those 12 years and older have the opportunity to get vaccinated...can do so, and it makes sense and it's rational. I believe this plan [makes sense and is rational], too."



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Gambling deal could open doors for casinos

Out-of-state casino operators for years have sought entrée to the Sunshine State.

For more than a decade, the glitziest casinos in the state have operated on lands owned by the Seminole Tribe of Florida.

The Tribe's facilities have been a go-to place for Florida bettors to play popular Las Vegas-style card games such as blackjack, while also being able to take their chances on slot machines. Though racetracks and jai alai frontons in Miami-Dade and Broward counties also offer slots, the Seminoles are in control of the only fullfledged casinos in Florida.

But a multibillion-dollar deal announced last month by Gov. Ron DeSantis and tribal Chairman Marcellus Osceola Jr. opens the door for other gambling behemoths to establish a footprint in the nation's third-most populous state, which draws tens of millions of tourists annually. Lawmakers approved the agreement, known as a "compact," during a three-day special session last week.

Out-of-state casino operators for years have sought entrée to the Sunshine State, but House Republicans had long frowned on the possibility of expanded gambling. And the Seminoles, until now, largely had sought to restrict competition.

Part of the deal would allow the tribe to amplify its Broward County operations, which recently underwent a \$1.5 billion expansion that added a 36-story, guitarshaped tower to anchor the Seminoles' Hard Rock casino. The Compact would allow the Seminoles to contract with other gambling operators to manage up to three new facilities on the Tribe's Hollywood reservation.

And the proposed compact — now awaiting DeSantis' signature — could set the stage to allow casinos in other regions

The Compact would allow pari-mutuel operators to sell or transfer permits to other entities, a process known as "portability." with certain caveats.

Permits could be transferred so long as they are more than 15 miles "on a straight line" from the Tribe's Broward County operations or 100 miles from the tribe's other casinos, such as the Seminole's cash-cow facility in Tampa.

But the potential casino expansion off of Seminoles' lands faces a number of bar-

Standing water and deary skies were the perfect backdrop as NASCAR's Senior Vice President of Competition Scott Miller admitted his group may have waited too long to pull the plug on the inaugural EchoPark Texas Grand Prix last Sunday,

May 23, at the Circuit of the Americas road course.

"I would own the fact that maybe we let it go a little bit too long there before we did something." he said after the race ended after 54 of 68 scheduled laps. "We will learn. We will do better the next time.

What NASCAR learned was a bulky stock car, a group of aggressive drivers and a tropical system don't mix.

By the time NASCAR figured out the obvious and gave up, many racing fans had already turned the dial to watch Phil Mickelson's amazing victory at the PGA Championship. Talk about must-see TV.

By all accounts, COTA was a modernday masterpiece of a facility. Speedway Motorsports Inc., which leased the track from Formula One, has the option to return next year. It would be a mistake to use a downpour created by an earlyseason tropical system that spun into existence two days in advance as a reason to drop it from future schedules. COTA earned a second chance to be judged in a more favorable light.

That certainly didn't happen Saturday or Sunday.

Troubles started on Saturday when several cars were stuck in the inspection

line during the only practice session of the weekend. Many never got a chance to run a lap because the process proved to be so tedious.

Torrential rain on Monday not only turned the 20-turn, 3.41-mile highspeed slip-and-slide, the spray as cars ran through puddles had drivers running blindly. Rain tires were no match for Mother Nature's furv.

Kevin Harvick said it best: "I've never felt more unsafe in my whole racing career, period."

There were a couple of chain reactions because drivers couldn't see. The first came on the 20th lap when Ryan Blanev slowed down because he couldn't see his breaking point entering Turn 12 at the end of the straightaway. Christopher Bell plowed into Blaney's back bumper. Harvick slowed down, only to be rearended by Wallace. The force of the impact lifted the rear tires of Harvick's Ford off the ground.

Harvick was rightfully upset with the conditions - and the decision to keep rac-

"It's the most unsafe thing I've ever done in a race car by a lot," he said. "You can't see anything down the straightaways. These cars were not built to run in the rain and when you can't see, my spotter said, 'Check up, check up,' because he thought he saw two cars wrecking. I let off and the guy behind me hit me wide-open because he never saw me. It's unbelievable that we're out there doing what we're doing because we're in race cars that aren't made to do this, and if you can't see going down the straightaway. It's absolutely not safe, not even

the worst decision that we've ever made in our sport that I've been a part of."

The worst crash came five laps later when Martin Truex Jr. ran into Michael McDowell's car near the same spot of the Harvick accident. When he slowed down, Cole Custer blindly slammed into Truex's car. Custer's Ford went under the trunk deck of Truex's car, then burst into flames. Both walked away a little soggy, but un-

"It's just that you can't see anything. It's pretty bad," Custer said. "I mean, you can't see a foot in front of your car. I was just rolling down the backstretch. You can't see anything. I'm just so frustrated about having our day end like this. It killed the car

and it's just really frustrating.

"You just can't see anything on that backstretch. I think the same thing happened to us at the same time, somebody was going slower and by the time you want to slow down, they're in your front bumper so there's no chance of you even missing it. We just wanted a good run and it's just not fair to all our guys and everybody at [Stewart-Haas Racing] to have a destroyed race car for really no good reason."

After a red flag to clean up the mess and wait for a break in the weather, the race resumed.

So did the rain.

Elliott eventually worked his way into the lead. His Chevrolet probably didn't have enough gas to make it to the end, so his Hendrick Motorsports team was counting on a bunch of yellow flag laps or for NASCAR to put an early end to the show.

The sport's most popular driver got the early checkered flag.

As expected, Elliott didn't have a critical opinion of the dangerous conditions. Winners never do.

'Yeah, that's not my call. If they say race, we're going to go," he said. "If they make the call to say that it's not doable or not smart, that's what we'll do, too. Look, it's not for me to say. It's not my call. I'm not the one in that position to have to make

that call, and I don't want to be. I'll try to make the most of whatever it is, try to do my job the best I can.

"It's not the ideal way to win, but we'll take it."

NASCAR certainly needs to find a solution to reduce the clouds of spray in the rain. But it also needs act quicker when conditions are too dangerous.

If not for Mickelson's victory, Sunday would have been a total wash.

National Doral resort and the Fontainebleau Miami Beach. Also, it could open the possibility of a casino in downtown Miami.

Relocation of permits would require legislative authorization as well as approval by municipal leaders. The Legislature has not given the go-ahead to a bill that would allow South Florida permits to

The possibility of adding casinos in other parts of the state also has drawn questions. Sen. Jeff Brandes, a St. Petersburg Republican who cast the Senate's sole vote last week against ratification of the compact (SB 2A), questioned Jim Allen, CEO of Seminole Gaming and chairman of Hard Rock International, about the Tribe's view on competition outside of its areas.

"Does that mean if somebody wanted to establish, let's say, a casino in the Panhandle ... is that something the Tribe would then fund against, or because they're following within the rules ... that you would be neutral?" Brandes asked Allen during a Senate Appropriations Committee meeting.

"I think that's a really fair question," Allen said, indicating that the Seminoles would not actively oppose such a move. "The answer would be no. The Tribe ... agreed to a casino in downtown Miami. I think the tribe has always been receptive to navigate the process. ... I certainly can't speak on the elected officials of the tribe 10, 20 years from now, but certainly today, that's not the case.'

Perhaps the highest-profile part of the proposed Compact would legalize sports betting in Florida and put it under control of the Seminoles. The Tribe would host online sports betting at servers located on its lands in an attempt to comply with federal and state laws. It also would be required to contract with three pari-mutuel operators for sports betting, and the Compact envisions that Floridians and visitors will be able to use cell phones to place online sports bets anywhere in the state.

Under a revenue-sharing plan, the

Seminoles would pay \$500 million annually to the state for the first five years. If the sports betting provision is not approved by courts or the U.S. Department of the Interior, which oversees gambling compacts, the Tribe's payments would decrease by \$50 million a year.

The bulk of the Tribe's payments to the state, at least in the initial years of the Compact, would be derived from landbased casino games conducted by the Seminoles. The Tribe would be allowed to add craps and roulette to the house-banked card games — such as baccarat, blackjack, Pai Gow and three-card poker — and slots already available. But a constitutional amendment, known as Amendment 3, approved by Florida voters in 2018 could complicate the addition of sports betting, potential relocation of permits in South Florida and opening casinos in other regions of the state.


The amendment, passed by 72% of voters, required statewide voter approval for future expansions of gambling. That would require casino backers going through the citizens' initiative process, an expensive endeavor recently made even more difficult by Republican lawmakers.

The expansion of casinos permitted under the proposed Compact runs contrary to other agreements signed by states and tribes, according to John Sowinski, president of the group No Casinos.

"Compacts, at their best, close doors to the future expansion of gambling. This Compact does the opposite, and that's that it leaves doors open for future expansions, be it by referendum, the Legislature, anybody," Sowinski, who served as chairman of the political committee behind Amendment 3, told The News Service of Florida.

Out-of-state gambling operators and their representatives gathered with De-Santis and tribal leaders in advance of the April 23 signing of the Compact and subsequent ratification by state lawmakers.

Middleburg-Clay Hill Library now abuzz with a new bee garden

MIDDLEBURG – The Middleburg-Clay Hill Library is now home to thousands of bees residing in the new garden.

The Clay County 4-H Bee Stingers Club president, Josh Knowles, was joined by the club's other members on May 22 to help install new flowers in two garden beds behind the library before transferring more than 10,000 bees to their new home.

"Honey bees like big, open areas," Knowles said. "That's why this place is perfect. We're planting flowers specifically for them to pollinate...and as you can

see, these flowers are right by their setup so they can fly right over this fence and pollinate the flowers."

One of the club's co-leaders, David Sieruta, said the club expects 40 to 50 pounds of honey each year. They'll extract honey in the middle of June and again in the middle of September. While the bees have two garden beds right outside of their hive setup, those flowers won't be the only things they pollinate.

They'll travel all around the library and the surrounding woods pollinating flowers. The flowers just outside of their hive are best for the nectar dearth season, which is a slower period for bees and the flowers they usually pollinate. That's when the new

flowers installed in the club's garden beds will come in handy as the flowers installed there are great in Summer weather.

"Bees love gardens like this because it's all they have during the dearth season," 4-H co-leader Ralph White said.

The 4-H club held an event in March of 2020, just before the COVID-19 pandemic hit, to explain the importance of bees and why the Middleburg-Clay Hill Library would be a good home. The bees were originally going to be installed shortly after but because of COVID-19, the installation didn't happen last week.

The bees are happy and buzzing at their new home now, though. The 4-H club used a \$1,500 grant from several years ago to build a tall fenced-in square for the hive to reside. Two new garden beds also were installed. Other 4-H members and community members interested in the project showed up to help out.

The hive is made up of 10 frames and a super, which is a section of the hive where the excess story will go when there's an excess. The queen bee is stuck inside a sugar-coated cage that the bees will eventually eat through over the coming days. The idea was to give the bees time to acclimate to the gueen and vice versa. When the sugar cage is no more, the queen will join the 10,000-plus bees at their hive.

When you look through the observation window in the fenced-in area, you will see a white box with bees. You'll likely see bees flying over the fence to the nearby flowers, too. The queen and bees always are busy inside building the hive, and as the process continues, the bees will begin to form

"It takes seven to eight pounds of honey to make one pound of beeswax," Sieruta said. "They'll have a strong hive in about a day and a half and in about two days, a good nectar flow will begin for the hive, and...honey comes after that."

The Stingers encourage anyone and everyone to go to the library to check out

Sherrif's Office expands its Marine Unit with new boat

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Sheriff's Office is adding more eyes to the county's waterways thanks to a statewide program aimed to increase law enforcement resources. The agency increased its Marine Unit with a state-of-the-art boat, which allows for more deputies to be out on the waterways. The agency was able to acquire the boat through the Florida Sheriffs Association Shared Asset Program. The program provides funds for assets that can be shared regionally, like boats, utility terrain vehicles, drones, and speed trailers. The CCSO's new-to-the-agency asset will be used in the county, but the agency will also make it available to other local law enforcement entities when necessary.

"We're proud of the partnerships we have with our neighboring agencies," Sheriff Michelle Cook said, "We know they will be there for us when we need it, and we are more than happy to return the favor. This new Marine Unit boat is a part of that understanding."

During the 2020-21 fiscal year, the

FSA awarded 13 sheriffs' offices more than \$630,000 to purchase resources to share in protecting and serving the State of Florida. Shared assets make sheriffs stronger — whether through coordinated Florida Sheriffs Task Force efforts or responding to natural disasters and other emergencies. Since its inception, the program has awarded more than \$1.3 million directly to sheriffs' offices.

"The Florida Sheriffs Association is leading the way by doing more with our innovative statewide program that increases law enforcement resources," said FSA President and Gilchrist County Sheriff Bobby Schultz, "Our Shared Asset Program provides a way for neighboring sheriffs to share assets, increase our response, and serve more citizens."

This round of applications was unique and did not provide direct funding, rather a boat was provided for the program's grant cycle

"This is a win for everyone," said Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri, "Pinellas County donated this state-of-the-art marine craft to the Clay County Sheriff's Of-



fice, which puts more eyes and technology on the water. In turn, Clay County can aid other areas in the region as needed. It's the gift that keeps on giving."

The Clay County Sheriff's Office Marine Unit is routinely called upon by neighbor-

ing agencies to assist in events and operations alike. Clay County has 39-square miles of heavily traveled waterways.

The boat is already out on the water and made its debut at the CCSO's Police Memorial ceremony earlier this month.



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NE Florida unemployment rate drops to 4.4%

CLAY COUNTY – The Florida Department of Economic Opportunity announced on Monday, May 24, the unemployment rate for the Jacksonville region declined slightly from 4.5% in March to 4.4% in April 2021.

Of the 833,880 people counted as part of the area's workforce in April, there were

still 37,044 unemployed residents.

In Clay County, the unemployment rate remained at 4%. The state's rate is 4.8%, while the national rate is 6.1%.

"Although it was only a very slight decline, the employment picture in Northeast Florida continues to improve – and we are near the employment levels that existed before the pandemic began last March," said CareerSource Northeast Florida President Bruce Ferguson. "The industries gaining the most jobs over the year



include leisure and hospitality, increasing by 26,300 jobs, and education and health services, increasing by 10,100 jobs."

CareerSource NEFL notes that the agency is seeing an uptick in open job positions from regional employers – and it is receiving approximately 3,000 monthly job positions from its partner-employers monthly.

goes for residents who also live on the road. The driveways that lead to homes there are directly connected to 209 and that poses a major traffic problem in the inherent danger it presents for residents, their children and pets, and it's just generally unsafe to have cars driving 50 miles per hour 50 feet away from one's home.

The new neighborhoods are being developed with this in mind. Subdivision entrances are what's going to be found off of main roads. People will turn into them and then drive safely to their house at a presumably much slower speed.

"That's one of the best things I think the county has done," Smith said in regards to this type of development. "Not everyone wants the First Coast connector, but it's coming and the thing the county and the county leaders did that's so forward-thinking is this."

The First Coast Expressway is going to bring hundreds of jobs to Clay County. It's going to be the driving force between many new housing developments and multiple schools. It's an exciting time to live in Clay County, but the growth can be unwelcomed for some, especially in relation to traffic.

Smith is aware of the county's traffic problems. He knows how congested Blanding Boulevard can be and he knows U.S. Highway 17's rapid growth and the congestion it's beginning to receive. He said Clay County is great for traveling north to south. Getting from Green Cove Springs to Orange Park is a breeze after all, but anyone who lives here knows getting from Green Cove Springs to Middleburg is more difficult.

There are ways to travel east to west and vice versa in Clay County but it feels more like a detour than an official route. Smith is excited to change that.

He said opening up veins that allow drivers to traveling east and west one of the county's main arteries – U.S. 17, Blanding Boulevard and the Expressway – essentially is tied to fixing Clay County's biggest traffic problems. It will alleviate the congestion on U.S. 17 and Blanding Boulevard and make it easier for drivers. It will feel deliberate, too, and not like a detour.

He also said widening projects like the

one happening at this moment on Blanding is crucial. One of the other bigger facets of the challenges for Smith is road paving and resurfacing. There are several roads in Clay County that are dirt. Some are privately owned and until everyone on that road gives permission to turn it into a non-dirt road, it won't be paved.

The challenge of paving a dirty road is getting the residents to agree. Everyone on the road must agree and they usually need to give up a bit of their land and right-of-way because the new road needs shoulders, sewer and water drainage and more modern commodities associated with roads.


"It costs about \$1 million a mile to turn a dirt road into a paved one," Smith said. "Oftentimes, these roads aren't used by anyone but the people that live on it. If 50 people want the road paved, but one person doesn't, we can't pave the road. We have a list of dirt roads we're working on based on priority, but it's certainly a balancing act."

Smith said he's committed to successfully juggling and balancing the wide-scale traffic construction associated with projects like the First Coast Expressway and its traffic-related impact and the smaller roads that need some love in places like Middleburg and Keystone Heights too. It's not about one or the other, he said. It boils down to right-of-way availability, which is in the hands of the residents, and funding availability, which is in the hands of the county.

Smith's plate is certainly full. He was asked by Dale Smith, who previously held the job, to come to the county as the deputy director because Smith planned to retire in about five years. Two months later, Richard Smith now holds the title.

"I've enjoyed working here for the six months I've been here so far," Smith said. "It's nice to be back home where I grew up (Smith now resides in Orange Park). We've got some great leadership here with [county manager Howard Wanamaker] and the commissioners and with their term limits, it means there's always new people and fresh ideas coming in and that's exciting.

"I'm excited to guide Clay County through its future growth."

DCL's Wane uses guitars as a positive option for children instead of drugs

ORANGE PARK – Paul Wane got his first guitar when he was 8. Now, 35 years later, he said the gift from his "Uncle" Chester saved his life.

'Without that guitar, I'd be with the guys I used to hang with," he said, "and they're either dead or in prison."

That message wasn't lost on the lead guitarist and anchor of the popular local band, Duval County Line. His "Rising Star: Guitars for Kids" program has given away nearly 200 guitars to aspiring musicians, and many of them packed Big Dawgs Family Sports Restaurant Monday night to join Wane on stage.

The first "Celebration of Rising Stars" attracted young players with a variety of skill sets. But all shared one common bond - they all have bought into Wane's commitment to providing children a more positive outlet than drugs.

"This is all about substance abuse prevention," he said as parents and fans clapped. "We need to give them something else to do, something positive."

Wane said the children in the program not only are learning to play the guitar, but most have better grades in school.

The four-man lineup for Duval County line features three players from Clay Coun-

"I tell parents don't punish their kids by taking their guitar away when they act up. I say, make them practice another 30 minutes. If we build them with love, they will turn out to be lovely people."

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Clay SafetyNet Alliance hopes to resume in-person meetings in the fall

Fann: COVID-19 didn't diminish the needs of important programs in the county

CLAY COUNTY – The Clay SafetyNet Alliance was founded on the belief that communities are stronger when they work together. While the COVID-19 pandemic has put a halt to many services offered to Clay County residents, Clay SafetyNet Alliance still continues to work for the general public.

According to Don Fann, the Executive Director of The Way Free Clinic and new Chairman of Clay SafetyNet Alliance, the pandemic has not stopped Clay residents from helping one another.

"This community of providers has been very cohesive during the pandemic...facilitating information to one another has continued to be successful," Fann

The Clay SafetyNet Alliance is not just one specific nonprofit organization, but a network of organizations dedicated to helping Clay County residents. Currently, there are more than 200,000 residents in Clay County and according to SafetyNet there are 140 nonprofit organizations that service in the county. The function of Clay SafetyNet Alliance is to bring social services and organizations together to better achieve the goal of helping the general public.

Once a month, these nonprofit organizations will come together in a meeting hosted by Clay SafetyNet Alliance to discuss current issues. In March, 2020, the monthly meetings started being held on Zoom meetings due to COVID restrictions. Normally as many as 100 attend the meetings, but since going to Zoom, only about 70 people have participated.

Another issue Clay SafetyNet Alliance faced was some organizations temporarily closing due to COVID lockdowns. Al-

though the pandemic has affected Clay County, it did not stop SafetyNet from working to help people. At the height of the pandemic the Clay SafetyNet Alliance partnered with Clay County Emergency Operation Center. Fann recalls when there was a food shortage during the lockdown. SafetyNet worked with the Emergency Operation Center to more effectively distribute food to both individuals and food pantries. For the last year and a half Clay SafetyNet Alliance has also worked with the Clay County Health department to brainstorm solutions to problems. For example, if there was a shortage in face masks, the health department asked participants of SafetyNet Alliance for solutions.

Monthly zoom meetings are still being held but Fann hopes to resume live meetings in the fall, after schools starts. SafetyNet held its meetings in a conference room at Haven-Custead Hospice Center in Orange Park, but Fann currently is looking for a larger space for participants to maintain social distancing.

Andre Van Heerden, a member and former Chairman of Clay SafetyNet Alliance, hopes to one day bring the whole community together with this network of organizations.

"Our dream is to have the whole county, every faith-based group and every social and emergency service in the county, you name it," Van Heerdan said. "Anyone that's involved in community service or community benefit work to be at the meeting."

The monthly zoom meetings for Clay SafetyNet Alliance is the third Thursday of each month. The next Zoom meeting will be June 17 from 8:30-10 a.m.

"Palestine-elected Hamas – terrorists – who attacked Israel out of greed," Janet Brooks said. "Biden was out of line telling Israel to back off, and the squad are traitors to this country under any circumstances and should not be listened to. Israel is our ally, and they deserve our help."

Barbara Evans said Israel has a "right to defend itself and should." They said they stand with Israel. Marsha Willougby echoed a similar thought and said she wouldn't call what's happening there a



"conflict" because it's a matter "of one trying to annihilate the other."

"Well technically, the U.S. caused most of this issue after World War II," Karen Fey said. "Not sure if we help or hinder with continued involvement. Weapon supplying doesn't help. Probably better leaving it to NATO.

Jeff McKeown said he stands with Is-

Tobacco-free events are more accessible to people who suffer from asthma, cancer, or other diseases that are negatively affected by tobacco products.

A 2012 study on hospitality workers' health was performed using 45 studies of 33 different smoke-free laws, with an average follow-up time of 24 months. It showed that comprehensive smoke-free laws were associated with lower hospital admission rates, lower death rates, fewer coronary events by 8%, other forms of heart disease by 6%, fewer cerebrovascular accidents (strokes) by 8%, and respiratory disease by 8%. In another study of hospitality workers by the Community of Preventative Services, they concur with the previous study mentioned, while also stating that smoke-free policies have not had an adverse impact on businesses such as bars and restaurants.

Tobacco-free environments save in cleanup and costs because there would be no cigarette butts, vaping products, or dip cans to clean up, and this would also reduce the possible risk of fire due to cigarette butts being dropped on the ground or being placed in a trash can while still lit.

Most people prefer tobacco-free environments and feel that smoking should at least be kept to a designated smoking area. Studies have also shown that the safest and healthiest events are those that prohibit the use of all forms of tobacco/Vapefree-free products, and it has been concluded in worldwide studies by health authorities that there is no safe level of secondhand smoke.

Secondhand smoke causes lung cancer,

stroke, heart disease, low birth weight, sudden infant death syndrome, serious respiratory conditions, and premature death. In conclusion, the best practice would be a 100% smokeless environment. If there is zero tolerance, it makes enforcement much easier. There would be no worries about enforcing tobacco use outside of designated areas because it is stated beforehand that the event is tobacco-free with zero tolerance, therefore, no gray area to

Towne is happy to be home and to bring a couple of his former students to the stage.


"We love Green Cove," the co-owner of Guitar Station on Walnut said. "We're always happy to be home and playing right there by the water."

CLAY COUNTY – Residents in Clay County mourn the loss of a loving volunteer, Kathy Garske.

Garske served in the community for more than 10 years and has touched the hearts of many people. Garske volunteered with Mercy Support Services, Clay SafetyNet Alliance and The Way Free Medical Clinic. She also volunteered with various Catholic charities and Clay County Soup Kitchens. It is undeniable that Garske left a positive impact on the Clay County community.

Patrick Hayes, the executive director and CEO of Mercy Support Services was shocked when he heard the news Garske had passed away.

"She was always a bright spark, full of faith and love," Hayes said.

Garske was one of the first volunteers at Mercy Support Services. Garske helped

with taking calls and giving phone briefings in the Fleming Island area. Garske, who was also a strong woman of faith, would coordinate weekly prayer meetings at Mercy Support Services. During these prayer meetings Garske would take any prayer requests from volunteers and those who used Mercy Support Services.

Hayle describes Garske as a fun and affectionate woman who cared deeply for others

"She was bubbly all the time," Hayle said. "She was always helping somebody."

Andre Van Heerdan, a board member of Impact Clay and former chair of Clay SafetyNet Alliance, also can attest to Garske's commitment to the county.

"She has engaged with our community on multiple levels...it's going to be a huge loss for our community," Van Heerdan said.

Garske worked in the communications sector at Clay SafetyNet Alliance alongside her friend Janie Fox. Garske and Fox

would work to get all agencies together if there was a certain issue that needed to be tackled. For example, if there was an issue of homelessness in the community, Garske and Fox would contact the facilities who handled homelessness. Garske and Fox would also sit in on the hearing committee as well.

Van Heerdan noted although Garske had a gentle spirit, her opinions were meaningful to those around her.

"She was very unassuming, not intrusive in any way," Van Heerdan said, "but when she gave her opinion, it was profound."

For Garske there was nothing that was too much or too little for her to do. She was both capable of being a great leader and completely content with doing more miniscule tasks. So long as she was helping people, Garske was happy simply answering phone calls or being in charge of an important project.

Although the community mourns Garske's passing, residents can still gain inspiration from her level of commitment and involvement within Clay County.

Garske's life will be remembered as a faithful volunteer who never stopped praying for the community she loved.


According to the arrest report, the informant recorded the purchase at Mc-Millan's house. CCSO Narcotics Unit and SWAT teams raided the house at 4655

GCS man charged with vehicular homicide following road-rage crash

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Two men were arrested and charged with three counts of vehicular homicide in connection with a road-rage accident a year ago in St. Johns County.

Joseph John Devenuta, 70, of Green Cove Springs, was taken to jail following a lengthy investigation into a crash on State Road 16 that resulted in the deaths of three people. Lucas Hedetniemi-Hart, of St. Augustine, also was

arrested on May 20.

According to the arrest report, surveillance showed Devenuta and Hedetniemi-Hart chasing each other while heading west on S.R. 16. The Florida Highway Patrol said Devenuta ran a red light at the intersection of Woodland Road and slammed into a car driven by 71-year-old Christopher Converse. All three people in Converse's car died.

Devenuta told troopers he was trying to take a picture of Hedetniemi-Hart's van with his cellphone when he ran the red light.

Both men are being held on a \$450,000 bond.

Tallahassee man charged with trafficking methamphetamine

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A call about a suspicious person led to the arrest of a Tallahassee man and the recovery of a stash of narcotics

Thomas Marshall Spingler, 41, was charged with trafficking methamphetamine and manufacturing, delivering or selling cocaine, after deputies detained him because the license tag on his car was assigned to a mobile home.

Women's Giving Alliance kicks Off 20th-anniversary celebration

CLAY COUNTY — The Women's Giving Alliance, an initiative of The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida, today kicked off its 20th Anniversary celebration at its annual Member Forum with the announcement of \$587,500 in grants to 10 Northeast Florida nonprofits.

"Harnessing the power of collective giving, the Women's Giving Alliance has awarded more than \$7.6 million in grants to 68 non-profit community partners since its founding to improve the lives of women and girls in Northeast Florida," said Jan Healy, president of WGA and Founder and President of Renewing Dignity. "We are a dynamic and diverse group of more than 400 women committed to our mission, which includes grantmaking to improve the lives of the most marginalized women and girls in our community."

Two organizations in Clay County shared in the benefits, including:

- Generation USA: Information Technology and Administrative Medical Assistant Programs. Generation USA is a boot campstyle training program that focuses on the technical and soft skills employers say are most needed in the workforce. Generation USA partners with local employers to provide full-time jobs or paid internships upon successful completion of the training. The \$75,000 grant will provide a stipend to 70 women in training and 24 in internships so they can afford to participate full-time in the IT and Administrative Medical Assistant programs.
- Generation W: Generation WOW. The Generation WOW program provides girls in middle and high school with mentorship, guidance, and specific tools to better navigate post-secondary education and potential careers.

The \$75,000 grant will allow 75 girls to participate in Generation WOW clubs designed specifically for girls who are at

or near the poverty level, including those in rural areas, by providing tablets and accessibility resources so they may participate in remote learning activities.

At the meeting, WGA shared priorities from its new strategic plan, which include simplifying grantmaking processes to reduce administrative burdens on grant applicants; analyzing new approaches to grantmaking such as through trust-based philanthropy; and strengthening the organization's operating budget to support growth. WGA has also formalized its ongoing focus on diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI), both in its membership and in the women and girls supported by WGA grants.

"From the beginning, WGA has sought to be inclusive and bring women with a diversity of opinions, experiences, ideas and passions—in addition to demographic diversity—into the fold," said Ann-Marie Knight, chair of the WGA DEI Committee and Vice President, Community Engagement and Chief Diversity Officer, UF Health Jacksonville.

"Now, we are being more deliberate about how we structure our recruiting of new members and our grantmaking to address the different experiences of women and girls of color."


John Ward, the Director of Emergency Management, has a few suggestions for how pet owners can be ready for hurricane season

"Make a kit for your animals just as you would do for yourself," Ward said.

This kit should include important paperwork such as vaccinations or health certificates, food and water that can last the pet for five-to-seven days, any medication and a carrier for travel. Other items to include would be cat litter and a litter box for cats, bedding, leashes and toys to keep them occupied. Everything in a pet emergency kit will be required if pet owners have to go to a pet-friendly shelter.

Pet-friendly shelters should be seen as a last resort for pet owners. Spaces are limited and pet-friendly shelters aren't available unless there's an evacuation alert. The locations for these shelters are not announced until the storm is imminent. Pets that are accepted into these shelters are dogs, cats, rodents, rabbits and birds. Families are encouraged to make an emergency evacuation plan that includes their pets.

For large animals such as horses and cows, Ward believes it's important not to



keep them locked in a barn so that they have a chance to escape from danger.

"The biggest thing for large animals is not to coop them up because animals have the ability to get away from danger unless they are locked in a barn." Ward says. "For large animals, it's really about being able to identify them, either through the animal having a chip or putting an address on them."

It's especially important for owners of horses and other large animals to have emergency evacuation plans as these animals are commonly left behind and given no access to escape. Equestrian owners should have a location for where to go in the event of an emergency evacuation. Currently, there is only one equestrian shelter available in North Florida, the Jacksonville Equestrian Center at 13611 Normandy Blvd.

It's important for pet owners to start planning ahead for natural disasters to save both human lives and pet lives. 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'Working to put a roof over their heads' NEFAR assists disaster victims with \$250,000 donation to REALTORS Relief fund

"Now is the time for communities along the coastline as well as inland to get prepared for the dangers that hurricanes can bring," said Secretary of Commerce Gina Raimondo. "The experts at NOAA are poised to deliver life-saving early warnings and forecasts to communities, which will also help minimize the economic impacts of storms."

President Joe Biden said Monday he's going to direct \$1 billion in emergency spending to help communities prepare for hurricanes and other extreme weather events

Last year, the United States dealt with 22 weather and other natural disasters with losses greater than \$1 billion each. The disasters, which included wildfires, hurricanes and snowstorms, had a combined cost of nearly \$100 billion.

The season officially started until June 1, storm season already started with Tropical Storm Ana in the Central Atlantic and a cluster of tropical-like storms formed last weekend off the coast of Texas.

It's never too early to get ready for a possible natural disaster, according to John Ward, the Director of Emergency Management in the county.

"We should be prepared year-round," he said.

An important first step is joining the text alert list from the county. When there's an emergency, the county will issue an alert on cellphones, and every resident should sign up for the service, Ward said.

"I know a lot of people don't like getting woke up, but we only use that for an emergency – missing kids, severe thunderstorms, tornado warnings, those kinds of things that are issued for that geographic area," he said. "As always, keep a preparedness kit in case we have a storm or an order to evacuate. All of our information that our residents need is at the alert. claycountygov.com website. They can get a lot of the preparedness information there."

One of the most devastating storms in Clay County history was Hurricane Irma in 2017. While the NOAA said the storm had weakened to a Category 1 storm when it came within 100 miles of the Northeast Florida coastline. And while Irma didn't meet NOAA's standards for wind speed and millibars of air pressure to be categorized as a hurricane in Clay County, the storm still did significant flooding damage throughout the county, particularly along the Black Creek that crested at 28.5 feet. The previous high for Black Creek was 24.3 feet in 1923. According to county and state officials, at least 1,200 homes in the county sustained flooding damage.

"That's a problem. Since Dora [in 1964], there's some question since Dora we haven't had a sustained tropical storm," Ward said. "A lot of people think because it was named, like Tropical Storm Debbie or Hurricane Beryl or Hurricane Irma, that they've lived through one – and they really haven't."

Even if a storm is more than 1.000

miles away, once it's named it's too late to make changes to insurance policies, Ward

"A lot of people don't check into that until it's too late," he said.

Once a storm is imminent, it's probably

too late to safely hunker down.

To help Florida residents get ready for hurricane season, Gov. Ron DeSantis announced a tax-free holiday on storm supplies from May 28 through June 6. Items that can be purchased tax-free include reusable ice packs, candles, flashlights, lanterns, gas and diesel fuel containers, batteries (not including automobile and boat batteries), radios, tarps, tie-downs and portable generators which cost \$1,000 or less

Prepare for Hurricane Season

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 to Nov. 30 every year, so now is the time to prepare ahead of the storm season. Here are some helpful tips to get you and your loved ones ready.

Stay Informed

Your first line of defense is to stay informed. The Federal Emergency Management Agency has developed an app that will send real-time alerts via the National Weather Service. The app can be viewed at https://www.fema.gov/about/news-multimedia/mobile-app-text-messages.

The National Weather Service office in Jacksonville will announce any real-time weather updates from their official @NWSJacksonville Twitter and NWSJacksonville Facebook sites.

For even more local information, sign up for Clay County-specific emergency alerts to be sent to your mobile device or home phone with Alert Clay from Clay County Emergency Management. To sign up, visit https://www.claycountygov.com/community/emergency-management/alert-clay.

Make an Emergency Plan

If you do not have an emergency plan, make one today. The Clay County All-Hazards Preparedness Guide is a great place to start at https://www.claycountygov.com/home/showdocument?id=1434. Remember to consider the needs of your pets, or any special medical or dietary needs your family may have.

Floridians are encouraged to have at least seven days of supplies on hand. These include food, water, medicine, batteries, pet food and anything special that you or your family need every day.

Know your Evacuation Zone

If ordered to evacuate, do not delay. Every minute you wait will result in significantly longer travel times as traffic congestion worsens. Make hotel or motel reservations before you leave, and make sure that your vehicle is full of fuel. Consider downloading the Florida 511 app or the Waze app to help determine the best route.

Get Ready

Review your important documents and make sure to have them handy, especially your insurance paperwork.

Make digital copies, but keep them password protected.

Verify that your insurance is current. Make a list of valuable items and take inventory of the items in your refrigerator and freezer, as some insurance policies cover food loss claims in the event of a power outage.

Get tech ready. Charge your cellphones, portable charging stations, computers, tablets and other devices. Grab your charging cords if you need to evacuate or shelter.

Fill any medical prescriptions and have medical equipment ready to go prior to the storm.

Strengthen your home. Bring in any outside furniture, lawn ornaments and other loose items. Clean your gutters and drains, and consider installing hurricane shutters.

This year is still different

Like last year, the coronavirus pandemic has added a complication to hurricane preparedness. Verify if local shelters will be open and if they have capacity restrictions. If you do need to evacuate to a shelter, be sure to bring items to help protect you and your loved ones from COVID-19, including hand sanitizer, cleaning supplies and at least two face coverings a person.

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Channell grand slam gets Liberty one more game

KNOXVILLE - Liberty University freshman Savannah Channell hit a go-ahead grand slam off of Tennessee pitcher Ashley Rogers, sparking a 6-4 come-from-behind win as the 24-the ranked Lady Flames eliminated No. 9 national seed Tennessee, Saturday at Sherri Parker Lee Stadium in the NCAA womens softball championship tournament held in Knoxville.

"Savannah is an amazing athlete," said Liberty coach Dot Richardson, a U.S. Olympic gold medalist and an NCAA champion player for UCLA. "At shortstop, she is poetry in motion at shortstop. She makes great plays look easy. She did it (homered) against Alabama and LSU. For her to hit a grand slam against Rogers, the Tennessee pitcher, I smile and hope she knows how special that was."

For Channell, a graduate of Keystone Heights High School, it was her fourth homer of the season. Channell finished with a .256 batting average, 29 runs batted in plus 78 put outs from her shortstop position.

The Lady Flames (44-14) advance to its second Regional final in program history and first since 2018. Liberty staved off elimination twice today, downing Eastern Kentucky 5-1 this afternoon before knocking off the Lady Vols tonight. Tennessee sees its season end at 42-15 after falling to James Madison and Liberty today. The Lady Flames downed the Lady Vols for the first time in program history after Tennessee had won each of the first 20 meetings. That included a 6-0 Lady Vols win over Liberty on March 30 this season.

The Lady Flames eventually lost an 8-5 contest to James Madison on Sun., May 23, to end their season in the double elimination round of the tournament. Liberty's bats hit three homers against James Madison. James Madison (37-1) extended its winning streak to 27 games, the longest active winning streak in NCAA Division I softball. In the process, the Dukes advance to their third NCAA Super Regional and


Lowery tagged as state weightlifting coach of year

On a good day, we had a lot of third guys that could be number two before a meet."

Lowery was selected as the 2021 Boys' Weightlifting Coach-of-the-Year after leading Keystone Heights to the Class 1A state title, the school's first since 2014. The team had eight place winners, including 139-pound champion Zach Glover and 169-pound champion Kade Sanders, in scoring 37 points. "I've got 10 more years to go and I love coaching and I love teaching and love doing both," said Lowery. "This year we had some big meets near the end of the season to ready the guys for the big lights. The Suwannee and county meet were real good for going up against bigger, strong kids. In the past, we would get to the point of big




state championship game.




One idea Lucas put out was a possible return to multiple game series for playoffs.



The Fleming Island Plantation Community Development District ("District") intends to levy special assessments (i) to secure repayment of bonds issued by the District to refinance its \$19,410,000 Fleming Island Plantation Community Development District Special Assessment Refunding Bonds, Series 2017 ("Existing Bonds") and (ii) to fund certain infrastructure improvements, including but not limited to, additional recreation improvements.

The District will hold a public hearing and regular board meeting on Tuesday, June 22, 2021, at 6:00 p.m., at 1510 Calming Water Drive, Fleming Island, Florida 32003, to consider the adoption of an assessment roll, the imposition of non-ad valorem special assessments on benefited lands within the District, a depiction which is shown below, and to provide for the levy, collection and enforcement of the assessments. The public hearing is being conducted pursuant to Chapters 170, 190, and 197, Florida Statutes. The purpose of the public hearing is to receive opinions from the general public and answer questions on the proposed special assessments prior to taking final action. The District may amend or alter the proposed special assessments at the public hearing. At the conclusion of the public hearings, the Board will, by resolution, levy assessments as finally approved by the Board. The Board will also hold a public meeting to consider any other business that may lawfully be considered by the District.

A description of the property to be assessed and the amount to be assessed to each piece or parcel of property may be obtained at the District Manager's Office c/o Inframark, 12574 Flagler Center Boulevard, Suite 101, Jacksonville, Florida 32258, Ph: (904) 436-4102 ("District Manager's Office"), during normal business hours.

By way of background, the District previously issued the Existing Bonds to fund a portion of the infrastructure improvements ("Improvements") identified in the District's *Improvement Plan*, dated March 6, 2000, as amended June 22, 2000 ("Improvement Plans"). The streets and areas that are subject to the Improvements are depicted below and in the Improvement plan. The Existing Bonds are secured by non-ad valorem assessments levied on certain property within the District ("Existing Assessments").

In general, the District intends to refinance the outstanding Existing Bonds to take advantage of interest rate savings and to raise additional proceeds through the issuance of new bonds, in one or more series ("Refinanced Bonds"). The proceeds of the Refinanced Bonds will fund certain infrastructure improvements as described more fully in the preliminary *First Addendum to the Improvement Plan – Series 2021 Project*, dated May 12, 2021. The District reserves the right to modify improvements described therein at the hearing.

As part of the refinancing, the District plans to levy special assessments to secure the Refinanced Bonds ("Refinanced Assessments"). Annual assessment payments will not increase and the term of the bonds will not be extended. However, the Refinanced Assessments will be made up of a higher principal amount and a lower interest amount. The assessments may be prepaid in whole at any time, or in some instances in part. The proposed schedule of assessments includes no more than thirty annual installments from the initial collection date of the respective Existing Assessments which the Refinanced Assessments are replacing.

The manner in which the District proposes to consider the levy of the Refinanced Assessments is more fully described in the District's preliminary *Special Assessment Revenue and Refunding Bonds, Series 2021 Supplemental Assessment Allocation Report*, dated May 12, 2021 ("Series 2021 Assessment Report"), a copy of which is on file in the District Manager's Office. The total assessment amount to be levied against each parcel and the unit of measurement to be applied against each parcel to determine the assessment is set forth in the Series 2021 Assessment Report.

All assessments described herein may be collected directly by the District in accordance with Florida law, or may be collected by the Clay County Tax Collector, as applicable, on the property tax notice. The decision to collect special assessments by any particular method – e.g., by direct bill or on the tax roll – does not mean that such a method will be used to collect special assessments in future years, and the District reserves the right in its sole discretion to select collection methods in any given year, regardless of past practices.

Please be advised that failure to pay any assessments will cause a tax certificate to be issued against your property within the District that may result in a loss of title, or, if the assessments are directly collected, will cause a foreclosure action to be filed against your property within the District that may result in a loss of title.

The public hearings and meeting are open to the public and will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Florida law for community development districts. The public hearings and meeting may be continued to a date, time and place to be specified on the record at the hearings.

Any person requiring special accommodations at the public hearings and/ or meeting because of a disability or physical impairment should contact the District Manager's Office at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the hearings or meeting. All affected property owners have the right to appear at the public hearing and meeting and the right to file written objections with the District within twenty (20) days of the publication of this notice. WHEREAS, the Fleming Island Plantation Community Development District ("District") is a local unit of special-purpose government duly organized and existing pursuant to the Uniform Community Development District Act of 1980, Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, as amended ("Act") and was established by Rule 42BB-1 of the Florida Land and Water Adjudicatory Commission, as amended; and

WHEREAS, the District previously issued its \$19,410,000 Fleming Island Plantation Community Development District Special Assessment Refunding Bonds, Series 2017 ("Series 2017 Bonds") for the purpose of financing certain of the improvements described in the *Improvement Plan*, dated March 6, 2000, as amended June 22, 2000 ("Original Improvement Plan"); and

WHEREAS, due to current interest rate market conditions, the District has determined it is in the best interest of the District, its residents, and landowners, to refinance the outstanding Series 2017 Bonds ("Prior Bonds") to achieve debt service savings and raise additional proceeds through the issuance of the "Series 2021 Refunding Bonds" in an amount not to exceed \$15,600,000 to finance a portion of the Improvements, as defined below; and

WHEREAS, the District has adopted its preliminary First Addendum to the Improvement Plan – Series 2021 Project dated May 12, 2021, attached hereto as Exhibit A ("Series 2021 Improvement Plan"), which further amends the District's capital improvement plan and identifies certain improvements, including additional recreation improvements ("Improvements"), a portion of which are to be provided by the District; and

WHEREAS, the District hereby determines that the Series 2021 Assessments to be levied will not exceed the benefits to the property improved; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the District's adoption of this resolution to begin the process of levying the Series 2021 Assessments, all prior assessments related to the Prior Bonds, shall remain valid and binding until such time as the District levies the Series 2021 Assessments and issues its Series 2021 Refunding Bonds, which may be issued in multiple series, to be secured by the Series 2021 Assessments; and

SECTION 6. There is on file, at the Districts Record Office, an assessment plat showing the areas to be assessed, with certain plans and specification describing the Improvements and the Estimated Cost of the Improvements, all of which shall be open to inspection by the public.

Assessments are certified for collection, the Series 2021 Assessments shall be paid in not more than the maximum period of time permitted by law then in effect. The Series 2021 Assessments may be payable at the same time and in the same manner as are ad valorem taxes and collected pursuant to Chapter 197, Florida Statutes ("Uniform Method"); provided, however, that in the event the Uniform Method is not available to the District in any year, or if determined by the District to be in its best interest, the Series 2021 Assessments, or any portion thereof, may be collected as is otherwise permitted by law. The decision to collect special assessments by any particular method – e.g., by direct bill or on the tax roll – does not mean that such a method will be used to collect special assessments in future years, and the District reserves the right in its sole discretion to select collection methods in any given year, regardless of past practices.

SECTION 8. The District Manager has caused to be made a preliminary assessment roll, in accordance with the Series 2021 Methodology, attached as **Exhibit B** hereto, which shows the lands assessed, the amount of benefit to and the assessment against each parcel of land and the number of annual installments into which the assessment may be divided, which is hereby adopted and approved as the District's preliminary assessment roll.

SECTION 9. The Board shall adopt a subsequent resolution to fix a time and place at which the owners of property to be assessed or any other persons interested therein may appear before the Board and be heard as to the propriety and advisability of the assessments or the making of the Improvements, the cost thereof, the manner of payment therefor, or the amount thereof to be assessed against each property as improved.

SECTION 10. The District Manager is hereby directed to cause this Resolution to be published twice (once a week for two (2) weeks) in a newspaper of general circulation within Clay County and to provide such other notice as may be required by law or desired in the best interests of the District.

SECTION 11. This Resolution is intended to amend and supplement the District's prior resolutions relating to the debt service assessments on lands securing the Prior Bonds ("Prior Assessment Resolutions"). As such, all Prior Assessment Resolutions remain in full force and effect, except to the extent provided for herein; provided, however, that nothing herein shall reallocate or otherwise modify the existing assessments and related assessment lien except as described herein. As such, the previously-adopted assessment methodologies, assessments and assessment liens remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 12. The invalidity or unenforceability of any one or more provisions of this Resolution shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of this Resolution, or any part thereof.

SECTION 13. This Resolution shall become effective upon its passage.




