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GCS Chief of Police Derek Asdot: End of watch Sept. 28 2021

Transformational police chief dies from COVID-19 complications

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Connie Butler knew Derek Asdot loved to eat. Even while he was hospitalized, she took a picture of a fancy meal she was eating in Atlanta and texted it to him to lift his spirits.

Asdot replied. It was the first time in five days he was able to open his eyes, she said. He sent her three heart-shaped emojis that made her smile. And it continued to give her prayerful hope.

"It was the last time I ever talked to him," Butler said.

Asdot, who understood being the Chief of Police in Green Cove Springs required being gregarious, yet gentle, died Tuesday afternoon after struggling with COVID-19 and pneumonia for more than a month.

"I maintained hope all along because Derek was a strong, mentally and physically strong individual," Vice Mayor Matt Johnson said. "He was in great health. You never know with COVID. I'm just shocked. It just does not seem real that he has passed away from COVID."

A man who was passionate about his work and hometown left an indelible impression on so many. Council members were stunned, although after 37 days in intensive care they knew the worst was a possibility. That still didn't make Tues-

day's announcement any easier.

"It was an honor to know him, his incredible dedication to family, his police department and his city beckoned us all. His love of Green Cove Springs was truly aspirational," Mayor Ed Gaw said. "He was the heartbeat of Green Cove. That allowed him to accomplish the role of police chief with an incredible combination of authority and compassion and understanding."

"We were so fortunate as a city to have a chief of police with his sense of direction. It was incredible."

City manager Steve Kennedy called city



officials with the news. Asdot's wife, Angie, told everyone else with a post on Facebook:

"With great sadness, we share that my sweet husband left us this afternoon to be with the Lord. Our family is immensely grateful for your notes, messages, and words of support over the last month. We love Derek with all of our hearts, and will miss him every single day. We will continue to post updates about memorial services in the coming days. Derek Asdot."

Asdot joined GCSPD in 2002, and he was promoted to Chief in 2017.

Evatt, Hailey earn state awards for teaching social studies, history

CLAY COUNTY – Teaching already is a challenge, but teaching during the COVID-19 pandemic created the most difficult teaching challenge in modern education history and a feat unto itself.

Wilkinson Elementary social studies teacher, Lorraine Evatt, and Lake Asbury Junior High social studies teacher, Josh Hailey, took it a step further by winning state awards for their work in the classroom.

Evatt won the Dr. Theron Trimble Florida Social Studies Teacher of the Year for Elementary Schools, and Hailey earned Florida's Recipient Excellence in Teaching History Award.

"I was so surprised," Hailey said. "As

Orange Park, Keystone Heights, Green Cove Springs set their budgets

Rising property values means all three municipalities will take in more money

CLAY COUNTY – Orange Park, Green Cove Springs and Keystone Heights set their 2021-22 budgets in the last week. While all three municipalities expect to collect more tax revenues, all three essentially managed to do it without raising the millage rates.

In Orange Park’s case, the town has maintained the same 5.8781 rate for four consecutive years.

“The Town of Orange Park millage did not go up,” Mayor Randy Anderson said to one person in the audience that expressed her concern that taxes were being raised. “The county did raise their taxes, though. We stayed the same. We haven’t gone up in four years.”

The millage roll-back rate is 5.7512. That’s the rate the Town Council would have needed to set the 2021-22 millage rate to if it wanted to stop taxes from rising at all. That 5.7512 rate would have seen homeowners pay the same amount of taxes in 2021-22 that they paid in the 2020-21 fiscal year.

Property values have increased in Orange Park, Green Cove Springs and Keystone Heights and that will allow all three to increase their budgets without raising their rates.

Green Cove Springs’ millage rate was set at 3.8, and it’s expected to lead to an operating budget of \$55,827,685 – an increase of nearly \$11 million.

Keystone Heights’ rate was set at 4.2901, which will help the city collect the \$1,244,303 it needs to operate.

During the city council’s brief second and final budget meeting Monday night, there were no public comments and all four council members – Mayor Karen Lake,

Vice Mayor Stephen Hart, Marion Kelly and Tony Brown – approved the budget without any questions. Councilman Bobby Brown missed the meeting. Green Cove Springs’ budget approval also was unanimous.

Orange Park’s final budget includes \$229,000 for Rob Bradley Conservation

Park. The town will shift money from the general fund balance to the town’s capital project funding and it will provide the costs needed to build the park’s unique parking lot and fence.

Commissioners increase Fire Rescue budget to accommodate higher salaries

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The county’s Fire and Rescue Department is feeling the same pinch as the Sheriff’s Office, but a \$3.5 million budget increase could stop the bleeding.

Throughout the 2021-22 Board of County Commissioners budgeting process, CCSO has received much of the spotlight. Sheriff Michelle Cook wanted significant increases to pay employees more, create more raises and repair and expand the county’s jail. However, CCFR is in need of some financial love, too.

“The overall figure on the budget summary we asked for was about \$3.5 million,” Assistant County Manager and acting Fire Chief, David Motes, said. “That is centered around being able to be competitive with outside organizations. We’re experiencing almost identical problems to CCSO.”

He said the reason CCSO has probably taken so much of the budgeting spotlight because CCSO’s problems likely are bigger. One difference between the two departments’ problems is that CCSO has no phased approach to pay and raises. CCFRD already does have that. Motes said CCSO has to bring employees up to the market

minimum and then create a payment plan. He said CCFR already has that system in place and that this year’s budget increase is “about stopping the bleeding.”

Motes said 289 people have been hired since 2009 and that number is so large because of how many employees CCFR has lost. He said the department’s problem isn’t the starting salaries offered, but rather, the pay that’s offered three to five years in. That’s when most employees that want to leave CCFR do leave and they often go to neighboring departments like St. Johns.

Every time somebody leaves CCFR, especially three to five years in, money is theoretically lost. Motes said every employee gets non-reusable protective equipment, training and more. When they leave, that money spent on those things essentially becomes lost money. That’s why the \$3.5 million budget increase is targeting employee salaries. CCFRD needs to keep its three- to five-year employees happy and the root of them leaving at that point is often because of pay.

“We might have a competitive starting salary, but we can’t compete a few years in,” Motes said. “Our highest competitor is probably St. Johns. People might leave here as an engineer [the second rank for a firefighter to achieve] to become just a

firefighter at St. Johns, even if they lost money or don’t gain any because when they become an engineer there, they’ll probably make more money. That’s where we’re bleeding.”

Motes said the department has a three-fold process to fixing things: keep employees here, increasing the department’s employee numbers and create enough fire stations to house them.

That touches on another problem CCFR is experiencing.

“We are 127 firefighters down from where we should be based on state standards,” Motes said. “We need to be at 1.52 firefighters per 1,000 people in the population. We are dramatically beneath that.”

He said fire stations are severely un-

derstaffed and as a result, people are overworked due to necessary mandatory overtime and the like. Then there’s the pandemic, which has seen the department experienced a 20% increase in call volume so now the department has a higher workload and less manpower. Motes said the department wants to bring in more employees to match that workload.

However, when it does that, then they face a housing problem. Many of the county’s official fire stations are old volunteer stations repurposed as full fire stations. They don’t feature everything necessary to house additional employees, though, as a result.

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Parkland safety commission coming to end, concern for students continues

The Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission sunsets next year.

The state's schools are safer since bullets ripped through Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School that fateful Valentine's Day in 2018, but there's still a lot of work that needs to be done, the commission charged with examining that disaster heard Monday.

Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri, chairman of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission, expressed a belief at the group's meeting that more oversight on school safety is needed, beyond the MSD commission's duties sunsetting next year.

The commission, created by the legislative act in 2018, was charged with examining and remedying the systemic and specific failures that resulted in 17 dead and another 17 injured at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

Gualtieri recalled how the reunification of surviving students and their parents had been "a mess" in the hours after the shooting. But when legislation died that would have required schools across the state to formulate a plan for reuniting students and parents after a mass casualty event, so did Broward County's efforts to avoid another wrenching scene like the one that happened as some parents waited into the next day to learn what happened to their child.

In anticipation of his presentation at Monday's meeting, Gualtieri called the Broward School District last month and found the district had no reunification plan in place, he said.

"To say that's unacceptable is an understatement," he said. "It's mind-boggling."

The Broward County School District did formulate a reunification plan after his phone call, Gualtieri said.

"What all of this tells me is there has to be ongoing oversight to provide the right amount of accountability," Gualtieri continued. "If this commission didn't exist, if I didn't make that call in August, would they have a reunification policy today? No. It would be sitting in a drawer someplace."

"Doing business this way ... What message does that send to the parents of the kids in Broward County Schools?" he asked rhetorically.

The commission also got an update on Alyssa's Law, named for 14-year-old Alyssa Alhadeff, who was one of 17 people who

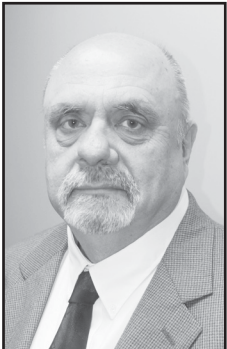
Ocktoberfest in September and the many other things I don't understand

died in the Parkland shooting. The legislation set aside money for silent panic alarms to be on cell phones in every public school building to alert police and fire to emergencies.

The effort was supposed to be in place at the start of this year.

Sylvia Ifft, deputy director of emergency management at the Florida Department of Education, said about half the state's school buildings were online with it when she took a survey in July.

"We heard one situation where there was an intruder on campus and Alyssa's alert was activated," she said. "Guardian [the armed person on campus] was notified, guardian responded, campuses went on lockdown, the students in the area were evacuated, everything went according to plan. So, this is working."

What's not working so well, though, is that within one county, there are multiple providers that make it more difficult for county 911 system workers, who now have to be trained on multiple systems, creating more room for error.

Max Schachter, a commission member whose son, Alex Schachter, was killed at the school, said there are five different

systems used by schools in Miami-Dade County and six in Palm Beach County. Added to that, it hasn't been widely accepted by some staff where training on the cell phone app is not mandatory.

"In Broward County, we have 18% of the teachers that have downloaded the app on their phone," said Schachter, who runs Safe Schools for Alex, a nonprofit that aims to provide the best safety practices to parents, school districts and law enforcement.

State Department of Education officials said the law was written so that charter schools are able to pick their own vendor, regardless of which one the public school district picks.

The commission will reconvene again Tuesday at the BB&T Center to wrap up its first in-person session since the pandemic began.

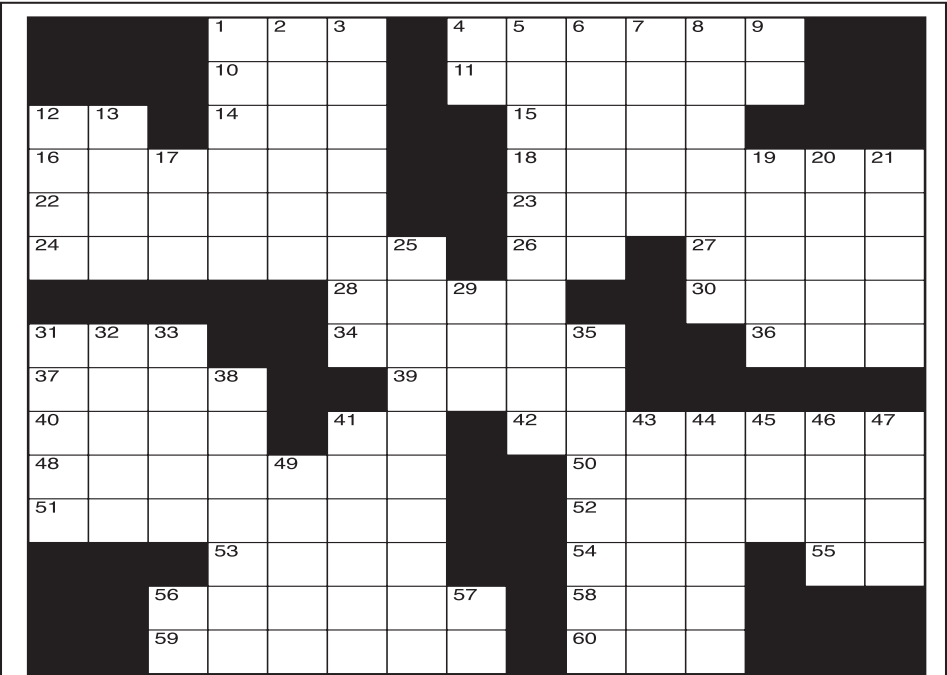

The new Fleming Island donor center provides easy access for Clay County residents to donate whole blood and platelets at a critical time when donations are needed more than ever, due to the COVID-19 crisis.

The donor center is located at 1605 County Road 220, Suite 160 on Fleming Island. The center collects donations Wednesday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m., and Saturday through Sunday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. To celebrate the opening, donors who give blood at the Fleming Island donor center will receive a \$20 e-

gift card. “The opening of our first donation center in Clay County is testimony to our commitment to making blood donation as convenient and accessible as possible for the public,” said Angie Byrd, District Director of LifeSouth. “We are dedicated to providing a safe blood supply to meet the needs of our community in Northeast Florida every day, and especially during this critical time.”

LifeSouth is the blood provider for several area health care systems, which account for approximately 70% of Northeast Florida’s hospital beds. The nonprofit community blood center’s local hospital partners include Orange Park Medical Center, Baptist Health hospitals, Memorial Hospital, UF Health, UF Health North and Wolfson Children’s Hospital.

Emergency rental assistance still available in Clay County

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Emergency Rental Assistance funding is available for Clay County residents negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and at risk of eviction or the loss of basic housing security. Eligible residents can receive up to 15 months of rental assistance and funds for utility payments including gas, electric, and internet service. Extended stay hotel residents are also eligible if they can prove Clay County residency and a COVID-19 im-

pact. Residents at risk of eviction or homelessness may also apply for homelessness stabilization funds to cover security deposits and the first month's rent to secure housing, moving expenses, or for a transitional stay in a hotel or motel until housing can be located.

This county-wide program covers unincorporated areas and all municipalities.

Clay County has a team of experts available to determine program eligibility and help with the online application process. Contact the Emergency Rental

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BCC elevates first responders to head of the line with its new budget

Tax increase to provide CCSO, CCFR much-needed revenue to compete

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Board of County Commissioners voted Tuesday to approve a 2021-2022 fiscal year aggregate millage rate of 8.3406, which represents the first property tax increase in years.

The BCC voted 4-1, with commissioner Betsy Condon dissenting, during its regular Sept. 28 meeting. Condon said her “nay” vote had nothing to do with law enforcement and fire rescue. She stressed she fully supports those departments getting the money they need, but in reality, the tax increase will go to other areas of the budget, too. Therefore, she wasn’t comfortable raising the property tax millage rate.

Dozens of residents attended the meeting wearing red shirts and blue shirts that said “Support Clay County First Responders” to show their support, and the hallway outside of the BCC chambers were filled with those same people talking excitedly about how the tax increase will help first responders. CCSO Sheriff Michelle Cook, who requested \$70,098,070 which represents a 12.03% increase compared to the current budget, said she’s thrilled that she’ll be able to pay her employees what they deserve.

“It’s the beginning of what I hope is an effort to really pay our first responders what they’re worth,” Cook told Clay Today after the vote. “We don’t enter this profes-

sion to make a lot of money, but we have to provide a living wage and that hasn’t been the case for a very long time.

“The numbers show that at the end of the day, it costs more to hire and train people who then leave the agency and must be replaced than it does to give people raises. If we can slow the attrition and start recognizing those savings in the long run, it will be cheaper.”

Condon said she feels the money was already there to give first responders the money they deserve without raising taxes, in part due a 6% increase in property values.

“I could talk about the waste that goes on ... we didn’t come back and look at anything [after I asked staff to find ways to save more money],” Condon said. “There’s a road project that occurred in District 4 and it was approved and signed off by

county employees over six months ago and it’s still not done.”

BCC chair Mike Cella said it was time for Clay County to raise taxes.

“It bothers me a little bit that we still have questions over our process,” Cella said. “At some point, we have to make a determination as to what’s important in our county. Am I a big tax and spend guy? No. You’re not going to find a cheaper guy than me. At the same time, though, this is deadly serious and as a board, our number one priority is public safety.”

Commissioner Jim Renninger said he hears people in Clay County pay too much in taxes, but he refutes that. He said out of 67 counties in Florida, Clay ranks 62nd.

“You can’t convince me we’re over-taxed. If you don’t take care of your people, you’re dealing with a dying organization. People move in here, get trained and move

out, and it’s costing us money. Clay County shouldn’t be an afterthought. It should be a leader in this region. We haven’t raised taxes in seven years...you might pat your back, but I think that’s a sign that we might have missed something. I’m in full support of this budget.”

The final budget looks like this: an aggregate millage rate of 8.3406, which is more than the current year aggregate rolled-back rate of 7.5232 by 10.87%. The County Services millage rate is 5.5727, the Unincorporated Service MSTU Fund rate is .1221, the Fire Control MSTU-8 Fund is .5048, the Lake Asbury MSBD rate is 0, and Challenger Roadway MSTU rate is 3 mills.

In other business, Clay County Florida Department of Health director Heather Huffman said Clay County is currently in a lull period in regards to COVID-19.

“We’re coming down from the Delta surge we had,” Huffman said. “We’ve had 364 cases in the past four days, which is around the same trend [in recent weeks] of 80 to 90 cases a day and 30% of our cases are still coming from 32068 [Middleburg area].”

Huffman said the 5-14-year-olds are no longer leading the way for COVID-19 cases, which likely occurred as a result of the school year starting, and that the 14-24 age group now are the most-affected age bracket.

“We’ve currently had 645 total deaths and 266 have come since July 1,” Huffman said. “Forty one percent of all deaths here are from Delta.”

The new budget’s \$3.5 million increase goes straight to salary but the BCC’s 2021-22 budget also includes funding for five new fire stations. In fact, the Green Cove Springs department will be moved to what is the current site of the county’s health department. Once the health department moves to its new building, the Green Cove Springs station will be built at the old health department property. It’s the first new fire station of five the county will build.

Motes said fixing all of these problems will allow the station to hit the state standard ratio it’s supposed to strive for. The county is also supposed to arrive at calls

within four minutes 90% of the time, but right now, their percentage is about 25%. He said the department can arrive at the first call a station receives within four minutes 90% of the time, but when that station receives a second call, that’s where the response time stretches beyond four minutes.

“You can’t just attack one thing here,” Motes said. “It’s all of it and combined, we will get better response times and a more highly efficient and effective field force to meet all of the county’s needs. You see this train coming down the tracks – the county’s growth – and when you’re already deficient, it creates a hill too big for that train to climb...and that’s why we had to get aggressive with this budget.”

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My time at Clay Today has come to an end – but I’m not going far

ONE LAST TIME – I’ve been covering Clay County and all its intricacies, governmental processes, schools, standout citizens and more for nearly four years but today, I must announce that my time at Clay Today is coming to an end.

You might not necessarily recognize my name in the column section of this paper – the captain of this ship, Don, has been

steering through that ocean for years – but if you read Clay Today’s school stories, or perhaps the Board of County Commissioners stories (everyone loves a good government meeting, right? Right?), you might recognize the name Wesley LeBlanc.

I kind of fell into this job back in November of 2017. I had interned at the paper earlier that year for about six months as part of my final semester in college. I had a great time but it was an internship and



after graduating, I didn’t think much of it. The University of North Florida’s journalism program requires an internship, and while I loved my time interning at Clay Today, I never thought the paper would offer me a job. There was a full staff of reporters already and they were great.

So, I continued managing Spring Park Coffee in Green Cove Springs, the excellent coffee shop I had been working at for five years. Then, my old editor shot me a text in November 2017 and said there’s a reporter position open and that I should interview for it. I set up an interview and when I arrived, it was less of an interview and more of an “it’s yours if you want it, and here’s what we can offer.”

It didn’t take long for me to begin seeing Clay County through a new set of eyes – a reporter’s set of eyes. I always noted that it wasn’t necessarily the school district’s fault – as someone who’s known multiple school board members and two superintendents on a close professional basis, I can confidently say these people want your child’s teacher to be paid more. The state funding simply isn’t there and teacher insurance stinks.

I urged my parents and my friends to pay attention to what was happening in BCC meetings and local town and city meetings.

These boards are dealing with millions of dollars and voting on big projects for those millions. It’s your money – wouldn’t you want to be in the know? There are certain things towns and BCC boards approved that I disapproved of and there were things I internally jumped for joy over (I’m quite proud of Clay County for voting in favor of

the school district’s half-cent sales tax), but I feel confident in saying that you’d never know it.

That’s important too. You shouldn’t be coming to me or Clay Today for opinions about what’s happening in Clay County. You should come to us for hard-boiled news, void of bias. That’s what journalism is all about. We’re watchdogs of government and caretakers to residents and citizens who want to be in the know.

When I wasn’t breaking down multi-million-dollar budgets, new amendments and public hearings, I was usually trying to find a teacher doing something amazing for her student or following a forest firefighter handling a controlled burn. One day I was talking to a charity about their new initiative to help those in need get medical help. Another day, maybe I was writing about a Clay County woman who went to prison and now uses her very famous TikTok to advocate for women’s rights in prisons. Whatever I was writing about, I was proud to be doing it.

Clay County is a great place to inhabit and live. It’s a great place to start a family. It’s an amazing place for your children to attend school in. It has great food (OP Fish House is legendary, y’all, and Saigon Wok on Fleming Island has the best bowl of Pho I’ve ever had) and it has some good people in it.

I’m happy to have met some of them, interviewed them, photographed them, written about them, worked alongside them and mostly, I’m happy to have known them for these past four years. To the teachers, elected officials, constitutional officers, standout citizens, local business owners, charity leaders, children looking out for their peers ... I’m proud to know you and even prouder that I was able to tell your story.

Keep being you, Clay County, but maybe consider staying open later and also, quit trying to avoid the growth that’s coming no matter what. It’s better to be involved and prepared for growth than upset about it and left wondering how things came to be because you chose to stay uninformed about it.

It feels great to be informed, doesn’t it? After my four years here, I stand by this: Every issue of Clay Today will make you feel great about being informed.

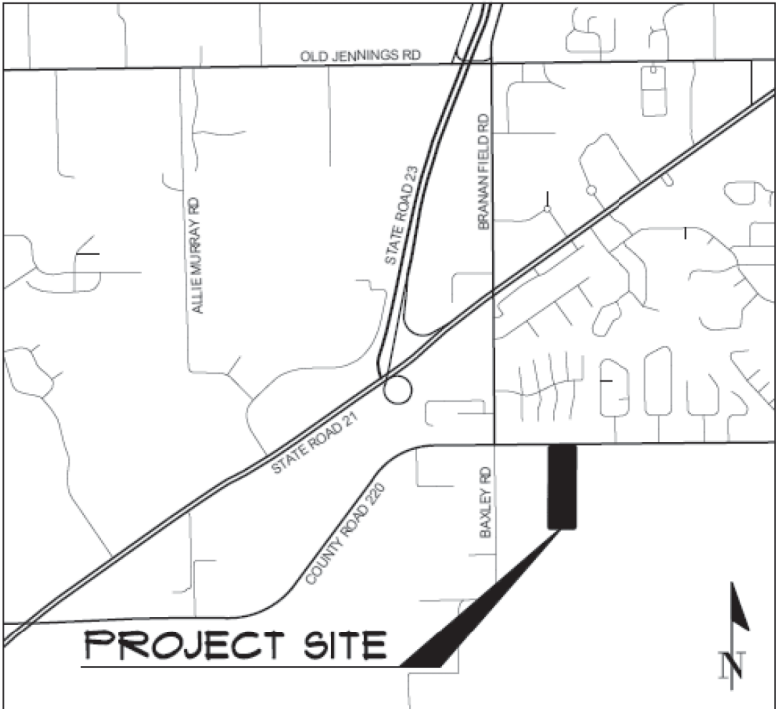

OPMC offers group sessions to help teens deal with their anxieties

ORANGE PARK – The Orange Park Medical Center is targeting teen-aged mental health with its new group therapy program.

The program is now live at the hospital, and it's being led by Dr. Barbara Gracious. OPMC says it's the only program of its kind in Clay County and it's been developed specifically to give teens the tools they need to manage and resolve the anxieties and behavioral health experienced during this part of their lives.

"We've recognized for years that there's been a huge lack of services for youth in Clay County and this program has been planned for the past several years and now, we're finally able to get it off the ground," Gracious said. "It was delayed due to COVID-19, but it finally opened on Aug. 30."

Gracious said there are two on-site therapists that will spend three hours with a group of teenagers in a therapy session

three times a week: Monday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. She said the sessions will focus on cognitive-behavioral and dialectical behavioral therapy in addition to behavioral processing.

Those interested can call the referral number at (904) 639-8654. Therapy is like a doctor's appointment – you can pay out of pocket or go through insurance.

"We're targeting 13 through 17 years of age because that's often when the most common symptoms for mood disorders and when psychotic disorders can begin," Gracious said. "There's a long list of issues teenagers deal with: peer conflicts, peer stresses, sexual orientation crisis, episodes of major depression, episodes of bipolar disorder, cutting behaviors...and while this isn't designed for psychosis, we certainly will see kids where they could be starting disorders such as schizophrenia and bipolar disorders, hallucinations or paranoia, suspicious withdrawals ... and more."

Anxiety orders can arise from all kinds of things during the teenage years, too, Gracious said, such as social anxiety, generalized anxiety, general worries, obsessive-compulsive disorder, puberty and academics.

"Group therapy will help to address

all of that," Gracious said. "Teens respond really well to group therapy and it helps because they can support each other and learn from each other. That creates a faster rate of progress overall compared to individual therapy. They're soaking up everything they hear, getting other perspectives, hearing other suggestions for problem-solving and it just creates a great

environment for teens."

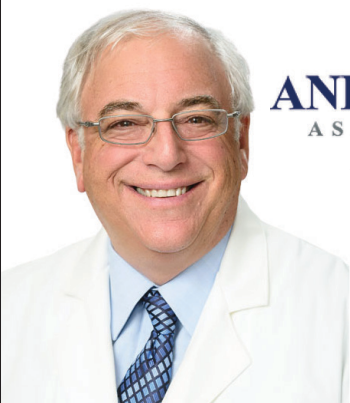
Gracious said the group therapy mental health program isn't necessarily a one-stop-shop either. She said it's great for a teen to have in their toolbox alongside their standard therapy and she also said that just because a teenager finishes the program doesn't mean they won't come back. That's OK, she said.

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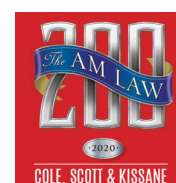

a second-year teacher, of course, I came in and tried to do my best in public education but I was pleasantly surprised when I found out I actually ... won an award. It was so exciting.”

Hailey attended Orange Park Elementary years and years ago and graduating from Orange Park High in 2010. He went to grad school in Arizona, and while he wasn't necessarily sure he'd be back teaching in Clay County, it was one of the many places he applied to work at post-graduation. The stars aligned and Hailey returned home and now, two years in, he's an award-winning teacher.

Evatt has been teaching in Clay County, all at Wilkinson. She's no longer a classroom teacher, but she now works as a literacy coach at the Clay County School District Office. She won the award for her service last year.

Both Evatt and Hailey won different awards at the county level and the school district encouraged them to apply for the state versions.

“I would like to think [I received it] because I try to be as creative as possible in the way that I present historical content to students and we do that through primary sources and eyewitness accounts and pictures to give students a sense of what was really going on during the times that we study,” Hailey said.

“I try to encourage them to use their creativity as well and that includes finding different kinds of mini-projects for them to complete where they can express themselves and engage with the material in a way that suits their learning preference.”

Hailey said he also has to give as much credit as possible to the people he works with at LAJH, both in terms of administration and fellow teachers in the history department. With him being just a teacher two years into the gig, he leaned on his colleagues a lot, he said, and they were always down and willing to help.

“I've always said jokingly (in regards to teaching during a pandemic), I didn't know any better,” Hailey said. “I came into this job in the middle of all this and I just

simply tried to do my best and support the school however I could. There were certainly challenges, but I learned to be flexible and as supportive as possible throughout all of it.”

Clearly what Hailey was doing worked, and the same can be said for his fellow social studies teacher, Evatt.

“When we went to distance learning when COVID-19 first began, I wanted my students to know more social studies content and I'm good at integrating social studies into English Language Arts so that's what I did,” Evatt said. “For the following school year, I wanted history to take on a whole new level of reverence for students and I began to teach history and reading because I wanted them to realize it was more of a history class than just a reading class. I wanted them to see my room as an engaging place for a history lesson rather than just an English one.”

She said it was important for her to create excitement in social studies. Most students, she said, feel that kind of excitement about math and science, but it was always a challenge to get that same reaction out of reading and history. So, she melded the two together and created a new immersive experience for her students.

“We did thematic units on different periods of history like colonial life, the American Revolution and more,” Evatt said. “With each unit, we did a field day and because we couldn't have volunteers on campus due to COVID-19, I had to reach out to my colleagues and the district office to help come out and run the field day stations. I wouldn't have received this award without their help.”

Evatt said students made colonial dolls, wrote about what they learned using feather pens and ink, wrote essays comparing colonial life to modern life, dressed up like colonials, played colonial-era games and more.

“I guess you could say it worked,” Evatt said. “We did a pre-assessment before each unit, one midway through it and one at the end and we could see a huge difference between pre and post. Because they had such a good time learning history, they'll have that background knowledge for when they move on up to seventh grade and beyond.”

“That's what teaching is all about.”

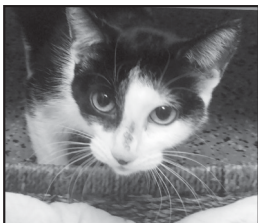

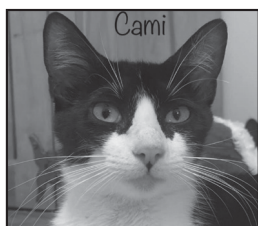

were shaken. He struggled to maintain his composure while talking about his friend.

"We've lost the heartbeat of Green Cove Springs. Derek, doggone, that rascal had passion everywhere," Royal said. "That passion throbbed throughout the city. It will be close to impossible to take this with any person I've ever dealt with. My heart goes out to the family. Great friend."

Asdot joked about eating too much Mexican food during a trip to Arizona in early August. After returning, he ran three races as part of the Tour De Pain competition at Jacksonville Beach on Aug. 14. While he ran, however, he said "during these races my stride was way off. I felt like I couldn't breathe." He attributed it to eating too much ahead of the races.

On the same post, he said:

"After the third race Saturday afternoon I was gassed and my whole body hurt. Turns out I was positive. Then over the next week and a half it turned into pneumonia.

"Hopefully my stubbornness will pay off and I can make the turn pretty quickly. If y'all test positive, please pay attention to your breathing. This is no joke.

"See y'all soon."

Asdot entered the hospital on Aug. 23. He never came home. He was 49.

A day later, the city canceled its Rock the Dock and Trunk and Treat programs out of concern for the pandemic.

The man people called "Chief" was avid about being outdoors and working to get in shape. So was councilman Steven Kelley.

"Honestly, he's one of the people in the city I've been closest with because we were close to each other in age," Kelley said. "We always worked out together in the gym. He's gotten me involved in several



5Ks, 10Ks and different runs, things like that. This has been one of the most shocking outcomes that have come out of the whole COVID pandemic experience. He is someone I consider very similar to myself. My activity level and how much they care for themselves, things like that. For this to have gone the way it did, it's so shocking. It hits so close to home.

"The service he and his team provide the city, just adding to the quality of life, everything he's done with all of the events he's come up with and what his team has put on every year. It's heartbreaking. It's tragic. I'm still processing it. This is the most alarming thing to come out of everything that's happened in the last year. I can't believe it."

Within hours, officers from other agencies were filling the Green Cove Springs Police Department parking lot. They came to offer support. They came to help. They

came because they didn't know what else to do.

"We're a small community," said Clay County Sheriff's Office Chief of Detention Security William Arnold.

Sheriff Michelle Cook provided the following statement: "We are deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Green Cove Springs Police Department Chief Derek Asdot, who passed away after a long battle with COVID-19. Chief Asdot was a commendable law enforcement officer, a member of our community and a partner to our agency. Our prayers are with the men and women of the Green Cove Springs Police Department as they navigate this loss. We will be there for them in any way we can."

Later she said, "It's devastating. A larger-than-life law enforcement leader whose integrity is impeccable and really a model for what leadership should be. I mourn for the agency and the community. His loss

will be felt."

The police department flag was lowered to half-staff. The department placed a large canvas at the front door where residents and friends can leave notes. Asdot's SUV is backed into a parking space in the front lot. And while it was cordoned off from traffic, officers invited the community to leave remembrances on the car.

For some, gifts and flowers will never be enough. "He was very involved with the police department and how they worked with the children and the community," Butler said. "He was very instrumental in reshaping the police department and giving them a different outlook. With all the things we have going on in the world, in this bubble, in our community he was very passionate about not having that image and working along with a lot of people.

"He had a rapport with a lot of people. Every community has its own challenges, but because of the things he led his department to do, he really made a difference to our community. My heart is just aching."

Asdot became the third law enforcement officer in Clay County to die from the virus. Clay County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Eric Twisdale and deputy Clint Seagle both died from the coronavirus. Twisdale died on Sept. 16, 2020, and Seagle lost his long battle on Aug. 29.

"Derek Asdot is widely regarded as a progressive leader who spearheaded dynamic transformational changes at the Green Cove Springs Police Department in a short period of time," the police department said. Asdot also is survived by his son, Jake, and his daughter, Ashley.

Orange Park man arrested for secretly recording, sending child pornography

ORANGE PARK – A man was arrested after he secretly recorded a 15-year-old girl in various stages of dress without her knowledge.

Jonathan David Bohnsack, 36, of Orange Park, was charged with two counts of possessing and watching child pornography, transmitting child pornography with his cellphone, video voyeurism of a child and using a two-way communication device to facilitate a felony.

His bond was set at \$125,015.

According to the arrest report, the mother of the girl found chats between Bohnsack and another person on Facebook messenger concerning explicit incest, bestiality and abusing a 15-year-old child. The mother then viewed a live conversation between Bohnsack and the other person while using another device and she saw “lewd images” of her daughter. She also recognized clothing and her daughter’s bedroom in the background.

Many of the photos were taken while the child slept, CCSO said. The child told investigators she wasn’t aware she was being recorded.

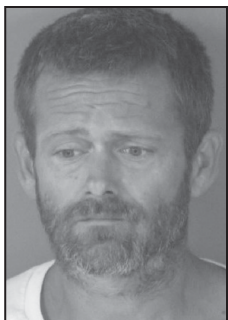
Bohnsack admitted he transmitted the sexual images with his cellphone so he could get caught and die from “suicide by cop,” CCSO said.

Bohnsack’s next court appearance is scheduled for Oct. 11.

Raiford man busted for trafficking methamphetamine, fentanyl

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A traffic stop for a wrong license tag led to the arrest of a man for trafficking in methamphetamine and fentanyl.

Eric Wade Kudlesky, 40, of Raiford, also was charged with possession of carisoprodol, marijuana and drug paraphernalia.

A deputy saw a plastic bag filled with 4.9 grams of marijuana during the traffic stop. A subsequent search of the car uncovered 14.8 grams of methamphetamine, five grams of fentanyl, six cariso-

prodol pills, metal spoons, three scales, two cut straws and \$1,875 in cash.

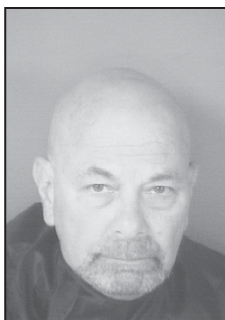
Kudlesky also has an outstanding warrant from Duval County for violation of probation for domestic battery.

CCSO: Sex offender arrested for exposing himself to 7-year-old girl

JACKSONVILLE – A registered sex offender was arrested on Sept. 27 and charged with three counts of lewd and lascivious behavior for exposing himself and photographing a 7-year-old girl.

Ludwig was arrested by the Jacksonville Sheriff’s Office in 1996 after he asked two girls if they wanted to see him without pants. He was ordered to register as a sexual predator in 1997.

Woman charged with selling fentanyl to confidential informant

ORANGE PARK – A Lake Asbury woman was charged with the sale or delivery of fentanyl after she was caught selling the drug to a confidential informant for the Clay County Sheriff’s Office.

According to the arrest report, the informant bought .64 grams of fentanyl for \$60 on May 5 at a prearranged location on Blanding Boulevard. The sale was recorded by CCSO. Tara Autumn Trimble, 38, was arrested on Sept. 22.

Teens caught after leading CCSO on 7.8-mile chase

JACKSONVILLE – A 14-year-old boy was taken to the Juvenile Detention Center in Jacksonville on Sept. 25 after Clay County Sheriff’s Office deputies said he rammed his stolen SUV into a patrol car and led deputies and members of the Jacksonville Sheriff’s Office on a high-speed chase on U.S. Highway 17.

The juvenile, who wasn’t identified because of his age, now faces charges of attempting to flee or elude law enforcement, aggravated battery on a law enforcement officer and driving without a valid license.

According to the arrest report, the teen was spotted in the 800 block of Wells Road driving a Ford Explorer that was reported stolen from St. Mary’s, Georgia, on 23. Because there was heavy traffic, a CCSO deputy positioned his car in front of the SUV to force a stop. The driver, however, accelerated and struck the deputy’s car. The stolen SUV then turned north on U.S. 17 and crossed into Duval County. The truck was clocked at more than 100 mph and it was spotted running at least four red lights, according to the arrest report. The vehicle finally crashed into another car just past the Ortega River Bridge, ending what turned into a 7.8-mile pursuit.

According to CCSO, “all suspects were taken into custody by our deputies and will be charged with aggravated battery and felony fleeing and eluding. Additional charges are pending.”

Man jailed after school counselor reports abuse of girl

MIDDLEBURG – A Daytona Beach man was charged with lewd and lascivious behavior against a 14-year-old girl.

James Edward Plemmons, 27, was being held on a \$150,006 bond in the Clay County Jail after the Clay County Sheriff’s Office was called by the girl’s school guidance counselor after the girl confided to a

friend she was fondled “on numerous occasions.”

The victim’s brother told investigators with the Child Protection Team he saw Plemmons put his hand on his sister’s breast in her bedroom.

Plemmons denied the accusations, CCSO said.

Commissioner Renninger: ‘I’m not afraid to say boo to the boogeyman’

CLAY COUNTY – County commissioner Jim Renninger has enjoyed a variety of unique and fulfilling experiences in his life.

He represents District 3 for Orange Park and Fleming Island, and he’s the Vice-Chairman of Finance and Audit Committee.

The biography for each County Commissioner gives the basics. Citizens elected him three times to the Orange Park city council; he served twice as mayor and served twice as vice mayor until terming out in 2016. He’s worked in local government for years, but that isn’t the first service he’s done for our community. He’s also served 26 years in the U.S. Navy.

Renninger is more than familiar with odd jobs and strange hours. He once spent 155 days on an aircraft carrier at sea.

“You’re living on a big machine,” he said. “It’s a nuclear reactor basically, but you’re on it for five months. When you get off a ship and smell fresh grass, you see it as a simple pleasure.”

That reflects his approach to giving back.

“As a former Navy pilot, we work 24/7. I used to joke that when it was Friday, there were only two more work days until Monday,” he said. “I’m very accustomed to odd hours and schedules. Although I am retired, I serve on two condo boards, the Penney Farms board of directors, and am a member of many social and political organizations. I still have time to get out in the community and work for the community.”

Working in the military, Renninger understands when something goes wrong, the guy at the top gets blamed for it. And it’s up to him to fix it. The same holds true in politics as well. Despite being affected by the pandemic, Renninger said it’s up to everyone to figure out ways to do their jobs and serve the community. “We’re doing our best. You’re charged with hard decisions in the military that often have no perfect solution,” Renninger. “You don’t always have time to figure out a perfect solution. If the

building is burning, you have to slow it down as best you can as quickly as you can.”

Renninger knows the importance of split-second decisions. When he was in the Navy, he saved an aircraft and its four crewmen.

“By all rights, that aircraft and its crewmen should be at the bottom of the ocean,” he said. “In a normal situation, that wouldn’t have happened.”

Thirty years later, it’s still remarkable, and something he remembers.

“I’m not afraid to say boo to the boogeyman,” he said. “People ask sometimes ‘doesn’t this make you nervous?’ and I have to laugh and say no. I’ve been in worse situations.”

Beyond his work in the Navy and in politics, Renninger is a firm believer in preparation, and he highly endorses education.

“I’m labeled as the guy who reads all the minutes,” he said. Renninger used to work with FSCJ and their aviation center and would go out to high schools to teach them the importance of STEM education. “Aviation is nothing but STEM, but it’s STEM plus fun,” he said. “I used to ask them a difficult question at the end, and if they could research it fully and get the answer, I would get their parents’ permission to take them out flying on my plane.”

Seeing the students get so excited about science and math and get involved in STEM careers is something that motivates him to continue to learn more every day.

He knows the importance of communication. When recounting his work in the pentagon, he reflected on advice given to him that’s always stuck with him throughout his career: “When you change something, you better have a reason.”

All the changes he brings to the BCC are ones he truly believes in.

“Clay County is a great place to live, work and play, but it could be better,” he said. “We are growing exponentially, and it will take skilled legislators to grow the county in a smart direction while keeping in mind the need for economic limitations.”

Time to strap up for playoff runs

FLEMING ISLAND - With mid-season about to hit area gridirons, a big step to securing a playoff spot will make this Friday's game a bit more intense.

Middleburg, with a week off, returns to the turf intent on using the playoff points off a loss to St. Augustine work in their favor by running the table on the remainder of the schedule.

Note: The football playoff system is based off percentages of teams played; the winning percentage of the initial team, the winning percentage of the scheduled teams and the winning percentages of the scheduled teams' opponents. In essence, St. Augustine, though a loss, can be considered a high-value team for Bronco playoff hopes, thus the remainder of the season can be determined by wins and losses from here to finish for most teams. Different from 2020, a district champion will emerge from each district to determine four immediate region playoff qualifiers while the rest of the region field is based off the RPI (Playoff points rankings). There will be 32 teams in each class; eight qualifiers from each region-four district champions and four at-large teams based on RPI.

As of September 27, Keystone Heights has the highest RPI from local teams at 122nd statewide followed by Oakleaf at 204, Clay 239, Middleburg 253, Orange Park 285, Fleming Island 387 and Ridgeview 392 out of 482 ranked teams statewide. Locally, Creekside (5-0) is one of the top ranked teams in area at 45th and would be considered high value for game for Oakleaf for their October 29 game. Robert E. Lee is 31st; important to Orange Park football while Nease and Columbia are in the top 100.

Singleton, a junior committed to the University of South Florida, was his usual elusive self. He gained 114 yards on 17 carries, scoring twice and adding a two-point conversion after his first touchdown. The Panthers finally sustained a drive

in the fourth quarter, moving 72 yards in eight plays. Durriente Myrick lined up as a wildcat quarterback, swept right behind several blockers and tiptoed up the sideline for the final 15 yards.

Ridgeview has 10 sophomores in its starting 22, and Ridgeview Defensive Coordinator Stephen Creech was pleased with the young team's effort.

"We ask the kids to compete the whole time, and they played the whole game," he said. "Fleming has a good coaching staff and a lot of great athletes, so we knew it was going to be tough."

The schedule does not get any easier for Ridgeview, which got two sacks from defensive tackle Derrick Moseley and an interception from Tillman. The Panthers host prohibitive District 4-6A favorite St. Augustine on October 1.

was recovered by Clay defensive end Blake Thompson to give the Blue Devils prime field position at the Oakleaf 23 yard line. Clay would get as close as the eight yard line but a missed field goal kept the game scoreless (The kicking game for both teams would be a theme all night). The Clay defense would get a fourth down stop at the Oakleaf 44 yard line to help set the Blue Devil offense once again in prime scoring position. Mobley would make another long run of 15 yards to the Knights 19 yard line and then two plays later he would find Peavy again on the

same play for a touchdown. Unfortunately, the extra point was wide left and Oakleaf held a 14-13 lead.

The Blue Devils would get the ball back after another fourth down stop, this time at their 44 yard line. Mobley would have yet another long run (his third of the half) of 24 yards to the Knights 37 yard line. He would then find a diving Frazier for a spectacular catch in double coverage to put the Blue Devils ahead. They would also score on the two point conversion to take a 21-14 lead with 1:48 left before half and seemingly seizing all the momentum.

Oakleaf wasn't going down that easy. Running back Mike Brannon would carry the load with a 30 yard run to the Clay 45 yard line along with a Blue Devil personal

foul penalty giving the Knights the ball at the Clay 30 yard line. Brannon would score on a 30 yard run but the snap on the extra point was high and Oakleaf was unable to run for the two point conversion and Clay would take a 21-20 halftime lead.

"We had to adjust with their running back out and with four freshman starting on defense for us it was difficult to contain the quarterback runs" said Garis. "We adjusted some things defensively at halftime that helped us in the second half."

The Oakleaf defense would force a punt from Clay giving the offense the ball at their own 39 yard line. The Knights would waste little time as quarterback Drew Ammon found Shevchook again for a 24 yard touchdown pass to regain the lead 27-21 with 8:00 left in the third quarter.

On Clay's ensuing possession, they found themselves at their own 10 yard line after an intentional grounding penalty by quarterback Billy Mobley. The Blue Devils then faced a fourth down and one from their own 29 yard line. Mobley was able to hard count and draw the defense offside for the first down. Backup quarterback Jayden Jenkins then took over with some nifty runs including a fourth down run to the Oakleaf 25 yard line. The Knights defense held on and forced an incomplete pass on the next 4th down to take over, although Clay took nearly eight minutes off the game clock giving their defense a much needed rest. The break was crucial as Oakleaf was unable to move the ball and punted after three plays. Jarvis Lee would get a 25 yard punt return to the Oakleaf 44 yard line setting up the offense on a short field. Three plays later Mobley would find Peavy again for a 29 yard touchdown pass tying the game at 27-27. Unfortunately the Blue Devils missed another extra point was as both teams struggled all night in the kicking game.

The Knights responded with and 80 yard drive that was sparked by an early pass interference penalty on the first play. From there Mike Brannon and Isaiah Shevchook led the ground game for the Knights allowing them to also control the clock. On third down from the two yard line Ammon found Shevchook for a touchdown with just under two minutes remaining. Yet another extra point was missed giving Clay some hope down 33-27. However, the Oakleaf defense held firm as Clay was able to get to near midfield with less than a minute left but a sack on 3rd down and an interception on 4th down by James "stay out of my" Kitchen sealed a big win for the Knights heading into four straight district matchups starting at Sandlewood next week.

compish comes with the focused effort of the team.

“We want to return to Raider football which is in your face, rough and strong and tough defense,” said Macpherson. “The first 14 minutes of this game looked like Orange Park football, but the next 10 minutes, we lost that focus. Football is a 48 minute commit to execution and discipline. This was a good game for us returning to that standard.”

On defense, linebacker Britton Roberts was the main chaos creator for the Raider defense with numerous plays on the Pirate

Indian smashmouth, in your face football led by Hollingsworth and Jenkins to get the ball to the Rams three yard line. When Hollingsworth was asked about the weapons his team has in the backfield, the Senior replied “I like it because everyone is playing for the team. The Rams heavily depended on the legs of Junior Quarterback Reginald Allen Jr who carried the entire first set. Although a quick cutter, and fast runner, the Indians defense shutdown the attack every way the Rams tried throwing it at them. The home game will be the last for three weeks as the Indians go on the road until November when they close the regular season out home against P.K. Yonge.

St. Johns Country Day School, at 8-2, has a four game win streak rolling with a match at Oakleaf set for Mon., Sept. 27.

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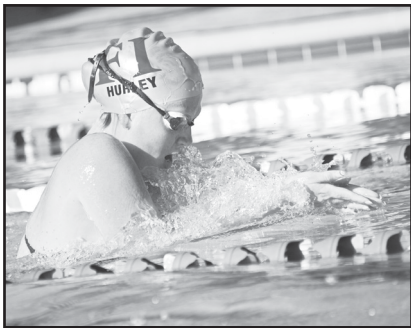

The Board of Supervisors ("Board") of the Creekview Community Development District ("District") will hold a public hearing on **October 26, 2021, at 9:30 a.m. at the offices of Carlton Construction, Inc., 4615 U.S. Highway 17, Suite 1, Fleming Island, Florida 32003**, to consider the adoption of an assessment roll, the imposition of special assessments to secure proposed bonds on benefited lands within the District, a depiction of which lands is shown below, and to provide for the levy, collection and enforcement of the special assessments. The streets and areas to be improved are geographically depicted below and in the District's *Creekview Community Development District Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP")*. The public hearing is being conducted pursuant to Chapters 170, 190 and 197, *Florida Statutes*. A description of the property to be assessed and the amount to be assessed to each piece or parcel of property may be ascertained at the office of the District Manager located at 2300 Glades Road, Suite 410W, Boca Raton, Florida 33431 ("District Manager's Office").

The District is a unit of special-purpose local government responsible for providing infrastructure improvements for lands within the District. The infrastructure improvements expected to be funded by the District ("Improvements") are described in the CIP, and are currently expected to include, but are not limited to, road rights-of-way and improvements, utilities, stormwater systems, recreational improvements and other improvements, all as more specifically described in the CIP, on file and available during normal business hours at the District Manager's Office. According to the CIP, the estimated cost of the Improvements is **\$90,549,000**.

The District intends to impose assessments on benefited lands within the District in the manner set forth in the District's *Master Special Assessment Methodology Report ("Assessment Report")*, which is also on file and available during normal business hours at the District Manager's Office. The purpose of any such assessment is to secure the bonds issued to fund the Improvements.

As described in more detail in the Assessment Report, the District's assessments will be levied against all benefited lands within the District. The Assessment Report identifies maximum assessment amounts for each land use category that is currently expected to be assessed. The method of allocating assessments for the Improvements to be funded by the District will initially be determined on an equal assessment per gross acre basis, and will be allocated on an equivalent residential unit ("ERU") basis at the time that such property is platted or subject to a site plan. Please consult the Assessment Report for a more detailed explanation of the methodology.

The annual principal assessment levied against each parcel will be based on repayment over thirty (30) years of the total debt allocated to each parcel. The District expects to collect sufficient revenues to retire no more than **\$115,325,000** in debt to be assessed by the District, exclusive of fees and costs of collection or enforcement, discounts for early payment and interest. The proposed annual schedule of assessments is as follows:

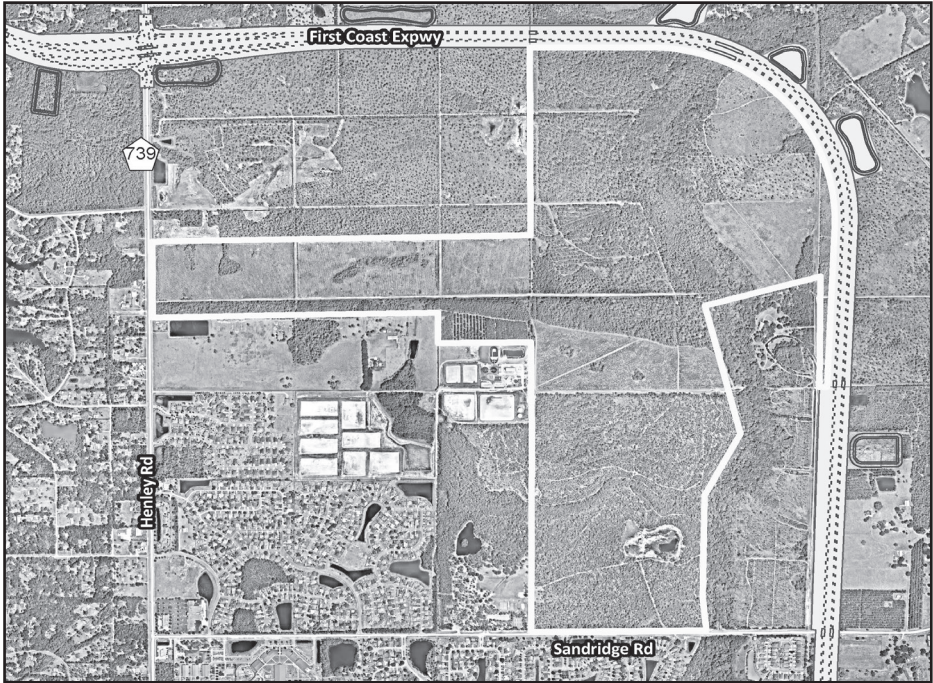

All amounts stated herein are subject to change and/or final determination at the public hearings and meeting identified above. Specific maximum amounts expected per parcel or product type are as set forth in the Assessment Report.

The assessments may be prepaid in whole at any time, or in some instances in part, or may be paid in not more than thirty (30) annual installments subsequent to the issuance of debt to finance the improvements. These annual assessments are anticipated to be collected on the Clay County tax roll by the Tax Collector. Alternatively, the District may choose to directly collect and enforce these assessments. All affected property owners have the right to appear at the public hearings and the right to file written objections with the District within twenty (20) days of the publication of this notice. Notwithstanding the description of the Maximum Assessments herein, landowners will not have a payment obligation until the issuance of bonds, at which time the fixed assessment amounts securing those bonds, as well as a collection protocol, will be determined. The fixed assessment amounts will be determined at a public meeting, pursuant to a supplemental assessment resolution, engineer's report and assessment methodology, but will in no event exceed the Maximum Assessments noticed herein. Please note that the preceding statement only applies to capital (debt) assessments, and shall have no effect on the ability of the District to levy assessments and collect payments related to the operation and maintenance of the District.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CREEKVIEW COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT DECLARING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS; DESIGNATING THE NATURE AND LOCATION OF THE PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS; DECLARING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COST OF THE IMPROVEMENTS, THE PORTION TO BE PAID BY ASSESSMENTS, AND THE MANNER AND TIMING IN WHICH THE ASSESSMENTS ARE TO BE PAID; DESIGNATING THE LANDS UPON WHICH THE ASSESSMENTS SHALL BE LEVIED; PROVIDING FOR AN ASSESSMENT PLAT AND A PRELIMINARY ASSESSMENT ROLL; ADDRESSING THE SETTING OF PUBLIC HEARINGS; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION OF THIS RESOLUTION; AND ADDRESSING CONFLICTS, SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Creekview Community Development District ("District") was established by Ordinance 2021-20 as adopted by the Board of County Commissioners of Clay County, Florida, effective June 29, 2021, and is a local unit of special-purpose government organized and existing under and pursuant to Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, as amended, located entirely within Clay County, Florida; and

WHEREAS, the District is authorized by Chapter 190, *Florida Statutes*, to finance, fund, plan, establish, acquire, install, equip, operate, extend, or construct certain improvements, including but not limited to: transportation facilities, utility facilities, recreational facilities, and other infrastructure projects, and services necessitated by the development of, and serving lands within, the District; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors ("Board") of the District hereby determines to undertake, install, plan, establish, construct or reconstruct, enlarge or extend, equip, acquire, operate, and/or maintain the infrastructure improvements described in the District's *Capital Improvement Plan*, dated August 26, 2021, attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference ("CIP") and the improvements described therein, the "Improvements"; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the District to pay all or a portion of the cost of the Improvements by special assessments levied on benefited lands within the District pursuant to Chapters 170, 190 and 197, Florida Statutes ("Assessments"); and

WHEREAS, the District is empowered by Chapters 170, 190, and 197, Florida Statutes, to finance, fund, plan, establish, acquire, construct or reconstruct, enlarge or extend, equip, operate, and maintain the Improvements and to impose, levy and collect the Assessments; and

WHEREAS, this Resolution shall serve as the "resolution required to declare special assessments" contemplated by Section 170.03, Florida Statutes, for the assessment lien(s) levied against the property as described in Exhibits A and B that secure the Assessments.

WHEREAS, as set forth in the Master Special Assessment Methodology Report, dated August 27, 2021, attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by reference ("Assessment Report"), and on file at Wrathell, Hunt & Associates, LLC, 2300 Glades Road, suite 410W, Boca Raton, Florida 33431 ("District Records Office"), the District hereby finds and determines that:

- (i) benefits from the Improvements will accrue to the property improved,
- (ii) the amount of those benefits will exceed the amount of the Assessments, and
- (iii) the Assessments are fairly and reasonably allocated.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CREEKVIEW COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT:

1. AUTHORITY FOR THIS RESOLUTION; INCORPORATION OF RECITALS. This Resolution is adopted pursuant to the provisions of Florida law, including without limitation Chapters 170, 190, and 197, Florida Statutes. The recitals stated above are incorporated herein and are adopted by the Board as true and correct statements.

2. DECLARATION OF ASSESSMENTS. The Board hereby declares that it has determined to undertake all or a portion of the Improvements and to defray all or a portion of the cost thereof by the Assessments and is as set forth in the Assessment Report attached as Exhibit B.

3. DESIGNATING THE NATURE AND LOCATION OF IMPROVEMENTS. The nature and general location of, and plans and specifications for, the Improvements are described in Exhibit A and as set forth in the CIP, which is on file at the District Records Office. Exhibit B is also on file and available for public inspection at the same location.

4. DECLARING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COST OF THE IMPROVEMENTS, THE PORTION TO BE PAID BY ASSESSMENTS, AND THE MANNER AND TIMING IN WHICH THE ASSESSMENTS ARE TO BE PAID.

A. The total estimated construction cost of the Improvements is **\$90,549,000 ("Estimated Cost")**.

B. The Assessments will defray approximately \$115,325,000 which is the anticipated maximum par value of any bonds and which includes all or a portion of the Estimated Cost, as well as other financing-related costs, capitalized interest, and a debt service reserve as set forth in Exhibit B.

C. The manner in which the Assessments shall be apportioned and paid is set forth in the Assessment Report attached as Exhibit B, as may be modified by supplemental assessment resolutions. Commencing with the years in which the Assessments are certified for collection, the Assessments shall each be paid in not more than thirty (30) annual installments. The Assessments may be payable at the same time and in the same manner as are ad valorem taxes and collected pursuant to Chapter 197, *Florida Statutes*; provided, however, that in the event the uniform non-ad valorem assessment method of collecting the Assessments is not available to the District in any year, or if determined by the District to be in its best interest, the Assessments may be collected as is otherwise permitted by law, including but not limited to by direct bill. The decision to collect Assessments by any particular method – e.g., on the tax roll or by direct bill – does not mean that such method will be used to collect Assessments in future years, and the District reserves the right in its sole discretion to select collection methods in any given year, regardless of past practices.

5. DESIGNATING THE LANDS UPON WHICH THE ASSESSMENTS SHALL BE LEVIED. The Assessments shall be levied, within the District, on all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such Improvements or specially benefited thereby and further designated by the assessment plat hereinafter provided for.

6. ASSESSMENT PLAT. Pursuant to Section 170.04, *Florida Statutes*, there is on file, at the District Records Office, an assessment plat showing the area to be assessed, with certain plans and specifications describing the Improvements and the estimated cost of the Improvements, all of which are open to inspection by the public.

7. PRELIMINARY ASSESSMENT ROLL. Pursuant to Section 170.06, *Florida Statutes*, the District Manager has caused to be made a preliminary assessment roll, in accordance with the method of assessment described in Exhibit B hereto, which shows the lots and lands assessed, the amount of benefit to and the maximum assessment against each lot or parcel of land and the number of annual installments into which the assessment may be divided, which assessment roll is hereby adopted and approved as the District's preliminary assessment roll.

8. PUBLIC HEARINGS DECLARED; DIRECTION TO PROVIDE NOTICE OF THE HEARINGS. Pursuant to Sections 170.07 and 197.3632(4)(b), Florida Statutes, among other provisions of Florida law, there are hereby declared two (2) public hearings to be held as follows:

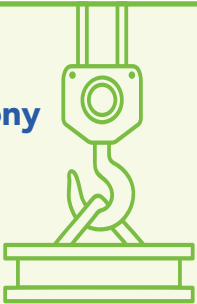
