School district continues to grapple with transportation challenges

CLAY COUNTY – The School District is not alone in having transportation challenges, but officials may entertain proposals to add incentives to recruit drivers.

Superintendent David Broskie, at last week's board meeting, said Clay County School District buses travel 7.7 million miles a year. He said the district is five bus drivers short of fully staffing its 155 routes, though the district would like to have a higher number of drivers due to absences. He said the State of Florida has a bus driver shortage of 1,882 employees.

"We would like to exceed our allocation," Broskie said. "The reality is, the positions aren't being filled. There's a nationwide shortage for people in transportation."

Broskie targeted a recruiting fair in December. He also said there are three incentives proposals to recruit drivers on the table for board members to review at an executive session.

"This is a tough issue," Broskie said.


"I'm confident we can tackle this issue."

About two weeks ago, Bannerman Learning Center students were told to stay home for four days due to bus challenges. During public comment, parent Patricia Shaffer said Bannerman students should not have had to encounter that problem. Shaffer said the district knew growth would explode and asked if transportation challenges could have been addressed in advance.

"The bussing and transportation issue is not going to go away. It's going to get worse," Shaffer said. "Please do something before we lose more drivers. It's unfair to them."

Parent Chanda Holsey has a child in elementary school and one child at a junior high. Holsey said her students' bus route was missed recently and she drove her child to school. She asked if the district or parents could form a carpool group and asked what the district is doing creatively to help families.

"What if there's a parent already at work?" Holsey said. "What if there's a par-

ent who doesn't have the transportation or their car's getting serviced, it could be anything."

Barbara Smith, a bus driver, said the district needs more drivers and an updated dispatch system. She said several areas in the county are rapidly growing and drivers have to deal with doubling up routes, less time for training and language barriers. Smith said there are issues communicating with schools after dismissal and drivers have to prevent students from riding on unassigned buses with friends.

"Believe me, we are doing our utmost best to serve our community," Smith said.

Lonnie Roberts, Clay Educational Staff Professionals Association President, said employees are being asked to do the responsibilities of multiple jobs and a fix needs to be in place sooner rather than later. He referenced the rising cost of gas and other costs besetting the district.

"Just be mindful of your support staff," Roberts said. "People are working the best they can."

Kissimmee lawmaker pushes back on transgender sports ban

Central Florida lawmaker is bringing back one of the last Session's most contentious issues with the hope her colleagues will realize excluding transgender students from girls' athletics could draw an economic penalty.

Democratic Rep. Kristen Aston Arrington of Kissimmee last month filed a companion bill (HB 6065) to Sen. Gary Farmer's SB 212, which seeks to repeal last year's legislation regarding transgender athletes. That law, passed largely along party lines last Session, means athletes are eligible for sports teams based on the gender listed on birth certificates at

or near the time of birth. So transgender girls and women are banned from girls' or women's teams.


Equality Florida Executive Director Nadine Smith argues transgender bans are unfair to boys who want to play against girls. She said in March the state may pay a price for not repealing the ban.

"Simply put: lawmakers in Florida are putting the state's economy at risk right alongside the health and well-being of transgender kids in a move that puts political pandering ahead of the welfare of children."

LBGTQ advocates regard the law as stigmatizing those who identify with a gender other than the one assigned at birth. Still, eight other states have passed similar laws: Alabama, Arkansas, Idaho, Mississippi, Montana, Tennessee, Texas and West Virginia. In South Dakota, Gov. Kristi Noem signed an executive order banning transgender girls and women from participating on girls' or women's teams.

Arrington said she heard some corporations might be willing to show states passing these laws consequences, such as what North Carolina suffered in 2017 for its "bathroom bill." That year, Bruce Springsteen and other performers canceled concerts and the NCAA canceled its championship game there after a new law banned transgender people from using bathrooms

Kyle Larson finishes first after getting a second chance

yle Larson is a deserving NAS-CAR champion.

Few have been more dominant in a brutally long 10-month season. Ten victories and 2,581 laps led – the most since the inception

of the 36-race season – are important footnotes in a championship that will be defined by so much more than a fast car.

A perfect pit stop at the Phoenix Raceway Sunday

catapulted Larson Don Coble

from fourth to first with 28 laps remaining. With that advantage, he did what he's done all year – run away from the field. Sunday's win said a lot about racing and race. And while he's never deflected blame for making a racial slur during a live stream of a virtual race last year, he's worked tirelessly since to be a better person.

Banished by NASCAR after only four races in 2020, Larson earned a second chance by growing past his indiscretion, and he did it with the backdrop of one of the most difficult times in American history when racial and cultural divisions ran deep.

Larson put himself above all that. He started a foundation to help families in need. He wanted to become a role model for children from all different backgrounds. His "Drive for 5" program started with \$500,000 of his own money, and he vowed to chip in \$5 for every lap led and \$5,000 for every top-10 finish.

That added up to \$612,905.

In addition, Larson became a volunteer with the Urban Youth Racing School, which encourages STEM-related careers for children in the Philadelphia area.

But most important, Larson taught everyone there is value in redemption. Hundreds of families and children now are served because Larson chose to mature emotionally and spiritually.

Now his message will be delivered from the championship pulpit.

"Eighteen months ago, I didn't think that I was ever going to be in a Cup car again. Strapping in for the Daytona 500 didn't even seem real, let alone winning the championship," he said.

"No, it's definitely been a journey, a roller coaster. But I'm very thankful for

consistent with their gender identity. Estimates put the state's economic losses at \$3.76 billion as a result of the ban. The law has since been repealed.

"Bills that fly in the face of inclusion and empowerment for all young people are bound to draw the ire of organizations committed to encouraging equitable participation," Smith told For FloridaPolitics.com in March. "Their boycott of championships in North Carolina following the disastrous 'bathroom' bill torched the state's economy and marred its reputation."

Arrington doesn't want that to happen in Florida

Last year, Arrington said, "big business didn't weigh in. My hope is that if we bring some attention to the ban, more companies will speak up and people will realize why this is a bad idea.'

The same legislation has been introduced in many other state Legislatures, but hasn't passed.

Last Session, the ban came back from the near-dead after a last-minute amendment. Impassioned debate ensued. Republican Sen. Gayle Harrell left the Senate floor in tears during discussion. She later crossed party lines to vote against the amendment.

Arrington said there is scant evidence female athletes have been deprived of fair opportunities to compete because of transgender athletes.

"There is no need for this legislation," she said.

The bill is now in the Secondary Education and Career Development Subcommittee.

my second chance and every opportunity I've been given in these last 18 months.

Life is a crazy thing, and you've just got to stay positive through it all, and everything will hopefully work out for you."

The enormity of his comeback hit him before the race started. He cried before driver introductions, during the pre-race ride-around and during his warm-up laps. By the time he crossed the finish line, he was a mess.

"With the pressure of this race and evervthing that was on the line, to win this championship - every one of these fans made me feel it," he said. "I was trying to tell myself to just chill out, stop tearing up. I make fun of my dad all the time for crying, and I'm worse than he is.

"But [Sunday] was more tears than normal, I think, just because of the significance of the event, of the journey that it took to get here."

Larson was lucky. Most, no matter how talented, don't get a do-over. Car owner Rick Hendrick was one of the few with the resources, compassion and influence to bring Larson back. Hendrick found sponsorship for 12 of 36 regular-season races, so he filled the void by putting his own HendrickCars.com sponsorship stickers on the car.

"I never thought I was taking a risk. I mean, I know how good he is," Hendrick said. "I'm just fortunate we were able to

get him, and man, what a wheelman he is. Ten races won, 11 with the all-star race. It's unbelievable.'

The championship is just a part of the celebration. He watched Larson grow into a person who inspired change and growth. He watched him become a winner - both on and off the track.

"You know, the more I was around Kyle, the more I appreciated the kind of person he was in and all the things he was doing out in charity," Hendrick said. "I think last week or the week before, he visited three food banks and gave out a ton of money.

"I got to know the person. I knew the racer but got to spending time with him and his family and how dedicated he was to doing the right thing. He's done everything he could to get back into the sport and [being] something we're all proud of - and he's proud of.

He's been more talented than I thought he was, and he's been an unbelievable person. He's got a big heart, and he's done a lot of things that nobody in here knows about. He doesn't try to get publicity, and he's just a good human being, and he's got a tremendous amount of talent.

An inordinate amount of talent.

During his break from NASCAR, he won 46 dirt races, including the prestigious Chili Bowl. Tony Stewart, who knows what it takes to be a champion, has been Larson's biggest fan. On Sunday, he called Larson the "best race car driver I've ever seen.'

And a deserving NASCAR champion.

Board wants 'School R' to be called Spring Park Elementary

FLEMING ISLAND – At last week's board meeting, Clay County School District board members selected Spring Park Elementary School as the name for the new elementary school near County Road 315.

A 15-person naming committee presented the board with three names: the Spring Park Minnows, the Magnolia Mills Owls and the Black Creek Trails Ramblers. Board member Ashley Gilhousen motioned to go with a combination, Spring Park Owls, which was approved unanimously.

"We'll keep [Black Creek Trails] on the

back burner for when we build a school over there." Gilhousen said.

The district wants the K-6 school to open by the 2023-2024 school year. The school, near Green Cove Springs, will have the capacity for more than 850 students and alleviate capacity issues at nearby R.M. Patterson and Charles E. Bennett elementaries. The school has been referred to as "School R.'

The committee consisted of school district officials, principals, teachers, members of School Advisory Councils and community members who met numerous times, according to district documents. Board member Mary Bolla said new schools built can use the other names. She said Spring Park is one of the main parks for children in the area and is identifiable.

"I would have assumed many of them have been there," Bolla said.

Bolla said the school was equally located near Magnolia Mills, Spring Park and Black Creek. Each name carries weight, she added. "We could go with all three of these," she said. "It's at the backdoor of Magnolia. It's near Black Creek and it's near Spring Park."

Board member Janice Kerekes said she wanted more options but thanked the naming committee for a hard task. She emphasized the school's name had to be related to Green Cove Springs, Board member Tina Bullock liked the Black Creek Trails name, but that area is more associated with Middleburg. she said. Board member Beth Clark, who was elected in 2020, said naming and overseeing the construction of a new school is special. Clark added she was surprised the district didn't have owls as an elementary school mascot yet. Bolla and other board members joked they were appreciative that Rosemary Hill wasn't a choice due to the landfill of the same name. "We now have a new school, no longer 'School R,'" Bolla said after the vote.

County commission legislative priorities ready to push ahead

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Through the county's three elected legislators, the Board of County Commissioners is targeting expanding the Clay County Jail, improving broadband and establishing a juvenile justice program.

At a workshop last week county commissioners decided to establish legislative up items: improvements to Wells Road and

priorities for \$10 million for a jail expansion, \$5 million to bolster broadband infrastructure and \$250.000 for a Sheriff's Work Ethics and Training program. The formal approval was pushed to a Nov. 23 BCC meet-John Mobley

ing, which would give

staff the time to create a printed card of the priorities to pass to legislators.

Commissioners also created four back-

Blanding Boulevard, water and drainage projects, funding for greenways and trails and upgrading barns at the Clay County Fairgrounds.

Assistant County Manager Troy Nagle said implementing broadband improvements statewide will not have one solution. He said county staff would present the BCC with options for projects to increase the county's broadband capabilities.

"It's going to have to be at the local level saying, 'Here's how we solved the problem here,' as opposed to running wire all over the state which isn't feasible," Nagle said.

County Manager Howard Wanamaker said the appropriations and policies discussed are not new. He said the Capital Improvement Plan and American Rescue Plan Act funding list served as a roadmap. He added the workshop last week was to narrow the list of appropriations and ask commissioners what bills staff should track.

Lobbyist Joe Mobley of the Fiorentino Group said projected revenues for appropriations are higher than usual. He said the state could pay police officers a bonus like what Gov. Ron DeSantis did it for teachers last year.

'There is certainly money and we should be ambitious this year," Mobley said.



Clay County Commissioners officials salute veterans

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — To kick off a board meeting Tuesday, the Clay County Board of County Commissioners held a Veterans Day ceremony recognizing service members within the organization, the county and country.

instead of the 364.7-acre property being used for more housing inside the gated neighborhood.

"I am, myself, a golf player," Shao said after meeting with about 100 residents. "I have some friends that live in the same community. I went down and visited them, and I saw a huge potential there, plus the clubhouse property. All together I have a combination plan to not only restore the golf course."

The property currently is owned by 121 Financial Credit Union. It obtained it after the club's original owners, Shasta Michelle and James Anthony Price of Johnstown, Ohio, lost it in foreclosure in 2020. It was placed for auction and 121 Financial, which already won a \$1.399 million judgment against the Prices and bought it for \$75,100 on Oct. 27, 2020, according to records at the Clay County Property Appraiser's Office.

The bank said months ago it would entertain offers to sell the land. Officials at 121 Financial, however, have yet to settle on a buyer.

The tax appraiser's office said the land was worth \$920,530 and the clubhouse, which has fallen into disrepair, is worth \$567,986 for a combined worth of \$1.489 million.

Shao met with residents in the country



club to show them what he has planned. The course will need to be completely overhauled, and he said he wants to spend about \$800,000 to expand the clubhouse's ballroom to make it a popular location for larger affairs.

Without community support, Shao said he wouldn't have made an offer of \$1.2 million last August.

"It looks like not only the greens need to be restored, the entire golf course, [364] acres, is almost damaged. Small trees couldn't even grow after two years of being abandoned," Shao said. "I realize the risk."

Shao said he expects to spend at least \$2 million rebuilding the 18-hole golf course. He also told the homeowner's association he wouldn't ask for fees from nonmembers, he would offer a variety of membership packages to fit a family's needs, and the course would move from private to semi-private to increase cash flow with additional rounds and special events. He also said he hopes to build as many as 50 homes on a new proposed street adjacent to the course that wouldn't affect current residential sightlines or play on the course. The houses would help him offset his upfront costs, he said.

Shao said he had to extend his offer last Sunday, Nov. 7, to keep his proposal current.

"So, right now it is a waiting game," Shao said. "There's nothing else I can do from my side."

Messages left with 121 Financial weren't returned. However, Chief Operating Officer Paul Blackstone met with the homeowner's association during its September meeting to explain his financial institution's position.

The homeowner's association made an \$800,000 offer that quickly was rejected by 121 Financial, Blackstone said.

He told them it had at least three other offers ranging between \$1 million and \$1.2

million. He also said all three developers had an interest in building new homes.

Shao apparently was the only of the three who expressed an interest in reviving the golf course.

The homeowners no longer have an offer to buy the property.

Blackstone told residents during their September homeowner's meeting 121 Financial wasn't in a hurry to make a decision since costs, including a current tax bill of \$23,213,26, were already calculated in this year's budget.

The land could be redeveloped for as many as 300 new homes, but that would require a second entrance into the community. That would require purchasing additional land, rezoning from the county and considerable opposition from current residents.

"All I can do is wait," Shao said.

Along with the rest of the residents inside the country club community.

Brandon is credentialed with the Veterans Administration. Florida Department of Veterans Affairs and Disabled American Veterans for Compensation and Pension Claims. He is also a certified Military Veterans Benefits Counselor and a National Career Coach, according to a county press release.

The last three years in the army led him to prepare soldiers for deployment at Camp Blanding.

"I went, that sounds great to me, and I fell in love with the place," Brandon said. "You grow roots and stay."

It's normal for some veterans to go to Duval or Alachua counties for assistance, but now they can seek help locally at the VA Clinic in Middleburg or by visiting Brandon.

"You don't have to leave Clay County to find something we have right here," Brandon said.

A veterans' services officer can file claims or direct veterans to resources. Whether the veteran is newly retired or has been retired for decades, Brandon said his goal is to let them know what benefits or educational opportunities they can receive.

"I want my fellow veterans to know I'm enthusiastic to be my own county's VSO and I'm motivated about being here. There's a

whole lot of knowledge to give to veterans," he said. "The status of an injury can change. When vets come in here to see me, it's not just one time. I say if it gets worse come see me.'

At the end of a service member's active duty, they complete a course about claiming benefits and adjusting to post-military life. Brandon said things fall through the cracks because leaving the military is a time-consuming process in itself.

"When they arrive back in their community, they get off the plane, come back to Clay County and think, 'Wow, what was it they said in class?" Brandon said. "The first stop should be the veterans' services officer."

Board of County Commissioners Chairman Mike Cella said Brandon brought a wealth of knowledge and experience to the county.

"... We are pleased to have him on board," Cella said. "We know he will provide an excellent level of service to local veterans and their dependents seeking assistance."

More than 30,000 veterans call Clay County home. Brandon notes he's the only veterans' services officer in Clay County, while Jacksonville has six.

"The biggest thing we're wanting to do now is proving the need for an additional VSO in the county," he said.

Setting the stage ounty Charter Review Committee priming topics for 2022

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Every four years Clay County's charter can be altered and the 2021-2022 session will have no shortage of topics.

A 15-member citizen panel, which met last week, is responsible for bringing forth alterations to the charter. The last time the Charter Review Committee met was 2017-2018.

An early discussion point, brought forward by Chairman Bo Norton, was if the Board of County Commissioners should remain at five members. Committee member Mitch Timberlake also wanted a review of county commissioner and constitutional officer term limits.

"I think it's worth reevaluating whether they're effective or useful," Timberlake said of county commission term limits.

Another topic is a potential change to Clay County commissioner salaries, a change that would require a majority vote in a general election. Voters shot down an

increase in 2018. Commissioners currently make \$37,500.

The committee members were presented with 19 other charter counties and their commissioner salaries. The closest population comparisons to Clay's 219,000 people were Charlotte County's 187,000 people and Alachua County's 271,000 people. Charlotte County's commissioners make \$37,580 and Alachua County's commissioners earn \$54,317.

Committee member Randy Gillis wanted board members in future cycles to receive a turnover file, listing changes previous committees have made. Gillis said there's a wealth of knowledge in decisions brought before previous committees and it should be built into maintaining the charter. Gillis and other committee members also wanted to discuss a Citizen's Bill of Rights.

"I would like to set the stage for evervbody who follows to have some sort of booklet or background material," Gillis said.

Committee member David Theus want-

ed acknowledgment of Clay County being a 2nd Amendment-friendly in the charter, referring to a late 2019 resolution passed by the BOCC affirming residents' 2nd Amendment rights.

"I would at least like to converse on the weight of the resolution vs. should it be included in the charter as far as our support of the 2nd Amendment," Theus said.

The last item was the legal counsel for the committee. The committee agreed

to reach out to several local and out-ofcounty attorneys and unanimously passed a motion to allow legal representation to use video conferencing. Committee members also wanted to know how much was spent by previous committees to establish a frame of reference.

Parents sound off as CCSD clears first Oakleaf rezoning hurdle

FLEMING ISLAND - Parents voiced concerns regarding a Clay County School District rezoning measure that would move hundreds of students from Oakleaf to Orange Park schools.

The district is moving 452 students from Oakleaf High, which is at 108% capacity, to Orange Park. Ridgeview High also is set to receive 54 students from OHS. There are also about 200 students that will transition from Oakleaf Junior High to Orange Park Junior High. If approved, the changes would take place for the 2022-2023 school year.

At last week's board meeting, board members unanimously approved to advertise the boundary changes and a public hearing is set for early December. Dozens of people attended community meetings last month.

Most of the areas changing zoning are in Argyle Forest. The district stated there are more than 10 communities planned for Oakleaf, necessitating moving some students to Orange Park, which is at 65%capacity.


Parent Paula Mason said one of her children was in OHS' first graduating class in 2010 and another child graduated recently. Mason said she moved to the area for the high school. Her youngest child is a ninth-grader and Mason remarked switching to OPHS could lead to fewer programs for the student.

"That's their school," Mason said. "It's our neighborhood school and it's always been our neighborhood school.'

Adam Warren said he currently had one student in Oakleaf Junior-High and three in Argyle Elementary. Warren said he was concerned about traffic and transportation issues, and he felt parents were forced to send their children to an unsafe environment

"As a parent, it's our job to protect our kids at all costs," Warren said.

Travel times to reach Orange Park High, which is on Kingsley Avenue and Blanding Boulevard, was another talking point. It was an additional six-to-eight miles to

drive for most of the Argyle parents who spoke. Jessica Horne's child attends Oakleaf Junior-High and the student planned to attend OHS.

"These parents and students are a part

of the Oakleaf community," Horne said.

Board member Mary Bolla's district lies in Oakleaf, and she has fielded calls and emails pertaining to the issue. Bolla attended the opening of Argyle Elementary

more than 15 years ago. The district will go through cycles in rezoning students, she said, and there isn't an easy answer.

"It is a growing pain," Bolla said. "It is painful, and as I said, it's breaking my heart."

Board member Ashley Gilhousen said there is a serious capacity issue at Oakleaf and the district had to fix it. She said the district didn't take the decision lightly.

"No matter who is affected by this, they're going to be upset whether it's your neighborhood or another," Gilhousen said.


Board member Beth Clark said Orange Park Junior-High and OPHS have new principals and parents should give them a chance. Board member Janice Kerekes asked if there were changes the district could make to the boundaries.

"I know staff really looked hard and close at it," Kerekes said. "I understand families are being uprooted from the community that's their home."

Oakleaf High has about 2,700 students. That figure is difficult to track, board member and former principal Tina Bullock said.

That makes it really hard for the administration and managing those kinds of things," Bullock added. "We talk about class size, but school size is a critical thing in my opinion, too."

County prepares for massive adoption of 266 rescued animals

517 residents sign up to take home a pet this weekend that were 'mistreated' at Old Jennings Road home

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Most of the 266 animals brought to the Clay County Agriculture Fairgrounds on Oct. 11 were hungry, thirsty, covered in fleas, filthy and in dire need of medical attention.

Nearly two months after they were rescued from a one-acre home on Old Jennings Road, they will be sent to loving homes this Saturday and Sunday from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

The county approved 517 applications from residents who want to adopt the dogs, pigs, goats, rabbits, chickens, trutles and other birds that were "mistreated" and kept in small pens on the dilapidated property. There was such an outcry of support following the raid, Emergency Management Director John Ward said a lotterylike system was used to determine when residents will be allowed to come to the fairgrounds to pick out a new pet.

"We turned over the applications to the county auditor and they will assign a date and time for the adoption," Ward said. "It's all being done randomly. There are so many people who want to help, but a lot of them are going to go home empty-handed."

Within days of arriving at the fairgrounds, residents and businesses inundated the fairgrounds with food, leashes, collars, shampoo, blankets and treats. The response was so overwhelming, within days the county had to stop accepting the donations.

Jennifer Michelle Wilkie was given an opportunity to convince a Clay County judge the animals should be returned to her property, but she failed to appear to

answer the county's lawsuit on Oct. 21. Judge Timothy R. Collins not only took custody of the animals away from her, Collins said she also was responsible for all costs related to the recovery and care of the animals and she was banned from owning animals in the future.

According to records at the Clerk of Courts office, the case is now closed. Added with the improved health of the animals, the adoption process will be competed "in the next couple weeks," Ward said.

More than 200 of the applicants were interested in adopting the livestock animals, Ward said.

Once applicants were given an appointment number, they will be escorted through the livestock area where they can pick out one animal. Adoptions will be restricted to one animal for each address, Ward said. Each adoption will include the health needs of the animal, and new owners must agree to the possible challenges and future care. As many as 80 dogs need dental care, a veterinarian told the judge.

And since there was so donated, new pet owners will be able to take home a "goody bag" of supplies. Leftover supplies will be sent to the county's animal shelter to replenish what was needed immediately after they were rescued.

"One thing everyone needs to know is you must have an appointment to adopt one of the animals," Ward said.

County officials accepted appointment applications for three days last week. Each applicant was required to assure officials they are zoned to own pets. And if they've ever surrendered an animal to a shelter,

they were required to offer an explanation.

Ward told the Board of County Commissioners on Tuesday registrants who didn't receive a timeslot were encouraged to monitor the county's social media to see if any animals were not adopted.

We were trying to do it as controlled and organized as possible," Ward said.

Ward told commissioners he's fielded calls from the state and has been told this is the largest animal seizure managed by a local government. County Manager Howard Wanamaker said the process was gru-


thrilled for a trip to Walt Disney World to perform but going to London for one of the world's largest New Year's Day celebrations, will be the trip of a lifetime.

Sophomore Chau Tran has traveled internationally, but primarily to Asia. This will be her first trip to Europe, she said.



Middleburg Church of God thriving behind the Jordans





Schools rally around Clay's classmate Hunter Burke

MIDDLEBURG – Hunter Burke is just a normal sixth-grade student at Clay Charter Academy. To look at him, no one would suspect that just a few short months ago, he was in Diabetic Ketoacidosis with a blood glucose level of more than 500.

Burke is the son of Hannah and John Burke. Hannah is a sixth and seventhgrade science teacher and John is active-duty Navy who was nearing the end of a 305-day deployment when he got the news that Hunter was being admitted to Wolfson's Children's Hospital and that he was one of the 40,000 people diagnosed each year in the United States with Type 1 Diabetes. Type 1 Diabetes is an autoimmune disease unrelated to

Donations accepted but not expected. diet or lifestyle and can strike at any age – even adults. Burke, who was diagnosed with Autism at 2, has always had a fear of needles. It took five people to hold him down just to get the pin-prick to check his blood sugar levels. Now, he takes an average of 10 shots a day to stay alive and must count every carbohydrate he eats to survive.

"Hunter had many symptoms of Type 1 Diabetes, but because we have no family background with the disease, it went unnoticed," said his mother. "He was just at the end of his fifth-grade year during the pandemic, his father was deployed, and we were still dealing with his Autism. It was a challenging time to say the least."

According to the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, Type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune disease where the pancreas stops producing insulin, which is a hormone that allows the body to get energy from food. Symptoms include frequent urination, extreme thirst, dry mouth, fatigue and weakness, increased appetite, unexplained weight loss and slow-healing cuts.

Now Hunter has started his first year in middle school and while trying to navigate being in advanced classes he is having to struggle with keeping his blood glucose in range so that he can stay alive. After the diagnosis of Type one diabetes which is an auto-immune disease Hunter returned to full in Person learning and continues to get A/B Honor Roll. His classmates, and in fact, his entire school will hold a fundraiser to raise money for JDRF as well as raise awareness of the disease. The kick-off was Nov. 1 on Facebook Live at Clav Charter Academy, located at 1417 Red Apple Road in Middleburg featuring principal Brian Gifford. He talked about the school's fund-raising efforts and promote friendly competition with its sister school, Duval Charter School at Westside. "Our students will participate in activities throughout the entire month of November," said Clay Charter Principal Brian Gifford. "From raising funds to dress down days and a Diabetes Walk, our students will gain a first-hand knowledge of what one of their peers and teachers is going through while helping the greater cause that affects so many children and adults."

FLEMING ISLAND - Two-way star Jhace Edward dominated on both sides of the ball, scoring 30 points as host Fleming Island gave itself a chance at a Class 7A playoff berth with a 49-34 win over Oakleaf on Nov. 6.

Edward ran for four touchdowns and three two-point conversions as a wildcat guarterback and had three tackles for loss and an interception in the red zone from his inside linebacker position. The junior was on the field for 90 of the game's 126 plays from scrimmage, but said he was never tired.

Indians perfect season ends; playoffs next

GAINESVILLE - After nine straight wins over 10 weeks, the Keystone Heights High School football team had an opportunity to make Indian football program history by having a perfect season. In their season finale, on the road at P.K. Yonge in Gainesville, the Indians finally met an opponent they couldn't beat. The Indians figured out they found a way to beat themselves as the perfect season ended with a 33-14 loss Friday night.

"We are a ball control team. We slowly and methodically try to score," said Keystone Head Coach Chuck Dickinson. "We tackled poorly in the first half. We turned the ball over one time all year. Tonight, we turned the ball over four times."

With a heap of penalties and the turnovers, the Indians beat themselves as the Blue Wave stayed true to their script of an air heavy attack and ran up the first half score 27-0 on their way to a bruising 33-14 defeat of the Indians.

Things seemed to start off fine for Keystone Heights as they won the toss and as they like to do, took the ball first to try and deliver a gut punch with the first points. On the drive, the team drove the ball to the 20 yard line and faced a fourth down and five yards to go. Off a timeout, Dickinson dialed up a curveball with a Conner Guy pass over the middle that was incomplete,

turning the ball over to the Blue Wave. The Blue Wave took the next 3:30 to work the ball 80 yards, highlighted by quarterback Aaron Small Jr. connecting with his go-to receivers Cameron Pedro and Jaren Hamilton, to go up 7-0. The Small-Pedro-Hamilton connection would wreak havoc all night.

The first half onslaught would continue each time the Bluewave had the ball. It wasn't fancy tricks, or misdirection. Just

uncharacteristic Indian bad play that resurfaced over and over.

"We just had people missing tackles; we took bad angles and we missed," said Dickinson, who will open with Umatilla in the region 2-4A playoffs on November 12. "Our defense funnels things to one guy, and if he misses, it hurts you."

Keystone Heights had to overcome numerous self-inflicted wounds, like a snap that went several feet over punter Jerremy Miller's head. Miller made an amazing recovery, found an inch of open real estate and was able to get a rugby kick off to move the ball.

Along with the four turnovers, the Indians fumbled and recovered the ball three times in the first half. Asked about the 15 to 30 mile per hour winds, constant rain, and brief downpours, Dickinson said "the weather really didn't cause the issues. We played in worse weather this season."

At the half, the coaches harped on putting the first half in the rearview mirror and winning the second half. Whatever woes struck the team off the bus, were left in the first half as Keystone Heights looked like a different team in the second half. "We told the kids we have to keep doing what we do. Go out and pound the ball," said Dickinson.

The second half started good for the Indians as they stopped the Blue Wave and finally forced a punt. From their own 43 yard line, Keystone Heights would again hurt themselves by fumbling and turning the ball over. After the Blue Wave burning half the quarter off the clock, the Indians finally had another little victory as the ball went back to the Indians on downs. The teams would volley possessions, and while Keystone could not find the endzone, the Blue Wave were not scoring either. "In the second half, we did so much better. That is attributed to our offense. They were able to grind it out and get some yards, keeping our defense fresher." The hard work finally paid off when Kade Sanders slipped several tackles on the right side of the line and bulled his way into the endzone to put the first Indian points on the board with 6:07 left to play. Sanders had his number called again for the 2-point conversion to make the score 27-8.

Never laying down, the Indians continued to play wrecking ball and forced a fumble and recovery on the first Blue Wave offensive play of the return drive. Pounding the ball, Keystone Heights running black Jackson Williams went to the other side of the Blue Wave defense, finding enough daylight on the left side to get the corner of the endzone, scoring at 2:45 left to play, 27-14. The pass attempt for two-point conversion was no good. Small would add another Blue Wave score on a single play quarterback keeper, 33-14.

"We'll look at this film for mistakes. We told our kids forget this game," said Dickinson. "We have a playoff game to play, and we have to get ready for that. We have a chance to make Keystone history. We never had a team win in a playoff game. I'm so proud the way they fought back after we told them in the second half, it's zero, zero, and we won the second half."

formation featured a wingback behind each tackle, with a fullback lined up next to Edward in the shotgun. Both wingbacks and the fullback would plow through the gap between the guard and the tackle, with Edward following behind them.

"We took a play from Bartram [Trail] that we had seen on film," said Springs, referring to the Bears' 49-33 win over Oakleaf on October 22. "We were able to get three blockers on one linebacker."

Oakleaf nose guard Akeem Neal recovered a botched handoff on the first play from scrimmage, but Edward erased the turnover with an interception at the Golden Eagles' 13 yard line.

The theft led to Edward's first touchdown, a leap over a mass of humanity from one yard out that gave Fleming Island a 6-0 lead four minutes into the game. Edward's second touchdown came after Isaiah "Shevy" Shevchook had pulled Oakleaf to within 19-17 in the final seconds of the first half with a one yard plunge. Seeing that the Knights had shifted an outside linebacker to the inside to stop Edwards from running between the guard and the tackle, Springs began sending Edward and his convoy of blockers outside, leading Edward around the end. Edward swept left from 14 yards out to put Fleming Island ahead 25-17, then ran the same play for an easy two-point conversion to extend the lead to 27-17. When the Knights scored touchdowns on two consecutive drives in the fourth quarter, Edward kept them at bay with touchdown runs of 16 and six yards. He followed up each of those scores with a two-point conversion run.

There was drama after Oakleaf freshman Carlos Witherup scored on a 12 yard run to bring the Knights to within 41-34 with four minutes remaining in the game. Drew Ammon dribbled an onside kick straight down the middle of the field. Fleming Island's Dedric Walker stood his ground and caught the ball on a bounce as three Knights, including Ammon, converged on him. Jones was knocked to the ground as the three Knights tried to pry the ball loose. Jones handed the ball to the officials, who ruled that he had maintained possession. Oakleaf players drew four unsportsmanlike conduct penalties for protesting the call. The resulting markoff of 46 yards brought the ball to the Oakleaf six yard line. On the next play, Edward swept left behind his convoy of blockers and easily sped to the corner of the end zone for the game-clinching score. He ran the same play for a two-point conversion, providing for the final margin with 3:14 remaining.

"Our behavior was not representative of who we are," said Oakleaf head coach Frank Garis, who thought that the Knights had recovered the ball. "We cannot let it snowball like that."

Jones described the play this way: "I saw the ball, I stepped up, caught it and just hugged itl. Then I said to myself, 'Gotta hold onto the ball.'"

Fleming Island dominated the line of scrimmage despite the fact that the Golden Eagles play two freshmen and two sophomores in their six-man defensive line rotation. Freshmen Demhir Jackson (who doubled as Edward's blocking back on offense) and Khalil Matthews and sophomores Joey Couch and Braden Cunningham, along with senior Ricky Joseph, harassed Knights' quarterback Drew Ammon all evening and bottled up Oakleaf's potent running game. Ammon completed only 10 of 33 passes, often throwing balls away to avoid being sacked. Oakleaf averaged only 2.8 yards on 38 rushing attempts.

"I was proud of them," Springs said of his young linemen. "Jackson has a high motor; he is always attacking."

Meanwhile, the Golden Eagles ran for 277 yards, averaging 6.3 yards per rush. Edward finished with 83 yards on 14 carries. He was complemented by the shifty running of sophomore running back Cartavion Valentine, who ran 15 times for 98 yards. Springs likened Valentine to firststring running back Sam Singleton, who sat out the game due to concussion protocols.

"Cartavion is Sam 2.0," said Springs. "Like Sam, he is speedy and can take it to the house, and he is a lot stronger than he looks."

Musthafa Marshall chipped in with 56 yards and a touchdown. Springs said that the Golden Eagles' game plan was to pound the Knights with the running game.

"We knew from film that we could run the ball on their defense, and we wanted to run it down their throats," he said.

Fleming Island quarterback Cibastian Broughton did not throw often, but was very effective when he did. The freshman completed four of six throws for 115 yards, including two long touchdown passes to junior Brenden Cook. He also converted a third and 10 from midfield with a 12 yard scramble in the fourth quarter when the Golden Eagles were clinging to just a 33-27 lead. Edward scored later in the drive. "You can tell that some guys have 'it,'" Springs said. "He's got 'it,' and he is the future."

Fleming Island finishes the regular season with a 6-4 record, having finished third in District 3-7A. Their playoff chances lie with securing an at-large bid due to their power ranking.

"I am not worried about the playoffs," said Springs, whose Golden Eagles won five of their last six games after a 1-3 start. "If we get that call, we will be ready. It just feels really good to see the guys come together and play like we knew they could play all year."

Shevchook and Witherup, who led Oakleaf with 69 yards on 23 carries, each scored two rushing touchdowns for the Knights. Junior Taylor Bradshaw led all receivers with six catches for 106 yards, and Ammon was two for two on field goal attempts. Ridgeview returned to Orange Park after losing 3-1 Saturday afternoon in the region final against Mosley with Henry intent on keeping the throttle at full tilt after few days of easy breathing.

"The long drive home, my brain was already thinking of ways to improve for next year," said Henry. "This year, I wasn't really sure what to expect being head of a program, but now the picture is much clearer."

In the run to the region final, Ridgeview beat Arnold, 25-13, 25-13, 25-12 in dominant fashion led by senior Elaina Reynolds




