

District 4 incumbent vies for another commission term

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – A Clay County Commissioner with more than a year's experience already, is seeking her first four-year term representing the western and southern portions of the county.

Betsy Condon, a Republican, won a special election in 2020 to serve the final

two years of Gavin Rollins' term, meaning she has the potential for two four-year terms. Condon, a businesswoman and former Clay County School District board member, said she wants to keep the momentum going. An opponent is yet to file against Condon.

Condon said her three main priorities are improving broadband in the county, maintaining roads and the completion of the county's lake projects.

"I want to see these things come to fruition" she said

Condon said she was pleased that county staff is reviewing the broadband Request For Proposal to establish a provider and there should be an award soon.

In the coming months, the county anticipates results from its comprehensive road study and Condon said she's championed regular maintenance of roads, rather than only paving dirt roads.

"The Comprehensive Road Plan is for all road needs," she added.

The St. Johns Water Management District's Black Creek Restoration project, which would move about 10 million gallons of water from Black Creek to the depleted Lake Brooklyn in Keystone Heights, is expected to begin construction this summer.

Condon said her district possesses a large number of natural resources in the county with three state forests and other waterways.

"There's three state forests in our district, as well as Camp Blanding and all of the waterways from Keystone Heights to Black Creek," Condon said. "It has a lot of agricultural areas as well."

As the growth comes, Condon added, it isn't as simple as erecting a gate around the county. The growth has to be planned, structured and smart, she said.

"I think it really is a transition for us. We're moving from a small town situated to a suburban-type county," Condon said. "It's about maintaining and protecting the rural way of life, while accommodating the smart growth of the county. It's going to be a balancing act."

Science Fair participants ask the tough questions

Winners to be announced at awards ceremony on Feb. 8

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Students addressed the problems of today and tomorrow at Tuesday's Clay County State Science

Across more than 40 tables at the Clay County Fairgrounds Exhibit Hall, students from 6th-12th grade planted their poster boards and went over their methods with judges. The students tackled mechanical problems, ecology, biology, sound and the Solar System.

Ridgeview High 10th graders Benjamin Lohse, Nathan Bartholomew and Alexander Gordon created an algorithm to improve the accuracy of an autonomous robot's movements.

Lohse said people hit their brakes before they reach a red light and their project was to establish when and how hard a robot can stop


"The solution we came up with is motion profiling, essentially you create a map of the robot's motion using the maximum acceleration, velocity and jerk," Lohse said

Bartholomew said the robot follows a graph and goes through a series of adjustments.

"We did find our algorithm to work and we wrote it in such a way you can apply it in different scenarios," Bartholomew said. "Self-driving cars are a good example of how motion profiling is being used in the modern-day."

Discovery Oaks Elementary sixth grader Julia Logan's project explored the possibility of maintaining life on Venus. She created models of a dome supporting plant and animal life. Water and air would have to be recycled, she said.

"Basically, my final takeaway is that planets have more things to do with them and are closer to Earth than we imagine,"

Logan said. "Venus is a lot like Earth."

Lauren White, a Lakeside Junior High seventh grader, studied the longevity of fresh cut flowers. She mixed the flowers with distilled water and either sugar, vinegar or bleach and measured the effects over 10 days.


"I thought I could help people that work at flower shops and find out ways to keep them fresh for the longest time," White said.

Ridgeview High ninth graders Riley Chapman and Ayden Catucci observed the acidity levels at different areas of the St. Johns River, such as the Ortega River, Green Cove Springs and Doctors Inlet. They sought to determine how the humidity affects a water body's pH levels.


"A lot of Florida's water is acidic," Chapman said.

"Not only are we both interested in what pH levels are, but water is very accessible around this area," Catucci said.



House committee wants to keep church doors open during emergencies

he House Judiciary Committee OK'd a bill Tuesday that would ensure church doors are among the last to close during a declared state of emergency.

Under the bill (HB 215), state and local governments can no longer deem a box store as more essential than a church. So long as any business is permitted to operate, the bill asserts, so shall religious services

Republican Rep. Nick DiCeglie of Indian Rocks Beach is the bill sponsor. The committee OK'd the measure despite some concern among Democratic lawmakers. The bill will now head to the House floor.

"I'm a Floridian and I'm an American who wants to make sure that my First Amendment right is protected," DiCeglie told lawmakers.

The bill, DiCeglie explained, is a reaction to the COVID-19 pandemic and the government's subsequent response.

Under Gov. Ron DeSantis, Florida was among several states that deemed houses of worship essential during the early months of the pandemic, meaning the state allowed church leaders to conduct business as usual.

States like California, New York and even Texas, however, took a different path. They shuttered houses of worship, while other businesses remained operational.

Tampa Democratic Rep. Fentrice Driskell described the bill as "well-intentioned," but suggested it may threaten the health and safety of Floridians in a future emergency. She voted against the measure despite describing faith as "important" to her

"If the pandemic taught us anything, it's that you never know what's coming around the corner," Driskell said. "So it makes me uncomfortable to tie the hands of future governments, as we might need to see what else is coming down the pike, even with COVID-19."


Florida, though, was not without controversy. Police arrested a Hillsborough County pastor in April 2020 after hosting an in-person service with hundreds of parishioners.

Authorities deemed the service in violation of a local ordinance, which prohibited gatherings of 10 or more people DeSantis later lifted all local emergency orders.

"Our pastors have to do better too," said Democratic Rep. Andrew Learned of Tampa, who voted in favor of the bill. "Flaunt-

24-hour race proves sports car racing back on fast track to prominence

urley Haywood still remembers being overwhelmed by the enormity and importance the first time he came to the Daytona International Speedway.

That was in 1973.

 $\mbox{``I remember the first time I came}$ through the tunnel, it took my breath

away," Haywood said.

His emotions haven't changed.

Now 73, the legendary racer from St. Augustine is still overwhelmed by the sound of a purring sports car and the daunting chal-

lenge of racing non-stop for 24 hours on the 3.54-mile road course.

Haywood, a five-time 24-hour winner, returned to Daytona for last weekend's Rolex 24 at Daytona. Although he's no longer behind the wheel of the iconic red, white and blue colors of Brumos Racing, he forever will be remembered as one of endurance racing's pioneers. More importantly, he knows he helped steer the IMSA sports car series toward a road of rebirth and growth.

"It's great to see the speedway for the 24-hour endurance program filled with spectators," he said minutes after a field of 61 cars took the green flag to start the around-the-clock marathon. "The infield, there's not a blade of grass available. I think it's a record crowd. I've never seen a crowd here in the 24 years I've been racing here, the amount of people who



were out there (before the race). It's really cool. And this shows you IMSA's on the right track. Great cars. Great drivers. A really international platform. It seems to be working."

Sports car racing has been looking for more-secure footing for years. Dwindling fields, rising costs, the lack of manufacturer support and constantly-changing rules forced several teams — including Brumos — to the sidelines.

If last weekend's race is any indication, the work done behind the scenes by IMSA officials and the work done by the race teams in the garage area has paid off.

"It wasn't something that happened overnight. It's been evolving for a period of time," Haywood said.

The endurance race got off to a fast start a week earlier with a three-day Roar Before the 24 practice session. Fans were allowed to walk through the busy garage area, often within inches of \$500,000 race cars, to create impressions that last a lifetime.

The track also opened its gates to

sands of fans at the test were children.

"IMSA and the NASCAR folks know how to attract fans and keep fans with that sort of personalized way where the kids and the grownups can get close to the drivers and the team owners, and they remember that," Haywood said.

"I remember when I was starting out, Darrell Waltrip was sitting next to me at an autograph session and he said if you want to have a fan for life, you have a direct conversation with them, looking them in the eyes, shake his hand and start a conversation about anything and he'll be a fan forever.'

Despite the threat of the coldest overnight temperatures in nearly 50 years, every spot in the infield was taken by fans who were willing to brave the cold to watch prototypes powered by Cadillac, Oreca and Acura, along with a host of luxury cars like Lexus, Mercedes, Ferrari, BMW, Porsche, Ligier, McLaren, Chevrolet Corvette, Lamborghini and Aston Martin weaving through the flat infield and around the high banks of the superspeedway.

"Now you've got a field of 61 cars – all class cars; all really good cars, all with really good, experienced drivers," Haywood said. "The chances of those cars breaking are very slim. They're bulletproof. Now it all comes down to the drivers and the ones who make the least amount of mistakes are the ones that are going to do well."

By Sunday afternoon, an Acura-powered prototype driven by defending Indianapolis 500 winner Helio Castroneves, Oliver Jarvis, Tom Blomqvist and Simon Pagenaud had the fastest car and fewest mistakes to outlast everyone else.

And in the process, they traveled 2,693.94 miles – the distance to Omaha, Nebraska, and back in a single day.

More impressive – and fan appealing – was the fact there were 76 lead changes among seven different space-aged sports

The real winners, however, is a series that's back on the fast track to racing prominence and the thousands of new fans it made last weekend.

ing public health in the middle of a pandemic just so you can get a news headline to increase your congregation — which is exactly what happened — is wrong."

Some Republicans, meanwhile, wished the bill went further. Like DeSantis. some Republicans including Rep. Spencer Roach of North Fort Myers, argued government has no business to determine what is and is not "essential."

"I think we really need a sweeping review of executive power to ensure that in the future, no Governor, no cabinet officer. no Mayor, no county or city manager or no county Sheriff has the power to determine what businesses or institutions — religious or otherwise — are essential or nonessential," Roach said.

Alternatively, American Atheists' Florida Assistant State Director Devon Graham testified against the bill.

She asserted the bill not only threatens the safety of Floridians, but it is also woefully vague. The bill, she contended, stops short of defining which businesses are relevant in regard to the proposal.

"If they are open to do the jobs that are necessary during a disaster, then churches can be open without any restrictions," Graham said of hospitals, ambulance services

She also lamented that the bill does not adequately define religious services.

"Is it just your typical Sunday morning service or is a 5,000-person tent revival?' Graham asked.

DiCeglie's proposal now awaits the House's full consideration. Lake Mary Republican Sen. Jason Brodeur is the Senate companion sponsor (SB 254).

If the bill becomes law, it would take effect July 1.

Small Business Development Center receives three-year extension from County

ORANGE PARK - The Small Business Development Center has been funded for the next three years in Clay County.

The Board of Clay County Commis-

sioners unanimously passed the move last week allocate \$150.000



to continue the agreement until Dec. 31, 2024. American Rescue Plan Act funds, set aside for disaster relief purposes, have been approved.

At no cost, the center can consult businesses before they invest, in their startup phase, or as they grow with a plethora of workshops and events.

County Volunteer Coordinator Victoria

Hapner said the Clay County Chamber of Associate Director of Special Programs Commerce used to house the SBDC, which later moved to office space on Park Avenue in Orange Park. The plan is to move the center to College Drive.

"We'll be housing it at Community Services and hoping that we'll be able to have a large impact," Hapner said.

Commissioner Jim Renninger asked about optimizing their services. Commissioner Betsy Condon said local businesses needed resources to improve their likelihood of success.

"They were instrumental in helping us in everything," Condon said of her experience with the SBDC. "We needed a website design and they put us in contact with a small business that went through the same

The SBDC is based out of the University of North Florida with consultants in more than a dozen local counties. Marice Hague, & Marketing, said the SBDC gradually increased its profile in Clay County. She said the office was staffed part-time for almost two decades.

Hague said the chamber collected money from sponsors to pay for the SBDC, but that funding was lost.

"For six years, we've been trying to have that support and funding, and of course, the chamber was able to offer that for a limited time," Hague said. "So now with most of our other counties, we do have funding from public sources.

County Commissioner Mike Cella referred to the SBDC's focus on entrepreneurs as "economic gardening." Cella said he wished he would have had a service like the SBDC when he went into business.

"This is really key to our economic development," Cella added. "It's a valuable free service."

Scottish Games returns to fairgrounds on Feb. 26

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The premier event in the region for haggis, herding and highland games is coming back to the Clay County Fairgrounds on Feb. 26.

It's the Scottish Games' 19th year in Clay County and 27th year overall in operation. Organizer Audie Gibson said despite the COVID-19 pandemic, the event drew several thousands in 2021 and being spared in 2020.

"I think we're going to do pretty good this year," Gibson said.

The games run from 9 a.m.-10 p.m. and the opening ceremony begins in Cattlemen's Arena. The games also include bagpipe competitions, sheep herding and traditional Scottish foods. The athletic competitions, involving the hammer throw, weight toss and Turning the Caber, are looking at 110-120 athletes.

"That's quite a large number," Gibson added. "If you're an athlete in Michigan or a northern state and you get a chance to come to Florida, where it's possibly 60 degrees, what would you do?"

The games started in a lot near the former Morocco Shrine Center in Southside Jacksonville and later moved to the University of North Florida. Gibson said the event was limited for space, which necessitated another move. Now, the Scottish Games has grown in stature, attracting about five times the clans and vendors it used to. The 2022 Games honored Clan Gunn.

"We've had an increase in attendance



over the years," Gibson said. "The first one, there wasn't a huge turnout and it was cold. We had six to eight clans."

For Gibson, he didn't find out the extent of his Scottish heritage until he was an adult. A hairdresser on a movie set he was working on told him he looked like a Highlander.

"Since I was a kid, I loved everything Scottish, the kilts, the bagpipes," Gibson said. "It's intensified since then."

Orange Park narrowly approves pay raise for Town Manager

ORANGE PARK – The Town of Orange Park approved a 3% cost of living raise for its town manager with a 3-2 vote at Tuesday night's board meeting.

When council members met Jan. 18, the scores of Town Manager Sarah Campbell's evaluation were present in the agenda, but the written portion wasn't. Mayor Randy Anderson requested the written portion and said a raise is usually discussed after an evaluation, which in this case covered Oct. 1, 2020 to Sept. 30, 2021.

The town manager was graded on eight categories, including fiscal management, policy execution, staffing and citizen relations, out of a possible five.

First up, Council Member Alan Watt gave Campbell an average score of five. He said the town has a highly respected staff and the best in North Florida.

"She's more than earned it in the past two years," he said.

Councilmember Eddie Henley gave Campbell an average of 4.8 and Anderson's average was 4.6. Henley said Campbell made being a council member tolerable and the education she provided was topnotch. He said Campbell was the CEO of Orange Park who makes sure every town event is ready. Anderson added the town pays high for high-quality work.

"We have the best of all of them," Anderson said.

Councilmember John Hauber, who

provided an average score of 3.8, mentioned that Campbell also serves as the town's Human Resources director. He said he'll continue to push to examine town policies, but the town manager has done a remarkable job.

Campbell said the town did not get approval to post an HR director position. Anderson and other council members said the town saved about \$40,000 by Campbell doing two jobs.

According to Campbell, she makes an estimated \$122,387 a year with a vehicle stipend of \$200 a month, and \$50 a month for a phone stipend.


From her own research, Council Member Susana Thompson said the figure was high compared to other city or town managers.

Thompson gave an average score of 2.2. Her written portion included more than 20 items critical of Campbell's performance.

She praised Campbell's strengths with the budget, but shot down the idea of a raise, citing the town's duty to be fiscally responsible.


"We're in Florida. We're not in San Francisco; we're not in New York," Thompson said. "I need to also think about what our town residents are paying from their pockets when they're paying their taxes. I need to consider everything."

Council members were polled of the 3% raise vote shortly after and it was approved, with Thompson and Anderson voting against.

Rethreaded looks to combat sex trafficking in region

CLAY COUNTY – A Jacksonville-based organization raises money to assist sex trafficking victims by employing them.

Rethreaded is a gift company with a purpose, offering long-term employment for survivors with wrap-around services for women affected by sex trafficking. The group has had meetings and presentations in Clay County.

CEO Kristin Keen said the organization, which she founded in 2011, has 13 employees with plans to hire five more. In all, it has assisted more than 60 victims by giving them resources and full-time employment. Rethreaded provides resources, counseling and transportation that it can connect to a woman in need.

"It's more about providing education and getting people involved through shopping and awareness," Keen said.

Jacksonville ranked fifth in the state for

sex trafficking offenses in 2017. In 2021, the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office rescued 15 people, including five children, from the sex trade. Keen said Clay's proximity to Jacksonville means it's probably present in Clay.

Keen said there are many hurdles for survivors. Finding a job can be a challenge, there is usually deep trauma and mental health resources can be costly and hard to navigate.

"A woman needs time and a new community to heal from severe complex trauma. There's an 85% chance a woman will be re-trafficked if she isn't placed in a new community," Keen said. "Human trafficking happens in every city, it's happening in Clay County."

She said human trafficking is a hard thing to talk about, but the more Rethreaded sells the more women it can help.

"That's our call to action right now," Keen said.



Rethreaded is dedicated to fighting sex trafficking by teaching life skills and helping victims find sustainable long-term employment.

During the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic, things were uncertain for Rethreaded, Keen said. However, the employees made thousands of masks. The organization received Payment Protection Program loans and assistance.

Rethreaded recently moved from a 2,500 square-foot building in downtown Jacksonville to a 36,000 square-foot build-

ing in Historic Springfield. Beyond jewelry, the company does corporate gifting and sells pet toys and journals. Rethreaded bought a toffee company and looks to tackle affordable housing.

"It was an interesting year," Keen add-

Department," Reid said. "You guys are the best. I love you guys."

Council members later tabled \$57,680 to place concrete in Clarke Park but approved using \$29,664 in ARPA funds for two automated battery CPR devices and their hardware.

According to town documents, emergency personnel is short-staffed. Councilman John Hauber said the devices would make



treating cardiac arrests more effective.

"I'm glad we're doing that," he said. "We're starting to make a little headway here and there."

Christmas lights are another item ARPA dollars can be spent on, as well as being a key feature of the town during the holiday season. Town staff delivered its report on Tuesday to the council. Refurbishing the

town's 32 street decorations would cost \$19,200 and replacing them with new lights would cost about \$35,200. This item and potential changes to the recurring \$20,000 spent a year on lights at Town Hall and for medians were tabled.

"They are dated," Mayor Randy Anderson said. "Half the lights work."

Councilman Alan Watt advocated for

new lights and some toward the south end of the town. Vice Mayor Eddie Henley said some of the lights shouldn't be on display.

"We definitely need new lights," Henley said. "We have angels with no heads."

Council members also unanimously approved \$13,525 for replacing 10 silhouettes and adding 21 new lights for its Hometown Holiday event. In other business, the town changed the minimum required space for off-street parking at medical and dental offices from one space per 150 square feet to one space per 200 square feet. The change was based on a Planning and Zoning Committee recommendation.

"We weren't looking at hotels, we weren't looking at retail space. All of those have their own separate parking," Development Director Stephen Smith said.







Engvall leaves his fans laughing in his final Thrasher-Horne appearance

ORANGE PARK — Bill Engvall's reputation precedes himself, as seen by the long lines outside the Thrasher-Horne Center last Saturday. For someone unfamiliar with the reach of Engvall's career, the sight might be overwhelming, but having interviewed the comic earlier that week, it properly impressed me.

Bill Engvall is both humble and relatable. It's one thing that makes his comedy so special. Despite being a multi-award-winning comic, a double-platinum certified artist, and the guest star of many hit TV shows, Engvall revealed he doesn't let his fame go to his head. If anything, it gets him into more situations that even a comic would find hilarious.

Engvall's show on Saturday, part of his "Here's Your Sign, It's Finally Time" farewell tour, touches on a variety of stories from Engvall's life and his 40-year career on the road.

Laughing at medical issues, reminiscing about grandparents and his hometown, and the crazy shenanigans his wife gets him in were all highlighted. The crowd clearly loved him, and as the show ended, the ovation lasted for almost five minutes. It's clear that fans of Engvall will miss his particular brand of comedy after his retirement begins.

Engvall will miss it as well.

"I always said that I loved touring, and the shows are great, but I'll be 65 here in a few months, and travelling is getting harder," he said.

As a performer, you don't get weekends off. It may seem counterintuitive, but that's when everyone wants to see a show — and Engvall is no exception to this rule.

"As bad as covid was for the entertainment industry, it made me realize I could quit," Engvall said. "When I couldn't work, it made me realize how much I didn't need to do it. It'll be nice to just go get dinner

and see family without having to worry about my schedule.

"When people come to the show, they see you for those 90 minutes and think 'Wow what a great show, what a great life,' but they don't see the hours that went into it and all the travelling. Writing the set and working on interview, it all takes a lot out of you. It's a hard life, it's lonely, and that's what starts peeling the layers off the onion. During a show I have 200 new best friends, but then they go home and I'm in a Holiday Inn by myself.

"They always say you know in your gut when it's time to leave, and I wanted to do it on my own terms. You always see those shows that go on for way too long on TV and I don't want to be like that. Why not go out while I'm doing well?"

With the family welcoming their grand-daughter a few years ago, being able to stay at home has become even more important.

"I just want to enjoy my life, without having to think about where and when I have to go next," he said.

As a retiring legend of comedy who came into the era of comedy surrounded by the best, Engvall has spades of advice for those just starting out.

"Be relatable and work clean. The people that book me know that I'm going to show up, be sober and do a great show that people are going to leave happy."

Beyond those basics, there's a certain level of practice you must put in, and Engvall is adamant that it's more than important- it's necessary.

"There are so many people on YouTube and TikTok that make a short video and they're hilarious so people think they can be a big headliner, but there's so much more to comedy," Engvall said. "You have to have stage time; you have to understand standup. It's more than having a few jokes. It's knowing how to tell a story and build it up to the punchline."

when the mother suddenly realized one of her children had wandered off.

"Mom can go on the SaferWatch app, immediately notify our real-time crime center and include a photograph of their child in the message to the real-time crime center," the sheriff said. "She could say, 'My 4-year-old daughter is missing. Here's a picture of her from this morning on the swing.'

"That picture comes into our realtime crime personnel; they immediately start building out a call to start dispatching Green Cove Springs and Clay County Sheriff's personnel to the area. In that call the deputies are receiving, that call includes the photograph of the child so while they're driving there, they can see who they're looking for.

"In addition, our real-time crime personnel can send out a message to anyone in the general area of the park and say 'We have a missing child. If you see this child, please stop the child and call 911 or stop the child and notify an officer. If you're driving past the park and you passed the park two minutes ago and you're thinking, 'Man, I saw that child at the coffee shop,' you can send us a message and say, 'I just saw that child and she was standing out there two minutes ago.' That information comes in and it's all collected within that call."

SaferWatch operates a lot like the silent panic systems which are required Alvssa's Law – in all Florida schools. But instead of connecting a school with law enforcement about a pending or ongoing threat, it will put several law enforcement agencies and the public in the same loop. "County schools have switched over its mobile panic alert system to SaferWatch because "it was a logical choice," school police chief Kenneth Wagner said. "We work closely with county law enforcement to integrate the system so our officers are made aware of any situation that arises at any one of our schools, whether it be a tip or whether it be a threat."

The free app will allow a resident to



report a crime to a real-time crime center. It also will allow the resident to send photographs and live video, so it can be dispensed the proper agency — and residents.

"In fact, if you have a smartphone in your hand or access to a computer, you can now be part of the SaferWatch team," Cook said.

The system will be utilized by the sheriff's office, Clay County School District Police Department and the Green Cove Springs Police Department.

"People use their phones every day to send information and the SaferWatch app will just be another tool for our citizens to communicate and share information with local law enforcement," Green Cove Springs Chief John Guzman said. "By no means does this app replace the need to call 911 or calling your local law enforcement agency, but it definitely will enhance the services we already provide."

The system went live on Jan. 31. Cook showed how the program works with a test message. Within seconds, a dispatcher in the crime unit was reading her text and watching a video she was taking of the deputy answering the call.

"We understand technology is evolving each day and we are working each day to evolve with it — all with the goal of keeping our community safe," Cook said. "Safer-Watch is a web- and mobile-based security and reporting system that was built to provide a higher level of safety and security to our community, including our schools, our businesses, our public buildings and our neighborhoods.

"In fact, if you have a smartphone in your hand or access to a computer, you can now be part of the SaferWatch team."

2045 Comprehensive Plan, and it has targeted repair downtown streets, sidewalks and storefronts to provide a bright and lively makeover – all while enhancing the Historic Triangle area and Spring Park.

Other long-range plans include the creation of more cozy bed-and-breakfasts, making storefronts facades along U.S. Highway 17 more attractive, bringing new businesses — particularly restaurants and clubs that will pump new life into nightlife and creating more parking to handle the additional crowds.





"There's a difference here," said George Kramer, the Downtown Master Plan project lead with S&ME civil engineering planners. "Something's happening here."

The downtown area is defined as the area between Bay Street to the south and

up to Gum Street to the north, then west of Green Street on Ferris Street to the west and out to the St. Johns River to the east, according to city Planning and Zoning Director Mike Daniels.

"The Comprehensive Plan is a foundation for how the city will look and how the city will function over a 20-year period. It is a plan that emphasizes what the vision and what the intent is for the city moving forward, but it isn't as focused on a lot of the details."

The Downtown Master Plan is focused only on the downtown area. But it shares many of the same goals as the Comprehensive Plan, especially improving the U.S. 17 corridor to make it more appealing and pedestrian-friendly and redesigning Walnut Street to attract pedestrians and restaurants with sidewalk dining.

Another target for the Downtown Master Plan is the area occupied by the Clay County School District near the Historic Triangle.

Erik Aulestia, the lead engineer for the Downtown Master Plan and partner with Torti Gallas and Partners, questioned why



some of the lot is used for school bus parking. He said that not only takes away valuable space, but it's also a distraction for the things the city wants to achieve.

"It's not the prettiest thing, the way the education buildings are set out, the park-

ing is confusing," Aulestia said. "At some point, they're probably going to have to add a program for consolidated uses. We really think that should be part of the identity of Green Cove Springs."

Kramer agreed.

"We work in places where economic progress has been bulldozed over," he said. "That hasn't happened here. We want to restore the historic footprint of the downtown area so we have the ability to unlock the history and character of the city."

City officials have asked residents to take a brief, nine-question survey, which asks you about your relationship with the downtown area, existing conditions within the community and how you envision the downtown will grow within the next 20 years.

Golden Eagles being fined \$4,000 and forced to forfeit nine games, including the Fortegra Invitational title.

Clay County School officials cited an anonymous tip that started their own investigation.

"Once we find out that a player or student may or may not be legally enrolled, we are required to investigate," said Clay County Athletic Director John Sgromolo. "Because he was an athlete did not affect the investigation except to put a little more exposure on the situation."

McDuffie, a senior for the Golden Eagles, transferred after his junior year at Mandarin High after an encouraging summer basketball season with numerous Fleming Island players at the AAU level.

A tense interaction between Mandarin Coach George Macloud and Bennie McDuffie, Sr., the father of Bennie McDuffie and another son, Kaleb McDuffie, who was also a part of the Fleming Island junior varsity basketball team and also is now transferred to Potters House Academy, seems to be the starting point of the McDuffies choosing to find a new school.

There was an incident between the coach and I that eventually led to him emailing me that he would advise me to find another program for Bennie to play at," said McDuffie, Sr., who has owned a small barbershop for 22 years in Jacksonville. "There was some tension based on a conversation forum that the coach set up to keep parents informed on team happenings that [were] supposed to be a positive forum for the team parents to discuss things like transportation and game preparedness stuff. An incident created a tense conversation between the coach and another player's parents and I tried to ask the coach to keep the forum on team activities only.'

According to documents within the investigation, McDuffie moved into a rental house on Fleming Island with his brother

and was required to submit a resident lease and another form of identification to the Clay County School District office to enroll at the school.

"We got the lease from my brother and did not think we needed anything more," said Bennie McDuffie. "When we were informed the lease needed me and my boys on it, we got the original lease amended. That's in the paperwork."

On Dec. 11, Sgromolo received an anonymous phone call questioning the eligibility status of the brothers.

In a letter to the FHSAA's Craig Damon, head of compliance, from Fleming Island Principal Tom Pittman, dated Dec. 16, Pittman confirmed the summer basketball connection, a phone call to Mandarin athletic director to determine any issues with McDuffie coming to Fleming Island, and confirmed that both McDuffies started school on Aug. 10.

A return phone call Dec. 17 from the owner of the house to Pittman, who called the prior day, clarified the living arrangements with the house having 10 bedrooms and the owner's family on the first floor and the McDuffies living on the second floor. An amended lease with all names involved on it was sent to Pittman and was part of the record package called Amendment A dated Dec. 17.

The problem was the Amendment A lease had the McDuffies added to the May 1 list that was submitted in the original document exchange. The signatures on the Amendment A lease though, have all parties signing on Aug 15, 2021.

At first glance, and, after normal review from the Clay County School District, Fleming Island High and the Fleming Island Athletics Department, Fleming Island coach Traavis Chandler was given a green light to let both McDuffies play on their respective teams.

Athletic directors in Clay County generally agree any athlete coming into a program is usually given a second look.

After the Golden Eagles started 9-0 in the regular season record, Sgromolo was tipped about living arrangements for the McDuffies.

According to investigation documents, McDuffies lease agreement submitted to the School District as well as a credit card statement were the two forms of identification Sgromolo started his investigation with. Noted was the lease agreement term start date of May 1, with the names of six tenants: McDuffies' brother and his family; a wife and four children, but no neither of the athletes or their father. The lease did mention a non-related "Landlord" as the owner of the property.

A social worker sent to the residence confirmed the six names with, according to the report, no mention of the two players or their father

Also in the report, an electric service agreement dated May 4 was confirmed, but not with McDuffie as part of the service agreement.

Sgromolo also submitted a property records check, apparently the family home of the McDuffies in Jacksonville, still owned by McDuffie.

One of the final documents in the FH-SAA package is a letter from Fleming Island Athletic Director Travis Cunningham to FHSAA's Damon who seemed to, in his words, "have an issue with those three accusations when it comes to this situation. Those are not right or accurate assessments of this situation or how we conduct business here at Fleming Island High School"

Cunningham further wrote, "I will also add, due to this situation, there will be additional measure going forward to prevent

this situation from happening again."

Cunningham's "situation" pertained to the By-Laws McDuffie apparently violated; ByLaw 9.1.2.1 Falsification of Information, ByLaw 3.5.1 Administration Control and ByLaw 3.5.2 Compliance with Rules.

Cunningham wouldn't talk on the record about his letter to Damon.

For the season, Chandler has commended his team for forging on despite the forfeitures of games; from a 21-1 overall record to now 12-10.

"They have bucked up and continued to practice hard and win games," said Chandler. "This situation only changes the fact that we may have to play most of our games on the road in the playoffs."

Accordingly, in the FHSAA ByLaws, it reads FHSAA bylaws may not limit the competition of student-athletes prospectively for the rules violations of their own school or its coaches and their adult representatives... Contests may not be forfeited for inadvertent eligibility violations unless the coach or a school administrator should have known of the violation."

McDuffie has already enrolled and played games at Potter's House Academy in Jacksonville.

"The sad part for Bennie is that he really did not want to leave Fleming Island," the father said. "Both boys developed nice friends there, but this whole paperwork thing I decided it was best for him to get out of that situation and start new. Everybody said they would fix this and we could move on, but nobody did anything for Bennie."



Nickles and dimes:

The price to be healthy

CLAY COUNTY – As a fitness trainer and gym owner, the most common objection in selling a new client on either personal training or a gym membership is cost. The cost of a service is always a topic to be sure, but why is it in 2022 when there are more avenues to get in shape than any other time in history are we still unhealthy?

If the issue of cost were the only issue, the problem would be solved. Gyms like Planet Fitness have been a race to the bottom of the pricing structure sit comfortably at the bottom of the bucket slowly collecting your money. You allow them to collect it because the price barrier for entry is so low (currently no money to sign up and \$10 a month membership). With such a low price point you get sucked into amenities you do not need or rarely use such as tanning, nice equipment, pizza parties, and classes you rarely attend. So, a low price is not the issue as most Planet Fitness members do not use their memberships and are rarely in peak physical condition.

Let us look at other "luxury" consumables we tend to purchase on a monthly, weekly, or even daily level. For this article, I am considering a gym membership and personal coaching a luxury, even though in reality it is as important as items like health insurance. For the purposes of this article, I will only use large national brands versus smaller mom-and-pop companies.

Are you a coffee person? Your average Starbucks coffee is \$3 and on average four days out of the week that is \$12. If you have a Frappuccino, its \$5 each so with our average of 4 days a week that comes to \$20. If we are talking eating out, the average cost of a commercially prepared meal is \$13 so that comes to \$52 a week. Maybe you are thinking healthy and want a smoothie. That will cost you \$8-10 which on the low end is \$64 a week. Let's cut loose and grab a drink, which will average us between \$12-\$15 each, and we are probably having more than one.

Let us look at other more entertaining

options. The average Netflix membership is \$15-\$20 and is set to rise this year. Hulu is \$13 for the cheap version and \$70 for the version with live television. The average movie ticket is \$11 and that is without any popcorn, soda, etc.

These are just a few items that most adult people have and quickly add up to way more than a gym membership or personal trainer would cost. So what else is in play besides money and how we use it?

Time and where you put it plays a huge role in not only the hobbies you choose but where your money is spent as well. When I use the term "time" I also mean attention because where you put your attention will eat up most of your time.

The average personal training session or gym group class is one hour long. That is only four-to-five hours out of an available 168 hours in any given week. According to US News the average American spends 3.1 hours a day watching tv, and that increased to 5.5 during and after the pandemic. According to a new study by Uswintch the average American spent 58 minutes a day simply on Facebook. This takes into consideration no other social media platforms such as Instagram, Snapchat, Twitter, TikTok, etc.

The issue is attention and priority versus the simple cost of being healthy. I know many who spend significantly more each month than what I laid out above. According to the stats, the average American would rather not give up four-to-five hours a week to be healthy. Yet Americans consume the most as far as sales in the fitness realm. We are quick to buy body bands, detox teas, and others as seen on television garbage in search of a quick fix.

If you do not prioritize your health now you will be forced to deal with it later in the form of the disease, medical bills, and lower quality of life. I challenge you to look at what you spend your money and time on and shift some of that over to buying healthier foods and hitting the gym during the week. Your health and wellbeing depend on it.

Dealing with plant damage after a freeze

CLAY COUNTY — January brought us our first heavy frosts and some freezing temperatures across the region, which for many gardens has done some damage. Lawns and tender landscape plants are likely damaged or may even appear dead back to their base at this point. However, don't panic as patience is key when you have cold damage in your garden.

Irrigation in winter

Watering before a freeze can help moderate soil temperatures, protecting the roots, so a good rain the day before a hard freeze can be a blessing. Make sure the soil around damaged plants stays somewhat moist and does not dry out completely. If temperatures ever stay below freezing for a prolonged period, watering may help defrost the soil and give plants some available water. (On a side note, never leave hoses pressurized with water during cold weather, it makes them likely to split or burst).

Don't fertilize it

Injured plants make people want to baby them, don't. Do not fertilize until spring, when the plants begin actively growing again. Fertilization with nitrogen in the winter can lead to even more damage as the young growth nitrogen promotes is very cold sensitive.

Don't prune it back

While it may be ugly, the wilted, brown, and dead plant material associated with frost or freeze damage protects the rest of the plant that is still living. Leave it there until the danger of cold is gone in the spring, then check for fresh growth. Woody plants can be checked by scratching the surface with a fingernail and seeing the color of the wood underneath: black or dark brown wood can be a sign of cold damage. Tender, fleshy plants like begonias or impatiens can be pruned back after cold so they don't rot and lead to disease.

A browning lawn is normal

With cold weather, many lawns will



turn brown as they head into full dormancy, don't worry, this is normal. Some lawns will even take on a purplish tint in the cold.

However, if temperatures drop too low it can cause some permanent damage which can be observed by wilting, turning to a brown or white color, and then a rotting smell. If growth does not resume in the spring, you will likely need to replace damaged areas.

State files three more charges against former Sheriff Daniels

Judge agrees to push his trial back to May 16

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A judge from St. Augustine agreed Wednesday to give attorneys representing former Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels three more months to prepare after the state added three additional charges against him.

Prosecutors from Ocala added one count of tampering with or destroying evidence and two more counts of making false accusations to law enforcement. Those were added to the one felony count of tampering and three counts of giving false information to law enforcement of an alleged

crime.

Prosecutors said the new tampering charge was added after they learned Daniels may have deleted a Google account.

The trial originally was set to start last Dec. 13, but it was moved to Feb. 21.

Daniels eventually will face a jury to face charges that came while authorities said he tried to cover up his extramarital affair with a former co-worker.

Daniels was arrested on Aug. 14, 2020, after he set up a meeting with his former mistress, Cierra Smith, in Oakleaf, then calling the Clay County Sheriff's Office deputies to have her arrested for stalking

him, according to the arrest report.

Smith was released without being booked shortly after arriving at the jail. When the Florida Department of Law Enforcement launched an investigation, Daniels was accused of taking his cellphone to his agency and asking information technology agents to destroy any connections he had with Smith, FDLE said.

Daniels was running for re-election at the same time. His arrest came four days before the primary, and he still contends the charges, and the timing of the arrest, was designed to keep him from winning reelection

HEAVEN GETS AN ALL-STAR DEFENSIVE END, #CONNER7STRONG

FLEMING ISLAND - Last March 28 was a fateful day for Conner McKay after a successful youth football season that saw his Fleming Island Dreadnaughts 10-Under team get into the National Championship tournament by way of Valdosta "Titletown" Georgia's exclusion from the tournament.

'We started spring football and he complained of headaches so we went to the hospital to check on a concussion." said Brittany McKay, who was at Conner's side on Saturday at Fleming Island High School when members of his 10-Under team were set to take on Oakleaf in a 2021 12-Under team contest under the lights at the high school. "They checked him out and found the tumor at about 2:30 a.m.'

The tumor, a DIPG brain tumor, is on Conner's brainstem and both the tumor and the swelling around it affect his balance, his coordination and his vision.

Conner started radiation treatments in April with a six week blast of daily treatments minus the weekends that ended on May 26.

"I fall a lot and my energy is kind of day by day," said Conner, as his former teammates gathered for hugs at the Fleming Island festival in his honor. "It doesn't hurt, but they say they can't go in and get it out."

officer, noted Conner's treatments; chemotherapy and a ton of anti-immune therapy drug trial, have kept him sustaining life, but it is his affection toward his football family that is keeping his smile in tact.

For Dreadnaughts coach Michael Kenny, Conner's impact on the field and now off the field is immeasurable.

"His team was undefeated in regular season, won the conference title and made it to round four of the national playoffs," said Kenny. "Conner was a ripped, fast and athletic defensive end that had a big motor. I play my best athletes at the defensive end position all the time and he was it. His situation made all of us recalibrate what was most important in life."

For Kenny, the impact of the diagnosis was palpable and fueled a state championship run by his 14Under team that eventually only accepted the

Eagles use muscle to upend Raiders

FLEMING ISLAND - Fleming Island power forward Ahman Greenidge scored 18 points and hauled down 10 rebounds as Fleming Island used a dominant third quarter to nip visiting Orange Park 53-52 Thurs., Jan. 27, in a battle of Clay County titans that lived up to its billing.

Greenidge, who is committed to play at Wingate next fall, scored eight points in the first half and added 10 more in the second.

"He brings strength and power to the floor," said Fleming Island head coach Traavis Chandler. "Plus, he is quick and agile."

The six-foot, five inch Greenidge combined with fellow senior Demarion Valmyr, who stands six feet, seven inches and weighs 245 pounds, to give Fleming Island a decisive edge on the boards. The Golden Eagles outrebounded the Raiders 32-20, giving themselves extra shots at the basket. Valmyr scored on three putbacks after offensive rebounds.

"They have the size and beef to get it done," said Chandler of his front court duo. "If they crash the boards hard, it is hard to box them out."


Fleming Island outscored the Raiders 24-9 in the decisive third quarter. Greenidge and Valymer notched 10 points during a 13-2 Fleming Island run over the first four minutes of the second half to turn a 22-16 Golden Eagles' deficit into a 29-24 advantage. Fleming Island led from that point on.

When Colton Zapp swished a three-point jumper from the right wing to give the Golden Eagles a 47-36 lead with four minutes remaining, it appeared that Fleming Island would win easily. But Orange Park scored the game's next eight points on two three-pointers by Sherrard Adams and two free throws by point guard Thomas Faucett to close within 47-44 at the 2:00 mark

Greenidge then scored off of a feed from wing Antoine Sandy and on a dunk in transition, but was matched by a drive by Faucett and a floater by Adams. Down three, the Raiders' Jeremiah Gabriel passed up a contested three-point opportunity and drove to the rim. His lay-up closed the gap to 53-52 with 1.2 seconds left. After a time out, Zapp inbounded the ball to Greenidge, who quickly flipped it back to Zapp before any Raider could foul him, running out the clock.

"We never quit," said Orange Park head coach Derek Kurnitsky. "We have got a lot of heart and character."

Large contingents from both schools, including a boisterous Fleming Island student section, created a playoff atmosphere for one of the season's most anticipated matchups. Fleming Island, top-ranked

team in Class 6A, and Orange Park, the sixth-ranked school in Class 5A, play similar full court pressing, fast-breaking styles. The constant pressure by both teams contributed to a frenetic first half in which neither team could establish an offensive rhythm. With defenses extended beyond the three-point arch, open shots were hard to come by. The Raiders converted two Fleming Island turnovers into points and took a 6-0 lead. Orange Park led 8-7 at the end of the first quarter.

The Raiders, and particularly Jacksonville University commit Josiah Sabino, gained traction in the second quarter. Sabino scored 10 of his team-high 18 points in the first half as Orange Park took a 20-16 lead into the intermission.

Both teams handled the pressure much better in the second half, combining to score 69 points.

The Golden Eagles' eighth consecutive win runs their record to 21-1, but more accurately now at 12-10 with the loss of games played with transfer point guard Bennie McDuffie, no longer on the team amidst an FHSAA investigation. Orange Park is at 20-4 after adding two more wins since the Fleming Island game with wins over Nease (69-52) and Trinity Christian (79-59).

Both coaches enjoyed the intense atmosphere and felt that the game would help prepare their squads for the playoffs, which begin next week.

"If you like high school basketball, then this was the place to be," said Kurnitsky. "I think Clay County gets underestimated, but there is really good basketball here."

Chandler's comments were similar: "It was great," he said. "When both teams are good, it is fun for the teams and fun for the community."

Zapp finished with 12 points for Fleming Island, while Orange Park's Gabriel had 11.







The senior made nine saves in the first half, including diving rejections at the 14:00 and 21:00 minute marks.

"Taylor is our heart and soul," said Orange Park head coach Gary Valero. "She is just good. The goals they [Stanton] did get, nobody could have stopped them."

Despite Murwin's efforts, the Stanton trio of Register, Brown and Victoria Quintero dominated the middle of the field, consistently controlling the ball and sending long outlet passes for their wings to chase down. Brown scored off

of a rebound at the 7:00 mark to open the scoring, and scored on a breakaway to give the Blue Devils a 3-0 lead at the 35:00 mark.

"Stanton has height and speed, but the biggest thing is their experience," said Valero. "We have three club players—they have a bunch."

Middle forward Ryanne Robinson gave the Raiders a lift going into halftime, controlling a rebound in the box and left-footing a bullet past Stanton keeper Savannah Yerger to cut Orange Park's deficit to 4-1. The goal was Robinson's 21st of the season, accounting for nearly half of the 43 goals the Raiders have scored.

"She is a beast," Valero said of Robinson. "She is so athletic, so smart."

Despite the loss, Valero was upbeat about the campaign and about where the program is headed.

"The last two years, Stanton mercied us," he said, referring to the mercy rule which ends a match when one team goes ahead by eight goals at or after one half of play. "I am so proud of them."

Orange Park had not won more than three games in any season between 2015 and 2020, and won only a single game in Valero's first two years at the helm in 2019 and 2020. But the Raiders won seven games last season and finished 7-5-3 this year.

Seven of 10 starters will return for 2022-2023, including Robinson and cocaptains Hope Miller and Davila.

Stanton improved to 9-5-1 and will host a regional quarterfinal on February 8

Clay, Ridgeview finish 1-2 in region weightlifting

ST. AUGUSTINE - Clay County girls weight-lifting teams came home with eight top finishers in the newest weightlifting technique; the Olympic Snatch; four from Clay, the team champion; three from Ridgeview, second place, and one from Middleburg in fifth place in a show of power at the region 2-2A girls weightlifting championships held Wednesday at St. Augustine High School. The Olympic Snatch entails lifting the weight directly from the floor to an overhead press position.

Clay finished ahead of Ridgeview with a 57-36 advantage with Middleburg fifth at 18 points behind Leesburg and Ponte Vedra.

Clay also came home with a team champion trophy for a third straight year in the Traditional Lift competition; Bench Press/Clean and Jerk competition.

Clay beat New Smyrna Beach with 49 points with New Smyrna scoring 23 and Middleburg and Leesburg tied for third at 18 points. Ridgeview was sixth with 16 points. Teams head to Port St. Joe High School on Fri., Feb. 11 for the Class 2A championships.

In the Olympic Snatch, Clay had championships from Gabby Etheridge winning at 110, Emma Heck at 129, Gianna Torres at 169 and Kyleigh LaFary at Unlimited all coming home with champion trophies.

Ridgeview opened with Ania Haber, a freshman, taking second behind Leesburg's Kaitlynn Brady in a tie at 75 pounds with the winner determined by body weight with Haber being heavier than Brady.

Ridgeview's first champion came at 119 with Adriana Dimeo beating Clay's Riley Ledford by 10 pounds; 110-100.

In the most dominating weight class, Clay freshman Emma Heck, at 129 with a body weight of just 128.5, hoisted 150 overhead to tie teammate Kyleight LaFary, at Unlimited at 273.8 pounds, and Ridgeview's Ava Haber at 173.9 pounds, with the best

lift of the day. Heck's lift won the division by 50 pounds.

Ridgeview got titles with senior Tyra Sulph at 139 and Haber at 183 with Middleburg senior Katlyn Griffin winning at 199 with a 145 lift.

Leesburg and Citrus won two weight divisions. In the Traditional, where the power of the bench press is a determining difference in weight totals before the clean and jerk, Clay got champion efforts from Riley Ledford at 119, Heck at 129, Janiyah Stevens at 154, Anna Harbison at 183 and La-Fary at Undefeated.

Griffin also won at 199 for Middleburg. For the Panthers of Ridgeview, Ania Haber finished fifth ahead of Middleburg's Kaylnn Gaither.

Heck again was the class of the meet with a 355-280 total difference for her trophy with an astounding 60 pound gap in the clean and jerk. Heck won the bench press by just 15 pounds over runnerup Andie Tice of Matanzas.

Sulph finished third at 139 behind lifters from Lecanto and Matanzas with Middleburg's Kendall Bryan fourth.

At 154, Stevens won decisively with a 180-145 gap in the bench press, but just a 190-185 gap in the clean and jerk.



LaFary had one of the closest competitors in Menendez' Cara Zuaro with Zuaro winning the bench press, 215-205, but LaFary owning the clean and jerk, 195-180 for


the five pound win.

Briley, Gunn top lifts for Knights



Navarre is the defending Class 3A team champion with Flagler seventh last year. Oakleaf was 10th last year.






