

LAKE ASBURY— A Keystone Heights Junior-Senior High seventh grader correctly spelled "dicey" and "trivia" after 13 rounds to become Clay County's 2022 spelling champion.

At the Lake Asbury Junior High's au-

ditorium, 33 students from 33 middle and elementary schools took center stage for the Clay County Spelling Bee. Successfully maneuvering words like "Kaddish" and "Vambrace," Rena Reddish was the last student left standing.

The first round shed 11 contestants on words like "herbalist," "embroidery"

and "faltered." Round two was more dangerous, eliminating 12 students on tough words such as "quatrains," "kimchi" and "Jains." Five of the remaining 10 exited round four due to the following words: "Arapahoe," Quasimoto," "ziggurat," "Yom

Mayor: Contentious rift probably 'not fixable'

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The division on the

City Council has become so contentious Mayor Karen Lake said it's probably "not fixable," and the person caught in the crossfire is City Manager Lynn Rutkowski.

The last Keystone Heights City Council meeting became so argumentative, councilman Tony Brown demanded Lake to resign, while Lake pushed Rutkowski to relinquish her duties. Rutkowski told the council she had too many of the latenight texts from the mayor - some which

Orange Park geared for council race between Thompson, Sandlin

ORANGE PARK— The Orange Park Town Council has one council seat up for grabs, while another seat's incumbent remained the same. Incumbent Susana Thompson, who served the last year of a three-year term that was vacated, will face Susan Sandlin. Mayor Randy Anderson was elected unopposed for his council seat.

For Thompson, she initially ran to represent more of the community because she felt people were ignored.

"I really felt we needed to have somebody in that seat to speak up for people whose voices have gone unheard," she said. She has an extensive background in the medical field including being a registered nurse. Thompson wants a maintenance plan for the town's tributaries.

"Homeowners get nervous during storms," Thompson said.

Thompson said called for the town to improve both the accessibility for young-

er families and the accommodation of seniors. Thompson said walkability, essentially how pedestrian-friendly an area is, is a key target for the town. She also said small businesses are the backbone of the community and needed Susana Thompson what support they



could get from the town.

"We need to make sure they can do well in the town," Thompson said.

Sandlin, who goes by her middle name Winnette, has lived in the town for about 25 years. A veteran of the insurance sector, she's on several town committees.

"As I've gotten more involved. I believe I can contribute more," Sandlin said. "I want the future of this town to be the best

With 10s of thousands of cars going up and down U.S. 17 every day, she wanted

the town's ancillary roads to be wellmaintained.

"We have to be cognizant of it and anticipate a further increase in traffic." she said.

Streams and tributaries are also a key priority for Sandlin in the immediate future. She said



the town has to be mindful of where waste ends up and keep its waterways clean.

"They need to be cleaned up," Sandlin said. "We need to do better to protect our environment.

In the other race, a lack of an opposition candidate for Anderson goes both ways, he said. He welcomed competition, but now he gets to look forward. The town will have workshops to address the American Disability Act, waterways and infrastructure

"My focus is on what we can do to make it better, and in the years to come, how can we ensure we'll still be here?" Anderson

Anderson, who was elected unopposed in 2018, said he's appreciative of his yearterm as mayor. He said he and fellow council members were able to get meetings under control and streamline some processes.

"The first term went well," Anderson said. "I feel that we're making headway."

County moves forward on business tax; holds off on utility tax talk

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Two taxes were in the early stages of discussion at Tuesday's Board of County Commissioners

meeting and one is closer to becoming an

ordinance.

A utility tax can be levied by municipalities and charter counties. The tax did not receive a consensus from commissioners to take the next step.

Clay County currently has a 4% tax on electric and gas, with no tax on water. Alachua, Duval and Volusia counties charge the maximum 10% for some categories, officials heard.

According county figures, a rise from 4% to 10% in the electric tax could trigger an increase from about

\$4.2 million to \$10.5 million in revenue, while a similar raise for gas potentially would cause revenues to grow from about \$150,000 to \$376,000.

There is close to \$1.76 million to be

gained by maxing out water to 10%.

Assistant County Manager Troy Nagle said the potential revenue could be used to offset property value swings, address infrastructure and broadband, or used for critical services.

Commissioner Betsy Condon said property values are increasing rapidly. She cited the ever-increasing cost of gas and other necessities as to why the taxes shouldn't be raised. Commissioner Jim Renninger said he wouldn't want the water tax raised, but elevating the electric tax was acceptable. He said he wanted to align with the rest of the region.

"We've got to do something to resurrect that revenue stream in the future." Renninger said.

Commissioner Mike Cella said he saw the need for the taxes, but added he was hard pressed to increase it right now and he wanted to see how a few bills played out at the state level.

"It's my feeling you shouldn't mix electricity and water," he said to laughs from the audience.

Officials then turned to a potential business tax, which would be a fee charged for any business, profession or occupation in the county. Examples from St. Johns and Duval counties were presented, where the entities charged \$11-\$30 depending on the business' classification.

County Attorney Courtney Grimm noted that the town of Orange Park, Green Cove Springs and Keystone Heights have taxes

Guns, COVID-19 and the internet:

House panel Oks 'freedom of speech bill

ver objections from some members that the bill could protect internet grifters and "neuter" Florida's health care regulatory boards, a House panel on Monday voted 12-5 to pass a bill that protects doctors' "freedom of speech" on the internet.

The legislation is aimed at preventing a crackdown on doctors accused of spreading misinformation about COVID-19, a trend that has been occurring across the country and drawing scrutiny from regulators who say such actions are unethical.

Before passing HB 687, members of the House Professions and Public Health Subcommittee beat back a pair of amendments offered by Rep. Carlos Guillermo Smith, including an amendment to delete from current law the "gag clause" that prevents physicians from discussing guns with their patients.

While a federal appeals court in Atlanta struck down the so-called "Docs v. Glocks" law, the language remains in two sections of state statutes. Smith's proposed amendment struck the language, which cannot be enforced

Smith also offered an amendment to the bill that would have ensured freedom of speech protections also apply to Department of Health physicians. Smith is from the same county where a top DOH official was removed after raising concerns with the department's vaccination rates in an

Rep. Anna Eskamani spoke in favor of the amendment saying that the state cannot pick and choose which speech to protect.

"Let the Department of Health follow the priorities established in this legislation," she said.

While the committee members shot down both of Smith's amendments, law-makers agreed to take up an amendment to HB 687 drafted by committee staff that removes the \$1.5 million fine the Department of Health could face if it violated a practitioner's right to free speech.

The proposed committee bill would continue to make it illegal for the state to reprimand, sanction, or revoke or threaten to revoke a license, certificate or registration of a health care practitioner unless it can prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the free speech leads to the direct physical harm of a patient. But the department

wouldn't have to pay the steep fine for violating the law.

Bill sponsor Rep. Brad Drake told committee members the bill does not offer physicians any freedom of speech protections they are not offered today.

Drake said he filed the bill after hearing about physician Joel Rudman. Rudman testified in committee that the American Board of Family Medicine tried to take action against him after he made comments about the COVID-19 vaccine.

Gov. Ron DeSantis threw his support behind HB 687 and its Senate counterpart. SB 1184, earlier this month.

The bills are not supported by organized medicine.

The legislation comes at a time when the Federation of State Medical Boards has reported an uptick in complaints against licensed medical professionals for disseminating false or misleading information. The

organization found 67% of medical boards reported an increase in complaints and 21% had taken some sort of disciplinary

The federation has come out in support of scrutinizing medical professionals amid the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

"We are encouraged by the number of boards that have already taken action to combat COVID-19 disinformation by disciplining physicians who engage in that behavior and by reminding all physicians that their words and actions matter, and they should think twice before spreading disinformation that may harm patients," said Dr. Humayun Chaudhry, the president and CEO of the federation said in a December statement.


The all-senior team consists of a captain who possesses a saber, two guards with replica weapons and the three flag holders.

County using 'TNVR' to curb cat problem; moves to tighten animal laws

CLAY COUNTY – The county is seeking to alter some of its animal ordinances relating to breeders and dangerous dogs.

Assistant County Manager Troy Nagle told commissioners Tuesday at a BCC meeting that the county created a classification for aggressive dogs if a dog severely injures a person or animal without provocation or causes two minor injuries in a one-year period without provocation. People have the right to appeal a decision and could appear before a magistrate.

A \$100,000 liability insurance requirement for pet owners with specified "Dangerous Dogs," obedience training and a muzzle in public are potential items the county can use to prevent future violations.

The proposed classification was created eight months after a puppy named Arlo was attacked by a Dogo Argentino on Fleming Island. After Clay County Animal Services said it couldn't issue any penalties, the dog's owner, Frank Byman, told the council it needs to change the way dangerous animals are handled.

For hobby breeders, the county will target housing, feeding and watering requirements and limit the number of a breeder's litters to two or 20 offspring total. The changes will also allow the inspection of property.

That follows the recent raid on a home in Orange Park that was used as a puppy mill. More than 100 dogs, most crammed in small cages, were rescued from filthy conditions.

The updated ordinance would also pro-

hibit the retail sale of a dog or cat by a commercial establishment, which has one year to comply. The ordinance also applies to people selling dogs or cats at a flea market, public throughfare or public common area.

"This will effectively stop the sales in the Walmart parking lots, on county rightsof-way and transition you away from having pet stores," Nagle told commissioners.

Commissioners Kristen Burke and Betsy Condon asked if animal control officers can use force on the job and staff was tasked to look into that personnel policy topic. The changes to the county's animal ordinance will be reviewed at a future meeting.

The county is trying to chip away at a similar issue: roaming cats. With the county's cat population in the tens of thousands, officials are again urging residents to participate in the Trap, Neuter, Vaccinate and Return program.

The Clay County Board of County Commissioners moved earlier this month to support the program with \$75,000 in funding, \$6,000 greater than last year. County figures show the cost running to \$542,000 by 2025-2026. Commissioner Jim Renninger said the plan gets the county where it needs to be, and it can later explore its options.

"In the short term, doing nothing is worse," Commissioner Mike Cella said.

County Chairman Wayne Bolla said he wanted the program frontloaded to handle as many cats as possible. County officials said it's difficult to free staff for a large push.



"I know we have a cat problem," Bolla said. "I still get calls about it."

Nagle said the county may have 53,000 cats and could be about 64,000 by 2030. The TNVR programs can be impacted by a veterinarian shortage throughout the country.

Clay Humane Executive Director Linda Welzant said the organization's sterilization program has resulted in more than 30,000 cats sterilized since the program's inception in 2013. She added there is still a lot to do to solve cat overpopulation issues the county faces, but said the county is taking the right steps.

Welzant said the returns from a TNVR program are plentiful, whether it's fewer free-roaming cats; lower cat intake and euthanasia, more adoptions or cost savings.

"By joining forces with Clay Animal Services and designating a number of spay/neuter appointment spots each week on our feral day, the impact will be even more significant," Welzant said. "Working together will give us greater resources to reach previously unreachable populations and the means to perform even more sterilizations, ultimately reducing the numbers

of unwanted births and shelter intakes, which has always been our goal."

Cameron Moore, a Duval County-based University of Florida Shelter Strategy and Operations Consultant, said TNVR is winwin for the county and the animals, opposed to euthanasia and relocation. The reality is there are thousands of roaming cats in the country, some owned and some feral, and the problem isn't unique to the county, Moore said.


"We know there can be nuisance behaviors when they're not spayed and neutered. When sterilized, those nuisance behaviors virtually go away," she added. "They become better neighbors. We know trap and removal, or kill has never worked."

Moore said the program is a leap of faith, but it isn't a new concept. It's largely on residents to take the cats, get them fixed and release them where they're from.

"There always has to be maintenance with the program. People are moving in and out and could have cats that have not been sterilized or people leaving behind pets," Moore said. "We're probably never going to spay and neuter every cat on the planet."

she believed were abusive — and would tender her resignation. In fact, she told the council three times, "You got my 90 days."

Each time, however, the majority of the council asked Rutkowski to stay.

Two weeks later, Rutkowski hasn't delivered her letter of resignation.

City freedom of information requirements, Clay Today asked for copies of emails sent by Lake to Rutkowski on city-owned cellphones. One chastised Rutkowski for not telling the council about a new sign at the Keystone Heights Airport. The time stamp was 11:06 p.m. There were several "non-emergency" text messages sent past 10 p.m.


At issue, Lake said, is Rutkowski's employment file which doesn't have an application, proof of education, prior evaluations or other documents.

Lake suggested those documents could have been removed by Rutkowski since she's in charge of maintaining city employee records.

"We waived the bachelor's degree requirement for the job," Lake said, "but you still need a high school diploma. I asked her about graduating from high school and she told me she did. She lied."

Other councilmembers, however, said they were more concerned with Rutkowski's nine years of experience. Two said the underlying reason for the division is how Lake perceives her role as mayor.

"The issue is how one approaches the job of mayor," said councilman Stephen

Hart. "I'm very sensitive to the letter of the law of how structure. Under our form of government, we have here in the city, all council people are equal. Karen has never really been with that program."

Much like the Town of Orange Park and City of Green Cove Springs, the mayor is selected by the rest of the council, not by the voters. The charter ordinance makes the title more of a ceremonial designation, and it doesn't give a mayor any additional authority.

"The mayor is just one of five, although she is the person who goes out and represents the city at special events, like the front man in a rock band," Hart said.

Councilman Tony Brown said Lake often acts as if she wants to be in charge.

"It's power," he said. "That's all it is." Brown said the council selects one member to represent the city on the Northeast Florida League of Cities. On two occasions, Lake attended meetings because, as mayor, she represented the city, not the person designated by the council.

"I'm not casting aspersions on her," Hart said of the mayor. "I just think she honestly believes that the mayor has a lot more authority, if you will, and the right to get over to the administrative side than I think she does. The city council, generally speaking, passes laws. The city administrator, and the people who work under her, are on the administrative side. We need to have separation of power."

Lake insists she wants Rutkowski to resign because she believes the city manager didn't provide clear information ahead of her hiring.

"It's a reflection on the city," Lake said.
"The job of city manager is too important."

Hart said as long as a majority of the council approves of Rutkowski's job performance and qualifications, she won't be voted out of her job, regardless of how hard Lake pushes. Right now, at least three of the five strongly support Rutkowski.

"I think she's doing a fabulous job," Hart said. "She's very talented, very smart. I've consistently been in her corner. That doesn't mean I'm anti-Karen. I think Lynn, like a good professional, should be left alone to do the job."

The next city council meeting is on March 7 at 6 p.m. Lake said she's sure the animosity between sides will continue.

"I'm sure the boys (Brown and Hart) will come up with something," the mayor said.

on businesses at differing levels.

Nagle outlined the benefits and impacts. He said a business tax could improve zoning and code enforcement, assist emergency agencies and allow for a better enforcement of the sales tax through the

Department of Revenue.

"This is not a mechanism to shut down businesses or to preclude a business from doing business in Clay County," Nagle said.

Cella wanted to know the amount of money it could generate and said he's sensitive to businesses in municipalities that already pay more.

"I would be in favor of moving forward

and seeing how that would be implemented." he said.

Establishing and verifying a list of county businesses is a potential gain from a business tax. Renninger said it's a short-coming that the county can't verify its businesses and Burke added that a small fee isn't a large problem.

Condon asked what an existing busi-

ness owner would get from this and said she wanted the language to be clear.

"If we're going to do this, it almost seems like a money grab from our businesses and I would say, for what?" Condon asked.

County staff was given the go ahead to give the business tax language to commissioners at a future meeting.



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A gut feeling saves a life

Quick-thinking Baptist Clay patient services representative leads to emergency surgery

FLEMING ISLAND – Last Nov. 30 was just another day for Janet Hayes and her husband, Ed, until suddenly it wasn't. A patient of Baptist MD Anderson Cancer Center, Janet Hayes was coming in to get her routine bloodwork done.

"I was supposed to have a PET scan the next day and I was scheduled to have chemo on Friday, so I needed to get my bloodwork done," Hayes recalled. "My husband drove me to Baptist Clay and waited in the car while I went inside."

Upon entering Baptist Clay, Janet was met by Jaime Copeland, a patient access services representative.

"Janet was having difficulty telling me why she was here. She was speaking clearly but seemed to be unable to find the right words," said Copeland. "Some things, like giving me her name and date of birth were no problem for her. But instead of saying she was here for lab work, she said she needed diagnostics and couldn't tell me what kind. She kept rubbing her arm to try to indicate what was needed. I was able to determine through yes and no questions that she needed labs for Baptist MD Anderson."

What was concerning behavior to Copeland, was even more alarming to Janet.

"I was trying my very best, but the words just weren't coming out right," said Janet. "She asked if I was alone and I managed to tell her 'no,' that my husband was in the car."

"When they called me and said she was having trouble speaking, my first response was 'Well, we did just have a margarita at La Nopalera,'" Ed said. "They assured me that wasn't the cause and said she was missing words in her sentences. I went inside and they explained everything further. They were on top of it."

Knowing cancer patients are at a higher risk of stroke and with Janet' confusion

and inability to speak normally, Copeland realized there was a real possibility that Janet could be having a stroke.

"My gut told me something was wrong, and I shouldn't let her leave. We have always been told that if in doubt, inform our nursing staff and let them make the determination." Copeland said.

Copeland told Janet she was going to call a charge nurse to come out and speak with her. Suzie Williamson, BSN, quickly arrived on the scene and immediately asked Janet what month and year it was. Janet started to say the wrong year and then corrected herself with the correct year. After a few other questions, Williamson agreed that Janet may be having a stroke.

Williamson and Copeland strongly recommended Janet be admitted to the emergency department.

"After some convincing, we called a CODE STROKE and everything moved very fast," Copeland recalled. "She was immediately taken to get a CT scan and before she was even wheeled out of the imaging room, Dr. Bunce said that Life Flight would arrive in 20 minutes."

The CT scan at Baptist Clay revealed a mass in her brain was bleeding.

"The next thing I knew I was on a helicopter going to Baptist Medical Center Jacksonville. Once we got there, they did another MRI and then I went to surgery," Janet said.

Neurosurgeon Dr. Eric Sauvageau performed a left frontal craniotomy and removed a four centimeter tumor. Postoperation, Janet progressed well and her ability to speak and communicate improved. She was downgraded from the neuro ICU appropriately and was then cleared for discharge by neuro oncology and neurosurgery.

"There was a 20% chance this could happen, and it happened. It was a reality

check," said Janet. "I was very grateful for their attention. When I was discharged, they set me up with everything I could possibly need."

"I'm really thankful I listened to my gut and that we were able to convince her to seek emergency help," said Copeland. "A PAS team member is the first person a patient sees when they come through our doors, so it's really important everyone understands what to watch for when it comes to stroke and other emergencies. Just be aware and be observant. Listen to your

gut and when in doubt, call the nurses. If you're wrong then so be it, but it could save a life."

Fourth suspect arrested for ambush shooting of Orange Park High student

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - A fourth person was charged with the ambush murder of a 17-year-old Orange Park High student to settle a dispute between the victim and one of the four teens accused in participating in the shooting.

Deashaun Green, 18, of Orange Park, was charged with second-degree murder after detectives used surveillance video, text messages and other interviews to connect him to the Jan. 2 killing of Jan-

del Rodriguez while

he walked on Claremont Avenue in Orange Park

Christopher Walters, 18, was charged with second-degree murder last week after he told investigators he was supposed to be the "lookout" during the shooting.

According to arrest reports obtained by Clay Today, Andrew Desmond Neeper, Deierrick Gillum and Green organized a plan to shoot Rodriguez. They met at a fast-food restaurant on Blanding Boulevard to put bullets in a handgun before laying in wait for Rodriquez. Walters told the sheriff's office Neeper was the triggerman.

Neeper also was charged with seconddegree murder last week. Gillum was arrested for second-degree murder on Jan. 19

All four are being held at the Clay County Jail without bond.

Middleburg man goes to trial on child pornography charges

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The trail for Rodney Thomas Ternovsky, 44, who faces 20 charges of possessing child pornography and one count of transmitting child pornography in 2018, is underway at the Clay County Courthouse.

Working along with the Department of Homeland Security, deputies arrested Ternovsky and seized various electronics devices such as flash drives he used to store the illicit material. Each file had more than 10 images on it. according to the Clay County Rodney Ternovsky

Sheriff's Office. Depu-



ties served Ternovsky with a search warrant at his Ibis Drive home at 9:20 a.m. on Feb. 15, 2018.

According to the police report, Ternovsky stored the flash drives in a locked box he had inside a larger locked safe. Police said the flash drive contained both videos and still images of child pornography.

"Numerous files were of prepubescent female children being sexually exploited some of which show the children being sexually battered by men," according to the arrest report.

The case is being prosecuted by Tonya Patterson-Barge and Randi Daugustinis, with Judge Steven B. Whittington presiding.

Probation revoked for sexual predator following fraudulent car insurance application

JACKSONVILLE - A man accused of filing a false insurance application form was arrested for violating his probation following a 2007 conviction of sexual battery of a child who was younger than 12.

Christopher Devon Britt, 34, of Jacksonville, was charged with violation of community control and he was returned to the Clay County Jail without bond.

According to a report from the Florida Department of Corrections, Britt's offender probation states: "You shall live without violating any law. A conviction in a court of law is not

necessary for such a violation to constitute a violation of your probation, community control, or any other form of court ordered supervision.'

Corrections said Britt's car insurance was canceled for nonpayment on June 2, 2020 - a month after he established a policy with an insurance company. He tried to reinstate the policy on June 9, 2020 and was asked to sign a "No Loss Statement" which verified he hadn't suffered a loss or being involved in a car accident during the seven days he wasn't covered. The insurance company notified on June 9 Britt had been involved in an accident on June 8, 2020 and was given a citation for driving without insurance. The insurance company reported what appeared to be a fraudulent application to the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office. Britt was arrested on Dec. 2, 2021 by JSO. Britt was convicted in 2007 for sexual battery on a child younger than 12 and now is a registered sex offender. The crime was committed when he lived in Orange Park, but he's since moved to Jacksonville. His original sentence was to serve eight years in prison, followed by 10 years of sex offender probation. He also was to register as a sexual predator.

Green Cove Springs man pleads guilty to two federal child sex crimes

JACKSONVILLE – U.S. Attorney Roger B. Handberg announces that Edward Alan Hardin, 35, has pleaded guilty to one count of attempted production of child sex abuse material and one count of possession of such material. Hardin faces a minimum mandatory term of 15 years, and up to 40 years, in federal prison and a potential lifetime term of supervised release. His sentencing hearing has not yet been set.

According to the plea agreement, at various times in 2018, 2019, and 2020, Hardin had access to three female children who were in his custody. One of those children - referred to as Minor Victim 1 - had known Hardin since she was a toddler and considered Hardin to be a father figure. Beginning when Minor Victim 1 was about 12 or 13 years old, Hardin provided money and gifts to Minor Victim 1 in exchange for the sexual abuse of Minor Victim 1.

On May 8, 2020, a deputy with the Clay County Sheriff's Office observed Hardin's truck parked at a shopping center in Orange Park. As the deputy approached Hardin's truck on foot, he observed Hardin in the driver's seat of the truck, and then observed Minor Victim 1 sit up in the passenger seat of the truck. The deputy smelled the aroma of marijuana emanating from the truck. As the deputy approached the passenger door of the truck, he could see that Hardin's pants were unzipped.

Hardin's phone was searched and contained photos of Minor Victim 2 engaged in sexually explicit conduct. Additionally, Hardin's phone contained text messages to Minor Victim 1 in which Hardin repeatedly requested that Minor Victim 1 produce pornographic images of herself.

In all, Hardin was accused of having sex with three minor girls.

The case was investigated by Homeland Security Investigations and the Clay County Sheriff's Office. It is being prosecuted by Asst. U.S. Attorney Laura Cofer Taylor.

Eight ways you could be making your seasonal allergies worse

ORANGE PARK – For many people, the warmer, longer days of spring can't come soon enough. But for tens of millions of

people, early spring marks the beginning of yet another allergy season — and the sniffling, sneezing, itching, wheezing and overall frustration that comes with it.

In the United States, those with seasonal allergies may contend

with these irritating symptoms as early as February and they may linger until early summer. The main culprits triggering this misery are tree, grass and weed pollen. These yellowish powders fertilize plants and are spread by wind, insects and birds.

A rainy spring can help plants – and mold – grow more quickly, causing allergy symptoms to linger for months. Milder winter temperatures can also cause plants to pollinate early, which means that spring allergy season is starting earlier and lasting longer. And the problem is likely getting worse, not better. Pollen counts are expected to double by 2040, according to research presented at the Annual Scientific Meeting of the American College of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology.

If you're one of the millions affected by seasonal allergies, it's important to make sure you're doing all that you can to keep your symptoms under control. This includes being aware of all the ways you may be unintentionally making your allergies even worse

Dr. Alexander Farag a head and neck surgeon at Orange Park Medical Center has some tips and tricks to avoid missteps, which could trigger a flare up of your symptoms. Here are things you may be doing to trigger your seasonal allergies:

Using the wrong air filter

Air filters can help purify the air and get rid of pollen in your home or office, but only if you choose the correct one. There are two types of air cleaners: portable air cleaners and central furnace, or HVAC, filters. Portable air cleaners filter the air in one room, while central furnace filters treat air throughout an entire home. Inexpensive central furnace and air conditioning filters, however, don't always do the trick. In fact, not replacing them often enough could make your allergies worse.

If you have a forced air heating or cooling system in your home, consider using high-efficiency filters and stick to a regular maintenance schedule. Placing a portable high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter in your bedroom or using a dehumidifier can also help.

Letting fresh air in

Spring air can be refreshing and invigorating, particularly after a long winter. But if you have spring allergies and open your windows, you're not doing yourself any favors. Open windows allow pollen-laden breezes to flow into your home. The pollen can then settle into your carpeting, furniture, bedding and upholstery, triggering pesky symptoms. During spring allergy season, you can avoid flare ups by opting for an air conditioner on hot days and keeping your house and car windows closed.

Hanging clothes outside to dry

Air-drying your wet sheets, towels and other laundry outside might be tempting. It is, after all, less expensive and more energy efficient than using a dryer. But your laundry will likely also be coated in pollen after drying in the afternoon breeze since pollen easily clings to fabric. And climbing into a bed with these "spring fresh" sheets or wrapping yourself in a towel that was hung outside to dry could make your allergy symptoms worse.

Skipping your evening shower

After a long day, the last thing you may want to do before falling into your is taking a shower and shampooing your hair. Not taking a shower before you go to sleep allows the pollen that's accumulated on your body, hair and clothing to get into bed with you. This could not only make your symptoms flare up, but also prevent you from getting enough sleep. Make nightly showers part of your routine to remove pollen.

Letting furry friends sleep in vour bed

Sure, you love your pets, and snuggling up with them in bed can be cozy. But this tempting habit could be making your allergies worse. Pollen can settle into your pets' fur, triggering symptoms. Keep your pets out of your bed, or better yet, keep them out of your bedroom altogether.

If your symptoms are particularly bothersome, restricting pets to certain rooms so they can't wander can help reduce the spread of potential allergens. Allergens can still spread beyond the rooms that pets occupy. If you have pets and you also suffer from seasonal allergies, it's also a good idea to bathe or groom them at least once a week.

Spending time outside on the wrong days

Heading outside when pollen counts are high is one way to trigger seasonal allergy symptoms. If you suffer from this misery, try to stay indoors on windy days and reserve your outside time until after it rains. Rain clears pollen, which helps to keep allergy symptoms at bay. If you have to do outdoor chores on a day with high pollen counts, always wear a NIOSH-rated 95 filter mask and take appropriate medication beforehand.

Delaying spring cleaning

The dust in your home may contain pollen as well as a cocktail of year-round allergens — pet hair and dander, mold and dust mites — that could make your allergies flare up. Taking the time to clean can help you enjoy spring rather than suffer through it.

If you have seasonal allergies, having someone else (who doesn't have allergies) clean your home can help you avoid a flare up. If that's not an option, be sure to wear a dust mask while you clean. It's also a good idea to use a vacuum cleaner that has a HEPA filter and wash your bedding weekly.

Starting your medications too

Waiting until you develop allergy symptoms to see your allergist or healthcare provider (HCP) is too late. You can stay several steps ahead of allergy season by taking your medication before it gets underway.

Talk to your doctor about what treatment is appropriate for you and develop a plan of action to help ensure you avoid unnecessary flare ups. And be sure to see your allergist or HCP if your treatments aren't working well enough and need to be adjusted.

Guess Who wastes 'No Time' in delighting Thrasher-Horne audience with iconic hits

ORANGE PARK – It's 1970, and through the haze of stage smoke and excitement, the Canadian rock band The Guess Who is playing ABC in concert. Girls dress in their finest bell bottoms, and throughout the crowd, there are band shirts galore.

There's a distinct feeling of excitement- after all, The Guess Who is one of the best bands of the decade and with their latest album "American Woman" charting in the Top 10 in America, there are more than a few dedicated fans. The stage lights dim, the roar of the crowd is its own entity, and as the four members step out onto the stage to the first chords of "No Time".

If you can imagine that scene clearly. you'll understand the atmosphere that surrounded the Thrasher Horne this Friday. The parking lot was bustling, even 15 minutes early to the show, and inside the building hundreds of fans crowded together, excited to see the band that played a huge part in their lives.

I was definitely one of the younger fans in the audience, something lead vocalist Derek Sharp commented on early in the show.

"It doesn't matter how old we get. We

had the best era of music we had the best songs. The youth today- they don't know good music. They wouldn't know good music if it was right in front of them.'

Drummer Garry Peterson, the only original member of the Guess Who still involved with the group, echoed the sentiment. At 76, the drummer is still thriving, and the band still has all the energy and excitement that they had in the sixties and seventies.

Leading with "When We Were Young" set the tone for the rest of the show. Almost immediately, the crowd was active, though they still needed some heckling from the band to get up and dance.

"Remember guys, this is a rock show. What happened to when we would see a concert and we couldn't sit down?"

The band transitioned into "Clap for The Wolfman" a song dedicated to the radio DJs who would make or break a record depending on when and how often they played it, especially the legendary DJ Wolfman Jack, the namesake of the song. It was a DJ who gave the band their first double hit back in the day.

'There used to be two sides to a recordthe A-side with all the hits, and the B-side with the more unknown songs. One night, a DJ flipped over the record and play 'Undun', from our 1969 album 'Canned Wheat'. Fans loved it, and it gave us our first record with a hit on both sides. Eventually they even released it as a single because DJs were playing the B-side more than the

The group moved on to other hits including "No Sugar Tonight," "Haunted," and arguably one of their most popular songs beside "American Woman" - "Shakin' All Over". In between each song, Peterson or Sharp gave a brief insight into the song's history or the time that inspired them.

"Hand Me Down World" and "Share the Land" both had backing vocals from the crowd as fans sang along to the hits and the incredible performers. Lead guitarist Michael Staertow and multi-talented music man Leonard Shaw went head-to-head with solo pieces. In "Shakin' All Over" there was a three-minute shred session, while "Undun" had its own incredible flute solo. It all culminated in a head-to-head battle against musicians, as Shaw and Staertow played guitar versus saxophone.

The show culminated in a serenade to one of the front row audience members, with vocalist Sharp and guitarist Staertow playing "Baby" to a smitten woman before immediately switching gears into "American Woman" the song that launched the group into stardom. They finished the show with "In America," "These Eyes," and "No Time" before stepping off stage to an ecstatic standing ovation.

When listening to live performances of this legendary music, it's easy to see why they and so many others agree that the bygone era of music was superior. The members all still have the energy and charisma of a young rock group- and watching them, I understood how it felt to feel invincible in

ORANGE PARK - Orange Park High's girls basketball team rode a rugged road schedule to get to a point of toughness to last through a deep region playoff run, but the mojo did not happen Friday night in the region final against Pensacola Pine Forest who out-energied the second half against the Lady Raiders to win 70-55 and end the Orange Park season. A breakaway up and under layup from senior guard Sam Hardison from a Piera Alexander steal closed the gap to 12-10 with Autumn Nesmith tanking two frees to tie the game at 12-12.

"We got our game going and started getting steals to layups," said Nesmith. "I was trying to find the right combination of players to offset their attack."

Pine Forest mounted a swift counterattack to end the first quarter up just 15-14 at the buzzer with Brown landing a jumper at the horn.

Orange Park would stay within shouting distance to the half, 31-22, with five missed shot opportunities off offensive rebounds before the half by the Lady Raiders.



For first year coach Rory Roderick, who is an Oakleaf High wrestling alum, to get a district title in his home gym as a coach was a special moment.





Nonetheless, Pickett was confident about his squad's chances.


"I think we are the best team in the state if we play our best."





Fleming Island defense turns tables in region semi win

FLEMING ISLAND - Fleming Island High point guards Gavin Rayes scored 17 points and Colton Zapp bucketed 14 as host Fleming Island overcame an early deficit with a frenetic defensive strategy to beat Neptune Beach Fletcher 56-49 in a Region 1-6A semifinal on February 22.

The Golden Eagles will travel to face second-ranked Ponte Vedra in the region 1-6A final on Fri., Feb. 25 with the winner heading to the Class 6A Final Four tournament in Lakeland.

The semifinal was a rematch of a January 5 regular season contest won by the Golden Eagles 52-51. And like the first matchup, this win was not easy.

Fletcher connected on its first four three-point attempts of the game to open a 14-8 lead at the end of the first quarter. Fleming Island turned the tide by forcing the Senators into 25 turnovers with their "Claustrophia" full court press, seven in the decisive second quarter. The strategy was the result of a late night film session watched by Fleming Island head coach Traavis Chandler.

"I could not sleep last night, so at about 3:30 a.m., I watched film," said Chandler. "I

"Their shooting was very important," said Chandler. "Other teams try to pack in their zones, so we need these guys to hit shots."







