Historic past of Hill Top area can't be erased by bulldozers

Longtime residents cling to simple life, memories of the community

MIDDLEBURG – The telephone rings every day at Maude Burroughs Jackson's house with offers to buy her house. The sales pitches are alluring and unexpected. They mention amounts of money that tempt the imagination.

But each call ends the same way. No thanks. The Hill Top area of southern Middleburg is home to her. No matter how many bags of cash are offered, some of the family homes can't be replaced. Jackson was born there. She will die there.

"I came back here about 30 years ago and I started building a house here," she said. "My son said, 'Why do you want to build a house here? You can go anywhere you want to

go.' I told him this was home. This is where the memories are. This is the place of my birth. All the love and morals and standards I have were developed here in this community."

Time has challenged the boundary of this one-square-mile community. The \$2 billion First Coast Expressway is rising from what used to

be timberland to a massive sheet of concrete and progress.

Bulldozers are plowing an expansion of Blanding Boulevard between the expressway and County Road 218 less than a 10-minute walk from Jackson's front door.

New stores have replaced fields of watermelons and fond memories. And one-by-one, homeowners are giving into the offers and moving away with a pocket full of money.

But not Jackson. She's here for good.

"It's changed so much so. I still love it," she said.

Jackson stands against the challenges of her community armed only with a smile and an open heart. And that's been more than enough to keep her home from becoming a sprawling development. After all, while new gates, community centers and public pools bring new money and a faster way of life, they lack a soul and consciousness.

Make no mistake: Jackson is happy. She doesn't see the slow erosion of Hill Top as a loss. She, instead, clings to what's still "I worked at trying to be happy and making the people around me be happy and to do something to make them feel like they're worthy of what good life we do have. standing – and what it means.

"I have this philosophy, guess I got this from Dr. (Ken) Heinen and Dr. (Martin Luther) King: life is what you make it. If it's not what you want it to be, then you work at what you want it to be. That's what I've done most of my life.

"I worked at trying to be happy and making the people around me be happy and to do something to make them feel like they're worthy of what good life we do have. It could be worse."

Hill Top was founded more than 125 years ago by Black homesteaders who carved a little niche off the main roads through southern Clay County.

They fought against the scourge of drugs and crime during segregation. Many were students at the old Middleburg Colored School, a one-room classroom built in 1903 in the heart of Middleburg.

The school was scheduled to be torn down, but Jackson's grassroots nonprofit Hill Top Heritage Delopment Inc. had the old building moved to Hunter-Douglas Park. The classroom-turned-museum, along with the park, now serves as the hub of Hill Top

Residents put heirlooms and photos in the museum to show the impact of Hill Top's influence on its children.

"I've had a beautiful life. I'm a naturalist," Jackson said. "I love to see people be happy.

"When I first got back here, I started working with the young people. What makes it so much different, when we were coming out we found something to laugh at and have fun with. We had to be creative. We didn't have the televisions and new computers and all this stuff. We made life what we wanted it to be.

We ran across the woods. We ran out into the fields. I remember Mr. Grant. He used to do a lot of farming. He would plant his watermelon patch. We would go out there and run in his watermelon patch and burst his watermelons and eat the heart of

the watermelons right there in the field. "We enjoyed life."

As the community's past is pushed over by heavy construction equipment, Jackson hopes there's room for the future and the past to coexist.

"Am I proud of what's happening? Not completely," she said. "There could have been more involvement of all of the people, instead of just a small group of people. There were times when I came back and we were working on different projects, I'm not particularly proud of what happened here in Hill Top. People would come into the Hill Top community and make plans that it should be this way or that way. This can't be here, that can't be here. I said, when you plan for us, please include us in the planning. Let us help. What direction do we want to go?

"I think if they did, it would be a happier place. I get calls every day from people who want to buy my house. I said no. Having this house, this property means more to me than money. This is where my parents were, where my grandparents, my siblings were."

It's where Maude Burroughs Jackson will always be, and daily telephone calls and tempting offers won't change that.

Orange Park bolster Moosehaven fireworks funding

ORANGE PARK – Fireworks will return to Moosehaven after a two-year hiatus, about three-and-a-half months prior to the 4th of July.

Orange Park council members voted unanimously Tuesday night to kick in a few thousand dollars more than they would have for the celebration. The council had \$10,000 already set aside for the fireworks and approved an extra \$5,000 from leftover federal disaster relief funds.

An estimate provided to the town showed materials, fuel and shipping costs increased dramatically. The 2019 fireworks roughly cost \$26,500, with \$6,500 of that for the barge service. However according to the projections, firework shows varying by length could start at \$25,000-\$32,400, excluding the barge service.

"What used to be \$20,000 for a 20-minute show is now \$32,000 for an 18-minute show," Town Manager Sarah Campbell said.

After a two-year wait, Council Member Susana Thompson said the fireworks' return would be welcomed. She called for using the \$5,000 from American Rescue Plan Act funds as an additional contribution.

"I think it's important we bring it back," she said. "People have been saying that they would love to have the 4th of July fire-



works and celebrate all these other holidays. I think we need to bring them back for sure."

Council Member John Hauber said many residents and families enjoy fireworks and they still give people excitement

"I think that's something that's well-deserved in this time period we're currently sitting in, and most importantly during current world events," Hauber said. "I think we need to bring back that patriotism we have and celebrate that day."

Vice-Mayor Eddie Henley said he felt it was time for people to smile again. He added that the town can do more in terms of events, referencing successful events like the Fall Festival.

Orange Park council considers renting space at Town Hall

Plan would generate \$30,000 for town's coffers

ORANGE PARK – Town officials discussed amending the Orange Park Town Hall lease at its board meeting Tuesday.

Town estimates said the entity could earn more than \$30,000 a year by renting a 1,500-square-foot portion of Orange Park Town Hall. Two prospective tenants approached the town, the Clay County Chamber of Commerce and First Federal Bank.

The chamber was told to vacate its Fleming Island-based office and they mentioned an 18-month term. According to town documents, the bank was seeking a seven-month lease for an administration office, rather than banking on-site, to establish a foothold in the area.

Town Manager Sarah Campbell said

space was vacated by town staff last year. She provided council members with two draft lease agreements and said the staff was flexible.

Council Member Susana Thompson said it would be beneficial for another government entity to share the space. Mayor Randy Anderson said the town can be more involved with the chamber if it's in-house. He also asked if \$2,800 a month in rent was the market rate for a commercial renter.

"I think that's a plus for us to have it here for our businesses," Anderson said.

Council Member Alan Watt said the chamber, which has some government-type responsibilities, is the best the town can do with the space.

"I think it's a better deal for all aspects," Watt added.

Town Attorney Sam Garrison said a final contract had to be brought before the council later, and council members gave staff direction to open negotiations with the chamber.

Second lawsuit filed to stop Florida's new Congressional lines

rogressive critics of the Florida Legislature's redistricting process are filing suit in federal court — the second lawsuit filed about Florida's congressional map before it reaches Gov. Ron DeSantis' desk.

And like the first, it cites the Governor's veto threat as additional judicial urgency.

"The Governor has repeatedly and inappropriately inserted himself into the congressional redistricting process, and with each intervention, the Legislature's proposed maps have deviated further and further from the required constitutional standards," The complaint reads.

"Although the Legislature has proposed subsequent congressional maps in response to Gov. DeSantis's pressures, the Governor has nevertheless made it clear that he will veto virtually any map that protects the voting rights of minorities and avoids partisan gerrymandering. As a result, there is a significant likelihood that Florida's political branches will fail to reach consensus to enact a lawful congressional district plan in time to be used in the upcoming 2022 elections."

Common Cause Florida, Fair Districts Now, and five Florida citizens filed the complaint in U.S. District Court. The case was filed after business hours on Friday in Florida's Northern District.

It lists DeSantis, Secretary of State Laurel Lee, and several lawmakers, including Senate President Wilton Simpson, House Speaker Chris Sprowls. It also lists defendant Sens. Ray Rodrigues and Jennifer Bradley and Reps. Tom Leek and Tyler Sirois, who headed congressional redistricting efforts respectively in the Senate and House.

The Florida Legislature approved a controversial two-map congressional redistricting plan earlier this month. That includes a primary map crafted in the Florida House (H 8019) that significantly reconfigures Florida's 5th Congressional District from a Tallahassee-to-Jacksonville spanning jurisdiction to a Duval County-only seat but keeping it as a minority seat.

That attempts to address complaints raised by DeSantis, whose office submitted two maps eliminating any Black seats in North Florida. The office has also argued the current CD 5, represented by Democratic U.S. Rep. Al Lawson, is an unconstitutional gerrymander. As House members debated the final map, DeSantis announced

Pain in the gas: Rising costs makes us all victims of greed

drove to the Clay County Fairgrounds last week and passed a gas station on U.S. Highway 17 in Green Cove Springs where the price for regular unleaded gas jumped 20-cents in one day to \$4.19 a gallon.

Apparently, oil companies were just getting started.

After leaving the fairgrounds, I saw

a station on State Road 16 where gas was only \$4.01 a gallon. I slammed on my brakes, made a sharp right turn and pulled up to the first open pump.

on the gas pump nozzle, the sign in front of the store flashed with a startling change. Gas now was \$4.19 a gallon. It literally changed during my fill-up.

Three days later, that same station was advertising gas at \$4.41.

I understand there is war in Ukraine. The images and stories are despicable. I also know the gas I pump today came out of the ground months ago — long before the first shot was fired weeks ago. So why raise the price now?

A lot of our price hikes are the fault of our leaders. Two years ago, the United States was self-reliant in oil production. The administration changed, and now we are forced to buy oil from other countries.



The White House said we now pump more oil than ever. That's a lie. And that can be backed up with the government's own statistics.

According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, an average of 11.145 million barrels were pumped each day in 2021. The record number of barrels was 13.1 million a day in February 2020 – just a few days after Donald Trump left office. Seven months later under Joe Biden – and after pipelines were canceled and drilling was suspended in many areas – that number dropped to 9.7 million barrels a day.

Now we're trying to cut deals with Venezuela and Iran. I thought we didn't like those regimes.

Here's an idea: why not start pumping in Texas and buy from Texans, not terrorists? Maybe the simplicity of that solution is hard to grasp. But so is paying \$4.41 a gallon.

It's not just oil. Winston Churchill once said, "Never let a good crisis go to waste." Government and business officials have taken that idea to a troubling level

he would veto it.

But the Legislature has tipped its hat at concerns courts will find even its own map in violation of the state constitution if it finds any change to Lawson's district diminishes minority voting power. In that case, the Legislature offered a second map (H 8015) if courts threw out the first map.

Of note, the Florida Supreme Court did just that after Common Cause and the League of Women Voters sued over a congressional map passed by the Legislature in 2012. That resulted in the courts replacing the Legislature's map with one produced by plaintiffs in the case.

Like a case filed in state court Friday against Lee and Attorney General Ashley Moody, the lawsuit stresses the need for a congressional map to be implemented immediately. Florida was awarded an additional congressional seat after the 2020 Census, so the state needs a map with 28 congressional districts instead of the existing 27 seats in effect now.

Of note, while some groups criticized maps throughout the redistricting process, the lawsuit argues one approved by the Senate (S 8060) "was substantially compliant with the law and largely successful in protecting minority voting rights, and did not appear on its face to be a partisan gerrvmander.'

But the suit argues after DeSantis submitted a map "which largely ignored the law," the Legislature shifted further from the guiding principles used with Senate cartography.

"The maps drawn by the Legislature after Governor DeSantis inserted himself into the process and submitted his proposed congressional maps appear to be an attempt to assuage the Governor's concerns." the suit argues. "Accordingly. they retain the influence of the Governor's proposed maps and disregard for state and federal law.

The complaints say courts should dismiss DeSantis' cartography for several

"In addition to eliminating two performing Black districts, Governor DeSantis's map also weakened one Hispanic district all contributing to Republican dominance," she said. "The Governor's map appears to have been drawn with the intent to favor Republicans."

It notes while the Senate's map had 16 districts where Republican Donald Trump won the 2020 presidential election and 12 won by Democrat Joe Biden; The Governor's first map had 19 Trump districts, and his latter had 20.

Regardless, DeSantis' involvement had a "chilling effect" on the entire process. and it notes the maps have yet to land on the Governor's desk.

"There is also significant uncertainty regarding whether, once Governor DeSantis vetoes the congressional map proposed by the Legislature, a Special Session will be convened to respond to the veto," the lawsuit asserts. "And, the legislative supporters of this plan do not have enough votes to override a veto. As a result, Florida will be left without a congressional districting plan to remedy its malapportioned districts. A solution the lawsuit offers: Courts

must adopt a "approve a new constitutional and lawful congressional plan."

The suit doesn't offer a map but calls for the judiciary branch to "establish a schedule that will enable the Court to adopt and implement a new congressional district plan by a date certain." It suggests

actions need to happen as soon as possible to allow candidates to decide if they can run and educate the public on their platforms before the August Primary elections.

Candidates for Congress must qualify by June 17.

Safe Animal Shelter continues signature charity gala

MIDDLEBURG – The Safe Animal Shelter is returning to the Thrasher-Horner Conference Center for its "The Wizard of Paws" event that was delayed due to COVID-19 last year.

The annual in-person charity gala at 5 p.m. April 9 is a way to raise funds and adopt animals, Safe Development Director Sandy Summerton said.

The organization did not host the gala in 2020 and the 2021 version was postponed.

"This is two years on and we're finally back to having it," Summerton said. "It's our largest fundraiser of the year. It helps cover costs of veterinary care and brings in more animals each year."

Summerton added that the shelter was able to get 1,600 animals, cats and dogs, into homes in 2020 and about 1,970 animals into homes in 2021. At any time, Summerton said, the shelter can have more than 2,000 animals pass through in a year's time and that's the shelter's goal.

"Without this, we would really struggle, it's big to catch up with adoptions," Summerton said. "We want to be able to continue to adopt more and more animals. One of our biggest expenses is at the vet."

Safe Animal Shelter is a nonprofit organization working to reduce the number of cats and dogs euthanized in Clay County,

Duval County, Northeast Florida and the surrounding areas. It became Clay County's first no-kill shelter in 1991 to provide housing for more homeless pets in the community until they could find a forever home. All services provided to the community are funded by individual and business

donations, grants from charitable foundations, pet adoption fees, and fund-raising activities held throughout each year.

Summerton said the shelter is seeing an influx of kittens. However, additional animals mean more care that raises costs for the shelter.



"Each year, we keep increasing the number of animals we take in. That increases veterinary costs as well," she said. "This (event) goes a long way to putting a dent in those numbers for us."

Free dental day provides \$63,125 in services

Sunrise Dental Care, Florida Baptist Convention help 89 patients

ORANGE PARK – Although it cost Gary Rios a full tank of gas and required nearly four hours of roundtrip driving, he said last Saturday's Smiles for Miles 904 was money well not-spent.

The man from Palm Coast desperately needed two teeth pulled. And since he had no dental insurance, he had learned to live with the pain.

"Being an adult is expensive," Rios said. "Having insurance is expensive. Being an adult without insurance ..."

Rios was one of 89 patients treated at the free event at Sunrise Emergency and Family Dental Care and the Florida Baptist Convention on Wells Road. Some came from as far away as Georgia and Central Florida. All left with less pain and a better smile – and a little groggy from the Novocain. The office was closed on March 20 so it could screen candidates. More than 200 stood in a line that wrapped around the strip center and 89 returned on Saturday for much-needed treatment.

"Bigger and better. Last year we saw 79 patients," said Dr. Michael Thomasino. "We did \$45,000 worth of services. We did overseas missions, and now we hope we can do charity here at home. That's what inspires us." Patients received three X-



rays and extractions.

"We're limited to extractions," Thomasino said. "We feel that's the biggest impact for our community because really, they should be going to ERs, but a lot of times they have to. They really don't provide the treatment they need. We feel by taking out the teeth, we clear up that end and we save taxpayer dollars. These people are suffering for years."

The first patient arrived at 4 a.m. -

more than four hours before the doors opened. Patients were treated at the dental office or in the Florida Baptist Convention's Mobile Dental Unit.

For Kia Waiters, it was a chance to finally be pain-free. She drove from Jacksonville to get two teeth pulled. She saw the line of patients standing at the front door and shook her head.

"This shows there's a big need for this," she said. "I don't know what I would have done without this. I don't have insurance and I can't afford it."

According to the dental office, 10 dentists, three hygienists, six hygiene students and 11 dental assistants worked together to help with 108 exams and X-rays. Of those, 119 extractions were taken from 89 patients. The volunteers donated 432.5 hours, which translated to \$63,125 in services.

"We set a goal to treat even more patients than we did at our event last year," Thomasino said. "We were able to achieve that goal thanks to the help of the other volunteer dentists, oral surgeons and their assistants who partnered with me and my staff."

"We were very happy to be able to provide the Florida Baptist Convention's dental mobile unit along with five volunteers to help Sunrise Emergency and Family Dental Care facilitate its 2nd Annual free dental day," said Marc Johnston, the Community Ministries Catalyst for the Florida Baptist Convention.

Clay Electric trustees approve \$12 million Capital Credits refund

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS - Clay Electric Cooperative's Board of Trustees has declared a \$12 million Capital Credits refund for members who received service from 1992 through 2020.

Capital Credits reflect the cooperative's not-for-profit and member-owned status and represent each member's pro-rata share of any margins left over at the end of the year after all expenses are paid. Capital Credits are a unique benefit of being served by an electric cooperative. Investor-owned electric utilities send their margins (profits) to stockholders, and municipally-owned utilities return their profits to city coffers

Before Clay Electric's nine-member board of trustees decided whether a refund could be made, it carefully considered a variety of data and economic conditions. Following this review, the board decided it was prudent to refund \$12 million to entitled members and former members. This year's refund will be the 48th consecutive time that the cooperative has refunded Capital Credits.

Current members of the co-op who are entitled to a refund will receive a credit on their March bills. Multiple accounts with the same member number will receive a credit on the account associated with the membership.

The number of Capital Credits bill credits scheduled for this year is about 142,500. The average amount of a bill

credit this year is \$38.35.

Clay Electric provides service for a majority of the county.

For those entitled to a refund but who no longer receive service from Clay, a refund check will be mailed around March 24. The co-op is scheduled to mail around 57,000 refund checks to this group. The minimum amount to be refunded by check is \$10 and the identifying customer number on the check should be preceded by three zeros (for example, CC#0001571429).

The average check amount this year is \$55.60. Former members of the cooperative who receive a refund check should cash their check within 90 days. If the check is not cashed and remains unclaimed after 90 days, a \$1 maintenance fee will be assessed each month against the Capital Credits refund.

There could be former memberships whose joint relationship may not print on the check. If a former member is unable to deposit or cash the check because of the missing name, they should call the co-op at (800) 224-4917 to have the check reissued.



ORANGE PARK – With a refreshed lineup and newfound energy, The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band remains one of the most accomplished bands in American roots music.

The band will bring its legendary setlist to the Thrasher-Horne Center on Sept. 2 at 8 p.m. Tickets, which start at \$39, are now on sale.

Following an extended 50th anniversary tour, the ensemble grew to a six-piece in 2018 for the first time since their early jug band days. All six members also sing, and when their voices merge, the harmonies add a powerful new component for the legendary band. The acclaimed project is considered a landmark recording in American music.

Keystone Heights to welcome incumbent, newcomer to council

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Two candidates essentially were elected unopposed to take their seats on the Keystone Heights City Council.

Tony Brown is a local businessman and former mayor who served on the council in the 1990s, before running again in 2019. He will enter a second three-year term unopposed. commuting from Keystone Heights.

Brown said his second tenure on the council is about applying some of the fiscally conservative principles to the council and keeping the community family-oriented

He pointed to the city's Streetscape project, Keystone Beach renovations and airport improvements.

"We've got so many projects going on that I've been a part of and we need to fin-

ish," Brown said.

The Black Creek Restoration project is largely in the St. Johns Water Management District's court, but multiple layers of government like the city need to keep a watchful eye on it, he said.

"As a city, we have to be in tune with our elected officials, local, state and even federal with our lake issues and have a good relationship with the district," Brown said. Other targets include overseeing the city's charter review, which can do things such as alter the duties of council members.

"There are things I would like to see looked at and brought before voters," he said

Brown said it's important to believe in the community. He encouraged controlled growth that doesn't disturb Keystone's tranquility.

"We're not Blanding Boulevard. You can come home after

a hard day of work Christine Thompson and relax," Brown added. "What I'm like and what a lot of people I talk to are like, they just love Keystone Heights."

Having grown up in the community, Thompson said her desire to run was her wanting to keep up the good work in the city.

Entering the council unopposed, she noted the lack of a traditional campaign wouldn't stop her from being involved in the community.

"I think the community as a whole is a very friendly, welcoming place," Thompson said. The protection and enhancement of the city's waterways are critical, she said. Thompson recalled the high levels and the clear lakes of years past.

"It's a new adventure," she said of her candidacy. "I'm excited for the improvements to the city and I'm really excited about lakes."

Thompson will replace Marion Kelly, who decided not to seek re-election.

Blight is also a key concern for Thompson. Like Brown, growth management is vital to impacting how the city looks in 10-to-15 years.

"I want to keep the trees and natural beauty of Keystone," Thompson said. "I don't want to see a bunch of housing developments come in and clear cut all the properties."

Local pastor recalls how he found salvation following addiction

ORANGE PARK - A local pastor has an inspiring message for those impacted by addiction.

Springs Church Outreach Pastor Matt Poole was the final speaker at the Overdose Awareness Seminar at the church last week. He told the crowd about his struggles with addiction.

Poole said he had brokenness and a void in his life, drawing him toward using drugs. He said it was fun at first, but then it turned to survival mode.

"It took me down a very dark path," Poole said of his addiction.

He remembered going to a pill mill and later overdosing near County Road 218. His wife revived him and that pivotal moment provided clarity, he said.

"She, just by the grace of God, was able to get me breathing again," Poole said. "If I was her, I would have left me there for two

more hours and called the fire department to come get me."

Recovery came through people, places and things. He turned to Christ first, which led him to a community. A mentor told Poole that successful people hang out with other successful people, so if a person wants to be sober, they hang out with sober people. Resources are also available from local emergency services, he added.

"We literally have the Clay County Sheriff's Office ... and (Clay County Fire Rescue) saying, 'We are here to help you. We want you to get help. We're here to provide you with the resources.'"

Poole said family members are spokes in the wheel of addiction, also impacted by the person suffering from the addiction. He said boundaries have to be created but wanted people to know a person under the influence can be loved through their sickness.

"If you're dealing with a loved one, and who knows where they're at right now, lis-

ten, there is hope. Sometimes, tough love is the best love," Poole said. "Sometimes, you have to love people enough to confront them and challenge them with the truth and to be in their business, to love them

enough to say, 'We can't do this anymore.'"

CLAY COUNTY — Fleming Island's Kathryn McDade is currently serving with the National Civilian Community Corps, a 10-month, full-time AmeriCorps program. Founded in 1994, AmeriCorps NCCC strengthens communities and develops its young adult members into leaders.

AmeriCorps Week 2022 is an opportunity to recognize the service of the 250,000 Americans engaged in AmeriCorps and AmeriCorps Seniors programs annually. These dedicated citizens help communities across the nation, ensuring students stay on track to graduate, combatting hunger and homelessness, responding to natural disasters, fighting the opioid epidemic, helping seniors live independently, supporting veterans and military families and much more.

AmeriCorps NCCC operates out of four campuses, which serve as regional administrative hubs and training facilities. These campuses, located in Sacramento, California, Aurora, Colorado, Vinton, Iowa, and Vicksburg, Mississippi, train and deploy new classes of members several times



each year. McDade began her term of service in Fall 2021 at the Pacific Region campus in Sacramento and will graduate from the program in June 2022.

McDade is completing a series of different six- to 12-week-long service projects in different places across her assigned region as part of a five- to 12-person team. Projects support disaster relief, the environment, infrastructure improvement, energy conservation and urban and rural development

As a Team Leader, McDade is responsible for managing the daily activities of the members on their team. She serves as a role model, educator, safety manager, and liaison between the campus and project sponsor. She began their term of service with an additional month of training prior to member arrival.

Before joining the NCCC, McDade attended Fleming Island High and Florida State University, which she graduated from in 2017 with a degree in Environment and Society. McDade also served with Peace Corps in Ruvuma and Songea in Tanzania from 2019-2020.

"After being evacuated from the country and our terms ending early (due to the COVID-19 Pandemic), I was looking to fulfill the same services in a capacity that the world would allow, given the circumstances of a pandemic," McDade said. "I chose to do a national service term because it provides a balanced marriage between communities and service members to work towards a common goal."

AmeriCorps NCCC members complete at least 1,700 hours of service during the 10-month program. Corps Members are all 18 to 26 years old; there is no upper age limit for Team Leaders. In exchange for their service, all program participants receive \$6,495 to help pay for college.

Other benefits include a small living stipend, room and board, leadership development, team-building skills, and the knowledge that, through active citizenship, they can indeed make a difference. Clay County offers home repair and replacement assistance

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Clay County is now offering financial assistance to residents for home repairs, mobile home replacement, or Code Enforcement mitigation though the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG). This program is made available through a federal allocation of funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development intended to foster affordable, decent, safe, and sanitary housing in Clay County.

Program funds can be used for housing rehabilitation projects such as roofing, electrical, plumbing, heating and air conditioning, accessibility modifications, health/sanitary problems, safety code violations, and or interior/exterior damage or deterioration to the structure. Failing septic systems and old wells can be replaced by paying for connection fees, abandoning private wells, and closing septic tanks, as well as other related plumbing costs. Funds may also be used for emergency repairs to bring a home into code compliance.

Funds may also cover demolition and replacement of mobile homes that have been determined not economically feasible to rehabilitate. This strategy will only be available to persons older than 65, disabled or those who have special needs.

Clay County residents must complete and submit the CDBG Funding Application to determine eligibility. Applications will be accepted through 31. Visit http:// www.claycountygov.com/community/ Funds may also cover demolition and replacement of mobile homes that have been determined not economically feasible to rehabilitate. This strategy will only be available to persons older than 65, disabled or those who have special needs.

Required documentation includes a completed application form, state issued identification for all household members or birth certificate for all household members under the age of 18, proof of home ownership, and income verification. All applications will be processed in the order they are received. Priority will be given to individuals earning 50% or less than the area median income.

All applicants will be notified of their acceptance or denial for participation in the program.

Clay County Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners Wayne Bolla said: "Providing for a high quality of life for every Clay County resident is critical and we are pleased to be eligible for CDBG funds in Clay County to help reduce the financial burden of home repairs for our lower income residents."

TRICARE authorizes temporary prescription refill waivers in Clay County

FALLS CHURCH, Va. – The Defense Health Agency announced TRICARE beneficiaries in Florida's Clay, Highlands, Marion and Putnam counties may receive emergency prescription refills now through March 24 due to severe storms.

To receive an emergency refill of prescription medications, TRICARE beneficiaries should take their prescription bottle to any TRICARE retail network pharmacy. If the bottle is unavailable or the label is damaged or missing, beneficiaries should contact Express Scripts or their retail network pharmacy for assistance.

To find a network pharmacy, beneficiaries may call Express Scripts at (877) 363-1303

They may also search the network pharmacy locator at https://militaryrx.express-scripts.com/find-pharmacy.

If possible, visit the pharmacy where the prescription was filled. Prescriptions filled by a retail chain may be filled at another store in that chain. If the provider is available, beneficiaries can call in a new prescription to any network pharmacy.

As a reminder, TRICARE beneficiaries, other than active-duty service members, may receive urgent care from any TRICARE-authorized urgent care center or provider and do not need a referral. This allows beneficiaries to seek nonemergency care for illnesses or injuries if their primary care provider is unavailable because of emergencies.

Elections office warns of another misleading mailing

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Clay County Supervisor of Elections Chris H. Chambless is warning voters of another mail campaign by the Voter Participation Center (VPC) and the Center for Voter Information (CVI). Both VPC and CVI are non-government organizations and are NOT affiliated with the Clay County Elections Office, or any state elections office.

VPC and CVI use commercially available databases to pull personal information, which may not reflect what the Elections Office has on file. These unverified sources have resulted in letters sent to currently registered voters, deceased individuals, minor children, and even pets, causing confusion and undermining the public's trust in the elections process.

These letters may include voter registration applications with some information prefilled, and say a number of things including:

- You're not registered to vote.
- Your mailing address is incorrect.
- Your voter information needs to be updated. Clay County Elections Office makes every effort to update voter information and maintain accurate registra-

tion. Eligible voters are encouraged to visit ClayElections.gov to review their current information and find #TrustedInfo2021. Voters who have questions or want to be removed from the list are urged to contact VPC directly at (877) 255-6750 or CVI at (866) 290-1599. Or you mail email the code in your letter to VPC at unsubscribe@voterparticipation.org or CVI at unsubscribe@centerforvoterinformation.org to be automatically removed.

The chase went over the Shands Bridge and ended in the Bartram Trail area when they found the car crashed. Soto Martinez, and a woman identified as Yelian Marie Gonzalez Rivera, escaped.

Deputies found two handguns, ammunition, crack cocaine, a "significant number of tools that were "consistent with burglaries and other criminal activities" in the car.

A resident said he had video surveillance of the two spending the night in his shed. He said the couple asked if they could use his cellphone and detectives with the St. Johns Sheriff's Office said the woman sent a text message to someone else identifying herself as Helian and her companion as "Kelvin."

The GCS officer reviewed the surveillance and identified Soto Martinez as the man who ran away, according to the arrest warrant.

Soto Martinez's bond was set at \$196,518.

In other business, council members unanimously approved having alcohol sales times from 7 a.m. to 2 a.m. every day. Vice-Mayor Eddie Henley said he preferred no alcohol sales on Sunday due to it being the Sabbath, but understood the move the town was making. Anderson said the town is now in line with the county and Hauber said the town could see more revenue due to the change.

Watt said several neighboring counties have similar periods of alcohol sales.

"This is supporting our businesses," Watt said. "... It brings us in line with all the surrounding counties and the state and supports our businesses so people don't drive across the (county) line to get something so they can go to the beach on a Sunday morning. I think it's a good thing all around."

The town then turned to the state's Voluntary Home Buyout Grant program, where council members authorized the offer for three lots on the 600 block of Settlers Court for \$394,000, which is reimbursable from the state. The program is used to buy homes, damaged by Hurricane Irma, on a floodplain to turn them into open space.

JSO deputy arrested for soliciting child in Clay

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A deputy with the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office was arrested March 15 and charged with online solicitation of a child, transmission of harmful materials to a child and using a two-way communication device to facilitate a felony.

Alejandro Carmona, 47, who lives in Green Cove Springs, was caught after he sent "inappropriate images of himself" to a 16-year-old boy, according to Clay County Sheriff's Office Undersheriff Ron Lendvay. The victim hoped to get workout advice from Carmona, but instead the boy received requests for shirtless poses.

The victim received nude photos of Carmona that also showed the officer's face, CCSO said. Carmona also sent pictures of himself wearing his police uniform.

"It's disappointing when an officer tarnishes the badge," Lendvay said.

Carmona was taken to the Clay County Jail Tuesday night and he posted a \$100,000 bond.

The investigation started during the last week of February, Lendvay said. Carmona worked with JSO for more than 15 years, according to the JSO Undersheriff Pat Ivey.

"He was given the option to resign, which he refused," Ivey said.

"We will seek termination. Hopefully, he won't be employed at our agency much





Girgis twins:

ORANGE PARK - They are both super competitive for their respective teams and, according to one, the kitchen table, the Jenga table and even checkers, is no less intense.

Billy Girgis cited the batting cage as their favorite hangout with both super hyped to out-lumber the other, but Mary outed a second sport that both excel.

"Fishing, we both fish a lot and, it is all about the biggest one of the day," said Mary Girgis. "He gets out there a little more than I do, but it's pretty close."

With a dad that played college baseball, a brother, Robert, a strong lefty pitcher at Santa Fe CC and Flagler College (All Peachbelt Conference first team 2019), the Girgis name is all about pushing the envelope and 2022 will be no different for Ridgeview softball and baseball.

Billy Girgis is considered by his peers as one of the smoothest infielders: shortstop, in Clay County while Mary Girgis is a fleet-footed centerfielder for the Final Four repeating Lady Panthers softball squad; 26-4 last year with a 2-0 Class 4A state semifinal loss to eventual champion Eustis. The Lady Panthers stayed alive through the region playoffs with spinetingling wins of 2-1 over Clay (Girgis sixth inning triple for go-ahead runs) and 6-5over Baker County (returning senior Giana Michel with walkoff winner). Coach Casey Thompson loses three major players in Brittany and Brooke Michael and Ashlyn Halford: all in college.


"I think teams will underrate us because those seniors were so big," said Mary Girgis. "The baseball comes in as a underdog while we will still come out on top."

Thompson sees the team's "small ball" approach, bunts, basestealing and clutch hitting, as still integral to success despite the loss of the firepower.

Jimenez has top hitter Jacob Rowe (.465 batting average, 16RBIs) returning and senior college commit Austin Arrocha

The Girgis twins have been a tandem for most of their life with the pair starting as teammates on T-Ball locally.

"It's fun to have her around because we pushed each other but have fun doing it," said Billy Girgis. "We learn a lot from each other; hitting and fielding stuff, because we practice a lot together."

Ridgeview baseball is currently 3-3 with Girgis sporting a .353 batting average five singles and a double. Girgis has at least two hits in all six games with one four hit game in five at bats and three three hit games. Girgis also has pitched 5.1 innings




first NCAA All-American honor this season. As a freshman, Detwiler was named the New England Wrestling Association rookie of the year and a second team all NEWA team member at 21-7.



Ontario native took fourth overall at the UT Distance Classic but ran the second fastest 100m time in program history with a time of 13.26. Ramsay also competed in the 200m where she took eighth in 28.13.

Sophomore Capri Procopio led three Mocs in the 800m. The Sarasota, Fla., native took ninth overall after crossing the line in 2:27.36. Sophomore Sophie Barth finished 21st in the event after stopping the clock in 2:33.54. The final Moc finisher was senior Kate Hanna who placed 33rd after completing the two laps in 3:02.70.

Barth and freshman Emily Opalinski competed in the 1,500m. Barth took 13th in 5:04.37 while Opalinski came in 27th with a time of 5:25.70.

For the Florida Southern mens team, Jones led a group of 13 Moccasins; including Keystone Heights High grad Alex Guy, in the 5,000 m as he topped the 99-memberfield with a school record time of 14:19.08. The mark surpassed his own previous school record of 14:26.67 which he ran at last season's UNF Invitational. Graduate student Joshua Wagner was the next to cross the finish line as he posted the fourth fastest 5,000m time in program history at 14:32.07. Fellow graduate student Mitchell Kozik came across next with a 16th place finish in 15:09.22. Junior Alex Guy crossed the line in 15:15.23 to take 20th overall. Sophomore Bryson Yamnitz finished three spots back in 23rd after stopping the clock in 15:24.47. Freshman Caden Kwiatkowski picked up a 38th place showing after crossing the finish in 15:40.14. The final seven Moc finishers were sophomore Noah Ellenback (43rd/15:46.81), sophomore Zach Dale (56th/16:01.12), freshman Seth Augustynowski (57th/16:01.29), freshman James Simpson (58th/16:02.34), freshman Aiden Redmond (64th/16:14.45), junior David Pautienus (72nd/16:31.07) and freshman Jaylen Caneus (74th/16:31.96).

Sophomore Luke Dickinson competed in the 800m and took 18th overall while clocking in at 2:07.41.


