Inmates gain confidence, certifications with IN2WORK program at county jail

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - John got out of the Clay County Jail on Tuesday. After spending months incarcerated, he was eager to get to the Polk County correctional facility to take an important step in his life.

This time, however, John would be entering – and leaving – on the free side of the bars. No more striped jumpsuits. No more lockdowns. No more open showers. Freedom.

John is one of three at the jail who just completed a program called IN-2WORK, which teaches inmates the necessary skills to gain meaningful employment in the food industry. The program is designed to provide inmates a bridge between a responsible future and away from the vicious cycle that usually ends up with another lengthy sentence as a repeat offender.

John set up a job interview while he was an inmate. He hopes to take the skills – and confidence – he learned in the program to help run the commissary at the Polk County Jail.

Another graduate. JuanDavid. has been offered a job in Miami to work in

Vietnam War Veterans Day ceremony at TAPS on Saturday

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The annual Vietnam War Veterans Day ceremony will be held Saturday, March 26, 10 a.m., at the TAPS Monument, 915 Walnut St. in the Historic Triangle.

More than 250 are expected to attend the ceremony to commemorate the National Vietnam War Veterans Day. The ceremony is open to the public.

The ceremony is being held in partnership with Vietnam Veterans of America Col. William G. Byrns Chapter 1059 and the Clay County Board of Commissioners.

It is the only Vietnam War Veterans Day recognition event being held in Northeast Florida with Vietnam Veterans of America chapters from Duval, Nassau and St. Johns counties being represented at the ceremony. All Vietnam Veterans are encouraged to attend as the 50th Commemorate lapel pins and certificates will be available.

The TAPS monument in Green Cove

Springs has the names of 66 Clay County Veterans that were killed in action, 22 during Vietnam. The names of the KIA will be called followed by a bell tone ring.

The National Vietnam War Veterans Day, which is on March 29, honors the U.S. military members who served during the Vietnam War (1955-1975).

From Jan. 1, 1965, to March 28, 1973, 2.6-million military personnel served within the borders of South Vietnam. Another 50,000 served in Vietnam between 1960 and 1964.

During the Vietnam Era - August 5, 1965 to May 7, 1975 – more than 9 million served on active duty.

There were more than 58,000 U.S. military casualties in Vietnam from 1959 to 1975. There are still 1,584 missing.

Don't undermine scientific discovery – especially now

hile the pandemic is by no means over, COVID-19 isn't the only threat to public health we face. In fact, it might not even be our most serious challenge.

Despite the tragic loss of over a thousand American lives to the virus each day, case counts have dropped dramatically and hospitalizations and deaths are falling, too.

By contrast, we're rapidly losing the ability to fight "superbugs," the bacteria and fungi that have evolved and developed resistance to almost all existing antimicrobial treatments. Antimicrobial resistance (AMR) already

kills at least 35,000 Americans each year and about 700,000 people worldwide. And because these superbugs may soon learn to evade even our strongest antibiotics, they're on track to kill 10 million people worldwide annually by 2050.

A world without antibiotics would catapult us back into the medical dark ages, where simple cuts and scrapes could prove fatal, and routine procedures like joint replacements and C-sections become horrifically risky.

The only way to stop this increasing threat is to develop a new arsenal of antibiotic treatments, which will require government policies that encourage, rather than inhibit, innovation.

In recent years, many drug companies have scaled back, or even fully abandoned, their research into new antibiotics due to unfavorable economics. Drug development is expensive. Bringing a single medicine all the way from initial concept to FDA approval costs an average of \$2.6 billion and typically requires 10 to 15 years.

For antibiotics developers, those high up-front costs present a particularly thorny problem, because advanced antibiotics are only supposed to be used in emergencies. These types of medicines naturally have low sales volumes, making it tough for companies to recoup their initial investment, much less earn a return.

Some lawmakers have taken note of this market failure and proposed measures,



such as the PASTEUR Act, that would increase reimbursements for new antibiotics and reward companies that bring them to market.

Those reforms are sorely needed to combat arguably the biggest threat to public health in the 21st Century. But even those measures won't be enough if Congress proceeds with its plan to allow the government to set drug prices.

The Build Back Better Act, which is currently stalled in the Senate, allows federal officials to fix the price of dozens of common medicines. That would slash biotech companies' revenues by hundreds of billions of dollars.


Such drastic cuts in funding would force companies to scale back their research, thereby hamstring efforts to manufacture and distribute these therapies for COVID-19, superbugs, and all sorts of

other diseases, from cancer and diabetes to cardiovascular diseases.

From the perspective of patients, lowering drug prices should focus on reducing what they spend out-of-pocket. While the Build Back Better Act caps out-of-pocket spending at \$2,000, this is still too high for many patients, particularly those who are already living with one or more chronic conditions and were still well before the pandemic.

There's a lot on the table as we still work to close the door on the Covid-19 pandemic, and perhaps even more important work to prevent and prepare for future ones. Making sure that we have a stable runway for innovations that will protect us into the future should be a top priority.

Success is the result of a lot of hard work. Volunteers spend hundreds of hours working all year to make the 11 days the best of the year.

Orange Park woman plans cross country Trip for SAFE Animal Shelter

MIDDLEBURG – A coast-to-coast odyssey to benefit a local animal shelter beckons for an Orange Park couple and their adopted dog.

By bike and RV, respectively, Vicky Connell and her husband Jim Connell will travel from Florida to Washington and back again during the next few months. On the return leg, Vicky Connell will travel to Northeast Florida via bicycle.

They adopted a 4-year-old shepherd called Luna, which they nicknamed the "Lunatic," from SAFE animal shelter a few years ago. Connell said the trip was something she wanted to do her whole life.

"I thought what better way to raise money than to dedicate the trip to them and use it to raise awareness of the great work they do," she said.

The Connells will visit family in Washington, which is more than 4,000 miles away. During the bike ride on the way back, the pair will meet in the morning, pick a destination and head out in tandem on the RV and bike. She plans to take one

day off a week and believes the trip will require three months on the road.

"We're bringing our dog Luna because she's part of the family," Vicky Connell said. "It will be quite an adventure."

SAFE Animal Shelter doesn't euthanize animals, Connell said. She has a heart for stray animals and she said the shelter gives animals a second chance at life, at a home with a family.

Luna had a tough life before SAFE came into the picture. Vicky Connell said it took roughly a year for Luna to socialize and realize she had a home. Luna is at 100% now, and "loves everybody and everything," Connell said.

"We love our dog Luna so much and we're so grateful to the SAFE Animal Shelter for rescuing her. She was in a bad situation the first year of her life. She lived in a cage," Connell said, "... We could tell we had such a sweet spirit."

As for the trip, Connell called it a seed of an idea that blossomed.

"The thing with the people who do this is, you always start with your back tire in the ocean," she said. "So, I will be in Ocean

Penney Farms joins popular yard bombing trend

PENNEY FARMS – At the town's Old Fashioned Day last weekend, the trees were covered in a form of unique graffiti: swaths of yarn.

Penney Farms resident Skeeter Tower described the process as labor-intensive, but the hours of work paid off, she said.

"People were pretty excited to see it," Tower said. "A lot of people were taking pictures."

First, a target is selected to cover. Then, the yarn bombers measure the circumference of a tree's limbs. Crochet and yarn specialists are engaged, and once the piece is completed, hours of applying the yarn to the leaves occur.

Tower said the two large pieces took three weeks to make and 10 hours to apply. The finished article resembles something from a Dr. Suess book or a snakeesque pattern, meant to be eye-catching.

"The trees are beautiful themselves; that's one of the things we wanted to call attention to," Tower said.

Tower was helped by Norma Brown, a resident with a long history of community work

"(Brown) has a heart of gold and works

hard to maintain contact with residents ... like with this yarn bombing project," Tower said

The yarn is removable and Tower said she wants to preserve the art with no damage so it can be reused.

Last weekend, the yarn was exposed to some rain, but it dried quickly. The pieces were cleaned and removed after a brief period to prevent damage by bugs, Tower said.

"It didn't damage them at all," she said. Originally from Western New York state, Tower said she learned of yard bombing in an art class, where the goal was to draw attention to historic houses. The practice is used from Alberta to Australia and "yarn bombed" pieces include buildings, statues and buses. International Yarnbombing Day is June 11.

"It would draw attention to a historic house and it came to be a tradition," she said

'He was fascinating'

Former CIA station chief Natirboff lived in Keystone Heights

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — Is 100 years enough? It's a question worth asking after reviewing the life of Murat Natirboff, a former CIA station chief, World War II veteran and lecturer whose considerable accomplishments and major postings were driven by his sharpness, emotional intelligence and political will.

Natirboff died on Jan. 10 in Keystone Heights, about three weeks before his 101st birthday, where he lived the final three years of his life. He was an ethnic Circassian, but his family fled the country when the communist Bolsheviks drove out or killed millions loyal to the Russian royal family in a bloody civil war lasting five years.

Mark Natirboff, an attorney who lives in Keystone Heights, described his father as fascinating. The older Natirboff joined the Marines in World War II and was a chemical engineer, but Mark said Murat's rise to prominence came from CIA postings in Soviet Union, Indonesia, Sudan, France, Egypt, Kenya, Pakistan recruiting people, also referred to as assets, to further U.S. interests.

"He was very good at what he did," Mark Natirboff said. "He worked in the Soviet Union during the Cold War in Moscow and was the CIA station chief. That's a very hard position to obtain."

Murat Natirboff could have either been born on the Crimean Peninsula or Turkey,

adding to the intrigue of his life. He spent his childhood in New York prior to World War II.

He loved individual Russians, but detested communism. Murat's father was a colonel in the monarchist White Army that ultimately was defeated by the Bolsheviks.

"My goodness, he hated communism," Mark Natirboff said. "He said it was the worst form of government. It was like a monstrosity to him."

As for dangerous situations, Sudan is a strategic-located country in American energy interests, and in the early 1970s, it was where Natirboff was a CIA station chief.

He narrowly avoided the attack on the Saudi Arabian Embassy in Khartoum where the Black September Organization, responsible for the massacre at the 1972 Summer Olympics in Munich, took ten hostages and killed three diplomats. It was a reception for the departing deputy chief of mission to Sudan and the insurgents were searching for U.S. intelligence officials like Natirboff, his son said.

"He was right in Sudan when it happened," Mark Natirboff said. "He was blessed because he wasn't at the reception. He was the real CIA guy."

Natirboff later taught courses at the CIA for high-security clearance employees.



They were so successful it became standing-room-only, but the speakers couldn't be boring, his son said.

"If they were exciting, they got invited back. He didn't care if they were from Harvard or Princeton," Mark Natirboff said. "He was teaching these courses in his 90s." Far away from Natirboff's foreign exploits, he enjoyed life in Washington D.C., splitting time between Wellsboro, Pennsylvania and the capital, a five-hour commute on a good day. Mark Natirboff warmly described his father's driving style as menacing.

"His stack of speeding tickets got so big he had to hand in his keys," Mark Natirboff added.

In D.C., Natirboff lived in the famous Westchester, an ornate 1930s-built apartment building adorned with gargoyles.

"It was very nice, really a beautiful place with gardens, a grocery store and barber shop at a subterranean level," Mark Natirboff said. "You didn't have to leave the nlace '

Natirboff went to live with his son in 2019, he was 97. Secular for most of his life, he converted to Christianity in 2017 in D.C.

"Earlier in his life, I couldn't read the Bible to him if I begged him to," Mark Natirboff said. "He later believed that Jesus Christ was his Lord and savior."

A quick Google search of Natirboff reveals news clippings from the Washington Post, New York Times and mention in numerous books. But through the eyes of his son, Murat Natirboff was approachable with an ability to interact with anybody. He described his father as a raconteur, interested in other cultures.

"He was very good at having two-way communication and making people at ease and that's why he was so good at his job," Mark Natirboff said. "He asked about people's lives. He wanted to learn about other people, other cultures."

Gov. DeSantis celebrates teacher pay raises at Fleming Island Elementary

FLEMING ISLAND – Gov. Ron DeSantis announced \$800 million in this year's budget to raise minimum teacher pay and increase veteran teacher salaries On March 21, and he brought that message to Fleming Island Elementary. According to the governor's office, the \$800 million is a \$250 million increase over last year's funding and it brings Florida's investments in teacher pay to greater than \$2 billion since the 2020 Legislative Session. In 2020, the average starting salary for a teacher in Florida was \$40,000, which is 26th in the nation, and it jumped to ninth in the country with the new funding. "Over the last three years, we have worked hard to increase teacher pay," DeSantis said. "We have invested more than \$2 billion in teacher pay, and with rising inflation, this could not come at a better time. This will help Florida to recruit and retain great teachers." DeSantis launched his campaign to raise the starting salary to \$47,500 at Middleburg High in 2019. Among those joining the governor at the school were Reps. Sam Garrison and Billy Payne, Sen. Jennifer Bradley, Florida Commissioner of Education Richard Corcoran, Superintendent David Broskie and Fleming Island principal Jennifer Collins, who was praised by the governor after her school achieved an "A" rating in each of the past nine years.

FLEMING ISLAND – Jacksonville's Weaver Philanthropic Initiative counts a Fleming Island man among its members for its class of 2022.

Josh Longmire, senior investment portfolio manager, is one of the program's 13 participants. He said he was familiar with The Community Foundation, which runs the program, and it's how he was introduced to the initiative.

"It sounded more about philanthropy and giving specifically in the Jacksonville region," Longmire said.

The program was spearheaded by Jacksonville philanthropists and former Jacksonville Jaguars owner J. Wayne and Delores Barr Weaver. Longmire was born and raised in the community and built a career here, he said, but he wanted to learn more about the art of giving back.

"The Weavers set a footprint in Jacksonville several decades ago," he said. "I think it's just a phenomenal program."

In a press release, The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida's leader-

ship called the 13 people as the next generation of philanthropists.

They will participate in a six-month course focused on grantmaking and giving. The newest members follow in the footsteps of eight prior classes, and the organization attempts to get members to maintain philanthropic and civic leadership when the course concludes. There are about 100 alumni of the program that began in 2013.

"We are happy to be hosting the Weaver Philanthropic Initiative again this year," The Community Foundation Vice President of Philanthropic Services Joanne Cohen said. "We are pleased to be working with these class members who are all committed to our community and helping to make it the best place for us to live, work and play."

The program started last month and runs through the early summer. It culminates with class members making their own grants. It's a way of the program members paying it forward, Longmire said.

"I want to have a better understanding of the process and giving in the Northeast Florida region," Longmire said.





County helps workforce housing with ARPA dollars

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Board of County Commissioners voted unanimously to provide a workforce housing developer \$600,000 of American Rescue Plan Act funding at Tuesday night's board meeting.

A planned development, Nathan Ridge,

is a \$34 million workforce apartment project. Jacksonville-based Vestcor Companies plans on building 192 units, which are one-to-three bedrooms. It will be located near the intersection of Old Jennings Road and Discovery Drive.

TVC Development is a subsidiary of Vestcor. TVC Development Vice President Ryan Hoover told commissioners the project faces extreme increases in construction costs. Hoover said establishing funding has been a long process, using bonds

from the county, and that the project was at risk.

"The longer we wait, the worse it's going to get for us," Hoover said.

The Housing Finance Authority of Clay County determined that there exists a shortage of housing for people of low-tomoderate income in the area, according to county documents.

Commissioner Betsy Condon said rents are also skyrocketing.

As an example, she mentioned an Orange Park property built in the 1960s, which sold for \$10 million in 2019 and last month sold for \$20 million. The rents are now estimated to be in the \$1,700-\$1,900 range. Condon said projects like Nathan Ridge needed support.

"There just is not, whether you want to call it affordable workforce or whatever, housing available in Clay County," she said.

Condon and Commissioner Mike Cella relayed instances where someone asked them about renting, and the county's housing situation made for a difficult answer. Cella said counties across the state are providing much larger figures than



\$600,000 to assist workforce housing.

He cited a lack of real estate and high costs as reasons for the problem and called the funding for the project appropriate.

"It is a problem not only in the state of Florida and all 67 counties, but in this country," Cella said.





OP Council tackles trio of issues at weekend workshop

ORANGE PARK – Town council members and staff addressed three key issues at a workshop early Saturday morning: the town's waterways, infrastructure and American Disability Act compliance.

Mayor Randy Anderson said the three issues were complex and the workshop format gave each of the matters more time that a normal board meeting wouldn't.

He called for an aggressive plan to clean up the town's waterways that's practical and cost-effective.

Town Manager Sarah Campbell said the town has identified eight problem-laden basins from a 2020 stormwater plan. Town staff also listed a large amount of work the town had done or completed, such as improvements Shaw Street and Winfred Drive.

Anderson asked for a month-to-month update of projects for residents and a quarterly maintenance plan for what the town would attempt to do. Vice-Mayor Eddie Henley added that there should be signage about where work is performed.

"There may be an area residents want to avoid because of work," Henley said.


Council Member Alan Watt said the town's plan is sound, but the town doesn't have the money to accelerate it. He said the grant process is slow and he previously broached the idea of a bond issue for the town's approximately \$10 million in stormwater projects.

"We have a plan, we've had a plan for two years," he said.

Councilmember Susana Thompson said the town should use some of its remaining American Rescue Plan Act funds for stormwater projects. The town has set aside \$500,000 toward retention ponds from ARPA dollars and will receive \$2.2 million from ARPA in September. "I find that this is a need for our town and we should look at potentially putting these ARPA funds towards these necessary repairs of our tributaries," Thompson said.

Turning to infrastructure, streets were a major topic, with the council briefly reviewing its Capital Improvement Program list.

For ADA, resident Sherri Snow advo-



cated for a disability task force in the town. Resident Frank Ricketts asked for it to become policy and procedure that the town exceeded ADA's minimum standards.

"With particular areas where accessibility is problematic at the onset, we need to seriously look at those areas to make sure we are above the minimum standard to

minimize the complications that are going to occur." Ricketts said.


Watt said ADA is a federal law with no variances.

He said public involvement and better practices for the town were worth discussing, but the town already adhered to ADA.

"Everything that gets built in this town

goes through a code review which includes ADA compliance," Watt said.

Anderson and Council Member John Hauber asked for more awareness of and training for disability-related issues impacting the town. "We have the standards already, let's bring up the standards," Anderson said.





Agencies offer Hope for drug addiction; CCSO drops Hammer on pair for drugs

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — While several members of the Clay County Sheriff's Office were answering questions and offering help for its Hammer and Hope program, other members of the agency were less than eight miles away, preparing to round up two people on drug charges.

Hammer and Hope is designed to help families affected by opioid abuse, as well as addicts. Families are given information that guides them to programs and financial help to work through damage created by addictions.

At the same time, members of the sheriff's office, Clay County Fire Rescue, Florida Poison Control Centers, healthcare, abuse and social services agencies were at the First Baptist Church of Keystone Heights providing much-needed services to a community that too often struggles with drug problems.

Narcan was given away to help victims during an overdose. Also, point control gave away heavy-duty lock bags to safely keep drugs from getting into the wrong hands. A counselor with Children's Services appropriately described the six-hour-long program, saying, "Just come by. We'll have a talk and point you in the right direction."

One deputy said several residents got the information they desperately needed to fight addiction. He said the agency didn't get track of how many visited because it was more important for residents to feel comfortable in looking for answers.

FRESH Ministries offered free counseling for drug abuse prevention and employment programs.

One of the organizations that deal directly with addictions and alcoholism, the Mission of the Dirt Road had a variety of resources for the Keystone Heights area.

In all, there were 27 vendors.

"The Hammer and Hope" is a deal where we put people in jail if they are dealing drugs," said CCSO Sheriff Michelle Cook. "But it's also here to help if your family needs help. We will help you. I promise

you if you are struggling there is somebody here who can help you or point you in the right direction."

Two residents felt the hammer side of the program. The arrests were done in conjunction with the services offered at the church.

Hammer and Hope started at 10 a.m. Within three hours, two people already were on their way to jail as part of the program.

Johnathan Joseph Brooker, 31, of Keystone Heights, was arrested shortly before noon and charged with the sale and delivery of a controlled substance.

Paige Elizabeth Patterson, 26, of Melrose, was arrested on March 21 at 1:05

Paddleboarding app boosting county's nature tourism

CLAY COUNTY – A South Florida-based paddle boarding kiosk service has made a push into Northeast Florida, including three stations in Clay County.

Paddleboarders can rent equipment using PADL's solar-powered stations. The partnership began last summer, Clay County Director of Tourism Kimberly Morgan said.

"It was a unique opportunity. The county manager got a request from them to set up a PADL station and to work together, and later there was a request for proposal made," Morgan said. "They took it and ran with it."

The three locations are located at Camp Chowenwaw, Doctors Lake Park and Keystone Beach. In 2021, the company opened 22 new locations in Florida. According to the company, PADL users traversed more than 4,500 miles, with more than 5,500 hours on the water and more than 4,600 individual uses.

"They've got a very engaged following," she said. "We are their first entry into Northeast Florida. The developers are friendly. They see huge potential for Clay County."

Paddleboarders can rent equipment in a few minutes. It costs about \$19 an hour for a ride. Membership rates vary and can gain riders two hours for free and \$10 an hour after. Morgan said PADL is easy to access and other locations can offer tours, lessons or have meetups, a level the county doesn't have yet.



"Right now, we're building that awareness, working with PADL and getting the word out," Morgan said. "What we want to do now is make the stations we have to be more successful, making sure locals and visitors know this paddleboarding experience can be yours economically."

With the county's ecotourism, the COVID-19 pandemic pushed people to go to areas they hadn't traveled to, Morgan said. The county saw a substantial increase in its bed tax in 2021.

"Ecotourism is our greatest asset. Whether it's hiking or cycling or just being outside, our natural beauty is what people are continuing to want," Morgan said. "They want to see places they've never been before."





Jehovah's Witnesses returning to in-person meetings

Congregation resume services after meeting virtually for two years

CLAY COUNTY – All congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses across the world are being encouraged to begin holding in-person meetings during the week of April 1.

George and Judy Keith are Clay County residents in Middleburg. When asked how they felt about in-person meetings, Keith said, "Both my wife and I were over overjoyed. We moved right in the middle of the pandemic to a new congregation in Green Cove Springs. We knew some in the area but very few. Our meetings over the Zoomvideoconferencing was a real blessing. But Jehovah's people are 'people-people' we need to shake hands, hug, and look into one another's faces. We will love to be able to do those things once again."

For most of the last two years, buildings for worship have remained closed globally due to the risks associated with meeting in person. Jehovah's Witnesses in the United States also suspended their public ministry on March 20, 2020. Since that time, they have carried on their ministry through letters and phone calls while holding twice-weekly meetings in a virtual format. Average attendance at these meetings exceeded 1.5 million each week in the U.S., even though there are fewer than 1.3 million Jehovah's Witnesses in some 13,000 congregations.

"There is a collective shout of joy



among Jehovah's Witnesses around the world right now," said Robert Hendriks, a U.S. Spokesman for Jehovah's Witnesses. "While we have prospered in many ways as individuals and congregations using technology to bring us together, nothing can adequately replace being together in person. We have longed for this moment for the better part of two years.

"The timing of resuming in-person meetings could not be better. Bringing everyone back together for these special events will have a powerful effect on the worldwide congregation."

Guidelines for holding "hybrid" meet-

ings have been sent to all congregations in the United States. Over the past six months, many Kingdom Halls have been equipped with the required technology to hold a productive meeting that allows for in-person and remote attendees, all of whom can participate in the discussions. A pilot program was held in October and November in countries around the world to assess how this could be done most effectively. The lessons learned in these pilot meetings have helped form the plan for moving forward with reopening all Kingdom Halls, where the law permits.

As of now, Jehovah's Witnesses have

In fact, since the start of the pandemic through November 2021 in the United States, Jehovah's Witnesses spent more than 400 million hours in virtual Bible studies, writing letters of comfort to their neighbors and making phone calls. They have released 77 new language translations of the Bible and held two global virtual conventions in more than 500 languages.

"No time was wasted in the past two years," said Hendriks. "Our congregants have been busy and productive helping each other and their neighbors through this most challenging time. That's what love and unity are all about."

Woman arrested for extorting former lover for protection against 'mafia'

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - A jilted woman was arrested on March 15 after the Clay County Sheriff's Office said she extorted a

former lover for protection against the "mafia."

Kristina Michele Fanning, 48, of Overland Park, Kansas, was charged on March 16 with extortion, making threats and grand theft after she became angry the victim wouldn't

end his marriage. Fanning told the victim she needed money because the mafia or a cartel threatened to kidnap her, the victim and his family, according to the arrest re-

Fanning was angry because she said she had an affair with the victim while they lived in Kansas. The affair ended when the victim and his wife moved to Florida. Fanning eventually moved to Florida, too.

The victim paid \$1,000 for protection to Fanning last November, according to CCSO. On Jan. 15, the victim paid another \$10,000. Ten days later, Fanning said the mafia wanted \$2,000 to make sure the victim's daughter wouldn't be kidnapped and another \$1,000 to keep his wife safe. The demands for money were sent in emails.

CCSO said Fanning also is accused of telling the victim the "mafia" needed to see them in public acting like a loving couple.

While being questioned, CCSO said Fanning admitted she developed a plan to extort money from the man in an effort to spend more time with him.

Fanning's bond was set at \$75,006.

Fugitive extradited from Spain to face molestation charge

JACKSONVILLE - A 72-vear-old man from Middleburg was extradited from Rota, Spain, back to Clay County to face a twoyear-old charge of molesting a minor who was younger than 12.

Ronald Anthony Macedo was taken into custody at Jacksonville International Airport on March 21 by members of the U.S. Marshal's Service and Florida Caribbean Regional Fugitive Task Force after he was caught in Spain and re-

turned to the United States.

He originally was charged with molestation in October 2020 after deputies said he inappropriately touched a minor twice between Aug. 6, 2002, and Oct. 28, 2008.

A warrant was issued 15 months ago after he apparently fled.

Now that he's back at the Clay County Jail, he's being held without bond.

Three dead in pair of Clay County crashes

CLAY COUNTY - Three people, including two girls visiting from Canada during spring break, were killed in two accidents last week.

A 62-year-old man from Green Cove Springs was killed on U.S. Highway 17 in a wrong-way head-on collision on Fleming Island on March 17.

The Florida Highway Patrol said the man was driving the wrong way on U.S. 17 when he slammed into a car driven by a 42-year-old man from Glen St. Mary. That man suffered critical injuries.

On Saturday, Madeline Kort, 13, and Joni Kort, 10, died at the intersection of County Road 218 and U.S. Highway 301 in Maxville when a cement truck slammed into the back of their minivan and pushed it into the back of an SUV.

The accident happened at 6 a.m. on March 19, the Florida Highway Patrol reported.

The minivan was being driven by Pi-

eter Kort, a lawyer from Belleville, Ontario, Canada, according to Kort's law office partner Ed Kafka. Hannah Kort, 16, and the mother, Jamie Kort, were taken to an Intensive Care Unit in critical condition, while Kort and his son, Ethan, also suffered injuries.

The SUV and minivan were accelerating northbound through the intersection following a light change when a cement pumping truck rear-ended both of them.

A portion of the Kort's minivan was wedged under the front of the truck.

There were five people in the SUV, FHP said. The driver was a 72-year-old man from Gainesville and the other four passengers, including a 3-year-old girl and a 12-year-old boy, were from Fort Collins, Colorado. Nobody in the SUV was seriously injured.

The driver of the cement truck, a 48-year-old man from Gainesville, wasn't hurt.

Aramark's warehouse.

Justin, who's not scheduled to be released until June, knows he faces a promising future once he's released.

"I can't change what I did, but I can re-write my wrong," Justin said. "You don't have to be in the past. You can be in the future. Here I am to learn from this."

The rigorous eight-week IN2WORK program is offered by Aramark, the company which has the food preparation contract at the jail. Aramark's Maryanna McCray and Patty Atkinson, the Program Unit Supervisor at the jail, realized offering inmates a path to success would decrease their chances of getting in trouble again.

"I was approached by Maryanna McCray," Atkinson said. "She sent me a PowerPoint, showing me how they teach the different cooking techniques. They had to learn about customer service skills, and then get enough training where they can take the state certification test. The state certification gives them safe service, which helps them get a position like an assistant manager of a restaurant.

"I love the idea because I really want people to leave here better than when they came in."

All three earned their ServSafe certificates, a state-level diploma that assures they've been trained to properly handle food and alcohol.

"This was to better our skills, to give us a better understanding how everything works," JuanDavid said. "Ms. Mc-Cray gave us the opportunity, not just on the level of management, but how to supervise certain equipment, how to supervise a crew, how to do things more efficient and better."

JuanDavid, who will be released within a month, said it was important to

focus on a promising future than dwelling on a regrettable past.

"This is a great program because Clay County does not have re-entry services," he said. "You have to think: what are you guys in here for? Even a misdemeanor can hold you up. They're very hard on the sentencing part here. You can lose any kind of stability in the first 30 days you're in here. If you've been in here for an x-amount of time and you don't have any re-entry services, this gives us an opportunity to reenter back into society.

"We have job interviews. In my situation, I'm a father. That's one of the biggest elements for us is that we can go out there and gain the ability so that we can meet our responsibilities, to accel after a bad episode."

The class wasn't easy, McCray and Atkinson said. Eight started, but only three made the final cut. Their final exam required them to make several delectable desserts like chocolate mousse and tarts.

"We set the standard high here," Mc-Cray said. "They can only go up."

"The main reason why is to better my education and my skills," John said. "I've already been in the food and beverage industry and hospitality part of everything. I felt like if I'm going to be here, make the best of the situation. The simple matter of the fact is, I will be leaving here with a certificate — and the opportunity to feel like I did something with myself while I was incarcerated."

And the freedom to go home when the workday is done.

Surgeries will be done on Tuesdays at the Clay Humane clinic. Registration is required for the 40 weekly sterilization slots available. Those interested must email Clay County Animal Services at claymedical@claycountygov.com by Thursday at 5 p.m. to get cats scheduled for the following Tuesday. You will receive an email confirmation of the number of cats you are approved to bring. If you do not have access to email, you can call (904) 529-5876 for assistance.

Cats can be dropped off at the Clay Humane clinic between 7:45-8:30 a.m. on Tuesdays and must be picked up on the same day. Services provided will include spay/neuter surgery, Rabies and FVRCP vaccinations, and ear-tipping.



"We know there is an issue with feral and community cats, and Clay County is moving forward with a plan to reduce unwanted breeding by offering free TNVR services through a partnership with Clay Humane," BCC Chairman Wayne Bolla said. "We also plan to expand sterilization capacity at the new animal shelter, currently in the design phase, and to partner with local veterinarians to outsource sterilization surgeries.

Commissioners are committed to drastically increasing the number of feral and community cat sterilizations done each year and hope to place Clay County at the forefront of dealing with the outdoor cat population."

Jim Tuttle loved his Fleming Island baseball

FLEMING ISLAND - Amongst a virtual Who's Who of former Fleming Island High School baseball greats past and present, including coaches, Fleming Island baseball coach Jim Tuttle's family got a final farewell from the baseball family of the Golden Eagles at Monday's game against Bartram Trail.

"He just loved being in the dugout with these boys," said Martha Tuttle, his wife of 37 years who was joined by sons Austin and Bryson on the field as the 2022 Golden Eagles presented the Tuttle family with personalized Jim Tuttle bases around the infield and a emblazoned plaque for Jim Tuttle's nearly two decades of dedication to Fleming Island baseball.

Tuttle was diagnosed with cancer in his kidney in October and surpisingly passed away just a month later to the shock of his immediate friend.

"He thought he had kidney stone, but it was worse and fast," said Martha Tuttle. "He was 60."

Joining the Tuttle ceremonies were former coaches Don Suriano and Marty Lanoux who built the Fleming Island program into the state rankings from the 2005 era.

"He's been around for everything here," said Lanoux. "The family part of the program came from Jim influence. He was good at teaching them to see beyond themselves."

Also on the field, present head coach Grant Bigilin, a former Fleming Island High standout infielder, has had a full circle of sorts with being named as head coach a few years ago.

"He was here as a coach when coach Bigilin was playing, then was here when Grant started coaching, then got to be on the field with Grant as coach, Jim as a coach and son Austin as a field umpire," said Martha Tuttle. "He was very proud of last year's team that went to the state championship."

Tuttle, who never played high school baseball because of work as the fourth boy

in the family, started his coaching when his two boys arrived. Tuttle's dad played semipro ball in the Sanford area years ago.

"Grant and Austin played infield together here," said Martha Tuttle. "There was some chatter in the other dugout when they were all three on the field as coach and umpire but I know Jim was more proud than anything to have it happen for a couple games."

Martha Tuttle remembered Jim came home with a big smile after Bryson smashed a grand slam against Baker County before playing some college ball at St. Johns River State College. Bryson Tuttle went to Lake Sumter then played some club ball at University of Central Florida.

Austin hit a homer at Fleming Island during a game that Jim liked as Austin was not noted as a big power hitter.

"He really liked just being at the game and watching them play," said Martha Tuttle. "We had very little time without baseball or softball in our 37 years, but I was a good coach from the stands. Nothing I ever suggested was used on the field."

Don Suriano was a mentor for Tuttle and, according to Martha Tuttle, Jim always loved watching and learning from Suriano.

Tuttle, who worked in real estate, did have a brother Allen who coached at Lake Mary High School for a long while creating a similarly strong program down there. Allen Tuttle spent 32 years at Lake Mary and also got recognized by his peers with the naming of the Allen Tuttle Field at Lake Mary in 2002.

Martha Tuttle noted that Jim Tuttle never really strived to be a head coach somewhere.

"He did win a baseball commissioner position when we were in Pensacola and they told him if he didn't like the way it was run, he should run," said Martha Tuttle. "He ran and won and ran the league for a long time."

Martha Tuttle said her husband had nearly 300 people visit his funeral services.

"He was friendly to everyone he knew," said Martha Tuttle.



Hudson wins third Frosh of week gymnastics award

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. – Alabama's Lilly Hudson was named the Southeastern Conference Freshman Gymnast of the Week for the third time this season after another standout performance February in Baton Rouge, the league office announced in a press release.

The Fleming Island, Fla., native helped Alabama to a season-best road score of 197.600 at No. 5 LSU with a career best all-around score of 39.550.

Hudson finished second in the all-around as well as on the floor exercise with a score of 9.900. Hudson also recorded a 9.925 on the balance beam to help boost the team score to a 49.625 in the event, the Tide's second highest score of the season and tied for the fourth highest in program history.

Hudson spoke at a pre-Southeastern Conference championship press conference saying watching Alabama win their 10th SEC title a year ago and now seeing herself contributing is exciting.

"It's one thing to watch it and watch them succeed," said Hudson, who was part of Alabama's 31st top two finish; second to Florida on March 19. "Now, this year to actually be a part of it is even bigger and better. I'm excited for this post season."

At the SEC championships held last weekend, Hudson, with a 9.900 on the vault pushed Alabama to a 49.350 score for the event, also scored a 9.900 on the uneven parallel bars.

"That bar rotation was on fire," said Alabama head coach Dana Duckworth. "I feel on floor and vault we got through it, and then on bars and beam we went out and dominated."

The Crimson Tide, ranked sixth nationally coming into the meet, finished just behind No. 2 Florida (198.200), and ahead of No. 6 Auburn (197.225), No. 11 Missouri (196.875), No. 5 LSU (196.725), No. 17 Arkansas (196.450), No. 9 Kentucky (196.350) and No. 22 Georgia (195.800).

With its second-place finish, Alabama remains the only school in SEC history to never finish outside the top four at the conference championship meet.







the same result plus one.

"We stay with the same basic principles of being prepared and being ready," said Lucas, now 6-1 with a recent blowout win over Bolles behind a two homer night by senior Brad Hodges. "This is a veteran, experienced lineup and we sometimes have to knock them down a bit, practice hard and make them continue to work to improve, then show up at the game and tell them they are invincible."

Lucas, with a tenure of building success step by step, cited his senior guys as the driving force of the momentum.


"This is the best culture of a team that I have ever been a part of because they push each other every day; game and practice," said Lucas, citing Hodges, Finn Howell, Jordan Taylor, Tyce Moore, Dalton Moore and Cooper Hunt, all seniors on the Spartans roster, as embracing his philosophy and putting it on the field. "We went to LaGrange against really good competition and hit like .400 as a team. The team was excited to face him."

last year, five state titles since 2014), La-Grange (4A, 21-12 last year, eight Final Fours since 2004 3A state title) and Buford and came home with three wins and a thrilling 8-7 loss to still-unbeaten (14-0, third ranked USA; 32-2 last year) 6A-Buford, the state runnerup last year).

"We didn't see Lesko (Buford pitcher Dylan Lesko, Gatorage National Baseball Player of Year), but they threw a guy going to the University of Miami," said Lucas. "They hit it really well the whole visit, no complaints."

Hodges has been the solid leader in the batter's box (.586, 10 hits, two doubles,

five homers), with junior shortstop Shawn Andrade (.448, 13 hits, eight singles, four doubles, one homer) being Lucas' surprise player thus far.

"He has worked his butt off to be in the lineup and be right up there with Brad," said Lucas. "As a 10th grader last year, he just grinded his way into the lineup as a right fielder even though he just committed to University of South Florida as an infielder."

Lucas credited graduated Connor Moore, now at Florida State University, with instilling the Spartan work ethic last year into the younger guys. "Connor would stay and work with Shawn in the batting cage and he put that team pride to keep improving in him and he took to it," said Lucas. "All these guys like each other and hang out together and that's a big plus. We have few young guys; Kyle Boylston, Kody Daneault, both young players who we felt could fill the open spots from last year. Isaiah Mameo has had a big bat so far even though he is a pitcher commit to South Florida."

For the rest of the 2022 season, Lucas is focused on batting prowess and smart baserunning tactics.

"We had power last year and we lost a lot of that with a bunch of home run hitters, but this year we knew we were going to be a different team," said Lucas. "We don't have as much pop, but we will have more average and get people on base. We are better at the line drives and putting the ball in play. We struck out a bunch last year. We either hit homers or struck out."

St. Johns gets a gauntlet of games to finish the regular season with a possible replay of a game against Fleming Island postponed by rain, but the Spartans facing the likes of Clay (8-1), Trinity Christian, Episcopal, Providence and Oakleaf.

"Trinity is going to give us all we want in our new district," said Lucas, who saw a Trinity 3-0 win over Oakleaf recently. "Trinity has our attention. We will both be in the playoffs."

Lucas' upcoming schedule includes four games in nine days; Providence, Oakleaf, Trinity Christian and, finally, Clay (8-3) on Thurs., March 31.

"The Clay game is always a good rivalry and they are hitting real well now," said Lucas. "We have Trinity two days prior to the Clay game and that will dictate our starting lineup."

Clay returned home from a Tampa weekend that included a 6-2 loss to unbeaten Berkeley Prep (3A region finals last year) and a 3-2 loss to Tampa Catholic (3A region semis last year).

The Blue Devils face Trinity Christian (6-3) on Thurs., March 24 and Bartram Trail (5-5, March 19 6-5 loss to Berkeley Prep) on Fri., March 25 before hosting the Spartans on Thurs., March 31.






