Local son has an emptiness, respect created by his father's sacrifice



LAKE ASBURY – The radar went dark on March 16, 1966, over Lai Chau Province in North Vietnam. Jim Underwood was just 12 – and a half-world away trying to comprehend society's discord, his father's void and the isolation a child of the military could only understand.

Clay Health: Follow these guidelines during baby formula shortage

County's WIC program not affected by lack of supplies

FLEMING ISLAND – The Department of Health in Clay County is monitoring the current infant formula shortage and takes this life-threatening issue very seriously.

On May 12, 2022, State Surgeon General Joseph Ladapo sent a letter to U.S. Food and Drug Administration Commissioner Robert Califf regarding the formula shortages affecting some of Florida's most vulnerable populations. DOH-Clay wants to ensure Floridians are kept up to date on this issue and have the correct information on how to protect your family.

When the initial recall was issued by Abbott Nutrition in February, the Department immediately reached out to retailers that accept the Women, Infants and Children benefits to recommend ordering an alternative supply of formula. For our medically complex children that depend on medical specialty formula, the Department

found alternative products to off-set the shortage.

The current recall does not affect Florida's primary WIC milk-based formula, but the shutdown of the Abbott plant in Sturgis, Michigan, is causing strain on the entire formula market. In a recent press release from Abbott, the company stated they could restart their factory within two weeks, and get products to shelves six to eight weeks after the restart.

For Florida families in need of certain metabolic formulas, Abbott continues to



release these products on an as-needed basis with a referral from a health care professional. These products were not included in the recall and have been tested and comply with all product release requirements before distribution. Impacted families should contact their health care provider or local WIC office to ensure they are getting the necessary formula.





DeSantis' style makes him a national influencer

hile the Beltway crowd may not like his style, it's his record that will become his legacy.'

Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis continues to make his mark nationally, the latest example being one of the most prestigious placements in mainstream media.

DeSantis, who often decries the legacy, corporate press, was recognized by arguably the prime example of the genre this week, with Time Magazine honoring the first-term Republican Governor as one of the 100 Most Influential People of 2022.

DeSantis, whose calling card has been a legacy of conservative, disruptive reforms, was sympathetically contextualized by a previous Republican Governor known for his own willingness to shake up the status quo

"While the Beltway crowd may not like his style, it's his record that will become his legacy," wrote former Gov. Jeb Bush.

Bush's blurb supporting DeSantis highlights the Governor's willingness to carry on despite critics and naysayers.

"During the pandemic, most people stayed home, and those who didn't probably moved to Florida. Despite relentless criticism, Gov. Ron DeSantis kept schools open, ensured Florida's economy remained open for business, and allowed individuals to determine their own risk tolerance," Bush asserted, writing that DeSantis' approach "works."

"It's one that has allowed Florida to emerge from the pandemic as a national model of personal freedom, economic growth, environmental protection, and education excellence."

Bush extolled Florida's performance on a number of key metrics, while lauding the Governor's commitment to environmental reform.

"Florida continues to see record population growth, unemployment remains below the national average, the private sector is growing, and Florida remains a national leader in school choice. On top of that, DeSantis has demonstrated his environmental credentials with major investments to restore America's Everglades, preserve and expand wildlife corridors, and protect Florida's precious waterways."

Critics on the Left will chop this up, but for those who believe DeSantis is the future of the Republican Party, the conservative movement, or both, it's clear the national media is starting to take notice of Florida's DeSantis-era public policy approach.

Bradley helps push stricter condo inspections across finish line during the Special Session

reaching a deal to require stricter inspections for condominiums, the agreement is advancing through the Legislature.

On Tuesday, the Senate passed the language as an amendment to a related bill and the House Appropriations Committee teed up the House version for a final vote expected Wednesday. At both stops, lawmakers approved the language unanimously.

Miami Republican Rep. Daniel Perez filed the legislation Tuesday afternoon, eleven months after the Champlain Towers South collapsed in Surfside. The 101-page bill is the culmination of months of work by legislative leaders and local lawmakers.

"We were able to accomplish – not just for Surfside families but for all Floridians that live in condominiums – a product that they should be proud of, because I think we accomplished our goal, which is one step closer to making sure what happened in Surfside never happens again," Perez told Florida Politics.

Fleming Island Republican Sen. Jennifer Bradley, the Senate Community Affairs Chair who sponsored the reform bill during the Regular Session, filed the language as an amendment to Bradenton Republican Sen. Jim Boyd's roofing bill.

"We spent a lot of time last Session talking about condo reform, but ultimately proved to not be enough time," Bradley told Senators. "But I pledged at that time when Session ended, and Senator (Jason) Pizzo did as well, that we would not stop trying to find a solution and trying to find a meaningful response to what was an absolute tragedy in Surfside."

Pizzo, a Miami-Dade Democrat whose district includes the site of the collapsed tower and who was on the scene following the collapse, says he is the only Senator to live in a condo.

"I do not ever want you guys to see the body or body parts of loved ones in a pile," Pizzo told Senators.

The language is mostly a product pushed by the Senate during this year's Regular Session that died during a pingpong of negotiations at the end of the Session. Ahead of the Special Session on property insurance, negotiations picked up where the Senate left off in March, with stronger condo inspection requirements that chamber passed unanimously plus a maintenance reserve requirement for condo associations.

Per the legislation, condo buildings at least three stories tall within three miles of the coast would have to be inspected when the buildings reach 25 years of age. Those more than three miles inland would be inspected at 30 years. After the initial "milestone" inspection, the buildings would need an inspection every 10 years. The legislation also includes transparency measures so that inspection records are made available to buyers, renters and unit owners.

Gov. Ron DeSantis had summoned lawmakers to Tallahassee to address a looming property insurance crisis this week. Lawmakers returning to Tallahassee to address a topic adjacent to condo inspections served as a catalyst

Reader: Don't blame mothers at border for baby formula shortage

I would like to comment on the provision of baby formula to mothers and babies in custody at the border. The key phrase is not "baby formula," but "custody," which means detention.

These refugee mothers are not able to go anywhere and seek provision for their children. Under law, food must be provided to them: therefore there is needed storage of such, otherwise, their babies would starve. This has nothing to do with the crisis present for the American public now, which is due to several things: first, Abbott, the Company whose formula was contaminated and led to some infant illnesses and deaths, was outed by a whistleblower months before the FDA did anything.

The company falsified its inspection results and knowingly released contaminated products. Abbott is also only one of four companies nationwide producing neces-

sary formula, and the only one accessible to mothers relying on the WIC Program for aid.

This was a major failure and must be addressed by increasing the number of safe outlets for such products. Let everybody take the blame that deserves it, but doesn't blame mothers detained at the border. It is disingenuous to suggest that they have received "preferential" treatment.

(U.S. Rep. Kat) Cammack might better pay attention to the needs of families and children in her District who need increased health care access or who are in food-insecure - programs against which she has voted, "because it would increase taxes on the Middle Class."

Bringing up "the Border" is an attention-shifting partisan ploy.

Elections Supervisor reminds voters to trust, but verify the count

CLAY COUNTY – Recently, in another state's jurisdiction, it was announced that a significant number of mail ballots returned by voters were unable to be scanned due to a printing error by its vendor. The problem was discovered shortly after canvassing began on Election Day in that state.

That county's Board of Elections explained the incorrect printing happened after elections staff had approved the vendor's test ballots, which had the correct identification code and had scanned properly.

While Clay County Elections Office can certainly empathize with this story, we do have several advantages in place to prevent this issue.

In Clay County, we code or create our election files, and subsequently our ballots in-house, and are the only source from which any ballot is created. The test ballots are used and validated through every part of the process. We also randomly sample ballots from all our production methods- including our Ballot on Demand printers (used during in-person voting),

ExpressVote (ADA) machines and Vote by Mail ballots, to use in pretesting and Logic and Accuracy testing.

The biggest difference is that the state's law doesn't allow mail ballots to be opened until after 7 AM on Election Day. Florida law states Vote by Mail ballots can begin being processed once we've completed the Logic and Accuracy Test. Any anomalies or errors can be identified far in advance of Election Day and gives us plenty of time to make corrections and alert voters to any problems.

We do our absolute best to minimize the chance of errors, but they can happen. However, having the time to find a potential problem and, more importantly, to correct it, gives Clay County a distinct advantage.

While the Beltway tries to belittle his influence, the governor has turned to a baseball-themed campaign to fight off the attacks.

Long before entering politics, DeSantis was an accomplished baseball player. He learned the game in the Sunshine State, complete with a trip to the Little League World Series. DeSantis would eventually take the diamond for Yale University.

DeSantis is in a different field of play now, standing in the batter's box at press conferences most days, as pitch after pitch comes in from the situational hurlers of the Florida media.

In a new promotional effort for his re-election campaign, the Governor yet again turns the tables on his adversaries in the working press and uses the baseball motif to frame the narrative and, perhaps, to cull more donations for what has been a dynamic fundraising push thus far for the re-election bid.

The digital spot begins with an announcer's voice: "The corporate media's been throwing curveballs all day long,

but they can't get anything past this batter."


Indeed, the DeSantis on display dispatches his media adversaries, launching zingers and dingers at corporate press ringers over a hard-rocking soundtrack loop.

"It's why people don't trust people like you, because you peddle false narratives,' DeSantis asserted to one luckless journalist in this collection of clips.

"These are smear merchants," the Governor groused at another event. "That's why nobody trusts corporate media.

While the trust of corporate media may be in doubt, what's assured is DeSantis has a collection of merchandise ready to match this spot. A set of 500 "limited edition Gov. DeSantis classic baseball cards" is available, with each one costing \$49.99. Quantities are capped at three on the website form. For those who want more of a personal touch, an auction is still in process for autographed cards. The auction concludes Friday, May 27, at 11:59 p.m. or until the maximum bid of \$3,000 is reached, whichever is sooner.

DeSantis, who is increasingly becoming a national figure, continues to dominate the fundraising race against potential Democratic challengers. Gimmicks like this will only help to keep that trend going.

State issues blue-green algae warning for Doctors Lake-Mill Cove

Special for Clay County Department of Health

CLAY COUNTY – The Florida Department of Health in Clay has issued a Health Alert for the presence of harmful blue-green algal toxins in Doctor's Lake – Mill Cove. This is in response to a water sample taken on May 17. The public should exercise caution in and around Doctor's Lake – Mill Cove.

Residents and visitors are advised to take the following precautions:

- Do not drink, swim, wade, use personal watercraft, water ski or boat in waters where there is a visible bloom.
- Wash your skin and clothing with soap and water if you have contact with algae or discolored or smelly water.
- Keep pets away from the area. Waters, where there are algae blooms, are not safe for animals. Pets and livestock should have a different source of water when algae blooms are present.
- Do not cook or clean dishes with water contaminated by algae blooms. Boiling the water will not eliminate the toxins.
 - Eating fillets from healthy fish caught

in freshwater lakes experiencing blooms is safe. Rinse fish fillets with tap or bottled water, throw out the guts and cook fish well.

• Do not eat shellfish in waters with algae blooms.

What is blue-green algae?

Blue-green algae are a type of bacteria that is common in Florida's freshwater environments. A bloom occurs when rapid growth of algae leads to an accumulation of individual cells that discolor water and often produce floating mats that emit unpleasant odors.

Some environmental factors that contribute to blue-green algae blooms are sunny days, warm water temperatures, still water conditions, and excess nutrients. Blooms can appear year-round but are more frequent in summer and fall. Many types of blue-green algae can produce toxins.

Is it harmful?

Blue-green algae blooms can impact human health and ecosystems, including

fish, and other aquatic animals.

To report fish kills, contact the Florida Fish and Wildlife Research Institute at (800) 636-0511.

Report symptoms from exposure to a harmful algal bloom or any aquatic toxin to the Florida Poison Information Center. Call (800) 222-1222 to speak to a poison specialist immediately.

Contact your veterinarian if you believe your pet has become ill after consuming or having contact with blue-green algaecontaminated water.

If you have other health questions or concerns about blue-green algae blooms, please call the Florida Department of Health in Clay County at (904) 278-3784.


disrepair.


\$27,000 in scholarships. Recipients from Clay, Duval and St. Johns County schools demonstrated exceptional work ethic and relationship building with industry professionals.



Lakeside's Matz a Top-5 finalist for state teacher of the year honor

ORANGE PARK – Melissa Matz, Clay County's 2023 Teacher of the Year, has gotten used to officials barging into her classroom with good news.

The enthusiastic math teacher at Lakeside Junior High is in the final five for the state Teacher of the Year. In February, Matz received the county award at the Thrasher-Horne Center.

Mirroring how local district officials surprised her in her classroom, a team with state Deputy Chancellor for Educator Quality Paul Burns, School Board Chairwoman Mary Bolla and superintendent David Broskie did the same thing last week.

"It was amazing again. It's wonderful for (state officials) to see Clay County. I feel proud. Now, they get to see how supportive Clay is for its teachers. It's starting to be a regular thing," Matz said with a laugh. "(Students) are used to it."

Math is not a universally loved subject, but Matz's practices involve meeting students halfway with real-world examples. Matz aims to talk to every student during her class and tries to take them out of their mathematical comfort zones.

Matz, who has been with the district for about 18 years, is focused on her craft and said teachers aren't in the profession for money or recognition. The Lakeside Junior High community also did its part to get Matz where she is, the teacher said.

"For our faculty, staff and administrative team we have a common goal, which is doing what's best for the students," she said of her school. "We do it to make a difference in our student's lives year after year."

Matz has served as the school's Math Department Head and leadership team member since 2015. She is the chairperson for Lakeside's School Advisory Committee and a school representative for district curriculum-map writing, the district said. Accolades for Matz and the other four finalists came from the highest educational levels of the state.

"My congratulations to Melissa Matz on being named one of five Florida Teacher of

"Melissa Matz's students see firsthand that the skills they acquire in her classroom can be applied to a broad spectrum of fields, and therefore, they can become well-rounded members of our community," Broskie said.

For the state's evaluation, Matz completed a write-up and described strategies she used, putting together a packet with student work samples.

"It's a lot of writing, but it's great because it's a reflection of how we teach," Matz said.

The Teacher of the Year process centers around recognition but also networking. Matz is gearing up to attend state events in Tallahassee and Orlando.

"It really brings the state together," she said





According to the organization's Director of Development Lynne Dougherty, Clay County's only abuse shelter was the second in Florida to include pets as part of their shelter. Now that number has slowly grown to 14 out of 41 shelters.

"Quigley House advocates help survivors create safety plans and answer calls from our helpline," Dougherty said. "We

provide counseling, referrals and sexual assault response for forensic evidence collection 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. In our Sexual Assault Program, 43 survivors received forensic medical exams and were accompanied by a Quigley House Advocate last year."

She said there now are 10 kennels available to survivors of violence. Nationwide, there are only 250 kennels.

"Quigley House is proud to be the second domestic violence shelter in the state of Florida to provide an on-site pet shelter for survivors escaping violence. Currently, there are 14 other shelters in the state of Florida and only 250 nationwide to offer this haven for pets of domestic violence survivors," she said.

"In addition to a secure kennel, the pets are provided with food, water, bowls, bedding, toys, medical services such as spay/ neuter surgery, vaccinations, heartworm testing, microchips, collars and leashes. There are 10 kennels available for large-breed dogs, which are spacious enough to accommodate two small dogs from the same family. We also have an on-site, climate-controlled feline facility that can house 10 cats or other small pets. Both facilities are in dire need of repair and updating."

By offering a safe place for both pets and survivors alike, Dougherty said the need to expand and repair in ongoing. The donation from the Orange Park Women's Club will be enough to sponsor three of the organization's kennels

"Each year, Quigley House Pet Shelter houses an average of 25 pets who escaped an abusive home with their human family. Abusers often use violence against the pets to intimidate their partner," Dougherty said. "Fearing for the safety of their pet, the individual feels forced to stay in the relationship. Providing a pet shelter gives survivors an extra level of comfort and security knowing that their pets can come with them, thereby preventing further abuse to both the pet and the family."

Dougherty said Quigley House is the only domestic violence and sexual assault center in Clay County, Florida, that is certified by the Florida Department of Children and Families and the Florida Council Against Sexual Violence.

The programs, services, and resources we offer prepare survivors to break down and break through the barriers that would otherwise make it difficult to live independent of an abusive relationship.

have not gone unnoticed in regard to the success of our school system these past few years," he said.

District board members approved a continuation of a 1 mill rate increase meant for school security. They choose Spring Park Elementary as the name for its newest school, off of County Road 315.

According to state data, the district maintained its Top 10 in a COVID-stricken 2020-2021 school year. Prominent education resource website Niche ranked the Clay County School District as the fourth-best district in the state. Broskie said the district would continue to push academic

options for students like Career and Technical Education

"Every senior high school offers an accelerated pathway for college readiness or a Career and Technical pathway that has an industry certification," Broskie said. "Our newest program is a partnership with Garber Automall and Middleburg High School, which will now host an academy with a direct career pathway for students in automotive repair."

However, there were challenges. The most visible was and still is hiring teachers and support personnel like bus drivers. The supply chain crisis also impacted the district, with the district exploring options in terms of buying buses.

According to the district, 100 of its 240 buses were recently replaced as part of a fleet modernization plan. It reduced the repairs needed and the demand for parts. The organization also increased its number of critical items such as oil and fuel filters, brake drums, brake shoes and tires.

"The Clay County District Schools Transportation Department has been working to monitor supply chain issues to be as proactive as possible. We are actively reviewing proposals regarding the purchase of school buses configured for Exceptional Student Education transportation," the district said in a statement.

"These buses, if approved, would be used to replace a number of older buses with a specific engine model that we have found to have limited parts availability."

But potential change is on the horizon. The county continues to grow, and with it, the district. Three school board members face re-election in Districts 1, 3 and 5 by November. The millage continuation also faces a vote from taxpayers.

Broskie said the past few years with COVID-19 have been tough. He was elected to the district's highest position in November 2020 after spending about nine months as interim superintendent, but the former teacher and principal refered to himself as a 30-year employee of the district.

"I continue to be excited about the future of Clay County District Schools as we build our 43rd school next year, and I look forward to a traditional start to the 2022-2023 school year," he said.

to reach a final deal.

Negotiations initially fell apart in the waning hours of the Regular Session in March, when the Senate insisted on stron-

ger condo inspections and the House insisted on the reserve fund requirement. Travis Moore, a lobbyist who has been advocating for stronger condo inspection measures since the day of the collapse, told Florida Politics he began pushing for lawmakers to revisit condo inspections during the Special Session when he concluded that the

desired legislation was closely related to building code issues.

The measure also received support from the Florida Engineering Society and American Council of Engineering Companies of Florida, which was part of the Surfside Working Group and helped develop the recommendations following the Champlain Towers South collapse.

Like Pizzo, Aventura Democratic Rep. Joe Geller's district included the condo. "This is what Special Sessions are for," Geller told House members. "This is when you almost get there and can't quite, and you need to come back. Hard work gets it done."

St. Johns Classical Academy celebrates first senior class

FLEMING ISLAND - St. Johns Classical Academy has been operational fewer than five, years and it has now reached a key milestone for any school: its first graduating class.

The K-12 school has an enrollment of 789 students this school year and its first group of graduates had 22 seniors.

The school has a lot to build on after its "A" grade from the state for the 2020-2021 school year, the school's founding Board President Diane Hutchings said. It's hard not to be excited for the first seniors, she said.

"The class has done a really good job setting the tone," Hutchings said.

The school's waitlist is hovering around 1,000 students, Hutchings said. The school is seeking to open another branch in the Lake Asbury area. The Fleming academy open the summer of 2017. Students wear uniforms and learn about virtues and citizenship early on.

"You see, no one person could have pulled this off," Hutchings said. "It's the parents, the teachers, the students and the board all working to pull this off."

Hutchings explained as students move through the grades, there's more loyalty and pride associated with attending the school. Having a K-12 campus allows the schools to show younger generations of students what they accomplish later with their education. Starting in seventh grade, the students are sorted into houses and get different regalia.

'The students watched the seniors do a parade around the school's grounds and

saw what they can look forward to," Hutchings said. "It's something our culture has lost, the stages of crossing over to the next phase of learning with age."

Headmaster Matt Johnson was a founding board member of the school, he said. He referred to the graduation as a major milestone for the academy.

"We had a really good ceremony honoring the school's students and families," Johnson said. "It was quite an honor. Now to be back as headmaster and witness the first graduating class, it was really touch-

Seniors must write a 10-page thesis and defend it in front of a panel. Johnson likened the process to grad school.

"It's rigorous. The diploma means a lot," Johnson said. "We do feel when they go to college and have a paper, it shouldn't be a problem."

The key for the school's success is combining the growth and demand. Johnson said. The Lake Asbury campus may begin as a K-8 school and pivot to K-12 like its Fleming Island counterpart, Johnson said.

Next year's graduating class will resemble the 2022 class in size, but a quick look at enrollment shows a pattern. The rising 10th grade class is expected to have 50 students and Johnson said the upcoming ninth grade class is about 75 students, more than three times greater than the 2022 graduating class.

"With the demand of our waitlist, and following the growth in Clay County, we expect to have two full schools in six years." he said. "We have goals to replicate campuses."



doubt that they were going to get to the Final Four."

The Blue Devils, complete with their fve new graduates, will play Deltona at Legends Way Ball Fields in Clermont in one semifinal game on Thursday, May 26,, while Lake Wales faced Key West in the second game. The winners will play Friday for the Class 4A title.

A look back at Lewis's girls travels last week showed a resiliency of faith that, first, lost a district semifinal game thus creating a waiting game to see if a region playoff spot would come via the FHSAA playoff points rankings.

"We cried all night waiting for that phone call," said Davis. "It was awful. Then coach Lewis told us we were in and right then and there, we said, we are going to state. And it has been a crazy ride.

The "crazy ride" included a clerical error that, first, with Clay losing their district semifinal game to Paxon to seemingly end the season right there, Lewis had a glimmer of hope to get chosen as one of the top eight teams in the region based on the FHSAA's playoff points system.

When the final teams were selected, Menendez was in the final eight teams and not us and that was obviously a clerical error," said Lewis. "We knew if Bishop Kenny beat Yulee, we were higher than Yulee and we are in. The person who made the bracket mistakenly put Menendez instead of Matanzas."

"At first, because of the Friday graduation. West Florida was resistant to move the game; we suggested Saturday, but the state said no because of weather had to be Thursday," said Lewis. "West Florida had their senior awards set for Thursday, so that was a no. We thought maybe early Friday which meant a game at 10 a.m. so we could be done by noon and then drive home for the 8 p.m. graduation. Against West Florida, with sophomore pitcher Gabbi Ellis seemingly indestructible in three games, Clay's defense put the hammer down on the vaunted West Florida batting lineup.

"Our defense has been playing crazy good," said Davis, who rifled down two base steal attempts from her catcher's slot. "Everyone has been getting after balls and hustling every play. We knew with Gabbi back strong, we had a chance if we didn't commit errors."

Ellis, with a minor muscle injury in midseason, returned to the Clay lineup in a flurry after the Blue Devils' suffered three straight losses to Palatka, Baldwin (in Class 3A Final Four with win over Keystone Heights) and Paxon in the district tournament.


Against West Florida, Ellis stymied the Jaguars with 11 strikeouts, but defensive plays from Kendall Mann, the sophomore sister to Kierstyn Mann, kept the Blue Devils in the game with a run-scoring triple from sophomore McKinsev Bardroff after a Rutledge walk in the 10th the game-winner.

"Kendall, who was my second baseman until a concussion in midseason, has been our designated hitter, but with her sister making the tough decision to walk at graduation, we had her in at left field for Kierstyn," said Lewis.

'Talk about karma or divine intervention because Kendall normally hits for Bardroff, but because of the situation, we did not use a designated hitter. Bardroff hits the triple to win the game. Kendall, wearing her sister's number in left field, backs up a West Florida hit late in the game that keeps the baserunner on the base that gives us the win. She misses that, they score, it's over. Big play.

For first year Clay High Principal Jen Halter, the graduation ceremony is a huge milestone for the student-athletes and much deserved considering the situation.

"Having a graduation ceremony for state champions has never happened for me as a principal," said Halter, who lightly corrected her prophetic answer. "Soon to be, hopefully, state champions. This is one of the best experiences I've had as an administrator. Graduation is a huge accomplishment and they deserve the right to have a graduation."

the States never lost hope their strapping father would walk through the door with a pilot's swagger, smile and a flight cap crooked a little off-center.

As long as there was no news, it was good news.

U.S. Air Force Col. Paul Underwood officially was listed as missing in action for years before the military declared him dead. Even then, his family never lost hope he'd return home until they saw the official report in 1997 that it had recovered his dog tags and what was believed to be 32 of his bone fragments at a crash site.

Without being able to say "goodbye" or "I love you" one more time, the Underwoods reluctantly walked with their father's remains to Arlington Cemetary 32 years to the day after his F-105 Thunderchief fell from the sky.

he reported his jet was
on fire. Underwood's
wingman said he saw the
F-105 crash – and that he
never saw a parachute.

Still, the family refused to consider the worst.

Now the Underwoods have a different appreciation for Memorial Day.

"Well, while we were waiting for him to be found, Memorial Day didn't have that big of an impact because a lot of the family, we just thought he was still alive," Jim Underwood, of Lake Asbury, now 55, said. "We were just waiting for them to find him. And then afterward, you know, when we found out that he had passed away.

"Of course, you know, Memorial Day now greater impact. And you realize a lot of the other people who've also lost their loved ones during that time. You just sort of go on from there, but during the time where he was missing an action, we were all pulling for him the whole time. We wouldn't let him die, so to speak."

Underwood was flying a fighter jet that could travel at 581 mph with a ceiling of 48,100 feet. It was equipped with a 22 mm cannon and it was capable of delivering 8,000 pounds of munitions, including conventional bombs, rocket packs, missiles and special weapons. It was lethal.

But something went wrong on March 16, 1966. And there never will be any definite answers.

Underwood's likely crash site was in the heart of the enemy territory. The rest of his 33rd Tactical Fighter Squadron stayed near the scene as long as they could until they fell under heavy ground fire and worsening weather conditions.

Once the war ended, an American recovery team was dispatched to the area to bring Col. Underwood home. It's what the military does. They don't leave a brother

behind.

In 1996, the search team excavated an area of 50 meters-by-50 meters that some locals remembered as the site. After 20 days, they had bone fragments and dog tags. For the Underwood family, the military finally had uncovered a reason for some closure. The military provided the family with a detailed account of the search and what it recovered. It was filled with photos, reports and maps. It also said the fragments and dog tags were a forensic match to Col. Underwood.

"We saw the report and we realized that he was dead," Jim Underwood said.

On Monday, March 16, 1998, his remains were taken to Arlington National Cemetary where they were entombed with other American heroes who have their own stories of family sacrifice and sorrow.

And acts of indescribable courage.

☆ LESSONS FROM FATHER ☆

Jim Underwood never had a chance to know a lot about his father. He still feels cheated from growing up having to learn many of life's lessons from other fathers.

"I remember him taking us every week to get haircuts," he said. "I remember him helping us build models. And I remember he used to take us to the base and we would sit in the cockpits of the fighters.

"He was traveling all over the world most of the time, so it didn't seem very much that I'd feel like my childhood was robbed. I'm not angry. But I did find an attachment to other people's fathers in the neighborhood where I would go over and hangout with him – the guy across the street was an electric motor repairman and a welder and I'd sit down and talk with him and stuff. We'd work on go-karts and mini bikes and also that kind of stuff. And he was sort of like a second father. You know, a child needs that bonding with a father figure. And so we found that where

we could."

at Arlington.

Underwood had such high regard for his father – "He was my hero" – he retired from the military. Underwood knows the majority of today's society will never understand the sacrifices that were necessary to keep a nation safe.

He worries stories like his father will be a forgotten footnote in a world of continued chaos.

"I don't think they actually realize what they did for this country," he said. "And I don't think it would actually sink in on many of the new millennials because they've never had to go through this and their lives are tied up with kind of ridiculous things. We've never really been in a, so to speak, major world war that would actually affect the population. And so they're not going to know that and they're never going to be able to appreciate that."

But a nation does remember, especially on Memorial Day. It's when it remembers heroes like Col. Paul G. Underwood, who, like others, set aside the politics of the moment to die while defending his post.

In Thursday's region final against topseed Baldwin, the third seed Lady Indians again started with a flash off a first inning, second pitch solo homer from Alaina Kinsal that shocked the standing room crowd at Baldwin High including a raucous bunch in centerfield.

Keystone Heights' senior pitcher Madi Mitzel then opened with two strikes against Baldwin's first batter, Rylan Gray, that sucked the energy a bit from the Baldwin dugout. Baldwin calmly got two singles in play, but Mitzel whiffed Baldwin powerhitter Kayla Robinson; five homers on the season, to close the inning.


Speedster Nappolean Cion offered tight coverage on multiple attempts of vertical passes as Fort White was disrespectful of his track speed

MANDARIN - The Fleming Island offensive line, consisting of Timothy Lawrence, Ethan Hoffstetter, Michael Zeray, Ethan Williams and Braden Cunningham, paved the way for 196 first half rushing yards as Fleming Island shot out to a 21-14 halftime lead that its junior varsity could not hold in the second half of a 38-28 loss to Mandarin in the Spring Classic on Thursday, May 19.

"I loved how the O-line started pounding on them," said Golden Eagles head coach Damenyum Springs after the game. "Those guys were opening up some big holes tonight."


With starting running back Sam Singleton sitting out the game with a hamstring injury suffered while running for Fleming Island's track team this spring, Musthafa Marshall was the lead back and responded with 87 yards on 16 carries. He capped a game-opening 75 yard drive with a two yard run to give Fleming Island a 7-0 lead.

Jhoel Robinson, who appears to be a featured back in short yardage situations and gained 30 yards on three carries, bulled his way into the end zone from seven yards out to give the Golden Eagles a 21-7 lead in the second quarter.

The Fleming Island defense was challenged by one of North Florida's most potent passing games. Mandarin's freshman quarterback, Tramell Jones, is being scouted by BCS colleges, as are wide receivers Jaime French, Kieren Jackson and Koron Hayward. And while the Mustangs moved the ball in the first half, the Golden Eagles defense made enough big plays to lead 21-14 going into the intermission.

On a third and goal from the Fleming Island 12 yard line in the second quarter, Golden Eagles defensive end Jake Little got past his man and chased Jones further away from the line of scrimmage. Jones eventually eluded Little, but linebacker Abram Wright broke free from his blocker and sacked Jones for a 20 yard loss. Mandarin was forced to punt. Springs has noticed progress from Wright, who had two sacks on the night.

"That sack was very big," said Springs.

Cibastian Broughton, Fleming Island's freshman quarterback, played a different type of game than Jones. He only completed one of four passes in the first half, but repeatedly hurt Mandarin with his legs, running for 78 yards on seven rushes. He scrambled for 15 yards on a third and 12 to set up Robinson's touchdown. His completion went for a touchdown when he escaped the grasp of Mandarin end Joshua Burton in the pocket, drifted left and connected with junior Kaan Jumani at the goal line from 40 yards out.

"He brings a lot to the offense," Springs said of Broughton. "He makes something happen when there is nothing there. He saved us.'

Springs sees the need to develop depth behind his starters and for the secondary, which will have two new starters, to learn to work together as priorities over the summer. He is planning to take the Golden Eagles to several seven-on-seven camps work on these goals.

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS - Monday Night Football visited Keystone Heights as the Middleburg Broncos came across the county to take on the Indians in the annual Spring Classic, Keystone Head Coach Chuck Dickinson and Middleburg Head Coach Ryan Wolf were anxious to get on the field and see what they had in store for Fall as the teams prepare for the 2022-2023 season.

Keystone Heights played their traditional disciplined run game, staying rather conservative. Keystone will need some players up front to bulk up over the summer and gain some mass. 

semifinal over Gainesville and region championship win over Lincoln, Forrester had 19 sits.

Second, the Broncos have a handful of "gamewinner" players that will surprisingly (by mere mortal sportswriters) pop up in games and make game-changing plays either in the batters box or on the field.
