

### Wilkinson becomes a UCF-Certified Community Partnership School

Designation will lead to more resources, support for student needs

MIDDLEBURG – There were times when it was difficult for Shawn C. Smith to keep her composure when describing Wilkinson Junior High's two-year mission to become one of the few UCF-Certified Community Partnership Schools.

Her voice cracked at times, but her smile was infectious. This was a big deal, and she knew it.

"Previously, schools were just the

## **Branan Field land use change approved by BCC**

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – At a meeting Tuesday night, Clay County commissioners heard of a land use change that could pave the way for potential homes in the Branan Field area between Middleburg and Orange Park.

A change of more than 2,320 acres of land to Rural Suburbs category would allow manufactured dwellings in those areas. According to county documents, the Rural Suburbs land use category is meant to preserve the rural character of an area. Development is defined by lots five acres or larger and whether they are served by wells and septic tanks.

County Zoning Chief Mike Brown said the issue was discussed at a previous meeting and was a county-led initiative. The Planning Commission approved the measure unanimously on Aug. 2.

The code change also prohibited building housing in "recorded subdivisions." About 1,090 acres in the Branan Field Master Plan area are not within existing subdivisions and could be impacted by the proposed code change.

"Those would not be included in this change," Brown said.

About 157 acres of the 1,090-acre figure are vacant.

"Those acres are undeveloped. That's really what would be most likely impacted by this change if adopted," he said. "There's potential that anything in those 1,000-plus acres could be utilized if adopted."

Commissioner Kristin Burke asked about the five-acre minimum lot size for the homes. Board Chairman Wayne Bolla asked how much an acre would cost.


Brown added that manufactured homes currently are allowed only in Agricultural, Agricultural/Residential, Residential Estate and Residential Mobile Home Park zoning districts. He said the land use change could expand more housing to areas with a rural settings with larger lot sizes.

Brown said there have been a lot of requests for manufactured units and called the change quick, logical and providing relief. Brown and county staff stressed the demand for housing.

"The increase in housing costs in the recent past, this is an alternative and we see the demand in housing," Brown said. "We see the demand to come in and do more manufactured units."

The item was continued.

In other business, more details about the county's federal disaster relief spending from the American Rescue Plan Act were reviewed for the 2022-2023 budget. Stormwater projects and a county

health plan were both \$3 million. An infrastructure study and Indigo Branch drainage improvements were both budgeted at \$1.5 million. Two other high-cost items were work management cloud service Workday for \$850,000, and adding Clay County Courthouse cameras and security for \$800,000.

## Nearly 40,000 students kick off busy first day of school

Superintendent Broskie welcomes children at Ridgeview Elementary

ORANGE PARK— The first day of school at Ridgeview Elementary saw students, like rockstars, greeted with cheerleaders, balloons and loud popular music.

The students funneled into classrooms figuring out where to go and saying goodbye to parents. A group of school district board members and district administration went classroom to classroom Wednesday morning.

Elementary school is all about fundamentals. Students need to learn how to sit still, get in line and how to speak up without interrupting. Useful things for later in life. Teacher Claire Scott does this for her kindergartners.

With a practice called "five-star listening," she moves them from their desks to the front of the classrooms with cues. They are going to get used to it.

About 15 minutes later, teacher Christy Simmons was reading a "Pete the Cat" book. She stops mid-story to ask the students questions. Superintendent David Broskie said a traditional start to a school year is what employees deserved after the past few years, which demonstrated their resiliency.

As for Ridgeview, the Title I school's full capacity is about 600 students. Principal Heather Roche is in her fifth year as principal and 21st year overall in public education.

Roche said her team was optimistic for the school year and her main goals are keeping students safe, 90% attendance, academic achievement and building relationships.

"We're looking forward to developing strong family and community relationships," Roche said. "We have a lot of new teachers, so there's a focus on climate and culture and building a strong team."

The school still has heightened sanitation measures leftover from COVID-19, but Roche said this school year does offer a chance at normalcy. The balloons, cheerleaders and music are part of a weekly event the school aims to welcome students

## Aza Health opens satellite clinic at Wilkinson Junior High

MIDDLEBURG – School Board Chairwoman Mary Bolla was lost for words as she stood inside one of the two examination rooms at the new Aza Health.

"Incredible," she muttered.

As part of the school's new UCF-Certified Community Partnership School designation, a health clinic that will serve Northwest Middleburg and Clay Hill is now operational on the campus.

The clinic will be available to students, teachers and staff during school hours and to the general public when school's not in session. Officials said the clinic will serve an area that's been void of local healthcare.

"Our priorite is to ensure that children are healthy and have healthcare, and so we are so thrilled that Aza has joined on board with the wellness community partnership school to make that a reality for the students in the school community, as well as the adults who are in the school," said Melanie Patz, Executive Cabinet Chair and Vice President of Community Investment and Impact for Baptist Health.

The certification is one of only 13 in the state. It required Wilkinson's Community Partnership Schools to create part-



nerships with Baptist, Woofson Children's Hospital, Clay County School District, St. Johns River State College and Children's Home Society of Florida.

There are 15,281 public and charter schools in Florida, according to great-schools.org.

Keystone Heights Junior High and Orange Park High are community partnership schools that are seeking UCF certifications.

Aza will add to an assortment of benefits available at the Title 1 school, includ-

ing free or reduced breakfasts and lunches, eye and dental care, tutoring, mental health counseling, laundry services and free clothing.

"The wellness clinic will provide, not only for our students but the middle of our community, a place where they can address their medical needs," said Community Home Society Association Regional Director Becki Couch. "Our motto with Children's Home Society is we do good, and it is through your collaborative efforts that we can all say we do. Everybody knows it's an undeserved community; we don't get enough."

Additional security measures at all county schools required the school to ask the district to move some fences to allow residents to use the laundry mat, clothes closet and clinic when the students are gone. The district complied and now has two fences – one that protects classrooms while making community services available.

Alex Delgado, Aza Nursing Director, said it's rare how many stakeholders came together to solve a common problem.

"We truly appreciate the collaborative efforts that have taken place to make today happen," she said. "It is not often that you will find this many stakeholders with differing perspectives all working together to improve the lives of the students and their Middleburg community by providing a number of good services and programs. We have each brought our own unique expertise, skill and dedication to this partnership to make this happen."




Northwest Middleburg and Clay Hill are considered one of the most economically deprived areas of Northeast Florida. But that's not an excuse. It is a catalyst for change.

"Good morning Mrs. Ganas!" the students belted in unison.


At the end of the tour, most students were in classrooms except for a few stragglers, quiet after the hectic drop-off period. The school year concludes on May 26.

## St. Johns Classical Academy gets approval for Lake Asbury location

FLEMING ISLAND – After meeting the criteria, a Clay County charter school can now open a second location.

St. Johns Classical Academy is tentatively gunning for the 2023-2024 school year to open its Lake Asbury campus.

Headmaster Matt Johnson said teachers, staff and students are ready for the first day of school, which was Wednesday. Part of those duties involves making sure first-day transportation issues are smoothed over and students know where to go.

"We want to thank the district for their cooperation and are grateful for the 15-year renewal,. We want to be an option for families who want school choice and a classical education for their children."

The school hit the target of being an "A" school four years in a row to achieve high-performing status. State law requires a charter school to have received at least two school grades of "A" and no school grade below "B" for the last three years or received at least two consecutive school grades of "A" in the most recent two school years.

The school must also receive an unqualified opinion on each annual audit in the most recent three years and must avoid meeting "emergency conditions" in the previous three fiscal years.

The school, affiliated with the national Hillsdale College, has a waitlist of more than 1,000 students.

"I'm excited about the road to replication," Johnson said.

Johnson said the school's presence can be an asset to alleviate the capacity in one of the county's fastest-growing areas. Two votes at a Clay County District meeting last week approved contracts greenlighting the replication and a 15-year renewal for the school.

"We want to thank the district for their cooperation and are grateful for the 15year renewal," he said. "We want to be an option for families who want school choice and a classical education for their children."

The capacity of the Lake Asbury school is approximately 1,000 students. The contract covers July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2028. The school will serve kindergarten through 12th grade and will be located on Russell Road, according to district documents.

Diane Hutchings, a founder and board member of the school, now volunteers with the school in a business-type role. She called replication hitting a milestone.

Despite a successful Fleming Island campus, Hutchings said the school will be careful about switching students between

schools. She said the school initially plans to start as a kindergarten through eighth grade.

"We don't want to dilute that current success," Hutchings said.

Hutchings said there are more developments for the school: a gym on the Fleming Island campus and soccer fields. The school hosted its first graduation earlier this year. She added that while students may leave for public high schools around ninth and 10th grade, it does build a strong core of graduates.

"With replication, we don't have to do anything different than we're already doing," Hutchings said.

CLAY COUNTY – Work has begun on a resurfacing project on State Road 21 (Blanding Boulevard) between State Road 16 and Commercial Circle in Keystone Heights.

Anderson Columbia Company, Inc. was selected to complete the \$13.4 million project, which involves milling and resurfacing approximately 16 miles of roadway, the addition of a center turn lane near Gold Head Branch State Park, drainage improvements and other incidental construction

The project is expected to be completed in fall 2023, weather and unforeseen circumstances permitting.

During construction, no lane closures will be permitted between State Road 100 and Gas Line Road from 6:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. No lane closures will be permitted between Gas Line Road and State Road 16 from 6:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. 

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## School district celebrates accomplishments; focuses on new year

FLEMING ISLAND - The docket at last week's Clay County School District featured a series of recognitions as well as the excitement and challenges facing the new school year.

The district has had a couple of highlights since the last meeting: having the state Teacher of the Year and high scores again when state testing data and grades were released.

Superintendent David Broskie said the district earning one of 14 'A' districts in the state is a serious accomplishment. The last time grades were reported after a year-long delay.

"It shows our resiliency even during tough times, providing good quality worldclass education opportunities for our students," Broskie said.

Broskie put the spotlight on a few schools. Clay Hill Elementary achieved 17- and 22-point gains in test scores for English language arts and mathematics, respectively. Doctors Inlet Elementary secured a 26-point jump in math test scores and Lakeside Elementary had high proficiency and learning gains in the same subject. Jennings Elementary also saw ELA scores rise rapidly.

highest-ranked elementary school in the district, Broskie said. Broskie also mentioned Plantation Oaks Elementary receiving an A grade for the first time since 2015. Broskie added Plantation Oaks Prin-Paterson Elementary School was the cipal Kim Marks was an assistant principal at the school in 2015. "It was a fantastic job." Broskie said.

However, Broskie pointed to staffing issues, particularly for transportation. He said there are still 1,900 bus driver vacancies statewide, and 10 of those vacancies are in Clay. Some routes will double back and he cautioned the first week of school usually has some transportation issues when hundreds of district vehicles hit the road. He asked for patience, grace and compassion.

This is not an education-related issue. This is not a Clay County-related issue," he said. "Everyone is experiencing labor shortages when it comes to drivers."

Board members also shared their thoughts on another first day of school a few days before Wednesday when things kicked off. They welcomed back teachers, support staff and students. Board Member Tina Bullock said the schools she visited were abuzz with activity, whether it was room decoration or workshops.

"It was very inspirational," Bullock said.

Board Member Janice Kerekes said Clay's high rankings and being an 'A' district are well deserved, but employees should garner a lot of the credit.

We're a family here in Clay County and I'm looking forward to great things to come," Kerekes said. "Thank you for all you do and welcome back to those children."

In other business, district officials heard from state Teacher of the Year Melissa Matz. It's been a long journey for the Lakeside Junior High School seventhgrade math teacher since she earned the county's top honor at the Thrasher-Horne Center.

Before Matz's comments. Board Chairwoman Mary Bolla joked about the board receiving a pre-algebra lesson. Matz recalled her Iowa roots and interviewing with the district at an Orlando hiring fair 18 years ago. She previously worked at Thunderbolt and Argyle elementaries in addition to Lakeside Junior High.

Matz said she was thankful for her students over the years.

"They inspired me to be the teacher I am today. And if you know me, you know all of the decisions I make are to better the lives of my students," Matz said.

Matz said her new year-long role, which involves speeches and traveling around the state, was a chance to "elevate and celebrate" the teaching profession.

"I look forward to sharing my story as a Clay County teacher and promoting the contributions of all Florida teachers," Matz said. "Teaching is more than just a career or profession. It is a hope and belief of a better tomorrow."

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## **District's tentative budget gets go-ahead**

FLEMING ISLAND - Every governmental agency in the county has a budget that's malleable for a fiscal year generally overseeing every dollar earned, spent and saved


The Clay County School District board unanimously voted last week to set a tentative budget for the 2022-23 fiscal year at a public hearing last week.

District Assistant Superintendent for Business Affairs Susan Legutko broke down levying the 6.419 millage rate, which consisted of the required local effort (3.171 mills), the basic discretionary millage (0.748 mills), and additional voted millage (1 mill) and for capital outlay (1.5 mills).

She said property values skyrocketed and raised challenges for taxing agencies.

"This is not just for Clay County," Legutko said. "This is for the state of Florida."

She drew attention to the district's 1 mill levy, which has been in effect for four years. It will go before voters in the general election three months from now. The 1 mill is expected to generate \$16.5 million. which the district said is for school security purposes whether hardening buildings or funding for the police department.



"Those are the funds we're expecting to collect this tax year," Legutko ssaid.

Overall. district figures said \$106,269,536 would be generated from the levies. The state makes up a large portion of the general fund, about 70% of revenues, or about \$250 million.

As for the total budget, it calls for a \$385 million general fund. Roughly 78.75% of the general fund is slated for salaries and benefits. Later in the meeting, board members did see how the new selfinsurance policy for district employees would work.

"It will be effective Oct. 1. There's still some setting up we need to do on that," she said.

The total tentative budget for 2022-23 fiscal year including the general fund is \$593,489,578, according to the district. There's almost \$119 million for capital projects and \$81 million in special revenue. About \$7 million is devoted to debt service.

She said the budget changes regularly due to adjustments.

"A lot of this is just an estimate at this time," Legutko said.

The district's planner, Lance Addison, shared projection data concerning the district's future. On the high end, the county could have 352,000 residents by 2050.

"From what we have now to (2050). that's a 61.5% increase on the high projections," Addison said. "... That tells you we are growing rapidly.

The district has plans for building at least six schools within 10 years. The organization has to keep up with adding a projected 9,000 students, according to the Florida Department of Education's Capital Outlay Full Time Equivalency data.

"Every year in June, the COFTE projections change. They come out with a new projection," Addison said.

School board members set Sept. 8 for a public hearing on the budget.

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## Keystone Heights residents get sneak peek at plans for new elementary school

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The construction plans for a new and remodeled Keystone Heights Elementary were shared with the community recently during an open house meeting.

The meeting was held at the Keystone Beach Pavilion and it allowed residents to ask questions regarding the project.

"It's a unique project. I've been involved with most of the renovations and improvements over the years to the campus," said Paul Stressing, the architect for the project. "So, it's nice to see a concentrated effort on doing an overall appreciation of a master plan for the campus to give the district a road map to future development."

Stressing told the school board during its July 11 meeting the current elementary is outdated and overcrowded.

The master plan for the school consists of two phases. In the first phase, construction will focus on improving the drainage, staff parking, parent drop-off area and relocating the kitchen service drive. In addition, the school will build a new cafetorium, convert the old cafeteria into a media center and convert the previous media center into six classrooms with a testing center.

And a new playground and covered play

court will be built. In fact, the cafeteria was build for 275 students and the school had 865 last year.

The second phase consists of knocking down two older buildings that are 65 years old. Construction for the first phase has begun and the anticipated date of completion is December 2023.

The completion of the project will give the school a one-way entrance and more cameras to provide better security for its students.

"It makes it safer for our students," said Tina Bullock, who represents District 4, which includes Keystone Heights, on the school board. It also will give the students state of the art classrooms, a larger cafetorium that can accommodate 1,200 people and the removal of portables, which will be replaced by permanent classrooms that are hurricane compliant. Also, a new Gary Cooper Monument will be constructed to preserve the memory of a student who was killed during the Vietnam War.

"Myself and my company are going to donate our services to do something that is going to properly represent this young man's efforts," Stressing said.

The project has taken years to come to fruition. Mayor Karen Lake has approached the Board of County Commission

to implore for their support.

"I've been advocating for the Keystone schools. It's overdue," Bullock said.




#### Why did you choose SJR State?

### Neighborhoods can unite to build gardens, enhance butterfly population

ORANGE PARK - When my husband and I moved into our new home in Edgewater Landing in the fall of 2018, we fully intended to carry on a tradition of building a butterfly garden in our yard.

This "tradition" had come about through our having seen the movie "Flight of the Butterflies" and a subsequent trip to Mexico to observe the Monarchs firsthand.

We soon realized however that our new yard was not suitable for this activity, so we went looking for an alternative location. Since we were one of the first families to move into the neighborhood, the developer was still active in the construction of the subdivision. We found the lot where the site construction company had stored the gravel, concrete culverts and other materials for site development; consequently, large pieces of concrete and gravel were strewn above and below ground, making it impossible for in-ground planting.

Since we have used raised beds in the past, this was not a roadblock for us. We had found our future garden.

We contacted the real estate agent on site and outlined our idea for a community butterfly garden. She in turn put us in touch with the developer in Vancouver, Canada. As it turned out, the developer was coming to check firsthand the progress of the construction. After meeting the developer in person, followed by many emails, our plan was approved, and my husband began to build our community garden.

Raised beds and containers were the order of the day. We didn't intend to complete the garden in one effort, instead built it in steps as our budget permitted. Today, after three years, our garden is basically complete.

We feel like we have made a small but important contribution to preserving some of nature's most beautiful creatures, and that's the point. Any effort by one, two or more people is important and can make a difference. Every community has easements, vacant lots, and unused spaces of every size that can be planted and maintained for the benefit of native species.

All it takes is someone to say "yes, I'll do it." If a new community is being planned, one should ask the developer to set aside a space for planting native and beneficial plants.

I am aware that several garden clubs in the area maintain butterfly gardens at several libraries, schools, and parks. They are making a difference and so can you.

## Historical Archives to chronicle Clay County's Hispanic history

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The Clay County Historical Archives Center, a service of Clerk of Court and Comptroller Tara S. Green, unveiled an exciting new partnership involving an oral history research initiative for Clay County's Hispanic residents; the goal is completion in 2023.

Historian Dr. Rebecca Dominguez-Karimi founded the Voces de Hispanos Oral History Collection in collaboration with the Jacksonville Historical Society in 2021. Forty oral histories were collected for the Jacksonville Historical Society's Hispanic Heritage Month presentation. Dr. Karimi's

conversations with other regional historians revealed an unfortunate gap in Hispanic community history since the 1920s. Her goal is to help fill this 100-year gap by gathering stories from more Jacksonville area residents, now including Clay County residents

Thanks to a new partnership with First Coast Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Dr. Karimi is gathering oral histories from residents in a five-county area. Voces de Hispanos: New Stories to Tell is a first-ofits-kind project due to scope, economic and cultural significance.

"Documenting the history of Hispanics in northeast Florida remains important for us all, for it will serve as a guidepost to our children and future generations," Karimi said.

Green agreed.

"Since our Archives Center is a local hub for historical research and preservation, Hispanic community history is welcomed and needed", she said.

The Archives Center is located at 21 Gratio Place in Green Cove Springs, inside the Old County Jail. 



On the first day, 92 households were able to destroy 5,116 pounds of sensitive materials in just two hours. Each one of these events is focused on convenience for the consumer and streamlined processes for the staff.

Residential consumers now follow the signs to the drop zone, complete a short form, donate and drive away without ever having to leave their vehicle. To save even more time, both the form and donation have been made available in advance online.

The average household drops off about 55 pounds and donates \$14 a visit. Considering that most drop-off shred sites charge more than \$.50 a pound; the Shred for Good's Residential Shred Drop-Off Program at \$.26/pound is a cost-effective alternative for the community it serves.

Following an extended 50th anniversary tour, the ensemble grew to a six-piece in 2018 for the first time since their early jug band days. The group now includes Jeff Hanna, Jimmie Fadden, Bob Carpenter, Jim Photoglo, Ross Holmes and Jaime Hanna. All six members also sing, and when their voices merge, the harmonies add a powerful new component for the legendary band. And with the father-son pairing of Jeff and Jaime Hanna, the band carries on a country music tradition of blood harmony.

The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band played their first gig in 1966 in Southern California as a jug band and by 1969 had become a cornerstone of the burgeoning country-rock community. Their career breakthrough came in 1970 with the release of the record Uncle Charlie & His Dog Teddy and the single "Mr. Bojangles," a folksy Top 10 pop hit that remains a staple of their live show.

During a tour stop in Nashville around that time, Earl Scruggs and his family came backstage to say hello. That introduction led to a friendship and some of the connections the band needed to record Will the Circle Be Unbroken. That threedisc album brought Nitty Gritty Dirt Band together with a number of country, folk and bluegrass legends. Heroes like Roy Acuff, Mother Maybelle Carter, Jimmy Martin, Merle Travis and Doc Watson joined the

source of education," she said during a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Aug. 5. "Now community partnerships, they can be a source of change."

Big change.

According to Central Florida, The UCF Center for Community Schools promotes community partnerships that include at least four core partners – a school district. a university or college, a community-based nonprofit and a healthcare provider.

For Wilkinson, it means students will have more tools to help break the cycle of poverty, hunger and a lack of opportunities.

Wilkinson's partners included the Clay County District Schools, St. Johns River State College, Baptist Health, Wolfson Children's Hospital and Children Home Society of Florida. Together, they intend to lift one of the poorest areas in Northeast Florida.

healthcare services during school hours, while clinic will remain open after hours for the general public.

Those services will add to much-needed services already available at Wilkinson. Students and families can use washers and dryers, as well as getting clothes in a portable next to Aza. The school also offers mental health counseling, weekend meals, free or reduced breakfasts and lunches, eye care and tutoring.

Smith was hired to put together Wilkinson's UCF application. The grant request was 57 pages, and it detailed the services offered - and needed - in Northwest Middleburg and Clay Hill areas.

"A lot went into this," she said. "But it was worth it. This is a great day at Wilkinson."

Former Florida Sen. Rob Bradley, who was a driving force to gain funding for the program in Tallahassee, said: "Not everybody gets to start with the same set of advantages. Some people win because they're just the natural, but others are having to kind of climb a harder face of a mountain to get to where they need to be. We owe it to make sure that everybody has the same opportunity. That's one of the core things of a good human being is serving our fellow man to make sure that everybody when they're done with their schooling has the same opportunity. The Clay County District Schools Police Department, Clay County Sheriff's Office, school board members Tina Bullock, Janice Kerekes and Mary Bolla, joined officials from Habitat for Humanity Clay County, Community Partnership School, Aza Health, Children's Home Society, Wilkinson school administration, including former principal Christina Cornwell and incoming principal Nate Warmouth and program volunteers also joined in the celebration.

The commitment from UCF and Children's Home Society is for 25 years.

Superintendent David Broskie talked from the heart. He was so overwhelmed, that he didn't need a script.

"You got to kind of take solace these days," he said. "You're only measured by how you treat everybody. In my heart, you are specially measured by how you treat those that need you the most. Right? So, I'm just so proud of everyone. I'm so proud of our community.

'We're so thankful and so grateful because, ultimately, our students are going to be the ones that benefit."

### Pilots fear Haller Airpark safety will be compromised by development

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Residents of Haller Park, pilots with hundreds of thousands of flight hours, are wondering how the approval of a large development about fewer than 1,000 feet from a runway could have happened.

Haller Airpark is roughly seven miles south of Green Cove Springs. The group, citing a litany of risks, is looking for options and seeking the county's help.

In August of 2021, the Planning Commission unanimously approved rezoning 48.3 acres of Agricultural/Residential zoned property and 46.8 acres of agriculturally zoned property to Planned Unit Development.

The application made no mention of a private airpark nearby, nor was it addressed publicly at meetings until mid-June. The airpark is visible from satellite images and the road to enter the airpark is called Airpark Road. County officials and the pilots contend whether the changes were noticed properly.

Later that month, the Board of County Commissioners discussed water and sewer and the rezoning was continued. The county, however, approved the zoning and use for 550 resort RV spaces and other amenities in late September of last year.

On Sept. 28, the commissioners asked about the tourism impact and types of camping. The rezoning passed unanimously.

"This is not going to be catering to flyby-night hobo-type residents," attorney Wyman Duggan said last year. "The intent is to provide the amenity that doesn't currently exist, right near what's going to be a major transportation thoroughfare for people to come and stay for a while here."

Michael Bourré, of Bourré Construction Group, is a member of the Planning

Commission who recused himself during sort was a low burden to the county and votes related to the property. He said at the same September meeting how a RV re-

the perfect use for the site, which includes a burrow pit.



"There's nothing really around it, there's a couple of houses scattered around on acreage," Bourré said.

In April of 2022, the parcels sold for \$2.7 million in April from G&T Batton Properties to Jacksonville-based RV Park Clay County LLC, according to the Clay County Property Appraiser's Office. The address of the LLC belongs to JWB Real Estate Capital, and a representative could not be reached for comment.

A grass runway splits the series of homes in two. In a clubhouse next to the runway, pilot Dennis Gillespie draws a diagram of the runway. He demonstrates that pilots need adequate room for takeoff and landing, especially in the case of engine failure or similar life-threatening issues.

Gillespie said he's witnessed fiery crashes and he foresaw the danger a potential development poses to pilots and residents.

"This is about purposefully being negligent and having people in this area," he said. "This is something we need to deal with, otherwise we can't fly.'

Pat Lee has been a vocal advocate for the airpark at meetings. It's not hard for him to list off the credentials of the pilots at ease and to express the frustration of the ordeal. A goal of a pilot is mitigating risk, he said.

"This is all we've been doing our whole lives," Lee said. "We are trying to tell these people that safety is an issue and they will not listen.'

Lee warned of encroachment on small airparks across the country. The Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association found that 1.4 airports close a month each year, a figure "  $\ldots$  that should worry every general aviation pilot," according to the organization

Pilot Don Yoakley said the airpark was there first and possible encroachment could impact the airport's future as complaints come in.

"Our concern is public safety of the people living in that area and how over time with noise and complaints ... it's going to affect the property values of this airpark as it becomes untenable between these two entities," he said.

After furor from pilots, commissioners have signaled to look into the matter, with officials into the morass of private airpark law. The permitting process involving the property is ongoing.



## County to provide outlook, answer questions about seven road projects

MIDDLEBURG – The Clav County Bonded Transportation Program Administrator has scheduled a construction kick-off community meeting on Aug. 18, 2022, at 6 p.m. at the Middleburg-Clay Hill Library, located at 2245 Aster Ave.

The public is invited to attend and learn more about the seven road projects selected for the Bonded Transportation Program that will be underway soon in Lake Asbury, Middleburg and Green Cove Springs. All road projects are scheduled for completion by the end of 2024, before the opening of the First Coast Expressway in 2025.

County Commissioner Betsy Condon. County Manager Howard Wanamaker, Bonded Transportation Program Overview Director Ed Dendor and County Road 218 Project Review Manager Carlos Campos will be on hand to answer questions.


The projects are designed to increase public safety, improve traffic flow, and reduce congestion throughout the county. Roadway designs will also incorporate drainage features and safety features including sidewalks and bicycle lanes.

At the meeting, the Bonded Transportation Program Administrator and Owner's Representative WGI Inc. will provide an overview of the seven bonded transportation road projects with a focus on the County Road 218 improvements that will be starting very soon in Middleburg. The public will be able to view construction plans and renderings illustrating the three and four-lane roadway designs, and safety and drainage features. A question-andanswer session with engineers and county officials will conclude the meeting.

What is the Bonded Transportation Program?

Growth and development are happening all over northeast Florida and it has been amplified by the future First Coast Expressway. Clay County aims to stay ahead of the growth by redesigning the



infrastructure now to handle both current and future traffic volumes by increasing capacity on the main east/west roadway arteries and connecting to the First Coast Expressway.

County engineers analyzed the current roadway capacity in areas of predicted growth and selected six existing road improvement projects based on roads that were already at capacity or were deficient to handle traffic flow. The cost estimated to increase roadway capacity and build a


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new connection to First Coast Expressway was \$129 million. Commissioners determined the fastest way to complete and

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fully fund the work, with the best values for taxpayers, would be through an infrastructure sales tax revenue bond. The taxexempt bond was issued in March of 2020 and will be repaid at a fixed rate through the county's infrastructure sales surtax (1 cent sales tax) over a period of 20 years.



"I had a busy week already at midstream due to our Clay Today preseason football magazine in full production mode and I was reluctant to attend for that reason – at first," said Lefko, the 10-year sports editor for Clay Today. "I went knowing I was in the top three finalists, but also curious to see

what the photo was that they selected. The fact I didn't know prior to the event which made it more exciting."

Clay Today also was recognized for a sports column. Managing Editor Don Coble won second place for his column honoring former Florida State football coach Bobby Bowden.

Lefko said his and Stotler's schedule almost didn't provide a window for the photo. After two failed attempts, and at the behest of her coach, Kyle Casias, the former Fleming Island High swim standout and now coach at Planet Swim in Ponte Vedra Beach and Lefko also had to work around Stotler's schedule at the University of Tennessee.

Casias called Lefko and said he could arrange 15 minutes during her warmup at the Argyle Pool.

"Kyle being a high-level athlete was very cognizant of the mental and emotional importance of regimen for preparations and was very forthcoming with allowing me to get in the pool with Stotler for the shot," said Lefko.

"At first, Stotler was a little wary and I felt like she was distracted so I knew I had to get in, get the pic and get out and gone so she could focus on her preparation."

Lefko managed to attend the awards

ceremony in Northeast St. Johns County and still be at Keystone Heights on time for a football photo shoot later that afternoon.

Lefko was joined by Clay Today owners Graham, Julie and Hugh Osteen and former publisher Jon Cantrell.

"As I watched the production of the winners for the bigger newspapers, dailies and bi-weeklies, it became apparent that football pictures were not a prime target of the judges," said Lefko. "There was a wide variety of photo subjects in the top three prizes for the three divisions."

"I was honored to get the first-place and what made it more special was that Jon Cantrell, our former publisher, who was the past president at Florida Press Association and he was the final person to congratulate me for the winner's photo," Lefko said. "Jon first hired me after a few years as a sports correspondent, then he gave me free rein to use as much imagination as I could muster. I truly owe Jon Cantrell a big thank you for his confidence in my abilities and also his support for some crazy ideas over the past 10 years."




Middleburg High coach Carrie Prewitt will look to finish her 30-plus years as Lady Broncos coach with a strong playoff finish.





# Will Holden quietly providing adequate depth

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - One of the longest lasting National Football Leaguers from Clay County, offensive tackle Will Holden, a Blue Devil out of Clay High, is expected to stay with the Detroit Lions offensive line in 2022 after spending his last few years with the Indianapolis Colts and Baltimore Ravens. Holden was drafted out of Vanderbilt University.

Will Holden is a name that was probably lost in the mix. While he didn't contribute a ton on offense in 2021, he was a valuable piece on special teams and perhaps provided peace of mind to a coaching staff dealing with a beat-up roster.

According to Jeremhy Reisman of Detroit on Lion in a March 2022 article, Holden enters 2022 as a restricted free agent. Will he be back in Detroit next season? Let's take a closer look in our final Lions free agent profile.

The Detroit Lions offensive line was one of its relative strengths for the 2021 season. While most of that is due to the play of its talented starting lineup, Detroit also had to rely heavily on their depth due to injury.

Will Holden is a name that was probably lost in the mix. While he didn't contribute a ton on offense in 2021, he was a valuable piece on special teams and perhaps provided peace of mind to a coaching staff dealing with a beat-up roster.

Holden enters 2022 as a restricted free agent.

Holden was added to the practice squad roster just days before the season opener in 2021. A four-year journeyman, Holden was simply expected to be a depth piece in case of emergency.

Holden was a capable player who could

spot start early in the season while Detroit's young depth developed under the new coaching staff. He played in 14 games in 2021 with one start for 71 offensive snaps.

Holden was promoted to the active roster prior to the team's Week 2 game against the Green Bay Packers, and he stayed there the rest of the season. With Taylor Decker out, Holden was the sixth offensive lineman that Detroit occasionally deployed in heavy run looks. He was also part of the field goal and extra point units on special teams.

In injury relief—specifically in Week 17 replacing Decker at left tackle—Holden was about as good as you'd expect a player who has been on eight different teams in four years. He allowed three pressures and one sack on 19 pass blocking opportunities. That said, he graded out as a solid run blocker, earning a 71.5 PFF grade.

Putting a restricted free agent tender is likely out of the question, but it's certainly possible the Lions bring Holden back on a minimum salary kind of deal. The problem for Holden is that Matt Nelson, who was given an ERFA tender earlier this week, showed significant growth last year both as a backup and as a sixth lineman on the field. Detroit still needs more depth at tackle, seeing as only Dan Skipper—who has played just three offensive snaps in the past two seasons—is the only other reserve under contract.

There are certainly other offensive tackles the Lions could add via free agency or the draft, but Holden is someone who knows the staff, knows the scheme, and earned enough of the team's trust to stay on the 53-man roster for nearly the entire season last year.

The District imposes O&M Assessments on benefitted property within the District for the purpose of funding the District's general administrative, operations, and maintenance budget. Pursuant to Section 170.07, Florida Statutes, a description of the services to be funded by the O&M Assessments, and the properties to be improved and benefitted from the O&M Assessments, are all set forth in the Proposed Budget. A geographic depiction of the property potentially subject to the proposed O&M Assessments is identified in the map attached hereto. The table below shows the schedule of the proposed O&M Assessments, which are subject to change at the hearing:



The proposed O&M Assessments as stated include collection costs and/or early payment discounts, which Clay County ("**County**") may impose on assessments that are collected on the County tax bill. Moreover, pursuant to Section 197.3632(4), *Florida Statutes*, the lien amount shall serve as the "maximum rate" authorized by law for O&M Assessments, such that no assessment hearing shall be held or notice provided in future years unless the assessments are proposed to be increased or another criterion within Section 197.3632(4), *Florida Statutes*, is met. Note that the O&M Assessments do not include any debt service assessments previously levied by the District and due to be collected for Fiscal Year 2022/2023.

For Fiscal Year 2022/2023, the District intends to have the County tax collector collect the assessments imposed on certain developed property, and will directly collect the assessments imposed on the remaining benefitted property by sending out a bill prior to, or during, November 2022. It is important to pay your assessment because failure to pay will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the property which may result in loss of title, or for direct billed assessments, may result in a foreclosure action, which also may result in a loss of title. The District's decision to collect assessments on the tax roll or by direct billing does not preclude the District from later electing to collect those or other assessments in a different manner at a future time.

The annual Stormwater Assessment rate for the Base Charge for the upcoming Fiscal Year and future fiscal years will be \$42.00 for each Tax Parcel.


The second component – the Usage Charge -- will fund the City's additional Stormwater Management Services provided to developed property. These stormwater management services are necessitated by the existence of Impervious Area that impedes or restricts infiltration of rainfall into the soil, which then increases the need for City services and facilities to convey, retain, and treat increased volume of Stormwater runoff from developed property and the Usage Charge is based upon the estimated amount of stormwater runoff generated by impervious surface on the Developed Property, as measured by the number of Net ESUs assigned to each parcel of property. The City has determined that a typical single-family residence in the Stormwater Service Area includes 3,000 square feet of impervious surface, which is defined as the "equivalent stormwater unit value" or "ESU Value". Generally, the number of ESUs were calculated individually for each parcel of developed property by dividing the impervious surface area by 3,000 square feet. Credit for privately maintained Stormwater management facilities and other factors affecting the quantity or quality of Stormwater runoff has also been applied, resulting in an assignment of Net ESUs. The annual Stormwater Assessment rate for the Usage Charge for the upcoming Fiscal Year and future fiscal years will be \$125.00 for each Net ESU.


