First nail finally driven in Grumpy's rebuild in Middleburg

Popular restaurant on road to reopening after devastating fire on Jan. 19

MIDDLEBURG – There's still a faint smell of smoke inside the skeletal remains of Grumpy's. There were bins of charred vents and ducks in one corner and two men working to rebuild the popular restaurant in the other.

Work on aluminum beams sounded more like a train wreck because there were no walls, tables, counters or customers to absorb the noise.

Nearly eight months after a fire raced

through the store on Jan. 19, work finally started to rebuild Grumpy's on Friday, Sept. 2. It's progress co-owners Dell and Courtney Hoard have impatiently wanted for months.

"I thought we would start (this) week," Dell said. "I'm happy we're already starting. I'm happy with the noise. I can't wait until we get in there and really start getting it ramped up. Once this (framing) is done, you'll really start seeing the work happen. Once we get the priming out of the way, we'll start knocking it out."

An electrical fire that started in a fan in the dishwashing room quickly turned the diner into a complete loss. The next

Council advances plan to raise Green Cove Springs' millage rate by 32.12%

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Despite getting a smattering of complaints, the Green Cove Springs City Council pushed its plan to increase the millage rate by 32.12% to increase salaries for city employees.

Not only did the council advance a resolution to a second public hearing to raise the millage rate from 3.8 to 4.5 to generate an additional \$2,845,534, but it also sent a proposal to set the city's budget at \$52,306,229 to a second public hearing. According to finance director Marlena Guthrie, that figure is \$3,521,456 less than fiscal year 2022.

A couple residents questioned why the millage rate was increased, especially

OP Council members discuss Bradley Park; reviews contracts

ORANGE PARK – Town council members endured a marathon three-and-a-half hour meeting Tuesday night, again talking about Bradley Park and rejecting a contract.

The town announced it received a \$200,000 matching grant from the state Department of Environmental Protection for the Rob Bradley Park at Nelson Point. The grant application calls for improved restrooms, a multi-use shoreline, a nature trail and observation areas.

According to town documents, the town is using \$65,000 from the Capital Improvement Plan for restroom roof and tree plantings. The remaining \$135,000 is earmarked for construction.

Several public commenters also voiced concerns over spending on the park, with a couple of people storming out.

Councilmember Susana Thompson, the lone vote against the agreement, said several facets of the plan weren't signed off on by residents.

"I want to know how this grant was applied for without it coming to council," Thompson said. Town Attorney Sam Garrison said the charter is flexible in what the town can do with a piece of property. The charter did not prevent the government from adding to the property or selling it.

"Council made the decision to take the parcel. You gained control. You also gained

while the country is dealing with inflation and rising prices.

"I think it is horrible on you all's part of thinking of raising the millage rate with everything else being so high," Audrey N. Dornbusch said. "You nailed this last year with the storm drainage fee added to our tax build that increased my tax bill by \$124. People here in Green Cove don't make that kind of money."

Dornbusch said one of her neighbors is considering moving to an apartment because she can't afford rising costs.

"A lot of seniors you have are living on Social Security," Dornbusch said. "My neighbor is 87, and when she got her estimated tax bill she cried. She is now having her daughter have her look to see if she can find an apartment she can afford because she feels she's going to lose her house."

Councilmembers said they were sympathetic to residents who will feel the pinch of higher taxes, but they said it was necessary to attract and retain city workers.

Councilman Steven Kelley said the turnover rate for some of the city's departments is between 35%-75%.

"I'm so confident we have the highest level of service, I think, as any utility as any municipality and county – even before making this decision as part of this budget session," Kelley said. "We're still the lowest millage rate of any of the municipalities, I believe, in the county. I know (other taxing municipalities) may not have increased, but I still think we have cared for the level of services received here.

"It was definitely not something I had hoped that we wouldn't have to take such a big improvement. It was a big ask and I'm certain it's something we're all feeling."

Dornbusch received applause from about five other residents when she walked away from the podium.

Moments later, the council approved the first reading.

In other business

In other business, the council also approved a plan for the city to collect a solid waste assessment from the Magnolia West Subdivision and the reimposition of stormwater management service assessments against real property.

responsibility for any financial liability associated with that," Garrison said. "There is not a requirement to do anything."

Mayor Randy Anderson asked for Bradley Park to be an agenda item at the regular Sept. 20 council meeting.

In other business, town council member Alan Watt brought back a recommendation from the town's Public Safety and Public Works Committee to use \$50,000 in federal disaster relief on traffic calming measures. They recommended 10 radar speed signs and poles to deter speeding.

"Frankly, this was the only viable option," Watt said. "The action is either accept this or do nothing for the foreseeable future." Thompson said she was concerned about paying \$50,000 if a speed deterrent may not work.

"We don't have the data at this point, we have other priorities," she said.

Watt said the recommendation could be a motion, but it didn't have to be decided Tuesday. Anderson recommended waiting for supporting documents for the signs.

Next, the town denied a \$26,701 pay increase on a construction contract. Though the town was quoted at \$163,035 to pave six roads, they were billed \$189,736 for the work when the scope was misjudged by 2,245 square feet.

Town staff reported the money to pay

the increase could impact other funds. The contractor, Hubbard Construction, was not present Tuesday night. Town council members unanimously denied paying the increase.

At several points in the meeting, residents criticized town staff. Council Member John Hauber said they shouldn't be barraged during public comment.

"It's getting irritating to see how our staff is treated," Hauber said. "To have them come up to this podium and then to point fingers is unacceptable as a resident of this town, and as a resident, I shouldn't have to be saying this to another resident because we're all supposed to be treating each other as one."

Here's a parable originally written in the early 1800s by the Brothers Grimm ... I hope you'll take a few minutes to absorb its message and discover its deeper meaning.



Now we work in the cloud. Whatever that is.

No matter how old I get, the need to report stories responsibly has never changed. Most journalists my age now are either waiting on blue plate special hours, on the golf course, on a fishing boat or in the graveyard, but I don't plan on going anywhere soon. Just as sweetly, the boy responded, "Oh, I am making a little bowl for you and Mama to eat your food in when I grow up." The 4-year-old went back to work.


The words so struck the parents that they were speechless. Then tears started to stream down their cheeks. Though no word was spoken, both knew what must be done.

'I got to go on an adventure'

Abbi Bell finishes 7th in horse race across Mongolia

MIDDLEBURG – When Abbi Bell's riding day was done, she approached a tent-like home in the middle of Mongolia and asked

if she and her horse could spend the night. She used a translation device on her cellphone for the favor. The door opened and she was quickly surrounded by seven children and an eager couple who welcomed her into their home.

Less than a minute later, dinner was served. Goat heads.

"I lived on 200-to-300 calories a day," Abbi said. "I couldn't eat goats or mutton, and that's all they eat."

Bell was one of 48 riders who participated in the grueling Mongol Derby last month. She wound up being just one of 28 who made it to the finish line.

The Derby was a 1,000-kilometer (621.4 miles) ride across Mongolia. Riders were aboard native semi-feral horses. Some of them were fast. Others were slow.



The main course offered at one of the Gers on the Mongol Derby route was a tray of goat heads.

All, however, were spirited. Fresh horses were provided every 3,000-4,000 kilometers, and the choices often were the luck

of the draw.

Abbi crossed the finish line on the ninth morning of the competition. There were no hotels or shuttles to safe houses along the ride. She either camped in the wild or bunked down at horse stations, but most of the time she relied on the generosity of strangers who shared their crude homes.

"They're called Gers," Abbi said. "Nobody spoke English; I don't speak Mongolian. We had prepared cards that asked if my horse and I could spend the night. I also used my cellphone. Although nobody talked, we found a way to communicate." Which included meals.

"Beef is very rare over there," she said. "They boil goats and mutton in goat fat. I couldn't eat that. I made eight ounces of beef jerky last nine days and I had a oneounce Gu (Energy) Gel every day. Sometimes they had candy or a piece of bread at the horse stations. Once they had watermelon and it was so good."

She was limited to 11 pounds of sup-

plies. Clothing, water and bedding made up most of that weight, which left little room for snacks.

Unlike her attempt in 2019, she pushed on. The ride included rocky mountains, sand, flood plains and bogs – all on horses that seemed spring-loaded to be wild.

She suffered a herniated disk and pinched nerve in 2019 and was forced to drop out. Despite contracting the Norovirus during the event, she was determined to finish her final Derby. Other riders either chose or were forced to retire with the virus. Abbi didn't tell anyone she was just as sick.

"I didn't let anyone know it," she said. "The Derby is 80% mindset; 20% skill."

She still had 45 minutes remaining on Day 7 when she approached a mountain range. Instead of making a run through it, she decided to wait until the next morning.

"I remember being there in 2019 and I got lost in the mountains," she said. "This time I knew where I was, so I waited. Also, I don't think my horse would have made it."

Abbi finished the race in seventh place. She said if she had a faster horse for the stretch drive, she would have finished by the eighth night.

Bell's family owns Cedar River Seafood. She ran the Middleburg store, but it closed in March. Abbi said a combination of factors – COVID-19, lack of workers, increas-

ing rent and ongoing construction on U.S. Highway 17 –led to the family closing the doors after 27 years.

Abbi said the just-completed Mongol Derby will be her last. It cost \$15,000 to participate and she estimated travel and lodging for the 20-day trip halfway around the world to be another \$5,000.

She said it was worth every penny.

"I got to go on an adventure," she said. "Money comes and goes. The Derby was amazing. It wasn't easy, but I loved every minute of it."

He still remembers the smells, the sounds and the sights of twisted metal and the soot-covered faces of emergency workers digging through the carnage.

Along with the nearly 3,000 who were killed, he also remembers confusion and disorganization.

"We went up to New York, and we were trying to hook up with an emergency team from Miami, but we never could find them," Callahan said. "So we just kind of stayed in New York. We observed what we could to help out, but we really didn't do much because it was so disorganized. You know, something of that magnitude, all these resources coming in, it's very hard to organize all that stuff."

Twenty-one years later, Callahan is retired and lives in Green Cove Springs. The memories, he said, will never fade.

"Well, you know, at that time, it was pretty confusing all over the United States and people were just sending people there and it wasn't very well organized," he said. "So we got together a team of people and we went to we stopped it at the Pentagon first, and they had already done their job at the Pentagon.

"When we got to New York, we really didn't get to work too much because we could never find a way to hook into the system."

Callahan said the group from Jacksonville showed their fire rescue badges and were given immediate access to Ground Zero. But once they got there, the size of the rescue and recovery was overwhelming.

"We were right there," he said. "We tried to help, but there was no method to integrate us into the system."

Green Cove Springs Police Chief John Guzman won't ever forget Sept. 11, 2001. And to make sure, he has a large tattoo displaying the World Trade Center Towers on his right arm.

Originally from Brooklyn, Guzman moved to Jacksonville four years before the attacks. He was enrolled in the Criminal Justice class, but the sights of seeing planes slam into the twin towers, the Pentagon and a field in Shanksville, Pennsylvania inspired him to be go through the police acemey and be a police officer.

"I was working at a hotel and when the planes started hitting the towers, I watched it in the hotel lobby with everyone else in the hotel," Guzman said. "I've actually been right in front of the twin towers before, I don't think I've ever gone inside them.

"The tattoo was kind of my homage to New York City."

Keystone Heights Jr./Sr. highs allies with UCF, Community Partnership Schools

FLEMING ISLAND – Keystone Heights Junior-Senior High is the latest school to join forces with a notable University of Central Florida program that will assist students with medical needs, counseling and academics.

At a school board meeting last week, officials recognized Keystone Heights High as a UCF-certified Community Partnership School. The program provides tutoring, hygienic products, help with food hardships and access to medical care and a clothes closet for students.

The partnership's accreditation needs at least four key partners including a school district, a university or college, a community-based nonprofit and a healthcare provider. Keystone Heights Community Partnership School Director Tina Baker said the health partner was Aza Health, Children's Home Society of Florida was the nonprofit and the higher education partner was Sante Fe College.

Baker said the partners made the difference. Orange Park High is also a Community Partnership School. It is seeking UCF certification.

Middleburg's Wilkinson Junior High celebrated the same partnership early last month. The partners are based on proximity: the school partnered with St. Johns River State College, Baptist Health and Wolfson Children's Hospital.

"Through your commitment, we've been able to accomplish so much," Baker added. "We can continue working against the barriers that keep our children, our families and our community from being successful."

Keystone High Principal Laurie Burke called the partnership an "awesome endeavor." Both Burke and Baker said that the organizations and schools felt like a right fit after years of partnership. Burke said Community Partnership Schools had a tremendous impact on students, with more than 1,000 students receiving supplies.

"(There were) 152 volunteers dedicated over 1,300 hours supporting Community Partnership Schools initiatives," Burke said.

Burke also said 11% of students were able to have medical and dental appointments. According to district statistics, the

school has one appointment a day and five referrals for food or laundry a day.

"Becoming a Community Partnership School is a distinguished honor and it sets Keystone Heights High Junior-Senior High School apart from other schools," he said. "It represents intentional dedicated work that signs with students' success and wellbeing."

Law enforcement agencies hope playing cards will help them pick up 52 criminals

Project Cold Case to focus on puzzling unsolved crimes

CLAY COUNTY – Jillian Berrios and a friend spent most of the night dancing at clubs on Oct. 19, 2013, while celebrating a friend's birthday. As they arrived at the friend's house on Loring Av-_____

enue, a black man approached the car and fired five shots. Berrios was killed.

The friend was injured.

Nearly 19 years later, the case remains unsolved – but not forgotten.

The Clay County

Sheriff's Office, along with the Green Cove Springs and Orange Park police departments, joined forces to create a deck of playing cards that identify 52 of the county's most-puzzling unsolved crimes.

Jillian Berrios

Berrios is the ace of spade.

Lt. Cody Monroe has been assigned to dig deeper for facts that may lead to the arrest of Berrios' killer.

"Obviously, you want to catch a per-



petrator," Monroe said. "I think it's important that we keep the memory of the victims fresh in people's minds. We might get something if things pop up, or connections are made by people that may have connections with the victim or if new information comes forward. I think the more that we can talk about cold cases, educate the public on the cold cases in this area, the more likely that we might have people come forward and give us information that could lead to an arrest of the suspects."

Clay Today will work in collaboration

with all three agencies to highlight each of the cases. The series will start next week with Berrios.

Detectives often have a solid lead on the perpetrator, but they lack one piece of evidence that proves guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. By refreshing the community's memories of the crimes, law enforcement officials hope they can find the final missing piece of the puzzle.

"Sometimes we think that we have a lot of information to say that that person did it, but unfortunately, it's not enough to prove beyond reasonable doubt and coordinate a trial," Monroe said. "And you don't want to risk going to trial and losing. You just always want the next piece of evidence to help ensure that you have the right person because, on the flip side of it, the last thing we didn't want to do in the world is put the wrong person in jail."

CCSO Det. Daniel Tenbusch will be working on a cold case from 2009. He will be the ninth person to investigate the shotgun slaying of 54-year-old disabled truck driver Mark Glenn in

Green Cove Springs. Tenbusch said the sheriff's office will distribute the cards to inmates, knowing they likely are a source of significant leads.

"There might be somebody out there"...," Tenbusch said.

Eight of the cards identify unsolved homicides. In addition to Berrios and Glenn, CCSO is looking for information on the murders of Teryl Orcutt in 1990 in Middleburg, Jennifer Medernach in 2001 in Maxville and Chelsea Rohn and Matthew Brumbaugh in 2007 in Middleburg and the 2000 slaying of Yvonne Belcher in Green

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Town of Orange Park approves tentative budget

ORANGE PARK – The Town of Orange Park began the final steps of its budget process at Tuesday night's council meeting.

With a 5.8781 millage rate and an estimated 96% collection rate, the town expects to earn \$4,055,769 in revenues from property taxes.

Town Council Member Susana Thompson said she had concerns with overrunning costs. She asked why the town couldn't charge out-of-town event-goers. Due to high salary costs, she queried about having part-time firefighters.

Campbell said the town hadn't explored volunteer firefighters working alongside paid firefighters and the certifications would be rigorous, roughly a year's worth of training, according to Fire Chief John Contestabile.

"It is very difficult to find somebody to do that for free," Campbell said.

Thompson said the town must deal with increases in several budget items.

"We need to look at that more carefully." Thompson said.

Budget and Finance Committee member Frank Ricketts criticized town staff salaries. Ricketts said the town kicked the can down the road on infrastructure and necessities.

"How are we going to continue doing this?" he said.

The town scrapped two events, a movie night and The Longest Table, to save about \$10,000. In the committees, the officials voted to devote \$20,000 toward an adultoriented event. Former Mayor Eugene Nix said during the public comment portion the town needs to decide what it wants.

"Then you figure it out, then you start spending ... the first thing is figure out what you want to do," Nix said.

The budget passed the millage rate and the first reading of the budget unanimously.

Town officials met three times from Aug. 15-24 to view numbers and highlights from each department. Town officials have the option to pass the final budget at the Sept. 20 council meeting. The fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

In other business

In other business, the removal of trees at Bradley Park has been a hot-button issue bringing out polarizing public comment and leading to conflicting opinions from the town and its residents. Town officials said 27 diseased or invasive species-related

trees were removed, though at previous meetings some residents claimed more than 50 trees were destroyed.

"It's home to a lot of wildlife ... It's their home. There's a lot of faces here and they have no voice," Lindholm said.

Earlier in Tuesday's meeting, some residents were concerned with the removal of trees at the property. Chuck Lindholm provided pictures and video of what the park used to look like during public comment.

He disputed the tree-cutting and how the trees were counted and the uniqueness of the park. Lindholm listed animals like ospreys, turtles and otters as the area's inhabitants.

morning, the Hoards met with 41 employees at the Clav County Sheriff's Office substation to assure them their jobs would be waiting on them once the rebuild was completed.

What the Hoards didn't know was the paperwork would take longer than putting the building back into shape.

"We were naïve at the beginning. We really didn't understand the scope of how bad this was, how long it was going to take," Dell said. "We were thinking (of reopening in) May, June, July – at the latest. We didn't understand the significance, the fact it was going to be a total loss.

"Once you have insurance involved, it gets spread out and it takes a lot more time than you ever thought. We started to realize a couple of months in it was going to be a long process."

With the first of many wall frames now installed, the Hoards finally can look forward.

"Any little bit of progress helps," Courtney told Clay Today.

The Hoards now plan a second grand opening on Nov. 21. And they believe at least 30 of their former employees will be back

Many of the displaced workers were added to the staff at Grumpy's in Orange Park. A handful went to work at the St. Johns location. Hoard said he worked with several other local restaurants to make sure everyone would get a paycheck during the downtime.

He also hosts monthly dinners to keep everyone posted on the progress. In fact, the group met at V's Pizza on Fleming Island last weekend.

"We really expect to keep 75-80% of our people," Dell said. "We need our core to come back and it looks like that's going to happen. I'm comfortable saying we're going to have a majority of our people back.

"In the first few months after the fire, we were getting together every week. Now it's once a month. We want to keep it in the family. We're a big family, so we make it a point to see everyone so we all still feel like they're part of this family."

is responsible for the rebuilding. They were the original firm in charge of the store's first opening in October 2020.

In less than three months, the sounds of saws, hammers and shrill of metal framing finally will be replaced with clanging dishes, sizzling bacon and the constant buzz of customer banter.

District gets feedback on progress, challenges it faces

FLEMING ISLAND – The issues a school district faces hae increased in recent times whether it's reportedly inappropriate materials, a school bus driver shortage or teacher pay.

At last week's meeting, the trio of issues came before district officials.

Gov. Ron DeSantis increased starting teacher pay to \$47,500 in 2020. Although the move was applauded and increased the state's overall teacher pay dramatically, experienced teachers expressed concern about pay compression.

Oakleaf High teacher Joel Miller said he loved his job and it meant a great deal, especially since some of his former students are now teaching alongside him.

Miller said educators are under fire on social media.

"There's something wrong when I've been highly effective every year and I make \$341 more than the minimum teacher pay," Miller said.

A similar field is the district's school bus driver shortage, leading to longer pickup times. District officials expressed about 20 drivers are in the hiring process and the issue is being felt statewide. At the meeting, the district passed small raises for maintenance workers and some other employees with requisite experience.

During public comment, Barbara Brown said her husband is a bus driver. On top of the wait times, she and others said drivers do not have time to go to the bathroom and cannot give referrals to students.

"A first-or second-grader can't sit down on a school bus," she said.

For the instructional side, DeSantis signed a bill into law earlier this year giving parents more oversight over a school's library collection and what their students can view. However, a senior student from Ridgeview High questioned whether some potential restricted materials would impact his International Baccalaureate studies.

A special interest group, No Left Turn in Education, has submitted hundreds of requests about perceived inappropriate material in school libraries.

Pastor Josh Dubois wanted to protect the well-being of children. He said the challenges to books are not going away. He said the district has a responsibility or there will be consequences at the ballot box.

"You don't want your kids reading pornographic language in schools. You don't, none of us do," he said.

Bruce Friedman, a member of the group, asked where the action would come from. He said the group has submitted 500 book requests. He also criticized the public comment format of the meeting.

"How many of them have we even had the chance to talk about?" he asked. "We don't get answers."

Superintendent David Broskie said the district wants to solve problems upfront. He said he was appreciative that he lived in a country where public commenters could speak freely.

"Sometimes, we forget that it's really about kids," he said.

During board member comments, Board Member Beth Clark said the district came a long way from debates over masks. She said the district has to deal with some parents liking a book and some not, but the state makes it clear what the district can do.

"With all of this going on, our teachers are doing a superb job," she said. "They're not caring about all the static. They're getting the job done."

Team Combat Athletix emphasizes jiu-jitsu growth

ORANGE PARK – James Smiley's jiu-jitsu gym has many different types of training and techniques, balancing discipline and fun for a variety of students.

This month marks about four years of Smiley's Wells Road gym. although his organization, Team Combat Athletix, started in 2007 on Peoria Road.

Gear and space are not in short supply. A portion of blue mats is for sparring or groundwork. There's a middle section of gray mats with hanging punching bags. Flags decorate the ceiling and the gym belongs to numerous associations founded by martial arts leaders in the field.

Smiley teaches Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu, mixed martial arts, boxing, Muay Thai and other martial arts. The fields are a bit different but can be used in competition, for self-defense, for an older person to pick up a new skill or to give a restless child something to do.

He had just finished giving a private lesson to a small group, mostly footwork and boxing. About an hour earlier, he worked on jiu-jitsu with a younger class. He said 70 to 80 people enter the gym's doors every day.

Smiley notes that discipline instilled by martial arts is hard to replicate.

"Consistency takes discipline." Smiley says. "Motivation comes and goes, but discipline is what gets you out of bed every morning. You know training is going to make you stronger, get you in better shape and it makes you more capable."

The martial arts teach goal setting and respect, he said. Students have cards

tracking thier progress and know exactly when they get stripes on their belts. Students, who can be as young as 3, have to bow before removing footwear and entering the mats.

"It teaches them to keep a schedule. They know how the uniform is supposed to be," he said. "They have fun. They have games at the end but if they don't listen, they don't play the games. If you want to play, you've got to work first."

Smiley said he wanted to be a karate teacher from a young age, joking he saw himself as a wizened old master stroking his beard like what he saw in the movies. He hails from Georgia and landed in the area after serving in the U.S. Navy.

He has noted the growth tin the sport. Florida is a hotbed of jiu-jitsu and mixed martial arts, with several high-

profile gyms in Central and South Florida. Jacksonville hosted two UFC pay-perviews during the COVID-19 pandemic, events usually reserved for Las Vegas or New York.

MMA organizations like the UFC have increased visibility of the grappling arts that feature in MMA like jiu-jitsu, Smiley added. And that exposure can bolster Clay County martial arts schools.

"It's driven people to schools like mine because they want to see what people on TV are doing. It used to be used in Kung Fu because you see Bruce Lee, you see Chuck Norris," Smiley said. "But with Bruce Lee, you can't just learn (the martial art) Wing Chun. Now, there are jiu-jitsu schools everywhere. The more exposure we get, all of it will be high quality."



"The Clay County Sheriff's Office continues to partner with the county and local businesses in the Gateway to Clay initiative. Since its inception, we have seen a decrease in overall crime in the area," Sheriff Michelle Cook said.

"Unfortunately, a large group of young people took advantage of what should've been a family friendly movie theater initiative at the AMC.

"We are committed to keeping Clay County safe, and we will not allow incidents like this to define who we are as a community."

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

Middleburg (0-2) at Bradford (1-0)

With miscues costly in the Broncos first two games, coach Ryan Wolfe will need what calls a "perfect" game to defeat a tough Bradford team coached by coach Jamie Rodgers, a Baker County state runnerup coach and former Suwannee High coach with vast playoff experience. Rodgers had his former Baker County guys down 21-0 two weeks ago before lightning stopped the game at halftime. Last week, Bradford rocked Baldwin 35-0 last week and that means Rodgers has the offense humming.

Middleburg's Demarion Suggs is the

point man on the defensive line and has been chaotic up front with his quick step off the snap. Linebackers Tony Steele and Austin Cruce will be tested at the second level to control the game.

No answer for Resar

Middleburg's Demarion Suggs knifed through the line and dropped Crusaders running back James Davis for a loss to thwart the initial Bishop Kenny drive on downs, but the Crusaders scored touchdowns on their next four possessions. The Broncos did a solid job limiting Bishop Kenny tailback Julian DeWees, who had only 44 yards on 12 carries. But they had no answer for Resar, who completed 13 of 17 passes for 226 yards with three touchdowns and ran for three more scores in the first half as the hosts built a 42-13 lead.

Resar, who has scholarship offers from multiple Division I colleges including Iowa, led Bishop Kenny in rushing with 73 yards on 11 carries.

Resar. "He smoked us all night."

Resar was especially good on third downs. Late in the first quarter, on a third and nine from the Middleburg 31 yard line, the 6'4" junior ran towards the line after taking a shotgun snap. Just as he was being tackled by the Broncos' Tony Steele, Resar shoveled a pass out ahead of teammate Michael Leonard, who ran under the ball, cradled it and ran all alone to the end zone for a touchdown. The improvisation put Bishop Kenny ahead 14-7 after Ethan Eddins' extra point.

On the next Crusaders' possession, Resar threw a well-timed out route to Jayden Harris for 14 vards on a third and 11. That conversion led to a quarterback sneak by Resar that pushed Bishop Kenny's lead to 20-7.

Later in the second quarter, Resar escaped pressure to find Leonard along the sideline for 17 yards to convert a third and nine. On the next play, he connected with Jackson Burnett on a slant pattern to give the Crusaders a 27-7 edge.

The Broncos' effort to keep pace with Resar was sabotaged by two special teams mistakes.

First, a short kickoff following Leonard's touchdown was fielded by Middleburg upman Terrence Thomas, who fumbled

following a jarring hit by the Crusaders' Antonio Alicea. The ball was recovered by Bishop Kenny at the Broncos' 40 yard line. That turnover led to Resar's quarterback sneak and a 21-7 Crusaders' lead.

Later in the second guarter, after Middleburg had for the first time forced Resar into a three and out, it appeared that the Broncos would get the ball back in good field position with a chance to cut a 28-13 deficit to a single score. Eddins rocketed a 57 yard punt that Middleburg return man Aiden Postemski attempted to scoop off of the turf that had been rained on throughout the first quarter. Postemski could not secure the ball as he looked up at the oncoming Crusaders. MACCLENNY - After a topsy-turvy 48 minutes of football against one of northeast Florida's strongest programs, Oakleaf High football coach Marcus Miller was emotionally spent when asked to evaluate his Knights' efforts in the 25-22 loss on Friday in Baker County.

In a game that should be a breather, Oakleaf will host Hollis Christian Academy of Jacksonville, a Freelance school with losses of 28-18 to North Florida Educational Institute; coached by former Orange Park and St. Johns Country Day School coach Rodney Dubose, wno left Westside High, and unbeaten (2-0) Rocky Bayou Christian, 23-0. Rocky Bayou, in 2013, was a North Florida Football Conference championship winner over St. Johns Country Day School.

Oakleaf can heal some bodies and retool as their schedule goes gauntlet; four unbeaten teams in four games, after Hollis with Fleming Island (2-0), Tallahassee Chiles (0-2), Creekside (2-0) and Buchholz (2-0) to follow with Class 1A powerhouse Madison County (2-0) on October 21.

Seven seconds into the game

Against Baker County, the first miscue happened just seven seconds into the game with Oakleaf opening at their own 30 and quarterback Drew Ammon looking

for wide receiver Carlos Witherup in the Baker County red zone only to have Wildcat safety (and quarterback) Davion Dean step in front of Witherup to reverse the Oakleaf scoring attempt.

Late in the fourth quarter, with just 10 seconds on the clock, Ammon had the Knights' at midfield with a look to swiping the game on fourth and five after two shots to wide receiver Taylor Bradshaw. A plunge from running back Devin Outlaw breathed life into the upset opportunity with now three seconds on the clock and the Wildcat defense on its heels.

Set up in the shotgun, Baker County's defense, knowing Ammon would be hoisting a Hail Mary attempt, sent nearly the entire front seven on a pass rush to eventually corral Ammon on the run to end the game.

Oakleaf defensive back Drake Stubbs sniffed out a jet sweep and put Baker County back to their own seven before the Wildcats took a swing pass the distance for a score with a penalty flag for a chop block bringing the ball back to Wildcat territory with still just 54 seconds off the game clock.

A punt to midfield gave Oakleaf their second start with Ammon finding Witherup on his own swing pass that got zero yards but a 15 yard flag against Oakleaf giving Ammon a first and 20 to go situation.

Ammon and Outlaw, on second and three near the Wildcat 28, tried to hit Witherup again streaking into the end zone only to have Dean snag his second centerfield interception to thwart the drive.

Oakleaf would strike paydirt first after the entertaining first period action with Ammon running left side to the Baker County two yard line before Outlaw powered in behind Chase Johnson and Kyland Armstrong to put Oakleaf up 7-0 at 4:34 in first quarter.

Oakleaf's defense held on Baker County's ensuing drive to force a 37 yard field goal to a 7-3 lead with a minute left in the first quarter. Another flag would force an Ammon punt from the Oakleaf goal line to put the Wildcats at their own 42 to start the second quarter.

Baker County would get a first at the one before Dean sliced in with nine minutes to halftime to put Baker County up 9-7 with a missed PAT kick.

Oakleaf would take just two minutes to get to the Wildcat seven yard line before Outlaw whipped in on a sweep to put the Knights' up 14-9. A post pass to Bradshaw for 36 yards and a sideline pass for another 12 put Oakleaf in scoring position with Outlaw blasting to the eight on a draw play before the score at 6:54.

After a defensive stop, Ammon got hit with his third interception trying to hit Bradshaw but throwing low.

Baker County would get an offsides flag to continue a drive at midfield, but the Oakleaf defense would get a fourth down penalty to give Ammon the ball at the Oakleaf 20 with 1:29 to half time.

Outlaw would break a 30 yard draw play to midfield with five seconds to go. Ammon fled the pocket with two penalty flags behind him with one an unsportsman, the other against Baker County to end the half.

"I don't think we need to change too much because we moved the ball, but three turnovers doesn't help," said Miller, at halftime. "That second interception in the end zone hurt us. With the muffed punt, we just got to take care of the football better."

Stubbs and Savea again made strong defensive plays and an illegal block flag forced a first and 14 for Baker County with the Wildcats passing to the Knights' 11 yard line then the five with a third and and three with 7:57 in the third.

Oakleaf linebacker Dajon Brown got a sack to put Baker County at fourth and seven with the Oakleaf band playing loudly as the Wildcats ended the drive with an incomplete pass.

Now, the Oakleaf band ramped up their big brass sound, only to have Baker County score off a dive play to put the Wildcats up 15-14; 16-14 with the PAT.

The fourth quarter started with Oakleaf at the Knights' 32 yard line with a third and two before Outlaw blasted for the first down.

Ammon would break for 30, but had it erased with a penalty flag.

At 8:06 to go, Baker County hit a 47 yard field goal to up the score to 19-14.

Huff debuts with 600 offensive yards

GREENVILLE, S.C. – Furman rolled up 589 yards of total offense and scored 45 first half points en route to a 52-0 victory over North Greenville in the season opener for both schools Thursday night at Paladin Stadium.

Graduate transfer quarterback Tyler Huff, a Ridgeview High graduate in Orange Park, FL, paced Furman (1-0) with 189 yards passing and 94 rushing yards, including a 56-yard touchdown run, in his first game with the Paladins. The former Presbyterian College signal caller completed 10-of-12 passes and tossed scoring strikes covering 33 and 12 yards in the first half in helping Furman to a 45-0 halftime lead.

"It felt good, I haven't started a football game in about year with that COVID year than I tore my ACL," said Huff, a Ridgeview High graduate. "I got good guys around me so it made it easy."

The shutout was Furman's first at home since blanking Gardner-Webb, 45-0, in 2003 and first season opening shutout since downing South Carolina State, 38-0, in 1988 en route to its 13-2, national championship.

"First game in quite some time, I felt like I had something to prove with my first ball game here," said Huff, in a post game interview. "We didn't throw a lot of long balls; lots of ding dong stuff, simple stuff."

Huff helped open the scoring when he found All-America tight end Ryan Miller open down the middle of the field for a 33yard touchdown strike on the game's initial possession.

"It's extremely easy to throw to a guy like Ryan, big, strong, almost a wide receiver in a big body," said Huff. "Everywhere I've been, the tight end was not a primary receiver, but he busted a couple of coverages."

Paladin cornerback Cally Chizik, who sat out the 2021 season with a back injury, made good on his return to action by stepping in front of a pass from North Greenville quarterback Bryce Fields and returning it 56 yards to make it 14-0.

Huff closed out the first quarter with a 56-yard scoring run, the longest of his career, to put Furman ahead, 21-0.

The Paladins doubled their advantage in the second period with a pair of short Dominic Roberto scoring runs and Huff's second touchdown strike of the game, a 12-yard hookup with Wayne Anderson, Jr.

Furman head coach Clay Hendrix substituted freely in the second half, as 77 players saw action in the contest.

The Paladins' 589 total yards featured 323 on the ground and 266 through the air. North Greenville (0-1) finished with 227 yards.

The Eagles found the endzone four minutes later when their passing game caught fire. Senior quarterback Joe Wiesner found his reads, especially on screens, and he hit Corey Scott in the flats with the 2-point try to match for a 14-8 Eagle lead to end the first quarter.

The Raiders could take the lead after defensive end Triston Johnson fell on an errant Eagles snap. The next 8-point drive from the Raiders had Myrick as the conductor. On a 4th and goal, Myrick shot through the middle to score under heavy pressure. He then saw a seam over the left for two points. But the Eagles answered again, with Wiesner from his own 7 yard-line hitting Scott on a 50-yard bomb to midfield. And after a quick Raider drive, the Eagles converted a 29-yard field goal with a minute left in the half and a 24-10 lead.

The Raiders didn't come out the gate. they blew it up. Eagles punter Alexander Hillyard blasted the ball into another player's back and it caromed to their own 18 yard-line. Raiders running back Kenneth Henderson scored immediately over the middle. Tacklers fell by him: he had been waiting for a run like this.

Brown's successful conversion brought the Eagles' lead to 24-22. The Eagles were

"We want to learn from our mistakes and get better," Wimberly said. "We played a lot better than we did last week. We fought harder. Districts are right around the corner."



star Mike Mitchell, who is committed to Utah. Lane averaged 8.4 vards per carry on 23 rushes, including runs of 30, 38 and 45 yards. The senior scored both of his touchdowns on the same play, lining up as a wildcat quarterback and following the lead blocking of h-back Wyatt Underwood. His two-yard plunge in the first quarter tied the game at seven after Wade Mathis' extra point, and his three yard run in the second quarter brought the Broncos within 28-13.

"TJ is a baller," said Wolfe. "He is a great student, . . . has a great work ethic, and had a great game."

Middleburg outscored Bishop Kenny 12-3 in the second half. Broncos quarterback Jayden Jenkins, who only attempted three passes in the first half, got the Broncos' passing game going over the final two quarters. On a third down and 10 from the 12 yard line, Jenkins faked a handoff to Lane and found Jayden Levy behind the defense for a touchdown that made the score 45-19 with 11 seconds left in the third quarter. The drive covered 80 yards in seven plays.

After forcing a three and out, Middleburg pulled to within 45-25 with a 65 yard march that was capped by a 12 yard strike from Jenkins to Underwood on a skinny post route with 7:19 left in the game. Jenkins finished with eight completions in 14 attempts for 146 yards and two touchdowns.
