Clay County helps turn Florida into a Republican stronghold

CLAY COUNTY – Once considered an important swing state, Florida turned decidedly Republican Tuesday after Governor Ron DeSantis and Senator Mark Rubio easily won their re-elections.

The red wave continued with Sam Garrison, who is in line to become the Florida Speaker of the House in 2024, easily outdistanced Cornelius

Jones by 49 percentage points in the Florida newly-drawn District 11 race.

"It was an amazing night for Republicans in Clay County," Garrison said. "There's no other way to describe it. It was about as good as it gets."

Republicans now will have super-majorities in the Florida House and Senate. The advantage will be 85-35 in the House. Garrison said since he will have a supermajority, DeSantis will call a special session next month to address property insur-

ance issues.

"It's a new day in Tallahassee, the voters have spoken, decisively," Garrison said. "That's the largest Republican (legislative) margin in the history of the state."

In Clay County, Alexandra Compere easily beat Leroy Edwards by 24 percentage points for the District 2 seat on the Board of County Commissioners. Compere

will replace Chairman Wayne Bolla, who termed out.

"I am just overwhelmed by the support, truly," Compere said. "I don't have the words. It has been quite the ride, quite the ride." Compere said the

Nicole forces cancels Veterans Day celebrations

Clay County's official Veterans Day celebration scheduled for Nov. 11 at Camp Blanding has been canceled by the threats posed by what was Hurricane Nicole.

According to the county, "We regret to inform you that the Veteran's Day at Camp Blanding event this Friday has been canceled due to the impending tropical activity in our area. At this time there are no plans to reschedule the event."

The celebration at the Veterans Memorial inside the gates of Magnolia Cemetary in Orange Park also was canceled, according to the Historical Society of Orange Park. meeting a couple of weeks ago, so I'm looking forward to diving in and getting familiar with the issues, the pros and cons of both sides."

Aaron Bean won the newly-drawn District 4 seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. Clay County currently is in District 3 and represented by Kat Cammack – also easily won re-election – but the House moved the county into a district that now includes portions of Duval County and most of Clay and Nassau counties.

"We said better days have to be ahead on curbing inflation, stopping skyrocketing gas prices and issues impacting everyday Floridians," Bean said during his victory speech Tuesday night. "We said better days have to be ahead on supply chain issues that hurt business owners day in and day out under Biden-Pelosi.

"We said we have to protect and secure our borders, we have to make sure parents are the deciders of their child's education, and Americans need to be able to work and provide for their families. And together, we will do just that.

"I want to thank the voters of Congressional District 4 in Nassau, Duval and Clay counties for believing in me and for sending me to the United States Congress."

Ashley Moody was re-elected as the state's Attorney General; Wilton Simpson won the Agriculture Commissioner's race; Jimmy Patronis won the Chief Financial Officer's job.

All are Republicans and all won by at least 16 percentage points statewide. In Clay County, the closest race was decided by 47 percentage points.

In other ballot measures, all judges for the court of appeals were re-elected.

Statewide amendments limiting assessments on real property for hurricane improvements, abolishing the Constitutional Revision Commission and providing additional homestead property tax exemptions to specific public service workers all passed.

Countywide, the cost of living pay increases for county commissioners, the removal of term limits for constitutional officers and the removal the Charter Review Commission all failed, but the continued one mill ad valorem tax to provide security at public and charter schools passed.

Safe not sorry: Clay County keeping eye on Nicole

CLAY COUNTY – The biggest lesson learned from Hurricane Ian in late September is that storms don't always do what's expected. That's why the county didn't take any chances as Tropical Storm Nicole approached.

Storm models originally had the storm entering the state near Vero Beach, turning north, then exiting near Jacksonville. A day later, one path has it entering between Melbourne and Daytona Beach, going through Orlando, turning north and entering Georgia east of Tallahassee.

But since the heaviest rain and wind are north and east of the storm – and tropical force conditions reach out nearly 400 miles from the center – residents need to be prepared.

Governor Ron DeSantis declared a state of emergency for 34 counties, including Clay. That will help residents with damage to quickly receive federal resources.

The Keystone Heights City Council declared a state of emergency which gave City Manager Lynn Rutkowski the authority to order evacuations. As of Wednesday afternoon, however, none had been ordered.

The Clay County District Schools canceled classes on Thursday.

The county's emergency management office went into a partial activation Wednesday. The Unified Command included Deputy Director of Emergency Management Mike Ladd, Clay County Sheriff's Office Special Operations Department Di-

rector Wayne McKinney and Clay County Fire Rescue Chief David Motes.

A Tropical Storm watch was issued for Clay County, along with flood watches," Ladd said. "Surge effects are forecasted from Wednesday evening through Thursday of three to four feet above ground level along the St. Johns River and potential into Doctors Inlet."

The prepare for possible flooding, the county opened four locations where residents can fill sandbags at the Eagle Harbor Soccer Complex at 4387 Lakeshore Dr. on Fleming Island, behind the CCSO Fleet Maintenance Facility at 25 Roderico Ave. in Green Cove Springs, Keystone Heights

City Hall at 555 S. Lawrence Blvd. and the Orange Park Athletic Association Fields at 1086 Fromhart St.

Since Clay County is under a state of emergency, patients are allowed to refill any prescription, according to Ladd. He also stressed being vigilant.

"Make that plan. If you've got a plan, refine the plan," he said. "Make sure everyone in the household knows what they are going to do. Keep gas cans filled and make sure you have information conduits – the SaferWatch applications, and also the alert.claycountygov.com website."

He also suggested residents visit NWS-Jax for up-to-date information.

Local insurance expert: Expect changes in Social Security, Medicare in 2023

ORANGE PARK – Bill Green advises Medicare beneficiaries that two historic announcements for next year with Social Security and Medicare include an expected Social Security increase of approximately

8.7%, the largest increase in the program's history. Also, the Medicare Part B premium and Part B deductible will cost less with coverage for physician services, outpatient hospital services, durable medical equipment and other medical and health services no



and other medical and health services not covered by Part A. According to Green, president and owner of Green Insurance Agency in Or-

owner of Green Insurance Agency in Orange Park, the standard Part B premium in 2023 will reflect a decreased amount of \$164.50 from this year's cost of \$170.10. The annual deductible for Part B will be \$226, a decrease of \$7 from \$233.

"In 2022 we saw a huge increase in the Part B premium due to the estimation of the cost of a new Alzheimer's medication called aducanumab with the brand name of Aduhelm," Green said. "The cost and usage were still unknown going into 2022, so to get ahead and create extra reserves for the Medicare trust fund, the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services increased the premiums significantly.

"However due to a lower cost and usage than anticipated, the premium reduction is an attempt from CMS to pass some of the reserves back to people with Medicare Part B coverage."

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services is part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The Medicare annual enrollment period for 2023 is underway and will end on Dec. 7.

"This is the time when people eligible for Medicare can compare the upcoming 2023 coverage between original Medicare, Medicare Advantage, and Part D prescription drug plans," Green said. "Medicare health and drug plan costs and coverages can change each year, so people with Medicare should look at the coverage options annually to decide on the options that fit their health needs."

Additionally, while Part A covers a portion of hospital costs for beneficiaries, the deductible for 2023 is increasing from \$1,556 to \$1,600, a small \$44 increase.

The election is done. But now in the great words of the Alan Parsons Project, "Where do we go from here?"

We should be ready to move to the next election cycle, but we're left with more questions than answers. In Pennsylvania, the Senate candidate said the mail-in ballot was filled out incorrectly with the wrong dates or no dates should. Pundits claim to throw those ballots out hurt Democrats, but it begs the question: why are problems with ballots seem to involve Democrats? Are Democrats proportionally unable to fill out ballots? Green said the second part of Part A is a stav in a Skilled Nursing Facility following a hospital stay. Medicare covers at no cost for the first 20 days in a SNF. That is a slight increase from \$194.50 to \$200 a day after day 20.

"Part A is no cost for the majority of Medicare beneficiaries, however, if they or their spouse do not have at least 40 quarters of work credits then you have to pay for Part A. That cost is based on the number of quarters you have reported," said Green. "For those with at least 30 quarters, the premium to buy Part A is \$278, a \$4 increase from 2022. Those with less than 30 quarters pay the full premium of \$506, an increase of \$7.'

Community Walk: Gateway to Clay marches on with amazing results

Violent crime reduced by 45% along Wells Road in Orange Park

ORANGE PARK – There was plenty of optimism the Gateway to Clay Initiative would make a difference along the Wells Road corridor when it was organized a year ago.

The results were more than optimistic, so state, county and local officials, along with residents who want to erase the crime and stain the main thoroughfare into the county, hit the streets to talk with business owners in the area. They brought the following message: violent crime has dropped by 45% along Wells Road, while property crime has decreased by 10% in the past year.

They also asked businesses to link their surveillance cameras with the Clay County Sheriff's Office so the agency can get realtime information for a quicker response.

"We're heading in the right direction," said CCSO Asst. Chief of Patrol North Domenic Paniccia.

Twenty-five people, including Fla. Rep. Sam Garrison, county commissioner Jim Reninger, county manager Howard Wanamaker and Asst. Fire Rescue Chief David Motes, spent 90 minutes talking with residents and businesses on Friday, Nov. 4. Most said they've noticed results.

"We don't let problems simmer," Paniccia said. "We get right on them."

Sheriff Michelle Cook said the program resulted in "zero" issues at the Orange Park Mall during a weeklong carnival and haunted house. A carnival was closed a day early after somebody fired shots near the carnival in 2021.

According to the sheriff's office, Gateway to Clay was developed to address challenges in the Wells Road area, like the absence of public parks, vacant businesses, homelessness, traffic concerns like bike lanes, crosswalks and speed limit inconsistencies and median maintenance.

If successful, it would increase public safety and marketing and communication between the community, business and law enforcement, while improving the quality of life and economic development.

In addition to the dramatic reduction of violent crime in the area, county officials have planted trees in the medians, attracted new business and created a partnership with Salzbaucher to create a homeless task force.

903 pounds of unwanted drugs destroyed in Northeast Florida

CLAY COUNTY – The Drug Take Back event last week resulted in 15.7 pounds of expired, unused or unwanted medications in Clay County.

Overall, 903 pounds of drugs were collected in Clay, Duval, St. Johns and Nassau counties. Duval led the way with 443 pounds, followed by St. Johns with 360 and Nassau with 84.5 pounds.

"I want to say thank you to all the people in Duval, Clay, St. Johns and Nassau Counties who cleaned out their medicine cabinets. Getting rid of medication that is no longer needed takes the threat out of the home," Florida Poison Information Center-Jacksonville Director Dawn Sollee said.

Drug Takebacks are held on the last Saturday of April and October each year. Between events, you can find a location near you to drop off medication for safe disposal by visiting floridapoisoncontrol. org.







County curbside recycling pickup to resume in December

DOCTORS INLET – Keith Madsen was happy, yet skeptical when he read the notice taped to the side of the collection bin at the Doctor's Inlet Environmental Convenience Center that said curbside pickups would resume on Dec. 5 in the unincorporated areas of Clay County and Keystone Heights.

"I'm just surprised how long it took to get it back," he said as he dumped a bin of bottles and cans into the oversized dumpters. "We've had to do a lot of stuff on our own, but it would be worse if we didn't do it."

The county was forced to halt curbside pickup more than two years ago during the COVID-19 pandemic. Waste Management, which has the contract to pick up trash for the county, struggled to find as many as 10 drivers since, forcing conscientious residents to bag up their bottles, cans, plastic, boxes and paper and drive them to any of the five permanent dropoff sites or one of the seven temporary sites.

"Some people don't think it's worth it," Madsen said. "I'll be glad when they start picking it up, but I'll believe it when I see it."

Madsen said he drives from Orange Park to the Doctors Inlet transfer station about once a week.

County commissioners approved re-





bates from property taxes during the suspension of service.

Residents should start to request bins now, the county said. To get a recycling bin, residents should visit the county's website homepage, www.claycountygov.com/, and on the Garbage and Recycling webpage here: www.claycountygov.com/community/ garbage-and-recycling.

Residents can also request a bin on the free Clay Connected app, which is available for Android and Apple devices in the app store or by calling Environmental Services at (904) 284-6374. Residents in the City of Keystone Heights should call Waste Management at (904) 695-0500 to request bins. Waste Management already is delivering recycling bins.

The paper products bin is for clean, dry paper products such as newspapers, books, junk mail, shredded paper, and flattened corrugated cardboard cut into 2-foot by three-foot pieces.

The containers bin is for rinsed containers including plastic and glass bottles and jars, aluminum and steel cans, and cartons and juice boxes.

Please place only accepted recyclable items in the bins and keep containers and paper products separate.

Residents can expect their curbside re-

Lab-grown diamonds can be a girl's best friend – for half the cost

ORANGE PARK – Jim Dumas has been in the jewelry business for more than 50 years.

"So basically I'm a master jeweler," said Dumas, "(And) I make jewelry from scratch."

Formerly of Underwood's Jewelers and Master Jeweler in Orange Park, Dumas now operates LAB GROWN Diamonds: Everything You Want in a Diamond at Half the Price."

So what is a lab-grown diamond? First of all, Dumas said diamonds at his store at 807 Park Ave. are 100% real diamonds.

"Lab-grown diamonds have the same chemical, optical and physical properties as mined diamonds. They have the same molecular level and produce the very same durability, fire and sparkle found in all diamonds, except they are made in a lab instead of forged through millions of years of heat and pressure below the surface of the earth," Dumas said.

To create the natural process of a diamond formation, the pressure must be equivalent to the pressure 2,100 kilometers below the earth – most of the way through the mantle, and the temperature must be about 15,000 degrees Celsius. To put things in perspective, that's hotter than the surface of the sun. All in all, it takes about two weeks to several months to create a lab-grown diamond, depending on its size. And they can come in a variety of shapes and colors, Dumas said.

"They're growing them up to 10 karats. They cut it, shape it, all that stuff. And they're able to grow them in a range of colors, so if someone wanted a five-karat pink, heart-shaped diamond, we can do that."

On the market today, natural pink dia-

monds can go up to \$100,000 a karat.

"They are so rare that if you have a natural pink diamond that is four to five karats, you're talking millions. So with this scenario, we can grow a four- or five-karat pink diamond in whatever shape you want for \$50,000 or \$60,000 as opposed to \$4 or \$5 million," he said. "The only real difference is the price tag."

In the last few years, lab-grown diamonds have taken over the industry as millennials, and now Gen Z, have become the top purchasers of diamonds for engagement rings. In 2021, synthetic two-karat diamonds outsold natural two-karat diamonds worldwide. The growth is expected to continue as more jewelers start to sell lab diamonds and more labs are launched, especially as the world's biggest jeweler, Pandora, recently announced that they won't be selling mined diamonds anymore.

"It's a new industry. I think it's going to take up more and more of the business. It's just a matter of people knowing about them," Dumas said. However, this begs an obvious question: if synthetic diamonds look exactly like naturally mined diamonds on an atomic and molecular level and are impossible to tell apart, does this open doors for counterfeit gems?

"It's going to create a problem in the future because there are people who might buy lab-grown and try to sell it as natural. You're either a crook or you're not. If there are people out there looking to cheat people, they can buy lab-grown and not tell you it's lab-grown and have a lot less money in it and sell it for what a natural would be," Dumas said.

However, Dumas believes that the possibility of good outweighs the bad.

"A lot of people have died mining diamonds, whereas this is more sustainable. No one's out there digging in a mine, tearing up the earth. It takes millions and millions

of tonnage to dig for diamonds, whereas lab-grown diamonds are machine-made," said Dumas.

An estimated 250 tons of earth is shifted for every single carat of diamond causing spikes in greenhouse gas emissions and water pollution.

"But that's not the only problem that mined diamonds," said Dumas. "You also have Blood Diamonds out there, too." Blood Diamonds, also known as "conflict Diamonds," are stones that are produced in areas controlled by rebel forces. Blood diamonds are often stolen during shipment or seized by attacking the mining operations of legitimate producers, smuggled into the international diamond trade, and sold as legitimate gems to fund their military efforts.

With the rise of lab-grown diamonds, jewelry wholesalers are trying to eliminate this. With more mined diamonds coming off the market, lab-grown diamonds can be used for environmental and humanitarian benefits, as well as economic ones.

"There's really no reason why you wouldn't want to buy lab-grown diamonds," Dumas said.



Jim Dumas has been working with diamonds for more than 50 years, and he said lab-grown diamonds are every bit as real as mined diamonds. In fact, many jewelry chains only sell diamonds that are made in a lab.



Orange Park High's monthly food distribution provides nourishment without stigmas

ORANGE PARK – Providing food to hungry families hasn't been a problem for Orange Park High's monthly food distribution.

The real challenge, said Community Partnership School Director Lauren Pfanenstiel, has been spreading the word about available resources and silencing the stigma that sometimes comes with being needy.

The partnership, which is part of the Children's Home Society of Florida, offers a drive-up food distribution in the parking lot of the school on the third Thursday of every month, and Pfanenstiel said her organization has enough food to feed twice as many families that use the program.

"This month, on Nov. 17, we're going to have a pretty good distribution because we've got some great donations," she said. "We want to get the word out. We've had about 42 or 43 families on an average, but we can definitely feed double that. We need people to know who are in need."

When a family drives up to the orange tent near the Family Center in the east

parking lot, a bag of food is delivered to their car. The hours are 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m., which makes it one of the rare nighttime pantries in Northeast Florida.

"It's good for working families to be able to come up at that time of day," Pfanenstiel said.

Pfanenstiel said she's noticed a greater need for assistance, but it's not always easy to connect families with the help they need

"In our particular school, we have over 1,000 students who meet the criteria for living in low-income households," she said. "We're seeing more students being added to our weekly food distribution lists, which means they take food home every week and supplemental food over the weekend. There's sometimes a stigma around kids

wanting to ask for food. So this is just stigma-free. It's a drive-through. There are no students that volunteer at our food distribution, so they won't know in terms of peers.'

Pfanenstiel said Orange Park High is considered a food desert since many groceries have raised their prices and "it's not affordable for many families."

The Community Partnership School

program provides health and wellness services to students, as well as providing access to healthy foods and helping with homework.

The core partners for the program are the Children's Home Society of Florida. Clay County Schools District, HCA Florida Orange Park Hospital, Palms Medical Group and St. Johns River State College.

Change Makers work to lessen the struggles for people with disabilities

CLAY COUNTY – Disability impacts all of us. Sixty-one million adults in the United States live with a disability, nearly a quarter of our population. In Florida, the number is even higher. Nearly one in three adults in Florida have a disability, including more than 800,000 deaf and hard of hearing individuals and approximately 300,000 who are blind or visually impaired.

Thousands with developmental disabilities rely on the Medicaid waiver services in Florida- many with the help of a personal care assistant. And yet, the state is 49th in Medicaid Waiver funding and 46th in funding for long-term support and services.

"It's honestly embarrassing," says DeAnn Burgess, advisor for Clay County Change Makers, a self-advocacy group for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. "We used to have a pretty good system from what I've heard and researched, but in 2008, the government started cutting a lot of services and funding. Big cuts."

Legislators slashed as much as \$1.2 billion in spending for crucial healthcare programs such as Medicaid, making it much harder for families to get the services they need.

"Not to mention the budget cut created

a huge staff shortage. Even if you get on the waiver, there are no providers. If you don't have staff, then you don't have a program," said former defense attorney and lobbyist, Alan Abramowitz.

Direct care workers are essential for supporting people with disabilities. They provide daily assistance for the elderly, the disabled and those living with chronic illnesses. But as many have experienced, there are not enough workers to meet the growing demand for direct care. So how does this shift the burden of families?

"Without Home and Community-Based Services, many parents are forced to quit their jobs to take care of their disabled children or admit them into institutions," Burgess said. "I've gone into homes where the parents are in their 70s and lifting their adult child to the shower, the bathroom, to change their adult diapers. I've seen people who are nonverbal living in hospitals because there is nothing for them."

Many states are opting to integrate the disabled population into managed care as a way to be more cost-effective. However, many people receiving long-term care are losing services as they transition from Medicaid to Managed Care.

"For example, with Managed Care, there are select dental plans," Burgess said. "Now, there are only three dentists in North Florida that accept these plans. They don't

sedate. This population, you have to sedate at least 70% to 80% of folks because of their behavior, anxiety, the lack of flexibility, so people are going without dental care."

This, Burgess said, was the first step into the managed care world.

"We have to save the med-waiver," she said. "The waiver allows people with disabilities and their families to have a CHOICE in providers of their services."

Burgess urges congress to expand Medicaid and drop Managed Care.

"If we go the Medicaid expansion, that would take care of the services and we wouldn't be 49th in the county. There are only five or six states that have not taken the Medicaid expansion. If Florida was to take that they would see a lot of people thriving and seeing people getting the support they need," Burgess said.

Abramowitz agrees.

"We know there are only going to be pros are there are not going to be any cons," he said.

If this is true, then why hasn't Medicaid been expanded? "With Medicaid expansion comes other expectations. The governor would have to follow certain rules that he obviously doesn't want to follow," Burgess said.

"Governor DeSantis and state republican leaders have long rejected expanding eligibility for Medicaid because of concerns about potential future costs. But this is not a political thing. This is a humanitarian crisis. This is beyond Republicans and Democrats. These are vulnerable people and we need to do something about it."



Marshall Tucker's 50-year-long hard ride to make a stop at Thrasher-Horne

ORANGE PARK – The hardest parts of hitting the road for a concert tour are the hours traveling, the mindless hours of sitting in a different hotel room every night and counting on Ma Bell to maintain a relationship.

For Doug Gray, it's the only life he's known for the past 50 years.

No matter how many days he's gone from his South Carolina home, one thing that makes it all worth while is knowing the crowd will be loud, happy – and appreciative.

"Once the (house) lights go down and the (stage) lights come back up again and music starts, it takes you back to when you originally first started, so your energy level goes up," Gray said. "But then when you come off, you know you got to 400 miles to the next gig."

But make no mistake: Gray doesn't plan to shut down Marshall Tucker anytime soon.

Gray joined former high school classmates in a band called The New Generation. That band then blended with The Rants. Military service broke the band up and Gray spent a tour in Vietnam with the U.S. Army. When he came home, he rekindled his musical relationships with Tommy Caldwell of The New Generation, Toy Caldwell of The New Generation, Toy Caldwell of The Rants and saxophonist, keyboards player and flutist Jerry Eubanks. In 1972, the band changed its name to The Marshall Tucker Band after a blind piano tuner from Columbia, South Carolina, who inscribed his name into a piano key at their rehearsal space.

Fifty years later, Gray is still singing songs like "Can't You See," "Heard it in a Love Song," "Fire on the Mountain," "Long Hard Ride," "Take the Highway," "This Old Cowboy" and "Ramblin'."

The iconic band that folded Southern Rock into jazz, progressive country and blues rock will stop its relentless sojourn long enough for a show at the Thrasher-Horne Center on Saturday, Nov. 18. The lights "will go down" at

8 p.m. with opening act Shannon Lawson, followed by the six-man band will tear into their remarkable setlist.

There's a certain gift I found I could share, whether I was in front of five people or 20,000 people," Gray said. "I was blessed with that ability and I'm thankful I can share with others."

Marshall Tucker still maintains a demanding schedule. They've played more than 225 shows in the past 18 months, and they recently played a stretch of 22 consecutive nights on stage.

Gray is the last founding member of the band. Toy Caldwell died of viral myocarditis; Tommy Caldwell was killed in a car accident; guitarist George McCorkle died of cancer; and, Eubanks broke away to make a solo album and Paul Riddle left to become a drum insructor.

The sound, however, remains the same. "It's just amazing that people are coming back with their grandkids and sitting there and the grandkids know the songs," Gray said. "So that's kind of a weird thing. I mean, me and Joe and Tommy, and George, and everybody else, we just wanted to make a point, but we didn't know what that point was. Regardless, we knew that we would be giving 100% to it all."

Marshall Tucker's music catalog consists of more than 20 studio albums and a score of live releases. The band has racked up multi-platinum album sales many times over. The secret ingredient to the ongoing success of The Marshall Tucker Band's influence can be seen and felt far and wide throughout many mainstream digital outlets, like Netflix and Amazon.

According to the band, "The framework for Marshall Tucker's music is more like a spaceship than a house," Gray said, "because you can look out of a lot of windows and see a variety of things that show where we've been and what we've done, and how we've traveled through time to bring those experiences out in all of our songs."

Cleanup draws support from Lowe's for College Drive Initiative

ORANGE PARK – Volunteer Day to support Pond to Park Project on College Drive attracted community leaders, residents and volunteers from Lowe's Home Improvement who spent the day digging in the dirt to transform a spillage pond into a recreational nature park last Friday, Nov. 4.

The cleanup is part of the first phase to pump new energy into College Drive to make it a destination, not a thoroughfare between County Road 220 and Blanding Boulevard.

More than 50 worked in the heat and with the calamity of cars zooming by to rally to support the Pond to Park Project. They hunched over shovels, dug potholes, planted sapling pine trees and hauled 20-pound bags of mulch and manure to be spread around the site. Others set up benches for public use.

"The turnout was more than I could ever dream for. We have almost forty, maybe fifty volunteers today. We're going to finish this project even quicker than I wanted us to," said Brain Rau, the sales and merchandising business manager for the local Lowes at Orange Park.

The home improvement warehouse donated approximately \$6,000 worth of ma-



terials and provided labor support for the project.

"There's a lot of ongoing projects in this space that Lowes wants to be a part of," Rau said. "This is the beginning of a longlasting relationship with a lot of the things we want to accomplish here."

County Commissioner Mike Cella, County Manager Howard Wanamaker and

former Orange Park Councilmember Connie Thomas all were in work clothes and gloves to help.

"Here we are today for a great volunteer opportunity for residents to get involved and they all turned out in a big way," Cella said. "We have Lowes here today, Challenge Enterprises, Operation Barnabas and Public County Works, as well as College Drive Initiative volunteers to turn what was essentially a stormwater pond into a beautiful park. We're planting trees and bushes. We're paving a patio and eventually, there will be benches out there, too, so people can look out at the pond and enjoy nature."

The viewing area will be accessible to walkers and wheelchairs. The project came out of College Drives' Deliberative Dialogue, a conversation group for citizens of Clay County to be a part of envisioning the future of their community, as well as implementing projects to improve the area.

A steering group, including government leaders and staff, nonprofit agency employees and business owners contributed to creating this dialogue resource.

"This is a great example of how government can work alongside private initiatives and residents," said Cella. "In this case, the residents are taking control of the situation and asking the government to help where it can, and I think that's a great experiment that we've started. Even though this is one small ending, it will be an ongoing process. It's a great example of how residents have rallied and showed up for their community."

Rau is currently in the process of submitting a presentation for Lowe's 100 Hometowns \$100,000 grant which supports towns in need across the country with 100 improvement projects. Rau was a recipient of a grant in Palatka, which he used to beautify the riverfront and build an amphitheater. Parks and Recreation director, Justin Piece, is also excited to work with the community on future endeavors, as well as the future of the Pond to Park project.

"Eventually, the park will have a walkway that will proceed around the pond for people to walk. We also hope that Pace School For Girls and other organizations will be able to utilize it for educational purposes. And then hopefully, we can have some connectivity with the elementary school and the residents, and the neighborhoods they live in. It serves multiple purposes," he said.

The Pond to Park Project is only the first of what's to come, and the first step in a much bigger plan to improve the area.

"We're going to be working with an engineer and design teams, as well as a consulting firm to conceptualize what the park will look like and let those subject matter professionals give us their ideas so we can continue to build our action plan to work towards our long-range goals," Pierce said. "So this is just another project that's getting a lot of attention. We just want to do our best to make this county enjoyable for all people."

I knew she had won."

Ava Brinkman was unaware of her position on the leaderboard until the very end when mom Andrea motioned to look at the scoreboard behind her.

FIHS Myers third at state XC

TALLAHASSEE - Fleming Island High junior Graham Myers was slowly approaching a possible triple play of cross country with his recent district and region titles, but his journey for the third prong; the Class 3A title, fell short only because the defending Class 3A champion decided to set a new state course record on the same day.

"He (Patrick Koon, Leon, defending state champion) went out really fast on the first mile, like 4:38, and me and another guy were chasing at 4:46," said Myers. "My dad had suggested going out at 4:50 and having some energy at the end which may have worked. I pleased I had some gas at the end to chase down Ruiz (Joshua Ruiz of Belen Jesuit, runnerup for eventual team champions) just not enough real estate."

Myers, third in an outstanding 15 minute, 42.10 second effort, watched from the lead chase pack as defending champion Patrick Koon, of Leon, pulled away decisively at the second mile to garner his second straight title in 14:56.70. Koon's run was the fastest time ever posted on the Apalachee Regional Park tough, hill course.

As the runners passed mile one on the course, Koon was closer to both Ruiz and Myers in a 4:38 opener with his chasers at 4:46, but Koon blasted the second mile



extend away from the field smoothly with a 9:30 two mile split with Ruiz and Myers 14 seconds off the pace.

"He just took off at the top of the hill," said Myers. "This is his home course and he has probably run that hill a hundred times. It was decisive."

In second place, Belen Jesuit, a 10time state title team, had junior Joshua Ruiz able to hold off Myers' surges in the final mile to take the runnerup at 15:37.30 to hold off a big move by Myers. Belen Jesuit eventual finished with four top 10 finishers to win the state title again with Fort Myers; led by fourth placer Joseph Koraya in 15:47.20 behind Myers.

All three frontrunners broke early from the main pack of chase runners to stage their own mano-a-mano battle for the title.

From there, teams battled after withstanding the furious front pace and settled in to get runners in at 21st (John Keester IV in 16:32.60), 36th (Danny Sakowski in 17:00.91) and 39th (Jacob Campbell in 17:02.90) to secure the third place team finish. Eagles end Springs era with 52-point win

FLEMING ISLAND - Fleming Island's Cibastian Broughton threw four touchdown passes as the Golden Eagles pulled away in the second half for a 52-12 romp over visiting Orange Park in the season finale for both teams on November 4.

Broughton completed 12 of 16 passes for 216 yards with no interceptions and ran for 72 yards on seven carries.

"I am very excited for his future," said Fleming Island head coach Damenyum Springs. "As a sophomore, he already does things that a senior or a college player would do."

Broughton's performance was overshadowed by the biggest news of the night: After 18 years as a coach at Fleming Island, seven and a half of them as the head coach, Springs is stepping down. During his tenure, the Golden Eagles went 56-24, had a winning record in each of his full seasons and made it to the regional playoffs four times, with two regional final appearances.

"I have given all I've got," said Springs, who made it clear that it was his choice to leave. "I feel like I am complete."

Springs had informed his players of his decision the day before the game. After the win, which left Fleming Island with a 5-4 record, the team presented Springs with a game ball that they had signed. At least three players told Springs they loved him during his post-game interview, one with tears in his eyes.

Springs described coaching as a calling.

"My high school coach was like a father to me, and I wanted to be that for others," he said. "I never cared about the wins and losses."

Springs is not planning to take another coaching job in the near future, but did not

rule out a return to coaching someday. He will remain at Fleming Island as a teacher and will continue to lead the program through spring practice if the school's administration wants him to do so.

The game was competitive for the first half, but the Golden Eagles outscored Orange Park 33-0 over the final two quarters to turn it into a route.

Two touchdown passes from Broughton to Trace Burney turned the tide for good. First, Broughton connected with his freshman teammate on a deep slant from the Raiders 25 yard line. Burney caught the ball in stride, just behind a lunging Dacarris Jacobs, who had roamed over from his safety position. With Jacobs out of the play, Burney coasted across the goal line to give Fleming Island a 19-12 lead heading into the intermission.

Broughton and Burney teamed up again on the first possession of the third quarter. Broughton surveyed the field, and, not seeing an open receiver over the middle, looked to his left, where Burney had drifted up the sideline from the flat. Burney gathered in Broughton's throw and sped to the near pylon before the Raiders safeties could cut him off.

The 30 yard score gave the Golden Eagles a commanding 26-12 lead after Ben Hollinger nailed the extra point.

From that point, things only got worse for Orange Park. The Raiders, who had 138 yards of total offense and eight first downs in the first half, mustered only 20 total yards, including minus 23 rushing, over the final two quarters.

Fleming Island's Tay'Shaun Smith scored on a three yard run on Fleming Island's first possession after Burney's score. On the next series, linebacker Jhoel Robinson priedthe ball loose from Orange Park running back Jojo Restall and carried the fumble 14 yards to the end zone to give

the hosts' a 39-12 lead at the end of the third quarter.

The Golden Eagles scored twice more in the fourth quarter, both on fourth downs. On a fourth and goal from the 25, Broughton surveyed the field, drifted to his right, and connected with Brenden Cook at the two yard line. Cook shook the grasp of Raiders defensive back Orlando Jackson and high stepped into the end zone. With 4:08 remaining, Fleming's Musthafa Marshall burst up the middle and outran the safeties 30 yards to the end zone on a fourth and eight yards to go.

Fleming Island was four for four on fourth downs.

"We called the right plays at the right time," said Springs. "We saw that they did not have two high safeties."

Orange Park head coach Marcus Wimberly cited mental breakdowns and a lack of depth for the second half collapse.

"They [Fleming Island] are a little more athletic than us anyway, and we were without nine or 10 guys," he said. "If we were at full strength, it would have been a different game."

Nolan Chambers scored both Raiders touchdowns in the first half, during which he ran seven times for 56 yards. The senior took a direct snap, faked out Fleming Island cornerback David Smith and cut inside to reach the end zone from three yards out to cap a 60 yard drive in the first quarter, and pulled Orange Park to within 13-12 on a five yard run in the second quarter.

"Chambers brings toughness and speed," said Wimberly. "He wants it. He is one of the guys that bought into our program, especially midway through the year."

Fleming Island spent much of the game trying to get its seniors on the stat sheet. After Sam Singleton, an FSU commitment, ran for 65 yards on six carries in the first quarter, fellow seniors Smith and Marshall took over at running back. Senior Ben Hollinger kicked four extra points, and senior wideouts Darion Domineck, Kaan Jumani and Brody Glickman had receptions. Glickman's was the most improbable.

With a first and goal from the 10 yard line, Broughton had to tip a high shotgun snap to himself, throwing off the timing of what was a designed running play. Broughton took a step forward, then flipped the ball to Brody Glickman, who appeared to be looking for someone to clock in the secondary but was all alone at the two yard line. Glickman cradled the throw and walked across the goal line, opening the scoring with 5:44 left in the first quarter.

"I am very happy to see Brody get a touchdown," said Springs. "All those guys work hard on the scout team, and to see them get some glory is great."






