

#### **PALATKA HISTORIC ROOTS RUN DEEP AT RAVINE GARDENS STATE PARK**



Ravine Gardens State Park is a 59-acre Florida State Park in Palatka. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The park was constructed by the Works Progress Administration, with cypress buildings, rock gardens and fieldstone terraces. Near the park entrance is The Court of States and a 64-foot obelisk dedicated to Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Activities include viewing the thousands of plants and shrubs, picnicking, jogging, hiking and biking. Amenities include interpretive exhibits, picnic areas, gardens, hiking trails, a 1.8-mile paved perimeter loop road, and a parcours trail. Visitors can rent a large covered pavilion, auditorium and meeting rooms.

Ravine Gardens State Park is one of the nine New Deal-era state parks in Florida. The park has two ravines up to 120 feet deep with steep banks at 45-degree angles.

Unlike common gullies, trenches or sinkholes caused by temporary flooding, the steephead ravines are a permanent feature with a spring-fed creek that never dries up, called Whitewater Branch. The underground water bubbling up cuts into the bank and carries the sand and soil downstream to the St. Johns River.

Over thousands of years, the ravines have widened and deepened to what you see today.

In 1933, the ravines were transformed into a dramatic garden by the federal Works Progress Administration. Some of the original landscaping still exists as formal gardens and a unique system

Numerous picnic sites, equipped with tables and grills, are available to visitors. The Roy E. Campbell Civic Center complex features a large covered pavilion, auditorium and meeting rooms that are available for rent. Contact the park office at 386-329-3721 to obtain a quote on facility rentals and outdoor events.

The garden's peak flowering period is azalea season, January to March.

The hundreds of remaining azaleas have a "rolling bloom" and top out with about 50% to 60% of the plants blooming simultaneously. A recent survey documented 18  $\bar{\text{different}}$  types of azaleas. The season is variable based on weather conditions.

# Billy Graham's started teaching the gospel in Bostwick 'America's pastor' has deep roots in the Palatka area

BOSTWICK - Billy Graham shook with fright when BILLY GRAHAM he took to the pulpit for the first time at the Bostick Baptist Church on Easter Sunday in 1937. He was 18 and had never tried to spread the word of God in front of worshipers. But eight minutes later. he was on his way to becoming "America's pastor."

Graham's amazing career spanned more than 81 years. He met with every president from Harry S. Truman to Barack Obama, and he met Donald Trump before his presidential run in 2016, before dying in 2018 at the age of 99.

His historic career took root following a restless night at the Florida Bible Institute in Florida before driving  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours to the tiny church in North Florida.

He described himself in his autobiography "Just As I Am" as a "spindly farm boy with lots of nail-biting

energy, a mediocre academic record and a zeal to serve the Lord that exceeded my knowledge and skills."

Graham drove to Palatka with his college dean Rev. John Minder, who originally was asked to deliver the sermon to about 40 inside the tiny church. Minter declined and suggested Graham do it.

A historical marker was placed where the Bostwick Baptist Church once stood.

"My first talk was given at a place called Bostwick, and I remember we went there, it was a very cold night. ... They had a big old stove in the middle of the church, and the church wouldn't have seated more than maybe 60 people," he wrote. "I had prepared four different little outlines that I could talk from, I thought, and I'd practice them. ... When I stood up that night, I was so nervous that I was just trembling all over and I almost didn't stand up ... but I did."



Graham was baptized by Rev.
Cecil Underwood and other
Southern Baptist preachers in
Silver Lake in 1938 and he was
ordained at Penial Baptist Church
in Palatka in 1939. The Southern
Baptist Church built in the 1870s
still stands.

So does Graham's legacy.

Graham continued to preach in churches throughout Northeast Florida, including Palatka. A group of young preachers from the bible college often came to Palatka on the weekends. They ate fried chicken and slept on floors as guests of parishioners. On Sunday mornings, the group disbanded so they cough teach at several churches.

# Florahome artist turns plain pine boards into patriotic pieces of art *By Don Coble*



FLORAHOME – Darryl Ferrell didn't consider himself to be an artist, but that all changed one night during a dream three years ago.

His wife saw a flat United States flag out of lumber, and she told him about it. That discussion led to a life-changing career.

His first flag was a Christmas present for his wife. He had enough leftover wood, he made more flags for Christmas gifts – and he hasn't stopped since.

"I just love to build the American flag. I love this country. I believe in this country," he said. "I support this country and our troops. And I am a veteran. I was in the United States Army Reserves.

"I've always had a passion for working and I started by doing some construction work when I was younger. So I love working with wood. I built a few cornhole boards and things like that in the past, but once I saw that flag and built that flag, that was I knew that was something that I wanted to do."

Ferrell now has completed more than 500 flags in his shop east of downtown Palatka. He sells them at art festivals, craft shows, county fairs and online. Since no board is alike, each is unique.

"I just fell in love with doing it," Ferrell said. "It has become a deep, deep passion of mine. I actually went ahead and retired on Jan. 7 of this year so I can do this more."

# "It all comes together very nicely," Ferrell said. "I love it."

Ferrell buys pine two-by-fours and he carves them into shapes that often resemble a waving flag. It takes one board to make a single stripe. The stars are hand-carved and he uses a blowtorch to scorch each plank before they are stained red, white and blue.

"First off, the challenge is to get a hold of the right pieces of wood, ones that are straight, and those that are going to make it shine.

"Then we've got it to link our slab together. Then we carve it to make it a good production piece. Then we'll color it, burn it and put it together. It's a pretty good lengthy process. A large waving flag takes anywhere from 14 to 16 to 20 hours to make. I prefer making the waving (flags) because they really give it something different and something that you really can't find out there.

And there are no shortcuts.

"I don't use any CNC machines. Everything I do is by hand. No CNC machines," Ferrell said. "That means all the stars that you see have been hand-carved. And I'm over 10,500 stars that I've carved.

"These flags come to me in a dream. I'm self-taught. As for my colors, I don't use just regular wood stains. I use a special blend of Akita dye mixed with alcohol that I've come up with. I do put a little bit of stain in it, but the base is an Akita dye."\

"That's my favorite part is seeing the colors shine through."

Once each board is carved to fit snuggly against other boards, Ferrell uses glue and screws to bring it together. All that's left is to add a coat of finish and get it ready for the next sale.

"It all comes together very nicely," Ferrell said. "I love it."

# Everyday products, responsibly made.

For 75 years, Georgia-Pacific's Palatka mill has worked to help people improve their lives by producing household products that make everyday life a little easier.



# Georgia-Pacific Palatka mill has been producing paper products for 75 years

PALATKA – Georgia-Pacific's Palatka mill, which employs 900 people, now has been doing business in Putnam County for 75 years.

Employees celebrate its 75th anniversary of operation this week.

On Nov. 5, 1947, the first sheet of paper was produced at the Hudson Pulp and Paper Company, a large plant located on Palatka's northern outskirts. At first, Hudson employed only 279 persons, but within three decades the work force had risen to 2,400 persons. It was the state's largest producer of facial and bathroom tissue, and through the years has produced other products including gummed paper tape and kraft paper used to make bags and sacks.

Today, the mill remains the largest private employer in Putnam County, employing nearly 900 employees plus an additional 2,426 indirect jobs in the community. The mill produces familiar consumer brands like Brawny, Sparkle and private label paper towels; Angel Soft and private label bath tissue; kraft paper used for EarthKraft Recyclable Mailers, grocery bags and butcher paper; and linerboard used to make corrugated boxes. Daily production has increased by 800% since its first day.

"We are thrilled to celebrate 75 years as part of this

community, including the generations of employees who have worked here," said Deb Coduto, vice president of manufacturing for the Palatka mill. "We're thankful for the opportunity we have each day to make products that consumers want and need."

In its early days, the mill was the second-largest community in Putnam County. Completely self-contained, it had its own power plant, fire department, police department, medical facilities (emergency room and hospital), two cafeterias and water supply.

In 1979, the mill was purchased by Georgia-Pacific, which modernized and expanded the facility through the years. The company's capital investment in the mill has totaled more than \$1.2 billion since 2002. With an economic impact of more than \$1 billion annually, the mill remains a strong contributor to the growth of Palatka, Putnam County and the region.

In addition to its financial impact, the Palatka mill also has been recognized recently by the Environmental Protection Agency for its work in reducing energy and water use. In 2018, the mill achieved the ENERGY STAR Challenge Achiever for Industry by reducing energy use by more than 10 percent over three years. In 2020, the mill was awarded the EPA's ENERGY STAR Top Project for 2020 for achieving a 40 percent water reduction in a 10-week period through investments in improved equipment and monitoring.

Based in Atlanta, Georgia-Pacific and its subsidiaries are among the world's leading manufacturers and marketers of bath tissue, paper towels and napkins, tableware, paper-based packaging, cellulose, specialty fibers and building products. The company operates more than 150 facilities and employs approximately 30,000 people directly and creates more than 89,000 jobs indirectly.



# City of Murals

## Giant Downtown Palatka murals put focus on the city's colorful, historic roots

PALATKA – There's a reason why Palatka embraces its nickname as the City of Murals.

Buildings have been adorned with murals that tell colorful stories about the town, attracting visitors and adding a splash of beauty to the historic downtown area.

There are more than 30 cultural and historical murals around town, and that doesn't include a giant banner on the side of Wilkinson Automotive where each letter in the word PALATKA offers a scenic glimpse into the attractions that make up the town. The banner greets motorists as they drive north over the Memorial Bridge U.S. Highway bridge, and it sets the tone for a day of artistic discovery.

The project to add color and purpose to the downtown area is managed by the Conlee-Snyder Mural Committee. Prints of each mural are available at the Palatka Welcome Center at 900 St. Johns Ave. Proceeds from those sales finance the creation of new murals.

One of the newest murals is of The Putnam House, circa 1891, on Second Street and St. Johns Avenue. Artist Luke Taft, who lives in nearby Florahome, completed his biggest, and perhaps his best, mural in October and it is 20 feet by 40 feet. In all, Taft has created six of the city's murals. According to his website, he works as a musician, artist and arts educator in Palatka, a small town nestled on the edge of cypress swamps on the St. Johns River. Palatka has a colorful downtown with a strong revitalization effort, historic buildings and architecture, and is developing a thriving arts community.

Taft is so committed to enhancing the Putnam County area, he opened The Art Hole, a nonprofit fine arts school for children.

"My work in teaching art is very important to me and I firmly believe that it strengthens the community when our youth have a creative outlet," he said. "We are all artists, as art is a merely unique expression. When provided the tools, we can speak this language more articulately and expand our ability to think and communicate."

Another artist is Nina Larkin Mateyunas. One of her works is "The Wild West Comes to Palatka," which features cowboys rassling with cows and the day in 1908 Annie Oakley brought her shooting



exhibition to town.

Mateyunas, along with her husband Ed, also created "Harlem Nights in Palatka," which is on St. Johns Avenue and North Eighth Street.

Terry Smith's 13-foot by 56-foot painting of "The Georgia Southern and Florida Railroad" can be found on St. Johns Avenue and North Seventh Street, while his "Heartbeat of Palatka, Circa 1890-1909-1916," is on display at 205 N. Second St. and his "To God Be the Glory," which chronicles the first sermons by Rev. Billy Graham, is at South Fourth Street and St. Johns Avenue.

"My goal is to paint as much of 'The Real Florida' as I can," Smith said. "Future generations need to see what has been and is being lost. There is a need to encourage others to speak up to protect our most valuable treasure. Many things in life can be replaced or rebuilt, but not our greatest possession. It is my hope that by recording the natural Florida now, people will realize the importance of saving Florida's natural resources, to avoid being left with just memories."

Other mural artists include Carolyn Stevens, Dean Quigley, Monique Sinclair, Richard Currier, Kitty Williams, Joe Puskas, Betty Sutliff, Julia McCoy and Sherrie Z. Lowe.

## The Bass Capitol of the World

Big fish, miles of pristine waterways hook anglers from all over the world \_\_\_\_

There's an old saying that goes: "A bad day fishing is better than a good day at work." For Capt. Ken Walker, fishing is his work.

The fishing guide has spent more than 20 years helping guests hook trophy-sized largemouth bass on the St. Johns River and Rodman Reservoir southwest of town.

The river is a big part of the lifeblood of the city. Riverfront Park is a scenic platform of art, docks, a playground and incredible views of the river. It's also where hundreds of professional fishermen launch for Major League Fishing's Phoenix Bass League tournament every September.

The Bassmaster Tournament comes to Palatka for three days in February and the Wolfson Children's Hospital Bass Tournament – the largest one-day fishing tournament east of the Mississippi River – has attracted as many as 500 boats every May.

"Yes, fishing is a major industry here," Walker said. "I know dozens and dozens of guides that do the St. Johns River and the Rodman Reservoir, also. And I mean that's, that's my primary job is to take people fishing."

The St. Johns River runs 42 miles from Palatka south to Lake George. North of the Palatka Memorial Bridge on U.S. Highway 17 to Trout Creek, there are several drops, sandbars, docks, pilings and natural structures. The river and its connecting bodies are home to marinas, hotels, fish camps, ramps and launches.

The Rodman Reservoir was created in 1968 by the creation of the Rodman Dam. It's 15 miles long and covers 13,000 acres.

Walker said in addition to catching large bass – he caught a couple of lunkers that weighed more than 11 pounds this year – he can put fishermen on crappies. According to bassonline.com, Florida is ranked among the top 10 states for crappies and the St. Johns River in Palatka is considered the premier location for the fish. While they can be caught all year, the best months are January, February, April and November.



Bass can be just as fickle, Walker said, but an experienced guide can find them all 12 months.

"Fishing is a little slower when it's too hot to go fishing," he said. "The fish are still there and they still bite, but they're not as active as they are in the cooler months. Your hottest months are in January, February and March because that's when they're the heaviest the biggest because they're spawning.

"I'll make most of my money in the coldest three months of the year. And it's a lot of fun. I've taken guys over 90 years old out there on my boat and they just have a blast. They've been fishing for 65 years and they never caught a bass as big as they did. So that's always a bonus when you can put somebody on the biggest fish they've ever even seen other than on TV."

Walker isn't the only one who makes his living with a fishing rod. Other places like Georgia Boys Fish Camp and Steghone's Fish Camp also attract out-of-area fishermen.


Expert guides are knowledgeable about spawning and feeding patterns. Even when the fish aren't biting, the scenery is spectacular, Walker said. But Walker rarely comes home emptyhanded, and he offers a money-back guarantee if nobody hooks a fish.

"It's a beautiful area, the nature on the reservoir and in the St. Johns River," he said. "Nature is just beautiful. I mean, you've got manatees, you got 1,000s of different species of birds that are around the waterways, otters, manatees. And alligators. You can see all kinds of eagles. Eagles stay here year-round. We have the Eagles and Osprey. You see owls and hawks and all the birds of prey. The really big draw is the manatees when they're in the St. Johns River and they come up out of the Atlantic. They'll just float on through with the boats and go out the other side. And it's not uncommon for me to see you know, groups of up to nine or 10 together in the reservoir."
