Top Story of the Year

Work on the Black Creek Water Resource Development Project finally begins

Plan to restore lake levels in Keystone Heights pushes forward after 40-year battle.

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — Lake Geneva served as a backdrop to the formal announcement the Black Creek Water Resource Development Project was a reality. Once filled nearly to a small seawall, water from the lake had receded nearly 70 yards to remind residents and dignitaries why they were there.

In about two years, water levels are expected to be returned at Geneva and nearby Lake Brooklyn to the levels that made the tiny city a paradise.

"What a journey," said former Florida Sen. and Chairman of the St. Johns River Water Management District Rob Bradley said.



Indeed. After decades of irresponsible use, state, county and local officials finally forged a plan to siphon unneeded water from Black Creek and send it to the lakes in Keystone Heights. As the population grew in the Lake Region, so did the demand for water. After decades of taking, resi-

dents, particularly the Save Our Lakes Organization, created a mission to put a plug in draining the lakes while demanding water levels be replenished.

"This has been four decades or more journey," said SOLO President Vivian Katz-James. "It's a big day for a lot of people, not just me, but a lot of people."

Essentially, the Black Creek project, which was created in 2017, will divert as much as 10 million gallons of water from the South Fork of the Black Creek between Seamark Ranch and the Clay County Animal Control Services on State Road 16, move it through a 17-mile pipeline and filtering system, and dump the water into Alligator Creek, which flows into Lake Brooklyn.

Three days after the formal announcement, workers already were breaking ground and starting work on the pump station about 100 yards west of the South Fork.

The Keystone Heights lakes recharge the Upper Floridian aquifer and Lower Sante Fe basin through the lake bottom, so the benefits will be felt in surrounding counties as the aquifer improves.

The project, however, took years of debate, negotiating and planning. State and Keystone
Height officials, along with the Clay
County Board of Commissioners,
St. Johns River Water Management District, SOLO and four local
utility companies — Clay County
Utility Authority, Gainesville Regional Utilities, St.
Johns Utilities and JEA — all had to find common ground. The completed project is expected to cost
\$100 million, and Bradley, Florida Reps. Bobby
Payne (Palatka) and Travis Cummings (Fleming Island) helped appropriate more than \$48 from the state. The utility companies agreed to pay a total
\$19.2 million.

Construction of the pump station started on Monday, Oct. 24, just a few yards from Black Creek.

"There were people who really didn't want this to happen," Bradley said. "But we brought everybody together. It didn't matter if you were a Republican, Democrat or Independent. We didn't care. We just wanted to save the lakes, right?"

SOLO members started attending SJRWMD meetings nearly 30 years ago. They all wore red shirts and sat in the front row, and each time, they had the same message — save the lakes. They were persistent and unapologetic, but their passion finally made a difference.

Former SJRWMD Chairman Douglas Burnett was an early advocate to save the lakes. He faced difficult challenges of getting the money and uniformed support to make the project a reality.

"This is a way, not the commotion you see on TV every day in Washington, of elected leaders working for their people and their local groups like Save Our Lakes, working for the good of the community," Burnett said.

Baptist Medical Center Clay accepts patients minutes after opening it doors

FLEMING ISLAND – Darin Roark's dream of building an intricate, yet contemporary, medical facility was, at long last, at the finish line two weeks before Christmas. Except for buffing out a few scuff marks, laying sod and fluffing pillows, the work is done

His mind had been filled with ideas, plans and challenges since hospital and county officials broke ground nearly two years ago on the \$235 million project that also included transforming the old VyStar building west of the hospital into a health center.

"I usually get about two hours of sleep," Roark

said while walking through the hospital two days before the ribbon cutting. "I get up and go running for about an hour and then I'm here. I've been running on adrenaline. This project is personal."

Roark is the hospital president. He's walked through the site since the first scoop of dirt was moved and the first nail was driven. He's been down every hallway and checked behind every door since construction workers started framing the 102 patient rooms. The plans are committed to memory so all work stayed on target.

Portions of the Baptist Clay were operational before the official opening. The laboratory has been open for more than a week. The pharmacy is ready to go. Nurses and technicians spent weeks in training, often sharing the same hallways with men in yellow vests and hard hats who were making sure every wall was straight and sound.

A couple of hours before the official opening on Dec. 19, Fleming Island's Gil Aguayo was rushed to the hospital after his glucose level "crashed." As officials got ready to open the doors, Aguayo already had been admitted as the first patient.

It didn't take Baptist Clay long to welcome its first birth. Baby Waylon was born on Dec. 20, and he and his mother, Savannah, were both in good spirits following the delivery.

"We want the bonding to take part from the minute that baby comes out of the womb," maternity nurse Sarah Surrency said. "We are going to have skin-to-skin care bonding. The entire stay, there is no moving and shuffling of departments when that baby's delivered. Mama and baby stay together and they stay in the same room."

If there are complications, NCIU is next door.

"We're just so blessed with this technology," supervisor Letitia Croce. "This is brand new. To me, and I've been in NICU for almost 15 years, this is the best of the best. We have so much of the newest that I'm a little speechless. I'm super excited to be a part of it."

The health place next door also has several available services. Just last week, the Wound Care and Hyperbaric Medicine Center where healing is possible for even the most complex wounds.

The Wound Care and Hyperbaric Medicine Center at Baptist Clay provide comprehensive care to patients with chronic or acute wounds, foot ulcers, venous insufficiency, diabetic ulcers, wounds caused by radiation, trauma and more.

Eventually, health place will be home to Baptist doctors, as well as meeting rooms for classes, healthy living programs and other medical services.

The new hospital cost \$175 million, Roark said, and with the conversion of health place, "We're all in at \$235 million."

There currently are 585 employees and Roark said that soon will grow to 600. And with it comes a shift in challenges from building a hospital to running one.

Former Sheriff Daniels acquitted of lying to investigators, tampering with evidence

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Saying he was grateful a Clay County jury found him not guilty on all seven charges stemming from a six-year extramarital affair, Former Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels compared his three-year ordeal to the persecution of former president Donald Trump and called out the abuse of power by government entities.

The state tried to convince jurists he lied to investigators about the affair and that he wanted his former mistress arrested for stalking. Prosecutors also said he attempted to destroy and tamper with evidence.

Daniels' defense team said he was trying to hide information about the affair from his wife to save his marriage.

The jury needed less than three hours on Thursday, Sept. 15, to agree with Daniels. While he admitted his personal life and reputation were tarnished by the affair, he felt vindicated of breaking any laws.

Known for his bravado, Daniels said, in part, after the verdict:

"I would like to thank the jury for their service and thank all of the people of Florida for their support during this challenging time for me and for my family. The abuse and overreach that I have had to endure over the past three years is an example of what happens when sectors of our government go unchecked. If this abuse of power by government

entities can happen to a duly elected sheriff, then it can happen to anyone. I pledge to all Floridians and people from across the country who offered their support during these trying times, that I will continue to fight for them to ensure that we all receive equal iustice under the law. This abuse cost me my job that I loved and it cost Clay County their sheriff." His mistress, Cierra Smith, and Clay County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Christopher Ruby testified Daniels ordered Smith the be arrested for stalking him. She was stopped on May 6, 2019, in an Oakleaf Village Parkway parking lot and taken to the Clay County Jail. Smith said Daniels asked to meet her to get a copy of a CD of an internal investigation at the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office where it was likely he would be identified as having an affair when both Smith and Daniels worked for JSO.

Smith wasn't charged or booked after other agency officials said there wasn't any probable cause. CCSO then drove Smith home.

Within days, the Florida
Department of Law Enforcement
launched an investigation. They obtained a warrant
for seven charges, and the sheriff was arrested on
Aug. 13, 2020 – just five days before the 2020
primary. He wound up losing to Michelle Cook by
3,121 votes.

The state found more than 2,000 texts and voice messages between the couple.

Prosecutors said Daniels lied to Ruby at the scene, telling him he attempted to get a restraining order against Smith earlier in the day. However, the Clay County Clerk's Office said there were no records of any requests.

Assistant State Attorney Toby Hunt told the jury Daniels took action to alter evidence, including asking a CCSO tech to wipe out records on his agency-issued phone.

Defense attorney Matthew Kachergus said anything erased or hidden by Daniels was to keep his wife from learning the sorted details of their relationship.

After the verdict, Daniels hugged his defense team.



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

As we head into 2023, it's important to take a moment to look back at the important and memorable stories of 2022. We enjoyed championships and returned to normal activities – often in record numbers. We continued to search for solutions to helping those who are fighting methamphetamine and fentanyl addictions, helping the families affected by drug abuse and putting the people who peddle the poison in jail.

We survived another election cycle, the threat of two tropical cyclones and another year of never-ending construction on Blanding Boulevard in Middleburg.

But most of all, we learned to adapt to an ever-changing world. Here are a few of the stories that got our attention in 2022:

JANUARY

Man buys Hell House land to preserve Lynyrd Skynyrd's legacy

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Adam Hartle remembered riding his jet ski along Peter's Creek not long ago and making an impromptu stop at a vacant lot with a rickety dock.

He strolled among the moss-draped oaks and tried to imagine what it must have been like to be there more than 40 years ago when the thundering sounds of Lynyrd Skynyrd used to echo from what was known as the Mudcrutch Farm through the swampy wilderness.

When he returned months later, he saw tractortrailer loads of lumber stacked on newly-paved streets and the basic outline of new homes being created by cinder blocks.

The more the land was being transformed into the Edgewater Landing subdivision, the more determined he became to keep the lot where Hell House served as a crude rehearsal studio like it was back in the early 1970s — raw and unforgiving.

"It's nature, and it's history," Hartle said. "The

band did so many good things here, I don't think Jacksonville gives Skynyrd enough credit. I didn't want to see some house go up here, become some lady's back yard and see them tear up the dock. I didn't want to see the history get torn up."

So he bought it.

His plans for the .6-acre lot are simple: he's going to leave it alone.

Grumpy's vows to rebuild and reopen following devastating fire

MIDDLEBURG — Portions of the drop ceiling, mixed with water from a Clay County Fire Rescue hose, laid clumped on the floor like a child's paper mache project 12 hours after a fire raged through Grumpy's in Middleburg on Jan. 19.

Light fixtures dangled from the walls and ceiling. Except for some blue plastic trays that melted on a shelf and hung like stalactites, the rest of Grumpy's was cloaked in complete blackness. And uncertainty.

Since the restaurant closed nearly six hours earlier, nobody was injured. It also meant the fire was able to ravage the building before an employee at a neighboring store smelled smoke.

Hoard said the fire will strengthen his resolve to re-

open – and to reconnect with a loyal and friendly group of customers.

"We will open back up. Some places can't make this," Hoard said. "We are going to survive. We are going to make it back up. And I know the community will be behind us. I don't know how long this process is going to take us right now, but we'll be back."

The owner said he expects as many as 80% of his former employees to be back, too. Many were transferred to other Grumpy's locations, while Hoard worked to help the rest find new jobs.

Hoard said the grand re-opening will be on Jan 2

FLEMING ISLAND – The Clay County School District disputed allegations made against its staff in a recent lawsuit filed in the U.S. Federal Court for the Middle District of Florida that a sixth-grade student attempted suicide in the girls' bathroom at Paterson Elementary.

The 54-page document was delivered to the District on Feb. 4. It alleged a guidance counselor and other school officials were to blame after the girl attempted suicide at the school on Jan. 5.

Lawyers representing the girl's parents said their rights were violated because the school didn't alert them of their daughter's apparent mental issues. According to the suit, the girl said she went to the counselor because she felt she was being bullied

The suit also contended the school told the parents the reason the girl tried to hang herself was "because of her gender identity issue" and she believed her parents would be angry because of their Catholic beliefs. The parents said the school failed to tell them of their daughter's issues, and they said the school counselor may have contributed to the confusion by calling her boy names.

Without offering details, the District denied the allegations and said it would present its facts in the courtroom.

"Clay County District Schools has performed a thorough and complete investigation into this matter as it was presented to us and has determined that the allegations made by this out-of-state organization are completely false, fabricated, and appear to be intended solely for the purpose of inciting the public," the District told Clay Today.

House of horrors: Bones found near home where couple were bound for days

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - From the start. Aubrey Lamar Lumpkin provided the Clay County Sheriff's Office with an assortment of confessions, confusion and possible contradictions. He admitted to tying up a couple in their 70s for more than two days on Heath Road and he told detectives he killed someone and buried them nearby.

Both confessions proved true when the couple was rescued and investigators unearthed the bones of a woman three days later.

It started on April 12 after he called 911 to first tell dispatchers "I'm a piece of $S^{\star\star\star}$ and that he'd done some "horrible things." He then said he needed medical assistance for an elderly couple.

What deputies and fire rescue found was troubling.

They found a couple in their 70s with their feet, hands and mouths bound by duct tape. According to the arrest report, the couple was suffering from being "extremely dehydrated, covered in feces, malnourished and suffering from infections and lesions from being bound for more than 48 hours."

"We began a search of the property. (Friday) we have uncovered what we believe may potentially be human remains," Sheriff Michelle Cook said. "I cannot tell you how long those remains have been there. Been there for a while. We do not know who the person is at this time. So, the investigation for us is really now beginning as we attempt to identify the remains and follow this investigation to a logical conclusion. In the wooded area behind the house was behind the house."

Lumpkin has been in the Clay County Jail since with a \$400,009 bond. His next court appearance is scheduled for Jan. 9.

Three able to provide information on deadly officer-involved shooting

ORANGE PARK — After each job was completed for their moving company, Adam German, Zachary Kellar and a co-worker had a ritual to stop at the Wawa on Blanding Boulevard to get a soft drink and a sandwich.

That routine provided them with a clear view of

the deadly officer-involved shooting on April 27.

"It was really bizarre," German said. "I was standing close enough I could hear the bullets whizzing and cracking."

The man was shot to death after the Orange Park Police Department answered a call for possible domestic violence. A man left in a PT Cruiser and led police on a car chase. Clay County Sheriff's Office deputies eventually became involved in the chase as he sped toward Middleburg on Blanding Boulevard.

The man turned right on Filmore Street onto a road behind the gas station, which allowed a deputy to perform a PIT maneuver. Seconds later, more than 20 rounds were fired.

The man was pronounced dead at the scene. His identity hasn't been released by the sheriff's office or the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, which assumed the lead role of the investigation immediately after the shooting.

German and Kellar not only saw the incident, they heard it. They also got one of the clearest views of the PIT maneuver, shooting and aftermath — and they were able to record it on a cellphone.

Clay Today obtained a copy of the recording. In it, deputies clearly yelled commands to the man to not move and show them his hands. Clay Today then forwarded the recording and audio of an interview with German and Kellar to the FDLE the day after the shooting.

The agency then interviewed both men, German said.

"The lead cop car was able to get up close to him and actually picked it up and spun him out," German said. "The lead car cop got out the police officers behind and then got out and proceeded to pull their firearms saying, you know, yell, 'Put up your hands! Let me see your hands! I heard that. I heard them yell at him.

"And then they started opening fire."

"We witnessed this," Kellar said. "I heard him (CCSO deputy) say, 'Put your hands up. Don't move.'"

"I don't know what the police knew if he had a firearm or not," German said. "I don't know anything like that."

World Champion pitmaster lives high on the hog

FLEMING ISLAND – All Josh Skipper needed was a match, a bag of charcoal, a chunk of wood and a hunk of meat to create a mouth-watering masterniece.

Skipper played a major role in Blues Hog's Grand Champion victory at the renowned Memphis in May competition, a cookoff that's considered the world championship of barbecue.

Hours of preparation and a 550-gallon drum cooker smoked the competition — literally — and

earned the team a total of \$36,000 in prize money.

Just don't expect Skipper to taste his success. "I really don't eat barbecue," he said. "I'll taste it, but I don't eat it."

Skipper learned to cook from "a bunch of oldschool guys," but every pitmaster takes a unique path to smokey success.

Blues Hog uses its proprietary spice blends, injections and lump charcoal. But more than anything else, the team use a giant barrel cooker that accelerated the low-and-slow process. While others spent nearly a day cooking a hog, Blues Hog only needed 91/2 hours.

The team cooked three hogs belly-side down. The result was crispy, mahogany skin and succulent meat that dripped with flavor. Since the shoulders and hams take longer to cook, Blues Hog placed bags of ice or beef briskets on the middle of the back to keep the loin from overcooking and drying

"It's a crazy amount of moisture you get out of it," Skipper said.

Bill Arnold created Blues Hog but the team was sold to Scheer in 2015. Scheer owns Marble Ridge Farms in New Haven, Missouri where he raises wagyu cattle and Mangalitsa-Berkshire-Duroc pigs. Many of them wind up on the grill.

Skipper said he's probably cooked 30 whole hogs. He's also done half steers, ribs, chicken and Boston butts. In fact, he has a 1,000-gallon grill that he's used to cooking a steer and whole hog at the same time.

The team's victory at Memphis in May was featured in season one, episode six of Michael Symon's "BBQ USA" on the Food Network.

"Due to a significant and sudden increase in clientele, funding has been inadequate to meet the demand for assistance. The grant from State Farm will help meet these needs.'

State Farm opened the program for the first 4,000 applicants. All of the spots were gone within

Clay County schools earn an 'A' from state

CLAY COUNTY – The School District notched an A grade, with about 85% of schools hitting A or B grades for the 2021-2022 school year, with some subject test scores being ranked in the Top-5 in the state.

Excluding 2021, where reporting was optional and was declined by 56 of the state's 67 districts, Clay County has had seven A rankings and four B

rankings since 2010. The A grade from 2021-2022 school year maintains the A grades from the school years beginning in 2019 and 2018.

Clay County students are part of a school

district that earned an 'A' rating from state.

Grades, their reporting and their release have been marred by the COVID-19 pandemic, said Superintendent David Broskie.

"We are so excited about our A ranking," Broskie said. "That shows the strength and resiliency of Clay County District Schools."

The state doesn't have overall rankings of districts listed on its website or from various spreadsheets documenting scores. However, numerous reputable academic websites list Clay among the Top-10 districts in the state.

The county is one of 14 districts to achieve the A ranking last school year. The district also did not have D or F schools. The district had 11 schools drop a grade level from their 2019 scores, most

Two schools, Plantation Oaks Elementary and Lake Asbury Elementary increased from a B to an A, with Montclair Elementary jumping from a C to a B. After consecutive D grades in 2018 and in 2019, Charles E. Bennett Elementary achieved a C grade for the second year in a row.

Overall, the district posted 18 A grades, 17 B grades and six Cs.

"The district's grade is calculated as if the district's students are enrolled in one large combination school," according to the state Department of Education. "All students who are full-year enrolled in the district will be included in the district's grade."

Schools join law enforcement to establish unified plan to protect students

CLAY COUNTY — School officials and law enforcement laid out plans to keep Clay County schools safer from active shooters.

In July and August, every public school, as well as the larger private and charter schools, was fortified with fencing, single-access points and security cameras to minimize the risk of a school tragedy that has become all too common in the country.

The school district, school police department, members of the Clay County Sheriff's, Fire Rescue and Emergency Management and the Green Cove Springs and Orange Park police departments met with the administrations to create an emergency response plan specific to the needs of each school

"You know Clay County is a great place to live," said Superintendent David Broskie. "It's a great place to work, and it's a great place for kids to go to school. There's little doubt there's no doubt about that. You know, one of our most sacred challenges is ensuring that all students are safe."

After reviewing mass casualty attacks at schools like Marjory Stoneman Douglas High in 2018 and at Robb Elementary in Uvalde, Texas, Clay County officials said they worked to identify the strengths and weaknesses of each school.

"We started meeting about a month ago to discuss school safety and the importance of school safety, and what are our plans moving forward? To the parents that are out there? Let me just say this, I promise you we're going to keep your kids safe — law enforcement, fire rescue emergency management and school administration," Sheriff Michelle Cook said. "We have all been working together and will continue to work together to keep our kids safe.

Wilkinson becomes a UCF-Certified Community Partnership School

MIDDLEBURG — There were times when it was difficult for Shawn C. Smith to keep her composure when describing Wilkinson Junior High's two-year mission to become one of the few UCF-Certified Community Partnership Schools.

Her voice cracked at times, but her smile was infectious. This was a big deal, and she knew it.

"Previously, schools were just the source of education," she said during a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Aug. 5. "Now community partnerships, can be a source of change."

Big change.

According to Central Florida, The UCF Center for Community Schools promotes community partnerships that include at least four core partners — a school district, a university or college, a community-based nonprofit and a healthcare provider.

For Wilkinson, it means students will have more tools to help break the cycle of poverty, hunger and a lack of opportunities.

Wilkinson's partners included the Clay County District Schools, St. Johns River State College, Baptist Health, Wolfson Children's Hospital and Children Home Society of Florida. Together, they intend to lift one of the poorest areas in Northeast Florida.

Skipper, Hanson unseat school board incumbents in Primary

CLAY COUNTY – The 2022 primary election saw two Clay County School District board members dethroned and two Republican primaries for county commissioner races were decided.

Of a possible 161,385 voters, approximately 40,835 ballots were counted, meaning the turnout was 25.3%. As for voting patterns, 17,837 ballots were cast on Election Day, 12,989 mail-in ballots were cast and 10,001 ballots were cast during early voting.

Incumbents Janice Kerekes and Tina Bullock were defeated by Erin Skipper and Michele Hanson, respectively. To win District 1's seat, Skipper captured 54.6% of the vote to Kerekes' 33.19%, with Charles Kirk securing 12.2% of more than 39.000 votes cast.

Skipper, who was endorsed by Gov. Ron De-Santis, said she wasn't expecting the win. Describing the feeling as overwhelming, Skipper estimated she knocked on at least 1,000 doors.

In District 4, Hanson's 54.93% bested Bullock's 45.07%. Bullock, a long-time district administrator who has served on the school board before, was seeking a second term against Hanson, a former teacher.

Hanson said she wanted to give people a voice and she felt a change was going to happen based on the people she talked with.

In the county's District 4, Commissioner Betsy

Condon secured a second four-year term with 64.62% of the vote, as she defeated Dale Carter, 35.38%, in a Republican primary. A Democrat candidate has not filed for the district.

Condon said she worked during the election but now has a chance to focus all her effort and attention on the work.

Alexandra Compere won the Republican primary in Oakleaf's District 2, where incumbent Wayne Bolla is termed out. She earned 70.39% of the vote to candidate Rodney Herring's 29.61%. She was to face Leroy Edwards in the General Election, but he withdrew.

CCSO, Post Office break up 'Lucky 777's' drug trafficking ring

ORANGE PARK – The Clay County Sheriff's Office and U.S. Postal Service worked together to put two men behind bars and uncover a massive drug trafficking ring.

Jason Terril Setzer, 46, of Jacksonville, was charged with conspiracy to traffic more than 2,000 grams of fentanyl. Trafficking fentanyl, possession

of marijuana and a firearm by a convicted felon and trafficking methamphetamine and fentanyl, and Alvin J.J. Mercado, 37, of Fleming Island, was charged with conspiracy to traffic fentanyl and trafficking fentanyl on Sept. 11 after investigators got a tip the two received large quantities of drugs through the mail. The arrests came after the CCSO SWAT and Narcotics Unit raided two homes on Sept. 10 and seized 30 firearms, as well as a large cache of drugs.

"We've been working on it since late June, early July," Clay County Sheriff Michelle Cook said. "We could have continued this investigation, but these guys were distributing so much. We had to pull them off the street because just in a couple of months they brought in enough fentanyl to kill four million people. And so we had to remove them as quickly as possible because they truly are a danger to society with that level of distribution."

The arrests were part of a multi-agency, including federal, state and county agencies, investigation that started in June, Cook said. The case started with a traffic stop by the Florida Highway Patrol in Jacksonville and quickly grew in scope. The arrests were in conjunction with large seizures of cocaine, fentanyl and methamphetamine in both Jacksonville and Nassau County. Less than a week before Setzer and Mercado were taken into custody, the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office confiscated more than three kilos of fentanyl, more than one kilo of cocaine and 6,000 pills containing fentanyl.

According to two lengthy arrest reports, Setzer and Mercado received fentanyl, methamphetamine and cocaine from an address in California. Packages were sent to Setzer on William Paca Street in Orange Park and to Mercado at houses on Eagle Cove Drive and River Breeze Drive on Fleming Island.

According to the arrest report, bricks of the drugs were "broken down and then distributed."

The drugs were sent to various locations in Northeast Florida and cash was mailed back to the same address in California, Cook said.

Both men are expected in court on Jan. 9.

Clay County Fair recognized for its picnic table, Sunflower Hours projects

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Tasha Hyder found a unique way to turn soon-to-be garbage into a community fundraiser when she invited local artists to put their artistic touches on old picnic tables at the Clay County Fairgrounds.

Not only were the tables spared from being crushed into sawdust, but their transformations also helped raise money to help 44 state charities.

That wasn't lost on officials at the Florida Festivals and Events Association annual convention. The organization honored both the Clay County Agricultural Fair and the South Florida Fair in West Palm Beach with its Community Impact Award.







Instead of throwing old picnic tables away, artists created masterpieces from them that were sold at the fair to benefit local charities.

Both fairs turned old picnic tables into monevgenerating pieces of art that raised a total of \$200,000.

Clay also finished second in the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion for its Sunflower Hours Project where music and loud noises were muted to allow people with visible disabilities to participate in a morning of fun.

Artists were extremely creative with their designs. Sixteen tables were turned from splintered eyesores into art that was sold at auction during the 11-day fair. All the money was dispersed to area charities. Hyder said one table fetched \$500.

The picnic table and Sunflower Hours will return next vear. Hyder said.

"We have about 30-to-40 tables here, so we're going to do it again," she said. "And we're going to expand our Sunflower Hours. We're going to do it until we run out of tables."

lan's unexpected turn takes **Clay County out of its wrath**

CLAY COUNTY - Residents brought in plants and outdoor furniture and trimmed trees. They fortified their homes with sandbags and stocked up on bottled water, diapers, gasoline and bread.

Shelters were opened and evacuations were ordered.

And just as Clay County dug in on Sept. 29 for what was supposed to be significant damage from Hurricane lan, the massive storm made an immediate - and unexpected - hard turn to the left and passed to the south.

lan didn't follow any of the projected paths from the experts, proving again Mother Nature doesn't pay attention to forecasts or expectations.

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Clay County Director of Emergency Management John Ward was relieved the area was spared the brunt of a storm that rolled over and through Fort Myers as a Category 4 storm on Sept. 28.

Then came the challenge the reassure residents not to be dismissive of the next storm.

"Obviously, we had to change and pivot," Ward said. "We have to be Super Gumby and always flexible. Last week was a perfect example. We ordered evacuations and opened shelters. I always tried to wait till I'm sure on that. Like I've said before. I've got about 23 hours that I've got to do it to execute to be effective. I was actually well inside that. I should have done it earlier but there was so much changing information that I was unsure."

There were a few downed trees reported in the county and minor flooding near Doctors Inlet and Black Creek.

Keystone Heights prepared for the worse and prayed for the best. The rural area was a primary concern since many of the homes there are older and some of the infrastructures are lacking.

"It's a weeklong preparation for the potential of a really bad storm and we are very grateful that it wasn't a really bad storm, but we were ready if it would have been," City Manager Lynn Rutkowski





The United States Team began the third and final round with a one-shot lead against first-round leader Team Canada.

"Nobody panicked," said PGA President and U.S. Captain Jim Richerson.

Connelly-Eiswerth's par on the par-4, 395-yard 18th hole clinched the title. She was immediately mobbed by teammates as the celebration began.

"It's everything and more," said Connelly-Eiswerth. "I really wanted to qualify for this. To qualify and also to win it, it's not just being here and being part of the team. You want to win with the team. It's truly incredible."

County embarks on program to treat CORE issues of opioid abuse

MIDDLEBURG — After a successful two-year test run in Palm Beach County, Florida's Coordinated Opioid Recovery program (CORE) will soon expand to seven other counties, including Clay County.

State and local officials in the fight against opioid addiction, including Florida Surgeon General Dr. Joseph Ladapo, Assistant Secretary for Substance Abuse and Mental Health for the Florid Department of Children and Families Erica Floyd Thomas, program architect and Deputy Secretary for Health Dr. Kenneth A. Scheppke joined officials with the Clay County Health Department, Fire Rescue and

Clay Behavior Tuesday to announce the revolutionary program that's designed to offer resources to break the vicious cycle of addiction.

CORE is a comprehensive approach that expands overdose responses and treats the primary and secondary impacts of substance abuse disorder. Floridians battling with addiction can utilize CORE to receive medically assisted treatment that is specialized to sustain a clean pathway to success. CORE will be expanded in two phases. Phase one counties include Clay, Brevard, Duval, Escambia, Gulf, Manatee, Marion, Pasco, and Volusia counties.

Typically, when somebody overdoses, they're taken to the nearest hospital and released once they are out of danger. Once CORE is operational, an overdose patient will be treated by EMTs and emergency response technicians who have training in substance abuse. They then will be transported to a medical facility that's also equipped to deal with addictions, similar to someone who is taken to a trauma center.

Treatment will include a sustainable clinical pathway to sobriety, including a transfer to a multi-specialty medical group to start medication-assisted treatment.

Our most significant role as educators is to help our students reach their full potential socially, emotionally, and academically while supporting their endeavors," Murphy said.

Also, Middleburg Elementary's Amanda Strickland was selected as the county's assistant principal of the year.

"Principal Murphy is a wonderful representation of Principal of the Year for Clay County District Schools. Ms. Murphy truly cares for all students and staff and has spent the last four years at Ridgeview High focused on building a great culture where students are not only involved in their school community on campus but involved with their surrounding community outside of schools," Broskie said.

As the award recipient, Murphy will represent Clay County District Schools in the state competition. In November, Murphy will be formally recognized at the monthly school board meeting.



RideOut's Rosie steals the spotlight on The Kelly Clarkson Show

MIDDLEBURG — RideOut Elementary's Rosie's gegarious attitude and infectious smile made the first-grader one of the most popular guests on "The Kelly Clarkson Show" when she appeared with Dolly Parton to highlight the success of the singer's Imagination Library Program.

The show unexpectedly reached out to Rosie's family and asked to do a video interview. After the show recognized her expressive outlook, they invited her and her mother, Liz Williams, to Universal Studio, California to share their story about receiving Braille books from Parton's program. Parton's initiative to provide books has been so widespread, one in 10 children now receives a book from her. Rosie, who suffered from septooptic dysplasia that left her blind shortly after birth, is one of the children.

Since 1995, more than 200 million free books have been delivered to children every month.

"We began receiving Braille books from the Imagination Library. So our daughter was exposed to pre-Braille and Braille and that is so important," said Rosie's mother, Liz. "I don't know if you're aware of it, but only about 10% of blind children have the opportunity to be Braille literate. She's in the first grade at RideOut Elementary School in Clay County, Florida. She was reading braille and writing Braille before most children are reading or writing in print." Then Clarkson surprised Parton when Rosie walked onto the stage. From there, she stole the show. Rosie got hugs from Clarkson and Parton and she quickly asked them to "sing me a song." They picked "Amazing Grace."

While they sang, Rose clutched Parton's thumb. She responded by pulling Rosie's hand to her cheek.

"I liked singing the most," Rosie said. "I liked it. It felt good to sing."

Then Rosie asked if she could sing a song, and she picked "The Lion Sleeps Tonight."

Rosie got a book a month from the program. Her favorite is "Look Out Kindergarten, Here I Come."

nothing filled the coffers more than popcorn.


"We made \$16,000 on popcorn," said band director Mara Rose. "That's a lot of popcorn."

Don't throw your money out of the window

Local leaders: Please give – but only to reputable organizations

CLAY COUNTY – You may have noticed the large blinking sign at County Road 220 in front of Walmart that warns motorists to "Give Wisely." It's pretty hard to miss. Normally for real-time traffic safety and guidance information about planned and unplanned events, the sign stands as a reminder that the Holiday season is upon us. Although we might be feeling charitable this season, local leaders remind everyone they should give wisely.

"You work hard for your money, and you have a big heart for others who may be struggling — especially during this holiday season. However, you would not drive down the highway throwing your hard-earned money out of the window," said Sheriff Michelle Cook.

County officials, including the sheriff's office, county commission, county manager, Green Cove Springs and Orange Park police departments, want to remind residents to use the same vigilance when making a charitable donation.

"Giving wisely to reputable charities in Clay County can impact more than just one person," Cook said.

A recent interpretation of existing law has resulted in widespread panhandling in major intersections. While some of these groups may use the money as you intended, it is nearly impossible to verify an organization while waiting for a red light to change to green, CCSO wrote on its social media pages. The agency said to watch out for charities with names that sound similar to well-known, reputable organizations. Sometimes these sound-alike names are simply intended to confuse donors.

Panhandlers like to work busy intersections or in parking lots of big stores. They generally have predictable stories: disabled veteran, homeless or a sick child or spouse. Some will play instruments (music actually is coming from a CD player) to

solicit sympathy – and your dollars. Other groups walk between lanes of traffic with buckets asking for donations without a clear explanation of their missions.

Cook warns that desperate pleas don't always happen in your car. They can come in the form of cellphone calls or emails.

Therefore, she said to avoid clicking on links to charities on unfamiliar websites or in texts or emails. Don't give them personal financial information or click on something from an unknown source, as it might download harmful malware onto your computer.

There is no need to give on the spot. If you are solicited for a donation at your home, workplace, by phone, or while in your car, CCSO asks you to give wisely. If you are solicited or if you feel pressured or uncomfortable, just say, "no, thank you" or you can point individuals to resources in the community that can properly help

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
Do not pay in cash. If you want to help, you can give care packages with muchneeded items such as socks — this is the No. 1 most asked-for item — gloves, water bottles, bandages, wet wipes, toothbrush, toothpaste, sunscreen and nonperishable food. You can also include gift cards to local grocery stores.

"We know that our residents care about our community and want to help out their neighbors in need when they can," said County Commissioner Chairwoman Betsy Condon. "Your compassion and generosity are just one of the many reasons why Clay County is such a wonderful place to live. There are a number of organizations in Clay County that work hard to help as many people as possible, and our staff can help point you in the right direction."

After a six-month shutdown for the pandemic, Shred for Good rolled out a rebooted Residential Shred Drop Off Program in October 2020. On the first day, 92 households were able to destroy 5,116 pounds of sensitive materials in just two hours. Each one of these events is focused on convenience for the consumer and streamlined processes for the staff.

Residential consumers now follow the signs to the drop zone, complete a short form, donate and drive away without ever having to leave their vehicle. To save even more time, both the form and donation have been made available in advance online.

The average household drops off about 55 pounds and donates \$14 a visit. Considering that most drop-off shred sites charge more than \$.50 a pound; the Shred for Good's Residential Shred Drop-Off Program at \$.26/pound is a cost-effective alternative for the community it serves.

Family relinquishes Emmitt's Auto Repair, but wheels will keep turning at shop

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The sign outside of Emmitt's Auto Repair on U.S. Highway 17 tells motorists the shop is on vacation. The iconic automobile repair shop specializing in brakes, steering and suspension set to reopen on Jan. 3.

But for the first time in 50 years - 22 of them north of city limits, it will be in the hands of a new owner

During a more than half-century run in Duval and Clay counties, Emmitt's saw a blessed time of business and family-friendly service to customers at the shop, with the Rigsby's establishing a business model like no other during their time in North Florida

With Teresa Rigsby heading into retirement, she decided to turn the business over to somebody else. Leaving a legacy that took generations to build, however, won't be easy.

Following the passing of her husband, Teresa not only had to run the store's finances but she was thrust into a general manager's role, as well.

She now will wade through a day-by-day

healing process while continuing to spend valuable time with her grandchildren.

"One day at a time, and my grandkids," she said.

It will be up to the new owner to maintain a standard that took decades to build.

The reputation that founder Emmitt Rigsby, who then passed the torch to his son, Matthew, established was that of hard work, toughness and a belief in getting the job done at all costs.

When mechanic Matthew Rigsby died on Aug. 3, 2020, the county not only lost a great mechanic but a larger-than-life figure in the community whose memory will forever be remembered.

He served as the lifeblood of the auto repair shop; his personality shone through at all moments. He was good at fixing a vehicle, and regardless of the circumstances, he always was honest about the status of their ride – all while finding a way to allow his plain-cut, and brutally honest, personality to shine through.

"It was his way, or no way," Teresa Rigsby, his late wife, said laughingly.

Hundreds of residents Have walked inside the doors of the auto shop. One of

the longtime customers has been the Clay County Sheriff's Office, which gets all of its regularly-scheduled alignments completed there.

Customers came from all over Florida and out of state, Teresa said. Emmitt drew such a cult following that one resident who moved to Louisiana would make the trip back to have his car serviced at Emmitt's.

"Matt was very knowledgeable. He knew everything going on in that shop. He touched every vehicle and made sure it was right when it went out of the driveway," she said. "(The community) believed in him."

Residents have trusted in Rigsby's auto advice, but it was a phenomenon that went much deeper than having a clean set of wheels on the road.

"My husband was tough, and he ran a tight ship. But everyone came to him for advice, and everything that he said was like liquid gold. Customers would just come and pour out their hearts to him, and he would take the time to talk to them. They would come to him for everything, even family issues.

They appreciated his boldness. They

knew where he stood, and they liked it," Rigsby said.

New ownership will have the benefit of keeping two of Emmitt's top mechanics. Lead technician Rick Santillo and mechanic John Holmes will be retained as the company moves into a new era of providing fast, friendly and loyal customer service. Between the two, they have worked for more than 37 years at Emmitt's.

Teresa said one of the conditions of the sale was each of her full-time employees would be retained.

"I made sure that my guys were guaranteed jobs. And I guarantee you the (new owner) wanted them," Teresa said. "I want all of my people to know that Rick and John will still be there. They have that level of trust in those guys."

Teresa had a final message for her family's loyal customers, saying:

"I just want to thank you on behalf of my father-in-law, husband and the whole family. I want to thank you for all of these years of coming to us. I just want to reach out and touch them, and ease their mind. Give the other company a chance since my guys are staying there."

But whether a prospect is looking to earn a collegiate scholarship or further develop their skills, personally attending to a student-athlete can oftentimes be challenging for coaches, who are tasked with managing 14-player rosters in a short practice session.

Those who truly desire to take their game to the next level must commit extra time, money and resources to reach their desired destination.

That's why Steve Holstine, a current Clay Hill and former Fleming Island resident, founded Hard Core Baseball and Softball Training Academy in 2017, two years after his relocation from Danville, Indiana in 2015.

"God bless the coaches, but you know, when you have 12 to 14 kids and an hour out there and 1 hour, 30 minutes of practice, you do the math. There's not much time to work with each kid to coach and improve them," he said.

"No kid likes to go out and fail, and the parent wants them to go and succeed, too, and sometimes, they don't necessarily know how to go help them. They can get frustrated, and sometimes, it can even create friction in the relationship between the parent and the child. So, having said all of that, I've seen a need to provide a service that would give them an affordable opportunity to get their kids the training that they need," Holstine said.


Steve, a former high school baseball star in the Midwest, found a burning passion for the game when he was young. Since then, it's a spirit that has latched on inside of him – a spirit that he likely will never let go.

Holstine has now been coaching for more than 20 years.

The loving father and man of faith always wanted to continue coaching, but he didn't realize the true possibility that he could kickstart his very own fully operational baseball (and softball) skills training academy until he moved to sunny Florida.

"Growing up in the north, it's a totally different culture. In Florida, it's year-round

Stop for outstanding drug warrant leads to additional trafficking charges

ORANGE PARK – The Clay County Sheriff's Office stopped a man in the Pine Tree Plaza parking lot on Blanding Boulevard for an outstanding drug warrant, and in the process, they uncovered an additional 4.56 grams of fentanyl and 1.91 grams of cocaine.

Horace Lee James, 52, of Jacksonville, now faces charges of trafficking fentanyl, and possession of cocaine with intent to sell, as well as the outstanding charges for trafficking opium and selling methamphetamine and cocaine.

According to the arrest report, when deputies removed James from his car on Dec. 22, they saw a "rock like substance" which later tested for being cocaine in a plastic bag in the driver's side door handle. Inside the bag, they also found fentanyl.

James' next court appearance is scheduled for Jan. 24. Until then, he will remain in the Clay County Jail with a \$325,006 bond.

Cowboy Mounted Shooting Championship Takes Aim at fairgrounds



More than 200 cowboys will be at the Clay County Fairgrounds for the annual Cowboy Shooting Championship. Riders are judged by their skills with a horse and firearm.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Nearly 200 riders in old-style western regalia and a pair of six-shooter holsters competing for the title of Cowboy Mounted Shooting State Champion in the Cattleman's Arena on Friday, Dec. 30, starting at 8 a.m.

The competition will proceed with the 4th Annual Warmer Winter Pastures, New Year's Double Shoot-out, starting on Saturday, Dec. 31. The competition will end on New Year's Day.

Mounted contestants compete in this fast-action timed event using two .45 caliber single-action revolvers, each loaded with five rounds of specially prepared blank ammunition.

"Live rounds are strictly prohibited at competitions," said Florida Peacemakers CMS Club President Nelson Riollano.

"The guns have been remodeled and modernized for safety reasons. The bullet, I will call it a bullet, is really just a shell casing stuffed with black powder. The blast of black powder extends about 15-18 feet,"

he said.

The closest target to the perimeter of the fence cannot be closer than 21 feet, so spectators don't have to worry about flying bullets.

"It's based on historical reenactments at Wild West shows in the late 19th Century," Riollano said. Although firearms have been modified for safety reasons, the models used must be before 1888.

Contestants must complete a course marked by orange traffic cones. On top of each cone is a balloon. The objective is to shoot ten balloon targets while riding through various challenging courses. It's a timed sport. The competitor who rides the fastest with the least amount of missed targets wins.

"There are about 80 patterns; some take longer to maneuver, so even the fastest competitors are running it any 18 or 20 seconds," said Riollano.

Unlike most equestrian sports, Cowboy Mounted Shooting combines both horsemanship and marksmanship.

"You have to be able to stay on the

horse. That is a sport in itself. Then you add the marksmanship," Riollano said. "You can have a really fast horse, but if you can't keep up with the shots, it doesn't do you any good."

If a contestant misses a balloon, five seconds are added to the total time.

"When you're talking about the upper levels, one-half a stride, one-quarter of a stride between you and your competitor means the difference between a win. You have people that are within three-tenths of a second of one another. That's how close it can be," Riollano said. "Fast and clean gets you to the top of the leaderboard. That's the best you can do."

The championship will be divided into three events throughout the weekend. "Friday is the Florida State Championship. We will run a calvary event, a shotgun event, a rifle event, and the main match where everyone shoots pistols across all levels — men's, women's, even the wranglers (for ages 11 and younger)," Riollano said. "Saturday is an all-day competition. It

play whenever the weather permits it. There's an on-season and an off-season," Holstine said.

Warm, sunny weather in Clay certainly wasn't the only reason that he performed the undertaking upon arriving on Fleming Island from his old home that was more than 900 miles away

But when Holstine first set foot in the state, he quickly realized the sizable, and advantageous, set of differences that the beautiful year-round weather in the county could provide in his climb to conquer his personal coaching mountain, a mission mainly focused around the kids whom he seeks to make a positive and lasting impact upon

"I'm just a man of faith, and I don't push my views onto people, but it's just part of who I am, and my values reflect that. I just try to inspire them with that and impact them with that," he said.

Steve said that he was also a former youth pastor at a large church in Illinois, working diligently to aid in character and leadership development.

Fast forward one-half decade later after Hard Core Academy opened, and he's already trained more than 1,500 players, many of which would leave the county to reach greater heights by becoming part of the select 7.5% of high school studentathletes who go on to the next level to play at Division 1, 2, or 3 schools.

However, the dedicated coach and family man isn't one for the limelight, as Holstine admittedly doesn't keep official tabs on who went where.

It might be hard to remember, anyway.

Holstine has mentored many elementary, middle school and high school student-athletes from kindergarten through 12th grade from Clay. Steve estimates that 70% come from within county lines, the other 30% that he said hail from other areas of the Sunshine State and outside of the Florida border, some being as far away as Georgia, South Florida and beyond.

Many of those players stumble across Hard Core Academy while on vacation or when simply passing through the area.

Hard Core Academy formerly operated on County Road 220 in Fleming Island, but after moving to the Middleburg-Clay Hill area in 2021, the coach opened a new facility in his backyard. The set-up is complete with a large barn for catching, pitching and hitting practice. It also has a large, field-like backyard.

The facility serves as a sort of a safe haven for amateur players of all ages, who can compete and shoot for the stars while having fun while participating in the game that they love.

A myriad of services is offered at the academy, most of which can be scheduled for 50-minute sessions. Several options are available, including hitting, fielding, throwing, catching, or the combination of two skills, such as hitting and throwing, hitting and fielding, fielding and throwing, or catching and throwing.

Hard Core Academy is especially known for catcher clinics, with large sessions that draw as many as 40 players. It's something that Steve especially likes to focus on.

"They actually see the field from a totally different perspective, and a lot of these kids are not taught how to properly play the position," he said.

Holstine's son, Joseph, is also making a

name for himself as a baseball coach. He ran the operation for more than a year during a time when Steve was extremely busy with his 9-5 job.

"We were naïve at the beginning. We were thinking (of reopening in) May, June, July — at the latest. We didn't understand the significance, the fact it was going to be a total loss."

The Hoards resisted the temptation to make changes to their 1805 Blanding Boulevard. Not only did they not expand, they replicated the décor to make sure diners won't notice a difference.

"The store is going to be the store. We love the location," he said. "This is the space that we have. We're going to keep on doing what we did prior, make sure we stay on our game."



FIHS LB Wright heads to Rutgers

FLEMING ISLAND - Fleming Island High linebacker Abram Wright became the first Florida football athlete to sign a scholarship to play at Rutgers University in New Jersey as area athletes joined the ranks of early signees in anticipation of the traditional February 5 National Signing Day.

Wright follows another Fleming Island graduate in running back Trey Sneed who is now a top running back at Fordham University after two years as a Scarlet Knight.

Wright, a 6'-2" linebacker under coach Damenyum Springs reportedly had 17 offers to play in college and chose Rutgers as a three-star prospect.

As a recruit, Wright garnered comments from 247 Sports Recruiting Analyst, a nationwide football website dedicated to football recruiting who said "He (Abrams) was 6-foot-2 and some change and 225 pounds back in March. And he ran 4.6 laser [40-yard dash] at a camp, which is super impressive. There are not a lot of guys that size that fast entering their senior year of high school. We list him as a linebacker, but I think he is more of an edge player.'

Bobby Deren, a Scarlet National Senior Writer, a publication dedicated to Rutgers sports, said about Wright "This is a Greg Schiano type linebacker. Wright is hard-hitting, tough and also has good speed. The linebacker position will be a little more crowded than it was last season with Moses Walker and Mohamed Toure returning from injury."

Note: Greg Schiano is Rutgers head football coach

Deren also noted that "A player of his caliber still has a chance to crack the two-deep, especially with early enrollment. Schiano likes to use linebackers on special teams and that could mean a college debut in the first game of the season for Wright."

On NJ.com, in a story by Todderick Hunt, Wright was listed with a 13 other Rutgers early signees as one of two high-prospect linebackers signed by Rutgers including Washington, PA linebacker Davoun Fuse, a 6'-4", 200 pounder who also played

quarterback and safety.

Wright was noted as a "prototypical linebacker. He's six-two-and-a-half, a sure tackler, he's physical, has speed, can get from sideline-to-sideline and he's a really smart football player. Both should help immediately on special teams and supplant the walk-ons Rutgers rolled out in 2022."

For the season, Fordham scored a school record 594 points to eclipse a 2014 record of 569 points.

Sneed finished with 1192 yards in 12 games with a 5.8 yards per carry average plus five scores. Sneed averaged just over 95 yards per game.

Sneed's best game was a 230 yards effort against Colgate with one touchdown rushing and one via pass. Sneed also had games of 110, 120, 104 and the 139 yard effort in the playoff game.




TAMPA – Behind a three-touchdown performance from quarterback Sam Hartman

as he earned MVP honors on Friday night, Wake Forest University defeated Southeastern Conference representative Missouri 27-17 to win the Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa, Fla. The win marked Wake Forest's fifth in the last seven years since the Deacs began the Atlantic Coast Conference's second-longest bowl streak back in 2016.

The Demon Deacons defense, led by senior captain linebacker Ryan Smenda, Jr., a Fleming Island High School graduate (Orange Park, FL) forced one Missouri turnover and wreaked havoc in the Tigers backfield with 10 tackles-for-loss as a team. Individually, Smenda, Jr. led Wake Forest with a game-high 11 tackles, his seventh double-digit tackle performance of the season, as he moved into eighth all-time in program history with 355 career tackles.

Wake Forest Head coach Dave Clawson's five bowl victories, which is the most in school history, now ranks tied for fifth in ACC history for postseason wins. Clawson ranks behind Bobby Bowden (Florida State, 11), Dabor Swinney (Clemson, 11), Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech, 6) and Danny Ford (Clemson, 6). Meanwhile, he is now tied with Jimbo Fisher (Florida State, 5) and Ralph Friedgen (Maryland, 5).

The 2022 Wake Forest football team (8-5, 3-5 ACC) is just the 10th in program history to win eight games in a season in the 115-year history of the program. Four of the 10 eight-win seasons have come in the Dave Clawson era (40 percent).

Godfrey was selected a semifinalist for the first time and it is the second straight season for the Cavaliers to have a semifinalist for the award as Diana Ordoñez was a semifinalist for the award a year ago. Godfrey is the most recent Virginia player to be a semifinalist for the award, joining program alums Ordoñez (2021) and Alexis Shaffer (2016) as semifinalists. Virginia has also had a finalist for the award in six other seasons, including two-time MAC Hermann Trophy winner Morgan Brian (2013, 2014).

Godfrey earned All-Region first team honors from the United Soccer Coaches for the third consecutive year with her selection this season.

She was a first team All-ACC selection to earn her third straight All-ACC honor this season as she tallied eight goals and five assists on the year. She tied for second on the team in goals with Spaanstra and second in assists with Spaanstra and Hopkins. Godfrey hit three game-winning goals on the year with the winning strikes coming at No. 2 North Carolina, No. 4 Duke and against Xavier in the second round of the NGAA Tournament.

She is a two-time All-America selection and ranks among the top-20 active NCAA Division I players in career assists as a junior and is 12th among all active DI players in assists per game (0.39) for her

career. She helped Virginia advance to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Tournament for the ninth time as the Cavaliers made a 29th consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance and 35th total appearance as a program this season.

Godfrey became a three-time All-American on Friday (Dec. 2) when she was named a first team All-America selection by the United Soccer Coaches with the release of their annual All-America team.

Godfrey is the only three-time All-America selection in the list of 46 players to receive first, second or third team honors this season.

Virginia posted a 16-4-3 record this season on the way to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament. The Cavaliers advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 29th consecutive season and 35th time overall. The 29 consecutive appearances is the second-longest active streak and the 35 overall appearances is the second most by any NCAA Division I program.

Godfrey was also named a first team Scholar All-America honoree to lead a pair of Virginia women's soccer players honored for academic and athletic achievement by the United Soccer Coaches. Graduate forward Haley Hopkins was named a third team All-Region honoree.

To be eligible for selection, candidates must be a at least a junior in academic standing and have a cumulative GPA of 3.40 for their career. Players must also have played in at least 75 percent of the season's games, contributed significantly to the team's success and be an elite player as evidenced by athletic accolades for the season

OAKLEAF - Fleming Island High wrestling coach P.J. Cobbert strode smoothly around the Oakleaf High gym during the semifinal rounds of Oakleaf's "Hammer" Wrestling Invitational held Thursday.

"Here is where the points are made," said Cobbert. "Wear and tear, ground and pound. We get a lot of guys in the semis, push more into the finals, then take care of business. Numbers count."

Cobbert's premonition stood firm as the Golden Eagles, by the numbers, filled the brackets with prototype Cobbert-style wrestlers who executed the game plan with lightning fury and won convincingly with a 313.0 point total that far surpassed runnerup Harmony's 192.5 and third place Merrit Island's 162. Harmony was fifth in Class 3A last year as the class of the challenge to Fleming Island.

In a glimpse of the Cobbert influence of sorts, Oakleaf High, under the direction of first year coach Mark DeToro, finished fourth at 141 ahead of Bishop Kenny and Fletcher. Cobbert and DeToro were teammates at Clay High as seniors in 2001 with Cobbert getting his fourth state title, at 152, while DeToro finished as runnerup, two matches later, at 171.

"Little steps along the way, toughen up the room and get the techniques down," said DeToro, who was a frequent contributor to Cobbert's North Florida Wrestling Academy room over the past few years before signing in with Oakleaf. "We are hoping to sneak up on P.J. one day."

DeToro's coy optimism is somewhat justified with his recent 38-30 win over Clay in a dual match that was a first-time win for the Knights' program over the perennial powerhouse program at Clay; first in 1A, now clumped in with Fleming Island in 2A.

since four years old with both moving from Argyle to Oakleaf at 10 years old," said Breen. "They both played for the Oakleaf junior varsity under coach Jason Mauloni."

Breen noted that Lauren Mateo was the driving force for the Home Run Derby as a tribute to Isaiah's baseball.

"She did all the legwork to make it happen," said Breen. "Her and her mom, Rachel, got the ball moving."

"He does a certain amount of dives like a scuba diver would who had the BENDS, or ascend too fast to the surface," said Breen. "It's quite fascinating, but the family is living in the Ronald McDonald House as he goes to the hospital."

Breen noted that the therapy is having some success with Carrasco able to communicate with familiar faces with eye movements.

"Right now, he has a special wheelchair and he does extensive physical therapy," said Breen. "They have noticed the Hyperbaric chamber is helping, but it's expensive."

Breen said when the accident occurred in June and Carrasco wound up in a long surgery bout, the Oakleaf baseball community was in full force in the hospital until near 1 a.m.

"That night that it happened, about 10 minutes after it was all figured out, we



Against Columbia, top scorers were Darion Domenick, 13, and Axel Holmquist, 10, against fast, athletic Tigers team.


Against Martin County, Ethan Williams was only player in double figures with 15 points.



Middleburg beat Smiths Station, AL, 37-33 for their third place medal.





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
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
