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Florida Peacemakers start new year with bangs

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Nearly 200 riders in old-style western garb and a pair of holstered six-shooters competed for the title of Cowboy Mounted Shooting State Champion at the Cattleman's Arena last weekend.

The competition proceeded with the Fourth Annual Warmer Winter Pastures, New Year's Double Shootout on Dec. 31 and ending on Jan. 1.


Mounted contestants competed in this fast-action timed event using two .45 cali-



ber single-action revolvers, each loaded with five rounds of specially prepared blank ammunition. Contestants completed a course marked by orange traffic cones. On top of each cone is a balloon.

The object of the game is to shoot 10 balloon targets while riding through a variety of challenging courses. It's a timed sport in which the competitor who rides the fastest with the least amount of missed targets wins.

Unlike most equestrian sports, Cowboy Mounted Shooting requires multiple skills, as it relies not only on the horse's speed and rider's horsemanship but also the rid-





er's shooting skills and accuracy, making it a multi-level challenge. Mounted shooting has divisions for men, women, seniors and youth. There are subcategories within those divisions by skill level, from one to six.

Competitors advance by winning a specific number of competitions at each level. The overall results were posted on New Year's Eve.

Stephen Harris, Men's Level Four was named State champion with the best overall time of 50.932. He was followed by Senior Men's Level Six, Dave Kennedy, with a time of 51.534, and Women's Level Six, Morgan Swanson, with an official time of 51.638.

Eric Anderson, one of the sport's leading competitors and multiple CMSA world championships said the sport is alive and

well since the association started in 2004. As time progressed throughout the years, it has continued to grow, inviting members from all over the world.

"Florida has the No. 1 club in the whole country. This is the number one club- the Florida Peacemakers. That club designation came from Pan Handle Peacemakers, one of the clubs that we conglomerated when we started this club. We have several world champions. We have several world champions. We have international champions. We are the most successful club in the nation, and that's documented," Anderson said

Green Cove Springs City Manager earns high grades in annual evaluation

Steve Kennedy provides
City Council with goals for 2023

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – While the city council gave City Manager Steve Kennedy an outstanding grade of 4.9 out of 5 in his annual evaluation Tuesday night, Kennedy already was looking ahead to priorities for the new year.

Kennedy outlined seven categories he plans to improve, expand or create, including developing an annexation plan to address downtown and overall city growth.

Kennedy was hired in 2012. The council was asked to grade him in 10 categories with the highest grade for each category being a 5. The council approved his evaluation and the staff recommendations, 5-0.

Other ideas by Kennedy that were approved include:

- Improving electric utility reliability and reputation, including quicker response time for outage calls and continuing to reduce the number of outages.
- Bringing all utility infrastructure to 20% above current capacity.
- Improve community outreach, education and communication by hosting quarterly town hall meetings, continuing the citizen advisory committee and highlight-

ing one of the city's departments every month

- Better define city codes, city zones, overlays and adopt a blight tax ordinance.
 - Improve fund and reserve balances.
- Exploring opportunities to create a Smart City by making city data more accessible to the public, coordinating participation between private and public sectors and aligning departments to leverage the internet technology infrastructure.
- Create of a two-year budget with more concise planning.

In other business, the council heard the first reading of a plan to change an ordinance that would allow Blue Solutions to sell pools and spas at a store planned for

Idlewild Avenue.

The council agreed the amended ordinance was consistent with the city's Comprehensive Plan because it would "promote public health, safety and welfare of the city."

Also, the city council decided it would ask the trail project to connect Clay County with Duval and another trail project from Reynolds Park to Spring Park to be added to the North Florida Transportation Improvement Program. The trails would enhance safe pedestrian and bicycle traffic and improve operational efficiency.

The Green Cove City Council meets on the first and third Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. at City Hall.



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
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

Damar Hamlin reminds us there are no timeouts in game of life

ootball is supposed to be an escape from real-life problems and challenges. For three hours, fans

get to immerse themselves in a fantasy world of athletic excellence, \$12 beers and deafening festivities.

Monday night's NFL game between Buffalo Bills and Cincinnati Bengals reminded us there is no escape from life – and death.

Announcers and reporters struggled to find words after Bills safety Damar Hamlin got up from a tackle, adjusted his facemask and fell lifeless back to the artificial turf. Doctors and emergency technicians spent nine minutes reviving him with cardiopulmonary resuscitation before he was taken by ambulance to a local hospital.

Suddenly, football didn't seem important. It no longer was an escape. It was a setting that attracted 66,000 fans in person and millions on national television to remind us there are no diversions or timeouts in the game of life.

Media outlets reported nothing like that had ever happened in the NFL. That's not true. Chuck Hughes went into cardiac arrest while playing for the Detroit Lions against Chicago in 1971. To date — and let's hope it stays that way — he's the only player to die during an

NFL game.

What I watched Monday night reminded me of when I met Dale Earnhardt in 1979. We both were in our first full-time years in NASCAR and we were friends for 23 years. I was there on Feb. 18, 2001, when his black Chevrolet hit the fourth-turn wall on the final lap of the Daytona 500 and slid across the track into the infield.

At first, it didn't seem to be that serious, especially compared to most of the harrowing accidents common at the Daytona International Speedway. But Earnhardt's heart pumped a few times and stopped.

Hamlin's tackle also seemed to be routine, especially compared to other horrific hits common to professional football. His heart also stopped, but quick-acting first responders pumped new life back into him.

What both moments taught us is there's nothing routine about life and death

One former NFL player said football can be a matter of life or death. In reality, we all face life or death every time we get up in the morning and start our days. A pizza delivery driver died on New Year's Eve when another driver ran a red

Not taking the full course can lead to antibiotic resistance, a serious public health problem, and will not make you feel better if you have a virus, such as a cold or flu.
- Invest in your mental health by managing stress, getting sufficient sleep, exercising, and seeking help from a mental health professional when you need it.

light on Blanding Boulevard and slammed into him. An 18-year-old was shot and killed in Orange Park last week after arguing during a basketball game. A mother and her son died in an apartment fire in Orange Park the day after Christmas.

Their stories are no less - or more significant than Hamlin being in the hospital in critical condition or Earnhardt being dead. All are tragic.

One of the realities of covering auto racing for more than 40 years is I've witnessed a lot of fatal crashes. Ricky Knotts was my first. It happened on Feb. 14, 1980, during one of the 125-mile qualifying races for my first Daytona 500.

Another was George Turbyfill in 1987.

He died when his throttle stuck and he caromed off the fourth turn wall at Volusia Speedway Park. As they loaded his body into a life flight helicopter, I stood next to his wife and son when the boy asked. 'Mommy, where is daddy going?'

Those words, along with the emptiness of trying to write about Earnhardt's death, still haunt me.

We've all heard the phrase: "He died before his time." No, we die when it's our time. There are no guarantees printed on our birth certificates. The only thing we all are promised is the certainty of death and the opportunity to make the best of the time we're alive. It's up to us to make the best of it.

Damar Hamlin was doing just that. Let's pray he has another opportunity to make the best of his new life.

"It's an environment that really is for everyone from your silver sneakers that comes from our medical care program to pro athletes and everyone in between," said Fitness Director, Carl Boothby.

"I have seen everything from watching who suffered a stroke who could barely shuffle, let alone walk, become very active. We have a trainer who is wheelchair-bound, and he's highly successful. We had a 16-year-old whose pediatrician told her that she was morbidly obese.

We created a personalized workout routine, and she's starting to feel better, and more confident about herself. These stories, these are why we do what we do," he said.

Diamond agreed. "We guide them through the health and fitness lifestyle. My oldest client is 89. He couldn't reach up and get something in his cupboard because his shoulder range of motion was so bad. He trained with me, and now he can reach and pick up the heaviest bowl pain-free. I've had multiple patients who have gotten off diabetic, high cholesterol, and high blood sugar medication. It's life-changing for them," she said.

"It's not just about getting into shape, but shaping people's lives."

During gym orientation, clients can meet with Workout Anytime staff members to address their fitness goals, whether they



March," said Reilano "You actually have to have sponsors to host the regional tournament, but because we are the largest club in the country, we won the right to host the shoot."

The Spring Shoot will be held at the Georgia Fairgrounds in Perry.

"Our shoots locally usually range between 40 to 60 people. It depends on the season, the weather."

However, this particular event, the Florida CMSA championship, is one of the bigger shoots that the CMSA holds, he said. "It's been going on for about three years, and it's getting larger every year. This shoot here has right around 200 people. It's just a great shoot."

Riollano only expects to see numbers rise.

"There is actually a plan to renovate the fairgrounds, and one of the renovations is to tear down the cover of this arena, the barn. They are uncovering this and making one bigger cover, combining barn A and barn B into one. We were limited to the size of our time to how many stalls there were, so if this happens, we can accommodate more people and more horses," he said.

The open barn will create more versatility in the future.

"If you have stalls, you are limited to livestock. If you leave it open, you can put anything in it. It can be a car show. It can





be vendor space. That's going to allow for huge versatility for the fairgrounds," Riollano said.

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Southern Rock mourns the man who saved Hell House's legacy

Adam Hartle died weeks before historical marker to be installed in GCS

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Adam Hartle planned to put a historic marker on the only empty lot in Edgewater Landing where the legendary Hell House once

Hartle bought the lot two years ago to preserve Southern Rock's history and the legacy of Lynyrd Skynyrd.

The marker's been purchased, the date was set for Jan. 15 – Skynyrd founder Ronnie Van Zant's birthday.

Whether it happens now is unknown. So much of Hartle's plans died with him on Nov. 30 when he reportedly suffered a heart attack.

Hartle was 43.

His story is compelling. Too small to play, he worked with the University of Florida football team's video department and was a game day analysis coordinator. He also was the junior varsity football coach at Mandarin High before he became an assistant coach at Nease. While with the Panthers, he met 16-vear-old quarterback Tim Tebow. Hartle played a role in Tebow's recruitment to the Gators by introducing him to then-head coach Urban Mever.

Hartle also was a successful entrepreneur, buying stock in Apple and Tesla before they became the rage on Wall

But two other passions drove Adam stand-up comedy and Lynyrd Skynyrd. He toured nationally and worked primar-

ily at his comedy club in Austin. Texas.

He bought the .6-acre lot where the group wrote their first three albums and perfected hits like "Free Bird," "Gimme Three Steps," "Simple Man," "Saturday Night Special," "Swamp Music" and "Sweet Home Alabama."

He bought it to keep bulldozers and progress from wiping away a significant piece of musical history. The lot still sits without development. The rickety dock has been replaced and rotted away again. Until the marker is placed, there's nothing to suggest Lynyrd Skynyrd once called it home.

"It's nature, and it's history," Hartle told Clay Today last year. "The band did so many good things here, I don't think Jacksonville gives Skynyrd enough credit. I didn't want to see some house go up

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Still going at 92, women shares stories of parents in World War II

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Sue Plaster was only 11 when Pearl Harbor was attacked.

"My 11th birthday was three days before Pearl Harbor," she said.

At a young age, she became interested in the war after realizing the significance of the event.

"I remember thinking that I'll be the only one to remember all this. So, I was taking it in," she said.

Her interest in World War II also stemmed from the fact her parents were pilots during the war.

Her father, Alfred Ellis, enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps the day after Pearl Harbor.

"My father was flying all over the world," she said.

Eventually, he was stationed in Africa where he remained there until the war ended. Unfortunately, he died not long after the war concluded when his plane's engines failed over the ocean while transporting a group of women in the WAC, also known as the Women's Army Corps.

"There were 20 WACs in there. They were taking them to a larger base to put them on a big plane to send them back home," she said.

Plaster was 14 when he died, but remembers him as someone who was fun

and had a love for aerobatics. Her mother, Natalie, was a pilot like her husband before the war started. She taught classes on packing parachutes at the beginning of WWII.

"She was the fourth woman in the world to get a license packing parachutes. She didn't want someone else to pack her parachute," Plaster said. "She wanted to do her own."

A few months later, she moved the family from Iowa to Texas after joining the newly formed Women Airforce Service Pilots or WASP.

"There were only 1,200 that made the WASP. They had 4,000 go through. Some of them didn't make it. They were very tough on them," she said.

During her time as a WASP pilot, her mother ferried aircraft from their factories to their designated bases. After the war, she remarried and never pursued flying again. Plaster, now 92, continues to share the memory of her parents and World War II. In addition, she is active at Trinity Baptist Church and plays bridge twice a week. She is also an active member of the Daughters of American Revolution, the Woman's Club in Melrose and Keystone Heights and a member of the Forever Sisters of Lakes.

Lastly, she is a realtor for CB Isaac Realty and has nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Managing bee population a balance between nature, responsible planning

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – While some county beekeepers have noticed a typical colony decrease that comes with a winter adour, local bees have been spared starvation felt by other areas in the country.

"Backyard beekeepers won't be nearly as impacted by this type of event as commercial beekeepers who make a living beekeeping, and a 20% reduction is much larger to a commercial beekeeper," said Cassidy Dossin, Agriculture and Natural Resources Agent at the University of Florida-Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences Extension.

Dave Sieruta, who serves as president of the Clay County Beekeepers Association, said there are three types of beekeepers in the state of Florida: backyard beekeepers who maintain one-to-40 colonies, sideliners with 41-to-100 and commercial that maintain 100 or more.

There are no commercial beekeepers in the county, so the losses fell within a typical season trend, both Dossin and Sieruta said

An adour is an event that occurs twice annually in the form of two seasonal cycles



when flowers, fruits, and other plants are going through a period of reduced blooming.

The first adour occurs following the original spring honey flow between July 1 through the middle of September as summer heat starts to subside in late fall. Then, after a second fall bloom, the first freeze initiates the second sequence.

One way to segment a potential colony

population decrease is to leave surplus honey behind and only harvest the sweet nectar during the spring season.

If you're running low on honey, go ahead there and supplement the supply with sugar water. There are several simple syrups to choose from. Whatever you pick, just make sure to make it with one part water and one part sugar.

"That's pretty close to what nectar actually is," said Sieruta.

The veteran and longtime beekeeper took up a passion for beekeeping from 1982-1990 in Brunswick, Maine, before returning to Florida with his wife in 2010.

The bees need two resources to create the ever-valuable resource.

"One is nectar and the other is pollen," Sieruta said.

The insects are extremely intelligent, according to the association's president.

"The worker bees actually go in there and dictate to the queen bee on how many eggs she can lay based on the availability of those two resources, nectar and pollen," Sieruta said.

After communication between the worker bees and the queen, the beekeeper takes over

"Usually we're all done extracting the spring honey at the end of June, and you're supposed to leave enough honey for them to go ahead and survive in the fall time. If they have enough nectar and pollen available, they will survive, and the reason they starve out is that they don't have the resources," Sieruta said.

One reason for the successful habitat preservation in Clay is the lack of commercial farming. But the only true reason that a strong contingent of the bee population survives today is the residents that care

for them. While development is an everpressing issue in the town, those moving into them are the ones that still keep the tradition alive.

"These people that are going into the developments are going in there and planting flowers and fruit trees, so that might be contributing to it. The county is growing and more and more people are getting into gardening and flowers and stuff," he said.

Beekeepers in Florida are required to register their colonies.

More than 5,000 participate, with 85% falling under the backyard category and 15% being a combination of the sideline and commercial beekeepers, according to Sieruta

The introduction of vermella mites and small hive beetles is a new issue that Sieruta didn't face in Maine.

The mites can be managed by oxalic acid, which Sieruta prefers to take care of by vaporizing in the summer, fall and spring seasons. He then attacks the small hive beetles with a potion created with vegetable shorting, honey, sugar and wintergreen oil

The passion for beekeeping is continually growing in Clay, and as long as folks move forward with an increased level of interest, the practice and population should both survive and thrive.

Beekeeping provides those who participate with the soul-soothing effect of nature along with the help benefits of producing raw honey.

"(Producing the raw honey may be one reason why people are doing the beekeeping," Sieruta said. "There's a lot of people that are getting into having vegetable gardens and fruit trees where they need the bees to do the pollination for those plants."

ingredients and easy-to-follow recipes to cook at home

A home-cooked meal contributes to a healthier diet, reduces calorie consumption and gives us more control over what we put in our bodies.

"And notice, I don't say eating out of a box or at a fast food restaurant," Brown said. "Every day, I get three to four referrals for people with Type-2 diabetes. Every single day. And that's just the referrals coming into my office. There's been a huge increase, primarily because of fast food restaurants and junk foods."

Junk foods are high in trans and saturated fats, which can raise triglycerides, a type of fat in the blood. High levels of triglycerides increase the risk of developing Type-2 diabetes.

"If you want to start cooking on your own, we also have a grocery list. We have the meal plan. We have the software where I can calculate how many calories you need, then you can put in what kinds of foods you like, and then it generates up to 30 days of menus. You can even tell it how many days of leftovers you want," Brown said

"If you set a goal to eat healthier, most people can find a way to do it, but we can definitely help with that."

If delivery services don't fit your budget, there are ways to access fresh fruits and vegetables for little to no cost. Feeding Northeast Florida has distributed 2.7 million pounds of food in Clay County alone.

The organization's new warehouse will be located on Old Kings Road in Jacksonville, according to President Susan King. The organization announced its purchase and planned renovations of a 121,000-squarefoot building that will serve as the new home of the food bank.

"We will be a more efficient organization. Food insecurity in all eight counties that we serve is a huge issue. It's been a significant issue. We've seen a twenty-five percent increase in people requesting food assistance for the first time. More than 23,000 in Clay County are food insecure," said King.

"In terms of serving the community, we have a lot of programs around health and nutrition. Suppose you can help eliminate the need for high blood pressure medicine or insulin for diabetes or any other number of things that might be a requirement for that budget. In that case, we can help eliminate them by teaching them better eating habits and using fresh fruits and vegetables. If we can do that, we have helped a family or individual escape that cycle of poverty.


"A lot of people are starting from a very limited information base. We think people understand how to cook and eat well, but generationally, some people don't know how to cook. So, we have to approach this problem at a very basic level."

Additionally, The University of Florida/IFAS Extension provides the public with free and low-cost educational programs to create healthy people, a healthy environment, and a healthy economy in Clay County. These programs include various health and wellness programs offered at the Extension office. Programs on healthy eating/weight management are offered in partnership with employers such as Clay County Schools and Clay County Government.

Also, seniors at each of the four Aging True Senior Centers receive monthly nutrition education lessons.

Smaller is better

Concert on the Green drops Memorial weekend concert for smaller events

ORANGE PARK – Following a successful rendition of the first annual Cocoa and Carols, Concert on the Green has big plans moving forward as the calendar year shifts to 2023.

Sights, sounds, and senses from the event included the warm taste of fresh-to-serve hot chocolate, various food trucks serving a variety of items including anything from classic American fare to ice cream and Latin tacos, and of course, over a dozen elementary, middle, and high school choirs and bands performing favorite Christmas carols for their families and friends, the event was family-friendly fun for the whole community.

The event capped the nonprofit's ambitious year. It also prompted organizers to include it in this year's schedule.

There, at a meeting with a yet-to-beannounced date to be held either this week or the next, the trio of decision-makers will elect whether or not to bring back the event in 2023

The popular event is an odds-on favorite to return to the town during the upcoming year, but the decision on whether or not to pull the trigger on the festival-style holiday event will likely be based upon one major factor — logistics, according to David Kle-

inik, who serves on the board of directors.

"We didn't receive any negative feedback (on Cocoa and Carols) It's more of, you know, how much would the town allot for resources, and how many more police and fire do we need on-site for safety purposes? You know, just general things, but for the most part, I feel like we did well with it," Kleinik said. In a surprising caveat, Concert on the Green will not move forward with plans to hold its biggest annual spring concert, which is the Memorial Day Concert on the Green.

In its place, the board of directors envisions a smaller, separate early spring concert, and they're not wasting their time in piecing together plans for the event which will also likely be held in Orange Park.

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News of the cancellation, however, does not necessarily mean the big-time event will not return in the future.

No further plans have been made at this time, according to Kleinik.

The fundamental reason for canceling the event on the kickoff weekend of summer is that the nonprofit has reconsidered their operating model, Kleinik said.

"You know, COVID has affected a lot of nonprofits in Clay County. We got hit, too, so we've looked at how the charity is built. The mission is to bring arts and music to the county and give scholarships and grants to schools. We've looked at the way our charity is built, and our mission, and with COVID and the rebuilding we're doing, we've really assessed bringing the symphony to Clay

County. So, right now, we are not going to be doing our Memorial Day concert," he said.

Concert on the Green will instead shift their focus to smaller concerts such as Cocoas and Carols and Rocking on the River.


Concert on the Green also will continue its program to provide instruments to local schools. "That way, we can keep giving heavily for scholarships and school grants," he said

With Clay County both being threatened by hurricanes and lacking an indoor theater, problems exist in the world of a non-profit attempting to schedule an outdoor event, which can at times be a logistical nightmare.

"In the past five or six years, I would say that Concert on the Green has been canceled due to a hurricane or major rain formation two or three of those times. You can't really get insurance for an event like that," Kleinik said.

By sticking to smaller, more budgetfriendly events, the nonprofit will have more rainy day funds, and with better financial backing, the Concert on the Green can then better perform its base function: arts, music, student scholarships and school grants.

"If we go to smaller events and we cancel one, we can still have our sponsors piggyback onto that. If they're happy, we're happy," he said.

He said he was motivated by Skynyrd's "Every Mother's Son." The lyrics included a line, "I can see the concrete creeping."


"It was expensive. Everybody told me I was crazy. My wife told me I was crazy. She said, 'You're wasting your money.' It's not an investment. I'll never see that money back. Five years ago, the entrepreneur and



Re-opening of Grumpy's puts loyal customers in great mood

MIDDLEBURG — The minutes before Grumpy's Restaurant was scheduled to reopen were filled with frenzied activity inside the popular eatery. There were menus to place on tables, food to be prepped, T-shirts to be folded and a final moment for everyone to catch their breath.

"I need these guys to be exceptional today," co-owner Del Hoard Sr. told his kitchen staff. "Actually, guys, just do what you always do."

Outside, the line of hungry and eager customers was growing. The dark and foggy conditions created an eerie backdrop. Headlights poked a hole through the thick cover as the line quickly became a crowd.

Then at 5:30 a.m., Courtney Hoard, the wife of co-owner Del Hoard Jr., opened the door and she was quickly greeted with smiles and hugs.

"We got here about 4:40 (a.m.). We wanted to be the first when they opened the doors," said Middleburg's Jay Miller.

The restaurant was destroyed on Jan. 19, 2022, by a fire that started with an electrical spark in the wall behind the dishwasher. COVID, supply chain issues, red tape and labor shortages caused sever-

al delays in the rebuilding. Nearly a year of frustration and anticipation was replaced with filled stomachs, hot cups of coffee and a few tears.

"It feels good to be back," Hoard Sr. said. "We never gave up."

Within minutes, every seat at Grumpy's was filled. A new line formed outside, and it didn't subside until the final lunch left the line at 2 p.m.

The only things that distinguished the pre-fire Grumpy's with the rebuild was the large "GRUMPY'S" signs above the counter and a wooden American flag leading to the restrooms. The GRUMPY'S letters still were covered with soot and char. So was the flag. They serve as a reminder of the restaurant's journey, Hoard Sr. said.

The rest of the place was rebuilt exactly as the old one. The Hoards resisted the temptation to expand to better accommodate the demand, but they decided coziness and a friendly attention was more important.

Only a few returning customers opened their menus. Most were such regulars, they already knew what they wanted to eat.

Including Miller and his wife, Barb. They took the first booth near the door. He ordered two poached eggs, grits, bacon

Playing in the dirt

Harvey's eco-garden features array of blossoms, butterflies, bees, bugs

ORANGE PARK – Frances Harvey is an eco-gardener with one big plan.

Harvey, who has lived in Orange Park for 15 years, was first motivated to start a garden after taking a workshop over 10 years ago from Horticulture Agent and Master Gardener Wayne Hobbs at the UF/IFAS Clay County Extension office.

Since laying the framework for her garden in 2012, Harvey now has accumulated a list of 35 plant species, with a seemingly never-ending list of shrubs and greens, including the Florida state wildflower, Coreopsis, beach sunflowers, milkweed, Arizona Sun, Aztec Grass, Muhly Grass, Mondo Grass, Wild Verbena, Japanese Blueberry, many varieties of Salvia, Tickseed, Hibiscus, Purple Fountain Grass and more.

The garden provides some of Harvey's vegetables, with plants such as bananas and yuccas. But that's just the beginning of the majestic powers of the half-acre in the middle of town.

The plants attract an array of animals, and all involved play a critical role in going on to support the environment, including ever-important insect species, an array of colorful dragonflies, lovely ladybugs and, most importantly, pollinators such as the Monarch and Zebra Longwing butterflies, along with a long-ranging variety of bees.

There also are a collection of other common birds, animals and reptiles that frequently the garden such as bluebirds, cardinals, crows, mockingbirds and the majestic swallow-tailed kite, along with other local critters like frogs, squirrels, owls and hawks.

All plants involved not only play a role in helping ever-important pollinators as the honeybee thrive, but that's just the beginning of the magic that a properly-maintained front yard or backyard can provide, no matter how small the space. Harvey's entire parcel is .23 acres, with her front





yard garden only accounting for 10% of the total acreage.

"You can save money. My water bill is very, very low. I don't have to have a lawn service for my front yard, and that works for a lot of people," she said.

But that's not all: establishing a garden can even enhance the value of your home, she said.

"It can enhance your curb appeal," Harvey said.

Her gardens have strengthened family bonds, which can certainly be accomplished in an area that receives more than 270 days of sunshine annually.

"Just start small with a butterfly garden. You can start small. It's an opportunity," she said.

To start your garden, you can get easy-to-follow instructions from the Florida Yards and Neighborhoods Program at the Extension Office, which provides an excellent resource on how to begin cultivating eco-friendly plants that go on to protect the environment. Clay County residents can find out more by following this link: https://sfyl.ifas.ufl.edu/miami-dade/landscapes--gardening/florida-yards-and-neighborhoods-fyn/.

Hobbs' lecture certainly went on to inspire Harvey, but her biggest boost came when she adopted the practice of natural landscaping — a school of thought that has been championed by Doug Tallamy, an American entomologist, ecologist and conservationist author.

Hobbs co-founded Homegrown National

Park, a nonprofit with a grassroots mission of regenerating biodiversity and ecosystem function because every human being on this earth needs diverse and highly productive ecosystems to survive.

The organization's call to action is to catalyze a collective effort of individual homeowners, property owners, land managers, farmers and anyone with soil to start a new habitat by planting native plants and removing invasive plants. Intending to plant 20 million native seedlings, it is the largest cooperative conservation project ever conceived or attempted.

Harvey's garden participates in the nonprofit's call to action, and she called on all other county residents to do the same.

"There's 60 million acres of backyards in the (United States), and much of that is unused," she said.

She not only hopes that Clay residents will help her in performing the nonprofit's mission but also envisions the county as a potential hub for the gardening world in the state of Florida.

"I would love to see Clay County become the garden capital of Florida. I've grown pineapples, blueberries and asparagus. It depends on the soil, but this could be a point of pride for our county," she said. "You're doing good for the environment. It's for the manatees, monarchs, and bumblebees, and you can get the kids involved and away from the electronics."

"I came up here right after the fire and took photos of the inside," Jay Miller said. "We've been waiting a long time for them to be back. We come up here for the comradery. It's a very personal place. It's a family affair here.

"Grumpy's is a lot more than eggs and grits."

"We've been coming here since they

opened," Barb Miller said. "We love it here."

Although Grumpy's is new again, the Hoards were glad to pick up where they left off. That means legions of loyal customers, huge bowls of fresh fruit, big waffles, fresh-squeezed orange juice, eggs and a waiting line that forms before the doors are unlocked.


Grumpy's re-opened after being closed for nearly 50 weeks by a fire, customers were happy to be in line waiting for a table.





Fleming Island High band celebrates New Year's at London parade



Once the Spartans made the adjustments to pull the keeper forward, it was all Boaventura needed to head the ball past Kasica from the top of the penalty box line, fed from Ava Johnson in minute 56 of the competition, to put St. Johns on the board.

Asked if she saw it go in where she wanted it to, Boaventura admitted "I think I did. My heading is something I've been working on and getting better at."

Just four minutes later, with a feeding pass from Towers, Boaventura, off her left foot three meters outside the penalty box line, blasted a cannon shot by Kasica to put her team out front 2-0.

For Tyre, 49-2 for the season, who missed his state meet ticket last year due to an unsportsmanlike ding at the Fleming Island vs. Clay dual match that brought a suspension that included the district tournament, he has kept focus on his goal at hand throughout the season to avoid the same fate.

"I learned from that experience that wrestling hard and little things that happen are not personal and I had to think of the bigger picture to avoid that this season," said Tyre. "The focus has been to wrestle hard and compete and not let things that

happen get the better of me. My coaches have been super helpful in keeping my head on right this year and it paid off."

One key moment of the season, at the riveting region championship match, was an errant out of bounds throw that put Watson and Tyre on the floor off the mat and on top of the mat boundaries.

"He was shaken up and I was scared that I might get stuck with a penalty, but I think the officials saw that it was just tough wrestling," said Tyre. "Jamari came back on the mat and we wrestled hard to the finish and both looking forward to the state meet. I was more worried that they were going to call one of us for a concussion and that would have ended the match."

In Kissimmee, Tyre advanced with pins of 1:36 and 3:33 with a 9-1 major decision in his semifinal to get to the final while Watson, 18-3, pinned all the way to the final: :28, 2:16 and 1:18.

"I watched his first match (an 18 second pin) and was not expecting him to beat him so fast," said Tyre. "From there, I knew we were going to be in the final."

In the championship match, Tyre scored first, but both wrestlers were hit with one-point stall penalties before Watson got a two point takedown. Tyre responded with an escape to end the second period tied at 2-2

"He was coming hard and I was stressing a bit," said Tyre. "I just kept thinking I worked too hard to not win this."

In the third, Watson struck first with a one point escape with Tyre getting a takedown in the final seconds for the win.

"I shot in on him at about 21 seconds, grabbed an ankle then we bounced around until about three seconds to go before I got the points," said Tyre. "It was amazing. He texted me later about it. He's a classy guy."


PORT ST JOE - It was expected and it was delivered.

Oakleaf High senior weightlifter Tamira Briley, the defending 110 Class 3A record setting champion, has been settling in with her shot at a repeat title at 119 pounds, and with convincing fashion, the dynamo of Oakleaf delivered the goods not once, not twice, but three times with a state record in tack

"I try to stay calm and not think about things I can't control," said Briley, who joins big brother Melvin, a two-time state champion triple jumper for the Oakleaf High track team. "I know what I have done in training and in meets to get here and it's just a matter of not making mistakes and executing."

Briley, who set a state record for bench press last year as a 110 lifter en route to

her title, repeated that task as well as a successful finish for the title at 119, plus adding a state title in the first-time Olympic Snatch discipline, also in dominant fashion

"She is literally the best female athlete to come out of Oakleaf High School and the face of Oakleaf weightlifting if not Oakleaf sports, plain and simple, everyone knows who Tamira Briley is," said Oakleaf weightlift coach Ben White, who has brokered the girls weightlift team to a district title, a repeat state champion and a state medalist for a first-year lifter; Ivy Gunn at 169 in fourth place. "We set the goals all season and she went after them. On the way, she was an inspiration to the rest of the team and pushed them to join her in the medals' chase."

Clay High, who has dominated the team scene in north Florida for a few years, finally got the elusive gold medal as a team with 26-24 team championship over powerhouse Sunlake High in the traditional competition, then a double dose of Lady Iron with a 34-28 win again over Sunlake in the Olympic Snatch team points. Not to be overlooked, Ridgeview High, under coach Trenton Davis, finished fifth in the Snatch with a champion at 183 from Ava Haber over Clay's Anna Harbison by just five pounds.

"Coach Keller is the class of the class in weightlifting and I'm glad he finally got his trophy; trophies," said White. "Think about the past few year in weightlifting in Clay County; Keystone champs, Fleming Island champs, handfuls of individual champs; thank Rodney Keller for that."

In the traditional meet, Keller got his gas power from freshman Emma Heck at 129, junior Janiyah Stevens at 154 and Unlimited Kyleigh LaFary who all crushed the bars with wins of 35 pounds by Heck, 20 pounds by Stevens and 25 pounds by LaFary.

"Emma is an incredible lifter and a great kid who comes from a wonderful family," said Keller. "The dynamic between her and teammates has been really fun to watch. They really do push one another".

The three state title holders in the tra-

ditional discipline came back to medal in the Olympic Snatch with Heck being joined by teammate Gianna Torres at 169 as champions with Stevens and LaFary getting silvers.

"So many things have to go right to pull off both titles in one day and that can only be attributed to the success of many of our girls, including Gabriella Etheridge, Gianna Torres, and Kenya Tinajero, who also placed in the meet," said Keller. "And one of the most exciting things moving forward is that many of our qualifiers are returning next season, including Ansley Weseman and Ansley Lyda."

In 2021, Florida joined Illinois and Wisconsin as additions to 26 states in America

that have female wrestling.

Led by a triple threat of three Clay High Lady Blue Devils; Aubreanna Apple, Madisyn Blackburn and Jaidyn Vinson, all regional finalists and state meet qualifiers, the rest of the county contingency is chock full of talent forged by history.

"That's what we do at Clay High," said Apple, a junior, after her riveting district championship pin two weeks ago at Matanzas High School. "We want to prove we belong."

Joining the Clay trio, from Middleburg, Orange Park, Oakleaf, Ridgeview and even Keystone Heights, the Clay County girls wrestling program jettisoned this season after last year's trial run, per FHSAA allowances, to move ahead as a club-like season including state championships; one to Blackburn, a senior who recently signed a college scholarship to Brewton Parker College in Georgia, and one to Orange Park senior Andrea Smith, both top-ranked all season according to Kabra Wrestling, the official state ranking system.

Smith, yet to be beaten at 235, and Blackburn, with three losses on 27 wins, are the two trendsetters of the bunch with both smooth and confident on the mats thus far. Smith has teammate Jasmine Hecht at 155, ranked 10th after spending much of the season at number one, to forge the aura of the big arena of state championships in the Silver Spur Arena next week.

The Clay trio earned one region title to Apple with two silvers with Blackburn finishing second with stomach issues into the region final.

For Smith, the region title came a week after a distric title against a familiar foe, Raines' Jada Arnold with Smith winning via pin both times. Hecht, second at districts, finished fourth at regions.

For Middleburg, the freshman dynamic duo is Cheyenne Cruce (19-8) who follows big brother Austin, a junior 182 grappler for the Broncos, with a third place finish with Bradshaw, (24-7) at 110, taking third as well.

Both Cruce siblings will be entering new territory with another sister/brother duo in Oakleaf High's Adrianna Barrientos (14-6), a sophomore, getting a distric title and a region fourth place finish at 105 while twin brother Keon just won his district title at 126 for the Knights en route to their first ever team title last week

"We talk a lot at the kitchen table about our matches and there is a little jawboning about who could beat who, but it's all good," said Keon Barrientos. "We both want to go as far as we can."

Ridgeview's lone athlete was sophomore Cheyanne Moralez whoe finished at the consolation quarterfinals.

Clay remaining competitors were Mi-Kayla Wyrick at 110, who lost her opener to Bradshaw; Alexis Buck at 140 who finished 2-2; Jaysie Garcia at 145, who finished at 1-2.

For Keystone Heights, who fielded their first official girls team, two seniors; Stamatia Papainannou (4-14) and Saige Dennis (12-22) both medaled at districts and wrestled into the consolation rounds at regions.

Hudson wins third Frosh of week gymnastics award

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. – Alabama's Lilly Hudson was named the Southeastern Conference Freshman Gymnast of the Week for the third time this season after another standout performance February in Baton Rouge, the league office announced in a press release.

The Fleming Island, Fla., native helped Alabama to a season-best road score of 197.600 at No. 5 LSU with a career best all-around score of 39.550. Hudson finished second in the all-around as well as on the floor exercise with a score of 9.900. Hudson also recorded a 9.925 on the balance beam to help boost the team score to a 49.625 in the event, the Tide's second highest score of the season and tied for the fourth highest in program history.

Hudson spoke at a pre-Southeastern Conference championship press conference saying watching Alabama win their 10th SEC title a year ago and now seeing herself contributing is exciting.

"It's one thing to watch it and watch them succeed," said Hudson, who was part of Alabama's 31st top two finish; second to Florida on March 19. "Now, this year to actually be a part of it is even bigger and better. I'm excited for this post season."

At the SEC championships held last weekend, Hudson, with a 9.900 on the vault pushed Alabama to a 49.350 score for the event, also scored a 9.900 on the uneven parallel bars.

"That bar rotation was on fire," said Alabama head coach Dana Duckworth. "I feel on floor and vault we got through it, and then on bars and beam we went out and dominated."

The Crimson Tide, ranked sixth nationally coming into the meet, finished just behind No. 2 Florida (198.200), and ahead of No. 6 Auburn (197.225), No. 11 Missouri (196.875), No. 5 LSU (196.725), No. 17 Arkansas (196.450), No. 9 Kentucky (196.350) and No. 22 Georgia (195.800).

With its second-place finish, Alabama remains the only school in SEC history to never finish outside the top four at the con-

ference championship meet.

The NCAA Tournament selection committee was to meet Tues., March 22 to determine the seeds for the upcoming tournament that starts March 26.

Top records at the District duals tour-

nament held on January 7, were senior Shepard Wingate (25-8 at 152), senior Jacob Andrews (13-5 at 195), senior Ethan Cosby (16-7 at 132) and junior Matthew Delano (11-4 at 220). Caley was at 9-4 at 285 with seventh grader Baron Bryson unbeaten in four meets at 120 prior to the tournament.

At the district 4-1A duals tournament at Clay, the Indians lost 67-12 to Baker County, the eventual runnerup to Clay. Delano and Jason Bowden both won by pin for the Indians' 12 points.

"We didn't have to wrestle against Clay today, but I'm sure we will wrestle some of their guys in the IBT tournaments," said Knott, who took over after the first coach left. "I took over after coach Rick Marshall left and I took it over. The team would have gone away and I stepped up to keep the kids here. Everyday I'm learning as much as they are. The kids need sports."

With 24 athletes; three girls included, Knott sees the drive and intensity of the program as becoming a big part of the Keystone Heights sports community.

Prophetic as he is, Lowery got three individual state champions; Ulysses Freed, Logan Williams and Mason Dicks on top of the team title; a resounding 55-17 win over West Nassau with Port St. Joe third at 16 points.


"To tell me we were going to do that, with that score, no way, " said Lowery. "The morning that we left here to head to Port St. Joe, the kids from the git-go were on, they had the right mentality compete. When I went down the hall at the hotel 4:30 in the morning and they were all waiting on me, I knew they were ready to go."

In the Olympic Snatch competition, Keystone Heights won again decisively; a 44-20 score with South Sumter as runnerup. Wewahitchka and North Bay Haven were third with 16 point apiece.

Freed and Bryar Schenck were individual champions in the Olympic Snatch competition; with the Indians adding points with key top five finishers; Wyatt VanZant, fourth at 129; Ben Ulsch and Nate Tisdale at 169, fourth and fifth; Tyler Jenkins at 183, second to Schenck; Jayden Goodman, third at 199; Trey Jeffries, second at 219; Caleb Moncrief, third at 238 with Jackson Herman sixth, and, finally, Mason Dicks and Luke Snider, fourth and ninth at Unlimited. Reid Begue was eighth at 129 with Sam Ulsch seventh at 154.

Lowery's trio of champions in the Traditional competition included Freed, who returned to the team after two years of a COVID year and a torn labrum to get his gold; Williams, a senior who missed his state run last year with a rodeo injury and hit personal bests in all his lifts, and Dicks, who was sixth last year at 670 and jumped to 730 to win by 45 pounds in 2022 to make an emphatic statement after a excruciatingly close region competition.

"I knew it was going to be between me and him (Bolles Branden Black) and I had two personal best lifts for the win," said

Dicks. "I've been doing near 365 during the week and I was hitting it in practice. It's great to go out with a win and be a part of a legacy here."

Dicks had one of the closest region titles with Bolles' Branden Black, but his jump was too much for Black to follow as both tied at 700 at regions with Dicks getting the title based off body weight.

For Freed, to just return to the sport was a blessing on its own after a first visit as a freshman in 2019; 12th at 139, got his 2020 opportunity taken by COVID, then got hurt in a wrestling incident and tore his labrum to lose his 2021 shot.

"If you asked me last year when I got injured last year that I would even be going to a state weightlifting meet, I would have never guessed, absolutely not," said Freed, who while competing for the wrestling team tore his shoulder labrum. "My goal is to compete in the Olympics, so I kept training and doing therapy."

Freed's comeback story was daunting even to himself and caused some anxiety.

"My lifts went according to plan at the meet," said Freed. "My very last clean and jerk I tried to get the school record of 270 with a 275 attempt but I lost focus. I already had the state title at that point."


