GREEN COVE SPRINGS - When Aalivah (Devin) Callahan enrolled at Clav High after being home-schooled for three years, she was terrified by what she saw. The restrooms were filled with vape smoke and there were several mentions of drug use.

"It hit me like a truck," she said. "I was surprised seeing it in high school."

That gave Callahan an idea for this year's Clay Rotary Science and Engineering Fair. She posted a question-

naire on social media and placed QR codes on the walls at the school to solicit information about the connection between anxiety and drug use.

The message was: "Are you diagnosed with anxiety? Do you partake in drug use? (EX. weed, nicotine, alcohol, methamphetamines, ect.?)

The school let me put up the QR codes and everything was anonymous," Callahan said. "I also put a Google Form on social media and kept it up for two

Janae Jordan's career path has been like a ride on a spaceship – meteoric with a seemingly-scripted course.

As a child, she loved building Ikea furniture and playing with LEGOs, which led her to take engineering classes at Lakeside Junior High. That led to studying robotics and a seventh-grade trip to the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Duke}}$ Talent Identification Program. The only courses available at Duke were aerospace engineering, so her future continued to be narrowly refined.

Now a freshman at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Daytona Beach,

Is bigger better? **Residents, county wrestle to get ahead of growth in Lake Asbury**

LAKE ASBURY – With multiple construction developments seeking to move forward with blueprint plans, what used to be a quiet area could soon become a primary example of what overdevelopment looks like in the county.

U.S. Census data indicates a 21.2% rise in the community's population from 2010 to 2020, a figure that rose from 8,700 to 11,036 residents, which could become even larger soon.

County Commission Chairwoman Besty Condon said during the State of the County luncheon last month that more than 10,000 home permits were already planned for the area.

That same rural sentiment still has some familiarity in the Lake Asbury community, but that's something that could possibly fade away with time.

Priscilla Welch, who has been a resident of Lake Asbury for 28 years, said she used to be able to ride her horse on the street. Welch, a server at Dalton's Sports Grill on Henley Road, has owned two acres in Lake Asbury since 1995.

Her trails are now filled with heavy traffic and heavy construction equipment. Another resident of 40 years isn't hap-

py with the rapid growth.

"It sounded like shooting over there on Sunday. I don't want to talk about it. Don't get me started," an anonymous local grumbled. A number like 11,000 residents may not seem like too many. Still, even a population that grows by a little bit could create additional stress in a community that possesses infrastructure that has its limits.

Asbury Lake is defined by two-lane roads, with County Road 220 running northeast to northwest, County Road 218 stretching south, and Russell Road and Sandridge Road. Henley Road interconnects the area.

"The concern of everyone here is the infrastructure. The Board of County Commissioners approved so much development to occur," said Kay Manly, a Lake Asbury resident who's opposed to overdevelopment in the community.

But that's not all.

The second phase of construction for the 46-mile First Coast Expressway running through Clay, Duval and St John's counties has been ongoing since March 2019.

The expressway is planned to pass through State Road 16 to Blanding Boulevard - a 10.5-mile stretch that will carve through the middle of the Lake Asbury area.

The potential effects are unknown, but placing a large highway in the middle of Lake Asbury could spell trouble for an area already seeing some struggles due to infrastructure.

With only so many schools, police stations, and fire stations in Lake Asbury to go around, Manly is concerned that these services, which serve as the lifeblood of any



community, might not be able to keep pace with the growth that is taking place.

"Without the appropriate fees, we don't have the roads, schools, and fire and police stations to keep up with all of this new growth," Manly said.

The county commission voted to impose \$121 million in impact fees to be collected during the next 22 years to help pay for the growth. That equates to as much as \$7,034 for each new home, but the county won't start collecting those fees until June.

The two closest high schools to Lake Asbury are Middleburg High (7.7 miles away) and Clay High (12.5 miles).

Doctors Inlet, RideOut, Coppergate, Lake Asbury and Shadowlawn are within a seven-mile circle for elementary school parents. Still, with only one junior school – Lake Asbury – and no high schools in the immediate area, options for some students could be limited until a new high school is built.

One new development is Hyland Trail

on Henley Road. The property will soon become a master-planned community that will offer approximately 1,500 residential homesites, according to the website of the developer, Green Pointe Holdings.

Plans for the Community Development District call for amenities like multipurpose trails connecting neighborhood pocket parks, a resort-style pool and a dog park.

For now, Hyland Trail resembles a baron pit of sand and mud. A stormwater retention pond sits at the front of the unfinished development with runoff and tire tracks making their mark on an area with plenty of unfinished construction still left to be completed.

Behind the pond, many large pipes and construction materials for soon-to-be underground infrastructure for sewage and drainage lay down, ready to be placed into action.

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Why moving public notices to government websites is a bad idea

Last year, the Legislature passed a public notice bill that went into effect Jan. 1. The new law gives counties the option to place public notices solely on their own govern-

ment website and dispense with any such notice in the traditional format - newspapers and newspaper websites. The reasons given

for county websites vary – saving the

government money, newspapers are dying, it's a newspaper subsidy, no one reads public notices, etc.

But a closer look reveals another side to the story, one that casts doubt and reveals the downsides of such a plan.

In fact, government website-only notice will push government actions further into the shadows and make them less transparent. And it will make it harder for Floridians to monitor their local government and hold their leaders accountable.

Public notices cover a host of government activities, ranging from local millage rates and zoning changes to delinquent taxes and school board decisions. They can herald an important hearing by elected officials on matters crucial to everyday lives. The notices are, in fact, a form of basic constitutional due process protecting the rights of citizens and their property in a functioning democracy.

Under the traditional process, the notices are not just placed in the printed newspaper. They are also required by law to be posted visibly on the newspaper's website. In addition, the notices are required to be uploaded to a searchable FPA website that aggregates all Florida government notices at floridapublicnotices.com.

If a citizen wants follow-up notices to those posted to the site (or the newspaper's site), he or she can request email alerts of the new notices. These services -- required by law – are free to the public; there is no paywall. What's more, the aggregated site continues to be

modernized and upgraded to serve Florida's state government, as well as its towns, municipalities, businesses and taxpavers.

If this traditional process is discarded and notices moved to the county website, they will no longer be posted in newspapers or on the statewide website. The re-

Trump's newest low blow calls Ron DeSantis a 'groomer'

Ron DeSantis continues to be attacked by former President Donald Trump as indications increase the two are on a collision course next year.

Trump took to his personal social media platform, Truth Social, to sling fresh mud at the Florida Governor, including accusations DeSantis was engaging in "grooming" behavior.

Trump began the barrage by "retruthing" a post incorporating a tweet from 2018 urging the election to be "called" in favor of DeSantis and Rick Scott, each of whom was in close elections that November. In another retruth, the former President answered a rhetorical question about the then-Congressman voting against the "border wall" in 2018.

"Wow, if I knew that, I wouldn't have Endorsed him (and he would have had to quit the race, down 35 points!)," Trump contended, alluding to stories told frequently about how DeSantis begged him for his endorsement, apparently with "tears coming down from his eyes," and said that he would have guit the race for Governor without it.

That material is well-rehearsed, as followers of this one-sided flame war know. But last Tuesday, the former President opened up a new and sordid line of attack, focusing on a photograph dating back to the Governor's short-lived career as a teacher at a college preparatory academy, where he reportedly fraternized with students.

The former President re-truthed a poster commenting on a picture of De-

Santis and former students.

"Ron DeSantis was having a 'drink' party with his students when he was a high school teacher. Having drinks with underage girls and cuddling with them certainly look pretty gross and ephebophiliaesque." went the description.

Trump responded, "No way?"

Then, a second re-truth on a post with text on the image stating, "Here is Ron DeSanctimonious grooming high school girls with alcohol as a teacher."

'That's not Ron, is it? He would never do such a thing!" Trump responded sarcastically.

The timing seems more than coincidental, amid news that allies of DeSantis are forming a super PAC ahead of an expected run for the White House beginning later this year.

Trump had taken nearly a week off from attacks on DeSantis, with the last barrage being at the beginning of February, when he took to his Truth Social account to whack DeSantis as a "globalist" and a "RINO" (Republican in name only).

"Thank you. The real Ron is a RINO GLOBALIST who closed quickly down Florida and even its beaches. Loved the Vaccines and wasted big money on 'Testing.' How quickly people forget!"

Trump also "re-truthed," similar to retweeting on Twitter, various supportive messages, such as "President Trump will destroy DeSantis in the primary," "people need to do there (sic) research, DeSantis is fake and a globalist," and reminders that the then-Congressman voted for resolutions that would raise the retirement age to 70.

"You need to go back and look at his



history. You will change your mind. He is a RINO. Paid opposition to keep Trump from saving America. A vote for DeSantis is a vote for the establishment." read a message from one Trump supporter that the former President boasted.

Trump also offered a retort to DeSantis' assertions the voters of Florida had offered a "verdict" by re-electing him in 2022 by

sult will be a county-by-county patchwork of notices around the states - making public notices less visible and accessible to the public.

What about the claim that newspapers are dying? While print circulation in daily papers has declined, weekly newspapers are growing, and our dailies are seeing increases in digital subscriptions and page views. In some cases, newspapers are experiencing double-digit online growth.

Newspapers in Florida reach 5.6 million readers in any given week, and our newspaper websites typically reach more audiences than most city or county websites and draw a minimum of 53 million unique online users in any given month. The claim of newspaper irrelevancy is simply not true. They are more relevant than ever.

So, what about the cost savings the government websites will produce? In the counties considering this change, no specific savings have been outlined. If county websites replace newspapers, the local governments will be required to recreate the same infrastructure newspaper already have - increasing the cost of government

keting to direct citizens to hundreds of government websites, the public will not know where to find public notices. Also, on the expense front, county government public notice websites will also be required to provide citizens, if requested, a copy of notices via email or first-class mail - another new cost.

As for the charge that the notices are a newspaper subsidy, it's true newspapers derive some revenue from them, but calling it a subsidy ignores the fact that newspapers perform a service just as other county vendors do.

This issue is not only about money. It's about an independent publisher helping to ensure government transparency and honestv.

Public notices belong in a public forum -- newspapers - where citizens are most likely to see them. Public notices should remain in newspapers, not placed on hundreds of different government websites, with the hope that people will find them.

Call your county and city officials to share your views. Tell them the other side of the story--and directly from citizens who care.

Orange Park still working on plans to phase out septic tanks

ORANGE PARK – The Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Septic To Sewer project highlighted Tuesday night's Town Council meeting because it affects several residents and impacts the future of the infrastructure.

The council said it was concerned that 50 properties in Orange Park are not connected to the town's sewer services.

According to town manager Sarah Campbell, the project will be completed in

two phases. Work is currently underway in the right-of-ways owned by the town to extend the sewer mains to those homes. Water mains will also be added if needed.

The second part of that process would be going onto private properties to connect those pieces of land.

The reason behind this is to improve water quality and stormwater runoff concerns for lakes and streams.

However, the measure was not put to a vote, as mayor Randy Anderson determined it would be best to have an educa-

Jordan was one of a handful of students in the country to earn the Patti Grace Smith Fellowship.

The honor comes with paid internships at industry-leading firms, professional mentoring and grants of as much as \$2,000. For the third consecutive year, Embry-Riddle had the most students selected for this award of any university in the country.

"When I was at Duke TIP, I took the (aerospace engineering) class and it was fun," the Fleming Island High graduate said. "It wasn't as hard as I thought it would be. That's when I thought maybe this is what I want to do with my career. That's how it all happened."

The fellowship is offered to Black students as a "commitment to help African-Americans around the world to get their foot in the door," Jordan said. It recognizes students based on excellence in academics, creativity, ingenuity and serving others to help promote diversity in the aerospace sector, including in engineering, science, policy and more.

"We are delighted to continue to find excited, driven and talented students that want to bring Black excellence into aerospace," said Tiffany Russell Lockett, cofounder of the Patti Grace Smith Fellowship. "Our goal is always to bring the best students forward for our host companies to consider, and this is the most competitive class to date. With the highest number of applicants ever, we are excited to see where this class goes and how we will continue to make an impact in the future."

The annual fellowship is given to 31 students a year.

For Jordan, it was another step in a complicated life. Her mother died of a brain tumor when she was 11. Her academic records were lost when her school closed, which forced her to retake all of her placement exams. Suddenly she was a year behind her classmates.

"However, this gave me the motivation to catch up in any way possible," she said.

To catch up, Jordan took dual classes that got her back on track with the rest of her class and helped her earn college credits. Her success in those courses led to scholarships and, eventually, to acceptance into Embry-Riddle.

After graduation, Jordan hopes to work in the design and manufacturing of rockets or planes.

Now majoring in Aerospace Engineering, Jordan will do her internship at BryceTech in Alexandria, Virginia.

"We couldn't be prouder of our students chosen for this prestigious award," said Russell Griffin, Embry-Riddle's chief diversity and inclusion officer. "These Patti Grace Smith Fellowship winners exemplify how Embry-Riddle's deep focus on readiness for aerospace engagement extends to all our students, making them standouts to and for the industry."

reads: "Coming Soon: New Homes From the \$300s (\$300,000s)."

Another potential issue that Manly is also worried about is another phenomenon caused by the growth is less affordable housing available to the public.

"School teachers and firefighters can't afford a \$300,000-plus home. Affordable housing is going away out here," she said. However, not all are opposed to devel-

opment in the community. "I think that the growth is good for (lo-

cal businesses). This business is wonderful. I'm worried about traffic, but I'm OK with the growth and bringing some business out here," Welch said.

Safeguards have been set in place by the county to prevent the problem further. This includes the Lake Asbury and Branan Field Master Plans, which are the county's fastest-growing areas, primarily due to the construction of the First Coast Expressway, according to Annaleesa Winter, County Commission Public Information Officer. The plans have specific guidelines that control the types and quality of development in these two areas.

Those plans can be found at www.claycountygov.com/government/planning-andzoning/master-plans.

The BCC approved a 12-month moratorium on any proposed land use amendment that increases allowable residential densities in the Lake Asbury Master Plan Area on Nov. 9, 2021, and was renewed a year later. Commissioners also held a pubcould be offered for an extended period, allowing residents to cover the cost at a low rate.

Campbell suggested a cost of 36 annually for 10 years, which would be part of

lic hearing on an ordinance to address the matter further.

Another environmental issue could be if Lake LARC Development pushes forward with its \$7 million Capital Improvement Plan. However, thee are no known plans are currently in place for development on the land.

The development could prove to be harmful to a parcel that has several complexities in a Fall 1982 report from the University of Florida, which among other things, found new homes aren't suitable for septic tanks.

One major side effect that could potentially damage both the natural environment and quality of life for residents is runoff from stormwater containing the nutrients from landscaping and septic tanks.

Lake LARC flows directly into Lake Asbury, which then flows into Black Creek.

Lake Asbury experienced a large algal bloom in 2021, and it's possible that future development at Lake LARC would further trigger the foul, green mess issue, especially for a lake that is already being treated as a retention pond for a growing Henley Road area that already has several new homes across the street.

The potential of construction vehicles moving in and out of home sites for several years could overstress Lake Asbury and other dams. The Florida Department of Transportation posted a weight limit sign at a barrier that had already been slapped with a label by the National Inventory of Dams with an Unsatisfactory Construction Rating.

Navy SEAL Virtual Reality Experience makes stop at Oakleaf High School

OAKLEAF – Allivah Turner leaned as if she was riding in a boat, speeding along a waterway and carving a path through a series of turns. She turned the steering wheel and maneuvered the throttle to avoid running ashore in a simulated U.S. Navy SEAL virtual experience presentation.

The Oakleaf High junior was invited to the Virtual Reality Experience in the school's parking lot last Tuesday. She was one of nearly 600 students who talked to recruiters, virtually piloted a high-speed boat and watched displays for STEM-related careers.

"Mainly, it's JROTC and Aerospace students, but students from Career and Technical Education (CTE) classes were invited," said Aerospace Team instructor Ellis Bowler

The Navy Outreach and Diverstiy program makes selected stops at high schools. The team at Oakleaf was at Palm Coast High last week, and their stop was Phoenix this week.

According to the Navy, the program

identifies high-ability students who excel in high-demand Navy STEM fields, such as nuclear engineering, cryptology, IT and health care. The Navy also shared information about its \$180,000 ROTC Scholarship Program, which pays full college tuition for students with exceptional academic and

leadership credentials.

The main attraction will be the Nimitz,

a mobile, state-of-the-art virtual reality experience that simulates an actual highspeed Navy SEAL mission.

"We (were) extremely excited to spend time at Oakleaf High School, meeting with the exceptional students and faculty, and discussing the great opportunities available in today's Navy," says LCDR Claudia Alday, with Navy Diversity and Outreach. "It is important for today's high school students to understand that a Navy STEM career offers an exceptional future."

Participants go through a video briefing before strapping on an Oculus Rift headset and a piece of wearable technology called a SubPac (traditionally used by Club DJs) that percusses in real time to the sounds of the mission. Students then navigate the mission using a cutting-edge steering wheel and throttle system replicating the actual sensation of piloting a high-speed SWCC boat. Once finished, participants move to the debriefing station, where they receive feedback and a performance grade.

with a new stuffed animal and lots of hugs.

"She just brings joy to the officers. It's a hometown feeling and they love the whole family." Acres said.

Dani-Lynn and her two older sisters are no strangers to the GCSPD.

"I've seen Dani-Lynn on and off from (her mother) Amelia bringing the kids with her," Acres said.

"They are always visiting us during the Holidays, during Trunk or Treat. They recently brought us pizza for National Thank a Police Officer Day in January. They are very involved in the community."

The family has donated to the Green Cove Springs Food Pantry for the past seven years. They also take toiletries and other supplies to the Ronald McDonald House in Gainsville and donate toys to the local heart clinic.

Sporting bedazzled Crocs and a broad smile, you wouldn't know that Dani-Lynn was born with three congenital heart defects; HLHS, VSD, and a PAPVR repair, or that she has undergone two major heart surgeries and many hospitalizations.

"She has half of a heart, a hole in her heart, and poor left lung function," said her mother, Amelia Early.



However, her condition didn't stop Dani-Lynn from taking a personal tour of the GCSPD and sharing a plate of cheesy nachos with her favorite communications officer at a local diner.

"She always has a smile on her face. She's never met a stranger and loves life," Early said. Dani-Lynn loves her sisters, misses her teachers and friends, and has a big heart for helping others. She dreams of being a heart doctor when she grows up.

Currently, there is no cure for her heart disease. A day after she visited the GCSPD, Dani-Lynn was admitted to Shands Childrens Hospital in Gainsville. "Amelia got the call to go to the hospital to admit her to the Cardiac unit," Brandi said. Dani-Lynn was having chest pains. Her stomach was swollen. "They said she was going into



heart failure."

Dani-Lynn has no discharge date. Due to her high antibody count, she does not qualify for a heart transplant. Doctors say she would reject it immediately.

"She has a 90% chance of rejecting a new heart," Early noted.

Dani-Lynn's family is doing their best to let her live the best life she can for what little time they have left with her. However, they hold tight to their faith and pray for a miracle for Dani-Lynn.

"There are a few other experimental drugs. There's a chemo-like drug therapy called IVIG transfusion. It's a long and slow process. The IVIG drug therapy, per infusion, costs thousands of dollars," Early said, adding that the drug could possibly make Dani-Lynn's condition worse.

If the IVIG drug therapy shows little to no results, they could attempt a plasma replacement treatment, but it's a very aggressive treatment and would require Dani-Lynn to live at the hospital.

"And these treatments are all to lower her antibody levels/rejection rate so she can qualify for a heart transplant," Early said. There are more than 2,000 children currently waiting for a heart. Unfortunately, there are fewer donor organs available than there are people waiting. Waitlist times for transplantation vary depending on a patient's weight, blood type, and waiting status.

"As it stands right now, Dani-Lynn has a very likely chance of dying while waiting on a treatment that may or may not work," her mother said.

Despite the odds being stacked against her, the medical team is doing its best to give Dani-Lynn the best quality of life before she is gone. It has been an emotional journey for the whole family.

"My girls understand that sometimes they don't get to go to sleepovers or birthday parties because their baby sister is sick," Early said.

Dani-Lynns mother currently drives three hours to the hospital every day after work. She drives to Gainsville to spend as much time with her daughter, and then she drives back with barely enough time to make the route back to work. On top of caring for Dani-Lynn, she is also trying to get through college and purchase a home for her three daughters.

She wants to get her medical management degree to help families like hers.

Hampshire's desire for better life helped transform Green Cove Springs

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Felecia Hampshire was the first Black woman to become mayor of Green Cove Springs, something she never expected in her long and twisted life

"It wasn't like being on the city council or becoming the mayor was even on my radar screen. I grew up in this community and always wanted to give back in some capacity, but never in my life did I think



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that I would become a (publicly-elected) official.

Hampshire served her community as mayor twice - in 2009 and 2014.

She lists Joe Love, the first Black mayor in city history whose campaign she worked for in the 1970s, and Matthew Tinney, who served as mayor in 2011, as pioneers that provided her with the inspiration needed to pursue a career in the field of public service.

"I was inspired by those two men," she said.

Simple issues such as roads and quality of life were what originally drove her to attend and speak at the city council and other local government meetings in the first place before being elected to office.

"What drove me to more city council meetings was that it was a little rough around here in the 1980s. We have five kids, and we wanted them and other children to have the best quality of life possible in their hometown," Hampshire said. But the quality of life wasn't the only

issue. "People want equality, and one of the

reasons I wanted to be on (the) council was

equality, and she organized changing Middleburg Avenue to Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Clay County was a different place when Dunbar High opened its doors in 1942. Jim Crow laws and segregation served as the law of the land, thus prohibiting black students from receiving an education at the public schools they attend today

The school was the county's only "Black" high school, educating students from seventh to 12th grades.

Friends and former students will remember the former high school during a program called Remembering Dunbar High and Black American Anchor on Saturday, Feb. 11, at 4 p.m. at the Green Cove Springs Junior High.

The event coincides with Black History Month celebrations. But in Clay County, it's where the Civil Rights movement took root.

The school colors were purple and white, but their band uniforms were orange and gray because somebody donated them.

Although students often used hand-medown books and school supplies, many of the graduates have fond memories - and they gather every two years to celebrate their time at the school.

Dunbar was built on land donated by artist Augusta Savage and operated until 1967.

Since then, the Augusta Savage Museum and Mentoring Center have been erected on the same grounds. The City of Green Cove Springs is completing a significant overhaul of the center, which still serves as the hub of the Black community.



Former students of Dunbar High were ambitious and dedicated to education. Their history continues to resignate in the county and it will be celebrated Saturday at 4 p.m.

Family still recounts memories of Oakleaf war hero Walter Stevenson

 $\operatorname{OAKLEAF}$ – War hero, school bus driver, and radiologist.

Walter Stevenson, a longtime resident, passed away last month. But his life would never have been fully complete without the love of his life, Martha Alford Stevenson, by his side.

Martha and Walter's love story is a nostalgic American tale that brings back memories of a simpler time.

Walter enlisted in the U.S. Navy as a 17-year-old in 1945, serving on the home front as a member of the reserves during World War II. He also fought in wars in Korea and Vietnam.

When Stevenson was out on temporary leave from the military in 1950, he returned to his new home in Palatka to work as a farm hand. The property was being rented by his uncle Clyde.

That farm neighbored the property of Martha's father and mother.

However, the details of the marriage didn't come without trial for the lucky man to finally wrap a ring around the finger of his lovely woman. That's because Martha's mother disapproved of her relationship with Walter – or any other man.

Walter was greeted at the door with a revolver on more than one occasion when heading next door to meet her. To get married, the couple went to a church in Folkston, Georgia. Stevenson borrowed his uncle's pickup truck to make the trip.

"(Her mother) had the police there to prevent (Martha) from running off with him, but they outsmarted her," said Carol Trudel, daughter of Walter and Martha Stevenson. Martha worked at a department store when their relationship came about. She and her soon-to-be husband took off for the races during her lunch break.

The couple married in 1951, one year after the then-named Martha Alford earned her high school diploma.

One of Walter's several stories was about a long and twisted road.

Stevenson served a colorful 24-year career in the Navy aboard aircraft carriers Valley Forge, Forrestal, Saratoga and Roosevelt. Stevenson served in World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War.

Walter's military career would allow him to travel to the farthest corners of Earth. Stevenson sailed worldwide and crossed well below the equator when navi-

"We already have had a couple of people ask if we have particular tools that we don't have, but we are keeping track of that," Morford said. "We're keeping a list of what it is that people are looking for so that when we're ready to add that next phase of tools, we'll have some idea of what we need to include."

GIRL & A GUN *Women's group takes aim at gun safety, protection, knowledge*

ORANGE PARK – Eliza Parington got her first firearm 10 years ago when she moved to Northeast Florida. She had never fired a gun before, but she decided to give it a try.

- Now she shoots.
- And shoots.
- And shoots.

"I was like, 'How can I do this?' I want to learn more," she said.

Parington discovered Girl & A Gun Women's Shooting League, a women's only shooting league that introduces women and girls to pistol, rifle and shotguns. The firearms program is designed to help women feel more comfortable when talking with instructors and handling guns.

Parington has been involved with the club ever since then.

"I started shooting with Girl & A Gun in Tallahassee and quickly made shooting a regular part of my life," Parington said.

Now she's a member of the Jacksonville chapter, although many of their members are from Clay County.

The club regularly meets in Clay for practice at Basics Shooting Range on College Drive in Orange Park.

Basics is where Parington and her group meet once a month on Saturday mornings at Breakfast and Bullets. Before the chapter heads to the range, Parington serves freshly cooked bacon, eggs, pancakes and other favorites at her house before heading to the range.

"We get together and hang out, and then, we all go shoot something fun together," Parington said.

Homemade Hounds helps rescues transition to home life

'Train hard, love harder'

MIDDLEBURG – Tasley Wheeler started cleaning kennels at a guide dog facility in New York when she was 14. She worked with service dogs for the visually impaired, got her training certificate in New York and has worked with different species in training facilities.

"That's when I decided to open Homemade Hounds in 2012," she said.

Homemade Hounds is a boarding and training facility focused on low-cost training options, behavior modification, and socialization courses for families and animal rescue organizations.

"We really work with kids and families, women specifically. Women have different physical needs than men because we are built a little differently," Wheeler said. "When you have a 120-pound dog pulling you across the street, that keeps you limited in your own brain as to what you can accomplish, so we would like to remove those obstacles.

"We focus more on women's physicality and thought processes to give us good insight to really help women the edge up on these types of training."

Wheeler and her staff work with dog owners of all ages to help build better relationships with their canines. It's not about trying to overpower or control the dog, she said, but working with them to build their trust.

"We teach children how not to get bit, how to touch the dog the right way, how to read their body language. We are trying to

keep everyone safe and happy and dogs in homes," she said.

Homemade Hounds also works with local shelters, teaching obedience, socialization and a few fun tricks. The program not only helps the dog but improves the shelter environment.

"We have a very good relationship with Clay County Animal Services. We have a number of different rescue partners that we deal with who bring us the problem dogs or the dogs that need evaluation," Wheeler said.

"You'd be surprised how easily my staff can build a good connection with the dog and find out what the problem actually is so we can recommend further on what kind of home they should go into."

Homemade Hounds offers private lessons as well as group classes. They will also partner with other rescue organizations like Twisted Oaks Rescue to educate the public about dog handling and training at the Clay County Agriculture Fair during Pet Adoption Day on Sunday, April 1, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Cattlemen's Arena

at the fairgrounds.

"We're specifically looking to bring out Clay County Animal Services, Twisted Oaks Rescue Services and quite a few other animal-related places like Pet Supply Plus," Wheeler said.

The Clay County Animal Services will also assist fair guests with dogs that need fur-ever homes and provide them information about medical care, such as low-cost spay and neuter, and all their other medical needs.

"It's a wonderful time in rescue – I've been doing these 20-something years -and it's a really cool thing to see everyone come together to be a beacon of light for these animals," Wheeler said.

Besides dogs, there will be a meet and greet and a trainer table where people can ask questions about the adoption process. Homemade Hounds will also be hosting a trick show for young owners and their loyal canines. The dog show will be held on Sunday, April 9, at noon.

"The whole point of the kid's trick dog show is to give them the opportunity to show off their dogs and get them involved in dog training at a young age. That makes a huge difference later on," she said.

GCS veteran continues to salute the sacrifices made by fallen family members

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Visitors will know when they have arrived at the Vietnam War veteran C.J. Gauthier's house because there are several landmarks proudly positioned at the entrance.

First, you'll see a classic, three-wheel trike motorcycle with seven flags positioned at the rear. This includes the stars and stripes, along with six other banners that go on to salute the country's servicemen, including Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Navy and MIA/POW.

Standing to the left of a life-sized G.I. Joe, affectionately named Frank, after Gauthier's father. Just like his dad, a World War II veteran, the mannequin is dressed in full U.S. Navy garb.

While Gauthier proudly served from 1971-75, he'd rather not talk about that. The former serviceman said he didn't acknowledge the fact of that to friends and family until 2005, a whopping 30 years following the conclusion of the conflict in Southeast Asia.

Instead, Gauthier would prefer to discuss the extremely proud and strong legacy left by his late uncle and great-uncle. The tales of the heroes' lives and deaths still have an everlasting impact on America that can be felt to this very day.

Step inside C.J.'s military-themed home, and you will see plenty of framed photographs, magazines and memorabilia – many of which are dedicated to two of his fallen family members who have been at the forefront of his mind for much of his existence.

Portions of the room are dedicated as a shining tribute to his uncle, Electrician's First Mate Second Class Richard William Jones, who died in 1963, and his great-uncle, Capt. Joseph McConnell Jr., who died in 1954.

Both played a large part of a family with a long and distinguished line of military history.

While C.J. never had the opportunity to meet his uncle, his father, Frank, described the captain as a hellion who loved to chase women.

But the captain, indeed, was much more than that.

A native of Dover, New Hampshire, Mc-Connell originally didn't have the skills or training needed to become a pilot during World War II. However, when the Korean War started rolled around in 1950, McDonnell joined the Air Force to fight for the United States.

McConnell served in the war from 1952-1953, with the captain shooting down 16 and damaging five enemy aircraft in five months between January and May in 1953.

After that, the enshrined airman forever cemented his status as the first triple jet ace in U.S. history.

McConnell did so while flying at least three F-86 Sabres, all of which were named

Beauteous Butch after his wife, Pearl "Butch" Brown, the hero even shooting down a MiG-15 piloted by Soviet Union ace Semyon Fedorets during the process.

The captain's plane was badly damaged and he was forced to eject into the Yellow Sea, but he was quickly rescued by a U.S. helicopter within minutes. McConnell returned to battle the very next day, where he would shoot down another MiG.

Following the conclusion of the war and his safe return home, McConnell became the focus of the national limelight. He had the opportunity to meet President Dwight Eisenhower and embark on a nationwide tour that included guest appearances on radio and television programs and meet-andgreets with famous Hollywood celebrities.

However, he was tragically killed while conducting a test flight in 1954. He had been temporarily assigned to the service testing program of the new F-86 planes and his plane suffered a control malfunction.

It wasn't long after his death that the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star and Air Medal recipient was recognized. In 1955, Warner Bros. Studios released the McConnell Story, a 107-minute film dramatizing the life of the heroic veteran.

A copy of the film still sits on top of Gauthier's desk.

Gauthier's uncle, Richard, was a happy boy that enjoyed a colorful childhood. He was active in the Boy Scouts of America and a member of both the cross country and track teams.

After high school graduation, he enlisted in the Navy in 1959.

Jones attended Submarine School before volunteering for submarine duty, graduating in 1960. He was then assigned to the U.S.S. Diablo), becoming a fully-certified Submariner in 1961. In 1963, Richard was reassigned to the submarine U.S.S. Thresher.

Following an overhaul, the U.S.S. Thresher began deep-diving tests along the U.S.S Skylark approximately 220 miles east of Cape Cod, Massachusetts. However, something appeared to be inherently wrong after communications from Thresher to Skylark became muddled, which then completely stopped.

Jones was one of 128 other officers, crewmen and civilian technicians who were lost on board, with the shattered remains being found 8,400 feet below the surface in five major sections in 1964.

Jones' nephew remembers the moment like yesterday.

"My mother came out yelling and screaming and fell to her knees, and my father came out running behind her, trying to catch her," he said.

C.J. was 7. He couldn't understand what was happening at the time, but would soon learn of his uncle's tragic fate.

Nevertheless, both served as monumental heroes and role models to Gauthier and he will forever salute their memories.

weeks and four days. I cut it off at 150 people."

Callahan broke down her results to include boys, girls and others. Her results were telling: Anxiety does increase the chance of drug use.

Judges liked her method, experiment, hypothesis and conclusion enough to give

her the second-place award Tuesday in the Combined Behavioral, Social, Biomedical and Health Science category.

This year's science fair attracted 109 entries at the Clay County Fairgrounds. Winners were announced Wednesday night at Orange Park High.

"These projects are so impressive," said Superintendent David Broskie. "It's amazing how they come up with these ideas. We certainly have a lot of talented students in this county."







As we celebrate Black History Month, Clay Today and the Clerk of Court and Comptroller's office have created a three-part series on Civil Rights Icon Maude Burroughs Jackson.

MIDDLEBURG - From May 1963 until July 1964, protesters in St. Augustine endured physical beatings and verbal assaults. They did not fight back, however, based on Dr. Martin Luter King Jr's explicit nonviolence instructions at the time.

By suffering through the violence and hate-filled rhetoric that embodied our nation's Civil Rights Era, the protesters' ability to literally turn the other cheek garnered national sympathy. This was a major factor in the passing of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

A young woman from Clay County bravely marched in St. Augustine with those protestors, met Dr. King, and went on to inspire generations.

Maude Burroughs Jackson was interviewed by Clay Today's Mary Jo McTammany during January and February of 2007. This is her story in her own words:

"I was with Dr. King in '63 and '64 when he came down to St. Augustine on occasion. I started working with The Movement in St. Augustine sometime in 1962. I was in college in St. Augustine at Florida Me-

morial. I started there in 1960 and graduated in 1964. When I started, three of us were in school there at the same time my sister Ann, my brother Eddie and I. We all commuted to class. I never lived in the dormitories at Florida Memorial. I met a family in St. Augustine, and it so happened that their pastor knew my family. The pastor taught one of my brothers back in the '30s, and he knew the name Burroughs, and he had talked about us to people in St. Augustine. When I met this family, she recognized our name and made me welcome to be a part of her family and stay during

"About 1962, I learned about the local Movement. I participated in all the sitins and marches. I went to headquarters a lot. Our headquarters was at Dr. Robert Hayling's office. He has since moved from St. Augustine. There is a great story about him being in St. Augustine. He was in business there - a dentist. He had some terrible experiences trying to integrate St. Augustine. Some things I don't think he even wants to talk about. I guess that's why not too much has been written about St. Augustine and the Movement there. I met him by going to the mass meetings and by going to the sit-ins at Woolworths. I'm

not too clear on exact dates, but I was deeply involved in all the sit-ins and demonstrations during '62, '63, '64. The only exceptions were when I was at home in Middleburg during the summers."

"We would go and sit at the lunch counter at Woolworth's, and the waitresses would just keep walking past us. Every now and then, a waitress would say, 'We don't serve (racial slur) here.' I know what that word means, and maybe, coming through the Movement, it doesn't hurt me as much these days as it did then. So if I use the word. don't feel hurt about me using it. It doesn't really bother me if I use it because I'm using it in the context of how it was used back in the day. It did hurt during that time. In those days, ladies of quality – black or white – dressed nicely to go to town. The demonstrations and sitins were no different. I would have worn a nice skirt and blouse or a nice dress with hose and heels, with my nails done and my hair would have been combed. I probably looked much nicer than I would dress to go to town today. Times have changed. Also, being from 19 to 21 years old, I was very concerned about the way I was dressed. We were raised to be that way."

"At the sit-ins, we always sat down in an orderly way because that was part of the instruction when you wanted to be a part of Dr. King's Movement. There were very precise and detailed instructions on how to go out and how to conduct yourself while you were out, and no matter what people said to you, you were not to respond in any ugly way."

There was a group that was in charge of the Movement in St. Augustine, and I got involved by just going and sitting at the office. typing letters, sending out information about the Movement, and talking to people who didn't want to go out on the marches.

Bartram Trail District inducts 39 to rank of Eagle Scout

FLEMING ISLAND – Michael Garrick reached into a bag and pulled out items from his days as a Scout, including his Eagle Scout coffee mug and sash with 21 badges.

Once a Scout, always a Scout.

The retired U.S. Navy captain entered Scouting's highest rank in 1989, and he wanted this year's group of scouts to know they never will lose that distinction.

"This is permanent," he said.

Five months after getting his Eagle neckerchief, Garrick embarked on a 33year career in the military. He returned to be the Bartram Trail District induction at Sacred Heart Catholic Church last Saturday to deliver the keynote address.

Garrick said as a teen, he quickly realized the oaths for the Navy and Scouts mirrored each other, and he said the values and principles learned through Scouting prepared him for success in the Navy.

"You've demonstrated character; you've learned competencies and oaths, and those are going to set you apart as leaders in the society," Garrick said. "You're a testimony to your families. And I think that everybody here would agree that earning Eagle Scout means a great number of things."

For Fleming Island's Karl Bolt, it meant embracing the challenge of hiking and camping at the Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico. For Orange Park's Lance Ambrosio, it meant creating friendships with fellow Scouts.

And for Madelyn and Francesca Considine, it meant continuing a proud family tradition.

"What I like most is meeting new people," Ambrosio said.

He created a butterfly garden at the Ortega Methodist Church in Jacksonville for his Eagle Scout project. Ambrosio now a freshman studying biology and environmental studies at Rollins College in Winter Park.

Bolt built two book share boxes and placed one at the entrance to the Eagle Harbor pool and the other at the back pool.

"My project was suggested to me," he said. "We got the materials and design, and there was some trial and error. It was challenging."

The Considine sisters became the third in their Keystone Heights family to become an Eagle. Their father, Frank, achieved the rank nearly 30 years ago.

Their mother, Jacqueline and sisters Evelyn and Penelope, are all involved in Scouting.

To earn the rank of Eagle, scouts had to earn a minimum of 21 merit badges, including badges in first aid, citizenship in the community, nation and world, communication, cooking, personal fitness and

emergency preparation or lifesaving. They also were required to serve in a leadership role, complete a board of review and enlist help and finances for a project to benefit the community.

Bartram Trail's 39 inductees combined to donate 7,436 hours and raise \$31,118.80.

This year's Eagles received light blue neckerchiefs created for the newly-formed Bartram Trail District. The district was reshaped a year ago to include scouts from Clay, Putnam and Baker counties. Eagles from the former Black Creek District received white neckerchiefs.

Each new Eagle received an array of citations from the sheriff's office from all three counties, the Clay County School Board, County Commission, Rotary Club of Orange Park, U.S. Rep. Aaron Bean, Florida Sen. Jennifer Bradley, Florida Reps. Sam Garrison and Bobby Payne and Sons of the American Revolution.

Garrick closed by telling the younger Scouts what he believes is the most important aspect of being an Eagle.

"Earning this goal is not the end of this journey," he said. "It's the beginning. I am humbled to be able to call myself to be in your ranks."

would be left there to handle the office many times during those early marches. At that time, there might have been 15-20 people who would be there to organize things before the marches. They always reminded people to be on their best behavior, and that (they) might encounter people who would make remarks that would upset (them). They might throw things at you. They might hit you. They might spit on you. They might do anything to you, and you must not respond. Anybody who could not accept this – could not participate. So you already knew what to expect. You knew to expect doors closed in your face, skipping you in line; anything of that nature might happen to you."

"Then, Dr. King started coming down (St. Augustine). The first time that I saw Dr. King, he came in for a mass meeting, and I stayed there at the office to take care of answering the phone or to take care of anything else that came up. He was getting

in so late, and after the meeting, it was going to be so late that you wouldn't dare try to go to a restaurant or anything. So, I was asked to prepare dinner for him that night at the office using a small toaster oven. I made a steak for him and toast and a little salad. And I got a chance to just sit and be in the inner circle of the leaders of the Movement. He was such a compassionate, such a common person – you just felt good being around him. A man of this importance, but every one of us was treated like we were the special one. And he showed so much respect for all of he participants for everybody. It wasn't like you were just a little person here in St. Augustine. He didn't treat you that way.

"After that, when he began coming to St. Augustine on a regular basis -I spent a lot of time with Dr. King. Sometimes he would fly in and have to fly right back out. All of us spent time with him just working around the office and organizing the meetings. Some of us even went out to the high school with him and recruited children

to participate. Dr. King didn't necessarily come to all the mass meetings, but he did the marches. At night, we did the marches while the picketing and sit-ins were done during the day.

"After a mass meeting where Dr. King gave a fiery sermon - we sang "God Will Take Care of You" and just felt all fired up and ready to save the world. Sometimes, Abernathy or sometimes Andrew Young might be the speaker. All of them came to St. Augustine – C.T. Vivian, Y.T. Walker. Josea Williams, John Lewis. I got the opportunity to be around all these people. All of them didn't come at the same time; they kind of cycled in and out. It was very well planned. One would leave, and another would come in to help with the Movement. (The) presence of the national leaders really was intended to generate national media interest. Local people could not get that kind of attention."

GCS continues exploration to pay for electricity upgrades with impact fees

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Still in the exploratory phase, the City Council continued to push for defining details of a likely impact fee to prepare for the demands on the electrical grid and other projects.

The council voted 5-0 for staff to determine the long-range needs and the costs during its Tuesday night special meeting.

Much of the concern is the development of 1,600 acres south of downtown. If a retail center, homes and apartments are built, as expected, it will overload the city's ability to provide electricity to all of its residents.

One study said the city would need to spend at least \$24 million in the next 10 years to meet the expected demands. The council said it wanted to determine the needs in advance – and the way to pay for it.



The council got an hour-long presentation from Tallahassee-based attorney Heather Encinosa, who specializes in city and county tax increases and impact fees. She said the best way for Green Cove Springs to collect more money was to define the specific needs and impose impact fees.

She also said an impact fee could only be levied on the residents who will benefit from the expanded services. If the council borrows the money, it would have to prove the impact fees would be enough to pay off the note. The challenge is knowing the details of what the town will need 10 years from now.

One thing the council already knows is Green Cove Springs will need to expand and upgrade its electricity department.

"We have to get out in front of it," said Councilman Ed Gaw.

City Electric Director Andy Yeager said his department could handle the first development phase but nothing beyond that. A fourth transmission line would have to be installed to meet the demands of full development. "If we wait, it's too late," he said. "When you get behind, it's awful hard to catch up." The vote to proceed with the explorato-

ry stage was a significant step, Gaw said. Encinosa said the city faces a June deadline to be able to get all of its paperwork, loan application and long-range plans done in time for the Sept. 15 cutoff. That's the latest impact fee that can be assessed next year.

Staff also will look at other projects, like sidewalks, roads and stormwater management. Encinosa said the city is allowed to combine several projects to create a single impact fee. Those fees, however, could vary if a specific project doesn't benefit residents in another part of town.

During the regular meeting, Kennedy won approval to execute an interlocal agreement with the county on impact fees. The city council's next meeting will be on Feb. 21.

the user's utility bill.

The second option would be for the town to cover the pump installation cost with grant monies. The pumps have a life expectancy of 10 years, and the town would foot the \$600 bill if the pipe were to fail the first time around.

The third potential option is for homes that are in clusters. A town-owned and operated small-package lift station could use gravity from residences, which would then pump from there to the main. Final costs for this have not been determined.

In other business:

In a historic movement for the town, the council unanimously approved plans to open Rob Bradley Conservation Park at The Point, 4-0. The park would provide free waterfront access to town residents for the first time.

When the park opens, the town public works department will unlock the gates each morning, while the town police department will lock them at night. Tasks still remaining to be completed include grading ruts, cleaning up remaining concrete and metal debris and some other small projects.

With Orange Park celebrating its 146th anniversary on Sat, Feb. 18, the town will host a cleanup session for the park in honor of the monumental date to remove vegetative debris.

In her presentation, Campbell set a target for a tentative opening date of March 1. However, the entirety of the project, which would include a nature trail, kayak launch, and canoe launch, wouldn't be completed until an estimated date of Spring or Summer 2024.

An authorization to approve an interlocal agreement with Clay County for the collection of county-wide impact fees passed unanimously, 4-0.

Finally, two golf-cart related ordinances passed unanimously, one allowing golf carts within town limits, and the next creating signage for those golf carts. A little more than 100 signs would be posted, and streets that would allow for the usage of the vehicles would be marked.

LEESBURG - Clay High's girls weightlifting team solidified their prowess as the strongest team in the state with an overwhelming double region championship compounded with three athletes in top seed positions for the upcoming state championship meet in Lakeland on Sat., Feb. 18.

Clay dominated both disciplines with a 43-34 1-2 finish over New Smyrna Beach with Leesburg third at 32. Fleming Island was sixth with 20 just ahead of Middleburg, 10. and Ridgeview. 9.

In Traditional, Clay won with 45 points over New Smyrna Beach again, at 36, with Leesburg at 29. Middleburg was sixth at 21 with Fleming Island seventh at 18 and Ridgeview eighth with eight points.

Clay, the Olympic and Tradition defending Class 2A champions, leads a contingency of athletes; three defending state champions; two top seeds in 2023; Emma Heck, Janiyah Stevens and Kyleigh LaFary, to the Class 2A championships that includes a remarkable five athletes from Fleming Island; one a top seed, after a zero camp last year, six from Middleburg (three from state champion softball team, one a state discus thrower) and three from Ridgeview.

For Clay coach Rodney Keller, a second title run seems imminent not just because of his three defending champions returning, but for the wingmen of those three.

At Unlimited. LaFarv has been the top total for the entire season with teammate Kenya Tinajero just a step behind with the duo looking to chock up a bucket load of points for the Blue Devils. LaFary and Tinajero are 1-2 in totals; 375-350 in Olympics and 425-400 in Tradition to have a possible 19 point swing for Clay.



Heck is a lock with overwhelming totals: 360 and 370 with her chasers, including Ridgeview High's Adriana Dimeo unfortunately the second best lifter at 139 from Clay County, only able to watch and battle for the silver medal. That should make that weight class a second Clay County explosion although Dimeo and Heck will battle earlier than LaFary and Tinajero blow the competition away. For Stevens at 154, the defending champion is the second seed coming in; an astounding 415 by Nicole Caamano of Springstead, with Stevens region champion at 375. Keller is a master of big meet preparation and mental toughness and this could be a mano-a-mano showdown in Lakeland.

Keller's other aces in the hole are Annalee Harbison and Ansley Lyda who both have hovered under the radar all season and could make a points impact at state.

For Fleming Island coach Sean Coultis, who took a young batch of athletes last year that got a bit beat up in the season and turned a newcomer, top seed Autumn Leviston, into a beast on the bench press, punched up some technique improvements around his roster which includes a power lacrosse athlete; Jillian LaBelle, and now will travel with five athletes to Lakeland. Bradi Johnson is just hair off the top total at 119 in Traditional. Ridgeview state meet veteran Harper Herring is a good bet for a second state medal for coach Trentin Davis.

Middleburg softball coach Ashley Houston relied on some power hitting last year to garner the schools first team state title and her little infielder powerhouse: Kaelyn Hagan, is a lead-by-example big game player. From the track team, Madison Underwood's discus is state meet stuff and her competitiveness is unquestioned.

Big games bring big players doing big things. Clay County will represent in Class 2A.

ORANGE PARK - Coming off a 58-8 domination of Baker County 48 hours prior, the Rickards Lady Raiders were looking to lay claim to the 5A District 2 Championship when visiting host and top seed Ridgeview High School.

The Raiders $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{T}^{M}$ Genesis Henry is the team leader in just about every statistic and would need to be under a defensive thumb if Ridgeview wanted to control the game.
