



Midway taking shape at Fairgrounds a week ahead of March 30 opening

Rides already being erected in anticipation of March 30 ceremonies

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – When Tasha Hyder got to work at the Clay County Fairgrounds last Monday, she was greeted with an unusual, but certainly welcomed, site of workers putting together rides for next week's Agriculture Fair.

The bigger rides from Deggeller Attractions weren't needed for this week's county fair at nearby Putnam County, so the group specializing in building bustling midways sent them to Clay County.

"We're 10 days out, and they're already setting up the big rides," said the fair's executive director Hyder. "It's really exciting to see the midway starting to take shape.

Solite: Saga of coverups, corrosion, contamination

State, county leaders join fight to block construction until toxic site is investigated

LAKE ASBURY – Developments continue to unfold about Solite, the former aggregate kiln company that ran a reckless operation from the 1950s-1990s off County Road 209-A in the Lake Asbury/Green Cove Springs area that residents said had no regard for the environment and the community.

Burning jet fuels and other chemicals, hiding barrels and more were part of the daily operation on the large 900-acre property tucked deep in the backwoods of Clay County.

As three generations of residents must face multiple health and quality of life issues, the drama between the ex-plant, a shell company, a potential property buyer, local officials and the community has

OP Town Council haggles over merits of St. Johns Classical Academy campus

ORANGE PARK - After debating whether St. Johns Classical Academy would be an asset to the tax roles or another failed nonprofit, the Town Council voted 5-0 to rezone the property at 1324 Kingsley Ave. to advance the project.

The charter school already has a campus on Fleming Island. With a lengthy waiting list, the school decided to expand to the building that used to house Orange Park Performing Arts Academy.

The arts academy closed because it failed to pay rent and salaries.

The council heard a second reading of an ordinance to amend the comprehensive plan for the site at the property and rezone the parcel from a Planned Unit Development to a Professional Commercial Office. Both measures passed unanimously. 5-0.

Vice Mayor Alan Watt said while he voted for the first bill, he wanted it on the record that he opposed the measure.

"I am categorically opposed to this. I do not think it is a need for the town. It is very bad, financially, for the town. We finally had this property positioned to become a useful, tax-paying facility, and now we're back to having another nonprofit, which will not contribute anything financially," he said

Councilman Josh Hauber said he thinks the new school will be good for students living in Clay County because they can enter a lottery system and grow their knowledge and experience.

However, the school's status as a nonprofit creates positives and negatives, Hauber said.

"It's a nonprofit, so it's a dual-edged sword here that we're combating with," he said. Mayor Randy Anderson said the forthcoming of St. Johns Classical Academy as an overwhelming positive.

"Yes, I understand they're a nonprofit, and nonprofits don't pay taxes, But this is a very good school. I think this is a plus for our community to bring that school here, and with that school comes young families, so I think it's a big plus for us," he said.

But not if it doesn't serve town students and considers low-income students.

"The only concern I have is the kids in the town limits of Orange Park. Financially, are they going to be able to attend, or will they be overlooked? That's my biggest concern because if they're going to be overlooked, I'd rather not have the school. The school is to be for everybody. But overall. I think the school is needed." Anderson said.

Councilwoman Susana Thompson said that a lottery system guarantees low-income families a spot during enrollment.

That means we're getting close."

The fair association spent much of the weekend putting up banners and preparing most of the 65-acre lot for 11 days of rides, food, exhibits and fun. The fair opens on March 30 and runs through April 9.

The skeleton for the rollercoaster was going up on Monday, while workers also started to piece together the Sea Ray and the fair's newest attraction, Crazy Mouse. Hyder, however, was excited to learn after years of asking, Deggeller found space on the Midway for its 90-foot Super Slide.

Fair-goers can still grab a deal ahead of opening ceremonies. Gate admission is reduced by \$4 to \$8 if they're bought in advance at the fair's website, claycountyfair.org. Also, ride armbands

can be purchased in advance for \$17 every night except Saturdays. Armband prices vary, ranging from \$12 on opening day to \$30 on Saturdays.

The fair also has two family packages. For \$50, a family can receive four admission tickets and two armbands that can be used on any day except Saturdays. Also, for \$100, a family can get six gate admissions and four ride armbands for any day except Saturdays. A gate pass for all 11 days is available in advance for \$75.

With rides already taking shape, the fairgrounds will be busy with home arts, horticulture, fair theme and 4-H projects being submitted on March 26-27. Chickens, pigs and rabbits will arrive on March 29, while cattle will be delivered on April 3. "We're already in fair mode," Hyder said. "It's going to be busy for the next three weeks. This is the best time for me – getting things in place and watching it all come together.'



As Municipal Super Tuesday approaches, some 2024 candidates start campaigns

CLAY COUNTY - As Keystone Heights and Orange Park residents prepare to vote during Municipal Super Tuesday on April 11, several county constitutional officers are already looking toward the 2024 General Election.

Supervisor of Elections Chris Chambless, County Tax Appraiser Tracy Drake and Clerk of Court and Comptroller Tara Green all have announced their intentions to seek re-election. Sheriff, tax collector, superintendent, three county commission seats and two school board spots will also be on the ballot. Candidates for those seats still have until June 2024 to qualify.

Chambless decided to announce early since his office will be busy planning for the General Election next year.

"My duties and responsibilities require my full attention, which is why I have filed early for re-election as your Supervisor of Elections," he posted. "If you believe, like I do, that Clay County is best served by a fis-

cal conservative who fiercely upholds the Florida election code with a proven track record of accurate, transparent elections versus the lawlessness and numerous problems found in some jurisdictions."

Drake announced because he wants to concentrate on Florida's ever-changing property tax laws.

"I have worked for the Clay County Property Appraiser's Office for 30 years and understand that the effective administration of a mass appraisal office re-

Green offered a simple reason to announce early: "I love what I do and want to keep doing it. I work with some amazing people, and we still have things to get done.

Voters in Keystone Heights will vote by mail, Chambless said, because Nina Rodenroth is running unopposed for Seat 4 after Mayor Karen Lake termed out.

While there are no candidates on the

ballot, voters still will be asked to decide on four charter amendments to the city charter. The first would amend the charter to allow a majority of the city council to set the maximum purchasing amount for bids.

The second would prohibit city council members from interfering with routine operations by the city manager. The third would change the way the mayor's role is determined. Currently, residents vote for four people on the council and the mayor, but the amendment would change it to the election of five city council members, with the council selecting who would serve as mayor.

The fourth would create a procedure in the city charter to censure or reprimand a council member for illegal or serious violations of city policy.

In Orange Park, voters can vote by mail, in person or early, where Doug Bennefiled and Kenny Radwanski are vying for Seat 1 on the Town Council. Susan Sandlin is unopposed for Seat 2. The only poll that will be open is at Town Hall.

Group: Chemical levels at military bases near Clay County seven times higher than at **Camp Lejeune**

CLAY COUNTY – Throughout the 20thcentury, the U.S. Army's mismanagement of toxic substances has irremediably impacted the lives of countless individuals who lived and served on severely contaminated military bases. In cases like North Carolina's infamous Camp Lejeune, close to one million residents were unintentionally exposed to chemical hazards for over three decades in the form of volatile organic compounds leaching from decaying oil, solvents, degreasers, and industrial chemicals.

With more than 60 toxic contaminants identified on the base's grounds, Camp Lejeune was designated as a Superfund site, only remaining operational due to ongoing cleanup projects and periodic site reviews.

Although Congress and the Department of Veterans Affairs have actively sought to address these issues, passing laws and establishing eligibility criteria for servicerelated exposure, specific hazards with the potential for long-lasting harm remain largely unaccounted for. Per/poly-fluoroalkyl substances are one such hazard, commonly known as "forever chemicals" because they don't decompose.

PFAS was the primary ingredient in aqueous-film-forming foam), a type of fire suppressant used by the military since the 70s in training scenarios and to put our difficult fuel blazes. However, since they don't break down naturally and are environmentally persistent, PFAS can build up in the body and lead to several types of cancer, thyroid issues, lower birth weights, decreased vaccine efficiency in children and higher blood pressure in pregnant women. In 2016, the EPA set a lifetime advisory level for the most prevalent PFAS compounds of only 70 parts per trillion.

Due to the army's extensive use of AFFF in previous decades, "forever chemicals" were found on the premises of over 700 bases across the US. Florida alone hosts more ethan 20 such installations, many exceeding concentrations reported at Camp Lejeune, including NAS Cecil Field and NAS Jacksonville.

Coincidentally, both bases were listed as Superfund sites in 1989. For many veterans and military families, the time they spent on contaminated bases incurred a heavy toll.

stay, she suffered two miscarriages and was diagnosed with breast cancer years after leaving the base. While multiple toxic agents were identified at NAS Jacksonville, none came close to the levels of PFAS uncovered in 2018.

Currently, my associates are reviewing close to 200 toxic claims from Clay County veterans and their relatives. Like Jane, many were stationed on bases where PFAS contamination was later confirmed and developed afflictions consistent with exposure to these ubiquitous contaminants.

Despite the risks they represent, the U.S. Army's attitude towards "forever chemicals" began shifting only over the past decade due to the growing body of clinical evidence indicating their toxicity. Since they were originally believed to be benign, exposure to PFAS didn't factor into the VA's long-term considerations of service members' health. In august 2022, Congress passed the Honoring Our PACT Act with near unanimous support. The bill seeks to improve access to adequate benefits and compensation for veterans and relatives who developed diseases due to toxic exposure on contaminated bases.

Even though the PACT Act is widely regarded as a significant step forward, the bill doesn't completely cover the health risks associated with emerging contaminants. While more than 20 new conditions are now afforded a service-related status.

the VA still doesn't consider PFAS-related illnesses like thyroid and prostate cancer as presumptive of toxic exposure.

Since different toxins can trigger similar conditions, clinically determining which of the many chemical hazards present on bases like NAS Jacksonville or Cecil Field was the actual cause can be financially challenging for many individuals.

Fortunately, the growing awareness regarding PFAS' potential for enduring harm has determined the adoption of several measures that provide promising prospects of higher regulatory involvement. The National Defense Authorization Act will finance vital PFAS remediation projects on the most affected bases around the country. It will also mandate the phasing out of AFFF from military use by late 2024.

Most encouraging of all, the EPA may be the catalyst for future improvements as it prepares to set federally-enforceable standards for "forever chemicals" in drinking water this fall. In June 2022, the agency updated its advisories for PFAS compounds to reflect the dangers they represent, even in minuscule amounts, slashing what it deems acceptable to under 0.02 ppt

ORANGE PARK - Clay Humane, a nonprofit veterinary clinic in Orange Park, is asking for donations to care for Trevor, an injured Border Collie mix found by Clay County Animal Services on Jan. 21.

"Clav County Animal Services transferred Trevor to us. He came in lame on his left hind leg with a deep laceration in his neck, more than likely from an embedded collar," explained Clay Humane Executive Director Linda Welzant. "He had little fur and a severe skin infection affecting the entire body due to malnutrition and neglect.'

Trevor is recovering from a cranial cruciate ligament repair. With the help of heavy antibiotics, antiparasitic medi-

cations, pain management, medicinal bathing and quality nourishment, he is healing nicely from all his conditions. While officials don't know the exact circumstances of Trevor's situation. they suspect neglect. Although he has multiple fractures in his tail, they don't believe he was involved in dogfighting.

"Trevor has an exceptional disposition and is good around other animals," said Welzant. "He is a calm and sweet boy who learns quickly and wants to be with you, preferably in your lap."

Trevor is between 5-8 years old and weighs about 60 pounds. He has several potential adopters and will go into a forever home following his recovery over the next few months. The total cost of Trevor's rehabilitation so far is approximately \$4,000.

Clay Education Foundation gives teachers 'Tools' to finish school year

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Monday, March 20, was a planning day for teachers. Even with students home for the day, many planned for the final two months of classes by filling bags with enough school supplies to complete the year.

A steady flow of about 160 teachers moved through a small room stuffed with pens, pencils, glue, hand sanitizer and paper as part of the Clay Education Foundation's Tools 4 Clay program.

Teachers have been able to pick up free supplies four times yearly at Garber Automall and Keystone Heights. For many, it's the type of support that helps them concentrate on education instead of making ends meet. "It really does help, especially when children don't have anything," said Nancy L. Johnson, a seventh-grade reading teacher at Oakleaf Junior High. "We can give them what they need and we can keep teaching. It also means we don't have to go to the parents again."

Johnson came with a shopping list in mind. She wanted tissues, folders, sanitizer and composition books. Thanks to the education foundation and its tireless work to attract donations and matching grant money from the state, school district

"You can never get enough," said Charles E. Bennett fourth-grade teacher Kimberly J. Carter.

Krall said the success of the program depends on the community's generosity.

Garber gave Clay Education Foundation a room at its Pre-Owned Center to store supplies and open its doors four times a year for a shopping spree. The foundation has access to the room all year.



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

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A generation of soldiers who fought in the Vietnam War is dwindling.

Daughters of the American Revolution will provide lapel pins to veterans. The Green Cove Springs-based Dreamland Squadron will conduct a flyover ahead of







Cmd. Master Chief Mack Ellie and the Clay County Public Safety Honor Guard will present colors and lead in the playing of the National Anthem.



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House Civil Justice Subcommittee applauds Florida Clerks' funding measure following Tara Green's comments

For Clay Today

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - A measure that would diversify revenues, support staffing needs and account for services without a dedicated funding source for the Florida clerks received high praise during its first scheduled hearing before the Florida House Civil Justice Subcommittee on March 14

Rep. Adam Botana's (R-Bonita Springs) bill would give Florida's court clerks access to \$31.2 million that would have otherwise flowed to the state's general revenue fund. It's part of a multi-year effort to stabilize a revenue source largely dependent on fines and fees.

Clay County Clerk/Comptroller Tara Green addresses the subcommittee in Tallahassee. Speaking in support of the bill. Green told the committee that Florida's clerks are facing significant challenges in supporting the critical court-related services they perform in their communities.

"The budget that supports our services has only increased by about 1% in the last 10 years," Green said. "Over 90% of the clerks' budget is paid personnel. We are so busy plugging holes in our staffing we often don't have enough time to properly train, manage quality control, and even manage

employees."

Green said these issues threaten accuracy and run the risk of mistakes and increased errors.

"We want our records to be accessible, accurate, and timely and so do many others who rely on our information, including law enforcement, state agencies, the judiciary, and The Florida Bar," Green said.

Green said the bill addresses the gaps in funding that result in all these issues and provides a more stable base.



"Quite honestly, we're here because we are struggling to meet the expectations and obligations we have in our communities and to be there to serve the people when they need us," Green said.

Clerks presented a united front as seven of the 67 came to Tallahassee to waive in support of the measure, including Green, Martin County Clerk and Florida Court Clerks and Comptrollers President Carolyn Timmann, Polk Clerk Stacy Butterfield, Lee Clerk Kevin Karnes, Madison Clerk Billy Washington, St. Lucie Clerk Michelle Miller, Suwannee Clerk Barry Baker and Volusia Clerk Laura Roth.

Members of the committee praised the bill and said they understood the clerks' difficulties.

"I think it's good that we're trying to

ease the financial burden on the clerks. This is a great start, and I look forward to working on it," Rep. Mike Beltran, R-Riverview said.

Rep. Rick Roth, R-West Palm Beach, said the redistributing of funds is a necessary step.

'One of the things I really like to see in legislation is things like redistributing the money back from the general revenue fund

. . . to where it belongs. [F]ees and stuff have been going into general revenue and not staying with the clerks of the court, and I've seen it in other locations," said Rep. Rick Roth (R-West Palm Beach).

The Civil Justice Subcommittee reported the measure favorably by a unanimous 18-0 vote. Its next stop is before the Justice Appropriations Subcommittee.

March perfect time to plant spring flower gardens

Garden Club of Orange Par Birds, Bees, and Butterflies Chairman

ORANGE PARK - March is the perfect month to start planning for your spring flower garden. Take a day and give thought to your plant selection for the upcoming season. Whether you are starting your plants from seed or planning on purchasing them from a big box store or nursery, why not give thought to our insect friends, particularly the butterflies.

Here are some things you might want to consider: Heirloom (old) plant varieties are best. Hybrid and GMO plants were created for our pleasure and consumption, not for the benefit of beneficial insects. In fact, some GMOs are designed to deter insects and are known to kill bees. Make sure you read the label to see if the plant(s) have been treated with pesticides in the neonicotinoid family which you want to avoid purchasing.

Another thing you might want to consider is succession planting. Look at the blooming period for your plant selections. Try to ensure that something is in bloom throughout the growing season. Plants that I have successfully grown in our area, and are sure to attract a host of insects, especially butterflies are: the old-fashioned zinnias (the taller the better); black-eyed Susans are easy to grow and will come back year after year; cone flowers--while they can be a bit fussy, are excellent butterfly plants; cleomes (spider plants) add a bit of pizzaz to the garden; and, last but not least are the pentas, the tall red ones are preferred by several of our local butterfly species.

batic Contest from March 23-25. Aerobatic pilots throughout the Southeast will join the contest's five categories of difficulties: Primary, Sportsman, Intermediate, Advanced and Unlimited, based on their flight proficiency.

The USA team will use the contest as a preliminary practice for the World Advanced Aerobatic Championship in late October. "These members were picked last year at Nationals and will be competing in the Advanced category in October this year in Las Vegas," said Hector Ramirez, president of International Aerobatic Club Chapter 89 and contest director of Snowbird Classic Aerobatic Contest.

Though the competition is not open to the public, visitors can watch from outside the airport fence boundary at the FBO airport building. Overall, the International Aerobatic Club is a division of the Experimental Aircraft Association that promotes the safety and enjoyment of aerobatics. In addition, the Keystone Heights Airport has been active in the aerobatic community for many years, as it is one of the few remaining airports in the state to have an aerobatic box. Local musicians, community rally to support 'Nugget' Dani-Lynn

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Her situation is dire, but her smile remains radiant. While others worry, Dani-Lynn giggles.

The community will come together on April 1 to put another smile on the 7-yearold's face in a day-long music fest at The Corner Pocket to provide financial and emotional support for the girl battling three heart ailments.

The girl joined Paul Wane's Rising Star Family in 2019. The program provides musical instruments to give children an alternative to playing video games and getting into trouble.

Wane will be joined by many of his friends to raise money and support for the little girl in what he calls "Keeping Faith." There will be free concerts, a pool tournament, a silent auction, raffles and vendors to help the family pay for mounting medical bills – and the inevitable decision to move Dani-Lynn into Hospice.

"We want to make our 'Nugget' shine," Wane said.

The Music lineup will include Wane's Duval County Line, Curt Towne, Doc Moccasin, Remedy and Emily Anne Faith.

Wane, Towne and artist Lyneke collaborated to create a custom guitar that will be one of several items raffled. The guitar will be displayed at Towne's Guitar Station at

421 Walnut St. in Green Cove Springs until the fundraiser.

Wane gained national notoriety in January when he played the "Star-Spangled Banner" ahead of the Jacksonville Jaguars-Tennessee Titans game. Within minutes national media outlets were posting stories on the impressive performance.

Dani-Lynn was diagnosed with HLHS, VSD and PAPVR. She's already been through two major surgeries, and a transplant isn't likely to be successful. "She has half of a heart, a hole in her heart, and poor left lung function," said her mother, Amelia Early.

Currently, there is no cure for her heart disease.

"She always has a smile on her face," her mother said last month. "She's never met a stranger and loves life," Early said. Dani-Lynn loves her sisters, misses her teachers and friends, and has a big heart for helping others. She dreams of being a heart doctor when she grows up."

The political, legal and environmental saga continued after a resident eyewitnessed excavation on the property two weeks ago. County Commissioner Kristen Burke also received a fresh batch of emails from current and former residents, which she forwarded to Florida Rep. Sam Garrison (R-Fleming Island), the FDEP and Clay Today. The complaints detailed severe health and quality of life issues.

In addition, an anonymous expert provided email testimony on a scientific report relating to the plant from 2022.

The latest significant political development was this:

Florida Sen. Jennifer Bradley (R-Fleming Island) and Garrison spoke with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection during a 90-minute phone call on March 16.

The sale of the property was to be finalized between Stoneridge Farms and Danhour Group CEO Micheal Danhour on Monday, March 20, the FDEP told Bradley and Garrison.

William D. Preston, a Tallahassee-based attorney representing Stoneridge Farms and Danhour, did not return a phone call from Clay Today to confirm whether the sale occurred.

One thing seems to be certain for now: the consent order for Solite won't be amended, FDEP confirmed to officials.

That could change if the sale to Danhour is completed, but it will continue to be upheld until Bradley and Garrison wait to hear back from the FDEP. A moratorium was passed on placing residential zoning on the property at the BCC's Nov. 22 meeting.

The consent order applies to all 900 acres, but only 264 acres are currently being tested under the FDEP's current work plan. That's is because the agency believes the remaining acreage is clean, Burke said.

The consent order won't be modified unless Burke, Bradley, Garrison and residents get advanced notice, and if another purchaser were to buy the parcel, the status of the consent order would not change, Burke confirmed to Clay Today.

New evidence was provided to the state agency during a recent phone call meeting that included Burke, County Attorney Courtney Grimm, County Manager Howard Wannamaker, three ex-employees of Solite and the FDEP.

"(Not) testing the remaining acreage is what we have a problem with, and FDEP still feels that the remaining acreage has been clean since 2006. (The recent evidence provided by ex-employees) is (why) we have a problem with (no current testing on the remaining acreage), due to the new information provided to the FDEP from the ex-employees (testimony) and residents (emails)," Burke said.

Other details from the meeting also reveal one significant concern: Danhour or Stoneridge Farms are currently allowed to clear-cut the property. Because of that, Bradley and Garrison expressed their concern to the FDEP.

"So their question to the FDEP was, 'What are we supposed to tell the residents as they are upset and fearful as we know contaminants are most likely in the moisture in the trees, and that if the trees are disturbed, the contaminants can get into our waterways and air?" Burke said in a social media post to the local Facebook group, Save Russell Landing/Stop Toxic Solite last week.

After the meeting, Bradley and Garrison told Burke they told the FDEP it was important for a third party to conduct an independent study of the property.

The legislators further stressed the consent order wouldn't be modified, and neither the state agency nor anyone else could stop the property sale.

Bradley, Garrison, and Burke, County Commissioners and Grimm are seeking to have the remaining 600 acres tested by an independently-hired consultant.

Then, there's the other piece of the puzzle: what has happened at the property over the last two weeks?

Danhour and the FDEP conducted a walk-through of the property on Wednesday, March 8, at one of the 14 areas identified by ex-employees as zones that could be potentially marked as contaminated on the map.

Danhour and the FDEP discovered either one or multiple fiberglass barrels. The number of barrels found wasn't disclosed, according to Burke.

On Wednesday, March 17, representatives of Golder, an agency that conducts environmental testing and assessments, were on the property. Solite has been a client of the company for several years.

During their stroll through the property, Golder checked peninsulas that connect to the main lake bordering the plant's central operation.

The waterways are believed to be part of a system of ponds, peninsulas and lakes designed to hide the containers and toxic chemicals, according to ex-employee and Solite whistleblower Micheal Zelinka.

While the nearby lake is believed to be more than 100 feet deep and contain items like cars, trucks and boom lines, Golder tested at only a depth of eight feet in the peninsulas, Burke said.

A truck also returned to the site on Monday, March 20.

Area resident Dan Mills, whose home borders the alleged toxic site on Buckeye Road, provided an eyewitness account of the vehicles entering and exiting the property. He also talked with employees.

"We saw a piece of equipment go in on a trailer, a truck hauling a mini-excavator. Then, a little while after, there was another truck behind it. They were there for several hours. We could hear them, and it sounded like it was all going on around the lake. Then, five to six hours later, they were coming out, so I went down and talked to them. They said they were digging test holes to make samples. (The employee) elaborated a little bit, and another gentleman in another truck said that he was a 'geo tech' guy and that they were taking samples to the lab to be tested," he said. Then, his account from just three days ago: "The white truck, the second truck that came in (the first time), was coming out of the property at 8:30 a.m.," Mills said.

Mills said he had similar interactions with surveyors in 2017, 2018 and a month ago. Six or seven years ago, one employee told Mills they were surveying the property where homes would eventually be built.

Construction isn't allowed while the moratorium and consent order is in place.

More pejorative details are now in the "Solite Files" from scathing emails from 14 current and/or former residents obtained by Clay Today that allege horrific mishaps by the company.

Lee Bishop grew up on CR 209-B in the 1980s and 1990s, where he and friends would sneak on the property to play and explore, mainly around Doctor Ira Drive.

"We would climb on big dirt hills around the lakes. When the water was low, you could see the tops of trucks and tractors in the bottom of the ponds," he said.

Bishop said he and his friends would stick to areas 10, 11, and 12 on the Solite map and that a tall dirt perimeter ran along the fence line where barrels are believed to be hidden. Bishop also said ormer ponds that are no longer on the map used to exist.

"They built tall dirt walls around the edge of the property. Crazy that my playground was toxic a dump," he wrote to Burke.

Robert Ownby has lived in the area since 1984, shifting from 1776 Oak Grove Dr. to the corner of CR 209-A and North Fork Road in 1992. The two properties in the Solite area are just 1.8 miles apart.

He served as a firefighter on the Lake Asbury Volunteer Fire Department in the mid-1980s, where he and other volunteers would go to Solite to train and familiarize themselves with the area.

"I remember seeing rows and rows of 55-gallon drums and the smell of chemicals in the air. It was spooky to me," Ownby said. "I just had an unsettling feeling about the place. I've always wondered why we never received any (service) calls to Solite. No accidents, fires, or chemical spills over the years."

After moving to Oak Grove Drive, he heard scraping clay from the ground.

"It sounded like they were coming through the bedroom wall," he said.

"Treetops appeared bright, reddish and orange glow. There seemed to be a white, mist-like substance emitting from the glow."

He later learned kilns operated at full speed during nighttime, nicknamed "balls to the wall," according to Zelinka.

Another witness that provided email testimony to FDEP was former American military hero Henry Danley, a retired Command Master Chief for the U.S. Navy stationed at NAS Cecil Field from 1987-1992.

After earning his position as Command Master Chief, Danley said he took the opportunity to question one of the personnel loading a truck, inquiring what the material was.

The employee told him it was oil laced with toxic PCBs scheduled to be destroyed by fire at Solite.

"This was and still is of great concern to

me since I lived at 2974 Russell Road," he said. The home is just a stone's throw from Solite: west and across the railroad tracks of the entrance of the former plant.

"Their burning of the oil left residue on my vehicles and there were times when the air would be full of smelly, oily smoke and raining ash," he said.

Patricia Foss relocated to Green Cove Springs with her husband, Doug, in the mid-1980s. After she started noticing suspicious signs at the plant in the late 1980s, health problems possibly linked to the plant began to arise in her family.

"My immediate family endured multiple symptoms, including heart, digestive issues and cancer. My son, Douglas, has been affected by Bradycardia, which has resulted in five pacemakers since the age of 16. I have had four lumps removed from my breasts and various treatments," Foss said.

Also, her daughter, Kimberly, who was 13 years old, was diagnosed with Giardiasis, which Giardia forms. This tiny parasite is found in soil, food and water that was contaminated with feces, and died two years ago from Ventricular fibrillation, a dangerous type of arrhythmia or irregular heartbeat.

Her husband suffers from heart issues as well.

Debbi Spradlin moved to the neighborhood in 1983.

"Our little neighborhood was in shock when we started noticing an occasional tanker truck with crossed bones and 'Hazardous' on the sides of the tankers heading into Solite down a tiny road alongside the railroad tracks late at night. It wasn't long until the same tankers, all with out-of-state plates, became more noticeable and multiplying in number," she said.

She knew that something wasn't right.

"The General Manager of Solite, John Kuiken, after Solite closed, told me personally that there was so much hazardous waste buried in barrels all over the property, that it would not be habitable in our grandchildren's, their grandchildren's, or their grandchildren's lifetime. Sadly, he passed away from cancer last October," she said.

Burke said she would like to focus on three main goals.

First, it would be to verify that the FDEP is still actively managing the portion of the Solite property under the consent order and does not allow for residential usage until a complete clean-up is done.

Then, the commissioner said she would like to work with FDEP to review the rest of the property based on the widespread allegations of chemical dumping.

"If contamination is verified, then the rest of the property would also not be suitable for residential use until properly cleaned up," she said.

Next, she would like to work with FDEP to investigate potential violations stemming from stormwater runoff from the former Solite property through the canal and into Black Creek.

Afterward, guests can enjoy a dessert while enjoying each other's company and





"It's been good. We've had two so far this year, and they both averaged about 50 participants," Rodgers said. "We're happy






with the outcome."

Japanese exchange student etches her mark on community

FLEMING ISLAND – "My name is Sakura Inoue. I'm from Aichi Prefecture, which is in the middle part of Japan," she said straightforwardly.

Inoue came to the United States in January. She lives with her host parents in Middleburg and attends Fleming Island High through a partnership with Green Greenheart Exchange. This non-profit organization finds host families for international high school students.

In about two months, Sakura has significantly impacted her new community, painting calligraphy for Koushinryou Curry and Sando, a local Japanese Restaurant in Jacksonville. Koushinryou specializes in Japanese sandwiches and curry, the national dish of Japan, and is located in Pablo Station.

An employee familiar with Inoue's work from local events offered to put Chef Levi Broadwell in touch with Inoue to do calligraphy for the restaurant.

"I wasn't sure if she would be interested in it or not, but I asked her for her contact information, and to my surprise, she was super excited," Broadwell said.

Broadwell had been looking for someone to do calligraphy for his new restaurant sign. Inoue did the work for the sign, and she drew calligraphy on the back of the seats.

"Since the beginning of 2023, I went to Mr. Levi's restaurant three or four times," Inoue said. "I worked on the signs, and I worked on the tables and backs of chairs. For almost two or three months, I have been working on calligraphy work at the restaurant."

Japanese Calligraphy, or Shodo, is "the way of artistic handwriting or beautiful writing." It is traditionally done with ink and brush, the tools which create the form's flowing, cursive style.

The art came from China around 2000 years ago but was adopted by Japan. It is still widely taught in traditional Japanese elementary schools.

"The most important role of calligraphy was communicating, but now we don't use it to communicate as much. It's more of a symbol of Japanese culture. It was important for communication many years ago, but now it is more symbolic," Inoue said.

However, many families enroll their children in calligraphy classes to improve handwriting skills, a symbol of both education and professionalism. Inoue started taking private calligraphy lessons nine years ago.

"When I was in Japan, in my private class, I would have to work on my calligraphy for two or three hours. It was very long. And when I went to my calligraphy camp, I would have to work almost all day long. I got used to a lot of work," she said.

"My calligraphy teacher was really strict, but thanks to him, my calligraphy skills really improved. Calligraphy has been a hobby and a big interest of mine for

many years."

Now her calligraphy will be on display for years.

Besides being an artist, Sakura is an A student taking English, government and American history. She is on the track team and loves her yearbook class.

"I have been taking those classes since the beginning of the year. My teachers and my friends are very kind to me. There are many differences between my Japanese school and Fleming Island High School, but it has been really great so far," she said.

Inoue also participated in World of Nations, an annual international festival in Jacksonville and one of North Florida's largest multicultural festivals, featuring exhibitions and events from various countries.

"There are many countries at the event and I was working on Calligraphy at the Japanese booth. It was very exciting," she said.

After graduating from high school, Sakura plans to pursue international relations and diplomacy.


"I want to learn about international relationships between many countries so that we can make a peaceful world. I am learning a lot about the relationship between America and Japan," she said. "I don't think calligraphy is going to be my work. It's more like a hobby, but from this experience, I get to introduce my calligraphy to the world. It became part of my dream."

Many foreign exchange students come to the United States for an American high school experience and English language immersion. They embrace our culture and share their own.

"This is just one example of that," said Greenheart High Exchange Coordinator Coordinator, Wanda Cox.

Clay County and the Industrial Revolution

CLAY COUNTY – The second phase of the Industrial Revolution (1850-1940) came to Clay County via the railroads, and the railroads and steamboats came tourism. The county saw a boom in tourism and agriculture.

Once Henry Flagler and Henry Plant completed railroads in Florida, northern visitors, our original "snowbirds," flocked here in droves, some even in private railcars.

Transportation

Steamboats, the essential steam-powered means of transportation, ruled the St. Johns River and Black Creek. The sound of their whistles, each different from the other, floated over the water. Graceful, steampowered paddle wheelers created churned waves that washed over the riverbank.

Suddenly, grand hotels started popping up beside the Spring and along the banks of the St. Johns River.

Hotels

The Magnolia Hotel was the grandest of all, with its third version standing as a massive four-story structure with an indoor spring-fed swimming pool, a ballroom, and wraparound porches. The grounds boasted tennis courts and a golf course that used Civil War-era Union trenches as sand traps. National golf and tennis champions like Richard Sears and Clarence Hobart came and played in tournaments. One of those trophies is on display at the county courthouse, as are hotel keys, photos, and other items found at the former site.

Those porches captured the cool winter breezes. The scenery entertained hotel guests and visitors like Thomas Alva Edison, President Chester Arthur, President Ulysses Grant, President Grover Cleveland, John Murray Forbes, William Morris Hunt and Harriet Beecher Stowe.

In its early history, the hotel's (1850-1870s) guests were Northerners active in the abolitionist and suffragist movements. The hotel's second owner, Dr. Seth Rogers, was Susan B. Anthony's cousin.

The hotel offered state-of-the-art amenities like gourmet food, fresh milk and dairy products, hot water, a phonograph donated by Edison, and lights inspected by Edison. He seemed to enjoy his visit, although he did complain about lunch one day.

Farming

Meanwhile, back at the farm, engines replaced animal and human muscle. In Clay County, especially in the early 1900s, large-scale farming and ranching took place. Florida Farm & Industries (FF&I) held tens of thousands of acres on which they ran hundreds of head of cattle and operated a dairy. Recent scientific discoveries improved the soil with new types of fertilizer, creating greener and healthier pastures.

FF&I also had a full-scale cannery on site and used to can crops of tomatoes and other vegetables. A narrow gauge railway ran from Longbranch, now known as Penney Farms, to Green Cove Springs. Railroads made it much easier to harvest fresh fruits and other crops and get them to northern markets unspoiled. The Atlantic Coast Line railroad, which had routed all over the state, played a crucial role in transporting farm products and people.

Large sawmills like the Dowling-Shands Lumber Mill were located near railways and waterways. Timber was shipped down Black Creek on rafts pulled by steamboats, then cut and milled into planks, barrel staves, shingles, and other products. The mill could produce 1,000 barrels a day at full production speed. The cutting capacity in the day shift was 3,000,000 feet a month. The planer's capacity was 1,000,000 feet a month. A.G. Shands later went on to build the original Shands Bridge.

E.I. DuPont began phosphate-mining operations near Camp Blanding using steam-powered shovels. Today, the mine produces titanium, ilmenite, kyanite, leucoxene, rutile and zircon.

Camphor trees

A little community known as Waller, located near Camp Blanding, was once home to E.I. DuPont's 12,000-acre camphor farm. Camphor is a white, crystalline substance with an aromatic smell and bitter taste in certain essential oils. Obtained especially from the wood and bark of the camphor tree, it was used as an ointment, a mild topical analgesic in medicine, as a plasticizer and as an insect repellent.

By 1916, there were 400 acres planted with mature camphor trees and another 350 acres of seedlings. By 1919, 2000 acres of camphor trees grew.

Camphor was also an essential ingredient in gunpowder and fireworks. Alfred Nobel's 1877 explosive creation of Ballistite, also known as smokeless gunpowder, required camphor. Camphor stabilized the explosives against decomposition and spontaneous explosions.

The trouble was that, before this decade, Japan controlled the world market on camphor. In 1919, the United States imported over a million dollars worth of camphor. WWI created a considerable demand for gunpowder, and the price rose to \$3.75 a pound. The solution was to grow trees in Florida and produce our camphor supply. Unfortunately, the tree is an invasive species, just like so many other plants and animals in Florida. The trees at the DuPont farm were not allowed to grow tall because of the inconvenience of harvesting. It took about six years for a tree to grow large enough to use for camphor production. Leaves and twigs were distilled. That produced about one pound of camphor crystals from every 100 pounds of twigs and leaves. Almost as soon as DuPont got the Waller plant ready, a process for producing synthetic camphor was invented. In 1921, DuPont's chemists made synthetic camphor from the turpentine of Southern pine stumps. The price of camphor plunged, and Clay County was left with acres and acres of a beautiful but invasive tree.

Electricity

Electrical grids came to Clay County

Four face additional charges following jailhouse brawl

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - An argument between two inmates on March 10 led to the attack of one of the men by four others, including three who were in jail on murder charges.

According to a five-page arrest report, Dontae Cameron Reid and Bernard Reese got into a confrontation in the B4 Wing of the Clay County Jail. Reese punched Reid in the face before Deshaun Michael Green, Kyle Randelston, Qwentin Deshaun Simmons and Daveion Austin joined in the attack.

Reid also sustained several stab wounds to his back and the back of his head. He was transported to HCA Florida Orange Park Hospital for treatment.

The fight started when Austin entered Reid's jail cell while he was asleep. He said Austin said he wanted to use his cell so he could talk to somebody in another dorm. Reid told Austin not to sneak up on him while he was asleep, and that started the argument.

Reese then attacked Reid to trigger the

melee.

Surveillance video showed Simmons striking Reid's back with a weapon, but nothing was recovered. Simmons told deputies, "You're not going to find it. I got rid of it.'

Deputies believe the weapon was either a pencil or pen. Simmons, who was in jail after being charged with six counts of attempted murder, aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer, firefighter or EMT, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and attempted murder of a law enforcement officer after he fired at U.S. Marshals agents and deputies with the Clay County Sheriff's Office and officers with the Green

Cove Springs Police Department. On Dec. 16 when they tried to apprehend him during school hours near Green Cove Springs Junior High and Charles E. Bennett Elementary, Simmons fired randomly at law enforcement while he tried to escape on a bicvcle.

He now faces an additional charge of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon.

Austin, Reese, Green and Randelston all were charged with aggravated battery in iail.

Green was in jail after being charged with second-degree murder after Jandel Rodriguez was shot while walking on Claremont Avenue in Orange Park on Jan. 2,

2022.

Randelston was arrested for jail fight on Feb. 26, in 2021, and for two counts attempted murder for shooting .380 into a Sweet 16 party on Vine Street on April 10, 2020. There were 20-to-30 people at the party when a fight broke out in the living room after someone commented about somebody's nose ring. One man was shot in abdomen, another in the back.

CCSO arrested Austin following Nov. 17, 2020, armed robbery in Green Cove Springs. Felony murder charges were then added after 18-year-old Skyler Townsend was shot on Center Street during the robbery. Reese was charged with murder and possession of a concealed weapon after the Orange Park Police Department said he shot his brother in the back with a gun he bought to threaten someone to stop "hitting" on his cousin.

He was in the bedroom with his brother when he pulled the trigger and it discharged. He told police he forgot he had a bullet in the chamber. Reid was arrested on Jan. 27 and charged with stalking and making threats against his former fiancée.

Record-setting Christian band, Casting Crowns, to headline at Fair

Band has sold more than 12 million records, earned 18 Dove Awards

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The popular Christian band Casting Crowns took a unique approach to release their latest collection of songs. January 2022 saw the release of the seven-song EP "Healer." Those seven songs have been released on a deluxe version of "Healer," adding seven more pieces to complete a 14-song fulllength album.

The band, which will play at the Clay County Agriculture Fair on Monday, April 3, has been a leader in ticket demand, according to Fair Executive Director Tasha Hyder.

Mark Hall, lead singer and main songwriter for the group, chose this approach because of how many people consume music.

"The reason I did it this way, it was my idea, is that people will get your record. They listen to it for a week, and they're like, 'OK, when's your new record coming out?' Hall said in a recent phone interview. "I just thought, man, there are so many things we're talking about, and so many themes that we're hitting here (on "Healer"), I want to space this out. I want people to digest some of the songs, live with these songs, and then give them the other half."

So now, as Casting Crowns follows up a fall tour with an extensive run of shows this spring, all 14 songs written for the project are together on the deluxe version of "Healer." That's enabling the band to tweak the set list for this latest installment of the "Healer" tour.

"The first seven songs came out for that (spring 2022) tour. But the second seven have come out now," Hall said. "So we're going through and looking at some of the (new) ones we want to play for everybody."

Hall and his bandmates select which "Healer" songs to perform judiciously. Most of the set will be drawn from a cat-

alog with more than 20 top 10 Christian music singles, including 11 chart-toppers. The consistent ability to write hit singles has made Casting Crowns one of Christian music's most popular and long-

running acts.

Hall formed the band in 1999 with Hall, and the current lineup includes guitarists Juan DeVevo and Josh Mix, violinist Melodee DeVevo, bassist John Michael Hall (the frontman's son), keyboardist/accordionist Megan Garrett and drummer Jack Williams.

After releasing two independent albums, Casting Crowns signed to Beach Street Records. In 2003, they made a significant breakthrough with their third album, a self-titled effort that became one of the fastest-selling national debuts in Christian music history. The band has remained at the forefront of Christian music since, with seven of the eight subsequent albums debuting atop the Christian albums chart. The one album that failed to reach that mark, "Only Jesus," reached No. 2.

The group has sold more than 12 million copies of its albums, winning a Grammy award, four American Music Awards and 18 Dove awards (Christian Music's highest honor).

The 14 songs came to explore a variety of ways healing happens through God. The title track speaks to how people sometimes seek comfort and healing through social movements, political candidates, or internet influencers instead of turning to the only true healer, Jesus. "Anything But Easy" is about bringing loved ones to Jesus, no matter what challenges must overcome. "Scars In Heaven" (a top 10 single from the first half of "Healer") is about healing after the death of a friend and how that process can come in unexpected ways.

Such messages are within songs that fit the Casting Crowns' trademark brand of uplifting, anthemic pop ballads filled with inviting melodies, burnished instrumental tones and layered choir-like harmony and backing vocals.

With the pandemic upending life every-

late in the game. Ed Wiggins, as described on his WWI draft card, was a slight man with grey eyes and gray hair at 36. This unassuming man electrified Clay County – literally.

In 1924, Wiggins was running a hardware store in Green Cove Springs when the founders of Keystone Heights, the Lawrence Development Company, asked him to come down and help with the plumbing and electrical work at the new Keystone Inn. He ended up owning the town's electrical plant – if you can call it that.

It was a diesel Delco generator with a few lines stretched across poles and through trees. It was an unreliable system, flickering, and so on. A gust of wind or the wrong bird on a wire would cause total blackouts. People kept their kerosene lanterns nearby. really want to talk about how he is the true healer."

In 1936, the electric company's power plant had grown to 115 kilowatts. The distribution system grew to 100 miles of line. The community was deep into the Great Depression, and Keystone Heights' population had barely reached 320 people.

On Dec. 9, 1937, the Clay Electric Cooperative was incorporated. The first member meeting was on Dec. 21, 1937, where it all started: the Keystone Inn.

Today the Cooperative is one of the largest in the United States, and the headquarters are still in Keystone Heights. There are approximately 183,000 member-owned accounts, and its service area stretches into 14 North Florida counties with more than 13,000 miles of distribution and transmission lines.

Harry Horton was an enterprising inventor and forward thinker. He invented a refrigeration "contraption" to keep perishables fresh during shipment, ran a steampowered sawmill, and had the first car and the telephone in Orange Park.

Flores, Keester earn Bob Hayes titles

JACKSONVILLE – Fleming Island High distance runner John Keester IV turned the trick for a third Bob Hayes title while teammate Gabrielle Flores endured wet, sloppy conditions to win the high jump as area track athletes not only competed against the best athletes in Florida, but also had weather factors throughout the Saturday festival of events. The annual event, the 58th running on Saturday, has recently moved from its historical venue of Raines High School, who has staged the meet since 1968 in honor of NFL and Olympic sprint legend Bob Hayes, to the state of the art track facility at University of North Florida.

"We think the move to University of North Florida was a great move for the enhancement of the meet as was evident by this being one of our biggest athlete participation in recent history even with the bad weather," said Henry Smith, a 25-year veteran of staging the Bob Hayes Memorial Invitational with its long history at Raines High School now being elevated with the world class track at UNF. "Greg Coleman, the event director who took over after coach James Day passed last year, has made the transition a world class move into a world class facility. We saw the world class performances like never before just like we used to see every year at Raines. On Saturday, the 4 x 400 and the 100 meters, the two showcase events, were the highlights of the meet."

Top local performances for the day were a third 3200 meter title to Keester IV who ran a 9:42.29 split to outdistance Fleming Island teammate Jacob Campbell who was runnerup at 9:55.02; a high jump title to Flores who won with a 5'-.25" leap to win by two inches and a courageous elite mile run by Fleming Island's Graham Myers, who led the entire race, extended on the final lap, but could not hold off a late charge from Mandarin's Gavin Nelson who won by .16 seconds with a 4:18.41. Myers time; 4:18.57, was a new school record for Fleming Island.

In the sprints, Oakleaf's Evan Brown continued his strong season of sub-11 second splits in the 100 meters as he finished fifth in 10.81 against an elite field that was won with three runners at the front all under 10.60; winner Brandon Bennette of American Heritage, just a freshman, in 10.51. In second and third,

Nesi: Flagler record 5K

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. - Fleming Island High track and cross country graduate Kameron Wallizada, a sophomore track runner at the University of North Florida now, blasted an incredible 60 second final lap of a track 10K (6.2 miles) race on his home track to lead a 1-2-3 finish for Osprey runners at the River City Classic season opener on Thurs., March 16.

"I just felt good and wanted to win the race," said Wallizada, who was among a four-man pack near the bell lap when he revved up his engine for the incredible finish to win the event in 30 minutes, 50.51 seconds. "I've been training hard with Aiden O'Gorman and the rest of the team and the payoff was tonight."

UNF track coach Jeff Pigg commented that Wallizada's performance, though exciting and dramatic, was not much of a surprise.

"He's a tough kid," said Pigg. "He's got a strong character and I don't have to worry about the little stuff of readiness. He's also hungry to do well. One big thing is he is not afraid to hurt. Sometimes, he works too hard, but we keep him easy on the easy days."

Also at the River City Classic, in the 5000 meters (3.1 miles), former Ridgeview High track standout Joel Nesi, now a sophomore at Flagler College, shredded the Flagler track record in his event with a sixth place finish in 14:32.82 with two Florida State University runners taking the top two spots in 14:15.81 and 14:18.87.

For Flagler, also in the 5K, Oakleaf High grad A'Jani Stokes finished 34th in 16:30.18.

Just a week ago, Nesi and teammates Brandon Knieja, Chase McKee and Francisco Ramirez received all-region honors (top five finishers) in the distance medley relay at the 2023 NCAA Division II Indoor Track and Field region championships. Flagler had the third best region time at 10:0815 to break the old record of 10:20.17.

In the 10K, Wallizada blasted away to

finish in a time of 30:50.51 seconds to win the event followed by UNF freshman runners; Paul Lespacio and Cole Perry; in at 30:51.35 and 30:57.39, respectively.

"Kameron [Wallizada] won with a great 60 seconds over the last 400m," said UNF coach Jeff Pigg.

"These guys work their tails off constantly. They are humble, respectful and are hungry. I'm happy for them and so proud of those guys. It was Paul [Lespasio]'s first collegiate race and what a way to start his career."

Pigg noted that Wallizada's 60 second finish was not much of a surprise.

"I knew they were all working together to break 31 minutes and it was a great, cool night to run out there," said Pigg. "The three of them exercised good patience and took turns leading; Kameron maybe doing a bit more than the other two, but he later said when Paul (Lespacio) took off near the end, Kameron said that was what got them trio under 31 minutes. It's good to see a kid like Kameron, who works his butt off, do well."

Cool winds accompanied the North Florida men's track and field team, as it highlighted the outdoor season debut on the home course at Visit Jax Track in Hodges Stadium on Thursday evening. The Osprey men went for personal-best times in several athletic events including the 200m, 1500m, 3000m steeplechase, 5000m and the 10.000m.

Wallizada, who visited the UNF track on Saturday to watch the Bob Hayes Invitational, noted that his training while at North Florida has simply become more simple.

"Consistency, good nutrition and easy runs that are easy," said Wallizada, noted in his high school days as a torrid-paced runner both in competition and in training with his Fleming Island teammates which ultimately led to nagging injuries. "The rest and recovery we are required has been the biggest change."

In the womens 5K, Middleburg High grad Emma Mussante, a sophomore at Florida Southern College, finished eighth in 17:24.37 to break her school's record for the event.

In the women's 10,000 meters, for-



top ranked program in Florida at 10-0 and with a strength of schedule rating of 10.8, the top three teams in Florida; IMG, Stoneman Douglas (7A defending champion) and Archbishop McCarthy, both 9-0 and with strength of schedules of 10.0 are all established as the best teams based on MaxPreps goal of ranking teams based on wins and losses plus opponents within

those records.

Area teams high in state ranks (as of March 16)

According to Maxpreps, the ranking system utilizes the huge number of game results stored in the MaxPreps database. Generally, the more a team wins, the higher the ranking. However, the system takes into account quality wins (against other highly ranked opponents) and strength of schedule.

For 5A-Clay, 8-1 after their win over unbeaten Oakleaf, jumped 13 points to 10th in Florida with a 7.4 strength of schedule rating. Clay is third ranked in Class 5A; Ridgeview at 11th, behind Archbishop McCarthy of Fort Lauderdale and Tampa Jesuit.

Oakleaf, 11th in Class 6A, dropped 18 spots with the Clay loss and sits at 43rd statewide.

St. Johns Country Day School, second in Class 2A to Canterbury (Fort Myers), jumped 12 spots to 20th with their 8-2 record and 8.3 strength of schedule. Spartans coach Tom Lucas has never backed down from a tough schedule and has, in the future. Oakleaf. Providence (twice). Fleming Island, Trinity Christian, Clay, Trinity Christian and Bishop Kenny (beat Clay).

Fleming Island, also 8-1 and ranked 6th in Class 6A, but with a 5.7 strength of schedule, sits at 31st with a 27 spot jump after six wins in the last seven games; a loss to 11th-ranked Providence, and wins over Bolles, Spruce Creek and Buchholz (54th)


