# School board sets rules for restrooms, locker rooms use

Students required to use facilities according to their birth-assigned gender

FLEMING ISLAND – The school board approved a policy requiring students to use restrooms, locker rooms and changing rooms according to their birth-assigned gender.

The measure passed unanimously, but not without much discussion and one final moment of controversy.

Mary Bolla attempted to abstain from

her "yes" decision after casting her vote. Board attorney J. Bruce Bickner suggested she shouldn't change her vote. He wasn't trying to influence her opinion but warned Bolla that changing the vote would require her to complete ethics paper-


work.

The school board member still has her doubts moving forward.

"My concern with this particular policy with an attachment of a punishment is that we are punishing some of our most vulnerable students. These vulnerable students have gone through a lot in their lives. They have not had the support that some of our sons and daughters have. It concerns me that we're going to push the vulnerable

students even deeper into vulnerability," she said.

Violating the policy could result in school detention or potential law enforcement consultation.

# Hurricane prep lasts all year in Green Cove Springs

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Although hurricane season has officially started, the city said it never stopped preparing for the next storm.

Work crews work year-round, ensuring tree branches are being cut back to avoid power lines. They also constantly monitor drains and ditches so they won't face significant challenges when the storm clouds brew.

"We are in a constant state of readiness," said Public Works Director Mike Null. "We always try to stay ready."

Null said Green Cove Springs learned lessons following Hurricane Irma in 2017, but he said the city experienced as much damage from last year's Hurricanes Nicole and

"The water level was three feet higher than normal for Hurricane Irma, but Nicole and Ian did a lot of erosion at the end of some of our right of ways," Null said. "We lost 40 feet of roadway going toward the river. We have grants in design to fix that.



We have an understanding of our storm areas."

Crews will cut trees back for the next three weeks to create a wider swath for

power lines. The city has also tweaked its hazard mitigation plan to raise lift stations and control panels. It's part of our normal pren."

Waterways make up so much of the city's character, especially the St. Johns River and Governors Creek. The challenge is to prepare for the unpredictability of ris-

ing water

"At the beginning of hurricane season, we schedule all of our updates," Null said. "We make sure we have enough supplies, especially for our electric department."

Null said the city also has a stormwater capital plan for the future.

# Green Cove Springs forced to delay West Street Project

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The City Council delayed construction for the long-awaited West Street Project on Tuesday.

Council members voted to reject the award originally given to EltonAlan Inc. and reject all bids.

Assistant City Manager and Public Works Director Mike Null said issues with the contractor are at fault. Null said the subcontractor group,

originally set to begin the pipework, backed out, leaving Elton Alan Inc. unable to perform the job for the original price they bid. "At that point, we only had one other bid. It was about half a million dollars more. So, we've rejected all bids. We're going to tweak the plans a little bit [and] do some clarification over the next four to six weeks." Null said.

The project aims to replace half a mile of stormwater pipe through West Street, from Walnut Street to Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard.

After the plans are reworked, Null said the city plans to put the project up for bid again to get more bidders and a better price

EltonAlan Inc. had previously been awarded a bid of approximately \$2.2 million at the previous council meeting and was set to begin working shortly after.

With the prospective project delayed, Null added that the best-case scenario for its start date would be three to three and a half months.

The next city council meeting will be June 20.

# Orange Park fills committee positions

ORANGE PARK – The Town Council appointed chair and vice chair positions to Town Committees during its Tuesday night meeting.

For Culture and Recreation, Councilman Doug Benefield will serve as Chairman, and Mayor Randy Anderson will be Vice-Chair. For the Economic and Community Development Committee, Councilwoman Winnette Sandlin was appointed as Chair and Council-

man Daniel Cobreiro will be Vice-Chair.

Vice Mayor Susana Thompson will lead the charge as Chair of the Community Development Committee, while

Cobreiro will follow up as Vice-Chair.

Anderson will serve as Chair for Finance and Budget, with Thompson taking the post of Vice Chair.

Each official will serve a term until May 21, 2024.

New members were also designated for the Planning and Zoning Board, Environmental Quality Board and Historic Preservation Board via votes from the council that appointed residents to the seats. Each resident brings qualifications and experience to the table, and the Town Council unanimously approved the new role of each individual, 5-0.

The Town welcomed Benjamin Couch to Seat 3 and Alex Hawkins to Seat 5. Then, for the Environmental Quality Board, George Niles was appointed to serve as a Seat 3 Board Member for the Planning and Zoning Board

Kenny Radwanski was appointed as a Board Member of the Historic Preservation Board

Each appointed official will also serve until May 21, 2024, except for Hawkins, who will serve until May 20, 2025.



# Clay County farmers closely monitoring California law

CLAY COUNTY – At issue is the closely divided Supreme Court ruling on California's Proposition 12, which has the potential to affect producers across the nation.

The Clay County Farm Bureau and its members are looking at the possibility of farmers and ranchers in one state being forced to adhere to another state's regulatory standards. That would be problematic for farmers and ranchers nationwide and could cause shortages of certain agricultural products in states with excessively restrictive regulations.

Charles Shinn, Florida Farm Bureau's Director of Government & Community Affairs, shared the following information to give a clearer picture of the issues causing a very unclear future for agriculture producers.

A California ballot initiative passed in 2018, written by the Humane Society of the United States, required pork, veal, eggs, and other items be raised in a certain way to prevent perceived cruelty from being sold in California. That applies even if the livestock is not grown in California.

American Farm Bureau Federation and the National Pork Producers sued California and lost. The U.S. Supreme Court agreed to take the case, and it was argued on Oct. 11, 2022. The 5-4 opinion came on May 11, 2023, in favor of the State of California. The opinion was fractured in reasoning on both sides.


The NPP and AFBF argument was based on the Constitution's Commerce Clause. States should not be able to regulate commerce between states since Congress holds that power.

The SCOTUS majority found the text of the Constitution does not explicitly say states can't regulate commerce, so strict interpretation means that a state can regulate interstate commerce.

This has significant implications for state-regulated standards applying in other states where products may be coming from.

I can only imagine how my grandfather felt when he played football at Boiling Springs (North Carolina) College in the early 1930s. He wore a leather helmet. I had one with a heavy strap and no padding. Now they have a miniature Select Comfort mattress protecting their

## Working through the pain, doubt and future recovery of knee surgery

ORANGE PARK - May 9 was a regular day at football practice at Ridgeview High.

My third rep of the day, I was asked to run a slant. Without hesitation, I got in my stance, and took three hard vertical steps, and on my fourth step to cut to the left, my right leg collapsed. Not knowing what just happened, I knew something was wrong. Having a rushing pain throughout my leg felt like it was on fire.

"Why me? Is football over for me?"

That's the first thought I had at this moment. The first day after the injury. I had an X-ray on my leg. Hoping nothing came up on the results, the doctor came back to the room with news.

"After reviewing your X-rays, I can't see anything, but after doing my handson exam, it definitely has something to do with your ACL." he said.

My heart dropped. I prayed it was the smallest tear that could be fixed and I could be back in at least three weeks. The next day I needed an MRI to pinpoint the real problem. On May 12,, the doctor walked into the room, and I can tell from the expression on his face it wasn't good.

You have torn your ACL and you are projected to be out six-to-12 months," he said.

It felt like my life was over. I burst into tears crying on my mother's shoulder, not wanting to accept the reality of the situation. About 15 minutes passed, and the doctor wanted me to start pre-hab immediately. Having no hope, I reluctantly made my way there. The order was to regain my range of motion, trying to put pressure on

After my first session and walking again, I didn't need my crutches as much. I felt that maybe I did have a chance to have a speedy recovery. For the next three weeks, I've had three sessions of pre-hab a week. The one thing I've heard the most during the process is everything happens for a reason, whether it be from family members, friends, teachers or even coach-

Now I'm waiting for my surgery on June 13. I am excited to start my re-hab process and nervous at the same time because I know I can recover fast. I'm too hard of a worker to let this stop me from playing at the college level, but nervous because what if I can't get back to the level I was

Ultimately, no matter what happens, I know that I have a strong support system that will support whatever decision I make after my surgery.

There is some Congressional action underway to protect the Constitution's Commerce Clause, but it is not likely to pass.

As a result of the decision, California is already moving to ban some food ingredients overriding FDA decisions on safety. The "Skittles ban" is an example where red food dve is the target ingredient that the state has decided to ban.

We could see states using this case law to limit the ability of competitive states' ability to enter local markets.

Processors and buyers will likely tell farmers what they can and cannot do, based on where they want to sell products.


California's State Veterinarian doesn't know how to handle this situation; even FFA and 4-H students have to certify prescribed humane animal-raising methods.

How can/will California enforce this nationwide? There are already inspections on California farms, but it is still unclear

in other states or countries. Additionally, there is an interesting exception to processed products that are brought into California. Sellers are the liable party for violations and will be immediately in violation when Proposition 12 becomes law on

Clay County Farm Bureau's President, Gayward Hendry, said, "I am concerned that this will lead to reducing competition among producers and result in higher prices or lack of availability of some agricultural goods to families in states where excessive restrictions deter inter-state commerce. With the cost of food already putting a strain on most people's food budget, we are concerned how the effects of California's Proposition 12 will further affect the ability of our American families to feed themselves.'

ORANGE PARK – After a long road with plenty of twists and turns throughout their four-year experience, Pace Center for Girls Class of 2023 finally celebrate on Friday.

Seniors were honored at a Highpoint Community Church graduation ceremony, with students recognized for their hard work and dedication to the finish line.

Sarah Waldin, the class Salutatorian, thanked all involved – but most of all, her classmates

"Finally, to my friends, you guys helped me the most, gave me laughs when I was sad, helped me when I was down, celebrated me during the good times, and congratulated me for accomplishing my goals. I'm proud of all of us for reaching this milestone. Once again, congratulations to our Class of 2023. We made it," she said.

Waldin spent her first one and a half years in a traditional public school, and things didn't go well.

## Middleburg's Hatchet in NASCAR protocol after being injured

Crewman hit by tire, knocked out on pit road during Sunday's race

Thomas Hatcher remembers a tire hitting him in the chest and chin during a pit stop on Lap 180 Sunday at the World Wide Technology Raceway. After that, everything still is a blur.

The front tire changer for Eric Jones' No. 43 Chevrolet was hit on pit road by a tire. Medical technicians were so concerned he was taken to the trauma center at St. Louis University Hospital for further treatment.

After clearing a CT scan, the Middleburg High graduate flew to his North Carolina home nine hours after his Legacy Motor Club teams arrived.

A day later, he spoke with Clay Today about the accident during Sunday's Enjoy Illinois 300 for the NASCAR Cup Series.

"We had the 3 (Austin Dillon) pitting in front of us and we (Jones) followed him in," Hatcher said. "The 3 didn't give us any breaks by giving us room to the wall. You try to split the cars (running out to do the pit stop) when they follow each other. The front (tire carrier) didn't get enough room. Everything recoiled into me and I got blasted."

One of the tires hit Hatcher so hard his feet went straight up, and he dropped to the pavement head-first. His helmet and foam

cushion were cracked.

"I got knocked out," Hatcher said. "I mean, I was out cold for about 30 seconds. I don't remember anything. I tried watching some of the videos, but it's all still crazy to me. I just laid there. I started to get up, and I guess I fell over. They told me I needed to stay down."

While Hatcher pits for Legacy, he's employed by Joe Gibbs Racing. Many of the second-tier teams hire crews from larger organizations. A year ago, he was the front tire-changer for Kyle Busch, and the team

won the NASCAR World Pit Crew Championship

Busch now drives for Richard Childress Racing and he won Sunday's race.

Tyler Reddick drives for Michael Jordan's and Denny Hamlin's 23XI, and they also get crews from Gibbs. After Reddick crashed, Houston Stamper finished the race for Legacy. Jones finished 18th.

Hatcher is now in NASCAR's concussion protocol. He said he feels good enough "to pit a car right now," he won't be allowed over the wall until he's cleared.

"The doctor had me do a couple of little things and I definitely was knocked out," he said. "I honestly feel great. Now I'm sore. My neck muscle feels like when I had a football neck — you know, when you first start the first few days of football practice and your neck gets sore."



# Second chances lead to first-class fun at Batton Ranch

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — Batton Family Ranch is a family-owned business that rescues unwanted horses and rehabilitates them.

The ranch opened in January but has given unwanted horses a second chance in life since 2021. In addition, the ranch focuses on encouraging kids to be more engaged with nature and less on their phones.

"I created the ranch as a place where people and horses can come together," said owner Charles Batton. "I've taken horses that no one wants and have given them a second chance at life and a new job."

Over the years, the ranch has rescued and rehabilitated 20 horses.

"Every horse is different," Batton said. "A lot of times, we get sick, starving or lame horses that have medical issues."

Rehabilitation depends on the animal's condition, but it usually requires nutrients, love, and re-training. After rehabilitation, the animals either remain on the ranch as riding horses or go to new homes.

"I would love people to be more aware of all the horses out there that are languishing away and how these animals are willing to work and partner with people more than any other animal," he said.

The ranch offers equestrian riding services as a way to encourage children to be



outside with nature and animals. Families can learn the basics of horseback riding through interactive lessons. Activities such as flag hunting, horse trails, and timed races are available for individuals to sharpen their riding skills further. In addition, lessons allow children to learn skill sets and values such as communication, problemsolving, kindness and self-confidence. # Keeping Fido, Fluffy safe during hurricane season

Animals require advanced preparation to survive storm

CLAY COUNTY – While no storms are on the radar, residents should begin preparing for themselves, their families and their pets.

There's plenty that county residents can do now to get a head start.

For pet owners, food, water, medications and shelter are the most important things to have on hand. Special considerations should also be made in advance to provide shelter and relief areas.

Dogs, cats, rodents, birds and rabbits are the only animals accepted at selected animal-friendly shelters in Clay County. Visit claycounty.gov to find out which locations will accept pets.

"A lot of dogs will not go outside to use the restroom, so a lot of people recommend getting a big kids' pool and putting some sod in it and putting that in the garage. That way, a dog has a place to go potty and they're not out in the rain," said Sandy Summerton, Executive Director of

Safe Animal Shelter.

Keeping pets safe and comfortable during a storm is also crucial.

"It's really important to make sure you're keeping your animals contained because they are stressed out during that time."

Summerton said owners should have a stock of food, water and medications for at least two weeks.

"If we lose power and we're out for two weeks, do we have enough for that time period. It's the same kind of thing for when we prepare for ourselves. We need to make sure that we're also looking out for our animals and pets," Summerton said.

She had one last word of advice:

"Do not leave your animals on leashes when outside and in a storm. We should not be keeping animals outside in a storm. Make sure any of those animals are brought inside," she said.

Another important tip to keep pets safe is to create an emergency kit tailored specifically to them.

CJ Acres Farms founder Lee Sackett said evacuating livestock isn't an option.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency recommends individuals gather a three-day food supply in an airtight, wa-



terproof container and three days of wa-

ter, along with medications and medical records. Registration documents, adoption papers and vaccinations should be gathered. It would be best to talk to a veterinarian about microchipping and enrolling your pet in a recovery database is also recommended.

A first aid kit is also never a bad thing to have. Cotton bandage rolls, bandage tape and scissors, antibiotic ointment, flea and tick prevention, latex gloves, isopropyl alcohol, and saline solution are recommended items to include.

Also, have a sturdy, reliable crate or pet carrier handy in case you need to evacuate. The container should be large enough for the pet to stand, turn around and lie down

Bring litter and a litter box if appropriate, along with newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags and household chlorine bleach.

Last but not least, a photograph of you and your pet should be taken and saved if you haven't done so already. If you become separated from your pet, the picture will help you document ownership and allow others to assist you in recovering your animal. Writing down species, breed, age, sex, color and other distinguishing characteristics on the back of the picture could make the difference between lost and found

# When the winds blow, rains come, Orange Park will be ready

ORANGE PARK – With hurricane season upon us, all hands are on deck in Orange Park, including the Public Works Department, Town Manager's office, and other departments taking extensive safety measures to protect residents from the 2023 storm cycle.

Public Works is already making initial preparations

siderations to be made for farm animals as hurricane season touches down in the county.

Lee Sackett, the founder of CJ Acres Animal Rescue Farm, a nonprofit and all-volunteer animal rescue farm that reduces suffering and rehabilitates several species in Keystone Heights, knows about preparing for a storm.

With more than 100 animals, CJ Acres has information to protect horses, cows, goats, feral cats, sheep, chickens, pigs or ducks. The animals come from across Florida, the Southeast, the United States and Canada.

With a wide-ranging list of animals with various needs, evacuation is not an option.

"We find that it's time-consuming, and there are too many challenges with trying to move over 100 animals," he said.

Focusing on preparation is a better option, and it's a process that begins before hurricane season began on June 1.

"For us, it's making sure that we have the proper equipment and personnel to take care of any issues before an event," he said.

"Whether it's a hamster or a bull, it's an event that you should be taking seriously. Some people think 'Oh, this hurricane is not going to hit us because the (weather predictions) were wrong the last three times. You can't arrive to the Home Depot the day before a storm hits and magically think they will have generators," Sackett said

Utilize CJ Acres' 3-3-3 strategy 30 days before a storm.

"Thirty days ahead, think about, 'Do we have everything we need?' Three days ahead, ask that question again. Three hours ahead, ask yourself, 'What do we need last minute?' Do we need to close up the barn? What are we missing? It's our last chance," he said.

Sackett's strategy has worked well so ar.

"We've never had an animal that was injured, ran out of food, or ran out of water, and that's even when power has been out for over a week, and a lot of that is just due to preparation," Sackett said.

# Aya Osman awarded the Wenger Family STEM Scholarship

ORANGE PARK – After winning her twoyear battle with childhood cancer, 18-yearold Aya Osman will take on a new challenge – college.

Once considered too far out of reach, Osman is excited to announce she will be attending New York University in the fall and will be cancer-free.

Her dream is made possible in part by the Tom Coughlin Jay Fund. The fund helps families tackle childhood cancer by providing comprehensive financial, emotional and practical support.

Osman won the Jay Fund Foundation Wenger Family STEM Scholarship, an annual college scholarship awarded to 16 cancer patients and survivors to encourage them to pursue their dreams.

"I heard about the Jay Fund through the clinic I would go to for treatment, but I received a letter about the scholarship months ago. It had been sitting on my piano for some time, and I thought, 'Why not go ahead and apply?'" Osman said. "I did, and I was lucky enough to be chosen. I am endlessly grateful for their financial support."

After being diagnosed with synovial cell sarcoma in her arm during her junior year, Osman's long-term goals were put on the back burner

"It came by really fast. When I was diagnosed, everything was just tunnel vision. I had to focus on one thing at a time, and graduation seemed 100 years away," she said.

Despite undergoing chemotherapy, radiation and surgery to kill the tumor, Osman never backed down and continued to apply herself in school, taking rigorous courses in the IB diploma program to pursue her

dream of helping others in medicine.

Osman graduated Summa Cum Laude and as an AP Scholar in May. She received the African American National Recognition Award and has placed twice in the senior division in the Chemistry and Environmental Clay County Science Fair and received second place in healthcare administration in the Future Business Leaders of America district competition this year.

Now, Osman can finally embrace her dream of being a neuroscientist, a dream she's had since elementary school. She will

take biology classes at NYU to prepare her for medical school.

"Graduation during my cancer treatment seemed so far in the future. There's no point in focusing on all that now, but it was during a time, let's say when I was throwing up from cancer treatments. After remission, I realized that graduation and going to college was possible, very possible," she said

"I knew I was on the right path. My grades were good, even with my absences. When I was in the hospital, my mom would bring my laptop so I could work on my assignments," she said. "So you know, I was laying down on my hospital bed, and the nurses would come in checking my heart rate, checking my temperature and whatnot while I would be rushing to finish an essay for IB history or English."

Classwork and her passion for piano helped distract her from the stress and anxiety of her extensive medical treatment. It also opened her eyes to the medical profession she longed to be a part of.

"I would often stay for three days at a time for chemo treatments, and that made me really pay attention to what the doctors and nurses were doing, and I saw how passionate they were about the field," she said.

"I feel this experience, in general, has been valuable in maintaining an empathetic approach to working with patients. It's always important to understand what they are going through, even if that is impossible because we all deal with things differently – but I think it will help me sympathize with patients and be more passionate about what I am working towards."

However, the most important lesson didn't come from textbooks and lectures. It came from within.

"I learned a lot about myself in the last two years. What surprised me the most was realizing that I was capable enough, even undergoing everything that I went through, to take care of my body and my mind," she said

"I feel that really anything is possible. It's your mind that needs convincing, not your body. You need to make sure that what you're doing is something you're really passionate about if you put your entire body, mind, and soul into it," she said.

To those struggling with a difficult diagnosis, to those who may feel lost or directionless, Osman reminds them to never give up on our dreams.

"I'm not going to say it's an easy time because it's not, but even though the future may not seem promising, we dance with fear and doubt every day. Using that as an excuse not to pursue your passions is not going to cut it," she said. "You should try to be more optimistic about what you are going to do rather than being pessimistic."

their staging areas, making room for debris to be collected at their headquarters, and ensuring all equipment is in proper running condition in light of hurricane season.

"We're ready for debris clean-up," said Kyle Croce, Public Works Director.

Croce and the department began coordinating with other departments and county so they would be on the same page if a potential storm were to strike.

"We've coordinated with the Fire Department, Police Department and Town Manager (Sarah Campbell) on any forecasting and tracking needed, and the county on their emergency operations. We've also started looking at the weather (forecasts) a lot more," he said.

By surveying parks and structures, Croce and his crew already have their boots on the ground in preparation for hurricane season. Now, they'll be ready for the worst-case scenario.

"They are out there looking at the parks and setting up (other) areas for more inspections and clean-up throughout the city for stormwater and the stormwater system." Croce said.

Here's how it works:

Workers split up into different sections of the town and looked at inlet structures and ditches that carry stormwater. "They (also) start moving them and clearing them of any debris that may have fallen in," he

said.

An excellent working relationship in the county is also crucial for a smoothly-running operation which the town coordinates with for essential services when a storm makes landfall for things such as coordinating sandbag pick-up and drop-off locations

The county is also willing to lend a

hand, not just with sandbag drop-offs and communications, but with hauling debris after the storm.

"They've always offered help if we need help, and we can piggyback off their debris-hauling and monitoring contracts. We haven't had to in the past couple of years, but they've said (the service) is available (to the town) in their contracts. It's a great relationship," Croce said.

Of course, Orange Park returns the favor

"(Public Works) is one of the locations that the Sherriff's Department comes to get fuel from for the vehicles in the area," he said.

The primary responsibility of the Public Works Department is to keep the roadways clear so that emergency vehicles can travel freely after a storm. They work alongside the police department and Jacksonville Electric Authority to maintain a smoothly-running operation.

"Any time we get a call that a tree is down or a power line is down, we get out there, as long as the streets aren't flooded, and we're able to get there so that emergency vehicles can get through and reach anybody needs help. We're right in the middle of it during a storm," Croce said.

A convoy of town-funded trucks provides workers with the necessary tools to clear debris

Dump trucks are necessary for hauling debris, which can be disposed of in a num-

ber of ways following the storm, all dependent on the storm's size.

Bucket trucks are also a major asset. One of the machines can lift a worker to the highest point so they can safely perform a job, such as cutting down a broken limb.

One of Croce's favorites is the trash truck. Otherwise known as the "claw truck," this especially comes in handy during each hurricane season.

The powerful red claw mounted to the back of the cabin is capable of ripping away broken branches and picking up large objects, which are placed into its large trash bed, which can then be hauled away. Two outriggers also provide ultimate stability as the machine completes its tasks.

Keeping wastewater services operational is also important.

"We have permitted generators, and we set up temporary generators to ensure that all lift stations keep going. Sometimes, lift stations can be a problem, but we're there, and the JEA also helps us with power, so that's really good," Croce said.

Campbell has been preparing Orange Park for storm season.

"Every year, we participate in the Clay County Hurricane season exercise. I participated, along with the Police Chief, Fire Chief, and members of our staff. In addition, we review the Town's Disaster Management Plan without Department Head Team," she said.

the methods of dealing with Mother Nature's wrath also change.

"The bigger concern is, typically, that we're very susceptible to wind and surge," he said. "So whether big or small, it's more effects-based. I think that, unfortunately, a lot of folks get trapped into the Saffir-Simpson Scale, Cat 1, Cat 2, Cat 3, whatever. The effects of the smaller storms, we still had significant flooding with significant surges and downed trees. The wind may not have been as long-lasting, but they're still there for those periods of intensity."

Emergency management offices also face the challenge of ensuring the community is safe and prepared, even if previous alerts aren't as disastrous as feared.

The last two tropical-related storms to hit Clay County were Ian and Nicole. Both caused minor flooding, erosion and wind damage.

Ian was spawned from a Tropical Wave off the coast of Western Africa last October to a Category 5 storm with 160 mph winds. It was projected to hit the Florida Panhandle but took an unexpected turn to the East and tore through Fort Myers and surrounding areas.


The unpredictability of the storm prompted Clay officials to order an evacuation. Again, Ian fooled experts and left the state along the Space Coast. It turned again and hit South Carolina.

But Clay essentially was spared from any significant damage.

"You have a complex problem where you're trying to make sure (to make accurate plans)," Ladd said. "We've luckily. We have a very good team that's been here, done that. They do this all the time. I mean, there's no new curveballs."

Ladd said the first step to being prepared for all dangerous weather is downloading the free Alert Clay app from the claycountygov.com website. It will inform residents about hurricanes, thunderstorms, evacuation notices and flood warnings.

"That is our information conduit," Ladd said. "We really just need to pound the table so folks can get our information content. Its got packing





## **Make worship** a way of life



## **Charmed Memories:**

## **Turning grief into cherished keepsakes**

MIDDLEBURG - When Dezaree Sargent's daughter cut her hair for the first time, Dezaree wanted to find a way to savor the fresh cut and make the memory last forever.

"Instead of just throwing it in the drawer, I was like, 'Oh, maybe I could just make a necklace or something.' So, I did, and it turned out cool," Dezaree said.

With the creation of that simple necklace, Dezaree's idea catapulted into a business built on the same concept: remembering things we have loved - and maybe lost.

"I just started asking people if they would be interested, and it just went from there," Dezaree said.

Dezaree owns the local business Charmed Memories and makes it her mission to preserve special memories for customers to cherish forever.

Charmed Memories is a hand-made cremation jewelry business that began back in 2016. Working with remains of all sorts. Dezaree spends her days intertwined with the personal treasuries of others.

The company specializes in memorial jewelry in rings, pendants, glass beads and necklaces. The personal material she can put into jewelry ranges from cremation remains and hair, teeth, breast milk and even fabric fibers.

"I've gotten many people say they were in tears because it was so meaningful to have something they could wear with them every day. That is part of the person they lost or the pet they've lost," Dezaree said.

At first, she started selling simple jewelry with hair and pet fur on Etsy. As a stay-at-home mom, Dezaree said the business began as a hobby and a way to make some extra money. However, the company has massively grown from what

From exclusively using hair and pet fur, Dezaree said the growth of her business has now led to her using more cremations and ashes. Dezaree said her orders are a 50/50 split between the two.

In addition to the material growth, Dezaree said her work has grown to impact the world, reaching places such as



Canada and the United Kingdom.

As customers place their orders for their charmed memory, Dezaree said they are sent kits to help them through the process. Customers place a little piece of the hair or a tablespoon of ashes into these kits and send them back. Dezaree said orders take about three-tofive weeks to complete.

However, Dezaree said one downside of the process comes with sending the remains through the mail, as they could get lost.

"That happens sometimes. It's like a little tiny bit of hair is all they have left, and then it gets lost in the mail, and they don't have it," Dezaree said.

For that reason, Dezaree said she advises customers only to send a small amount of what they have and not the

All done from her home, Dezaree hand-crafts epoxy resin liquid to make her jewelry. Dezaree said she mixes the resin in equal parts with the two-part liquid and then pours it into the jewelry base. From there, she fills in the gaps with the ashes and resin. In 24 hours, Dezaree said the jewelry was hardened and resembled the glass look.

also makes his mark on the business. He makes the glass necessary for the glass

"She gives me the ashes, I degas them and then encapsulate them in glass," Corey said. "Then, put them into a bead, charm. necklace...whatever you're going for."

Even with her success with her products, Dezaree said her choice to get into the business didn't come without scrutiny.

"The general public would be, 'That's kind of gross, kind of creepy, nobody would want to see their dead pets' fur in the keychain," Dezaree said. "I was like, 'Well, you never know."

Corey said knowing this fueled him to do everything he could to ensure his wife

"It was really the underdog thing. I really wanted it to work. I really wanted her to succeed and turn into exactly what it has turned into. It has really been an awesome thing to see," he said.

The business has become an outlet for customers to wear their emotions on their sleeves literally.

Customer Jessie Miller said she had purchased items from Charmed Memories a couple of times, and she appreciates the effort that Dezaree puts into beautifully memorializing what could easily be forgot-

"She puts color in them. She makes them beautiful. They shine. They are memorialized because they're kept that way. Ashes in an urn on a shelf, to me ... you put them up there, and you forget about them," Miller said.

In addition to the hand-crafted jewelry, Dezaree said she takes her business to the next level by diving deeper into the physicality of the ashes. With her cremation macrophotography services, she closely examines the "cremains".

To do this, Dezaree said she uses a unique sifter to separate the smaller particles from the large particles in the ashes. This created a unique vision Dezaere said she had never seen before.

"I started seeing all these colorful pieces in the ashes...it was pink, and blue and green," Dezaree Sargent said.

Dezaree said the different minerals in the body react differently to the cremation temperature, causing them to obtain their bright colors under the microscope.

After taking the pictures, Dezaree said she sends them to customers upon request.

"A lot of people are really interested in looking, just because they say it's more beautiful ... every cremation of ashes is different. That was them. That was their makeup. They think that it's comforting to see, I guess, the beauty of what was left

Even with the beauty of the job, Dezaree said there are times when it can be-

Once at the jail, detention deputies found methamphetamine in a plastic bag tucked in her body cavity and a pill in her fanny pack bag.

Her bond was set at \$65,013.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement identified the thumbprint Eiland provided when he cashed the check.

CCSO and FDLE identified the other two suspects as Alisa Belladonna and Tyrence Simmons-Powell.

Eiland's bond is \$25.003.

## Hospital staff find drugs hidden in shoplifter's body

come overwhelming.

Dezaree said working so closely with death, she has a hard time processing it.

"You talk to people every single day about them losing people they love, and sometimes it gives me a lot of anxiety. I think about my death or my family members' death a lot more now than I used to," Dezaree said.

To cope with that, Dezaree said time with her family is important.

"I spend time with my kids. I feel like I'm a lot more present, [and] at the moment because I realize you never know," Dezaree said. "So, we're just taking everything as it comes."

Charmed Memories is partnered with Ophelia's Eclectics at 1838 Henley Road. Dezaree said that's where work samples can be found, local pickups/drop-offs and consultations take place.

However, Dezaree said she hopes to further expand in the local community.

"I'm kind of hoping now that I have this spot...maybe I can get more local customers. A lot of people say they didn't know that it was ever an option to have stuff made like that. So, I'm hoping to get a little bit more involved in the local community," Dezaree said.

Ladd said the landscape change presents an ever-changing challenge.

"It's more geographic based and more of the susceptibility to wind and storm surge," he said. "As we have more development and again, I don't have a lot of blueprints, and I'm not an architect by any stretch, but as that topography starts to change, then some of the models of the (Black Creek) South and North prongs could adjust waterways. Some places that may not have flooded in the past may flood this time.

"What concerns me is any changes to what I think to be a somewhat sedimentary problem set. If there are changes in the topography, the big thing is, will the problems act differently than I think they're going to?"

The last official Tropical Storm here was Andrea in 2013. It had a maximum sustained wind of 55 mph. The last hurricane came in 2006 with Ernesto. The most-powerful storm was Georges in 1998, with top winds of 135 mph.

The costliest, however, was Irma in 2017. It ripped across the state before being downgraded from a Category 5 to a strong Tropical Storm with maximum

winds of 72 mph. Irma, however, was a significant rain event, dumping 14 inches of water in a county already defined by its waterways. Flooding destroyed or damaged 858 homes and forced the evacuation of 900 residents. Water levels for Black Creek's North and South prongs measured at 28.5 feet – nearly three

higher than the previous records.

A record 6.5 million people were evacuated during Irma – the largest in state history. From the Caribbean to Southeastern U.S., a total of 134 people died, and it caused \$77.2 billion in damages. In Clay, nobody died, but it left more than \$40 million swath of local damage.

Except for 18 Boating Under the Influence citations, last Friday's event was the largest and most successful in the history of the unofficial "Mardi Gras-like" holiday.

Although the Clay County Sheriff's Office said the peak of the daylong event is at 2:30 p.m., they estimated more than 1,000 boats were already moored a half-mile on either side of the sandbar at Mile Marker 24.

Boaters started arriving on the river a half-day in advance. The gathering was supposed to get underway at 9 a.m., but by then, the sheriff's office sent an alert saying ramps at Governors Creek, Knight's Boat Ramp, Lake Shore Boat Ramp, Doctors Lake Boat Ramp and Williams Park were at capacity. The ramp was closed at Whitey's Fish Camp on Fleming Island during the event.

Despite the congestion, the music was still loud; the atmosphere was still festive. But according to law enforcement agencies, there were no incidents.

"We're out here because you have to be prepared for anything," said CCSO Marine Unit Deputy Joseph Morrell. "We've planned for this for months. We're working in conjunction with several agencies."

Morrell's boat included three members of the sheriff's office SWAT team. While the threat of a brawl or an active shooter was remote, they were prepared for any challenge.

Agencies representing CCSO, Clay County Fire Rescue and Emergency Management and Putnam County, St. Johns County and Jacksonville sheriff's office were on the water, along with units from Green Cove Springs and St. Augustine police departments, Jacksonville Fire Rescue and the U.S. Coast Guard. Their heavy presence didn't dull the party atmosphere.

At the scene, a rescue helicopter, river rescue boats and ambulance were parked at the Point.

"We just wanted them to know we're here if we're needed," Morrell said.

A couple of miles north of the fun, law enforcement, including the Florida Highway Patrol, Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and CCSO, established a command post to focus on anyone with too much to drive a boat.

They also ensured everyone had a lifejacket, and every boat was equipped with flares and an ignition kill switch.

There were 18 arrests made for BUI, according to FFWCC Capt. Philip Glover. Other than that, "there were no other incidents."


"It's another step in our plan to improve all of the sports here at Middleburg," said Wolfe, who turned a 5-5 final season record last year in his initial season. Garcia quipped that the history of the stadium included Pepsi Cola bottles dating 1959 that were found in the stadium rubble.

Brightman, who succeeded Michael Harrison as athletic director, noted that the scoreboard was changed prior to the destruction of the old stadium and that the new stadium includes new bathroom facilities (45 stalls from six previously) and a new concession stands plus an amped-up press box.

"The press box is fully air conditioned, Wi-Fi fitted and has cameras installed for live streamed events in the future," said Brightman. "We haven't done anything to the visitors side yet, but that may come in the future. Coach Harrison had more to do in getting the ball rolling."

The track, fully rubberized and FHSAA district capable, was installed after a hurricane destroyed the previous track nearly five years ago.

The stadium, according to Garcia, has

a lot of history and some Raider alums and families were interested, at one time, of taking bricks from the rubble to commemorate the stadium.

"The stadium, built in the late 1950s and 1960s, had a lot of memories for the people of Orange Park," said Garcia. "There are literally four air conditioners instead of one window unit for the entire press box and the WiFi is up to date for being a top notch press box. There are also two coaching boxes for assistant coaches to watch the game and report to the coaches on the field."

Brightman noted the seating capacity seats around 2,500 fans with special seating for wheelchair bound fans and a ramp into the stadium body.

Brightman also commented that the new coaching staff, led by second year coach Marcus Wimberly, has been technologically improved with the facility itself still on the planning board.

"Coach Wimberly has done a lot to bring in new tech stuff," said Brightman. "We'll get to that building another time. Right now, the coaching staff is the only new part of the fieldhouse."




Romer currently competes in the FINA League; Federation of Ninja Athletes.

devices nearly all day; like 100 squeezes a day."

The one obstacle that is a constant in all Ninja competitions is the dreaded finishing wall; a run-up wall that stretches up to 22 feet with a lip that athletes grab with fingers and pull themselves up to the top to smash a bell at the end of a run.

"It's very daunting up close and in person," said Romer, who has three walls to train on in his home gym; 12 feet, 14 feet and 22 feet. "The key is to run up as far as you can then explode literally away from the wall before grabbing the lip. You have to fly."

Dawn Romer remarked of her son's ability in the air. "He flies and floats throughout the courses," said Dawn Romer. "It's cool to watch because he kind of floats; he flies when he launches from one obstacle to another. It's an art."

Dad Pete Romer, a former swimmer as a young athlete, appeared still fit enough to battle the courses and revelled in his family's love of the sport.

"To see him get to the show is awesome," said Pete Romer, noting he did plenty of obstacle courses in his Navy tenure. "I get inspiration from other gyms and other people to keep building the obstacles in our gym. We have one of the premiere obstacle builder's autograph on one of my designs."




## **Description of Assessments**

The District imposes O&M Assessments on benefitted property within the District for the purpose of funding the District's general administrative. operations, and maintenance budget. A geographic depiction of the property potentially subject to the proposed O&M Assessments is identified in the map attached hereto. The table below shows the schedule of the proposed O&M Assessments, which are subject to change at the hearing:

The proposed O&M Assessments as stated include collection costs and/ or early payment discounts, which Clay County ("County") may impose on assessments that are collected on the County tax bill. Moreover, pursuant to Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, the lien amount shall serve as the "maximum rate" authorized by law for O&M Assessments, such that no assessment hearing shall be held or notice provided in future years unless the assessments are proposed to be increased or another criterion within Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, is met. Note that the O&M Assessments do not include any debt service assessments previously levied by the District and due to be collected for Fiscal Year 2023/2024.

For Fiscal Year 2023/2024, the District intends to have the County tax collector collect the assessments imposed on certain developed property. It is important to pay your assessment because failure to pay will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the property which may result in loss of title,



or for direct billed assessments, may result in a foreclosure action, which also may result in a loss of title. The District's decision to collect assessments on the tax roll or by direct billing does not preclude the District from later electing to collect those or other assessments in a different manner at a future time.

## **Additional Provisions**

The public hearings and meeting are open to the public and will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Florida law. 
