Residents get chance to tell county how to spend grant money

ORANGE PARK – Residents heard a presentation about the County's Community Development Block Grant Annual Action Plan and were allowed to voice their opinions, ask questions and provide suggestions.

While the meeting was at the Orange Park Library, most of the conversation focused on the rapid growth and needs of residents living in the Lake Asbury area.

Among factors they said would be the right recipe for a vibrant neighborhood community are clean and well-kept, safe, walkable and good lighting.

For infrastructure improvements, residents said sidewalk improvements needed to be made, along with the clean-up of dead trees to assist with the safety of residents, particularly in the Grove Park neighborhood. One resident said traffic on busy roadways like Russell Road and others was a major concern, and traffic infrastructure improvements needed to be made to address those issues.

The most important portion came when residents commented on the grant entitlement funding budget.

Suggestions were compiled on three pieces of poster paper and taped on the wall.

Recommendations included re-prioritizing funding for code enforcement from housing rehabilitation, providing more accessible transportation in rural areas that would benefit from improved infrastructure, and focusing on smaller projects to reach more individuals in housing rehabilitation. The construction of more stay-well facilities, such as yoga and community centers and community nonprofits like the YMCA and Boys and Girls clubs were suggested. Targeting need areas for low- to moderate-income residents and families, addressing infrastructure concerns on roadways such as Henley Road. and County Road 220 – such as broken sidewalks and potholes – enhancing walkability in rural areas, increasing public transportation options like buses, controlling pests including feral cats and raccoons, conducting more drug rehabilitation outreach programs in the community and placing a greater emphasis on roofing repairs were recommended.

Clay County Grants Manager Megan Mosley, Director of Community and Social Services Gabrielle Gunn led the meeting. Assistant County Manager Troy Nagle provided comments and answered questions.

Residents were given three stickers and asked to vote for the projects they wanted the most. The stickers were labeled No. 1-3, with No. 1 denoting the item of most importance., but residents had the option to place all three stickers on infrastructure. Infrastructure, which will be budgeted at \$523,450, received six votes, followed by housing rehabilitation (\$350.000) and code enforcement (\$50,000) with five votes each. This was the final of five meetings for the action plan. The plan will be adopted during the Board of County Commissioners meeting on July 25 in the Administration Building in Green Cove Springs.

County, firefighters union continue overtime discussions

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Clay County rejected The International Firefighters Association Local 3362B's proposal for the wording of overtime pay for battalion chiefs during a crucial meeting where the

two sides are negotiating their collective bargaining agreement, which expires on Sept. 30, 2024.

Representatives from both sides exchanged their views, with the county rejecting overtime pay for battalion chiefs, emphasizing it plans to limit instances when chiefs would work overtime.

In response, the Firefighters Union sought clarification, expressing concerns about whether the decision would eliminate all overtime for battalion chiefs. The union also inquired about the county's current practice of using step-ups, where the

The Firefighters Union said it hadn't seen much overtime for battalion chiefs. However, they did acknowledge battalion chiefs had worked overtime during "swap time," which occurred when three chiefs were appointed and the remaining personnel was promoted.

They suggested if openings were available, safety captains should be allowed to step into battalion chief positions, while any remaining vacancies could be filled by following overtime procedures.

A union representative proposed adding new wording, specifically requesting the battalion chiefs be eligible for overtime when performing step-up duties. However, Mock rejected the suggestion, citing the management's prerogative and unwillingness to grant latitude in defining position qualifications.

During the two-part meeting, which addressed the Clay County Public Safety Rank and File's Collective Bargaining and Battalion Chief's Collective Bargaining, they also discussed holidays, paid time off, and more.

V Pizza's move to U.S. 17 designed to enhance dining experience

FLEMING ISLAND – V Pizza, a popular local chain with seven locations Northeast Florida, has nearly completed a significant move to cater to the demands of their loyal customers in Clay County.

The decision to relocate from County Road 220 to U.S. Highway 17 was driven by popular demand and a desire to offer the community an exceptional dining experience, according to CEO, David Villmow.

"We wanted to give Fleming Island a much better experience, something (more valuable) than leasing a space that existed previously," he said.

In response, V Pizza seized the opportunity, with shovels breaking ground on the 6,000-square foot for the approximately \$3 million building with contractor Urban Partners in June 2022.

Now the project is all but completed, pending on approval of final permits and county inspections.

The move is a two-phase process, Villmow said.

V Pizza's lease at their old location on County Road 220 expired on June 30, and staff was working diligently to ensure the opening of the new location by July 1, Villmow said.

Villmow admitted that permitting factors are beyond his control and may impact the project's timeline, but that his team is ready to hit the ground running as soon as

the red tape is lifted.

Whenever opening date will be, he said customers should be amazed by V Pizza's "new digs."

The large, spacious, modern state-ofthe-art dining area with high ceilings is a work of wonder, and the design was a collaborative effort between the company's management and employees, the vision a "brainchild" between the two groups.

"We generally come up with a vision of how we want to make things look, and then we come up with the design," Villmow said.

The bar will have 50 or more beers on tap, with 60-66% of the beverage selections being sourced locally from brewer-

ies, he said.

Third-party voter registration organizations win in court

A federal judge has issued a preliminary injunction targeting aspects of changes to election law passed by the Legislature this year, after a hearing last week in which plaintiffs argued that the changes violated the Constitution by stopping third-party voter registration organizations from doing their work.

Judge Mark Walker of the Northern District of Florida ruled in favor of the plaintiffs - including the Florida State Conference of Branches and Youth Units of the NAACP, Equal Ground Education Fund, Voters of Tomorrow, Disability Rights Florida, Alianza for Progress, Alianza Center, UnidosUS and Florida Alliance for Retired Americans - against provisions in SB 7050, which restricts what third-party voter registration groups are able to do.

Walker's order focuses on the bill "barring non-citizens from registering to vote," and "exposing individuals working for third-party registration organizations to felony prosecution for retaining voter information without telling them to whom the prohibition applies, what they can retain, and when they can retain it."

"The Free State of Florida is simply not free to exceed the boundaries of the U.S. Constitution," Walker writes.

Walker agreed with the plaintiffs that the "citizenship requirement" in the law violated the First and 14th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution, saying SB 7050 is an "omnibus election bill that imposes harsh new restrictions and penalties on 3PVROs engaging in voter registration and voter engagement activities and makes it harder for eligible Floridians - and in particular voters of color and voters with disabilities - to participate in the State's elections."

Walker rejected the defendants' pleas to defer the ruling until September, arguing that it could allow "retroactive punishments" of 3PVROs.

"Removing the threat of enforcement the risk of a \$50,000 fine, automatic cancellation of the 3PVROs' registrations, and further civil enforcement by the Attorney General - would directly redress Plaintiffs' injuries. In other words, they could continue the voter registration work they have been hired to do, without fear of Defendants penalizing their organizations with devastating fines, automatic cancellation of their registrations, and other civil enforcement actions.

Walker also contends the law is a solu-

I was happy with the outcome especially since Skynyrd Lynyrd was the only band with two songs in the Top 10. "Sweet Home

Alabama" finished in ninth. and "Free Bird" was voted fourth Those

Led Zeppelin's "Stairway to Heaven," the Eagles' "Hotel California" and Oueen's "Bohemian Rhapsody" were

Other Skynyrd songs to make the list included "Simple Man" in 35th, 'Gimme Three Steps" in 74th, "Tuesday's Gone" in 182nd, "That Smell" in 205th, "Call Me the Breeze" in 253rd and "The Bal-

That's why it troubles me to say the historical marker is gone - for now from the site known as Hell House, the shanty where most of Skynyrd's songs



were crafted. An Edgewater Landing's Home Owners' Association Board member ordered it to be removed because he believed non-residents didn't have the right to be inside the gated community.

But they have the right to see the sign from Peters Creek. Edgewater Landing doesn't own the creek. That's why we installed the marker at the dock. That has public access, and the marker couldn't be seen from the street.

It's sickening when someone has little regard for history or the law. Their sense of importance consumes them so much that they forget the significance of what happened on that lot more than 50 years ago.

The fledging band Lynyrd Skynyrd moved their practices to the shack in the woods where they could play from sunrise to sunset without bothering anyone. The shack, known as Hell House

because it didn't have air conditioning, is where songs like "Gimme Three Steps," "Tuesday's Gone," "Sweet Home Alabama" and "Free Bird" were written, practiced and perfected.

Apparently, one man didn't care.

What bothers me most is he didn't have a problem with the construction and pool companies who used the historic lot as a garbage can. There are piles of concrete and rocks on the lot. And until two weeks ago, there was a port-a-john there. Pallets of sod have been stored there. Empty boxes of wiring have been discarded there. Residents also throw their lawn debris, especially branches, over the fence and onto the lot.

No beer cans, fast food trash or liquor bottles have been left on the lot. Nobody has spray-painted graffiti or stolen property. The man said unwanted Skynyrd fans were driving down the cost of the properties in the development. That's not true. I checked with the property appraiser's office.

I know about the lot because I mow it each week as a favor to the family of the $% \left({{{\rm{T}}_{\rm{T}}}} \right)$

man who bought it two years ago. Adam Hartle paid \$7,000 for the marker, but he died unexpectedly of a heart attack weeks before it was delivered. He was 41.

Music historian Bob Kealing and I made sure Adam's wish to identify the history of the lot was honored when we had the marker installed near what's known as Ronnie's dock

The man called the association's property management company and had the sign removed. He didn't go to a judge and get an order. The Clay County Sheriff's Office didn't deliver an order to have it removed.

Home Owners' Associations aren't above the law. Nobody can enter private property and take something that doesn't belong to them. The sheriff's office can't do it, so what makes anyone believe an HOA can do it? If you think an HOA has that right, I'm glad you don't live near me.

We decided not to make an issue of one man's ill-advised decision because the majority of other owners there don't deserve to be criticized. That's why we ask that you don't approach the lot from the street and don't do anything to disrespect the neighborhood. The sign will return.

Somebody has to act reasonably in this matter. And it will be Lynyrd Skynyrd fans.

tion in search of alleged problems.

"The State of Florida is correct to seek integrity in our electoral system. Sound election laws ensure the people are heard without distortion from negligent and bad faith actors. Here, however, Florida's solutions for preserving election integrity are too far removed from the problems it has put forward as justifications," the order adds.

An appeal is inevitable, in keeping with many of Walker's initial rulings against the state of Florida, whose defendants, in this case, include Secretary of State Cord Byrd, Attorney General Ashley Moody, and the state's Supervisors of Elections.

SB 7050 imposed sweeping changes but arguably received more publicity for clarifying Florida's "resign to run" law ensuring Gov. Ron DeSantis could run for President without resigning. The plaintiffs' filing did not address that or the judge's ruling. Meanwhile, Florida Democrats did not hesitate to celebrate the preliminary injunction.

"This is a huge win for the people of Florida," said Florida Democratic Party Chair Nikki Fried. "Our democracy works best when everyone has access to the ballot box, and I applaud the court for recognizing that and actively protecting the rights of Floridians.

Continued Fried: "Ron and his sidekicks in the legislature, to quote the injunction, struggle with 'governing within the bounds set by the United States Constitution' – a struggle driven by their endless and unquenchable thirst for power. I don't know what's more embarrassing – his recent scorecard in the courts or his cratering poll numbers."

Reparation Earth: Putting the 'fresh' back in fresh foods

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – When thinking about "natural" food, it is common to assume dirt is involved.

Dangerous pesticides and GMOs have become common when consuming farmgrown fruits and vegetables. But one local business is putting the "fresh" back in fresh foods.

Reparation Earth aims to get back to the "roots" of Earthly nourishment and provide all-natural, freshly grown food to customers in Northeast Florida.

"We have to do a better job of being efficient ... there's just more and more people. So, what's a better way that we can produce food for everyone? In an all-natural way, where we're not dependent on chemicals," said farm owner Joe McCarthy.

The greenhouse farm uses both aquaculture and hydroponics to carry out a process that alters how food is traditionally grown. Aquaculture consists of farmraising aquatic animals, while hydroponics consists of growing fruits and vegetables using solely water-based techniques.

This combined approach, dubbed aquaponics, allows the farm to recycle filtered wastewater produced by their farm-grown fish to supply nutrients to the aboveground plants. The wastes from the fish convert ammonia and nitrite into nitrate, feeding the plants and growing the food.

With roughly 70 fish in each 200-gallon tank, McCarthy said that by using the waste from the fish, the farm could bypass the worry of possible pathogens in the food.



"Fish are cold-blooded animals. So we don't have to worry about warm-blooded pathogens meaning your listeria [and] Ecoli. So, we don't have those pathogens in our food," McCarthy said.

The farm recycles its water for continued use by utilizing deep water culture and a nutrient film technique. According to Reparation Earth, one continual cycle allows crops to grow 365 days a year.

In addition to fish, the farm also raises chickens to produce fresh eggs.

Aquaponics dates back centuries, however, McCarthy said it has grown a lot more popular in recent years due to its benefits.

"It's just become a lot bigger currently. Just because, again, you get your protein, you get your produce. So, it's just like that self cycle, so, it's [an] all closed environment," McCarthy said.

The farm produces romaine, butter and

leafy lettuce all year round. Their fresh herbs include basil, thyme, oregano, rosemary and lemon balm. Seasonally, the farm produces veggies such as cucumbers, kale, green beans, cherry tomatoes, squash and collards.

As extras, the farm offers frozen tilapia, frozen pesto, fresh eggs, honey and loofahs.

Produce Manager Stephanie Scarborough said she had never heard of the technique before she started working at the farm. Scarborough said the method is something essential for food production.

"Because in traditional farming, we're using a lot of pesticides, we're using a lot of water to water those crops. Especially here in Florida, even though we have wet seasons, we also have dry seasons. I do believe it is the future of farming and sustainability. That way, we're not using up our resources as much and as quickly," Scarborough said.

From feeding the fish to cleaning the

water and packing the produce for sale, McCarthy's days of farming consist of constant effort. However, his passions only make him work harder.

Growing up, McCarthy said he always had an interest in farming. Originally from Illinois, McCarthy said he had the opportunity to raise a pig and pick up rocks in fields for \$10 an hour when he was younger. The experience was great for McCarthy. However, he said he can remember thinking the corporate world was his only calling.

"It's just I was always 'Oh, I'm going to go to college and get the tie and go off to work," McCarthy said.

Starting as a banker, McCarthy said his passion for being in the service-oriented industry propelled him to the forefront of change.

Officially taking severance with the bank, McCarthy faced many career options. Taking a leap of faith, he and his wife

"I was working someplace else, and another girl quit. I found out about the job. I came over to talk to him, and he hired me on the spot. That was in July of 1992, and I enjoyed working with the man because he was quite comical. After he passed away, I just continued to work here because it was a great job," she said.

Wallace said her time with Modern Barber and Style has been nothing short of extraordinary.

"Great job, great customers, great people that come in," she said.

She's served four generations of some families.

"It's a pretty nice place. We enjoy our people," Wallace said.

The barber shop, which is the oldest in Clay County, is a cherished institution in Orange Park. It's not just a place for haircuts, but instead, a hub for stories, memories and community fellowship.

"It's been in the same location, and people know it's here. That's why we have generations of people that kept coming in," she said. The shop, pro-military and patriotic, is adorned with photographs of fighter planes and warships on its walls, some of even which pre-date the shop's storied 67year history in the town.

"We used to cut hair for a lot of guys from Cecil Field before it closed, including the Blue Angel pilots and most of the people from the base," she said.

Step inside the shop, and you'll be greeted with a sweeping feeling of nostalgia.

From the barber chairs to the old photographs to the hidden backroom with a giant aerial shot of Mayport and the old Coca-Cola machine, to the antiques, toys and treasures like the old coffee mugs, miniature American flags, and vintage signs such as the one that reads "Corvette: America's Only Authentic Sports Car," you'll feel as if you literally stepped into a time machine and returned to the 1970s.

The photographs feature fighter planes,

warships and a spaceship. Many of them were hand-picked by Modern Barber and Style's military customers that once piloted or sailed those vessels.

"All of the military guys would bring in the pictures and things and say, 'was on that plane, I was on that ship,'" she said.

The shop's modest and homey red brick structure, three-chair, two-room set-up, which is filled with antiques and old treasures, captures the spirit of a bygone era.

For employees and customers alike, the shop isn't just a place for haircuts, but rather a home away from home.

"It's a really great place to work. You come in, do your job, talk with folks, and go home," she said.

You'll never find Jenifer Strickland, a 16-year employee and resident of Keystone Heights, not smiling.

Strickland echoed her boss's sentiment: "It's a good place, and we hope it stays for a long, long, time, and even more," she said.

The shop's historical significance to the town and county is undeniable, and the staff is eager to preserve Modern Barber and Style's unique, enthralling and nostalgic heritage.

Wallace believes that the shop is wellqualified candidate to be added to the U.S. Register of National Historic Places.

"We would like to (apply). I think it's a historical building to still be the same business as long as it has been. That's pretty good. There's not too many businesses that can say that anywhere. But for us to continue to stay in business is a testament to or work and love of our customers," she said.

The shop has a fan-like following, and customers are treated like family once they walk in. Wallace, Strickland and the rest of the Modern's hardworking staff know the ins and outs of their customers' lives.

Tom Lilly became a regular customer 13 years ago. He said the shop's warm, friendly atmosphere and unique charm keep him from coming back, along with the fact that they give the best haircut in town.



"These are the friendliest, nicest people you'd ever want to meet. They're down to earth, and they'll tell you to your face whether you're right or wrong. That's the way we need to live. This (shop) is just America right here," he said.

He didn't bring the photograph, but Lilly's USS Saratoga CV-60 from the 1960s is adorned on the "wall of fame" as well.

"You've got a picture of my ship in your shop. I think that's wonderful," he said.

The shop's strong mettle was heavily tested during the COVID-19 pandemic, but they survived through struggles due to their loyal customers, Wallace said.

"Thank you for helping me out during COVID. Those were rough times," she said.

During the pandemic, Wallace and her staff would make house calls to provide a

much-needed trim.

Strickland was especially amazed. "We got through it because of our customers. They cared about us," she said.

She received checks in the mail, and one customer even donated her a bicycle when she made a home visit. He offered other items, as well. She sold the bike for \$50.

"We just have a lot of wonderful customers," Strickland said.

Wallace, Strickland, and Lilly all agree Modern Barber and Style Shop is a true "hometown barber shop."

"I'm so glad I found this barber shop, for real. I don't know if there are any other ones. They may be around, but this is 'it,'" he said. In an ever-changing world, the shop remains a landmark of the yesteryear – and a symbolic staple of the community.

ticipated and contributed to the event's success. Dingman was born and reared in Clay, and his children attended Orange Park High.

"This event holds a special place in my heart, and it's fantastic to see so many Clay County anglers involved," he said.

Jacqui Grant and her husband, Steve, are from the county and play vital roles in organizing the tournament annually. Volunteer Josh Hargis helped provide crucial assistance for King Buster.

Steve, employed with Hi-Liner Fishing Gear and Tackle in Green Cove Springs, said his company had been a sponsor since he began working there. He and Jacqui's son, Tyler, also landed a 23-pound kingfish during the youth tournament.

"He was ecstatic," Grant said.

The number or size of fish or prizes awarded does not solely measure the success of King Buster. It is instead a celebration of community, compassion and joy that brings together children and families. Through the tournament's partnership with Dreams Come True, organizers continue to touch the young lives facing challenging circumstances, ensuring that dreams come true for brave children.

"It's a lot more than fishing. When you're fishing with kids, you're not talking about chores or homework or my job. Are you doing the same thing together? How often does that happen nowadays?" Dingman said.

Custom Guitars.

He still works as a salesman, but his real passion is turning old, beat-up, out-of-tune guitars into musical masterpieces. One, a classic guitar painted with an American flag, gained worldwide notoriety when Paul Wane electrified a sellout Jaguars crowd with the "Star-Spangled Banner" ahead of their regular-season finale against Tennessee in January.

"It's come full circle with the Jaguars," Murphy said.

Wane's performance was "liked" on social media more than 3,000 times and shared more than 400 times within three hours of his performance. Murphy already was spending every spare moment in his shed tinkering with old guitars. Now he's thinking he may retire three years earlier than planned to devote his full attention to his handiwork. It wasn't easy to realize his guitar-playing ability was above average but not exceptional. But he found an outlet every bit as rewarding as playing an encore at Madison Square Garden.

"I love music; I love the sound of a guitar," Murphy said. "I wanted to be a rock star. I'm not a rock star, but I love to see people play my guitars on stage. I live vicariously through them. I get that rock star feeling.'

The Jaguars' patriotic protest

Murphy said he used to spend weekends watching football and golf on television, but that changed when players from Jacksonville and Baltimore kneeled at London's Wembley Stadium.

The display turned off many fans - especially in an area where the military is the No. 1 employer. And it prompted the Jaguars President Mark Laming to send a letter of apology to the Jacksonville Director of Military Affairs two weeks later.

"They did it on foreign soil," he said. "Being a military brat, that hit me hard. I

turned off the TV and said. 'I'm done.' I'll never watch a game again. I still haven't." He found a better way to "not waste my

time.' "The Jaguars were the ones who made

this happen." Terri said. "Then we ended up at the Jaguars (with the guitar). It's been full circle.

Murphy had two free tickets to Wane's performance, but "I wasn't going all the way to Jacksonville to watch a 90-second song and leave," he said.

Murphy said the Jaguars hired Wane because they didn't expect the team to be competitive at the end of the year. Not only did the team surprise the experts by winning the division, but Wane's "Star-Spangled Banner" became the NFL's most-watched National Anthem on YouTube last season.

"The cool thing was when they hired Paul to do that, he was some local guy," Murphy said. "They expected the Jaguars to be terrible, especially at the end of the season. They figured there might be 20,000-30,000 people in the stands. They were getting a discount by having this local guy. Then the season progressed the way it did. They won their last (five regular season) games, so the game was essentially a playin for the playoffs. It was a sold-out stadium and turned out to be a nationally-televised game

Murphy created the guitar, and Running Barefoot Farm's Jackie Strickland added the artwork. The procedure is called pyrography. It involves burning the wood and drawing the flag with colored pencils. Murphy then added 13 coats of lacquer.

"We didn't expect the National Anthem to be televised with all the controversy. They (networks) quit showing it. When the telecast came on, the teams would already be out on the field."

The Murphys were at Amvets Post 86 in Keystone Heights during the performance. Wane's rendition was quickly labeled "pure Jacksonville.'

"My mom and my sisters called and said they just saw it on ESPN." he said. "It went viral. The funny thing is, a lot of the country, they were making fun of us and laughing at us. And we're like, 'This is who we are. We don't care."

Murphy's guitar business keeps rocking along

Wane was impressed with Murphy's work as soon as he picked up one of his guitars. "He started coming up to my open mic a couple of years ago to Howlin Wolf and just asked if he could bring guitars up and display them and let people play them," Wane said. "He did that so he could work the bugs out of anything that needed to be done. To him, because a lot of times with a new build, it will tell you what you need after it's been played a few times.'

The first time the two met, Murphy asked him to play one of his custom-built guitars. Wane was so impressed he played it all night.

"I asked him how much he wanted for it, and I took it home," Wane said. "Now, just about everyone in a band around here has a Jay Murphy Custom Guitar. I have four. I also take him my other guitars and have them worked on."

Murphy quickly attracted an extensive customer base of more than 25 local musicians.

"It's a cool way to get business, whether it's a way for somebody to bring in a guitar to get fixed up or somebody who wants to buy one," he said. "People don't realize how much better a guitar like this is compared to one you buy off the shelves somewhere. I've got some customers who have three custom builds. They buy one. Then they want another. And another."

Travis Bryan, another dedicated customer, plays beside Wane with Duval County Line. Bryan used to put new guitars through the paces and provide Murphy with helpful tips. One of Murphy's guitars was recently played by Austin James at Wane's "Jumpin' and Jivin' Juneboree, a day-long festival of games and music to benefit Wane's Rising Star: Give a Kid a Guitar program that provides free instruments to children as an outlet from trouble and sitting behind a computer screen.

"Dozens and dozens and dozens" of the nearly 300 guitars given away have been refurbished by Murphy.

"We have to buy parts every once in a while, but other than that, Jav's never charged a dime for this," Wane said.

Murphy often looks for old guitars in pawn shops and brings them back to life. A lot of them wind up in Wane's musical nonprofit.

"We still get a lot of beat-up old guitars and some that are in great shape - somebody bought a guitar, played it for three months, stuck it in their closet. Five years later, they're pulling stuff out of their closet, and they find it," Murphy said. "They need a little attention to bring them back to life. They need to be freshened up, cleaned with new strings, a new setup.

"You can buy a guitar at a big box store, but it won't be set up well. The cheaper guitars are often terrible right out of the box. I'll take a little nicked-up guitar, beat up, and set it up where a kid can play it and enjoy it."

By his admission, Jay Murphy never grasped his dream of becoming a rock star. The musical community would disagree.

Baby jaguar named Banks at zoo

For Clay Today

JACKSONVILLE - Meet Banks. Jacksonville Zoo and Gardens' 12-week-old jaguar cub received his name Friday.

After a week-long submission period and a one-day public poll, Banks was chosen as the winning name for the cub born on April 7. 2023. The "Name That Jag" naming contest began on June 21, 2023 in partnership with the Jaguars Foundation and received nearly \$11,500 in donations from 700 submissions.

Banks was one of four names chosen by Zoo staff and the cub's care specialists for the 24-hour public poll on June 29 on the Zoo's Instagram and Twitter. Banks, an homage to the St. Johns River and the home of the Jacksonville Jaguars, received 2,185 votes, or 30% of the total votes. Zuco (ZOO-CO), a combination of the cub's paternal grandparents' names, Zassi and Tuco, came in second with 2.174 votes, or just over 29% of the total votes. Duwey, a play on Duval County and the Jacksonville



Jaguars' rally cry "DUUUVAL!", took third place with 2,164 votes, or 29% of the total votes. In fourth place was Tobai (TAH-BY), short for "Ah Tabai," which is the Mayan god of the hunt and protector of animals. receiving 816 votes, or 11% of all votes cast.

"Banks has captivated our community's attention since he was born, and the success of this contest is a testament to Jacksonville's passion for jaguars, both on and off the field," said Nikki Smith, Chief Philanthropy and Community Engagement Officer at Jacksonville Zoo and Gardens. "We are beyond grateful for the support and generosity the cub and Zoo have received throughout the naming process, and we look forward to introducing him to his fans later this summer."

It costs more than \$10,000 to provide annual medical exams and food for the jaguars at Jacksonville Zoo and Gardens, and to support Jacksonville's newest jaguar, the Jaguars Foundation agreed to match up to \$10,000 in donations through the naming contest, bringing the total funds raised to \$21,494. The public can watch Babette and Banks on video at the Zoo's Range of the Jaguar exhibit. Admission tickets can be purchased at jacksonvillezoo.org.

Their mission is to use their watercraft to clean up portions of the river's shoreline that are inaccessible by land. particularly in the area near JAXPort, near the Dames Point Bridge and under the Mathews Bridge.

A barge supplied by Current Problems, a nonprofit based in Gainesville that seeks to restore and protect the wetlands and waterways of Florida, will be available to assist in the trash disposal. Boaters are, of course, responsible for caring for their own vessels and following all U.S. Coast Guard regulations.

Each clean-up and boat convoy site will be marked by a NEFAR flag. Snacks and water, rubber gloves and grabbers will be available to all participants.

Nursing home manager charged with stealing patient's money

ORANGE PARK – A joint investigation by the State Attorney's Office and the Orange Park Police Department led to the arrest of the former office manager at The Palms Nursing and Rehab at Orange Park.

Priscilla M. Sluder, 34, of Jacksonville, was charged with grand theft after an audit revealed \$29,504 of the residents' Patient Trust Fund was missing. Investigators with OPPD and Attorney General Ashley Moody's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit said Sluder took the money from Dec. 19, 2019, and May 5, 2022, and used it for her own gain. The fund was set up for patients to make cash purchases.

Sluder turned herself into the Clay County Jail on June 30. She was released after posting a \$10,003 bond. Her next court appearance will be on July 24.

"Florida seniors should not have to worry about their personal funds being stolen, especially from a manager of a nursing facility who is supposed to be looking out for them. The defendant's actions are shameful, and I am grateful for my Medicaid Fraud Control Unit stopping this grand theft," Moody said.

The stunning aesthetics of the new establishment aren't quite as visible from the front entrance, but the dining area and the towering glass wall between the inside, outdoor bar, and green space should turn plenty of heads for customers.

The big-ticket investment should create an inviting environment for patrons to relax and spend quality time while enjoying beer and fresh-to-order pizza, which is only made with the highest quality of ingredients.

"It's meant to be a place that you can

actually sit down and enjoy and spend some time in. We're not expecting people to eat and run," he said.

Villmow also highlighted V Pizza's convenient location next door to The Church of Eleven22, a place that holds special significance to several staff members.

"That's almost family to several mem-

moved to Florida and dived right into the food-producing industry.

"Everything I told people not to do when I was in the bank, I did. So, really just knowing that I wanted to produce something and be part of where the food comes from," McCarthy said.

As a child, McCarthy recalled the loads of genetically modified foods he encountered. In seeing the effects that the modifications caused, he wanted to find a safer way to grow and consume the food.

"I'd rather just grow something from all-natural, and then just know where it comes from, produce something, and then go from there," McCarthy said.

So, he did. Reparation Earth made its home at 5968 County Road 209 in 2018 and has proudly serviced Clay County residents since.

The small farm sits on the city's outskirts, surrounded by nothing but trees and a peaceful atmosphere. With so many frequent customers, the quaint farm has become a trustful source of fresh food in the area.

Since they first opened, the farm has partnered with local businesses such as the Elks Lodge and the Penney Retirement Community. However, just recently opening its doors to the general public back in January, the farm is working to give residents confidence in what they put in their bodies.

Now with an open market on the property, residents can order their veggies for pickup or come right to the farm for a fresh pick.

Customer Christine Klausser said she gave up buying her lettuce from the grocery store. She cited the bitter taste as the main reason for the switch to fresher options. Now Klausser said she shops at the farm to get her produce.

"I go down there probably once every two weeks or so, sometimes shorter than that. [I] get three heads of lettuce, I usually get their butter lettuce, a romaine and usually a red leaf," Klausser said.

Customer Martha Mangus said it's im-

portant to bring this type of farming to the local area to bring confidence to residents and their food choices. Mangus said she's thankful the farm shares its ways with the community.

"We need to know where our food comes from. And, to make sure it's grown ethically and responsibly. I think Joe definitely does that," Mangus said.

Mangus added that it's important to have the farm available for the food and the experience. Mangus compared the farm to bringing a version of EPCOT's "Living with the Land" to the local community.

"It's just so sustainable, and it makes sense. It's fantastic, it makes you feel like you're at Disney World, but even better," Mangus said.

For the future of Reparation Earth, Mc-Carthy has a lot in store. First up is the expansion of the farm by adding another greenhouse. Breaking ground within the next six months, McCarthy said with the new greenhouse, he hopes to add more room for growing heads of lettuce even more efficiently.

McCarthy noted during the summer,

lettuce shrinks due to high temperatures. In the next greenhouse, he hopes to fix that.

"So, we're going through those planning stages of 'okay do we do something different, do we do this, do we do NFT throughout the whole greenhouse. A lot of people think that's scary, but I think it's exciting," McCarthy said.

Reparation Earth also hopes to expand its produce options. McCarthy said the farm is looking to start growing fruit trees. Currently, the farm's bee hive occupies the space. However, McCarthy said citrus trees would soon reside next to it.

"Our wheels are always spinning. So, we'll see where [we] get," McCarthy said.

For now, McCarthy said he hopes to continue building a strong relationship with the community, bringing quality food to the masses, and teaching about techniques to change how food is grown.

"I think we bring a lot to the area once we get up and running. And [I'm] kind of looking forward to just teaming up with the community and getting involved," McCarthy said.

The District is a unit of special-purpose local government responsible for providing infrastructure improvements for lands within the District. The infrastructure improvements ("Improvements") are currently expected to include, but are not limited to, stormwater management system, roadway improvements, water and sewer utility systems, recreation improvements, wetland mitigation, and other infrastructure, all as more specifically described in the Improvement Plan, on file and available during normal business hours at the District Manager's Office.

The District intends to impose assessments on benefited lands within the District in the manner set forth in the District's *Preliminary Supplemental Special Assessment Allocation Report, Special Assessment Bonds, Series 2023* dated June 13, 2023 ("Assessment Report"), which is on file and available during normal business hours at the District Manager's Office. The Assessment Report identifies each tax parcel identification number within the District and assessments per parcel for each land use category that is currently expected to be assessed. The method of allocating assessments for the Improvements to be funded by the District will initially be determined on an equal assessment per acre basis. The methodology is explained in more detail in the Assessment Report. Also as described in more detail in the District. Please consult the Assessment Report for more details.

The annual principal assessment levied against each parcel will be based on repayment over thirty (30) years of the total debt allocated to each parcel. The District expects to collect sufficient revenues to retire no more than \$12,195,000 in debt to be assessed by the District, exclusive of fees and costs of collection or enforcement, discounts for early payment and interest. The proposed schedule of assessments is as follows:

The assessments may be prepaid in whole at any time, or in some instances in part, or may be paid in not more than thirty (30) annual installments subsequent to the issuance of debt to finance the improvements. These annual assessments will be collected on the Clay County tax roll by the Tax Collector. Alternatively, the District may choose to directly collect and enforce these assessments. All affected property owners have the right to appear at the public hearings and the right to file written objections with the District within twenty (20) days of the publication of this notice.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CROSS CREEK NORTH COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT DECLARING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS; DESIGNATING THE NATURE AND LOCATION OF THE PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS; DECLARING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COST OF THE IMPROVEMENTS, THE PORTION TO BE PAID BY ASSESSMENTS, AND THE MANNER AND TIMING IN WHICH THE ASSESSMENTS ARE TO BE PAID; DESIGNATING THE LANDS UPON WHICH THE ASSESSMENTS SHALL BE LEVIED; PROVIDING FOR AN ASSESSMENT PLAT AND A PRELIMINARY ASSESSMENT ROLL; ADDRESSING THE SETTING OF PUBLIC HEARINGS; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION OF THIS RESOLUTION; AND ADDRESSING CONFLICTS, SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Cross Creek North Community Development District ("District") is a local unit of special-purpose government organized and existing under and pursuant to Chapter 190, *Florida Statutes*; and

WHEREAS, the costs of the Original Project have continued to increase, and the District hereby determines to undertake, install, plan, establish, construct or reconstruct, enlarge or extend, equip, acquire, operate, and/or maintain the additions to the District's overall capital improvement plan as described in the District's Supplemental Engineer's Report, dated April 3, 2023 ("**Project**"), which is attached hereto as **Exhib**it **A** and incorporated herein by reference; and WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the District

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the District to pay for all or a portion of the cost of the Project by the levy of special assessments ("Assessments") using the methodology set forth in that Master Special Assessment Allocation Report, September 18, 2023, as supplemented by the Preliminary Supplemental Assessment Allocation Report which is attached hereto as **Exhibit B**, incorporated herein by reference, and on file with the District Manager at c/o Rizzetta & Company, Inc., 3434 Colwell Avenue, Suite 200, Tampa, Florida 33614 ("District Records Office");

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CROSS CREEK NORTH COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT:

1. AUTHORITY FOR THIS RESOLUTION; INCOR-PORATION OF RECITALS. This Resolution is adopted pursuant to the provisions of Florida law, including without limitation Chapters 170, 190 and 197, Florida Statutes. The recitals stated above are incorporated herein and are adopted by the Board as true and correct statements.

2. DECLARATION OF ASSESSMENTS. The Board hereby declares that it has determined to undertake the Project and to defray all or a portion of the cost thereof by the Assessments. 3. DESIGNATING THE NATURE AND LOCATION

3. DESIGNATING THE NATURE AND LOCATION OF IMPROVEMENTS. The nature and general location of, and plans and specifications for, the Project are described in Exhibit A, which is on file at the District Records Office. Exhibit B is also on file and available for public inspection at the same location. 4. DECLARING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COST OF

4. DECLARING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COST OF THE IMPROVEMENTS, THE PORTION TO BE PAID BY ASSESSMENTS, AND THE MANNER AND TIMING IN WHICH THE ASSESSMENTS ARE TO BE PAID.

A. The total estimated cost of the Project is \$10,888,660 ("Estimated Cost").

B. The Assessments will defray no more than \$12,195,000, which is the anticipated maximum par value of any bonds and which includes all or a portion of the Estimated Cost, as well as other financing-related costs, as set forth in Exhibit B, and which is in addition to interest and collection costs. On an annual basis, the Assessments will defray no more than \$1,098,474 per year, again as set forth in **Exhibit B**.

C. The manner in which the Assessments shall be apportioned and paid is set forth in Exhibit B, as may be modified by supplemental assessment resolutions. The Assessments will constitute a "master" lien, which may be imposed without further public hearing in one or more separate liens each securing a series of bonds, and each as determined by supplemental assessment resolution. With respect to each lien secur-ing a series of bonds, the special assessments shall be paid in not more than (30) thirty yearly installments. The special assessments may be payable at the same time and in the same manner as are ad-valorem taxes and collected pursuant to Chapter 197, *Florida Stat*utes; provided, however, that in the event the uniform non ad-valorem assessment method of collecting the Assessments is not available to the District in any year, or if determined by the District to be in its best interest, the Assessments may be collected as is otherwise permitted by law, including but not limited to by direct bill. The decision to collect special assessments by any particular method - e.g., on the tax roll or by direct bill – does not mean that such method will be used to collect special assessments in future years, and the District reserves the right in its sole discretion to select collection methods in any given year, regardless of past practices. 5. The proposed O&M Assessments as stated include collection costs and/or early payment discounts, which Clay County ("County") may impose on assessments that are collected on the County tax bill. Moreover, pursuant to Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, the lien amount shall serve as the "maximum rate" authorized by law for O&M Assessments, such that no assessment hearing shall be held or notice provided in future years unless the assessments are proposed to be increased or another criterion within Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, is met. Note that the O&M Assessments do not include any debt service assessments previously levied by the District and due to be collected for Fiscal Year 2023/2024.

Upcoming Public Hearings, and Regular Meeting

The Board of Supervisors ("Board") for the Cross Creek North Community Development District ("District") will hold the following two public hearings and a regular meeting:

The first public hearing is being held pursuant to Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, to receive public comment and objections on the District's proposed budget ("Proposed Budget") for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2023 and ending September 30, 2024 ("Fiscal Year 2023/2024"). The second public hearing is being held pursuant to Chapters 190 and 197, Florida Statutes, to consider the imposition of operations and maintenance special assessments ("O&M Assessments") upon the lands located within the District, to fund the Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2023/2024; to consider the adoption of an assessment roll; and, to provide for the levy, collection, and enforcement of assessments. At the conclusion of the hearings, the Board will, by resolution, adopt a budget and levy O&M Assessments as finally approved by the Board. A Board meeting of the District will also be held where the Board may consider any other District business.

Description of Assessments

The District imposes O&M Assessments on benefitted property within the District for the purpose of funding the District's general administrative, operations, and maintenance budget. Pursuant to Florida law, a description of the services to be funded by the O&M Assessments, and the properties to be improved and benefitted from the O&M Assessments, are all set forth in the Proposed Budget. A geographic depiction of the property potentially subject to the proposed O&M Assessments is identified in the map attached hereto. The table below shows the schedule of the proposed O&M Assessments, which are subject to change at the hearing:

The proposed O&M Assessments as stated include collection costs and/or early payment discounts, which Clay County ("County") may impose on assessments that are collected on the County tax bill. Moreover, pursuant to Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, the lien amount shall serve as the "maximum rate" authorized by law for O&M Assessments, such that no assessment notice shall be provided in future years unless the assessments are proposed to be increased or another criterion within Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, is met. Note that the O&M Assessments do not include any debt service assessments previously levied by the District and due to be collected for Fiscal Year 2023/2024.

For Fiscal Year 2023/2024, the District intends to have the County tax collector collect the assessments imposed on certain developed property, and will directly collect the assessments imposed on the remaining benefitted property by sending out a bill prior to, or during, November 2023. It is important to pay your assessment because failure to pay will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the property which may result in loss of title, or for direct billed assessments, may result in a foreclosure action, which also may result in a loss of title. The District's decision to collect assessments on the tax roll or by direct billing does not preclude the District from later electing to collect those or other assessments in a different manner at a future time.

Additional Provisions

The public hearings and meeting are open to the public and will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Florida law. A copy of the Proposed Budget, proposed assessment roll, and the agenda for the hearings and meeting may be obtained at the offices of the District Manager, located at c/o Rizzetta & Company, Inc., 3434 Colwell Ave., Suite 200, Tampa, Florida, 33614, Ph: (904) 436-6270 ("District Manager's Office"), during normal business hours. The public hearings and meeting may be continued to a date, time, and place to be specified on the record at the hearings or meeting. There may be occasions when staff or board members may participate by speaker telephone.

Any person requiring special accommodations at this meeting because of a disability or physical impairment should contact the District Manager's Office at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the meeting. If you are hearing or speech impaired, please contact the Florida Relay Service by dialing 7-1-1, or 1-800-955-8771 (TTY) / 1-800-955-8770 (Voice), for aid in contacting the District Manager's Office.
