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# James uses colorful imagination to create unique pieces of art

Middleburg man with retinitis pigmentosa isn't limitedby disability

MIDDLEBURG - Mark James' world is filled with the bright colors of dragonflies, palm trees, alligators and elephants. He just can't see them.

His imagination isn't limited by retinitis pigmentosa that stole his sight. If he can touch it, he can see it.

The artist learned to twist wiring scraps into artwork, which brought him emotional clarity.

"You know, for some reason, I don't know what it is, but when I'm sitting here bending wire, I actually feel like I can see it," James said. "Sometimes I have to look away because I get so focused. I feel like I can see it in my hands when I'm twisting it. I just sit there and keep bending until it lands in the right spot."





Retinitis pigmentosa robbed Mark James of his sight but not his creativity. He learned to transform scrap pieces of wire into pieces of art. He has more than 100 pieces at his Middleburg home, including a giant shark hanging in his carport and a purple elephant on his mantle.

Retinitis pigmentosa is a genetic disease that breaks down the light-sensitive layer of tissue in the back of the eye. The disease is incurable, affecting a person's ability to see in the light.

"I can't see colors," James said. "I can barely make out shapes.'

James offers some of his pieces to fundraisers and friends. A few have been sold, but his inability to drive makes it difficult for him to sell his work.

"I've given away a few. I've sold a

# Green Cove Springs to consider beautification project for Orange Avenue

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – City council members discussed a potential plan to improve more of the city's scenery at Tuesday night's meeting. According to Assistant City Manager and Public Works Director Mike Null, the city is currently looking to design a project to landscape the two medians on Orange Avenue (U.S. Highway 17).

"[We're] basically looking just to beautify those two medians. Crape myrtles, maybe some larger trees, shrubbery. Whatever DOT will allow us to do," Null said.

The landscaping will enhance one median north of Harbor Road and the other south of Harbor Road. Null said there is no immediate necessity to the project, just an act to make the area more appealing.

"That's the front door to the city, as you're coming south on 17. So, just to make it look nicer when folks are driving in," Null said. If approved, funding for the potential project may come from the Department of Transportation. Null said that the city's match for the budget would require providing utilities and maintenance for the medians moving forward.

Null said plans regarding the beautification project have been in the works for

a while. He added about three weeks ago, an engineer notified the city about an FDOT Beautification Grant application cycle.

"Part of that process is to get with DOT personnel to make sure that the project is a good fit. To make sure they would sign off before we go through the grant process," Null said.

Null furthered that in coming to scope out the potential project, the DOT concluded that a grant wouldn't be necessary to complete it.

"The funding in the grant program is very limited," Null said. "So, for our district, the landscaping folks came out, looked at the project, they liked it, and said most likely they have money [that's] available in their regular annual budget."

In not pursuing the grant any longer, Null said it would hopefully leave the money to other districts that don't have the funding available. Currently, there is no set time frame on when the project will come to fruition. Null said the project's development depends on near-future arrangements with DOT.

"So, the question is are they going to fund the design, [or] do we – and then construction. [We] don't know any details on that yet. Hopefully, in the next few days, we'll know," Null said.

### Renninger to run for reelection for BCC

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – With the stroke of a pin, District 3 County Commissioner Jim Renninger became an official candidate for reelection in 2024. So far, nobody else has filed to com-

pete for the District 3 seat.

The incumbent said that while it is still nine months until the petition deadline next May, his constituents have been asking him whether he would seek

### a second term.

Renninger, who also serves as the Vice Chair for the Commissioners, has addressed several issues, such as evictions and code violations, the Gateway to Clay initiative to improve Wells Road and aligning Clay's priorities with the Northeast Florida Regional Council through the Strategic Plan, which focuses on forefront issues like affordable housing, stormwater resilience and parks.

He discussed several centerpiece issues he plans to run on as the campaign for his second term looms ahead. During his next term, Renninger would seek to address the situation at the airport in Reynolds Park in Green Cove Springs, which Pegasus Technologies own.

The company and city are in a legal dispute because the city annexed and rezoned approximately 14 acres less than a mile away from the private airstrip in June 2022.

"The local governments should have developed codes for operations of airports so that you can maintain operability and security for all concerns. You need safety for the pilots, and you need safety for the people on the ground," he said.

# **Property Appraiser's Office completes Homestead Exemption Audit**

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – One of the responsibilities of the Clay County Property Appraiser's Office is to ensure that all eligible property owners receive the full benefit of those exemptions, reductions and classifications to which they are entitled.

Conversely, property owners who are improperly or fraudulently receiving tax exemptions are problematic and create inequity within the assessment roll and tax base. In the end, honest taxpayers are left with making up the difference that property owners who are improperly receiving or fraudulently claiming a tax exemption create.

Florida law provides for many property tax exemptions that will reduce the taxable value (and taxes) of real property; the most common is homestead exemption. Every person who owns real estate in Florida makes the property his/her permanent residence as of Jan. 1, and files an application with the property appraiser, may be eligible to receive a homestead exemption.

Applicants must establish and maintain proof of permanent residency. Once a homestead exemption is granted, it is renewed every year. Therefore, a subsequent application to maintain the exemption is not required.

Homestead exemption is much more than just a taxable value reduction, as it can protect against large assessment increases. In 1992, Florida voters approved the Save-Our-Homes Constitutional Amendment, thereby limiting the annual increase in the assessed value of properties with a homestead exemption to no more than 3% a year. If a property's market value exceeds the annual increase limitation amount allowed for the assessed value, the difference between those values becomes the SOH assessment differential, which is non-taxable. The SOH assessment differential benefit begins the year after a homestead is granted and can accumulate to a significant property tax savings

As of July 1, the countywide SOH as-

sessment difference is more than 6.5 billion.

Due to the automatic annual renewal and the tremendous benefits of a homestead exemption, Florida law requires property owners to notify the property appraiser if exemption eligibility has changed – and there are severe penalties if not reported.

Pursuant to Florida Statutes, the property appraiser may review the exemption status for any current or prior year for up to 10 years and shall file a tax lien against any property determined to be improperly or fraudulently claiming a homestead exemption. Such property shall be subject to the taxes owed due to the ineligible exemption, plus a penalty of 50% of the unpaid taxes for each year and 15% interest per year.

More than 56,500 parcels are receiving homestead exemption in Clay County and more than 5,000 new applications are received each year. Although the CCPAO has the ability and capacity to process new applications and investigate individual cases of possible homestead ineligibility, a systemic review of all existing exemptions is not plausible.

Therefore, the CCPAO partnered with TrueRoll, an independent research firm, to conduct a homestead exemption audit. The audit was intended to confirm exemption eligibility and certify that all property owners pay their fair share – no more, no less.

During the past 18 months, all existing homesteads in Clay County were reviewed for compliance. After much investigation and research, 190 tax liens were filed, resulting in more than \$55 million in taxable value and \$1.4 million in potential tax revenue. To date, 117 tax liens (61.57%) have been satisfied, equating to more than \$750,000 in property taxes recovered.

All property owners have an interest in protecting the homestead exemption benefits. Although the CCPAO will proactively monitor for homestead exemption compliance, exemption abuse can be reported at www.ccpao.com/report-exemption-abuse.

# Silence, uncertainty is a parent's worst nightmare

Nancy got a text message from her brother last week that triggered a level of anxiety no parent should face. He warned his baby sister of a fire sweeping through Maui.

Immediate shock quickly turned into frustration

Hawaii has the most comprehensive alert system in the world. There are more than 400 alarms on the islands to warn of tsunamis. There were 80 alarms on Maui, but they were silent because tsunami alerts are issued by the National Weather Service. not HEMA.

Once the smoke settles, let's hope NWS and HEMA develop plans to overlap their services.

But, like everything else on Maui, that will come later. There's so much to be done first – like scheduling funerals

Meanwhile, a challenge by minority advocacy groups of Florida's congressional map, signed into law last year, continues to play out. On Friday, the state and plaintiffs reached a joint stipulation, effectively agreeing the map diminished Black voting power in North Florida.

The map, drawn by Gov. Ron DeSantis' office, eliminated a prior configuration of Florida's 5th Congressional District. which spanned from Tallahassee to Jacksonville and covered a number of heavily Black communities.

"Defendants concede that if the nondiminishment standard applies to North Florida (Question No. 1), then there is no Black-performing district in North Florida under the Enacted Map," the stipulation agreement reads. "The parties agree that the former congressional district 5 used for the 2016, 2018, and 2020 congressional elections was a Black-performing district.'

The prior district had been represented since 2017 by former U.S. Rep. Al Lawson, a Tallahassee Democrat. Lawson under the new lines, ran in a new version of Florida's 2nd Congressional District covering all of Tallahassee, but U.S. Rep. Neal Dunn, a Panama City Republican, successfully de-

for nearly 110 people.

Last week's tragedy was another that nobody said it was easy to be a parent. You want the best for them. When there's a chance your children could be hurt, you compromise with higher authorities, keep a vigil by the telephone and worry. And you cry

I remember in 1999 when my daughter was diagnosed with malignant ovarian cancer on a Monday. She was in surgery by Thursday morning. I waited for two hours to learn they got it in time.

I also remember on May 26, 2002. I was in Charlotte, North Carolina, for the Coca-Cola 600. I got ready for breakfast when I saw a breaking news bulletin on television. A barge had run into a 2,000-foot suspension bridge on Interstate 40 in Webbers Falls, Oklahoma. A 580-foot portion of the bridge fell into the Arkansas River, and

fended the seat in November.

The dismantling of Lawson's district resulted in a new configuration of Florida's 4th Congressional District and created an opportunity for Bean. As a state senator, Bean voted to approve the new map in a Special Session. In November, he handily won election to the open seat, winning more than 60% of the vote against Democrat L.J. Holloway. Meanwhile, U.S. Rep. John Rutherford, a Jacksonville Republican, ran in the new version of Florida's 5th Congressional District.

But of note, Bean in the Florida Legislature also voted for a prior congressional map that preserved a version of Lawson's district but was ultimately vetoed by De-Santis. Indeed, he also voted for a map that only passed in the Florida Senate.

DeSantis rejected those maps, specifically deriding Lawson's wide and shallow district as an "unconstitutional gerrymander." In the current lawsuit, the state has held that the Florida Supreme Court, when it enacted the district in 2015, erred by creating a district motivated primarily by race. That ultimately led to the Legislature taking up a map drafted and submitted by Alex Kelly, now Commerce Secretary and DeSantis' acting chief of staff, that was put in effect for the 2022 elections.

Should courts restore a district similar to Lawson's prior constituency, Bean would likely face a treacherous road to

there were immediate death reports.

I knew my son was driving back to his Air Force base in New Mexico from Atlanta. I know he was supposed to spend the night east of Oklahoma City, get up early that Sunday and continue his drive.

I did a quick calculation and realized he would be very close to that bridge at 8:45 a.m. when it collapsed. I called his cellphone and didn't hear back. I called again. And again. And again.

An hour later, he called. He was in Oklahoma City and wasn't unaware of the bridge. I told him when it happened, and we realized he had driven over that bridge 15 minutes ahead of the disaster.

Fourteen people died that morning.

I can't imagine the parents' anguish in Hawaii and Oklahoma have gone through. They waited for calls that would never come.

So if you'll excuse me. I will call my children. I want them to know I love them.

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# Schools reopening rekindles poison concerns

## Distractions, hectic routines contribute to accidental dosing

CLAY COUNTY – As students head back to school, parents and educators are urged to remain vigilant about potential poison exposure that can unexpectedly arise for children during the transitional period.

Michael McCormick, Media Relations and Education Coordinator at the Florida/ USVI Poison Information Center, wanted to emphasize the importance of heightened awareness regarding toxins around children.

With changing routines, increased use of cleaning products at schools, and concerns like energy drinks and online dares to be aware of for teens, the need to err on the side of caution has never been greater. Children have consisted of 37% of the Poison Information Center's calls in the last six years.

"We always see an uptick in calls when school reopens. The surge can be attributed to a variety of factors. Family routines change during the summer, and all of the sudden, you're back to school, and your routine has to change back again. People are getting up early, and there's a mad morning rush," he said.

During these times, medication errors can occur. A typical scenario is "double dosing," when a parent or caregiver accidentally administers a second dose of medication, McCormick explains. He advises caregivers to take a moment, read the medication label carefully, and administer it without distractions.

"It's crucial to focus solely on giving the medication and ensure that you aren't doing anything distracting you. Put the cell phone down and take that 'medicine time,' Make (that time) solely focused on giving medicine," McCormick said.

McCormick also addressed the challenges of handling multiple children.

"You're very busy, trying to make breakfast and getting dressed, and you might hand the wrong medicine to the wrong child or administer the incorrect dose. We know it's hectic. We go through it, too. You have to stop and pause for a second and make sure that you read the bottle every single time. Our memories have a crazy way of forgetting sometimes," he said.

McCormick also urged parents to lock their medicine high and tight, away from

children, while also being wary of cleaning products, which contain dangerous toxins like alcohol, among other chemicals.

With the increased use of cleaning products in classrooms, such as hand sanitizer, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, teachers should also be especially wary. "Obviously, since COVID, there's been a greater emphasis on making sure classrooms are germfree as possible. We've seen an increase in children ingesting things like hand sanitizer, and that can become very dangerous because some of those are alcohol-based, which raises blood sugar levels," he said. Teachers should also keep items locked away out of the reach of children.

But that's not all. McCormick said that it's common for younger children to attempt to eat pens, pencils, markers, and crayons. However, there is one saving grace.

"The good news is that most of these are non-toxic," he said.

But in this and all situations, he still encouraged adults to play it safe by calling the Poison Information Center. "We still encourage you to go ahead and call us. SEE POISON, 15

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# Students return to classes with cellphone, dress restrictions

New laws also require teaching social media safety

CLAY COUNTY – New rules passed by the Florida Legislature made schools a cellphone-free zone this year. Also, students can no longer wear pants with holes and rips above mid-thigh.

The rules require students to learn social media safety, which includes the ban of TikTok, Snapchat, Twitter and other social media platforms on school-provided devices. The Florida House of Representatives voted unanimously to approve the social media guidelines, and it went into effect on July 1.

House Bill 379 states: "A student may not use a wireless communications device during instructional time. A teacher shall designate an area for wireless communication devices during instructional time."

Superintendent David Broskie said the Clay County District Schools will enforce the law, but it will issue a warning on the first offense.

"The student gets a warning, and their parent is contacted on the first offense for cell phone for certain cell phone issues," he said. "And then it goes from there. You know, it's kind of like a phased-in approach, OK? Some schools, by the way, were already doing that last year. That policy was already in place because they recognized that, perhaps, cellphones cause a distraction."

Students can bring phones to school but only send and receive text messages between classes.





New laws in Florida mean students can't make cellphone calls during school hours, and nobody is allowed to wear pants with rips above their knees.

And during class, cellphones must be silenced and out of sight.

According to the policy, the first violation will result in a warning and a call to a parent or guardian. A second violation will be punished with one afternoon of detention; a third violation will earn two days of afternoon detention; a fourth violation will result in two days of in-school suspension, a fifth violation will lead to five days of inschool suspension; and, a sixth violation will result in one-to-three days of out of school detention.

There also are new dress code rules.

No apparel with off-color remarks or pictures is allowed, along with drug, alcohol or tobacco-related slogans or violent imagery.

Also banned are spandex shorts, tank tops, halter tops, tube tops, crop tops, spa-

ghetti straps, mesh and see-through shirts, muscle shirts, chains hanging from clothing, bedroom slippers and jeans or pants with holes above mid-thigh.

Finally, students in grades seventhrough-12 must have a signed permission slip to check out books in school libraries. Each student is required to have their own form, which is available at docs.google. con/.../1Snwx/mobilebasic.

# NE Florida law agencies detail fentanyl scourge to Senator Marco Rubio

Agencies plead with U.S. Senator to strengthen southern border

FLEMING ISLAND – U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio looked in astonishment when he was told about a Flagler County Sheriff's Office deputy who, just a day earlier, was overwhelmed by an apparent fentanyl overdose.

The deputy was testing the substance seized during a DUI arrest was indeed fentanyl when he told a fellow deputy he needed an ambulance. Just touching the synthetic opioid can be deadly, especially for law enforcement officers without tolerance.

A FCSO deputy administered Narcan to save the other deputy's life, Sheriff David Williams said. Narcan is a drug that reverses the effects of an opioid overdose.

More than 15 law enforcement officials, including representatives from the Green Cove Springs and Orange Park police departments, met with deputies and



drug chiefs from several sheriff's offices at CCSO's Fleming Island substation to tell Rubio the fentanyl crisis has never been greater in Northeast Florida. They asked for help on the federal level – especially securing the southern border – to better

restrict drug flow into the country.

"It is overwhelming, really overwhelming," Cook said. "It really is priority No. 1 for law enforcement in Northeast Florida."

Cook said distributors and street-level dealers are so eager to create addicts many now give Narcan with purchases. She said they are adding fentanyl, which is 100 times stronger than morphine, to marijuana to hook unsuspecting victims.

"This is a local problem. It's a state problem. It's a national problem, and only through the cooperative efforts and enforcement from the local, state and federal partners can we even make a dent in this," Cook said.

"Standing here today. I want to tell you, as a parent and as a sheriff, you need to talk to your kids. We are seeing fentanyl being laced into almost anything and everything. A child or a young person could be experimenting with drugs. Something as simple as marijuana is laced with fentanyl. This could kill them. And so you have to be talking to your kids about drugs and not taking things given to them by their friends or people they don't know."

# Sheriff's Office looks for new leads in vandalism cases

CLAY COUNTY – After finding no solid leads, the Clay County Sherriff's Department has inactivated an investigation into a string of bizarre and symbol-laden graffiti vandalism incidents that have defaced property in the county's northern portion for the past several months.

The case is not closed and can be reactivated as soon as investigators find additional evidence.

The most recent incident was on July 20 when private and public properties were damaged in Orange Park. Sgt. Zachary Cox first observed the graffiti spray paint at 2 p.m., on the traffic control box owned by the Department of Transportation at the intersection of Wells Road and Blanding Boulevard.

That was just the beginning. Deputies found more graffiti at the Orange Park Mall. The same purple-spray paint logo was painted on two separate light poles – one with a circular logo design, the other with star, planet and moon, ordained with the words "Super Gotcha M2N."



Certified Arborist Disease Diagnosis Fertilization The brand of vandalism, defined by the purple spray paint and a heart and star logo, has been spray-painted onto multiple businesses, traffic boxes and light posts over the last six months, according to the sheriff's office. A potential suspect did meet in the parking lot with deputies, but the individual provided a Lyft receipt showing travel from Jacksonville to St. Johns County.

"The heart-star logo design is interlocked with each other as one symbol," deputy Patrick McFetridge wrote in a redacted incident report. Along with that wild series of star-ridden graffiti vandalism incidents, another publicly-owned property was tagged by vandals at the overpass of Plantation Oaks Boulevard over State Road 23 at 4000 Plantation Oaks Boulevard late last month.

By the time deputy Matthew Edmonson discovered the wall had been heavily spray painted by numerous forms of graffiti," that "appeared to be spray painted by numerous individuals on both the north and south side of the retaining walls," on July 26, several months could have already passed.

"There are numerous weeds and foliage grown over the graffiti, which would lead me to believe it has been there for at least several months," Edmonson wrote in his report.

The vandals, who left behind the graffiti with random and discernible patterns, did not leave behind names or specific brands, which would have potentially helped provide a lead to a possible suspect. However, they did leave behind graffiti in numerous colors with famous juvenile cultural markings such as smiley faces, penises, cartoon characters, and phrases such as "Class of 2023" and "Deez Nuts."

This time, public property was once again the victim. The County Roads Department owns a portion of the wall, while the State Turnpike Authority owns the other part of the road.





The Clay County Sheriff's Office needs new leads to solve a series of vandalism cases, particularly a man riding an electric bicycle in Orange Park who's on several video surveillance systems spray-painting stars on public and private property. The county has been busy for months removing graffiti from power poles, traffic boxes and buildings.



After observing the crime scene, Edmonson quickly reached out to the County Public Works Department, advising that a work order be requested to have it painted over. The representative said the graffiti would be removed. Due to a lack of evidence, the case is considered inactive until new leads are established.

The investigation can be reopened. In the meantime, the sheriff's office, county officials and the Turnpike Authority have talked to address the incident. The criminals acted in Alexandra Compere's district, which quickly addressed the issue. She mentioned the criminal activity at the county commissioners' meeting on July 27.

During commissioners' comments, Compere said she was inundated with phone calls, texts and social media messages from





her constituents. She expressed her disappointment in the actions, sharing the shame with the community.

"Anytime someone defaces public property, that's unacceptable. It's frustrating because (the suspects) just need a creative outlet," she said.During the Aug. 8 commissioner's meeting, Compere provided an update."The Turnpike Authority has let us know that it is scheduled for cleaning, and their portion of the wall would be handled, leaving a time frame for the end of the month, as well as the end of the week for the county's portion of the wall," Compere said. She talked with Sherriff Michelle Cook and the Turnpike Authority.

"I'm thankful for swift action on this, and there were quite a few collaborators on this," she said.

Cook said her agency learned of an overdose death, the 25th in the county this year, minutes before the roundtable.

"It's like some of the other drug epidemics we have faced in the past," Rubio said. "This is the first where incidental exposure to the drug can actually kill everyone around, including the person or the people who responded to that call. So we have a very serious challenge here."

Rubio said the federal government needs to fight the scourage from several directions.

"We're really deeply concerned about border security," he said. "It's not just that I'm not in favor of someone coming into this country. They want to work here, but the real danger in the country, the immediate danger, is it's not just the person who's crossing illegally because they have a relative here. They want to work here.

"That network that traffics them is the same network that's also bringing in the drugs. You have to disrupt that network. It's too easy to get across the country. And so we have a lot of work to do in that regard in terms of improving that."

Nassau County Sheriff Bill Leeper didn't mince words when describing the drug crisis.

"They don't give a \$&#@ about closing the border," he said. Leeper then held up a ballpoint pen and said you could put enough fentanyl on the tip of a pen to kill someone.

Rubio said another key will be the upcoming presidential election in Mexico. Current President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador doesn't appear to be as concerned about the flow of drugs from the cartels into the United States.

"There will be a change in government in Mexico at some point here (in 2024) with a new election coming up," Rubio said. "We need an administration over there that's more open to disrupting the activities of these cartels."

Rubio also said the federal government also needs to be tougher on China, which provides the cartels with the chemicals that become fentanyl. Cook said most Northeast Florida counties and municipalities combine resources to create a more formative line of defense. But for now, it's an impossible battle.

# Orange Park Methodist's Early Education more than a daycare

ORANGE PARK – Located on Reed Street is a hidden gem dedicated to changing the lives of young children.

Since 1982, Wonderworks, the early education center of Orange Park Methodist Church, has dedicated time to teaching kids from infancy. From 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., the center makes its mission to allow local children to learn.

And with the start of the new school year, Director Pat Noonan said the center is ready to continue its calling.

"We've had so many kindergarten teachers say that the kids from here are just ready. They're ready to learn. They love learning because we instill that in them," Noonan said.

Opening 30 years after the church's birth, the quaint center originally began as a "Mother's Day Out" program, eventually morphing into a full-blown childcare facility.

The center has found great success in the local area, focusing on providing an early education and a social environment for children.

With about 75 children currently enrolled, Noonan said her daily responsibilities as the center's director consist of maintaining the flow of the school, such as caring for maintenance and ensuring the school is fully staffed.

"Even though we're a daycare, we try to run it as a preschool," Noonan said.

Noonan said her journey at the school first began back in 1987. Searching for somewhere to place her child, Noonan said working at the center was the last thing on her mind.

"I mentioned that I had worked with young children, [and] the director gave me a job application," Noonan said.

After working with the school's bookkeeping and resource offices, she took her place as the woman in charge back in 1991.

In her time at the center, Noonan said she has witnessed the dire need for childcare in the community, especially during the pandemic. As many of the parents were first responders, Noonan said that the center kept its doors open daily through the pandemic to give the parents and children a place of solace. "A lot of our parents are policemen,

nurses, doctors. And they needed us. They needed a place to go," Noonan said.

With its colorful and kid-friendly atmosphere, the school continues to be a place of comfort for many. Filled with rooms about each child's educational and social needs, the school prides itself in being the 'first stop' to a child's future success.

Following the Starfall curriculum, Noonan said the school aims to create a computer-based, interactive learning environment for VPK students to participate in. Noonan said the school tries its best to allow children to have fun while providing the necessary educational nourishment to satisfy the curriculum requirements.

VPK Teacher Susan Nowlan said for her class, she likes to take an interactive



approach to teach her kids the alphabet, numbers, basic math, and even their five senses.

"We do a book a week that goes along with the letter of the week. And, then, we try to pull in a science activity," Nowlan said.

Students are currently reading the popular children's book, "Chicka Chicka Boom Boom." Nowlan said for that lesson, the kids will experience cracking a coconut open and using their five senses to explore it.

With servicing children all over the county, Noonan said most students filter out into local schools such as R.M. Paterson, Orange Park and Grove Park

There's no cost to call, and we can make sure that the substance is definitely non-toxic and see if there's any sort of treatment we can give you over the phone," McCormick said.

The changing of season ushers a unique set of additional concerns, including those related to wild plants such as mushrooms. Teachers should be especially wary of this when children are on the playground.

McCormick also is concerned by the popularity of energy drinks.

"When you start to look at the amount of caffeine in caffeine energy drinks, you can very quickly put yourself in a case of caffeine poisoning," McCormick said.

He said a new brand, Prime, contains approximately half the daily caffeine dose in one drink. The key is to monitor children's habits and familiarize them with potential hazards.

With schools back in classes, food poisoning becomes an issue. Cold foods should be kept at 40 degrees or colder, and hot foods should be at least 140 degrees.

Poison Information Center's calls are computerized and entered into a database that tracks more than 500,000 substances. Florida's locations are part of a national network, including 55 locations. The center's hotline, (800) 222-1222, is a national phone number.

calls, and just reach out to let us know what your concerns are because we certainly want to address those. We always encourage parents to reach out. Call us or email us. We all understand that the transition from elementary school to junior high is a big deal," said Principal Lydia Creel.

While some parents had concerns, the school diligently works for their students, and it's nearly impossible to get every schedule and bus route right on the first day, especially in a county with 43 schools.

But with bus routes, class schedules and construction obstacles considered, all things went extremely well.

"I thought, for all intents and purposes, it went well this morning. Parents were patient, and students hopped out of their cars, largely looking happy to be here today. The traffic flow went well, and we're going to make sure that everyone gets picked up on their right bus this afternoon in a timely fashion," she said.

"It's fantastic," the first-year principal said. "We're really excited. You have the whole year in front of you."

All of the pieces are coming together. Eighth graders are stepping up for seventh graders to show them the ropes of Lake Asbury. Teachers and faculty spent a large portion of the summer making preparations, which included professional development sessions and breakout groups,

# FCC offers spiritual counseling for life's challenges

ORANGE PARK – Foundations Christian Counseling opened its new branch recently. FCC helps those struggling with the challenges of everyday life, providing a safe space in which each client is supported on their journey toward wholeness.

The office is located at the First Baptist Church of Orange Park on 1140 Kingsley Ave. and offers counseling and other vital resources to our community from a Christ-centered perspective.

"We are what you would consider biblical counseling," said Russell Franklin, the Regional Director and one of two counselors. "First and foremost, we are going to come to it with scripture, but also we look at each and individual issue. We want to get to know that person and their unique situation."

Franklin said it's not a "one shoe fits all" approach to therapy. How the Bible is used directly in the counseling room depends on the client's unique needs.

"People come in with various issues and we want to listen. The first session or two is getting to know that person and letting them know we care and they have a place to share in a non-judgemental environment to help them navigate that program," he said.

Clients may participate in journaling, in-depth readings of the Bible and memorization of passages to help them navigate their own lives.

"The thing about the Bible is, whatever you are going through, the folks in the Bible went through them too," Franklin explained. "We see throughout scripture so many examples of shame, depression, grief, sorrow, and how that affects people emotionally. And then we can point them to what the word says when someone goes through a particular issue."

FCC partnered with Orange Park and Middleburg First Baptist Churches. They are also reaching out to churches and ministries to get involved.

"The goal is to come alongside churches. Our office is inside Orange Park First Baptist Church on Kingsley, but we are not a part of the church. And you don't have to be a part of one of the partnered churches to receive counseling."

something fun, and it's something different... at the end of the day, we're raising money to provide scholarships for young ladies," Cook said.

One by one each contestant, wearing sparkly and flashy ensembles, took their turn, leaving it all on the dance floor. From upbeat tunes to intense melodies to full blown lifts, the engaging performances had the crowd cheering and applauding their way through the dance.

We really do," Swissa said.

# Art Guild of Orange Park adds splash of color to OP Elementary

Organization brightening the sidewalks around the iconic school

ORANGE PARK – Have you been around Orange Park Elementary lately and noticed red, white and blue painted crosswalks and wondered what is happening?

Have you also noticed the Town Public Works employees with paint buckets in the morning near the school?

And have you seen people with Art Guild of Orange Park black T-shirts walking along Plainfield with clipboards and measuring tapes?

The community is in the preliminary stage of the Orange Park Crosswalk Project. The project was initiated when the Town, in collaboration with the Haskell team, created a "Completed Streets Policy." In the policy, the Haskell team proposed "Traffic Calming" initiatives using painted crosswalks and intersections.

Traffic calming is implementing physical road design or other measures to slow vehicles as they move through residential neighborhoods. When specific plans are in place, drivers tend to reduce their speed, comply more readily with speed signs and increase pedestrian safety.

Town Manager Sarah Campbell shared sample crosswalk ideas and received the support of the Orange Park Town Council to move forward with a crosswalk project. Campbell approached the Art Guild of Orange Park President Phyl Renninger to see if the Guild would be interested in leading this project.



Renninger offered an immediate and resounding "Yes!"

Campbell then approached Orange Park Elementary Principal Tyler Woods and received her second enthusiastic "Yes!" She shared sample ideas with the key players and proposed that the initial location be the school zone in front of OPE, along Plainfield Avenue from Winfred Drive to Blake Avenue. The area includes one intersection and eight crosswalks.

The Town Public Works Director, Kyle Croce had experience with crosswalk painting in neighborhoods, suggested that basic colors work best: yellow, black, blue, green, red and white. These are standard colors typically used on streets and parking lots.

Sand/grit was added to keep the painted areas from being too slick for the foot traffic. Using standard colors will also allow easier maintenance.

Suggestions were mentioned at a March 23 meeting with Campbell, Croce, Wood, OPE art teacher Shelby Bromme and AGOP members Kim Russell, Kathy Plante and Renninger. Wood made two suggestions: incorporate the OPE mascot, Eagle and possibly incorporate OPE's five school pride words – Positive, Respect, Integrity, Determination and Engagement. Brommer suggested the Art Club, composed of 24 sixth-graders, submit design ideas for the school crosswalks. Campbell selected the eight crosswalks and one intersection, and provided the needed measurements and information.

The AGOP members, Phyl Renninger, Kathy Plante, Bill Gura, and Melody Pickens, led by Kim Russell, Chair of the AGOP Community Service Committee, met to review the suggestions and artwork submitted by students, and generate a creative and cohesive themed presentation for the paintings. The challenge was to unify the design, and it was decided to use the school colors red, white, and blue. The Art Guild decided that instead of picking one design, all of the student's ideas would be used.

The town council approved the Art Guild proposal at their April 18 meeting. Work has begun with the Town painting the sidewalks.

The Town handles the supplies, the painting of the background colors and the coordination of the traffic detours. AGOP will have their artists lay out the designs and oversee the work. With the Art Guild's and OPE's oversight, Art Club students will paint their designs into boxes on the crosswalk. At the end of each session, the AGOP artists will complete the images with black outlining.

The work has begun with the main intersection at Plainfield and Stiles Avenue in front of the school, with red and blue paint for the crosswalks. Eagles will be



painted at the center of the design with white Eagle feathers and the wording in black. The crosswalks will have various red, white and blue colors with OPE Art Club student artwork embedded into boxes in the crosswalk designs.

Once this project is done, look for other painting projects around other schools happening in the future as part of the Orange Park Crosswalk Project.

Voters who want to send in ballots must re-register

CLAY COUNTY – Did you request a Vote by Mail ballot in 2022? Then you may have received an email from the Clay County Supervisor of Elections Office.

Last week, two emails were sent to approximately 18,600 voters who previously voted a Vote by Mail ballot in 2022, but don't presently have a request on file. A recent change in Florida law caused all Vote by Mail ballot requests to expire on Dec. 31. Moving forward, a voter will have to make a new request to Vote by Mail for each election cycle.

The new legislation means the Elec-

tions Office is starting from zero. Only a fraction of those who Voted by Mail in last year's election have renewed their requests. Of the 36,780 Clay County voters who requested a mail ballot for the 2022 General Election, less than 6,000 voters have ordered mail ballots for 2024.

While the next election, the Presidential Preference Primary, isn't until March 19, Supervisor Chris H. Chambless encourages voters to be proactive. A request for a Vote by Mail ballot doesn't mean a voter must use it. If they haven't already voted their mail ballot, they may vote in person.

In the past, voters only needed to check a box on the Vote by Mail envelope to keep receiving mail ballots. While that's no longer an option, requesting a Vote by Mail ballot is still simple. 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provide either their Florida driver's license number or the last four digits of their Social Security number when they request in person, over the phone, through email, online at ClayElections.gov or by scanning the QR code.

Note that you cannot use the online portal if your information is protected. Instead, you will need to request by phone, in writing, or via email, providing your name, address, driver's license and/or last four digits of your Social Security number.

Duque Estupinan was arrested on May 19 after a girl said she caught him in a stall in the restroom. According to the arrest report, he was caught using his cellphone to record girls. When he was detained by the School Resource Officer and the Clay County Sheriff's Office, Duque Estupinan allowed them to search his cellphone and they found a video of a 14-year-old girl using the restroom.

During a follow-up investigation, the Clay County Sheriff's Office investigators found at least 10 files of young girls performing sexual activities. According to the affidavit for the arrest report, one of the children depicted was 5 or younger.

Duque Estupinan will appear in court on Sept. 18. He will remain in the Clay County Jail with an \$825,033 bond until then.

### Informant helps nab man suspected of trafficking heroin, fentanyl

ORANGE PARK – A confidential informant helped the Clay County Sheriff's Office arrest an Arizona man for trafficking heroin and fentanyl. Jeremy Dubre Shannon, 38, was arrested on Aug. 9 after deputies found 2,084 counterfeit oxycodone pills laced with fentanyl. The informant

set up the drug purchase in June. Deputies stopped Shannon on July 29

after the buy, and a K-9 alerted them to the likely presence of illegal narcotics.

few and donated a few," he said. "People tell me all the time I need to take it to an art show, or I need to put it online, but I can't do none of that stuff."

He made his first piece in 1998. Now there are more than 100 at his house.

"Mainly, I just collect them," he said.

Twenty-five years ago, James was an air conditioning technician who hated throwing away leftover wiring pieces. He stripped away the plastic coating and found eight to 58 single strands of wires.

James found a way to incorporate colorful wires into his pieces. Each color has a specific spot in his studio. He knows it's the fourth spool from the left when he needs an orange wire. He relies on friends to restock and organize them. His landlord built a separate shelf with letter tiles to identify other colors.

"I just know it's red, blue, blue, orange, purple, green, green, gold, silver, copper,' he said.

From there, James relies on his fingers and imagination to do the rest.

"Sometimes, I'll pick something up and figure it out," he said.

He is currently working on a large bird sculpture. He said it started as a chicken, but now he thinks it will be a duck or goose.

"I go where my fingers take me," he said. "And I have a lot of time, a lot of time, to work on these. I'm in no hurry to do anything else."

## Clay @ Bishop Kenny Kennard's reverse season starts in Jax

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Clay High coach Kyle Kennard will need a jump start to his 2023 to forget about a 3-7 season last year that did have its good and bad.

Against Bishop Kenny, Kennard's Blue Devils will see a very similar look with a solid coaching staff, tough, rugged football play and a little bit of cockiness from a squad last year that probably went deeper than expected.

Panther coach Bryan Arnette has been lauding the progress of his team to include a handful of much bigger bodies than he has had in past seasons; both 1-9 finishes.

"This season we have some big guys on both sides of the ball; Jacob Jones on offense/defense line (250 lbs.) and JJ Moore at tight end (220 lbs) will bolster our attack," said Arnette.

If anything, a couple of scores by sophomore quarterback Gabe Taylor, a bomb to Brown and maybe a sack and fumble for a score by Tyler Jackson will give Raider fans momentum for a season opener against Oakleaf.

nutrition after initially entering college to study criminal justice, earned an internship through the reference with the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs as part of the nutrition program for the massive football players.

"It was honestly luck, but I was ready to go as soon as they called." said Motes. who interviewed, got the internship and was recently hired full-time to be a nutritionist for the Chiefs program. "It was fast moving and, honestly, a little intimidating at first to be servicing meals for guys you see on TV.'

Ironically, one of Motes' curriculum focuses was called Athletic Performance Cuisine. Also, ironically, Motes did start working in college at a mom-and-pop restaurant that fueled the bug for learning to cook.

"It was a course lab that taught how to make meals for people athletes who eat a lot of food and burn a lot of calories," said Motes. "I never knew the head chef, Erin Wishon, but she did go to Johnson and Wales. That was the connection, I think because she knew about the culinary program at the school which is highly reputable.

Motes did admit that it was dad Scott, a home remodeler by trade as well as an assistant coach for the Fleming Island High football team, who was doing work for the defensive line coach, Joe Cullen, for the Kansas City Chiefs, who owned a home in St. Johns County.

"They started talking, he said the Chiefs were looking for a chef guy, dad said my son does that and coach Cullen made the call to the head chef," said Motes. "I started my internship in January 2023 and graduated recently and was hired full-time after I graduated.'



Motes arrived as the only intern and started as a preparation chef for the Chiefs preparing specialized diets for specific players.

"I have a list of players that have very specific and detailed diets; whether to lose weight, gain weight, or some are vegans and I prepare those meals," said Motes. "There is one more executive chef, Wishon, who handles day-to-day operations, me for specialty plans and our boss who also manages the diets for a couple of other teams."

On the job, Motes noted that the players are pretty normal eaters, but that the mass of food is the impressive part.

"The metabolisms of these guys are crazy and my job is to keep them hydrated and fueled up for practice, games, in conjunction with other aspects like sleep and recovery," said Motes. "The school prepared me well."

Motes observed that a guy like Patrick Mahomes, the Chiefs' quarterback, is a normal scrambled egg with cheese, bacon and ham guy.

"Basically, they eat normally except that they eat a lot," said Motes. "My job is easy, get as much good food into them as they like to eat. Quality and quantity, what these guys eat are nowhere near what I or my brother would eat as high school athletes.'

Motes has learned enough in his short span to almost be a dietician to understand the needs of his high-octane athletes, but for now, he is the guy who prepares the meals.

"Being a chef is a 14-hour day on your feet, lifting stuff and moving all day," said Motes, noting he works during most games and gets to watch games on his phone. "Maybe in the future, I'll be on the dietician side of the preparations, but for now, it's a fast pace world and pretty intense. Maybe, one day, I'll be an athlete private chef, that would be cool."
