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Town Council determines legal future of Orange Park

ORANGE PARK – During Tuesday night's meeting, the Town Council selected Jody Lane Brooks as its new Town Attorney.

Mayor Randy Anderson and Town Manager Sarah Campbell interviewed three law firms vying to be appointed as the new legal counsel to represent Orange Park. The previously contracted town attorneys – Kopelousos, Bradley and Garrison – will be stepping down after many successful years of service.

The council was tasked to pick between Jody Lane Brooks, Balch & Bingham and Vose Law Firm. The three introduced themselves during their interviews on Sept. 28, and they made their respective pitches and answered tough questions on how they would best represent the town of Orange Park. A discussed hot-button issue pertained to a law signed by Gov. Ron DeSantis in June, SB 170, which permits companies to sue local governments for "arbitrary or unreasonable" ordinances that harm profits. The Town Council held a special meeting to interview the three law firms that qualified on a pared down list of Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for Orange Park's attorney services. The council will make their final selection on who will earn their new attorney services contract after a long run of success from Kopelousos, Bradley, and Garrison at Town Hall at their regular meeting on Oct. 3.

Wade Vose, partner at Vose Law Firm and resident of St. Augustine, who leaned on his firm's results-driven approach. Vose brought a background specializing in appeals, and he shared his

Brooks, Balch & Bingham, and Vose Law each made their pitch to the council and Town Manager, Sarah Campbell. Representatives made their introduction to officials and answered tough questions about how they would handle town business. SB 170, which was signed into law by Gov. Ron DeSantis in June, allows companies to sue local governments for "arbitrary or unreasonable" ordinances that harm profits, was a hot-button issue discussed between Orange Park and the three organizations that hope to become their suitors.

Paul Wade. Partner at Vose Law and St. Augustine resident, emphasized the firm's result-driven approach when talking about the firm's approach to the new bill. Wade, who specializes in handling appeals, shared a recentrecent victory in which he successfully defendinged a criticaln environmentally-critical ordinance in Naples, which addressed algal blooms The victory addressed algal blooms and red tides caused by excessive fertilizer usefertilizeruse. In 2017, red tide forced the city to close its beaches and collect 2,000 tons of dead sea animals from the shore. The fishing industry was rayaged. During the crisis, fishermen were lining up at food banks. The firm highlighted their an impressive track recordin litigation, asserted a readiness to take on any challenge, and boasted an ability to take the "kill shot" in the courtroom.

Asserting their readiness to take on challenging cases and their reputation for taking the "kill shot" when necessary to protect the town's best interests.

Patrick Krechowski, a partner at Balch & Bingham, who brought extensive experience involving land development codes. Krechowski aims to address potential developmental compliance issues across Orange Park if selected. To improve compliance with state and federal regulations, he plans to utilize Orange Park's network of resources, notably reaching out to the Florida League of Cities to cooperate with other municipalities

He emphasized the importance of staying informed in a dynamic legal landscape, ensuring accountability and working with

other municipalities to pave consistency throughout the town and the county. , talked about his extensive experience in addressing land development codes.

Improving compliance with state and federal regulations and tapping into Orange Park's network and resources would also be on deck for Balch & Bingham if they were to be selected.

Krechowski also touched on litigation, a critical aspect of legal services for any municipality. He addressed the challenge of controlling where litigation may lead and the potential financial strains that it can impose. In response, he proposed a structured approach, recommending a proposed budget with specific benchmarks, allowing the town to have a clear overview of associated costs if they select the firm.

He said that the majority of services for Balch & Bingham would be covered under a flat fee, but that there may be instances that fall outside the scope of basic services. This approach aimed to alleviate any uncertainties with legal fees. Vose Law would operate entirely under a flat fee structure if they entered an agreement with the town, they said.

Brooks, founder and sole representative of her organization, pressed her expertise into the mix. Her impressive 30-year career led her to become the first Chief Legal Officer at Jacksonville Electric Authority and much of her work centered around environmental law. With a thorough knowledge of state and federal regulations and compliances, Brooks contends to be an asset to the town, if selected.

She highlighted her legal background, which spans over 30 years. She touched on her impressive career trajectory, which included becoming the first Chief Legal Officer at Jacksonville Electric Authority. Much of her work focused on environmental law. She said that her deep knowledge of state and federal regulations, coupled with

an ability to ensure compliance, makes her a valuable asset to the town.

Brooks stressed a personal advantage – her status as a nearby resident – to position herself as a legal expert and a neighbor. She accentuated the special place in her heart that Orange Park fills and expressed eagerness to start the job the moment the decision is made. Brooks offered to commit to hosting office hours during the week if selected.

Brooks spoke passionately of the town that holds a special place in her heart. She expressed her readiness to start the position immediately. She even asked for weekly office hours. Brooks positioned herself as not just a legal expert, but a neighbor. Spending a significant portion of her life in the community, Brooks is uniquely attuned to the town's needs, she said.

The council selected Brooks.

"I talk about 'shop local' or 'shop within the county.' We would be hypocrites for not following our own recommendations," said Mayor Randy Anderson before casting his vote. Doug Benefield agreed, saying that he found a 'certain amount' of value in Brooks. Alongside the mayor and the council member. Winette Sandlin concurred. saying that all three firms were qualified, but Brooks was her top choice at the final bell. "I'm going to give preference to the person that lives in the county. She's here, she's local, and she lives in our community. I think (Brooks) would be a good match," she said. Vice Mayor Susana Thompson and Council Member Daniel Cobriero voted against Brooks, siding with Vose Law Firm based on their larger staffing capabilities and 80 combined years of experience, much of which relates directly to munici-

Ultimately, Fleming Island's Brook was selected, with her strong local presence and commitment to the community strongly swaying the final decision for officials.

City Council discusses financing for new stormwater treatment plant

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Festivals, financing and dedicating the name for a new street sign were some of the highlighted topics discussed at the city council meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 3.

The city council dedicated Saturday to the Soul Food Festival, which will be the 22nd anniversary of the event. The council recognized the cultural importance of the celebration, which promotes unity and instills pride in the community.

The city just paid off its debts following the completion of the Palmetto Trail Project but is now gearing to issue more for the construction of a new stormwater treatment plant. The volatile interest rate

of around 5% forced the council to debate whether a bank loan or bond issuance would be more advantageous for the estimated \$8 million project.

"It's better to start sooner rather than later with costs increasing," said Vice Mayor Steven Kelley. "We've been trying to finance projects that have been kicked down the road for 25 years," said Assistant City

Manager Mike Null.

The council passed a request for proposal and has decided a bank loan would be better for its immediacy and flexibility to be refinanced.

In honor of the longest-serving pastor in the history of Clay County, the council approved the name of a new street sign to be "Bishop John Newman Corner."



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Think land conservation now ... or pay consequences later

Northeast Florida is at a crossroads of history for land conservation, and it is literally Now or Never. The people of Florida and their leaders have stepped up to the plate. Now it's time for you, the landowners, to step up to the plate in response.

If we do it right, there is a lot of money to be made for landowners while, at the same time, our grandchildren will get to see what the real Florida looks like. If we do it wrong, shame on us as we watch our end of Florida become like Orlando, cheap-

ening property and lifestyle values. We can truly have it all if we choose, so let's choose.

The leaders of Florida have spoken – again and again. Under Republican and Democrat governors, initiatives have been advanced to preserve our natural lands. Preservation 2000 under Gov. Bob Martinez put \$2 billion into land conservation in 1990, which was considered a lot of money.

Gov. Jeb Bush matched it with Florida Forever in 1999. These initiatives are built upon the Save Our Everglades and similar initiatives of governors Reuben Askew, Bob Graham and Lawton Chiles/Ken MacKay. Gov. Ron DeSantis has made ample budget provisions for environmental targets.

In Florida, the love of our environment is bipartisan, as it befits its wonder and clear economic impact; even the built attractions like Walt Disney World seek to recreate Florida's outdoors.

Florida's voters have done their part. No statewide initiative on the environment in our state has received less than 70% of the vote. In 2014, a citizen initiative led by Graham as the Democrat and the undersigned as the Republican created a dedicated pipeline of funding for environmental acquisition, restoration and maintenance in the billions. The effort received more than 70% of the vote statewide, carried all but four counties, and in some, it received over 80% of the vote.

No state and few nations have ever acted so boldly. The funding tied to real estate sales has skyrocketed in recent years as our population has exploded.

Local efforts mirrored these statewide initiatives. Referenda were passed in 27 counties, starting in Volusia and have been

Florida Supreme Court to decide if ilegalized pot plan goes up in smoke

The Florida Supreme Court will review oral arguments on an Adult Personal Use of Marijuana citizen initiative that could lead to a constitutional amendment for voter consideration, with legalization in effect as soon as May 2025 if 60% or more of voters approve.

The amendment, titled "Adult Personal Use of Marijuana," would allow non-medical use of the narcotic and prohibit any law subjecting use to criminal liability or civil sanctions. It would also clear all licensed Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers in the state to start making and selling recreational cannabis products.

The hearing is set for Nov. 8, with each side getting 20 minutes to make the case about whether the initiative should be put on next year's General Election ballot

If the amendment should make the ballot, it will be with the opposition of Gov. Ron DeSantis and Attorney General Ashley Moody.

"We have medical in our Constitution, we have medical marijuana, we enforce that, you know, we abide by it, but to take action now to make it even more available, I would not do that," DeSantis said in Iowa this summer, adding that legalization in Colorado has only expanded the "black market."

Florida voters in 2016 passed a constitutional amendment legalizing marijuana only for medical uses. That laid the groundwork for a still-growing industry in the state and a host of regulations around the product. However, it's



still not legal for residents and visitors of Florida to use marijuana without a prescription.

He had previously indicated olfactory objections to the aromatic plant.

"What I don't like about it is if you go to some of these places that have done it, the stench when you're out there, I mean, it smells so putrid," he told reporters in 2022. "I could not believe the pungent odor you would see in some of these places. I don't want to see that here. I want people to be able to breathe freely."

Attorney General Moody holds to the same opinion she did in 2019, the last time a citizens' initiative sought to put the adult use question to voters, saying the drafted amendment was overbroad.

"I believe that the proposed amendment fails to meet the requirements

renewed in all counties where offered for renewal. Conservation initiatives were also passed in 55 municipalities. Locally, Clay is preparing to take a similar Conservation Land Acquisition and Management plan to its voters in 2024. At the grassroots, Floridians care.

This year, even after some vetoes, the total commitment of state funding was over \$900 million. To this base, our House of Representatives Speaker Paul Renner courageously added a similar amount targeting wildlife corridors, including an eyepopping \$400 million for our O2O, Ocalato-Osceola corridor.

Federal partners have also come into play. For example, these efforts expand buffer lands around military bases such as Camp Blanding, vital to national security and our economy. Initiatives aimed at salt marshes and resiliency are aborning.

The toolkit has also been expanded. In addition to fee simple acquisition of lands. which then require ongoing management, efforts increasingly involve conservation easements that allow the landowner to retain ownership and traditional uses such as timber or farming while pocketing the value of development rights. Innovative developers, such as at Babcock Ranch and Framton, have discovered that blending conservation into their development plans for open space and recreation can actually increase the value of the lands actually developed. The majority of people in Florida living on golf courses are there for the open space, not the golf, and it is a cheaper alternative for the developer. Environmental

mitigation, though controversial to some, has allowed monetization of efforts to restore and enhance the environment.

In sum, We the People have stepped up to the plate. North Florida Land Trust has, for 24 years, led these efforts, helping establish and/or working with other regional and national partners in our region.

Landowners, it is now batter-up!

Without willing sellers, these massive efforts to create willing buyers will come to nothing. Some tools allow you to "cash ou,t" in farming terms, your development rights while staying in traditional uses and enjoying those income streams into the future. You are also often better stewards than the state would ever be, and that can be recognized. There are win/win alterna-

My family has been in Florida for nine generations, which speaks to the heart of who owns the land. You own it because you love it and often have for generations. You, like me, have seen it slipping away, now seeming to gallop away. Like me, you want our grandchildren to know the Real Florida while also making provision for them economically.

There are ways and means now to do this, and they will not be available forever. Some of us are old enough to know that big budgets can turn quickly into 'sweep the trust funds' when a recession inevitably arrives. North Florida Land Trust and your local land trust stand ready to help. The money is here. It is truly Now or Never. You know it in your heart.

of Section 101.161(1), Fla. Stat., and will present additional arguments through briefing at the appropriate time," she wrote in May.

In Florida, marijuana use hasn't been decriminalized, but medicinal use is al-

Moody cited a law requiring constitutional amendments to touch on just a single subject, and expressed doubt whether this one complies with all technical requirements of state law.

Smart and Safe Florida, behind the push for the citizens' initiative, already has more than a million verified signatures, meeting the threshold needed for ballot inclusion should the Supreme Court back its position.

The committee has raised more than

\$39 million, almost entirely from Trulieve, the leading dispensary chain in the state in terms of number of storefronts.

Polling this Spring from Mason-Dixon suggests the amendment would have 50% support on the ballot, ensuring it falls short of ratification.

However, given that the vote would happen on a presidential General Election ballot, it's all but assured that turnout will be juiced compared to that of most off-year election cycles, and anti-cannabis Republicans may suffer a backlash as a result.

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
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City manager tells Lake Region Prosperity Partners of Keystone's 'strategic' growth

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Residents seemed comforted during a Lake Region Prosperity Partners meeting on Thursday, Sept. 28, to know how the city is working ahead to manage growth.

City Manager Lynn Rutkowski said the Florida Department of Transportation and North Florida Regional Transportation Management Center is talking with the city about relieving congestion at State Roads 100 and 21

At the same time, she said everything in the city has been mapped technologically so responsible departments can pinpoint and quickly resolve problems.

Rutkowski also said the city is reviewing plans to build a recreational park behind Hitchcock's Plaza and is studying the feasibility of a new municipal building.

"Traffic in Keystone Heights has increased, which is not bad," she said. "We're starting to plan on what we're going to do in the future. Keystone Heights is growing, and it's growing in a very strategic, very fantastic way.

"We're looking at new innovations to bring businesses in to support our town atmosphere. Keystone Heights has a heart and soul, a very love-your-neighbor, loveyour-community atmosphere. We can never lose that. So all the things that we do are very strategic and cute."

Residents have long been critical of the main intersection in town. Traffic headed north on SR 21 is often delayed by three or four light changes at SR 100. An aban-

doned Asian restaurant is also a blight and restricts drivers' vision to the east on SR 100

Rutkowski told members the city has gained attention nationally and internationally for its progress in becoming a "smart city." Engineers with Manzan Consulting have mapped every inch of the city, compiling locations of every tree, building and garbage can that can be monitored electronically.

"That way, we can work smarter, not harder," she said.

Publications from as far away as Venice, Italy, and Seattle, and as close as Washington, D.C., Tampa and Miami have studied the benefits of using sensors, not human resources, to monitor the city.

"That's been our goal for the past three years in the city," Rutkowski said. "How can we keep our taxes, keep our millage rate where it's at, and not have to charge additional taxes and offer the services and keep up with the demand, keep up with the cost of living and the increased costs across the board? So we've been working with this. I'm proud to say Keystone Heights is the leading edge with this technology."

Keystone Heights will also be recognized for its smart city initiatives at this month's Northeast Florida League of Cities meeting

"We've been busy for the past couple of weeks to question the visuals or capturing all of our vertical assets," Rutkowski said. "We're putting a two-dimensional digital twin to see more issues, our areas of concern, instead of deploying individuals to ride the streets now."

The North Florida Transportation Planning Organization awarded the smart city grant.

Clay County Utilities Authority, St. Johns River Water Management District and Clay Electric Cooperative also are part of the smart city program.

Rutkowski finished by members that the city is exploring ways to replace its dilapidated town hall and building Sunrise Park behind Hitchcock's Plaza on SR 100.

The proposal includes replacing the town hall "because we can't patch the roof anymore. When you come in, you have to flip the light switch on three or four times until they turn on, and even then, only half are working."

She said the city wants to build a sports complex with two batting cages, two tennis courts that can also be converted into four pickleball courts and at least one basketball court.

Rutkowski said that the city still has about \$400,000 left over from American Rescue Plan funds that would be used toward the complex.

"So everything you need will be in one spot," she said.

To consolidate services, Keystone Heights hopes to find partners like the tax collectors and sheriff's offices to offset the costs of a new municipal headquarters. The city council and staff are exploring an expansion behind the town hall that would remove the old tennis and basketball courts.

"You can live here; you can work here," Rutkowski said. "You can shop here and be

entertained here because this is the best place in Florida."

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Clay County gets \$48,469 grant from Justice Department

Money will buy 14 new cameras for Community Connect Program

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The U.S. Justice Department announced it has awarded more than \$4.4 billion to support state, local and Tribal public safety and community justice activities.

More than \$36.6 million was awarded to entities in the Middle District of Florida, including \$48,469 to Clay County for its Community Connect Program and to expand the operation of the Real Time Crime Center.

The grants from the Department's Office of Justice Programs will help build community capacity to curb violence, serve victims and youth, and achieve fair outcomes through evidence-based criminal and juvenile justice strategies.

The money will allow for the deployment of 14 additional cameras in the county to help reduce crime and become a force multiplier in fighting crime.

According to the Justice Department, Clay Community Connect will continue to interface with communications, operations, intelligence, special operations and community affairs for strategic operations.



"Everyone in this country deserves to be safe in their communities," said Attorney General Merrick B. Garland. "That is why, in addition to continuing our efforts to identify and prosecute the most violent criminals, the Justice Department is putting every available resource to work to support the efforts of our law enforcement and community partners nationwide. This significant investment will go directly to state and local programs that support the victims of crime, support officer safety and wellness, build the public trust in law enforcement essential to public safety, and help make all of our communities safer."

"Improving the safety of our communities requires a comprehensive approach and commitment by those working on the front lines," said U.S. Attorney Roger B. Handberg. "The funding announced today

will greatly support those working tirelessly to help keep our citizens safe daily."

The more than \$36.6 million in grant funding awarded this fiscal year in the Middle District of Florida will support state, local, and community-based efforts and evidence-based interventions that reduce violence, crime, and recidivism while delivering treatment and services to those at-risk of justice system involvement. Funding will expand partnerships between criminal justice professionals and behavioral health experts, help people safely and successfully transition from confinement back to their communities, reach crime victims in underserved areas, steer young people away from justice system contact, improve the management of sex offenders, and support a wide range of research and statistical activities that will help justice system professionals meet community safety challenges.

"Across the country, the Justice Department is working side-by-side with our partners in state and local law enforcement to combat violent crime by using our federal resources to amplify their work on the front lines," said Deputy Attorney General Lisa O. Monaco. "The billions of dollars in grants announced today will augment those efforts and the tools law enforcement uses to curb violence, counter

deadly drug abuse, and promote safety and public trust. Together with our state and local partners, the Department will continue doing everything possible to protect the communities we all serve."

"The Department of Justice is investing in community-based approaches to violence prevention, law enforcement health and wellness, Tribal courts, improved services for victims, research and data collection efforts, reentry programs, and much more," said Associate Attorney General Vanita Gupta.

Many employees have been delivering plates of shrimp, gator tail bites and glasses of beer for more than 20 years. To them, Whitey's is family.

"I lost four people in my family last year, and they helped me with the funeral arrangements." said Michelle Shearin. who's spent the last 17 years there as a server. "They delivered food. They treated me like family. Everyone looks out for each other up here."

When AAssistantssistant Manager Kelly B. needed three major surgeries, the sibling owners said owners Elaine Cassala, Luke and Greg Lawley plusand Billy Ham ensured her position would be waiting for her after a full recovery. said she needed "three major surgeries" recently, and the brothers and sister who make up the ownership group held her position until she recovered.

"That's why I've been here so long," she said. "Whitey's will always be a staple in the community. It's amazing how many people bring their families here. We've served adults, and they started bringing their children. Now we're serving their grandchildren."

From the beginning

Whitey and Ann Ham opened a fish camp in 1963 while he was in the Navy. It consisted of a tackle shop, a nine-seat bar, soft drinks, beer, a toaster oven and sandwiches.

Originally, Whitey had difficulty catching fish during the first winter months. According to his daughter, Cassala, he finally found success running the fishing lines deeper in the cold waters of The fish's metabolism slowson Swimming Pen Creek, Doctors Lake and the St. Johns Riverduring the winter months, so Whitey ran deeper catfish lines, according to his daughter,

"There was no money in the winter because the fish didn't bite," she said. "He ran catfish lines, and soon they had to figure out what to do with all those fish. My mom said, 'Why don't we cook these up (and sell them)?' That's how it all started."

One of the first faithful customers 50 years ago was Ronnie Van Zant, . Oa founderne of the founders of Lynyrd Skynyrd. He often sat in the same seat and feasted on catfish 50 years ago."

A fire in the kitchen on March 30, 200220, destroyed the kitchen and restaurant. It re-opened 11 months later. During reconstruction, the brothers and sister worked in the bait shop.

It now has an inside and outside bar area andplus two tiki bars. There's also a Captain's Room that seats 40, beach seating for 100, a private section that can accommodate 40, the upper tiki deck for more than 50, another tiki area for 40 and a dining deck.

On most nights, especially the weekends, the outside areas fill quickly - especially since with some some patrons arrivinge by boat to the pier to dock and dine. t and moor their vesselsat the restaurant's dock. "It's insane we've been here this long," Cassala said. "The key is to serve good food. We've had the same customers here for a long time. And we have a good management team. Our parents started it. We're carrying the tradition."

When the COVID-19 pandemic forced restaurants to close or reduce their services, Whitey's reported record sales the first week after the front doors were locked.

Manager Danielle Lawley said traffic from boaters kept the bar and kitchen busy.

"We kept getting paid," Kelly B said. "They helped as much as they could. The boat traffic was incredible. We stayed busy, even during the shutdown."



Orange Park man arrested in 'Piegeon Drop' scam

Sheriff's Office looking for possible additional victims

For Clay Today

CLAY COUNTY – A suspect is facing charges concerning a "pigeon drop" scam investigation in Prince George's County, Maryland.

William Coleman, 51, of Orange Park, was charged with scamming victims by

asking for money or collateral to share a larger sum of money.

Coleman was arrested Tuesday in Orange County.

There have been nine pigeon drop scams reported in the county in 2023. Coleman has been charged in connection with of the two

In one case, he and his accomplice(s) successfully stole thousands of dollars from their victim. In the second case, the victim ultimately did not lose any money. In both incidents, the victims are females and senior citizens. The successful scam occurred on June 8 in District Heights, Maryland. The attempted theft occurred on June 1 in Mitchellville, Maryland.

Following an extensive investigation into these two incidents, PGPD detectives

identified Coleman as a suspect. At the time of his arrest on Tuesday, and through subsequent search warrants, PGPD Financial Crimes detectives recovered multiple pieces of evidence indicative of these scams, including more than \$100,000 in counterfeit cash recovered by the Clay County Sheriff's Office at his Orange Park home.

Pigeon drop scammers often carry notes or fake letters from non-existent law firms confirming the receipt of a large amount of money from either a settlement or inheritance. A similar letter was recovered inside of Coleman's car. Deputies also found a newspaper wrapped in a bandana. In many pigeon drop scams, scammers use bandanas to wrap the money a victim withdraws from their bank. Scammers then swap out the money for bundled newspapers unbeknownst to the victims.

"These crimes target some of the most vulnerable in our community. I want residents in Prince George's County to know our detectives work relentlessly to identify and arrest suspects in these scams. Regarding Coleman, we do not believe he acted alone and that he worked with accomplices. Detectives are looking into whether he is linked to similar crimes along the East Coast. We sincerely thank our law enforcement partners in Florida for assisting us with this

significant arrest," said Chief Malik Aziz, Prince George's County Police Department.

"I commend the coordinated efforts of Financial Crimes Investigators from the Clay County Sheriff's Office and Investigators from the Prince George's County Police Department.

The team worked seamlessly to execute a warrant, demonstrating exceptional teamwork. Such crimes occur all too frequently and are predatory in nature, making this arrest a significant success. Thanks to the arrest, law enforcement has prevented further losses to potential victims and put another scammer behind bars. Through the collective efforts of law enforcement, we

have effectively put an end to this scammer's ability to target innocent people, whether in Clay County or elsewhere," said CCSO Sheriff Michelle Cook.

Coleman remains in custody in Florida pending extradition to Prince George's County. Law enforcement agencies remind residents to never give money or financial information to anyone you just met in person, online or on the phone. If something seems too good to be true, it usually is.

- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains – away from your stoveton.
- Be alert. If you are tired or have consumed alcohol, don't use the stove/oven.

The range will be open to the public on Saturday, Oct. 7, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. The hours soon willwill soon be extended to include Fridays. The range will be accessible only to law enforcement Monday through Wednesday, and it will be closed on Sundays, Davidson said.

"I think we're far enough behind [Oak Grove Baptist Church] that they won't hear us, but we're going to close out of respect for the church."

After backstops for the handgun lanes are completed, Davidson said the park will add archery and skeet shooting. Only targets bought at the range will be allowed The range will sell the only targets allowed.

Shooting guns costs \$15 for a county resident and an additional \$10 for a shooter sharing the lane. Each lane can accommodate one or two shooters.

The range also features offers an annual membership of \$250 for county residents, or \$200 while the cost for retired law enforcement officers, active dutyactive-duty military and veteransis \$200 a year.

Membership perks include ladditional range fees, lane waitlist priority, three guest passes, a \$5 fee for sharing a lane, 10% off pro shop merchandise and a free shirt.

The berm behind the target area is nearly 25 feet high. The area behind targets is filled with ballistic sand to stop projectiles that can be sifted to remove slugs.

Keane feels a sense of belonging at the church, which is genuinely undeniable when she walks into the chapel. "When you walk into the sanctuary, you feel God's presence. When you talk to people here, you can sense their love for one another. They pray for each other. You just know that God is working," she said.

CLAY HILL – Hairstyles, fashion and music trends have come and gone during the past 30 years, but one thing remains the same – Dorothy White stepping into traffic to ensure Wilkinson Elementary and Junior High students arrive safely.

Short in stature but immense in fervor, White's service as a crossing guard since 1993 has made her beloved by the community.

That service was recognized recently by Sheriff Michelle Cook, who approached White before the early morning bell rang and offered her a card, a pin and a hug on behalf of the community.

Rain or shine, White continues to be a sentry for "her kids" at the intersection of Freedom Drive and CR 218. She has overseen generations of children on their commute to and from school – some even became the parents of current students. She is steadfast and excited at the prospect of overseeing grandchildren, the next generation to safely "follow in their footsteps."

"I'll be 75 (on Oct. 25)," she said. "I'm not quitting. I do this because I love the kids. I only get to see them for a short period of time, but they always make me smile."

Children haven't changed much in the past 30 years," White said. Although, some groups have been better behaved than others

"I've had some issues with some, but I tell them I'm here to take care of you. I'm here to protect you getting across the street," she said. "Most of the time, they say, 'Yes, ma'am."

She knows every child who steps into the intersection. She said this year's group of students are incredibly "adorable."

"I've got a set of triplets and some twins," she said. "They're all so wonderful. That's why I love my job."

The Wilkinson schools are in a rural area of the county, which sometimes entails crossing more than just school children

"I crossed dogs and ducks," she said. "I've had horses and donkeys, too."

Her favorite memory was when a stray dog approached the crossing. A neighbor noticed the trotting animal and called the Clay County Sheriff's Office, fearing it was vicious. By the time the deputy arrived, the dog had plopped down beside White – sitting, staying and wagging a tail as the children crossed the busy road.

"There's a woman who walks her dog in the afternoons, but that morning she walked alone," White said. "She saw me with the stray dog. She offered to take it home if nobody claimed it. She still has that dog. His name is Murphy. When they visit, the dog runs up like he wants to hug me."

As the county grows, so does traffic on CR 218. And with that comes distracted, indifferent drivers. White said close calls

Middleburg's Stilts trades banking career for education award

Economics, Government, U.S. History teacher selected as Warren Tracy Teacher of the Year

MIDDLEBURG – In a major victory for the County School District, Breyana Stilts, an Economics, Government and U.S. History Teacher at Middleburg High, was recently selected as the Warren Tracy Teacher of the Year by the Florida Council for the Social Studies

Stilts reflected on her journey to becoming an educator, how she instilled her unique teaching style in the classroom and the significance of bringing home the prestigious award to the county where she grew up.

Stilts never taught high school before being hired at Middleburg.

"I was shocked. This was only my first year at Middleburg. After hearing that I had won the award, I was honestly kind of thrown into a loop," she said. Stilts transitioned from a four-year career in the corporate banking world at Wells Fargo as an Account Resolution Specialist. She had only been an educator for one year prior to winning the award. She taught Intensive Reading to middle school children from sixth to eighth grade in Duval County in 2021-22.

Despite her surprise, Stilts attributed her success to the relationships she built with her students and her strong support from her colleagues.

"I built a really great relationship with my kids and had a really strong support system with the Social Studies team here, but even they couldn't prepare me for the kids' reaction (to the classes I taught)," she said

Stilts was nominated by to students, colleagues and parents. Above all, she credited her students for the honor.

"That means they're taking the extra

effort. For some (students), it takes an effort just to get to school. To put in that extra effort and (take their time) to give a nomination is (impactful). They recognize how important this is to me," Stilts said.

"To me, that means they have a greater appreciation for this country's history than they did before. It means they take pride in their civic responsibilities and duties and actively participate in the community."

Stilts' teaching style is anything but traditional. She emphasizes a hands-on learning experience and ensures her students actively engage in their learning and exploration.

Instead of relying on traditional methods like textbooks and worksheets, she encourages movement and interaction in the classroom. "We don't do a lot of paperbased work or typical work that you would think of when you see a history book. We move around a lot. Yesterday, we had a gallery walk where we walked around and viewed (photographs) from the Second Industrial Revolution. We talked about the effects of communications and steel and how they influenced that (era)," she said.

Her teaching philosophy centers students at the forefront of their learning. Stilts believes that students must take charge of their education and be responsible for their learning.

"I can guide them, but they need to make it happen for themselves," she said.

Stilts' teaching style draws inspiration from her own experiences as a student. Stilts said Oakleaf High Principal Matthew Boyack, who taught her world history at Orange Park, made an everlasting impact.

"He had such an impact on me that I still remember how I felt in the classroom. That's the kind of classroom (environment) that I want to create," she said.

Middleburg Principal Martin Aftuck, who was Stilts' Principal at Orange Park while she was a student, also played an influential role, Stilts said.

Stilts expressed gratitude for the blessing she had the opportunity to work with fellow educators who molded her teaching style.

Her economics and government coursework focuses on preparing students for real-life scenarios, like filing taxes, budgeting, calculating deductions, planning finances, registering to vote and analyzing political platforms. There is no greater honor than representing the county. "I don't think there's any greater than being able to represent (my) community," she said.

The hard work required to achieve the award is nothing new for Stilts. She earned her online Master of Library and Information Science from Wayne State in May while teaching children across Northeast Florida for the past two years. Her journey toward the award was not a one-time event but a continuing daily commitment.

"Every single day in the classroom is a testament to your teaching style. There are no missed opportunities. You have to come in every day and be ready to deliver an engaging lesson," Stilts said.



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Daniels' inspiring tactics leads to state honor

Orange Park teacher wins Florida Council for Social Studies Excellence Award

ORANGE PARK – Justin Daniels, a veteran educator and cornerstone of the Orange Park High community, recently earned the prestigious 2023 Florida Council for Social Studies Excellence in Teaching Award.

Daniels, a longtime Standard and Advanced Placement Social Studies teacher and department chair, has amassed a large trophy case during his educational tenure. But no honor has been bigger than this

When asked about his reaction to winning statewide honor, the eight-year employee leads more than 10 teachers in his department, serves as boys' wrestling and girls' tennis coach, and expresses pride for earning the recognition.

"If you get a general award, like 'Teacher of the Year,' that's great, but it's even more amazing to be recognized for working hard in a subject that you're really passionate about, something that you've really dedicated your teaching expertise and poured your life into," he said.

Daniels' journey to excellence started in the county. The homegrown teacher graduated from Middleburg High, where his former educators inspired him.

"I had an incredible educational experience (at Middleburg). I had fantastic teachers that (made me realize) that this could be a possible career path for myself," Daniels said.

The veteran educator credited his

unique teaching style for helping him reach the big milestone.

"I approach my class every day with a sense of excitement. I'm transparent with the students. I'm honest with them," he said

If they want to hear "stupid stories," Daniels tells them one. He replays scenes from "Buffalo Rider," a 1978 movie where half of the plot literally involves the character "Buffalo Jones" riding a buffalo. "I try not to take everything so seriously," Daniels said. The jokes and laughter are all part of a hook to keep students engaged from the moment they walk into the classroom.

"When they walk into class, they ask, 'Are we going to see 'Guy on a Buffalo' to-day?' While it's irrelevant, they walked into my classroom and immediately engaged with me, which means they are ready for class. That's the whole point. I want them to be excited for class because what we're (learning) contains (immense) value," he said.

While very important, government and economics can be incredibly boring, which Daniels admits.

"Those are the two most boring classes they will ever receive," he said.

"By any means necessary" is his only option. He said both subjects will transcend the rest of his students' lives after leaving the classroom. "They're building to become active citizens and learn to manage their money. Those are two things that will impact (my students) immediately and the world around them," Daniels said.

In his classroom, "busy work" carries a negative connotation and is crossed off students' to-do lists.

"There is a negative connotation with what 'busy work' is. I don't want to fill their life with that. (Instead), it should be work that is engaging," he said.

Just ask students how they feel in his

classroom

"Yesterday, we played a game, and a (child) said, "Is class over?" And I said it's (already) been 40 minutes. He said, 'Man, that was so fast,' and I said, 'That's because we were doing something that is so engaging. It's not busy, it's active," Daniels said.

Building positive relationships that make a positive impact takes center stage.

"I went into administration for a bit, and being away from the classroom (I rediscovered) my purpose. Everything was constantly pulling me back into the classroom. I want to be amongst (the children), building positive relationships and impacting them. Social Sciences is a (subject) that will hold incredible value for the rest of their lives," he said.

Students, teachers and parents (named and anonymous) have to nominate their teacher of choice for that individual to qualify. Daniels said his students' decision to put him up for the award reflects they share the value of Social Studies with him.

"It's nice to see that they see value in this. It's (validating)," Daniels said.

Winning the Excellence in Teaching Award is not only a personal achievement for Daniels, but also reflects a storied winning tradition in the classroom in the county, he said.

"It's a testament to the long tradition of Clay County providing students with excellent opportunities, whether through social studies (or other subjects). The county's pathways to success are so immense," he said.

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














Fleming Island Band prepares for trip to New York City

Gym named after Prewitt; Forkum keeps Broncos

MIDDLEBURG - Two eras of volleyball at Middleburg High crossed paths Thursday night as a former coach, Carrie Prewitt, was honored for her decades of commitment, and a new coach, Meredith Forkum, jet-bolted her team to one of the more decisive wins in her short career.

"Felt like it was like a blink of an eye and it was over," said Prewitt, who spent nearly 30 years in the Middleburg gym with a plethora of district and region titles and numerous Final Four finishes. "I was never expecting this because you don't do something like this expecting days like today."

Prewitt, who has been succeeded at the coach position by Forkum, a former player of hers and also a more recent assistant coach, noted that her lifespan has centered around the gym.

"I kind of realized the other day that for the past 30 years, I've spent more time in this building than in any building in my lifetime," said Prewitt. "Recently, I have taken time to take care of my mom, did some hiking in the final years and spent time with my kids and grandkids."

As for the celebration, which featured a ton of alums, friends and family members who flew in from around the country to share the moment, Prewitt, who was presented a huge portrait by Middleburg Athletic Director Casey Thompson and Principal Martin Aftuck, was toured around the gym to see her door display above the entrance way plus a huge banner on the outside wall of the gym's main doors.

"I hope that the things that I put into it, like the hard work, the dedication, the commitment to the players, things like that are what I hope they think about when they walk through the doors," said Prewitt. "If they put those kinds of expectations on themselves knowing the history of the athletes before them, then that's something I would be proud of."

For Forkum, in a county rivalry game with a 7-1 Fleming Island High team that also featured a first-time, alum coach in former Fleming Island High standout Amy Schermerhorn, the game was a typical great rivalry game in the Bronco gym that made her mentor smile.

"Coach Prewitt always prepared us for games like this in her long history here and I think this year's team is very aware of that," said Forkum, who saw her team, led by hitter Connor Rahn's 12 scoring kills with Brooke Forkum, Meredith's junior daughter, adding nine at the net, to a 3-0 win over the Golden Eagles (now 7-2). "Those two are our team leaders and they showed why. Sophomores Kate Lowery, five kills, and Camden Rahn also played well in the very loud gym."

Middleburg's record improves to 8-3; ranked fourth in 5A, with recent wins over Orange Park and Oakleaf in county play with the teams' three losses; 7A-Doral Academy (now 8-4, 20-8 region finalist last year), 3A-Trinity Christian Academy (now 14-2, 25-4 last year region finalist) and 5A-Jensen Beach (now 13-2, 29-3 5A state champion last year), coming in the Nike Invitational Tournament in Tampa early in the season.

For Fleming Island, junior Savannah Jackson tapped out eight scoring kills to lead the Golden Eagles with Emily Topp and Rauly Eason adding four a piece; Eason with three blocks also.

Schermerhorn has guided her Golden Eagles to wins over Fletcher and Creekside thus far with Christ's Church Academy with their lone loss to Buchholz on August 24. Eason and Jackson have been the 1-2 punch at the net with 81 and 64 kills apiece with Samantha Rupert at 54 kills.

On the schedule for Fleming Island is Bishop Kenny (4A Final Four last year, 5th in 4A 2023), Orange Park and Ridgeview to end September with top contenders. The Ridgeview game will be a good benchmark game as Middleburg and Ridgeview are dominating their district

4-5A but will not play each other in regular season play and Fleming Island is a solid late-season common foe. Ridgeview, 8-1, ranked third in 5A, with astounding play up front from Haley Robinson, finished with a silver medal at the JJVA River City Classic with the Panthers losing a 2-1 match to Trinity Christian Academy, ranked 13th in Florida and fourth in 3A. The second-place finish was the highest ever for Ridgeview in the prestigious tournament.

"We are getting great play in our defensive back with our Oakleaf transfer Sydney Little," said Ridgeview High coach Steven Henry. "She was a little tentative at first coming in as a senior and not wanting to take a spot, but she is too good (20-25 digs a game) to keep off the court."

St. Johns Country Day School sits at 5-3 with three recent wins over Beaches Chapel, Duval Carter and Harvest Community. have become too common.

"We have problems just about every day," she said. "Some of these people are parents that just won't slow down. They're dropping off their kid at the elementary or junior high. I get upset because they know it could be their child that I'm crossing here."

One morning, a pickup truck sped through the school zone, and White raised her arm to shake her finger at the driver. He immediately slowed, rolled his window, stuck his head out, and yelled, "I'm sorry!"

White has tremendous love for "her kids." That's why the lockdowns from the COVID-19 pandemic took such an emotional toll. Classrooms transitioned online, so her job was put on hold. "I cried when that happened," White said. The hardest part, she said, was not seeing her little friends or saying 'Goodbye. Have a good summer.' to the sixth graders who were moving on to high school.

"Those were the toughest days," she said. "When we came back, I was the happiest person ever. I got to see a bunch of my kids, and I got to see new faces who were starting school. It was such a delight."

Man jailed for running over, at **CCSO** deputies after traffic stop

FLEMING ISLAND – A traffic stop quickly escalated into a litany of serious charges for a Middleburg man on Sept. 27 when he ran over a Clay County Sheriff's

Office deputy's foot with his car while attempting to flee.

Olivier Mardoche Osier, 22, was charged with aggravated attempting to flee or elude with injury, three counts of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon,

driving with a suspended license, possession of marijuana and aggravated assault with intent to commit a felony after he was pulled over on Marsh Hawk Lane after a deputy saw him driving erratically on U.S. Highway 17.

According to the arrest report, Osier stopped in an apartment complex parking lot. When the deputy asked for his driver's license, Osier put the car in gear and sped away. In the process, he drove over the

According to the report, another deputy had to "jump out of the path" after Osier drove toward him. The ensuing chase included speeds of nearly 90 mph on Old Hard Road. Osier continued onto County Road 220 and to Lakeshore Drive West. When a third deputy tried to stop him in the parking lot of Crossroad Lutheran Church, Osier steered his car toward the deputy's cruiser, forcing him to swerve to avoid a collision. Osier then slammed into a CCSO cruiser being driven by another deputy.

After the crash, deputies eventually used a taser to subdue Osier following a brief scuffle, according to the report.

Deputies found marijuana and a rifle in the trunk.

A further investigation revealed Osier's license was suspended in May for failing to pay a traffic fine.

Osier will be in court on Oct. 31. Until then, he will be in the Clay County Jail with a \$777,028 bond.

Bond set at \$1 million for man accused of carjacking, robberies

ORANGE PARK – An Orange Park man was arrested on Sept. 20 in connection with a carjacking and a series of burglar-

Javden Anthony Butler, 18, had additional charges filed on Sept. 30. He's now accused of carjacking, attempted grand theft auto, burglary and armed robbery.

His bond was set at \$1,50,012.

According to one of four arrest reports, Butler's spree started on May 25 when a woman said Butler put a gun against her

head inside her apartment and said, "Where's the money!" Butler then hit the woman in the head with the handgun. He and another woman, identified as Izza Azzaria, took \$70 and a pocket knife from a backpack. She told deputies the two defen-

dants warned her if they saw her again, they'd kill her.

The victim identified the two men after looking through suspect photos provided by CCSO. Deputies found items reported stolen in a bedroom where Butler lived on Wells Road.

Butler was also charged in connection with three incidents on June 18.

It started with the theft of a handgun from a car on Aurora Boulevard in Orange

Forty-four minutes later, he was accused of attempting to steal a car from Ursa Street in Orange Park. According to the arrest report. Butler admitted he was the lookout while four others broke into the steering column of Kia so they could steal the car and go to a party in Jacksonville. The screwdriver broke in the ignition, so they couldn't take the car.

Then, at 10:15 p.m., Butler is suspected of being one of three men with handguns who pointed their weapons at a couple on Ursa Street and demanded the keys to their car. Deputies found the stolen car a halfmile away in an apartment complex parking lot where Butler lived on Wells Road.

Butler's bond was set at \$1,050,012.

through a parking lot and crashed into a curb and a tree at another restaurant.


He tried to hide behind his truck when he saw deputies. According to the report, he had trouble standing up after he was detained. When he was asked if he'd

Former JSO officer sentenced for attempting online sexual enticement of child

JACKSONVILLE – Chief U.S. District Court Judge Timothy J. Corrigan sentenced Alejandro Carmona-Fonseca, 49, of Green Cove Springs, to 11 years and eight months in federal prison, followed by 15 years of supervised release for attempted online enticement of a minor to engage in sexual activity.

Carmona-Fonseca pleaded guilty on Dec. 14. He has been detained since his June 6, 2022 arrest. Carmona-Fonseca was employed as an officer with the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office.

According to court documents, this case began when the Clay County Sheriff's Office received a report from My Time Fitness in Lake Asbury that a gym member, Carmona-Fonseca, sent a nude photo to another gym member, a minor child (MV1). During an interview with CCSO, MV1 said Carmona-Fonseca had requested MV1's Snapchat account, and MV1 provided it to him. MV1 told Carmona-Fonseca he was in high school. Carmona-Fonseca sent images and videos with his genitals exposed to MV1. At one point, Carmona-Fonseca sent MV1 a picture of himself in his police uniform and wrote, "you can call me your police daddy." At times, Carmona-Fonseca would ask for shirtless pictures of MV1.

With the consent of MV1 and his parents, CCSO assumed MV1's identity over Snapchat and, on March 3, 2022, a Homeland Security Investigations Task Force Officer/CCSO detective began communicating with Carmona-Fonseca using MV1's Snapchat account. The TFO confirmed that Carmona-Fonseca was friends with MV1 and that location services were available on Snapchat. The TFO observed Carmona-Fonseca's location numerous times during the chat. Carmona-Fonseca's location showed him next to a JSO substation on numerous occasions, the areas where he worked as a patrol officer, near his residence, and near the gym he frequented. The TFO communicated with Carmona-Fonseca on March 3 and March 4, 2022. During those conversations, Carmona-Fonseca sent a video in his police uniform. He also sent one in which he was nude with his genitals exposed. Carmona-Fonseca

also made several requests for nude videos of MV1 flexing. Carmona-Fonseca said that everything stayed between them and because it was Snapchat, it would disappear.

Further investigation by law enforcement also identified additional victims that Carmona-Fonseca had exploited over Snapchat.

"Instead of honoring his oath to serve and protect, this former law enforcement officer chose to use his position of trust to exploit the innocence of the very children he was charged with protecting," said HSI Jacksonville Assistant Special Agent in Charge K. Jim Phillips. "Alongside our law enforcement partners, HSI and the Northeast Florida INTERCEPT Task Force will continue to aggressively target those who prey upon our children."

The Clay County Sheriff's Office, Homeland Security Investigations and the Northeast Florida INTERCEPT Task Force investigated the case. It was prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Ashley Washington.

It is another case brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative launched in May 2006 by the Department of Justice to combat the growing epidemic of child sexual exploitation and abuse. Led by the United States Attorneys' Offices and the Criminal Division's Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section, Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state, and local resources to locate, apprehend, and prosecute individuals who sexually exploit children and to identify and rescue victims. 


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Mussante tops at FSU XC Invite

TALLAHASSEE – The Florida Southern College women's cross country team, led by junior frontrunner Emma Mussante (Middleburg HS, Middleburg, FL) took on arguably its toughest field so far this season with several strong NCAA Division I programs and several Sunshine State Conference teams competing at the Florida State University Invitational Friday morning. In the men's race, FSC graduate student Alex Guy (Keystone Heights) was third third-team finisher behind Christian Gillers and Owen Allen, who finished in the top 11 of the 342-athlete field. Guy finished 20th in 25:24.3 with teammate Bryson Yamnitz in 21st in 25:25.7.

The Moccasins will be in action next Saturday, Oct. 7 at the UAH Invitational in Huntsville, Ala. The women's race is currently scheduled for 9:50 a.m. (EST).



Dusinberre was long a staple of Clay County wrestling and was also a fixture watching his sons and grandsons coach and play youth football for the Middleburg Athletic Association. Dusinberre, 50, was part of the Bronco coaching staff with Coll Robertson, now head coach, and Jamie Harrison that got the first girls state wrestling champion, Cheyenne Cruce, also unbeaten, last year. Dusinberre worked alongside Robertson the past five years despite his fight with cancer to develop the Bronco program into a state meet contender.

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and compete."

Broughton's rushing total was an unofficial school record for rushing yards in a game by a Fleming Island quarterback. Combined with his 144 passing yards, he accounted for 72 percent of the Golden Eagles' total offense. With his team trailing in the second half, Broughton was even inserted to return kickoffs, though he never got an opportunity.

Despite lofty preseason expectations for each team, both the Bears and Golden Eagles came into the contest with 2-2 records, making it as much of a must-win game for both teams as can be in only the fifth week of the season. Fleming Island head coach Chad Parker, who admitted before the game that it meant more to him than other games because he had been the assistant head coach and running backs coach at Bartram Trail last year, went for broke by playing more of his Golden Eagles on both sides of the ball.

"When I coached at Orange Park, the big thing was, 'Play our best 11,'" said Parker. "Depth is definitely an issue for us [at Fleming Island]."

The strategy paid off in the first half, as the Golden Eagles kept the high-flying Bears—who boast Riley Trujillo, a quarterback who is headed to Central Florida on a football scholarship, Laython Biddle, a running back who is committed to playing at the Naval Academy, and Arthur Lewis, a slot man/running back who is just a sophomore but who is already entertaining several Division I offers— off of the scoreboard. Braden Cunningham, Fleming Island's star offensive tackle, also played defensive tackle and recovered a Bears' fumble in the end zone to thwart a drive that had reached the five-yard line. But the Fleming Island offense also failed to score, hurt by a holding penalty that nullified what would have been a 46-yard touchdown run by De'mhir Jackson and a turnover at the Bartram Trail five-yard line, leaving the teams tied 0-0 at halftime.

The second half was a complete reversal of the first half, with the two teams exploding for 77 points and 897 yards of offense. Lewis turned a swing pass from Trujillo into a 62-yard score on the first play from scrimmage, and the Bears never let up. Bartram Trail reached the end zone on their first six possessions of the second half. While Fleming Island answered the Bears' first score with a touchdown of its own, the fatigued Golden Eagles were unable to keep pace. At least four Fleming Island players left the game with leg cramps.

"We played more guys both ways," said Parker. "With that comes conditioning, and we were not there yet. We just got to get in better shape."

Lewis ran the same wheel route on which he had scored Bartram Trail's first touchdown to the other side of the field on the Bears' second possession of the third quarter and scored again, this time on a 30-yard pass from Trujillo that gave the Bears a 14-7 lead. In all, Trujillo threw

three touchdown passes to Lewis.

With the Golden Eagles wary of the passing game, the Bears changed tactics and started feeding Biddle. He ran for 270 yards and three touchdowns on 22 carries.

"They [the Bears] are loaded with talent," said Parker, who pointed out that

Bartram Trail has a roster of 190 players and fields two junior varsity teams while Fleming Island has a roster of 60. "It was only a matter of time."

Fleming Island kept pace for a while. One play after Lewis's first touchdown, Golden Eagles running back Tyler Beverly burst through a hole on the right side and was not caught until he gained 77 yards, reaching the Bears' three-yard line. Three plays later, after a block in the back penalty nullified an apparent touchdown pass from Broughton to Trace Burney, Broughton rolled left, cut upfield, and cut back into the end zone from 16 yards out. Parker Sirdevan's extra point tied the game at 7 with 9:46 remaining in the third quarter.

One play after Biddle scored on a 36-yard run to give the Bears a 21-7 lead, Broughton faded back, faked a pass, took off up the middle and outran everyone 80 yards to cut the deficit back to a single score with three minutes left in the third quarter. Broughton, who is on the Fleming Island track team and credited weightlifting with his legs for his improved speed, has been clocked at 11.1 in the 100-meter dash. The junior could not be headed off by the two Bears' safeties who had angles on him

The game's defining sequence spanned the end of the third and the beginning of the fourth quarters. Down 28-14, the Golden Eagles marched from their 20-yard line to the Bartram Trail 32. On a third and two from there, Broughton took the snap and feinted towards the line as if it was a running play but pulled back to pass. The Bears' Ryan Spencer blitzed from Broughton's blind side and sacked him for an eight-yard loss as the third quarter ended. On fourth down, Broughton's deep pass intended for Jackson fell incomplete.

Taking over at their own 40, the Bears needed just two plays to put the game away. Biddle swept left, escaped the grasp of Fleming Island's Jackson— another of Fleming's two-way players— at the corner and sped all the way to the end zone. The 60-yard score gave Bartram Trail a commanding 35-14 lead with 11:07 left in the game.

Broughton did not let his Golden Eagles teammates give up, pulling his offensive lineman aside on the sideline and encouraging them to keep fighting. Midway through the fourth quarter, Broughton faked a swing pass to Daevean Boykin in the flat, then lofted a perfect spiral to a streaking Burney along the left sideline. Burney hauled it in and cruised 57 yards to the end zone for a touchdown, cutting the Bears' lead to 42-21.

Broughton led the Golden Eagles on their final scoring drive with under two minutes to play. He scrambled for 21 yards and followed that with a 39-yard completion to Burney. After Broughton ran for 11 yards and a first down at the nine-yard line, Jackson took a handoff, ran right, broke a tackle and scampered into the end zone for the game's final touchdown with 0:54 remaining.

The Golden Eagles, now 2-3 overall and 0-2 in District 3-4S, must recover in time to face Lake Minneola on Friday, October 6. The Class 4S Hawks are also 2-3.

"The season is not lost," said Parker. "Seven and three and six and four will get us to the playoffs. If we take care of business the next few weeks, we will go to the playoffs."






"It's not what we wanted to end up, but it is what it is. We played with our hearts. Next week, we will recover and get better, study (our opponent) more, and just come prepared," he said.
