

BCC approves appropriations and priorities wish list

County hopes to get funding from state for several key projects

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Board of County Commissioners unanimously passed its Appropriations and Legislative Priorities that will be sent to the state ahead of the next legislative session that opens on April. 10.

The BCC voted to remove the planned pickleball courts from the County Regional Sports Complex, with funds instead being sought for a cross-country trail, additional restrooms and expanded amenities for parking.

A trail would be more cost-effective. With the potential to build to NCAA standards, the facility could cater to various age levels and sporting events, hosting anything from junior high meets to collegiate-level competitions, potentially providing a boon to the community while attracting more big-ticket sporting events.

The BCC also voted to modify the Property Assessed Clean Energy statute to clarify the authority to regulate the activity within its jurisdiction and improve customer protection.

The plan won't expand the permissible uses of the Tourist Development Tax, while

continuing to fully fund Visit Florida, limit short-term rental legislation changes, and limit changes to the Florida Retirement System, while also increasing the maximum amount for the assessment of additional court costs and surcharges, which would increase the allowable fee and modify reporting requirements for the Value Adjustment Board.

Earmarked monies from the state will be divided into three categories: Infrastructure and Resiliency, Trails, Parks and Lakes and Public Safety and Library Facilities. Proposed funding the county would seek to receive from the state in the first category includes County Road 209 safety improvements (\$1.5 million), extending County Road 218 to four lanes (\$1.5 million), extending County Road 220 to four lanes (\$1.5 million) west of Knight Boxx road, a bridge and safety improvements for County Road 217 (\$2.5 million) and a State Road 16 right-of-way and four-lane from First Coast Expressway to Randall Road for a right-of-way acquisition (\$1.5

Trails, Parks and Lakes, the county will seek \$1 million for a number of appropriations, including multi-use fields, volleyball courts, a cross-country trail, or additional



lighting at the County Regional Sports Complex.

Then, a matching \$1 million ask will be made for the Veterans Park Greenway Access, providing access to Veterans Park, along with \$3 million for the Moccasin Slough Boardwalk and Tower, which would provide access to Moccasin Slough. Then, a trail mitigation for the Black Greek Bike Path, transitioning from wood to composite, would total \$750,000.

The county will work with the State on

Phase 2 of the Black Creek Water Resource Development Project, which is part of the Geneva Restoration Project and the restoration and refill Lakes Geneva and Brooklyn in Keystone Heights.

Finally, Public Safety and Library Facilities will look to get \$10 million for Phase 1 of the 911 and Emergency Operations Center building, \$750,000 for Fire Station No. 15, \$750,000 for Fire Station No. 21 and \$750,000 for the Oakleaf Plantation Library.

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Our children come first

We need to keep school district police department

According to the U.S. Secret Service, the best way to reduce school violence is to eliminate bullying, address mental health needs and foster high-quality relationships between staff and students so threats are detected and reported.

The tragic Marjory Stoneman Doug-

lass school shooting incident in 2018, where 17 students lost their lives, prompted the Florida legislature to mandate that the county's school district SHALL act as the agency responsible for guaranteeing the safety of our school children.


They also allowed us to pay for most of this mandate, and you voted to provide an additional \$13 million in funding to pay for a police presence in every school, along with \$4.8 million to harden facilities against hostile intrusions, \$7 million to implement a more robust mental health program and increase and enhance incident reporting and oversight and \$1.2 million to our charter schools.

Former Sheriff Daryl Daniels came up with a price that was 60% higher for each deputy than either the Orange Park or Green Cove Springs Police departments. After months of negotiations, the Sheriff held to his original number, and the Clay County School Board, faced with the start of a new school year, determined it could save more than \$1 million a year by providing the School Resource Officers with its own agency.

Control of the school policing segment of the program needs to remain with those responsible for the overall program. The school policing authority should enforce the policies of the local school district and the criminal law system while remembering our kids are still children. Mission 1 of a School Resource Officer is to keep kids safe. If a robbery occurs across the street, an officer reporting to the school system won't be pulled from campus to respond. The value of our children growing up learning that "officer friendly" is just that, and not someone to fear, cannot be overstated. Effective School Resource Officers are central mentors and can identify children in school and during after-school activities who need additional support. During the two months of summer vacation, officers

There are environmental consequences to relying so heavily on petroleum - oil spills, tetraethyl lead, greenhouse gas emissions and climate change – but there are also economic consequences. The growing trend in electric vehicles is offset by the still overwhelming reliance of motor vehicles on gasoline. Putting just one type of gas in the tank is the energy equivalent of putting all of our eggs in one basket. Today, oil price fluctuations can have a huge sway over the economy. Just last week, the price for a gallon of gasoline jumped nearly 20 cents, seemingly overnight. Diversifying the energy sector is as much a matter of natural security as it is a way to cut costs and improve air

Well, propane isn't a perfect energy source, but it is a better alternative to gasoline in many ways. Like gasoline, propane is an "organic compound," not "organic" in a grocery store sense but "organic" because it is comprised of carbon atoms – just three, to be exact. Like gasoline, it releases greenhouse gas carbon dioxide when burned, but at a lesser rate per capita. It oxidizes more efficiently in a combustion reaction, emitting far less toxic carbon monoxide. That

is why forklifts that run on propane can be operated indoors.


Propane is listed as a "clean energy fuel" by the U.S. government. A propane spill is nontoxic, much unlike the catastrophic spectacle of oil spills. The kicker is that it has the potential to be more costeffective. In Florida, a gallon of propane can be half the cost of gasoline but has about 85% of the fuel efficiency. That's still a good deal when you compare apples to apples.

A step toward any proven alternative fuel source is a step in the right direction. This isn't "paper straw" activism. Purchasing an electric vehicle or converting your existing car to be propane-powered would have immediate ecological and economic benefits.

Businesses and individuals should continue to be encouraged to incorporate alternative fuel options. The "Sunshine State" offers incentives to put up solar panels. Nuclear energy, which has no emissions, has gained wider acceptance. Propane itself has the potential to be a renewable energy source. A strain of bacteria, Halomonas bluephagenesis, has been demonstrated to produce propane after editing its genome.

Currently, gasoline is the convenient choice. Gasoline still holds hegemony over the auto industry, and its infrastructure is ubiquitous. But electric charging stations have started popping up in the county. And if there's a demand, gas stations may soon start offering propane or other alternative

Step by step. Clay County can choose to be more self-reliant and walk away from a dependence on fossil fuels.

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Company uses alternative solution to gasoline for fleet vehicles

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – In a significant move toward promoting eco-friendly and cost-effective solutions for fleet vehicles, Precise Alternative Fleet Solutions, an alternative solution to gasoline and diesel fuel through propane, recently opened its doors in Clay County.

The business, which launched two years ago in Michigan and conducted sales nationwide with a wide-ranging array of clients, including FedEx and other commercial fleets, businesses within the propane industry, law enforcement agencies, towing companies, and more, set its sights on the county earlier this year, conducting a four to five-month search before finally locking down their brick-and-mortar location this summer.

Precise has already expanded to four employees. But the impact on local jobs from the company selling the go-green, odorless, colorless propane could soon grow as it seeks to create even more job opportunities for county residents. Owner Ronny Martinez said his company has the potential to employ 15 to 30 people as they work to reach full production capacity.

The company was given a warm welcome with a ribbon-cutting from the County Chamber of Commerce on Oct. 6 at their 989 Worthington Ave. address, just an ear-

shot from the Green Cove Springs Marina and the County Port.

"The ribbon-cutting was phenomenal," he said. More than 60 attendees, including current and potential new customers, representatives from the propane industry, and community members, were on hand at the big event for a resource that could signal what the future looks like in the county.

Representatives from the Florida Propane Gas Association, which included Ex-

ecutive Director Dale Calhoun, were on hand to pitch attendees on the stability and cost-effectiveness of the fuel, along with everything propane had to offer.

"Today, we can actually introduce renewable propane. Most people think propane is just fossil fuels, but it's not just fossil fuels. Yes, it comes from crude and natural gas, but you can have renewable propane," Calhoun said.

The 7,000-square foot facility features

800 square feet of office space and an onsite fueling station that provides clients with service 24 hours a day, seven days a week with their 1,000-gallon propane tank. The digitally-operated system activates when drivers enter their PIN, mileage and vehicle number, which is connected to a network of 2,500 units across the United States.

The company, which partners with Florida's Finest Kustom Karts, which sells Golf Carts powered by electric and lithium batteries, provides clients with a wide range of services. They specialize in converting existing fleet vehicles to run on propane, which involves installing necessary equipment and systems and offering maintenance and support throughout the life cycle of converted vehicles.

Precise also works closely with businesses to provide consultation and education about the benefits of using propane as an alternative fuel source. Martinez and his team explain the environmental and financial advantages of making the big switch. The 41-year-old spent 15 years in the alternative fuel industry and 21 in transportation.

But for the creative entrepreneur, the job isn't done.

The county businessman, who recently

protection at all but five of the schools in the county. The Town of Orange Park and the City of Green Cove Springs provide school resource officers at their schools.

The decision to fold the district's police department into CCSO comes after the school district broke away from the sheriff's office in 2019, citing costs.

Now, the board is considering moving its police department, which includes a \$4.8 million budget, back under the auspices of the sheriff's office. It will decide at its Nov. 2 meeting if it wants to advance the project.

"We need to be looking at cutting pro-

grams anyway," said board member Michele Hanson. "There (are) a lot of hard decisions to be made in the next three years. For me, making a decision on the security of our kids is not as tough as making a decision about something else. Safety decisions are easier. They're easy for the public to understand."

Cook said the district asked for costs and ideas in July. She said she couldn't provide them with details until the Board of County Commissioners approved her budget last month.

She said her agency would need a onetime \$1.7 million transition payment to switch equipment.

"We went back and forth several times with questions and then followed up," Cook said. "So when it came to actual numbers, we had to wait for the BCC to approve our budget, which included a compensation plan so that we could provide the best estimate numbers, how much a transition would cost and what ongoing costs would look like."

Cook said, if approved, school officers would simply change uniforms and maintain their basic duties. She dispelled the idea that SROs would be asked to go on patrol when they aren't protecting students, faculty and staff.

"Operationally, it would make no sense (to move them)," Cook said. "It would be my intent to hire as many people as possible and keep them in their same positions."

School officers also would get pay raises and get credit for their service. The sheriff's office also would hire a director who would answer to the undersheriff.

However, she said, unlike the current policy where school officers are restricted to be within 1,000 feet of the campus, sheriff's office deputies may answer an emergency close to a school to make sure there aren't any life-challenging injuries or threats

"If you're made aware of an issue nearby, there is an obligation to go check it out and make sure that there's no immediate life safety issues," she said. "But as you're doing that, what happens is the deputy will key in on the radio and say, 'I'm so and so, and I'm at this location. I've been told of an accident along the way."

The school board will meet at 6 p.m. at the Teacher Training Center at Fleming Island High.

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Historical Society

Green Cove Springs rich history dates back 250 years

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - John Nelson, a globetrotting cybersecurity expert with a profound fascination for local history in Clay County, was the guest speaker at last Tuesday's County Historical Society Meet-

As Nelson stood before members and guests, he transported them to a bygone era, weaving together the captivating narrative of an area that has undergone several remarkable transformations throughout its history.

While now a residential neighborhood across the street from Hagan Ace Hardware, St. Johns Landing Apartments was originally established as housing for members of the U.S. Navy and their families in 1951. It was converted into public housing in 1960, and the area, just south of Black Creek and stationed on the western bank of the St. Johns River, has a history dating back to the 1760s.


A favored British officer at the time, Patrick Tonyn – who would later serve as the last Royal Governor of East Florida

- received a 50,000-acre land grant for Magnolia Springs, which extended from Magnolia Springs on the south bank of Black Creek all the way up to the forks of the river.

During the American Revolutionary War, the governor had no choice but to burn down the property so Americans could not access it. Following the Treaty of Paris and the war's end in 1783, the property switched hands to be under Spanish control.

The area that would become Green Cove Springs has a unique history. No other place in Florida has had an uninterrupted run of 250 years, surviving the Civil War, three Seminole Wars, and under the rules of both Charles II of Spain and King George III of Britain. In the late 19th century, the area would be defined by the Magnolia Springs Hotel. Emphasizing grandeur, the hotel was an original resort and golf course in the state.

Isaac Cruft, a Boston hotelier and one of the most successful developers of the time, completed Magnolia Springs Hotel in 1881, a hallmark of architectural design

during the Hotel Era of Clay County. For nearly three decades, state tourists, who could only access the posh resort hotel by steamboat, booked 200-plus rooms, suites and five privately-owned three-story cottages, maxing out at a capacity of 800 during the peak of the winter season, enjoying luxury and exotic adventure, which included alligator hunting.

'(The Magnolia Springs Hotel) attracted hundreds of Northerners each vear to escape from the cold Northeast winters. There were all sorts of amusements," Nelson said.

The steamboat played a pivotal role in

the settlement's history as an early mode of transportation in the state. Magnolia Springs, centrally located, served as an important drop-off and pick-up point for travelers. The area's freshwater source, favorable location and strategic location were key factors that originally drew settlers, a one-day canoe ride leaving Black Creek or just a day's journey from St. Augustine. The Magnolia Springs Hotel's dominance ended in the early 1900s when Henry Flagler extended the railroad to Miami, which allowed tourists to travel by train instead of boat to escape cold winter weather.

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Fleming Island High trying to serve up new pickleball program

 ${\it FLEMING\ ISLAND-For\ one\ high\ school\ in\ Clay\ County,\ momentum\ is\ picking\ up\ for\ the\ newest\ sporting\ sensation.}$

Tessa Wilson is a local pickleball prodigy and All-County tennis star. Ahmed El-Zarif plays competitive travel pickleball with her. The two teammates, both students at Fleming Island High, devised a game plan: launch the beloved sport of pickleball in Fleming Island and throughout the School District.

When Wilson hosted the first meeting of the Pickleball Club in August, she expected a turnout of maybe 20 to 30 students. To her astonishment, 75 students attended the meeting, demonstrating the remarkable interest in the sport, which is growing nationwide. "We were blown away with how many people actually wanted to join the team," she said.

But Wilson and El-Zarif have far bigger plans. To increase pickleball's reach across the Northeast Florida region, the sport will need to jump through a few hoops. To reach varsity status in the School District, at least four high schools must participate at the club level for two years.

With one student and one coach or faculty member needed to sponsor a club sport, Wilson took the initiative at Fleming Island by linking with Eagles' Girls Tennis Head Coach Molly McNeill to kickstart the program.

Then, El-Zarif reached out to County Athletic Director Jay Stilianou and high school principals to get the ball rolling. After some persistence, El-Zarif received an email containing instructions on how he could help other schools start a club-level sport.

Last summer, the Eagles' Club Pickleball team hosted a fundraiser at the Eagle Harbor Tennis Club. The event was dubbed a success after raising \$1,300.

"As soon as people heard that we wanted to start pickleball, they asked, 'How can I donate? Can I give paddles and equipment? What can I do?'" Wilson said.

Currently, the pickleball torchbearers in the county are Fleming Island and Middleburg Highs. They held a scrimmage on Oct. 17 to experiment with multiple formats, including mixed doubles and matches combining players from both schools.

"I think everyone loved it because you get to compete against another school instead of just practicing against your own team. It was just fun to see people enjoy

the sport and its social aspect," Wilson

Wilson started pickleball as an extension of her passion for tennis, but soon after she picked up her new pickleball paddle, the game flickered from a hobby to an addiction.

"I love competing, and I've played tennis my whole life, so I always loved that sport. But when I first stepped onto the Pickleball court, I said, 'I love this more,'" she said.

With Wilson and El-Zarif playing at a high level of competition, traveling across the state for events, the pair could become a dominant force in bringing the sport to a varsity level at Fleming Island.

Last April, the dynamic duo participated in the U.S. Pickleball Open in Naples, which spanned a week. The event, sponsored by the Professional Pickleball Association, gave them the chance to win a

"golden ticket," which can be acquired by players who win a gold medal at a tournament in their designated bracket. This means the pair will compete at the upcoming Nationals in Dallas in November.

"It's exciting because they are very dedicated to it, very committed to it," she said.

The Golden Eagles' practice is each Tuesday and Thursday, and Wilson's father, Graham Wilson, heads the program. Twice-weekly sessions give students ample opportunities to sharpen their skills and bond as a team while also advertising the school's new pickleball program as students pass by the tennis courts.

Wilson shared her excitement about the growing club.

"Even if you don't have previous experience, we have a lot of people who joined who have never picked up a pickleball paddle. Now, they are competing and love it," she said

"I think we were working on a couple of new songs right now, and I'm hoping that we can get at least one of those out before we get to Memphis," said singer Mike Hale. "We've got some stuff that we haven't played in these challenges yet, so we're going to bring that with us."

All six members — singer Mike Hale, bassist Gerry Goyette, drummer Steve Gard, keyboardist Debbie Stokes, guitarist Pops Stokes and harmonicist Dave Hockman — are from Middleburg. They played three original and two cover songs in Gainesville last week to win the regional competition. And they have plenty of new material they can work into their routine before hitting Beale Street from Jan. 16-20

"Wow, you've got to be excited about that." said drummer Steve Gard. "We aren't



sure what we're going to do for Memphis. We have several originals we didn't play (in Gainesville). We have covers we didn't play. We're going to try to work it down to our four or five best songs."

Whatever they pick, Hale said it would

be "tight."

"I think I think the secret is just being a very tight, tight, well-rounded band," he said. "I mean, from the guitar to the keys. I mean, from the bass player to the harmonica – the harmonica adds dynamics to the band. So, I mean, a very tight band is what I think is the best thing about being a great blues band."

And attitude.

Blues music started in the Deep South in the Mississippi Delta about 160 years ago. It originated in the working fields and features distinctive melancholic subjects and sounds. Blues influences can be found in jazz, rhythm, and rock and roll music.

Three of Southern Junction's originals that earned them a spot in Memphis were "Makin Shine," "Hard to Believe" and "Cajun Queen." Hale said the band was comfortable with its setlist for Gainesville, but they weren't sure how they'd stack up against the competition.

"We knew we knew we had a chance, but I mean, there was definitely some good competition there," he said. "We didn't go in there with a heavy head. You know what I mean? We kind of felt like we could win. We were runner-up two years ago. I had a little bit of new material, and we came out with the win."



The 14th Colony

As the 14th colony, Florida's place in the Revolutionary War is often forgotten. When thinking about the American Revolution, folks think about the thirteen colonies north of Florida. Looking at the big picture, the British colonies began with the British West Indies, ran through Florida and the thirteen other colonies, and then continued into the British Canadian colonies of Quebec, Nova Scotia, Ontario, and New Brunswick. St. Augustine and Florida in general were in the middle of the British Empire in the Western Hemisphere.

Then there was the attitude of British Floridians, who were happy with the status quo. While the upper thirteen had a beef with the British crown, East Floridians did not. Local plantations, especially those in Clay County, were thriving. East Floridians saw the Continental Congress as rabble-rousers who posed a great threat to an economy that was working in their favor. East Florida could feed itself, defend itself, and produce profits. Because of this success, Florida became a refuge for Loyalists fleeing the upper thirteen colonies.

When news of the signing of the Declaration of Independence reached St. Augustine on August 11, 1776, a large mob of Loyalists burned the effigies of John Hancock and Samuel Adams in the town square. British East Florida, of course, sent no representatives to the Continental Congress. St. Augustine soon became a base of operations from which the British dealt with the southern colonies. Troops and munitions were amassed there, and refugees from the other thirteen colonies flooded the streets.

None of this went unnoticed by the rebel colonists. The Continental Army launched three attempts to conquer East Florida in 1776, 1777, and 1778. The first attempt was ordered by General George Washington himself. These ultimately failed, as it seems that the true grit needed to invade just wasn't there. Lack of manpower, poor leadership, and logistical errors all led to these failures.

Sneaky raids by low-level rebels were one way that the Revolution affected East Florida. As a result, Governor Patrick Tonyn had to send several of his workers and slaves to St. Augustine to build public defenses. In order to keep property, houses, and other such assets out of the rebel's hands, General Augustine Prevost decided to burn all "houses and manufactured timber" along the west and north of the St. Johns River and around Doctor's Lake. Tonyn diligently carried out the order. He wrote that his orders were "fully executed", and his own 20,000-acre plantation on Black Creek was totally destroyed. He lost two plantation homes, sixteen slave cabins, two barns, four sets of indigo vats, and 3,000 cypress planks.

The American Revolution brought raids and extensive damage to British East Flor-

ida. The ungrateful rebels saw Florida as a great resource for slaves, timber, cattle, cotton, and whatever else they could lay their hands on. Not all these raiders were whom we think of today as our Revolutionary War heroes; some were sometimes just small bands of raiders and bandits.

Over at Doctor's Lake, Spring Garden and Tobacco Bluff were British indigo plantations. They were located on the western side of Doctor's Lake and were the property of John Davis. When John Bartram. the Crown's botanist, visited the area, he stayed with Davis. Spring Garden was 400 acres and Tobacco Bluff was 600 acres. Between 1774 and 1776, the sales of indigo exports from Spring Garden and Tobacco Bluff in London totaled £556 sterling. The land was considered excellent for timber and naval stores, and the set value of the property was £2844, including slaves. Indigo, tobacco, citrus, sugar cane, and Sea Island cotton were common crops.

On July 1, 1776, armed rebels from Georgia surrounded the slaves at Tobacco Bluff while they were at work in the fields. Twenty-seven men and women were abducted and marched to Georgia. The cattle, horses, hogs, indigo and provisions fields, a framed and weather-boarded barn, a log dwelling house, a mill house, slave dwellings, indigo vats, and poultry houses were destroyed or stolen.

The plundering of slaves in East Florida by American rebels was rampant. On July 1, 1776, Governor Tonyn reported that the theft of slaves was an obvious goal of the rebels as "they took upwards of thirty (slaves) and a family" from the first two plantations they reached. Tonyn was talking about Spring Garden and Tobacco Bluff. Plundered slaves were also used to carry other items taken from plantations, such as furniture, household goods, food stores, and farm equipment.

Tonyn dealt with the "unnatural colonists who are ungrateful to British designs," as he called the rebels and Continental soldiers. He sent out his local militia, like Thomas Brown and Brown's Rangers, after them. Many were arrested and brought back to the Castillo, where some were treated as prisoners of war and others like common criminals. In 1779, Spain took advantage of Britain's total distraction with the Revolution. By 1781, Britain had lost West Florida to Spain. On September 3, 1783, the Treaty of Paris ended the American Revolution. Under a separate treaty. England ceded Florida back to Spanish control in exchange for the Bahamas, ending British Florida. The war, having drained Britain's coffers, resulted in Britain being forced to recognize American independence. After losing control of the majority of its colonies, Britain had little interest in keeping Florida.

No one was angrier about the abandonment then Governor Tonyn. Patrick Tonyn, who was so loyal to the Crown felt deeply betrayed. All his efforts to keep the colony safe and ensure its economic success were tossed aside. The "Great Evacuation", as it was called, did not go well. Stretching the new Spanish governor's patience, the British managed to turn an evacuation into an almost three-year ordeal. Then, Parliament, like a dog with a bone, demanded that he explain his management of the "Long Evacuation." There were no parades welcoming back Governor Tonyn. Instead, he faced years of red tape and paperwork.

closed on a deal for 80 vehicles for a Law Enforcement Agency in North Carolina, said that business owners that deploy fleet vehicles could see not only long-term savings but a return on investment on their decision to use propane in just six months to a year, depending on the vehicle. He said that this can allow business owners to reinvest in employee programs with savings, such as 401(k) plans and benefits.

Propane-powered vehicles deployed at municipal, county or state levels for fleets like school districts, law enforcement and public works also have the potential to save taxpayer dollars with government incentives obtained by rebates and grants that encourage the use of alternative fuels.

Stipulations exist for converting a vehicle to propane. The cost typically ranges from \$8,000-to-\$12,000 to go green, Martinez said. However, an Alternative Fuel Tax Credit currently exists through the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, active until 2024. That allows consumers to save 37

cents a gallon to power a motor vehicle or forklift with the colorless, odorless fuel.

The future for going green isn't solely by going electric, as currently demonstrated by Martinez and others utilizing propane.

"Electric makes sense for your golf cart or grocery-getter, but it doesn't make

sense for your workhorse (vehicle) yet," he said. He isn't discounting electric, but the future could be propane, as embodied in the company's showcase truck, a 2024 GMC 3500, that was on display last week at Trunk or Treat at the Julington Creek, where Martinez and his team passed out candy and marketed their product to potential clients.

The truck has two separate fueling systems, gas and propane, and the 40-gallon propane tank adds 1,000 miles of range. The propane tank can be placed in the back of the pickup or where the spare tire regularly sits in the undercarriage, with a dedicated line to hook up propane right beside the gas pump.

"If you move products or people, then propane should make sense for you," Martinez said

Green Cove Springs looking for funds for stormwater projects

For Clay Today

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – During its most recent meeting, the City Council took the first steps in securing a bond for Stormwater Capital Improvement Projects.

Council approved the first reading of an ordinance that authorizes city staff to borrow up to \$9 million for stormwater capital improvement projects and up to \$600,000 to purchase a Vac-Con truck for the City Stormwater Department. It also agreed to put George A. Smith Jr. of George A. Smith PLLC on retainer to serve as council for selecting and signing the bond.

The second and final reading of the ordinance will be presented to the council for approval during the Nov. 7 regular session meeting. The city is already in the Request for Proposal process for terms and conditions for a bank loan. Once the City Council adopts the ordinance, staff will present their selected loan recommendation for council approval on Dec. 5. If the recommended loan is approved, staff anticipates finalizing the loan in December 2023 or January 2024.

The proposed bond will supplement the funding needed to complete crucial stormwater projects throughout the city. Stormwater User Fees will support paying back the proposed bond rather than directly funding stormwater capital improvement projects.

Once a bond is approved and finalized, funds will help accelerate the timeline for several stormwater projects, including:

West Street Drainage Project: Replacing stormwater pipes along West Street from Walnut Street to Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. City has already begun the construction bid process and plans to start construction in January 2024

Clay Street Storm Basin Project: Replacing stormwater pipes and repairing river bulkhead along Clay Street, Lambart Street, Magnolia and St. Johns avenues. The city will be able to begin the construc-

tion bid process in Spring 2024, shortening the project's timeline by two years.

Julia Street Stormwater Project: Upgrading stormwater systems and replacing pipes along Julia Street from Sunset Avenue to the end of the street at Governors Creek. City will be able to begin the construction bid process in Spring 2024, shortening the project's timeline by a year. Bayard and St. Johns avenues upgrades: Stormwater upgrades to replace pipes along Bayard Street from St. Johns Avenue to the St. Johns River and St. Johns Avenue from Elmore Street to Bayard Street, and repair river bulkhead

on Bayard Street. The city will be able to begin the construction bid process in Spring 2024 and begin construction as scheduled.

Cove Subdivision Pipe Lining Project: Lining stormwater pipes to extend the life of the current pipe system. The city will be able to begin the construction bid process in Spring 2024, shortening the project's timeline by three years.

Ferris Street Storm Basin Project: Replacing stormwater pipes along Ferris Street and the connecting streets. The city will be able to begin the design and permitting process in Spring 2024, shortening the project's timeline by three years.

Roberts Street Project: Replacing stormwater pipe and drainage structures. The city will be able to begin the design and permitting process in Spring 2024, shortening the project's timeline by three years.

South Highland Avenue Project: Upgrading stormwater systems. The city will be able to begin the design and permitting process in Spring 2024, shortening the project's timeline by two years. Oakridge Stormwater Project: Installing new stormwater piping and stormwater pond on Oakridge from Walnut Street to Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. The city will be able to begin the design and permitting process in Spring 2024, shortening the project's timeline by three years.



Blue Devils set for district showdown

PALM COAST - Entering Friday the Clay Blue Devils were ranked ninth in the FH-SAA Regional Playoff Rankings, the first team out of the eight-team bracket. A win on the road at Matanzas would not only help Clay's playoff wild-card prospects, it would also set up a winner-take-all all-state championship with St. Augustine at home this Friday.

Clay set the tone early, recovering an onside kick on the opening kickoff. On 4th and 10 at the Matanzas 30-yard line, Merrick Rapoza found Payton Dykas for a 15-yard gain to keep the drive going. Moments later, Rapoza capped off a 13-play 53-yard drive with a 1-yard touchdown run. That possession chewed 4:54 off the clock, a trend that would continue through the evening. Clay Coach Kyle Kennard said of his team's start "Our kids come to play, they played hard tonight."

Two plays into the Pirate's first series, Chandler Thomas intercepted a Dakwon Evans pass to give the Blue Devils the ball again. Clay turned the ball over on downs and Matanzas went three and out. The teams then traded punts before the Pirates recovered a Rapoza fumble. Matanzas ended the quarter with the ball trailing Clay 7-0.

Ninety seconds into the second quarter, Landon Grover kicked a 28-yard field goal for Matanzas cutting the Blue Devils lead

to 7-3. After a Clay punt Pirate quarterback Dakwon Evans hit his 6' 3" 240 Lb tightend Daniel DeFalco on a post for a 69-yard TD pass. "It is awesome," gushed Middleburg head coach Ryan Wolfe, who intimated a 2M-Bishop Kenny win as strong for the Broncos' playoff aspirations. "The game had so many ups and downs."

In the same district playoff chase in district 3-3S, Orange Park got cranked by 4S-Ponte Vedra 35-0 to hamper their playoff hopes with an upcoming Middleburg vs. Orange Park game on Friday a possible season changer for both teams. For Orange Park, a Timothy Barfield interception in the first drive of the third quarter by Ponte Vedra was the highlight of the night.

In Middleburg, there were five lead changes in a tense game and neither team ever led by more than seven points.

Bronco Quarterback Jaydan Jenkins directed the game-winning drive, moving the Broncos 57 yards in seven plays in the final 1:15. Jenkins, who had misfired on his first six passes, connected on his final five, four of them on the final possession. The big plays along the march were a swing pass that Jarren Rosier turned into a 20-yard gain and an 11-yard out pattern to Braydan Street. The senior's five-yard run allowed the Broncos to take their final timeout with the ball sitting on the 26-yard line with 2.5 seconds remaining.

"We have one of the best kickers in the country," Wolfe said of Robison. "With the wind behind us, I knew that if we got within the 40-yard line, we would be okay."

A sharp snap by Travis Antienowicz and a perfect hold by Joe Forte preceded Robison's kick, which split the uprights with plenty of room to spare and triggered a rush of black-shirted Broncos onto the field to celebrate with their kicker.

Wolfe called running plays on the final two plays of the drive to ensure that there would be no time left after the field goal attempt.

"I did not want to give them the ball back," he explained. "[Bishop Kenny] Coach Krause is a great playcaller. He and I have been through this before. Ten years ago, when Clay beat Bishop Kenny 74-73, I was the offensive coordinator for Clay and he was the offensive coordinator for Bishop Kenny. It was, 'Whoever had the ball last would win,' just like tonight."

It appeared that the Broncos had clinched the game on a 17-yard fade route from Jenkins to Rosier— Jenkins's first pass completion of the game— that gave the hosts a 28-21 lead with just 2:15 remaining. Rosier snared the high throw along the sideline despite blanket coverage by the Crusaders' Julian Dewees, somehow managing to get a foot down in bounds. But Bishop Kenny's James Resar stunned the home crowd with a 60-yard bomb to J.P. Donovan to tie the game at 28. Resar, an Iowa commitment, completed 14 of 21 passes for 290 yards and two touchdowns, while Donovan led all receivers with six catches for 201 vards.

Both offenses were successful using uptempo, no-huddle attacks in the first half. Jenkins capped a 38-yard drive on Middle-

burg's first possession with a 26-yard run, giving the Broncos a 7-0 lead. The Crusader's defenders appeared to lose sight of Jenkins in a scrum in the middle before he burst out of it and sped to the end zone. Luke Wheeler's fumble recovery set up the short field. After Bishop Kenny answered with a 12-yard scoring run by Caleb Mattison, the Broncos retook the lead on Jenkins' second touchdown run of the quarter, a 20-yard scamper off of the right end.

Bishop Kenny dominated the second quarter, scoring on an 18-yard back shoulder throw from Resar to Kaleb Lampkins and on a one-yard plunge by linebacker/fullback Gunnar Rogers. The Crusaders led 21-14 at halftime.

Whether in an effort to rest its harried defense or to rest Jenkins, who tallied 34 carries on the night, Middleburg slowed its pace in the second half. The Broncos methodically marched 80 yards in 13 running plays to open the third quarter, taking 7:57 off of the clock.

Linebacker Austin Cruce entered the game at running back on a third down from the six-yard line and dragged several tacklers into the end zone to knot the game at

21. Robison had a huge impact on the game as a punter, averaging 46.8 yards on four punts. The Broncos gained 37 yards of field position when the teams exchanged two punts each on three-and-out possessions spanning the end of the third quarter and the beginning of the fourth. Robison's 54-yard blast set the Crusaders back to their 10-yard line and his next punt, a 41-yarder to the sideline, forced them to start their next drive at the two-yard line. Middleburg began its next possession at the Kenny 43-yard line and drove the short field for Rosier's touchdown

Jenkins had 203 yards rushing and accounted for 265 of the Broncos' 311 total yards.

"This is the guy who has to touch the ball a lot," Wolfe said of Jenkins, who moved from wide receiver to quarterback in week four. "He's our guy, and our offense goes through him. A defense can take away a receiver, but you cannot take the ball out of the quarterback's hands. Plus, quarterback runs add an extra hat [for blocking]."

Wolfe was also complimentary of Rosier, a 6'0" receiver whose role in the offense has risen dramatically in the last few weeks.

Rosier finished with 51 yards on four receptions and ran for 18 yards on six rushes.

At 4-4 and with their remaining games at Orange Park on October 27 and at home against Fernandina Beach on November 3, the Broncos will be favored to win out. Both the Raiders and the Pirates are 3-5. While Middleburg will not win District 3-3S on account of its 17-6 loss to Lake City Columbia on October 13, the Broncos are positioned to earn an at-large spot in the playoffs. In addition to the four district champions, the next four highest-ranked teams according to MaxPreps.com in the region receive a playoff berth. Entering Friday's game, Middleburg sat as the seventh-ranked team in the region, a ranking that should only improve with the win over the Crusaders.

"We are in pretty good shape," said Wolfe. "What's great about it is that our fate is in our hands. Our strength of schedule really helps us."

Conner Subjinski was wide right on a 27-yard field goal attempt with 1:12 remaining in the third quarter for Bishop Kenny. The Crusaders, now 5-3, travel to Bolles on October 27 in a battle for the District 2-2M championship

Smith parred her first seven holes with two birdies to finish with a 34, but could





PONTE VEDRA - The Fleming Island Golden Eagles showed their resilience as they fought back from two sets down against Ponte Vedra, but a comeback bid came up short and they lost to the Sharks in four sets, 25-21, 25-19, 23-25, 28-26 in the district 3-6A championship on Oct. 19.

ORANGE PARK - Seven kills from Brynn White and six each from Brooke Pickett and Kendall Proffitt were not enough to get St. Johns Country Day over their nemesis, as the Spartans fell in three sets at Christ's Church Academy in the District 2-2A volleyball final on October 19.

To continue its season, the Spartans, now 14-7 and ranked 19th in the FH-SAA Class 2A rankings on MaxPreps. com, must hope for an at-large berth in the Class 2A regional playoffs. The first four spots in the regional go to District champions, while the remaining four are awarded to the highest-ranked teams in Districts 1 through 4, using the Max-Preps.com rankings as of October 21.

SJCD had leads in each game, only to see the Eagles roar back to steal the wins. In the first game, the Spartans led 16-11 after consecutive blocks by Ashanti Williams, who frequently combined with Hadley Dantzler to set up a wall that thwarted the Eagles' outside hitters. But Christ's Church scored six of the next seven points to knot the game at 17, and then went on a run during which they scored five of six points to take control at 23-20.

"That is the thing about volleyball—it is all about momentum," said SJCD head coach Jenna Williams. "We had the momentum through the first 15 points."

The Spartans led 5-3 in the second

RHS Huff vs. CHS Belanger; **Furman beats Western Carolina**

Quarterback Tyler Huff's 53-yard touchdown run with 54 seconds remaining sealed FCS No. 3 Furman's 29-17 victory over No. 8 Western Carolina on Saturday afternoon in a Top-10 nationally-ranked Southern Conference showdown at E.J. Whitmire

Huff is a Ridgeview High graduate who played four years at Presbyterian where he set numerous school records then transferred as a graduate student to Furman.

With the victory, its fifth straight and 10th consecutive league triumph, Furman (6-1, 4-0 SoCon) took sole possession of first place in the SoCon. The win was also Furman's seventh in the last eight clashes with Western Carolina (5-2, 3-1 SoCon).

Huff, in his second season with the Paladins, accounted for 263 yards of total offense and three touchdowns, passing for 174 yards and two scores while finishing with 89 yards rushing and a touchdown on six attempts. The Paladins improved to 18-3 with Huff in the starting lineup, 15-1 versus FCS opposition, and 11-0 against the SoCon.

The Paladins compiled $508\ yards$ of total offense, including a season-high 334 yards rushing. Running back Dominic Roberto proved again to be a wrecking ball against Western Carolina, rushing a career-high 31 times for a season-high 154 yards and a touchdown. Wayne Anderson Jr. added 85 on eight rushes to give Furman its first 300yard performance on the ground since totaling 426 against the Catamounts last season in Greenville.

84 yards rushing. The Paladins sacked WCU quarterback Cole Gonzales three times and intercepted him twice.

Note: On the Western Carolina offense was former Clay High wide receiver A.J. Belanger who registered one catch for four vards.

Linebacker Evan DiMaggio led the Paladins with 10 tackles and two of the three sacks, giving him four in the last two games.

Seven Paladins registered pass receptions, led by tight end Mason Pline, who had four grabs for 88 yards.

Pline's 10-yard scoring catch from Huff helped give Furman an early 7-0 lead.

The Paladins followed with touchdowns on their next two possessions — on a 16yard strike from Huff to freshman wide receiver Colton Hinton and a Roberto 9-yard burst four minutes into the second quarter to go up 20-7.

Western Carolina cut the lead to 20-14 with two minutes remaining in the half.

After failing to convert a 32-yard field goal attempt in the third quarter, Furman watched Western Carolina move to the Paladin 18, but on a second-and-nine play Cally Chizik stepped in front of a Gonzales pass at the pylon for his third interception of the season, halting the threat.

The Paladins turned to their potent ground game to take command in the fourth quarter, covering 59 yards on 11 plays to set up a 39-yard Ian Williams field goal for a 23-14 advantage with 7:54 remaining.

WCU countered with their lone score of the second half, a 43-yard Richard McCollum field goal with 5:13 left, but Furman's offense put any Catamount comeback designs to rest on the ensuing possession, covering 79 yards in eight plays, capped by Huff's keeper around right end on a thirdand-nine play with WCU's defense keying on

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
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
