GREEN COVE SPRINGS – With so many farmers approaching retirement, Florida 4-H State President and senior at St. Johns Country Day, School Taylor Thigpen, told guests it's vital to support 4-A, Future Farmers of America and Youth Agriculture Programs. Thigpen told nearly 200 people at the 51st Farm-City Luncheon that growing the next generation of farmers is a matter of national security. "According to the 2017 United States Census, 98% of the more than two million farms in the U.S. are family owned and operated," he said. Keystone Heights City Manager tenders her resignation

Lynn Rutkowski informs counsel Jan. 10 will be her final day

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – City Manager Lynn Rutkowski submitted her letter of resignation during last Monday night's City Council meeting. She was hired as a part-time Code Enforcement Officer. She was promoted to the Planning and Zoning Clerk and hired by the council as the City Manager in 2016.

When former Mayor Karen Lake questioned her education, the council voted 4-1 not to accept her resignation in 2022. The city is currently embroiled in controversy over its Keystone Heights Airport Authority.

Game plan *for* Tallahassee Local lawmakers' hopes for next year

FLEMING ISLAND – Florida Sen, Jennifer Bradley had big shoes to fill left from her term-limited predecessor and husband, Rob Bradley. The Bradleys have been a dynamic duo at the state level since Rob Bradley was first elected in 2022.

Now in her second term, Jennifer Bradley is optimistic. She finds it fulfilling to foster safety in the state she is proud to call home. However, she seemingly faces a paradox as chairwoman of the Appropriations Committee on Criminal and Civil Justice. Despite strides in reducing the crime rate to its lowest in 50 years, there are more inmates in prisons than ever before.

"The issue is that while the crime rate is at a historic low, Florida's growing population means that the total amount of crime is going to increase," she said.

There are about 80,000 people incarcerated in Florida state prisons.

"The Department of Corrections is in crisis. I've visited prisons that are substantially understaffed. One prison was a security concern, where the glass could be easily broken and used as weapons."

Lack of resources, such as faulty or absent air conditioning systems, has made

city government. Her current contract expires on Dec. 25, but she offered to stay longer so the city can find a replacement and avoid hiring an interim manager.

Councilman Stephen Hart said he wanted her to stay.

"Before we can agree to an extension. we first have to accept your resignation," he said. "I hope you will reconsider. I, for one, will not accept your resignation.

"Keystone is small, but there's a lot going on - and it's all in her head."

Her resignation letter was brief. It read: "This letter is to notify Council of my last day. At the Council meeting on September 25, 2023, I publically informed Council of my resignation. My last day will be Wednesday, January 10, 2024. It has

She will leave after the city gained international acclaim as a "smart city." Engineers with Manzan Consulting have mapped every inch of the city, compiling locations of every tree, building and garbage can so it can be monitored electronically.

blooms, often toxic, that plagued the coastlines of Florida's waterways. It passed unanimously in the Florida legislature.

Payne is preparing for the Regular Session to start again on Jan. 9. The state transportation budget is increasing from \$12 billion to \$16 billion, and he is brainstorming ways to decrease congestion. A bus fleet and high-speed rail are some methods that are not off the table.

"A thousand Americans move to Florida every day. One person using public transportation means one less person off the roads," he said.

Pavne is scheduled to be term-limited in 2024, concluding an era of eight years representing his hometown and sponsoring bills increasing environmental protections in the state legislature.

Just across from Bradley's district office is the district office of Rep. Sam Garrison. The self-described "legislative lineman" is slated to become the next Speaker of the Florida House, contingent upon Republicans retaining a majority in 2024.

"It would be such an honor. First, I need to be reelected and continue caring for things at home. But I'm proud of what this means for our community." he said. "When doors open, I walk through and never allow myself to be outworked."

Garrison currently serves as Health Care Appropriations Subcommittee Chairman, where he oversees allocating healthcare's budget of \$49 billion – nearly half of Florida's total budget of \$115 billion.

'The only constitutional requirement of a state representative is implementing a balanced budget. That's the bare minimum." he said.

"They're all connected," said Payne. "We're working to find commonality for the growth of Florida."

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

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Florida retailers expect boost in Christmas spending

There is bad news for anyone annoyed when Christmas decorations start gracing the halls of retail establishments before kids have even said "trick or treat": Nearly half of the consumers said they have started their holiday shopping before Nov. 1.

The survey by the National Retail Federation found that was the case among 43% of respondents.

"It's clear that shoppers are already in the holiday spirit and in search of the perfect gift," Florida Retail Federation President and CEO Scott Shalley said.

"Florida retailers are here to help. Your local retail stores are the best place to shop this holiday season with great products, excellent customer service, and holiday deals. When you choose to 'Find It In Florida,' you're supporting local jobs and businesses this merry season."

Most consumers who planned to start shopping early (60%) said they wanted to spread out their budget for the season. Another 46% of those early shoppers said they hoped to avoid the stress of last-minute shopping, while 45% said they wanted to avoid crowds.

Despite the high number of consumers planning to get a jump on holiday shopping, most consumers (62%) said they don't expect to finish shopping until December.

Spending habits are expected to be up this holiday season, with survey respondents indicating plans to spend \$875 on average on gifts, decorations, food and other seasonal items this year. That's up \$42 from last year. Respondents indicated that most planned spending (\$620) will be spent on gifts, while consumers have \$255 budgeted for other seasonal items such as decorations, candy or food.

• Myron William Ernst, who robbed two Clay County banks with a stolen vehicle, was deemed a flight risk and a danger to the community. In one robbery, a passed note read: "I have a gun I will blow your brains out & everyone else in the bank \$2,500 in 100's no dve packs no alarms no tracking devices you have 30 seconds." Ernst would eventually plead guilty and be sentenced to 10 years in prison.

10 years ago, 2013

• State Sen. Rob Bradley and Representatives Travis Cummings and Charles Van

Zant, Sr. were encouraged by Green Cove Springs Mayor Mitch Timberlake and their other constituents to expedite the construction of the First Coast Outer Beltway. Orange Park Mayor Jim Renninger told the three legislators that cities need a better definition of allowable phosphates in their wastewater system discharges.

their shopping lists for the season, it might be helpful to know this year's gift trends. Gift cards are the top-requested item of the season, with 55% of respondents indicating that it was at the top of their wish list. Clothing and accessories followed at 49%. Books, video games or other media are also a top wish list item this year, at 28%. Among the top five are personal care or beauty items at 25% and experiential gifts at 23%.

Not surprisingly, home improvement items are toward the bottom of the list — husbands beware.

Consumers favor online shopping, with 58% of survey respondents saying they will turn to e-commerce this holiday season.

Other popular shopping destinations include department stores (49%), discount stores (48%), grocery stores (44%), clothing stores (32%), small businesses (24%), and electronics stores (20%). Craft, outlet and thrift stores all came in at less than 20% among survey respondents.

The Florida Retail Federation is promoting its "Find it in Florida" program, a grassroots campaign encouraging consumers to shop locally. • Lil' Champ Food Stores were boycotted and picketed by a Christian group claiming the convenience store chain was the largest retailer of pornography in Flor-

• The Clay County School Board voted to allow county voters to determine whether a \$25 million bond issue should go forward. School Superintendent Jesse Tynes said the money was needed to repair current schools and build future schools that would be needed with growth.

• Officials with Humana Hospital in Orange Park teamed up with Ray Boylan, meteorologist for Channel 12 in Jacksonville, to kick off "The Great American Smokeout," a national anti-smoking campaign.

The Florida Retail Federation notes that when consumers shop locally, they support local businesses and jobs. Florida retailers account for 1 out of every five jobs in the state, generating \$104 billion in annual economic impact, including more than \$69 billion in wages each year. Additionally, Florida retailers collect and remit more than \$20 billion in sales taxes to support public schools, roads and infrastructure.

I started donating whole blood in Marine Corps boot camp when I was 17 years old. One day, my [drill instructor] asked, "All those that want to donate blood, take one step forward." Fearing needles since my childhood, I remained still for a few moments until the DI was yelling in my face. He was so loud that I thought my ear drums were going to burst. That is when I opened my eyes to see that I was the only one standing there. He repeated that message, "I said ALL those that want to donate blood take one step forward."

I leaped forward.

After that, I continued donating, not thinking how my donation could possi-

bly save a life. I just felt it was my duty as a Marine. After my four years of active duty, I did not have blood donation on my radar until I met my wife. We were at church when I was asked to stand if I was willing to donate blood after services. I looked at my wife and did not want her to think that her Marine was afraid to donate, so I stood up and found myself donating often again. After several years, I was asked if I would sign up to be a bone marrow donor. I was told that the odds that I would be a match were exceedingly rare.

To my surprise, a few years later, I was notified that I was a match. I was assigned a special ID number for my platelet donation to go directly to that person. At that

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Altruism as an investment

Mom and I were walking around Seattle on a rare sunny morning. We just hopped off the ferry and pursued through Pike Place Fish Market. I had \$10 in my pocket from chores around the house and absolutely no

intention of spending it on any stinky fish. I was 7 or 8. so the bill was earmarked for candy, Pokémon cards or a toy I'd get bored with after a day. Instead, I crum-

ran off.

home, Mom asked why I got nothing. I lied and said I lost it, and I never told a soul (all until now. obviously).

I was in for a lecture definitely, but I was committed to the bit. It was the first time I donated my money, not merely handing off a bill handed to me like some middleman when the offering bin was passed around during mass. I was modest, sure, but there is an intrinsic joy in donating and knowing that your actions have brightened the day for another person.

holiday season so special.

If people want to give anonymously, great. If people want to give and bring attention toward a good cause, even better. But I find it icky when people only donate to prop up their own self-image.

This is why I was captivated by the trial of Sam Bankman-Fried, a cryptocurrency mogul charged with money laundering, wire fraud, securities fraud and conspiracy to commit fraud. He also had an impressive philanthropic record.

"I'm in on crypto because I want to make the biggest global impact for good," Bankman-Fried said in an FTX ad in The New Yorker.

Indeed. Bankman-Fried has been painted as an "effective altruist," characterized as a dogmatic "utilitarian." The radical Robin Hood only earned to donate and donated by whatever means necessary.

Michael Lewis - acclaimed author of "The Big Short" and "Moneyball" – agreed in his latest book. "Going Infinite." which he wrote as a "letter to the jury" that he allegedly signed in an empty room of the courthouse where Bankman-Fried's trial took place. Bankman-Fried was painted as a misunderstood genius whose heart was too big for his chest.

Earlier this month. Bankman-Fried was convicted on all seven counts.

What I found so icky was how, in nearly It feels good to give. It's what makes the every interview, Bankman-Fried guided

the conversation to his philanthropic philosophy. He did the same when he took the stand during the trial. It was revealed in the trial that millions of dollars of donations were siphoned off from unsuspecting customers and investors. The prosecution proved his moral stance, if noble on paper, was egregiously disingenuous. The jury must have felt icky, too.

He allegedly remarked that political donations have the largest return out of all investments in the United States.

Bankman-Fried is only the most prevalent, recent example of weaponizing altruism. Pablo Escobar was once a beloved benefactor in Colombia. Bernie Madoff, the architect of the largest known Ponzi scheme, was a prominent philanthropist, serving as a board member of multiple nonprofit charities.

Why? For political capital? For PR? To chase clout? Regardless, the truth always catches up to those who try donating bounced checks.

time, the procedure took more than two hours with needles in both arms. I could not move during that time. Even if my face itched, someone else had to scratch it for me. Once, I asked at the donors office what was next. They checked the patient's condition and told me that she still needed my platelets. Later I would have to go through additional testing. The clerk slipped by, saying she, as I am not supposed to know any facts about who that person is. Knowing it was a female, I often thought it could be someone's wife or young daughter like ours. That helped me continue as frequently as possible. I went so often that I had memorized that ID number.

Over the years, I had my downtime donating, mostly because of four major surgeries, including the removal of one of my kidneys and later the time for recovery from cancer. In addition, my deployments with the Red Cross on over 20 disasters and two international deployments for three months each interfered with my donating schedules. To God be the Glory, as He kept me healthy and able to donate platelets nearly twice a month for years.

Once, I had a special experience while donating platelets. A woman came into our center with her young son. He was handing out something to the platelet donors. I did not hear the little boy's words as he handed me a burnt cookie. His mother told me that am grateful to Jesus for giving me the pas-

her son wanted to thank all the platelet donors for saving his life. He was in remission from Leukemia and made the cookies himself. She added she was sorry that some came out burnt. I thanked him and told him I loved burnt cookies and that it was the best cookie I ever ate. He then hugged me. and "sweat" came from my eyes.

Reaching 100 gallons is an honor, and I

sion to help others most of my life. Ask any donor, and most will tell you it is not about the amount of donations but about trying to help someone live longer.

Donating many times or just the first time could be the time you saved a life. I am grateful to the Lord for helping me stay healthy enough to serve others, and I hope the attention I have shared will encourage others to donate.

If you are unable to donate blood, you can still make a difference in someone's life. There are many organizations where you could donate your time. If this is your first time looking to volunteer, I suggest starting with your church, and to your surprise, the difference could be with you. When Reyna and Tristan were asked how they felt about the adoption, "excited" and "good" were what they stated to the judge.

The pound of the gavel officially christened the Mosley family. Cox welcomed the new family to take pictures. Reyna and Tristan were invited to take home a book and a stuffed animal. The two children smiled, not just because Christmas came early but because they'd be going home with their new mom and dad.

For Thanksgiving, the Mosley family plans to prepare smoked turkey and ham. Every year, they make extras for their friends and family and donations for their community. For the Mosleys, giving back is what makes Thanksgiving so special.

Next came the Sweeting family. With his soon-to-be son, Donovan, Clint Sweeting took the stand in the courthouse.

Homestead exemption applicants must have legal or equitable title to the property as of January 1, 2024. Applicants must also provide at least two documents to establish proof of permanent residency (i.e., updated driver's li-

cense or identification card, voter registration card, vehicle registration, utility bill, etc.); and the social security number of all applicants (including spouses) is required. Applicants who are not U.S. citizens must provide a copy of their permanent resident (green) card. Applicants without permanent residence status should contact our office for eligibility details. Manufactured (mobile) home owners should also bring the title(s) or registration(s) to the home.

Applications may be filed at our main office in Green Cove Springs (located on the

2nd floor of the Administration Building), at our Orange Park branch office located at 1518 Park Avenue (Park Central Plaza), or at the Tax Collector's branch office located at 7380 State Road 100, Keystone Heights (visit our website for a detailed schedule), or by email to exemptionsonline@ccpao.com. Before emailing an application, contact the office for the list of supporting documentation required to complete the application, as incomplete applications will be subject to denial. Appointments are not required or necessary. Once the initial application has been filed, granted exemptions will display on the office's website (property search function). Additionally, granted homestead exemptions will be automatically renewed each January and a renewal notice will be mailed. It is the property owners' responsibility to notify the Property Appraiser if eligibility for exemptions has changed.

The property owner must qualify as of January 1 of the current assessment year. Operation Barnabas making a difference by providing hope, homes

Community of tiny houses to get veterans off the street, back on track By Don Coble

MIDDLEBURG – There is a lot on Old Jennings Road that looks rough on its surface. Under construction, the land is susceptible to flooding and adorned with mounds of debris. But for veteran Keith Mitchell, the land is one of opportunity. For him, it's an oasis.

Appreciating the land's true beauty requires vision, faith and hope. These virtues got the veteran off the street and ultimately saved his life.

The recent ribbon-cutting for Fort Barnabas is the beginning of an ambitious project to provide housing for former soldiers who've fallen into financial hardship.

The plan includes clearing and leveling the property, followed by installing eight

tiny houses and as many as 10 small single-family homes for at-risk veterans.

The first tiny house was donated by "a beautiful family," according to Operation Barnabas. It still needs county approval and some plumbing and electric work before it can be called a home.

"We're going to take the first veteran off the street and put him in that house," Mitchell said. "It's ready to go. We're going to start getting people in here around the first of the year."

According to its website, Operation Barnabas is a Clay County nonprofit that is committed to providing hope, encouragement and mentorship to at-risk veterans and first responders through outreach and resources in a swift and timely manner.

By providing sanctuary, meeting physical needs and linking resources, the nonprofit aims to ignite a positive transformation in those striving to find purpose and meaning.

Fort Barnabas will put a roof over their heads while they find the training and life skills to succeed independently. "We have a place where they can be at peace," said Operation Barnabas Lead Officer Tyler Summers. "That's our vision – having a sanctuary place in Clay County to serve veterans and first responders that's never been done before. We are going to be



Grace Episcopal edges St. Johns Country Day in food drive challenge

Real winners were Food Pantry of Green Cove Springs, hungry residents

ORANGE PARK – Collecting canned goods and donating them to the Food Pantry of Green Cove Springs is a beloved tradition of Grace Episcopal Day School during the Thanksgiving holiday season.

The 35-year-old tradition added a fun, new twist this year with a friendly competition against St. Johns Country Day School to see who could donate the most food.

The event culminated on Friday, Nov. 17, with a church ceremony celebrating the donation of food. Grace won the challenge after collecting 1,872 pounds, while St. Johns finished with 1,690. While it was an 182-pound difference, everyone was a winner because the food would help eliminate hunger.

Grace gave out 517 more pounds than they did a year ago. Coupled with the reinforcements from St. Johns, the two schools combined for a whopping total of 3,562 pounds of food donations. The contributions of Grace, St. Johns and other local organizations will help feed the hungry.

of St. Johns and others) really provide the food we need to be able to serve Clay County," said Jim Brewer, a volunteer with the Food Pantry.

The organization has fed 3,900 children, 2,000 families and 400 homeless this year. "This gives us the ability to feed (even more) people," he said.

During the ceremony, the food was displayed at the altar. Children sang classic Thanksgiving tunes and played instruments, and students, parents and guests heard from Head of School Angela Bast and Rev. Canon Aaron Smith.

"It's awesome to have that dedication,

especially during this time of year. There's nothing harder than not having food on the shelves for people when they come to (the Food Pantry). This (ensures) that doesn't happen," Brewer said. "We're just excited to support and (give) service. We're excited to help the community in any way possible," Bast said.

"St. Johns Country Day School has a longstanding tradition of community service and has been participating in (the season food drive) since 1989," said Lower School Student Council Advisor Jennifer Keller. "We are honored to be able to help the Food Pantry and our community in this way, and the competition with Grace Episcopal is a fun new twist."

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

on the map with this."

The organization used to get 10 hotel rooms a night in Orange Park, but a change in management forced Summers to find a different solution. Fort Barnabas will soon be a temporary home to some of society's most vulnerable and deserving members.

"Since we started this in 2017, we've taken 160 people off the street," Summers said. "We're getting permitting done. We're getting things rolling.

"People who've served this country should never live on the streets, or under a bridge or in the woods. We address homelessness, suicide and hopelessness. We don't want to put a bandaid over a gash. None of this is possible without God. We're here to navigate through his purpose."

Fort Barnabas will allow veterans to rebuild their credit scores, replenish their bank accounts and rebuild skills and purpose without worrying about a place to sleep. It's designed to be a stepping stone toward a positive outcome.

"We want our veterans to give back," Summers said.

Mitchell said he was homeless near Tampa when he was arrested for criminal mischief. When he was released, a woman deputy noticed he was despondent. She told him of programs that focused on assisting veterans. "That night, I was back in Green Cove Springs," he said. "I found people to lean on. I haven't been in trouble since 2006. I've seen a lot of good coming from faithbased programs."

Mitchell lives on the property in a mobile home. He knows he eventually will have to move because the mobile home will be removed for a permanent structure. Until then, he said his employer, Black Pearl Plumbing of Middleburg, has offered to provide plumbing materials, while he said he would do the work for free.

"It's all about lifting your brother up," Mitchell said. "When you do that, you lift yourself up."

Project completed after two years of planning

ORANGE PARK – Thanks to the creative hands of two dedicated and talented local artists, Sophie Destine and Kathy Plante, the Orange Park Florist and Gifts shop has a colorful new look.

At the shop's back entrance is a towering masterpiece of a mural that stretches over the shop's back door. The work features sunflowers, a monarch butterfly and an array of purple, red, orange and light blue flowers against a dark blue background backdrop, similar to the mural on the town water tank in 2021.

Facilitated by the Town Art Guild, the project highlights the exciting future for the arts.

Owner Carol Berg said in the past, the florist shop has tried to create other welcoming "arrangements" at her entrance, where 70% of her customers walk in.

"We've tried using plants and other elements to welcome people, but a mural is a bigger statement, and most people love it." she said.

The project is the culmination of an exhausting two-year journey for Berg, who has faced several hurdles.

"I had one person lined up to do it two vears ago, and they dropped out. Then, we had another (individual) lined up, and they


(canceled), too," Berg said. The reasons were numerous. The first

artists left for college. The timing wasn't right for the second person. Weather also created further delays.

The mural is finally complete, all thanks to the art guild.

"Finally, it was perfect, and (Destine and Plante) from the Art Guild of Orange Park stepped up and did a wonderful job," she said.

Work on the project broke ground on Nov. 6 and was completed four days later. Plante used traditional paintbrushes, abandoning any use of spray paint or commercial paint cans. The dynamic duo even mixed their paint, creating a unique color

Destine and Plante met challenges like working through warm temperatures, putting together and taking down scaffolding and staying careful while working high up in the air. The project was also redesigned to go around the awning for cost purposes.

"It was just a fun and interesting (challenge) considering how hot it was in November. But we worked like a well-oiled team. We play to each other's strengths," Plante said.


There were obstacles along the way,

but Berg gave the artists few restrictions regarding creativity. Both artists are excited about the mural's completion and what it could mean for the future of local art.

Phyllis Renninger earns Distinguished Fellow Award

Honor given for more than 25 years of writing grants

ORANGE PARK – Phyllis Renninger, an influential figure in grant writing and education, was recently was awarded the 2023 Distinguished Fellow Award at the Grant Professionals Association Summitt earlier this month.

Ironically, the organization that honored Renninger was one she and six others founded in 1998.

Only eight people attended the first annual conference during that year. Now, 25 years later, the organization boasts 4,500 members in the United States and 250 members from across the globe, and 850 of those were at the conference in Kansas City, Missouri.

A relentless pursuit of excellence has marked Renninger's illustrious career. She not only has created an indelible mark on Clay County, but she has also transformed the landscape of grant professionals.

She began her career as an elementary school teacher and administrator with humble beginnings. Her transition to Coordinator of Grant Development at the County Schools District got her and thousands of others into the GPA and other organizations.

But as time has passed, with 25 years of experience writing grants, Renninger has secured more than \$100 million in monies for several organizations, with a focus on public schools of all levels and government agencies.

They were faced with navigating the waters of grant writing, with questions like how a grant writer can be hired and whether they were qualified.

"There were no professional training or standards for grant writers at the time, and people were very confused. It was a challenging landscape. There were a lot of misconceptions about grant writing," she said.

Cleaning the house was the top priority. "One of the first things we did was develop a code of ethics because that was not a (certification) standard," Renninger said.

As part of her doctorate dissertation, she researched the requirements and certification standards for a professional certification called the Grant Professionals



Certification and created the Grant Professional Certifications Institute.

Locally, her influence helped create a network of grant writers, ensuring that nonprofits and organizations receive quality services.

"We have a network of people who know each other. I get calls about a nonprofit looking for a grant writer, and because we have a strong network, I can refer to someone that can truly help them," she said.

Through comprehensive knowledge, Renninger and her husband, County Commissioner Jim Renninger, have created changes in the county government. Together, they helped prompt the startup of the county's Grant Development Department.

"As money gets together, funding agencies look around and go, 'How can we decide?' So, they'll put out a grant competition. They're going to give the little money that has to those that can prove the most need," she said.

Renninger's journey from kindergarten teacher to Distinguished Fellow and grant pioneer is a testament to passion, hard work and the transformative impact she had on grant writing and education.

fire rescue, emergency management and the Green Cove Springs and Orange Park police departments, will be stretched thin.

Last week, Cook organized 35 other first responders to set a strategy for each event. She called the demand for law enforcement and fire rescue that day "a heavy lift."

"The goal is to go through the manpower lift," she said. "That's why we're going to start messaging it now. I got a sense pretty early on that there were very few people who holistically knew all that was happening very early on. It is going to be a very busy day. This is a lot for this county in one day."

The biggest focus will be on the parade in Oakleaf. It's the first year for the event, so the sheriff and fire rescue offices don't know what to expect.

"This one scares me," CCSO Lt. Mike Lane said.

CCSO is aware of issues with a Halloween party at the Oakleaf Plantation clubhouse. The private event quickly escalated into a traffic nightmare after uninvited guests blocked driveways and roads.

Lane created a strategy for each event, including identifying a commander, a radio channel and a command center. The day is supposed to be so demanding the Emergency Operations Center will be activated in the same manner as a natural disaster or imminent threat.

One of the greatest concerns at Oakleaf is parking. The parade will start at the Oakleaf Baptist Church, proceed north to Plantation Oaks Boulevard, and end at Oakleaf High. The route includes several private developments.

"We are closing two major thoroughfares and the north end of our county for an extended amount of time," Lane said. "We're actually cutting off a few neighborhoods while the parade's going on."

The sheriff's office said it hopes Oakleaf Village Elementary, Oakleaf Junior High and Oakleaf Athletic Association will be available for parking. Lane said people shouldn't park in residential areas since that will restrict traffic and block drive-ways.

Oakleaf Plantation Parkway will be shut down to all traffic until the final float turns onto Plantation Oaks Boulevard. Oakleaf Plantation will reopen, and Plantation Oaks will be closed when the parade approaches.

And more than 3,400 people have responded on the Oakleaf Community Events page on Facebook about the parade.

In addition to the 48 deputies on regular patrol, Lane said CCSO will have 66 deputies and police officers from other jurisdictions working the special event, including 19 at Oakleaf.

Lane said the Oakleaf parade must follow special guidelines. Everybody in the parade must be in a car or on a float.

"We cannot have anybody walking in this parade," he said. "That way, we don't have to wait three hours for the marking band to come through."

Paraders will start organizing at the church at about 5 p.m., and the event will start an hour later. Organizers plan to host food trucks and vendors during and after the parade.

Besides Oakleaf, Dec. 9 will include returning, beloved parades in Keystone Heights, Middleburg and Penney Farms, as well as the Whitey's Fish Camp Boat Parade.

"One of our saving graces is these are annual events, so we have some experience with them," Lane said.

The Christmas Parade in Keystone Heights will start at 6 p.m. It will stage at Keystone Heights Elementary and start at the corner of SW Pecan Street and Lawrence Boulevard. It will move north on Lawrence and turn left on Flamingo Street behind Dunkin.

The Middleburg Christmas parade will start at 7 p.m. from Omega Park on County Road 218 and proceed east before making a U-turn at Pine Avenue and returning to Omega Park.

"This is a very heavy lift because we have a lot of side streets," Lane said.

Penney Farms' Christmas Parade will start at 9 a.m. and be completed by noon. It is a closed event inside the community but will still require six deputies. The Whitey's boat parade will start at 6 p.m. The procession will pass through Swimming Pen Creek from underneath the County Road 220 bridge. The restaurant said it had reached capacity for the number of boats. Plus, because of the rising popularity, Whitey's accepted reservations for tables and arranged for a free shuttle between the restaurant and Swimming Pen Elementary. There will be some lane closures to accommodate pedestrians.

Nine deputies and both agency boats have been assigned to Whitey's, Lane said.


A Country Christmas will be staged during two weekends from noon to 9 p.m., starting on Dec. 8 and 9 and ending on Dec. 15 and 16. Lane said more than 2,000 tickets have been sold in advance after the event moved from Apopka Drive in Orange Park South to the expansive Elrod Acres at 3679 Thunder Road in Green Cove Springs. The event will include 30-foot tree lighting, food trucks, letters to Santa, more than 750,000 lights, pet adoptions, live music and more than 50 vendors.

The Hometown Holiday in the Park will be at the Clarke House in Orange Park. The historic property will be open from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. Tours, pictures with Santa Claus, hay, train and pony rides, holiday-themed music and a shopping village will be available. The Orange Park Police Department said Hometown Holiday in the Park usually attracts between 1,500-to-2,000 people.

River Christian Church on Fleming Island will present its Journey to the Nativity on Dec. 8 and 9 from 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., where families can tour nativity exhibits.

Also, the Christmas Light Spectacular will be at the Sniktaw Farm on Russell Road in Green Cove Springs at 6 p.m..

While CCSO hasn't been asked to back up private security, Lane said the Delman Circus will be at the Orange Park Mall for two shows – 4:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.





Local mover unpacks truth about scrupulous brokers, scams

Rapid growth opens door for fake promises, pricing and performance

FLEMING ISLAND – Amid Clay County's burgeoning growth, MoveBright Moving and Storage, a local, family-owned company serving Clay County, warned the community about fraudulent, third-party moving companies, otherwise known as "moving brokers."

Since the COVID-19 pandemic, Florida has seen an unprecedented spike in new residents. In 2021, the U.S. Census reported 674,740 new residents relocated to the Sunshine State, a 12.2% increase from 2020. With up-and-coming communities on the rise, many people are making long-distance moves from northern and western states, and companies catering to those services are in popular demand.

But as the county's allure continues to attract an influx of new residents, a troubling trend has emerged, leading to the rise of fraudulent moving companies, according to MoveBright Moving and Storage Director of Sales and Marketing Travis Bennett.

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration defines these companies as entities that arrange for the transportation of your cargo, utilizing for-hire carriers to provide truck transportation.

"Moving brokers are sales teams that book your move and sell it to an actual moving company," their website reads.

The broker is not a mover. It is not authorized to transport your household goods and doesn't own moving trucks or employ professional movers.

Many are duped by a price quote that seems too good to refuse, which may very well be too good to be true.

A move for a three-bedroom house from New York to Florida for \$3,000 may seem like a steal, but buyers beware: you could be in for a scam.

By the time the disaster is complete, you may be due \$13,000 or more for a move originally quoted much lower.

"Although distorted, there is language that traps the customer into paying the full price," Bennett said.



Partnering with Fleming Island's Coldwell Banker and other local agencies, MoveBright Director of Sales and Marketing Travis Bennett spearheads seminars and campaigns to teach residents how to recognize the red flags when hiring a moving company.

Lawsuits are often ineffective, as none of the companies are typically left on the hook for damages.

Company owners hire SEO experts to generate traffic, create a web landing page and contract work out to logistics companies that haul anything from fruit to freight. In the process, your personal belongings, which will likely be handled by day laborers who have no knowledge about professional moving, could be damaged, stolen or destroyed.

In the meantime, the third-party vendors of the moving broker have a litany of other tasks to complete, so expect about three to four business weeks to receive what remains of your belongings.

But even then, that is just the beginning of the painful experience most will endure when hiring moving brokers, Bennett said.

"There is constant theft and damaged property, with no ability to trace it back to the specific individual. The longer the distance, the worse your problems will be," Bennett said.

This is just the beginning. When "Joe" and "Jim" from the brokerage refuse to

answer your phone calls, an even more catastrophic scenario could unfold: your property being held hostage until you pay the total amount owed.

While racketeering charges are mounting against these fraudulent organizations at the federal level, the elusive nature of these small-scale scams has made it challenging to bring them to justice.

But the loopholes continue. After reading about the scams, clients falsely believe that Bennett and MoveBright operate under the same wild-west format.

"(Sometimes), we have to convince (customers) that we are legit," he said.

Or customers unknowingly sign their services with the third-party vendor instead of MoveBright.

"I will (try to say), 'You don't have to go with me, but don't go with them,'" Bennett said.

To bridge the gap, Bennett and Move-Bright are taking a proactive approach. Bennett conducts seminars at events for real estate companies, such as Coldwell-Banker Vanguard Realty in Fleming Island. Completing training sessions at real estate offices is another core process component.

"Educating agents so they can educate clients because they are the closest voice to their ears," he said.

By establishing relationships with agencies, Bennett builds trust to book more moves, as home buyers often rely on the recommendations of those companies. But more important to him is helping residents moving to and from the area to avoid devious-minded moving brokers.

Bennett is a former detective and deputy with the Clay County Sheriff's Office. He said the county's many attractions and relatively low cost of living means that the Clay has become a hotbed for new residents. He insists residents needing a moving company should do their homework before signing a contract.

"You have to do a journalist's job and dig into these companies. Read Google reviews and listen to what other people are saying. People need to know what to look for. (Moving brokers) will lie straight to your face," Bennett said.



The year the U.S. Constitution was ratified, 1787, was a busy time for the Spanish in Florida. It had been four short years since Spain regained control of La Florida from the British. Having lost the Revolutionary War, Britain was in no economic or political state to deal with Florida, often referred to as the 14th Colony.

Spain was eager to bring new colonists to St. Augustine and its surroundings. To make the colony profitable, Spain needed population growth. Citizens of that time were British Loyalists who stayed behind after the British left, i.e., the Minorcans, free Blacks, and enslaved Blacks. There were also those of Spanish descent, just not enough. The Spanish did not count the Native Americans.


New laws for "East Florida" enabled generous land grants. The terms declared that each head of household would receive 100 acres with an additional 50 acres for each household member, and this included both free and enslaved members. The 1,000 acres were also available if the settler would cultivate the land. They had to build adequate housing, keep livestock, and tend to the land for ten years. Settlers could not sell or dispose of the land during those ten years.

In the past, Spain required recipients to convert to Catholicism. This caused a big headache for Governor Zepedes. Many new colonists were Americans and British Loyalists who were Protestant and unwilling to convert.

After much political maneuvering, a compromise was reached, and a conscious decision was made not to enforce this requirement. While the adult settlers failed to comply with the religious rule, they didn't seem to mind when it came time to baptize their children Catholics. Prospective landowners were required to swear allegiance to Spain and become Spanish subjects.

Spain, who had a poor relationship with the Native Americans, did not extend these generous offers to that population. This poor relationship ended up causing real trouble later, as the Native Americans conducted raids against the settlers and made the rural grant locations dangerous places to be.

When Spain got 'La Florida' back



Here in Clay County, one of the earliest grants was given to Dr. Thomas Travers.

Dr. Travers, a native of County Kildare, Ireland, had been stationed in East Florida as an army surgeon under the British. He stayed behind when the British left. He was a contemporary of George Fleming, Philip Fatio, and Zephaniah Kingsley, all recognizable names in Clay County to this day. His home in St. Augustine was on Hospital (now Aviles) Street. He served as the Spanish government's Royal Doctor, and his service earned him several large land grants.

Travers' Clay County grant was for 1,000 acres, covering the area known as Magnolia. Magnolia was just on the north side of Governors Creek, where the St. Johns Landing Apartments are located today in Green Cove Springs. This grant was in the same place as where Governor Patrick Tonyn's British land grant had been.

Dr. Travers called it "Santo Tomaso" after himself. Dr. Travers' Spanish friend Mathew Solana named his land grant after himself, too, and we now have San Mateo.

Dr. Travers' wife, Maria Fitzgerald, was also from Ireland. They had three children: William, Maria and Margarita Maria Salome. All three were baptized Catholic. Dr. Travers died in 1807, and Ana Saunders, his second wife, was made executrix of his estate. Dr. Travers is buried in Tolomato Cemetery in St. Augustine.

As heir to the Travers grant, William renamed the plantation "Constancia" after his daughter and made many improvements. William ran a sugar plantation and partnered with Mathew Solana on a sawmill. He built a home there, as well as outlying buildings.

Later, once Florida was a U.S. territory, the Black Creek District (modern-day Clay County) began to take off. Spanish land grants like Hibernia (Fleming's Island) were thriving. Laurel Grove (Orange Park) was doing well, and other Spanish land grant holders, such as the Branning family, were making something of their land.

Unfortunately, the good times were not meant to last. The Seminole Wars were heating up, forcing many to seek shelter at Fort Heileman (Main Street Boat Ramp, Middleburg). Native American predation was rampant. Sadly, the Travers plantation was burned down by the Seminoles in 1840.







"You know, he's paralyzed, but people treat him like he's normal," Eric said. "He's getting around pretty good. He's going to therapy. He's doing everything he needs to do. Spiritually, he's good."



Ridgeview's Huff earns 2023 Armed Forces Merit Award

FORT WORTH, Tex. - Senior quarterback Tyler Huff of Furman University has been selected as the 12th recipient of the Armed Forces Merit Award presented by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA).

Huff is a Ridgeview High graduate in Orange Park.

Coordinated by the staff at the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl, the Armed Forces Merit Award presented by the FWAA was created in June 2012 to honor an individual and/or a group with a military background, or involvement with the military, that has made an impact on college football.

Huff was selected from a list of 46 nominations (41 individuals and five programs) as the 2023 recipient by a nine-person committee made up of FWAA members and Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl officials.

Huff was commissioned from Presbyterian College into the U. S. Army Reserves on May 13, 2022. He will depart on January 8 to Fort Huachuca in Arizona for active duty training through May 7, 2024.

"Having a commissioned Army officer quarterbacking a nationally-ranked school makes today's presentation special," said Brant Ringler, executive director of the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl. "Tyler is a DUAL threat on-and-off the field. On the gridiron, he is a runner and passer. As an individual, he has made a commitment to serve his family and country."

In leading Furman to an 8-1 record this season and consensus No. 2 ranking in the two major FCS Top 25 polls, Huff has compiled 1,977 total yards for the Paladins with 488 yards rushing (5 TDs) and 1,489 yards passing (9 TDs). He began his Furman career by leading the Paladins to the 2022 FCS playoffs and a 10-3 mark with

694 yards rushing (8 TDs) and 2,199 yards passing (15 TDs).

Huff played his first three seasons at Presbyterian (2019-21), where he amassed 3,085 total yards (525 rushing and 2,560 passing) and 27 touchdowns. He played just four games at Presbyterian in 2021, qualifying for a medical redshirt. He earned his undergraduate degree from PC, majoring in business administration with a concentration in business analytics.

Furman head football coach Clay Hendrix, who coached at the United States Air Force Academy for 10 seasons before returning to his alma mater in 2017, said Huff "joined our program in the summer of 2022, and over a span of 16 months has been a positive difference maker in every regard. Through his role as our starting quarterback, which he secured in the fall of 2022 without the benefit of going through spring practice, he quickly established himself as a top performer and leader in our program who commands tremendous respect, which he returns with consistently strong, unselfish support of his teammates.

Hendrix added: "The stature Tyler holds is reflected in the fact he was elected a team co-captain for the 2023 season by vote of his teammates -- something I have rarely witnessed for a second-year player in my 38 years of coaching. Tyler's maturity and confidence as a person and player, constructed through his playing experience and shaped by the challenges of coaching changes and injury he experienced prior to coming to Furman have also been greatly influenced by his military background. No football team wins without strong, effective leadership and ability at the quarterback position. Tyler quickly deflects and shares praise among his teammates, which to me underscores even more his effectiveness as person, player, and leader on the field and beyond."




