Clay schools flex its muscles with 16 state championships

When it came to winning gold, few school districts in Florida ran faster, hit harder, were stronger or wrestled better than Clay County District Schools.

Four teams and SSS individual athletes were crowned state champions in the past calendar month.

It started with Middleburg 190-pound wrestler Cheyenne Cruce winning the Class 2A girls' state championship. After finishing fourth in her freshman season a year ago, the sophomore finished the season with a 39-0 record.

She was joined on the champions' podium by Fleming Island's Jayce Paridon, who won the Class 2A boys 132-pound class.

The county also celebrated a runnerup finish by Oakleaf's Adrianna Barrientos



Paul Wane rocks 'Star-Spangled Banner' at Jaguars-Titans game

CLAY COUNTY – Paul Wane's 47-year music career came down to a 90-second performance on Jan. 7 in the final regular season game for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

And the local Duval County Line Band guitarist rocked TIAA Bank Field.

His rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner" not only put nearly 70,000 fans in a deafening frenzy but also sent shock waves around the country. Social media quickly praised the local musician, including nearly 112,000 likes on YouTube in one

Wearing biker boots, sunglasses and

a No. 23 Jacksonville jersey, Wane put a distinctive Southern Rock spin on the song representing the nation.

"It's been way more than I expected," Wane said of the overwhelming response. "It's been a whirlwind. I'm doing my best to keep up with it, but it's not easy. My phone has been going crazy."

The pregame song was a solo act that shook the stadium. When he finished his final lick, the crowd erupted in approval, and national media outlets who are more accustomed to long-winded versions of the song were impressed.

The process for the Jaguars game started with Wane's Guitars for Kids Foundation's Rising Star program. Wane takes donated guitars and refurbishes them before giving them to children. The foundation was created to provide children with the option of music instead of drugs and alcohol.

One of the guitars went to a boy whose father works security at TIAA Bank Field. He told fellow workers and word eventually reached the Jaguars brass.



Hungry customers return to Grumpy's after fire

MIDDLEBURG – There was frantic activity activity on Jan. 2 at Grumpy's inside the popular eatery. There were menus to place on tables, food to be prepped, T-shirts to be folded and a final moment for everyone to catch their breath.

"I need these guys to be exceptional today," co-owner Del Hoard Sr. told his kitchen staff. "Actually, guys, just do what you always do."

Outside, the line of hungry and eager customers was growing. The dark and foggy conditions created an eerie backdrop. Headlights poked a hole through the thick cover as the line quickly became a crowd.

Then, at 5:30 a.m., Courtney Hoard, the wife of the co-owner, opened the door. She was quickly greeted with smiles and hugs.

"We got here about 4:40 (a.m.). We wanted to be the first when they opened the doors," said Middleburg's Jay Miller.

The restaurant was destroyed on Jan. 19, 2022, by a fire that started with an electrical spark in the wall behind the dish-



washer. COVID, supply chain issues, red tape and labor shortages caused several delays in the rebuilding.

Nearly a year of frustration and anticipation was replaced with filled stomachs, hot cups of coffee and a few tears.

"It feels good to be back," Del Hoard Sr. said. "We never gave up."



Sheriff's office joins six law enforcement agencies to stop child trafficking

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Sheriff's Office receives "hundreds" of tips about sexually abused and trafficked children. More alarming is the fact those represent a small portion of the victims.

That's why the Clay County Sheriff's Office became one of seven law enforcement agencies on Feb. 25 to join forces to create the largest task force in the country to combat human trafficking and child exploitation.

Operation Lightshine is a group organized by former U.S. Marine Matt Murphy, whose sister was murdered by a man who sold women and drugs.

Murphy and Tim Tebow, who won a Heisman Trophy and two national championships with the Florida Gators, have worked tirelessly to stop the scurge of child exploitation and trafficking. Both delivered powerful messages during's Thursday's announcement at the Old County Courthouse.

"I had the privilege of growing up, whether it was at Normandy Baseball Park, at Lakeshore, or it was at Trinity (Christian) or at Niece (High), or it was even at the University of Florida, to be fortunate at times to now and then win an MVP for being the most valuable player of a baseball game or a football game or even basketball for me. But, if that's one of the coolest things I did in North Florida, that would be a big mess for me.

"But as cool as those MVPs are, they mean nothing compared to what this group is fighting for, and that's a way, way, way more important MVP. This group is fighting for (are) real MVPs – the most vulnerable people who desperately need us. Need you. Need all of us to work together to put the mission above the credit."

Clay County Sheriff Michelle Cook, Murphy, Sheriffs Gator Deloach of Putnam, Bill Leeper of Nassau, T.K. Waters of Duval, Robert Hardwick of St. Johns counties, Florida Department of Law Enforcement Science Applications International Corporation's Mike Williams, Homeland Security Investigations Tampa Special Agent John A. Condon, Florida Rep. Sam Garrison, U.S. Attorney for Middle District of Florida Roger Handberg and Tebow jointly announced the creation of the INTERCEPT Task Force to "protect our most vulnerable," Cook said. The task force's purpose is for law enforcement agencies in Northeast Florida to pool their resources and information to catch and punish people who exploit children.

"We are putting ourselves in a position to protect our children, our most vulnerable," Cook said. "We will have investigators assigned to this, and together, we can have a more involved investigation."

St. Johns Country Day's girls soccer championship streak ends

DELAND – The St. Johns Country Day School's girls soccer team played about as good a game as expected, according to coach Mike Pickett, but several factors and bad bounces denied the team from extending its state title streak to 12 years.

A 2-0 loss on Feb. 22 in the Class 2A championship to Lakeland Christian also ended the team's run of 59 consecutive playoff victories.

Lakeland's win was the first for them in 10 Final Four opportunities against St. Johns. Lakeland moved to Class 3A and had won two straight titles prior to the Wednesday final in Class 2A.

"We had our chances; Sydney Schmidt's shot that hit the crossbar could have changed the game," said Pickett, referring to a 25 mph wind. "They had four shots in the game, and all were late. Their corner shot was just dumb luck and a lot of wind."

Lakeland scored on a corner kick by Lilly Harrington near the 10-minute mark. Harrington quickly scored again to put the Vikings out front, 2-0.

"That corner kick was just dumb luck with the wind," said Pickett. "The second goal was us pushing forward too much

"John Doe" believed the sheriff's office would flinch first, but deputies couldn't file charges without a proper name. So Williams sat.

"He figured since it was a simple marijuana charge, he would get out soon," Holbert said.

Holbert checked with Williams' roommate and learned his real name was Sean. He also learned he was from Philadelphia, so Holbert called the Philadelphia Police Department. That's when both agencies realized the man in the Clay County Jail was Sean Williams, who was wanted for murder. Holbert's intuition and determination led to Sean Devant Williams, now 30, being returned to Philadelphia to face charges of murder, robbery, criminal conspiracy and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon

CCSO also selected him as the Detention Deputy of the Year on Feb. 10.

"But he had some unique tattoos, and



Congress to chip away at PGA Tour's tax-exempt status

Congress may count a merger with LIV Golf as a stroke against the league to chip away at the PGA Tour's tax-exempt status.

U.S. Rep. Vern Buchanan said it's time the country calls a penalty on the nonprofit status enjoyed by the sports league. The Longboat Key Republican filed a bipartisan bill with U.S. Rep. Mike Thompson, a California Democrat, that would strip the PGA Tour of its tax-exempt status.

The lawmakers want to count a stroke against the PGA Tour for its decision to merge with LIV Golf, a league primarily owned by Saudi Arabia.

"With billions of dollars in annual revenue and record profits streaming in, coupled with their looming partnership with Saudi Arabia's sovereign wealth fund, why should hardworking American taxpayers subsidize the PGA's tax-exempt status in the world?" Buchanan said.

The legislation would impact any sports organization that earns more than \$1 billion in any year over five years. Golfweek recently reported that the PGA Tour earned around \$1.9 billion in 2022, up significantly from \$1.59 billion in 2021.

The PGA Tour-LIV merger has proven rife with political controversy. Last week, former President Donald Trump, who Buchanan endorsed for a return to the White House in 2024, announced he would welcome LIV Golf to several golf course properties he owns, including in Doral.


Meanwhile, Jeff Roe, who just left a super PAC backing Gov. Ron DeSantis' competing bid for President, boasts ties to a PR firm that represented the PGA Tour before the merger and had rallied 9/11 families behind an anti-LIV Golf public opinion campaign. That included bringing the families to an event at the Florida Governor's mansion earlier this year.

For his part, Buchanan focused his criticism mainly on the fact that professional golf rakes in enormous amounts of money to be still considered a 501(c)(6) organization, a tax designation generally reserved for chambers of commerce and other business leagues.

"We should be supporting local charities on Main Street, not foreign-backed professional sports organizations that are not dedicated to benefitting the American people," Buchanan said. "That's why I'm pleased to introduce this legislation with Congressman Thompson to end this special-interest giveaway and require the PGA to pay taxes, just like every other Ameri-

can business."

Thompson similarly questioned why Americans should pay more taxes than international golf circuits.

"The proposed PGA-LIV merger raises serious concerns. Nonprofit tax treatment should be reserved for institutions and charities that help everyday Americans not billion-dollar sports leagues backed by Saudi government money," the Democrat said. "I look forward to working with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to achieve that goal as the PGA and LIV continue their negotiations.

The PGA Tour largely stands alone among major sports organizations in the U.S. that are still claiming its tax-exempt status. Major League Baseball gripped

onto similar status until 2007 and the National Football League clung on until 2015. But those groups gave up the status voluntarily. The National Basketball Association, National Hockey League and Major League Soccer also do not have such status.

receive free tuition for their first two years of college.

When she mentioned the winner was a girl, some boys moped dejectedly. The more Wilkerson narrowed her comments, the more Kimberlee Dimorier started to think it was her.

"When she said the winner was in all-advanced classes and was a straight-A student, I thought it might be me," Dimorier said.

It was.

Dimorier earned a two-year Florida Prepaid College Scholarship. The award came in partnership with Florida TaxWatch and the Florida Lottery.

Longtime volunteer Kirkland honored ahead of Clay Fair

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Lemmie Kirkland needed two minutes to slowly walk to the stage at the Cattleman's Arena on March 26 during the Clay County Agriculture Fair Juncheon

That was a pretty good pace for someone who was days ahead of her 95th birthday.

The longtime fair volunteer was honored with the first Lifetime Award for her dedication and effervescent spirit has been a big part of Early Florida Village's success.

Kirkland has worked at the fair for "many, many, many years," Fair Executive Director Tasha Hyder said. And she's not ready to slow down.

"I'll be at the Baxley House greeting people this year, too," Kirkland said. "I'm going to be like the Energizer Bunny. I'm going to keep on kicking as long as I can."

Kirkland welcomed fair-goers into the historic village, and she told stories of how simple life used to be. She liked to talk about wood-burning stoves similar to what her mother and grandmother used.

"People can enjoy the old-time section of the fair because it gives them an idea of how people used to live," she said. "Sometimes I think people are astonished about how we used to live."

It proved to be Kirkland's final appearance.

The fair ended on April 9, and Kirkland passed away peacefully while surrounded by family 27 days later.

Officials break ground on Clay County Regional Park

MIDDLEBURG – Bulldozers were five acres away, busily turning Florida scrubland into what will soon become Clay County Regional Park when County Commission Chair Betsy Condon put the project in perspective on March 28.

"I can't wait for the day to see this open," she said. "I can't wait to see kids out here playing. I want to bring people outdoors and onto the playing fields."

The 250-acre complex will now celebrate its grand opening on April 5.

The county bought nearly 250 acres of land on U.S. Highway 21, a mile north of State Road 16, to create a unique sports park to draw national tournaments.


North Florida Land Trust bought the 750 acres between the park and SR 16. The nonprofit, which is committed to preserving natural places, told the county it could add nature trails in its portion.

"This will be a first for Clay County and Northeast Florida," Condon said.

Former Florida Sen. Rob Bradley and Rep. Travis Cummings were instrumental in working with County Manager Howard Wanamaker to secure a matching grant from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity program. The county paid the first \$3 million, and the state matched it.

Once operational, the park could become a money-maker in taxes, Condon said

Clay County Agriculture Fair shatters attendance record

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Except for an occasional bird trying to find an easy meal of leftover fries or pretzels, the Clay County Fairgrounds were eerily quiet on April 10.

Most of the rides that thrilled patrons a day earlier had been disassembled and were on the way to their next stop at Sumter County. Livestock was back at their farms. Volunteers were still resting aching feet and tired eyes. And the countdown to next year's Clay County Agriculture Fair had already started on the marquee.

The fairgrounds were Ground Zero for Northeast Florida fun for nearly two weeks.

Even with inclement weather in the last two days, everything ran smoothly. Even when finding a parking spot presented a challenge and lines were long at the rides, fair volunteers wanted to ensure everyone had a good time.

That's why this year's fair attracted a record 156,480 people. Executive Director Tasha Hyder said this year's attendance could have been as much as 200,000 if not for the final weekend washout.

"We are growing with the development around us," she said. "We knew it was going to be big, but I don't think we realized the numbers would be that big. If you think about it, if we hadn't had bad weather (on the final) on Saturday and Sunday, we probably would have been very close to 200,000. To be honest with you, on Saturdays, we averaged about 25,000-ish. And on Sunday, we average about 15,000 to 20,000 on that second Sunday. So imagine that we would have had good weather on Saturday and Sunday we would have been talking about right now."

The previous fair record was 147,948 in 2021

The fair also broke three daily records – 23,475 for a Sunday, April 2, 8,808 for a Monday, April 3, and 10,270 for a Wednesday, April 5.

Waste Not Want Not wins top Reinhold Foundation honor

ORANGE PARK – Sandra L. Staudt-Killea realized her nonprofit was about to be honored as the Paul E. Reinhold Community Service Award winner shortly after Olivia Myers talked about the winner during the



Celebrate Clay breakfast on April 25. Her suspicions were confirmed when Myers said:

"It is our civic responsibility to be good stewards of the Earth's resources and to feed the most vulnerable. Today's agency we honor is a clear champion on both fronts, bridging the gap between waste and want.

"We're so proud to present this year's Paul E. Reinold Community Service Award to Waste Not Want Not."

Staudt-Killea's agency was one of more than 100 local nonprofits hoping to earn a portion of the \$100,000 the foundation awarded.

"It was so exciting waiting to hear the words," Staudt-Killea said. "It's like a beauty pageant. You don't want to hear your name too soon. At the same time, the longer you don't hear your name, you start to worry about it being too late."

Staudt-Killea operates a group that collects unused food and redistributes it to 47 food banks that feed 7,000 people a week.

Waste Not Want Not earned the top award of \$15,000 from the Paul and Klare Reinhold Foundation. The organization was one of 47 county nonprofits that were selected for a variety of prizes.

The Way Free Medical Clinic and Clay Behavioral Health Center earned \$7,000 after winning the Judge's Choice Program Awards. Penney Retirement Community President and CEO Teresa Scott earned the Jack Myers Executive Director Award and Saved 2 Serve's William Darnell won the Peggy Bryan Volunteer of the Year Award. Both earned \$7,000 checks.

School Board approves new plan to review library books

FLEMING ISLAND- The school board unanimously approved the School Board Procedures Manual for Instructional Resources on April 11 to clarify which books are allowed to be on school library shelves.

The vote was in response to House Bill 1467, which Gov. Ron DeSantis approved in March. It requires each school board to define its rules for training media personnel and reviewing and approving all books and publications. Part of this means the public and parents getting involved in the process.

The bill was approved to identify the objective material and list those removed. In the Clay County School District, 383 books have been removed. Eleven parent volunteers helped by reading disputed

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The city council evaluated 13 applications on Dec. 20 for the soon-to-be-open City Manager job. Lynn Rutkowski submitted her letter of

resignation in November, but she agreed to continue to serve until Jan. 10 to ensure a smooth transition for the city.

"I'm proud that we received 13 applicants," Mayor Nina Rodenroth. "We need to find the right person, right now, for our town," she said.

"I spent two days (reviewing the applicants)," said Councilmember Christine Thompson.

The job description calls for "high level administrative, technical and professional work in directing and supervising the administration of City government." according to an online listing.

The salary ranges from \$65,000 to \$90.000

City Council began the session by crossing some names off the list. The council was concerned about

one applicant who had managerial experience but was fired for harassment. Other applications were discarded for lacking the right experience or background. One application was disregarded because of a cover letter:

"He mentioned 'Mayor Lake' (instead of



Mayor Rodenroth) in his cover letter. He is out of touch with our community," said Councilmember Dan Lewandowski.

However, most of the applications were well received. City Council made the tough decision not to consider otherwise qualified candidates, preferring instead those who could transition into the role quickly and hit the ground running. Rodenroth reaffirmed the importance of "finding the right person right now."

Ultimately, three candidates from the applicant pool of 13 were invited for interviews: Elmon lee Garner, Jeff Shoobrige, and Charles Van Zant Jr.

Garner brings a background in city management and an ICMA certification to the table. He served as city manager in Chattahoochee, Palatka and Sneads.

Shoobridge served as city manager of Madison Lake, Minnesota, and Redington Shores.

Van Zant was the former Superintendent of Clay County schools. He served as superintendent from 2014 to 2017 but was defeated in subsequent reelections by Addison Davis and again by David Broskie.

All three candidates have military experience.

"We were spoiled to have (Lynn Rutkowski as Town Manager). She's literally been out in the storm helping out. It is going to be hard to find someone willing to do that," said Councilmember Tony Brown.

The city council will interview the three candidates on Jan 3. that's open to the

Residents help create 20-year long-range strategic plan

FLEMING ISLAND – Residents had the opportunity on May 15 to help county officials create a 20-year long-range strategic plan. Although the Board of County Commissioners generally looked 10 years into

the future, they solicited help developing a master plan that will serve as a roadmap for the next generation.

"I'm definitely a proponent of habits for success," said County Manager Howard Wanamaker. "So, these habits can lead to many things out into the future. So as a county and as we're growing and expanding, we can now take the lead and ultimately have a litmus test on how we're doing and achieving these goals."

Some residents were surprised to know many future projects had already been approved. Assistant County Manager Troy Nagle said, "We're doing seven bonded road projects. We have implemented impact fees recently, which is a fee charged on new developments to help them pay for needs like fire stations and police stations. We are currently work-

ing on a regional park and a gun range; we've got designs in the works for two fire stations and others to build four fire stations in the next five years."

At the first of six fown hall meetings, residents were encouraged to list what they liked and disliked about the county. Then, they were asked to suggest what they'd like to see in the next 20 years. Two primary concerns were roads and growth.

Some said the small-town feel is the best part of living around Clay County. Others said their biggest concern is how growth is erasing that coziness.

Other popular features of the county were the quality of schools, availability for recreation, overall quality of life, safety, low taxes and affordability for retirees.

Dislikes mentioned were traffic, overdevelopment, a lack of access to public transportation, food deserts, a lack of alternative modes of transportation and putting development ahead of addressing infrastructure.

Sheriff's office drops 'Hammer' with 57 drug arrest warrants

ORANGE PARK – It's called Hammer and Hope for a reason.

While more than 20 organizations have united to provide the hope portion of the program by helping those fighting opioid addictions, the Clay County Sheriff's Office said on May 24 the hammer side has resulted in 57 arrest warrants.

Sheriff Michelle Cook said her agency would remain diligent in removing the

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"plague" of drugs. And with 52 people already charged and booked, she vowed to track down anyone who peddles illegal narcotics.

"The Clay County Sheriff's office recently had the largest drug bust in Clay County history, seizing enough fentanyl to kill four million people," she said. "Since the announcement of that drug bust, our detectives have continued to work the various investigative units, and today, I want to update the drug seizure totals attributed directly to Operation Lucky 7's.

In total, 3,519 grams of cocaine, 5,400 grams of methamphetamine and 12,480 grams of fentanyl have been removed from our streets. In addition, we are up to \$334,651 of drug dealer money seized, and we've seized 31 illegally owned firearms."

Cook called a press conference two days ahead of a community support program to get addicts and their family members – the help they need. Cook said the two-pronged approach has made a difference.

"Just since January of this year – our narcotics team this does not count totals from our patrol division, which does a phenomenal job of taking drugs off the streets as well – but just our narcotics team have removed from Clay County streets, an additional 450 grams of cocaine 285 grams of methamphetamine and 470 grams of fontany!"

CCSO also caught 52 of 57 people suspected of selling, possessing or trafficking drugs. She said five – Harley Pearson, Austin Downs, Michael Van Ness, Alphonse Flores and Paul Simmons – remain at large.

Four Keystone students inducted into National Speech and Debate Honor Society

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The Keystone Heights High Speech and Debate team inducted four National Speech and Debate Association Honor Society members – Mikayla Turner, Oliva McCoy, Seth Preseau, and Benjamin Man.

"This is our first year as a debate team. We have competed in a total of seven regular-season tournaments and a couple of state tournaments, and then we are going to nationals at the end of the week. It's been keeping us very busy," said coach Shannon Southam.

Turner and McCoy competed at the national tournament with The National Catholic Forensic League in Louisville, Kentucky, on May 26-29. The competition is one of the most prestigious in the country.

Events range from limited preparation events that require extensive knowledge of current events, impromptu speaking, Congressional Debate where students draft proposed laws and give position statements and Oral Interpretation of literature.

To prepare for competitive events, the team engaged in practice rounds. Students get seven minutes to select a topic, brainstorm ideas, outline and deliver a speech in front of their peers. Students also worked on presentation skills, tips and techniques.

Speech and debate sharpen students' ability to think critically, organize their thoughts, and communicate their viewpoints quickly and succinctly. Whether debating in the classroom, volunteering, speaking at a rally, or acting on stage, students use what they learn in speech and debate daily.



School board decides students must use birth-assigned restrooms, locker rooms

FLEMING ISLAND – The school board approved a policy requiring students to use restrooms, locker rooms and changing rooms according to their birth-assigned gender.

The measure passed unanimously, but

not without much discussion and one final moment of controversy.

After casting her vote, Mary Bolla attempted to abstain from

her "yes" decision. Board attorney J. Bruce Bickner suggested she shouldn't change her vote. He wasn't trying to influence her opinion but warned Bolla that changing the vote would require her to complete ethics paperwork.

The school board member still has her doubts moving forward.

"My concern with this particular policy with an attachment of punishment is that we are punishing some of our most vulnerable students. These vulnerable students have gone through a lot in their lives. They have not had the support that some of our sons and daughters have. It concerns me that we're going to push the vulnerable students even deeper into vulnerability," she said.

Violating the policy could result in school detention or potential law enforcement consultation.

"I think regarding the bathroom policy, we can all say a lot, but to me, it's simple common sense, and it's sad that we have to even write a policy," board member Beth Clark said.

Students can request an exemption. A student or parent must submit a request, and the school's administration must approve it. If approved, the individual can use any gender-neutral or single-stall accommodations available on campus.

County considering a Southern Rock Museum

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Southern Rock Initiative got a lot of attention at a unique subcommittee meeting on June 13 at the Clay County Administration Building.

There were several issues, like the location, who would manage it, and whether it would be a private, public or public-private partnership,.



One blueprint for a successful model is the Museum at Capricorn in Macon, Georgia, at Mercer University, which exists via funding from two to three private investors and a partnership with the school at the municipal auditorium.

The submitted committee agreed on a couple of deliverables, including putting together a draft Request For Quote, which would be vetted by the county's legal and purchasing staff and would give requirements and information. A draft score would be sent to committee members.

A project could include a number of amenities, such as a cafe and gift shop, visitor and welcome center, art council, performance stage, in-house house kitchen and a gallery. Hosting historic tours, private events, and a Southern Rock festival could all be in the mix between the multi-use facility, which would include a Hall of Fame Museum, Boutique Outdoor Amphitheater and more.

The county has deep Southern Rock roots. It was home to Hell House, where Lynyrd Skynyrd wrote their first three albums. It's also where members of Skynyrd, 38 Special, Molly Hatchett, Tom Petty, DCL and The Curt Towne Band live.

Ridgeview's Alex Romer appears on NBC's 'American Ninja Warrior' finals

ORANGE PARK – For Ridgeview High senior Alex Romer, the tension of competing on television is over. Still, the anxiety of being unable to talk about it was probably more taxing than his adventure.

"I'm not allowed to talk about how I did because of the show," said Romer, 17, who









recently returned home from Los Angeles after a stint on the TV show "American Ninja Warrior." I submitted a video of my skills, and they invited me. I went out, competed and now we wait."

Romer's segment aired in episode eight. "American Ninja Warrior," which will be starting its 14th season on NBC and it will feature an age limit of 15 and younger.

The winner earned \$1 million at the national finals in Las Vegas.

Athletes like Romer compete in numerous qualifying rounds and semifinals to advance.

LaPierra and two students wrote a three-paragraph essay on why Ridgeview should be considered. LaPierra said condensing so much information into three paragraphs was no easy task.

"This is huge for the culinary depart-



ment. This will help us greatly for years to come," she said.

According to the foundation, ProStart, a two-year technical education program focused on culinary arts and restaurant management who are closely connected to industry experts through guest speakers, class mentors, tours of local facilities, student competitions, and more – all to ensure the real-world experience is brought directly to the classroom. ProStart students finish the program ready to join the workforce and make an immediate impact in restaurants and food service.

Orange Park gets \$7 million from Florida Department of Environment Protection

ORANGE PARK – The Town got a \$7 million grant from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Statewide Flooding and Sea Level Rise Resilience Plan.

It was the only grant awarded by the state program for a municipality in Clay

County. Duval was the only neighboring county to receive funds, which received \$11.67 million for two projects.

The grant, titled "Johnson Slough Roadways and Culvert Improvements," will seek to address infrastructure concerns at Johnson Slough on Plainfield Road, Nelson Drive, Nelson Drive South and Carnes Street via roadway improvements, culvert replacement and improvements and improvements to the project's overall design, according to Public Works Director Kyle Croce.

He said the town's engineering consulting firm would assist in enhancing the project design.

Johnson Slough was identified as an area of "critical infrastructure that needs improvement," according to Croce.

Town officials directed their pitch to the streets near Rob Bradley Conservation Park at Nelson Point and Doctors Lake, which are prone to flooding after heavy rain.

Darin Roark leaves Baptist Medical Center Clay, replaced by Orange Park's Ed Hubel

FLEMING ISLAND – With his work completed in Clay County, Baptist Medical Center Clay President Darin Roark left the hospital on July 14 to tackle new challenges in New Hampshire.

Before he left, Roark was honored by the Board of County Commissioners for spearheading the completion of the \$234 million, 102-bed hospital. He will

Ed Hubel, a graduate of Orange Park High, will become the interim president at Clay. He currently is the president of Baptist's Nassau facility.

"In a lot of ways, this is a coming home for Ed," Roark said. "That's super exciting that I can turn it over to someone who has roots in Clay County, knows Clay County, and understands Clay County. It means a lot to me to turn it over to somebody who loves the county as much as I do."



Spring Park Elementary, 42 other schools welcome students

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Although work continued on County Road 315 as dignitaries met to officially open Spring Park Elementary, the district's 43rd school opened on time, on budget and without debt, according to Superintendent David Broskie.

Spring Park Elementary had 48 classrooms to accommodate as many as 851 students. Principal Tiffany Quitman said the school was prepared for the first day of



school on Aug. 10.

"In this building, memories will be made. Lessons will be learned. The hearts and minds of our most precious resource will be nurtured," Quitman said.

Teachers, parents and students were at the ribbon-cutting ceremony, along with School Board Member Beth Clark, County Commissioner Mike Cella, County Manager Howard Wanamaker, the entire Green Cove Springs City Council and members of the Clay County Schools District and Green Cove Springs police departments.

District-wide, nearly 42,000 students returned to class.

Broskie said the openings were the smoothest in his 37-year education career.

"I would say it's exciting," he said. "When I go to schools, I see young people smiling to be back at school, where they get to see their friends and their teachers. And on a side note, I would say many parents are also happy the children are back in school, which usually brings a little bit of laughter."

Clay County spared wrath of Tropical Storm Idalia

CLAY COUNTY – Hurricane Idalia was expected to bring between two and three inches of rain and tropical storm winds as it passed over Clay County early on Aug. 30, the National Weather Service and Clay County Emergency Management said.

The storm, which quickly organized into a Tropical Storm off the coast of Mexico, was projected to make a wide swath across the state.

Most of the storm tracks had the storm making landfall north of Tampa before cutting a path across Northeast Florida and exiting into the Atlantic Ocean just north of Jacksonville. That put our county in the storm's crosshairs. At one time, Camp Blanding was under a hurricane watch alert.

However, less than 12 hours before it hit shore, Idalia jogged north and west and struck Keaton Beach, 75 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

Nonetheless the county activated





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its emergency management center and opened shelters at Lake Asbury Junior High, Orange Park High and Keystone Heights Junior/Senior highs. The Lake Asbury location was equipped for people with special needs; Keystone and Orange Park were pet-friendly.

The National Hurricane Center said Idalia was poised to be major hurricane with sustained winds of at least 111 mph.

State awards Clay County \$3.5 million for infrastructure projects

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Gov. Ron DeSantis delivered more than \$3.5 million to the Clay County Board of County Commissioners on Sept. 18 as part of the governor's Florida Job Growth Grant Fund for targeted infrastructure improvements.

Clay County's population grew 35% in the last 10 years. The infrastructure improvements will directly support job growth in the manufacturing sector, creating approximately 170 new high-wage jobs upon completion.


"Florida's freedom-first and businessempowering policies draw manufacturers from across the globe to our state," DeSantis said. "Today's infrastructure award will connect the Clay County community with high-wage jobs, bolster Florida's manufacturing industry, and strengthen the nation's number one economy."

The investment in Clay County builds on more than \$250,000 awarded to the city of Green Cove Springs for electrical line infrastructure upgrades, \$500,000 awarded to the Clay County Development Authority to construct 2.5 miles of asphalt road at the Camp Blanding Joint Training Center and \$700,000 to improve infrastructure in the City of Green Cove Springs.

The award will go toward infrastructure support in Clay County with the construction of a new half-mile section collector road, Pringle Road, and enhancements to a quarter-mile section arterial road, County Road 218.

Orange Park High finally unveils new football, track stadium

ORANGE PARK – Orange Park and Clay Highs have met on the football field several times. But the Sept. 8 matchup had a different feel at the newly-refurbished



Hoyt B. Cotney Stadium.

The Raiders were home in their freshly renovated, state-of-the-art version of the stadium, which got its first facelift since the original stadium was built by Clay County Jail inmates in 1962.

Students, fans, alumni and community were eager to take a peek at the Raiders' new crown jewel.

"Generations of people and families from Clay County have attended school at Orange Park. (The stadium opening) is going to be a huge deal for past, present, and future Raiders. We hope to put our best foot forward, and I just can't wait to see everybody at the game," said second-year football head coach Marcus Wimbley.

The stadium now will seat approximately 2,500 fans. Last year, the old stadium, which was 60 years old, could only be described with one word: dilapidated.

"The (old stadium) has been there almost as long as the school has been here. We were one of the only schools that still had an old concrete stadium. It was falling apart. There's only so much glue and paint you can put on it. Even when you put paint on it, you could tell it was old," said Joel Wallace, a retired U.S. Navy veteran and school's track coach.

The new stadium boasts 39 more restroom stalls – an increase from six to 45 – and a new concession stand and press box.

County wners to pay more in property taxes although millage rates remain stable

CLAY COUNTY – The good news is the millage rates for county, city, and town property owners either were reduced or stayed the same for fiscal year 2023-24.

The bad news is that since the overall property value increased countywide by

\$1.9 billion, everyone will be paying more taxes

Rates were finalized at council meetings during the final week of September. The new fiscal budget started on Oct. 1.

The Board of County Commissioners kept the rate at 8.601, but with the increased value of non-exempt property, the county will generate \$729.25 million – a 12.03% increase compared to 2022-23.

Green Cove Springs' rate is 4.7, Keystone Heights' is 4.2901, Orange Park's is 5.7, and Penney Farms's is 4.4535.

Green Cove Springs reduced its rate of 4,5 for 2022-23, but the city will still collect an extra \$3.3 million in revenues.

Orange Park's rate decreased from 5.8781 for 2022-23 because Mayor Randy Anderson said there was a surplus of \$35,700 in the town coffers.

"Operation Lightshine' leads to 10 child exploitation arrests

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Five men left their homes in Jacksonville in August, believing they were meeting a child for sex.

Instead, law enforcement agencies were waiting.

"Operation Lightshine," a four-day undercover operation, was created on Aug. 2 to "identify and apprehend individuals using the internet to sexually exploit children."

The operation led to 10 arrests, including two men from Georgia and one from California. All used apps to message victims they believed to be 13 or 14.

"During 'Operation Lightshine,' investigators and agents went undercover as

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children online to uncover and capture individuals involved in child sexual exploitation," Cook said on Oct. 18. "During the operation, they successfully identified several suspects engaged in these activities. Once the operation concluded, investigators needed to gather more evidence, some requiring search warrants, to ensure these suspects could be prosecuted and held accountable. This complex process involved a thorough investigation and collaboration between law enforcement agencies at the local and federal levels across the country. As a result of these efforts, 10 individuals attempting to sexually exploit minors were

The collaborative effort involved various agencies, including the Clay County Sheriff's Office, Homeland Security Investigations, Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, States Attorneys' Office, 4th Judicial Circuit, Federal Bureau of Investigations, Naval Criminal Investigative Service, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, Orange Park Police Department and the U.S. Attorney's Office.

CCSO joined forces with seven other law enforcement agencies eight months ago to combat human trafficking and child exploitation. They joined with Operation Lightshine to create the largest task force to fight child exploitation in the country.

Local Chick-fil-A makes surprise \$100,000 donation to Waste Not Want Not

ORANGE PARK – Dedicated volunteers packed up 5,000 to 7,000 pounds of food from restaurants, farms, grocery stores and anywhere else, producing surplus food at Waste Not Want Not. The donated surpluses were about to be redistributed

to other nonprofits in 14 counties across the state, matching the specific nutritional needs of each supplier.

Then, representatives from Orange Park Chick-fil-A at 1925 Wells Road arrived with breakfast for the hardworking volunteers on shift.

But after Volunteer Director Linda McKenzie finished her tour guiding Craig Phillips, owner of the Chick-fil-A, she saw employees holding balloons and a Chick-fil-A cow mascot rushed her with a massive check.

McKenzie saw the check reading \$1,000 initially. Then, she realized that she imagined the two trailing decimal points.

The check actually read \$100,000.

McKenzie, Executive Director Sandra Staudt-Killea and the many volunteers realized they had hit the nonprofit lottery. Waste Not Want Not was selected as one of seven nonprofits among 1,200 across the United States and Canada that rescue surplus foods from the national chain restaurant. It was part of Chick-fil-A's \$1 million philanthropic effort to address food insecurity.

Clay blues band Southern Junction wins spot at international competition

MIDDLEBURG – A victory at the North Central Florida Blues Society competition on Oct. 16 elevated the status of the six people who make up Southern Junction and earned them a spot at the January International Blues Challenge in Memphis, Tennessee.

Rutkowski resigns as Keystone Heights' City Manager

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – City Manager Lynn Rutkowski submitted her letter of resignation on Nov. 20 at the City Council meeting.

She was hired as a part-time Code Enforcement Officer. She was promoted to the Planning and Zoning Clerk and hired by the council as the City Manager in 2016.

When former Mayor Karen Lake questioned her education, the council voted 4-1 not to accept her resignation in 2022.

Rutkowski told the council during its September meeting she planned to leave city government. Her current contract expired on Dec. 25, but she offered to stay longer so the city can find a replacement and avoid hiring an interim manager.

Councilman Stephen Hart said he wanted her to stay.

"Before we can agree to an extension, we first have to accept your resignation," he said. "I hope you will reconsider. I, for one, will not accept your resignation.

"Keystone is small, but there's a lot going on – and it's all in her head."

Her resignation letter was brief. It read:

"This letter is to notify Council of my last day. At the Council meeting on September 25, 2023, I publically informed Council of my resignation. My last day will be Wednesday, January 10, 2024. It has been my honor and a privilege to serve this community since June 28th, 2012."

BCC, DBCCD reach agreement to build library in Oakleaf

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Board of County Commissioners agreed with the Double Branch Community Development District on Nov. 14 to acquire a critical parcel of land necessary to address the







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long-standing need for a library in Oakleaf Village.

In October, the BCC submitted a request to the DBCDD to acquire the land. Now that it's completed, it can pursue construction.

Alexandra Compere, who represents the Oakleaf area, attended Double Branch's meeting on Monday night when they said they would agree to convey their portion of the property to the county.

The land, located on a small, empty lot at the end of Plantation Oaks Boulevard near Oakleaf Village Elementary, is split nearly in half. The BCC owns a 0.47-acre parcel, and the DBCDD oversees a 0.568-acre parcel.

There are stipulations in the details. The land transfer is contingent upon the construction of a library. A proposed community center was also green-lighted by the CDD, but books will be the main focus. Double Branch is only willing to convey the property if the library is built. If not, it will retain the property.



State: Clay County schools make the grade – again

CLAY COUNTY – For the fourth consecutive time, the Clay County District Schools earned an "A" rating on Dec. 11 from the Florida Department of Education, and it posted the second-highest scores statewide in social studies and fourth-highest in science.

"I've always said: Clay County is a great place to live. It's a great place to work. And it's a great place for students to go to school," Superintendent David Broskie said. "We are so proud of how our students performed. It's a testament to the teachers, staff, parents and the community at large."

It was the fourth time Clay schools earned an "A" in five years and ranked among the top 10 in the state. County schools didn't receive a grade for the 2021 school year during the COVID-19 pandemic

Thirteen elementary schools earned an "A" rating: Orange Park, Doctors Inlet, Middleburg, Clay Hill, Lake Asbury, R.M. Paterson, McRae, Fleming Island, Thunderbolt, Rideout, Shadowlawn, Discovery Oaks and Plantation Oaks. Fleming Island extended its streak of being an "A" school to 24 years, dating back to 1999, while Orange Park has been an "A" school for 21 consecutive years.

At the same time, Orange Park, Keystone Heights, Lakeside, R.M. Paterson, Fleming Island, Thunderbolt and Discovery Oaks were recognized as Schools of Excellence.

Green Cove Springs and Lakeside junior highs are Schools of Excellence. They joined Lake Asbury as an "A" school.

Five high schools earned "A" marks: Middleburg, Ridgeview, Fleming Island and Oakleaf. Keystone Heights Junior/Senior High also received an "A."

Oakleaf Village Elementary's Brown fourth on MasterChef Junior: Home for the Holidays

OAKLEAF – Despite being a fourth-grader, Landon Brown wasn't intimidated by Gordon Ramsay, a celebrity chef with a reputation for his fiery temper.

It just needs a little bit of a cooking-down agent. You nailed the cookies. The cookies were beautiful. Really good job."

County agrees to manage growth by approving new five-year strategic plan

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Board of County Commissioners unanimously approved the county's five-year strategic plan on Dec. 5 during its final meeting of the calendar year. From sticky notes on whiteboards to community workshops, discussions, and implementing feedback from residents and businesses, the blueprint for the county's next five years

has been an undertaking that has been months in the making.

"This is a good quality product," said Commissioner Jim Renninger during his first BCC meeting as chairman.

County Manager Howard Wanamaker was especially proud of what this plan means for the county's future. He is so proud that he wants to send copies to Florida's 67 other counties.

"It shows off our county, what we're up to and what we will achieve," Wanamaker said

The plan created goals, targets and actions in five categories: community health and safety, economic and community development, good governance and quality of life. The plan is a culmination of a nearly year-long journey that was a collaborative effort between officials and the community, who gathered insightful perspectives through feedback in all six districts,

Some objectives include providing resources for citizens experiencing substance abuse, promoting "high yield recycling," enhancing greater tourism toward the county, fostering greater communication with the community, developing community connectivity and maintaining access to various water-based activities: boating, kayaking, skiing and fishing.

The Keystone Heights boys' team won its third consecutive 1A championship, the Clay High girls won Class 2A and the Fleming Island boys won in Class 2A.




On an adjacent course, the Fleming Island girls finished sixth

Fleming Island's incredible athletic run finished with Maryn McDade winning the 50- and 100-yard freestyle races in the state finals. Her effort earned her the Class 3A Swimmer of the Year award from the Florida Dairy Farmers High School Sports Awards program.

School Police to move under direction of Sheriff's Office

FLEMING ISLAND — The Board of the Clay County School District voted 4-1 on Nov. 7 to enter negotiations that will put its police department under the direction of the Clay County Sheriff's Office for the next three years.

If negotiations are successful, the Clay County District Schools Police Department





and its \$4.8 million operating budget will be overseen by the sheriff's office. CCSO School Resource Officers would start during the next school year.

Superintendent David Broskie will spearhead the negotiations, involving multiple stakeholders, the sheriff's office, the Board of County Commissioners and others.

Broskie and School Board Attorney Jeremiah Blocker stressed the importance of complying with state statutes.

Members agreed to include charter schools and strongly expressed mutual support for transferring the district police department's equipment to the sheriff's to avoid paying duplicate costs.

The sheriff's office would need to make a one-time \$1.7 million payment to switch the equipment back to her agency, Sheriff Michelle Cook said during a workshop on Oct. 24.

Four years ago, amid cost concerns, the district separated from the sheriff's office in 2019. After reassessment, the school board will return to the prior arrangement, citing budgetary constraints and a desire to increase safety and security.

Cook said once an agreement is reached, school resource officers would change their uniforms and continue their basic duties. She also said the sheriff's office would intend to hire as many former district officers as possible for the same positions.

The Solite saga continues for residents living near former aggregate kiln plant

LAKE ASBURY – In the 1950s, Solite opened on the north side of County Road 209-A. In 1996, the aggregate kiln company closed.

Solite may have left Clay County, but its effects still haunt some residents.

Since then, neighbors said the plant has caused continual health and quality of life problems 27 years later.

The plant practiced illegal and egregious health and safety practices like using hazardous materials to speed up burn processes while not requiring employees to wear protective gear or warning them of the effects. They were accused of dumping hazardous materials like jet fuel and hospital biohazards and dumping and hiding barrels on the property.

Some residents who have lived near or worked at the former Solite report numer-



ous health defects.

Christine Robertson, a frequent visitor to her brother's property near the plant, swam in, drank water and ate fish from the lake. Her son, born with Spina bifida, died of defect and pain in 1996. She believes that Solite is to blame.

Micheal Zelinka's mother, lived one mile from the plant and had breast cancer. Zelinka, who had a heart attack in his 20s, said that doctors found high arsenic levels in his blood

A developer wants to build a community on the 900-acre plot, but the county commission said it won't re-zone the land until extensive testing is allowed.

According to Clay County Commissioner Kristen Burke, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection recently conducted testing at selected sites and found two traces of arsenic.

Joan Starnes, a nearby resident, said she wouldn't feel safe until the property, where tests already found arsenic, lead and cyanide in the soil on a 200-acre section of the former plant, undergoes an independent, third-party testing process.

"If any of the chemicals are disturbed in the soil, they could go airborne. We don't feel that it is safe for the property to be (worked on) until it is properly tested," she

Starnes isn't the only one who wants to see a third-party agency perform a complete and unbiased test.

"Our concern is that they will put it in names with no funding, take down the trees, disturb the soil with excavation, and then leave after they make money off of that

Then, the county taxpayers will be left with the burden of dealing with the contaminated property," Burke said.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - It all starts by heating plastisol to 350 degrees. The molten material is injected into molds. After it cools overnight, the finished product is a batch of multicolored, soft plastic fishing bait that can be scented with grape, garlic or coffee.

Twisted Tackle is 15-year-old Tristan Dowdy's first business venture, which specializes in handcrafted fishing apparel. Tristan has customers buying his signature fishing bait from as far as Texas and Oklahoma. Tournament fishermen buy multiple packs at a time, he said.

"He was fishing before he could talk," said Scott Tristan, his father.

The young entrepreneur got wet in the fishing industry, business finance, accounting, marketing, logistics and taxes. His mother, Robin Tristan, helped him design a logo. He said he has already sold more than 2,000 units and reinvested profits into the business.

Tristan was promoting Twisted Tackle Irick at the grand opening of an ACE Hardware store at Callahan when he met David Irick, the Department Head of Hagan Coastal Outfitters. Irick was impressed with his enthusiasm and his product, which helped him add Twisted Tackle baits to the shelves at the Hagan Ace Hardware store.

"The baits are good quality, made locally, and it's a bargain compared to Yamamoto." Irick said.

An eight-pack of Twisted Tackle bait costs \$6. A comparable pack from Yamamoto, an international competitor, is sold

Irick generously offered his boat for a fishing trip down Governors Creek. Tristan and Scott took the opportunity to demonstrate the merchandise in action.

"Nothing like some research and development," said Scott, hooking his line.

They demonstrated how easy it is to hook the soft plastic bait, which captured light with bright colors and glittering finish even in the dark, brackish water.

It was a frigid, windy morning, and the water was 51 degrees. Unfortunately, the brief stint didn't yield any bites. (The only thing I reeled in was a clump of Spanish Moss). But the excursion demonstrated the hardiness of the baits and their illustrious quality in dark, murky water.

"Well, you know what they say: the worst day fishing beats the best day at work," said

For Tristan, his best days are usually at the same time.





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New group empowers women with skills, confidence for self-sufficiency

CLAY COUNTY — At the height of the CO-VID-19 pandemic, feelings of loneliness and uncertainty surfaced. A young Rianna Barbary discovered an idea to gain a friendly fellowship and meet a mutual goal.

The goal of everyone involved is to become fully self-sufficient and confident within themselves. With interests and hobbies revolving around homesteading and cultivation, Barbary created a niche Facebook group to find people with a common interest.

And she found an audience.

What started as a small group for local women in 2020 has risen to more than 800 members, and it is a nonprofit organization dedicated to helping women become more self-sufficient in their daily lives. As the founder and president of the Northeast Florida Homesteading and Prepping Ladies (NEFLHPL), Barbary continues to make sure that everyone involved can redefine independence for themselves.

"I was tired of feeling like I was the only one that cared about food preservation or gardening," said Barbary. "And so when I started this group, it was like, 'Oh, great! We all have things in common: we all like talking about these things.' And I think that's so important because no matter what the subject is, there will always be people with the same interests as you. It's just about finding them."


Growing up in Northeast Florida, Barbary has always liked the outdoors. From gardening to food preservation, she was interested in all things cultivation. And, with both of her great grandfathers being farmers, Barbary's love only blossomed into her passion for homesteading and growing her own food.

In creating NEFLHPL, Barbary wanted to share the knowledge with other women in the area. When looking online, Barbary noticed that most homesteading spaces were predominantly male. In addition, Barbary wanted to beat the common stereotype that women need men to do the work.

"We don't need a male figure to learn how to do it. We can learn how to do it on our own," she said.

During the pandemic, Barbary also said she noticed many older women, especially widowed or divorced, in Northeast Florida who struggled with self-sufficiency and learning how to do things themselves. That propelled her to spark a change.

NEFLHPL aims to give women these

opportunities to achieve self-sufficiency by helping them learn how to partake in home-steading activities such as gardening, hunting, fishing, knitting and sewing. The organization offers many programs with varying topics that women can pick from. For certain activities such as hunting, fishing and self-defense, NEFLHPL partners with other organizations in the community to act as a referral source.

Barbary said it's important for women to learn these valuable skills to prepare for times of need.

"That's what my mission started out as. I wanted to help women learn these essential skills that a lot of our ancestors knew. Any day they could do these things, now we're having to go back to those things," she said.

The organization also hosts frequent educational meetings where female guest speakers present their expertise. Barbary said in the past, one guest speaker who owned a birth center in Jacksonville prepped the women on doula services and safe water birth techniques.

In addition, Barbary said NEFLHPL also hosts opportunities for women to put a name to face by meeting in person and socializing.

"We want to keep reminding the women that it is about friendship, too. It doesn't have to be learning all the time," Barbary said.

Member Stephanie Sams recently joined the group and said it has been an amazing experience. Sams said she's met women who range in homesteading skills such as writing books, raising animals and hunting. And because of this, Sams said she initially felt like an underachiever.

"These women are young enough to be my daughters. I'm like, 'This is pretty impressive.' So that's how I got involved in it," Sams said.

Sams said that learning how to garden has been her favorite aspect of the group.

"I have nine rose bushes, three hibiscus

(and a) couple (of) crape myrtles that are still babies but in the process. I am a flower girl," Sams said.

Sams said because it's been such a male-dominated world, it's important for women to learn how to be self-sufficient and confident on their own.

"I'm thinking, 'Well, if my grandmother could do it, why couldn't we all these years later?'" Sams said.

Barbary said the opportunities allow women to return to some techniques of the past

"There's really not a lot of opportunities like this anymore. I definitely think that, in our day and age, we've gotten away from things like food preservation, growing our own food, hunting, fishing, and all those things. So, I think providing a way for women to get back to those things is really essential right now," Barbary said.

After officially becoming a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, Barbary said she has much in store for the organization's future. Barbary said that next year, the NEFLHPL will be implementing a pilot program that will help disabled and senior women learn specifically about food preservation and health benefits. Barbary said the organization is currently taking public donations.

"By getting donations, we can help fund the program and be able to provide women with their own canning supplies and followup," Barbary said.

Barbary hopes that women in the community continue to get involved with NEFL-HPL and become more confident in themselves and their skills, whether that be through volunteering, spreading the word, joining or being a future guest speaker.

"We have a lot of great ideas and programs that we want to launch. So, right now, we're just asking the community for their support. Help us help the women here in Northeast Florida become more confident in their self-sufficiency and prepping skills," she said.

Residents fear impending development near Shedd Road

Planning and Zoning to address plan for 62 new homes on Jan. 2

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Residents along Shedd Road, where only about 20 homes already exist, are concerned by a potential development that could erase more rural land

St. Augustine-based developer Matthews DCCM has applied to rezone property along Sheed Road to build as many as 62 homes on a 20-acre stretch currently zoned for four homes.

The planning commission will meet on Jan. 2 at 5 p.m. at the County Commission meeting room at the County Administration Building. If the request is approved, it still needs approval from the Board of County Commission.

Stacee Reape is a longtime resident. She said she and several other residents were at the planning commission meeting on Dec. 5 to oppose the plan. The commission decided to delay a vote until Jan. 2 so they could evaluate the specifications.

"Quite a crowd of us got up and spoke against it. Honestly, I don't think they were prepared for that," she said. "I think they thought it would be just like any other planning and zoning meeting and that it would not be met with opposition."

Ryan and Katie Marcys are neighbors of Reape. They said the development would create more density and trap residents between two neighborhoods. The Willow Springs community already is on one side. Willow Springs Drive ends at Shedd Road, where the pavement meets dirt.

Residents want a balance between rural living and suburban development.

The Marcys said they've lived on Shedd Road for 30 years.

"We live here because of the peace and quiet," Katie Marcys said. "This is pretty much the last little piece of rural area that we have left near Green Cove Springs."

"This was all family land at one point, and now, it's all being sold off to the highest bidder," Ryan Marcys said.

The Marcys and Reape said the development could create a traffic catastrophe.

"Shedd Road used to (connect) U.S. (Highway) 17 to County Road 315 before Willow Springs was built. Now, (those) people are using Shedd Road as a cutthrough to get to U.S. 17. These people are cutting through and flying down this dirt road. If we're supposed to create infrastructure before (building) developments, this is the prime example of what not to do," Reape said.

Katie Marcys also said there are additional concerns because the road is prone to flooding because it's between two wetlands

"People fly up and down that road. We've seen numerous accidents. It's ridiculous. And if rain (comes down) at any point, that makes (Shedd Road) even more challenging (to navigate)," she said.

They believe an additional 62 homes would increase traffic by nearly 75%.

The wetlands are home to several animals, such as alligators, raccoons, deer, turtles and opossums, Katie Marcys said.

The area also creates potential problems for emergency vehicles.

"I don't think the (proper infrastructure is there), and I don't think the builder has a clue. It could be a heck of a time (dealing) with an (emergency situation)," Ryan Marcys said.

"The flooding and drainage issues we've had to deal with since all of these developments (have been built) like Magnolia West and Willow Springs has been unbelievable," Reape said. "(The builder) hasn't walked this property personally. He doesn't see the value and the character of these generational, family lands that have been here. And he hasn't seen the water flow and (flooding and drainage issues) that we have on Shedd Road, either. He does not understand what we deal with on a daily basis. And we don't want to be closed off and boxed in besides cookie-cutter homes."

Katie Marcys said growth has become troubling, especially in the Lake Asbury and Green Cove Springs area.

"You have to figure in: if they start changing this area, what will happen down the road in a couple of years? All of Clay County could be changed, and I don't think that our citizens really want that to happen," she said.

Bow Wow Breakout

Residents can spend days or more with dogs from Animal Ser-

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – In the spirit of the holiday season, residents enjoy new ways to spend quality time outdoors while making a positive difference for furry companions.

Bow Wow Breakouts, a program started more than five years ago at the Clay County Animal Services, connects compassionate residents with shelter dogs for a day of exploration and fun.

"Sometimes, people can't adopt. They're not in the right house or apartment, but they still want to be involved and help that animal and really (forge) that connection," said Shelter Operations Coordinator Courtney Sumner.

Like Big Brother and Big Sister programs, pets can spend a day with a caretaker for walks, playtime and companionship.

"The process is simple to gear up for the big adventure. Just stop by Clay County Animal Services or give us a call," Sumner said. "We set you up with a shelter dog and a backpack full of essentials, and you're ready for your adventure."

The backpack contains a blanket, toy, treats, waste bags, a harness and a leash.

"It's a good time to get out for people, and it's a big relief for the dogs," Sumner said.

"Essentially, it's a way to give them a break from the shelter," said Animal Care Attendant Jett Linn.

"We encourage (people) to explore the county. We have a lot of parks and dog-friendly places," Linn said.


The experience helps dogs adjust to life outside the shelter, Linn said.

"It shows them how a car ride is going to be, and it gives them the human interaction they need that we just can't give them because we're too busy taking care of (their needs)." she said.

The program also allows dogs to spend the night. Sumner said some volunteers enjoy the interaction so much they wind up adopting the pet.

"Maybe they'll decide, (perhaps) we can do a sleep-over and see how the dog (interacts with the family or individual) in the home. Then, they might say, 'You know what, we are ready to (go through) the adoption process,'" Sumner said.

Three factors remain constant: there is no pressure, all are welcome and the final

result is consistently positive, no matter how far residents go through the process. "Sometimes, Bow Wow Breakouts turn into other things, but regardless, (the program) is fantastic," she said.

Linn, who has been working at the shelter since March, said the program helps alleviate stress on the shelter and dogs, especially when residents choose to adopt a pet.

"The program has proven we can get dogs out of the shelter. We've got a few dogs 'home.' It gives us 'peace of mind' knowing they have a good home, and they won't have to come back to a place where they don't receive as much love and care," Sumner said.

Like a test drive, the program allows potential owners to evaluate whether they want a dog. The shelter doesn't want anyone to rush their decision, and volunteers can spend the day with as many animals as they want.

Reaction from residents has been astounding, especially during the holiday season. "People are excited about this because it gives them a (unique) opportunity they (perhaps) wouldn't have at home, where sometimes, they don't have animals. It just gives them something to do, gets people out of the house, and gets people moving. They can explore our parks and the best of what Clay has to offer," Sumner said.

The overnight foster program during the Christmas holidays is gaining popularity. Dogs can leave the shelter for the warm relaxation of play and interaction. The pets might even fall asleep near the warmth of the fire.

Sumner described the program as simply "fantastic." It also said it benefits the mental health of both people and dogs.

"You can't go wrong when snuggling with a pup or taking him out for a walk. It's just calm, relaxing, and a great time." she said.

Bow Wow Breakouts is open to anyone 18 or older. The sessions are available during regular shelter hours at 3984 State Road 16.

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New cardiac rehabilitation center opens at Baptist Clay

FLEMING ISLAND — Clay County residents recovering from a heart issue can get the services they need at Baptist Medical Center Clay with the opening of the new Cardiac Rehabilitation Center.

Located adjacent to the hospital at Baptist HealthPlace at Fleming Island, 2310 Village Square Pkwy. in Suite 102B, the rehab center is a 2,400-square-foot center with an array of cardiovascular and strength equipment for heart patients to regain their health.

Baptist Clay's cardiac rehabilitation program is conducted in a group setting of up to 10 patients. Patients' heart rate, blood pressure and EKG are monitored continuously during each supervised session. Patients are re-assessed at each session for signs and symptoms of cardiac issues and medication compliance.

Education is a large part of the cardiac rehab program. Patients learn about their personal risk factors for heart disease and deal with the emotional ups and downs of recovery. Physicians, dietitians, nurses and clinical exercise physiologists work together to provide a treatment plan for each patient.

Patients can attend the center with a qualifying diagnosis (such as open-heart surgery, heart failure, peripheral artery disease, or chronic stable angina, among others.) A physician may submit a referral to Baptist Health's Central Scheduling department at (904) 202-4200. Patients

Lindsay Woods part of Navy's response to Houthi attacks

Orange Park grad aboard USS Carney in Red Sea

Petty Officer 1st Class Lindsay Woods serves aboard the USS Carney, currently deployed to the U.S. 5th Fleet area of operations.

Woods serves as an operations specialist and was aboard the ship on Oct. 19 when the crew of Carney shot down multiple land attack cruise missiles and unmanned aerial drones launched by Houthi forces in Yemen while the ship was operating in the northern Red Sea. The missiles and drones were believed to be headed toward Israel when Carney intercepted them. Since the 19th, Carney has engaged numerous other unmanned aerial drones.

"As combat information center supervisor, my role is to manage the flow of communication through CIC while recording,

reporting and identifying surface contacts and threats, as well as providing navigation recommendations to the bridge," said Woods.

The engagement lasted several hours and made news worldwide. According to Cmdr. Jeremy Robertson, Carney's commanding officer, crewmembers like Woods made all the difference.

"We could not have done this without all of the preparation and the support from our families back home," Robertson said. "This is what we are meant to do, and on that day, the crew came together and executed the mission seamlessly."

Carney's deployment helps ensure maritime security and stability in the Middle East region.

"Being a part of this mission means that we will stop at nothing to ensure the safety of those at sea and around the world," said Woods.

Arleigh Burke-class destroyers like Carney are outfitted with the world's most

sophisticated weaponry systems. They further strengthen the U.S. Navy's contribution to national security by deterring potential adversaries and protecting vital assets.

"I'm extremely proud of the Carney team," Robertson said. "Every member of the crew performed exactly what we have been training to do and kept Carney engaged throughout the fight during this act. We could not have done this without all the preparation and the support from

department last Wednesday resulted in both sides moving closer to an agreement.

The Fraternal Order of Police Orange Park Lodge 144 originally wanted an extra \$300,000

for salaries and benefits. The town offered \$160,000. Town Manager Sarah Campbell

Sarah Campbell said the new request from the union is "somewhere in the middle."

Campbell said she would ask the

Town Council to approve the tentative agreement of an additional \$240,000 reached between her and the union at their next meeting on Jan. 9.

"I believe this is a good solution. It's a good, middle-of-the-road approach," Campbell said.

After originally favoring a \$160,000 increase, Campbell said in light of the town's budget restraints, she now supports the \$240,000 ask - \$184,000 in salaries and \$56,000 in benefits.

The details include across-the-board raises, with lower-paid employees getting a higher percentage increase of around 20%, and higher-paid, longer-tenured employees receiving an approximately 10% increase.

"Each employee would receive an increase of about \$7,600 per year to their current salary," Campbell said.



If the council approves the proposal, the plan will be presented to the union for ratification. A final vote for approval from the council could happen as soon as its Jan. 23 meeting.

"I don't see any problems on this (vote) (making it to the finish line), as long as council approves the salary proposal," she said. Campbell said the new salary structure, particularly starting pay, would make the town competitive with a new contract approved for the Clay County Sheriff's Office. She said a starting dispatcher's salary will jump from \$34,700 to \$42,400 a year, while officers will go from \$42,509 to \$50,209.

"This gives us a bit of an edge over Clay County. They are a big organization, and they're still going to have the ability to attract people because of their size, but as far as salary goes, we are going to be very competitive with them," Campbell said.

While the proposed increase is less than the union's original offer of \$300,000, it represents a compromise that balances the town's budget constraints with the union's desire for fair compensation. Campbell remained optimistic about the potential outcome, stressing the positive impact the new deal could have on recruiting and retaining officers.

"I believe this also increases long-term employees and incentivizes them to stay with our organization, so we can continue to recruit and retain," she said.

Community helps CCSO indentify man wanted for armed robberies

CLAY COUNTY - The Clay County Sheriff's Office said the community responded quickly with information after it posted the photo of a man suspected of at least three counts of armed robbery after meeting vic-

tims on the LBGTQ+ dating app Grindr.

Adam Tyler Ayers, 18, was arrested Friday. Dec. 22, after the agency said it responded to three separate incidents in three weeks of men who said they met "Larry" for a date at a secluded place before they

were robbed at gunpoint.

Ayers was charged with kidnapping while facilitating a felony, armed robbery, aggravated battery with a deadly weapon and attempted armed carjacking after de-

tectives received "numerous" tips shortly after CCSO released a photo from the dating site where the "person of interest" partially concealed his face.

According to Sheriff Michelle Cook, Ayers ordered the men to drive to ATMs and withdraw money.

"A couple days ago, we asked for the public's assistance in identifying a person of interest that had been robbing people, specifically using the social media app Grindr," Cook said. "Thanks to the help of our community, our detectives received numerous tips about the identity of the wanted subject. These tips helped us identify or suspect, locate arrest and suspect."

Cook said she believes there may be other victims. They can call the sheriff's office at (904) 264-6512 or submit a tip on the SaferWatch app.

"Our investigation is still ongoing, and I'm asking anybody who may have additional information or may be a victim of Mr. Ayers to please reach out to us immediately. "Cook said.

"I'd like to thank the detectives for all of their hard work over these past few days, putting a case together and apprehending Mr. Ayers. And I'd like to especially thank our community because once we put that photo up, and within minutes, we started receiving really good information."

Ayers' bond was set at \$250,003. His next court appearance is on Jan. 22.

Nothing to hide

Elections Office opens doors to dispel misinformation

(This is the first in a series of how Clay County conducts elections. There are many misconceptions about the process, especially following the 2000 presidential election when Al Gore claimed some of his votes weren't accepted because of "hanging chads on paper ballots." A recount showed George Bush won the state's 25 Electoral College by a margin of only 537 votes.)

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – As the county's Supervisor of Elections, Chris Chambless has heard every concern and accusation about the integrity of the voting process:

Dead people can vote.

Ballots can be stuffed.

Outside sources can hack voting machines.

His response is always the same: "We had an elections expo where we invited members of the community, as well as the press, to come and take a look behind the curtain because there's a lot of individuals that are involved in politics but don't necessarily know how the elections are conducted. So, we walked through the process from the beginning to the end, from requesting a vote or registering to vote, requesting to vote by mail ballot, all the way through that process to voting. We even set up a polling location inside the training center and talked about tabulating the vote."

Moreover, Chambless said anyone with questions can stop at the office at 500 North Orange Ave. in Orange Park to get answers.

"If you don't have faith in the system, are you going to participate? Then, what

happens is you become the virus that infects other people from not participating. We have too many people sitting on the sidelines. We need you to get some skin in the game. We're here if anyone wants to see how we do it," he said.

The Presidential Preference Primary election is on March 19, followed by the Municipal Super Tuesday Election on April 9 for local candidates.

Since Florida is a closed primary state, Chambless wanted every registered voter to know they can only cast ballots for candidates in the voter's registered party. That means Republicans can only vote for Republicans; Democrats can only vote for Democrats.

"We are going to face a lot of individuals who aren't registered Republicans, and it hasn't occurred to them that they won't be able to vote in the (Presidential Preference Primary)," Chambless said.

Since the start of the pandemic, the U.S. has seen a mass migration of people moving to new states, and no state is gaining more newcomers than Florida. Many from Democrat-leaning states don't know they can't jump parties during primaries, such as Municipal Super Tuesday and the Primaries on Aug. 20. A voter can change their political affiliation at least 29 days ahead of election days — Feb. 20 for the PPP, March 11 for the MST and July 22 for the primaries.

Anyone can switch back ahead of the general election before Oct.7, although voters can cast ballots for any candidate, regardless of party, during the General Election on Nov. 5.

Two of the most common pieces of misinformation Chambless hears are dead people casting ballots, and election ma-

chines can be hacked from outside sources.

Both are completely false, Chambless said

"Of course, the first thing we hear is dead people voting," he said. "There is a lot of maintenance in a 90-day period, but we also do it in real-time."

The Florida Department of Health provides names from death certificates weekly. Chambless said his office also gets notifications from family members, clerks of courts and Social Security.

"Why is Social Security a good resource? They want to quit paying you, OK? As soon as they can quit paying you, they want to," Chambless said.

Chambless said voting machines can't be hacked because they aren't connected to the internet.

"Our systems are locked and sealed," he said. "We have a chain of custody. We have a two-person control. We have cameras out of the wazoo. Even if you get into the tab room, where only three people in

the organization have access to that tab room, you would have to have the knowledge to do that.

"Then we have at least three last failsafes – logic and accuracy tests randomly created in the test deck. If you don't know what precinct, test or race is being tested, how can you enter, let's say, a Trojan horse to wherever Candidate A gets a vote and Candidate B gets three votes and Candidate C loses votes? If you didn't know what was being tested, you would not be able to write such a script to be able to do that."

Although Florida only requires selected races and precincts to be verified, Chambless said every vote from every race is confirmed.

The way that we elect people is a democracy, and a democracy can stagnate. We got to figure out a way to make sure it doesn't happen," he said.

"Don't take my word for it. You know, come here and invest yourself into the process."

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Lady Spartans taking on the nation's best

ORANGE PARK - St. Johns Country Day School girls soccer coach Mike Pickett knows the value of a tough schedule to prepare for the spring championship run and December was the "test" for his attempt to return to state and national prominence.

"We've played a 5-1-1 schedule against five nationally ranked teams since early December," said Pickett, after opening the trial with a 4-0 win over previously unbeaten 7A-Atlantic Coast (8-1-2, ranked 5th in 7A) on December 8 then culminating his gauntlet with a 3-1 win over 4A state champion Bishop Moore on Friday. "We literally left here and drove six hours to play South Walton because the kids here had exams, showed up, warmed up for 20 minutes then played. Then finished, drove an hour to Niceville to find our hotel, then played at 10 a.m. the next day. We had a 1-0 lead on them when they got a penalty kick that I would question."

St. Johns opened the season with a 2-2 tie with Ponte Vedra (ranked 4th in the USA) then 0-0 ties with Gulf Breeze and Tocoi Creek, a 1-0 win over P.K. Yonge and a 3-1 loss to Tallahassee Chiles.

Pickett noted that offensively, with sophomore Sydney Schmidt leading the Spartans scoring with just nine goals, the Spartans have shifted their attack to concentrate on defense this season with a minimum of goals being scored as opposed to previous seasons.

"We are playing a 3-5-2 set which is the riskiest to play as it leaves just three defenders in front of the goal and more players going forward for offense," said Pickett. "We had 111 goals last year (38 at Christmas break) and we have just 24 so far this year. We had no choice but to go to 3-5-2 to score goals. We don't have the finishers that we've had in the past seasons."

The top goal-getter for Pickett is stand-

"We knew coming in that this was going to be a very competitive group of teams with Creekside, Ribault, Andrew Jackson and teams from Louisiana and Tennessee," said Chandler, who won his first game; a 54-39 win over 5A-Auburndale, a region semifinalist last year, before a thrilling loss to eventual tournament runnerup 7A-Creekside; 60-58, and a loss to 3A-Santa Fe Catholic, a 9-2 squad from Lakeland, ranked No. 2 in Class 3A and No. 1 in Tampa. Santa Fe Catholic lost in the region finals in 2020 to eventual 3A champion Saint Andrews who beat Andrew Jackson for the title. Andrew Jackson, one of

the strongest programs in Florida, lost to Calvary Christian in the 3A Final in 2022. "I wanted to see how the boys reacted to the competition that was going to be here. Then, me and the coaches could figure a way to be ready for the districts and regions and another Final Four run."

Against Creekside, Fleming Island battled to a 58-57 lead with a Carson Crawford free throw set before the Knights canned a final toss to win the game with 0.6 seconds on the clock.

Against Auburndale, Crawford, a freshman, controlled the pain with 13 points and 10 rebounds with senior guard George Hamm dishing four assists.

"We had such a tough game with Creekside and the guys were kind of moping for the first part of the Santa Fe game," said Chandler. "We have to learn to move on to the next game because the playoffs are win or go home. You can't have a bad game and play worse the next game."





The Middleburg, Florida native graded out as the highest offensive lineman on the season and played 599 out of 601 stated plays.



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
