35 staves Nancy Scherer's eviction by paying three months rent

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Fighting eviction and hardship was never a part of the plan for retired Clay County Sheriff's Office patrol deputy Nancy Scherer. And, during what she called "the most difficult time in her life," she refused

to lose faith.

"It's gotten to the point where I try to remain positive. I try to be positive, but when it's day in, day out [and] it's been like this for months, you get really discouraged. You pray a lot more," she said.

responders stepped in that Scherer said she had the chance to breathe and see a window of hope.

Scherer was the first female road patrol deputy and sergeant of patrol and investigations in Clay County. She was a teacher and was always working. Until her retirement in 1995, she couldn't remember when she wasn't on the go.

A recent medical emergency changed her life. She had back surgery several months ago. Last week, she had her right knee replaced. Now, she needs surgery to replace her left ankle.

The 'spicy' newest chapter of the 'book ban' debate

School board listens, responds to community to author new media policy

ORANGE PARK – School Board Members Michele Hanson, Erin Skipper and Mary Bolla invited the community to an open forum last Tuesday for feedback and suggestions to create a new media policy for library books.

The board members wanted to create a new media policy following months of being overwhelmed by challenges and inadequate policy to review them.

"We don't want to dictate policy for you. We want you to help us decide policy," Hanson said.

The county's "book ban" debate received considerable attention last year following Bruce Friedman's campaign to remove what he deemed pornography from school libraries. In the last 18 months, Friedman has single-handedly submitted more than 600 book challenges – more than one challenge a day.

The current media policy, adopted last April, allows for the return of challenged books that do not violate FS 847, which forbids books "depicting nudity, sexual conduct, or sexual excitement" without "serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value for minors."

This year, students needed a signed permission slip to "opt-in" to use school libraries.

The current media policy has been criticized for being transparent, inconsistent and having an appeal process that





Green Cove's Castro retires after 46 years

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Eliberto "Berto" Castro made \$3.47 an hour when he was hired by the city in 1977.

"And I was happy," he said Tuesday night after receiving a standing ovation by the city council during his retirement ceremony.

Among other things, Castro swept streets, worked in the warehouse and with the city's water department. He came to the city council to say goodbye.

"Back when he started, they swept the streets with a broom, and he wore out a broom in one day," said Water Utilities Assistant Director Scott Schultz. "He never had a bad thing to say about any employee, about anyone. He was always happy."

With a light agenda, the council easily

went through their other business, including:

• Awarding a \$4,700,360 bid to Besch and Smith to construct a sidewalk and add stormwater protection on West Street. The award incorporated two sections of the 2020 Community Development Block Grant with the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity.

Besch and Smith bid nearly \$4.964 million, but the company dropped \$263,413 in value engineering opportunities.

The project will be funded by CDBG grants, unspent funds from the 2023 budget and other stormwater proceeds.

• Approving a request to include State Road 16 Trail Projects into the North Florida Transportation Organization list of priority projects. The plan calls for the SR 16 West trail to be connected to the Clav-Duval Trail for \$642.975 and for the intersection of SR 16 and U.S. Highway 17 from Reynolds Park to Spring Park for \$981,951.

• Approving the first reading of an ordinance that requires written permission to use the city's seal for non-municipal purposes

• And, approving dates for this year's Food Truck Friday events at Spring Park, starting on March 1 and ending in November to coincide with the city's 150-year celebration.

The city is currently working on the musical lineup for each month.

that takes too long. These were criticisms residents on both sides debated during the open forum. No one has criticized the current media policy more than Hanson herself

"Our media specialists have suffered under the current policy, and I have felt so bad for them," she said.

A major talking point was a desire for accountable, consistent community standards that objectively evaluate books.

Hanson said whether a challenged book violates FS 847 is usually black or white. But certain books are in a gray area: not deliberately pornographic but, nonetheless, contain explicit language and themes that may be inappropriate for minors. Hanson used the term "spicy" to describe these books. She cited "Heroine" by Mindy Mc-Ginnis as an example.

Parents, teachers, librarians and residents broke into groups to discuss a new media policy. They agreed to empower parental choice. Using markers, sticky notes and posters, the groups presented their viewpoints to the school board:

• "Let me decide for my child," said one group.

• "All books should be returned to the shelves... This is the only option that supports all parental rights," said another.

• "Elementary school (books) (should have) no sexual content whatsoever... pornography (has) no educational value," was mentioned.

• "I, we, you cannot decide for other

parents. Only a parent can decide for their own child... return to opt-out to allow students to read except those whose parents want them restricted," was discussed.

• "Books that 'walk the line' of the statute (FS 847) but don't violate it should be (accessible in) high school (with) parental permission," said one group.

• "We need a rubric to grade books that violate (Florida) law... (We need) a timeline for the review process... all ageappropriate content from history should be allowed," was also mentioned.

Two groups proposed a "movie rating system" for books, following a rubric similar to the MPAA rating system used today (G, PG, PG-13, R, etc.). One group said the line in the sand should be drawn to differentiate between what can be "spicy" and

what should not be suitable.

"A lot of the ideas you shared make a lot of sense to me," Hanson said.

Hansen was receptive to the community's feedback. She said the school board would consider a community-proposed "opt-out" permission slip system and compare that alternative with the current "optin" system that is in place.

Skipper said the perspectives from the community and recommendations from media specialists would be the basis for designing the new media policy at the school board's upcoming workshop on Jan.

"Compromise is the bridge that leads to progress," said Hanson, reading a quote from one table's posterboard. "I couldn't agree more."





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Clay County wins statewide acclaim for high live-release rate

Nearly 99% of sheltered animals experience live outcomes

CLAY COUNTY – Aymie Hellard smiled when it looked like two dogs were sizing each other up for a fight at Clay County Animal Services. As the shelter manager, she knew they were being playful.

Minutes later, one of the dogs was on her way home to a new life.

Success stories never get old at animal shelters, especially when it means a cat or dog escapes the indignant possibility of euthanasia. And when it comes to happy – and living – outcomes, few counties in Florida do it better than Clay County.

According to the Florida Shelter Animal Census data collected by the University of Florida's College of Veterinary Medicine, nearly 99% of all animals surrendered to shelters like Animal Services or Safe Animal Shelter are left alive. Only three other counties reported better outcomes.

"We try very hard to adopt out, send animals out to rescue and to foster out animals so we can mitigate the euthanasia rate," Hellard said. "We don't want to have to euthanize anything that can be adopted."

Safe Animal Shelter in Middleburg is the oldest no-kill shelter in the county. So far, 836 of 895 cats dropped off have been adopted. Even better, 388 of 401 dogs have

gone to new "forever" homes. Since its inception in 1991, Safe has provided care to more than 18,000 cats and dogs until they were adopted.

The county's animal shelter on State Road 16 in Green Cove Springs has 79 kennels. Last week, it reached capacity, so officials decided to waive all adoption fees on Jan. 12-13. That resulted in 24 adoptions.

"Putting down animals is a last resort for any shelter, any reputable shelter," said County Animal Director Ernest T. Hagan. "That's not something we consider foremost of what we do."

While the number of live releases has improved, it's still not close to the 100% nokill rate pushed by Best Friends Save Them All. The organization said the benchmark for any state is a 90% live outcome, but it's advocating for 100% by 2025.

Typically, the number of pets suffering from irreparable medical or behavioral issues that compromise their quality of life and prevent them from being rehomed is not more than 10% of all dogs and cats entering shelters, according to Best Friends Save Them All. Florida's shelters reported 205,164 dogs and cats were put down in 2013. That number improved to 41,685 pets being killed in 2021. Last year, that number dropped to 20,653.

Animal Services only accepts dogs and cats but will find homes for livestock received in cruelty cases or strays. Also, all dogs and cats available for adoption have been spayed or neutered, microchipped, and given the required vaccinations.

Last month, Animal Services launched the Bow Wow Breakout Club, which pairs a sheltered animal with a volunteer to spend the day away from the kennel. Hagan said what started as an afternoon for a walk and exploration can lead to an adoption.

"Sometimes they don't like to bring them back as quickly as they're supposed to," he said. "The ultimate thing is the owner gets attached to them."

Hellard said she's proud of her shelter's record. "It takes a lot of work to make sure these animals are taken care of and find a home," she said. "I love what we do. We love the animals. We love our community. We work hard to get these guys homes because they all deserve it."

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How military spouses can find connection, support

She and her children visit the center often because of the warm welcome and sense of community she finds there. "There's something for each of us here," she said. "Being overseas, friends who are like family are the biggest blessing. And you can't turn down free coffee and snacks.'

• Support for new parents: Military parents are often away from family and friends during their pregnancies and first months as new parents. USO Special Delivery presented by Johnson's are baby showers providing a home touch. They allow expectant parents and military spouses to connect and bond; this year, 72% of participants have stated in feedback surveys that this is the only baby shower they will receive. More than 20,000 parents have been served through this program since its 2013 launch, including 1st Lt. Erika Pearson, an active-duty service member in the Air Force. She knew her spouse, 1st Lt. Drew Pearson, could potentially be deployed around her due date. "The USO helped me make friends that I could rely on if my husband were to miss the birth and offered me resources I could reach out to if needed," says 1st Lt. Pearson.

• Professional development: Military spouses often have trouble finding their professional footing due to frequent relocations. That's where the USO can step in. Connecting service members and military spouses to resources that focus on employment, education, financial readiness, mentorship and veterans benefits, the USO Transition Program helps military families build a roadmap to achieve their goals and positions them for success through-

Greed driven most by lack of empathy for consumers

Last year's average inflation rate was 4.1%, which, thankfully, isn't as steep as the 8% annual

inflation rate that capped off 2022 or the 4.7% rate at the end of 2021. But since then, costs have only climbed, as demonstrated by the consumer price index, a frequently cited measure of

buying power.

sures the price fluctuations of consumer goods and services. According to the CPI, inflation was higher -4.06% in 2023 and 9.59% in 2022.

Oddly enough, the CPI doesn't typically include food or energy. I hate to remind the pencil pushers in Washington, D.C., but those numbers significantly impact a family's budget. That's why the only numbers that matter to me are what's on the bottom of the receipt, and that number is infuriating.

Those numbers mean prices are higher, and we have fewer dollars to spend.

I'm sick of companies taking advantage of hard-working people, especially during difficult financial times. The more the dollar shrinks, the more big business works to squeeze every dollar from a family's budget.

Just two years ago, you could get a two-liter bottle of soda at the grocery

store for about \$1. Now it's nearly \$4. Nationally, the average cost for a gallon of gasoline is \$3.20. It was \$2.40 at the start of 2021 and as much as \$5.06 in 2022.

According to the House Budget Committee, mortgage interest rates have risen from 2.7% in January 2021 to the current rate of 6.4% – the most rapid rate increase since the end of the Jimmy Carter presidency and the beginning of Ronald Reagan's term in 1981.

Equally alarming, renting has become more costly than buying. According to Florida Housing Data Clearinghouse, rent increased by 45.77% in the last three years to a monthly average of \$1,591 for a two-bedroom apartment.

People are finally pushing back.

Global supermarket chain Carrefour pulled all PepsiCo products from its shelves of 9,000 stores last week in France, Spain, Italy and Belgium because of "unacceptable price increases."

That means you can't buy Pepsi, Mountain Dew, Rice-A-Roni, Lay's potato chips, 7UP, Lipton Iced Tea, Cheetos or Quaker Oats products after PepsiCo increased its prices by more than 10% in seven consecutive quarters.

Although PepsiCo reported a 14% increase in profits, it defended higher prices because cooking oil now costs more following Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

Stew Leonard's, a New Jersey, New York and Connecticut supermarket chain, said it wouldn't accept any more big company price increases because their customers were finally pushing

out their service, as well as in their postmilitary life.

• Support while solo parenting: The burden of solo parenting can become especially apparent during deployments when military family members must struggle to find a new normal. For Tessa Michaelson Schmidt, connection with her husband Brett, a lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve, became complicated when he was deployed to Kuwait, where there is an eight-hour time difference, unreliable Wi-Fi on base, and the added pressure of being deployed near the frontlines. Because they and their two children have an incredible passion for reading, the USO Reading Program has been a blessing. Deployed service members can record themselves reading a book to their child. Then, the recording and a copy of the book are sent to that service member's family.

"They have a real response when they



hear his voice, and then we get the books in the mail, and they know they're books from daddy," says Schmidt, who explained that her children will often watch the videos of their father just before bed so that in a way, he is present for storytime.

The life of a military spouse is undeniably challenging. By the USO fostering community and providing connection sources, military spouses can feel supported and empowered.

A McDonald's in Connecticut sells the Big Mac combo meal – a sandwich, fries and soft drink – for 17.59. The location wasn't in an airport, either.

I was a customer at the same car insurance company for more than 20 years. I have a good driving record and a 12-year-old car, but I got an \$800-ayear rate increase for my loyalty. The company told me it's because the cost of repairing and replacing cars has increased, so it passed those costs to its customers. I asked why reckless drivers weren't responsible for the extra costs. I didn't get an answer.

So, I pushed back. I changed companies. I'm contemplating doing the same with cable television.

Those of us with AT&T's U-verse or DirecTV took our local NBA and ABC broadcasts off the air for six weeks. Tenga Inc. owns channels 12 and 25 here, and according to AT&T, it dropped the stations because Tenga wanted more money. That meant fans with DirecTV couldn't watch the Jacksonville-Baltimore game on Sunday Night Football because it was on NBC.

Also, local subscribers of DISH Network haven't been able to watch FOX30 since November 2022 because station owner Cox Media Group wanted more money.

Tenga was originally part of Gannett Company. Tenga/Gannett has \$3 billion in revenues. AT&T acquired DirecTV in 2015, and together they have more than \$67 billion in revenues. Cox has annual revenues of \$21 billion, while DISH is worth \$3.08 billion.

And customers were caught in the middle of the money grab.

Last Saturday, NBC pushed its firstround playoff game between Kansas City and Miami to its streaming service, Peacock. The collective seething over the payper-view format came on the same day Tenga and DirecTV settled their stalemate.

More than 20 years ago, Eartha Kitt famously said, "Greed is so destructive. It destroys everything."

Things have changed since Kitt made that comment. Sadly, one thing never changes – greed.

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GCSPD Chief E.J. Guzman completes 'Yellow Brick Road'

10-week FBI training academy includes 6.1-mile advanced obstacle course

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – E.J. Guzman

knows what it takes to be a good cop. The stars on his uniform and the keepsakes on his office walls and shelves confirm that.

But his mission to learn more about police work doesn't stop.

Since joining the Green Cove Springs Police Department 20 years ago, he has been a patrol officer, street crimes and field training officer, instructor and detective with the county-wide drug and vice task force. He has overseen Criminal Investigations, Communications, Accreditation and Training, School Resource Officers, Records and Evidence.

He achieved the rank of sergeant and then lieutenant. The city council appointed him the Acting Chief of Police following the death of Derek Asdot in 2021. Three months later, the council officially put him in charge of the agency that regularly handles more than 55,000 calls a year.

Despite achieving the highest rank at his agency, Guzman recently attended Class 287 at the FBI National Academy for three months to broaden his law enforcement skills. The academy in Quantico, Virginia, is the same facility where the FBI trains its new special agents and intelligence analysts.

"It's top-tier training, right? It's the FBI," Guzman said. "This course is renowned worldwide for its caliber. What it offers is really three things. It offers education through the FBI, normally through former or current FBI agents, and then it offers guest speakers from all aspects of law enforcement and public safety. And then the last thing it offers is networking because you are meeting top-level enforcement officials from all over the country and worldwide."

It also includes completing a 6.1-mile advanced obstacle course set up by the U.S. Marines. The grueling run includes climbing walls, running through creeks,



jumping through simulated windows, scaling rock faces with ropes, crawling under barbed wire in muddy water and maneuvering on cargo nets. Those who make it to the finish line leave with one of the most cherished tokens of law enforcement - a Yellow Brick Road Brick.

"That was the toughest part of the academy," Guzman said. "Not everyone made it because you have to qualify through other runs. Some people who went to the academy couldn't make the mile run in the allotted time, so they weren't able to do the course. They got a certificate for completing the educational portion of the program. But they won't get the brick right behind me that everyone seeks."

Guzman keeps his brick on a table behind his desk.

"It's a big deal," he said. "I knew I was going to make it based on my time runs. I did pretty well. Now, I had no doubt that the Yellow Brick Road was going to be tough."

According to the FBI, the academy immersed Guzman in coursework in intelligence theory, terrorism and terrorist

mindset, management science, law, behavioral science, law enforcement communication and forensic science to improve the administration of justice in local police departments.

Guzman said he believes the training will benefit everyone who carries a badge in Green Cove Springs.

"Absolutely, having good training has a ripple effect if you share what you've learned," he said.

Guzman said he's now focused on earn-



ing his Master's degree in management at the University of Florida.

"It's very similar to an MBA, and it's really tough," he said. "I started off taking three classes at a time, and then I dropped down to two classes. Then, I dropped down to one class when I got into this role (as police chief). Although I scaled back in my classes, I only have a few more classes left."

After that, E.J. Guzman will probably start looking for another challenge.

Former Superintendent Charlie Van Zant to run Keystone Heights

City Council picks 'Hometown boy' as its City Manager

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Despite admitting he lacked a background in running a city, the City Council decided former Clay County Schools Superintendent Charlie Van Zant's deep roots in the city were more valuable than experience.

The council voted, 3-2, on Jan. 3 to offer the job to Van Zant following the resignation of Lynn Rutkowski. He signed his contract and was on the job Tuesday, Jan. 9.

Three councilmen, including Tony Brown, who called Van Zant a "hometown boy," voted to approve Van Zant's appointment. The two councilwomen voted "no" to support former Redington Shores Town Administrator Jeff Shoobridge.

Van Zant was a combat pilot in Iraq and Afghanistan for the U.S. Army before serving 14 years on the Clay County School Board and four as the Superintendent of Schools. However, he's never worked in city government.

"They won't find anyone who cares more about this city, Keystone Heights, or this community," Van Zant told the council. "I won't be outworked. You won't ever have to come in and wonder if you need to help me do my job. I'd like the guidance to clarify your vision and purpose. You and the citizens of Keystone Heights can expect me to execute that with fidelity all the way until it's complete, or I have to come back to you and ask for more resources, whether that be time, money or other governmental agencies waiting."

Before making the decision, the council asked Rutkowski one final time to reconsider her decision to leave on Wednesday, Jan. 10. councilwoman Christine Thompson motioned to give Rutkowski at least a \$10,000 a year raise and a city-owned car for official business.

Before voting, the council asked Rutkowski if she would accept the offer. "I appreciate the consideration," she said. "Resigning from my position as city manager was one of the most difficult decisions I've made. Before all of the social media stuff that happened, the decision was made to resign. I did waver back and forth on whether or not it was the best decision for me because I love this job. And there's no doubt about that. And I think that all of you, and prior council members, can probably see that. If not, then I haven't done my job well. However, I do believe that it is time for me to go.

"So, I appreciate all counsel and your consideration; however, I'm going to have to say no."

Brown said, "At least we tried."

The council then spent more than four hours interviewing the final three candidates – Elmon Lee Garner, Shoobridge and Van Zant. Then, they narrowed the choice to Shoobridge and Van Zant. Apparently, Van Zant's ties to the community – he played football and graduated from Keystone Heights High – impressed all three councilmen.

"I've known Charlie since he was a kid," Brown said. "That's the benefit of being in a small town. I've watched him grow from being a kid playing football."

Van Zant lost his re-election for Superintendent to Addison Davis in 2016 and then to David Broskie in 2020.

"I'm just going to be honest with you guys. I will take some heat from some people because there are people who hold grudges and issues that have happened in the past when Mr. Van Zant was school board superintendent," Brown said. "They can't get over it. I've gotten over it, so I don't know why they can't get over it."

Brown also addressed Van Zant's lack of experience in a municipality setting.

"Does he have an experience in a municipality? No. He's got more experience than any of these other candidates in the way of his background and leadership," he said.

Van Zant said he would earn city management certifications from the Florida League of Cities and the Florida City and County Management Association.

"If I were offered this position, I plan to call a few city managers in the same situations with likewise budgets and constituent groups, and ask which courses helped the most first, and start there," Van Zant said.

"I'll make a commitment to you to be involved in those and get whatever certifications are necessary to learn the nuances of city government."

The council then debated the merits and faults.

Mayor Nina Rodenroth said he liked the opportunity to hire someone who could bring fresh ideas to the city.

"It comes down to outsider versus insider," she said. "It's great to have those relationships, but I think it's good to have someone from the outside come in right now. New lives on the street, a new face in the town. Let's see where that takes us." "In my view, Charlie is head and shoul-

ders ..." Councilman Steve Hart trailed off.

"He's shown me sometimes actions speak louder than words, that he wants to do his job, but he wants to do it right," said Councilman Dan Lewandowski.



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Rutkowski content with new life away from city government

Former city manager has no regrets following her resignation

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The morning after she turned the keys to the city over to her successor at city hall, Lynn Rutkowski still got up at 5 a.m. and started getting ready for a job she no longer has.

She drove past city hall and noticed a different car parked in a spot that was no longer hers.

That night, she went to bed without a headache, knowing the challenges of running Keystone Heights weren't her responsibility any longer.

"It's different, for sure," she said.

After serving Keystone Heights for nearly 11½ years as the city clerk, interim city manager and city manager, Rutkowski decided to leave city politics and start a new chapter in her career. For now, she's decompressing and not thinking about any of her options.

"I want to take some time off and rest and get out of the city manager vibe," she said. "Maybe by February, I will start gearing up again and considering the things I'm passionate about. I'm good with my decision. I'm sure I'll resurface next month."

Rutkowski was hired in 2012 as the city clerk. She served as the interim city manager after Scott Kornegay retired in 2020 before the city council hired her a few days later as the full-time replacement. The council also decided not to replace the city clerk's position.

With a 3-2 vote, the city picked former school superintendent Charlie Van Zant on Jan. 3 from a pool of 13 candidates to replace Rutkowski. The council also hired a new city clerk last month. Instead of arriving to work before sunrise and leaving after sunset, Rutkowski said she is learning to adjust to a new schedule. "My son (Jacob) and I sat down and watched the hockey game the first night after I left, and during the intermission, he said it was the first time my phone didn't ring while we were doing something," she said. "That made me think. I got a lot done on my first day. There's certainly a transition, but it's nice to come home without a headache."

Her time at city hall came during a critical juncture for Keystone Heights. Like the rest of the world, it endured the struggles associated with the pandemic. Rutkowski convinced the city council and the Board of County Commissioners to spend nearly \$750,000 of CARES Act money to rebuild the Keystone Beach Pavillion for food distribution.

"Without a question, I'm very proud of what we accomplished with the Pavillion," she said. "Years ago, it was a shell of a building. We were able to bring in climate control and refrigeration. Now, it's rented just about every weekend. There are a lot of functions there."

Rutkowski also played a leading role in developing a Master Plan to get ahead of growth. There currently are 496 homes in the city, but there are plans to build as many as 500 more on a 13.88-acre sight off Sunrise Boulevard and nearly 37 acres at Fox Run Road.

"If that happens, the number of homes inside the city limits will double," she said. "That's a lot. You have to think about the water supply, traffic, parks and other infrastructure projects. These new developments will be geared toward new families, so you must get ahead of them."

A couple of residents used social media to criticize Rutkowski's work, especially the Smart City Initiative. They claim the project will use sensors to provide realtime information on things like local flooding, downed trees and traffic problems and will be used to "spy" on residents. They claimed modernizing its services would

"The only way I know how to do thin was my way," Rutkowski said.

Some on the council didn't want to lose that doggedness. They asked if she would rescind the resignation on the same day they interviewed the final three candidates. She declined.

She's ready to move on, although precisely what that means isn't clear.

Their first recipient was Nancy Scherer, the first woman Clay County Sheriff's Office deputy who fell three months behind on her rent while she dealt with several medical issues.

you, being disabled," Scherer said. Initially, she just dealt with the sudden pain until it got to be too much.

"It got to the point where I could hear crunching. And it got worse. That's when I went to a foot specialist," Scherer said.

Scherer said she was diagnosed with a condition that results in a lack of cartilage between the bones in her knee and ankle. Not being able to walk without assistance from a walker or crutches, Scherer struggled to make ends meet. And, with Scherer unable to continue working, her income was limited, leaving her plagued with the pressure of paying her bills.

"I've got your bills. Your rent, car payment, your food, credit cards, house insurance, etcetera," Scherer said. "I found myself in a big dilemma."

With no family around to help, Scherer said she eventually succumbed to the pressure and nearly faced being evicted. Scherer said that moment left her feeling lost and depressed. "I was sitting in a chair thinking, 'Well, what am I going to put in my car that I can keep when I get evicted,'" Scherer said.

Scherer began finding ways to stay afloat. Along with help from her daughter and a friend, Scherer said she began finding household antiques and coins to sell on Marketplace as a temporary solution.

"That's how I've gotten by. The grace of God just is it. First, having a lot of expensive jewelry helped a lot. Just really cutting down on food, cutting down on buying things. Just cutting corners everywhere I could look," Scherer said.

Amid her struggles, Scherer said she has always been reluctant to ask for help. She insisted on finding her own solutions.

"I don't like to ask for things. I'm not one that will say, "Oh, I need this. I need that.' I will do without until it gets to the breaking point where I have no choice [but] to ask," Scherer said.

Scherer said that a stubborn and independent mindset came from being in law enforcement for a large portion of her life.

Because of her time as a Clay County deputy, Scherer said she had the opportunity to endure many impactful experiences and meet many influential faces. Two of which would help to change the trajectory of her future circumstances.

Scherer said Sheriff Michelle Cook and her senior executive assistant, Denise Flak, became her guardian angels. Flak and Cook introduced her to the Signal 35 Fund, which was launched early last year.

Headed by a local group of community members, the nonprofit was created to provide aid and funding to county first responders in need. The name Signal 35 comes from the county's radio call code for "officer needs assistance."

After hearing about Scherer's situation, Cook asked Signal 35 for help. As a result, Scherer became the first official recipient of the funding.

"The fund did exactly what it was intended to do: it helped support a Clay County first responder who was in need," Cook said.

The funding was a saving grace after reaching out to many charities without suc-

cess. With its help, Scherer said her rent was paid for three consecutive months.

"You have no idea what a relief that was," Scherer said.

In addition, Scherer said Flak brought her supplies and food bought with donations.

"We were able to give her the check from the Signal 35 foundation, but she was just shocked that somebody would help her to keep from being homeless," Flak said.

Signal 35 is a private nonprofit that operates solely on donations. It helps county fire and rescue, law enforcement and corrections officers, 911 dispatchers, fire and arson investigators, forensics personnel, flight medics, retirees, recruits, cadets and family members.

Scherer said she continues to be grateful for the help. She added the experience taught her how to appreciate all she has.

"I see a lot of need to help more people. We have not really addressed the problem with people with disabilities as much as they need to be," Scherer said.

But, even with the help, Scherer said she would soon return to the same predicament. With it being January, Scherer said her rent payments and struggles will resume, and she will be back at Square 1.

Originally, Scherer had hoped to complete her surgery in early December to give her enough time to recover while preparing to find a job. However, her surgery was canceled and rescheduled to last week.

"I was thinking I'd already be into a month of recovery by this time, and I could go back to work," she said.

Scherer said her daughter set up a Go-FundMe account to help her. As of now, Scherer is just waiting it out. She is hoping for the best after her surgery.

"I've resolved that I might have to live in my car with my dog. If I can't get enough for rent for the next couple of months, I'll be living in my car," Scherer said.

She said she will keep fighting and hopes others in similar situations will do the same.

"Don't give up. Things will get better, eventually. Look at it as a hurdle, not a curse," she said.

MLK Day speakers share their stories fighting for civil rights

Hundreds of residents celebrated the historic legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. last Monday at events at Advent Lutheran Church, Vera Francis Hall Park in Green Cove Springs and Oakleaf High. Here are highlights of each:

ORANGE PARK – When Dr. Leroy "Zke" Zimmerman stepped to the Advent Lutheran Church podium during the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Prayer Breakfast last Monday, the aroma of sizzling meats and freshly brewed coffee filled the parish hall.

Zimmerman recounted a notable moment in his stance on civil rights and equality. It was one month before the famous 1963 March on Washington.

The river that flowed through his hometown was the ideal place to cool off during the muggy summer months. However, the natural wonder was a symbol of the inequality of racism. Upriver was a whitesonly section; downriver was Blacks-only, Zimmerman said.

Inspired by the civil rights leaders who paved the way, Zimmerman and nine other young Black men marched upstream with a demonstration permit with them.

"A girl approached me and spat on my face. But I did not move. I stood there at the river until it closed," he said.

Zimmerman was arrested two days later. The police officer who was transporting him was inspired.

"The officer turned around and said, 'You shocked everybody. We thought you were going to slap her into next week, but you didn't,'" Zimmerman said.

"That day (on the river), we gained a lot of respect from everyone in our community."

Dr. Michael Henry: 'Reflection is a part of history'

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Dr. Michael Henry was once classmates with Mayor Connie Butler. He couldn't help but remi-

nisce over fond memories. His father taught science at Dunbar High (now R.C. Bannerman Learning Center), which was designated as the all-black high school during segregation.

As a Black man with family from the South, Henry recounted how his ancestors suffered from violent racism during Jim Crow. It is still painful to him, but Henry stressed the importance of never forgetting one's history.

"Reflection is a part of remembering. There are those who want us to forget," Henry said.

Ten months ago, Henry's family was contacted by a professor from the University of Central Florida. As Henry stayed on the line, he realized that the call would not be pleasant. Henry said the words that

the professor said over the phone were traumatic. The professor had just linked a lynching that occurred in 1925 to Henry's family tree.

Arthur Henry was murdered on the eve of Thanksgiving.

"There are those who don't want us to remember or reflect on our history and our struggle. And the struggle continues." Henry said. "We stand on the shoulders of giants and did not get here ourselves."

Henry honored Arther Henry, Martin Luther King Jr., and all those who sacrificed their lives to pursue freedom and equality.

"Only through sacrifice will justice be achieved."

Vice Adm. David Brewer said America has the ability to chart new course

OAKLEAF – Retired Vice Admiral David Brewer watched the civil rights movement evolve from the late 1950s. He lived in an area of Central Florida where his parents could vote, although this was not the norm in the South. From a young age, he knew better than to take that freedom for granted.

"My parents could vote. They had a voice," Brewer said.

Brewer shared his perspective on the civil rights movement, which had economic and political sides. Many of the same struggles from the Civil Rights Era are still felt today. Progress has not been a straight line. Progress is more like a sine wave. Despite our problems – and because we have the freedom to think for ourselves and the ability to stand up for others – we get it right eventually, he said.

Brewer shared a fitting analogy from the Navy.

"America is like a ship. We have weathered through many storms in our history," he said.

Our nation is like a ship, and every election allows us, the constituents, to chart the next course. There are many hands on the helm, and there will be many more. The youth will one day lead us," he said.

'Got Sneakers' gains footing to support Isaiah Carrasco's plight

ORANGE PARK – A message that transcends tragedy and exemplifies the strength of unity, the "Isaiah Strong" fundraiser from Got Sneakers, a zero-waste sneaker recycling organization, allows users to raise money.

The fundraiser started in September in honor of 17-year-old Isaiah Carrasco as he fights daily toward recovery from a tragic accident.

In a single-car accident 19 months ago, on June 12, 2022, Carrasco lost control of his vehicle. The car was crushed, and he was in critical condition after sustaining a diffuse axonal injury (DAI).

Carrasco regained consciousness after the accident, which is exceptionally rare for someone who suffers a coma from a DIA. After that victory, and as the months went by, he continued to learn mobility and communication, showing signs of improvement.

As Carrasco seeks to finish the course, the growing sneaker donation fundraising program serves a three-part purpose: helping pay medical expenses for his family, providing shoes to those in need and eliminating waste from local landfills.

Shoes are being collected at several businesses in Clay County, including Rock Star Nail Salon in Orange Park, Tony's Pizza and Martial Arts in Middleburg, KinderCare on Fleming Island, Bargain Boutique in Or-



St. Luke Catholic Church Child Care in Middleburg got creative with their donation box, where residents can drop off used sneakers.

ange Park, and Lakeside Junior High.

The Orange Park Campus of the Business Club of the St. Johns River State College also joined the effort.

"I think (the decision made by the OPC Business Club and St. Johns River State College) to put out the boxes builds community. It helps college kids (further) understand the importance of giving back and working hard for each other," said DeAnn Burgess, advisor for Clay County Changemakers, who is playing a crucial role in heading the operation honoring Carrasco and his family.

Burgess said it's easy to join the cause.

"When shoes enter the box, that location calls us, and we come to pick them up," Burgess said.

She said they could continue to fight for Isaiah. If not, the volunteers will find another location in the Oakleaf area to donate.

Burgess said the initiative is significant. "It just shows that a lot of people want to participate and give back. We've had a lot of people just say, 'I've got a bag with a lot of sneakers in it. The sneakers don't even have to make it to the box. You can call us, and we will go pick them up for you," she said. As a bonus, non-sneaker shoes people would like to give away will be donated to people in need.

"We're just hoping and praying for Isaiah's strong recovery. And we should all recognize the importance of helping one another because traumatic brain injuries can happen to anyone at any time," Burgess said.

Burgess has big goals for the fundraiser this year.

"I believe the 'Isaiah Strong' fundraiser can grow even more, and a lot of people are already aware of (this fundraiser)," she said.

Burgess has already sent out more than 17 bags filled with used sneakers to GotSneakers, and she has six more that will also soon be given to the nonprofit.

"These boxes just continue to fill and fill," she said.

"Giving back to the county community is extremely important. There are a lot of needs and initiatives like the 'Isaiah Strong' GotSneakers fundraiser, which empowers people to give back. Bachelor Nation has a new idol in Joey Graziadei. First introduced to the franchise in Season 20 of "The Bachelorette," the 28-yearold is back for a second chance at love when Season 28 of "The Bachelor" premieres Monday, Jan. 22, on ABC.

A teaching tennis professional from Koloa, Hawaii, Graziadei first melted hearts on television with his near-winning stint in Charity Lawson's season of "The Bachelorette." One of two final matches for the leading lady, Graziadei left the show broken-hearted — and took the sympathies of many viewers with him - when Lawson chose Dotun Olubeko over him, leaving Graziadei as the season's runner-up.

But the heartthrob wasn't without prospective partners for long — during the "After the Show" special for the Season 27 finale, "The Bachelor" host Jesse Palmer introduced Graziadei to Lea Cayanen, a fellow Hawaiian and future contestant this season. While Cayanan was brought on the aftershow as somewhat of a teaser for things to come, Graziadei hardly



has to choose someone from his state - some 32 women await him, as announced by ABC on Sept. 16 of this year.

Among them are Zoe Antona (24), Rachel Nance (26), Allison Hollinger (26), Autumn Waggoner (26), Chandler Dewgard (24), Edwina Dorber (25), Evalin Clark (28), Erika Cardenas (25), Jennifer Tran (25), Katelyn DeBacker (26), Jessica Edwards (24), Kyra Brusch (26), Kelsey Anderson (25), Lauren Hollinger (28), Lexi Young (30), Marlena Haddad (26), Starr Skyler (25), Sandra Rabadi (26) and Sydney Gordon (28).

The youngest contestants this season are 23-year-olds Lea Cayanan, Taylor Wiens and Talyah Jackson. Los Angeles native Kelsey Toussant, meanwhile, joins Samantha Hale and Madina Alam at the top of the age range, all at 31.

Most notable among the women vying for the new bachelor's affections, however, would likely have to be 25-year-old Lincoln, Nebraska, beauty queen Samantha Washington. The daughter of retired NFL safety Brian Washington, who ended his career with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1996 after eight years in the league, Samantha has NFL ties herself, as a professional cheerleader for the Miami Dolphins. Looks like this potential connection could be rife with sports conversation.

Graziadei also flaunts some of his Canadian ties this season, bringing cameras north of the border to Montreal. Rumor has it Season 28 also filmed at Alberta's Fairmont Jasper Park last October — a site that was previously arranged for Season 17 of "The Bachelorette" but was canned due to ongoing travel restrictions (presumably due to COVID-19) imposed by the Canadian government.

According to an August 2023 news release from ABC, "Graziadei is looking for a life partner who is outgoing, caring and shares his love for adventure and exploring the outdoors." The article also notes that "he loves hiking,

surfing and ending his days watching the sunset," but it makes sure to mention that "he has much more love to give, and the only thing missing is someone with whom to share his life."

As the newest bachelor, Graziadei hopes to find all of this in one lucky, hopeful contestant. Having already been prepared to propose at least once in his life — to former Bachelorette Lawson — seasoned fans already know that the Season 28 star is ready to find the one and focus on their future together. A child of divorce himself (Graziadei shared the story of his father's coming out and his parents' subsequent split with Lawson and Palmer during the 'Bachelorette" aftershow in August), Graziadei has since wished for someone with whom he can truly be himself, but he never expected it would lead to such a dramatic televised journey.

This is crazy," Graziadei told Palmer following "The Bachelorette" Season 20's final rose ceremony. "I never expected this at all. I never knew this is what my life was turning into."

Hot commodity: 'Superhot' searches for world's hottest pepper

From director Brian Skope ("Ranch to Table," 2021), "Superhot: The Spicy World of Pepper People" premieres Monday, Jan. 22, on Hulu.

This limited, 10-episode docuseries brings the heat, narrated by funnyman Ben Schwartz ("Parks and Recreation"), who takes viewers on a quest for the spiciest of spices. "'Superhot' is a wild ride into the Spicy World of Pepper People — the self-proclaimed chili heads who have taken the chili pill and want to find out how deep the rabbit hole goes," Hulu describes.

"This 10-part series goes deep into a subculture fueled by spice: from the elite growers who strive to create new superhots to the chili eaters who chase the endorphin rush of consuming them. Along the way, one legendary chili head sets out on a quest to answer the spiciest of questions." The platform asks: "is there a pepper that can challenge the world's hottest?"

"Pepperheads" will know that the Carolina Reaper held this spicy title for years, only to be recently dethroned by the tongue-burning chili Pepper X for 2023's Guinness World Records. According to the records, the Reaper pepper clocked in at 1.64 million Scoville heat units — SHU, a measurement of the pungency or "spiciness" of a pepper's heat — while this new, green, bell-shaped pepper boasted an impressively hot 2.69 million SHU.

Developed by American chemist Wilbur Scoville in 1912, this measurement — the Scoville scale — aims to classify the concentration of capsaicinoids, which are said to cause the heat that comes off peppers. While subjective, Scoville's scale is derived from the average capsaicinoid sensitivity people experience while eating specific hot chilis. The average jalapeno pepper, for example, scores an average between 3,000 and 8,000 on the Scoville scale, meaning this new pepper is almost 900 times hotter than its more common cousin.

Both the Carolina Reaper and Pepper X were grown by Puckerbutt Pepper Company founder Ed Currie on his farm in South Carolina. According to an article published by CNN: "Ed cultivated Pepper X on his farm for over 10 years,

"Inspired by the World of Disney and Pixar's 'A Bug's Life,' the new Disney+ Original series from National Geographic, 'A Real Bug's Life,' is an incredible adventure into nine different micro bug worlds around the globe, where the forces of nature play out on a miniature scale and where tiny creatures rely on amazing powers and extraordinary alliances to make it through each day," shared a recent release from Disney and National Geographic.

"With new developments in filming technology and narrated by fun and witty guide Awkwafina," they continue, "follow the incredible stories of the tiny heroes living in worlds beyond the imagination — from a jumping spider looking for a home on the streets of New York to a Costa Rican orchid bee's first day on the job making perfume! Full of mind-blowing new behaviors and larger-than-life characters, this family-friendly series shows that 'A Real Bug's Life' can be every bit as fantastical as any animated film."

As the series travels from the African savanna to your own backyard, National Geographic promises that each episode will immerse viewers within a microcosm, where "tiny yet extraordinary creatures rely on their mighty abilities to make it through the day."

During the docuseries' first episode, called "The Big City," the team treks their high-tech cameras to the concrete jungle of New York City, where they "join a male jumping spider as he battles for real estate, a voracious fly as it dodges death, and cockroaches that emerge from a secret 'bugway' under cover of darkness. In the concrete jungle, only the streetwise can hustle for a living."

From there, episodes swing from the rainforests of Latin America, where newly



cross-breeding it with some of his hottest peppers to increase its capsaicin content." Whether it remains the highest mark on Scoville's scale — well, "Superhot" plans to find out. From paprika to jalapeno poppers, to Currie's Pepper X, explore a world of explosive flavor when all 10 episodes of "Superhot: The Spicy World of Pepper People" make their streaming debut Monday, Jan. 22, on Hulu.

moviereview by Jay BOBBIN **'Titanic' sets sail again on Showtime**

The basic story had been told earlier in other films and television projects, but even though it matches a fictional romance to facts of the ocean disaster, the Oscar-winning 1997 version of "Titanic" is the definitive one for many people.

Being presented by Showtime on Sunday, Jan. 21, writer-director James Cameron's epic is a beautifully structured saga that cleverly takes the audience from contemporary times — as a treasure hunter (Bill Paxton) and his colleagues scour the ship's sunken wreckage — back to its maiden voyage in 1912, when it was launched with much pomp and circumstance.

Various passengers are introduced, including the allegedly "unsinkable" Molly Brown (played here by Kathy Bates), but two key characters are the ones who came to matter most to the vast majority of moviegoers: privileged Rose and stowaway Jack, roles that elevated the highly charismatic-together Kate Winslet and Leonardo DiCaprio to superstardom. (Their later reteaming in "Revolutionary Road" surely was a bid to benefit from their iconic teamwork here, good as they also are in that picture.)

"YOUR LUCKY DAY"

A hugely valuable lottery ticket is at the crux of a hostage situation in writer-director Daniel Brown's melodrama, set on Christmas Eve ... which could explain why the distributor waited an extra month to release it on home video. A convenience store is the setting as the tension mounts, with each of those present having to decide what they would do for a share of the winning jackpot. The ensemble cast includes Angus Cloud, Elliot Knight, Jessica Garza, Sterling Beaumon, Spencer Garrett and "Third Watch" and "Beverly Hills, 90210" alum Jason Wiles. *** (R: AS, P, V) (Also on Blu-ray and On Demand)

"KINDERGARTEN COP"

One of Arnold Schwarzenegger's most accessible-for-all-ages makes its 4K Ultra HD debut, as the 1990 action-comedy casts him as an undercover police detective who poses as a schoolteacher to track a murderer (Richard Tyson). Directed by Ivan Reitman, the picture has its tougher moments, but it also has lots of humor as Schwarzenegger's character proves to be a fish out of water in dealing with youngsters in the classroom. (Among the kids is Odette Yustman, who grew up to be the actress currently known as Odette Annable.) Pamela Reed is enjoyable as the cop's sarcastic partner, Penelope Ann Miller is a fellow teacher and romantic interest, and Linda Hunt plays the school principal. Carroll Baker, Cathy Moriarty and (briefly) Angela Bassett also appear. * (PG: ÁS, P, V) (Also on DVD and Blu-ray)

From evading Rose's spurned and vengeful fiance Cal (Billy Zane) to navigating blocked and/or flooded passageways, the couple's experience aboard the Titanic turns into an endless series of perils ... ultimately enhancing and fusing their affection for each other, to the point where the legendary phrase "T'll never let go" is much more than lip service.

For as personal as the Jack-and-Rose story is, the production that surrounds them is massive and impressive, certainly justifying the 11 Academy Award wins that included best picture and best director (and making for what was one of the highest-rated Oscar telecasts to date, since so many observers were invested in how the movie fared in that ceremony). Cameron united Paramount Pictures and 20th Century Fox together to finance the project, and the result is stunning visually, particularly in scenes of the ocean liner in its final throes.

One note about the music, since some viewers are bound to come back to the film for a certain part of it: The hugely popular "Titanic" theme song "My Heart Will Go On," composed by James Horner and Will Jennings and performed by Celine Dion, plays only over the closing credits.

Over 25 years after its release, "Titanic" remains a singular screen experience, the type that always will have a large and loyal base of devotees. And despite the many TV showings it's had (and its recent debut in the 4K Ultra HD home-video format), such viewership potential undoubtedly gives Showtime confidence in running it again.

"THINNER: COLLECTOR'S EDITION"

An overweight lawyer, played by Robert John Burke (and a succession of body suits), suffers the title curse in director and co-screenwriter Tom Holland's effective 1996 version – available in a new Blu-ray release – of a Stephen King novel (which the horror icon wrote under the pseudonym Richard Bachman). The lawyer accidentally kills a woman with his car, and her grieving father then speaks a curse that makes the driver begin losing pounds at a very noticeable and ultimately alarming rate. Hoping to get his apparent fate canceled before it's too late, he asks a underworld-connected former client (Joe Mantegna) for help. King has a cameo role in a cast that also includes Lucinda Jenney, Bethany Joy Lenz (before she started TV's "One Tree Hill"), Michael Constantine and Kari Wuhrer. *** (R: AS, P, V)

"JENNIFER 8"

Now getting a Blu-ray release, writer-director Bruce Robinson's 1992 melodrama gave Andy Garcia one of his first top-billed movie roles as a personally troubled detective who takes on the cold case of a murdered woman ... one of several blind victims who may have been targeted by a serial killer. Uma Thurman plays the also-sightless roommate of the most recent victim, and her eventual romantic involvement with the sleuth complicates an investigation that already is complex enough. Lance Henriksen, Kathy Baker, Kevin Conway and John Malkovich also are featured; the striking cinematography is by veteran cameraman Conrad Hall ("Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid"). Interestingly, the British cut of the film was almost 20 minutes shorter. *** (R: AS, N, P, V))Also on DVD)

It's been better 'Late' than never for Stephen Colbert

Q: When a talk show is without its host at the last minute, as happened with Stephen Colbert recently, why isn't a guest host brought in rather than have repeat episodes scheduled? – Tim Donnelly, via e-mail

A: Though Jimmy Kimmel has been taking summers off from his ABC show with guest hosts subbing for him, it's become the norm for the hosts whose names are in the shows' titles to remain the ones seen behind the desks, new episodes or not. There's a consistency that comes from that, and with the rivalry as it is between Kimmel, CBS's Colbert and NBC's Jimmy Fallon — friends though they are off-camera — that's very important to



maintaining audience loyalty in an age where there's already sufficient viewership fragmentation. Late-night viewers were accustomed to seeing repeats for much of 2023, given the Hollywood strikes that prevented production of new episodes for some time. It's always preferable to have something tresh to present, but in a situation such as Colbert and the surgery he needed for his appendix (which came after another bout with COVID-19 for him), life sometimes overrides the best intentions professionally.

Q: I recently saw "Youngblood" with Rob Lowe and Patrick Swayze on cable. Didn't they make another movie together? – Danielle Scott, Colorado Springs, Colo.

A: They certainly did, and it's widely regarded as a modern classic. Three years before they made the 1986 hockey drama "Youngblood," the two actors were in the ensemble cast of the Francis Ford Coppola-directed drama "The Outsiders," based on the popular young-adult novel by S.E. Hinton. They played brothers in the story of Oklahoma youths trying to find their way in their socially separated locality.

"The Outsiders" is famous as a launching pad for many young talents of that time. Also in the group were Tom Cruise, Emilio Estevez, Matt Dillon, Ralph Macchio, C. Thomas Howell and Diane Lane. It's interesting that an appeal from a Fresno, California, school librarian and many of the school's students inspired Coppola to consider making the movie; a short-lived Fox TV-series version followed in 1990.

Q: It was fun to see Tina Fey and Candice Bergen welcome Emma Stone to the club of five-time "Saturday Night Live" hosts. Wasn't Bergen one of the very first hosts of the show? – Dana Grant, via e-mail

A: In fact, she was the fourth host, in an episode that aired in November 1975. (George Carlin, Paul Simon and Rob Reiner preceded her.) She evidently fared so well that she also was the eighth host, returning for another stint the following month. Bergen eventually became the founding female member of what has become known as "The Five-Timers Club" on "SNL," which she achieved in 1990.

Q: I keep reading conflicting things about whether there will be another "Psych" movie. Will there be? – Chris Lewis, Buffalo, N.Y.

A: Péacock — which has the corner on making new chapters of the franchise now — reportedly has been developing another one, which would be the fourth, and star James Roday Rodriguez has said one of the major challenges is in getting schedules to match up so that it actually can be filmed. The strikes by writers and actors last year complicated the timeline even more, but the ongoing popularity of the repeats of the original series confirm that fans still show up for it ... as they likely will for another "Psych" spinoff film.

Man back behind bars for using drugs during probation counseling program

ORANGE PARK - A man on probation after being convicted of a series of felonies is back behind bars after he admitted to using drugs during court-ordered residen-

tial and communitybased prison diversion

Joshua Paul Roberson, 41, of Orange Park, now faces charges he violated the terms of his release for 21 counts of dealing in stolen property and one count each of grand theft and burglary. The inci-

dents happened between 2014 and 2019, according to courthouse records.

According to the arrest reports, Roberson pleaded guilty to stealing several items from his grandparents and pawing them or selling them to a gold shop to support his drug habit. He was sentenced to eight years, with four years suspended, in prison in April 2019, followed by three years of drug offender probation. He also was required to submit to random drug testing at the probation office and complete the Crossroad Program. According to the Jan. 13 arrest report, a drug test at his probation office showed amphetamine and methamphetamine in his system. He was kicked out of the Crossroads Program for "a pattern of behavior that sets a negative consequence for the community." He later admitted to using drugs at Crossroads.

Roberson will be in front of Judge Steven B. Whittington on Feb. 20. Until then, he will remain in the Clay County Jail without bond.

federal court of conspiring to distribute over 100 kilograms of marijuana.

An indictment is merely a formal charge that a defendant has committed one or more violations of federal criminal law, and every defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

This is another case uncovered through the FBI's National Instant Criminal Background Check System. All NICS denials are reported to federal law enforcement and are reviewed daily for potential criminal prosecution. Federal law makes it a felony offense to make a false statement to a firearms dealer when trying to purchase

a gun. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives investigated the case. Assistant U.S. Attorney Frank Talbot is prosecuting it.

The case is part of Project Safe Neighborhoods, a program bringing together all levels of law enforcement and the communities they serve to reduce violent crime and gun violence and make neighborhoods

safer. On May 26, 2021, the Department launched a violent crime reduction strategy strengthening PSN based on these core principles: fostering trust and legitimacy in our communities, supporting community-based organizations that help prevent violence from occurring in the first place, setting focused and strategic enforcement priorities and measuring the results.
