County receives 107 animals surrendered from Middleburg home

Dogs, cats examined; most deemed in good shape

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Frightened and confused dogs slowly appeared from the back of an animal control truck Tuesday, not realizing their lives were about to change.

Clay County Animal Control workers and volunteers gave each dog – 94 of them – time to adjust to its new surroundings before carefully placing it in a new pen at the Clay County Fairgrounds.

Hours earlier, the animals, including eight six-day-old puppies, were "over-

whelming" a woman at a house in Middleburg. The homeowner called Animal Control last week to voluntarily surrender ownership of the animals. After days of planning, the county examined each animal Tuesday before they were removed to start the process of finding new homes.

In coordination with Clay County Fire Rescue, the Division of Emergency Management, the Sheriff's Office and Animal Services, dozens of cats and dogs will likely find a loving home.

Unlike the seizure of 266 "mistreated" dogs, pigs, chickens, goats, turtles, pigeons, quails, duck and a goose on a lot on Old Middleburg Road in 2021, the county was better prepared to handle the sudden

Agricola: Up-and-coming 'agi-hood' community proposed in Clay

Development of 3,100 acres planned south of Green Cove Springs

CLAY COUNTY – The Agricola family owns 30,000 acres of timberland forests across Florida, but 3,100 acres just south of Green Cove Springs have been set aside for something special.

Christophe Agricola stood underneath a cultivated canopy, looking through rows and rows of planted pine trees, and he envisioned something more. The family sometimes sells timberland to state agencies, investors or existing developers. But not this time.

"We thought we would look into our own property, see what could happen, and (attempt) something that would be better," Agricola said. The Agricola Property is a proposed planned community that aims to be not merely an ambitious project within county lines but a national model for what modern alternative living could look like – featuring the small-town charm and rural culture of Clay County.

According to one presentation, Agricola would be a walkable, self-contained community developed around a village center featuring mixed-use commercial/residential buildings. Pedestrian trails would integrate economic, residential and agricultural districts – forming not merely a neighborhood, but an "agri-hood." It would have its own schools, amenities and

BCC denies rezoning request for proposed Shedd Road development

Developer withdraws plans to build 62 homes on dirt road

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Since last year. residents along Shedd Road have been living in fear. The proposed development to build 62 additional homes nearby threatened their way of life. In their eyes, the development would bring flooding, traffic and pollution. It would mean erasing a beloved rural community, home to people and wildlife. A St. Augustine-based developer, Matthews DCCM representative, responded to criticisms and concerns at last Tuesday's BCC meeting. More importantly, the representative requested to continue the discussion at the Feb. 27 meeting when the property owner would be in town to speak on his behalf.

"The neighbors are very passionate," the representative said, referring to the Shedd Road residents. "We made changes. We are attempting to address these concerns. Hopefully, my client can build his property."

A myriad of concerned residents came out to bring forth those concerns. The residents cited the Planning and Zoning Board's 5-1 decision to deny development.

• "This is not smart growth," said one resident. "Keeping some land agricultural is not a bad thing."

• "This puts our neighborhood and children at risk," said another resident. "There should be no continuance. The answer is obvious."

• "I love playing outside," said a fifthgrader. "The new community will make it harder."

• "You do not improve property by endangering surrounding communities," said another resident.

• "The developer didn't show up (to the HOA meeting) without any notice," said another.

• "We are the original Clay County," said another resident. "Let them build with their current zoning."

• "Does he (the developer) plan on dig-

ging out a new road and installing drainage?"

"We were given a date, not a location," said the representative, referring to the no-show at the HOA meeting. "He wants to build and live in this community," she said.

Vice-Chair Mike Cella was against the continuance. "Many of (these) issues are not going to be solved anytime soon," said Cella. "The developer chose not to be here... Residents have come out meeting after meeting after meeting. It's been hanging over their heads."

"I don't see light at the end of the tunnel," said Chairman Jim Renninger.

The BCC voted 3-2 to deny the continuance. Renninger and Compere were the dissenting votes. With the continuance denied, the representative withdrew the rezoning application.

influx of animals.

"You will remember we had experience with helping pull animals into a central location after the animal seizure a couple of years back, although we had a completely different reason why this one happened," said Mike Ladd, the director of emergency management.

"Some of that organizational memory, that muscle memory, we pulled out a lot of lessons learned and were informed by those. Honestly, we've got a really good partnership with Animal Services. All we had to do was work through some fine details," he said.

According to animal services program manager Courtney Sumner, most of the animals collected were in good shape.

More than a dozen animal services trucks took 13 cats and a few of the dogs to the county's kennel. The rest went to the fairgrounds, where each dog was placed in a pen with fresh food and water.

Ladd praised the woman's difficult decision to call Animal Control.

"The woman realized she couldn't handle it," he said. "And so instead of letting the situation deteriorate where the animals would have gone downhill, they were

rescued and in relatively good shape.

"Without going into specifics, the pet owner communicated that she could no longer care for these animals. She agreed to accept the county's assistance. More personally, I want to personally thank the multiple agencies who have so professionally supported this effort. And most importantly, to her for making a very difficult decision."

The sheriff's office said the woman, who wasn't identified, won't face any charges since she voluntarily surrendered the animals.

Residents, particularly in rural areas, don't need licenses to own animals, Ladd

The plan now is to have many animals adopted at animal services, while the county has reached out to several animal shelters to ensure all of them find new homes

Until they all are in "forever" homes, the county again will ask its residents to help.

In addition to donations at the county's website, claycountygov.com/Home/Components/News, the county needs volunteers to walk the dogs at the fairgrounds. Shifts are from 8 a.m. to noon and noon to 4 p.m.

It also needs slip leads, puppy pads, wet and dry dog food, WypAll, Pup-Peroni, easy cheese, pill pockets, Kongs of assorted sizes, towels, contractor bags and dog waste holders. Those items can be dropped off at the fairgrounds Exhibit Hall 2 during business hours.

The county said it will update its information on when and how the animals can be adopted.

If you want to help or have questions, call (904) 529-4256.

The county also wanted to remind residents its animal services department is ready to help owners through difficult animal ownership decisions during regular business hours. You can also find a list of resources on the county's website to help owners deal with behavioral issues, and it offers pet food assistance.



DAYTONA BEACH – I remember walking down pit road during the 1979 Rolex 24

in the morning. Back then, I had that kind of energy and wonderment about racing twice around the clock. Despite

а deafening roar of more than 50 exotic sportscars,

covered with a sleeping bag or tattered blanket, trying to steal a few minutes of sleep. The top teams splurged and had a crock pot of chili simmering. Others ate bologna sandwiches and candy bars.

Back then, endurance required willpower, sacrifice, strong coffee and horsepower, not a kinesiology and artificial intelligence background.

Forty-six years ago, the racers had hands of stone, each stained by grease and sweat. Now they arrive in Polo shirts and fine Italian shoes.

Nonetheless, it's still the greatest show on wheels.

There's nothing better than the 24hour race at the Daytona International Speedway. It's always been my favorite race of the year; it always will be.

The cars have changed from sportscars you could find in the drive-thru at Dairy Queen to futuristic prototypes from a Jules Verne novel. But the more

it changes, the more it stavs the same.

"The car that usually wins is the one that spends the least amount of time on pit road," Haywood often said.

He should know. He's won America's premier endurance race five times. The driver from St. Augustine also won the 24 Hours of LeMans three times and the 12 Hours of Sebring twice.

A lot has changed since Haywood dominated endurance races. Teams now have massive compounds erected on pit road. WTFAndretti, for example, have four command posts, each outfitted with

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Bruce Friedman's Book Club Review of 'At the End of Everything' by Marieke Nijkamp

Bruce Friedman leads the nation in submitting book challenges. At the last school board meeting, he brought forth a challenge of a new kind.

"If you don't address (the most egregious appeals of books still in circulation) promptly, I'm going to do them one book (at) a time by calling the press. And I'll put all of your names in the story, and the title, and the author, and we'll let the community decide," Friedman said.

"At the End of Everything" by Marieke Nijkamp begins with a content warning before the story starts:

"This book deals with ableism, abuse, death, illness and implied eugenics, imprisonment, transphobia... assault, blood, gunshots, racial profiling, and sexual violence."

Acknowledging and flipping past that, the young adult novel "At the End of Everything" follows the perspective of three children – Logan, Emerson and Grace – at a fictional juvenile rehabilitation center. Logan is autistic and nonverbal. Emerson goes by they/them pronouns.

They and the other children enrolled at the rehabilitation center discover that all the guards have suddenly vanished. After being left behind during the onset of a national pandemic, the children work together to survive a deadly, contagious plague all alone in the deserted rehabilitation center.

Imagine "Lord of the Flies" by William Golding if the setting took place during the COVID-19 pandemic. Like "Heroine" by Mindy McGinnis, this book has been challenged, reapproved by a book review committee and placed back on the shelf for high schoolers. Bruce Friedman has appealed that decision, which is how the procedure for book challenges currently works. However, that may be subject to change in the new media policy for Clay County District Schools.

Friedman provided the challenge form he originally submitted, and he pointed out some additional "cheery content." His full challenge form can be viewed on our website.

"At the End of Everything" raises the question: is including a nonbinary perspective "indoctrination," as Friedman would argue, or does it capture "the broad racial, ethnic, socioeconomic and cultural diversity of students?"

While "At the End of Everything" is decidedly not pornographic, I'm actually in a tougher spot than where I was last week with "Heroine."

There was a lot I liked. For starters, I found the premise interesting. I thought the autistic and nonbinary representation was done in a respectful way. The rehabilitation center enrolled "delinquent" children: those convicted of crimes for just and unjust reasons and those who are culturally deviant, such as Emerson running away from home for being nonbinary. Regardless, these children were treated the same way: poorly.

This was an intentional choice to demonstrate how society views delinquency in children and how it attempts to address it.

I agree with the central point of the book's "thesis." Instead of judging others for what they did, we should attempt to understand why. I agree forgiveness is a virtue, and it's a virtue that is commonly discarded during a crisis.

This is why I was disappointed at the epilogue, which throws that message into the wind. Additionally, I found the writing style simplistic and even myopic during certain chapters throughout the book. The content is easy to digest, at least. Truth be told, I don't know if readers at a high school level would get much out of this entry.

The real debate surrounding this book is whether or not it should be acceptable for middle school. During the open forum last Tuesday, School Board Member Michele Hanson used the word "spicy" to describe books like this – books that toe the line (or surpass it in some instances) of what is typically acceptable for the target demographic.

Everyone who attended the open forum shared the common ground that pornography should not be in libraries. However, some books address the real-life issue of sexual assault – sometimes graphically, sometimes not. Some books detail drug abuse and addiction ("Heroine" by Mindy McGinnis) – sometimes in detail, sometimes not. Many of the "spicy" books use "foul language."

During the open forum, I heard a collective interest in developing a rubric that would objectively evaluate books using concrete standards for various age groups.

I think this book demonstrates the challenge of developing a comprehensive rubric. Even with movies, there can be a lot of variation within the "PG" and "PG-13" categories. Also, novels are typically longer than movies (the audio book for "At the End of Everything" is nearly 10 hours on Spotify), so it's harder to get a gauge on the context.


Friedman asked me if it would be acceptable to restrict this novel for middle school until a student turned in a signed permission slip from a parent or guardian.

If I were designing the new media policy, I would say "no." The book raises some interesting points – some of which I don't agree with – but I don't think that alone warrants this book special treatment or censorship.

I think individualized permission slips for books on a case-by-case basis would only overwhelm the media specialists further. For "At the End of Everything," in particular, there are admittedly some "spicy" moments. But it provides ample warning before the first page. I am under the impression middle schoolers would have the thought process to either put the book back on the shelf or continue reading. Maybe content warnings should be the norm in the new media policy.

As a community, we're going to have to decide this together. When we draw lines in the sand, should we do so based on the complexity of the writing itself? Or should we implement a "three strikes and you're out" approach to explicit content like extreme profanity, sex jokes, drugs, etc.? Should we – as Friedman recommends – err on the side of caution? If we even have to think this hard about a book, wouldn't it be better off gone?

Or is analyzing content part of what makes reading a book such an interesting and meaningful endeavor?

patients, offering headphones, sunglasses and other items to soothe anxieties.

New approaches, such as teledentistry, allow you to see a dentist at home through imaging and communication technologies. This doesn't replace in-person care but can help allay dental fears.

at least 15 computer screens.

Most teams, especially the elite GTPs, now have masseurs, quiet motorhomes with beds and showers and a nutritionist on standby. Others use hyperbaric chambers to help their drivers decompress after two- or three-hour shifts.

But whether you're fueled by chili like the old days or enjoy the pampered comforts of the modern era, the race is still about being around physically and mechanically after 24 hours.

The first time I met Hurley was after his win in 1979. Danny Ongias, Ted Field and Haywood drove their black No. 0 Porsche 935 to a 49-lap victory. They won by nearly 175 miles because the rest of the GTX field had serious engine issues – particularly blown head gaskets and turbocharger seizures.

The winning car wasn't immune from problems, but their issues came with only seven minutes to go. Ongias radioed the team his turbo was breaking. When they saw it smoking, they told him to stop on the track apron 100 yards short of the finish line. He waited until he saw the checkered flag, and the car chugged, spitted and spewed white smoke the final 300 feet for the win.

I have other great memories. ZZ Top drummer Frank Beard – the one without the beard – was part of a team that drove a Porsche 911 to a 15th-place finish. He sat against a fence along the pit road fence as two boys walked past in the night. They stopped, waved their right arm with a scoop and finished with the same wave seen in the band's music video, "She's Got Legs." Beard cocked his sunglasses – yes, the band wears them at night, too – and smiled.

Orange Park's Christine Howell wins Chick-fil-A Leader award

Twelfth-grade English teacher one of only 10 selected across the country

ORANGE PARK – Christine Howell's jaw dropped, and her eyes welled with tears when Chick-fil-A operator Craig Phillips started talking about the incredible accomplishments achieved by Orange Park High's Chick-fil-A Leader Academy.

He talked about her tenacity and compassion. He spoke of programs that make a difference in the community. He laughed when he said Howell constantly emails and calls him about grant applications to support the leadership development program.

Howell has helped students re-imagine leadership roles to significantly impact the school and the county for the past 10 years. Chick-fil-A determined it was time to show its appreciation by selecting her as one of 10 national Facilitator Honorees.

With more than 1,200 schools in the program, it's not a designation the international fast food chain took lightly.

Howell will be honored with other recipients in Atlanta on March 13-15.

"It's all about leadership and working through problems and, you know, growing as an individual," she said.

Howell said her students have created a food and clothing pantry called OP Outfitters that's benefited more than 2,000 people. They've also partnered with the Ronald McDonald House and the Clay County Sheriff's Office to make "blessing bags" for the homeless and Rethreaded that empower and support survivors of human trafficking.

"Her footprints are all over the place," Phillips said. "Everybody here knows Mrs. Howell and her personality. I met her 10 years ago when we started Chick-fil-A Leader Academy at Fletcher High. Typically, people are a little more mild-mannered. That's not how she came out of the gate. She

said, 'Hi, I'm Christine. I'm running the program in Orange Park.' Man, how time flies after 10 years."

According to the program, Leader Academy helps students learn values, communications, teamwork, and innovation so they can understand what it means to be a servant leader. Howell also got her students to establish Tad's Toys in memory of a student who died 15 years ago. Teacher of the Year Olivia Youhas was at the reception. She was in Howell's first Leader Academy class.

"How exciting that one of the very first members is now our Orange Park High School Teacher of the Year," Howell said. "How exciting is that?" Principal Ivin Gunder initially said he didn't believe the news when Chick-fil-A called a week earlier about the honor. He also was one of a handful who knew about the announcement in advance.

"It's amazing for our community and our school," Gunder said. "That's what teaching is all about. She has a heart for the students. We were excited for her to represent the state, but now the nation. That's amazing."

According to Chick-fil-A, more than 200,000 students have been part of the Leader Academy, and they've served more than 2.5 million people whom high school students have directly impacted.

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Elections office: Why you may see DeSantis on primary ballot

CLAY COUNTY – When a candidate decides to end a presidential bid, they often say the campaign has been "suspended" rather than they've dropped out.

Under election law, the phrase "suspending a campaign" has no formal meaning. So why "suspend a campaign" instead of "exiting a race"? There are two important reasons – delegates and money.


Candidates who suspend their campaigns usually get to keep any delegates they've won, and they can continue to raise money beyond what's needed to retire their campaign debts. In contrast, candidates who drop out of a race usually have to forfeit certain delegates and are limited in how they can raise future funds. If a candidate "ended" their campaign instead of merely "suspending" it, they might lose eligibility for federal matching funds to help pay off their debts.

The Federal Election Commission, in fact, doesn't consider a campaign completely over until its debts are paid off, loans are settled, and its cash has been transferred into other accounts. One more reason to suspend a campaign? Theoretically, if the political climate changes dramatically, a suspended campaign could return to life.

Suspending a Campaign vs. Withdrawing. The phrase has been employed at least as far back as the 1970s and continues to

Waffle House to cover, smother customers with classic menu on CR 220

DOCTORS INLET – Waffle House is coming to County Road 220, where Sonic Drive-In once stood near College Drive. The breakfast chain is known for being a cultural centerpiece for southern breakfast and hospitality.

Based 40 minutes from the first store opened in 1955 in Avondale Estates, Georgia, there are 1,983 locations in 25 states and territories.

Obviously, Waffle House is known for its waffles. And it should since they serve 145 nationally every minute, translating to 76 million a year.

The restaurant also sells nearly 300 million eggs, 178 million rashers of bacon and 2.1 million T-bone steaks a year. Its hash browns remain an iconic standard of its simple menu because you can top the crispy shreds of potatoes with cheese (covered), onions (smothered), ham (chunked), tomatoes (diced), jalapeno peppers (peppered), mushrooms (capped), chili (topped) and sausage gravy (country).

The "Waffle House Index" is an unofficial metric FEMA uses to triage the damage from environmental disasters and assess the scale of assistance required for recovery. The breakfast chain is known for its vigorous 24-hour service. A location closing can sometimes be taken as an ominous warning.

"If a Waffle House can serve a full menu, they've likely got power (or are running on a generator). A limited menu means an area may not have running water or electricity, but there's gas for the stove to make bacon, eggs, and coffee: exactly what hungry, weary people need," according to fema.gov/ blog/its-little-piece-normal.

physicals and referrals for residents without health insurance or limited health coverage. Seeds of Love and Springs Church had a clothing boutique "car" that offered clothes from infant to all sizes.

Cuts of Grace and Valkyrie Salon offered free haircuts.

Showering God's Love offered hot showers and privacy for those without access to running water.

Mercy Support Services offered faithbased counseling and spiritual guidance. Saved 2 Serve grilled up some sizzling, savory burgers and hotdogs.

Although Impact Clay Train is not a "train" in a literal sense, the organization was sure to offer engineers' hats, train whistles and a train ride attraction for anyone who wanted fun. Commissioner Mike Cella had a blast riding in the caboose, even if he was a bit dizzy getting off, he said.

Impact Clay Train will be pulling up to Clay Hill Elementary in Clay Hill on Feb. 17. After that, the train will stop at Grove Park Elementary in Orange Park on

Trying to rise from the ashes

G's Slow Smoked BBQ employees facing despair, uncertainty after fire

ORANGE PARK – Daniel Petty and Heather Roberts stood in the dark and watched waves of fire turn G's Slow Smoked BBQ into a charred heap. Neither realized at that moment their ability to earn a paycheck was also going up in smoke.

"You were in shock standing there, watching it burn," Roberts said. "You couldn't believe it."

The fire during the early morning of Jan. 9 destroyed the popular barbecue joint, leaving nine of 10 employees despondent and without jobs.

Petty said a lack of transportation means he has to be within walking distance to a new job. Roberts said the job market has become so competitive applicants often need vast experience or college degrees for menial tasks.

While owner Gary Park is dealing with insurance adjustors and looking for a new home for his sweet and smoky concoctions, his primary focus is on the people who suddenly became unemployed moments after Clay County Fire Rescue answered the call at 1:31 a.m.

Like Petty and Roberts, Park felt helpless watching the fire as portions of G's fell into a pile of bright-red embers.

"First and foremost, really are my employees," Park said. "They're displaced, for lack of a better word. The economy is not the greatest right now to find a job."

Petty said he's filled out applications every day since the fire.

"I have a lot of them out there. But, so far, I haven't had any callbacks," he said. "It's all very surreal. It's been really difficult to find jobs. I don't know what I'm going to do. It's really hard to deal with because you have to accept it. You have no choice but to accept it. It was a job I thoroughly enjoyed. I loved working with the people I worked with and the customers."

Roberts has also been filling out applications, and like Petty, there doesn't seem to be a lot of enthusiasm for new hires.

"I think a lot of places have raised the standards for what they expect for minimal work," she said. "in some of the places I've looked into, they say they want a [bachelor's of art] or an [associate's of arts] degree, and that's for entry-level stuff."

A three-day benefit for the employees is coming together at the VFW Post 8255 in Middleburg, 2296 Aster Ave., on March 15-17. Although the itinerary is still being developed, there are initial plans for 50/50 raffles, bounce houses, silent auctions, live music, food and merchandise.

Park has also set up an account for his employees at VyStar Credit Union and GoFundMe (G's Slow Smoked BBQ Rebuild and Employees). Park has asked other business owners to help. His friend, Skylar Davis, hired Kayla McCloud as a Dalton's Sports Grill server.

Park talked to another friend hours after the last fire truck left. He knew Dell Hoard Jr., a co-owner of Grumpy's in Middleburg, had first-hand knowledge of how to help his employees while they were trying to rebuild after a fire.

Grumpy's was destroyed on Jan. 19, 2022, by a fire in the dishwashing room. Delays caused by the pandemic delayed the reopening for a year until Jan. 2, 2023.

"I wasn't aware of what I'm going to face," Park said.

An immediate concern is finding a new location or learning how long it will take to rebuild at 1282 Blanding Blvd.

Park said he had two vacant locations in mind, but one wasn't available. He hasn't heard back about the other one.

Now, all he can do is hurry up and wait.

commercial and residential buildings.

Instead of paying typical HOA fees for lawn maintenance, residents would financially support, participate and enjoy community agriculture.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has affected how we perceive the workforce and housing. There's now a focus toward lifestyle and hybrid work options," Agricola said. "People want to live in a community and be a part of it."

The proposed community will benefit because it will be located near the developing First Coast Expressway.

Their financial assessment estimates that Agricola construction could create more than 4,000 jobs, \$7.4 million in ad valorem revenue to Clay County during development and \$236 million in ad valorem during the next 25 years.

While the economic and cultural potential is exciting, Agricola said the environment takes precedence. He says he plans to go above and beyond Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) guidelines by expanding the buffer between development and existing wetlands. FDEP recommends a 30-foot buffer. Agricola is pushing for a 100-foot buffer on average. Agricola views wetlands as a valuable natural resource, not a hindrance.

"We've been in Florida, and we've seen the growth. Much of the growth has been

good for the economy and has helped our family business, too. But there's been some bad growth as well. We are lucky to live in a state dedicated to conservation. But there is only so much that can be done at the state level," Agricola said.


Agricola said he understands the importance of environmental conservation. He said his father, Bill Agricola, brokered the deal between the Jennings family and the state of Florida that created Jennings State Forest. That was Agricola's way of following in his father's footsteps and leaving his legacy in Clay County.

"Growth is going to happen, but we want to ensure that it is for the better," he said. "We can put an emphasis on making something that is valuable and sustainable and respectful of nature – not just going ahead and clear-cutting wetlands and placing cookie-cutter housing on top."

Agricola wants his community to integrate nurturing homes and natural environments. Houses are to be made affordable and with quality. He said that walkability is vital to fostering a sense of community and experiencing surrounding nature. Agricola used the term "free range children" to describe the safety of his community – you can be comfortable that children playing outside, running along the trails or using recreational facilities will be safe.

But there's no such thing as a foolproof plan, especially in real estate development.

"Even with best-laid plans, you never know what can happen. What we did set us apart, so we went the planned community





route. We're tied to a development agreement that we are bound to and which the county can enforce. We're not making all these promises and then pulling a baitand-switch. We are committed to this vision," Agricola said.

The Agricola team first sat down with county staff three years ago. They are still rezoning their property from "agriculture" to "planned community." Agricola said they submitted their planned unit development (PUD) to the state and expect to receive feedback next month.

A community workshop is planned for Feb. 27 at 10 a.m. and is open to the public for feedback and suggestions. The final approval is up to the Board of County Commissioners from there.

"We try to be as transparent and open and communicative. We have an opendoor policy because it benefits us. Their perspective benefits us. If they have good ideas, we want to incorporate them. We do care. These are our neighbors, and we've always tried to be good neighbors," he said.

The team is eager to get the ball rolling. "It is easier to sell that vision when they can see it – and that takes time," Agricola said, referring to commercial investors that would set up shop in the community.

"Unlike most developers, we don't have a ticking clock hanging over our heads. It would be great to get this as soon as possible, but it depends on the market and reaching out to interested businesses. I don't have an answer to when we'll get started – it'll be when the time is right," he said.

"We're timber farmers. We've learned to be patient."



Chairman of Early Childhood, Elementary and Secondary Education

Aaron Bean meets and greets students at R.M. Paterson, SJCDS

ORANGE PARK – Rep. Aaron Bean came to Clay County to spend the school day with some of the county's students. His first stop was at R.M. Paterson Elementary to read to kindergarteners. Later, he stopped at St. Johns Country Day for a crash course on the legislative process.

"These are our leaders of tomorrow," said Bean.

The representative shared his political origin story with students at St. Johns.

"In 8th grade, we took a field trip. At that time, George Crady was a Florida House Representative representing Nassau County and Jacksonville areas. He looked at our class and said, 'One of you will take my place.' It was me. I was literally his successor over 20 years later," he said.

Bean currently serves as chairman of the Early Childhood, Elementary and Secondary Education subcommittee. He believes education is an integral component of the American Dream.

Last week in Washington, D.C., Bean held a hearing to affirm the importance of career and technical education (CTE) to prepare students for success in the modern economy. The main challenges businesses face is hiring technically proficient applicants, he said.

Bean's father was once a shop teacher who taught industrial arts. Bean's father brought his own tool kit to school and had his students bring broken items, which would be fixed as a class.



"As a country, we've consistently undervalued the importance of this type of (career-focused) education," he said during the hearing.

Kelly Mosley is one of two Career and Technical Education Supervisors for Clay County District Schools. She said the school district offers 33 different types of CTE programs that provide hands-on experience in various industries: agriculture, automotive, architecture, technology, business, health science, law, security, manufacturing and more.

"There are over 11,000 students enrolled in CTE programs," she said. "Last year, over 1,400 industry certifications were earned by Clay County students."

"Our education system has focused on everyone going to college. However, only about a third manage to go. There are 8.8 million jobs that can be filled that don't require a college degree – just technical training," said Bean.

When Bean returned to the county last week, he congratulated Superintendent David Broski on the robust (CTE) pro-

grams.

The representative was asked about his stance regarding the Clay County "book ban" debate. The county leads the nation in book challenges and book removals that have been determined to be pornographic or not age-appropriate. However, many challenges have been made against voices from marginalized minority groups.

Should our public school libraries be curated to incorporate the values of those who live here? Or should public school libraries be curated to incorporate the widest range of values and perspectives – even those that may not be agreed with? "That was one of the topics of a meeting I chaired regarding age-appropriate materials nationwide. I cringed. It was cringeworthy to have people read from the books, even in front of us adults in Congress," he said.

"I could only blush. It was clear that it didn't belong," he said, referring to one book read aloud by Sen. John Kennedy from Louisiana.

"Our focus should be on math and science. Schools shouldn't focus on sexual things. I support Clay County's decision. Pornography does not belong on the campus of any Clay County school."

Free care, free smiles on Fridays

County residents offered extractions, fillings in Green Cove Springs

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The receptionist met a mother and daughter with a smile when they entered the Clay County Dental Clinic on Friday, Jan. 19.

The mother smiled back. The daughter

couldn't because she had a toothache. They didn't have

to fill out insurance forms or disclose their financial information. The only questions that matter at the Adult Friday Dental Clinic are those relating to a patient's dental

needs

Dr. Greg Archambault was finishing a filing on a man in one of three examination rooms. The high-pitched whir of the drill competed with the slurping sound of a suction tool. But what many believe is a painful aspect of seeing a dentist – paying the bill – was nonexistent because all services are free.

"It's been going on for 20 years," Archambault said. "When they closed the public health clinic, we started the Clay County Dental Society a couple of years, but we got the clinic running.

"We have numerous donations and ba-

sically started that volunteer clinic. All the people are volunteers, from the receptionist to the assistants to the dentist. We have five dentists who volunteer regularly at the clinic, and another four or five volunteer at their office."

Care is offered on most Fridays, starting at 7 a.m. The schedule is set monthly and based on availability. (To find which Fridays are open, visit the Community Calendar on claytodayonline.com, Florida Department of Health Clay County or The Way Free Medical Clinic websites.)

The volunteers currently work in barebones conditions. There are no telephones to answer, and they usually clean the office themselves before they go home.

That will change in July when the dental society moves its services to the new The Way Free Medical Clinic at 302 College Dr. in Orange Park.

The 7,700-square-foot facility will include four new examination rooms with new equipment. The Florida Association of Free and Charitable Clinics gave \$145,000 for new dental equipment.

Moreover, Archambault said other dentists throughout the Jacksonville area have learned about the project and have donated their services.

The new building will feature a more streamlined operation, Archambault said.

"It's going to be more beneficial because we do a lot of patient education on their habits and diet that contributes to their oral health," the dentist said. "We're going to have more educational materials there. The equipment is going to be new. We will have a new X-ray system to be bet-



ter and faster."

Information at the Green Cove Springs clinic is kept in outdated paper charts. When it joins The Way, records will be paperless. And the upgrades will allow for expanded hours, Archambault said.

"We expect more people will know about the new clinic so that we can help more people," Archambault said. "We anticipate it will be easier to get more volunteer dentists because they know it's going to be well-equipped.

The clinic will also help reduce the number of low-income residents who go to

a hospital emergency room with a toothache. They may be able to get short-term pain relief, but hospitals generally aren't prepared to do dental work.

According to Dentistry Today, it costs three times more to go to the emergency room than a dentist, and visits to the ER to treat preventable conditions cost about \$2 billion a year. Medicare pays the bulk of that.

"We want people to know we're here for them," Archambault said. "We need people to know we have the resources they need."



St. Johns River State College to offer unique bachelor's degree

Degree in Criminal Justice, Applied Intelligence Studies taught online

TALLAHASSEE – Technology is rapidly changing the law enforcement and security professions. Today, this work relies heavily on intelligence gathering and analysis of digital assets. In response to these changes, St. Johns River State College has worked closely with local law enforcement agencies to develop a unique degree program to prevent and combat crime and assess threats in Northeast Florida.

"The time to address this need is now. Data indicates a significant unmet workforce need for graduates skilled in intelligence-related analytical skills in the criminal justice professions," said SJR State President Joe Pickens. "With today's approval from the State Board of Education, we're one step closer to offering the new Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice, Applied Intelligence Studies this fall. It is one of the very few programs of its kind in the state."

The three sheriffs in the SJR State College's service area attended the State Board of Education vote with President Pickens on Wednesday, Jan. 17, in Tallahassee to support the new program.

"With guidance from the college's Criminal Justice Advisory Board, I am also grateful for the collaboration and support from Sheriffs Michelle Cook, Robert Hardwick and H.D. "Gator" DeLoach in making this new opportunity for students possible this fall," Pickens said.

"The program brings both a convenient and affordable career option to our traditional students and to those seeking additional skill sets or a career change in criminal justice."

Cook said the new degree program will help prepare future law enforcement leaders as they navigate vital information and keep their communities safe. "Today's world is inundated with information. Having professionals who are educated in identifying and prioritizing information of value is crucial to the success of a law enforcement agency," Cook said.

According to Sheriff DeLoach, the program will have an immediate, real-world application for the sheriff's office and surrounding communities.

"As law enforcement has evolved, we rely heavily on intelligence-driven information in solving cases. For those who are


wishing to advance in law enforcement and obtain a bachelor's degree, this is a perfect fit for continuing education in their profession to a subject not only relevant but pertinent, as technology is rapidly developing to include crimes not even conceived a few decades prior," DeLoach said.

The bachelor's degree program will be

offered online. College credits toward this degree may be awarded to certified law enforcement officers who completed the Basic Law Enforcement program at a Florida criminal justice academy.

The program is pending approval by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges.

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Landowners can apply for matching conservation, land management funds

Florida landowners interested in aligning their land uses with conservation values and practices have an opportunity to apply for US-Held or Entity Held Conservation Easements and/or Land Management opportunities in partnership with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the North Florida Land Trust (NFLT) in Florida beginning January 17. Landowners who applied for the recent Florida Department of Consumer Services (FDACS) Rural and Family Lands Protection Program (RFLPP) cycle are encouraged to apply for potential match opportunities. Those who are within and/or touching the boundary are eligible.

Applications for the fiscal year 2024 through the NRCS Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) will be accepted and evaluated by NRCS and NFLT through Feb. 20. FDACS will be involved in potential match negotiations. NFLT and NRCS accept conservation easement and land management applications year-round; however, applications received after Feb. 20, will be considered for the following signup period, as funding allows.

The RCPP is a partner-driven approach to conservation that funds solutions to natural resource challenges on agricultural land. The RCPP promotes coordination of NRCS conservation activities with partners that offer value-added contributions to expand their collective ability to address onfarm, watershed, and regional natural resource concerns.

The state's RFLPP enthusiastically partners with NFLT and others when federal funds, such as RCPP, are involved. Those funding partnerships help move projects into a priority work plan for the FDACS, which means the conservation easements can be acquired more quickly.

NFLT is leading this RCPP project to protect the Ocala to Osceola Wildlife Corridor (O2O) in partnership with approximately 26 federal, state and private organizations. The O2O is a 100-mile long, 1.6-millionacre landscape of public and private lands that connects the Ocala National Forest to the Osceola National Forest, including a swath of land at and around Camp Blanding.

The O2O includes priority lands for the Florida Ecological Greenways Network (FEGN) and is a critical linkage in the Florida Wildlife Corridor. By protecting the natural beauty and sustainability of the landscape and connector lands, the O2O will continue to provide habitat for the Florida

black bear and imperiled species like the red-cockaded woodpecker, indigo snake, and gopher tortoise. In addition, there are opportunities for protecting iconic Florida ecosystems, including legacy longleaf pine forests, sandhills and scrub in the O2O.

As part of this initiative, NRCS and its partners have funding through the RCPP to pay landowners for conservation easements and practices placed upon their land. NRCS and NFLT will be responsible for screening for land eligibility, coordinating appropriately to determine the proper entity holder, coordinating with landowners to develop conservation project applications, negotiating conservation easement terms, and/or developing a land management plan. Due to the complex nature of these projects, landowners interested in these funding opportunities are strongly encouraged to reach out for guidance on the options available before applying. Applicants must take the appropriate steps necessary to establish farm records and certifications. See below for Application Requirements:

• Farm records established/updated with the Farm Service Agency (FSA) for the applicant and the land.

• Be in compliance with highly erodible land and wetland conservation requirements.

• Meet the adjusted gross income (AGI) and payment limitation provisions (If





applicable).

• Applicable documentation required for signature authority.

• Have control of land, where "control" means possession of the land by ownership, lease, or other agreement.

• Written concurrence from the landowner to apply a structural or vegetative conservation practice.

• Be compliant with provisions for protecting the interests of tenants and sharecroppers.

Conservation easements and practices funded through the RCPP program may maintain agricultural uses, promote longleaf pine range, native forest and grassland restoration, weather resiliency, carbon sequestration practices, and wildfire adaptability. This program will also contribute to protecting habitats and migration routes of native, threatened, endangered, and imperiled species. To protect water quality and quantity, this program will protect watersheds and springsheds (i.e., surface and ground waters). Land eligible for conservation easements and/or land management practices within the O2O will be evaluated based on criteria that include connectivity and accessibility to pre-existing conservation tracts, existing working land uses, presence of wetlands and watersheds, and natural habitats that house imperiled species (whether in a present or restorative state). Non-industrial, private forest land may also be enrolled when associated with active agricultural and/or conservation land. NRCS and NFLT encourage landowners and farmers who are historically underserved (HU) to apply. HU farmers are defined as farmers who are beginners, socially disadvantaged, or veterans, and/or who have limited resources.

Participating in the RCPP and RFLPP Grant programs helps secure the future of the nation's food supply, prevents land with high conservation value from being developed or converted to non-agricultural use, and provides public benefits, including environmental quality, historic preservation, wildlife habitat, and protection of open space.

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

Airborne TV event: New series honors 8th Air Force, WWII fighters



Through all of the ups and downs, changes and adaptations of the world, one thing seems pretty solid: humanity's interest in the art and devastation of war. This interest may be reflected in the hobbies of Civil War re-enactors, one's choice of literature or, as it turns out, one's choice of televised entertainment.

Luckily for the World War II enthusiasts out there, Apple TV+ releases a new series Friday, Jan. 26. Based on author and historian Donald L. Miller's book, "Masters of the Air: America's Bomber Boys Who Fought the Air War Against Nazi Germany," the series, titled simply "Masters of the Air," follows the 100th Bomb Group, an American airborne unit that helped defeat the Nazis during World War II. Nine action-packed episodes are to be released weekly until the March 15



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finale, with the first two dropping on the streamer Jan. 26.

Billed as — as British GQ writer Jack King wrote in his Nov. 9 article — the "spiritual sequel to 'Band of Brothers,'" "Masters of the Air" is made possible by the HBO series' producers Steven Spielberg, Tom Hanks and Gary Goetzman, all of whom also collaborated behind the scenes on the 2010 miniseries "The Pacific." While not a direct sequel to either HBO miniseries, "Masters of the Air" promises to take viewers away from a literal boots-on-the-ground look at the war machine and instead takes to the equally treacherous skies.

There are plenty of recognizable faces for viewers to watch in awe, including "The Banshees of Inisherin" (2022) actor Barry Keoghan, who also starred in the popular 2017 war epic "Dunkirk"; "War and Peace" star Callum Turner; and the King of Rock 'n' Roll himself, Austin Butler ("Elvis," 2022).

Also starring in all nine episodes of the series are Ben Radcliffe ("Anatomy of a Scandal"), Anthony Boyle ("Tetris," 2023), Rafferty Law ("Repo Men," 2010), David Shields ("The Crown"), Darragh Cowley ("The Essex Serpent"), Edward Ashley ("The Terror"), Elliot Warren ("The Batman," 2022) and Nate Mann ("Licorice Pizza," 2021). BBC's newest Time Lord, "Doctor Who's" Ncuti Gatwa, and Sawyer Spielberg ("Honeydew," 2020) also appear in the series.

Adapted from Miller's novel by "Band of Brothers" and "The Last Vermeer" (2019) screenwriter John Orloff, "Master of the Air" flies viewers back in time to Europe during the Second World War, a time when the 8th Air Force's 100th Bomb Group become known by its nickname, "The Bloody Hundredth." And like most war films and series, the excitement and patriotism are featured alongside a healthy dose of grounded reflection and plenty of unthinkable devastation.

Per the official Apple TV+ description, the series takes a pilot's-seat approach to the carnage as the men "conduct perilous bombing raids over Nazi Germany and grapple with the frigid conditions, lack of oxygen and sheer terror of combat conducted at 25,000 feet in the air."

While set largely in and over "the bucolic fields and villages of southeast England," the nine-episode event is, in fact, based on a true story and visits "the harsh deprivations of a German prisoner of war camp" (per Apple).

Such sensitive material requires an expert approach, and so Hanks, Spielberg and Goetzman are the perfect team to do the 100th's story justice. With plenty of history in this genre and an undying respect for the perils of war, the trio reproduces "a unique and crucial time in world history" by way of "a genuine cinematic achievement."

"Tom [Hanks] and Steven [Spielberg] have always wanted to visualize cinematically what our author Don Miller has called this 'singular event in the history of warfare,'" said Goetzman, as reported by Esquire. "We're thrilled that Apple TV+ has given us the opportunity to combine the efforts of so many talented people, on-screen and behind the camera, to tell this important story."

Ramsay returns: 'Next Level Chef' heats things up with all-new episodes

The "next" evolution in cooking competitions, Gordon Ramsay's "Next Level Chef" returns with an all-new season, beginning with a special episode airing Sunday, Jan. 28, on Fox.

This series — which was renewed for both a third and fourth season in May 2023 — follows competing chefs, divided into teams, as they tackle a series of cooking challenges. During this one-of-a-kind culinary gauntlet, Ramsay's contestants find themselves on the iconic "Next Level Chef" stage, split up across three stories, with each team randomly assigned one of three stunningly different, stacked (and stocked) kitchens - how stocked each kitchen is, however, depends on which level the team has been assigned, with the highest level kitchen equipped with a wide range of modern tools and devices, the middle offering a standard commercial kitchen, and the bottom level containing a limited collection of lower-quality equipment.

In their kitchens, the chefs are then given a short time to collect ingredients before they must prepare, cook and plate their dishes — incorporating any surprise ingredients that may be delivered to them — within a tight, 45-minute period. After presenting their finished concoctions, one member each from the top two teams will be sent up to the top kitchen, where they will compete in a 30-minute, head-to-head challenge that determines who "takes the cake."

moviereview 'Air Force One' still flies high

"Get off my plane!"

For many viewers, that legendary line defines "Air Force One," the 1997 action hit that became another feather in the resume of Harrison Ford. Currently streaming on Peacock, the Wolfgang Petersen-directed adventure presents Ford as the kind of president Americans need in a time of duress.

And Ford's President James Marshall certainly knows from duress: The military veteran's official airplane is commandeered by terrorists posing as a news crew (great security procedures there) to mastermind a comrade's release from prison, with Gary Oldman as a thoroughly convincing leader of the bad guys. His rage is palpable when he's made to believe the president has left the plane via an escape pod (the real Air Force One reportedly doesn't have one), but in fact, Marshall is hiding in the aircraft's belly, improvising a counterattack as he goes.

Our stalwart if vulnerable hero has good reason for conquering the invading enemies, since their hostages include his wife and daughter (Wendy Crewson, Liesel Matthews).

"MONK: THE COMPLETE THIRD SEASON"

Recently revived in a Peacock movie, Tony Shalhoub's obsessive-compulsive title character - for which the actor earned three Primetime Emmy Awards - expectedly has much to contend with as the show's third year comes to Blu-ray. During this round, co-star Bitty Schram left the program and Traylor Howard joined as Natalie Teeger, detective Adrian Monk's new helper. In the opening story, Monk is still investigating the murder of his wife (Melora Hardin, seen in flashbacks) on a quest that takes him to New York, where the police department hopes to make use of his skills. "THE BOOGENS"

A cult classic, this 1981 horror film now gets "Special Edition" treatment on Blu-ray, as Colorado construction workers unwittingly set the dangerous title creatures loose in the course of their assignment at a long-abandoned silver mine. The monsters start targeting the local population, and it's up to a group of friends who get trapped in the mine to eliminate the threat for good. Directed by James L. Conway – who also guided a bounty of television episodes, encompassing several of the :Star Trek" spinoffs - the picture stars several performers known for their own TV work, Rebecca Balding

Also among the captives are various members of the president's staff, some represented by such fine actors as William H. Macy and Paul Guilfoyle ... but there's also a traitor among them who's secretly in cahoots with the terrorists.

While the battle aboard Air Force One is unfolding in the air, the vice president played by Glenn Close (sorry, Kamala Harris, she got there first) — is trying to help as much as she can from the ground. She has to withstand cabinet members who want the president's power rescinded under the circumstances, with Dean Stockwell as an especially zealous official who warns Close that history will remember her for what she does. Or doesn't do.

A typically excellent Jerry Goldsmith score captures the majesty of the presidential office as well as the heroism displayed in the situation, and not surprisingly, terrific aerial stunts also are part of the recipe here. Those go right up to the final scene, with a midair transfer the only way to save those aboard Air Force One, rapidly losing altitude as a result of all that has transpired. (In real life, Ford has gained added fame for being a pilot himself.)

For a number of years, a Harrison Ford movie opening in late summer was deemed as sure a bet at the box office as there was, given his wide audience draw. "Air Force One" was one of those attractions, and not only did it meet expectations then, it has endured since as a first-rate example of its genre. More than 25 years later, it still flies very high.


"KING ON SCREEN"

Q: I recently saw "Bullitt" on Turner Classic Movies. Didn't Steve McQueen and Robert Vaughn make another movie together? – Gene Hart, Gettysburg, Pa.

A: It likely had to do with her work schedule, now that her syndicated weekday "Kelly Clarkson Show" is based in New York. The award ceremony was in Los Angeles, which would have been much easier for Clarkson to maneuver if she was still doing her show from that city. However, she did post on Instagram right after the Daytime Emmys, stating that she was "so proud of my whole team for our wins (for outstanding daytime talk series and outstanding daytime talk series host) tonight."

Overly-tinted windows leads to methamphetamine, gun charges

Deputies also found a loaded semi-automatic .22 caliber long rifle on the floor. Peek was convicted of possessing a controlled substance in 2018 and possessing methamphetamine and a firearm during the commission of a felony in 2020.

Jacksonville man sentenced for selling fentanyl in Clay County

JACKSONVILLE - Chief U.S. District Judge Timothy J. Corrigan sentenced Elliott Dubenion, 40, to five years and 10 months in federal prison for distributing 40 grams or more of fentanyl. Dubenion had pleaded guilty on Sept. 27.

According to court documents, agents with the Drug Enforcement Administration and the Clay County Sheriff's Office identified Dubenion as a mid-level supplier of fentanyl to other dealers in Duval and Clav counties. Agents conducted two controlled purchases of fentanyl directly from Dubenion in Jacksonville on Jan. 27, 2023, and Feb. 7, 2023. According to lab reports, Dubenion sold approximately 84 grams of fentanyl.

The Drug Enforcement Administration and the Clay County Sheriff's Office investigated the case Assistant U.S. Attorney Aakash Singh prosecuted it.

Owner of Orange Park accounting business going to prison

WASHINGTON – A Florida woman was sentenced today to two years in prison for a scheme to file false tax returns and to two years in prison for an unrelated online romance scam. The two sentences are to run concurrently with each other.

Iona Coates, 67, of Orange Park, owned and operated Bits & Bytes Accounting Services. According to court documents and statements made in court related to the tax scheme. Her business provided tax preparation and bookkeeping services. Between 2015 and 2020, Coates claimed \$228,788 in tax refunds on her federal income tax returns by falsely reporting taxes were withheld from her income and were paid to the IRS. Coates further enriched herself by creating nearly 20 sham entities to file false tax returns that claimed fuel tax credits. Between 2017 and 2019, Coates prepared and filed 35 such returns.

According to court documents and statements made in court regarding the online romance scheme, in 2020, Coates met two individuals online through a dating website. She subsequently provided them with her bank account information and began receiving money from victims of the scheme into her account. She sent the money she received to them.

In December 2020, U.S. Secret Service agents met with Coates and explained that she acted as a "money mule" in an online romance scheme. As the agents described, the individuals acting as fake suitors on dating websites convinced victims to send money to Coates's bank account. The Secret Service advised Coates to cease participation in the scheme, as the individuals were using her bank account to facilitate their theft.

Coates, however, began acting as a money mule for another online romance scammer soon after. Between December 2020 and September 2021, she received \$229,376.26 into her bank accounts from victims of the scheme and sent the money to the scammer.



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Put me in coach, I'm ready for baseball

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - A four-run seventh inning doomed the Clay High baseball season while St. Johns Country Day School made the "Show" but had a terrible first inning as area baseball teams gear up for another shot at baseball dominance in 2024.

St. Johns Country Day School's storied program ran the table to the state final against Lakeland Christian with big bats; scores of 8-0, 5-2, 10-5 and 8-3, to get to the Class 2A final, but gave up four runs in the first inning to a defending champion with a wild pitch, a walk and a hard single to centerfield; all uncharacteristic of the Spartans precision level of play.

St. Johns coach Tom Lucas loses a handful of seniors; notably Shawn Andrade, Jacob Thomas and Isaiah Mamea, but brings back a wealth of returners plus new faces that will put the Spartans back in the hunt.

For Clay, a shocking (to them) district championship loss to rival Ridgeview may have been the wake-up call for coach Josh Persinger as the Blue Devils rebounded with region wins against Escambia and, in the region semifinal, Ridgeview, before getting to the region final against a 24-6 Columbia team that was working five straight wins including their district title game; a 9-0 bombing of Tallahassee Lincoln.

Columbia's hard-hitting, run-scoring offense put up games of 14-0 and 8-4 before Clay in the region 1-5A final where Clay had just four hits on the night and had the game in reach until the dreadful seventh inning. Columbia bombed away with nine singles, a double, a triple and a homer.

Six seniors leave the Blue Devils in-

cluding Josh Rouw (17 RBI) and Chase Haggard (16 RBI) while on the mound Elijah Roberts (74 Ks).

Over on Blanding Blvd., Middleburg (4-15), (20-7) and Orange Park (8-16) created some chaos on their schedules with significant momentum at the end of their seasons; Ridgeview with a district title win over Clay; Middleburg with near 7-5 upset of Clay in district semifinals and Orange Park getting eeked 5-4 by Ridgeview in their district opener.

Middleburg, as history will attest, has traditionally had subpar won-loss records but much success in playoff time under coach Daniel Pierce and his predecessor Alan Burnsed.

The Broncos, who lost a 6-5 regular season game to Clay and had five games

decided by one or two runs, like to play possum throughout the season and then play the Snake in the playoffs.

Top hitter Jacob Baxley graduated (.387, 11 RBI), but the pitching staff could be solid; Logan "Worm" Wehrmeyer (37 Ks), a junior; Austin Larson (19 Ks) a senior, and Daniel Lee (31 Ks) a senior.

Ridgeview coach Saul Jimenez built a strong foundation in his dugout and got mileage with enthusiasm and a 20-7 slate; five straight to open the season, two losses, then five more straight wins, then seventh straight to finish the season as district champion and region semifinalist with a 12-6 win over Ponte Vedra in quarterfinals.

Jimenez loses the glue for the team; Billy Girgis (30 RBI, 42 Ks), who will be playing at FSCJ, and playmaker Xavier Harris (.441, 13 RBI, 5 doubles), but returns a strong lineup led by Doug Langley (.431, 10 RBI) and pitcher Keegan Roach (5-1, 1.47 ERA, 33 Ks).

In the 6A ranks, Oakleaf opened on fire with eight wins before a stop in Clay (6-2 loss) and St. Johns (3-2 win in 10 innings) that set the mode for the season as an explosive team with a strong pitching backbone.

Oakleaf and Fleming Island look to battle again in their district with the Knights depleting their lineup with the likes of Devin Outlaw, Antonio Diaz, Devin Dizon and Steven Farina while the Golden Eagles lose stalwarts like Abram Summers, Jackson Mercer, Gavin Billingsley and Anders







Agurkis loses everything playmaker Mary Girgis and hitter Kaitlyn Watts, but returns excitable Haylee McCrae who was a spark plug with her 28 runs batted in off a 15-double season. The Blue Devil run was quickly cooled when Trace Burney banged a fourth-quarter three-pointer to set the nest on fire. After a nearly foul-free third quarter, the Blue Devil intensity drew fouls and handed the Golden Eagles six more points as Fleming Island missed only a single foul shot attempt in the fourth.

role players are starting to step up and be balanced."

MIDDLEBURG - With a surprising majority vote, the Middleburg High softball team, entering the 2024 season with a chip on their shoulders to return to state championship status, all agreed that a 5:30 a.m. wake up call to a 6:15 a.m. weightlifting and conditioning session was the next step to engineering that return.

"We originally thought about a twice-aweek regimen in the morning and two sessions in the afternoon," said Middleburg head softball coach Ashley Houston, who orchestrated a state championship run two years ago, but got stopped last year in the district semifinals (by Columbia, then Ridgeview beat Columbia to win district title) and then in the first game of the region playoffs. "The girls voted on a majority to have it four mornings per week just so we would have the weight room to ourselves. They have a chip on their shoulders to return to the Final Four."

For their morning ritual, Houston banks on a fitter, stronger lineup that enhances more muscle recovery than overall strength and power.

"The team started in late August with the conditioning in the weight room with probably half of our girls on the Middleburg weightlifting team right now," said Houston.

"We don't do a lot of heavy powerlifting, but mobility conditioning with quick movements with weights. We are doing a program; The Summers Method (Thomas Summers in Tampa area), that a lot of college and professional athletes are using to improve their overall fitness."

Houston sees the payoff with fitter, stronger athletes.

"We had our best fall season and we could see the improvement in their athleticism on the field," said Houston. "We also talk about proper nutrition so they can workout here, go through a school day and be hydrated and nourished for a quality practice after school."

Houston also likes the camaraderie of the team to commit to being up early and in the weight room with teammates.

"We get some coming a bit grumpy, but with the music going and their teammates around them, the team vibe kicks in," said

Houston. "Our five seniors have made the commitment to play in college and three juniors also commited. They all push each other."

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
