Plan revealed for possible new 'book ban' policy

School Board crafting 'airtight' plan to incorporate community, parental input

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — School Board Member Michele Hanson exhibited a possible new media policy for Clay County District Schools, providing a new framework for how books can be challenged and upheld in public school libraries. Her presentation at a recent workshop came in front of several presentation board pages of ideas submitted by teachers, parents and residents collected during the open forum on Jan. 16.

"As a Board, we will never move forward out of our box unless we start to bring diverse personalities and diverse thoughts into meetings," said Hanson. "We had people from all walks of life."

She said the participants in the open forum shared three things in common: loving children, appreciating parental rights and an understanding that pornography should not be accessible in public school libraries.

Hanson pointed to a poster that read, "Compromise is the bridge that leads to progress."

"The best compromise will be what's best for our district because we cannot make 100% people happy all the time," she said

The new policy Hanson presented is subject to change and will likely be amended in subsequent school board meetings



County still leans heavily toward Republican Party

GOP has more registered voters than Dems, No Political Affiliation combined

CLAY COUNTY - Florida is a closed primary state, meaning you must be registered with the corresponding political party to vote in either the Republican or Democrat primary elections on Aug. 20. You can register for the Republican or Democrat political parties with the Supervisor of Elections. Election Day, the general election open to all eligible citizens, will be held on Nov. 5.

Clay County has leaned heavily toward Republican candidates in elections stretching back since the 1960s, and it's a trend that Clay GOP intends to continue this election cycle.

According to the Supervisor of Elections Office, there are 82,627 registered Republicans in the county. There are 30,746 voters with no political affiliation and 29.852 Democrats.

Clay GOP is the official branch of the Republican Party in the county. According to its website, Clay GOP believes the strength of our nation lies with the individual and that each person's dignity, freedom, ability and responsibility must be honored. Free enterprise and encourag-


Celebrate Clay History

CLAY COUNTY - Brevet Lt. Col. Julius Heileman lay on his cot at Fort Drane near Micanopy. He was sweaty and feverish. The exhaustion he felt was unbearable. He lain sick like this for days, his skin yellow with jaundice and blood seeping from his nose. The camp surgeon could do little for him. The battle at Micanopy took the last of his strength. Through eyes clinched tight with delirium, we can imagine him


A soldier named Julius Heileman



looking back on his life.

Born in 1787 in Granville, Massachusetts, to a doctor named Johan Frederich Heileman and his wife Olive Robinson, Julius was destined to serve his country. His father was from Claustal, Rendsburg-Eckernforde, Schleswig-Holstein, Germany. His mother, Olive Robinson, was the daughter of an American reverend.

Johan Frederich Heileman came to America and served as a company surgeon in the forces of the English ally, Germany, during the American Revolution. He was a General Riesdel's German Brigade mem-

ber in General Burgoyne's Army. Johan was captured at the battle of Bennington, and somewhere along the way to the prison camp, he either escaped or deserted. He

married Olive and had three children with her, Julius being the youngest. Johan made a good life for himself and his family in America, his adopted country.

When Julius was 16, he was accepted to West Point as a cadet. Laying on his cot, he thought about the harsh marching drills, the difficult engineering courses, and the classes on conducting warfare. He chose artillery when he graduated in 1806 as the 12th graduate of West Point.

Commissioned a second lieutenant, he would be a soldier on the battlefield, leading men from in front, not the rear. The Army sent him first to various garrisons around the Atlantic seaboard, and he was able to serve in the War of 1812. As he lay on his thin blankets, he thought about his promotion: First Lieutenant in 1808 and then Captain in 1813. He thought about the cold weather at some of his postings guarding forts like Sacketts Harbor, New York and Ft. Niagara. New York. The cold and the snow were very different from Florida's heat, humidity, and sweltering sun. Even the enemy he was guarding against was so different. Here in Florida, his foe was a tough, unforgiving, and proud people – the Seminoles. They took no prisoners.

Julius rolled over on his side and folded his arms tightly across his chest, groaning. He looked back in pride on May 1823, when the Army recognized his ten years of faithful service and made him a Brevet Major. He was stationed at Ft. Monroe in Virginia, then onto Ft. Moultrie in Charleston – the same fort the Seminole warrior Osceola would be held prisoner and died at in 1838. He thought about how much he had loved his first wife, Henrietta Auchmutz, when he married her in 1814 and how much it hurt when she died in 1823. She had been with him in Charleston and then gone back home to Boston. She died there of an undetermined illness.

He thought about his second wife, Ann Mason, and of the children. Ann was the daughter of George Mason. Julius thought about the old man who was so important to the young country. At Philadelphia in 1787, Mason was most outspoken at the Constitutional Convention. He exerted great influence, but during the last two weeks of the convention, he decided not to sign the constitution. Two of Mason's greatest concerns were later incorporated into the document. The Bill of Rights addressed one concern, and the 11th Amendment addressed his desire for control of the judiciary.

Who was going to take care of Ann and the children now? Julius was distraught. But, by 1835, Julius was sent to Florida. General Winfield Scott had come through the forks of Black Creek and understood its valuable strategic location. He ordered then-Maj. Heileman to proceed immediately and build a garrison there, an armory, a supply depot. Julius got to work on this huge task.

He remembered how hot it was, how

black the water was, how deep and cool it was. The fort was right at Garey's Ferry, a ferry run by Samuel Garey. He remembered the snakes, the fleeting deer, the graceful water birds and the creeping alligators. He thought about how many of his men seemed to be sick all the time with fevers, dysentery, scurvy, and the occasional drowning. He thought about his greatest battle on the day he fought the Seminoles near Micanopy. It was June 7, 1836. He felt pride in his chest at the way he raced out front of the cannon and led his men from the front. The president promoted him for his past gallantry and meritorious service just two days before, on June 25. But alas, the sun was setting. Julius' breathing stopped, and he passed onto that great battlefield in the sky, a soldier just fading away.

Fort Heileman, Clay County's Seminole war-era fort that once stood in modern-day Middleburg, is named after its founder and defender, Brevet Lt. Col. Julius Frederick Heileman. Located at the modern-day Main Street boat ramp, the fort was the major supply depot for North Florida during the Second Seminole War. The Indian Removal Act brought on the war and was signed into law by President Andrew Jackson on May 28, 1830. The law authorized the president to grant lands west of the Mississippi in exchange for Indian lands within existing state borders. A few tribes went peacefully, but many resisted the relocation, especially the Seminoles. The tribe, after everything was said and done, remains undefeated to this day.

Recognizing the signs to prevent teen suicide

Children and teens can be moody, but when signs of mental health troubles last for weeks, don't assume it's just a passing mood

Suicide is a leading cause of death among U.S. children, teens and young adults ages 10-24, and rates have been on the rise. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that all teens be screened for suicide risk starting at age 12.

While no single cause has been identified, suicide is often preceded by depression that is undiagnosed or untreated. Most youth show some warning signs or behavior changes in advance. Families and their doctors can work together to identify if a child or teen is struggling with depression, anxiety or substance use, all of which increase the risk of suicide.

"Suicide is complex but often preventable," said Janet Lee, MD, FAAP. "When a person talks about killing themselves or feeling hopeless or trapped, it should always be taken seriously."

Don't be afraid to ask your child or teen to talk about their mental health or if they're contemplating suicide. Asking directly is the best way to know what your child is thinking. Studies show that it is safe to ask about suicide risk and that asking the question will not put the idea into their head. Note that your child may initially turn away or be silent, but actions may speak louder than words. Watch for major changes in your child's sleep patterns, appetite and social activities. Self-isolation, especially for kids who usually enjoy hanging out with friends or participating in activities, can signal serious difficulties.

"Your goal should be to create a safe space where your child can trust you to listen and express concern without judgment or blame," Dr. Lee said.


If your child says something like "I want to die" or "I don't care anymore," some suggested responses should be:

- "I'm sorry you are feeling this way—can you share a bit more?"
- "It sounds like you're in tremendous pain, and you can't see a way out."
- "Maybe you're wondering how life got this complicated and difficult."
- "Right now, you're unsure of the answers to your problems."
- "You must really, really be hurting inside to consider ending your life."

Common causes of stress that increase the risk of suicide include major life-changing events, including the loss of a loved one to death, divorce, deployment

or incarceration. Bullying, discrimination, racism and stigma surrounding mental health or suicide can also increase risks. Children who have witnessed or are suffering violence or domestic abuse, engage in self-harming behavior or experienced a suicide in their school or friend group are also at higher risk of suicide.

Research has shown there are protective factors that help reduce the risk of suicide, including ready access to health care. Maintaining close connections to family, friends, and one's community is also important.

Parents and guardians should limit access to lethal means, such as removing firearms and locking up medications or other potential poisons or weapons in the home. Half of youth suicides occur with firearms - and suicide attempts with firearms are almost always fatal. Teens and adolescents who attempt suicide with a firearm almost always use a gun found in their house, studies find.

"Suicide is often impulsive and a moment of crisis can escalate quickly," Dr. Lee said. "If your child is considering suicide, call or text 988 or chat on 988lifeline. org right away. The Lifeline provides 24/7. free and confidential support for people in distress and prevention and crisis resources.'

As children grow and become more independent, knowing what they are thinking and feeling can be more challenging. However, if you see signs that your child's mental health is under threat, it's important to tune in and take action.





the truck because there wasn't enough room to do their jobs.

Town Manager Sarah Campbell said her office received a picture taken by a mailman after he left a note on the side window saying, "You're blocking this person's mailbox. You can't park here. Mailman."

The next day, the cars were back.

The standoff between residents of the street and Precision Dermatology & Skin Surgery dates back to 2018, said one of 12 residents of Blake Street who attended a special roundtable meeting Monday night hosted by Campbell, Mayor Randy Anderson, Town Attorney Jody Lane Brooks, Po-

Town Manager Sarah Campbell said she's talked with the surgery center without any results, and she told residents nothing can be done since the employees are legally allowed to park on a public street.

lice Sgt. Randy Case and Fire Chief John Contestabile.

Their anger matched their angst because they said they didn't understand why the surgery center would continue to ignore their concerns.

"We are not protected," Houck said. "We are being violated. We've gone to them. We've talked to them."

In fact, Taft said the center called the Orange Park Police Department on her when she pleaded with employees to stop blocking her driveway.

Campbell said she also talked with employees at the office. Like other residents who've approached the office, her requests to find a solution were ignored.

The residents said that Center owner Leonard Dr. Shvartzman, who lives in St. Johns County, told his employees to park in the street so patients could utilize the 27 parking spaces at the office. Campbell told residents Monday night the employees weren't violating the town code since it was a public street.

"There is not a whole lot we can do legally," Brooks said.

Campbell tried to clarify town ordinances. She said Precision Dermatology & Skin Surgery wasn't in violation.

"The requirements for the business are set in the town code, and they're based on the square footage of the building, which they meet," Campbell said. "They have two buildings, and for what they do and the size of their buildings, they are required to have 22 (parking) spaces. They have 27, and so they're exceeding what the code said by five spaces

"But, their business has exceeded that. Clearly, between employees and patients, they have more than 27 vehicles. They are not violating our parking requirements."

However, several of the parking spaces

aren't being utilized. When Clay Today visited the center on Tuesday, there were 11 open spaces.

Campbell offered several options like creating offset parking spaces and restricting parking on one side of the street. A plan to block the entrance onto Blake Street from Park Avenue and restrict parking to cars with a special decal was also discussed

Anderson listened for more than 40 minutes before giving his opinion. What he said had residents cheering and clapping.

"I don't live on Blake, but if I did, I'd be pissed," he said.

"The problem is, they don't care," Allen said.

"We need to make them care," Anderson said.

The Mayor said he would try to convince the center to be more "respectful" of the neighborhood.

"I will talk to the doctor," he said.

Clay Today also left a business card with a receptionist to ask the doctor to return a call. By noon Wednesday, Shvartzman had not responded.

The group vowed to keep fighting to regain control of their street. Case said if any car is 15 feet from a fire hydrant, blocking a driveway in any manner or 20 feet from a crosswalk or intersection, he asked residents to call his department so the car can be ticketed.

That was little solace to the group.

"They are disrespectful," Taft said.
"They wouldn't want me to park in front of their house. I don't want them to be cited. I just want them to be mindful of our community. Right now, they have more rights than we do."

and workshops.

As an overview, the new media policy would attempt to decentralize the book-challenging process by delegating decision-making to the principals of the high schools where the challenges originated. An additional goal of the new policy is to incorporate more parental input. Hanson especially wants this new media policy to be "airtight" to protect the school district from legal liability.

The new policy would continue to firmly uphold FS 847, which prohibits books "depicting nudity, sexual conduct, or sexual excitement" without "serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value for minors."

However, as discussed during the open forum, some books in circulation do not violate FS 847 but still contain explicit content and objectional material to some parents

Hanson explained her rationale for decentralizing the book-challenging process:

• To preserve the culture and values of each school. There should not be a "onesize-fits-all" perspective of what is age-appropriate unilaterally enforced onto each school.

- To incorporate more community and parental input in discerning whether objectionable material is age-appropriate.
- To put levees in the process to prevent the administration at the district level from being flooded.
- \bullet To make the school district's policy more accessible and accountable.
- To empower media specialists in determining what to do with books that are not pornographic but contain explicit content and objectional material to some parents.

School Board Attorney Jeremiah Blocker was pleased with the trajectory of the new media policy. Blocker affirmed the importance of enforcing due process so

that the school district is not legally liable. Blocker cited the ongoing lawsuit against Escambia County as an example.

"The courts will say, 'OK. You have a policy. You have a procedure. Are you following those procedures?," he said,

referring to a hypothetical example.

The board is still working to develop community standards to address books that are not pornographic but contain objectionable material.

"The goal is to put more challenged books back on the shelf," said Hanson.

"A lot of challenges that come to us have nothing to do with FS 847, and if (those books) go back on the shelf, that would make me incredibly happy," said School Board Member Mary Bolla.

"We've had 171 removed from shelves. Other districts far surpass that. Clay County does not lead (the nation) in removing books." said Superintendent David Broskie.

In Escambia County, more than 1,600 titles have been removed from its public school libraries to "err on the side of caution." Escambia is now facing a lawsuit from PEN America, Penguin Random House and various affected authors.

Clay County is, however, a national leader in book challenges. A new policy would likely add roadblocks to inhibit challenges, especially with discussions to limit the number of challenges by an individual to two a month. However, the courts will determine whether the new policy is legal.

Clay Behavioral Health addresses 'mental health crisis'

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Clay Behavioral Health was one of the many "cars" of the Impact Clay Train, the mobile health and resource caravan that recently stopped at Keystone Heights High.

"We love working with our community partners. Everything is all in one place. We were there connecting with the community and directing them to resources and other parties (on the Impact Clay Train)," said Irene Toto, CEO of Clay Behavioral Health Center.

During the stop, Toto said, Clay Behavioral Health assisted half a dozen residents with benefits and mental health resources. She said the organization offers behavioral health and substance abuse resources to 4,000 people annually.

Mental Health is an often-overlooked aspect of healthcare. It is fundamental to a person's well-being, even if it isn't outwardly noticeable. You can't know exactly what another person may be experiencing

in their head, but that doesn't mean there aren't ways to help.

According to its website, "Studies have shown that people struggling with debt are three times more likely to have a mental health disorder. Unfortunately, this means that those with a mental health condition are not only forced to manage their unique symptoms but are also much more likely to have difficulties managing their finances."

In the midst of a nationwide "mental health crisis," Clay Behavioral Health has made it its mission to fill that gap.

The organization has psychiatrists, physicians and social workers trained and dedicated to providing cognitive-behavioral, pharmaceutical and therapeutic solutions. The organization provides outpatient counseling and treatment with certified counselors and psychiatrists, as well as on-site services in some Clay County schools. Walk-in services are also offered.



FLEMING ISLAND – Crafting a wash table for a German Shepherd rescue seemed simple enough.

But Nolan Hollinger realized the table needed a drain pan. And steps. And pavers would be a good idea too, so the groomer wouldn't walk through mud.

As a scout, Hollinger was prepared for the challenge. The work became one of 27 Eagle Scout Projects that will benefit the communities in Clay, Bradford and Putnam counties

And for the K-9 Services German Shepherd Rescue in Green Cove Springs near Penney Farms, the work will help President Nila Walden-Hughes's mission to give her dogs "a new leash on life."

Scouts from the Bartram Trail District will be coronated to the rank of Eagle during an annual ceremony on Saturday night, Feb. 3, at 6 p.m. at Sullivan Hall at Sacred Heart Catholic Church on Fleming Island. All will receive citations and gifts from many Clay County organizations. But the highlight will be the placement of their white Eagle neckerchief.

Hollinger, a junior at Fleming Island High, picked the rescue as his beneficiary because washing dogs in the past usually meant getting just as dirty during the

"I only went over there to look around," Hollinger said. "We noticed that she didn't have some place or something to wash all the dogs. All she had was a wooden board, and you just sprayed the hose. We thought if we built her a platform, that'd be pretty useful. She didn't have one of those. We just thought of an idea and then came up with all the blueprints. It was meant to be effective."

Elevating the washing platform allowed Walden-Hughes and her volunteers to stand upright. The scouts decided the station needed a drain pan to avoid puddles.

'We decided to put in pavers so you didn't have to walk through any water,' Hollinger said. "It turned out to be quite a

small bronze plaque on the wash station. He delivered a bag of dog food and the leftover cash donated for his project, totaling \$198.

When they installed this a few years ago, they installed a right on top of her septic tank, and she couldn't get to it. We made it part of the project and moved it to another part of her yard."



Gideon: Faith and Deliverance

Woman charged with attempted murder in deputy-involved shooting

Standoff in cemetery ends when deputies shoot her with bean bag rounds

MIDDLEBURG – A woman suspected of embezzling funds from Doctors Inlet Elementary was charged Wednesday with

shooting at Clay County Sheriff's Office deputies.

Tammy Jo Saucier, 51, of Middleburg, was charged with five counts of attempted second-degree murder following a standoff at the Holly Hill Cemetary on Old Jennings Road, CCSO

According to Sheriff Michelle Cook, Saucier was in her car near her father's grave when she opened the door and fired one time at the deputies. At least three deputies returned fire. She had an injury to her right little finger, but it's not known if the gunshot was self-inflicted or from a deputy.

Then on January 29, she was charged with three counts of fraudulent use of a credit card.

Saucier was the bookkeeper at the school, and she was suspended after an investigation revealed funds were missing from the school. On Tuesday, Clay County District Schools Police Resource Officer

Adam Rabinowitz called Saucier's husband, Richard, after he received suicidal text messages from the woman. The husband then called the sheriff's office.

"We received at least two separate notifications regarding an individual who may have been suffering a mental health crisis," Cook said. "At that time, our deputies began looking for her. We entered her vehicle information into a license plate reader system and received a hit on her vehicle traveling from the Oakeaf area toward Middleburg. At that point, deputies saturated the area, and one of our sergeants actually got behind. She began to drive recklessly, including driving into oncoming traffic and running a red light after a short pursuit."

She turned westbound onto Old Jennings and then into the cemetery. Cook said one of the responding deputies was a family friend of Saucier.

"(He) attempted for quite a while to de-escalate (the situation)," Cook said. "At some point during the conversation, she told the deputies that she had a weapon, that she had a gun, and she began drinking alcohol from inside of a vehicle what appeared to be a clear large clear bottle of alcohol."

Deputies heard one gunshot inside the car. Then Saucier opened the car door and fired one round toward deputies from a Ruger .380 handgun. She dropped the gun but remained in the car after deputies returned fire.

She remained in the car and told a deputy she wanted a pack of cigarettes. Deputies were behind a ballistic shield when they approached with the cigarettes. When

she reached for the cigarettes, deputies shot her twice in the back with two non-lethal beanbag rounds before taking her into custody.

According to the arrest report, Saucier went to HCA Florida Orange Park Hospital to treat her finger. She also had surgery to

remove her spleen.

No deputies were injured, Cook said.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the State Attorney's Office are investigating.

Her bond hearing will be on Friday.

Adams, who was convicted of burglary, trespassing, criminal mischief and for cutting off a court-order ankle monitor in 2022, will be back in court on March 4. His bond was set at \$225,015.

Fleming Island man arrested in connection with Jan. 6 Capitol **Breach**

WASHINGTON – A Fleming Island man was indicted and arrested on felony and misdemeanor charges related to his conduct during the breach of the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6. 2021. His actions and the actions of others disrupted a joint session of the U.S. Congress convened to ascertain and count the electoral votes related to the 2020 presidential election.

Marcus Smith, 47, is charged in an indictment filed in the District of Columbia with a felony offense of destruction of property and aiding and abetting. In addition to the felony, Smith is charged with several misdemeanor offenses, including entering and remaining in a restricted building or grounds, disorderly and disruptive conduct in a restricted building or grounds, engaging in physical violence in a restricted building or grounds, disorderly conduct in a Capitol building, act of physical violence in the Capitol grounds or buildings and parading, demonstrating, or picketing in a Capitol building.

Smith was arrested on Jan. 26 by the FBI in Florida, and he made his initial appearance in the Middle District of Florida.

The U.S. Attorney's Office is prosecuting this case for the District of Columbia and the Department of Justice National Security Division's Counterterrorism Section. The U.S. Attorney's Office provided valuable assistance from the Middle District of Florida.

This case is being investigated by the FBI's Jacksonville and Washington Field Offices with assistance from the U.S. Capitol Police and the Metropolitan Police Department.

In the 36 months since, more than 1,265 individuals have been charged in nearly all 50 states for crimes related to the breach of the U.S. Capitol, including more than 440 individuals charged with assaulting or impeding law enforcement,

Keeping up with the Smiths: Glover, Erskine front new series 'Mr. & Mrs. Smith'



"Players" (Netflix — Feb. 14, Movie Premiere)

New York sportswriter Mack (Gina Rodriguez) has spent years devising successful hook-up "plays" with best friend Adam (Damon Wayans Jr.) and their crew. While it has led to countless one night stands over the years, following their playbook comes with a strict set of ground rules — chief among them: you can't build a relationship from a play. When Mack unexpectedly falls for her latest target, charming war correspondent Nick (Tom Ellis), she begins to rethink the game entirely. As the lines begin to blur, Mack must learn what it takes to play for keeps.





There's no need to relive the same old entertainment this Groundhog Day, because Prime has a brand new offering (without any time loops involved). "Mr. & Mrs. Smith," an action comedy series based on the plot of the original 1941 film, brings a new twist to the classic tale of espionage and high-stakes hijinks. All eight episodes of the series' debut season release Friday, Feb. 2, on Prime Video.

While the titular, married Smiths are likely to conjure the image of former real-life couple Brad Pitt and Angelina Jolie, both of whom starred in the 2005 film of the same name, the "Mr. & Mrs. Smith" concept is, in fact, a much older production, one directed by famed filmmaker and so-called "Master of Suspense," Alfred Hitchcock. The director — then not yet known for his 1960 masterpiece "Psycho" nor his other many

memorable films, which include "The Birds" (1963), "Rear Window" (1954) and "Vertigo" (1958) — became very well known for his gripping thriller style, but he also had a penchant for comedy, as was evident in several of his films, such as 1938's "The Lady Vanishes" and, yes, the 1941 spy comedy "Mr. & Mr. Smith," led by Carole Lombard ("My Man Godfrey," 1936) and Robert Montgomery ("Lady in the Lake," 1946).

Since Hitchcock's premiere of the now-classic tale, several other takes on the cat-and-mouse spy game have been born. This newest series iteration of "Mr. & Mrs. Smith" stars the multi-talented rapper, writer, actor and producer Donald Glover ("Atlanta") as a suave new spy who must assume the identity of "John Smith," a standard, unassuming, run-of-the-mill husband to his wife, "Jane," also a new hire by the same spy agency, played by three-time Emmy nominee Maya Erskine ("PEN15").

First announced in February 2021, the eight-episode series was originally designed to include "Fleabag's" Phoebe Waller-Bridge as the titular missus. But, due to some conflicts on the creative side, Waller-Bridge stepped away from the series, and Prime's new series was born with Erskine as co-pilot.

Glover, meanwhile, who signed an exclusive deal with Amazon in 2021, takes his usual stance with respect to the series and has become involved both on camera and behind it. In addition to starring as the mysterious John Smith, Glover also co-created the series with "Atlanta" and "Fargo" writer Francesca Sloane.

Alongside Glover and Erskine, Paul

Dano ("Little Miss Sunshine," 2006), John Turturro ("Barton Fink," 1991) and Michaela Coel ("I May Destroy You") are listed among the show's big names as well. 



Another night of NBA action gets underway as the Dallas Mavericks tip off against the struggling Brooklyn Nets in their final regular season game. The action airs live from New York City's Barclays Center, Tuesday, Feb. 6, on ESPN.

Leading the way for the Mavericks all season long has been none other than the sensational Slovenian, Luka Don-Having yet another incredible season, Doncic leads the

him in the top five in league scoring. Also contributing 9.1 assists per game and 8.1 rebounds per game, Doncic continues to show his well-rounded game.

And with the Mavs' recent acquisition of Kyrie Irving, both their games have complemented each other seamlessly, as Irving looks to have found his groove in 2024 with an average of 25.8 points per game — not to mention his five consecutive games in January scoring 30 points or more.

For the Nets, it's been an up-and-down year, with Spencer Dinwiddie (13.2 points per game) and Mikal Bridges (21.4 points per game) bearing most of the load this season, with point guard and small forward Ben Simmons sitting out the majority of the 2023-24 campaign due to injury.

The last time these two teams met. Doncic put on a show. scoring an easy 49 points, including scoring the tie-breaking three-point shot with 26.3 seconds remaining, with the Mavs walking away victorious, 125-120. While the Nets walked away with another loss, they managed to go 21 for 43 from beyond the arch, something they certainly hope to replicate against a lethal Dallas Mavericks squad.





"The Thomas Crown Affair" is criminally enjoyable in remake

Many movie remakes prompt the question of why they were even attempted. In the case of "The Thomas Crown Affair," though, the result is surprisingly good.

Originally filmed in a 1968 version with Steve McQueen and Faye Dunaway as romantically entangled adversaries in a heist investigation, the story was updated in 1999 with Pierce Brosnan and Rene Russo as the amorous opponents. Produced by Brosnan's company and directed by John McTiernan ("Die Hard"), the revision - which Cinemax shows Wednesday, Feb. 7, and Saturday, Feb. 10 - is engaging and stylish in its own way, standing successfully without taking anything away from the first edition. And that is no simple feat.

Brosnan is fashionable in more ways than



the Agatha Christie-written courtroom thriller, and directed and co-adapted by Billy Wilder. Tyrone Power stars as a man who stands trial for the slaying of a wealthy woman, and only his wife (Marlene Dietrich) can clear him ... but what she has to offer as the title witness isn't likely to help his case. Charles Laughton and John Williams play the Power character's defense lawyers, with Elsa Lanchester, Henry Daniell, Torin Thatcher and Ruta Lee also in the cast. A new special feature is an interview with Joseph McBride, who wrote a biography of Wilder; the film earned six Oscar nominations including best picture, director, actor (Laughton) and supporting actress (Lanchester). *** (Not rated: AS, P, V) (Also on Blu-ray)

"THE THOMAS CROWN AFFAIR"

A "Special Edition" of the original 1968 version of this combination of crime story and romance gets a reissue. Director Norman Jewison's stylish drama casts Steve McQueen in the title role of a Boston tycoon who secretly engineers bank robberies for kicks, eventually drawing the interest of an insurance investigator (Faye Dunaway) who plans to seduce him into confessing. Instead, he turns the tables on her and she falls for him, forcing her to decide which side she's on as he plans the next heist. The picture is famous for a literal chess game between the two stars, marked by extreme close-ups, that becomes something more. Jack Weston lends great support as the getaway driver, and Paul Burke is solid as a police detective who's skeptical about the entire probe; Yaphet Kotto and Gordon Pinsent also are in the cast. The theme song, "The Windmills of Your Mind" (performed by Noel

one as title character Crown, a New Yorkbased business tycoon and billionaire who gets kicks from stealing priceless artworks (a change from the Boston-set McQueen variation, in which bank robberies were the crimes of choice). His latest theft draws the attention of a police detective wryly portrayed by Denis Leary, as well as the glamorous insurance investigator represented by Russo. (In a nice nod to the original film, Dunaway has several scenes in a cameo appearance as Crown's psychiatrist.)

In their bountiful screen time together, Brosnan and Russo have great chemistry and a playful spirit as Crown's pursuer tries to get the goods on him ... though she ultimately him irresistible, especially as he plies her with aspects of his posh lifestyle as glider flights and getaways to exotic locations. As she continues to live the high life apparently under Crown's spell, the Leary-played cop casts a very skeptical eye toward how she is conducting the probe ... and herself.

Ben Gazzara and Frankie Faison also are in the well-chosen cast, as are a number of actors with physiques that could pass for Brosnan's, which the clever adaptation (by Leslie Dixon and Kurt Wimmer) of Alan R. Trustman's initial script requires as it proceeds. Not surprisingly, Brosnan never loses his cool as the tale unfolds; conversely, Russo has some nicely emotional moments as her ploy to ensnare Crown backfires on her, putting her heart at more risk than she had gambled on.

"MOON LANDING: WORLD'S **GREATEST HOAX?"**

The 1978 movie "Capricorn One" suggested that a space mission could be faked using television techniques, leading the public to believe the staged footage was the real thing. This documentary indicates that more than half of England's population believes that was exactly the case with the 1969 lunar landing, a theory debated here through the use of archival material, reconstructions and comments from experts and conspiracy theorists. Of course, Neil Arnstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin – who gained global fame as the first two men to set foot on the moon, per history – are seen in some of the clips. *** (Not rated)

"THE TERMINAL MAN"

The normally gregarious George Segal had one of his most unusual and intense roles in the 1974 film of Michael Crichton's science-fiction novel, now on Blu-ray for the first time. Adapted and directed by Mike Hodges ("Get Carter"), the tale casts the actor as a computer scientist plagued by blackouts, prompting him to agree to have an experimental procedure meant to control his seizures through brain implants. Everything goes well ... until it doesn't, and he escapes from a hospital ready to give full rein to a violent streak that he has become only more prone to display. Joan Hackett plays his psychiatrist, who tries to head off the tragedy that may be to come; Richard A. Dysart ("L.A. Law"), Jill Clayburgh, Donald Moffat and James B. Sikking ("Hill Street Blues") also appear. * (PG: AS, P, V) (Also on DVD)

CTE program earns praise at House meeting

School district's Kelly Mosley testifies in Washington, D.C.

CLAY COUNTY – Representatives from both sides of the aisle were impressed to hear how Clay County District Schools'

Career and Technical Education programs are making a critical impact on the future workforce during their recent "Preparing Students for Success in the Skills-Based Economy" hearing by the U.S. House's Early Childhood, Elementary and Secondary Education Subcommittee.

Kelly Mosley, Community and Business Partnership Supervisor for the CTE program, was invited to Washington, D.C., to tell how students in Clay County have numerous career options that may not

require a college degree.

"There's always
been a lot of support, I believe, for technical education," she said. "I think part of the problem is that they changed the name from vocational to Career and Technical Education many years ago.
I don't think the name change has

helped people realize that we still offer a lot of training in other programming in our school. I think that's part of the issue. There was a time when it was foolish for everybody to go to a four-year university. I've seen that in the last several years where students are exploring a lot of different post-secondary options."

Subcommittee Chairman Aaron Bean, who represents Clay County on the Hill, said his interest in skills-based education started with his father.

"My dad, his first job out of college was to be a shop teacher," Bean said. "His first day of class, he found he's got 45 students, but (with) no money, no budget, no materials, no tools, no nothing. And he's got to teach the students."

Bean's father asked the school's administration for help. They told him to make

"This issue is personal to me. Let me tell you what my dad did," Bean said. "He brought his own toolkit to school and told each kid to find something that's broken at your house, bring it in, and we will fix it as a class.

"That has such a lasting impact on so many people, and it prepared the people that do my plumbing and the people that fix my car. My dad taught them automotive shop as a trade. We've consistently undervalued the value of this type of education."




"Now, does everybody need a four-year degree from a university? Absolutely not."

Fleming Island Golf Pro gets top award

ORLANDO - Fleming Island resident and former teaching pro at Eagle Harbor Golf Club Stephanie Connelly-Eiswerth, now a PGA/LPGA Teaching Professional at San Jose Country Club in Jacksonville, enjoyed a standout 2023 while collecting 938.83 points to win her first national Women's PGA Professional Player of the Year Award.

"I played really solid all year," said Connelly-Eiswerth, who played college golf at Ohio State and the University of Central Florida."It feels good to have that accomplishment and I'm really thankful to have the opportunity to play the game that we work in and love so much."

The Professional Player of the Year Award, according to Connelly-Eiswerth, is competition among golf professionals like herself.

"Most of the players are professional in the sense that we work for a living doing something with golf like me being a golf teaching professional or golf course management," she said. "We just stay competitive with our peers and keep score and at the end of the year, someone wins."

Connelly-Eiswerth, 36, who was a Maryland high school state champion three times, then won the New Buckeye Award in 2006 as the top freshman golfer for Ohio State after being named All Big-10 Conference, set the tone for a successful season with a runner-up finish in the Women's Stroke Play event at the PGA Winter Championships in February.

"I got to Eagle Harbor after I transferred from Ohio State to the University of Central Florida and just stayed here because the weather was nice," said Connelly-Eiswerth, who has won at golf since age 11 with a Mid-Atlantic PGA Player of the Year award in 1998, then the Maryland Junior Golf Champion in 1999 in 13-Under play. "I stayed one winter and practiced at Orange Park and I just never left."

Connelly-Eiswerth finished T-34 in the 2023 PGA Professional Championship and later made her fifth consecutive appearance in the KPMG Women's PGA Championship in June.

Connelly-Eiswerth did have a stint as a professional golfer in what was known as the Epsom tour.

"It's kind of like the Korn Ferry tour that they have now," said Connelly-Eiswerth. "I got to the University of North Florida for a few years and, this year, I've been teaching for about four years in the area."

She claimed North Florida PGA Women's Player of the Year honors following a T-2 finish at the NFPGA Section Championship and a runner-up finish at the NFPGA Professional Championship. Connelly-Eiswerth finished her final round with a 69 score off four birdies in the final nine holes.

Connelly-Eiswerth finished 2023 on a high note by recording a historic victory at the PGA Tournament Series Event No. 1, becoming the first woman to win a PGA Tournament Series event in its 46-year history. Connelly-Eiswerth shot a final-round 4-under par 67 (10-under 132) on the Ryder Course at PGA Golf Club en route to a one-shot victory.

Connelly-Eiswerth prides herself on being a "grinder" and taking advantage of her strengths: hitting it straight and a

strong short game.

"I never count myself out of it," said Connelly-Eiswerth. "I'm always going to keep fighting and that was the theme of the year, give myself chances and even if I didn't have success at each tournament until the end of the year, it worked out, that patience and sticking with the grind."

Her advice to up-and-coming golfers, like Fleming Island's state champion Tyler Mawhinney and, on the girl's team, Alyzabeth Morgan, is to, first, love the game, and, second, just keep practicing and learning

"The technology today is incredible in the faster advancement of young golfers," said Connelly-Eiswerth. "Just the conditioning and fitness level of kids today makes for better golfers, but you still have to hit the ball 100 times a day."

Also winning awards from the PGA were Michael Block, the PGA Head Professional at Arroyo Trabuco Golf Club in California, as the PGA Professional Player of the Year Award and Bob Soward of Ohio, who won the Senior PGA Professional Player of the Year Award.

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – Keystone Heights High wrestling is undergoing expansion each season with a full lineup in place this season despite its youth.

"We have a lot of seventh and eighth graders on our roster right now, but they are hungry to make the program grow more in the next couple of years," said Keystone Heights coach Shaun Goetzman, in his second year. "The program has grown for the past six or seven years and I want to continue that."





Entering the final rotation in a back-




A week later, Guy ran 14:53.49 to finish seventh in the 5,000 meter run also at the Alachua County facility.



Penske's winning Porsche adds 'WOW' factor to Rolex 24 at Daytona

Winning team of Felipe Nasr, Dane Cameron, Matt Campbell, Josef Newgarden use strategy, fast prototype to win sports car marathon

DAYTONA BEACH – It takes a lot to impress Roger Penske.

The man racing calls "The Captain" has been to Victory Lane 19 times as the winning car owner at the Indianapolis 500. He also owns the current NASCAR Cup Series team with driver Ryan Blaney. But he said Sunday's victory at the Rolex 24 Hours of Daytona will always be special.

"If you look at RP (Penske), I think he had a tear in his eyes," driver Dane Cameron said after he joined Felipe Nasr, Matt Campbell and Josef Newgarden in the winning Porsche 963.

The jubilation that follows the twice-around-the-clock sports car race is unlike any other race. And this one was no different. The infield was sold out and bustling with activity. The race featured 59 cars and a lot of fuel and tire strategies.

"This is the biggest crowd here for a sports car race," Penske said. "My hat's off to IMSA. "I'll tell you, this goes down as one of the biggest wins we've had."

Penske had a class victory at Daytona in 1966 and an overall win in 1969. It took 55 years, but Penske was finally back on the most sacred ground at Daytona – Victory Lane.

The difference for the winning Porsche was a final pit stop with 43 minutes remaining. The Porsche got better fuel mileage, so it didn't take as long on pit road

as the Cadillac V-Series.R prototype driven by Tom Blomqvist. Time saved getting gas allowed Nasr to make what proved to be the winning pass on pit road.

"The race really came down to the wire at the very final stop," Nasr said. "It was pretty much all about the fuel numbers.



Roger Penske gave his team a thumbs-up after it led the final 24 laps Sunday to win the Rolex 24 Hours of Daytona. Penske's other overall win in America's most prominent sports car race came 55 years ago.

Each one was the energy numbers we were reaching. I just have to say that was a great call from the team, from Porsche Penske Motorsports, just to give me the opportunity to be in the lead again in that final part of the race, and then it was down to me to hit the numbers and keep the 31 (Blomqvist) behind."

"It all came down to a fuel game," Penske said.

Not only was it Penske's first 24-hour win in 55 years, but it was the 19th "official" time Porsche took the checkered flag at America's most iconic sports car race. (A Porsche-powered Riley won the race in 2010, but since it had a unique eight-cylinder engine, Porsche doesn't list it as one of its winning cars.)

With new tire rules, both Penske cars

waited until the night and cooler tem-

peratures on Sunday to turn up the heat. GTP teams were limited to 25 sets of Michelin tires for the entire event, including practice, and only 20 sets for the race. That meant they had to run two and three stints on the same set, which really made the cars difficult to control – especially with the unseasonably hot temperatures on Saturday.

Nasr hinted at his team's strategy less than four hours after the race started at 1:40 p.m. on Saturday.

"In the heat of the day, (Cadillac) seems to have an advantage, especially under braking and traction," he said. "They seem to handle better in those two areas. They have the upper hand now, but ask me in a few hours, and we might have a different answer."

In fact, neither of Penske's cars led during the first five hours. Campbell took the lead on Lap 594 and stayed out front for 155 laps after daybreak, but Blomqvist steered the Cadillac into the lead for 19 laps until his car was passed during the final pit stop. Nasr led the final 24 laps.

The Porsche and Cadillac were the only

leaders in the final 354 laps.

Blomqvist, who Pipo Derani and Jack Aitken joined in the Chip Ganassi-owned Cadillac, got as close as three car lengths with less than 10 minutes remaining, but Nasr pulled ahead to win by nearly 150 yards.

The Acura ARX-06 for Jordan Taylor, Filpe Albuquerque, Brendon Hartley and Marcus Ericcson finished third.

The GTP class used common hybrid powertrains that take kinetic energy gained in braking and store it in the batteries. The three other classes are slower because they don't utilize that kind of technology.

The team of Dwight Merriman, Ryan Dalziel, 17-year-old Conncer Zilisch and Christian Rasmussen were 24 laps behind the overall winner, but they won the

slower LMP2 class in an ORECA. Alessandro Pier Guidi, James Calado, Daniel Serra and Davide Rigonwon GTD Pro in a Ferrari 296 GT3 and Russell Ward, Philip Ellis, Indy Dontje and Daniel Morad were first in GTD in a Mercedes AMG GT3.

The next IMSA race is March 16 at the Sebring Raceway.
