## **OPCCOA/LRIA Steering Committee Report**

January's meeting was called to order at 6 pm by Tom Mackin sitting in for Daniel Butler. There was a quorum of the committee members present including a new member from OPCC. We welcome Jerry Deans.

2023 BUDGET: A review of the 2023 Budget gave us some good news. We ended the year under budget.

**JOINT LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE**: Corey Scott reported that the requested irrigation map is still being worked on. They hope to have it ready by February. There will be paper copies as well as an electronic copy. There were some emergency irrigation repairs that had to be made along Loch Rane Blvd. including 3 clocks not working, 2 underground breaks, 2 bad heads and 2 bad valves. \$1,000 was approved for these repairs. The committee is looking for ways to save money on flowers. There was conversation about the truck that is typically parked in the medians. The truck belongs to an aaoO Services employee who weeds flower beds in both neighborhoods. It was suggested that aaoO Services provide the employee with a sign for his vehicle. It was noted that the brick walls at the 4-way are crumbling. Corey Scott said that the Landscape and Roads Committees are working on this problem and the costs will probably come out of general funds.

**ISSUES AT THE GATE:** Due to concerns about traffic at the gate when having big events at the Club, The Grove has reached out to Giddens Security for suggestions. Giddens has made the recommendation to upgrade from GateKey to Gate Sentry which allows for operation from mobile devices. The good news is that the resident's current data can be uploaded from GateKey to Gate Sentry.

The Gate staff has indicated that notifying the property managers about residents who have malfunctioning barcodes so that they can send Friendly Reminder letters to those residents has mostly solved the problem. CCSO roving patrol is issuing Warnings to vehicles parked on common property, parked on the street and if in Loch Rane parked facing the wrong direction. The data from the Warning Notice is entered in a Ticket Log which is provided to the property managers so that they can follow up with Friendly Reminder letters.

It has been reported that the gatehouse roof is spongy. It was suggested that a roofing company be asked to come out and take a look. The shed at the gatehouse is in disrepair. The wood is rotted. It needs to be removed and replaced. It houses the gate garbage cans.

The next meeting is scheduled for February 22 at 6 pm at the Community Building.

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## **OPCC Board of Directors Meeting**

We had a good turnout for the first meeting of 2024. It is encouraging to see residents attend to hear and participate in the Board's meetings.

We review the ARC's decisions each month. This month, the ARC approved two roofs, one paint job, one paver job, and one tree removal. That was a fairly high number of projects for a normal January when residents are trying to recover from December spending. Roofs continue to be regularly requested due to the age of many of our homes. It is not unusual, these days, for insurers to decline coverage for roofs over fifteen years old.

Our lake report stated there remains a problem with beaver dams at the spillway at hole two of the old golf course. There are plans to tackle the issue, but the pesky rodents are master dam builders.

The Grove Event Center is moving along. We may see real work this month. While the center's management company has not been officially decided/announced, the pickleball portion of the new center is closing in on becoming a reality. You can see the presumptive developer of that portion at <u>https://thehubpickleball.com</u>. I believe every month, going forward, will reveal real progress on the Grove project.

Work was approved to replace the duct work at the community building and marcite and associated work at the wading pool. Neither of these projects are inexpensive but necessary. These costs are why we need to ensure a healthy Reserve Fund balance.

We took the first steps in reviewing the new Covenants that are shown on our website as Amended & Restated Covenants 2004 Ver 1. This document will be updated as the questions/ comments we receive are considered. We covered Articles I and II at this meeting which were fairly straight forward. A couple of the statements require clarification and may be deleted. Please review Articles III and IV prior to the next meeting. We expect to tackle a couple of Articles at each monthly meeting to maximize the input rather than try to deal with large portions at one time.

You should feel free to contact any Board member about the revised covenants at any time. We realize not everyone can attend our meetings or wants to do so. We still value and want your input. Our email addresses and phone numbers are readily available on our website.

The regular January Meeting for the Loch Rane Board of Directors took place on 1/23 and was well attended by members!

### Welcome new BOD Members!

This month saw the election of Sonya Kirk to the BOD! The BOD also selected Charles Honaker for the additional vacant seat for 2024. We would like to again thank previous members Marie Bryan and John Burke for their choice to volunteer and serve!

### **Annual Yard Sale**

The annual yard sale will take place on the first Saturday of May, rain or shine! Be on the lookout for more updates and the signup form to participate!

### **Dues/Assessments**

There is still \$22,000 in outstanding annual dues for 2023 by residents, and \$21,000 outstanding from the 2023 assessment. Please make efforts to work out a payment plan with the cam team to avoid being turned over to the association attorney for collections efforts.

### **Roving Patrol**

The changeover to OPCC officers conducting the nightly roving patrol appears to be going well! Unfortunately, it appears to be highlighting a larger problem of residents parking on the street overnight. These violations will be cited by the officers and are subject to the Association fine policy. Parking of any vehicles on the streets overnight is prohibited.

### Arran/Cameron Retention Pond

We received word from the civil engineer that the redesign of the pond at the end of Arran Court was being met with extreme difficulty and "red tape" from the powers that be (SJRWMD and such). It was estimated that this planning and approval process to develop a viable solution to repair the drainage for this pond is likely to be measured in YEARS vs months, and that is simply to obtain the proper permits/ permissions/etc. to begin to get quotes for contractors to perform the work itself. We are hoping to reach out to a previous contractor who provided the fantastic solution on the other Arran Court retention pond to see if something similar can be done in the meantime.

### **Devonshire Repaving/Repair**

Focus for 2024 still remains on the repaving and repair of Devonshire to include the excavation of the abandoned pipe that runs down the center of the road and is the source of the "depression" on the surface. We expect the cost of this entire project to be a significant % of the 2024 special assessment if we choose to go that route. We hope to begin soliciting bids for this project in the first quarter of 2024 to give us a better idea on the total cost.

The next BOD meeting is set to take place on 2/27 @ 6:30pm in the Community Building. All residents are encouraged to attend!

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## **BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA** What Do You Know About This Organization?

In northeast Florida, we are blessed with a vibrant youth organization that has evolved over time but still supports the strong values of citizenship, fitness, and reverence. It's the Boy Scouts of America (BSA).

You have seen these friendly, helpful young people selling mulch at our Community Center, as well as popcorn and camp cards (discount cards) at various locations around the area. They do more than that. Our young men and women, and girls and boys, participate in many activities that help build strength, community awareness, self-reliance, the ability to function well in the outdoors, as well as many other accomplishments.

The mission of the Boy Scouts of America is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law. These are not mere words. They guide leaders and youth through life.

Scout Oath: On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country and to obey

the Scout Law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight.

Scout Law: A Scout is Trustworthy; Loyal; Helpful; Friendly; Courteous; Kind; Obedient; Cheerful; Thrifty; Brave; Clean; and Reverent.

In 2018, a big change occurred in the BSA. The movement was opened to girls to become members of Cub Scouts. Sponsoring organizations, such as churches or civic organizations, could choose to have a Cub Scout Packs with all-boy Dens, or a Pack with all-girl Dens, or a Pack - Family Pack, with all-boy Dens AND all-girl Dens. Dens are not co-ed. It is important that young boys and girls learn to develop their skills in a group of similar age and gender from Kindergarten-age through age 10.

Following the introduction of girls into Cub Scouts, the BSA went on to introduce girls and young women into the program formerly known as "Boy Scouts." This program was reassigned the name "Scout BSA" which was formerly used in the 1970-80s. Girl Troops were established. Currently, BSA has all-boy Troops and all-girl Troops. The leadership development that takes place in the age groups of 11 through 17, is crucial. Individual Scouts BSA members have the opportunity to go on to become Eagle Scouts.

The introduction of girls into the BSA is not new. Young women have been a part of the older youth Explorer program for many years. Young women, ages 14-20, have been a part of the Venturing program since 1998. Girls now comprise over 16% of youth membership in the North Florida Council

Next time you see young people in the familiar dark blue of Cub Scouts or the khaki and dark green of Scouts BSA, realize that they are the bright future for our community. They are learning the values and skills that will serve them and us well into the future.

**FROM LOCH RANE'S PROPERTY MANAGER, Gina Cabral of the CAM Team** The most common question regarding violations in The Loch Rane Improvement Association is "What exactly is the management company looking for when they are inspecting the properties?"

When inspecting the properties of Loch Rane, we look at the overall appearance of the property. Appearance can mean anything from landscaping to boats, trailers, and recreational vehicles. Violations such as boats, trailer, and recreational vehicles occur because they are prohibited to be stored in view.

Landscaping can be open to interpretation, so when we drive through the property, we do our best to take a good photograph of the violation in question and add information to the notice to better explain. Landscaping violations include, but are not limited to mowing, keeping the yard free of weeds, edging, out of hand shrubs, anything dead or in need of removal.

Maintenance of your home includes pressure washing your home to keep it clean of mildew, including your driveway. Not allowing items to pile up in front of home (i.e. trash, landscaping equipment, boxes, etc.). Removing your trash cans after they are emptied and more.


